Destin draws line in sand

A look at the gradual privatization of city's world-class beaches

DESTIN — Yao Lo, a tourist from Atlanta, walked out to the Shirah Street public beach

access at 6 a.m. one recent morning to stake out a spot for his 15 family members.

Lo said he was paying \$6,000 to rent a house for the week just one block from the beach, but was dismayed to learn on his first day of vacation that there was little to no beach for his family to enjoy. Ropes on either side of the

Shirah beach access near his house designated nearly all the beach behind the ropes as "private." Between the ropes, the access was only about 60 feet wide.

He said he was forced to come to the small sliver of beach access before sunrise every morning to reserve a spot for his family before

people were "packed like sardines" in the one small section of public beach.

"You're down here for the summer paying six grand a week and you learn there's no space for you to bring your kids to the beach?" he asked as he screwed an umbrella

Panama City Beach engagement saved after beachgoer finds lost ring

PANAMA CITY BEACH — Taylor Farrar's proposal plan floated away into the Gulf of Mexico like a message in a bottle in Panama City Beach on Friday.

"(The ringo was in a Velcro pocket," said Farrar of Sevierville, Tenn. "I put the ring in a Ziploc bag, and me and some friends went to practice how we were going to (propose). In the process, a wave came up and hit me. It tumbled me."

Gone in the waves was Farrar's custom engagement ring.

"I never thought it would be found," he said.

Or so he thought. Further

down the beach, the ring Farrar bought for his girlfriend Cassandra Arn, along with his license and bank card, washed up under the feet of Sandy Osborn who was on a trip with friends.

"We all had beach chairs sitting at the edge of the water," Osborn said. "I saw something go under my chair and into the ocean. I thought it was trash. Ten minutes

after the Rooker Properties option fell apart.


"There will be an update regarding the federal courthouse," County Manager Bob Majka confirmed Monday night.

Trump ups sanctions pressure on Iran

WASHINGTON — The United States reimposed stiff economic sanctions on Iran Monday, ratcheting up pressure on the Islamic Republic despite statements of deep dismay from European allies, three months after President Donald Trump pulled the U.S. out of the international accord limiting Iran's nuclear activities.

Trump declared the

landmark 2015 agreement had been "horrible," leaving the Iranian government flush with cash to fuel conflict in the Middle East.

Iran accused the U.S. of reneging on the nuclear agreement, signed by the Obama administration, and of causing recent Iranian economic unrest. European allies said they "deeply regret" the U.S. action.

Trump said in a statement, "We urge all nations to take such steps

Today's Highlight in History

On August 7, 1964, Congress passed the Gulf of Tonkin resolution, giving President Lyndon B. Johnson broad powers in dealing with reported North Vietnamese attacks on U.S. forces.

On this date

In 1782, Gen. George Washington created the Order of the Purple Heart, a decoration to recognize merit in enlisted men and noncommissioned officers.

In 1789, the U.S. Department of War was established by Congress.

In 1882, the famous feud between the Hatfields of West Virginia and the McCoys of Kentucky erupted into full-scale violence.

In 1942, U.S. and other allied forces landed at Guadalcanal, marking the start of the first major allied offensive in the Pacific during World War II. (Japanese forces abandoned the island the following February.)

In 1959, the United States launched the Explorer 6 satellite, which sent back images of Earth.

In 1989, a plane carrying U.S. Rep. Mickey Leland, D-Texas, and 14 others disappeared over Ethiopia. (The wreckage of the plane was found six days later; there were no survivors.)

In 1990, President George H.W. Bush ordered U.S. troops and warplanes to Saudi Arabia to guard the oil-rich desert kingdom against a possible invasion by Iraq.

In 1998, terrorist bombs at U.S. embassies in Kenya and Tanzania killed 224 people, including 12 Americans.

In 2000, Vice President and Democratic presidential candidate Al Gore selected Connecticut Sen. Joseph Lieberman as his running mate; Lieberman became the first Jew on a major party's presidential ticket.

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
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

Thousands displaced by deadly Indonesian quake

SENGGIGI, Indonesia — Thousands left homeless by a powerful quake that ruptured roads and flattened buildings on the Indonesian tourist island of Lombok sheltered Monday night in makeshift tents as authorities said rescuers hadn't yet reached all devastated areas and expect the toll of 98 dead to climb.

It was the second deadly quake in a week to hit Lombok, a less-developed island compared with its more famous neighbor Bali, where the strong tremors caused panic and damaged buildings.

A July 29 quake killed 16 people and damaged hundreds of houses on Lombok, some of which collapsed in Sunday evening's quake, measured at magnitude 7.0 by Indonesian authorities and 6.9 by the U.S. Geological Survey.

Damage was "massive" in mountainous northern Lombok, where the quake was centered, said National Disaster Mitigation Agency spokesman Sutopo Purwo Nugroho. In several districts, more than half the homes were destroyed or severely damaged.

A large mosque collapsed on worshippers in northern Lombok's Lading-Lading village, and rescuers used a backhoe to search the debris. The number of victims was unknown.

Some areas still hadn't been reached 24 hours after the quake because of collapsed bridges, blocked and ruptured roads and the loss of power and

communications.

Nugroho said the death toll had risen to 98 and warned it will continue to increase. All but two of were killed on Lombok; the others died on Bali.

More than 230 people were seriously injured. Thousands of homes and buildings were damaged and those displaced camped wherever they could — in sports fields and on roadsides, cobbling together ramshackle shelters and building campfires for warmth.

Sahril, who uses one name, said he escaped his collapsing house in North Lombok with his immediate family, but his older

brother is buried in his flattened home in the village of Cubek.

"He was serving customers when the earthquake happened. The customers managed to escape, but he himself didn't," Sahril said. "His two-story house collapsed and buried him. He had no chance to scream (for) help."

The quake struck at a shallow depth of 10.5 kilometers (6 miles). Shallow quakes tend to cause more damage than deeper ones.

"We were sitting there having dinner at about 7 o'clock last night, we just felt a really big sort of shaking and the lights

went off and everyone just ran," Australian tourist Kim Liebelt said as he waited with other travelers for a flight out at Lombok's international airport. "And then the roof started falling down on us, rocks and rubble and then just everyone running to get away," he said.

Videos showed screaming people running in panic from a shopping mall and a neighborhood in Bali where parked vehicles swayed. On Lombok, soldiers and other rescuers carried the injured on stretchers and carpets. Many were treated outdoors because hospitals were damaged.

"People panicked and scattered on the streets, and buildings and houses that had been damaged by the previous earthquake had become more damaged and collapsed," Nugroho said.

The quake triggered a tsunami warning, and frightened people rushed from their homes to higher ground, particularly in North Lombok and Mataram, the capital of West Nusa Tenggara province. The warning was lifted after only small waves were recorded.

"When it happened, we stood with residents in the middle of the street and watched houses collapse around us," said Yustrianda Sirio, supervisor of a group of university students from Java doing a community service program in East Lombok. "Many of us screamed hysterically."

He said the group already had been staying in tents after the July 29 quake, but now officials told them to return to Java.


"We really want to stay here to help the villagers," he said.

On Gili Trawangan, one of three popular vacation islands near Lombok, thousands of tourists and residents spent Sunday night on a hill because of tsunami fears, said British visitor Saffron Amis.

"There was a lot of screaming and crying, particularly from the locals," said Amis, from Brighton. "We spoke to a lot of them and they were panicking about their family in Lombok. It was just a lot of panic because no one knew what was happening."



LONDON Court convicts US political consultant of groping passenger

A London court has found an American political consultant who worked on Ben Carson's 2016 presidential campaign guilty of groping a fellow passenger on a trans-Atlantic flight last month.

Samuel Pimm was convicted of sexual assault Monday following a trial at Ealing Magistrates' Court. He denied touching the passenger, who was seated next to him on the Washington to London flight.

Prosecutors said Pimm consumed several alcoholic drinks before he put his hands on the woman.

The woman testified that she was trying to sleep when she felt Pimm touching her arm and breast, then moving toward her crotch.

LAS VEGAS Forecasters warn of excessive heat in parts of Western US

Weather forecasters are warning of excessive heat this week in parts of Nevada, Arizona and California.

The National Weather Service has issued an excessive heat warning for Monday through Wednesday. It covers the desert regions and other low-lying areas.

Forecasters say temperatures could reach 114 in the Las Vegas and Colorado River valleys. Temperatures in Death Valley could hit 125 degrees.

Other areas were under shorter excessive heat warnings, including central and southern Arizona, and the Grand Canyon.

Forecasters say people should limit outdoor activity and stay hydrated to avoid heat exhaustion and heat stroke.

BERLIN Court: Man paid German mom so he could rape 10-year-old son

A 33-year-old Spanish man has been found guilty of repeatedly raping a young German boy whose mother offered him for sale to pedophiles on the internet.

The dpa news agency reported Monday the man, whose name wasn't released for privacy reasons, was sentenced by Freiburg state court to ten years in prison and fined 18,000 euros (\$20,800). He admitted paying the woman and her boyfriend 10,000 euros (\$11,560) to rape the boy multiple times in the town of Staufen. A verdict against the 48-year-old woman and her 39-year-old partner is due Tuesday. The boy, now 10, was offered in the "darknet" online for some two years starting in 2016.

MILAN 12 farmworkers killed in van accident in southern Italy

Italian firefighters say 12 people have been killed and three injured after a van accident in a town in southern Italy.

The ANSA news agency reported that the victims were immigrant farm workers returning from work Monday.

The van they were driving hit a truck carrying tomatoes head-on, causing the van to overturn near the town of Foggia.

The nationalities of the victims have not been released.

This was a separate traffic accident from the deadly tanker truck explosion that took place Monday in Bologna, northern Italy, that left at least two people dead and up to 70 injured.

SAN CLEMENTE, CALIF. Three Marines stabbed after scuffle in San Clemente

California authorities say three Marines were stabbed during a fight with two men in San Clemente.

Orange County sheriff's spokeswoman Jaimee Blashaw tells the Orange County Register that two 21-year-old Marines and a 23-year-old Marine were stabbed during a fight early Saturday morning.

She says the Marines were taken to a hospital with non-life threatening injuries.

Blashaw says a 24-year-old man has been arrested on suspicion of attempted murder.

Authorities also detained a 26-year-old man and a 20-year-old woman in connection with the stabbing.

into the sand. “I think we’re going to choose another place to vacation next year.”

Lo’s dilemma is one of many faced by tourists who visited Destin this summer only to learn that the vast majority of the city’s six miles of beach are private, marked off with ropes and no trespassing signs, and guarded closely by territorial beach chair vendors.

What’s more, large swaths of Destin’s beaches that should be open to the public due to past restoration projects funded by county and state money, have been unlawfully marked as “private beach” for years — and confusion on the part of city and Okaloosa County officials, as well as law enforcement, has created a culture of apathy that has further muddled the issue.

Shrinking public beach accesses

Okaloosa County’s beaches are heavily marketed by the Tourism Development Department as sand that’s “shockingly fine” and “so clean that it squeaks underfoot.” The water, the TDD’s website says, are a “brilliant emerald-green” color that “provides such a contrast with the blue sky and the white sand below.”

What’s more, the TDD’s website says, is that “the most amazing thing about our beaches is that the very best belong to you, the beach-loving public.”

But more and more tourists who visit the Emerald Coast, especially Destin, are learning that’s not entirely true.

Almost all of Destin’s six miles of beach are “private” — marked as belonging to the private homeowners and towering condo associations that line the beachfront roads on either side of Henderson Beach State Park. Ropes and “no trespassing signs” begin on either side of the city’s 13 public beach accesses, limiting the spaces accessible to only a few dozen feet at best.

According to Daily News measurements, taken both with measuring tape at the public beach accesses and by analyzing property appraiser records, only about 1.4 miles of Destin’s beach is open to the public. That includes Henderson Beach State Park, which divides Destin down the middle and has a little over 4,700 feet of public beach. The park charges beachgoers \$6 per car to visit.

Nine of the city’s public beach accesses, dispersed throughout the Crystal Beach and Scenic Highway 98 areas, have a combined total of less than a half mile of public beach. Some of the smallest beach accesses in the city are Tarpon Street, the Shores at Crystal Beach and Pompano Street, which have roughly 11.5, 40 and 50 feet of public sand, respectively.

On the west side of Henderson Beach State Park, there

are only two public beach accesses (not including the Norriego Point and Holiday Isle accesses). The Calhoun and Silver Shells/June White Decker accesses, near the Back Porch restaurant, have a combined 138 feet of public beach.

Visitors who don’t stay in a Gulf-front condo or neighborhood that has a roped-off private beach are directed to any one of the city’s public beach accesses. That sounds like a simple solution in theory, but in practice it means that many of the millions of visitors who come to Destin and don’t stay in beachfront property have almost no access to the beach. And those visiting the Crystal Beach accesses must contend with extremely limited parking — most of the accesses only have seven to 12 spaces. Some have no parking at all.

Beach restoration projects

But are the so-called “private” beaches actually, legally, private?

During two major beach restoration projects in Destin in the past 20 years, officials determined an Erosion Control Line that runs along the portions of the beach that were restored and maintained using taxpayer money.

The ECL line is, essentially, where the Mean High Water Line was located before the beach was restored. In some places, like on Holiday Isle and in Crystal Beach, the water was lapping up at property owners’ front doors. The taxpayer-funded restoration projects moved the Mean High Water Line back several feet in some areas, creating wide swaths of beach in front of the properties.

Those large swaths — those south of the ECL line — are, by law, public beach, according to the Florida Department of Environmental Protection.

“Where beaches have an established ECL, everything seaward of that line is property of the state, or sovereign land,” Dee Ann Miller, a spokeswoman for the DEP, said in an email to

the Daily News. “Where there is not an ECL, the MHWL is the boundary, unless the upland property owner’s deed states otherwise. Each upland property owner deed can potentially vary on where it states they own down to the MHWL or some other property line location.”

Miller also said that before all beach erosion control projects, an ECL “must be established along the shoreline to define the property boundary between sovereign submerged land and upland ownership.”

Public money, private beaches?

Two major beach restoration projects that took place in Destin in 2006-2007 and 2012-2013 altered the landscape of many of the city’s beaches and provided much-needed expansions to sand that had been critically eroded during the 2004 and 2005 hurricane seasons.

The first beach renourishment project was a joint venture with Walton County that restored about seven miles of beach, including two miles of beach in Destin from Henderson Beach State Park to the Walton County line and the remaining five miles of beach in Walton County from the county line to Topsail Hill State Park.

The project cost a total of more than \$27 million, with Destin’s share clocking in at \$9.8 million. The cost was split between the state of Florida and the then-Tourist Development Council (now the Tourist Development Department), both of which kicked in \$4.9 million. The second renourishment project took place on Destin’s Holiday Isle in January and February 2013. About 1.7 miles of beach was restored, with a 2,600-foot gap in between due to legal challenges by beachfront property owners of single-family homes and condominiums.

The Holiday Isle project cost almost \$8 million, with the TDC contributing about \$6.7 million. The remaining

money was raised through the county’s Municipal Services Benefit Unit, which was created in 2009 to cover the cost of beach restoration. Beachfront property owners bore the greatest burden of the MSBU fees, paying \$150 to \$200 annually, while inland property owners paid about \$55 a year.

Since 2000, the city of Destin has kicked in about \$450,000 in taxpayer money on various beach restoration projects, including things like cost-sharing and post-project monitoring, according to Doug Rainer, the city’s public information manager.

During both projects in 2007 and 2013, engineers used surveying to establish an Erosion Control Line. The ECL runs essentially unobstructed from the East Pass to the Walton County line, with the 2,600-foot gap on Holiday Isle and a 4,700-foot gap at Henderson Beach State Park.

The Okaloosa County TDD has records that dictate where the ECL line is located, thus making it clear where the public beach begins and the private beach ends. But TDD officials claim that the line would be impossible to determine without a new official survey.

“The Erosion Control Line (ECL) is based on an elevation, not a fixed line in the sand,” the TDD said in an email to the Daily News. “As a result, the location of the ECL may seem to ‘move’ as the beach erodes or accretes, but it does not. It is important to note that you can’t just walk out on the beach and locate the ECL unless you survey for that elevation.”

But the DEP says the ECL is clearly a “fixed boundary.”

“As private property owners, coastal property owners are afforded some rights as all other owners are; however, they cannot impede public access to sovereign lands or established public access routes,” Miller, the DEP spokeswoman, said in her email to the Daily News. “All of the operative ECL lines are recorded in the local County Clerk of Circuit Court, and DEP has electronic copies of those

files in our OCULUS system.”

She added that the DEP “does not get involved with land rights disputes or physically marking private property lines” but they “do work with private surveyors on projects such as those marking private lands near an ECL or MHWL to correctly identify property lines.”

Greg Kisela, who was Destin’s city manager during the 2007 project and currently is the deputy county administrator for Okaloosa County, said the ECL line is a clear, fixed line, although it’s difficult to determine without a survey.

“Some of that land south of the ECL is under water now, and some of it is still dry sand,” he said.

Kisela said nobody marked the ECL line with stakes, signage or other markings when it was first established in 2007, which would have made property lines explicitly clear. But city and county officials do have devices they can take to the beach to determine where the ECL is within about one foot.

About two years ago, he said, “using basically a GPS device, we were able to determine around 30 to 40 percent of the ECL beach was still dry,” he said.

But Taylor Engineering, the firm that the county contracted to execute both the 2007 and 2013 restoration projects, said in 2015 that the Holiday Isle project contained about 80 percent of its initial sand volume, and the Crystal Beach project contained between 94 to 99 percent of its original volume.

‘We won’t make them move’

Since the ECL line was never clearly physically marked, the Okaloosa County Sheriff’s Office uses a “20-foot rule” when enforcing trespassing on Destin beaches.

Sgt. Jason Fulghum said deputies will not trespass anybody who puts their things within 20 feet of the water’s edge, even if it’s behind “no trespassing” signs and ropes or in front of beach chair vendors.

“It’s a general order that we have. We’re not saying that the beach is public beach, we’re saying that we’re not going to enforce trespassing laws in that area because it’s just not clear whether or not it’s public beach,” Fulghum said. “There are people who say it’s public, there are people who say it’s private, and until there’s a definitive answer we’re not going to enforce trespassing.”

Fulghum said he had a large volume of trespassing calls “several years ago” but since then it has died down. He’s seen an uptick in calls since the Walton County customary use kerfuffle. House Bill 631 took effect July 1 and sent Okaloosa’s neighboring county into turmoil.

“If someone is set up anywhere on the beach in Destin and they’re within 20 feet of the water’s edge, we will not arrest them for trespassing and we won’t make them move,” Fulghum said.

Before the ring took a dip into the ocean, he planned on putting a proposal message-in-a-bottle for her to find. After the ring disappeared, he instead decided not to risk losing it again and went right over to Arn, who was lounging in a beach chair, and proposed.

She said yes. Nearby, Osborn cried during the proposal. She and the happy couple, she said, have become instant friends.

“(Cassandra) said: ‘You’re invited to the wedding,’” Osborn said. “I told them to come back to Panama City Beach and get married where I found the ring.”

Last month, Rooker Properties, an Atlanta-based company that had purchased land in downtown Panama City, emerged as GSA’s top option in the bid process to replace the current Federal District Courthouse at 30 W. Government St.

But only days later a problem with the taxes caused that deal to fall through, meaning once again GSA had to choose between a set of bids that included, at least, a proposal from Bay County and one from Marianna.

It’s possible there are more options.

Majka would not say Monday if the update means GSA has selected

the county’s proposal over the option set forth by Marianna.

In 2017, the Federal District Court announced it would not renew the lease on the current lease current federal courthouse, 30 W. Government St., because of the problems with the building and threatened to shut down the Panama City division.

The decision would have forced locals to travel to either Pensacola or Tallahassee for federal court appointments and potentially cost the region 27 direct jobs and 100 indirect ones.

Since then, a local task-force of which the county is a part of, has been working to keep the courthouse in Panama City.

The bid package the county submitted would, if chosen, require a building swap.

Ultimately, the county’s

plan calls for the current Juvenile Justice Facility on 11th Street to become the Federal Courthouse. Using the money from the lease, the county would pay down the debt on the juvenile facility and build a new juvenile courthouse on the same campus as the Bay County Courthouse.

While the new juvenile courthouse is being built, the personnel from the 11th Street facility will temporarily move into the former Panama City Hall, 9 Harrison Ave., which would be renovated.

The county commission meeting will be at 9 a.m., at the Bay County Government Building, 840 West 11th St.

NEW YORK Tech companies remove Alex Jones for hate speech

Major tech companies have begun to ban right-wing conspiracy theorist Alex Jones from their services, reflecting a more aggressive enforcement of policies against hate speech following protests on social media.

Facebook has taken down four pages belonging to Jones, including two featuring his "Infowars" show, for violating its hate speech and bullying policies. Over the past several days, Apple, YouTube and Spotify have also removed material published by Jones. Twitter, which hasn't banned Jones, has also faced similar calls. Facebook has also suspended Jones' account for 30 days because he repeatedly violated the company's community standards against hate speech that "attacks or dehumanizes others," it said in a statement Monday.

PepsiCo's latest female CEO to exit

PURCHASE, N.Y. — With Indra Nooyi exiting PepsiCo as its longtime chief executive, the circle of CEOs in the Fortune 500 is losing one of its highest profile women.

Nooyi, who was born in India, is a rarity on Wall Street as a woman and a minority leading a Fortune 500 company. She oversaw PepsiCo during a turbulent time in the industry that has forced food giants including Coca-Cola Co., Campbell Soup Co. and Oreo maker Mondelez International Inc. to adapt to changing tastes.

All those companies changed CEOs in roughly the last year.

At PepsiCo Inc., Nooyi stressed the company's move toward "good for you" options that people don't feel as guilty eating, such as Baked Lay's potato chips and Naked juices made of fruits and vegetables.

The company has not abandoned sugary sodas

or more indulgent snacks. Nooyi, 62, has been with PepsiCo Inc. for 24 years and held the top job for 12.

Another PepsiCo veteran, Ramon Laguarta, will take over as chief executive in October, the company said Monday.

Nooyi will remain as chairwoman until early

next year.

"Growing up in India, I never imagined I'd have the opportunity to lead such an extraordinary company," Nooyi said in a statement Monday.

Nooyi began her career in India with positions at companies including Johnson & Johnson. She

later attended the Yale School of Management.

The percentage of female CEOs in the Fortune 500 has climbed slowly over the years and broke the 5 percent mark just last year, according to Catalyst, which promotes women in the workplace. The Fortune 500 includes

the largest companies based on revenue.


In the S&P 500, an index that includes companies from different sectors, there are currently 25 female CEOs including Nooyi, according to Catalyst.

That also represents around 5 percent of CEOs.

Within the food industry, Nooyi is the latest female chief executive to step down, following Mondelez CEO Irene Rosenfeld last year and Campbell CEO Denise Morrison earlier this year.

The packaged food industry has been undergoing major changes through acquisitions, spinoffs and mergers as big companies look for ways to revive slumping revenues.

Nooyi, who took over as chief executive of PepsiCo in 2006, has resisted calls by an activist investor to spin off the company's beverage business, which has struggled in North America, from its better-performing Frito-Lay snacks business.

Lifeline for workers who face hardship between paychecks

Luis Vazquez and his girlfriend were down to their last \$50 after she got sick and had to miss work for a month.

He already paid his rent and bills for the month, but without her income the couple couldn't cover groceries and other essentials. His next paycheck was more than a week away.

Faced with a similar cash crunch years ago, Vazquez had resorted to a payday loan, a high-interest, short term loan meant to tide a borrower over until the next paycheck. But the couple and their toddler son were eventually evicted from their apartment because they couldn't make both their rent and the loan payments.

Vazquez vowed never to take out such a loan again. This time, he had another option. An overnight support manager at Walmart, Vazquez was able get a \$150 advance on his pay using an app that allows the company's employees to access up to half their earned wages during a pay period.

A growing number of companies are rolling out products and

services that allow employees to receive a portion of their pay when they need it. This can help workers, especially those making hourly wages or working irregular schedules, to avoid unpleasant and potentially costly options such as borrowing from loved ones, running up credit card debt, selling possessions or taking out payday or other high-interest loans when bills come due or emergencies arise before the next paycheck.

Could this be the future of payday? Developers of flexible-pay services say adhering to a rigid pay cycle doesn't make sense. Josh Reeves, CEO and co-founder of the payroll company Gusto, sees a model in the way parents pay their kids for doing chores.

"If they mow the lawn, they get paid right away," Reeves says. "We think in the future, everyone will get paid (for their work) when they do it."

Some experts acknowledge that giving employees early access to their pay can backfire if, for instance, they spend the money unwisely. But the need for flexible pay services is clear.

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Trump admin eases tariffs on newsprint

The Trump administration eased back somewhat from its proposed tariffs on Canadian newsprint, which could further devastate newspapers, but the U.S. International Trade Commission, which has the final say, should kill the taxes entirely when it hears the matter later this month.

The case arose from a complaint by a lone Washington paper mill owned by a New York hedge fund. The North Pacific Paper Co. argued Canada was unfairly subsidizing its producers, allowing them to undercut American companies. In response, the Commerce Department implemented tariffs in January of up to 22 percent on Canadian imports.

Newsprint is traditionally the second-largest cost for most publishers. During a time when print publications are struggling to meet the challenges of a digital market, the higher costs threaten to further drag down a variety of interests, particularly community newspapers, which play a vital role in keeping small-town and rural residents informed.

In Thursday's announcement, the Trump administration revealed a handful of modifications. It will now spare two Canadian paper companies from the tariff while imposing a duty of 22 percent on another company. Remaining producers north of the border will face tariffs of up to 9.81 percent. While an improvement, the adjustments don't go far enough. A bipartisan bill proposed by Sen. Susan Collins, R-Maine, has 20 co-sponsors and would put the tariffs on ice until the completion of an economic impact study. Identical legislation has support in the House.



Why is election security a partisan issue?

The Election Assistance Commission (EAC) is an independent, bipartisan body responsible for key aspects of voter registration, election administration, and technical guidelines for voting systems.

In the past few weeks, measures proposing an increase in its funding have come before both chambers of Congress.

Both times, they have failed. In July, the House of Representatives voted down an increase of \$380 million strictly along party lines.

In the Senate late last week, a more modest \$250 million was proposed; it still failed 50-47, with Tennessee's Sen. Bob Corker the only Republican voting in favor.

The author of the Senate amendment, Connecticut Sen. Patrick Leahy, said after his measure's failure that "the integrity of our elections, which are the foundation of our democracy, should not be a partisan issue."

Sen. Leahy is right. After all, we all know that

the problem is real.

Election infrastructure, including voter registration databases, were a target of Russian hackers in the 2016 election, per the intelligence community's unanimous assessment.

In addition, a variety of sources this summer have confirmed the Russians are hard at work once again trying to influence the coming midterm elections.

In the aftermath of President Trump's embarrassing presser with Vladimir Putin in Helsinki wherein he took Putin's side over that of the U.S. intelligence community (and a subsequent week's worth of damage control attempts by the White House), many Republicans rightly condoned the president's remarks.

They expressed their own agreement with the intelligence community that Russian active measures remain a real threat, and urged the president not to kowtow to Putin — or to invite him to Washington this fall, in the midst of a democratic process he was actively working to undermine.

But those words of criticism, while right and welcome, are meaningless absent any real action.

This problem of rhetoric without action was mirrored by the White House last week.

The administration trotted out a host of national security leaders — including Director of National Intelligence Dan Coats, National Security Advisor John Bolton, FBI Director Christopher Wray, National Security Agency Director Paul Nakasone, and even embattled Homeland Security Secretary Kirstjen Nielsen — all to confirm a "pervasive messaging campaign by Russia to try to weaken and divide the United States" in the midterm elections.

While their message was reaffirming and reassuring, it was disturbing to hear little in the way of policy specifics being undertaken to do something about the problem.

And of course, the president made matters worse not long after.

Ranting and slurring at a campaign rally later that evening, he once again referred to the notion of election interference as "the Russia hoax."

Clearly, with the executive branch ever hobbled by its own leader's ineffectiveness on this issue, it is up to Congress to act.

Maduro supporters rally



CARACAS, Venezuela — Pro-government factions mobilized thousands of Venezuelans dressed in red — the color of the ruling socialist party — onto the streets of the capital on Monday in a bid to show the country remains united around President Nicolas Maduro after what the government described as a thwarted assassination attempt.

“This river of red,” Foreign Minister Jorge Arreaza declared as the crowd waved flags and carried posters with Maduro’s image. “It could have been another red running through these streets.”

Authorities say they have now captured all those behind the attack using two drones armed with explosives. The names of those detained have not been released, but chief prosecutor Tarek William Saab said the six people arrested could face charges including treason, attempted homicide and terrorism. “They need to pay the penalty Venezuela’s law calls for,” Diosdado Cabello, a high-ranking socialist party leader, told the crowd of thousands. “There won’t be any more forgiveness.”

Public employees are required to attend such pro-government rallies to ensure a strong show of support. Yet, even as Venezuelan leaders sought to project a nation united behind Maduro, analysts warned the incident makes the already unpopular leader even

more vulnerable as he struggles to reverse a crippling humanitarian and economic crisis considered worse than the Great Depression.

Diego Moya-Ocampos, a Venezuelan analyst with the London-based consulting firm IHS Markit, warned Saturday’s failed attack could be a sign that low-level insurgent groups that have in the past expressed their frustration by throwing rocks and Molotov cocktails at the National Guard during protests are now escalating to a more violent approach.

“This is a manifestation of institutions not being able to channel the political, economic and social crisis that Venezuela is going through,” he said.

Maduro was addressing hundreds of uniformed soldiers Saturday in a

speech celebrating the 81st anniversary of the National Guard when an explosion pierced the air. Authorities say two drones, each packed with 2.2 pounds of C-4 plastic explosive, were aimed at the stage where Maduro, his wife and a slate of the nation’s highest-ranking government leaders were gathered.

The military managed to knock one of the drones off course electronically and the other craft crashed into an apartment building two blocks away.

Images captured on live television showed Maduro and his wife looking up at the sky as the explosion struck and then hundreds of soldiers scrambling from the scene, an image of panic in stark contrast to the one of power and control the government tries to project.

Saab said Monday that two suspects were detained quickly on Saturday after witnesses saw them operating one of the drones from a vehicle. He added that there was evidence that the attack was linked to an ongoing investigating related to a “terrorist attack” last year.

The comment appeared to be a reference to rogue police officer Oscar Perez, who flew a stolen helicopter over the capital in June 2017 and launched grenades at several government buildings. He and several comrades were killed in a gun battle with police after months on the lam.

In his rallying speech, Cabello told Venezuelans there is no doubt that the “Colombian oligarchy” and “North American imperialism” were behind Saturday’s attack.

clear that the Iranian regime faces a choice: either change its threatening, destabilizing behavior and reintegrate with the global economy, or continue down a path of economic isolation.”

A first set of U.S. sanctions that had been eased under the accord were going into effect at one minute past midnight under an executive order signed by Trump. Those sanctions affect financial transactions that involve U.S. dollars, Iran’s automotive sector, the purchase of commercial planes and metals including gold.

A second batch of U.S. sanctions targeting Iran’s oil sector and central bank are to be reimposed in early November. Trump warned that those who don’t wind down their economic ties to Iran “risk severe consequences.”

The Europeans didn’t like any of it. Despite Trump’s claims, the accord “is working and delivering on its goal” of limiting Iran’s nuclear program, said a statement by European Union foreign policy chief Federica Mogherini and the foreign ministers of France, Germany and the United Kingdom.

The ministers said the Iran deal is “crucial for the security of Europe, the region and the entire world,” and the European Union issued a “blocking statute” Monday to protect European businesses from the

impact of the sanctions. A senior administration official, briefing reporters under ground rules requiring anonymity, said the United States is “not particularly concerned” by EU efforts to protect European firms from the sanctions.

Iranian President Hassan Rouhani said that Iran still can rely on China and Russia to keep its oil and banking sectors afloat. Speaking in a television interview, he also demanded compensation for decades of American “intervention” in the Islamic Republic.

Months of uncertainty surrounding the sanctions have already further hurt Iran’s economy. The country’s rial currency has tanked, and the downturn has sparked protests across the nation.

The “Trump Administration wants the world to believe it’s concerned about the Iranian people,” Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif said in a statement posted to Twitter. But, he said, the reimposed sanctions would endanger “ordinary Iranians.”

“US hypocrisy knows no bounds,” he said.

U.S. officials insisted the American government stands with the people of Iran and supports many of their complaints against their own government.

National Security Adviser John Bolton said Iran’s leadership is on “very shaky ground,” but he insisted economic pressure from the Trump administration is not an attempt at “regime change.”

11 dead, nearly 70 wounded in weekend violence in Chicago

CHICAGO — At least 11 people were shot to death and about 70 wounded in a weekend burst of violence in Chicago that instantly became a political issue when President Donald Trump’s lawyer, Rudy Giuliani, blamed the carnage on longtime Democratic rule in the city.

Police on Monday attributed the dozens of shootings to gangs, the illegal flow of guns and sweltering August heat that drew more people outside.

The victims ranged in age from 11 to 63, according to police. One teenage girl died after being shot in the face. A teenage boy was fatally shot riding a bike Sunday afternoon. Other shootings took place at a block party and a funeral.

Even for Chicagoans all too accustomed to violence in parts of the city, the weekend stood out. By way of comparison, at least seven people were killed and 32 wounded during the long Memorial Day weekend, the Chicago Tribune reported.

“Our souls are burdened,” Mayor Rahm Emanuel said. “It is unacceptable to happen in any neighborhood of Chicago. We are a better city.”

Echoing comments that Trump himself has made repeatedly about Chicago, Giuliani blamed Emanuel — President Barack Obama’s White House chief of staff — and decades of “one party Democratic rule” in a series of tweets on Sunday and Monday.

The former New York mayor also tweeted his support for Chicago mayoral candidate and former Police Superintendent Garry McCarthy, referring to him as “Jerry” and calling him a “policing genius.”

McCarthy plans to run next February against Emanuel, who fired McCarthy in 2015 after the release of dashcam video showing a white police officer killing a black teenager by shooting him 16 times.

Misspelling Emanuel’s last name, Giuliani tweeted: “He can do a lot better than Mayor Emmanuel who is fiddling while Chicago burns.” Giuliani also falsely claimed that Chicago had “63 murders this weekend.”

The mayor had no immediate comment on Giuliani’s attacks.

Most of the shootings happened in poor neighborhoods on the West and South Sides where gangs are entrenched, said Police Superintendent Eddie Johnson, standing next to the mayor.

Johnson noted that homicides in the city are

down by around 20 percent from last year. But he said gang members and others arrested on gun charges aren’t dealt with harshly enough.

“It is the same people who are pulling the triggers,” he said. “This is a small subset of individuals who think they can play by their own rules because they continue to get a slap on the wrist when we arrest them.”

Johnson said at the morning news conference there had been no arrests in any of the weekend shootings.

Days before the attacks, some 200 protesters marched through a well-to-do North Side neighborhood and briefly closed Lake Shore Drive, calling for more resources to stem violence in poor areas.

Tio Hardiman, one of the organizers of last week’s rally, said members of the black community need to take the initiative by mediating truces between gangs.

The violence peaked early Sunday, including one shooting on the South Side that wounded eight people.

With a little help, angler reels in huge sailfish

Fisherman powers through despite lost gaff, capsizing kayak

PANAMA CITY BEACH — Two hours into the fight of his life, Lance Sanders realized he was going to have to call in reinforcements if he was going to land the monstrous sailfish he had hooked.

This fish was far more than he had bargained for.

On Sunday, Sanders and his friend Brian Russell had taken their kayaks out early in the morning to fish for king mackerel.

Sanders, who had worked late the night before and hadn't gotten much sleep, brought his Penn battle 5000 on a star rod with 60 pound braid to fish.

After three hours on the water, Sanders and Russell were tired and ready to head back to the shore when the sailfish hit.

"The moment it skyrocketed out of the water I knew it wasn't a king," Sanders said. "Once I saw what it was, my first thought was how far is this gonna drag me. And it pulled me everywhere."

He means it. GPS data saved from the fight show the sailfish took off toward open water, bringing Sanders along for the ride as Russell paddled along behind him on the journey that ultimately lasted more than five miles.

Only, it wasn't actually that long for Russell. About halfway through, Russell's kayak flipped, spilling equipment into the Gulf of Mexico — including the much needed gaff.

His paddle and poles were in Sanders' kayak at the time, which was both fortunate and unfortunate.

Fortunate that they too weren't lost to the sea, and unfortunate in that when the sailfish pulled Sanders 100 yards away, Russell had to







Fellow airmen replace woman's missing flag

CRESTVIEW — When KaSandra Gray lost her U.S. flag near Crab Island earlier this summer, she was heartbroken. She came to terms with the fact that she probably would never see it again. But when members of the 919th Special Operations Wing at Duke Field read about her story, they decided to give her a new one.

"I had such a crappy year, and losing that flag was such a huge hit to me," Gray said.

Gray — a 14-year veteran of the U.S. Air Force who is stationed at Hurlburt Field — went to Crab Island June 24 with her family. After a day on the water, they packed up and went to shore.

Halfway to the boat ramp, Gray's stepson realized their flag was missing. The American flag Gray bought before her first deployment to Afghanistan more than 10 years ago had fallen off the boat's flag pole.

The group quickly turned around and searched for the flag, but had no luck.

The Daily News wrote about Gray's situation in late June, and the story caught the eye of Maj. Terrell Eikner with the 919th Special Operations Wing.

"I said, 'Hey, I have a flag that was flown in combat in Afghanistan and I think we need to replace her flag because she's a member of the Air Force family,'" Eikner said. "It's the right thing to do."

Eikner and the rest of the wing presented Gray with a new flag on Sunday in a hangar

on Duke Field in front of her parents, boyfriend and children. Before Eikner presented the flag, he explained the significance behind it.

"I go up to my attic to retrieve the flag. I have about 50 boxes in my attic," Eikner said. "Luckily, it's in the first box that I grab ... I pull the flag out, there's a certificate in there. On that certificate (it says) 'flown by Maj. Bradfield.' Now, Col. Bradfield — our wing commander.

"I'm telling you ma'am, this

whole thing ... it was meant to be."

Eikner presented Gray the flag, the original certificate and a new certificate made just for her. With tears in her eyes, she thanked him and the rest of the soldiers for their generosity.

"This is a huge honor for me to receive something that you've kept for so long," Gray said, choked up. "And I fully understand, and I'm so, so grateful that you guys magically found this and decided to

give it to me. I'm overwhelmed with gratitude."

After the ceremony, Gray and her family got to meet Col. Les Bradfield and thank him, as well.

"I'm very sorry that you lost your original flag, but so glad that you got this (new one)," Bradfield said. "I'm proud of this wing because there's a lot of great citizen air commands that see things like that and reach out. I'm glad we can help."

Metal detectors delayed at Florida school where 17 died

PARKLAND — Metal detectors will not be installed for the start of classes at a Florida high school where 17 students and faculty were slain on Valentine's Day.

The South Florida Sun Sentinel reports Broward County Public Schools Superintendent Robert Runcie sent a letter Friday to parents of each Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School students informing them that

plans for the metal detectors were on hold.

A school board workshop on security measures is scheduled Aug. 14. Among the issues being considered: how to get 3,200 students through metal detectors each morning.

"As we continue our due diligence to implement the program — consulting with vendors and experts and reviewing turn-key solutions — many issues have been raised that require the District to pause and have a

more thoughtful discussion on policy and procedural aspects of this pilot," Runcie wrote.

Class starts Aug. 15. Officials previously said students would no longer have to use see-through backpacks when they returned to the Parkland school. The Miami Herald reports that students and faculty will see other safety measures in place when they return to the Parkland campus, including the addition of more security staff. School identification badges

will be required again for all students and staff members. New fences, gates, and surveillance video cameras have been installed, and the school's intercom system has been upgraded. Classroom doors throughout the school will remain locked from the outside at all times, Runcie said. Over 30 new portable classrooms also have been installed to compensate for the closure of the building where the shooting took place. Runcie said the school has

hired a new employee whose "sole responsibility will be to monitor the camera system and alert appropriate individuals of suspicious activity."

Many students from the school have criticized safety measures such as the clear backpacks, arguing that implementing gun laws would be more effective instead.

Former student Nikolas Cruz has been jailed on 17 counts of first-degree murder since the shooting.

DeSantis gets boost from public

TALLAHASSEE — Nearly \$450,000 was spread to seven statewide candidates in the second round of public matching funds, raising the total for the 2018 elections to \$3.9 million, according to Florida Division of Elections numbers.

In a sign of an increase in small individual donations, Republican gubernatorial candidate Ron DeSantis received \$183,006 on Friday, the most that any candidate received last week from the matching-funds program.

DeSantis, a Northeast Florida congressman, has now received \$826,232 through the controversial program, which has divided state lawmakers. Critics in recent years have sought to eliminate the program, which matches individual contributions of \$250 or less.

No public money is dispensed until candidates for Cabinet positions reach \$100,000 in such relatively small-dollar

contributions received in a period that began last September. For gubernatorial candidates, the threshold is \$150,000.

Statewide candidates drew \$4.34 million from the program in 2014 and \$6.1 million in 2010.

Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam, who is going up against DeSantis in the Aug. 28 Republican primary for governor, received \$81,170 last week, bringing his matching-funds total to just over \$1 million. Gwen Graham, a former congresswoman who is among the Democrats running for governor, picked up \$103,970 on Friday from the matching-funds program, bringing her overall haul from the program to nearly \$1.1 million.

In the attorney general race, former Hillsborough County Circuit Judge Ashley Moody received \$29,600 on Friday, bringing her total matching funds to \$313,348. Democratic state Rep. Sean Shaw of Tampa picked up \$19,832 on Friday. Shaw has now received \$158,825.

Florida seeking to uphold band on medical marijuana

TALLAHASSEE — Pointing in part to smoking-related health effects, Attorney General Pam Bondi's office on Friday filed a 57-page brief arguing that an appeals court should uphold a decision by the Legislature to ban smoking medical marijuana.

The brief, filed at the 1st District Court of Appeal, came as the state challenges a May ruling by Leon County Circuit Judge Karen Gievers, who said the smoking ban violates a 2016 constitutional amendment that broadly legalized medical marijuana.

The Legislature in 2017 passed a law to carry out the constitutional amendment and included the smoking ban.

Prominent Orlando lawyer John Morgan, who heavily bankrolled the constitutional amendment, filed a lawsuit last year challenging the smoking ban.

Bondi's office Friday filed an initial brief in its attempt to overturn Gievers' ruling.

The brief raised a series of issues, including arguing that the Legislature "considered important health and safety factors" when deciding to ban smoking.

"Notably, the Legislature considered evidence of the health hazards of

smoking and concluded that smoking marijuana constitutes a harmful delivery method," the brief said.

"Time and again during debate, elected members of Florida's Legislature emphasized that the amendment is exclusively about medicine, and that smoking is antithetical to good medicine. In considering these health-related factors, the Legislature reasonably determined that the harms caused by smoking — including harms to patients and those exposed to secondhand smoke — were ample reason to exclude smoking from the statutory definition of 'medical use.' The Legislature therefore acted under its general authority to regulate public health, safety, and welfare when it drew a reasonable line between the smoking of medical marijuana, and other delivery methods."

But in her May ruling, Gievers found that language in the amendment "recognizes there is no right to smoke in public places, thereby implicitly recognizing the appropriateness of using smokable medical marijuana in private places consistent with the amendment."

The "ability to smoke medical marijuana was implied" in the constitutional language "and is therefore a protected right," Gievers wrote.

Father, son survive Florida rip current

CLEARWATER — Robert Kantor thought he was going to die.

Then he quickly snapped back to reality. He had to fight for his life — and his son's.

Kantor, 45, and his 15-year-old son, Frank, were stuck in a rip current at the beach. The two were enjoying an evening swim on the evening of July 23 when they were swept up by a strong current and carried away from shore.

Here's how father and son survived:

Lifeguards are only on duty until 7 p.m. there,

and father and son found themselves in trouble soon afterward. They desperately tried to signal for help to Kantor's wife Gabriela, who was standing on the beach.

They didn't know if she saw them. As the waves crashed against their bodies, they came up with a plan to try to escape the rip current, relying heavily on the son. The father is usually a strong swimmer, but was recovering from shoulder surgery six weeks before.

They decided the 15-year-old would swim parallel to the shoreline to escape the rip. The father would grab his son's legs and be carried along.

It didn't work. Robert Kantor kept slipping away. He tried to keep it together.

"I thought about staying calm," the father said. "I meditate and I was able to think clearly and to communicate with my son and come up with a plan and not focus on the fear."

They came up with a back-up plan. The son got behind his father and kicked as hard as he could while the father swam parallel to the beach. It worked. The two started to feel relief from the current.

Robert Kantor said his son didn't tire. He treaded water and swam with ease, as if he was just

playing around.

But the father? His arms felt like cement blocks as his body filled with exhaustion.

Meanwhile on shore, efforts were underway to rescue them.

The wife had called 911 and told rescuers where father and son were in the water.

Clearwater Fire & Rescue arrived at the beach, near the 700 block of El Dorado Avenue. Firefighter Scott McGrail then swam 25 yards out and rescued Robert Kantor with a paddle board.

Lt. Matt Burmood said the father was visibly tired and pale. The 911

call was critical to a successful water rescue. The more information first-responders get, Magness said, the better prepared they'll be.

"It's very different from a house fire because there are so many variables to water rescues," he said. "We have to come up with a plan as we go so the caller needs to provide us with as much information as possible."

What father and son did to survive the rip current also conformed with the advice from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration: Swimmers caught in a rip current should let themselves float and swim

parallel to the shore to escape.

What those who find themselves trapped in a rip current should not do is try to swim back to shore against the current — that will just tire them out, and increase their risk of drowning.

But the biggest key to surviving a rip current, Lt. Kevin Bowler said, is to stay calm. He said father and son "absolutely did the right things."

Robert Kantor, of Clearwater, said his experience showed him that he can make a difference by educating more people about the dangers of rip currents.

PANAMA CITY AAA: P.C. gas prices some of highest in state

Gas prices in Panama City are some of the highest in the state, according to AAA.

The average gas price in Panama City is \$2.88, according to AAA, which ties it with the Crestview-Fort Walton Beach area for the second highest price in Florida.

The highest prices are found in West Palm Beach-Boca Raton at \$2.91.

The prices rose slightly last week, but analysts are hopeful the trend will reverse this week. The state's average price is \$2.76, which is 4 cents more than a month ago, and 47 cents more than last year, according to AAA.

The national average is \$2.87.

Gas prices in July averaged \$2.75 per gallon. That was the highest monthly average for July since 2014. Summer gas prices are poised to be the most expensive in four years, AAA said.

"Prices at the pump have pinballed around this summer, but fortunately have remained within a 20 cent range," said Mark Jenkins, AAA spokesman, in a prepared statement. "The limited swings in pump prices and a strong economy has led to one of the biggest driving summers in history."

Prices should slip lower this week, due to falling futures prices on the stock market. However, demand historically remains strong through

August, which should prevent prices from slipping anywhere near the lows we saw last year."

PANAMA CITY Victim ID'd, subject at large in shooting

The suspect in a shooting Sunday at the Royal Arms Garden Apartments on Balboa Avenue is still at large, though Panama City Police have issued a warrant for his arrest.

Police say Jarquez Whitley, 29, of Lynn Haven, intentionally shot Juwan Cummings, 21, in the back area of the apartment complex behind the J building around noon.

Whitley then fled the scene and while his vehicle was later recovered in Lynn Haven, Whitley's whereabouts are still unknown.

He has been charged with aggravated battery, felon in possession of a firearm and discharging a firearm in public. According to police, the shooting was not random and Cummings was targeted.

No information was available on the status of the victim, but radio reports from the time indicate he suffered from a gunshot wound to the abdomen.

Police were summoned to the apartment complex originally on a call of a shooting involving two young children, according to incident reports, though that was later determined that information was not credible.

One round was found behind the J building at the complex, where there is a small play area.

Then, the tail stuck out of the water and the pair was able to hoist it onto the boat.

"Lance and I just kinda looked at each other and he said, 'damn, I'm glad you came. I knew I called the right guy,'" Pemberton said with a laugh.

"Not that I had an idea of what I was actually going to do. I had never landed anything over five feet in my kayak."

With the meat though, they knew exactly what to do — tacos.

"For me, this was a once in a lifetime catch," Sanders said.

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

In today's deal, South opens one spade, and West overcalls two clubs. North can double to show values and the unbid suits. South now wants to get to a game, but does not know which. He cannot bid no-trump without a club stopper. Spades seems a likely prospect, but there may be a 5-3 heart fit, or his partner may have a club stopper.

South's three-club cue-bid asks North for more information about his hand. When North shows his diamonds, South repeats his spades, and North raises to game to end the auction.

South ruffs the third club and must then look for the safest way to make his contract. If South simply lays down his three top trumps, he will be left with just the trump 10 while West has the jack. South will then have to start on the diamonds, and if East gives count, West will wait until the third round of diamonds to ruff in. West will exit safely with a club, and South will have to surrender a heart trick for down one.

The solution is to give up the trump trick at a time when the opponents are unable to return a club. In other words, there must still be a high trump left in dummy when the trump is given up.

So, South crosses to a top diamond at trick four and leads a spade to the 10! West can take the trump jack, but if he returns a club, dummy's spade eight will protect declarer against the force. If West returns a diamond or heart, South can win, draw trumps and take the rest.





Mullen: QBs have a way to go

GAINESVILLE — Florida coach Dan Mullen has no illusions about his quarterback situation.

Especially not after nearly a week of practice.

Mullen made it clear Monday that Feleipe Franks, Kyle Trask and freshman Emory Jones have a long way to go to meet his lofty expectations. He said it might not happen this season or even next year. It was an

indictment of what Mullen inherited when he replaced Jim McElwain last November and offered a less-than-ideal outlook on the upcoming season for those hoping the Gators would return to their glory days after eight years of offensive ineptitude.

“To be a big-time quarterback, I don’t think they even think they’d know how hard that is,” Mullen said. “They should understand it by hopefully next summer. I was hoping maybe with just one of them it would really

click, but I didn’t see that happen. But that doesn’t shock me. It might not even be next summer. It might be the summer after that.

“A lot of guys it takes two or three years of really working. They work one summer and realize ‘Boy, I wasn’t close.’ They work the next summer and they think they’ve really got it and then they come out and they’re like, ‘I worked a lot harder. I thought I’d be ready, but I should be even further ahead than this.’”

Mullen had hoped to find

a starter long before the Sept. 1 season opener against Charleston Southern.

Franks started eight games last season, completing 55 percent of his passes for 1,438 yards, with nine touchdowns and eight interceptions. The 6-foot-5 sophomore has ideal size and an NFL arm. But his accuracy and decision-making ability made him look lost at times in 2017.

Backup Kyle Trask missed all of last season following foot surgery. Jones was one of Mullen’s top recruits in his first

signing class.

Mullen said the three have good attitudes and are making progress, but they also might need years to reach the level that Alex Smith, Chris Leak, Tim Tebow and Dak Prescott did under Mullen’s guidance.

“I’m seeing flashes here and there, but it’s really about consistency of performance,” Mullen said. “I watch each guy and that looks really good and then the next play and that looks really bad.”

Taggart FSU era starts with QB battle

TALLAHASSEE — Quarterback competitions are nothing new for Florida State, which has had four in the last six seasons.

But this competition is quite different from preseasons past. The Seminoles opened their first preseason under new coach Willie Taggart on Monday with two quarterbacks with starting experience.

Taggart, whose Florida State coaching debut will be Sept. 3 against Virginia Tech, said he has no timetable to make a decision.

“When they decide to separate themselves and make it a no-brainer is when we’ll make that decision,” said Taggart, who arrived at Florida State

after a year at Oregon. “It’s going to be pretty cool to watch them go do their thing.”

Deondre Francois and James Blackman may have the edge in experience, but Taggart also said not to discount redshirt

freshman Bailey Hockman.

Taggart feels the quarterbacks have similar traits, including arm strength, mobility, toughness and intelligence to run his uptempo, spread-based Gulf Coast offense.

What the Seminoles are looking for is an important intangible — who is the best leader.

“The job description of quarterback is make the other 10 guys better,” offensive coordinator Walt Bell said. “Who can do that at a higher rate? That’s going to be the guy that you entrust to be the quarterback. ... You’ve got to be a guy that your teammates can trust, and I think you earn that in a multitude of ways, whether it’s how you work or how you speak to people or the relationships you create.”

Blackman and Francois have a significant advantage in terms of experience. Francois started as a redshirt freshman in 2016,

Dolphins’ Gore is competing for starting position

DAVIE — The NFL’s active career rushing leader may still be a starter at age 35.

Frank Gore is listed as sharing the No. 1 running back spot with incumbent Kenyan Drake on the first depth chart of training camp for the Miami Dolphins.

Gore signed with his hometown team in March and was widely expected to fill the role of veteran backup. He’s awfully experienced for a feature back, with 13 seasons and 196 games of mileage.

But that mileage translates into lots of yardage — 14,026 yards, to be exact, which ranks behind only Emmitt Smith, Walter Payton, Barry Sanders and Curtis Martin.

And 10 practices into camp, Gore shows no sign he has lost a step.

“I’m not surprised,” coach Adam Gase said

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Heat serves as muggy reminder of the final PGA in August

ST. LOUIS — The PGA Championship finally found its identity. It's the one major where players are allowed to practice in shorts.

They might not need to next year.

This is the last year for the PGA Championship to be the final major. It will move to the middle of May and be held next year at Bethpage Black on Long Island. Based on the sweat pouring down faces — and legs — and drenched shirts Monday at Bellerive, next year will be a welcome reprieve.

But it's not just the steamy heat of golf in August.

The PGA Championship, which celebrates its 100th edition this year, is easy to get overlooked because it falls at the end of a busy schedule. Francesco Molinari, who opted for shorts on the first official day of practice, was hoisting the claret jug from his British Open victory just 15

days ago.

Justin Thomas could barely relish his first World Golf Championship title Sunday at Firestone when it was time to prepare for his title defense in the PGA Championship.

"I think it will be good for the vibe," Kevin Chappell said about the move to May. "It limits the golf courses we can play, which could be good or bad depending on your taste."

"The Open being the last one won't lose any pizzazz because it stands on its own. But this being the fourth major, and the third one in the U.S., it's easily overlooked."

It's not unusual for players to go a week or two early to see Augusta National (mainly because they can), or the U.S. Open course. The roster of players who took a side trip to St. Louis to see Bellerive is much smaller.

Phil Mickelson and Zach Johnson were here early last week. Dustin Johnson and Brooks Koepka were among those who didn't have time. They went from

Scotland to the Canadian Open to Ohio for the Bridgestone Invitational.

Jordan Spieth took the week off after the British Open for his bachelor party in Spain.

Spieth figured three days at a course should be enough for him or any

other tour professional to know how to play a new golf course. His original plan was to play nine holes Monday, 18 on Tuesday and nine on Wednesday.

He wound up playing a full round on Monday, stopping between nines to eat lunch and cool off.

Temperatures were in the mid-90s with humidity pushing 60 percent.

"You can do this when you have an early tee time on Sunday," Spieth said, referring to his tie for 60th last week at the Bridgestone Invitational. He didn't have his best

stuff last week and finished the final round in the early afternoon.

Spieth gets his second chance to try to complete the career Grand Slam, achieved by only five others since the Masters was created in 1934. He figures one of these years, he'll be in good form on a course that suits him, and Bellerive might be one of them.

This is a new course for most of the 156-man field, including the 20 club pros.

Only 15 players in the field have competed at Bellerive, either at the 1992 Championship or the 2008 BMW Championship.

That doesn't include Tiger Woods.

He was at Bellerive and even played the course in practice for the 2001 American Express Championship, which was canceled because of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks. He had knee surgery after winning the 2008 U.S. Open and missed the rest of the year.

It shouldn't matter, for him or anyone else.

Mullen said he expects players, especially quarterbacks, to take big steps over the summer.

QB's should be throwing with receivers and staying in the playbook.

"A lot of times, as they get older, it really clicks," Mullen said. "You see them coming on and they know exactly what they're doing with their summer and exactly what they're trying to work on with every aspect of their game."

"And that takes years to develop. But that's a program evaluation right there. You know what I

mean?"

The Gators have had 12 starting quarterbacks since Tebow's departure in 2010 — John Brantley, Jeff Driskel, Jacoby Brissett, Trey Burton, Tyler Murphy, Skyler Mornhinweg, Will Grier, Treon Harris, Luke Del Rio, Austin Appleby, Franks and Malik Zaire — and none has proven to be a long-term solution for the team's long-standing problem.

Florida has ranked no higher than 83rd in total offense since the 2009 season, and finished six of those eight years ranked in triple digits.

Mullen was hired, in part, to fix the team's anemic offense.

Franks or Trask is likely to get the first shot at

making it happen. Jones is expected to be a situational, change-of-pace backup.

"I do feel like I've made strides," Franks said. "And I think a big part has to do with just being more mature. When I first got here, I didn't know how to adjust from high school to college, just joking around, thinking everything (was) 'ho, ho'."

"It's fine to joke, but at the same time, you have to know when to be serious, when to not be serious. I think a lot of that has to do with maturity. When you get older, you know when to stop playing around. There's a time to watch film and there's a time to be serious and joke around with your friends."

Monday. "He's just been proving everybody wrong for so many years. You just never doubt that guy."

Gase, Gore and Drake all described as no big deal the depth chart, especially one posted leading up to the first exhibition game. But Gore has enjoyed showing in practice he can still play.

"I come out here and compete every day," he said. "Not just with Drake, but with every guy at my position. I think we all push and help each other. With me, whatever my coaches want me to do this year, I'm going to do it."

Drake could yet prove difficult to dislodge from the No. 1 job.

He ranked sixth in the NFL last year with an average of 4.8 yards per carry, topping 100 yards in consecutive games after he became the starter in Week 13.

"I don't think anybody really cares about where they are on the depth chart before preseason even starts," Drake said. "We've got to go out there and earn our spots."

Gore said Drake is worthy friendly competition.

"Kenyan is a very

talented guy," Gore said. He's smart; he can do everything on the field. I think that me and him can really help this team be successful this year."

That would be a change.

The Dolphins went 6-10 last season, when they ranked 28th in both points and rushing.

They expect to have a more potent offense this year with an upgraded line, the return of Ryan Tannehill and their new running back, who's not new to the NFL at all.

Gore has started every game since 2012. Last year he averaged a career-worst 3.7 yards per carry for the Indianapolis Colts, but they provided little room to run, and he did reach the 100-yard mark twice in the season's

final month.

He was thrilled at the chance to return to South Florida, where he was born and raised and starred for the Miami Hurricanes. The homecoming makes even Thursday's mostly meaningless game against Tampa Bay special to Gore, because he's playing for Miami again.

"Pop Warner, high school, college and now the NFL," he said. "I want to do some great things for my city and for my team. I want to show guys that when they get up in age, if you love the game and you go out and work hard, it shouldn't matter what age you are. That's what my goal is this year."

If he starts, that's a bonus.

passing for 3,350 yards, 20 touchdowns and seven interceptions while completing 58.8 percent of his passes. The 6-foot-11, 215-pound junior returned as the starter in 2017 but suffered a season-ending knee injury in the opener against Alabama.

Francois was investigated for a pair of off-field incidents and took part in a diversion program for a misdemeanor marijuana charge. Taggart said Francois has "been doing everything we asked him to do," which included him moving back on campus and spending more time with teammates.

He also spent much of the last year rehabilitating from knee surgery. His mobility was limited during

the spring, but Francois was a full go in practice Monday as he ran with a brace on his left knee. "I'm in a better place," Francois said. "It took a toll on me, being hurt, being out for the whole season."

With Francois sidelined, Blackman stepped in last fall and became the first true freshman to start at quarterback at FSU since 1985. He threw for 2,230 yards, 19 touchdowns and 11 interceptions, with 10 touchdowns coming in during Florida State's four-game winning streak at the end of the season.

The 6-foot-5 sophomore has worked diligently to add weight to his slim frame, adding nearly 20 pounds over the last year to his current weight of 178. Blackman joked on Monday, "I try to eat every second I can."

All of the quarterbacks have had time to adapt to Taggart's offense, which

features a no-huddle, two-minute philosophy.

"I feel a lot more comfortable, knowing the things that we were going over in the spring," Blackman said. "I know them a lot better by doing them over the summer."

Hockman is in the race but he will have to make up for the lack of game experience. The 6-2, 210-pound redshirt freshman throws well on the run and Bell remarked that Hockman's best four practices of the spring were FSU's last four, illustrating that with increased time on the field he was showing accuracy and understanding of the offense.

"They are all going to have an opportunity," Taggart said. "They all understand that. That starts now. We're in training camp now and those guys understand and those guys go out and perform each and every day."

France takes leave from NASCAR following DWI arrest

SAG HARBOR, N.Y. — NASCAR chairman and CEO Brian France announced Monday he was taking an indefinite leave of absence a day after his arrest in New York's Hamptons on charges of driving while intoxicated and criminal possession of oxycodone. France had a blood-alcohol content that was more than twice the legal limit, smelled of booze and slurred his words after he was seen blowing through a stop sign in Sag Harbor on Sunday, police said.

"I apologize to our fans, our industry and my family for the impact of my actions last night," France said in a statement Monday. "Effective immediately, I will be taking an indefinite leave of absence from my position to focus on my personal affairs."

France has been NASCAR's chairman and CEO since 2003. His uncle, Jim France, a vice chairman and executive vice president, will take over those roles on an interim basis.

France, 56, was arraigned at Sag Harbor Village Justice Court after spending the night in jail. He was released on his own recognizance and is due back in court Sept 14.

His lawyer referred reporters to a NASCAR statement on the matter. The organization said it takes France's arrest "as a serious matter and will issue a statement after we have all of the facts."

France, 56, was pulled over and arrested at about 7:30 p.m. Sunday after police said they saw his 2017 Lexus roll through a stop sign near the Sag Harbor waterfront.

His eyes were red and glassy and he struggled to keep his balance during field sobriety tests, police said.

Tests showed France's blood-alcohol content was 0.18, police said. The legal limit in New York is 0.08.

Officers found five oxycodone pills during a

subsequent search, police said.

TMZ first reported the arrest.

France is a third-generation leader of NASCAR. His late grandfather, Bill France Sr., founded the company in 1948.

He's introduced a playoff system, overhauled the design of its cars, and pushed for diversity within the circuit's predominantly white, male ranks.

In recent years, he's been dealing with plunging attendance and TV ratings and departing sponsors, attributing the down turn to the challenge of connecting with a new, younger generation of fans.

France last month characterized as "rumors" reports that his family was looking into selling its racing properties.

"The France family is locked and loaded in its dedication to NASCAR," France told SiriusXM NASCAR Radio. "We're focused on ruling and managing NASCAR. There's nothing to report on that. Rumors are always interesting, but they're seldom right."

France was involved in a 2006 incident in Daytona Beach, Florida, when a police report stated he crashed his Lexus into a tree after entering a restaurant parking lot.

France later told an officer called to his home that he was drinking a soda and "bumped into something."

But a witness called 911 and gave police a statement that claimed she saw France driving at a "very reckless speed," and claimed France's car hit the tree after hitting a parked car.

She said she also watched as France "fell over his own feet" as he got out of his car.

Her statement was not attached to the police report, and the Daytona Beach police chief later investigated whether France was given special treatment by authorities.

UNC: 13 suspended for selling school-issued shoes

Less than a year after emerging from a long run of NCAA issues, North Carolina is dealing with rule violations again — this time for football players selling team-issued shoes.

The school announced Monday that 13 players will miss games serving suspensions for the secondary NCAA violations, which will leave the Tar Heels short-handed during much of the season's opening month. While secondary violations are generally considered less severe, the penalties in this case will result in several players being forced to sit out at least a third of the regular-season schedule.

In all, nine players will miss four games, two will sit two games and two others will miss one contest. The NCAA approved a school request to delay two suspensions affecting multiple players at one position, while the other 11 suspensions begin with the Sept. 1 opener at California.

DETROIT
Oakland acquires pitcher Mike Fiers from Tigers

The Oakland Athletics have acquired right-hander Mike Fiers from the Detroit Tigers for two players to be named or cash.

The Tigers announced the move Monday.

The 33-year-old Fiers is 7-6 with a 3.48 ERA this season. The rebuilding Tigers picked him up before the season on a \$6 million, one-year contract, and he pitched well enough that he became a candidate to be traded to a contender.

Detroit wasn't able to work out a deal before the non-waiver trade deadline last week, but the Tigers have now sent him to an Oakland team that, if the season ended now, would be the American League's second wild card.

Fiers was with the World Series champion Astros last year, but he was not included on any of Houston's postseason rosters.

LOS ANGELES
Shaq's son to play basketball at UCLA

UCLA has landed forward Shareef O'Neal.

The son of retired NBA great Shaquille O'Neal signed a grant-in-aid to attend UCLA this fall. He will enroll in summer school this month.

The 6-foot-10, 220-pounder from Los Angeles played the last two seasons at Crossroads High in nearby Santa Monica. As a senior last season, O'Neal helped the school win the CIF Division II state title for the first time since 1997. He had 29 points, 17 rebounds and five blocks in the title game. O'Neal averaged 27 points as a senior while Crossroads finished with a 25-9 record.

UCLA coach Steve Alford says O'Neal brings a "terrific combination of size, skill and athleticism."

Knights at full tilt

UCF seeks to deliver encore performance with new coach

Central Florida is trying to follow up on its undefeated season with a new coach, a new defensive cornerstone and the same old high expectations.

The Knights head the list of Group of Five teams with reason for optimism this season.

UCF lost its coach when the lure of his alma mater prompted Scott Frost to return to Nebraska, though he stuck around long enough to coach the Knights in a Peach Bowl victory over Auburn. The Knights also must replace American Athletic Conference defensive player of the year Shaquem Griffin, who was drafted by the Seattle Seahawks in the fifth round.

They still have plenty of firepower. New coach and former Missouri offensive coordinator Josh Heupel inherits a group that includes star quarterback McKenzie Milton, who is making sure the Knights enter this season with the right attitude.

"Say you come off a winning year, teams might tend to get lackadaisical in the way they approach things," Milton said. "They might get complacent. That can't be us. We caught some teams off guard in the way we played, the way we won last year. We're not going to catch anybody off guard now. We're going to get everybody's best shot."

The Group of Five refers to conferences that aren't part of the Power Five (the Atlantic Coast Conference, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-12 and Southeastern Conference). It includes Conference USA, the MAC, the Mountain West and the Sun Belt, as well as the American Athletic Conference.

Here's a breakdown of top teams in each Group of Five conference heading into the season:

Arkansas State

Conference: Sun Belt
Notes: The Red Wolves have earned at least a share of the Sun Belt title five of the last seven years and are the preseason pick to win it again. Arkansas State had six first-team preseason all-Sun Belt selections and quarterback Justice Hansen was named

preseason offensive player of the year. Arkansas State went 7-5 last season and lost the Camellia Bowl in its seventh straight bowl appearance. Other Sun Belt teams to watch include defending co-champions Appalachian State and Troy.

Boise State

Conference: Mountain West
Notes: MWC preseason offensive player of the year Brett Rypien has thrown for 9,876 yards, the highest total of any active Football Bowl Subdivision player. The Broncos also return Alexander Mattison, who ran for 1,086 yards and 12 touchdowns last season as Boise State went 11-3 with an MWC title and a Las Vegas Bowl victory over Oregon. Boise State beat Fresno State in last season's MWC championship game, and those two teams figure to face off for the title again this year.

UCF

Conference: American Athletic
Notes: UCF owns a 13-game winning streak after ending last season as the lone unbeaten FBS team. UCF returns much of its offense from last season and is led by quarterback Milton, who finished eighth in the Heisman Trophy balloting last year. UCF figures to battle in-state rival South Florida for the East Division crown. The Knights' nonconference schedule includes a trip to North Carolina and home dates with Florida Atlantic and Pittsburgh.

Florida Atlantic

Conference: Conference USA
Notes: Lane Kiffin orchestrated a remarkable turnaround at

Florida Atlantic last season. FAU went from 3-9 in 2016 to 11-3 in 2017 and closed the year on a 10-game winning streak that included a Conference USA title and Boca Raton Bowl victory. Florida Atlantic has Conference USA's preseason offensive player of the year (running back Devin Singletary) and defensive player of the year (linebacker Azeez Al-Shaair). The schedule includes trips to Oklahoma and UCF.

Memphis

Conference: American Athletic
Notes: We've included two teams from the American, which has emerged as the strongest of the Group of Five leagues. Memphis loses star quarterback Riley Ferguson and receiver Anthony Miller from a team that went 10-3 last season, but Darrell Henderson is back after rushing for 1,154 yards and nine touchdowns a year ago. The Tigers figure to battle Houston and Navy for the West Division title. Memphis has only one game against a Power Five opponent, an Oct. 20 trip to Missouri.

Ohio

Conference: Mid-American
Notes: Although Ohio has reached a bowl game eight of the last nine seasons, the Bobcats haven't won a MAC title since 1968. This could be the year. Ohio went 9-4 and won the Bahamas Bowl last year with an offense that averaged 37.4 points. Quarterback Nathan Rourke rushed for 21 touchdowns last season, while running back A.J. Ouellette ran for over 1,000 yards. Ohio and Northern Illinois look like the MAC's top teams.

Cowboys, Prescott working on pass game

OXNARD, Calif. — Dak Prescott threw two interceptions just a few plays apart in a training camp practice, including an ill-advised pass across the field to a receiver just a few yards from the line of scrimmage.

Those picks, and the decisions that go with them, are under more scrutiny after the Dallas Cowboys' quarterback followed his remarkable rookie season with a somewhat pedestrian encore. And Prescott is among those doing the scrutinizing — each night at camp in the film room.

"When I go back, I'm being super-critical of myself, of the throws, of the placement, of where I should have went with the ball," Prescott said Sunday. "I'm tough on myself. So when I go back tonight, all of that was OK, it's got to be better and this is why it's got to be better. And I take my notes and I move forward."

With the release of three-time Pro Bowl receiver Dez Bryant and the retirement of 15-year tight end Jason Witten, Prescott is working with a revamped group of receivers and unproven batch of tight ends.

The resulting rough patches for the passing game after a week and a half in California aren't surprising, but notable nonetheless considering how the offense usually appears to be ahead of the defense with the Cowboys this time of year.

"The best teams I've been on are where it's back and forth all day and everybody is just competing and battling and no one really dominates the whole day," coach Jason Garrett said. "The other side competes back and challenges back and fights back. That's what we've had really throughout training camp."

There's a reality facing Prescott, though.

Two years ago, he set an NFL rookie record for passer rating and was voted the league's offensive rookie of the year for a team that finished with an NFC-best 13 wins. In 2017, the interceptions more than tripled (from four to 13), the passer rating dropped by almost 20 points and the Cowboys missed the playoffs at 9-7.

Some will point to running back Ezekiel Elliott's six-game suspension over domestic violence allegations, which started halfway through the season just as Prescott and the Cowboys were looking good enough for another playoff trip.

Others will remind of injuries that sidelined left tackle Tyron Smith for three games, a big reason the offensive line didn't live up to its reputation as one of the best in the league.
