## Elusive witness stalls murder trial

PANAMA CITY — A missing witness and a reluctant co-defendant in the deadly shooting of a 16-year-old Arnold High School student

during an alleged marijuana robbery plot has postponed the murder trial of two men, according to court records.

Demarcus Montrel Giddens, 22, and Gertavious Montrez Canada, 25, were scheduled to begin their trial Tuesday each on armed

robbery and felony first-degree murder charges. They were arrested in August 2017 after authorities arrived at the CVS at 7112 U.S. 98 (Back Beach Road) about midnight to find Jason Ian Price shot

PANAMA CITY BEACH — A man sought by authorities for allegedly impersonating a law enforcement officer in attempts to force unsuspecting victims into his car was arrested after a pursuit and wreck that jammed

traffic near the Hathaway Bridge.

Five people were taken to the hospital for treatment of minor injuries in connection with the crash, officials reported. The suspect, 45-year-old Terry Kenneth Guice, was uninjured and taken into custody, the Bay County Sheriff's Office reported.

Guice was wanted after he allegedly approached at least three people Sunday on the east end of the Beach, told

them he was a law enforcement officer and tried to force them into his car, saying they were under arrest. BCSO Chief Deputy Joel Heape said because of their uncertainty of Guice's intentions once he got a victim inside the car with him, officers could not risk Guice escaping.

“This is the guy we were telling everybody to look out for,” Heape said. “He was probably going to be a big threat to the public. We couldn't chance it.”

Heape said there also had

## Manafort guilty on 8 charges

**Judge declares mistrial on 10 other counts after jury deadlocked**

ALEXANDRIA, Va. — A jury found former Trump campaign chairman Paul Manafort guilty Tuesday on tax and bank fraud charges — a major if not complete victory for special counsel Robert Mueller III as he

continues to investigate the president's associates.

The jury convicted Manafort on eight of the 18 counts against him and said it was deadlocked on the other 10. U.S. District Court Judge T.S. Ellis declared a mistrial on those charges.

Wearing a black suit, Manafort stood impassively, his hands folded in front of him, and showed little reaction as the clerk read the word “guilty” eight

Today is **Wednesday, Aug. 22**, the 234th day of 2018. There are 131 days left in the year.

**Today's Highlight in History:**

On August 22, 1972, President Richard Nixon was nominated for a second term of office by the Republican National Convention in Miami Beach.

**On this date:**

In 1862, President Abraham Lincoln responded to Horace Greeley's call for more drastic steps to abolish slavery; Lincoln replied that his priority was saving the Union, but he also repeated his personal wish "that all men everywhere could be free."

In 1910, Japan annexed Korea, which remained under Japanese control until the end of World War II.

In 1956, President Dwight D. Eisenhower and Vice President Richard Nixon were nominated for second terms in office by the Republican National Convention in San Francisco.

In 1972, John Wojtowicz and Salvatore Naturile took seven employees hostage at a Chase Manhattan Bank branch in Brooklyn, New York, during a botched robbery; the siege, which ended with Wojtowicz's arrest and Naturile's killing by the FBI, inspired the 1975 movie "Dog Day Afternoon."

In 1978, President Jomo Kenyatta, a leading figure in Kenya's struggle for independence, died; Vice President Daniel arap Moi was sworn in as acting president.

In 1985, 55 people died when fire broke out aboard a British Airways charter jet on a runway at Manchester Airport in England. In 1986, Kerr-McGee Corp. agreed to pay the estate of the late Karen Silkwood \$1.38 million, settling a 10-year-old nuclear contamination lawsuit. The Rob Reiner coming-of-age film "Stand By Me" was put into wide release by Columbia Pictures.

In 1989, Black Panthers co-founder Huey P. Newton was shot to death in Oakland, California. (Gunman Tyrone Robinson was later sentenced to 32 years to life in prison.)

## EPA moves to dramatically cut regulation of coal power

WASHINGTON — The Trump administration moved to dismantle another major piece of President Barack Obama's environmental legacy on Tuesday, proposing to dramatically scale back restrictions on climate-changing emissions from coal-fired power plants even as it acknowledged that could lead to more premature deaths and serious illnesses.

The Trump plan broadly increases the authority given states to decide how and how much to regulate coal power plants. The Environmental Protection Agency said the move "empowers states, promotes energy independence and facilitates economic growth and job creation."

Bill Wehrum, head of the EPA's air office, said the administration rejects any suggestion the agency has a broad legal duty to combat climate change through regulation of power grids or promotion of cleaner energy.

"An important part of what we're doing here is getting us back into our lane," Wehrum said.

Environmentalists and other opponents said they expect legal challenges, arguing the Trump administration is abdicating its responsibilities under the Clean Air Act as set by Congress and the courts.

The Natural Resources Defense Council called the replacement proposal President Donald Trump's "Dirty

Power Plan."

The Trump administration is emphasizing "coal at all costs," said Gina McCarthy, EPA administrator when the Obama plan was developed.

"There is no other country in the world that is looking at coal as its future — they are all running to clean energy to save money, create jobs and save lives today and protect our children's future. Climate change is real," McCarthy said in a statement.

EPA officials said they could give no firm projections for the health effects of the Trump administration replacement plan because that will depend on what states decide to do in regulating power plants within their borders.

But models proposed by the agency estimate that under the

Trump plan, 300 to 1,500 premature deaths would be avoided a year by 2030. The Obama plan says 1,500 and 3,600 premature deaths would be avoided.

The models for the Trump plan also project tens of thousands of additional major asthma attacks and hundreds more heart attacks compared with the Obama plan, which has been hung up in the courts.

EPA called the Obama-era regulations on coal power plants "overly prescriptive and burdensome."

Combined with the EPA's proposal earlier this month to ease gas-mileage requirements for vehicles, the move may actually increase the country's climate-changing emissions, according to some former top EPA officials, environmental groups and other opponents.

## Microsoft uncovers more Russian hacking ahead of midterms

Microsoft has uncovered new Russian hacking efforts targeting U.S. political groups ahead of the midterm elections.

The company said Tuesday that a group tied to the Russian government created fake websites that appeared to spoof two American conservative organizations: the Hudson Institute and the International Republican Institute. Three other fake sites were designed to look as if they belonged to the U.S. Senate.

Microsoft didn't offer any further description of the fake sites, although it has previously outlined in court filings how this hacking group operated a network of fake sites designed to trick victims into installing malicious software.

The Russian Foreign Ministry said that Microsoft's report reflects a "witch hunt" in the U.S. The ministry said Tuesday that Microsoft's statement lacked any proof of Russian involvement because "there can't be any."

The revelation of new hacking efforts arrives just weeks after a similar Microsoft discovery led Sen. Claire McCaskill, a Missouri Democrat who is running for re-election, to reveal that Russian hackers tried unsuccessfully to infiltrate her

Senate computer network.

The hacking mirrors similar Russian attacks ahead of the 2016 election, which U.S. intelligence officials have said were focused on helping to elect Republican Donald Trump to the presidency by hurting his Democratic opponent, Hillary Clinton.


This time, more than helping one political party over another, "this activity is most fundamentally focused on disrupting democracy," Brad Smith, Microsoft's president and chief legal officer, said in an interview this week. The FBI said Tuesday it's aware of Microsoft's actions to disrupt the sites but the agency wouldn't provide details about whether it's working with the company to combat the hacking group.

Microsoft's court filing last week said the hackers "registered or used" the fake domains at some point after April 20.

Smith said there is no sign the hackers were successful in persuading anyone to click on the fake websites, which could have exposed a target victim to computer infiltration, hidden surveillance and data theft. Both conservative think tanks said they have tried to be vigilant about "spear-phishing" email attacks because their global pro-democracy work has frequently drawn the ire of authoritarian governments.

**Federal officials to Florida: No signs of Russian meddling**

Federal authorities have told Florida election officials that they saw no signs of any "new or ongoing compromises" of state or local election systems, a statement seemingly at odds with recent assertions by U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson of some Russian meddling.

A joint letter Monday by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Department of Homeland Security comes after the Democratic senator said earlier this month that Russians had penetrated the systems of certain Florida counties and "have free rein to move about" ahead of this year's election.

Russian hackers targeted at least 21 states, including Florida, during the last election.

**Officials: Man fleeing police fatally shot in New Hampshire**

A man who had previously fled from state police in Maine led New Hampshire officers on a car chase and died in a shootout, officials said.

Douglas Heath, 38, was wanted on several outstanding warrants, including one for trafficking narcotics and another for fleeing from Maine troopers, New Hampshire Attorney General Gordon MacDonald said.

Officers spotted Heath's car Monday afternoon and chased him for about 20 minutes before he crashed. Officials said Heath got out of the car, and there was an exchange of gunfire. Heath died at the scene, and a gun was found next to his body, MacDonald said.

**Aid groups urge Italy to allow 177 migrants to disembark**

Humanitarian groups urged the Italian government Tuesday to allow 177 migrants aboard an Italian coast guard ship docked at the Sicilian port of Catania to be permitted to disembark.

Doctors Without Borders, the U.N. refugee agency and Save the Children have all appealed to the government to let the migrants off the ship for humanitarian and medical reasons.

The Italian coast guard ship Diciotto arrived in Catania late Monday, but the Italian government won't let them off the ship until it has pledges from other European countries to take them, in the latest standoff over migrants being rescued at sea.

**Mental health exam could loosen restrictions for Hinckley**

The man who tried to assassinate President Ronald Reagan will soon undergo a new round of psychological tests before a court decides if he can live under fewer restrictions in a gated community in Virginia.

John Hinckley Jr. left a Washington mental hospital for good nearly two years ago to live with his mother in Williamsburg. A judge imposed a long list of conditions, including rules that dictate the frequency of Hinckley's doctors' appointments, his internet use and how far he can travel alone.

In an order issued on Friday, U.S. District Court Judge Paul L. Friedman authorized a doctor to "determine Mr. Hinckley's present mental condition and risk of dangerousness if unconditionally

released or conditionally released under the conditions proposed by the Department of Behavioral Health."

Rockets slammed into the heart of the capital of Kabul on Tuesday as President Ashraf Ghani delivered a speech marking a Muslim holiday, the latest in a series of brazen attacks that highlighted Afghanistan's deteriorating security.

No injuries were reported from the mortar rounds that hit in the diplomatic quarter; one struck near the presidential palace, another near a NATO compound and the U.S. Embassy, according to police official Jan Agha.

to death. However, with the recent disappearance of an “essential witness” in the trial and the refusal of a third defendant to cooperate, prosecutors have postponed the trial date of Giddens and Canada until September or October, court records show.

According to court records, an essential witness who was not identified had been “actively avoiding” being served with a subpoena as the trial date closed in. Despite law enforcement having leads on his whereabouts, he has yet to be located. Also, the third defendant in the case, 18-year-old Rodney Racquez Jones, has decided to not cooperate despite giving authorities an account of the entire incident, according to court records.

“Jones violated his plea agreement yesterday, August 16, 2018, by refusing to cooperate with the state,” prosecutors wrote. “This was unexpected since he already participated in sworn deposition which essentially exposed him to a life sentence.”

Instead of facing life in prison as a principal to murder, Jones had agreed

” Jones recalled. “I ain’t really think he was going to do it.”

to spend 20 years in prison in exchange for his testimony against Canada and Giddens.

In his sworn testimony given to the State Attorney’s Office, Jones told prosecutors he, Giddens and Canada — along with several others — made the four-hour drive to Panama City Beach from Auburn, Alabama, last August with no particular plan in mind or any hotel room booked. Jones said Giddens had brought a Draco AK-47 pistol in his backpack during the trip. After spending some time at the beach, Jones said his group met a group of Arnold High School students at the Taco Bell at the intersection of U.S. 98 and Thomas Drive, court records show.

Jones said he asked the group if he could buy some marijuana, and one of them made a call. As the group walked across Wildwood Road to the nearby CVS, Jones said Giddens hatched a plan to rob the students.

“D (Demarcus) was like, ‘Hey, look you know what I’m saying, I’m fixing to get them. I’m f\*\*\*d up, I’m fixing to rob them,’

According to his statements, Jones was around the side of the CVS “scaling up” or weighing some marijuana when he heard a scuffle and saw Giddens confront Price — who had arrived at the CVS moments before — with a firearm, putting the gun to his chest and pulling the trigger.

“I just heard D say, ‘You think this is a f\*\*\*\*\*g game?’ and then I heard the gun go pow,” Jones said. “As soon as he touched him with it, he dropped, boom, he dropped back, he said, ‘Ah, you shot me’ and dropped straight back.”

At the sound of the gunshot, Jones said he panicked and punched the male who delivered the marijuana, stealing his watch and his phone before fleeing with Giddens. All three men eventually were tracked down and taken into custody, where Jones, Giddens and Canada remain.

A tentative trial date has been scheduled for Sept. 24.

separate times. As through most of the three-week trial, Manafort showed no emotion as he looked at the six women and six men who convicted him.

President Donald Trump reacted to the verdict by denouncing Mueller’s investigation.

“Paul Manafort’s a good man,” the president told reporters in West Virginia. The verdict, he said, “doesn’t involve me but I still feel, you know, it’s a very sad thing that happened.”

He pointed out that the charges in Manafort’s case did not involve Mueller’s core mission of investigating Russian interference in the 2016 election and whether any Americans conspired with those efforts.

“This is a witch hunt that ends in disgrace,” Trump said.

# Ex-Trump lawyer pleads guilty in scheme

NEW YORK — Michael Cohen, President Donald

Trump's former personal lawyer and "fixer," pleaded guilty Tuesday to campaign-finance violations and other charges, saying he and Trump

arranged the payment of hush money to porn star Stormy Daniels and a former Playboy model to influence the election. Cohen's account

appears to implicate Trump himself in a crime, though whether — or when — a president can be prosecuted remains a matter of legal dispute.

The guilty plea came almost at the same moment former Trump campaign chairman Paul Manafort was convicted in Alexandria, Virginia, of eight financial crimes in the first trial to come out of special counsel Robert Mueller's sprawling Russia investigation.

In a deal reached with federal prosecutors, Cohen, 51, pleaded guilty to eight counts in all, including tax evasion and making a false statement to a financial institution. He could get about four to five years in prison at sentencing Dec. 12.

In entering the plea, Cohen did not name the two women or even Trump, recounting instead that he worked with an "unnamed candidate." But the amounts and the dates all lined up with the payments made to Daniels and Playboy Playmate Karen McDougal in the weeks and months leading up to the 2016 White House election.

Cohen, his voice shaky as he answered questions from a federal judge, said one payment was

"in coordination and at the direction of a candidate for federal office," and the other was made "under direction of the same candidate."

However, in the charging documents, a press release and comments outside the courthouse, prosecutors did not go as far as Cohen did in open court in pointing the finger at the president. Prosecutors said Cohen acted "in coordination with a candidate or campaign for federal office for purposes of influencing the election."

As cable networks were showing split-screen

coverage of the dueling conviction and plea bargain by two former loyalists, Trump boarded Air Force One in the afternoon on the way to a rally in West Virginia. He ignored shouted questions to reporters about both former aides, retreating to his private stateroom on the airliner.

After the court hearing, which ended with Cohen released on \$500,000 bail, the lawyer wiped away tears as he gazed out a courthouse window. He left the building and headed straight for a black SUV with tinted windows. A couple of people outside chanted, "Lock him up!" as they recorded the scene with their phones.

Under federal law, an expenditure to protect a candidate's political fortunes can be construed as a campaign contribution, subject to federal laws that bar contributions from corporations and set limits on how much can be donated.

### ATLANTA Atlanta, mayor touts project for Amazon

With Amazon.com expected to soon name its site for a second headquarters, Atlanta's mayor said a colossal development planned for downtown represents a once-in-a-lifetime shot to transform the city.

Amazon launched a high-stakes municipal beauty pageant in January by narrowing its list of potential locations to 20 finalists, including Atlanta. The company has said it expects to declare the winner of the headquarters and its roughly 50,000 jobs by year's end.

# Not so fast!

## Debate over longest bull market centers on rounding

NEW YORK — It could become the longest bull market ever ... perhaps with an asterisk.

S&P Dow Jones Indices, which compiles the benchmark S&P 500 index, and other research firms say the current bull market that began on March 9, 2009, is on track to become the longest in history on Wednesday, at 3,453 days.


Other market analysts say not so fast. They say this bull market would have to run until June 2021 to set the record, claiming the longest bull market ran 4,494 days between Dec. 4, 1987, and March 24, 2000.

The debate centers around whether a downturn in 1990 should be considered a bear market — generally accepted by stock market geeks to be a 20 percent decline from a previous high. It also involves the familiar mathematical concept of rounding.

In 1990, the S&P 500 declined 19.92 percent from July 16 until Oct. 11. The independent research firm CFRA says that period should be considered a bear market because the decline rounds up to 20 percent and because the market surrendered more than half of what was gained in the prior bull market, something that didn't occur in comparable market downturns.

By that reckoning, the bull market that ended on March 24, 2000, began on Oct. 11, 1990, and lasted 3,452 days — a record about to be eclipsed by the current bull market.

The other side of the argument holds that the 1990 decline was just a deep "correction" — which market watchers define as a decline of more than 10 percent but not quite a bear market — and

didn't put an end to the bull market that began in late 1987.

Those in that camp also say if the 1990 decline is considered a bear market, then so should other drops of 19-plus percentage points.

"We would never try to say that one 19%+ decline should be considered a bear market while another 19%+ decline shouldn't be," said analysts from Bespoke Investment Group, in a research note issued last week.

For instance, during the current bull market, the

S&P 500 fell 19.39 percent between April 29, 2011, and Oct. 3, 2011, but that decline is not considered by S&P Dow Jones Indices to be a bear market. (To be picky, none of the other 19-plus percentage point declines going back to World War II were 19.5 percent or greater, and by traditional rules of rounding would be rounded down to 19 percent.)

The Associated Press recognizes S&P Dow Jones Indices' conclusion that the current bull market is about to become the longest of all time.

# Animal crackers bust out of their cages

After more than a century behind bars, the beasts on boxes of animal crackers are roaming free.

Mondelez International, the parent company of Nabisco, has redesigned the packaging of its Barnum's Animals crackers in response to pressure from People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals.

PETA, which has been protesting the use of animals in circuses for more than 30 years, wrote a letter to Mondelez in the spring of 2016 calling for a redesign.

"Given the egregious cruelty inherent in circuses that use animals and the public's swelling opposition to the exploitation of animals used for entertainment, we urge Nabisco to update its packaging in order to show animals who are free to roam in their natural habitats," PETA said in its letter.

Mondelez agreed and started working on a redesign. In the meantime, the crackers' namesake circus — Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey — folded for good. The 146-year-old circus, which had removed elephants from its shows in 2016 because of pressure from PETA and others, closed down in May 2017 due to slow ticket sales.

The redesign of the boxes, now on U.S. store shelves, retains the familiar red and yellow coloring and prominent "Barnum's Animals" lettering. But instead of showing the animals in cages — implying that they're traveling in boxcars for the circus — the new boxes feature a zebra, elephant, lion, giraffe and gorilla wandering side-by-side in a grassland. The outline of acacia trees can be seen in the distance.

"When PETA reached out about Barnum's, we saw this as another great opportunity to continue to keep this brand modern and contemporary," said Jason Levine, Mondelez's chief marketing officer for North America, in a statement.

# Retirement fears, longevity and old friends

A major annual retirement survey was released this summer. Among its findings are the nine biggest fears that Americans have regarding retirement.

The greatest fear, shared by more than half of the respondents, is outliving one's savings and investments. A larger number

of those surveyed now see themselves living to age 90. A smaller but respectable percentage envision themselves as future centenarians. Bottom line? Our money must last longer as life expectancy increases. If Paul Simon was writing "Old Friends" today, he would change the age in the lyrics.

This is the overriding financial concern we all share in retirement. Of course, we need to begin addressing this issue decades before our actual retirement years. The survey did note that the average age that most Americans begin contributing to retirement accounts is 27. That's not bad.

Almost half of those surveyed fear the demise of Social Security. My own opinion is that Social Security will be there for us, with some potential changes, throughout our lifetimes. The voting bloc represented by Boomers is awfully strong. The

collapse of Social Security has been predicted annually since I began my practice more than two decades ago. Nothing to be gained by worrying about this issue, anyway, since it's beyond our control.

Three of the next four fears involve health-related issues: declining health that requires long term care; lack of access to adequate and affordable health care; and fear of cognitive decline, dementia and Alzheimer's disease. Health issues are the financial wild card in retirement planning. People rightfully fear the price tag of escalating health problems. We are also scared of living at less than our best, living in pain or becoming a shell of our former physical selves. In fact, according to many surveys, most of us fear being incapacitated or impaired more than we fear dying.

Folks often fear not one but a combination of these factors, even if they have amassed a significant nest

egg and are enjoying a nice annual income. One of the biggest challenges in retirement is accepting that we are never going to be as financially secure as we would like to be. Retirement means crossing the Rubicon from full-time employment to part-time work or none at all. Once we are there, things happen that we can't control. But planning well and taking care of our health can lead us in the right direction.

## Keep fighting toxic tides

If history repeats itself, the red tide plaguing a large swath of the inshore Gulf coast eventually will go away. The dead fish and other marine life that succumbed to the harmful algae will be removed from beaches and basins. The respiratory irritation experienced by humans will subside.

And legions of Floridians will forget the anger and dismay they now feel while viewing photographs and watching video of the impacts of red tide.

It happened after the 2005-06 red tide, one of the worst in Florida's recorded history, that resulted in a "dead zone" the size of Rhode Island on the Gulf bottom and caused massive losses of fish and marine mammals.

It happened after a two-year episode, from 1994 to 1996, and following the 1953-54 red tide that was, at the time, the longest on record.

As the blooms faded, so did the negative environmental and economic impacts that generated public outcry.

That's not to say steps aimed at reducing the intensification of red tide, a naturally occurring phenomenon, haven't been taken for the past three decades. They have occurred, and outbreaks have sometimes provided the impetus for incremental action.

But Florida continues to lack a science-based, fully funded plan for controlling pollution — from human-made nutrients — that, according to the scientific consensus, can fuel the inshore growth of microscopic red tide organisms that originally develop 10 to 40 miles offshore — not to mention its inland rivers and springs with their own algae problems.

One problem is that, in general, when red tide is out of sight (and out of smelling distance), it is out of the public's mind and, thus, not a political priority.

Another challenge is the complexity of the matter. There are different species of red tide algae; the bloom currently affecting the Florida west coast is known as *K. brevis*, or Florida red tide. The vastness of the Gulf, the length of Florida's coastline and the diversity of conditions on the mainland make it difficult to reach sweeping conclusions about causes and effects.

According to Sarasota-based Mote Marine Laboratory: "In contrast to the many red tide species that are fueled by nutrient pollution associated with urban or agricultural runoff, there is no direct link between nutrient pollution and the frequency or severity of red tides caused by *K. brevis*."

Not everyone in the scientific community agrees with the assertion that there is "no direct link." That said, Mote embraces the scientific consensus with this conclusion: "However, once red tides are transported inshore, they are capable of using man-made nutrients for their growth."

Regardless of red tide, this pollution should be dramatically reduced and water management practices dramatically overhauled.



## The truth behind Chicago's violence

The bloodletting in Chicago last weekend, with 74 people shot, 12 fatally, was enough to horrify even locals, who are relatively inured to chronic slaughter at the hands of gun-wielding felons. "Unbelievable," said state Rep. La Shawn Ford, a black Chicago Democrat who went so far as to call on President Donald Trump for help.

The shock was also evident beyond Chicago. Rudy Giuliani blamed Democrats in general and Mayor Rahm Emanuel in particular. The mayor's legacy, he tweeted, is "more murders in his city than ever before." Everywhere, there was agreement the city's mayhem is out of control and in urgent need of measures to contain it.

But don't believe the hype. There are not, in fact, more murders in Chicago than ever before. The number of homicides peaked at 920 in 1991. The death toll last year was 674 — down 15 percent from 2016. This year, even with the latest frenzy of shootings, the number of homicides is 25 percent lower than it was at this point in 2017.

These are real signs of progress, however tardy and insufficient. If this year's trajectory holds, it would mean some 280 fewer people dying violently this year than just two years ago. Another year on this trend line would put the city about where it was in 2013 — when the number of homicides hit the lowest level in 48 years.

Contrary to popular myth, cynically promoted by Trump and other outside critics, Chicago is not an exceptionally dangerous city. In terms of violent crime, it is less afflicted than a number of large cities, including St. Louis, Baltimore and New Orleans. Republicans blame unbroken Democratic control of Chicago for its mayhem. But partisan coloration is an unreliable indicator of crime patterns. Of the 10 states with the highest rates of violence, seven voted for Trump. Los Angeles, whose homicide rate is enviably low, has had only Democratic mayors since 2001.

One problem in Chicago is the dismally low number of homicides that police are able to solve — about 1 in 6. But the department's poor reputation among many of the people most at risk discourages the sort of cooperation from citizens that cops need to catch the killers.

The city's record of failing to discipline officers who resort to unjustified lethal force is corrosive.

Last year, WBEZ reported that since 2007, the city's Independent Police Review Authority had "investigated police shootings that have killed at least 130 people and injured 285 others" — and "found officers at fault in just two of those cases, both off-duty" incidents.

The Chicago Reporter provided additional evidence. "From 2012 to 2015, the city spent more than \$263 million on settlements, judgments and outside legal counsel for police misconduct," it found. If police want more help from the communities they serve, this is not the way to get it.

Despite these failures, the decline in homicides suggests the city and the department are doing something right. But what that might be is hard to determine with any confidence.

The fight against crime can't be restricted to more or better policing. Chicago's crime problem is concentrated in a small number of poor, blighted, mostly African-American neighborhoods. Those areas owe their plight largely to a sordid history of systemic, deliberate racial discrimination and violence, endemic poverty, and official neglect over decades.

#### Input wanted on fire assessments

I just received my 2018 proposed property taxes and non-ad valorem assessment fees summary.

For the most part, the various aspects of millage rate for the various entities that dig into our pockets annually to provide the services we have come to expect have varied little, although they continue to underlie and support the old axiom of "you only have to pay taxes and die."

One tidbit somewhat aggravates me, however, and that is the "Fire Service Assessment" for Springfield, but first a bit of history.

Back in the 2011-2013 time period, we had neither the fire assessment "fee" nor an ad-valorem tax, one of the few cities in Florida who could say that. However, your elected officials were confronted with a situation regarding the manning of our fire department. Don't get me wrong; we had (and still do have) an excellent department always ready to serve and save, but outside agencies deemed our manning, despite inter-agency agreements which had satisfied the letter of the law, too low. Given that our city fire rating was predicated on this report, the city elected officials had a major problem because individual home insurance premiums were,

in part, based on that fire rating. Had they not rectified the issue, citizens were faced with either an inability to get homeowner insurance or face significantly higher premium rates.

Having said all of that, after much internal debate and public meeting and input, the decision was made to initiate the fire assessment "fee" as opposed to generating an ad-valorem tax. An outside agency was contracted to compute just what that fee would be, and the rest is history as noted in the latest tax summary.

Shortly thereafter, though, an ad-valorem tax was also approved and levied, giving us, the citizens, double the

pleasure of digging deeper into our jean pockets.

Now, granted, what I pay is not going to send me to the poor house anytime soon and I would not expect the fire assessment to go away completely. On the other hand, though, I would certainly expect to see the fee diminish significantly for, after all, the new hires are in place and trained, the necessary gear to support them in hand and any annual maintenance and upkeep should be lower than the initial cost of the department expansion.

For the first time in a very long time we are seeing our city infrastructure improving. The mayor leaves no doubt that our tax dollars

are hard at work for those of us who pay those taxes.

With the public hearing on the topic of the fire assessment scheduled for Sept. 4 (5:30, City Hall) I would challenge each of you to attend and participate in voicing that the annual assessment should be lowered to reflect the imposition of the ad-valorem tax and the diminished need for the original fire assessment fee rate basis. Fair is fair as they say. Being an old country boy, I will always pay to play, but in the reality of my old age (mature, if you will) I'll fight all ya'll over even a penny more than needed and necessary.

# Ex-Nazi camp guard Palij, 95, deported to Germany

BERLIN — The last Nazi war crimes suspect facing deportation from the U.S. was taken from his New York City home and spirited early Tuesday morning to Germany, following years of efforts to remove him from the United States.

The deportation of the 95-year-old former Nazi camp guard, Jakiw Palij, came 25 years after investigators first confronted him about his World War II past and he admitted lying to get into the U.S., claiming he spent the war as a farmer and factory worker.

Palij lived quietly in the U.S. for years, as a draftsman and then as a retiree, until almost three decades ago when investigators found his name on an old

Nazi roster and a fellow former guard spilled the secret that he was “living somewhere in America.”

Palij, an ethnic Ukrainian born in a part of Poland that is now Ukraine, told the Justice Department he had Ukrainian citizenship. When their investigators showed up at his door in 1993, he said: “I would never have received my visa if I told the truth. Everyone lied.”

A judge stripped Palij’s U.S. citizenship in 2003 for “participation in acts against Jewish civilians” while an armed guard at the Trawniki camp in Nazi-occupied Poland and was ordered deported a year later.

But because Germany, Poland, Ukraine, and other countries refused to take

him, he continued living in limbo in the two-story, red brick home in Queens he shared with his late wife, Maria. His continued presence there outraged the Jewish community, attracting frequent protests during the years that featured such chants as “your neighbor is a Nazi!”

According to the Justice Department, Palij served at Trawniki in 1943, the same year 6,000 prisoners in the camps and tens of thousands of other prisoners held in occupied Poland were rounded up and slaughtered. Palij has admitted serving in Trawniki but denied any involvement in war crimes.

Last September, all 29 members of New York’s congressional delegation signed a letter urging the

State Department to follow through on his deportation.

Richard Grenell, the U.S. ambassador who arrived in Germany earlier this year, said President Donald Trump — who is from New York — instructed him to make it a priority. He said the new German government, which took office in March, brought “new energy” to the matter.

The deportation came after weeks of diplomatic negotiations.

Grenell told reporters that there were “difficult conversations” because Palij is not a German citizen and was stateless after losing his U.S. citizenship, but “the moral obligation” of taking in “someone who served in the name of the German government was accepted.”

## Witnesses: Deceit led to fatal shooting

PANAMA CITY — Suspicions of deceit apparently led a recently released convict to gun down his girlfriend inside a Lynn Haven home, witnesses told investigators in reports released Tuesday.

Steven Michael Hudson, 40, appeared in court Tuesday on a new charge of being a felon in possession of a firearm in

connection with the fatal shooting. He was arrested after Lynn Haven Police Department officers arrived about 5 p.m. Friday to 1216 Illinois Ave. to find 41-year-old Ashley Brooke Smith suffering from multiple gunshot wounds. Hudson is being held without bond at the Bay County Jail on an open count of

murder along with the firearm charge, court records show.

Hudson has declined to speak with The News Herald regarding the circumstances surrounding the shooting.

According to LHPD interviews, Hudson told two witnesses on the front porch of the home moments before the shooting that he felt he was being deceived by Smith, officers reported.

## JRA to design federal court facelift

PANAMA CITY — Architects were selected Tuesday to design the new federal courthouse in Panama City.

During its regular meeting, the Bay County Commission selected JRA Architects to design required renovations to the courthouse at 533 E. 11th St. in Panama City, which is the current Bay County Juvenile Courthouse. Juvenile justice operations will temporarily move to the former Panama City City Hall at the Panama City Marina and a new juvenile courthouse will be constructed by the county on the Bay County Courthouse campus.

JRA was chosen out of three firms. DAG Architects and VBA Design also were considered. The county and JRA will negotiate costs.

“We’re excited to finally get this thing moving. It’s going to be at a quick pace. We’ll be working with GSA to determine what needs to be done, if anything, to the courthouse, any type of renovations to meet their criteria for the federal courthouse,” Commissioner Robert Carroll said. “We had three applicants. They were all extremely high-qualified but (JRA) had the most courthouse experience. We needed someone that really had background in courthouse design and staff felt like they were the best one for this particular project.”

Bay County risked losing the courthouse but kept it after the community advocated for it to stay.

### East Avenue bridge project

The commission also approved agreements with other agencies to move forward on the East Avenue bridge replacement project. Commissioners approved a locally funded and off-system project agreement with the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) for right-of-way acquisition. Construction is expected to begin next year.

Right-of-way acquisition is estimated at \$123,100 and

## Gillum campaigns in Panama City

PANAMA CITY — Riding the wave of a sudden surge in polls placing him within single digits of the Democratic Gubernatorial front-runners, Tallahassee Mayor Andrew Gillum embarked on a whirlwind tour of North Florida on

Tuesday, covering from Pensacola to Jacksonville with stops in Panama City and Marianna.

With the sudden spike in popularity — Google searches for his name rose dramatically last week and are still climbing — Gillum’s tour is designed to put him in front of as many voters as possible, kicking off a bus tour in Tallahassee on Monday that will cover the entire state.

“Part of this bus tour is also to make sure that parts of the state that we have not been able to spend a significant amount of time that they know I’m a candidate and that I’m on the ballot too, competing for their vote,” Gillum said.

Speaking at the Glenwood Community Center, one of

# Judge blocks education ballot proposal

TALLAHASSEE — A Leon County circuit judge Monday knocked a proposed education constitutional amendment off the November ballot, saying the wording failed to inform voters of its impact on the creation of charter schools.

The proposed

amendment, placed on the ballot by the Constitution Revision Commission, would impose eight-year term limits on school board members and would require the promotion of “civic literacy” in public schools.

But the provision that drew a legal challenge from the League of Women Voters of Florida would

have allowed the state to operate and control public schools “not established by the school board,” wording that opponents said would have led to the expansion of charter schools. The proposal was aimed at overturning a 2008 appellate court decision that found the Legislature’s creation of a statewide commission to authorize charter schools

was unconstitutional.

“The failure to use the term voters would understand, ‘charter schools,’ as well as the use of a phrase that has no established meaning under Florida law, fails to inform voters of the chief purpose and effect of this proposal,” Circuit Judge John Cooper wrote in a 12-page ruling, removing Amendment 8 from the

Nov. 6 ballot.

Cooper called the challenged provision “a significant change” that was not explained by the Amendment 8 ballot summary, which is wording that voters would see when they go to the polls.

“The current Constitution and implementing laws provide district school boards the exclusive right to

make the initial determination of whether schools, charter or not, are needed and desirable in their counties,” Cooper wrote. “Without understanding the current role of school boards in approving new schools, voters cannot understand the important change they are making to local democratic control of education.”



under the agreements, local agencies are required to match 25 percent, which comes to \$30,775. The county will match \$10,258.34, and the City of Panama City and Port of Panama City each will

pay \$10,258.33. "The project has been designed. This is a good way for us to leverage our tax dollars," Carroll said. "This bridge is really in bad shape. The port is going to utilize it, the city is going to utilize it and the port is currently in an expansion mode, so they need that bridge for the additional traffic and jobs being created out there."

In other meeting news, the commission approved:

- A request from Bay County Sheriff Tommy Ford for \$67,000 from the Crime Prevention Fund to go toward crime prevention and safe neighborhood programs.
- Urging state legislators to prioritize estuary program funding in the Panhandle and throughout Florida.

three stops scheduled in Panama City, Gillum drove home his "everyman" image, reflecting on his working class roots in South Miami and remarking that he's the only non-millionaire in the race, with a net worth of about \$334,200 according to his financial disclosure documents. It's a message that seemed to land with

the older, largely African-American crowd at the community center, who encouraged him with a rousing chorus of "amen!" "I think he is awesome and I'm glad I got to see him for the first time," said resident Elaine Giffin. "I really think he's for the people. I really do." Gillum refreshed his stance on a statewide \$15 minimum wage, restoring voting rights to felons, and making it easier for those previously convicted of a crime to obtain employment.

"We're going to become a more forgiving state and become safer in the process," he told the crowd. With two decades having passed since the last Democratic governor, Gillum said it's time for the party to win again, not just for the name on the ballot but, "for those of us who lose when we lose these elections." "Everyday people need to be represented in this government," Gillum said. "Everyday people are the backbone of what is standing this state up." The Tallahassee mayor

has been fighting for recognition on a crowded Democratic ballot featuring former U.S. Rep. Gwen Graham — who represented Bay County in Washington — former Miami Beach Mayor Philip Levine, entrepreneur Chris King and billionaire Jeff Greene and had lagged far behind front-runners Graham and Levine until Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders stumped for Gillum at a Tampa rally on Friday. Despite the recent jump in polls, still looming over Gillum's campaign is an ongoing FBI probe into

corruption within the Tallahassee city government, news of which broke just a few months after Gillum announced his intentions to run for governor. Gillum said he believes any individual who has committed any wrongdoing in his government should be held "fully responsible" for their actions. "I don't have any fear for my government," Gillum said. "I think the City of Tallahassee has acted above the board. ... We are going to be completely cooperative as this

investigation whittles itself down to a close." Citing several other historic events from Aug. 28th past — Martin Luther King Jr.'s "I Have a Dream" speech in 1963, Barack Obama's nomination as the Democratic candidate for president in 2008, and others — Gillum urged those in attendance at the Glenwood center to head out to the polls next week and vote. "I want you to know that your vote means something and if you don't vote we can't win," Gillum said.

Federal officials: No signs  
of Russian meddling**

Federal authorities are telling Florida election officials they have not seen any "new or ongoing compromises" of state and local election systems.

The joint letter sent Monday by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Department of Homeland Security comes after U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson said Russians had penetrated the systems of certain counties and "have free rein to move about" ahead of this year's election.

Federal officials earlier said Russian hackers targeted at least 21 states, including Florida, ahead of the 2016 election.

Nelson, a Democrat, stuck by his comments even as Gov. Rick Scott, his Republican rival in this year's elections, pressed him for proof.

Scott issued a statement saying the agencies' letter shows Nelson was "irresponsible" and "reckless."

"Since 2000, I've been taking care of someone in my family who's had a mental illness," he said. "So I know how important these types of services are to the community."

In the fall, Emerald Coast Behavioral Hospital will offer an intensive outpatient program for adolescents ages 12-17. That level of care is currently offered only at Emerald Coast's satellite office in Fort Walton Beach, said Diane Kuepper, licensed clinical social worker.

"It would be nicer to have services closer for adolescents. It helps them stabilize after a hospitalization," Kuepper said.

The hospital will remain open, and continue to offer intensive outpatient programs for patients who have mental health and chemical dependency issues. The hospital also offers

"At one point, (one witness) states Steven stood up and said 'someone's not being 100 with me,'" officers reported. "He then walked inside the house and they heard two gunshots."

When one of the witnesses ran inside the home to investigate the gunshots, they went to the back bedroom shared by Hudson and Smith. There, in a chair in the corner of the room, the witness saw Smith slumped over, bleeding from two gunshot wounds. Hudson allegedly had a gun and was yelling while pointing it at his head, LHPD reported.

The witness "advised that she asked Steven if he shot Smith, but he did not answer," officers wrote.

Hudson then left the house in a truck before police arrived.

Several witnesses were in the home at the time of the shooting, and none told investigators that they heard "any kind of argument or yelling that came from the bedroom" in the moments before gunfire erupted, according to reports. They did, however, tell officers they saw Hudson fleeing afterward with the silver 9mm in his hand.

When police arrived, they found Smith in the same chair in the bedroom. She had a large amount of blood coming from a wound on her abdomen and a wound on her neck. A spent 9mm shell casing and numerous live rounds were in the room. Smith was unresponsive but breathing before being rushed to a hospital, officers reported.

A short time later, officers spotted Hudson driving back toward Lynn Haven in the truck he had fled in and stopped him. LHPD found the suspected murder weapon, a loaded silver 9mm Taurus, behind the passenger

seat of the truck, officers reported.

Officers took Hudson to the LHPD station where they interviewed him under oath, officers reported.

Hudson "did admit to shooting the victim at his residence and he also stated they had been dating a few months," officers wrote. "... While walking him to the patrol car, I received a phone call from Lt. Willoughby who informed me the victim succumbed to her gunshot wounds and was pronounced dead at the hospital."

Hudson then was charged with an open count of murder. He was released in February from prison after serving a three-year sentence on a felony fleeing and eluding charge. At one point in his court proceedings in that case, Hudson was deemed incompetent to stand trial because of a mental instability.

Hudson also was imprisoned once before for 30 days for burglary.

# Putnam portrays DeSantis as puppet

**Ag commissioner slams opponent in governor's race as riding president's coattails**

BRADENTON — GOP candidate for governor Adam Putnam portrayed his primary opponent as President Donald Trump's puppet during a campaign stop in Bradenton on Tuesday, saying Ron DeSantis doesn't have his own plan to lead the state.

"You can't afford to have a governor who calls

the White House every morning and says 'What are we going to do today, boss?'" Putnam said during a breakfast event at Theresa's Restaurant. "No, if you want to help our president make America great, the third-largest state has to be hitting on all cylinders."

"I know Florida best," Putnam added. "I have a plan."

With just a week before the Aug. 28 primary, Putnam is making a stronger effort to confront the key asset that has propelled DeSantis in the race: Trump's endorsement. Putnam's message: If voters look

beyond Trump's backing, they won't find much substance to DeSantis.

"My opponent's running on an endorsement," Putnam said. "No plan, no vision, no agenda — just an endorsement. Just hanging on to the coattails. It takes more than that to lead the state of Florida. You deserve better."

DeSantis campaign spokesman David Vasquez responded by saying it is "disappointing that Adam Putnam would disparage the president."

"Ron DeSantis is proud to have the endorsement of President Trump

because the president knows Ron is the best leader for Florida," Vasquez added. "From

issues like standing up to special interests and protecting our environment to cutting taxes and

creating more jobs, Ron is committed to securing Florida's future and working every day for the people of our great state."

Trump's involvement has upended the race and bedeviled Putnam, the state's agriculture commissioner and early favorite to win the GOP nomination. DeSantis, a congressman from Northeast Florida who graduated from Yale and Harvard Law School and served in the military, has surged to frontrunner status on the strength of Trump's support. The president even flew to Tampa recently to hold a rally for DeSantis.

# Video shows Rep. Hastings, a Democrat, joking about Trump drowning

Democratic Rep. Alcee Hastings of Florida on Sunday relayed to an enthusiastic audience a joke about President Donald Trump drowning in the Potomac River.

Hastings, speaking at a "Stronger Together" campaign rally in South Florida, said he had recently heard a joke from the son of a former state legislator.

"Do you know the difference between a crisis and a catastrophe?" Hastings said, according to video of the remarks on YouTube.

Quoting the joke's author, he answered, "A crisis is if Donald Trump falls into the Potomac River and can't swim," while "a catastrophe is anybody saves his a-."

Hastings emceed the event, according to the Sun Sentinel. Other guests included Democratic Sen. Bill Nelson and four of the five Democratic candidates for governor, the newspaper noted, though those figures had left by the time Hastings cracked his joke about the president, which he reserved for the end.

Hastings also asserted: "There is no question that something is tragically wrong with the president of the United States in his mind."

The 13-term congressman is no stranger to controversy. In 1989, he was removed from the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Florida when the Democratic-controlled House impeached him, and the Senate convicted, on charges of bribery and

perjury.

Hastings first attempted to resurrect his career in public service by running for secretary of state of Florida in 1990, losing in a three-way Democratic primary. He was then elected to the House in 1992, defeating his Republican opponent in the deep-blue district in southeast Florida after coming out ahead in a run-off in the Democratic primary.

In 2008, he apologized for incendiary comments about Sarah Palin, the then-GOP vice presidential nominee. In remarks on a panel at the annual conference of the National Jewish Democratic Council, Hastings had warned, "Anybody toting guns and stripping moose don't care too much about what they do with Jews and blacks. So, you just think

this through."

In 2011, a former congressional aide, Winsome Packer, filed a complaint against the United States Commission on Security and Cooperation in Europe, known as the Helsinki Commission, complaining that Hastings, its chairman at the time, had sexually harassed her. She was ultimately awarded \$220,000, while lawyers for Hastings argued that he was treated unfairly when moderately inappropriate comments were blown out of proportion.

Hastings' remarks are not the first time someone has insinuated harm to the president through discussion or depiction. Perhaps the most inflammatory incident during the Trump administration was Kathy Griffin's grisly photo shoot, in which

the comedian and actress posed holding a mask of Trump's severed head in May 2017. She apologized but was booted by CNN from her longstanding gig co-hosting the network's New Year's Eve program.

Hastings has been an outspoken critic

of Trump. In 2016, he referred to the then-GOP nominee as a "sentient pile of excrement," according to the Sun Sentinel. He boycotted the inauguration.

His office didn't return a request for comment Monday morning.



### JAKARTA, INDONESIA Liu breaks 50-meter backstroke world record

Liu Xiang swam a world-record time of 26.98 seconds to win the women's 50-meter backstroke gold medal on Tuesday night at the Asian Games. The 21-year-old Liu, who prefers swimming the freestyle, became the first woman to break 27 seconds in the event, lowering the record of 27.06 set by fellow Chinese swimmer Zhao Jing at the world championships in Rome in 2009 before the contentious rubberized suits were banned. "My main focus is actually the 50-meter freestyle," Liu said through a translator. "I didn't expect to break the world record at all. Because the focus is on freestyle, I didn't have any pressure. I could concentrate on my own performance."

### OTTAWA, ONTARIO Olympic skating medalist Osmond takes break

Olympic bronze medalist Kaetlyn Osmond will skip the upcoming figure skating season after becoming the first Canadian woman to win the world championship in 45 years. The 22-year-old Osmond had already decided to skip the Grand Prix circuit. The three-time Canadian champion announced Tuesday that her break would extend to the entire figure skating season. Along with her singles bronze at the Pyeongchang Olympics, Osmond was part of the Canadian squad that won team gold. She took the summer off to reflect on her future but plans to travel extensively this fall as part of the Thank You Canada Tour of figure skating stars. Also taking part in the tour are Olympic champion ice dancers Tessa Virtue and Scott Moir, pairs medalists Eric Radford and Meagan Duhamel, and three-time world champion Patrick Chan.

### CHICAGO Loyola nun Sister Jean celebrating 99th birthday

Sister Jean is celebrating her 99th birthday months after gaining national attention as chaplain of the Loyola-Chicago basketball team that reached the NCAA Final Four. The university held a campus party with students and school staffers Tuesday for Sister Jean Dolores Schmidt. The Catholic nun became a celebrity last March for her fandom and for praying before each game for her Ramblers — and for their opponents. Schmidt says her health is better some days than others as she's been recovering since last year from a broken hip. She received a number 99 basketball jersey and a birthday cake frosted in the team's maroon and gold colors. Players say they're still inspired by her example. Ramblers guard Marques Townes describes her simply as "Genuine, sincere, passionate, loving, caring, sweetheart."

Love ran for 2,118 yards and 8.05 per carry last season and was second to Baker Mayfield in the Heisman Trophy voting.

Oliver was a second-team All-American last year after being first team as a freshman in 2016.

Clemson and Wisconsin led the way with three players on the first team. Alabama and Wisconsin each had a total of five players on the first and second teams combined.

## Bryce Love hears the call of another season

STANFORD, Calif. — Bryce Love's unusual decision to return to Stanford after a season in which he was the Heisman Trophy runner-up might well be validated in December.

In fact, Love has already envisioned the ceremony. He can see himself walking on stage to receive the most coveted prize in college football.

But the decision to bypass the NFL draft after a 2,000-yard rushing season and play his senior year was not about individual awards. It was about getting his degree in human biology and spending another season with teammates. He calls the choice — staying in school vs. earning millions as a high draft pick — an easy one.

"It's going to be surreal," he said. "It's a big deal for me and my family, being a college graduate and being able to graduate from a university with this much prestige. It will be a blessing. Tears will fly."

Love's 2,118 yards last season are the most for an FBS player who returned to school the following year. Only one other player who reached 2,000 yards in a season and was eligible for the NFL draft decided to stay in school — Northwestern's Damien Anderson following the 2000 season.

Stanford coach David Shaw says he wouldn't have been surprised by whatever Love decided. He understands the legitimate arguments either way.

"In my heart of hearts, if I had to guess what he would have done, I would have guessed that he would have come back, just knowing what goals he has both in football and out of football," Shaw said. "I know he wanted to get stronger and be a little thicker, more prepared physically for the pounding of the NFL, and at the same time, I know what he wants to do off the field in his desire to go to medical school."

Love has made a career of doing what few have done, whether it's getting his pre-med degree in 3.5 years, returning to school when most others would have left or with his big-play production rarely seen in college football.

With vision that allows him to spot holes and sprinter's speed that makes him almost impossible to catch, Love made the spectacular seem almost routine last season. He set an FBS record with 13 runs of at least 50 yards.

"He's so quick, he's so fast, he's through the holes before you know it," said Stanford linebacker Bobby Okereke, who feels fortunate he has to face Love only in practice. "I remember one play in practice where he cut back in a hole and most guys make that a 5-yard gain. He made it a touchdown. That shows you how fast Bryce is."

# Florida expects quick fix on defense

GAINESVILLE — Florida linebacker David Reese remembers the low point of 2017 as well as any bone-jarring hit or tackle for loss.

It came on a cool day at Missouri in early November.

The Gators allowed 227 yards rushing, 228 yards passing and six touchdowns to the Tigers, who had lost their first four Southeastern Conference games by a combined 85 points.

There were tears and tantrums on Florida's sideline and in the locker room, the result of a two-week stretch that saw the program's usually stout defense surrender more than 900 yards and 87 points in consecutive losses to Georgia and Mizzou.

"It wasn't a good showing," Reese said.

It was a historically poor performance, exemplifying the team's worst defensive season in decades. The Gators allowed their most points per game (27.3) since 1946 and their most yards per play (5.7) since at least World War II. Simply put, it was the most stunning nose-dive taken by a Florida team filled with flaws under coach Jim McElwain.

Now, the Gators expect a quick turnaround in head coach Dan Mullen's first season.

"We just want to get that bad taste out of our mouths," Reese said.

Florida has reasons to believe the defense will return to normal this fall. The unit returns every starter outside defensive tackle Taven Bryan and cornerback Duke Dawson as well as well as their top four tacklers.

"Everybody played last year," defensive back Chauncey Gardner-Johnson said. "We know what's expected. We've been in big games. We've been in small games. We've just got to take advantage of it."

Florida also is counting on defensive coordinator Todd Grantham making a huge difference. Grantham has a recent history of quick fixes, including at Mississippi State last season. The Bulldogs improved from 93rd in scoring defense in 2016 to 26th in 2017, and jumped from 110th in total defense in 2016 to 10th.

Grantham enjoyed similar improvements at Louisville (2014-16) and at Georgia (2010-13).

"The biggest thing we always talk about on defense is playing to our identity, which we say is fast, physical and aggressive," said Grantham, who has installed a 3-4 scheme filled with blitzes. "And coaching is a part of developing that identity because really it gets down to habits. We're not where we need to be yet, but our guys have embraced trying to develop the habits we need to be that kind of defense."

Also aiding Brees: A defense can't throw anything at him he hasn't seen — again and again.

"I understand that I don't have a whole lot of time left," says Brees, who'll be 40 in January and whose contract expires after the 2019 season. "You've got to work and have high expectations and sacrifice and do maybe even more now than I ever have."

**Andrew Whitworth, Rams left tackle** — Whitworth was a stud for Cincinnati for 11 seasons, but the Bengals must have believed he was through in 2016 because they let him walk as a free agent. Now 36, he comes off an All-Pro first year in which the Rams were dominant on offense.

Despite all those years in the trenches, Whitworth looks as sharp and powerful as the day

he came out of LSU in 2006. He has a shot at his first Super Bowl with a supremely talented roster around him.

**Julius Peppers, Panthers defensive end** — Like Brees, Peppers will someday wind up with a bust in Canton, Ohio. At 38, he's no longer an every-down player, but he's an every-day leader.

Peppers can provide ample force as a pass rusher if he's mixed in efficiently, something Carolina is quite good at with its D-line. That's essential in the league's best division, facing Brees and Matt Ryan twice a season.

**Terence Newman, Vikings cornerback** — Now this is really impressive: a DB who will be 40 before the season kicks off, yet can handle the speed- and agility-based duties in an increasingly fast-paced game.

Newman enters his 16th pro season — he was the fifth overall selection by Dallas in 2003 — and this will be his fourth

year in Minnesota. The league's oldest defensive player likely will see some time at safety on a game-changing defense.

To see any time at all in an NFL secondary at such an advanced age is stunning.

**Vernon Davis, Redskins tight end** — Once among the elite tight ends of the NFL, Davis remains at 34 enough of a force on the field and a positive influence off it to be a factor for Washington. He averaged 15.1 yards a reception for the Redskins a year ago, third best in his distinguished career.

**L.P. Ladouceur, Cowboys long snapper** — At 37, this is his 14th year with the Cowboys; how many fans would recognize the Canadian in Big D without his jersey on?

Long snappers always are unsung, fitting the cliché of only getting noticed when they mess up. Ladouceur almost never does, and he's now the longest-tenured Cowboy with Jason Witten retired.

## ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

"One of the pleasures of middle age is to find out that one was right, and that one was much righter than one knew at, say, 17 or 23."

Today's deal features a maneuver that every declarer should have at his disposal.

Imagine that you play it in three no-trump on the lead of the spade jack. Naturally, you put up the queen. In the unlikely event that East wins the ace and returns the suit, you will duck once, win the third spade and try to set up clubs without letting West on lead. You will be able to accomplish this whenever East has three clubs or with quite a few of his possible doubletons. For example, if West has any three clubs including the four, he will have to follow with that card on either the first or second round of the suit, and you can simply cover that card and keep him off play.

Curiously, the reverse logic applies if the spade queen wins trick one. Now you have to set up clubs without letting East on lead, if possible, which might be more difficult than it looks if East has three clubs.

It is crucial to maximize your entries to hand by leading the heart queen to your king and then a low club toward dummy's honors. When West plays the 10, you win the king and follow up with dummy's low heart to your jack. Now you lead a club, ducking West's queen. East cannot overtake, and West cannot broach spades from his side, so he will get off play with a red suit.

Whatever he does, though, you have one spade trick, one diamond, three hearts and four clubs, making nine tricks in total.







### SUMMER SOUP

For a refreshing way to kick off a summer meal, try this Cantaloupe Soup recommended by Johns Hopkins Medicine.

- 2 cantaloupes
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger

# Chicken salad cravings

**Victoria's Last Bite prepares 500 salads of chicken salad weekly**

LYNN HAVEN — Chicken salad is a crowd pleaser for all ages — on a flaky croissant, a bed of lettuce or part of a cool school lunch with crackers.

"Some customers buy a half-pint of chicken salad for lunch and eat it with a fork. A mom and her little girl were over here yesterday and she said she only eats chicken salad at lunch," said Judy Tinder, who co-owns Victoria's Last Bite with Vickie Cook.

Victoria's Last Bite, 832 Florida Ave., is open for lunch from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday and also delivers lunch to area schools.

"We serve 30 to 50 pounds a day here," Tinder said. "I think it's the consistency and that there's a crunch to our chicken salad, the crunch of the pecans and the celery."

The half combo — a cup of soup and half sandwich with Zesty Cucumber or Creamy Pasta salad — is the biggest seller. Some get the chicken salad on croissant topped with tomato and lettuce. Others like a layer of cucumber salad and almond slivers.

"We'll give them whatever they want on it," said Tinder, who added Cook likes her chicken salad on a croissant sprinkled with French's Crispy Fried Onions.

"There's a lot of different ways to eat chicken salad."

I tried a sample bite with zesty cucumber slices, and the sweetness of the cucumber complemented the richness of the chicken salad. My quarter-sandwich on croissant was over the top with the onions — rich and salty with even more crunch, though I preferred the cucumber.

Tinder's daughter, Kathy, added, "I like a slice of pineapple on mine."

She also sometimes eats a couple of scoops with cucumber.

- 1 medium russet potato, peeled and finely grated
- 1/2 t granulated garlic
- 1/2 t freshly ground black pepper
- 1/2 t salt

Break up the meat with a fork in a large bowl. Add the potato, garlic, black pepper and salt. Mix thoroughly with the fork.

Shape into four patties. Heat a large cast iron skillet over

medium-high heat and add the burgers to the pan. Let burgers cook until there is a nice browned sear.

Flip the burgers and cook to your desired level of doneness. Serve on toasted buns with favorite toppings.

#### Salmon Burgers

If you've never tried a salmon burger, give these a try. An added bonus is a healthy dose

of omega 3s.

- 1 16 oz. can boneless/skinless salmon, drained and flaked
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1/4 t Old Bay seasoning
- 1 T lemon juice
- 1 T chopped fresh parsley
- 2 cloves garlic, grated
- A few grinds black pepper
- 1/2 cup bread crumbs
- 1 T minced red onion
- 2 to 3 T vegetable oil

In a medium bowl, lightly mix all ingredients (except vegetable oil) with a fork.

Heat oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Shape into four patties and place into skillet. Cook, occasionally turning, until burgers are cooked through, about 3 to 4 minutes per side. Drain on a paper towel-lined plate.

Toast the buns and serve with your favorite lettuce and tartar sauce.





"We use it a lot at catering," Cook said. "It's wonderful served in a little phyllo tart shells."

## Commercial kitchen

Food for Victoria's Last Bite is prepared across the street at their commercial kitchen next to Roberts Hall.

"At 10 o'clock, the truck pulls up and all the food is unloaded for lunch," Tinder said. "As soon as everybody at lunch is finished, April Tate starts boiling chicken for more chicken salad."

After customers fulfill chicken salad cravings at Victoria's Last Bite, the commercial kitchen cranks up its daily preparation of 100 pounds of chicken salad to meet the demand in local grocery stores.

"We currently sell it in all Grocery Outlets in Bay County, and also, we are one of only two locations in Bay County that have earned our USDA-approved status in meat processing — us and Johnson Meats," Tinder said. "We have inspectors at our commercial kitchen where the chicken salad is made every single day. This status also allows us sell our product wholesale nationwide. We currently have no plans to do this because we believe one of our greatest selling features is that there are no preservatives in our product."

Chicken salad is delivered fresh daily — in slightly overfilled half-pound and 1-pound tamper-proof containers — to the grocery stores.

"It's in all the Grocery Outlets — Callaway, Lynnville, St. Andrews and Lynn Haven — this one sells the most of

it," said Tinder, who also is a Lynn Haven city commissioner. "You have to be USDA inspected on meat when you lose control of it and it goes into stores. The 'sell by' is seven days from the day it's made, but it can be eaten seven days after that as long as it's refrigerated."

## Behind-the-scenes

The front of the chicken salad facility is a storage area, which they plan to turn into "Victoria's Chicken Coop" storefront with all of their salads, chicken paraphernalia and ice cream. Tinder and Cook also were required to build an office with a landline for the local USDA inspector, where he stores his white coats.

"The local inspector is there every day, and the regional comes quarterly — with his white jacket and hard hat," Tinder said. "They treat this small operation the same way they treat a chicken plant that has 2,000 employees."

Before I could enter the commercial kitchen, I had to don a disposable hair net and white coat. Employees, such as April Tate, wore blue jackets, denoting they were

working with the cooked chicken.

"April wears green when cleaning and red when working with raw chicken," Tinder explained. "So whenever an inspector stops in, he knows where we are in the process based on what color we're wearing."

Even the chicken has to sport a coat.

When the individually-sealed packages of frozen chicken are carried out in cardboard boxes from Grocery Outlet to the facility, they must be covered with an 8-by-10 blue tarp.

"We have to take the temperature of the chicken frozen, then six hours later after it's cooked, and when it's in the cooler," Tinder said.

Tate has worked with Tinder and Cook for 13 years — long before the restaurant celebrated its four-year anniversary in March.

"I started with catering and then started at the cafe. From there I went to behind-the-scenes in this kitchen," said Tate, as she picked the rib meat off the cooked, split chicken breasts.

This entire process — from boiling chicken in six large

pots to picking it off the bone and separating it into pans, takes five and a half to six hours. The cooked chicken then goes in the cooler.

"We use the broth that we cook our chicken in; that's what goes in our chicken and dumplings," Tinder said.

When it's time to mix up the chicken salad, a Robot Coupe grinds the chicken before it's added to a large steel bowl — which Cook purchased from Treasure Ship after it closed.

"We mix in pecans, celery and salt with mayonnaise. Then it's done and we package it up," Tinder said. "All the ingredients are on the label, but the person who puts the chicken salad together has the exact recipe."

They make four 25-pound batches each day they're open — resulting in 500 pounds of chicken salad each week.

"We go through 40 gallons of mayonnaise a week and 54 stalks of celery a week," Tinder said.

Thirty pounds of pecans, pre-chopped from Pensacola, last less than two weeks.

"We had to get letters of guarantee on the chicken from Sanderson Farms, certificates from the mayonnaise producer and salt, and letters of guarantee on the dishwashing detergent and bleach — everything that comes in contact with the chicken — to say that it's all safe for us to be able to say 'USDA inspected,'" Tinder said. "We also have to send in samples every month to be listeria tested."
