Overstreet: No sanctions for defense

Subpoenas still unlikely in Wilson case, judge says

PANAMA CITY — A circuit judge presiding over the felony case against former Deputy Chief State Attorney Greg Wilson said he has yet to establish

cause to call Wilson's old boss as a witness and admonished his defense attorneys for attempting to circumvent the authority of the court in doing so.

Circuit Judge Michael Overstreet addressed the issue Tuesday during a motion hearing in the case. He recently issued an order to show cause why Wilson's

defense attorneys, Lisa Anderson and James Dowgul, should not face sanctions for issuing subpoenas to several constitutional officers — State Attorney Glenn Hess, Bay County Sheriff Tommy Ford and 1st Circuit State Attorney Bill Eddins — without first clearing it with the court.

After hearing explanations from the defense counsel, however, Overstreet said they

did not receive permission to pursue the depositions, but he did not think their actions were an intentional decision to violate the rules of the court.

"The concern I have is you issued subpoenas without prior authorization of the court," Overstreet said. "You noticed their depositions without prior authorization

6 recent fires spur idea for joint training, preparedness

PANAMA CITY BEACH — Residents and renters walking out of the 22-story Treasure Island condominium building on Tuesday were surprised to see fire trucks parked all over their property and firefighters running up the stairs with hoses.

They were relieved to learn it was no emergency, but the start of a first-of-its-kind, three-day joint high-rise response drill involving Bay County and Panama City Beach firefighters.

Firefighters repeatedly performed drills at the condo building at 5004 Thomas Drive, including mock victim searches and water pressure exercises. They ran up the stairs with tanks and equipment and rolled out lines that were hooked into fire trucks on the ground floor. Crews stationed on the sixth floor sprayed water from the hoses down to the pavement below.

Bay County Capt. Gabriel Moschella said he felt the drill was necessary after six high-rise fires on the beach in the past six months.

"We have decided that Bay County Fire and Panama City Beach would work together

since we do automatic aid together and train on high-rise fires," he said.

In the second drill Tuesday morning, winded firefighters ran up steps in the building

Community questions removal of Patterson principal

Husfelt: Change was in district's best interest

PANAMA CITY — Attendees at Tuesday's school board meeting spoke adamantly against Bay District Schools Superintendent Bill Husfelt's decision to shift powers at Oscar Patterson Elementary by appointing Crystal Sullivan McNeal as acting principal.

Patterson's former principal, Darnita Rivers, served in the position for three years, beginning in the 2015-16 school year. Her tenure covered a time Patterson faced turn-around status after receiving consecutive failing grades. In the 2018-19 school year, Rivers will resume service for Bay District Schools as assistant principal of Breakfast Point Elementary.

"She's been very professional about it," Husfelt said. "I can't say enough kind things about Mrs. Rivers. We moved, I believe, five different principals, and I moved every one because I think it's in the best interest of the school."

Multiple community members in attendance, however, voiced their displeasure with the superintendent's decision to shift Rivers away from Patterson, stating her new position was a clear demotion and an incongruent conclusion to Rivers' work for Patterson after the school received a C grade for this school year, which ended the school's turn-around status and endangerment of being closed.

"She does not need to be moved if she's brought that school up to a C from an F," said retired Bay District Schools teacher Mary Bruce, who also has served on the district's Citizens Oversight Committee since its inception.

However, Husfelt maintained the shift was nothing

Today is Wednesday, July 11, the 192nd day of 2018. There are 173 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On July 11, 1804, Vice President Aaron Burr mortally wounded former Treasury Secretary Alexander Hamilton during a pistol duel in Weehawken, New Jersey. (Hamilton died the next day.)

On this date:

In 1767, John Quincy Adams, the sixth president of the United States, was born in Braintree, Massachusetts. **In 1798,** the U.S. Marine Corps was formally re-established by a congressional act that also created the U.S. Marine Band. **In 1859,** Big Ben, the great bell inside the famous London clock tower, chimed for the first time.

In 1937, American composer and pianist George Gershwin died at a Los Angeles hospital of a brain tumor; he was 38.

In 1952, the Republican National Convention, meeting in Chicago, nominated Dwight D. Eisenhower for president and Richard M. Nixon for vice president.

In 1955, the U.S. Air Force Academy swore in its first class of cadets at its temporary quarters at Lowry Air Force Base in Colorado.

In 1960, the novel "To Kill a Mockingbird" by Harper Lee was first published by J.B. Lippincott and Co.


In 1972, the World Chess Championship opened as grandmasters Bobby Fischer of the United States and defending champion Boris Spassky of the Soviet Union began play in Reykjavik, Iceland. (Fischer won after 21 games.)

In 1977, the Presidential Medal of Freedom was presented to polio vaccine pioneer Dr. Jonas Salk and (posthumously) to the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. by President Jimmy Carter.

In 1979, the abandoned U.S. space station Skylab made a spectacular return to Earth, burning up in the atmosphere and showering debris over the Indian Ocean and Australia.

In 1991, a Nigeria Airways DC-8 carrying Muslim pilgrims crashed at the Jiddah, Saudi Arabia, international airport, killing all 261 people on board.

Immigrant children, parents reunited

SAN DIEGO — Lugging little backpacks, smiling immigrant children were scooped up into their parents' arms Tuesday as the Trump administration scrambled to meet a court-ordered deadline to reunite dozens of youngsters forcibly separated from their families at the border.

In Grand Rapids, Mich., two girls and a boy who had been in temporary foster care were reunited with their Honduran fathers at a U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement center about three months after they were split up.

The three fathers were "just holding them and hugging them and telling them that everything was fine and that they were never going to be separated again," said immigration lawyer Abril Valdes.

One of the fathers, Ever Reyes Mejia, walked out of the ICE center carrying his beaming son and the boy's Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles backpack. The boy was secured in a booster seat, and father and son were driven away. Lawyers said the fathers were too distraught to speak to the news media.

The Justice Department said more than 50 children under age 5 could be back in the arms of their parents by the deadline at the end of the

day.

It was the largest single effort to date to undo the effects of President Donald Trump's zero-tolerance policy of separating families who try to slip across the Mexican border into the U.S.

Authorities gave few details on where the reunions would be held, and many were expected to take place in private.

In Grand Rapids, the children were "absolutely thrilled to be with their parents again.

It's all confusing to them why there's so many people here and why there's so many strangers here, but they know that they're safe," Valdes said outside the ICE offices.

Government attorneys, meanwhile, told a federal judge in San Diego that the Trump administration would not meet the deadline for 20 other children under 5 because it needed more time to track down parents who have already been deported or released into the U.S.

Asked about the missed deadline, the president said: "Well, I have a solution. Tell people not to come to our country illegally. That's the solution."

American Civil Liberties Union attorney Lee Gelernt, whose organization filed the lawsuit that forced the administration's hand, said he was "both thrilled and disappointed" with the government's work on the deadline.

"Things have taken a real

step forward," Gelernt said.

The administration faces a second, bigger deadline — July 26 — to reunite perhaps 2,000 or so older children who were also separated from their families at the border in the past few months.

On Tuesday morning, staff members at a nonprofit organization that has been housing many of the youngest children "made sure every backpack was full and every child got a hug and a goodbye," Southwest Key CEO Juan Sanchez said.

Authorities said most of the parents would be released into the U.S. from immigration detention centers, and the children would be freed from government-contracted shelters and foster care. The adults may be required to wear ankle monitors while their cases wind through immigration court, a process that can take years.

Thousands of babies, toddlers and older children were separated from their parents at the border this spring before Trump reversed course on June 20 amid an international outcry over the images of youngsters in chain-link cages and audio recordings of children crying.

Late last month, U.S. District Judge Dana Sabraw in San Diego set a 14-day deadline to reunite children under 5 with their parents and a 30-day deadline for older children.

MADRID Judge strips Catalonia's ex-leaders of public office

Spain's Supreme Court is stripping six prominent Catalan politicians of public office for trying to make the north-eastern region of the country independent.

Judge Pablo Llarena also ruled Tuesday that the six secessionists be sent to trial on charges of rebellion, which carries a maximum prison sentence of 30 years.

Those charged include former Catalan President Carles Puigdemont, who is fighting extradition from Germany, and former regional Vice President Oriol Junqueras.

Llarena left it up to the Catalan regional parliament, where the rebellion defendants now are lawmakers, whether to replace them.

Llarena was tasked with investigating what took place in Catalonia in October, when Puigdemont's government disobeyed a court ban on holding a secession vote and the regional parliament unilaterally declared independence.

LONDON Condition of man hospitalized in poisoning improves

Hospital officials say they've seen an improvement in a man poisoned in a nerve agent attack in south-western England.

Salisbury Hospital says Tuesday that Charlie Rowley has experienced a "small but significant improvement" and is now conscious. The 45-year-old is in critical but stable condition.

The hospital says in a statement that "while this is welcome news, clearly we are not out of the woods yet. Charlie is still very unwell."

Rowley's partner, 44-year-old Dawn Sturgess, died after being exposed to Novichok, a military-grade nerve agent produced in the Soviet Union during the Cold War.

Police have said the working theory is that their exposure was linked to the earlier Novichok attack in March on ex-Russian spy Sergei Skripal and his daughter Yulia in the city of Salisbury.

BISMARCK, N.D. State sues Dakota Access over farmland ownership

North Dakota's attorney general is suing the developer of the Dakota Access oil pipeline over agricultural land the company owns in violation of a state law banning large corporations from owning farmland.

In a separate case, an American Indian activist accused of starting a riot on a portion of the land during protests last year wants to use the state's lawsuit in his defense.

Attorney General Wayne Stenehjem on July 3 filed a civil complaint in state district court against Dakota Access LLC, a company formed by Texas-based Energy Transfer Partners to build the \$3.8 billion pipeline to move North Dakota oil through South Dakota and Iowa to a shipping point in Illinois. The pipeline began operating a year ago.

Dakota Access in September 2016 bought about 6,000 acres from a ranch family in an area of southern North Dakota where thousands of pipeline opponents had gathered to protest.

MILWAUKEE Grand jury indicts 2 in multi-state textbook thefts

A federal grand jury in Milwaukee has indicted two Texas residents in connection with textbook thefts at colleges around the country.

Federal prosecutors said in a news release the grand jury indicted Ryan Lewis and Genesis Abellar, both of Houston, on Tuesday on charges of conspiracy to transport stolen goods and interstate transportation of stolen property.

Prosecutors said the two stole textbooks from instructors' offices at several University of Wisconsin System schools and shipped the textbooks to a Texas business, which sold them to college students.

They said the two also carried out the same scheme at colleges in Minnesota, North Dakota, Arizona, New Mexico and Washington state.

Online court records didn't list the indictment or attorneys for either man as of Tuesday afternoon.

OKLAHOMA CITY DNA evidence helps free man convicted of rape

An Oklahoma man who spent more than 30 years in prison for rape in south-eastern Oklahoma is free after the Innocence Project presented DNA evidence it said excluded him from the crime.

Court records show 56-year-old Perry Lott was released Monday.

Lott was sentenced in 1988 to more than 200 years for rape, robbery, burglary and making a bomb threat related to the 1987 attack on a woman at her home in Ada, about 65 miles southeast of Oklahoma City.

Pontotoc County District Attorney Paul Smith declined to vacate the convictions, but offered to modify the sentence to time served.

Smith said the victim identified Lott, but that there could be no DNA match because the attacker wore a condom and gloves.

Kavanaugh begins confirmation battle

WASHINGTON — Conservative Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh plunged into his confirmation battle Tuesday, meeting face-to-face with Senate leaders in what promises to be an intense debate over abortion rights, presidential power and other legal disputes that could reshape the court and roil this fall's elections.

Kavanaugh is a favorite of the GOP legal establishment, and his arrival as President Donald Trump's nominee was greeted on Capitol Hill with praise

from Republicans and skepticism from Democrats. There were also pledges of open minds by key senators whose votes will most likely determine the outcome.

Majority Leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky called Kavanaugh "one of the most thoughtful jurists" in the country but warned of an onslaught of "fear mongering" from liberal groups trying to derail the nomination. He said it was clear that many Democrats "didn't care who the nominee was at all. Whoever President Trump put up they were opposed to." Chuck Schumer, the

Senate's Democratic leader, said his party's lawmakers did indeed care who the nominee was — and what his views were on such thorny issues as abortion and Trump himself.

Trump "did exactly what he said he would do on the campaign trail — nominate someone who will overturn women's reproductive rights," the New York senator said.

He also argued that the president chose the man he thought would best protect him from the investigation by special counsel Robert Mueller into Russian interference in the 2016 election.



Attacks on NATO raise questions about its future

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump's repeated tongue lashings of NATO allies and his friendly overtures to Russian President Vladimir Putin are stirring questions at home and abroad about Trump's commitment to an Atlantic alliance that has been a pillar of U.S. security policy for more than half a century.

Might a reordering, or even a reduction, of U.S. forces in Europe be in the cards? Clues may come when Trump gathers Wednesday with NATO leaders in Brussels. The official agenda includes a plan for increasing the number of land, air and sea forces capable of reacting quickly in a European crisis, but overshadowing it are tensions generated by Trump's view that the Europeans are slackers leaning unfairly on the U.S. military.

At the risk of deepening the rift with traditional allies, Trump will then hold a summit in Finland with Putin. On his departure from Washington on Tuesday, the president remarked that he "can't say right now" if Putin is a friend or foe, but he predicted that his first summit with the Russian leader "may be the easiest" of all his meetings in Europe.

Such comments have stirred unease not just in Europe, but in Washington. A bipartisan resolution, set to be endorsed by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on Tuesday,

pointedly voices support for NATO as strategically important for the collective security of the trans-Atlantic region.

"Although the Atlantic alliance has weathered many crises over its lifetime, I now am concerned that the alliance will not survive Donald Trump," said Elizabeth Sherwood-Randall, who served as senior director for European affairs on the National Security Council during President Barack Obama's first term.

"Because he isn't arguing with allies about policy. He's questioning the fundamental value of NATO to the United States. This antagonistic approach is generating an unprecedented debate in Europe and in Canada about whether the United States should be treated as friend or foe," she said.

The demise of the Soviet Union in 1991 prompted a partial drawdown of U.S. forces from Europe, but every administration since then has concluded that keeping a U.S. military presence there was important for wider U.S. security, political and economic interests, and as a sign of solidarity with Europe. NATO has been a key part of the long U.S. military involvement in Afghanistan, for example, and it is expected to agree this week to take a bigger training role in Iraq.

Trump, who has also questioned the U.S. military presence in Asia, is challenging those assumptions. That has been most plain in his antagonistic approach to Germany, the main host of U.S. forces in Europe. He

has criticized the Germans for not spending enough on their own defense and has castigated the country for what he calls an overly liberal immigration policy. He also has placed Germany at the center of his complaints about a U.S.-European trade imbalance.

Derek Chollet, executive vice president of the German Marshall Fund of the United States, a think tank, says there is a clear connection between Trump's criticism of German defense spending and reports that the Pentagon has undertaken a review of the cost of keeping troops in Europe.

"You cannot read this any other way" than looking at whether a U.S. troop reduction "is a feasible option for punishing them for their apparent lack of will," said Chollet, who was the Pentagon's assistant secretary for international security affairs during Obama's second term.

He questions whether Trump fully understands the global significance of the U.S. military presence in Germany, including its hosting of the headquarters of U.S. Africa Command, which leads U.S. counterterrorism efforts in North Africa. Stuttgart also is headquarters for U.S. European Command. Among many other facilities, Germany hosts a U.S. military hospital at Landstuhl, the largest American hospital outside the United States.

In addition, NATO has proposed creating a new command in Germany to improve the way the

alliance would move troops and equipment in a military crisis. Kay Bailey Hutchison, the U.S. ambassador to NATO,

told reporters this plan will be approved at the Brussels summit.

Notwithstanding Trump's grumbles about

America shouldering the defense burden of Europe, his administration plans to boost spending to support it.

of the court, and you should have done so. ... In the future, it would be prudent for you and any other officer of the court to obtain court authorization to notice and subpoena Category B witnesses."

Overstreet did not rule out allowing subpoenas to be issued to the three men. He added, though, that he did not think it would be likely because Wilson's defense team had yet to establish firm legal ground.

"If you're contending today that there is some kind of discriminatory prosecution taking place, and that's the end game of your defense, then you need to set forth a basis for that," Overstreet said. "... As of now, those witnesses are not material to your defense. They simply aren't."

Before hearing Overstreet's decision, Anderson attempted to show the court that unfortunate timing between filings in the court and scheduled court hearings gave the appearance they were circumventing the court. She presented email exchanges to illustrate that the defense team had intended to confer with Overstreet.

"We had not had time to seek leave of the court," Anderson said. "It was our intention as defense counsel... to bring the matter up at pretrial. Due to ... how quickly things occurred, we lost that opportunity to bring it before the court."

However, Overstreet pointed out, the subpoenas had been issued before the court hearing referenced by Anderson would have taken place as scheduled.

One of the developments Anderson cited was a filing to suppress the subpoenas from prosecutor Jack Campbell, claiming that as constitutional officers, Hess, Ford and Eddins are generally exempt from testifying in these cases. Campbell reiterated the point that taking the testimonies was outside the scope of the criminal allegations against Wilson.

"Going and asking who they asked advice from is completely beyond the scope of discovery and it is a fishing expedition," Campbell told the court. "... There has been no evidence or even an assertion that they were witnesses to any criminal activity. Their personal conclusions as to the admissibility of evidence have no bearing."

Anderson laid out the case that she sought the depositions because Hess had been contacted by the Bay County Sheriff's

Office to review phone recordings between an inmate and her attorney, determined to be Wilson. Wilson previously worked as Hess' No. 2 prosecutor before resigning for an unsuccessful run against his former boss in 2016.

Hess had advised Ford to gather additional information on Wilson, specifically instructing BCSO to place video cameras in the attorney/client interview to "surreptitiously" monitor their meetings. It was through these recordings that investigators obtained video evidence of Wilson acting as a go-between for two inmates passing notes in jail — a felony.

Wilson not only ran against Hess in the last election but had plans to do so again. The rivalry created an inherent conflict of interest between Hess and Wilson, Anderson stated, and Hess should have recused himself earlier from any involvement in the case, instead of taking what she called an active role in the investigation.

Anderson told the court that whether or not they are able to subpoena the officers, the defense intends to challenge the constitutionality of video cameras in the attorney/client interview room.

A tentative trial date has been scheduled for Aug. 20.

personal.

McNeal, who previously served as vice principal of C.C. Washington Academy, will be tasked with rebuilding Patterson's staff before the school year begins. The school faced losing many teachers when Patterson's future was unclear and still has about 15 teacher vacancies needing to be filled before school is back in session.

"My goal is to get us to be an A district, and the only way you're going to do that is to continue to improve,

and you can't improve unless you change," Husfelt said. "I believe the changes we made are going to help us improve overall, district-wide."

In addition to Patterson, schools within the district receiving new principals for the upcoming school year include Cedar Grove, Springfield, Lucille Moore and Oakland Terrace.

This year, Bay District Schools as a whole was only three points shy of A status.

that were wet from hoses dripping above.

"Our inspector has bypassed the system, and we are using standpipes and fire department connections to get water to the sixth floor," Moschella said.

Firefighters learned ways to improve from each drill, he said.

"They were a little bit short on fire hose, so that's something that that crew is going to work on, and they are going to be better next time," he said.

Moschella said the repetitive drills are designed to make the high-rise response like second nature.

"We want everything to be muscle memory, so that at 2 o'clock in the morning we don't have to think about what we're doing," he said.

Moschella said it's not just lives at stake, but property too.

"We can always improve," he said. "We don't want to leave anything on the table for flaws or mistakes, especially when it comes to

lives. This is where they live, so (preserving units) is important to us. If this unit shuts down, they can't rent it out. Insurance companies just don't pay out immediately."

Mark Register, the treasurer of the Treasure Island Condominium Association, said as a courtesy, the association has allowed county firefighters to regularly use the building's steps for physical fitness training.

"Our Thomas Drive guys use our stairwells to get in shape," he said. "They run in full gear up and down the steps."

He said residents understand the need for the training exercise.

"I'm not going to say (the training) is not a slight inconvenience, but that's all it would be, and it's more than a small price to pay for what we get," he said.

Children at Treasure Island, on the other hand, were entertained by the action and even got to help spray the hoses a few times.

Bill Bailey, who is renting out a unit in the building, said his wife initially didn't know what was happening Tuesday morning when she saw the fire trucks.

But he said he supports the training exercise.

"It's way better to be prepared," he said.

WASHINGTON US workers' willingness to quit hits 17-year high

The proportion of American workers that quit their jobs in May reached the highest level in 17 years, a sign that more people are confident they can find a new job, likely at higher pay.

Businesses also advertised fewer jobs in May than the previous month, but the tally of open positions outnumbered the ranks of the unemployed for only the second time in the past two decades, the Labor Department said Tuesday.

The figures reflect a strong job market driven by optimistic employers seeking to expand their workforces. Last week's jobs report showed that businesses hired workers at a healthy pace and the unemployment rate remained very low, at 4 percent.

Inspections close 5 restaurants in June

Reports cite roach activity, improper storage, 'unsanitary conditions'

PANAMA CITY — Live roaches, improperly stored raw meat and potentially hazardous buffet chicken caused health inspectors to temporarily issue emergency closures for five area businesses last month, according to official reports.

In June, the Florida Department of Business and Professional Regulations (DBPR) issued emergency closures to Burger King, 3218 E. U.S. Business 98 in Panama City; Dat Cajun Place Café, 8501 Thomas Drive in Panama City Beach; Pho Express Vietnamese Bistro, 8776 Thomas Drive #5 in Panama City Beach; Graceville Bingo, 5361 Cotton St. in Graceville; and King House Tian Feng Inc, 20118 Central Ave., Suite 3 in Blountstown.

Sanitation and safety specialists reported finding conditions that could contribute directly to a food-borne illness or injury at the time of their respective inspections. All of the businesses have corrected the issues and were allowed to reopen during followup inspections, DBPR reports indicate.

DBPR specifies their inspection reports are snapshots of a business at that time only. Many of the closures were the first of their kind for the businesses and all remain open, according to DBPR reports, though an active state license for the Burger King did not appear in state records.

The majority of closures were clustered around mid-month.

In the first closure of the month, investigators reported arriving about



5:30 p.m. June 11 at Pho Express to discover two live flying insects near the cook line, raw pork stored above soup in a reach-in cooler and roach activity around a cooler.

Inspectors "observed two live roaches between wall and make cooler," DBPR reports stated. "Observed one live roach crawl on top of make cooler. Observed two live roaches crawling out of wall by make cooler."

A person identifying herself as the owner of Pho Express, who declined to give a name, denied that DBPR ever visited the business. She also claimed Pho Express had not been issued an emergency closure.

Inspectors reported arriving the next day at 5:30 p.m. and allowing the restaurant to reopen after correcting the issues. The closure appears to be the first of its kind since being licensed in March 2016, DBPR reports indicate.

The day that one inspector was allowing Pho Express to reopen, another was in Jackson County inspecting Graceville Bingo. That officer reported about 6 p.m. June 12, the business was operating with an expired license, had raw eggs stored over iced tea in a refrigerator, was missing a vacuum breaker at a mop sink faucet and showed signs of roach activity, DBPR reported.

"Roach activity present as evidenced by live roaches found," officers wrote. "Found seven live roaches in cabinets at front counter

and three live roaches in drawers at front counter. Two live roaches in cabinets near stove and one live roach by freezer."

Multiple attempts to contact the proprietors of Graceville Bingo were unsuccessful.

Graceville Bingo had been closed only a couple weeks earlier on May 24, when investigators found roach activity under a microwave, in a utensils drawer by a microwave, on a shelf across from the stove and on a coffee maker, officials reported.

However, the business was allowed to reopen the day after both emergency closures once the issues were corrected. Before the two closures in two months, the business had gone without an issue since being licensed in August 2015.

On June 14, inspectors arrived about noon to the Burger King on U.S. Business 98 in Springfield. Details from the inspection were unavailable, with DBPR officials only reporting that the closure was because of "unsanitary conditions." However, the restaurant met inspection about 9:30 a.m. the next morning and was allowed to reopen.

Attempts to reach out to the business for comment went unanswered.

On June 18, inspectors arrived about 4 p.m. at Dat Cajun Place to find evidence of roach activity. Officials reported seeing 26 live roaches around a

grease trap under the dish machine.

Trudy White, owner of Dat Cajun Place, said a pest control company comes to the restaurant twice a month. She said the bugs were contained to that one area, indicating they came in on an outside item.

"We had some boxes stored there," White said. "That's all I can think of how they would get in."

White said the incident was the first of its kind, which DBPR reports confirmed. The business corrected the issue and was allowed to reopen at 9 a.m. the following day.

On June 19, inspectors arrived in Calhoun County to the King House about 4:30 p.m. to find insect, food storage and other issues. DBPR reported finding six flying insects in the food preparation area of the kitchen, a total of 10 live roaches, medication stored above the cook line and skewered chicken on the buffet being kept at improper temperatures. Inspectors ordered the business to throw away the chicken, DBPR reported.

"Stop Sale issued on potentially hazardous (time/temperature control for safety) food due to temperature abuse," officials wrote. "Chicken skewers 107°F, bourbon chicken 104°F, on buffet."

Attempts to contact the restaurant for comment were unsuccessful.

When inspectors arrived the next day, though, they found similar conditions in regard to the flying insects and live roaches in the kitchen, and the restaurant was not immediately allowed to reopen. During another followup inspection at 5 p.m. June 21, King House passed all safety inspections and reopened, inspectors reported.

The issues were the first of their kind.

Added to the temporary restaurant closures issued by DBPR from earlier in 2018 in the central Panhandle, June's five closures bring the total to 18 this year.

Unemployment declines but wage growth stalls

In spite of low unemployment and a consensus that an economic recovery has taken place, wage growth continues to stall. If the economy is good, where are the high-paying jobs which can support a family?

Unemployment is at its lowest level in 17 years and is likely to remain below 4 percent for the foreseeable future. Wage growth often has been a byproduct of tight labor markets: employers have to pay more to get good employees, or for that matter,

any employees, because there is such competition for labor. But while wages have grown at more than 3 percent per year since 2015, the rate of growth has stalled significantly. Wage growth was at its lowest level since the Great Recession (under 2 percent) in 2010, and has increased somewhat since then, but remains far below the 5 percent growth level achieved by the economy in 2000.

The Federal Reserve is raising interest rates periodically this year based partly on these low unemployment numbers. Simply stated, wage growth traditionally has accompanied low unemployment, and raising interest rates is a hedge against inflation.

So why aren't paychecks getting considerably larger? Let's consider two aspects of our current economy: an aging populace and hyper-globalization.

A large number of potential employees out there are growing older. But many business owners and

employers are hesitant to hire and pay large salaries to older workers. We have shorter runways than our millennial peers. The median age in the U.S. is now older than 38, more than a year older than it was only four years ago. The alternative, of course, is to hire to a younger person, a person with less experience but who might be willing to work for less. So unemployment remains low, but actual wage growth is stymied.

Secondly, international business competition is exerting forces on our economy that we haven't experienced since the late 1800s. When a foreign company makes a competitive product, while paying its workers far less than U.S. workers are paid, it's difficult for American businesses to compete on price. So business owners save money by paying employees less and then pass those savings on to consumers in order to remain competitive in the

international marketplace.

There always has been international business competition, but increasing hyper-globalization is creating a larger impact on our economy, and on the level of our wages, than at any time in American history. There's just no way around it.

It's complicated and confounding. The economy continues to improve; wages remain relatively flat.

Don't let nonprofits hide political donations

Once upon a time, liberals and conservatives, Democrats and Republicans, incumbents and challengers disagreed over the value of limits on campaign funding and spending, but they agreed (publicly, at least) on the need for attribution and accountability.

There was broad-based agreement that the names of individuals and, later, corporations and unions should be clearly stated and open to the public — whether they had made contributions directly to candidates or were making “independent expenditures” linked to “electioneering communication.”

The erosion of that consensus was accelerated by a 2010 U.S. Supreme Court decision, *Citizens United vs. Federal Election Commission*. The ruling found that the First Amendment prevents the government from restricting independent expenditures by nonprofit and for-profit corporations, labor unions and associations.

The *Citizens United* case has had many impacts, one of the most significant of which is a dramatic expansion of nonprofit organizations seeking tax-exempt status under Section 501(c)(4) of the U.S. tax code.

So-called 501(c)(4) organizations are, according to the tax codes, supposed to be “primarily engaged” in promoting “the common good and general welfare of the community.” Involvement in political campaigns is not banned, but it is not supposed to be the “primary purpose” of a tax-exempt group.

Yet, as we have written previously, many 501(c)(4) groups, including some of the largest and richest, have been overtly political or closely tied to so-called super Political Action Committees that raise funds to directly influence elections.

Although contributions to the organizations are not tax deductible, they are appealing to many donors and those groups for a simple reason: Disclosure of the contributors' identities is not required.

There are two problems, then:

- It is virtually impossible for the Internal Revenue Service to thoroughly, accurately and fairly assess whether 501(c)(4) organizations are meeting the requirements for their nonprofit status.
- Disclosure of donors' identities should be required when the organizations clearly advocate for specific candidates, whether or not there is direct link to the candidates' campaigns. After all, the organizations enjoy tax-exempt status; reporting should be required in exchange.

We were reminded of the role of 501(c)(4) organizations by a column in the *Sarasota Herald-Tribune* from Zac Anderson. He described that one such organization, Floridians for a Fair Shake, recently spent \$603,718 on an attack ad criticizing U.S. Rep. Vern Buchanan's support for the GOP tax bill.

That spending, while significant, pales in comparison to the campaign funds that Buchanan — a Republican from Longboat Key — has on hand and his ability to tap his personal wealth.

Right-leaning groups will aid Buchanan if his general election campaign is right: The practice is bipartisan, unfortunately.

Worse, the use of organizations that are exempt from naming donors has spread not only to federal and state races but to local campaigns as well — further eroding the belief that openness and disclosure are key components of elections in a representative democracy.


earned working at a job.

Rescue of Thai soccer team complete

MAE SAI, Thailand — “Everyone is safe.” With those three words posted on Facebook the daring rescue mission to extricate 12 boys and their soccer coach from the treacherous confines of a flooded cave in Thailand came to a close on Tuesday — a grueling 18-day ordeal that claimed the life of an experienced diver and riveted people worldwide.

Thailand’s Navy SEALs, who were central to the rescue effort, celebrated the feat with a post that read: “All the thirteen Wild Boars are now out of the cave,” — a reference to the boys’ soccer team. “We are not sure if this is a miracle, a science, or what.”

Eight of the boys were rescued by a team of Thai and international divers on Sunday and Monday. On Tuesday, the final four boys were brought out, along with their coach. Their rescue was followed a few hours later by the safe return of a medic and three SEAL divers who had stayed for days with the boys in their cramped refuge in the cave.

Cheers erupted from the dozens of volunteers and journalists awaiting news of whether the intricate and high-risk rescue mission had succeeded. Helicopters transporting the boys roared overhead. People on the street cheered and clapped when ambulances ferrying them on the last leg of their

journey from the cave arrived at a hospital in Chiang Rai city.

Their joy and relief was echoed around the globe by the multitude of people who had watched the long ordeal in widely broadcast newscasts.

Payap Maiming, who helped provide food and necessities to rescue workers and journalists, noted that fact.

“I’m happy for Thais all over the country,” he said. “And actually just everyone in the world because every news channel has presented this story and this is what we have been waiting for.”

“It’s really a miracle,” Payap said. “It’s hope and faith that has brought us this success.”

Amporn Sriwichai, an aunt of rescued coach Ekkapol Chantawong, was ecstatic. “If I see him, I just want to hug him and tell him that I missed him very much,” she said.

The plight of the boys and their coach

captivated much of the world — from the heart-sinking news that they were missing, to the first flickering video of the huddle of anxious yet smiling boys when they were found by a pair of British divers 10 days later. They were trapped in the sprawling Tham Luang cave in northern Thailand on June 23, when it became flooded by monsoon rains as they were exploring it after soccer practice.

Each of the boys, ages 11 to 16 and with no diving experience, was guided out by a pair of divers in the three-day high-stakes operation. The route, in some places just a crawl space, had oxygen canisters positioned at regular intervals to refresh each team’s air supply.

Highlighting the dangers, a former Thai Navy SEAL died Friday while replenishing the canisters.

Cave-diving experts had warned it was

potentially too risky to dive the youngsters out.

But Thai officials, acutely aware that the boys could be trapped for months by monsoon rains that would swell waters in the cave system, seized a window of opportunity provided by relatively mild weather. A massive water pumping effort also made the winding cave more navigable. The confidence of the diving team, and expertise specific to the cave, grew after its first successful mission Sunday.

“We did something nobody thought possible,” Chiang Rai province acting Gov. Narongsak Osatanakorn, leader of the rescue effort, said at a celebratory news conference.

Thai Prime Minister Prayuth Chan-ocha, speaking Tuesday before the final rescue was completed, said the boys were given an anti-anxiety medication to help with their perilous removal from the cave.

Asked at a news conference in Bangkok if the boys had been sedated, Prayuth said: “Who would chloroform them? If they’re chloroformed, how could they come out? It’s called anxiolytic, something to make them not excited, not stressed.”

Prayuth said the Tham Luang cave would be closed for some time to make it safe for visitors.

The eight boys brought out by divers on Sunday and Monday were doing well and were in good spirits, a senior health official said. They were given a treat on Tuesday: bread with chocolate

spread that they had requested.

Jedsada Chokdumrongsuk, permanent secretary at the Public Health Ministry, said the first four boys rescued were now able to eat normal food, though they couldn’t yet take the spicy dishes favored by many Thais.

Two of the boys possibly have a lung infection but all eight are generally “healthy and smiling,” he said.

“The kids are footballers, so they have high immune systems,” Jedsada told a news conference. “Everyone is in high spirits and is happy to get out. But we will have a psychiatrist evaluate them.”

It could be at least a week before they can be released from the hospital, he said.

For now the boys were

being kept in isolation to try to keep them safe from infections by outsiders. But family members have seen at least some of the boys from behind a glass barrier.

It was clear doctors were taking a cautious approach. Jedsada said they were uncertain what type of infections the boys could face “because we have never experienced this kind of issue from a deep cave.”

If medical tests show no dangers after another two days, parents will be able to enter the isolation area dressed in sterilized clothing, staying two meters (yards) away from the boys, said another public health official, Tosthep Bunthong.

John Tangkitcharoen-thawon, a local village chairman, was bursting with happiness over the successful rescue.



Pace trial restarts after mistrial

Man charged with sexual battery of teen boy

PANAMA CITY — For the second time, the case of a Bay County man arrested after a naked and distraught teen was seen fleeing his house is going before a jury.

Andrew Allan Pace, 65, appeared in court Tuesday for the first day of testimony in his second trial. He was arrested May 20, 2016, after Bay County Sheriff's Office

deputies arrived at Delwood Pointe to reports that a 16-year-old boy had been drugged, tied up and raped in a home of the affluent neighborhood. Pace faces charges of sexual battery, unlawful sexual acts with a minor and false imprisonment.

A previous attempt to try Pace on the charges ended in a mistrial last month after jury deliberations deteriorated to the point that a juror abruptly asked to leave out of fear for her safety. What transpired in deliberations was left unclear, but the outcome gave Pace a chance at another trial.

Prosecutor Jennifer

Hawkins opened her case Tuesday by telling jurors that Pace had been pursuing the teen for about a year to instill hopes of a modeling career. Pace had been a recruiter for Marsha Doll Models, a Tallahassee-based modeling agency. In May 2016, the teen agreed to meet Pace to start a modeling portfolio.

The teen "thought he'd found a friend, a confidant," Hawkins told the jury. "What he found instead — what he walked into — was a nightmare when (Pace) drugged him, tied him up and raped him."


Hawkins again laid out the

case that Pace and the minor planned to meet for lunch, then go back to Pace's home, where they would take measurements for the modeling agency and drink alcohol. At one point, though, the teen accepted a shot of alcohol from Pace and began to black out, Hawkins said.

"He ends up in (Pace's) bedroom — how or why he doesn't understand," she told the jury. "Then he comes to naked, tied to that man's bed. His hands and legs bound with (Pace) raping him."

Pace's defense attorney,

Puppy locked in trunk still at Animal Control

Owners released on bail; dog not available for adoption

PANAMA CITY — Her owners have been released on bail, but the puppy rescued by Panama City police after being locked in the trunk of a car July 1 is still in the care of Bay County Animal Control.

Maurice Sanders, 30, and Keshanna Thompson, 30, both of Canton, Mississippi, were arrested earlier this month after reportedly locking the puppy in the trunk of their rental car while they went shopping at the Panama City Mall. Officers had to

break a window and crawl through the rear seat to get to the puppy, who was in a kennel "obviously too small," they wrote in their report. When confronted about the puppy in the trunk, Sanders reportedly smiled about it as he explained to officers he didn't want to puppy to make a mess in the car while they were in the mall shopping.

The puppy was taken to a vet, where it was running a fever because of the heat, and then taken to Animal Control as the owners were taken to jail. The puppy is not yet up for adoption.

Sanders and Thompson have been charged with aggravated animal cruelty, a felony, and both have filed affidavits of insolvency,

though neither has yet hired an attorney.

According to Valerie Sale, public information officer for the county, the puppy will remain with Animal Control for the duration of the police investigation and criminal case should the case proceed in court, though there are a few different ways the case could play out.

As the case moves forward, the owners could forfeit the animal and sign over ownership of the dog to Animal Control.

"At that point, we would be able to adopt it out after it's been spayed," Sale said.

If the owners don't sign over the puppy and the case



Teachers 'blown away' by community's support


PANAMA CITY — When Oscar Patterson Elementary School math coach Tanja Roulhac set about raising money to buy T-shirts for students and staff to celebrate their turnaround from an F to a C school this year, she thought she would have to nickel and dime her way to the \$1,700 she needed.

Then she got a call from Allan Bense. Moved by her story of students surmounting the odds stacked against them, Bense, a former Florida House speaker and president of GAC Contractors, presented Roulhac with a check covering the amount needed, plus enough for 50 extra shirts and a more intricate design.

"I was just blown away," Roulhac said. "Blown away at the generosity."

All year, Roulhac and her fellow teachers watched their students continue to show up and perform despite tumultuous home lives and poverty, and with school closure looming. So the donation was a resounding answer to a question they all had been asking — whether anyone in the community actually cared about the students at Patterson and what they're going through.

"It was like being on the Oprah show and Oprah saying you're getting a new car," she said. "They're going to be so thrilled, and I can't wait."

Beyond Bense, Roulhac said that through this fundraiser and through posts on social media, she has found a whole community of people who want to step up and help Patterson's students, not just with the shirts, but with other needs as well. Many times during the school year, Roulhac said they need new school uniform shirts, and she has met donors who were willing to step in and help provide uniforms as needed.

"It's not a one-hit wonder and be out of the scene, they want to be a part of the school, and that's what we need," she said. "This is just the beginning. I thought it was an ending to a journey, but it's not. It's really a beginning."

Roulhac said teachers and staff still are working out when they will give out the shirts, but once they're dispensed, they will be taking a group photo to send to all the donors.

Day might be coming for Category 6 hurricane

FORT LAUDERDALE — As a ferocious hurricane bears down on South Florida, water managers desperately lower canals in anticipation of 4 feet of rain.

Everyone east of Dixie Highway is ordered evacuated, for fear of a menacing storm surge. Forecasters debate whether the storm will generate the 200 mph winds to achieve Category 6 status.

That is one scenario for hurricanes in a warmer world, a subject of fiendish complexity and considerable scientific research.

Some changes — such as the slowing of hurricanes' forward motion and the worsening of storm surges from rising sea levels — are happening now. Other effects, such as their increase in strength, already might have begun but are difficult to detect, considering all of the other climate forces at work.

But more certainty has developed during the past few years. Among the conclusions: Hurricanes will be wetter. They are likely to move slower, lingering over whatever area they hit. And although there is debate over whether there will be more or fewer of them, most researchers think hurricanes will be stronger.

"There's almost unanimous agreement that hurricanes will produce more rain in a warmer climate," said Adam Sobel, professor of applied physics at Columbia University and director of its Initiative on Extreme Weather and Climate. "There's agreement there will be increased coastal flood risk,

at a minimum because of sea-level rise. Most people believe that hurricanes will get, on average, stronger. There's more debate about whether we can detect that already."

No one knows how strong they could get, as they're fueled by warmer ocean water. Timothy Hall, senior scientist at the NASA Goddard Institute for Space Studies, said top wind speeds of up to 230 mph could occur by the end of the century, if current global warming trends continue. That would be the strength of an F-4 tornado, which can pick up cars and throw them through the air (although tornadoes, because of their rapid changes of wind direction, are considered more destructive).

Does that mean the current five-category hurricane scale should be expanded to include a Category 6, or even Category 7?

The Saffir-Simpson hurricane wind scale, developed in the early 1970s, ranks hurricanes from Category 1, which

means winds of 74-95 mph, to Category 5, which covers winds of 157 mph or more.

Since each category covers a range of wind speeds, it would appear that once wind speed reaches 190 or 200 mph, the pattern could call for another category. Last season saw two Category 5 hurricanes, Irma and Maria, with Irma reaching 180 mph. And in 2015, off Mexico's Pacific coast, Hurricane Patricia achieved a freakish sustained wind speed of 215 mph.

"If we had twice as many Category 5s — at some point, several decades down the line — if that seems to be the new norm, then yes, we'd want to have more partitioning at the upper part of the scale," Hall said. "At that point, a Category 6 would be a reasonable thing to do."

Many scientists and forecasters aren't particularly interested in categories anyway, since they indicate only wind speed, not the other dangers posed by hurricanes.

holders need to secure entertainment and begin their planning and budgets for the 2019 event season," said Catie Feeney, Visit Panama City Beach public relations manager. "It is important for them to know what amount of funding will be available to them from the TDC."

Funding for the budget comes from the tourist development tax, or bed tax, a 5 percent tax on transient rentals that can be used for beach maintenance, public safety and tourism promotion.

Officials budgeted \$910,000 for festivals and events; \$125,000 for equipment purchases for events; \$1.378 million for the sponsorship of events held in the city; \$12,000 to attend conferences related to events; and \$30,000 for unanticipated expenses.

That means a \$100,000

drop in festival and event funding compared to 2018, but an increase in event sponsorship. The TDC puts on some of its own events, such as Mardi Gras and Beach Home for the Holidays, and sponsors others. Oktoberfest, Gulf Coast Jam, the Food Truck Festival and the Beach's Summer Concert Series are among sponsorships listed in the 2019 budget.

Board member Philip Griffiths said in addition to bringing in tourists and dollars, some of the events also help market Panama City Beach to audiences

officials can't reach.

"We see the success of some of these events," he said. "We can't buy that type of advertising."

Events the TDC hosts or sponsors, such as Thunder Beach and the Seabreeze Jazz Festival, pull in thousands of people to Panama City Beach. Recently, SandJam — the newest event with which the TDC is involved — brought more than 20,000 people from 29 states and four countries to the Beach, according to event organizers.

"We've done a great job filling in the calendar with a diversity of events," said Richard Sanders, Visit Panama City Beach's vice president of sports marketing and special events.

The approved funding for the special events budget now will be sent to the Bay County Commission for approval, with the TDC's total fiscal 2019 budget expected in October.

If the owners are convicted, Sale said the puppy would be given to Animal Control, as there usually is a stipulation in an animal cruelty charge that would prevent those convicted from owning animals.

If the charges are dropped, the puppy could go back to the owners. However, Sale said there is a mechanism the county can pursue to have the owners deemed "unfit," which would involve petitioning a judge for a ruling. Sale did not say whether the county would pursue that avenue as the case moves forward.

Sale said the county has had "a lot" of people call about the puppy in the week it's been with Animal Control, but with the ongoing court case, the county cannot put together a wait list for potential adoption.

Stanley Peacock, agreed the plan had been to drink alcohol and take measurements to help the minor pursue a modeling career. However, Peacock argued that the teen had an economic motive to frame the financially well-off Pace.

"This case involves a young man taking social and economic advantage of an old man," Peacock told the jury. "This young man wanted to be a model, to make money. That is the motivation here. That's what led to all this."

Peacock also noted blood tests taken from the teen showed he had high levels of alcohol, cannabis and benzodiazepine in his system.

BCSO reported that about 7:30 p.m. May 20, 2016, neighbors in

Delwood Point stood in shock as the naked and distraught teen fled Pace's front door. Rebecca Kildow, one of Pace's neighbors, was walking back from the community mailbox with a friend that night. As the two spoke, they could see a naked and "hysterical" teenager running from the front door of Pace's neighboring house.

"He was crying and begging us for help, crouched over and covering his privates," Kildow said during Tuesday's testimony. "He was so afraid the guy in the white would get him again. He wanted us to hide him."

After BCSO arrived, officers went to Pace's house and knocked on the door to retrieve the teen's clothes. Pace didn't immediately answer. But when he did, officers recalled, he, too, was naked.

Pace denied knowing the teen at first, but

eventually allowed officers to come in to get his clothes. Inside Pace's master bedroom, BCSO discovered the teen's clothes on the ground and various ligatures tied to the bedposts, officers reported.

One of the key pieces of evidence the prosecution will be relying on is the victim's DNA. Moments after arriving at Pace's home, investigators took swabs from Pace's body, which later came back testing positive for large amounts of the teen's DNA.

Peacock countered that Pace had been measuring the minor before going to the bathroom. That was how he got DNA on himself, Peacock said. He encouraged the jury to use "common sense" to determine whether the combination of the victim's drive to become rich and the substances in his system better explained his actions that day.

time set for when all the shelters will go up, but the county tries to erect four to seven shelters per year.


Hobbs said Royal American's partnership was welcome as another way to fund the sheltered stops.

"The public transit service does not generate enough revenue to sustain itself. Public partnerships and grants are ways we fund things," he said. "By them partnering with us, we're able to buy more shelters than we anticipated."

Royal American officials reached out to county officials about the public-private partnership in 2017.

"Royal American recognized a need in the community for shelters at the trolley stops and realized it was the perfect opportunity for a public-private partnership with Bay County," Ausley said. "That partnership is making bus shelters available to people who depend on the Bay Town Trolley for their transportation needs."

Recently, trolley officials also partnered with the Eye Center of North Florida to install a landing pad, bench and

trash receptacle for Eye Center patients who use the transit services.

"We are working really hard to ensure all of our bus stops are ADA-compliant and provide our riders with every possible amenity," Hobbs said. "The Bay County TPO (Transportation Planning Organization) has approved a new shelter design that we will be different from the ones we have used in the past. We are currently trying to obtain the best pricing for the new shelters."

In addition, the trolley system is working to combat reports of loitering and other incidents at the transit shelters through signage. New signage

is being created, telling people the trolley's hours of operations and warning that use of the shelters outside those hours is criminal trespassing.

Loitering at transit shelters also has been a topic of concern for officials in Panama City Beach. At a June council meeting, Beach officials passed the first reading of a law that would prohibit loitering, camping and prowling near transit shelters.

At the time, Panama City Beach Police Chief Drew Whitman said officials have experienced issues with people loitering, camping and hanging out near shelters on the east side of the city.

Energy drink exploded in military aircraft cockpit

HURLBURT FIELD — A twin-engine intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance aircraft operated by a contractor working with the U.S. Special Operations Command (USSOCOM) reportedly sustained more than \$100,000 in damage after a can of Red Bull energy drink exploded in the cockpit in June of last year.

A report now making the rounds in the military aviation press details — as much as military records allow — the incident aboard an MC-12W Liberty aircraft that was reportedly operating at the time out of Hurlburt Field, headquarters of the Air Force's Special Operations Command (AFSOC). AFSOC is the Air Force component of USSOCOM.

The story surfaced late last week in The War Zone, part of Time Inc.'s The Drive automotive and aviation news website. The story had its origins in a detailed military aviation accident database maintained by Military Times, an independent newspaper and website covering the various branches of the U.S. military.

The following entry in the database for June 5, 2017 — "MC-12; Beverage can exploded, components in center console damaged, no injuries" — attracted attention at The War Zone. The website's reporting indicated that the aircraft was assigned to a unit of AFSOC, but Capt. Amanda Farr, AFSOC's public affairs chief, told the Northwest Florida Daily News on

Monday that the aircraft was assigned to USSOCOM and was being operated by a contractor, rather than military personnel, at the time of the incident.

After seeing the database entry, The War Zone filed a Freedom of Information Act request for more information. What the website got in return was a heavily redacted report that included the following account of the incident: "On 5 Jun 2017, the Mishap Crew (MC) was enroute (sic) to their assigned airspace when the Mishap Copilot (MCP, Person #1) retrieved a 16 oz can of Red Bull from his backpack. While still holding the unopened can, the can ruptured spilling fluid onto the center console. While the MCP used his shirt to absorb what he could, the Mishap Pilot (MP) noticed a faint odor. He subsequently shut down the mission system power, which alleviated the odor. The crew discussed their options and decided to RTB (return to base)."

The War Zone report also noted that the incident reportedly cost \$113,675. The money was spent to remove and replace more than a dozen cockpit components, which could have included an array of displays, computer processors and other systems, The War Zone surmised.

In Air Force parlance, the incident was a Class C mishap, the lowest classification of aircraft incident. Monetarily speaking, a Class C mishap is one that results in a direct mishap-related cost of between \$50,000 and \$500,000.

When contacted late Monday afternoon, USSOCOM's public affairs office was unable to respond immediately to questions about the incident.

Scott declares emergency over algae outbreaks

TALLAHASSEE — Gov. Rick Scott on Monday issued an emergency order over the re-emergence of toxic algae outbreaks on both coasts as the regions' water quality blossoms into a political issue.

After touring the Caloosahatchee River on Monday morning, Scott imposed the order for Glades, Hendry, Lee, Martin, Okeechobee, Palm Beach and St. Lucie counties "to help combat algal blooms caused by Lake Okeechobee water discharges from the Army Corps of Engineers."

The declaration comes as Democrats blame the outbreaks on past budget cuts and regulatory policies imposed by Scott, a Republican who is trying to unseat U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson.

The Everglades Foundation used Scott's emergency declaration to push for federal support for a planned reservoir, which is intended to move water south of Lake Okeechobee.

Monday's declaration allows the Department of Environmental Protection and the South Florida Water Management District to waive various restrictions and regulations to store water in additional areas south of the lake.

"It is my duty to protect Floridians, no matter what it takes," Scott said in a press release. "Since we are facing more harmful algal blooms from federal water releases, the state is taking a multi-faceted approach to protect families."

Scott ordered the

Department of Environmental Protection and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission to spend more staff time on water testing. The governor also told the DEP to set up a grant program to help local governments pay for clean-up services.

Scott also enlisted the aid of other agencies to address the toxic waters.

The governor directed state health officials to inform Floridians and visitors of the dangers of algal blooms. The public-private agency Visit Florida also will work with local tourism officials to find ways to reduce the impact of the outbreak on the industry, and the Department of Economic Opportunity will assist businesses affected by the algae outbreak. The Department of Transportation must identify road projects that can help with flood control and redirect waters.

Scott made a similar

emergency declaration two years ago as "guacamole-thick" algae blooms spread across the Treasure Coast, spurring the Legislature in 2017 to fund its share of the construction of a \$1.6 billion reservoir in the Everglades Agricultural Area. The state expects the federal government to cover half the work.

Scott continues to blame the federal government, specifically the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, for dragging its feet on Everglades restoration and needed repairs to the Herbert Hoover Dike around Lake Okeechobee.

Last month, Scott directed DEP Secretary Noah Valenstein to issue an emergency order urging the Army Corps of Engineers and the South Florida Water Management District to take emergency actions to help redirect the flow of water to the south.

The district installed temporary pumps in June to speed the southern flow into the Everglades.

On Sunday, the Army Corps of Engineers Jacksonville District announced it would temporarily suspend water releases from the lake into the Caloosahatchee Estuaries so a full assessment of system conditions could be undertaken.

"As we look at operations in the system, we believe we can pause discharges for a short time to get additional input from staff on available options for moving water," Jacksonville District Commander Col. Jason Kirk said in a news release. "We want to ensure we are using all available flexibility before we resume discharges east and west."

Serena reaches Wimbledon semis

LONDON — There are moments in which nothing at all seems different about Serena Williams, moments such as when she unleashed a 109 mph service winner to even her Wimbledon quarterfinal

at a set apiece, leaned forward and yelled, loudly as can be, “Cooome ooon!”

Or when, about 10 minutes later, she stretched for a lunging backhand winner to break at love and take control of the third set, then raised a fist, figuring a berth in her 11th semifinal at the All England

Club was close at hand.

And after Williams came up with a comeback to beat 52nd-ranked Camila Giorgi of Italy 3-6, 6-3, 6-4 on Tuesday, she headed off Centre Court with her right index finger aloft. Yes, no matter what the rankings or seedings say, no matter how long she was away, Williams

still looks capable of playing like someone who’s No. 1, just about 10 months after having a baby.

“Everything right now is a little bit of a surprise. To be here. To be in the semifinals. I mean, I always say I plan on it, I would like to be there, have these goals,” Williams said.

“But when it actually happens, it still is, like, ‘Wow, this is really happening.’”

So what if she’s still getting her game in gear?

So what if Giorgi wouldn’t seem to miss while moving out to that early lead?

Les Bleus advance to final

ST. PETERSBURG, Russia — They’re young, they’re brash and they’re collectively worth a billion dollars. The one thing missing for this French squad is an international title.

Kylian Mbappe, Paul Pogba and France are about to get that chance.

Les Bleus are headed to the World Cup final.

Samuel Umtiti clinched a 1-0 win over Belgium — and earned the approval of watching French President Emmanuel Macron in the VIP seats at St. Petersburg Stadium — by scoring on a header off a corner kick in the 51st minute on Tuesday.

“Vive la France! Vive la Republique!” France forward Antoine Griezmann shouted during postgame

celebrations.

Umtiti played his part in a strong defensive effort by the French, too, helping to shut out the highest-scoring team at the tournament and leaving Belgium’s golden generation of Eden Hazard, Kevin De Bruyne and Romelu Lukaku to regret another missed opportunity at a major tournament.

“It’s me that scored,” Umtiti said, “but we all delivered a big game.”

France’s players danced on the field after the final whistle and their fans sang in the stands long past the end of the match, surrounded by yellow-clad security.

They certainly hope to keep the party going on Sunday in the final in Moscow. France — with an average age of 26 — will face either Croatia or England, who play

Southgate, England ready to face music of history

MOSCOW — Gareth Southgate and England are ready to face the music.

No other soccer nation dwells on decades of failure quite like the English.

Southgate was so demoralized by his penalty kick failure against Germany in the 1996 European Championship semifinals, he avoided The Lightning Seeds “Three Lions,” the team’s official song when it hosted the tournament.

Now the song, with its repeated chorus of “football’s coming home,” is a staple again, No. 5 this week on YouTube UK’s top music videos chart with more than 2 million views on the day of England’s last match.

“‘Football’s coming home’ is a song I couldn’t even listen to for 20 years, frankly, so for me it has a slightly different feel,” Southgate said Tuesday on the eve of England’s World Cup semifinal match against Croatia. “But it’s nice to hear people enjoying it again.”

When the song first was released, the chorus proclaimed “Three lions on a shirt/Jules Rimet still gleaming/Thirty years of hurt/never stopped me dreaming.” A 1998 update changed the third verse to “no more years of hurt.”

Ronaldo leaving Real Madrid to join Italian club Juventus

Cristiano Ronaldo is leaving Real Madrid to join Italian club Juventus in a move expected to benefit the Portugal forward's tax return.

Juventus said Tuesday it paid 112 million euros (\$131.5 million) for Ronaldo, who signed a four-year deal with the Serie A champions.

The move brings an end to a hugely successful nine-year spell in Spain, and takes him further away from a tax fraud case that may end up costing the Portugal forward more than \$20 million in fines.

"These years with Real Madrid and in this city of Madrid have been possibly the happiest of my life," Ronaldo wrote in an open letter. "My only feeling is of an enormous gratitude for this club, for these fans and for this city. I can only thank them all for the love and affection I have received."

"But I think the time has come to start a new phase in my life and that is why I have asked the club to accept my transfer. I feel that it is time, and I ask everyone, especially our fans, to please understand me."

Ronaldo joined Real Madrid in 2009 from Manchester United and was the Spanish club's all-time leading scorer with 451 goals in 438 matches. He helped the club win four Champions League titles — beating Juventus in the final

in 2017 — and also won the league and cup twice each.

He has scored a record 120 Champions League goals, 105 of them since moving to Madrid — 12 more than Juventus managed in that same period.

But he was unhappy with the way the tax authorities treated him in Spain. Ronaldo, along with several other top players in the country, has been accused of tax fraud, with authorities saying the government was defrauded of 14.7 million euros (\$17 million) from 2011-14. Unconfirmed media reports last month said Ronaldo had agreed to pay a fine of 18.8 million euros (\$22 million).

In Italy, a new law caps tax on income generated from abroad at 100,000 euros (\$117,000) per year for

residents who have paid their taxes in other countries for at least nine of the last 10 years.

Other players targeted by Spanish tax authorities in recent years include Lionel Messi, Javier Mascherano and Luka Modric. Former Real Madrid coach Jose Mourinho, now at Manchester United, was also investigated.

Ronaldo is currently on vacation in Greece following Portugal's elimination from the World Cup. Juventus president Andrea Agnelli flew out Tuesday to meet the 33-year-old forward.

"Real Madrid wants to express its gratitude to a player who has proven to be the best in the world and who has marked one of the greatest eras in the history of our club and of world soccer," Real Madrid said in a statement.

Wednesday at the Luzhnik Stadium in the Russian capital, and has a shot at redemption after losing its last two major finals — at the 2006 World Cup when Zinedine Zidane was sent off for a nasty head-butt and the 2016 European Championship on home soil.

"We're immensely privileged to be in the World Cup final," France coach Didier Deschamps said. "It was so painful two years ago we have to savor it."

Deschamps now has the chance to become the third person to win the World Cup as a player and a coach, after German great Franz Beckenbauer and Brazil's Mario Zagallo. As France captain, Deschamps raised soccer's most prized trophy in 1998.

Deschamps has faced some criticism for being too pragmatic and functional despite having a squad of superstars, but his team was set up superbly against an opponent that was largely restricted to only minor chances and denied on two occasions in particular by France goalkeeper Hugo Lloris.

He dived to his right midway through the first half to claw away Toby Alderweireld's shot, then got in front of Lukaku to punch away one of the many crosses sent in by Belgium in the final stages.

In a tournament dominated by goals from set pieces, France's goal came off a corner when Griezmann curled in the ball from the right and Umtiti got in front of tall Belgium midfielder Marouane Fellaini to knock in his header at the near post.

Up in the corporate seats, president Macron reacted to the goal by shaking the hand of King Philippe of Belgium as

FIFA president Gianni Infantino watched on between them.

"Unfortunately for us, the difference is just a dead-ball situation, a set play," Belgium coach Roberto Martinez said. "The game was, as you can imagine, very close, very tight, and it was going to be decided (on) maybe the one that could find that final touch in the box."

After reaching the quarterfinals at both the 2014 World Cup and the European Championship in 2016, Belgium again missed the chance to get to an international final and has yet to fulfil its lofty expectations. Leading the scoring in this tournament with 14 goals, many thought this could be their year.

With Lionel Messi, Cristiano Ronaldo and Neymar no longer in Russia, Hazard and Mbappe have taken over as the stars of the World Cup and there was a buzz every time either got the ball.

England hasn't played in the semifinals of a major tournament since Southgate's penalty kick at Wembley was saved by Andreas Koepke 22 years ago, and Andrea Moeller put the next kick over David Seaman and under the crossbar. The most-cherished national team memory remains the 1966 World Cup final victory at Wembley over West Germany, a demarcation point in the island's history as much as 1066 (the Norman invasion) and 1707 (union with Scotland).

"It was a long time ago, so not too many of us can remember that far back," said midfielder Jordan Henderson, born in 1990.

The winner Wednesday advances to Sunday's final against France. Southgate wants to break stereotypes, and not just on the field.

"I'm rare breed. I'm an Englishman that doesn't drink tea," he said.

England and Croatia are teams that innovated over time but have generally been immutable during the World Cup, sticking to virtually identical starting lineups except for group phase finales, after advancement was secure. In the other four games, Croatia's only variable to its 4-2-3-1 formation was whether to start captain Luka Modric in a deep midfield role and Andrej Kramaric more advanced, or to move up Modric and start Marcelo Brozovic.

Right back Sime Vrsaljko limped off during the quarterfinal win over host Russia and goalkeeper Danijel Subasic had a hamstring injury during extra time but remained in the match. When asked about injuries, Croatia coach Zlatko Dalic responded through a translator with inconclusive palaver about Vrsaljko having "this niggle."

England has gone with a 3-5-2, and the only change was to start Ruben Loftus-Cheek in midfield after Dele Alli injured a thigh.

"The biggest thing that the gaffer's brought since he's

come in, which he's brought right from day one, was identity, and about the way that we wanted to create a team," Henderson said. "You can see that togetherness on the pitch now, and I think that's valuable in crucial moments in big games, and yeah, I can definitely say this is most together England team that I've been involved in, and so I think that makes a massive difference and you get your rewards for that."

With an average age of 26, England is one of the youngest teams at the World Cup.

"We were never quite sure how far this team could go," Southgate said. "The age of the players, the improvement in the players, the hunger in the players has been apparent for everybody to see. We're really proud in the style that we've played, with the intelligence that we've played, and that we've performed under pressure and dealt with difficult situations in games where we've had to wait until the last minute to score, we've had to recover from conceding in last minute, we've been through extra time, penalties."

Williams never was worried about losing.

"It's weird. Sometimes I feel, 'Man, I'm in trouble.' Sometimes I feel, 'I can fight.' For whatever reason, today I was so calm," said 36-year-old American, who has been wearing compression leggings as a precaution after a blood-clot scare following her daughter's birth. "Even when I was down the first set, I thought, 'Well, she's playing great. I'm doing a lot of the right things.'"

Asked whether that might represent a new way of looking at things, Williams smiled.

"No. Just to be clear, that was just today. I mean, I'm hoping this is, like, a new thing," she said. "Honestly, I highly doubt it."

Next up for Williams as she tries to earn her eighth title at the All England Club and 24th Grand Slam trophy overall will be a match Thursday against No. 13 seed Julia Goerges of Germany, a 3-6, 7-5, 6-1 winner against No. 20 Kiki Bertens of the Netherlands.

"It's pretty unreal for me," said Goerges, who reached her first major semifinal at a tournament where she exited in the first round each of the past five years.

The other semifinal is No. 11 seed Angelique Kerber of Germany vs. No. 12 Jelena Ostapenko of Latvia.

Kerber is a former No. 1 who owns two Grand Slam titles and was the runner-up to Williams at Wimbledon two years ago. Ostapenko won last year's French Open.

Kerber needed seven match points to close out No. 14 Daria Kasatkina of Russia 6-3, 7-5 at Centre Court, while Ostapenko defeated 2014 Australian

Open runner-up Dominika Cibulkova of Slovakia 7-5, 6-4 at a windy No. 1 Court.

After a series of upsets made this edition of Wimbledon the first since it began seeding players in the 1920s that none of the top 10 women reached the quarterfinals, Nos. 11, 12 and 13 are still around. And so is No. 25, Williams.

The All England Club seeded her there as a nod to all of her past success at the grass-court major, including titles the last two times she entered, in 2015 and 2016. She missed Wimbledon a year ago because she was pregnant, going about 16 months between Grand Slam tournaments, so her ranking is just outside the top 180.

That is going to change now.

Told she is guaranteed of rising to 51st next week — and higher if she reaches the final or wins the championship — Williams joked: "Got to keep trekking on, though. Serena Williams, 51? Eh, it doesn't have that same ring to it. The '1' part does, but not the '5.'"

Williams is 3-0 against Goerges, winning in straight sets each time.

"Every match starts from zero," Goerges said. "Everybody has the same chances to win that match, and I'm looking forward to it."

After their most recent meeting, in the French Open's third round last month, Williams pulled out of that tournament, citing a chest muscle injury that made it too painful to serve.

She went a couple of weeks without practicing serves, and the rest did wonders. She hit one at 122 mph against Giorgi, delivered six of her seven aces in the final set, and won 44 of the last 54 points she served.

"I messed up too much on my returns," said Giorgi, questioning her decision to stand inside the baseline to receive serve.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. New Panthers owner must keep Richardson statue

While new Carolina Panthers owner David Tepper would like the focus to be on his plans for the team's future, he cannot completely put the franchise's sullied past behind him.

Tepper has to keep the prominent statue of Panthers' founder Jerry Richardson outside of the stadium as part of the NFL-record \$2.2 billion deal he agreed to in June after Richardson decided to sell the team in December amid reports of sexual and racial misconduct in the workplace.

Tepper said Tuesday when he was introduced as the team's new owner that he's "contractually obligated" to keep the 13-foot high statue of Richardson standing alongside two growling panthers where it is.

The league substantiated the allegations against Richardson following a six-month investigation and fined him \$2.75 million.

Fans have expressed their desire on social media and sports talk shows to remove the statue, which was built in 2016.

KANSAS CITY, MO. Former NBA player Washington sentenced

Former NBA player Kermit Washington has been sentenced to six years in federal prison for spending hundreds of thousands of dollars in charity donations on vacations, shopping sprees and plastic surgery for his girlfriend.

The U.S. attorney's office said in a news release that the 66-year-old Las Vegas man was also ordered Monday to pay nearly \$970,000 in restitution after pleading guilty in November to making a false statement in a tax return and aggravated identity theft.

Washington played for several NBA teams in the 1970s and 1980s. He is best known for throwing a punch that fractured Houston Rockets player Rudy Tomjanovich's face and left him unconscious during a 1977 game. Washington was playing for the Los Angeles Lakers at the time.

TAMPA, FLA. Lightning sign Kucherov to eight-year extension

The Tampa Bay Lightning have signed forward Nikita Kucherov to an eight-year contract extension worth an average of \$9.5 million in salary and annual bonuses.

The team announced the deal Tuesday. The 25-year-old would have been a restricted free agent next summer with one year left on a deal that will pay him nearly \$4.8 million for the 2018-19 season. Now he is set to stay with the Lightning through the 2026-27 as the team's highest-paid player once the extension kicks in after next year.

The two-time All-Star had 39 goals and 100 points with a plus-15 rating last season. He was third in the NHL in points, sixth in assists and tied for ninth in goals.

World domination

Enforced development helps give Europe a grip on World Cup

MOSCOW — Explaining Europe's stranglehold on the World Cup requires delving into a thick handbook of seemingly mind-numbing regulations.

The eligibility requirements for clubs playing in Europe's elite club competitions go far beyond guidelines for stadiums, spectators and players at Champions League and Europa League matches.

Flick past finance and governance rules and stop at the section on youth teams.

Since 2004, European football's governing body has required all leading clubs to also operate youth teams at various age groups. Playing at the highest level of the game means also operating at least one team for under-10s, another in the 10-14 bracket and at least two in the 15-21 range.

The revolution, overseen by then-UEFA President Lennart Johansson, ensures a pipeline of technically-gifted talent is coming into the European soccer system. National teams are also beneficiaries.

Dominating this World Cup has not even relied on the heavyweights of Europe. The Netherlands and Italy didn't qualify. Germany's title defense ended in group stage, while 2010 winner Spain and European champion Portugal fell in the round of 16.

The last four teams were all European. France, the 1998 champion, beat Belgium 1-0 in St. Petersburg on Tuesday to advance to a final against the winner of Wednesday's semifinal match between 1966 winner England and Croatia.

"Even though some of our traditional contenders were eliminated, there are other teams which have surpassed expectations," UEFA President Aleksander Ceferin told The Associated Press. "These results validate all the work that is being done to develop football, and also showcase the strength and quality that exists across the whole UEFA region."

Ten of Europe's 14 participants in Russia made it to the round of 16. Of those, six progressed to the quarterfinals.

CONCACAF, which covers North and Central

America and the Caribbean, wasn't represented in the last eight. Costa Rica and Panama tumbled in the group stage and Mexico lost in the second round.

"Quite frankly," CONCACAF President Victor Montagliani said, "over the last 40 years CONCACAF as a confederation has not really done much to help the federations try to compete at a world level."

CONMEBOL, the South American confederation, gloated too soon when it tweeted in March about its teams routing European nations 6-0 on a single day of international friendlies. When it came to the World Cup, the status changed.

Even before five-time world champion Brazil lost to Belgium in the quarterfinals, CONMEBOL held a seminar to discuss the lack of infrastructure and organization within youth football. A region beset by corruption will now only hand out money that is earmarked for specific projects.

While Brazil won the Under-17 World Cup in three out of four editions from 1997 to 2003, no South American nation has collected the trophy since. Brazil won the Under-20 version in 2011 but European sides have triumphed since.

CONMEBOL could look to Europe for guidance, and to Portugal.

Lisbon club Sporting has produced more players at the World Cup than any other team, according to data provided by the CIES Football Observatory. England's Eric Dier is among the 13 Sporting graduates. He's the only member of the England team whose football education was outside his homeland.

"They give you all the conditions you need to learn to play football," Dier said after joining Tottenham in 2014. "I was completely embedded in it and I wouldn't be here if it was not for them. You play 7-a-side with a 2-3-1, just two defenders. It was a quick learning curve."

Tottenham is the best-represented club in the semifinals, with nine players including France captained by Hugo Lloris. It's a sign of the north London team's growing status in European football after three consecutive top-three finishes in the Premier League securing spots in the Champions League.

The World Cup reinforces the status of the

Champions League and Europe's top leagues. Those leagues account for 81 of the 92 players on squads of the semifinalists in Russia: England (40), Spain (12), France (12), Germany (nine) and Italy (eight). The wealth generated by the continent's club competitions allows UEFA to raise standards throughout the region.

"We have pledged to invest even more in grassroots football to ensure our players and teams have everything they need to perform at the highest level in the future," Ceferin said.

The Premier League's strength has been to the detriment of the national team since its inception in 1992-93 as foreign imports have taken the places of home-grown players. Nearly half of Belgium's squad — 11 of 23 — played in the English top-flight last season.

But the Premier League is also the destination for the world's top coaches, including Mauricio Pochettino at Tottenham, Juergen Klopp at Liverpool and Jose Mourinho at Manchester United. They have helped to broaden the horizons of young English players and coaches.

The English Football Association's investment in a St. George's Park headquarters and an over-arching tactical strategy across all age-group teams is also starting to pay off. England could be the first nation to possess the U17s, U20s and seniors World Cup if it manages in Moscow to win its first major title since 1966.

After serving as the FA's head of elite development from 2011-13 and Under-21s coach from 2013-16, Gareth Southgate has been able to implement his vision among senior players since taking over the top job.

"We know that our academies at club level are producing really technically good players," Southgate said. "We made a lot of changes with the national team ... that have helped us to be successful."

Croatia, featuring Real Madrid's Luka Modric and Barcelona's Ivan Rakitic, is back in the semifinals for the first time in 20 years.

"This generation has been under-rated for a long time," Croatia coach Zlatko Dalic said. "But they have shown their qualities when it mattered at this World Cup. They will go down in the history as a great generation."

It's generation Europe in the World Cup.

'It cannot happen anymore'

Female sports journalists in Brazil fight to stop sexism and harassment

RIO DE JANEIRO — Female sports journalists in Brazil have been campaigning to curb the sexism and harassment they face while doing their jobs — and incidents during reports from the World Cup have drawn attention to their LetHer-Work movement.

It's part of efforts worldwide by women to publicize sexual harassment and assault in their everyday lives, most famously through the #MeToo movement.

Just as women from Hollywood to academia have spoken out, the sports journalists are highlighting the difficulties of working in what has traditionally been considered a man's world and remains largely populated by men.

For years, they say, they have been groped, kissed and insulted while covering games and news conferences. Back at the office, they faced skepticism that a woman could effectively cover sports.

A few began a WhatsApp group to exchange stories and as that group grew, so did the feeling that they needed to do something publicly about it.

In March, several journalists posted a video online with a hashtag that was a call to action: #DeixaElaTrabalhar

— Portuguese for LetHerWork. They have also begun working with police and prosecutors to ensure that Brazil's laws against defamation and public insult are enforced in stadiums.

Some journalists have recounted hearing fans repeatedly shouting insults such as "prostitute" at them for entire halves of games with authorities doing nothing. When racial slurs are uttered, by contrast, other fans and police seem more prepared to act, said Gabriela Moreira, who appeared in the video.

"With racism, this has already been talked about a lot. With women, no," said Moreira, who works for ESPN.

The video begins with a montage of headlines about female journalists being harassed or threatened and screen shots of insults that people have posted on social media about them.

"It happened to me," one reporter says, followed by a clip of a fan leaning in to kiss her.

"It's already happened to all of us," another says.

"And it cannot happen anymore," a third adds.

But it continues. During the World Cup in Russia, there have been at least four recorded incidents of fans groping, kissing or attempting to kiss female journalists.

In one, a man shouted an insult in Russian at journalist Ahtziri Cardenas while she was filming a report for Univision. He returned moments later and tried to grab her genitals.

Baldrick: Have you got a plan, my lord?
Prince Edmund: Yes, I have — and it's so cunning, you could brush your teeth with it!

The single mistake more players make than any other is failing to devise a detailed plan as declarer before playing to the first trick. Today's deal saw two declarers in six diamonds, with only one of them taking his time — and, as a result, taking his tricks.

Both Wests found the testing trump lead. The first declarer won in hand, then set off on a cross-ruff spree. He ruffed two clubs in dummy and a heart in hand; but when he exited from dummy with the spade king, East took his ace and returned a trump. That took the last trump from dummy, so that although one of South's clubs could be discarded on the spade queen, there was no place to dispose of the other one. The contract had to go one down.

The second declarer quickly noticed that setting up clubs was unlikely to work, assuming the defenders would persist in trumps at their next turn.

He, too, won the lead in hand, but he then led a spade to the king and ace. Back came a trump, and upon winning in dummy, South ruffed a spade in hand. A heart to the ace allowed another spade ruff, with the 4-3 spade break a welcome sight.

Now declarer led a heart to the king and ruffed a heart with his last trump. The club ace and a club ruff in dummy saw him draw the last trump. Dummy's spades took tricks 12 and 13. In essence, this was a dummy reversal; the hand with the shorter trump suit drew the last trump.

Sangria summer



Experimenting with the spectrum of sweet, dry, bubbly and bitter

The summer solstice has snuck by, again. Depressing, I know, but as our hemisphere prepares for its date with winter, there is no need to overthink the situation. The roses are still fragrant, and the tomatoes are still ripening, because the heat has only just begun, and we can't lose sight of the big picture: This is a very good time to drink sangria.

By sangria, I mean a spectrum of wine- and fruit-based cold drinks, some of which have more merit than others. At one end is sangria itself, the famous Spanish punch made of wine, fruit, juice and liquor that's

adored by sun worshippers, tourists and underage drinkers. This end of the spectrum is one of incomprehensible complexity, as there are too many permutations of all of these ingredients, plus shots of simple syrup, 7 Up and the like to keep track of. One popular variation, for example, is the Italian-American version of the Eastern Seaboard, which contains brandy, triple sec and peach schnapps, along with the fruit. You will find these ingredients in the award-winning sangria pitchers of Spain Restaurant in Cranston, Rhode Island, and in the shared kitchen of a certain Cape Cod vacation spot, where a certain clan of Italian families shows up every solstice like clockwork to share a kitchen with my family (long story).

One of the clan matriarchs, Diane, told me her recipe and shared this nugget: While most recipes call for merlot or cabernet, she advises a red burgundy. It's drier, she says, and "has that woody taste."

I enjoyed the fact that a celebrated French wine is the secret ingredient in the Italian-American version of a Spanish drink, and filed it away just in case. But to be honest, I was having trouble getting excited about her sangria. It was both too delicious and too alcoholic.

This may sound like a win-win, but I find it counterproductive to add extra sugar so you can add extra booze. Summer may be gone in the blink of an eye, but it's also a grind, and I want to keep cool, keep hydrated and keep going.

I prefer the other end of the sangria spectrum. The side that's bitter, simple and bubbly. It's called tinto de verano, which translates to "red wine of summer." In Spain, it's what the locals have settled on as the ideal antidote for the Iberian heat. Credit for its creation is given to Andalusian restaurateur and bullfight promoter Federico Vargas, but credit is hardly due. It's such a simple recipe that its creation was inevitable.

Tinto de Verano

- Red wine
- Sprite (or the Spanish equivalent)

Open both items, mix and serve chilled.

The lemon and lime fine-tune the flavor, as the cold and bubbles do their things. It's numbing and stimulating. Pleasantly exhilarating.

This simple drink can be doctored in many ways. Ice, for example, is a great way to chill it if your glass and ingredients were not already frigid. Squeezed slices of lemon and lime, meanwhile, will significantly enhance the citrus pizzazz.

A shot of lemonade here, a dash of vermouth there — to the point that you have basically made sangria. And as the Italians and others have shown, there is plenty of room for exploration on the busy, fruity side of this continuum.

Drying out

Here is my recipe for extra-dry tinto de verano. It is optimized for maximum hydration, minimal added sugars and just the right level of buzz to keep you going. I call it Verano Seca, which means "dry summer."

If you have access to unsprayed roses, wild or domestic, I recommend harvesting some petals and using them in this drink.

Verano Seca

- Burgundy
- Bubbly water (unsweetened)
- Lemon and lime slices
- Ice
- Rose petals (optional but highly recommended)

Add ice first, then bubbles, followed by the squeezed citrus slices. Finally, add the wine. When added in this order, the wine stays atop the bubbly.

IN THE KITCHEN

Possibilities with pineapple, coconut unlimited

For a tropical delight, try pineapple and coconut as a flavor combo. Those are two of my favorite ingredients and are great for those who enjoy experimenting in the kitchen.

The possibilities with coconut and pineapple are unlimited, so you might want to try your hand at coming up with a new dessert using these ingredients.

I am considering using cream of coconut as part of the liquid in place of a little of the half and half.

Pineapple Coconut Cookie Pudding

- 2/3 cup sugar
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 3 egg yolks
- 2 cups milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 15 to 18 crunchy coconut cookies (not the macaroon candy type)
- 1 (8 oz.) can crushed pineapple, well drained
- Whipped cream

Combine sugar and flour in heavy saucepan. Stir to mix. Add egg yolks, but do not mix yet. Gradually add milk,

stirring yolks into mixture with it. Cook over medium heat until pudding begins to thicken. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla, coconut cookies, and pineapple. Mix well. Allow to cool slightly. Top each serving with whipped cream.

Hawaiian Bread Pudding

- ¼ cup butter
- 1 quart half and half
- 2 eggs
- 6 to 7 cups slightly packed Hawaiian sweet bread chunks
- 1 (15 oz.) can pineapple tidbits, drained
- 1 cup coconut
- 1 teaspoon coconut extract

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Melt butter in 9x13x2 inch pan. Set aside. In large bowl, combine half and half and eggs. Beat until well mixed. Stir in bread, pineapple, coconut and extract. Pour into pan and bake 55 to 60 minutes. Serve with this sauce:

Sauce:

- 1 (8 oz.) tub pineapple cream cheese
- 1 cup confectioners' sugar
- ¼ cup dulce de leche ice cream topping (or caramel ice cream topping)
- ¼ cup milk

Combine cream cheese and confectioners' sugar. Beat until blended. Add ice cream topping and milk. Beat until smooth. Serve with warm bread pudding.





It's quite possible that the name of this recipe undersells just how good it really is. These savory cakes are chewy and chock-full of nubby corn kernels and earthy spices, with juicy deposits of spinach. Thanks to a generous amount of baking powder, they puff up more like fritters yet cook in only a slick of oil in the pan.

Local corn is coming in, and you could use fresh kernels here, of course. You can also take advantage of the sweet, in-season crop and freeze it yourself. To do so, choose cobs that look plump and feel firm through the husk. At home, strip the cobs of husks and silk, then use tongs to place them in a pot of boiling water for 2 to 3 minutes. Transfer to a bowl of cold water until cool. Figure the yield

is about 1 cup per ear. (Could you toss those cobs in the freezer to make a simple corn broth later? Absolutely.) That's it. You can freeze on the cob or off; I prefer having kernels ready to go, so I use a chef's knife to cut off a couple of rows, creating a flat surface for it sit on the cutting board without rolling. Then it's just a few quick turns and cuts, and the kernels are in pile

that's easy to scrape into a zip-top bag. Label, seal and freeze for up to a year. Back to the pancakes at hand: Serve them with your favorite salsa or a fried egg. They make an easy and satisfying summer dinner meal.

Corn and Spinach Pancakes

4 to 5 servings (makes ten 3-inch pancakes)

Ingredients

- 2 ounces (about 1 cup) bagged frozen spinach (not in a block)
- 9 ounces frozen corn kernels (about 2 cups; see OVERVIEW)
- 1¼ cups flour
- 1½ teaspoons baking powder
- 1½ teaspoons kosher or coarse sea salt
- 1 teaspoon ground coriander
- ½ teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 teaspoon Spanish smoked paprika (sweet or hot)
- 1 large egg
- 1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil, plus more for the pan
- ½ cup cold water

Steps

Place the corn and spinach in separate microwave-safe bowls; place in the microwave and defrost in 20-second increments, until they are slightly warm. Use a fork or a whisk to stir together the flour, baking powder, 1 teaspoon of the salt, the coriander, cumin and smoked paprika in a mixing bowl. Stir in the egg and the tablespoon of oil until well blended, then add the water and defrosted corn, stirring to form a thick batter. (We used multicolored corn here.) Heat a large nonstick skillet or griddle pan over medium-high

heat. Once it's quite hot, add just enough oil to coat the bottom of the pan. Use ¼ cup of the batter for each pancake. As soon as it hits the pan, flatten each portion a bit, so the pancake is about 3 inches across. Scatter some of the defrosted spinach atop each pancake. Cook for about 2 minutes on each side, until golden. Transfer to a platter and cover loosely to keep warm while you repeat with the remaining batter, adding more oil to the pan, as needed. Sprinkle with the remaining salt; serve hot.

What's the best way to roll out a round of pie dough?

The Washington Post

Cookbook author Cathy Barrow recently joined The Washington Post Food staff to answer questions about all things edible.

Q: Do you have any tips on how to get your pie crust to roll to a circle? Whatever I do, it ends up some funky shape. Or should I stop worrying about it and just patch it before transferring it to the pie pan?

A: First, start with a circle. But seriously. Form the pie crust into a disk before chilling it, then work from the center outward, turning the disk a quarter turn, rolling out, and so on. (Of course, you could also choose to make a slab pie because rolling out pie dough to a rectangle is so much easier.) —Cathy Barrow

Q: I refuse to buy bagged lettuces, but my kids really miss the shredded lettuce on tacos. I got the great idea to use my food processor slicing blade to shred a beautiful head of organic iceberg lettuce. This worked great for dinner. When I went to make my lunch, the shredded lettuce had gotten sort of wilted and browned on the edges. How do manufacturers keep the prepackaged shredded lettuce from getting like that? I stored it in my salad spinner so it wasn't a matter of being squished in the bag.

A: Using a metal knife has been thought to cause cut lettuce to brown, but when the obsessive testers at America's Test Kitchen tried it out, they found that a plastic lettuce knife only bought an extra day before the lettuce none of it started to brown on the cut edges before 12 days

anyhow. Tearing instead of cutting bought an extra two days, because it ruptures fewer of the lettuce's cells.

So I wonder if the food processor is leading to more browning because it's possibly cutting the lettuce way more than simply slicing with a knife would?

Manufacturers often remove oxygen and add carbon dioxide to prevent this in bagged salad mixes. But at home, one thing you can do is try to reduce extra moisture by layering your cut lettuce between paper towels.

Q: Is there a particular brand of pita bread that doesn't fall apart when you try to fill it?

A: I usually feel for the thickness of the pita through the bag...if it's particularly thin at the center, it's more susceptible to tearing. Don't have a brand I prefer, but rather go for what feels best/freshest. —Bonnie S. Benwick

Q: We love a dinner of split peas and cornbread. I usually go by the 30-40 minutes rule for cooking the peas, but, last weeks batch (of dried split peas only) purchased a week or so ago) was not done at 40 minutes, not done at 60 minutes, not done at 90 minutes. It took a good two hours for them to cook, and then they were great, and had the usual taste and texture. Did I just buy a bag of old ones? That's the only answer I can think of.

A: Yes, it sounds like they were indeed very old! Were these from a different source than previously? I'd bring it up to the store to see if they have any other ideas, but I can't think of any other reason, especially if they were the same variety and everything. —J.Y.
