City weighs raising taxes

If approved, the hike would cost someone with a property value of \$100,000 an extra \$10 a month

PANAMA CITY — Taxpayers in Panama City could see

a hike next fiscal year.

On Tuesday, the Panama City Commission voted to set the tentative millage rate at 5.2146 mills, compared to the current rate of 3.9740. The increase would cost someone with a property value of \$100,000 an additional \$10.34 a month.

The tentative millage rate is, as the name suggests, not

the final number, but once set it becomes the maximum millage rate the city could levy in the upcoming fiscal year. The city retains the option of lowering the millage rate, which officials said they hope to do.

“Our goal is to make sure we do what we can to reduce this number by September,” said Commissioner Mike

Nichols.


The potential increase is reflective of two previous decisions made by the commission — taking out the loan to renovate the new City Hall facility and funding 17 new officers for the police department.

Options presented by budget director Brandy Waldron show that to pay

for the recurring personnel costs the commission would need to raise the millage rate to 4.5170 and to cover the recurring debt service for City Hall it would need to be raised to 4.665. To cover both recurring costs, she told commissioners the rate would need to be raised to the 5.2146

Thursday ceremony open to public

PANAMA CITY — It's time to say a frond farewell to the world famous four-headed palm at Oaks by the Bay Park.

Almost a year after news came out the popular oddity was dying, the city has decided it is time to chop down the pindo palm on Thursday at 8 a.m.

The city is planning to remove the tree, which has

Government announces billions to help farmers

Deal would assist those hurt by trade tariffs

WASHINGTON — The government announced a \$12 billion plan Tuesday to assist farmers who have been hurt by President Donald Trump's trade disputes with China and other trading partners.

The plan focuses on Midwest soybean producers and others targeted by retaliatory measures.

The Agriculture Department said the proposal would include direct assistance for farmers, purchases of excess crops and trade promotion activities aimed at building new export markets. Officials said the plan would

not require congressional approval and would come through the Commodity Credit Corporation, a wing of the department that addresses agricultural prices.

“This is a short-term solution that will give President Trump and his administration the time to work on long-term trade deals,” said Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue.

Officials said the direct payments could help producers of soybeans, which have been hit hard by the Trump tariffs, along with sorghum, corn, wheat, cotton, dairy and farmers raising hogs. The food purchased from farmers would include some types of fruit, nuts, rice, legumes, dairy, beef and pork, officials said.

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TODAY IN HISTORY

Today is Wednesday, July 25, the 206th day of 2018. There are 159 days left in the year.

Today’s Highlight in History:

On July 25, 1994, Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin and Jordan’s King Hussein signed a declaration at the White House ending their countries’ 46-year-old formal state of war.

On this date:

In 1866, Ulysses S. Grant was named General of the Army of the United States, the first officer to hold the rank.

In 1917, Nikon Corp. had its beginnings with the merger of three optical manufacturers in Japan. In 1943, Benito Mussolini was dismissed as premier of Italy by King Victor Emmanuel III, and placed under arrest. (However, Mussolini was later rescued by the Nazis, and re-asserted his authority.)

In 1946, the United States detonated an atomic bomb near Bikini Atoll in the Pacific in the first underwater test of the device. In 1952, Puerto Rico became a self-governing commonwealth of the United States.

In 1956, the Italian liner SS Andrea Doria collided with the Swedish passenger ship Stockholm off the New England coast late at night and began sinking; 51 people — 46 from the Andrea Doria, five from the Stockholm — were killed. (The Andrea Doria capsized and sank the following morning.)

In 1960, a Woolworth’s store in Greensboro, North Carolina, that had been the scene of a sit-in protest against its whites-only lunch counter dropped its segregation policy.

In 1961, in a televised address on the Berlin Crisis, President John F. Kennedy announced a series of steps aimed at bolstering the military in the face of Soviet demands that Western powers withdraw from the German city’s western sector.

Wildfires in Greece kill at least 74

RAFINA, Greece — The death toll from Greece's deadliest wildfires in decades climbed to 74 Tuesday as rescue crews searched on land and sea for those who sought to escape the blazes that engulfed popular summer resort spots near Athens.

The number of victims appeared set to go even higher, with crews checking charred homes and vehicles and the coast guard scouring beaches and deeper waters. There was no definitive count of the missing.

Fueled by 50 mph winds that frequently changed direction, the fires — one to the west of Athens near the town of Kineta and another to the northeast near the port of Rafina — spread at speeds that surprised many, trapping hundreds on beaches and cutting off escape routes.

All the casualties appeared to be from the fire near Rafina, a popular seaside area that is a mix of permanent residences and vacation homes. The blaze broke out Monday afternoon during a hot, dry spell but the cause was not immediately clear. Aerial photos showed charred swathes of forest and homes.

Prime Minister Alexis Tsipras declared three days of national mourning. Apart from the dead, which included children, hospital-

treated 187 people, most for burns, with 10 listed in serious condition.

Although it had abated by Tuesday afternoon, the blaze was far from extinguished and more than 230 firefighters were still trying to put it out, helped by volunteers and water-dropping aircraft. Another five fires continued to burn, with flare-ups reported in the blaze near Kineta. Authorities ordered the evacuation of some communities as a preventive measure.

Authorities urged the public to contact them about

the missing. Many took to social media, posting photos and what was believed to be their last location before the fires hit.

Twenty-six of the dead were found after dawn Tuesday, huddled in a compound near the sea in the community of Mati, the worst-hit area near Rafina, about 30 miles west of Athens.

Red Cross rescuers said they appeared to be families or groups of friends because they were found hugging in groups of threes and fours.

Hundreds of homes and cars were believed to have

been burned. Many vehicles were found with the keys still in the ignition and doors open, a sign of the urgency with which their occupants sought to flee the flames. Narrow roads quickly became jammed, forcing many to try to escape on foot. The ferocity of the fire melted cars' metal hub caps.

Many ran to beaches, but even there the fire got so close and the smoke was so thick that dozens swam out to sea despite the rough weather.

Coast guard and private boats picked up more than 700 survivors from beaches

and the sea — but also recovered six bodies.

"It happened very fast. The fire was in the distance, then sparks from the fire reached us. Then the fire was all around us," said Nikos Stavrinidis, who had gone with his wife to fix up his summer home for a visit by his daughter.

Stavrinidis, his wife and four friends swam out to sea to escape the smoke, but they quickly became disoriented, losing sight of shore and being swept out farther by the wind and currents. Two of his group didn't survive.

"It is terrible to see the person next to you drowning and not being able to help him," Stavrinidis said, his voice breaking. The rest of the survivors were picked up by a fishing boat with an Egyptian crew who jumped into the water to rescue them.

Rafina's dock became a makeshift hospital overnight as paramedics examined survivors, some wearing only their bathing suits, after being dropped off by rescue boats.

Rafina Mayor Evangelos Bournous said his home had burned down and his family escaped by going into the sea.

The speed of the fires caught many by surprise.

"Everything happened in seconds," said Andreas Passios, who lives next to the compound in Mati where the 26 bodies were found. "I grabbed a beach towel. It saved my life. I soaked it, grabbed my wife and we ran to the sea."

MADRID Tourist catamaran catches fire, injures 5

Emergency services say a catamaran carrying day-tripping tourists along the coast of northwestern Spain has caught fire, injuring five people.

Authorities in the Galicia region say on their Twitter account that two people sustained serious burns and were airlifted to a hospital Tuesday. Three others are being treated at local hospitals.

Spanish media say the boat was carrying 48 passengers and four crew members when it hit a smaller vessel and a blaze broke out. Some passengers reportedly jumped into the sea as the flames spread.

The boat was traveling between the Galician coast and the small island of Toxa, north of Vigo, on a sightseeing trip. The blaze sent a thick plume of black smoke over the sea.

DENVER Man sentenced to 18 months for plane bomb threat

A 22-year-old man has been sentenced to 18 months in federal prison for writing a false bomb threat while onboard a flight traveling from San Diego to Denver in 2017.

Cameron Korth was sentenced on Friday after pleading guilty in April to providing false information and threats. He also will be on supervised release for three years after his prison sentence.

Prosecutors dismissed another charge as part of the plea agreement.

According to court records, Korth told flight attendants on the Jan. 16, 2017 United Airlines flight that he found a written bomb threat in the plane's bathroom.

The plane landed on an isolated runway at Denver International Airport. All passengers were removed, and authorities found no explosives onboard.

ROME Antique desk once displayed in NYC's Met recovered

Italian police said Tuesday they had recovered an 18th-century ebony desk that was illegally taken abroad after World War II and ended up for a time on display in New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art.

The desk, made with ivory and mother of pearl inlays, is considered a masterpiece of Pietro Piffetti, one of the most important ebony carpenters of his time. Italy's carabinieri art squad police unit said the desk was believed to be worth more than \$2.3 million.

According to a carabinieri statement, the desk left Italy sometime after the war and traveled to France and Switzerland before arriving in the United States in 1996.

It was exhibited at the Met for some time, but Carabinieri Lt. Col. Silvio Mele said the museum wasn't implicated in any wrongdoing.

MISSOULA, MONT. Soviet immigrant withdraws felony plea to avoid deportation

A Montana judge is allowing a Soviet immigrant to withdraw his guilty plea to a 1995 felony charge that left him in danger of being deported.

District Judge Leslie Halligan ruled earlier this month that Vitaliy Kadoshnikov, who was then 18, likely didn't understand the deportation consequences of a felony conviction, the Missoulian reports.

He received a suspended sentence in the car theft case.

He later moved to Michigan and married a U.S. citizen. The conviction became an issue last summer when a dispute with a neighbor led to the police being called.

Kadoshnikov, who never became a citizen, was held in an immigration detention facility and faced mandatory deportation over the 1995 conviction.

DETROIT Boyhood memory leads to new trials in murder case

The boyhood memory of a man who witnessed his mother's murder at age 8 is leading to new trials for two people who claim they were wrongly convicted in a 1999 Mother's Day slaying in Detroit.

Charmous Skinner Jr., now 27, was never interviewed by police or defense attorneys, despite being in the van with his mother, Lisa Kindred, when she was shot.

The Michigan Supreme Court said Skinner's recollection of the shooter — mid-30s, big nose, short hair — is vastly different from the description offered by others at trial. Justly Johnson and Kendrick Scott are serving life sentences and have been in prison for more than 18 years.

The "convictions were based on shaky grounds," the court said Monday in a 4-1 decision.

that passed.

Waldron also presented a budget that would keep the rate at 3.9740 — the catch being the city would have to once again draw from reserves to cover the cost of the debt service and police officers.

Commissioners did want to dip into reserves again.

In addition to the expenses Waldron named, commissioners also talked about the rising cost of health insurance, which is anticipated to go up 5 percent this year, and the importance of offering competitive benefits to retain employees when considering the higher rate.

“In order for us to retain the kind of people we need to run this city, we need to have decent benefits... and pay a somewhat competitive wage,” Mayor Greg Brudnicki said. “I think we may have to go up this year. There is going to be some tweaking between now and September.”

Commissioners Ken Brown and Billy Rader also

voted to set the tentative rate at 5.2146. Commissioner Jenna Haligas was absent.

“It’s tough,” Rader said. “I’ve never been one in my life to want to raise any tax. I can’t stand it. It just makes me sick in my stomach to have to do it, but these figures are not lying to us.”

One area where the commission might be lowering taxes, however, is in the downtown district.

While commissioners set the tentative millage rate for the Downtown Improvement Board at 3 mills, the maximum the board can levy, Nichols said there will have to be “serious conversation” before that is finalized, with an eye on lowering it.

“I think we really have to address the millage for downtown,” Nichols said. “I mean, whatever number you put (for the city’s millage rate), you add that on top of it, it’s going to be tough for those businesses down there.”

The first budget hearing will be Sept. 13 at 5:01 p.m. The suggested final budget is hearing is set for Sept. 25.

significant root damage and one dead head, in a small ceremony that will be open to the public.

In partnership with Gulf Coast Tree Service and Gulf Coast State College, the city is hoping to create laser-etched memorial plaques from pieces of the tree. The plaque and quantity available will be determined after removal because of the uncertainty of the tree’s condition, according to Caitlin Lawrence, the city’s public information officer.

As of now, Lawrence said the fenced area the tree currently occupies will become green space — though there has been talk of putting in a sculpture or another tree. A final decision will be made after conversations with the public.

The four-headed palm — which is estimated to be 80 to 100 years old — is to put it bluntly, a freak of nature. It’s believed to

be the only one of its kind in the world and no one is quite sure how it came to be.

That the pindo palm lived a normal lifespan, despite the deformity and despite it being moved from its original home at the Millville Wastewater Treatment plant in the late 1990s, surprised tree experts as noted in a study Bartlett Tree Experts, a company that names Buckingham Palace among its clients, did for the city.

When the city first brought on Bartlett, the goal was to do “everything they could to save it,” Interim City Manager Jared Jones previously said, which included giving the tree nutrient injections.

The annual maintenance cost to continue the injections is \$2,000 to \$2,700, and ultimately won’t save the tree.

The 2017 prognosis declared the tree in “irreversible decline,” listing old age, structural deformities, long-term transplant stress, root death, poor soil nutrition and a very likely lightning strike as

reasons. Bartlett said no matter what the city did the tree should not be expected to live more than three years.

Since the disappointing news about the tree, people have gathered at the park to serenade it and write love notes.

History

The tree spent the first decades of its life in relative obscurity at the Millville Wastewater Treatment plant, before it was discovered by former city Utilities Director Dave Banka.

“We call it four-toed Pete,” Banka told The News Herald in 1996 when the tree was still at the plant.

An oddity, the International Palm Society took an interest in the tree, trying to figure out why it had four heads.

Contaminates were ruled out as the palm predates the facility, and members didn’t think it

was genetic. Instead, they hypothesized the tree was mowed over several times, which created a Hydra effect.

Members of the society, Banka and former Leisure Services Director Dave Goodwin moved the tree to St. Andrews.

“When the word got out there was a four-headed palm in Panama City, there was a botanical garden somewhere in Texas that heard about it, and they offered the city \$40,000 for the tree,” Goodwin said last year. “I said don’t sell it. Let’s keep it right here in its native city because it’s something that will bring life to St. Andrews.”

People lined up all along 11th Street to watch the tree be moved on Sunday, May 4, 1997.

The transplant was remarkably successful and the tree became an icon at the park for years.

In Kansas City, meanwhile, Trump told a veterans’ convention that he was trying to renegotiate trade agreements that he said have hurt American workers, and he asked for patience ahead of key talks.

“We’re making tremendous progress. They’re all coming. They don’t want to have those tariffs put on them,” Trump told the Veterans of Foreign Wars


national convention. “We’re opening up markets. You watch what’s going to happen. Just be a little patient.”

Agriculture officials said the payments couldn’t be calculated until after harvests come in. Brad Karmen, the USDA’s assistant deputy administrator for farm programs, noted that the wheat harvest is already in, so wheat farmers could get payments sooner than other growers.

But officials said soybeans were likely to be the largest sector affected by the programs.

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Ivanka Trump is shutting down her clothing company

NEW YORK — Ivanka Trump is shutting down her fashion line of dresses, shoes and handbags that became a target of political boycotts and spurred concerns about conflicts of interest after her father was elected.

The president's daughter said in a statement she made the decision so she could focus more on work as a White House adviser. She had stepped away from the day-to-day management of her company when she joined President Donald Trump's administration.

"After 17 months in Washington, I do not know when or if I will ever return to the business, but I do know that my focus for the foreseeable future will be the work I am doing here in Washington," she said. She called the move the "only fair outcome for my team and partners."

The Ivanka Trump brand has been buffeted by politics since she joined the White House early last year. Sales appeared to surge at times due her

celebrity as the U.S. president's daughter — White House adviser Kellyanne Conway once urged on Fox News for people to "go buy Ivanka's stuff" — only to get battered as those who disliked her father's policies urged shoppers to boycott the line.

Nordstrom dropped the Ivanka Trump line last year, citing slowing sales, and recently Hudson Bay reportedly did the same.

The company said that its business was strong, and the decision to shut down had nothing do with its performance. Shutting down the brand means 18 people will lose their jobs.

Trump-backed Kemp wins Georgia GOP governor runoff

ATLANTA — With a damning secret recording of his opponent and a late Trump-Pence endorsement, Secretary of State Brian Kemp on Tuesday won a bruising Republican runoff in the race for Georgia governor.

A self-described "unapologetic conservative" whose campaign ran an eyebrow-raising ad that said he could use his own pickup truck to "round up criminal illegals," Kemp rode a national wave of voter contempt for the establishment in favor of bare-knuckled outsider politics.

He now faces Democrat Stacey Abrams, who could become the country's first black woman governor, in a race that will test Democrats' assertion that changing demographics have turned the Republican stronghold into a swing state.

Abrams tweeted her reaction Tuesday, saying "Tonight, I have an opponent: Kemp. The race for #GAGov may change, but our values never will. Service, faith & family guide our vision for GA: Affordable health care. Excellent public schools for every child. An economy that works for all."

"Stand with us," she wrote, followed by a link to a fundraising page.

Kemp beat once heavily-favored Lt. Gov. Casey Cagle, who out-raised Kemp more than 2-to-1 and had a Rolodex

of endorsements from establishment Republicans in the state including Gov. Nathan Deal.

In a tweeted endorsement last week, President Donald Trump pointed to Kemp's tough stance on illegal immigration and strong support for gun rights. With days left in the race, Vice President Mike Pence also stumped for Kemp on the campaign trail. Both reiterated their support for Kemp in tweets Tuesday.

Kemp victory is likely to embolden Trump to become even more engaged in shaping the Republican Party in the final months of the primary season. And it is another election success for a Trump-approved candidate, following victories by Katie Arrington in South Carolina and Martha Roby in Alabama.

Nichole Jacobs went to Sandy Springs Christian

Church to vote Tuesday for Kemp, citing his stance on immigration. Jacobs sends both her children to private schools, and feels her affluent Atlanta suburb is overrun with "illegal immigration."

"People are moving out of Sandy Springs to get into a better school district or putting their kids in private schools," Jacobs said.

Cagle began to lose ground after the release of a secret recording in June in which he says he helped pass a "bad public-policy" bill for political gain. The recording was made without Cagle's knowledge during a private conversation with former GOP gubernatorial rival Clay Tippins, who last week endorsed Kemp. Portions of the recording were released by Tippins and then by Kemp's campaign.

JetBlue shares drop after airline reports \$120M loss

JetBlue shares plunged 9 percent — among its worst one-day declines in a decade — after the airline reported a \$120 million second-quarter loss on higher fuel expenses and gave a cautious outlook for the rest of 2018.

Executives of JetBlue, the nation's sixth-biggest airline, said Tuesday they will respond by reducing planned growth and redirecting some West Coast flying to more profitable transcontinental routes.

In the past few days, JetBlue has announced it would cut an undisclosed number of jobs at its headquarters in Long Island City, New York, and it raised fares — by \$5 each way on most U.S. flights, and up to \$50 each way on its premium transcontinental service called Mint.

Throttling costs

As Harley looks abroad to juice sales, tariffs hit home

MILWAUKEE — Harley-Davidson expects new tariffs to increase the company's annual costs by as much as \$100 million as long as the trade dispute between the U.S. and other countries goes on.

Executives with the Milwaukee company spoke with investors Tuesday for the first time since announcing last month that production of motorcycles sold in Europe would move overseas in order to avoid retaliatory tariffs the EU is imposing on American exports.

That announcement unleashed a series of critical tweets from President Donald Trump, and there was no sign that the administration's stance on trade would change, despite calls from within the GOP to do so.

"Tariffs are the greatest!" the president tweeted Tuesday. "Either a country which has treated the United States unfairly on Trade negotiates a fair deal, or it gets hit with Tariffs. It's as simple as that — and everybody's talking! Remember, we are the 'piggy bank' that's being robbed. All will be Great!"

With sales stagnant at home, Harley-Davidson has looked increasingly overseas for buyers of its iconic motorcycles. The

company did not discuss Trump's criticism, but CEO Matt Levatich stood by its decision to move some production overseas because of the tariffs.

"It put further pressure on our business and we made the best decision based on the circumstances," he said.

Harley-Davidson said it's working with the Trump administration and other governments to try to get the tariffs removed.

In the short term, the cumulative impact from the tariffs will increase Harley-Davidson's costs as much as \$55 million this year, the company said. Costs from raw materials subject to tariffs, like steel and aluminum, account for \$15 million to \$20 million, and the EU tariffs add another \$30 million to \$35 million, according to Harley-Davidson.

On average, the EU tariffs will increase the cost of motorcycles sold in Europe by \$2,200, but the company is absorbing all of those costs, rather than passing price hikes on to customers.

Harley was one of the high-profile American companies singled out by the Europe for tariffs, along with bourbon and Levi's jeans. Farmers, too, are getting hit as agricultural exports are targeted overseas.

The Trump administration readied a plan Tuesday to send billions in emergency aid to farmers who have been caught in the crossfire.

The tariffs rolled out by Europe took effect right at the end of the most recent quarter, on July 1, so the ramifications have yet to fully land at Harley-Davidson.

Heat waves, dust storms and summer of '34

In the summer of 1934, the entire country was sweltering with record heat and suffering on multiple weather fronts. Three years of dust storms had culminated on an April Sunday when the country was hit by the worst dust storm in history. Dust bowl conditions prevailed from Minnesota to Texas, and food production declined significantly.

That summer saw 29 consecutive days with temperatures hovering in triple digits. By year's end, 75 percent of the country was suffering from drought conditions. In North Texas, the cicadas were too thirsty to chirp.

Americans were dying from heat and hunger. In an attempt to bring relief to working class farmers, Congress passed the Smoot-Hawley Tariff Act, which raised taxes on 900 imports. But the import tariffs caused an international

trade war and the global economy hit a wall. The Great Depression then picked up speed and spread beyond our borders.

What many might not remember is that before Smoot-Hawley, there was a tentative economic recovery afoot and unemployment numbers had temporarily leveled. The Tariff Act helped negate the fledgling recovery and thrust the U.S. and the world further into depression.

Tariff costs are almost always passed on to consumers. Makers of cars, appliances and other products, when hit with tariffs, often will simply tack on that cost to consumers. The U.S. recently imposed 20 percent tariffs on the first 1.2 million washing machines imported this year. After that, there's a 50 percent tariff on the machines, which is expected to take effect sometime in the fall; the United States imports more than 3 million washing machines a year. The result? Between February and May of this year prices rose 16.4 percent, the largest three-month increase in prices ever.

Washing machine sales are a small part of the overall economy. If the tariff talk stops here, consumers would hardly notice. But investors rightfully fear what could be next.

For example, if automobiles, which are a much larger chunk of U.S. GDP, are tariffed at that same 20 percent rate, it likely would raise the price of a new car by at least \$5,000. This would hit a major domestic industry hard at a time when sales are flagging.

These price increases likely will show up full force in the CPI data later this year and early next year, just as the corporate sugar high from the recent tax cuts is starting to wear off. Beyond the headlines, what worries me most as an investor is that this almost certainly will speed up inflation data at a time when the Federal Reserve has a hair trigger and is primed to raise interest rates. Raising rates into an already slowing economy tends to equal downturns. Rinse and repeat if you dare.

'Difficult' time awaits new Fiat Chrysler CEO

MILAN — Fiat Chrysler's second-quarter earnings presentation was meant to celebrate long-time CEO Sergio Marchionne's achievement of eliminating all debt for the formerly troubled company. Instead, it will be overshadowed by his early and sudden exit for serious health problems and the debut of his replacement, Mike Manley.

Credited with the turnaround of the Jeep subsidiary, Manley faces his first big test as the group CEO on Wednesday, when he lays out the Italian-American automaker's earnings and takes questions from analysts likely to focus on how he will manage hard-earned growth and profitability.

Max Warburton, an analyst at research firm Bernstein, said the 54-year-old British manager's outing would be "a difficult baptism." The financial community, he noted, had assumed Marchionne would keep a hand in the business, perhaps as chairman "to phone in his instructions."

The uncertainty created by Marchionne's sudden exit was evident in volatility in the share price Monday, when the stock opened sharply lower only to recover. By Tuesday, its losses were fully recouped. Manley then got a vote of confidence from ratings agency Standard & Poor's, which said Fiat Chrysler's BB+ credit grade and positive outlook remained unchanged by the change in CEO.

For the stock, Warburton said "2019 should be a solid year. But long-term concerns will build." He noted Marchionne had close control of all aspects of the company, so it's unclear how the leadership change might affect that.

Fiat Chrysler's second-quarter net income is expected to come in at 1.28 billion euros, which would be an 11 percent increase over the same period last year, according to a survey of analysts by financial data company FactSet. Sales are expected to have risen 3 percent to 28.87 billion euros.

And it will be Manley who will confirm the achievement of zero debt, announced last month by Marchionne. Marchionne remains hospitalized in Zurich, Switzerland, after his health deteriorated suddenly due to undisclosed complications from surgery on his right shoulder.

No details have been disclosed, but Fiat Chrysler Chairman John Elkann has made clear that his condition precludes a return.

Manley's experience in the United States, where Fiat makes three-quarters of its profits, was key to his nomination.

While Marchionne was the most public face of Fiat Chrysler for the last 14 years, with trusted executives operating mostly behind the scenes, Manley played a key role in both drafting and presenting a new five-year business plan that foresees Jeep and Ram, the two brands he ran, as the growth-drivers. The plan calls for 9 billion euros in investments as the carmaker tries to catch up in the market for gas-electric hybrids and fully electric vehicles.

"Mike Manley has extremely strong credentials to run a global automaker in technological and automation transition," Morgan Stanley analyst Adam Jonas said. He noted Jeep's global expansion, four-fold jump in sales volumes and the doubling of its product lineup since Manley took over in 2009.

Find a starting point for change

As Election Day approaches, we have been reading stories about how millennials and the far left are seeking to turn the national Democratic Party further to the left — even mentioning the “s” word that would have doomed candidates in the past: “socialism.”

But before taking that disastrous turn, Democrats should stop catering to their base — look at what happened to Republicans to see the end result of coddling your base — and instead focus on independents, the middle class and working poor.

A few hints (Republicans, are you listening?):

- **Legal marijuana:** If you want to grab the attention of millennials, this is where you start. The states that have legalized marijuana for responsible adults have not experienced calamities that War on Druggers predicted. Have there been problems and concerns? Of course, but there are a myriad of policies in quite a few states — many of them with right-of-center, libertarian roots — that are ripe for cherry picking to find just the right policy prescription. There is still great irony in the fact that the two drugs that cause the most health issues, family issues and violence — alcohol and tobacco — remain legal while marijuana, the most harmless of the bunch in our view, is filling our prisons and jails with people who don't need to be there.

- **Health care and retirement:** We're not talking about Obamacare, which was a good idea in theory but a disaster in implementation. Even so, the tech/gig economy requires an option for health care — one that allows entrepreneurs to buy health insurance on an open market instead of relying on corporations that shed employees at every market downturn. No one has found the answer for this, yet, but a realistic approach rather than promises that cannot possibly be kept would be a good start.

Corporations once were the cornerstone of a stable life — they provided income, health insurance, stability and retirement plans/pensions. Finding someone who has spent most of their career working for one company, once common, is now a rarity. The generation entering the workforce in the last 10 years is also, for the most part, working toward a retirement that will not include a pension plan. Those have been mostly discarded for 401Ks, which is no guarantee. People are left to fend for themselves and take responsibility for their retirements, a difficult task without health insurance as the price of medical care for the uninsured continues to rise.

- **Get ahead of the weather:** Stop waiting for problems to occur before crafting a solution. Instead, read the newspaper, talk to actual living, breathing people walking in and out of hospital and doctors' offices with and without insurance, and identify what the state and/or country will need in the future. Only then will we finally be able to move forward instead of arguing about subjects endlessly and passing them on from generation to generation.

Even inland, hurricanes put you in jeopardy

In 1967, Pete Seeger composed a protest song that said: “We’re waist deep in the Big Muddy, and the big fool says to push on.” It was a poke at President Lyndon Johnson, in an allegory about Vietnam. That war is long past. But Johnson led us into another, more literal Big Muddy that we have yet to escape.

Hurricane season is underway in North America, with the worst storms likely between August and October. Americans who live inland may think they have nothing to worry about because their homes will not be drowned in saltwater.

But they are at high risk anyway.

That’s because they will have to shoulder a large share of the cost of helping homeowners who live in the path of tropical storms. The National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), created in 1968 under LBJ on the theory that the private insurance market couldn’t handle flood damage, presumed Washington could. Like many of his Great Society initiatives, it

has turned out to be an expensive tutorial on the perils of government intervention.

The program is set to expire at the end of July, but Congress will undoubtedly renew it sooner or later. Correcting its perverse incentives, however, may be a bridge too far.

Hurricane Harvey inundated a house in Kingwood, Texas, last year — the 22nd time it has flooded since 1979. You might think that after the first or second disaster, those in charge of the insurance program would have offered to pay for the owner to rebuild — somewhere else.

But it was allowed to remain in harm’s way. As of 2015, the government had paid \$2.5 million in claims — “at last eight times what the house is worth,” according to the Houston Chronicle.

Nationally, some 30,000 buildings classified as “severe repetitive loss properties” have been covered despite having been swamped an average of five times each. Homes in this category make up about 1 percent of the buildings covered by the flood insurance program — but 30 percent of the claims.

Their premiums don’t cover the expected losses. But as National Resources Defense Council analyst Rob Moore told The Washington Post, “No congressman ever got unelected by providing cheap flood insurance.”

That’s one reason the program is \$25 billion in debt. By underpricing coverage, the government encourages people to build in places that are doomed to go underwater. It also leaves other taxpayers high and dry, and not in a good way.

One explanation for the pattern is the NFIP rules allow rebuilding only if the damage is less than half the value of the home. Otherwise, the owners must move or elevate their homes.

If private insurers were providing coverage, you can be sure they would limit repeat claims in places vulnerable to costly storms. It would be less expensive if those whose homes keep flooding took buyouts so the land could be given over to frogs and sawgrass.

The federal program allows owners to choose that option. But it can take years for local governments to get the needed money from the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

And there is no guarantee owners will get buyouts in the end. The delay pushes them to swallow hard, fix the damage and stay put.

Board makes classification recommendation for Cosby

Sexual Offenders Assessment Board says he should be classified as sexually violent predator

Bill Cosby should be classified as a sexually violent predator, according to an evaluation by Pennsylvania's Sexual Offenders Assessment Board.

The district attorney's office that prosecuted Cosby asked a judge in a filing Tuesday to schedule a hearing on whether to accept the recommendation. No date was immediately set.

"We will see them in court," responded Andrew Wyatt, Cosby's spokesman.

The 81-year-old comedian was convicted April 26 of aggravated indecent assault. He was accused of drugging and assaulting former Temple University employee Andrea Constand at his home near Philadelphia in 2004.

The weekslong retrial in suburban Philadelphia included testimony from five other women who were among dozens who have stepped forward to accuse Cosby of similar sexual misconduct.

The Associated Press does not typically identify people who say they are victims of sexual assault unless they grant permission, as Constand has done.

The former TV star once known as "America's Dad" for his portrayal of kindly Dr. Cliff Huxtable on his

NBC hit "The Cosby Show" is now confined to his home awaiting sentencing, which is scheduled for Sept. 24. He faces up to 10 years in prison. His representatives have said he plans to appeal.

Superior Court Judge Steven O'Neill, who presided at the trial, ordered him to be outfitted with a GPS monitoring bracelet and required him to seek permission to leave home, and only then to visit with lawyers or go to the doctor.

The report by the Sexual Offenders Assessment Board, which examined 14 different criteria, is not public. Copies are given to the prosecutor, defense attorney and court before the hearing and the board's assessor will likely testify about how she made the recommendation.

State law already requires Cosby to register as a sex offender because of the nature of the charge of which he was convicted. The sexually violent

predator classification would require increased treatment in prison and increased notification of neighbors upon release. A person deemed a

predator is subject to lifetime, at least monthly, mandatory sex offender counseling with a treatment provider approved by the state board.

Thai soccer boys' heads shaved for Buddhist ordination

MAE SAI, Thailand — The young soccer teammates and their coach who were rescued after being trapped in a cave in northern Thailand had their heads shaved in a ceremony Tuesday as they prepared to be ordained as Buddhist novices and monks.

Eleven of the 12 boys and their coach prayed to ancient relics and offered drinks and desserts in gilded bowls to spirits at a Buddhist temple. The 12th team member who was trapped in the cave didn't take part because he isn't

Buddhist.

The boys, whose ages range from 11 to 16, will be ordained to become Buddhist novices in a ceremony on Wednesday, while the 25-year-old coach will be ordained as a monk, said Parchon Pratsakul, the governor of Chiang Rai province.

Wednesday's ordainment ceremony will take place at another temple on a Chiang Rai mountaintop before the group returns to reside for more than a week at the Wat Pha That Doi Wao temple near Thailand's northern border with Myanmar. That temple is close to the group's homes, making it

easier for friends and relatives to visit.

"This temple will be where they will reside after the ordination and I hope they will find peace, strength and wisdom from practicing Buddha's teaching," said the temple's acting abbot, Phra Khru Prayutjetianukarn.

Buddhist males in Thailand are traditionally expected to enter the monkhood, often as novices, at some point in their lives to show gratitude, often toward their parents for raising them. It's believed that once a person is ordained they gain merit that is also extended to their parents.

According to a statement from the GEO Group, which manages the Bay Correctional & Rehabilitation Facility, the employee was taken to Bay Medical Center, where she is in stable condition and is under observation.

Joby Smith, Emergency Management Division Chief for Bay County, said they responded to the facility about 10:30 a.m. and

Lynn Haven CVS moving 1 lot north

New building will replace current store closing because of State 390 widening

LYNN HAVEN — A new CVS store is being built right next door to the existing one in Lynn Haven as part of the planned State 390 road widening.

Taxpayers are shelling out more than \$11.7 million to buy the CVS property in Lynn Haven, as well as demolish the building and construct a new store next to it as part of the widening project.

The new store already is

under construction north of the existing CVS store at the northeast intersection of State 390 and State 77.

The landowner, FLA I Trustee Inc., was paid more than \$6.5 million for the property. And the business,


CVS, received \$5.2 for business damages, said Ian Satter, a spokesman for the Florida Department of Transportation.

CVS made the decision to build the new store next to the existing one.

CVS officials said they plan to close the existing store next month and move into the new one the day after the old one closes, so one of the stores will remain open throughout the process.

Satter said the CVS store has to be moved because the land was needed to funnel traffic from a divided six-lane State 390 west of State 77 down to the current two-lane

Retired PCB firefighter honored for rescues

PANAMA CITY — Monday evening was special for retired Panama City Beach firefighter Todd Flitcraft.

Flitcraft received a local and state Hero of the Year award from the local chapter of the 40 & 8, a veterans service organization, for two separate rescues spanning a decade. In January, Flitcraft ran into a burning home to save his neighbor, and in 2008, he saved a veteran who was caught in a rip current while swimming in the Gulf of Mexico.

"It is very humbling to be honored by a group like the 40 & 8," Flitcraft said. "These guys are the real heroes."

Flitcraft retired in 2015 after serving 12 years as a

firefighter and sea rescuer with Panama City Beach Fire Rescue, according to a biography.

40 & 8 members took notice of Flitcraft after news reports on January's house fire rescue. Steve Dring, the local 40 & 8 chapter's chef de gare — the group's term for leader — called Flitcraft "very modest" and "not boastful."

"I have personally known Todd Flitcraft for many years. ... Todd Flitcraft is a true American hero," Gary Swearingen, assistant fire chief of the Panama City Fire Department, wrote in an email recommending Flitcraft for the award. "I tell you his actions were those of a man who is a firefighter 'till his dying days, regardless of whether he wears the badge or not."

Flitcraft said the rescues stem from his mom's advice

of always helping people. "I felt like I was in the right place at the right time," Flitcraft said. "It's fortunate, the way everything turned

out." Flitcraft received a similar award from the Panama City Fire Department earlier this year.



Judges set to hear Medicaid challenges

TALLAHASSEE — Twenty-seven legal challenges filed by managed-care plans protesting state decisions to award \$90 billion in Medicaid contracts have been grouped into five cases that will be heard in administrative court next month.

A review of state Division of Administrative Hearings records shows that, for the most part, judges have agreed to consolidate challenges by the types of patients that managed-care plans would serve.

For instance, Administrative Law Judge Robert Kilbride consolidated three challenges that were filed by two companies about the provision of specialty care for people with HIV — the virus that causes AIDS — and AIDS. He is scheduled to hear the challenges Aug. 7.

The state Agency for Health Care Administration announced in April that it would sign a statewide specialty contract with Clear Health Alliance to provide services to people with HIV and AIDS. The AIDS Healthcare Foundation, which operates the managed-care plan known as Positive Healthcare, filed challenges in Medicaid regions 10 and 11, which encompass Broward and Miami-Dade and Monroe counties, respectively. The South Florida Community Care Partnership, a managed-care plan run by the North and South Broward hospital districts, filed a challenge in Region 10.

Managed-care plans filed the 27 challenges after the Agency for Health Care Administration awarded contracts in 11 different regions of the state to provide various types of care. The contracts range from caring for Medicaid beneficiaries with conditions such as HIV and AIDS to “comprehensive” contracts that include providing care to broad swaths of beneficiaries, including people who need long-term care.

Similar to the handling of

the HIV and AIDS contract challenges, Administrative Law Judge R. Bruce McKibben, agreed to consolidate 14 challenges filed by three companies over the provision of specialty care for people with serious mental illness. He is scheduled to hear the cases Aug. 8.

McKibben consolidated challenges that were filed by Coral Care, which wanted to provide services to people with serious mental illness in Medicaid regions 8 and 11; one challenge filed by the South Florida Community Care Network, which wanted to provide specialty services to Broward County residents; and 11 challenges filed by Magellan Health Care, which wanted to provide care to people with serious mental illness statewide. Medicaid Region 8, sought by Coral Care, includes seven counties in southwest and south-central Florida.

Administrative Judge Lawrence Johnston, meanwhile, has agreed to consolidate nine challenges filed by two companies regarding the provision of specialty care to children with complex medical needs. Those challenges — eight filed by Our Children’s Provider Sponsored Network and one filed by the South Florida Community Care Network — are scheduled to be heard Aug. 6 and Aug. 7.

The only challenge that stands alone is a case filed by Best Care Assurance. The provider-sponsored network, a type of managed-care plan, filed a challenge after the state Agency for Health Care Administration agreed to award Molina Healthcare a “comprehensive” contract for Medicaid Region 8. Molina was awarded the contract as part of a settlement agreement reached with the state.

But Best Care Assurance said state Medicaid law limits to four the number of managed-care plans the state can contract with for Region 8, made up of Charlotte, Collier, DeSoto, Glades, Hendry, Lee and Sarasota counties. In its challenge, the health plan argues the state has

contracted with five plans in the region. Administrative Law Judge Linzie F. Bogan will hear the challenge Aug. 15.

After approval from lawmakers in 2011, the Agency for Health Care Administration in 2013 launched a program that requires most Medicaid beneficiaries to enroll in managed-care plans. The agency initially signed five-year contracts with health plans across the 11 regions. It began reprocurement efforts in 2017, issuing an invitation to negotiate with managed-care plans that want new five-year contracts.

After months of reviews and negotiations AHCA has announced the 13 managed care plans it intends to contract with. In aggregate, the five-year contracts are expected to be worth about \$90 billion, one top-ranking Medicaid official has said.

Some health plans with existing contracts, such as Positive Healthcare and Magellan Health Care, were not chosen for the new round of contracts, prompting them to file legal challenges. Other health plans that were new to the market also challenged the state’s decisions.

Meanwhile, with existing Medicaid managed-care contracts set to expire at the end of the year, AHCA announced last month a timeline for transitioning to the new plans.

Southeast Florida, from St. Lucie County south to Monroe County, will be the first area of the state that transitions from the old to the new contracts, with Dec. 1 as the target date.

The target date for the state to transition from the old to new contracts for Medicaid regions 5, 6, 7 and 8 is Jan. 1. Those regions include 18 counties, stretching across Central Florida from Pinellas County to Brevard County and in Southwest Florida.

Most of the northern half of the state — stretching from Escambia to Volusia and Lake counties — will be the last area for the change in health care plans, with a Feb. 1 target date to transition to the new contracts.

highway east of State 77.

“There are millions and millions of dollars programmed for right-of-way acquisition along this corridor,” Satter said. “Obviously, the larger the property, the larger the business, that can affect the cost for the right of way.”

Satter said the CVS is not the only business bought out for the widening project, pointing out Precision Collision was purchased and has moved near Mosley High School.

“Sometimes right-of-way costs will exceed the cost of construction,” Satter said.

That is the case with this project.

Satter said the

right-of-way acquisition budget for the State 390 widening from Jenks Avenue to State 77 is \$50.5 million. The state needs 105 properties, and the total businesses affected is 24, Satter said.

The CVS property is costing almost half of what the overall construction cost is on the property. The state is shelling out \$26.2 million to widen State 390 into a six-lane highway from Jenks Avenue to State 77.

Work on the widening is expected to start in September and be completed in June 2022.

The project involves widening the 1.5 miles of existing two-lane highway to a divided six-lane highway while adding medians, buffered bicycle lanes and sidewalks, as well as constructing a new pedestrian overpass to Mowat Middle School.

began taking samples from the mailroom. They finished about 2 p.m. and did not find anything.

“There’s no connection that we have right now with anything that happened here and her reaction,” said Smith, adding that they were responding as part of an abundance of caution. “It’s better for us to come in and clear the building before

they go back to normal operations.”

As part of their testing, Hazmat workers collected air samples and physical samples with equipment that can analyze the chemical makeup of substances from the Bayline Drive facility, Smith said. The incident was isolated to the mailroom, and no inmates or other staff were moved.

The Bay County Sheriff’s Office Bomb Squad also assisted as a precaution, along with about half a dozen EMS ambulances to assist the Hazmat team.

Group to hold peaceful protest outside Gaetz rally

NICEVILLE — A “coalition of concerned citizens” will host a “Stand for Compassion” vigil outside Northwest Florida State College in response to the campaign rally Aug. 2 for Congressman Matt Gaetz which will include guest speakers Donald Trump Jr. and Ron DeSantis, who is running for Florida governor.

David Simmons, faculty adviser for NWF State’s Gay-Straight Alliance, said the decision to code the event as a vigil was to make clear that this is not an angry protest.

Instead, it is a chance for people to assemble peacefully and stand up for love and compassion. Simmons

said he expects 100 to 200 participants.

“I feel that Trump Jr. and the Trump administration have not been an administration of compassion,” Simmons said.

The vigil is co-hosted by both the Northwest Florida State College Gay Straight Alliance and Progressives Northwest Florida. Tracey Tapp, activism chairwoman for Progressives Northwest Florida, said she feels it’s important to be visible. She also credited NWF State’s security and the Niceville Police Department for helping the groups exercise their First Amendment right to free speech and assembly.

“We often feel like we have to be quiet because of the prevailing culture in this area,” Tapp said. “It’s so good to amplify our voice.”

According to the Stand for Compassion statement of principals, issues such as the separation of families at the U.S. border, efforts to roll back the rights and protections of women and the LGBTQ community as well as the lack of action in response to mass shootings are the key issues that vigil participants disagreed with the policies of Trump administration.

If he had the chance to sit

down with Trump Jr. and Republican politicians, Simmons said he would like to ask what they could do to bring more compassion to their policies.

“What will they do to help the poor, help minorities, women and the LGBTQ community?” he said. Simmons said he looks to the teachings of Martin Luther King Jr. when it comes to nonviolence protest. He’s also written two books on the subject. On Aug. 1, he will help lead a training session on nonviolence practices that will be open to the public.

“I feel strongly that we should be peaceful and respond to opposition with love and compassion,” Simmons said. “That’s what changes hearts and minds.”

Claudia LeBrun is president of the college’s Gay Straight Alliance. As a gay Latina, LeBrun said she felt it was her responsibility to stand up for minorities. LeBrun said she encourages peaceful dialogue at the vigil.

“The message of the vigil is tolerance and love of one another even if we don’t see eye to eye,” she said. “We all live in the country together and we want to be accepted and loved. We’re not there to be aggressive and if we get yelled at we’re not going to yell back.”



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Crab Island death total reaches 4

Man dies after trying to swim to Crab Island from Destin bridge

DESTIN — Authorities said a Texas man has died after he was pulled from the water July 14 while trying to swim to Crab Island.

Hamza Abusabeel, 28, from Dallas, died July 16, two days after friends said he tried to swim from the northwest corner of the Marler Bridge to Crab Island. The Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office announced his death Monday.

According to the sheriff's office, two friends tried unsuccessfully to talk Abusabeel out of his plan to swim across the channel because the current was too strong.

After several minutes, they lost sight of him in the water. A friend then spotted Abusabeel face down in the channel. Abusabeel was pulled to shore by another man and CPR was initiated

until first responders arrived. Abusabeel remained in

the Intensive Care Unit of Fort Walton Beach Medical Center until he

died two days later. Four people have died at or near Crab Island

this year. A man from Mobile, Alabama, died May 26 in

an apparent drowning at the popular boating and party spot.

Authorities said 36-year-old Essie Mitchell had gone down a slide into the water and was spotted a short time later floating face down.

On the morning of July 5, the body of 20-year-old Pethiley Deusetete Lopez Maximo of Destin was found by divers after friends told deputies he was last seen wading in waist-high water the night before, near the west side of the Marler Bridge. He had attended a Fourth of July beach party that night.

And this past weekend, an 18-year-old Pensacola man is believed to have drowned after he floated away in a strong current and was unable to get back to his pontoon boat on Crab Island. Two bystanders on another boat attempted to save him but were unsuccessful and also had to receive medical attention.

Zion Foster's body was found by sheriff's office divers early Sunday.

"We loved helping them out of the nest," she said.

According to the Panama City Beach Turtle Watch website, there have been 44 recorded nests so far this season. Turtles lay eggs between May and October, meaning that while some are hatching, others are still being laid. Turtle watch also has recorded 34 false crawls and 11 strandings so far this year for sea turtles.

Anyone who sees nesting or hatching turtles is urged to call Panama City Beach police at 850-233-5000 and to turn off all bright lights in the area.

TALLAHASSEE Judge strikes down state's campus ban on early voting

A federal judge is telling

Florida that college campuses can be used for early voting sites in this year's elections.

U.S. District Judge Mark Walker ruled Tuesday that the state's ban on using college and university campuses for early voting sites is unconstitutional. The League of Women Voters of Florida and several college students sued Secretary of State Ken Detzner over the ban in May.

Detzner in 2014 told officials in Gainesville that they could not use the University of Florida student union as an early voting location. He said the early voting law does not allow it. The state does allow voting on college campuses during Election Day.

Walker ruled, however, that Detzner's decision created a secondary class of voters and put a lopsided burden on students.

TALLAHASSEE Video captures officer helping homeless man shave

In a random act of kindness that's gone viral, a Florida police officer was captured on video helping a homeless man shave his thick beard before a job interview.

The Tallahassee Democrat reported Officer Tony Carlson pulled into a gas station Sunday and saw the man trying to shave. The man, identified only as Phil, didn't have a mirror and was having a difficult time.

The video shows Carlson shaving the man's beard.

Phil told the officer he was trying to get a job at the nearby McDonald's but needed to be clean shaven to get hired.

Carlson didn't know the encounter was being recorded by someone at the gas station. The Tallahassee officer said he hopes Phil gets the job.

ORLANDO Orlando officials: No questions about immigration status

Municipal workers, including police officers, in one Florida city won't be able to ask about someone's immigration status under a new policy.

The Orlando City Council on Monday unanimously approved the resolution known as the Trust Act.

A coalition of immigration and civil rights groups that advocated for the resolution said Orlando is the first city in the South to adopt such a resolution.

Other U.S. cities that have passed similar measures are Philadelphia, Chicago and Boston.

Before the council meeting, Orlando Mayor Buddy Dyer said he had heard heartbreaking stories about the effects of the federal government's immigration policies and he wanted Orlando to send a message of inclusiveness.

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
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

Alabama counting on Pierschbacher

ATLANTA – Ross Pierschbacher sat down at his station at SEC Media Days and was greeted by a flurry of questions and camera clicks. Once a young player from Iowa, but he was representing the defending national champions as a senior returning starter at SEC Media Days.

Pierschbacher will begin his fifth season with Alabama, marking his fourth year as a starter. An All-SEC performer last year and a second-team all-league player the year before, it is safe to say he's played a lot of football with a lot of different

people. He has started 42 games at guard, and running back Damien Harris praised that experience.

"Ross is one of the most dependable guys on our team. He started at right guard, he started at left guard, now he's starting at center," said Harris. "And so he's really the anchor of our offense, and everything revolves around him and runs through him."

When Pierschbacher first came to Alabama, he was characterized as being quiet and reserved. He has learned to speak up.

"You have to be more vocal and kind of commanding and have that confidence, so I think

I've really had to transition with that," said Pierschbacher. "That's sort of what I've been working on the off-season just knowing that I'm going into my senior year."

That leadership did not come naturally. Pierschbacher said that he wasn't comfortable being on such a big stage with talented players from all over the country at first, but that "gaining the respect" over time increased his confidence. No player respects him more than Harris.

"He's a guy that a lot of people look up to, and he's versatile as a player," said Harris. "He shows that unselfishness that he can do whatever he's asked to do."

Ready to step up

Check out six players expected to shine for the Gators this season

Every fall, a handful of Florida football players who haven't previously drawn much attention start to emerge as significant contributors.

Here are six Gators (three on offense, three on defense) who aren't really on the radar now, but will have a chance to show up this season:

C'Yontai Lewis, Tight end, Sr. – He hasn't been much of a factor up to this point in his career, combining to catch only 27 passes over the past three seasons. He'll have a chance to double that production in one season playing in an offense that features the tight end in the passing game. Long and athletic, Lewis can be a matchup problem for safeties and linebackers. He had an excellent spring, catching multiple passes. The

key for him in 2018 is showing better consistency with his hands. If he does, he could have a huge season.

Rick Wells, Wide receiver, So. – A four-star prospect coming out of Jacksonville Raines, this guy has been completely off the radar since he's been here. He red-shirted his freshman season, then was suspended all of last season for alleged credit card fraud. But this spring, out of nowhere, Wells emerged as a potential playmaker. He showed speed, the ability to get open and a determination to go get the ball. Transfers Van Jefferson and Trevon Grimes are getting all the attention heading into the season, but Wells has a chance to make his presence felt this fall.

Noah Banks, Offensive tackle, Jr. – This junior college transfer from Iowa Western College is physically and mentally ready to go and brings instant depth to the two offensive tackle spots. Should the coaches

feel the need to move Martez Ivey back inside to guard, the 6-foot-6, 315 pounds Banks is ready to step in at one of the tackles. He figures to be in the playing rotation either way.

Jeawon Taylor, Safety, Jr. – This player actually started emerging in the second half of last season, starting five of the final six games. Then he sort of disappeared. He injured his shoulder against UAB, underwent surgery and was held out of contact work in the spring. But he showed last season that he's not only a player, he also has leadership qualities that were evident in a young secondary. He's looking at a possible breakout season if his shoulder cooperates.

Rayshad Jackson, Linebacker, Jr. – This Miami product has mostly just been a special teams player in the past, but it looks like his role is going to change dramatically under new defensive coordinator

Darlington puts pedal to metal to finish work

DARLINGTON, S.C. – It's the final stage for Darlington Raceway's improvement project.

Workers toss plastic seats to each other to attach to framework laid into the redone Tyler Tower Grandstand. Solar-power lights line the backstretch once night falls to keep the 16-hour work days going. And cranes haul equipment skyward to finish the track's \$7 million renovation in time for an August re-opening and NASCAR's Southern 500 on Sept. 2.

"I don't think there's any cushion for lost time, now," Darlington president Kerry Tharp said Tuesday. "Every day is valuable."

Darlington vice president of track operations Dennis Adcock said the project that began in February about three-quarters finished. The goal, track spokesman Dennis Worden said, is to have things about 95 percent done by Aug. 14 when South Carolina Gov. Henry McMaster and

reigning Xfinity Series champion Elliott Sadler will be among those on hand to open the redone facility.

Right now, though, there's plenty of work left to do.

Piles of material fill parking lots where concessions and race vehicles will be stationed in five weeks' time. Drills whirr and backup warning tones blare throughout the track "Too Tough To Tame."

The control tower atop the Tyler stands where broadcasters, NASCAR officials and team spotters stay during the race has been rebuilt. Workers have altered the slope of the stands and added new, wider individual seats (with cup holders) culled from International Speedway Corp. tracks in Daytona, Kansas and Richmond to improve the sightlines for patrons.

Where fans often have had to look around the person in front of them in the flatter configuration, Worden explained, the

CLEVELAND Love agrees to \$120M extension with Cavs

Kevin Love isn't leaving Cleveland anytime soon.

The All-Star forward signed a new four-year, \$120 million contract with the Cavaliers, who are beginning anew following LeBron James' departure.

Love signed the extension Tuesday and immediately posted a photo on Instagram showing himself surrounded by construction workers inside Quicken Loans Arena, the Cavaliers' downtown home, which is undergoing a renovation similar to the one taking place with the four-time defending Eastern Conference champions.

Love, who will turn 30 in September, just completed his fourth season with Cleveland, which was swept by Golden State in the NBA Finals. That loss was followed by James leaving in free agency — for the second time in his career — to sign with the Los Angeles Lakers.

IRVINE, CALIF. Gurley inks record extension with Rams

Running back Todd Gurley agreed to a lucrative four-year contract extension through 2023 with the Los Angeles Rams on Tuesday.

Rams general manager Les Snead confirmed a new deal for the NFL's offensive player of the year, calling Gurley a cornerstone of a team with Super Bowl aspirations.

The Rams didn't announce the financial terms of the deal, but ESPN said the extension is worth \$60 million, with a whopping \$45 million guaranteed. That deal contains the NFL's largest annual average value for a running back contract, resetting the market for ball-carriers such as Dallas' Ezekiel Elliott and Arizona's David Johnson — and for Pittsburgh's Le'Veon Bell next year.

Gurley was a league standout in his third NFL season while playing in first-year coach Sean McVay's explosive offense. He finished second in the NFL with 1,305 yards rushing and 13 touchdowns while catching 64 passes for 788 yards and six more TDs.

EAGAN, MINN. Vikings cancel practice for Sparano service

The Minnesota Vikings have canceled their training camp practice on Friday so the team can attend the memorial service for offensive line coach Tony Sparano, who died unexpectedly of a heart condition.

The Vikings announced the cancellation on Tuesday, two days after the 56-year-old's death. Sparano died of arteriosclerotic heart disease, or hardening of the arteries, according to the Hennepin County medical examiner's office.

The service will take place in the Twin Cities area, where Sparano and his wife moved in 2016 when he was hired by the Vikings.

Training days

What to watch for as NFL camps get underway

NFL teams began reporting to training camps last week. More will do so this week.

After a busy and often tumultuous offseason that included major player and coaching moves, record-breaking contracts and intense controversy over the league's national anthem policy, here's what to watch as camps get underway.

More anthem policy deliberations

The league and the owners hoped they had resolved the matter when they ratified a new policy in May. But the controversy did not dissipate. The NFL Players Association filed a grievance. President Donald Trump continued to raise the issue. The public debate continued last week when the Miami Dolphins informed their players that they could be subject to as much as a four-game suspension without pay for conduct detrimental to the team for protesting during the anthem. Now things are far from resolved, with the league and union having announced last week that they'd reached an agreement to put both implementation of the new anthem policy and the NFLPA's grievance on hold. People on both sides have expressed hope that a resolution will be reached by the start of the season.

Wentz, Foles and the Eagles

Nick Foles is a Super Bowl MVP and a best-selling author after leading the Philadelphia Eagles to a triumph over the New England Patriots in February. Even so, he could be a backup quarterback once again. The Eagles are committed to Carson Wentz as their franchise quarterback. If he demonstrates that he's recovered from the knee injury that cut short what could have been an MVP season and shows that he's ready to start the season, he'll be in the Eagles' lineup and Foles will be back on the sideline. But there's no reason for the Eagles to rush Wentz. His every move will be scrutinized, especially now

that Foles has demonstrated what he can do in coach Doug Pederson's offense.

Helmet-hitting rule

NFL rulemakers surprised everyone when they pushed through the rule in May that makes it a penalty for a player to lower his head to initiate contact with an opponent. The league hailed the development as a significant player-safety enhancement. But no one knows exactly how the rule will be enforced and how great an impact it will have. It will be a wait-and-see matter for everyone, beginning with the enforcement of the rule during the preseason. The best guess for now is that the most egregious hits in open-field situations will draw penalty flags and possibly ejections and suspensions, while most of what happens at the line of scrimmage is likely to prove too difficult for the on-field officials to call in real time.

Rookie QBs

It was a highly celebrated NFL draft class that ended up with Baker Mayfield in Cleveland, Sam Darnold with the New York Jets, Josh Allen in Buffalo and Josh Rosen in Arizona. There's a chance that none of them will be an Week 1 starter as a rookie. The Browns traded for Tyrod Taylor. The Jets re-signed Josh McCown and brought in Teddy Bridgewater. The Bills signed AJ McCarron. The Cardinals added Sam Bradford and Mike Glennon. But Mayfield, Darnold, Allen and Rosen will get their chances at some point, probably sooner rather than later. There's too much hope and too much draft capital invested in them for their organizations not to be eager to get them on the field. Darnold and Allen, in particular, could make strong cases to be season-opening starters if they make quick progress during training camp and the preseason. And the other quarterback taken in the first round, Lamar Jackson, could make things interesting in Baltimore, although probably not until after Joe Flacco is given one more chance to get the Ravens back to contender status.

McCoy and the Bills

Running back LeSean McCoy

has been accused by his former girlfriend and her attorney of being involved in a home invasion in which she was injured at a house he owns in Georgia. While authorities investigate and the legal process plays out, the Bills and the NFL must make a determination about McCoy's playing status. NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell is empowered to place McCoy on paid leave by using the commissioner's exempt list, if he chooses.

Catch rule

What's a catch? The NFL claims to finally know, after streamlining the controversial rule during the offseason. Will the new standard satisfy players, coaches and fans, who so often in the past have been dumbfounded by the league's inability to figure out what should be one of the simplest and most straightforward rules interpretations in all of sports? The preseason will provide the first glimpses. The biggest change is that a receiver who makes a catch while going to the ground no longer must maintain possession of the football while on the turf to be awarded a legal catch. So, if this rule had been in effect at the time, Calvin Johnson would have made the catch. Dez Bryant would have made the catch. Jesse James would have made the catch. And on and on. The common-sense approach should be welcome for players and fans alike, although one byproduct could be an increase in the number of fumbles committed soon after catches on plays that previously might have been ruled incompletions.

Luck's return

Andrew Luck is back with the Indianapolis Colts after missing all of last season following shoulder surgery. The Colts desperately need him to resemble the quarterback who once appeared on his way to becoming the league's next big thing. If not, the retooling project being overseen by general manager Chris Ballard and Frank Reich, the new head coach hired after the Colts were spurned by Patriots offensive coordinator Josh McDaniels in a post-Super Bowl twist, won't be off to a promising start.

Lochte unsure about future

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — Ryan Lochte doesn't know when he'll be in another race.

And that worries him.

What's next for Lochte is a mystery, even to himself. The U.S. Anti-Doping Agency's decision to suspend the 12-time Olympic swimming medalist because he broke a rule by getting an intravenous infusion of vitamins will keep him from competing in any major meet through July 2019.

So essentially, the only opponent he'll be facing other than training partners as he preps for the 2020 Tokyo Olympics is rust.

"I'm worried about that 100 percent," Lochte said Monday, shortly after USADA announced his ban. "I know I'll be able to swim in 2020, but in swimming, you have to compete. You have to race. It doesn't matter how well you train. That doesn't matter. It's how you compete when you get on those starting blocks. And the less chance I have of getting on those blocks, the worse it's going to be for me."

The suspension was handed down by anti-doping officials, who made clear that Lochte was not taking any banned substance. His mistake was getting an IV that exceeded the legal level of 100 milliliters — something he and his wife did together at a Gainesville, Florida, clinic on May 24 in an effort to bolster their immune systems after their infant son got sick.

Lochte posted a photo of the scene on his Instagram account, and USADA opened an investigation after seeing that image.

Lochte cooperated with the USADA probe, but apparently was shown no leniency. His penalty: A 14-month sanction, going back to the date of the photo. It will cost him the chance to swim at this week's U.S. national championships, the Pan Pacific Championships later this year, and next year's world championships.

Hence, his concern about rust.

"It's something I'll have to deal with," Lochte said.

He said he will continue his daily training regimen. It's possible Lochte could race in some unsanctioned events during the suspension — he said he would review options. He hasn't raced often since the 2016 Rio de Janeiro Olympics, where he left in shame after his story about how he and three teammates were victims of an armed robbery unraveled and ultimately led to him being suspended for 10 months by U.S. officials.

"As soon as you get to a certain point or level, in any kind of sport career, you're always going to have an eye on you," Lochte said. "I think I've learned it the hard way, definitely — especially since Rio. And now this."

track officials call a "Wall of Honor" — banners of its 49 winners spaced in the bottom of its front- and backstretch grandstands. In all, the project will shrink Darlington's capacity by about 8,000 to 10,000 seats, Tharp said, making Darlington a more manageable facility.

Those lost seats, Tharp said, were not great places to sit.

"You couldn't see anything," he said. "That's not what we wanted for our fans."

Once the ribbon is cut on the re-opened building next month, Worden said most of the remaining work will go toward tweaking areas of need and normal preparations leading up to the yearly NASCAR race.

1. Pocono déjà vu

If it seems like the Cup Series was just at Pocono Raceway, you are not going bananas. NASCAR held an event there on June 3, and six races later, they are back in the mountain region of Pennsylvania. The "Tricky Triangle" has long been the track with two Cup race dates closest together. This tradition started in 1982 when Bobby Allison swept both races that season.

2. Charlotte crashes

The Charlotte road-course race later this season should be interesting. Several drivers crashed heavily (as they say in sports-car racing) after an open test on the officially dubbed and trademarked ROVAL (road course/oval). The track will use the road course for its Sept. 30 Cup

Series playoff race. William Byron got the worst of it. His No. 24 Hendrick Motorsports Chevrolet failed to make the hard left turn off the oval and slammed into a temporary tire barrier.

3. Silly season?

It's getting to that time of year when rumors start flying about the status of teams, drivers and sponsors for the next season of competition. Kurt Busch has started talking about his lack of a contract with Stewart-Haas Racing in 2019. Meanwhile, Jimmie Johnson will lose his primary sponsor Lowe's after 2018 runs its course, and 5-hour Energy won't be back next year with Martin Truex Jr. All of this news is not so silly.

ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

This week's deals come from last year's Summer NABC in Toronto. Our hero was Mark Cohen, playing with his wife, Stasha, in the Freeman Mixed BAM Teams. To make his contract, Mark managed to make the most of his club spots; yes, that 5-3 of clubs had a part to play.

Mark reached four spades, and after the diamond-six lead to the jack and king, Mark cashed the spade ace-king to get the first bad news, then led the diamond two to get more bad news as West showed out.

But there was some good news when West pitched an odd-even heart nine to encourage the suit, a card that he could not afford. Cohen ducked the diamond in dummy, and East won to return a diamond. Yes, a club would have been better, but the obvious power of the 5-3 was evident to all.

After West ruffed the third diamond, he shifted to the club 10. Mark won the club ace, crossed to dummy with a trump, took his diamond winner, discarding his club, and then led the club five from dummy. When East followed lazily with the club four, declarer pitched a heart and took the rest after West won the trick and was endplayed to lead hearts.

Had East covered the club five, Cohen would have ruffed to lead the heart queen. With West obliged to cover, the blockage in hearts would have caused South to be endplayed upon winning the heart 10 at the next trick. He would have to concede a ruff-sluff, allowing the third heart to go away.

ANSWER: The double of a four-heart opening (or any auction where the opponents bid hearts and raise to four hearts) is primarily for takeout. It is less clear how to play a similar sequence where the opponents get to four spades — I personally believe that is takeout-optional. But here you should have no problem bidding four no-trump to get partner to choose between the minors.

Move over, Track 29, and make room for a renaissance in this charming Southern city.

With more than a trifle to share, nothing could be finer than to dine at St. John's Restaurant, located in a flatiron building constructed at the turn of the 20th century. This property served as a hotel and later as a brothel before being abandoned for the next several decades. In the year 2000, however, local architect Thomas Johnson bought and restored the building, and St. John's Restaurant opened within it soon thereafter, debuting Chattanooga's first farm-to-table dining experience.

Rebecca Barron, a Milwaukee transplant whose wrist sports a tattoo of a beet, honed her chops in the kitchen there and is today the restaurant's executive chef. She embraces farm-to-table cooking and her menu is inspired both by local farms and by her culinary travels through Europe, India and southeast Asia.

Barron's bold style was on display in an amuse bouche of pimento cheese on a cracker, topped with lump crab, a ripe strawberry and a sprinkling of caviar sustainably grown in the Aquitaine region of France.

Her Croque Madame was a study in Southern ingenuity: sunny-side-up quail egg over pork belly on a buttermilk biscuit, enrobed in a smoked Gouda Mornay sauce with a side of country ham and a dipping sauce of blueberry jam. How could it get any better? With a quaff of Anthill Farms 2015 Anderson Valley Pinot Noir ... and a magic trick.

The trick was performed by my server, who set down a Bell jar, twisted off its cap and stepped back while white smoke slithered out like a cobra, unveiling the jar's colorful contents: roasted beets and local Crabtree Farm green beans, blackberries and strawberries, all sitting atop a base of sheep's milk cheese from Blackberry Farm.

On my final day in Chattanooga, I made a visit to Songbirds Guitar Museum, where I ooh'd and aaah'd at its vintage instrument collection, from Gibsons to Fenders.

It was a hot and humid walk from the museum to my digs at the boutique Dwell Hotel. There I gratefully succumbed to a cleansing salt bath in my oversized, in-room soaking tub.

I emerged refreshed and headed to the hotel's lounge, Matilda Midnight, and on to its dining room, Solarium Cafe. Locally sourced ingredients and botanicals are the draw in this cozy, 35-seat restaurant, where a health-forward menu includes a Cashew Kale Dip worthy of sharing.

Cashew Kale Dip

Serves 4-6

NOTE: Prepare 24 hours in advance

- 2 cups whole, unsalted raw cashews (soak overnight in 2 quarts room temperature water)
- ½ teaspoon garlic powder
- ½ teaspoon black pepper
- ¼ cup lemon juice
- ¼ cup nutritional yeast
- 1 bunch of kale
- ½ cup breadcrumbs (optional)
- Lavash crackers, veggie chips and raw veggies of choice

Soak cashews overnight or until plump and softened.

Drain the soaking liquid, reserving ¾ cup of the water. Add the nuts, garlic powder, black pepper, reserved cashew water, lemon juice and yeast to a food processor and pulse until the mixture is smooth. This is called cashew cheese.

Take 1 bunch of kale, with leaves stripped from stems, and sauté until wilted. Place kale in a colander to drain for 10 minutes, then press out



any excess liquid between paper towels and finely chop.

Fold together cashew cheese and kale, place in a baking dish, top with breadcrumbs (optional) and bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes or until top is golden and it is warmed through. Scoop up dip while still warm with lavash crackers and/or veggie chips.

Veggies in abundance for zucchini quick bread

Seeing freckles of orange and green bring smiles to the face and delight to the palate when you cut into zucchini quick bread. This time of year, when fresh vegetables are in abundance, I like to make Zucchini Carrot Bread. A crunchy crust and a tender crumb makes this quick bread special.

A bowl of overripe bananas on the kitchen table reminded me that it

had been a long time since I had made a quick bread. Of course, one of my all-time favorites is banana nut bread. I usually use pecans, but my granddaughter. Remember that bananas need to be very ripe.

Banana Walnut Bread

- ½ cup softened butter
- ½ cup sugar
- ½ cup firmly-packed light brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 ¼ cups mashed ripe bananas
- 2 cups self-rising flour
- ½ cup chopped walnuts

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and lightly flour a

9x5x3 inch loaf pan. Combine the butter, sugar and brown sugar in large bowl. Beat until mixed. Add eggs, extract and bananas. Beat just until mixed. Gradually add flour and mix until blended. Stir in walnuts. Pour into prepared pan and bake for about 45 to 50 minutes, or until a toothpick comes out clean when inserted into center of loaf. Remove from pan immediately.

Zucchini Carrot Bread

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/8 teaspoon freshly-grated nutmeg
- ¼ teaspoon ground

- cinnamon
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- ½ cup oil
- 2 eggs
- 2/3 cup finely shredded zucchini
- 2/3 cup finely shredded carrots
- ¾ teaspoon vanilla extract


Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Grease a 9x5x3 inch loaf pan. In medium bowl, combine flour, brown sugar, baking powder, spices and salt. Stir to mix. In large bowl, beat together the oil and eggs. Stir in zucchini, carrots and vanilla. Add the flour mixture and beat until smooth. Pour into the pan and bake for 45 to 50 minutes, or until a toothpick comes out clean when inserted into center of loaf.





This curry takes you from India to Thailand and back in nothing flat

Roasted Tomato and Chickpea Curry

4 servings
 Serve with rice, naan and yogurt, if desired.

Adapted from "New Feast: Modern Middle Eastern Vegetarian," by Greg and Lucy Malouf (Hardie Grant, 2017).

Ingredients

- 2 ½ pounds medium vine-ripened tomatoes, stems attached if possible (for visual appeal)
- 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
- ½ teaspoon kosher salt, plus more as needed
- 1 medium onion, grated or finely chopped
- 3 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 1 tablespoon peeled, grated fresh ginger root
- 2 tablespoons Thai red curry paste, such as Thai Kitchen brand
- 1 ¼ cups coconut milk (may substitute low-fat coconut milk)
- 2 ½ cups cooked or canned no-salt-added chickpeas, rinsed and drained (from two 15-ounce cans)
- ½ cup chopped fresh cilantro
- 2 cups cooked brown rice, for serving (optional)
- 2 to 4 pieces naan, for serving (optional)
- ½ cup Greek-style yogurt, for serving (optional)

Steps

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Arrange the tomatoes on a rimmed baking sheet. Drizzle the oil and season with ¼ teaspoon of the salt. Roast just until the skins start to split

and the tomatoes start to soften but hold their shape, 10 to 15 minutes. Peel, stem and chop just one of the tomatoes, and leave the rest of them whole (on the baking sheet). Pour the remaining tablespoon of oil into a wide, deep saute pan over medium heat. Add the onion, garlic and ginger; cook, stirring occasionally, until the onions are translucent and the vegetables are very soft, 8 to 10 minutes. Add the curry paste; cook, stirring, until fragrant and slightly darker in color, 2 minutes. Add the chopped tomato and coconut milk. Increase the heat to medium-high; once the mixture comes to a boil, reduce the heat as needed so the liquid is barely bubbling around the edges. Cover and cook for 15 minutes. Uncover, stir in the chickpeas, taste, and add more salt, as needed. Nestle the whole tomatoes in the pan. Cook, uncovered, just until the tomatoes have warmed through, 8 to 10 minutes. Remove from the heat. Scatter the cilantro over the

top. Serve hot, with the optional accompaniments of your choice.

Recipe intimidation can come from many sources: a technique or an ingredient you're not familiar with, or one you are — and know you don't like. Or sometimes it's cumulative. You read through and think: "Not all that. Not tonight."

That's where short-cuts come in.

Take a recipe I've been saving for tomato season, from "New Feast" by Greg and Lucy Malouf (Hardie Grant, 2017). Their Roasted Tomato and Chickpea Curry calls for a long list of spices and aromatics, but my mind went to store-bought curry paste — a quick, flavor-packed base for Thai-style curries. Would the substitution work? I thought so, because the dish also includes ginger, garlic, cilantro and coconut milk.

So 10 ingredients came out, one went in, and the dish's flavor morphed pretty seamlessly from Indian to Thai.

Spicy condiment is finally getting the attention it deserves

The sauce might be red, or green. It might have mint, or jalapeño, or fenugreek, or parsley. It might be called zhug, or zhough, or s'hug, or sahawiq, or daqus. But it's all the same thing: a spicy Middle Eastern condiment that, at long last, is getting its due in the United States.

Zhug, the Hebrew word for the sauce, and sahawiq, one of the Arabic words for it, originated in Yemen, but it has long been popular throughout the region.

The best thing about it? "It's a nice condiment to have with everything," whether it's meat or bread or vegetables, said Amar Alshehari, who cooks with his father, Abdul, the chef and owner of Arlington, Virginia's House of Mandi. "Whatever you're eating as a main entree."

His family is from Sanaa, Yemen, and the family recipe includes dried cilantro, fresh cilantro, jalapeño, tomatoes and mint, all ground together.

"Back home, we don't have blenders," Alshehari said, explaining that the word sahawiq comes from the root word for "breaking down." "You use a rock plate and a rock utensil to break

down the tomatoes and other ingredients."

There are other riffs on the sauce. At Sababa in Washington, chef Ryan Moore uses an Israeli recipe: equal parts fire-roasted and fresh serrano chile peppers, lemon juice, garlic, cilantro, parsley, cumin and fenugreek leaves. He pairs his zhug with roasted spicy peppers and harissa in a dish called Not for the Faint of Heart. It's meant to be an accompaniment to other foods, but some people eat it plain as a dare.

"They're always trying to best each other to see who can take down the most of it," said Moore.

At Maydan in Washington, where the menu spells it zhough, the sauce is one of seven condiment choices. Co-chef Gerald Addison makes it with parsley, cilantro, garlic, serrano peppers, cumin, olive oil and salt.

Middle Eastern food is on the upswing, with Israeli food one of the year's top trends. Americans' culinary understanding has evolved, with a greater appreciation for regional cuisines from abroad. It's made harissa popular; the fiery red sauce is sold at Trader Joe's, and "you find it in a lot of general new American restaurants," said Addison.

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
