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# Judge rejects Wilson's motion

**Overstreet says case not proven that arrest was politically motivated**

PANAMA CITY — Circuit Judge Michael Overstreet has blocked another attempt by the former chief deputy of

the State Attorney's Office, Greg Wilson, to establish he was targeted in a jail contraband smuggling case because he once was a political rival of his former boss.

The decision comes in light of recent court filings that show State Attorney Glenn Hess declined to prosecute a separate case in which Jonathan Dingus, a local defense attorney, unwittingly

delivered documents coated with synthetic marijuana to Bay County Jail personnel to pass on to one of his clients.

As a response to the recent disclosures, Wilson's defense team appeared in court Tuesday to again argue that the SAO's former second-in-command was targeted after losing a heated campaign against his boss. They asked that Overstreet allow them to

use "selective prosecution" as a defense and interview Hess as a witness to further their case. Weighing in on the request, though, Overstreet told Wilson's attorneys they had not met the threshold required to depose a constitutional officer nor present the case that Wilson's arrest was political retaliation.

PANAMA CITY — The fight for worldwide literacy forges on in Bay County.

Last month, four Little Free Libraries were constructed around town and packed with books, thanks to the Bay

# PCB looking to beef up payroll by 21 workers

PANAMA CITY BEACH — After crunching budget numbers, Panama City Beach is looking to hire 21 additional employees next fiscal year — including more firefighters and police officers.

Department heads requested 28 new positions at the Beach's budget workshop last week, of which City Manager Mario Gisbert said he believes 21 will be filled contingent upon approval at the scheduled budget meeting in September.

"Department heads requested 28 new positions, which would be the largest new hire ever for the city," he said. "The mayor and

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## TODAY IN HISTORY

Today is Wednesday, Aug. 1, the 213th day of 2018. There are 152 days left in the year.

### Today’s Highlight in History:

On August 1, 1966, Charles Joseph Whitman, 25, went on an armed rampage at the University of Texas in Austin that killed 14 people, most of whom were shot by Whitman while he was perched in the clock tower of the main campus building. (Whitman, who had also slain his wife and mother hours earlier, was finally gunned down by police.)

### On this date:

In 1714, Britain’s Queen Anne died at age 49; she was succeeded by George I.  
 In 1876, Colorado was admitted as the 38th state.  
 In 1907, the U.S. Army Signal Corps established an aeronautical division, the forerunner of the U.S. Air Force.  
 In 1911, Harriet Quimby became the first woman to receive a U.S. pilot’s certificate from the Aero Club of America. (Quimby’s accomplishments included being the first woman to fly across the English Channel; she was killed in an accident in July 1912 at age 37.)  
 In 1936, the Olympics opened in Berlin with a ceremony presided over by Adolf Hitler.  
 In 1944, an uprising broke out in Warsaw, Poland, against Nazi occupation; the revolt lasted two months before collapsing.  
 In 1957, the United States and Canada announced they had agreed to create the North American Air Defense Command (NORAD).  
 In 1975, a 35-nation summit in Finland concluded with the signing of a declaration known as the Helsinki Accords dealing with European security, human rights and East-West contacts.  
 In 1981, the rock music video channel MTV made its debut.  
 In 1994, Michael Jackson and Lisa Marie Presley confirmed they’d been secretly married 11 weeks earlier. (Presley filed for divorce from Jackson in Jan. 1996, citing irreconcilable differences.)  
 In 2001, Pro Bowl tackle Korey Stringer, 27, died of heat stroke, a day after collapsing at the Minnesota Vikings’ training camp on the hottest day of the year.  
 In 2007, the eight-lane Interstate 35W bridge, a major Minneapolis artery, collapsed into the Mississippi River during evening rush hour, killing 13 people.

## Official: Agency warned separation bad for kids

WASHINGTON — A Department of Health and Human Services official told senators Tuesday that his agency had warned the Trump administration that separating families would be dangerous for children. But some of the government's top immigration officials used a Senate hearing to largely defend how the policy has been implemented, with one comparing family detention centers to "a summer camp."

One official told the Senate Judiciary Committee that while the Trump administration was developing its immigration policies, Health and Human Services officials said they were worried "about any policy which would result in family separation due to concerns we had about the best interests of the child." Commander Jonathan D. White of the U.S. Public Health Service Commissioned Corps, a branch of HHS, said they were also uncertain their department had enough resources to handle large numbers of detained immigrants.

"There's no question that separation of children from parents entails significant potential for traumatic psychological injury to the child," White said.

Asked by Sen. Richard Blumenthal, D-Conn., what response HHS officials got from administration policymakers, White said, "The answer was there was no policy which would result in

separation of children from family units." White is a career official at HHS who has served in three administrations.

White's remarks came as the Judiciary committee questioned officials about what has become an election-year liability for the Republicans and the White House — President Donald Trump's separation of migrant children from detained families. Trump dropped the policy more than a month ago under fire from Democrats and Republicans alike. But of more than 2,500 children who were initially separated from parents and

guardians, hundreds remain in federal custody including more than 400 whose parents left the U.S. without them.

Lawmakers and journalists who have visited some detention facilities around the country and migrants themselves have reported poor conditions. The top members of the Judiciary committee — Chairman Chuck Grassley, R-Iowa, and Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif. — have asked inspectors general of two federal agencies to investigate reports by news organizations that immigrants at some centers have suffered alleged sexual

and other forms of abuse.

Matthew Albence, an executive associate director at U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, told the lawmakers that "the best way to describe" conditions at family detention centers was "like a summer camp." He said the facilities undergo rigorous inspections and offer basketball and other forms of recreation, food and water around the clock and medical and dental care.

"We do not leave our humanity behind when we report for duty," Carla L. Provost, acting chief of the U.S.

Border Patrol, told members of the committee.

At one point, Sen. Mazie Hirono, D-Hawaii, asked witnesses whether they would want their children to stay in one of the government's family detention centers.

"I think we're missing the point," answered Albence. "These individuals are there because they have broken a law."

While some Republicans offered measured criticism of the problem, Democrats ridiculed Trump's immigration policies as cruel and bungling. No. 2 Senate Democratic leader Richard Durbin of Illinois said Homeland Security Secretary Kirstjen Nielsen should resign and that someone "has to accept responsibility" for policies that show "the extremes this administration will go to."

Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., chided the administration for not having an adequate system for matching separated children with their parents. He cited the often frantically crowded Chuck E. Cheese children's restaurants as having procedures that work.

When Sen. Sheldon Whitehouse, D-R.I., asked the witnesses "what went wrong" when the government began having trouble matching detained children with parents or guardians, the most specific answer came from the public health service's White.

"Children were separated from their parents and referred as unaccompanied alien children when in fact they were accompanied," White said.

TransCanada ordered to inspect part of pipeline

TransCanada Corp. is digging up a portion of the Keystone oil pipeline in South Dakota after an inspection identified potential issues with the pipeline's coating.

The federal Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration is ordering the energy company to further inspect the route north of Britton, said Brian Walsh, spokesman for the South Dakota Department of Environment and Natural Resources. He told Aberdeen American News that there aren't any reported leaks.

TransCanada spokesman Matthew John said crews are conducting "standard monitoring and inspections" of the pipeline, which carries crude oil more than 2,600

miles from Alberta, Canada, to Oklahoma and Illinois.

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, CALIF.  
Unarmed US missile test flight terminated due to anomaly

An unarmed U.S. Air Force Minuteman 3 intercontinental ballistic missile was intentionally destroyed in flight when an anomaly occurred during a test launch from California.

An Air Force Global Strike Command statement says the flight was safely terminated over the Pacific Ocean at 4:42 a.m. Tuesday.

The Minuteman system's accuracy and reliability is routinely tested with launches from Vandenberg that send a missile's re-entry vehicle on a 4,200-mile flight to a target in the Kwajalein Atoll of the Marshall Islands.

IS claims Tajikistan attack that killed 4 foreign cyclists

The Islamic State group on Tuesday claimed responsibility for a car-and-knife attack on Western tourists cycling in Tajikistan that killed two Americans and two Europeans.

Officials in the ex-Soviet Central Asian nation didn't publicly address the IS claim and instead blamed the Sunday attack on a banned local Islamist group. The young men featured in an IS-linked video resembled the individuals that Tajik authorities identified as attack suspects who were later killed by police.

The Islamic State group said in a statement late Monday that several of its soldiers attacked the "citizens of the Crusader coalition."

LAS VEGAS  
FBI official: Vegas shooting report to be after anniversary

The top FBI official in Nevada said his agency's report about the shooting last year that killed 58 people and injured hundreds on the Las Vegas Strip is in the finishing stages but won't be released until after the Oct. 1 anniversary.

Special Agent in Charge Aaron Rouse said in a radio interview aired Monday that he doesn't expect the report, which includes information collected from nearly 1,000 agents who contributed to the investigation in the U.S. and 25 countries, will pinpoint a motive behind the deadliest mass shooting in the nation's modern history.

Rouse did not respond to requests for comment from The Associated Press.

Russia, Japan hope business ties will improve island dispute

Russian and Japanese officials are expressing hope that business ties between the two countries will help solve a long-standing dispute over four Pacific islands.

The argument centers on the four most southern of the Kuril Islands, which Japan calls the Northern Territories.

The Soviet Union took the islands at the end of World War II and the countries never signed a peace treaty as a result.

Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov told reporters Tuesday that Japanese businessmen will soon travel to the islands to develop joint economic projects.

The new libraries have joined a handful of others that already exist in the Bay County area started by other groups.

Little Free Library is a nonprofit organization whose purpose is to promote literacy worldwide by providing 24/7 access to books through weatherproof, often bird-house-esque structures.

Each book collection is constantly rotating with no fees or due dates, so the rules are simple.

"If you would like a book, you can take a book. You don't have to leave a book but if you have a book that you've finished and you want to share it with someone, then you can just put it right back into a library," said Burris. "It should be fairly self-sustainable but the foundation as well as the library are going to upkeep the libraries to make sure that they are

stocked with books."

The Little Free Library organization currently has more than 70,000 registered libraries in 85 countries.

"Literacy is one of the key goals. One of their mission statements is to support literacy in the area," said Burris. "They're all very excited that it ... brings communities and neighborhoods together so you might meet someone there and share your love of books."

The collection of books stocked at each little

library will take into consideration the location of the structure and attempt to meet the needs of the area. For example, the library in front of the Early Learning Coalition will have books predominantly geared toward a younger audience than books stocked at the library by the Bay County Council on Aging. All books stocked by the library are originally acquired through donation, which is open year-round.

"I think the most

important thing about the Little Free Libraries is it also is hoping to get people that can't make it to the physical library, so it allows for access to books and a change of books if you're not able to make it to the trip," said Burris.

Burris said she also hopes one of the impacts the little libraries will have is "instilling for the little ones a love of reading."

"I think my hope is they stay as vibrant and that the community is as excited about them in the

future as they are now and help keep it going," she said. "Everyone can participate. I think what the really cool part is if someone reads something they really like and they want to share it, it is like this anonymous share but then you're giving it to someone else who may enjoy that book just as much as you did."

Fifteen of the requested new positions are in public safety departments. The council tentatively approved the creation and funding for one IT person, one police department dispatcher, two maintenance workers in the parks and recreations department, three employees in the utilities department, four patrol officers, nine firefighters, and one Community Redevelopment

Agency (CRA) manager. The list was whittled down to 21 as some of the requested positions were combined.

Gisbert said officials still are working on the FY 2019 budget, and don't know for sure if all the positions will be approved.

"The budget is not complete. Last week we tackled CRA, Pier, Aquatic, General Fund Revenue and other items. General Fund expenditures will be discussed during the next budget workshop in August. A workshop will likely occur in early September to review water,

wastewater and storm-water," he said.

As for funding, the CRA will fund the CRA manager position, and the utilities fund will be tapped to pay for the three utilities positions through water and sewer rates, Gisbert said. The fire assessment,

which was implemented to help fund the staffing and operations at the new station, will help pay for the nine firefighter positions with funding also coming from the general fund. The other positions will be paid for using the general fund.

"When it comes to

budgeting, we estimate conservatively in order to keep a balanced budget. We are always cognizant of the need to be good stewards of taxpayer funds. We know the public puts its trust in us to be frugal and conservative in our spending," Gisbert said.

Gisbert said the total cost for annual salaries for those positions has not been settled.

The City of Panama City Beach currently employs 295 full-time employees, 43 part-time and 65 seasonal employees, Gisbert said.

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## NKorea provided 1 dog tag with 55 sets of remains

WASHINGTON — When North Korea handed over 55 boxes of bones that it said are remains of American war dead, it provided a single military dog tag but no other information that could help U.S. forensics experts determine their individual identities, a U.S. defense official said Tuesday.

The official, who discussed previously undisclosed aspects of the remains issue on condition of anonymity, said it probably will take months if not years to fully determine individual identities from the remains, which have not yet been confirmed by U.S. specialists to be those of American servicemen.

The official did not know details about the single dog tag, including the name on it, or whether it was even that of an American military member. During the Korean War, combat troops of 16 other United Nations member countries fought alongside U.S. service members on behalf of South Korea. Some of them, including Australia, Belgium, France and the Philippines, have yet to recover some of their war dead from North Korea.

The 55 boxes were handed over at Wonsan, North Korea last Friday and flown aboard a U.S. military transport plane to Osan air base in South Korea, where U.S. officials catalogued the

contents. After a repatriation ceremony at Osan on Wednesday, the remains will be flown to Hawaii where they will begin undergoing in-depth forensic analysis, in some cases using mitochondrial DNA profiles, at a Defense Department laboratory to attempt to establish individual identifications.

Defense Secretary Jim Mattis said last week that the return of the 55 boxes was a positive step but not a guarantee that the bones are American.

"We don't know who's in those boxes," he said. He noted that some could turn out to be those of missing from other nations that fought in the Korean War. "They could go to Australia," he said. "They have missing, France has missing,


Americans have. There's a whole lot of us. So, this is an international effort to bring closure for those families."

Vice President Mike Pence, the son of a Korean War combat veteran, is scheduled to fly to Hawaii for a ceremony, which the military calls an "honorable carry ceremony," marking the arrival of the remains on American soil at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam on Wednesday.

This will mark a breakthrough in a long-stalled U.S. effort to obtain war remains from North Korea, but officials say it is unlikely to produce quick satisfaction for any of the families of the nearly 7,700 U.S. servicemen who are still listed as missing and unaccounted for from the 1950-53 Korean War.

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# Judge blocks release of blueprints for 3D-printed guns

SEATTLE — A federal judge in Seattle issued a temporary restraining order Tuesday to stop the release of blueprints to make untraceable and undetectable 3D-printed plastic guns, saying they could end up in the wrong hands.

The company behind the plans, Austin, Texas-based Defense Distributed, had reached a settlement with the federal government in June that allows it to make the plans for the guns

available for download on Wednesday.

The restraining order from U.S. District Judge Robert Lasnik puts that plan on hold for now.

“There is a possibility of irreparable harm because of the way these guns can be made,” he said.

Eight Democratic attorneys general had filed a lawsuit Monday seeking to block the federal government’s settlement with Defense Distributed. They also sought the restraining order, arguing the 3D guns would be a safety risk.

Congressional

Democrats have urged President Donald Trump to reverse the decision to let Defense Distributed publish the plans. Trump said Tuesday that he’s “looking into” the idea, saying making 3D plastic guns available to the public “doesn’t seem to make much sense!”

Trump tweeted that he has already spoken with the National Rifle Association about the downloadable directions a Texas company wants to provide for people to make 3D-printed guns. The guns are made of a hard plastic and are simple to assemble, easy

to conceal and difficult to trace.

At a news conference Tuesday, Democratic senators said Trump has the power to stop the company from making the plans available online. The company’s website says downloads have been posted on the site since Friday. A lawyer for the company said he doesn’t know how many blueprints have been downloaded since then.

Massachusetts Sen. Edward Markey said Trump frequently boasts that he alone can fix problems afflicting the country.

“Well, fix this deadly mistake that once again your administration has made,” Markey said in a remark directed at the president. If he fails to act, “Donald Trump will be totally responsible for every downloadable, plastic AR-15 (gun) that will be roaming the streets of our country.”

Connecticut Sen. Richard Blumenthal was more graphic, saying that if Trump does not block sale of the 3D guns, “Blood is going to be on his hands.”

The NRA did not immediately respond to requests for comment.

Markey, Blumenthal and other Democrats filed legislation that would prohibit the publication of a digital file online that allows a 3D printer to manufacture a firearm. Democrats have filed a separate bill to require that all guns have at least one significant component made of metal.

# Prosecutors: Paul Manafort believed he was above the law

ALEXANDRIA, Va. — Paul Manafort orchestrated a multimillion-dollar conspiracy to evade U.S. tax and banking laws, leaving behind a trail of lies as he lived a lavish lifestyle, prosecutors said Tuesday as they laid out their case against the former Trump campaign chairman.

During his opening statement, Assistant U.S. Attorney Uzo Asonye told the jury that Manafort considered himself above the law as he funneled tens of millions of dollars through offshore accounts. That “secret income” was used to pay for personal expenses such as a \$21,000 watch, a \$15,000 jacket made of ostrich and more than \$6 million worth of real estate paid for in cash, Asonye said.

“A man in this courtroom believed the law did not apply to him — not tax law, not banking law,” Asonye said as he sketched out the evidence gathered by special counsel Robert Mueller’s team in Manafort’s bank fraud and tax evasion trial.

It’s the first trial arising from Mueller’s investigation into potential ties between Donald Trump’s presidential campaign and Russia. Mueller was not present in the

courtroom.

Defense attorney Thomas Zehnle said in his opening statement that Manafort trusted others to keep track of the millions of dollars he was earning from his Ukrainian political work.

He made clear that undermining the credibility of Rick Gates, his former business associate and the government’s star witness, is central to the defense strategy. Zehnle said Manafort, earning millions as a political consultant helping officials in other parts of the world, relied on Gates and others — including a professional accounting firm — to keep watch over the money.

“Money’s coming in fast. It’s a lot, and Paul Manafort trusted that Rick Gates was keeping track of it,” Zehnle said. “That’s what Rick Gates was being paid to do.”

He warned jurors that Gates could not be trusted and was the type of witness who would say anything he could to save himself from a lengthy prison sentence and a crippling financial penalty.

Gates, who spent years working for Manafort in Ukraine and is also accused of helping him falsify paperwork used to obtain the bank loans, cut a plea deal with Mueller earlier this year. Gates also worked as an aide on Trump’s campaign.



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



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# Facebook finds efforts to disrupt elections

NEW YORK — Facebook elevated concerns about election interference Tuesday, announcing that it had uncovered “sophisticated” efforts, possibly linked to Russia, to manipulate U.S. politics and by extension the upcoming midterm elections.

The company was careful to hedge its announcement; it didn’t link the effort directly to Russia or

to the midterms, now less than a hundred days away. And its findings were limited to 32 apparently fake accounts on Facebook and Instagram, which the company removed because they were involved in “coordinated” and “inauthentic” political behavior.

But official Washington connected those dots anyway, not least because the reported activity so closely mirrored Russian influence campaigns during the 2016 presidential election. Nearly

300,000 people followed at least one of the newly banned accounts and thousands expressed interest in events they promoted.

“This is an absolute attack on our democracy,” said Virginia Sen. Mark Warner, the top Democrat on the Senate intelligence committee and one of several lawmakers Facebook had briefed in advance. Warner expressed “pretty high confidence” that Russia was behind the assault.

A spokesman for Senate

Judiciary Chairman Chuck Grassley said Facebook had informed his office that “that a limited group of Russian actors has attempted to spread disinformation using its platform and that the affected groups are affiliated with the political left.”

The identified accounts sought to “promote divisions and set Americans against one another,” wrote Ben Nimmo and Graham Brookie of the Atlantic Council’s Digital Forensic Research Lab in

a blog post Tuesday. The nonprofit is working with Facebook to find and analyze abuse on its service.

The perpetrators, Facebook noted, have been “more careful to cover their tracks” than in 2016, in part because of steps Facebook has taken to prevent abuse over the past year. For example, they used virtual private networks and internet phone services to mask their locations, and paid third parties to run ads on their behalf.

After it became clear

that Russia-linked actors used social media to try to influence the 2016 U.S. election, Facebook has escalated countermeasures intended to prevent a repeat. It has cracked down on fake accounts and tried to slow the spread of fake news and misinformation through outside fact-checkers. The company has also announced new guidelines around political advertisements, requiring disclosure of who paid for them and keeping a database.

## Trump administration considering tax break on capital gains

WASHINGTON — The Trump administration is studying the idea of implementing a big tax break for wealthy Americans by reducing the taxes levied on capital gains, but no decision has been made yet on whether to proceed.

Administration officials said Tuesday that Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin prefers deferring to Congress. But he does have his department studying the economic impact of such a change and the legality of proceeding without congressional approval.

The change would involve taxing capital gains — profits on investments such as stocks or real estate — after taking into account inflation, which would lower the tax bite. Capital gains taxes are currently determined by subtracting the original price of an asset from the price at which it was sold and taxing the difference without adjusting for inflation.

For example, a stock purchased in 1990 for \$100,000 and sold today for \$300,000 would produce a \$200,000 capital gain. That amount, taxed at the top capital gains rate of 23.8 percent, would result in a tax bill of \$47,600. However, if

the \$200,000 gain was trimmed to just \$103,000 by adjusting for inflation over the past 28 years, the tax bill would be \$24,514.

“There has been a great deal of interest in this provision for a long time,” said a White House official who spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss internal policy deliberations. “Treasury is currently evaluating the economic impact and whether it can be achieved without legislation.”

Indexing capital gains for inflation would reduce federal revenue by about \$102 billion over a decade, according to the Penn-Wharton Budget Model. The Congressional Research Service has estimated that about 90 percent of the benefits would go to the top 1

percent of households.

The New York Times and the Washington Post reported Tuesday that the proposal was under active consideration by the administration. It has long been supported by Larry Kudlow, head of the president’s National Economic Council. Mnuchin, however, has signaled caution in approaching the idea.

Republicans, led by House Ways and Means Committee Chairman Kevin Brady, are leading an effort to extend and expand the \$1.5 trillion tax cut President Donald Trump pushed through Congress last December. But GOP lawmakers had mixed views on whether the administration could lower capital gains taxes without the approval of Congress.

## Russian secret-spilling site ‘Dossier’ steps into spotlight

LONDON — Over the past three months, a handful of highly placed Russians have discovered their secrets seeping onto the web.

It happened to a Russian Interior Ministry official whose emails were published online in April. It happened again this month, when details about a former Kremlin chief of staff’s American energy investment were exposed by Britain’s Guardian newspaper.

Last week, Natalia Veselnitskaya, the Russian lawyer who met with U.S. President Donald Trump’s son during the 2016 presidential campaign, saw her ties to senior Russian government officials laid bare in an Associated Press

investigation.

And the man behind the disclosures tells the AP that more are coming.

A key source for the recent stories has been Russian opposition figure Mikhail Khodorkovsky’s new project, dubbed the Dossier Center. Launched in November, the center is billed as an investigative unit. Its website features a sprawling, interactive diagram of interconnected Russian officials described as the “main beneficiaries” of Russian corruption.

“We have no shortage of material we’re currently evaluating,” Khodorkovsky said in a television interview last week from his office in central London.

The exiled former energy executive is funding the Dossier Center himself and said it was

born out of frustration with the inability of journalistic investigations to lead to real change in a Russia dominated by his foe, President Vladimir Putin. He wanted the project to produce more than occasional stories and to gather enough actionable information on the Kremlin’s leadership to bring its members, eventually, to court.

“We understand it’s a long-term ambition,” Khodorkovsky said with a smile.

By his telling, the center gets its data from a series of anonymous digital drop boxes. The leaks carry evidence not only of high-level corruption in Moscow, but of the Kremlin’s “illegal attempts to influence Western public opinion and Western politicians,” he said.

seven years under Hess. As the primary elections approached in August 2016,

“You can’t have (selective prosecution) as a defense until you can clearly identify a class of people committing a crime and not being prosecuted until your client,” Overstreet said, noting that the allegation was currently outside the scope of the criminal case. “The court is not interested in overseeing the prosecutorial efforts of a constitutional officer.”

Before the judge’s decision, defense attorney Lisa Anderson cited a letter from Hess to Bay County Sheriff Tommy Ford in an attempt to show Wilson had been targeted. The letter details an incident in May when Hess declined to pursue an arrest or prosecution of Dingus for unintentionally being “duped” into a contraband smuggling scheme. Anderson argued the similarities between the two cases amounted to selective prosecution.

“We have real evidence that Wilson was singled out while another attorney was shielded,” Anderson said. “The only difference is that Wilson was a political rival.”

According to Hess’ letter, Dingus at the time delivered an envelope with case law and the Bill of Rights from a client’s acquaintance to jail personnel so they could deliver it to his client. He turned over the envelope to jail staff and during the inspection officers discovered the enclosed documents had been coated with “spice,” or synthetic marijuana, prompting an investigation. Unlike Wilson’s case, though, Dingus was not aware he was delivering contraband, was not intentionally skirting

rules on contraband and wasn’t attempting to deliver the paperwork directly to the inmate, the letter stated.

Also, Dingus immediately assisted in the case when the matter arose, Hess wrote.

Prosecutor Jack Campbell, who stepped in once Hess recused himself from the case, argued that Wilson’s attorneys had not met the “heightened standard” to subpoena a constitutional officer. He told the court that chasing the subpoena against Hess was an attempt to distract from the underlying criminal case.

“I think this is a red herring,” Campbell said. “I don’t think it’s germane to the issue that I can prove the criminal case at trial beyond a reasonable doubt.”

Overstreet sided with the prosecution saying that Wilson’s defense had not met the standard to use selective prosecution as a defense. He added that he personally refused to sign an arrest warrant for Dingus because of a lack of probable cause. Overstreet did approve a motion from the defense to continue the trial to Sept. 17 so that jail IT people can be interviewed about equipment used to monitor Wilson leading up to his arrest.

Wilson, 46, faces a felony of introduction of contraband into the Bay County Jail and a misdemeanor charge of perjury. He is accused of helping two inmates pass notes in October and then lying to investigators about it.

Wilson was the second-in-command at the 14th Judicial Circuit State Attorney’s Office for

Wilson abruptly resigned, saying Hess did not fulfill an agreement to bow out at the end of his second term and hand the office off to Wilson. He then challenged his former boss to be top prosecutor over Bay, Calhoun, Gulf, Holmes, Jackson and Washington counties.

Wilson lost by a 10-percent margin, but vowed to make another run for state attorney in 2020.

Months later, though, Wilson became the subject of a BCSO investigation at the Bay County Jail. Authorities obtained video of Wilson appearing to help two inmates — sisters Clista Robbins and Christy White — pass notes, or “kites,” while meeting with him at separate times in an attorney interview room. When questioned under oath, Wilson, who was not aware of the video, categorically denied the allegations as “absolutely false.”

Hess recused himself shortly afterward because of his ties to Wilson, and Campbell was tapped by Gov. Rick Scott to lead the prosecution. Last month, though, Wilson’s defense attorneys attempted to subpoena Hess as a witness because Hess advised Sheriff Ford to gather additional information on Wilson, specifically instructing BCSO to place video cameras in the private attorney/client interview room.

At the time, Overstreet told Wilson’s attorneys it would be unlikely he would allow Hess to be called as a witness until they met the standard for selective prosecution based on political retaliation.

## Local, national businesses joining coalition pledging not to discriminate

Levi Strauss, Yelp and Lyft are leading a coalition of 1,200 businesses and cities that are pledging not to discriminate against employees or customers based on race, sexual orientation, or other characteristics.

Normally, making a promise to serve every customer might seem like a no-brainer. But the Open to All coalition is launching in a highly charged atmosphere, with florists refusing to provide flowers for gay weddings and stores turning away Muslim customers. On the same June weekend that White House Press Secretary Sarah Sanders was asked to leave a Virginia restaurant because of her affiliation with President Donald Trump, a transgender woman was harassed by staff at a Washington restaurant for using the women's restroom.

So it remains to be seen if the "Open to All" message — on businesses' Yelp pages or on stickers in their windows — will calm frayed tempers or anger customers and businesses who might question its motives.

Tia Agnew, co-founder and CEO of New Day Craft, an Indianapolis-based producer of mead and cider, is excited to put up her "Open to All" window sticker, which she says matches her "personal and professional ethos." She's not worried that it will be a turn-off to some potential patrons.

"All I can do is put our best foot forward and say, 'Hey, come on in and hang out,'" she said.

But George Marinakos, the owner of The Exchange Saloon in Washington, isn't sold on the idea. His bar is near the White House, and he has served Sanders as well as members of the Obama administration. A chalkboard in front of the bar reads, "Everyone welcome," but he thinks an "Open to All" sticker might raise questions. If he doesn't put it up, some people will wonder why; if

he does, some people might not feel welcome because of what they interpret as a left-leaning message.

"You're putting yourself in the position of being damned if you do or damned if you don't," he said.

The Open to All coalition got its start late last year as the U.S. Supreme Court was preparing to consider the case of a Colorado baker who refused to bake a wedding cake for a gay couple because it violated his religious beliefs. The court ultimately ruled for the baker but didn't give businesses a blanket right to discriminate against gays.

Calla Rongerude, Open to All's campaign manager, said businesses were asking civil rights groups how to make it clear they would serve gays and other minorities. The cities of New York and Oakland, California, are also part of the coalition, as are 190 civil rights groups, organizations and faith groups, including the American Civil Liberties Union, the Interfaith Alliance, the Service Employees International Union and the NAACP.

His parents named him Ambrose, and he could swim before he could walk. A venturesome and active toddler, he was nicknamed Rowdy. Often he would roll off the dock and into the water at his parents' Central Florida lakefront home, frightening friends and relatives. But he always popped back up like a cork on a fishing line. By eight months, he was dog paddling 20 feet or more.

In his second year of competition, he won a Florida state high school championship and was awarded a scholarship to Auburn University.

At Auburn, he set school records, was a five-time NCAA champion, and established himself as one of the fastest swimmers in the U.S. Eventually he would set 10 world records. He loved school and competing for the university, but his ultimate goal was to represent our country in the 1980 Olympic Games.

How good was Rowdy Gaines? In 1981, he was voted the Athlete of the Year in the Southeastern Conference.

The Soviet Union invaded Afghanistan in 1980, and rather than send our athletes to Moscow, President Carter decreed that we would boycott the Games there. Gaines was devastated. He had missed his window. Sprint swimming was for young men, not 25 year olds, the age he would be at the 1984

Summer Games in L.A. He left the pool for several months before his father convinced him to return to his workout regimen and try again in '84.

Gaines had little money, and often swam his morning practice after working all night at a local motel. In L.A., he won three gold medals. Seven years later he was afflicted with Guillain-Barré syndrome and became temporarily paralyzed. After recovering, he returned to the pool, and at age 35 became the oldest competitor to qualify for the 1996 Olympic swimming trials.

I am not a swim fan per se, but I recently watched a documentary on Gaines' life and was astounded at his perseverance. We need a similar commitment in our financial lives to become and remain successful. We all experience hurdles and setbacks; the road to financial security is rarely smooth and straight. It takes willpower and sacrifice to become financially

## Trump admin: Tougher fuel limits would make driving even riskier

WASHINGTON — The Trump administration says people would drive more and be exposed to increased risk if their cars get better gas mileage, an argument intended to justify freezing Obama-era toughening of fuel standards.

Transportation experts dispute the arguments, contained in a draft of the administration's proposals prepared this summer, excerpts of which were obtained by The Associated Press.

The excerpts also show the administration plans to challenge California's long-standing authority to enact its own, tougher pollution and fuel standards.

Revisions to the mileage requirements for 2021 through 2026 are still being worked on, the administration says, and changes could be made before the proposal is released as soon as this week.

The Trump administration gave notice earlier this year that it would roll back tough new fuel standards put into place in the waning days of the Obama administration. Anticipating the new regulation, California and 16 other states sued the Trump administration in May.

Overall, "improvements over time have better longer-term effects simply by not alienating consumers, as compared to great leaps forward" in fuel efficiency and other technology, the administration argues. It contends that freezing the mileage requirements at 2020 levels would save up to 1,000 lives per year.

New vehicles would be cheaper — and heavier — if they don't have to meet more stringent fuel requirements and more people would buy them, the draft says, and that would put more drivers in safer, newer vehicles that pollute less.

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## Has Scott taken the Panhandle for granted?

**G**ov. Rick Scott may need a reminder of where his bread is buttered.

In 2014, Scott defeated Charlie Crist to earn another four years in Tallahassee. His margin of victory was small, only 64,145 votes. And when you took a look at the map the next day, it's clear he couldn't have earned that win without the Panhandle.

It isn't just that Okaloosa, Santa Rosa and Walton counties combined to give him 101,263 votes, it's how few people voted for Crist. More than 75 percent of Okaloosa voters went for Scott. In fact, the county's 75.5

percent vote for Scott was the highest percentage in the state for either candidate. Santa Rosa voted for Scott at a rate of 74.9 percent. And 74.3 percent of Walton voters gave him the nod. Bay went gaga for Scott, as well.

In 2010, the results were similar, with only Clay County giving a higher percentage of support to then-

candidate Scott than our three counties.

So it's curious why Scott would make decisions during the final year of his term that don't sit well with many of the voters who support him the most.

Scott's signing of HB 631, regardless of which side you support, is confusing. He has thrown turmoil and chaos into Walton County's beach community. He has pitted neighbor against neighbor by intentionally targeting only Walton County with the law. If it applied to all counties with customary use, we'd understand. At that point, it's about property rights. But this was about upsetting the apple cart in Walton County.

And Bill Nelson has taken note.

Nelson was at the beach Friday, talking with reporters and whoever else was ready to listen, telling them what a terrible thing Rick Scott has done. He didn't allow beachfront homeowners to speak. He didn't hesitate to endorse customary use.


"Repeal the law the governor signed into law, easy as pie," Nelson said. "They can convene the session, say a prayer, do the Pledge of Allegiance, repeal the bill and be over and done with."

And Nelson can suggest it because he knows that isn't going to happen. Politics as usual, right? Absolutely. But Nelson doesn't care that most people recognize his suggestion as a political maneuver. He only cares that some people won't. He only cares that some people are so close to the customary use debate that they can be convinced not to vote for Scott.

Nelson's a smart guy. He has been a politician for decades, and he knows the Panhandle isn't a place he can win. But he also knows he doesn't have to win — he only has to lose by less.

## On North Korea and Iran, Trump is deluding himself

**T**ake a tough Republican president, a Chinese government committed to help us and a North Korean government faced with demands for denuclearization, and what do you get? It sounds like breaking news, but the scene comes from 2007, when the Bush administration thought it had achieved a historic breakthrough with North Korea. It was mistaken.

So, it appears, is Donald Trump. In June, he emerged from a summit with Kim Jong Un and tweeted that "everybody can now feel much safer" because there is "no longer a nuclear threat from North Korea." He could have been accused of putting the cart before the horse, if there were a cart, or a horse.

So far, the most he has to show for the meeting is the remains of 55 American military personnel killed in the Korean War, turned over Friday — a welcome achievement, but not one that makes us safer.

Secretary of State Mike Pompeo admitted last Wednesday the Pyongyang regime still is producing fuel for nuclear warheads. It has

begun to dismantle a missile test stand that already has served its purpose, but other facilities remain intact.

U.S. negotiators complain their North Korean counterparts "have canceled follow-up meetings, demanded more money and failed to maintain basic communications," The Washington Post reported. Trump, after claiming swift success in getting Kim to give up his nukes, now says, "I'm in no real rush."

It was once said of French royals that "they had learned nothing and forgotten nothing." Trump and his foreign policy team, by contrast, have learned nothing and forgotten everything. Their ignorance of and disdain for history have left them surprised at the difficulty of coercing our enemies — and the poor options available to us when bluster proves unavailing.

The president assumed that by threatening North Korea with "fire and fury," as he did last year, he could force Kim to surrender his atomic arsenal. So far, it hasn't worked.

That hasn't stopped him from using the same approach with Iran. On Monday, after President Hassan Rouhani warned him not to attack, Trump threatened Iran with "CONSEQUENCES THE LIKE OF WHICH FEW THROUGHOUT HISTORY HAVE EVER SUFFERED BEFORE."

He doesn't seem to realize

that every time he raises the specter of American bombs incinerating Iranians, he pushes the Tehran government to acquire a nuclear deterrent. Entrusting the State Department to Pompeo, who had advocated regime change in Iran, had the same effect.

Pompeo had unmitigated scorn for the nuclear deal with Iran, negotiated by the U.S. and five other parties, which Trump renounced in May. The secretary has vowed to keep sanctions until Iran meets a long list of stringent conditions.

Those demands go far beyond what Iran was willing to accept in the accord, which was the product of years of give-and-take. The administration's position on Iran, as with North Korea, is that we expect total capitulation. Trump has found the perfect formula for getting nothing while hardening the enemy's resolve.

The obvious lesson of recent history is that nuclear arms are the best guarantee of survival in the face of U.S. hostility. That's why North Korea has invested so much time and money acquiring nuclear warheads and the missiles to carry them. That's why Iran created the infrastructure to produce nukes.

## Man faces 30 years for crash

**Driver was passing cars stopped for school bus when he crashed, killing his girlfriend**

PANAMA CITY — A vehicular homicide trial is underway for a Southport man accused of speeding on a residential road when he flipped a car and killed his girlfriend.

What is at dispute in the case, though, is how fast the car was going and what caused the crash.

Christopher Stevens Chambers, 47, appeared in court Tuesday for the first day of testimony in the case. He was arrested after a violent April 2016 crash on Sherman Avenue that killed his 21-year-old passenger, Barbie Ann Wright. Chambers, with probation violation charges also hanging over his head,

faces up to 30 years in prison if convicted of vehicular homicide.

Prosecutor Alyssa Yarbrough began Tuesday laying out the case that Chambers had been driving about 79 mph on a 35-mph residential road. She said that while speeding, Chambers attempted to pass a line of cars stopped for a school bus and lost control.

## Flash flood watch issued for Bay

PANAMA CITY — With heavy rains predicted, a flash flood watch has been issued for much of Northwest Florida, including Bay County.

The National Weather Service of Tallahassee issued a flash flood watch starting at 7 p.m. CDT Tuesday night and lasting through Thursday evening. The warning covers Walton, Holmes, Jackson, Washington, Calhoun, Bay and Gulf counties.

Between 4 and 6 inches of rain is predicted, with isolated pockets of up to 10 inches of rain possible.

“There’s a lot of tropical moisture and a boundary stalling over Alabama,” said National Weather Service meteorologist Jeanie McDermott.

While the tropical moisture is typical of summer in Florida, McDermott said, the boundary that is holding the weather systems in place is not, creating the wetter than normal conditions.

The rainfall, she said, is likely to be heaviest near the coastline in Bay and Walton counties.

“With this system, the areas near the coast will be more prone (to heavy rain),” she said, adding that the coastal communities “can take more as the water runs off and goes into the sand.”

Areas with heavy rainfall in a short period of time are particularly vulnerable to flash flooding. McDermott said some localized flash flooding probably can be expected at “some point” during the watch.

The Weather Service cautions that flash flooding is “very dangerous.” People are advised to continue to monitor the forecast and should be prepared for a flash flood warning to be issued.

### ZooWorld putting the bite on plastic with eco-friendly straws

PANAMA CITY BEACH — As more and more businesses switch from plastic straws to paper, ZooWorld has found another creative

alternative — pasta.

“We’ve had them for about one month now,” said director Kayte Hogan. “People love it. The best part is they come back and buy extra straws because they eat the straws in the park. We’ve had to order additional straws.”

The straws are literally a thick, uncooked tube of pasta. They last about two

hours in a drink before they get soft, she said, and are for customers who order Ices. She said the straws are not given out with other beverages.

Before the straws were in place, Hogan said ZooWorld used plastic straws, a practice that operations manager Jessica Kiefer wanted to move away from.

“I wanted something

that was environmentally friendly,” Kiefer said. “Reusable straws are the thing, but they’re expensive. With paper straws, it’s still cutting down trees. Pasta straws are bio-degradable and animal-friendly. If a straw gets to one of our animals, it won’t harm them.”

Kiefer said she researched

## Shark count down substantially in South Florida

WEST PALM BEACH — Thousands of blacktip sharks ordinarily swim languidly off the South Florida coast. But this year the shark count is down substantially and warmer water temperatures could be the reason.

A researcher at Florida Atlantic University said a recent tally he did off Palm Beach County during the sharks’ annual migration had a high of only 2,800 blacktip sharks. That’s down substantially from the high of more than 12,000 sharks in 2011, according to

Florida Atlantic University researcher Stephen Kajiura.

The drop is dramatic, Kajiura said.

“The numbers have plummeted and this year was the lowest we’ve had so far,” Kajiura said.

The lower blacktip shark numbers correlate with higher water temperatures. In 2011, the mean water temperature along the blacktip shark’s Palm Beach County route was 73.9 degrees. This year, the mean temperature was 75.3 degrees, he said.

“Temperatures go up,



eco-friendly alternatives to plastic straws for about three weeks, and she ran across pasta straws. She said the park orders the straws from a company in California.

Hopefully, Kiefer said, pasta straws will be used at restaurants, bars, fast-food establishments and more in the future. She said it would be smart for restaurants on the Beach to use pasta straws because they're inexpensive and "great."

As the conversation about perceived problems with plastic straws gets louder and louder, more establishments are making changes. For example, Amavida in St. Andrews gives out paper straws. Other restaurants, such as Capt. Jack's Family

Buffet locations and Harpoon Harry's Beachfront Restaurant offer wrapped plastic straws upon request, which gives people the chance to opt out. Pineapple Willy's now gives out plastic straws only upon request.

Conservation always has been a theme at ZooWorld, Hogan said. She said the pasta straws are one of many eco-friendly options the park has explored, including the possibility of eliminating plastic gift bags and replacing them with reusable bags by next year.

"It's the little things people can do to make the biggest impact," she said.

shark numbers go down," Kajiura said. "Eight years does not show global climate change, but it does show what might be happening on a larger scale and why we might not get those big numbers of sharks like we used to if waters keep warming."

The researcher said the sharks might have gone farther north, near Vero Beach.

Blacktip sharks have a temperature tolerance of about 59 to 86 degrees, but generally prefer 68 to 77 degrees, according to R. Dean Grubbs, associate director of research for Florida State University's Coastal and Marine Laboratory.

"Cars were stopped waiting for a school bus with children to unload," Yarbrough told the jury. "That's when ... Chambers made the reckless choice to pass those cars at 79 mph causing a crash that killed his passenger — Barbie Wright."

Defense attorney Caren Bennett conceded that Chambers was driving faster than the posted limit but said the evidence would show Chambers was going only about 50 mph. She added that the testimony would show that Chambers was acting more responsibly than in the scenario painted by the prosecution.

"The evidence is also

consistent with somebody attempting to avoid a crash — at any speed," Bennett said. "Seeing parked cars in front of him, the choice was made to not crash into them but to avoid it."

Bennett argued law enforcement did not get statements from enough witnesses, who would have been able to detail that side. To further her case, Bennett has an expert witness expected to testify that Chambers was not going as fast as the prosecution alleges.

According to Florida Highway Patrol reports, Chambers was driving Wright — his girlfriend and mother of his young child — to an address on Sherman Avenue to locate items taken from his home while he was incarcerated on an unrelated assault charge.

Angela McDonald, a resident of a nearby trailer

park, had been moving a computer monitor from her room to her mother's. Her three children were playing outside. As McDonald looked out her kitchen window to check on the children, she saw a car driving at what she estimated was 70 mph, she said.

"I caught it out the kitchen window," McDonald said previously. "By the time I looked out the door, all I could hear was crunching and glass shattering."

Outside, she saw the upturned car wrapped around a utility pole and walked over — past the school bus and line of stopped cars — to check on the occupants of the car. On the passenger side, all McDonald could see was a bloodied hand protruding from the wreckage. She made eye contact with the driver, though, who was moaning in pain.

Joseph Brown, Bay District school bus driver, moments earlier had begun to stop and let about eight children off his bus. It was his third stop, driving north on Sherman Avenue, and traffic on both sides had stopped for the outstretched arm of the school bus bearing the "Stop" sign. As he looked around and the children stood to exit, Brown saw a car "dart" around the stopped traffic in the oncoming lane.

"I seen it coming from behind the last car," Brown told the jury. "I saw it lose control, then I saw it flip and hit the telephone pole."

Brown told the children to sit down because he thought his bus was going to be hit by the car.

Chambers was driving south on Sherman Avenue between 70 and 80 mph when he veered to the left to avoid a head-on crash with the

school bus, FHP reported.

Chambers' car instead collided with a utility pole and overturned on the side of the road without hitting the bus. He suffered minor injuries in the crash. However, Wright died from the injuries she sustained in the wreck, officers reported.

The charges reopened his 2006 conviction on charges of attempting to manufacture meth, trafficking meth, possession of ephedrine and pseudoephedrine, manufacturing paraphernalia and possession of paraphernalia. He was sentenced on those charges to four years in prison to be followed by 10 years of probation. He could be sentenced as a habitual offender if convicted at the end of this week's trial.

Officials expect closing arguments to take place Wednesday.

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


## Brian Dawkins' alter ego sends him to the hall

PHILADELPHIA — Brian Dawkins transformed from a calm, soft-spoken man into an action hero on game days for 16 seasons in the NFL.

Following what seemed like an out-of-body experience during pregame introductions, “Weapon X” terrorized opponents with ferocious hits all over the field. Dawkins redefined the safety position by providing excellent pass coverage, strong run support, and the ability to blitz quarterbacks.

A fan of the “Wolverine” Marvel comic, Dawkins played like a safety, cornerback, linebacker and defensive lineman in one package. No. 20 was the heart and soul on defense for the Philadelphia Eagles during the team's impressive run of success in the 2000s. His unique skills helped Dawkins become the first defensive back in franchise history elected into the Hall of Fame.

Perhaps even more remarkable is the fact no football player who passed through a

# Clemson's firm control of ACC fuels rise to national elite

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Dabo Swinney has built Clemson into an every-year power with regular College Football Playoff appearances and a recent national championship. None of that could've happened without first asserting unquestioned control of the Atlantic Coast Conference.

The Tigers open practice this week as the overwhelming favorite to become the first team to win four straight ACC titles since Florida State's romp through the 1990s. They also could become only the second power-conference team to win four straight league championship games.

"I didn't sit back and say, 'Well we're Clemson and we're going to go out there and everybody's going to try to catch us,'" Swinney said during the ACC Kickoff preseason media days. "But I definitely envisioned Clemson being one of the best programs in the country, and I envisioned this league growing and becoming one of the most dominant leagues in the country."

Indeed, the Tigers' rise helped the ACC climb onto level footing with its touted Southeastern Conference neighbor.

It wasn't long ago that Clemson was chasing Florida State in the ACC's power-heavy Atlantic Division. The Seminoles won three straight ACC titles from 2012-14 while going 26-1 against league teams — 3-0 against Clemson — and winning a national championship in the final BCS season of 2013. But the Tigers followed that with their own impressive run, giving the league a sustained stretch of top-flight success while putting the ACC alongside the SEC as the only leagues to reach all four playoffs.

Clemson is 25-2 against ACC teams in the past three seasons, with 18 wins by double-digit margins. The losses at home against Pittsburgh in 2016 and at Syracuse last year came by a combined four points. And last year's 38-3 rout of then-No. 7 Miami made Clemson only the fifth team to win at least three straight power-conference championship games since the SEC held the first in 1992, a group featuring FSU, Alabama in the SEC (2014-16)

and Oklahoma in the Big 12 (2006-08). Another December crown in Charlotte would allow Clemson to join Steve Spurrier's Florida teams in the SEC (1993-96) as the only power-conference schools to win four straight league title games.

"It all goes together: their budgets are elite, their facilities are elite and they're able to recruit and attract the elite players," said Boston College coach Steve Addazio, whose Eagles face the Tigers annually in the Atlantic. "So they're a 'Have' — that's the best way I can say it."

Clemson is on the verge of the ACC's longest reign since Bobby Bowden's Seminoles arrived in 1992 and won at least a share of the title for nine straight seasons, going 70-2 in the nine-team league.

John Swofford got a close look at those Seminoles, first as a competitor as North Carolina's athletics director before becoming ACC commissioner in 1997. He told The Associated Press that Clemson's run "does compare favorably" because today's 14-team league "is considerably better."

"I don't think there's anything wrong with a league having a dominant team when that dominant team is without question a premier team nationally," Swofford said. "And that's exactly what we have in Clemson."

Yet offensive lineman Mitch Hyatt and defensive lineman Clelin Ferrell dismissed questions about a gap between Clemson and everyone else.

"I wouldn't say that," Ferrell said. "You can talk about that as far as the past years, it might be a big gap. ... This 2018 team

hasn't done anything. There's not really a gap as far as what we've done."

Besides, Hyatt noted, there have been close calls. There was a hang-on-for-dear-life home win against Louisville and eventual Heisman Trophy winner Lamar Jackson in 2016. There were one-possession margins in ACC title games against North Carolina in 2015 and Virginia Tech in 2016. And North Carolina State played Clemson within a touchdown the past two years, including a 2016 overtime road loss after missing a short winning field goal at regulation's end.

"It's just executing in the final 2 minutes of the game," Wolfpack coach Dave Doeren said. "We missed a kick two years ago and had a couple of penalties (last year), and that's us, that's not them. So we've got to execute under pressure better — period."

But Doeren's observation underlines another way the Tigers are equipped to fend off challengers. There's a big-game-tested core from playoff routs of Oklahoma and Ohio State along with unforgettable title-game thrillers against Alabama, with the Crimson Tide winning in 2015 and the Tigers claiming the rematch before Alabama won Round 3 in last year's semifinals.

Swinney isn't changing his "you get what you earn" approach, either, even as the Tigers keep bringing trophies home to Death Valley.

"A big thing is Coach Swinney told us not to beat ourselves," Hyatt said. "We have the talent to win. We have the players, we have the coaches — we have everything we need to win."

well as the clean and jerk that Wiebers was familiar with in high school.

Comparatively, that is one of the minute changes Wiebers is about to experience.

"I was very interested in weightlifting for college, but knew there were not a lot of colleges that offered it, especially down South, so this is a great

"They're super excited for me," Wiebers said. "They know that it's a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for me. Even though it's so far away, they're

ready for me to move up there."

In addition to pursuing a degree in physiology and exercise, Wiebers is well aware that her athletic challenge will be intensified.

"I thought after state it would be my last time lifting" competitively, Wiebers said. "Then when I heard about the scholarship I was so happy to have the opportunity to have something like this."

"I think this is such a new and great experience. I'll be one of the girls paving the way. It's so exciting. I don't think that it's

totally hit me."

Wiebers said she'll be one of eight young women competing for the Knights during the athletic year, with meets more on a scale to develop national lifters. Eventually she thought that Brown wanted to expand the program to have 15 women on the team.

"It's a huge switch for me, but I just love to perform in front of people," Wiebers said. "It will be a lot more training, but I'm prepared to be in the gym two or three times a day to be as good as I want to be."

city known for its passion and toughness was more revered than Dawkins. He has a special bond with the fans.

"They're crazy. They're twisted in some ways. But I love them, because there are a lot of parts of me that are twisted in a lot of different ways," Dawkins said. "That's why I did some of the crazy stuff on the field that I did. So we fit like hand in glove."

"I believe if a Philadelphia Eagles fan had a chance to play, I believe the majority of them, if not all of them, would play the game the way that I played it. They would dance,

they would be having a good time, and they would go out and enjoy the opportunity to be on the football field and show it and not be afraid to show their emotions, to play with passion and give everything that they have, because that would be the only chance that they would ever get to play the game of football, and that's how I played. I played with a chip on my shoulder. I wanted to have a good time. I danced. I celebrated after plays. I celebrated with my teammates, and they saw that."

Dawkins was a four-time All-Pro and went to the Pro Bowl seven times in 13 seasons with the Eagles. He made two more Pro Bowl rosters in three seasons for the Denver Broncos.



# Long history at Firestone, 1 man who's seen it all

AKRON, Ohio — Deemed to be too young and too small for work, Paul Lazoran turned to walk away when the Firestone Country Club pro told him he could sit in a corner of the golf shop and clean clubs for \$2 a day. That was 1951. Lazoran was 9. And he never left. He was there in 1954 to watch Tommy Bolt win the Rubber City Open, the first tournament at Firestone. He was the caddy for Arnold Palmer, his hero, in the 1964 World Series of Golf, and for Gary Player the following year when Player won the four-man exhibition and paid Lazoran \$2,500, enough for a down payment on a house. He drank beers into the night with Nick Price when the 26-year-old from Zimbabwe won his first title in America. Tiger Woods? Lazoran was there for all eight of his victories at Firestone, and one stands out in particular. “I could hear the ball going over the roof,” Lazoran, now 76, said Tuesday as he geared up for his 89th event at the 90-year-old club in northeast Ohio. “It crossed over the roof down to where we keep all the trash. One of the cooks there thought he found a golf ball.” That was Josh Stuber, who was delivering a batch of crunchy cream pies when he stumbled across the golf ball. Apparently not noticing “TIGER” in small, block letters, he stuffed it in his pocket and drove off. Because the clubhouse area was not out-of-bounds, Woods received a free drop, made bogey to end the second round and went on to win in a playoff. Woods returns to Firestone one last time. This is the final edition of the Bridgestone Invitational

because the World Golf Championship will have a new sponsor (FedEx) on a different golf course (TPC Southwind) in Memphis, Tennessee, next year. It will not be the end of golf at Firestone. Filling the void will be the Senior Players Championship, which gives one of the five majors on the PGA Tour Champions a sense of stability, if not nostalgia. There is deep history at Firestone, which has hosted the PGA Championship three times — Jack Nicklaus won his 14th major in 1975 at Firestone — the Rubber City Open, the American Golf Classic, the CBS Golf Classic and the World Series of Golf, which preceded the World Golf Championship.

It has plenty of history. Lazoran has lived every bit of it. He went from cleaning clubs to selling sandwiches at the halfway house to working as a caddy. He was an assistant pro under Bobby Nichols and worked in the locker room for three decades. He retired from full-time work in 2010, but Lazoran still drops in for a few hours each day during the tournament to work in the golf shop. He feels no sense of despair that Firestone is losing the world's best players, replaced by the world's best players 50 and older. “I’ve been there for 67 years, and the area has always supported golf,” he said. His favorite memory was working for Player because they won, and for Palmer because he was the King. “He was my idol,” Lazoran said. “I was a nervous wreck on the first tee. I could feel my hands shaking. I’m caddying for the King. And he looked over at me and said, ‘I’m nervous enough for the two of us. Just relax.’”

### NEW YORK NBA strikes deal with MGM Resorts

The NBA and WNBA will now share official data with MGM Resorts International, a major win for the leagues as they prepare for the anticipated growth of sports betting across the country.

The Las Vegas-based casino giant will pay the NBA for that data to use in determining outcomes of various bets.

The NBA's stance has been that getting accurate stats to bettors is critical so players know what they're betting on and so casinos will know when to pay out, and MGM Resorts is the first casino to make an arrangement with the league for those numbers.

Terms of the deal announced Tuesday were not disclosed, other than it's a multiyear arrangement.

### WESTFIELD, IND. Newspaper: City paying \$1M for hotel rental

Officials in an Indianapolis suburb that's home to the Colts' summer training camp agreed to pay about \$1.1 million over three years toward the NFL team's hotel rental, according to records.

Contract documents obtained by The Indianapolis Star through a records request show Westfield officials committed to paying half of the hotel rental bill last year while publicly saying that no city incentives would be used to help lure the Colts. The team is leasing a 152-room Cambria Suites for roughly 30 days each summer to accommodate players, coaches and staff.

The Colts announced in September that they planned to move the team's training camp to the suburb's 400-acre Grand Park sports campus.

The team's contract to lease the campus said it would pay the city \$653,000 over 10 years.

The city was positioned to make an estimated \$190,000 per year from parking, food and beverage sales.

### MELBOURNE, AUSTRALIA Golfer Lyle, 36, to have palliative care at home

Australian golfer Jarrod Lyle has opted not to seek further treatment in his long fight against leukemia and will receive palliative care at home, his family announced late Tuesday.

The 36-year-old Lyle, who won twice on the Nationwide Tour in 2008, was first diagnosed with leukemia as a teenager and suffered recurrences of the disease in 2012 and 2017.

In a post on Lyle's Facebook page, his wife Briony wrote that Lyle had "reached his limit" and that he and his doctors had agreed that a "positive outcome" was no longer achievable.

## James joins other celebrities who launched schools

With the launch of a public school in his hometown of Akron, Ohio, LeBron James has joined a long list of celebrities who have sought to leave their mark on education centers.

The NBA star, who recently left the Cleveland Cavaliers and signed with the Los Angeles Lakers, was on hand Monday to welcome children to the I Promise School, built in a partnership with the LeBron James Family Foundation and Akron City Schools. The school launches with a group of third- and fourth-graders and plans to expand to serve first through eighth grades by 2022.

James has said the school, with a non-traditional schedule and year-round programming, can have a lasting impact for children facing the kinds of challenges he faced during a rough childhood. James grew up without a father, and he missed a lot of school because he and his mother lacked transportation.

Here is a look at some of the other celebrities who have been involved in creating schools, sometimes with mixed results:

### Deion Sanders


The NFL Hall of Famer co-founded a multi-campus charter school called Prime Prep Academy in Texas in 2012. He coached there and served in other capacities but had a rocky relationship with administrators and was twice fired and rehired. The school's enrollment slid amid financial and administrative problems, and it closed in early 2015.

### Shakira

The singer has funded at least a half-dozen schools for children in her native Colombia over the past two decades with her foundation, Pies Descalzos, which means Barefoot in Spanish. Those institutions included a \$6 million school she dedicated in 2009 in her hometown, Barranquilla, on Colombia's Caribbean coast. She said then that her foundation's work is about "breaking the myth that quality education is the privilege of the few."

### Magic Johnson

The Lakers legend announced in 2011 that he was partnering with for-profit Edison Learning Inc. to lend his name and business skills to promote dropout recovery centers. The effort expanded to at least 17

Bridgescape schools in six states within a couple years with the goal of reducing school dropout rates in urban areas. The company and Johnson parted ways after five years, but Edison Learning says four Bridgescape Learning Academies still operate with the Chicago Public Schools.

### Tony Bennett

The singer and his wife, teacher Susan Benedetto, founded the Frank Sinatra School of the Arts in 2001 in New York, naming it after the legendary singer, who was Bennett's best friend. The public performing arts high school in Queens, which gets support from Bennett's nonprofit group, admits students based on auditions. It boasts a high graduation rate, with alumni who have gone on to study at a variety of top arts colleges.

### Will Smith

The actor-rapper and his actress wife, Jada Pinkett Smith, founded the private New Village Academy in the Los Angeles area in 2008. Pinkett Smith said she was moved to start the school after developing home-schooling programs for their own children, but it was embroiled in controversy over rumors the curriculum used instructional methods developed by Scientology founder L. Ron Hubbard. The couple and school leaders denied any connection to the church. The school reportedly closed in 2013. Representatives for the couple couldn't immediately be reached for comment.

### Andre Agassi

The tennis great ran the Andre Agassi College Preparatory Academy for at-risk youth in his hometown, Las Vegas. In

2016, the academy was turned over to an out-of-state operator, and it has been rebranded Democracy Prep at Agassi Campus. The school change was compelled by a Nevada state initiative that targeted low-performing schools. The Andre Agassi Foundation for Education also is tied to an investment fund that helps charter school operators get access to buildings and facilities around the country.

### Sean "Diddy" Combs

The performer and entrepreneur added another role in 2016 as founder of the Capital Preparatory Harlem Charter School in the New York neighborhood where he was born. He said it was a dream come true to create the school, which is part of a group of schools aimed at supporting historically disadvantaged students.

### Pitbull

The rapper, whose real name is Armando Christian Perez, has been a celebrity ambassador for the Sports and Leadership Academy, which has locations in Miami and Henderson, Nevada. He's appeared at ceremonies for the schools, which focus on sports medicine, marketing, business and management. The academy is overseen by the Sports and Leadership Academy Foundation, and he is not a financial donor.

### Madonna

The pop star founded the charity Raising Malawi in 2006 to help vulnerable children in that impoverished southern African nation. Its work has included helping to build schools there. It also founded a children's wing at a hospital that opened last year.

## Users share tweets to expose 'toxic' culture

A pair of Twitter users whose posts exposing offensive tweets by baseball players went viral over the weekend say their aim was not malicious but to give fans a fuller picture of who they're cheering for, and to expose the sport's "toxic" culture.

In exclusive interviews with The Associated Press, both users said they weren't looking for the years-old tweets from Milwaukee Brewers reliever Josh Hader or Atlanta Braves pitcher Sean Newcomb, but when the posts came across their timelines, they felt obligated to share them.

Kevin Jenkins wasn't looking through Hader's twitter feed as he watched the All-Star Game earlier this month. But then they began popping up on his Twitter feed. After seeing the pitcher's racist, sexist and homophobic remarks, it was hard for Jenkins to remain a fan.

"Before the tweets, I thought he was a cool guy," Jenkins said via direct message on Twitter. "An amazing pitcher and an even better person ... After the tweets, I mean ... It's hard to defend the guy. My opinion has definitely changed."

Jenkins compiled screenshots of a handful of Hader's offensive tweets and created a post. That tweet has garnered nearly 6,000 likes. He said his intent wasn't to dig up Hader's past to bring him down.

"I still feel that he's an amazing pitcher, but the things he said were inexcusable," Jenkins said. "None of us know if he's really changed since then. I felt it was important for people to see the tweets and make their own judgment."

After Hader's tweets came to light, the reliever was swift to apologize, saying the posts were a youthful mistake, written in 2011 and 2012, when he was a 17-year-old and long before he was a major leaguer. For Jenkins, who is 16 and white, the explanation didn't fly.

"I'm younger than he was at the time, and no one would ever see anything like that from me," Jenkins said. "It's horrid."

Over the weekend, old, offensive tweets from Newcomb and Washington Nationals shortstop Trea Turner also resurfaced. Twitter user @NatsSquid posted about Newcomb after seeing one of the tweets on his timeline and did a search to see if there were others.

"Baseball culture is toxic and I want players to be held accountable for what they say," said @NatsSquid, who spoke to The AP via direct message on Twitter and declined to give a reporter his name identifying himself only as "a DC-area male."

## ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

*"If a man looks sharply and attentively, he shall see Fortune; for though she is blind, she is not invisible."*

— Francis Bacon

Against three no-trump, West hits on the one lead that will create a problem for South: the spade eight. This looks very much like top of nothing, so South plays low from dummy to preserve his queen. After all, if West has the king, the queen will make a trick later.

South must develop clubs to make his contract, but he must also try to keep West out of the lead. Accordingly, declarer leads the club nine, intending to let it ride around to East. If West ducks, he knows South will let it run, so West covers, and declarer must go up with one of dummy's top clubs, consistent with his plan of keeping West off play. When East unblocks his club jack — since he doesn't want the lead — South is in trouble.

He returns to his hand in diamonds and leads the club two, again intending to let this card ride around to East. West covers this card for the same reason as before — his best play is the eight. Once again, declarer wins in dummy, and East follows with the seven.

When declarer cashes the third top club and East shows out, pitching a diamond, declarer plays the diamond ace and king, as East pitches a spade. Before playing on spades, South falls back on one further slim chance, namely playing three rounds of hearts. Bingo! East must win and lead away from the spade king to concede the ninth trick.

Had West won the third heart, declarer would still have come home if the spade king was onside.

If you do double and your partner bids two no-trump, that will show two places to play, while his call of three clubs would show a single-suited hand. Of course, that doesn't answer the question of whether you should then pass or correct to three diamonds.



# A cool drink of cucumber

Hydrate with summer's refreshing green treat

The expression "cool as a cucumber" was bound to exist. The cooler the better, in fact, as nothing beats a cold one straight out of the fridge. But even a warm cucumber, freshly picked in the middle of a hot field, can be gloriously refreshing. The impossibility of a cucumber gathering and stashing all that water is as cool as the hydration itself.

People make a big deal about the different kinds of tomatoes they can buy during tomato season, but the same can be done over cucumbers. The differences are more subtle, but no less enjoyable. Variations in flavor, water content, crispiness and how it explodes in your mouth all add up to myriad gastronomic experiences.

#### Discovering health benefits

Cucumbers are considered a physiologically "cooling" food in the Ayurvedic medical philosophy of India, where the plant is thought to have first been cultivated. I can't comment on the physiology here, but I do know that if you cool your cucumbers first, they will be a cooling food. And beyond the relationship between cucumbers and temperature, cucumbers are proving potentially cool in other ways as well.

Pharmacological researchers have zeroed in on several chemical compounds found in cucumbers for potential medical applications. Many of these are found in cucumber seed extract, but

interesting compounds have been isolated elsewhere in the fleshy fruit, such as the peel and the blossom end of the cucumber, also known as the bitter end, which contains cucurbitacin C, a toxin created by the plant to ward off predators like spider mites that attack the flowers. Chemically, cucurbitacin C is a steroid molecule, though it isn't currently banned by any sports leagues, so it must not be much good in, you know, that department.

At low doses, results are promising in many arenas, with cucurbitacin C showing potential anti-tumor, anti-diabetic, anti-atherosclerotic and anti-inflammatory activities.

The cosmetics industry, meanwhile, has latched onto some other molecules in cucumber seeds, promoting their ability to hydrate, elasticize and — you guessed it — cool and calm the skin.

#### Try 'em all

Now is peak cucumber appreciation season at the farmers market, with each farmer's every variety of cucumber all hitting. Last week I brought home five different varieties from three different vendors, and let the comparisons begin. The highlight was the "Chinese cucumber," which had such a pale shade of green it was almost gray, with a thin, spiky skin like a pickling cuke and an explosive, watery crisp.

Another great cucumber is the Armenian, which is as delicious as it is enormous. And don't sleep on the normal, plain-Jane-looking dark green slicing cucumbers. There are some really fine varieties out there.

#### Cucumber Ambrosia

- 2 medium cukes (or one large)
- 4-8 ice cubes
- 1/4 lime
- 4 mint leaves

Slice the blossom ends of both cucumbers. If you can't tell which end is which, slice them both off and nibble each end. Then you will know. If you want to remove any bitterness from the blossom end, rub the cut face of the bitter end against the cut face of the cucumber. Rub in a circular pattern, which will extract a bitter, milky substance that you can wipe off. Cut the remaining cucumber sections into three or four pieces each, and put them in the blender with the ice cubes, mint leaves and lime juice.

Blend, starting low until it's a chunky slurry, then turn the blender up to high. If it's too slushy for your taste, add water. A little bit of added yogurt works really well, too.

Sipping on this greenish milky treat is refreshing and satisfying on so many levels, and is a delightful way to pass the afternoon — while loading up on vitamins and fiber.

And here is a cool fact: These flavors go very well with gin.

## IN THE KITCHEN

### 'Summer sapphires' go great in pie

Whether you enjoy them fresh from the picking or baked in muffins, cobblers, cakes or pies, I think we all agree the "summer sapphires" of the berry family are a special taste treat.

Blueberries are a good source of vitamins A and C, and they are not as perishable as most other berries. While blackberries keep their quality only about a day or two after they are purchased or picked, blueberries will keep about two weeks, if they are handled properly. Do not

wash blueberries until you are ready to use them.

Also, the Blueberry Association advises you should not wash the berries before freezing them, as this toughens the skins.

My husband's all-time favorite was Fresh Blueberry Pie, and I haven't made one in years.

When a friend gave me some blueberries recently, I decided to try my hand at making this classic dessert.

#### Fresh Blueberry Pie

##### Pecan pastry:

- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup purpose pecans
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup chilled shortening
- 1/2 cup chilled butter or margarine
- 5 to 6 tablespoons ice water

##### Filling:

- 4 cups fresh blueberries, washed and drained
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine

Combine flour, pecans, baking powder and salt in bowl of food processor fitted with the steel blade. Add shortening and butter. Process by pulsing until the mixture resembles coarse cornmeal with just a few lumps the size of peas. Gradually add ice water and mix until dough forms a ball. Remove from bowl and divide the dough in half, making two disks each about an inch thick. Cover with plastic wrap and chill for about 30 minutes.

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Remove dough from refrigerator and allow to sit until soft enough to roll without tearing.

Roll each disk to a circle an inch or two larger than a 9-inch pie plate. Fit one circle of dough in pie plate.

Combine berries, sugar and flour in medium bowl. Toss lightly to coat berries. Pour into pie crust. Dot with butter. Top with the second circle of dough. Trim and flute the edges of the crust. Cut 5 or 6 small slits in top crust to allow steam to escape.

Bake for 10 minutes at 450 degrees, then lower temperature to 350 degrees. Continue baking for about 30 minutes. If the edges of crust seem to be browning too quickly, cover them with aluminum foil the last 10 to 15 minutes of baking. Allow to cool completely before slicing.







# This garlicky-ginger chicken stir-fry can go mild or wild

Americans' taste for spicy and hot foods seems to be on the uptick. But when you possess a sensitive palate or digestive tract, or you are cooking for someone who does, a flexible recipe — and healthful! — that tastes good at both mild and wild ends of the spectrum makes things easy.

This stir-fry is a pantry-friendly way to go. Its classic ginger-garlic combination gives the dish enough flavor on its own; as soon as the green beans are warmed through, you can serve a portion as is. For those who can take the heat, your subsequent add-in options are many: A squirt of Sriracha, a dash of sweet chili sauce, hot sauce or chili-infused

honey or a sprinkling of crushed red pepper flakes among them.

Bone-in, skin-on chicken thighs are called for here because they are less expensive than boneless, skinless thighs and you will be able to stockpile bones and skin

for making wonderful things like chicken soup and fried chicken skins. But if you already have the latter on hand, you will save a step.

Serve with rice or rice noodles. You can chop up any leftovers for making fried rice.

## Ginger-Garlic Chicken With Green Beans

2 or 3 servings  
Adapted from SparkRecipes.com

### Ingredients

- 8 ounces frozen green beans
- 3 or 4 bone-in, skin-on chicken thighs
- ½ medium onion
- 2 cloves garlic
- 1 ½-inch piece fresh ginger root
- 2 tablespoons vegetable or grapeseed oil
- 2 teaspoons low-sodium soy sauce or more as needed
- ½ cup water
- ½ cup packed fresh basil leaves
- Kosher salt
- Freshly ground black pepper
- Hot sauce (optional)
- Crushed red pepper flakes

(optional)

### Steps

- Place the green beans in paper towel so they defrost a bit.
- Pull the skin from the chicken; freeze or discard it. Use a sharp knife to cut the flesh away from the bone; freeze the bones for making stock at another time. Cut the meat into bite-size pieces.
- Coarsely chop the onion. Smash, peel and mince the garlic. Use a spoon to scrape away the skin of the ginger root, then grate or mince the ginger to yield at least 2 teaspoons (the more, the better!).
- Cut the green beans into 1-inch lengths.
- Heat the oil in a wok or deep saute pan over medium-high heat. As soon as the oil

shimmers, swirl it around to coat. Add the onion, garlic and ginger; stir-fry for about 40 seconds, just until fragrant, and then add the chicken pieces. Stir-fry for about 4 minutes or until they have taken on some color and are almost cooked through.

Add the green beans and soy sauce; stir-fry for 1 minute, then add the water. Cover and cook for 3 or 4 minutes, then uncover, drop in the basil leaves and season lightly with salt and pepper.

At this point, the flavor will be mild. Taste, and add more soy sauce, as needed. Serve your guests who like it that way, and then season what is left in the pan with a spicy component before dishing out the rest.

# Yelp adds health inspection scores for restaurants

Starting July 24, Yelp is expanding across the nation a controversial program that pulls health-inspection data from government databases and places it directly on a restaurant's page on the user-generated review site. Yelp is calling it a win for consumer food safety. Some restaurateurs are calling it a misleading ploy to draw more people to Yelp.

Yelp launched its Local Inspector Value-Entry Specification, or LIVES, program in 2013 in San Francisco, working with city officials to make health inspection reports easily available to Yelpers who are trying to decide which restaurant to visit. Yelp executives had hoped other jurisdictions would follow San Francisco's lead, but only about a dozen did, says Luther Lowe, senior vice president of public policy for Yelp.

To expand the program nationally, Yelp partnered with a third-party company, HDScores, to scrub government websites to find health inspection reports that often live in the "dark, unvisited places of the internet," says Lowe. According to HDScores's website, the company has scrubbed the web for more than 6 million inspection reports, representing more

than 1.16 million restaurants and food-service establishments in 42 states. As a result, Yelp will add the data to restaurants in New York, California, Texas, Illinois and the District of Columbia. Data for restaurants in other states will be rolled out in the coming months, Yelp promises.

The inspiration for making health reports available on Yelp, says Lowe, was a 2005 study conducted in Los Angeles County, which in 1998 started requiring restaurants and other commercial food establishments to post grade cards in their windows. (Each restaurant is assigned a letter grade that corresponds to its health inspection score — 90 to 100 points for an A, 80 to 89 for a B and 70 to 79 for a C.) The study found that after the grade-card program was launched, foodborne-disease hospitalizations in Los Angeles County "decreased in 1998 to the same level observed in the rest of the state." The decreased was sustained for the next two years of the study as well.

"That was kind of the analog version of what we're doing," Lowe says about the grade cards. "In the case of Los Angeles, people would have to wait, I guess, until they've parked their car and are about to walk into the restaurant (to
