# Bay schools tax rate cut

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PANAMA CITY — Property owners can expect to pay a little less in taxes to Bay District Schools next year based on the tentative millage rate. On Wednesday, the School Board approved the tentative

millage at 6.122 mills, which is a .219 decrease from last year's rate of 6.341. The proposed millage rate matches the rolled-back rate.

Taxpayers will expect to be paying \$10.95 less per \$50,000 of taxable value.

"A decrease for homeowners is definitely a good thing. It means if they did

not increase in their property value, that their tax bill will go down," said Jim Loyed, executive director of business support services for Bay District Schools. "What that means now is it gives an opportunity for the property appraiser to send out tax

## Chambers convicted, could get 30 years for crash

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PANAMA CITY — A jury Wednesday sided with the state in convicting Christopher Chambers in the violent crash that killed the mother of his child in 2016.

Chambers, 47, was convicted of vehicular homicide in the death of his 21-year-old passenger, Barbie Wright. Prosecutors presented the case that he sped around a line of cars stopped in the 1900 block of Sherman Avenue as a school bus unloaded children. But the defense contended that it was an accident as a mechanical malfunction prevented Chambers from using his brakes as he was avoiding a crash with other cars.

Chambers faces up to 30 years in prison after being found guilty as charged and that the conviction violates the terms of his probation. He is scheduled to be sentenced Aug. 21.

At the end of a two-day trial, jurors spent about an hour and a half discussing the case before finding Chambers guilty. Chambers bowed his head and shook it in disbelief as the verdict was read aloud.

During much of closing arguments Wednesday, Chambers had likewise shook his head and appeared distraught.

Prosecutor Alyssa Yarbrough told the jury the case came down to whether they thought Chambers acted reckless in his driving on April 8, 2016. She said that his speed, the area

# Park makes a big splash

Lynn Haven water play area opens to delight of children and adults alike

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LYNN HAVEN — After much anticipation, the new splash pad at Kinsaul Park earned a thumbs-up from parent Andrew Noles.

"We love it. They opened the dog park and now they have this," Noles said. "We'll be out here every day. ... We come out here all the time and we've been watching them test it. Now, my son just loves it. He loves slides and he loves water."

Noles was one of

several parents who brought their children to play in Lynn Haven's first splash park Wednesday. City officials and employees, along with Bay County Chamber of Commerce representatives, had a ribbon-cutting ceremony for the park at 1146 W. Fifth St.

The water play area, named after local developer James Finch, is free and open from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily. It will be closed from October to February.

"I'd like to recognize all the city employees who have worked so very hard to make this possible. This is a great day for the children," said Mayor Margo Anderson,

## Judge: Manafort's wealth not a crime

ALEXANDRIA, Va. — The judge in Paul Manafort's financial fraud trial warned prosecutors Wednesday against using the word "oligarchs" to describe wealthy Ukrainians, and admonished them for spending so much time documenting the former Trump campaign chairman's extravagant lifestyle.

It's not a crime to be wealthy, said U.S. District Judge T.S. Ellis III. And the pejorative term "oligarchs" and evidence of home renovations aren't necessarily relevant to the charges in question, he added. At one point, Ellis even called out lawyers from both sides for rolling their eyes.

"Let's move it along," Ellis said repeatedly.

On the second day of the trial, jurors heard details of Manafort's acquisition of more than \$1 million in clothing, expensive cars and more than \$3 million in home improvement work — nearly all paid for either in cash or by offshore wire transfers.

The defense has argued that the illegal conduct alleged by the government was carried out by Manafort's business associate Rick Gates, who has pleaded guilty and is now the government's star witness. Gates also worked on the Trump campaign.

But a series of witnesses for the prosecution testified Wednesday that they didn't know Gates and he wasn't involved in paying them. The

witnesses instead testified Manafort personally directed them to be paid by wire transfers from offshore accounts that prosecutors say he hid from the IRS.

The trial is the first courtroom test for special counsel Robert Mueller, who was tasked last year with investigating Russia's efforts to sway the 2016 election and to determine whether the Trump campaign was involved. So far, Manafort is the lone person to stand trial as a result of the ongoing probe, even though the charges of bank fraud and tax evasion are unrelated to possible collusion.

Still, the trial pulled back the curtain on the former lobbyist who steered Trump's election efforts for a time, including descriptions of Manafort's \$15,000 jacket made of ostrich and the more than \$6 million in cash he put toward real estate. One witness, Maximilian Katzman, testified that Manafort spent more than \$900,000 at his boutique retailer in New York. He said Manafort was the only business client of his who paid via international wire transfer.

At one point, an FBI agent described the July 2017 raid on Manafort's Virginia condominium. He said he knocked

multiple times before entering with a key after no one answered, only to find Manafort sitting inside.

The searches described by agent Matthew Mikuska found expensively tailored suits and documents related to other luxury items allegedly bought by Manafort, including two silk rugs bought for \$160,000 paid from offshore accounts.

But when prosecutors introduced photos of Manafort's high-end condo and expensive suits, Ellis interrupted so as to limit the growing list of evidence jurors would have to consider.

"All this document shows is that Mr. Manafort had a

lavish lifestyle," Ellis said at one point. "It isn't relevant."

On the term "oligarchs," Ellis said use of the word implied that Manafort was associating with "despicable people and therefore he's despicable."

"That's not the American way," the judge said.

Prosecutor Greg Andres argued that Manafort's spending was important to the case.

"Judge, this is not an effort to prove Mr. Manafort lived lavishly," Andres said. "It's evidence of his income."

Ellis seemed to grow impatient after being told that attorneys on both sides were seen rolling their eyes after leaving the bench or in response to his rulings. The lawyers' facial expressions, Ellis said, appeared to show them thinking "why do we have to put up with this idiot judge?"

The proceedings, which could last weeks, clearly caught the attention of President Donald Trump, who defended his 2016 hiring of Manafort and suggested Manafort was being treated worse than mobster Al Capone. White House press secretary Sarah Sanders said the president indeed felt Manafort had been treated unfairly.

"Why didn't government tell me that he was under investigation," Trump tweeted Wednesday. "These old charges have nothing to do with Collusion - a Hoax!"

Manafort's defense attorneys are putting blame on Gates, Manafort's business associate.

Former airman resentenced in double homicide case

A former senior airman from southwest Wisconsin has been spared the death penalty for a second time on a double homicide conviction and will instead spend the rest of his life behind bars.

A military panel last month resentenced Andrew Witt to life in prison without parole in connection to the deaths of a fellow airman Andrew Schliepsiek and his wife, Jamie Schliepsiek.

The 36-year-old was convicted of murder and sentenced to death in 2005. But a military appeals court vacated the ruling in 2016, and returned the case to a lower court.

Witt's attorney said the life sentence was delivered last month, but prosecutors again sought the death penalty.

### MILWAUKEE

Wisconsin records 1st death linked to synthetic marijuana

Wisconsin health officials report the first death in the state linked to a recent surge in people using synthetic marijuana.

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services on Wednesday confirmed a death in Milwaukee County related to the use of synthetic marijuana, often called fake weed, K2 and spice.

The Milwaukee County medical examiner's office says a 33-year-old woman died July 1 of complications from ingesting rat poison, and that drugs including synthetic marijuana, methadone and cough suppressant were a contributing factor.

Fake marijuana contains chemicals that produce a marijuana-like high.

### CARROLLTON, VA.

Man facing bomb-making charges after search of home

A Virginia man is facing bomb-making charges after a search at his home. The Isle of Wight County Sheriff's Office announced Wednesday that they've charged Paul Longoria, 32, with manufacturing, possessing or using fire bombs or explosive materials. He's being held without bond.

News outlets report that a criminal complaint states that deputies were helping the FBI with a search warrant for electronic devices prompted by threatening communications originating from the home. The complaint states that items found during the search are commonly used to make destructive devices and Longoria acknowledges that he owned the items.

### ADDIS ABABA, ETHIOPIA

Ex-Ethiopian dictator meets former leader in Harare

The former Ethiopian dictator Colonel Mengistu Hailemariam met with Ethiopia's former Prime Minister Hailemariam Desalegn in Zimbabwe's capital Harare on Wednesday.

The meeting between Hailemariam, who was Ethiopia's Prime Minister until he resigned in April 2018, and Mengistu has stunned many in Ethiopia who had a rare glimpse of Mengistu since he fled the country in 1991 as rebels approached the capital, Addis Ababa.

A photo of the meeting between Mengistu and Hailemariam, who was in Zimbabwe as head of the African Union's election observers' mission, was widely shared on social media.

### PRISTINA, KOSOVO

Kosovo's president rejects ethnic land swap with Serbia

The president of Kosovo has rejected the idea of dividing the country along ethnic lines to resolve a dispute over its independence from Serbia.

But President Hashim Thaci told The Associated Press in an interview Wednesday that he was open to discussing "a correction" of borders during the difficult European Union-mediated peace negotiations between Kosovo and Serbia.

"Serbia's claim for a Kosovo division will not be successful. It is unacceptable," he said.

Kosovo declared independence from Serbia in 2008 and is recognized as a separate nation by more than 100 countries, but not by Serbia.

and the time of day demonstrated that he was.

"He was driving at excessive speeds," Yarbrough told the jury. "He was passing stopped cars and a school bus, ignoring the time of day. His only focus was getting down the road to get his personal items."

Defense attorney Caren Bennett, however, argued that Chamber's role in the crash was more benign. She conceded that he had been speeding before the crash, but said that a mechanical failure was what cost his passenger's life.

"This was an accident," Bennett told the jury. "Just because someone dies, as sad as that is, doesn't make it a crime. ... It's just as likely he was trying to avoid an accident and his brakes went out."

Court records detail the events of April 2016 when authorities arrived to a trailer park on Sherman Avenue to find a small silver car overturned and "embedded around a utility pole." It appeared the driver had been driving at excessive speeds along the 35 mph stretch of road and crashed while avoiding a head-on collision with a school bus.

After being treated for minor injuries in the crash, Chambers told investigators he had been trying to locate items taken from his home while he was incarcerated on an unrelated assault charge. Court records show he had been released that day for dragging Wright — his girlfriend and mother of his young child — by the hair for about 100 feet behind his car. Chambers and Wright were headed to an address on Sherman Avenue, where they were supposed to be purchasing some of Chambers' work tools that had been taken, the Florida Highway Patrol reported.

Chambers had requested a deputy be standing by because the resident of the house was under the impression a stranger, and not the owner, was coming to buy the tools, records state. Chambers and Wright had received word the resident would be leaving soon, so Wright was maintaining cell-phone contact with him

as Chambers drove, FHP reported.

That's when the speeding car came up on a line of cars awaiting a school bus.

The final day of testimony focused on that moment, with expert witnesses parsing evidence of skid marks and delving into "Newtonian mechanics" to determine what speed Chambers had been going — either 53 or 79 mph — and whether he had attempted to brake.

Bennett's final witness was a professional crash reconstructionist, Beau Biller. He reviewed the investigative reports and told the jury the car had logged crash data pertaining to the use of its brakes. However, the data recorder had been "mashed" in the violent wreck and no information could be retrieved.

Biller said that what he could tell from the sparse skid marks leading up to the crash and the history of the vehicle, a 2013 Nissan Versa, he thought there could be an issue with the brakes.

"It's my understanding it had recalls for brake problems," Biller told the jury. "If there were attempts at full brake application and only a few marks ... that would tell me something was wrong."

Biller's testimony on the matter relied on the assumption that Chambers had attempted to brake. And Chambers declined to testify himself to that aspect. Biller also said he did not test the brakes on the car for defects.

Yarbrough called FHP Trooper Dallas Jones as her expert witness to combat the defense's testimony. Jones was on the scene the day of the fatal crash and gathered evidence used in the trial. Jones said he tested the brakes and later

spoke in June 2016 with Chambers, who made no mention of brake issues in the crash at that time.

When asked whether the case came down to brake failure or speed, Jones responded "it's a problem with speed."

"After working the interstate for 30 years, this crash is consistent with interstate speeds of 70 to 80 mph," he told the jury.

The jury agreed. Yarbrough concluded in her closing arguments that the discrepancies in speed of 53 or 79 mph were inconsequential, because Chambers should have known his actions could at least hurt someone. And since someone died as a result, that constituted vehicular homicide, she said.

"This is no accident," Yarbrough said. "An accident is when you're doing everything right and something bad happens. That is not what we have. What we have is his reckless actions that led to the death of Barbie Wright."

a longtime advocate for the splash park. "I have already had a couple of good cries this morning because this is a time when all the children of Lynn Haven have an amenity that's going to be something they can really enjoy, and it will be for generations to come."

The park is between the playground and concession stand and has a nautical theme.

Features include water

sprays, stream jets, dump buckets and a slide. For the parents, chairs have been set up so they can relax watching their children.

"I think it's good for little kids and toddlers. I live down the street so it's good for my little daughter," Valerie Melillo said while sitting in a chair. "I think it's well-built. It's really cool."

Lynn Haven commissioners set aside \$200,000 for the park when drafting the city's 2017-2018 budget last year.

Commissioner Rodney Friend said the grand opening was a "great

day" for Lynn Haven.

"It's very exciting to see all the kids out here today. I didn't always agree with the location. I do have to say 'thank you' and I appreciate the mayor being persistent with the location," Friend said. "I really do believe kids will come out throughout all of Lynn Haven to visit."

A second splash park is planned at Cain-Griffin Park, which also is budgeted for \$200,000.

The park can be rented out for private events. Safety rules prohibit glass containers, food, beverages, skateboards and scooters.

notices to individuals so they would know what their tax bill will be if this was approved as a final budget."

The decrease in millage is because the state-set "required local effort" dropped to 4.084 from last year's 4.303 mills.

While the millage rate will decrease for taxpayers, the same amount of revenue will be produced. This is because of an increase in property values and the taxable new construction within the district.

The tentative budget approved for the upcoming school year is \$387,447,711. This is an increase of \$11,416,877 from last year, partially because of the increase in safety and security initiatives mandated by the state.

Much of that increase, however, is going to fund those security mandates, along with rising retirement and health insurance costs, leaving little for possible teacher raises.

"There's always discussion about teacher

and all employee salary increases," said Loyed. "There's really not a lot of additional revenue. The additional revenue is allocated for certain things. Safety and security and things like that, so we don't have any real discretionary dollars for salary increases."

Other budget highlights include a new mental health program, increased funding for school health technicians, math and literacy coach support for all schools, and supplemental funding for lower performing schools.

In Florida, the maximum a district can charge for local capital improvement (LCI) is 1.5, but the district has promised to keep the LCI at 1.290 to encourage citizens to vote for another cycle of the half-cent sales tax, which sends funding toward many of the same projects.

The proposed budget also has set aside \$500,000 in raises for teachers from Springfield, Lucille Moore and Oscar Patterson.

The final budget and millage rate will be approved Sept. 10. The district can go lower than the tentative millage rate, but not higher.

## Fed keeps key rate unchanged while signaling future hikes

WASHINGTON — The Federal Reserve on Wednesday left its benchmark interest rate unchanged while signaling further gradual rate hikes in the months ahead as long as the economy stays healthy.

The Fed's widely expected decision kept the central bank's key short-term rate at 1.75 percent to 2 percent — the level hit in June when the Fed boosted the rate for a second time this year.

The Fed projected in June four rate hikes this year, up from three in 2017. Private economists expect the next hike to occur at the September meeting with a fourth rate hike expected in December.

The Fed's statement was upbeat on the economy, pointing to a strengthening labor market, economic activity growing at "a strong rate," and inflation that's reached the central bank's target of 2 percent annual gains.

Analysts saw all the comments about economic strength as a clear signal that the Fed remains on track to raise rates two more times this year.

"All signs still point to a September rate hike," said Greg McBride, chief financial analyst at Bankrate.com. He said consumers should continue to pay down their home equity, credit card and other loans with variable rates that will rise further

as the Fed keeps hiking rates.

"Refinance adjustable rate debt into fixed rates to insulate yourself from further rate hikes," McBride recommended.

There was no mention in the statement of what many economists see as one of the biggest risks at the moment: rising tariffs on billions of dollars of U.S. exports and imports that have been imposed as a result of President Donald Trump's new get-tough approach on trade.

The Fed statement also made no reference to criticism Trump has lodged recently against the Fed's continued rate hikes.

The Fed's decision was approved on a unanimous 8-0 vote. The action was not surprising, given that this meeting followed a June session where the Fed took a number of steps including raising rates by another quarter-point and changing its projection for hikes this year from three to four.

The March and June rate hikes followed three hikes in 2017 and one each in 2015 and 2016. The Fed's key policy rate is still at a relatively low level. But it's up from the record low near zero where it remained for seven years as the central bank worked to use ultra-low interest rates to lift the economy out of the Great Recession.

The string of quarter-point rate hikes is intended to prevent the economy from overheating and pushing inflation from climbing too high. But higher rates make borrowing costlier for consumers and businesses and can weigh down stock

prices. Trump has made clear he has little patience for the Fed's efforts to restrain the economy to control inflation.

"Tightening now hurts all that we have done," Trump tweeted last month, a day after he said in a television interview that he was "not happy" with the Fed's rate increases.

Over the past quarter-century, presidents have maintained silence in public about Fed actions, believing that lodging complaints would be counter-productive. That's because it could produce even faster rate hikes if the central bank feels the need to convince financial markets that it will not yield to political pressure and allow inflation to rise to worrisome levels.

At the moment, economic growth is strong, rising at an annual rate of 4.1 percent in the April-June quarter, the best showing in nearly four years.

Unemployment is at a low 4 percent, and some analysts believe it will fall further when the government releases the July figures on Friday.

But there are worries as well, led by fears of what a Trump-led trade war might do to growth in the United States and around the world.

Many analysts believe that the possible harm from rising tariffs was a key discussion topic this week. While trade was not mentioned in the statement, it likely will show up in the minutes of the Fed's discussion which will be released in three weeks.

## Inflation, gas, tariffs squeeze consumers

The price of a can of Coca-Cola? Likely going up. A package of Pampers? That too. Plane tickets? They also may be more expensive. These items and more may cost more in the coming months as people start feeling the effects of higher fuel prices and raw-material costs as well as a range of tariffs.

Janette Hendricks said she has noticed higher prices on "just about everything" in the past three months or so. That's put a little pressure on the recently retired nurse in Washington. So she goes shopping less often, "makes things stretch," and she always shops for things on sale. She said she has also considered going back to work to have more cushion in the budget.

"The economy is doing great, so why is everyone doing so poorly?" she asked.

The consumer price index, the government's primary measure of inflation, rose 2.9 percent in June from a year earlier, the fastest increase in six years. Starbucks had said in June that it had raised the price of a regular drip coffee, and McDonald's said it raised prices when it reported its latest sales figures.

"I cut back on a lot of things," said Ada Caro of New York, sitting outside a Target in lower Manhattan. "I just buy the necessities."

Procter & Gamble, one of the biggest makers of consumer products, had said Tuesday that Pampers prices will increase by an average of 4 percent in North America, while the Bounty, Charmin and Puffs brands could see 5 percent increases.

Gas prices have already surged more than 24 percent in the past year. Rent and other housing costs were up 3.4 percent in June compared to a year earlier, and auto insurance has jumped more than 7 percent.

# Apple soars but energy, industrial stocks sag

NEW YORK — Apple surged to its biggest gain in a year and a half Wednesday and drew closer to \$1 trillion in value after it reported stronger iPhone sales and rising prices. But losses for energy and industrial companies left major stock indexes lower.

Already the most valuable company in the U.S., Apple was the biggest gainer of any S&P 500 stock Wednesday and the technology giant finished at another record high.

That made up for a lot of losses elsewhere in the market. Investors sold industrial stocks following reports that the Trump administration is considering

a higher tax rate on Chinese imports.

Energy and materials companies fell with the price of oil, and metals and car companies also declined.

After the close of trading, the administration said it might put a 25 percent tax on \$200 billion in imports from China. It proposed a 10 percent tax in July, shortly after it placed a 25 percent tax on \$34 billion worth of imports. China again threatened to retaliate.

China can't match the size of the tariffs the U.S. could put on Chinese exports. But Katie Nixon, chief investment officer for Northern Trust Wealth Management, said the Chinese government is already reacting to the new tariffs and the larger

proposed ones by pumping more money into the economy and weakening its currency.

"They're sending a strong signal that they cannot just withstand (tariffs), but they can manage through a period of turmoil related to the negotiations," Nixon said.

The S&P 500 index slid 2.93 points, or 0.1 percent, to 2,813.36. The Dow Jones Industrial Average lost 81.37 points, or 0.3 percent, to 25,333.82. The Nasdaq composite added 35.50 points, or 0.5 percent, to 7,707.29, but the Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks lost 1.54 points, or 0.1 percent, to 1,669.26.

Almost two-thirds of the stocks on the New York Stock Exchange traded lower. The

S&P 500 index rose 3.6 percent in July in spite of the trade war between the U.S. and China. The markets got a lift from strong company earnings as well as efforts by the U.S. and European Union to resolve their trade differences.

As expected, the Federal Reserve left interest rates unchanged, but suggested it's likely to raise rates again in September.

High-dividend stocks like consumer products makers sank as bond yields increased.

Automakers fell as they reported their monthly sales and Ferrari plunged after it said it might not make some of the profit goals laid out by Sergio Marchionne, its late former CEO.

## Republican presents market-friendly climate fix

If American conservatives were “conservative” in any reasonable sense of the word, they would worry about the risky experiment humans are conducting by filling the atmosphere with heat-trapping gases. They also would propose market-friendly solutions for dealing with it.

Yet, it has been a decade since a Republican proposed a bill that would put a price on the greenhouse-gas emissions that drive climate change, which is the most efficient way to combat global warming. In that time, climate change’s early consequences have harmed communities in the United States and abroad, warning of worse to come. And the Republican Party has met the warnings with ever-more-extreme science denial.

So it was nice to see Rep. Carlos Curbelo, R-Fla., introduce a climate bill last week. It does not change the fact of near-universal GOP intransigence. Only two other Republicans have signed on to Curbelo’s legislation. The GOP House just passed a resolution declaring “the sense of Congress that a carbon tax would be detrimental to the United States economy.” President Donald Trump is even more hostile to acting on climate issues than most Republicans.

But Curbelo argues his bill will help spur a too-long-dormant conversation among Republicans about how the government should tackle global warming and that something like it eventually will pass. That raises a question: If a new generation of Republicans more attuned to climate reality ever asserts itself, would a bill like his be a good place to start?

There is a lot to like. Curbelo would put a substantial price on carbon dioxide emissions, \$24 per metric ton in 2020, and set it to rise faster than inflation. An analysis from Columbia University’s Center on Global Energy Policy found the plan would slash U.S. greenhouse-gas emissions 27 to 32 percent below 2005 levels by 2025 and by 30 to 40 percent by 2030. These reductions likely would outpace President Barack Obama’s pledge to cut U.S. greenhouse-gas emissions by 26 to 28 percent by 2025, and the plan would provide a long-term road map for further reductions.

The plan would modestly raise energy costs, but these costs would nevertheless remain far lower than their 2008 peak. Curbelo also would make the tax more palatable by eliminating the federal gasoline tax and using some of the leftover revenue to aid low-income families, who would face a tougher time than richer people paying the new carbon tax. That still would leave substantial amounts of money to fund infrastructure projects.

Complaints? Well, a simpler, fairer approach might be to rebate as much money as possible directly back to Americans, reducing the carbon tax’s burden on as many as possible. But the Curbelo bill would be a great improvement over the status quo. A genuinely conservative party would embrace it.


that Kim Jong Un and Putin have played Trump for the fool they know him to be.

# Mexico plane hit sudden, violent storm before crash

DURANGO, Mexico — It began with a strong burst of wind and pounding hail that pummeled the Aeromexico jetliner minutes after takeoff in northern Mexico then sent it smashing belly-down onto a field near the runway.

Frightened passengers scrambled to flee as flames and blinding black smoke erupted around them. Miraculously, all 103 on board survived the crash Tuesday.

On Wednesday, passengers described the terrifying sequence of events.

"It's not every day you kind of fall from the sky and live to tell about it," said Alberto Herrera, a 35-year-old webpage engineer from Chicago.

Jose Luis Corral, a 52-year-old business owner from Portland, Oregon, agreed.

"It's a good thing we're all alive," said Corral, who still wore a neck brace from injuries he suffered in the crash.

"It's so fast, terrifying to see all the people screaming," added Corral, who was one of four people who helped the plane's badly injured pilot escape the blaze. The pilot suffered a serious neck injury and remains hospitalized, along with 48 others injured in the crash.

Herrera said the skies were sunny as passengers boarded the flight from Durango to Mexico City Tuesday afternoon and the violent storm seemed to come from nowhere.

"When we were sitting on the plane there was a little drizzle, but nothing to worry about. It was just a little light rain, super light, like barely hitting the windows," Herrera said.

That all changed, seemingly

in an instant, he said.

"You start gaining speed and as soon as you start taking off all of the sudden the plane starts struggling and it's getting hit with hail. The higher up we went into the storm the heavier the hail got and more wind got to us," Herrera said.

"Then all of a sudden the plane starts rocking and it starts seriously, seriously moving around and then hitting the ground," he said. "We skidded and hit a second time and you saw the flames. ... You're like 'This might be bad.'"

By instinct, Herrera braced for impact and yelled for others to do the same. The woman seated next to him was able to hold onto her toddler, though the little girl suffered some scratches and may have hit her head on a seat.

Officials said the impact ripped both engines off the Embraer 190 jetliner, and fires immediately broke out in the wings.

With black smoke filling the cabin, the exits over the wings were blocked by fire. Herrera went to the back exit and tried

to help as many people down as he could. The emergency slide had deployed but the fuselage was at an odd angle, so it was unusable and people had to jump to the ground.

The passengers walked back across the muddy field to the end of runway and waited there for emergency vehicles.

"Everything was so sudden I think the pilot had to do his job to make sure as many people got out alive," Herrera said. He grabbed his passport from the seat back, but his suitcase with his only set of car keys was in the plane's belly; Herrera has no idea what happened to it.

But he was thankful to be alive.

"Me, I just came out of it with scratches. Other people are seriously injured."

He credits both the pilot and the fact the plane had not gained much altitude for the good outcome.

"The pilot had to execute a maneuver correctly and then we hit the storm at its peak while we were going up, and not while we were up in the air," he said.

# Court strikes down Trump push to cut 'sanctuary city' funds

SAN FRANCISCO — A divided U.S. appeals court on Wednesday struck down a key part of President Donald Trump's contentious effort to crack down on cities and states that limit cooperation with immigration officials, saying an executive order threatening to cut funding for "sanctuary cities" was unconstitutional.

In a 2-1 decision, the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals agreed with a lower court that the order exceeded the president's authority. Congress alone controls spending under the U.S. Constitution, and presidents do not have the power to withhold funding it approves to pursue their policy goals, the court majority said.

"By its plain terms, the executive order directs the agencies of the executive branch to withhold funds appropriated by Congress in order to further the administration's policy objective of punishing cities and counties that adopt so-called 'sanctuary' policies," wrote Chief Judge Sidney Thomas, joined by Judge Ronald Gould.

The court, however, also said the lower-court judge went too far when he blocked enforcement of Trump's order nationwide after a lawsuit from two California counties — San Francisco and Santa Clara.

Thomas said there wasn't enough evidence to support it, limited the injunction to California and sent the case back to the lower court for more arguments on whether

a wider ban was warranted.

Devin O'Malley, a spokesman for the U.S. Justice Department, called the ruling a victory for "criminal aliens in California, who can continue to commit crimes knowing that the state's leadership will protect them from federal immigration officers whose job it is to hold them accountable and remove them from the country." "The Justice Department remains committed to the rule of law, to protecting public safety, and to keeping criminal aliens off the streets," he said.

The decision overall is a big win for opponents of the executive order, but Trump could try to enforce it against jurisdictions outside the nine Western states covered by the 9th Circuit, said David Levine, an expert on federal court procedure at the University of California, Hastings, College of Law.

"If they wanted to go after Chicago, if they wanted to go after Denver or Philadelphia, they would not be bound by an injunction," he said. "Those places would have to bring their own lawsuits and whatever happens, happens in those cases."

Trump signed the executive order in January 2017 — part of a push by his administration to go after cities and states that don't work with U.S. immigration authorities. The government also has moved to withhold a particular law enforcement grant from sanctuary jurisdictions and sued California over three laws that extend protections to people in the country illegally.

## 30A Recycle issues refunds

**Some customers say they still are waiting for their checks**

PANAMA CITY — It took longer than anticipated, but the last of the pro-rated refund checks for 30A Recycle customers are in the mail.

“Every pro-rated refund has been processed and sent via check, as of July 31,” owner Tony Bucher said via text message. “I personally mailed the last 75 refunds yesterday before I left (to

travel).”

In June, Bucher, said all customers would have their pro-rated refunds by July 15, following the March closure of the short-lived business. Bucher said he was paying for the refunds out of his personal funds.

A lack of communication about the status of the refunds has frustrated some customers as they were expecting to already have received their money back.

As of Tuesday, Patricia Ray of Freeport said she had not received her refund. She said she’s disappointed, and the experience makes her not

want to take a chance on small businesses.

“You hope people would stand behind their word,” she said. “I know they did not plan for life to throw them curve balls, but not being open with the communication or the follow up of the refunds was not cool.”

The recycling company offered curbside pickup in Bay and Walton counties, and began services in September.

The company stopped services after Walton County’s solid waste and recycling program — where 30A dropped off its materials — experienced a drop in the plastics

market.

Walton County Solid Waste Manager Billy McKee said the facility still is collecting and storing plastics, though the plastic is not being recycled because officials still are looking for buyers to move the materials.

The promise of refunds has cost some former customers. Cheryl Rhoads said she paid \$168 for a year of service, and that’s a lot of money to her. She took 30A service in November.

“I had just paid for one year of service,” Rhoads said. “They must have known they were in trouble when

they took my money, so at my kindest, I feel they were dishonest in taking it, they had to know they couldn’t fulfill that payments expectations.”

Ray said 30A’s lack of communication and late refunds could hurt future ventures.

Bucher said he does not believe it will disrupt any of his future business plans.

“Even though it took longer than I would have liked, I’m proud that every single customer was refunded. This was just an unfortunate situation where this didn’t work because of the current plastic recycling climate,” Bucher said.

## Bob Rackleff: Fund education, don’t reduce health care

PANAMA CITY — Ask Bob Rackleff why he decided to run for Congress, and he can answer in five words.

“Donald Trump,” he said. “And Neal Dunn.”

Rackleff is one of two Democratic candidates for Florida’s District 2 seat, challenging Brandon Peters in the Democratic primary Aug. 28. The winner will face Republican incumbent Neal Dunn in the general election in November.

Rackleff, a former Leon County commissioner in Tallahassee who served in

the Navy and wrote speeches for companies and high-ranking politicians including former President Jimmy Carter, made his 25th visit to Bay County on Wednesday. Before speaking at an event at the library, he stopped at The News Herald for an interview.

Here are four things Rackleff spoke about during his newsroom visit:

### Education funding

Schools in the Panhandle are underfunded, which had led to deteriorating buildings and teachers paying for their own supplies, Rackleff said. Inadequate focus on education hurts the local economy, he said.

“The human talent we have in this district is so underused

## Boy, 10, heroically saves ‘Pa’ after boating accident

VALPARAISO — A 10-year-old boy is being hailed as a hero two days after saving his grandfather who was thrown from their boat on a fishing trip.

Jayden Brown didn’t see his “Pa,” also known as Raymond Hobbs, fly into the water after losing control of the outboard motor’s tiller. But as their 15-foot boat started circling madly in the middle of the Choctawhatchee River, Jayden saw his Pa struggling in the water and bleeding heavily.

“I was scared to death,” Jayden said. “I just started bawling.”

Following his grandpa’s instructions, Jayden went to the stern of the boat, hit the motor’s kill switch and then

used an electric trolling motor to ease the boat alongside his Pa. Jayden then guided the boat to shore with his grandpa hanging onto the side.

Hobbs managed to get in the boat and lie down near the motor, with his head propped up on a battery. He guided the boat blindly back to the landing using Jayden’s instructions on where to go. They were met there by an ambulance and Jayden’s older brother.

Hobbs, who broke one finger and had the tips of two fingers stitched back on, was moving slowly Tuesday. He still can’t use his left arm, and neither he nor Jayden are in a hurry to get back in that boat again.

He blames himself for not attaching the kill switch to his clothing and for not insisting







# 'Stand Your Ground' changes sought after shooting

TALLAHASSEE — Florida's Legislative Black Caucus intends to file legislation for the 2019 session to readdress the state's "stand your ground" self-defense law after the July 23 shooting death of Markeis McGlockton in the parking lot of a Clearwater convenience store.

Caucus Chairman Bruce

Antone, a Democratic House member from Orlando, said in a news release Monday the legislation will aim to address "ambiguities in the law."

In declining to initiate charges against Michael Drejka in McGlockton's death, Pinellas County Sheriff Bob Gualtieri said "a largely subjective standard" is in place for the use of deadly force in such cases.

"Florida's Stand Your

Ground Law is replete with ambiguity and does not require the aggressor to justify or prove the use of deadly force was necessary," Antone said. "The sheriff's decision not to charge Michael Drejka with a crime is a travesty of justice."

Florida's "stand your ground" law, approved in 2005, allows people to meet "force with force" if they believe they're under threat

of being harmed.

McGlockton's death has refueled a debate about the law, which has been heavily backed by Republican lawmakers and the National Rifle Association.

The black caucus' proposed legislation was announced Monday as Democratic gubernatorial candidate Andrew Gillum held a news conference to call on Gov. Rick Scott to declare a "state of emergency"

over the law.

Meanwhile, state Sen. Darryl Rouson, D-St. Petersburg, has started a separate effort that requests lawmakers to hold a special session on the law.

"All you can do is try, and I couldn't sit on my thumbs," Rouson said. "The community is outraged, and I just don't want to be one of those who let time go by and did nothing."

### PANAMA CITY BEACH 1,000 sign petition calling for PCB mayor's resignation

More than 1,000 people as of Wednesday had signed a petition calling for the resignation of Beach Mayor Mike Thomas.

Internet and radio talk show host Burnie Thompson started the change.org petition after Thomas made a comment about people who are fat, pregnant and smokers.

"You need to hire people that aren't fat, don't smoke and aren't going to get pregnant; and that way you could save us some money," Thomas told Police Chief Drew Whitman at a budget workshop last week.

Thomas apologized for the comment, and said it was a joke. When contacted Wednesday, Thomas declined to comment.

The petition's goal is 1,500 signatures, according to the online petition.

### PANAMA CITY Health officials offer safety tips after heavy rains

With a flash flood watch issued for the area, the Florida Department of Health in

Bay County has offered some safety recommendations.

People using sewage systems or who have private wells that provide their drinking water should be particularly cautious, the news release says. Here's what health department officials recommend:

#### General precautions

- Do not let children play in flood waters as these waters could be contaminated by sewage.
- If you live in a low-lying or flood-prone area, the ground in your area could be saturated from heavy rainfalls or flooding. You should use household water as little as possible to prevent backups of sewage into your home.

#### Private wells

- Private well owners whose drinking water wells are affected by flood waters should take precautions against disease-causing organisms that can make their water unsafe to drink, such as using bottled water, boiling water for one minute before use, or disinfecting with about eight drops of plain, unscented household bleach per one gallon of water and letting it stand for 30 minutes.
- After the flooding

subsidies, follow procedures on the health department's website to disinfect the well and have the health department test the well to make sure it is safe.

#### Sewage systems

- If a sewage backup has occurred in your home, stay out of affected areas and keep children away. If your entire home has been saturated, abandon the home until all affected areas, including but not limited to carpets, rugs, sheetrock, drywall and baseboards, have been thoroughly cleaned and disinfected.
- Do not have your septic tank(s) pumped as long as the water level is abnormally high. Pumping the tank in that situation could result in the tank being crushed.
- If you are having problems in areas served by sewer systems, contact your utility company to ensure it is aware of the problems.



# Justices asked to halt Scott's judicial pick

TALLAHASSEE — In another twist in a battle over Gov. Rick Scott's authority to appoint a Northeast Florida judge, a Jacksonville attorney has asked the state Supreme Court to halt a Scott appointment while the case continues.

Jacksonville attorney David Trotti filed an emergency motion with the Supreme Court on Friday, a day after the 1st District Court of Appeal

ruled that Scott had the authority to name a replacement for retiring 4th Circuit Judge Robert Foster.

Shortly after the appeals-court ruling, Scott announced he would appoint Duval County Judge Lester Bass to replace Foster as soon as the 1st District Court of Appeal ruling becomes final.

Trotti, who argues Foster's replacement should be elected by voters, filed a notice Thursday that he

would challenge the 1st District Court of Appeal ruling at the Supreme Court.

But with Scott also announcing the pending appointment of Bass, Trotti followed Friday by filing the emergency motion seeking a stay of the 1st District Court of Appeal's issuance of a "mandate" — the action that would make the appeals-court ruling final — until the Supreme Court resolves the underlying issues in the case.

"The need for a stay could not be more urgent — within hours of the First District's opinion, Governor Scott publicly announced his intention to make an appointment as soon as the First District's decision becomes final through issuance of the mandate," the emergency motion said.

The Supreme Court has given Scott's attorneys until 2 p.m. Friday to respond to the emergency motion. The case stems from the upcoming

retirement of Foster in the 4th Judicial Circuit, which is made up of Duval, Clay and Nassau counties.

Foster was expected to leave office Jan. 7, 2019, which would be the end of his term, because of a mandatory retirement age.

But on April 2, Foster sent a letter to Scott making the retirement effective Dec. 31, four business days ahead of schedule.

The Scott

administration argues — and the 1st District Court of Appeal agreed — that the governor's acceptance of a judicial resignation before the start of an election-qualifying period creates a vacancy that should be filled by appointment, rather than election.

If Foster retired Jan. 7, the post would be filled by election.

Trotti, however, argues the opening should be filled in this year's elections.

they both put on their life jackets before they started their return trip.

Hobbs said he reached down to get something and his hand slipped off the tiller.

The boat took a hard turn at a high speed, throwing him and the seat he was holding into the middle of the river.

He swam up to the surface and found the cushion floating nearby. He hung on to that as he instructed Jayden, his fishing buddy since the boy was 3, on how to help him.

Jayden, a fifth-grader at Lewis School in Valparaiso, said he was "freaking out" when he realized what had happened. But he did what he needed to do to get his grandfather to safety.

He shrugged when asked if he's a hero. But

his grandpa and other family members have a more definite answer.

"He sure was," Hobbs said. "I got frightened of those alligators with me being out there and my fingers bleeding."

As soon as he could, Jayden called his grandmother and, still sobbing, told her what had happened.

"I'm just glad he was with him to get his Pa back," Patricia Hobbs said. "They scared us all to death."

and underpaid. We have to be more competitive," Rackleff said. "We have to improve education because that's our future workforce."

In the long term, if education isn't supported he said other programs, such as Social Security, will be at risk of collapsing.

### Health care

Rackleff is focused on preserving health care for Americans.

"The overriding concern I hear from voters, and I've been going door to door aggressively for the last several months, is about health care,"

Rackleff said. "They're afraid that what little health care they have now from the Affordable Care Act or Medicaid or Medicare is going to go away."

As Republicans are talking about reducing benefits for programs such as Medicare and raising the qualifying age for Social Security, he said people are needed in Congress who will protect those programs.

### Blue wave

While the Second District tilts red — in Bay County 66 percent of the population voted for Trump — Rackleff said going door to door he has seen signs of a blue wave sweeping through the area.

"I can do a lot (in Washington) if we elect

a Democratic Congress," Rackleff said. "I see that happening everywhere. ... I see a very determined Democratic Party organization."

Rackleff noted Democratic groups in Bay County have been active.

However, Rackleff said he's not against working with people he disagrees with, considering he did so while on the Leon County Commission.

"Nobody ever accused me of being part of the get-along gang," Rackleff said. "And yet, every year I was a commissioner, we balanced the budget. We did it on time and we did it without any drama."

### Trump and Russia

Rackleff spoke out against President Donald

Trump's remarks during a recent press conference with Vladimir Putin, during which Trump sided with Putin as allegations of Russian interference in the 2016 election continue.

"I was a naval intelligence officer for 15 years. I was a Soviet analyst during some of the most dangerous years of the Cold War," Rackleff said. "To see our commander-in-chief siding with a Russian dictator and dissing the intelligence professionals of our armed forces and civilian agencies was flabbergasting to me."

Dunn, he said, hasn't adequately addressed Trump's remarks from the press conference which he considered a sign of weakness and lack of leadership.

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# Poll: Scott has slight lead over Nelson for Senate

**Independent voters likely will be key to the race**

to show Scott with a lead. A Mason-Dixon poll in October showed the race tied, while a February poll gave Nelson a one-point edge.

“The overall trend line is running in Scott’s favor, as his support has slowly but steadily increased over the last 17 months,” Mason-Dixon said in analysis accompanying the poll results.

Mason-Dixon, which has long conducted polls in Florida, surveyed 625 registered voters who said they were likely to vote in the November election. The poll, conducted July 24 and July 25, has a margin of error of 4 percentage points.

TALLAHASSEE — With both candidates receiving solid support from their political bases, Gov. Rick Scott has opened a small lead over Democratic incumbent Bill Nelson in their high-stakes battle for a U.S. Senate seat, a new poll shows.

Scott leads Nelson by a margin of 47 percent to 44 percent, with 9 percent of voters remaining undecided heading toward the Nov. 6 general

election, according to the poll released Tuesday by Mason-Dixon Polling & Strategy. The race, which could help determine control of the U.S. Senate, has been tight for the past year, though the new poll was the first Mason-Dixon survey

## ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

*"The face is the mirror of the mind, and eyes without speaking confess the secrets of the heart."*  
— Saint Jerome

After North drives to game in spades, South shows extras and no shortage, then looks for a grand slam before settling in six. Slam is made more difficult by the fact that the side-suits are perfectly mirrored in the two hands. Switch the diamond four in North's hand to the club four, and the grand slam would hinge on a finesse. As it is, though, declarer appears to be poorly placed. What can you do about the fact that you have an inevitable heart loser and a likely diamond loser?

The club jack opening lead goes to the ace. Declarer draws trumps with the ace and king, then cashes the club king and both top hearts before exiting with a third heart. Whichever defender wins this trick, they must lead diamonds. If the diamond finesse is right, then West must win the trick, since a low diamond lead from East around to the queen would clearly be hopeless for the defense.

However, no matter which defender has the diamond 10, the contract is still cold, since declarer puts in a low diamond from dummy when West shifts to a diamond. East can put up his king or withhold it, but declarer can play diamonds for no loser.

This line simply needs the diamond king to be well-placed.

Note that if declarer leads a diamond to the jack before exiting in hearts, that line would result in defeat. West would be able to win the third heart and shift to diamonds, and the defenders would collect a trick in diamonds.

## New redshirt rule in place for coaches

For years college football coaches have labored, even agonized, over whether to play a freshman who might be able to contribute immediately or hold him out of games to preserve a year of eligibility and hopefully cash in greater rewards down the road.

Those decisions are about to get a whole lot easier.

Rarely does the NCAA pass legislation that is both wholeheartedly endorsed by coaches and beneficial to players, but the new redshirt

rule appears to be that kind of smash hit. Players will now be allowed to play in up to four games and still qualify for a redshirt season, maintaining four years of eligibility. In the past, playing just one game could cost a player an entire season of eligibility. Coaches say the change will provide needed roster depth, improve player development and avoid many of those damned-if-you-do-damned-if-you-don't situations where the choice becomes: Short-term need or long-term goals?

"Brilliant. Love it. Greatest

rule the NCAA has ever put in in the last 20 years," Minnesota coach PJ Fleck said.

It's a game-changer. But how, exactly?

"I don't know if people on the outside or even maybe us on the inside understand how different that rule is. How much the game is going to be different, the strategy behind it," Oklahoma coach Lincoln Riley said. "I think it's going to be fun."

All players, no matter their class year, can be red-shirted. Medical redshirts are common in college football, giving a player back a season

of eligibility that was mostly lost to injury.

But it is with the freshman class that teams need a red-shirt plan.

Even before incoming recruits step on campus, coaches start mapping out who is likely to play and who will probably sit. Sometimes the depth chart makes that decision. In other cases, player performance forces the issue.

The evaluation process is constant, but former UCLA coach Jim Mora said by the

CANTON, Ohio — Ray Lewis and Brian Urlacher, two of the NFL's greatest linebackers, enter the Pro Football Hall of Fame this week. When their teams meet in Thursday night's preseason opener, the game could very well honor them by being a defensive battle.

On one hand, the Chicago Bears are installing a new offense under first-year coach Matt Nagy. On the other side, few if any of the Baltimore Ravens' starters at the offensive skill positions are likely to get much action.

So if this winds up 10-9 or something similar, well, the smiles on the faces of Lewis and Urlacher might get a bit broader.

Nagy has a second-year quarterback, Mitchell Trubisky, who will be taking his first major steps running the new scheme Nagy brought from Kansas City. He seems

unconcerned that the second overall pick in the 2017 draft will be overmatched — even though Trubisky has been an interception machine in practices.

"Our guys have picked up everything that we've asked them to do," Nagy said. "There have been mistakes, but they're way ahead of the learning curve. So that's exciting and it tells me that once we get to the regular season we can do more than I initially thought. But we will be growing throughout the season."

And the preseason.

As for the Ravens, don't look for Joe Flacco in this one. The Hall of Fame game is an extra exhibition outing for the participants, and provides an opportunity for Baltimore coach John Harbaugh and his staff to look at first-round draft pick Lamar Jackson and veteran Robert Griffin III, who is attempting a comeback after not playing last year.

"We have that set," Harbaugh said of the QB plans for Thursday night. "I never really talk about that. We just go do it. But we have the quarterback rotation set, and then we'll organize the rest of it ... There'll be some guys who won't play in that game, probably you might guess the guys who haven't practiced as much that first week."

Some other things to watch in the Hall of Fame game:

### A fifth game

The extra preseason contest usually gives low draftees, non-draftees and guys trying to catch on an additional chance to show their stuff. This isn't much different from the final exhibition game, when starters generally sit and others get a last chance to make a roster.

"When you have that extra game, the benefit is it gives you more reps for your

Some parents have seized on posts by Milwaukee Brewer Josh Hader, Atlanta Brave Sean Newcomb and Washington National Trea Turner as teaching moments about how living life online means your posts may never go away. They're just not sure whether their young, uber-sharers are listening.

Charlie's dad, Bill Fish, is hopeful that Charlie gets it. He'll hope the same for his 9-year-old son when he, too, reaches the magical

start of the season the staff has identified the players who will play, those who will redshirt and what players were on the bubble.

"But you had to stay fluid because of things that could happen during the season," said Mora, who will join ESPN as a studio analyst this season.

That is still the case, but now that fluidity is more manageable.

Stanford coach David Shaw said in 2014 the coaches had decided to redshirt Harrison Phillips, who turned into one of the most productive defensive linemen in school history. Injuries forced them to reconsider. The injured veterans returned after two games, but Phillips kept playing rather than returning to the practice squad.

On the flip side, Shaw said, defensive back Paulson Adebo was ready to play by the end of last season but coaches decided it was not worth losing a year of eligibility.

Expect coaches to take the wraps off plenty of young players during bowl season. Teams often have an eye toward the next season when preparing for a bowl game. Add in the recent trend of some established players skipping the postseason to prepare for the NFL draft process, and the ability to tap into the freshman class without regret in the bowl game becomes even more useful.

Baylor coach Matt Rhule, whose team is coming off a 1-11 season, said the new rule is a godsend for the rebuilding Bears. He expects every freshman to play.

"To me, that changes your preparation. That changes your mind-set. When you know you're going to play, there's a whole 'nother level of pressure," Rhule said. "I think it will boost their morale. I remember the first time I got in at Penn State. I got in for, like, eight plays at the end of the game against Temple. I thought I was Lawrence Taylor walking off that field. All that work, all that stuff was finally worth it."

Penn State's James Franklin, with a team expected to contend in the Big Ten, said he expects to take a more conservative approach with his freshmen.

"We're not just going to play guys because we can now," Franklin said. "They still got to earn that right. If not, we'll save it until later in the season in case we get in a situation where we need a body."

Players, no surprise, are all for more opportunities to play.

"If I could go back, I would have wanted to play those four games," Mississippi State senior defensive end Gerri Green, who redshirted as a freshman. "Game speed is faster than practice speed."

# Woods gets one last crack at Firestone for WGC final edition

AKRON, Ohio — This is one farewell party Tiger Woods didn't want to miss.

Firestone will host the world's best players for the last time at the Bridgestone Invitational, and it wouldn't be the same without Woods. He has won it eight times, a PGA Tour record for most victories on the same golf course. Woods didn't finish out of the top 5 in his first 11 appearances on the venerable South Course, seven of them victories. It also was the last of his 79 victories on the PGA Tour in 2013, right before back problems started to surface.

One problem. Having played only four tournaments in 29 months because of four back surgeries, Woods returned in December at No. 1,199 in the world. He started his PGA Tour season in January at No. 647. His only hope was to move into the top 50 in the world after the British Open, or to win a tournament.

His tie for sixth in the British Open moved him to No. 50 on the button.

"I was just hoping to one, play the tour long enough to be able to get an opportunity," Woods said Wednesday, his first time at Firestone in four years. "But I also had to play well to do it. ... And within a year to get down to 50 I think is a pretty good accomplishment. But it also got me into this event."

Bridgestone decided not to renew as title sponsor of the World Golf Championship, said to be an annual

price tag of about \$15 million. The company next year sponsors the Senior Players Championship at Firestone, while the WGC event moves to Memphis, Tennessee.

"This event has been very special to me over the years, and it's sad to see it leave Firestone," Woods said. "We certainly understand it. But for me, I've always had such great memories of this golf course."

Where to start?

Was it the first victory in 1999 when he beat Phil Mickelson by one shot? The next year was even better when Woods raced to finish in the dark, made one last birdie to finish at 21-under par and won by 11 shots. He won in playoffs that lasted four holes against Stewart Cink (in 2006) and seven holes against Jim Furyk (in 2001). He won by eight shots in 2007 against Rory Sabbatini, who had said earlier in the year that Woods looked "beatable as ever."

"There isn't just one," Woods said. "I've done it so many different ways."

Ticket sales spiked when it was disclosed after the British Open that Woods reached No. 50 and would be back at Firestone. He became the face of this tournament over the last two decades, even through some rough patches when he was coping with scars on and off the golf course.

It would be a fitting conclusion at Firestone for Woods to walk off with yet another trophy, except it's not that simple. He has yet to win this year, and while Woods used to own the

short fields in these World Golf Championships with 18 titles, the competition is stiffer than ever.

Dustin Johnson affirmed his position at No. 1 in the world by winning the Canadian Open last week for his third PGA Tour title of the year. He won at Firestone two years ago and, like Woods, calls it one of his favorite stops of the year because it is big, tree-lined and doesn't have many frills.

Rory McIlroy is coming off a runner-up finish in the British Open. He won at Firestone in 2014, sandwiched between victories in the British Open and PGA Championship. McIlroy has eight consecutive rounds in the 60s.

"I really think it is horses for courses. There are just courses that fit your eye better than some others," McIlroy said. "Tiger has proved that with here, with Bay Hill, with Torrey Pines, with ... well, actually,

anywhere."

Woods hasn't been back to Firestone since 2014, when he hurt his back early in the final round. He hasn't been eligible since then.

He raised expectations, certainly among his fans, with his strong showing at Carnoustie, where Woods had the lead for a couple of holes on Sunday, only to fall back with a double bogey. He wound up three shots behind, with the only consolation being a spot at Firestone.

"He's going to play well this week," Justin Thomas said. "This place is like Augusta for him. He could probably take two, three weeks off and he's going to get it around here fine because he knows how to. He's won here as many times as I've won everywhere in my career. I grew up watching him win a lot of tournaments here, hitting the shots in the dark. ... So he's going to be very, very comfortable here."

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anything you wouldn't want your grandmother to read." Those words are easy, but as a former head of a company focused on reputation management, Fish knows a thing or two about how old social media posts can rear later in life.

"You wouldn't believe how many parents came to us after colleges dug up things their children posted online while going through the application process," he said. "For these baseball players to be raked over the coals for something they said six or seven years ago seems a little unfair, but at the same time a great lesson to talk about what should and what shouldn't be put on social media."

What grandma may not know, along with youthful social media natives, is at the heart of the baseball controversy, along with why someone would make racist, sexist or anti-gay statements to begin with. Deleted tweets, private messages — just about anything — can be unearthed these days. For kids, the potential dangers of that are endless, from college admissions to rookie job interviews, both rites of passage likely not on the mind yet for 13-year-old Charlie.

"Last year, there was a widely reported case of 10 students who had been accepted to Harvard who had those acceptance rescinded because of racist social media posts. The posts were supposedly in a private chat," said psychologist Shane Owens, who treats adolescents, college students and young adults in Commack,

New York. "Most kids are not able to appreciate the long-term consequences of their actions."

Josef Blumenfeld in Natick, Massachusetts, outside Boston, is a communications expert serving educational technology companies. He's also the father of two girls, 15 and 17. His oldest is on Twitter and posts a lot about makeup, youth activism and mental health, and the Boston Bruins.

"We talk about their social media activity all the time," he said. "We often point to something 'not smart' that someone they know did on social media. They roll their eyes, but we keep doing it."

The recent baseball tweets gone viral have not surfaced in their chats, but the subject of old posts resurfacing certainly has.

"Even disappearing photos on Instagram are discoverable," Blumenfeld said.

The challenge for parents is to recognize that their kids may not consider social media a form of speech, said Ari Yares, a psychologist, parenting

coach and father of four in suburban Washington, D.C.

"We keep talking to our kids about how, just like the spoken word, you can't take back what you say online. It's always out there," he said. "The challenge in having these conversations with kids is that from a developmental perspective they don't always see the impact that their actions can have."

Another important lesson of the ball player tweets is helping young people understand "even their idols have done bad things that they regret," said Dr. Gail Saltz, an associate professor of psychiatry at New York Presbyterian Hospital, Weill-Cornell Medical College. "No one, including them, is immune to the negative consequences of making impulsive choices that did not take into account possible bad outcomes in the future."

But are the regrets sincere, asks Maureen Paschal, who has four kids ranging from 14 to 24. She, too, has brought up the baseball tweets with some in her brood.

Trubisky at least can move around, and there's no question he will be the Bears' first-stringer. Guard Kyle Long's assortment of health issues doesn't help in the quest to solidify the line.

### Homecoming

This is sort of a homecoming for Trubisky. He played at North Carolina but is from this area (Mentor, Ohio).

"I'm excited. The Hall of Fame game is a great opportunity for this team, and it's a unique place to place," he said. "Just going back to the Hall of Fame, I'll have some family coming to the game. It'll be great to see some family, and it's an exciting time for this team."

The former NFL line-backer known as "Lights Out" will try to punch out an opponent's lights in a bare-knuckle boxing match.

Shawne Merriman has agreed to compete with the World Bare Knuckle Fighting Federation on a pay-per-view event in Casper, Wyoming, this fall, the promoters announced Wednesday.

The 34-year-old Merriman was a three-time Pro Bowl selection during his eight-year NFL career with the Chargers and the Bills.

Merriman retired from the NFL in 2013, and he flirted with the idea of becoming a professional wrestler the next year. He has trained in mixed martial arts during his retirement, even considering a professional bout in Japan.

**ATLANTIC CITY, N.J.**  
**Resorts, DraftKings get OK for NJ online betting**

Resorts Casino Hotel and DraftKings on Wednesday received approval to become the first companies to offer online and mobile sports betting in New Jersey.

The state Division of Gaming Enforcement gave approval to the casino and its Boston-based online partner to launch an invitation-only version of mobile sports betting, which will undergo several days of testing before becoming fully available. Requests for invitations to participate can be made at draftkings.com.

A launch was expected to happen Wednesday afternoon or evening.

The companies won a heated race to be first to market with mobile and online sports betting, which is widely seen as the most promising segment of the nascent sports betting market. New Jersey regulators are considering mobile applications from several other companies and could soon approve additional online providers.

Four casinos and two other tracks currently offer in-person sports betting.

**Lawyers defend conduct of Nassar's sentencing judge**

The Michigan attorney general's office is defending the conduct of Larry Nassar's sentencing judge and asking that she deny a defense request to disqualify herself from the former Michigan State sports doctor's appeal.

The attorney general's office argued in court documents filed Tuesday that Judge Rosemarie Aquilina's role was different than a trial judge when she sentenced Nassar after he pleaded guilty to molesting women and girls under the guise of medical treatment, the Detroit News reported.

Aquilina described Nassar as a "monster" and said she was signing his "death warrant" when she ordered him to serve 40-175 years, during the January sentencing at which at least 169 women and girls had provided statements.

**LAS VEGAS**  
**Court date set for UFC fighter Diaz in domestic battery case**

A grand jury decided not to indict UFC middleweight fighter Nick Diaz on a domestic battery charge, but prosecutors in Las Vegas have asked a judge to hear evidence and decide if he should stand trial anyway.

The Las Vegas Review-Journal reports that Diaz's lawyer, Ross Goodman, argued Tuesday it was unfair to proceed after a grand jury rejected felony and misdemeanor charges including strangulation allegations against Diaz.

But a prosecutor told the judge he just gave the court a voluntary statement from the woman alleging she was attacked.

Las Vegas Justice of the Peace Amy Chelini scheduled an Aug. 30 preliminary hearing of evidence stemming from the May 24 arrest at a home in a few blocks west of the Las Vegas Strip.

Diaz remains free on \$18,000 bail.



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
