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Fish kill in PCB prompts worries

Very low levels of red tide have been detected, not necessarily related to fish kill

PANAMA CITY BEACH — Between Beach Access 45 and Beach Access 50, dozens of dead fish washed up on the

beach Sunday. “About two o’clock we all ate sandwiches, and we came back down here, and it was just everywhere,” said Adam Brown who is vacationing from Arkansas. “It happened within 30 to 45 minutes.” Hours earlier, a commercial fisherman took a video of those same fish floating by the MB Miller County Pier, saying there were “dead fish

for miles.” It wasn’t nearly as dramatic as the fish kill that marked the red tide’s presence in Tampa Bay over the weekend, but still Brown couldn’t help but wonder if that might be the culprit. Fish kills can be a sign of red tide, causing some to worry Tropical Storm Gordon may

Dead tiger shark prompts investigation

PANAMA CITY BEACH — An 8-foot tiger shark left dangling with a hook in its mouth from the Russell-Fields Pier Saturday night has officials trying to figure out how it got there and if it was a criminal action. A photograph of the shark hanging from the pier with a bird’s nest worth of fishing line from its mouth briefly circulated on Facebook Sunday, prompting outrage as tiger sharks are a protected species and harvest is prohibited in state waters. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission is looking into the incident, according to public

information officer Rebekah Nelson, and the Beach is reviewing their tapes of the pier to see if that will offer answers, according to Will Spivey the Panama City

Beach aquatics and beach superintendent. “We’re trying to figure out what happened,” Spivey said. See SHARK, A5

‘Wake-up call’: 9/11 prompted some to move away to new lives

NEW YORK — On 9/11, Stephen Feuerman saw the World Trade Center aflame through the window of his Empire State Building office and watched, transfixed, as a second fireball burst from the twin towers. He ran through the 78th floor urging everyone to get out, thinking their skyscraper could be next. With transit hubs shut down, he couldn’t get home to his family in suburban Westchester for hours. Among the dead were someone he knew from college and people he recognized from his commuter train. Feuerman had always seen himself as a New Yorker, but “everything changed that day,” he says. Shaken by the experience, the apparel broker and his wife put their home

on the market weeks later. Within four months, they and their two small children moved to a gracious South Florida suburb they figured would be safer than New York. So it was until this past Valentine’s Day, when mass violence tore into Parkland, Florida, too. “There really is no safe place,” says Feuerman, whose children survived but lost friends in the massacre that killed 17 people at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School. 

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TODAY IN HISTORY

Today is **Tuesday, Sept. 11**, the 254th day of 2018. There are 111 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On **Sept. 11, 2001**, on America's single-worst day of terrorism, nearly 3,000 people were killed as 19 al-Qaida members hijacked four passenger jetliners, sending two of the planes smashing into New York's World Trade Center, one into the Pentagon and the fourth into a field in western Pennsylvania.

On this date:
In 1297, Scottish rebels led by William Wallace and Andrew Moray defeated English troops in the Battle of Stirling Bridge during the First War of Scottish Independence.
In 1789, Alexander Hamilton was appointed the first U.S. Secretary of the Treasury.
In 1857, the Mountain Meadows Massacre took place in present-day southern Utah as a 120-member Arkansas immigrant party was slaughtered by Mormon militiamen aided by Paiute Indians.

In 1936, Boulder Dam (now Hoover Dam) began operation as President Franklin D. Roosevelt pressed a key in Washington to signal the startup of the dam's first hydroelectric generator.
In 1941, groundbreaking took place for the Pentagon. In a speech that drew accusations of anti-Semitism, Charles A. Lindbergh told an America First rally in Des Moines, Iowa, that "the British, the Jewish and the Roosevelt administration" were pushing the United States toward war.

In 1967, the comedy-variety program "The Carol Burnett Show" premiered on CBS.
In 2003, actor John Ritter died six days before his 55th birthday at Providence St. Joseph Medical Center in Burbank, Calif. — the same hospital where he was born in 1948.

In 2007, a new Osama bin Laden videotape was released on the sixth anniversary of 9/11; in it, the al-Qaida leader's voice is heard commemorating one of the suicide hijackers and calling on young Muslims to follow his example.
In 2012, a mob armed with guns and grenades launched a fiery nightlong attack on a U.S. diplomatic outpost and a CIA annex in Benghazi, Libya, killing U.S. Ambassador Chris Stevens and three other Americans.

have brought the toxic algae with it from South Florida.

On Friday, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) reported finding "very low" levels of *Karenia brevis*, the organism that causes red tide, in a water sample from St. Andrew Bay. At the levels detected, the organism can cause possible respiratory irritation or shellfish harvest closures, according to FWC.

FWC is currently having partners collect water samples and shipping them to their lab in St. Petersburg for further analysis.

"It may be a couple of days before we know whether or not this fish kill was related to red tide," said FWC public information officer

Michelle Kerr. "It is difficult to speculate what caused this fish kill based off of photos alone."

In the meantime, FWC is asking people to report any fish kills to Fish Kill Hotline at 800-636-0511 or submit a report online, or download the free FWC Reporter app to your mobile device.

If the fish kill does turn out to be a red tide, it's hard for scientists to predict what the extent of it could be or how long it will last. It would be the area's first red tide since 2015.

In South Florida, however, this summer has been marked by a particularly intense red tide that currently extends from Collier County north to Pinellas County, covering about 120 miles of coastline.

In addition to fish kills, larger marine animals such as manatees, dolphins and whale sharks have been died as a result of the toxic algae



paralyzing the creatures' nervous systems.

For humans, the impacts are less extreme. Red tide releases a toxin that can cause respiratory irritation. For most people, the irritation is mild, but for people with chronic respiratory conditions such as emphysema or asthma, a red tide can cause serious illness.

In most cases, it is still

safe to swim during a red tide — which is often a patchy occurrence with some beaches showing the impacts of an algae, while a beach not even a mile away may be totally free of the organism — but FWC does caution people to use common sense.

"Swimming is safe for most people. However, the Florida red tide can cause some people

to suffer skin irritation and burning eyes," FWC wrote on their FAQ page. "If you are particularly susceptible to irritation from plant products, avoid an area with a red tide bloom. If you experience irritation, get out of the water and thoroughly wash off. Do not swim among dead fish because they can be

associated with harmful bacteria."

The red tide has drawn attention in the Senate race between Gov. Rick Scott and Sen. Bill Nelson as some feel human influence, mainly runoff from big sugar, may have worsened the red tide.

The next report from FWC on red tide will be issued on Sept. 12.

Admin. orders closure of Palestinian office

WASHINGTON — The Trump administration ordered the closure of the Palestinian diplomatic mission in Washington on Monday and threatened sanctions against the International Criminal Court if it pursues investigations against the U.S., Israel, or other allies. The moves are likely to harden Palestinian resistance to the U.S. role as a peace broker.

The administration cited the refusal of Palestinian leaders to enter into peace talks with Israel as the reason for closing the Palestinian Liberation Organization office, although the U.S. has yet to present its plan to resolve the Israel-Palestinian conflict. The Palestinians accused the administration of dismantling decades of U.S. engagement with them.

Shortly after the State Department announcement, President Donald Trump's national security adviser, John Bolton, launched a broadside against The Hague-based International Criminal Court. Bolton declared that the ICC "is already dead" to the U.S. He also threatened the court and its staff with sanctions if it proceeds with investigations into alleged war crimes by American troops in Afghanistan.

The closure of the PLO office — the latest in a series of moves targeting the Palestinians — was centered on the fact that no "direct and meaningful negotiations with Israel" are

underway despite previous warnings, the State Department said. It said the decision was also in line with U.S. law, a reflection of congressional

concerns and consistent with U.S. policy to oppose and punish Palestinian attempts to bring Israel before the ICC. The administration had told

the Palestinians last year that closure was a distinct possibility unless they agreed to sit down with the Israelis. It has yet to release its own much-vaunted but largely unknown peace plan although it said it still intends to do so.

Instead of heeding the warning to resume talks, "PLO leadership has condemned a U.S. peace plan they have not yet seen and refused to engage with the U.S. government with respect to peace efforts and otherwise," State Department spokeswoman Heather Nauert said in a statement. "As such, and reflecting congressional concerns, the administration has decided that the PLO office in Washington will close at this point."

Bolton followed up in his address to The Federalist Society, a conservative, Washington-based think tank.

"The Trump administration will not keep the office open when the Palestinians refuse to take steps to start direct and meaningful negotiations with Israel," he said. "The United States supports a direct and robust peace process, and we will not allow the ICC, or any other organization, to constrain Israel's right to self-defense."

Palestinian official Saeb Erekat said the move was "yet another affirmation of the Trump administration's policy to collectively punish the Palestinian people, including by cutting financial support for humanitarian services including health and education."

The Palestine Liberation Organization, commonly

known as the PLO, formally represents all Palestinians. Although the U.S. does not recognize Palestinian statehood, the PLO has maintained in Washington a general delegation office that facilitates Palestinian officials' interactions with the U.S. government.

The closure was just the latest move the administration has taken against the Palestinians and in favor of Israel.

Just last month, it canceled more than \$200 million in aid for projects in the West Bank and Gaza as well as the remainder of its planned assistance for the U.N. agency that helps Palestinian refugees around the Middle East. Over the weekend, it announced it would cut \$25 million in assistance for hospitals in east Jerusalem that provide critical care to Palestinian patients.

Trump recognized Jerusalem as Israel's capital and moved the U.S. Embassy there, from Tel Aviv, in May. That led Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas to break off contact with U.S. officials for what he called pro-Israel bias, and the opening of the new embassy was met with large Palestinian protests in which dozens were killed.

"The United States continues to believe that direct negotiations between the two parties are the only way forward," spokeswoman Nauert said in her statement. "This action should not be exploited by those who seek to act as spoilers to distract from the imperative of reaching a peace agreement."



CHARLESTON, W.VA. Audit: West Virginia Supreme Court skirted pay law

A new legislative audit report says West Virginia's Supreme Court skirted state law concerning pay for senior status judges.

News outlets report the audit released last week found 10 senior-status judges were authorized overpayments. State law prohibits them from making more than active circuit judges. The audit said that to circumvent the law, Supreme Court officials began converting senior status judges from employees to independent contractors.

The audit by the Legislative Auditor's Office Post Audit Division also pegged renovations for Supreme Court offices between 2012 and 2016 at \$3.4 million,

including \$1.9 million for the five justices' chambers.

ROME Health authorities investigate pneumonia outbreak

Health authorities in northern Italy are investigating whether bacteria — including the one that causes Legionnaires' disease — inhaled from the water supply is behind an outbreak of pneumonia that has afflicted nearly 150 people.

Experts said Monday that a single contamination but spread out over several towns and villages in Brescia was likely responsible since the cases were mostly reported in a short timeframe, not the usual person-to-person transmission that would drag out during a typical outbreak.

At least two of the cases reportedly involved victims

with Legionnaire's disease — a severe form of pneumonia that is usually caused by inhaling droplets from a contaminated water source such as air conditioning systems or cooling towers.

OKLAHOMA CITY Zookeeper accused of targeting big cat rescue group

The operator of a Florida-based animal sanctuary says she was the target of an Oklahoma zookeeper who was indicted last week on federal murder-for-hire charges.

Carole Baskin of Big Cat Rescue said she's clashed in the past with Joseph Maldonado-Passage, who goes by the nickname "Joe Exotic."

"He's been threatening me for many, many years," Baskin told The Oklahoman after Maldonado-Passage's arrest last week.

SACRAMENTO, CALIF. California aims to drop fossil fuels for electricity by 2045

California has set a goal of phasing out electricity produced by fossil fuels by 2045 under legislation signed Monday by Gov. Jerry Brown, who said the policy should serve as a model for other states and nations.

Brown, who has positioned California as a global leader in the effort to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, approved the measure as he prepares to host a summit in San Francisco of climate change leaders from around the world starting Wednesday.

The new law, along with an executive order Brown signed directing California to take as much carbon dioxide out of the air as it emits, represent the latest in a string of ambitious environmental initiatives

as California seeks to fill a void left by President Donald Trump's decision to withdraw from the Paris climate accord and his efforts to boost the coal industry.

BELGRADE, SERBIA Serbian president's praise of Milosevic triggers outrage

The Serbian president's praise of Slobodan Milosevic as a "great" leader triggered outrage on Monday in neighboring states where his nationalist policies in the 1990s caused bloodshed and destruction.

In his keynote speech while visiting Kosovo's Serbs on Sunday, Aleksandar Vucic called for peace and reconciliation with Kosovo Albanians, but also praised former Serbian leader Milosevic.

It seems likely, based on comments from people who say they were there when the shark was caught, that its death was an accident.

The shark was cut down from the pier early Sunday morning and sunk. On Monday,

Panama City Beach lifeguards were joined by a private diver and tasked with recovering the carcass from the murky waters.

While the lifeguards were out in the water, a group of fisherman watched the spectacle from the end of the pier. One of the fishermen said he was there when the shark caught, and another, Gary Brown, said he was the one that caught it.

Both men said Brown hooked up on "a rope" on the bottom, and spend half an hour reeling in the shark. Brown said the shark was already dead when he landed it — and likely dead before he hooked the rope. Brown said he left the shark dangling so the lifeguards could retrieve it.

"There's no story here," he said.

Sharks have been known to fight literally

to the death when caught, but at present there's no way to verify Brown's story.

The lifeguards retrieved the body of the tiger shark in question and dragged it to shore, where a gaggle of tourists took pictures with the juvenile female, measuring 8 feet 3 inches. The shark was brought to NOAA for an autopsy, according to Spivey.

Tiger sharks have been prohibited from harvest

in state waters since January 2012, according to Nelson.

"The change got its start in 2010, after concerned citizens, shark researchers, and shark anglers expressed their desires to the Commission to see increased protections for sharks," Nelson wrote in an email. "Research conducted outside of the FWC also indicated that tiger shark populations in the

Northwest Atlantic and the Keys are declining.

"Florida waters are also essential habitat for young sharks," she wrote.

To keep protected sharks safe, FWC offers numerous shark fishing tips. Prohibited species should be released immediately and unharmed, left in the water as much as possible, and not brought onto a vessel, pier, bridge or dry land beyond the surf zone.

The Sept. 11, 2001, terror attacks prompted the Feuermans and an uncounted number of others to quietly move away from their lives near the hijacked-plane strikes that killed nearly 3,000 people in New York, the Pentagon and a Pennsylvania field.

Some sought a place where they could feel safe. Some placed a new importance on living near family. Others simply re-evaluated what they wanted from life.

As the attacks' 17th anniversary approaches, The Associated Press caught up with several people who left and asked: Have they found what they were looking for?

"It really made us have a wake-up call"

About 30 weeks a year, Scott Dacey drives from his home near New Bern, North Carolina, to Washington for a few days. The 350-mile trips are a price the federal lobbyist pays for peace of mind after Sept. 11.

He and his wife, Jennifer, were rooted in Washington before the attacks. He was a former federal official lobbying on Native American and gaming issues. She'd grown up nearby, though her parents had moved to North Carolina.

Then came the strike on the Pentagon, the paralyzing feeling of not knowing what might happen next, the weeks of watching military aircraft patrol around their suburban Virginia home.

"It really made us have a wake-up call: 'How do we want to live our lives?'" Scott says. "Do we want to be up here in this rat race of Washington, D.C.?" Or raising kids somewhere that didn't feel so on-guard, somewhere closer to family in times of crisis?

The choice wasn't simple, particularly for a lobbyist. The couple's 2002 move to the New Bern suburb of Trent Woods meant extra costs, including a Washington apartment and a then-advanced phone system to make sure Scott wouldn't miss clients' calls to his office there. Jennifer, already a lawyer, had to take a second bar exam in North Carolina.

Friends suggested the Daceys were over-reacting. And it was an adjustment, going from career-focused, on-the-go Washington to the gentler pace of eastern North Carolina.

But it also opened unexpected opportunities. Scott is a county commissioner and ran for Congress; a Republican, he never considered seeking office in Democratic-leaning northern Virginia. Jennifer is a community college trustee and serves on other local boards.

And their children, 17 and 15, grew up in a town repeatedly ranked among

the state's safest.

"It would not be for everybody, but for us, it's been the right fit," Jennifer says. "We're outside the bubble, and this is how America really lives."

"You're only going to change your life when things are bad"

Michael Koveleski isn't afraid of taking risks. His Christian faith gives him confidence he'll be OK if he does what's right, and he's a motivational-book reader who thrives on "tenacious optimism."

He needed plenty of it after he and his wife, Margery, left New York in the wake of 9/11 with four children and no work lined up.

New York and church had brought the couple together in the 1980s: she a Haitian-American from Brooklyn, he a white art student from Massachusetts. By 2001, he was a furniture designer for a platform-bed shop, she a mom and frequent school volunteer. They had a small house and a full life.

After 9/11, though, Michael sensed emotional burnout surrounding him at his lower Manhattan workplace, while security measures lengthened his commute from Queens and devoured his time with the children. Two months later, American Airlines Flight 587 crashed near the Koveleskis' home, killing 265 people. There had to be a better way to live, the couple thought.

The next spring they moved to Springfield, Ohio, where they had church friends.

If a better way, it wasn't always smooth. It was initially a challenge for the Koveleskis' children to be the new, mixed-race kids in an area less diverse than Queens. And Michael struggled to find work in the shaky post-9/11 economy. A man who'd adhered to healthy eating, he found himself grateful for \$5 pizzas that could feed the family, which now includes five children. It took eight years or so before he made what he had in New York.

But when he did, he made it at his own business, Design Sleep, a shop selling natural latex mattresses and platform beds. His wife and older children sometimes help out at the shop, which has

quadrupled in size during its 14 years.

"You're only going to change your life when things are bad — or terrible," Michael says. "Our thing was 9/11, starting over with nothing. ... I am thrilled at the way it came out to be."

"This is the place I had the dream to come to"

Georgios Takos rides through northern Wyoming in his Greek-food truck with a souvenir New York license plate on the wall, a reminder of the place he once thought would bring his American dream to life.

Growing up in Greece, Takos longed to live in the America he saw in movies, the America where everyone wanted to go. He was elated when he arrived in New York City in 1986.

There were tears in his eyes as he left 15 years later, days after 9/11 shattered his sense of safety and his impression of his adopted hometown.

"This wasn't the America I remember when watching those John Wayne movies back home ... the place it was when I first arrived," he thought.

He headed for restaurant work in Arizona, then California, where he met his wife, Karine, a teacher. She persuaded him one summer to visit her home state of Montana.

There, and now in the couple's new hometown of Powell, Wyoming, he found the America he'd imagined — the wide-open West, the feeling of freedom.

As Takos launched his food truck, the Greek Station, Westerners largely embraced "the New York Greek guy." And Takos embraced Wyoming — "the real America," he says, where he finds life less rushed and people more caring.

"This is the place I had the dream to come to 40 years ago," he says.

Heather and Tom LaGarde loved New York and didn't want to leave, even after she watched the twin towers burn from their rooftop.

They felt at home living on Manhattan's then gritty-artsy Lower East

Side. She worked at a human rights organization and he, a former player with the Denver Nuggets and other NBA teams, ditched a Wall Street job to found a roller basketball program for neighborhood kids.

So at first, the ramshackle North Carolina farm they spotted online in 2002 was only an occasional getaway. They'd started to want one after worrying about their 1-year-old daughter's health in the 9/11 smoke. They had no intention of moving back to North Carolina, where Heather had grown up and her 6-foot-10-inch husband had been a UNC basketball star.

But over time, "we were very unmoored by 9/11," Heather says. "Even though I wasn't physically harmed, just to see it that close changes your perspective. ... Your priorities change."

So in 2004 the LaGardes

moved into their farm near small-town Saxapahaw with two children, a few months' consulting work for Heather and no more of a plan than to keep their eyes open.

One day they saw someone tearing down a nearby barn. That led to starting an architectural salvage company, which led to starting a popular free music series and farmers' market at an old mill that was being renovated. Which led to starting the Haw River Ballroom, a music venue in a mill building, and founding a humanitarian innovation conference held in the ballroom.

"We try to echo some of what we loved" in New York, Heather says, "but living in an easier, simpler, more natural place."

"This could have happened anywhere"

Fresh from dropping off his 16-year-old

daughter last month for the first day of her junior year at Marjory Stoneman Douglas, Stephen Feuerman still thinks his family made a good move after 9/11.

He's sensitive to what his daughter and 18-year-old son, now a college freshman, have been through. But he also appreciates the community where they got to grow up.

"We've had a good life here," he says. "And again, this could have happened anywhere."

In fact, he appreciates Parkland all the more since the tragedy. It introduced him to neighbors he'd never met and plunged him into a whirlwind of events and advocacy on gun laws and other issues. He marvels at the support that has poured into his hometown, and he's proud of its residents' activism.

WASHINGTON Ford: Hatchback won't be made in US despite tweet

Ford won't be moving production of a hatchback wagon to the United States from China — despite President Donald Trump's claim Sunday that his taxes on Chinese imports mean the Focus Active can be built in America.

Citing Trump's new tariffs, Ford on Aug. 31 said it was dropping plans to ship the Focus Active from China to America.

Trump took to Twitter Sunday to declare victory and write: "This is just the beginning. This car can now be BUILT IN THE U.S.A. and Ford will pay no tariffs!"

But in a statement Sunday, Ford said "it would not be profitable to build the Focus Active in the U.S." given forecast yearly sales below 50,000.

Eye of the beholder

After Moonves, CBS takeover possible in new media landscape

NEW YORK — The resignation of longtime CBS chief Les Moonves won't likely lead to drastic changes in network programs, but it could make the company ripe for a takeover as traditional media companies compete with upstarts such as Netflix and Amazon.

Moonves was ousted Sunday, just hours after the New Yorker detailed more sexual misconduct allegations against him. A dozen women have alleged mistreatment, including forced oral sex, groping and retaliation if they resisted him. CBS is on the hook for \$120 million in severance if its investigation, being conducted by two outside law firms, finds no evidence of wrongdoing. Moonves has denied wrongdoing.

CBS also shook up its board and settled a larger fight with its parent company, National Amusements Inc. As part of the settlement, National Amusements agreed not to push for a merger between CBS and sibling company Viacom for at least two years. As CEO, Moonves had opposed such a merger on grounds CBS was doing well, while Viacom was not.

The network was struggling when Moonves took over as entertainment chief in 1995. He quickly turned things around and churned out shows appealing to the older, more tradition-bound CBS audience — broad-appeal sitcoms such as "Two and a Half Men" and "The Big Bang Theory" and procedural dramas such as "CSI: Crime Scene Investigation" and "NCIS." "Survivor" was an early reality show hit, and continues to this day. Moonves became CEO of CBS Television in 1998 and CEO of the newly created CBS Corp. in 2006 after it split from Viacom.

Moonves' temporary replacement, Chief Operating Officer Joseph Ianniello, has steered top projects such as stand-alone streaming services for CBS and the Showtime cable channel. But he doesn't have a creative or sales background, which might make him an awkward long-term leader for the company.

For now, Ianniello is unlikely to make drastic changes in programming, particularly since CBS' formula has been working. Programming changes could be more substantial if CBS chooses someone outside the company as a permanent replacement.

B. Riley FBR analyst Barton Crockett said CBS could remain successful without

Moonves. He noted the continued success of other networks that have lost top executives to sexual misconduct claims, including Roger Ailes and Bill O'Reilly at Fox News and Matt Lauer at NBC News.

"Strong performance can continue even when a vaunted, tainted star departs," Crockett said. "These groups have deep talent pools."

A broader question is whether CBS will remain standalone company at all.

To better compete with tech companies such as Netflix, companies that have traditionally distributed TV shows and movies have been buying the producers of such programs. The producers, themselves, have been consolidating as well. AT&T bought Time Warner for \$85 billion in June, while Disney is in the process of acquiring the entertainment assets of Fox for \$71.3 billion.

That makes CBS a hot commodity. With the shake-up of its board, there are 11 independent directors and two affiliated with National Amusements, down from three. One of the new directors, Candace Beinecke, is a lawyer with expertise in mergers and acquisitions. National Amusements agreed to give "good faith consideration" to any offer the new board deems good for shareholders.

Stocks break losing streak

U.S. stocks broke a four-day losing streak Monday as industrial companies and retailers rose. Technology companies recovered some of their steep losses from last week.

Transportation and other industrial companies continued their recent rally and retailers like Nike, Home Depot and Walmart all climbed. While technology companies rose overall, Apple fell after saying a new round of bigger U.S. tariffs could push it to raise prices.

CBS slipped after it announced the departure of longtime CEO Les Moonves, and Alibaba skidded after the big Chinese internet retailer said co-founder Jack Ma will step down as chairman in 2019.

The European Union's chief negotiator said the bloc might be able to reach a deal with Britain by early November. The British pound jumped.

Investors expect the U.S. to put new tariffs on Chinese imports soon. The Hang Seng index in Hong Kong fell again Monday after President Donald Trump again threatened to tax almost everything the U.S. imports from China. The index has tumbled almost 20 percent since late January as the dispute has escalated.

Randy Frederick, vice president of trading and derivatives for Charles Schwab, said investors feel China has much more to lose in the conflict than the U.S. does, as it exports much more to the U.S. than it imports from it.

"If Chinese businesses and Chinese consumers get uncomfortable with this whole battle, they get nervous and they get tentative," he said. "When people do that, they stop spending."

Nike rose 2.2 percent to \$82.10. The stock slumped 3 percent Aug. 31 as investors worried about potential backlash to an advertising campaign featuring former San Francisco 49ers quarterback Colin Kaepernick. Nike's stock has now regained almost all the ground it lost since then.

Technology companies moved higher as Microsoft picked up 1.1 percent to \$109.38 and Broadcom rose 3.5 percent to \$240.61. The S&P 500 technology index is coming off its largest weekly loss since March.

Apple fell 1.3 percent to \$218.33 after it might raise prices on some of its products, including the Apple Watch and the Mac mini, in response to the tariffs.

The Trump administration could soon announce tariffs on \$200 billion in goods imported from China and has threatened more taxes after that. The administration has already imposed tariffs on \$50 billion in Chinese products, which Beijing matched.

China promises retaliation if US imposes more tariffs

BEIJING — China on Monday promised retaliation if U.S. President Donald Trump escalates their tariff battle, raising the risk Beijing might target operations of American companies as it runs out of imports for penalties.

The threat came after Trump said Friday he was considering extending penalties to an additional \$267 billion of Chinese products in their battle over Beijing's technology policy. That would be on top of \$50 billion of goods already hit by 25 percent duties and another \$200 billion on which Washington is poised to raise tariffs.

"If the United States insists on imposing another

round of tariffs on Chinese products, China will definitely take countermeasures to safeguard its legitimate rights and interests," foreign ministry spokesman Geng Shuang said.

Geng gave no details, but the government said in June it would impose unspecified "comprehensive measures" if necessary. That left American companies on edge about whether Beijing might use its control over the heavily regulated economy to disrupt their operations by withholding licenses or launching tax, anti-monopoly or other investigations.

China matched Washington's first round of tariff hikes on \$50 billion of its goods, but their lopsided trade balance means Beijing is running out of imports for retaliation. The United

States imported \$3 of Chinese goods last year for every \$1 of American goods bought by China.

Chinese leaders agreed in May to narrow that trade gap by purchasing more American soybeans and other products. But they reject Trump's demand to roll back official industry plans such as "Made in China 2025," which calls for state-led creation of global champions in robotics, artificial intelligence and other technologies.

Washington, Europe and other trading partners argue those plans violate Beijing's market-opening pledges. Market-officials worry they might erode U.S. industrial dominance. But Communist leaders see them as China's path to prosperity and global influence.

He's done calling Dunn

'The pain never ebbs. The tears never dry. But they are proof that my brother, Rob, mattered'

Last week, a California man was arrested for threatening to assassinate journalists at the Boston Globe newspaper.

In a series of phone calls, the suspect lashed the Globe for its editorials critical of Donald Trump and parroted a phrase often bellowed by the President: "You're the enemy of the people."

There was a time when I might have read about such a case and assumed the person was just another fuming, rambling misfit, all bluff.

I don't think that way anymore. Now, a story like this is desolately chilling.

Two months ago, a man with a shotgun walked into the office of a small Maryland newspaper and murdered five people.

The newspaper is the Capital Gazette in Annapolis. Gerald Fischman, the 61-year-old editorial page editor, was one of the shooter's victims. Another was a longtime sports writer named John McNamara, who was 56. A third was Becky Smith, 34, a sales assistant new to her job.

A fourth victim was Wendi Winters, a popular writer and columnist. She was 65. Survivors said she yelled and ran at the killer, trying to stop him from entering the newsroom. Her actions likely gave several staffers time to hide.

The other name on the list of dead was my only brother Rob, an editor and columnist for the paper. He was 59.

I mention him last because that's what he would have wanted. He also would have wanted me to write more about his colleagues than about him, but I didn't know them personally.

I wish I had.

So many compelling tributes to Rob have been published since his death that there seems little to add. He was six years younger than I am, but every spark of shining talent was his own. There was nothing I could have taught him - and much I could have learned from how he approached his life and craft.

Although he stood 6'5", it was his kindness and dryly tuned wit that filled the room. As Jimmy DeButts, one of his colleagues, recalled:

"If you were lucky enough to have a minute with Rob, you were the only person in his universe. ... You mattered. You were special. You were important."

He and I never worked at the same paper. I stayed here at the Herald, while Rob's



path took him to the Palm Beach Post, the Baltimore Sun and, finally, the smaller Capital Gazette, where he became an assistant editor and wrote a column.

He had misgivings about joining management, but I knew he'd be terrific in his new role, and I told him so.

He hated the idea of firing anyone, as editors occasionally must do, but even more difficult was enacting the broader staff layoffs that have hobbled almost every newsroom in the country. That part of the job made Rob sick to his stomach, literally.

What he truly loved about his work was putting out the news for the residents of Anne Arundel County in Maryland. It was basic hometown journalism, joyfully pure.

The Capital Gazette - often just called The Capital - is one of the nation's oldest papers. In recent days, it has covered the burial of Sen. John McCain at the Naval Academy, a student art contest celebrating the life of abolitionist Frederick Douglass and a deadly wrong-way car accident on Route 50.

I assure you that the reporters and editors who worked on those stories aren't "enemies of the people." My brother wasn't, either.

Whether you're covering the White House or the local school board, your job as a journalist is essentially the same: Get as much of the truth as you can, and present it in a meaningful way to important participants in a democracy.

As an editor, Rob wanted to see thorough, informed reporting and clear, sharp writing.

Nothing aggravated him more than fact errors and misspellings.

Rob wasn't as caustic and jaded as I am, and his style was more personal. The last column he sent to me was about our mom, who passed away two summers ago. It was poignant and funny, but it choked me up so much that the best I could manage was an email reply:

"That's truly a wonderful piece, man. It's really all I can say right now. God, I miss her, too."

Four weeks later, Rob was dead.

The twisted little creep who killed him and his colleagues

held a long grudge against The Capital, the details of which had no connection to any of the victims. In 2011, the man pleaded guilty to harassing a woman, and the newspaper had accurately reported the circumstances.

A flaky libel suit that the stalker filed had long ago been tossed out of court, but he continued threatening staff members online. I recall Rob mentioning it to me once or twice; he sounded concerned, but then the threats abated.

On June 28, the day of the murders, the shooter mailed letters to The Capital's former attorney, a judge and an appeals court. In the letters, which arrived after the crime, the shooter declared he was heading to the newspaper to kill everyone there.

I know enough about my brother's final moments to realize I don't want to know any more.

He and I chose a career that in these times requires writing about mass shootings in ghastly detail and with sickening frequency.

When my brother and I discussed these tragedies, we spoke not as hard-bitten reporters trying to analyze a hideous crime, but as fathers trying to figure out what kind of a country we were leaving to our children, and their children.

Rob was murdered on his wife's birthday. He had placed Maria's gift on the dining room table before driving to the newsroom for the last time.

Now our family is part of the fast-growing, long-grieving community of those whose lives have been torn apart by gun violence. Every spouse, parent, sibling or child of a victim has soul-wrenching stories to tell, like ours, about the beloved and irreplaceable person they've lost.

The pain never ebbs. The tears never dry. The awful cosmic questions never get answered.

My brother wasn't shot because he was in the wrong place at the wrong time. He was shot because he was exactly where he was supposed to be, where he wanted to be, editing a newspaper on deadline for the readers in a town he loved.

He was shot because he was a journalist and for no other reason.

PANAMA CITY — Employees at Berg Steel Pipe are grateful they were able to save a co-worker's life using an automated external defibrillator (AED), and today they are set to be honored for it.

Back in July, the co-worker fell unconscious and others at Berg Steel rushed in to save him. They performed CPR and used the AED to bring him back to life.

For their efforts, the Panama City Fire Department plan to give the group a Citizen Life Saving Award today. The employees who helped the man spoke with local media Monday about their efforts.

"I heard a hard hat hit the floor and then I heard

moaning and groaning," said Wade Miller, who first found the unconscious man and works at Berg Steel through a staffing service. "I went down to the stall and he was laying on the floor underneath the stall, so I pulled

him out into the hall. I said, 'Call 911.' Everyone came in and started helping and it was a group effort."

After Miller got other people's attention, supervisor

PCB planning board approves hotel

PANAMA CITY BEACH — The Panama City Beach planning board approved the development of a hotel on Front Beach Road — with conditions — as some residents expressed traffic and safety concerns.

In May, the St. Joe Company and Key International announced plans for a joint venture for a resort hotel with 252 rooms, pool and event spaces on St. Joe property at 16010, 16018 and 16006 Front Beach Road. A timeline for the project has not yet been set, according to Dan Velazquez, Vice President of Asset Management for St. Joe, but they hope to start before next summer.

First, they need to get city permissions, the first hurdle of which they cleared Monday.

The board approved the request for the large site development with the following conditions: developers supply a copy

of the lease agreement for the use of a nearby area for parking; a revision of parking plans to include pedestrian paths; verification of all sidewalks will be set at a minimum of 6 inches in width; developers show vehicle cross connection points from the parking area to a nearby property on the East to make sure future developments are connected; landscaping plans will meet or exceed city standards.

Board member Mark Sheldon said planning members have considered safety, in regards to the development.

Resident Brent Compton said he has no issue with the development of the hotel, but he did have concerns about traffic.

"I'm concerned it will overflow the area with people and traffic," he said. "It's going to put a burden in that area."

Another resident, Dave Everest, said he is

BLOTTER: 1 HAND IN THE WINDOW WORTH 2 SHOTS IN THE AIR

FOUNTAIN — It's hard to blame someone for losing their cool when they see a hand sticking in the window by their air-conditioning unit.

Deputies investigating a possible burglary were told by the resident that he and his wife were relaxing when they "saw a hand reaching into the bedroom window beside the a/c unit," the deputy wrote. "He then grabbed his gun and told the person reaching in the window he will shoot him. He then ran out the back door and fired 2 warning shots."

The man got an OK look at the truck and his wife confirmed his story, saying she was the one who initially heard a noise by the AC unit. She said she saw the curtains "moving back and forth and seen a hand. She screamed 'it's a hand' and ran out of the room," the deputy wrote.

The vehicle is described by several witnesses to being very similar to one driven by a friend who lives nearby — and who was involved in "an altercation early in the evening at a wedding."

The couple told the deputy it could be their friend playing a joke, but when deputies contacted the man he said it was not him and even let deputies take pictures of his shoes to compare to tracks outside the residence.

In the end, the complainants told the deputy they were quite sure it was their friend who had his hand in the window, but "they did not want to press charges on a lifelong family friend."

Another fine meth

PANAMA CITY — A fidgety passenger and a talkative driver ended up getting themselves into a big meth recently.

A Bay County sheriff's deputy on routine patrol pulled over a vehicle after he said it crossed over the center line "numerous times" and did not have a working front right blinker. The deputy observed a woman driving and a male passenger she identified as her boyfriend, saying they were headed to her friend's house.

"During the traffic stop she was very talkative," the deputy wrote. "He kept his head down and smoked numerous cigarettes. His body language came off as if he as nervous."

A Springfield police officer arrived with his K9, which alerted to the presence of drugs on the passenger side where the man had been sitting.

"A search of the vehicle yielded no narcotics," the

deputy wrote. "I advised the passenger that I was going to search him due to the positive alert of narcotics on his side of the car. He tensed up and asked me, 'wait what is going on.'"

The deputy said the man "reached into his pants pocket grabbing a pack of (opened) cigarettes" and "then threw the pack onto the hood of my car."

Inside the pack of cigarettes, the deputy said, was a baggie of methamphetamine. "He stated the methamphetamine was not his," the deputy wrote, adding, "After being placed under arrest, he asked for 'one of my cigarettes,' referencing the pack in which the methamphetamine just came from."

The man is charged with possession of methamphetamine.

"Shoplifting are we?" "Yes."

PANAMA CITY BEACH — Deputies on patrol were handed an easy one last week

and likely wish everyone was as cooperative.

Responding to a report of shoplifting from a store, deputies were told the manager saw a man "placing some chips" inside a backpack he was wearing.







Travis Underwood ran to get HR since he knew something was wrong. Numerous people pitched in to help, including Torlid May, who performed CPR. The incident was not May's first time performing CPR.

However, it was his first day at Berg Steel.

"I did compressions," May said. "I didn't even think twice about it. All of us were a collective effort. We were all there for a good reason."

Storeroom supervisor Michael Sexton also recalled his reaction to the scene.

"The first time, he didn't come to," Sexton said. "The second time, we prayed for him and went through the CPR. The second time when he shocked, he came back to us."

Environmental health and safety manager Tim Lister, who helped administer shocks, credits the happy ending with the AED training they received. The group also called 911 and met fire department

personnel when they came to help. Underwood said he never experienced anything like it.

"I freaked out. I'm seeing the guy turn purple," Underwood said. "He stopped breathing. I tried to remain as calm as possible but I was running around like a wild man, trying to do what I can to save his life."

Panama City Fire Chief Alex Baird said the incident shows why businesses should have AEDs on hand and train employees how to use it. Seeing a group come together to save a man's life is remarkable, Baird said.

"I have to applaud Berg Steel for understanding the importance of having AEDs on site," Baird said. "If it weren't for the AED and these employees knowing what to do that day, more than likely the employee would have passed away that day."

Citing a medical study, the City of Panama City said in a statement survival from cardiac arrest doubled when bystanders stepped in to use a publicly-available automated external defibrillator rather than wait until emergency responders arrived.

Florence strengthens to Category 4

RALEIGH, N.C. — Florence exploded into a potentially catastrophic Category 4 hurricane Monday as it closed in on North and South Carolina, carrying winds up to 140 mph (220 kph) and water that could wreak havoc over a wide stretch of the eastern United States later this week.

Communities along a stretch of coastline that's vulnerable to rising sea levels due to climate change prepared to evacuate the storm, which forecasters expect to be close to Category 5 strength by Tuesday. The South Carolina governor ordered the state's entire coastline to be evacuated starting at noon Tuesday and predicted that 1 million people would flee. And Virginia's governor ordered a mandatory evacuation for some residents of low-lying coastal areas.

The storm's first effects were already apparent on barrier islands as dangerous rip currents hit beaches and seawater flowed over a state highway.

For many people, the challenge could be finding a safe refuge: If Florence slows to

a crawl just off the coast, it could bring torrential rains to the Appalachian mountains and as far away as West Virginia, causing flash floods, mudslides and other dangerous conditions.

The storm's potential path also includes half a dozen nuclear power plants, pits holding coal-ash and other industrial waste, and numerous hog farms that store animal waste in massive open-air lagoons.

Airlines, including American and Southwest, have started

letting passengers change travel plans that take them into the hurricane's possible path.

National Hurricane Center Director Ken Graham warned that Florence was forecast to linger over the Carolinas once it reaches shore. People living well inland should prepare to lose power and endure flooding and other hazards, he warned.

"It's not just the coast," Graham said. "When you stall a system like this and it moves real slow, some of that rainfall can extend well away from the center."

concerned about the hotel having a crosswalk and the idea the hotel will add more traffic to Front Beach Road.

Robert Carroll, of McNeil Carroll Engineering, Inc. delivered the plans for the project to the board. He said developers will look into setting up a pedestrian

crosswalk near the hotel.

"We're in the business of making sure people are safe," he said.

The company is pursuing an Embassy Suites flag, but still need to conclude the approval process with Hilton.

The resort would complement tourism in the city, and back the area as allocation for corporate and leisure travels, said Shawn Gracey, Executive Vice President of Hospitality for Key International.

"We were able to

identify an existing need for a full-service resort in the marketplace, and in proximity to the area's lifestyle locale, Pier Park. While we are still finalizing details for the property, each of our developments is strategically designed to fit seamlessly into the surrounding community," Gracey said.

St. Joe company has also sent a letter of interest to Panama City about building a hotel on the Panama City Marina.

In other news, the planning board also recommended the adoption of ordinance 1464, which changes the city's sign code to outlaw "No Trespassing" signs on the beach in the city. The first reading of the law was approved by the city council at an earlier meeting, and the ordinance prohibits "No Trespassing" signs and any other signs that advise recreational use of the beach is unlawful.

"In the wake of the confusion surrounding the passage

of HB 631, the City wanted to make it clear that the public is free to use the beach for recreation and that is has not, historically, intervened in these disputes," said city attorney Cole Davis. "This same confusion led Governor Rick Scott to issue Executive Order 18-202 asserting the importance of the public's ability to enjoy the beach."

The recommendation will be sent to the city council for the consideration of a second reading.

Florida GOP candidate spoke at alt-right events

Rep. Ron DeSantis, R-Fla., a gubernatorial nominee who recently was accused of using racially tinged language, spoke four times at conferences organized by a conservative activist who has said that African Americans owe their freedom to white people and that the country's "only serious race war" is against whites.

DeSantis, elected to represent north-central Florida in 2012, appeared at the David Horowitz Freedom Center conferences in Palm Beach, Florida, or Charleston, South Carolina, in 2013, 2015, 2016 and 2017, said Michael Finch, president of the organization. At the group's annual Restoration Weekend conferences, hundreds of people gather to hear right-wing provocateurs such as Steve Bannon, Milo Yiannopoulos and Sebastian Gorka sound off on multiculturalism, radical Islam, free speech on college campuses and other issues.

"I just want to say what an honor it's been to be here to speak," DeSantis said in a 27-minute speech at the 2015 event in Charleston, a video shows. "David has done such great work and I've been an admirer. I've been to these conferences in the past but I've been a big admirer of an organization that shoots straight, tells the American people the truth and is standing up for the right thing."

The Florida gubernatorial campaign is one of the marquee races of 2018, pitting DeSantis, a Trump acolyte and lawyer in the Navy Reserve, against Andrew Gillum, the mayor of Tallahassee, who would become the state's first African-American governor. President Donald Trump has endorsed DeSantis, and Gillum is backed by progressive leader Bernie Sanders, an independent senator from Vermont. In less than two weeks since the primary, race has become a central issue in the nation's largest battleground state.

The Freedom Center covered DeSantis' expenses for the 2017 conference at a luxury resort in Palm Beach, according to disclosure forms he filed as a member of Congress.

Fellow speakers included a former Google engineer who was fired after arguing that "biological causes" in part explain why there are relatively few women working in tech and leadership; a critic of multiculturalism who has written that "Europe is committing suicide" by welcoming large numbers of refugees and immigrants; and a British media personality who urged the audience to avoid becoming like the United Kingdom, where "discrimination against whites is institutionalized and systemic."

Requests to the campaign and the congressional office to interview DeSantis were declined. A spokeswoman for the congressman, Elizabeth Fusick, provided a statement that described DeSantis as "a leader in standing up for truth and American strength."

"He appreciates those who support his efforts and is happy to be judged on his record," Fusick said. "He does not, though,

buy into this 'six degrees of Kevin Bacon' notion that he is responsible for the views and speeches of others."

DeSantis' four appearances at the annual events — only one of which, the 2017 speech, has been previously reported — are coming to light at a time when his positions on matters of race are under scrutiny. In three of the four speeches reviewed by The Washington Post, DeSantis delivered sharp-edged conservative criticism of Democratic policies without explicitly touching on race.

On the strength of Trump's endorsement, DeSantis surged from behind to win last week's Republican primary — then stepped into controversy as he was introducing himself to a national audience.

In an Aug. 29 interview on Fox News, he described his opponent, Gillum, as "articulate." He added that Gillum's policies would hurt Florida, saying, "The last thing we need to do is to monkey this up by trying to embrace a socialist agenda with huge tax increases and bankrupting the state."

Gillum and other Democrats lambasted the comments as coded racism, and later that day a Fox News co-anchor said on air, "We do not condone this language."

DeSantis later told Fox's Sean Hannity that his criticism of Gillum is based on issues, not race.

"It has zero to do with race, Sean," he said. "It has everything to do with whether we want Florida to continue to go in a good direction."

Gillum is increasingly facing questions about his relationship with lobbyists after subpoenas served on Tallahassee city hall last year revealed an FBI investigation into public corruption. Gillum, who was not named in the subpoenas, said he was told by the FBI that he was not a "focus" of the investigation.

As Gillum grapples with the fallout of the FBI probe, race has come to fore in the campaign.

On Aug. 31, the Tallahassee Democrat reported that an unknown number of Florida voters received anti-Gillum robo-calls paid for by a neo-Nazi group in Idaho called the Road to Power. The automated calls were narrated by someone with an exaggerated minstrel dialect who was pretending to be Gillum, with junglelike sounds in the background. Efforts to reach the group for comment were unsuccessful, and the DeSantis campaign denounced the calls as "appalling and disgusting."

Democratic groups, eager to associate DeSantis with extremist views, noted this week that a paid consultant to his campaign, Volusia County Republican Chairman Tony Ledbetter, posted

inflammatory comments on social media.

"ANIMALS REMOVE THEM FROM OUR COUNTRY," Ledbetter wrote on Facebook in one such post, commenting on a video that purports to show a Muslim man lifting a veil from the face of a woman dressed in white and then slapping her face as onlookers applaud.

The DeSantis campaign paid Ledbetter \$13,500 for "consulting" and "campaign management" between May and August, state campaign finance records show.

The DeSantis campaign said that Ledbetter's contract expired Sept. 1 and that he has "zero affiliation" with the campaign.

In a brief telephone interview Thursday, Ledbetter said: "This story needs to die. You have a good day."

Horowitz blasted DeSantis' critics. "There's a lynch mob on his back," Horowitz said in an interview. "Saying a black person is articulate is not racist — it's praising him for him being articulate. Are there no inarticulate blacks?"

The hard-line positions Horowitz, 79, has taken on immigration, climate change and national security — once on the political fringes — have moved closer to the mainstream during the Trump presidency.

Founded in 1988, the Freedom Center described its mission on a fundraising appeal: "We combat the efforts of the radical left and its Islamist allies to destroy American values and disarm this country as it attempts to defend itself in a time of terror."

Guest speakers at its conferences over the past five years have included Republican members of Congress, former governors Rick Perry of Texas and Mike Huckabee of Arkansas, young conservative activists James O'Keefe and Ben Shapiro, and right-wing European politicians Nigel Farage and Geert Wilders.

Yiannopoulos, a writer who helped turn Breitbart News into a leading organ of the alt-right, opened his speech in Palm Beach in 2017 with a joke that referred to black-male genitalia and with a crude comment about Rep. Maxine Waters, D-Calif., an African American who has sparred with Trump. In a speech that year, Katie Hopkins, a controversial conservative British media personality, lamented what she said was her country's embrace of the "Muslim mafia" and the "pocket-size Muslim mayor of Londonistan." (Sadiq Khan is the first Muslim mayor of London.)

At the same conference, conservative author Mark Steyn praised Trump as the first politician to talk about immigration policy from the perspective of people already in the United States.

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'They want a rich man's paradise now'

Unseen by tourists, thread of Florida Keys' society unraveling a year after Irma

A year after Hurricane Irma battered the Florida Keys, the iconic island chain is open for business, beckoning tourists in search of candy-coated sunsets, tropical solace — their lost shaker of salt.

The sandal factories, shell worlds and key lime stands advertise their colorful kitsch along the Overseas Highway that carries pilgrims to the promised land of sweet libations and Hemingway lore.

But scratch the surface of that coconut-scented veneer and a different side of Hurricane Irma recovery is revealed.

A thread of Keys society — musicians, artists, old-school Conchs and workaday Joes — is unraveling.

People whose grip on Eden was tenuous before Irma blew their homes apart are feeling it slip away entirely in the face of strict rebuilding codes that require raised structures fortified to withstand Mother Nature's worst.

It's a unique dilemma in an archipelago where there's no easy commute to cheaper suburbs. In other parts of the state, a trailer home lost to Irma could be replaced with another trailer home, said Phillip Decker, regional team leader for the United Methodist

Conference working on recovery efforts in Monroe County.

On Avenue G in Big Pine Key, fourth-generation Conch Mary Grimes ponders how she'll replace her ruined 60s-era trailer with a stilt palace of concrete.

The 74-year-old has six months to figure it out. March marks the end of FEMA's Direct Temporary Housing Assistance — 18 months since Irma's Sept. 10, 2017, landfall.

"We are trying with everything we can to stay," said Grimes, whose \$50,000 in insurance paid off her mortgage but is not enough to rebuild. "I don't know how I feel a year after Irma. I don't know how to put it into words. This is my home, but right now, I'm not permanent anywhere."

Irma's year anniversary is a frustrating time

for Keys residents still struggling. They want the world to know tourism is back — their very livelihoods depend on it. They also want it known the person serving you fish tacos may be going home to a FEMA trailer and an uncertain future.

"Sometimes I'm walking the dog, and I'll hear a tourist say, 'Oh, they didn't get hit very hard. Everything looks fine.' And I just want to scream," said Stephanie Kaple, executive director of the Florida Keys Outreach Coalition. "Not all wounds can be seen from the outside."

Or from Duval Street.

A storm for the record books

Hurricane Irma was born out of a tropical wave that left Africa

on Aug. 27, 2017. The carousel of rapid-fire thunderstorms took just two days to whip into a major hurricane over the spa-warm waters of the Atlantic, a strengthening called "remarkable" by National Hurricane Center experts.

Irma's 80-mph gain in wind speed over a 48-hour period is a rate achieved by only about 1 in 30 Atlantic tropical cyclones.

As a trembling Florida watched, Irma cut a path through the Caribbean like a lawn mower, running over Barbuda, St. Martin, Virgin Gorda and Little Inagua in the Bahamas as a raging Category 5 cyclone with winds maxing out at 178 mph.

Irma maintained Category 5 strength for a stunning 60 consecutive hours — earning it second

place for Cat 5 longevity behind the 1932 Cuba Hurricane's 72-hour record.

"You just had that very long buildup with Irma," said Michael Brennan, hurricane specialist branch chief at the National Hurricane Center. "It formed just about as far east as it can form in the Atlantic basin, and there was stark visual evidence of what it did to Barbuda and the British Virgin Islands."

Satellite images showed once lush tropical paradises scoured brown by windburn.

"Everyone was very hurricane aware," Brennan said.

Fearing a loss in communications at its Florida International University bunker, the National Hurricane Center sent two meteorologists to the Weather Prediction Center in College Park, Md., where they took over forecasting hurricanes Katia and Jose.

They were among an estimated 6.8 million Floridians who fled Irma as subtle shifts in the storm's path sent people rushing to the west coast, then north in 20-hour treks to Georgia.

Brennan's family went to St. Augustine, but he was still restless. The forecast weighs heavy when people's lives are at stake. He startled awake subconsciously every morning around 2 a.m. to check the latest computer guidance.

"I remember finally falling asleep one night and then the alert went off on my phone when we issued the hurricane warning for South Florida," Brennan said.

That was 11 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 7.

Fifty-eight hours later, on Sept. 10, Irma made its first Florida landfall on Cudjoe Key at 9 a.m. with 132-mph, Cat 4 winds.

Irma made a second landfall near Marco Island at 3:30 p.m. with 115-mph, Cat 3 winds.

Why NASA's next rockets may say Budweiser on side

WASHINGTON — The constant creep of corporate America into all aspects of everyday life — from the Allstate Sugar Bowl to Minute Maid Park — may soon conquer a new frontier.

The final frontier. NASA's administrator Jim Bridenstine has directed the space agency to look at boosting its brand by selling naming rights to rockets and spacecraft and allowing its astronauts to appear in commercials and on cereal boxes, as if they were celebrity athletes.

While officials stress that nothing has been decided, the idea could mark a giant cultural leap for the taxpayer-funded government agency and could run into ethics regulations that prevent government officials from using public office for private gain.

NASA has steadfastly stayed away from endorsing any particular product or company — even going so far as to call the M&Ms astronauts gobble in space "candy-coated chocolates" for fear of even appearing to favor one brand of candy.

But during a recent meeting of a NASA advisory council, Bridenstine announced he was standing up a committee to examine what he called the "provocative questions" of turning its rockets into corporate billboards the way advertisers decorate NASCAR racecars.

"Is it possible for NASA

to offset some of its costs by selling the naming rights to its spacecraft, or the naming rights to its rockets," Bridenstine said. "I'm telling you there is interest in that right now. The question is: Is it possible? The answer is: I don't know, but we want somebody to give us advice on whether it is."

He also said he wanted astronauts to be not only more accessible to journalists but even to participate in marketing opportunities to boost their brands — and that of the space agency.

"I'd like to see kids growing up, instead of maybe wanting to be like a professional sports star, I'd like to see them grow up wanting to be a NASA astronaut, or a NASA scientist," he said. "I'd like to see, maybe one day, NASA astronauts on the cover of a cereal box, embedded into the American culture."

The effort is part of a broader effort to generate more private-sector involvement in low Earth orbit. NASA already relies on companies to fly cargo to the space station — and is already on path to relying on companies to deliver crew. The White House has also said it would like to end direct funding for the International Space Station, and turn over operations of the orbiting laboratory to a private entity. Meanwhile, there are other companies looking to develop their own commercial space stations. And the White House is working to ease regulations to promote private-sector growth.

Florida's next governor may have budget surplus to work with

TALLAHASSEE — Florida's next governor may inherit a budget surplus during his first year in office, according to an annual forecast by state economists.

The new forecast released late Friday shows the state is expected to bring in enough money in 2019 to meet its needs for public schools and health care programs while leaving \$1 billion available for reserves and even some money for a small round of tax cuts.

The three-year forecast, which will officially be presented to legislators this coming week, predicts a relatively small surplus of about \$223 million. The state's overall budget, which includes billions in federal grants, is slightly under \$90 billion.

Sen. Bill Galvano, the Bradenton Republican in line to become the next Senate president, said that while the budget projections "give us reason to be optimistic" he pointed out that the new forecast also shows shortfalls in 2020 and 2021.

"These projections give us reason to again proceed cautiously as we evaluate policies requiring new financial commitments," Galvano said in a memo to state senators.

Florida's constitution requires that state economists draw up a three-year financial outlook each fall that looks at spending projections in key programs such as Medicaid and available tax revenues. Lawmakers will meet next March for their annual session, with one of their main jobs to be the crafting of a new budget.

Florida's budget has

been strained in recent years as legislators have cut taxes while at the same time tried to meet demands in education, environmental programs and in health care.

By the time legislators reconvene next year, there will be a new governor in office. Both Tallahassee Mayor Andrew Gillum, a Democrat, and U.S. Rep. Ron DeSantis, a Republican, are running to replace Gov. Rick Scott, who is leaving due to term limits. Gillum has vowed to boost spending on schools if elected and has promised to raise the state's corporate income tax in order to pay for it.

DeSantis has promised to keep intact policies adopted in recent years by Scott and the GOP-controlled Legislature, but during his campaign so far he has included very few specifics.

LYNN HAVEN Local nurse arrested for forging prescriptions

A local nurse has been charged with 17 counts of obtaining a controlled substance by fraud or forgery after allegedly using a stolen prescription pad to write prescriptions for herself, her son, her romantic partner and others.

Charline Rushing, 50, of Panama City Beach, was arrested Sunday and charged in connection with 15 hydrocodone prescriptions, one Adderall prescription and one phentemine prescription. She was also charged with practicing healthcare with an inactive or delinquent license after it was discovered her Practical Nursing license had expired July 31, 2017 but she continued to work as a nurse during the time period that her license was expired until June 2018.

According to Lynn Haven Police, Rushing's former employer at The Family Clinic in Lynn Haven reported to police that Rushing had been forging prescriptions for controlled substances between Aug. 1, 2016 and June 25, 2018 and provided copies of prescriptions written out to Rushing, her son, her romantic partner and another individual that were filled at the Sam's

Club pharmacy. Rushing's employer said she had never seen any of these individuals as patients, did not ever prescribe them any medication and that the signature on the prescriptions was forged.

The employer stated that after Rushing had been terminated at The Family Clinic, a blank prescription pad was found in her desk.

Despite having an expired license, after Rushing was terminated at The Family Clinic, she went on to work at the Hope Urology and Cancer Center as a nurse.

After her first appearance Monday, Rushing was held on \$25,000 bail.

BAY COUNTY Bust nets marijuana, THC vape pens

A series of search warrants executed Saturday netted a substantial amount of drugs

The bust is the conclusion of an operation spanning the last several months involving the Bay County Sheriffs Office, Panama City Beach Police Department, Panama City Police Department, Florida Department of Law Enforcement, Lynn Haven Police Department and the Jackson County Sheriff's Office.

TALLAHASSEE Governor orders flags at half staff for 9/11

Gov. Rick Scott on Monday afternoon ordered flags be flown at half staff today in commemoration of lives lost on 9/11.

"In honor and remembrance of those who tragically lost their lives in the terrorist attack on September 11, 2001, I hereby direct the flags of the United States and the State of Florida to be flown at half-staff at all local and state buildings, installations, and grounds throughout the State of Florida," the order said.

The flags will remain at half-staff until sunset.

CAPE CANAVERAL SpaceX launches communications satellite

A SpaceX Falcon 9 rocket carrying a communications satellite took off from Cape Canaveral Air Force Station overnight after a last-minute delay.

The launch originally

was scheduled for Saturday night. The delay was yet another in a string of setbacks since the rocket's initial targeted launch date in July. SpaceX has not given the reason for the delays.

Off the coast of Florida, the company's drone ship "Of Course I Still Love You" recovered the rocket's Block 5 booster in its automated return to Earth. SpaceX officials say the new Block 5 boosters can fly up to 10 times with routine inspections and up to 100 times with refurbishment.

The rocket's payload was the Telstar 18 VANTAGE satellite, developed by Canadian telecommunications company Telesat and shared by Hong Kong's APT Satellite.

The 15,564-pound satellite is built to stay in orbit for more than 15 years and designed to expand Telesat's broadcast, enterprise and government communications coverage in China, Mongolia, Southeast Asia, the Pacific Ocean region and Hawaii.

The satellite also will enable direct connectivity from any point in Asia to the Americas, Telesat said.

TALLAHASSEE Scott offers help to states as storm looms

Gov. Rick Scott offered resources and assistance Monday to the governors of North Carolina, Virginia and Georgia as powerful Hurricane Florence threatened the Southeast U.S. coast.

Florida Division of Emergency Management officials have also been in contact with South Carolina, the governor's office said. Due to the storm, Scott waived weight requirements for emergency supply and response vehicles through Sept. 17 and put the Florida National Guard and Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission law-enforcement officers on standby to help in areas affected by the storm.

Today's deal comes from last July's consolation teams event at the Yeh Bros Cup in Tokyo. Chen Yeh sponsors the tournament, and it is great news for bridge that this is back to being an annual event, so that spectators can watch the world's best bridge players competing for the largest cash prizes in the game, both online and in person.

As the daily bulletin sardonically remarked, it can be hard to console a team that is playing the secondary Swiss with a metaphorical big fat 'L' branded on its forehead. But David Beauchamp of Australia cheered his team up when he found a successful way home playing game in one of the opponents' suits.

The defense against four hearts doubled would have generated only 300, so it was right for him to bid on; but to what contract? Note that while four no-trump can be made, five clubs might be set on the spade ruff.

Fu Zhong, as West, led a heart against four spades, ducked the first trump and won the next to return a heart. Beauchamp now knew not to lead a trump again, since the suit was marked as 4-2. He discarded a club on the heart ace, won the diamond king and led a club to the ace, a diamond to the queen and a diamond toward dummy. When East discarded, West was marked with a 4-4-4-1 shape, so declarer could confidently run the club jack, losing just three trump tricks in all. Had both defenders followed to the third diamond, declarer would probably have played West as holding 4-4-3-2 shape.

Keselowski makes it a Penske sweep

INDIANAPOLIS — First, Brad Keselowski figured out the secret to restarting at the Brickyard 400.

Then he safely and strategically bumped his way into the lead and sped to the finish line.

One year after settling for second in a chaotic, crash-marred race last year, Keselowski redeemed himself by earning his second straight major win and finally giving team owner Roger Penske the elusive Brickyard win.

The 2010 Cup champion got past race leader Denny Hamlin on the second-to-last lap and beat Erik Jones to the finish line by 0.904 seconds. Hamlin finished third.

"Last year, I lost this race almost the exact same way. To bring it home this way, after messing up last year, is just incredible," Keselowski said. "We were hoping this would be No. 500 and the Brickyard, but that's all right."

Penske certainly won't be complaining about getting win No. 499 on the same historic 2.5-mile oval where he has won a record 17 Indianapolis 500 crowns.

His first win 25 Cup tries at

his favorite racing venue came on one of the rare days he wasn't actually attending in the pits for the rain-delayed race.

But Penske now joins Chip Ganassi as the only owners to win the Indy double in the same season. Will Power captured his first 500 win in May, while Dario Franchitti and Jamie McMurray both won at the Brickyard in 2010 for Ganassi.

The timing couldn't be better for Keselowski. He heads into the first round of the playoffs with momentum following wins at the Southern 500 and the Brickyard.

And he earned this one the hard way. He stayed close off the final restart with three laps to go, then quickly chased down Hamlin, running side by side with the race leader briefly on Lap 159. At one point, the cars touched but both drivers maintained control and Keselowski made the decisive move in the front straightaway just as the white flag started to come out.

Nobody got close again. "Not having guys in the back wreck," Hamlin said when asked what could have gone differently, referring to the late crash involving Landon Cassill and Jeffrey Earnhardt. "That allowed all the guys

who take tires to come back up there at the end. It happens sometimes."

Hamlin's consolation prize will be joining Keselowski and Jones in the first round of the playoffs next week.

Seven-time Cup champion Jimmie Johnson and Alex Bowman captured the final two open playoff spots in the 10-race sprint to the championship.

The winners

Clint Bowyer won the first stage Monday by 0.285 seconds over Kurt Busch. Hamlin finished third in that stage, which was marred two competition cautions and the crash that knocked Martin Truex Jr. out of the race.

Matt Kenseth took the second stage when several drivers in the lead pack decided to pit before the third and final stage. Elliott finished second and Jones was third.

Keselowski also became the first Ford driver to win at Indy since Dale Jarrett in 1999.

Up next: The series shifts back west to Las Vegas, where the focus will be on the playoff.

Finau added to US Ryder Cup team as captain's pick

NEWTOWN SQUARE, Pa. — Tony Finau has been named to the Ryder Cup team, the final pick by U.S. captain Jim Furyk.

Finau joins Bryson DeChambeau, Phil Mickelson and Tiger Woods as Furyk's four wild-card selections. Finau has 11 top-10s this season, including three in majors.

"There won't be any locker room noise with me," Finau said Monday. "I can play with anyone. I feel that my personality is just that way. I can bring the best out of different guys playing with them, and them the same to me. I'm pretty easy to play with. And I'm playing some good golf, some world-class golf."

His appeal is that he makes a lot of birdies, which is critical in match play. He was paired with

Furyk the first two days at the PGA Championship, and struggled in the opening round before he tied a championship record by making 10 birdies in the second round.

"He has an unbelievable body of work this year," Furyk said. "All those top-10 finishes, the play in big championships and the majors, and then his current form, a second, a fourth and an eighth in the playoffs. He checked a lot of boxes and made it impossible not to pick him."

Eight automatic qualifiers were set after the PGA Championship, so the start of the FedEx Cup playoffs was effectively an audition. After his top-5 finishes in the first two events, Finau shot a final-round 65 on Monday to tie for eighth at the BMW Championship while Xander Schauffele,

Bradley holds off Rose in playoff to win at Aronimink

NEWTOWN SQUARE, Pa. — Keegan Bradley had bottomed out, crashing from the high of winning the PGA Championship to tumbling out of the 100 in the world.

His chances to represent U.S. teams in international play had dried up, his preferred putting method was banned, and the confidence that once put him on the cusp of greatness was shot.

"It's scary when I look back, because I didn't know I needed this much improvement," Bradley said.

He was like a scientist in the lab, changing his swing, his putting stroke, his fundamentals — investing in the work needed to get to where he was Monday on soggy Aronimink: going head-to-head in a sudden-death playoff against the new No. 1 player in the world, Justin Rose.

For a player who had to reinvent his game, the clutch moment didn't seem so scary.

Bradley topped Rose with a par on the first playoff hole to win the rain-plagued BMW Championship for his first PGA Tour victory in six years.

Sam Darnold, Jets rout Lions 48-17

DETROIT — Sam Darnold made a stellar debut despite throwing a pick-6 on his first NFL pass and the New York Jets intercepted five passes while routing the Detroit Lions 48-17 in their season opener Monday night.

The 21-year-old Darnold became the youngest quarterback to start a season opener since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, and he got off to an inauspicious start. Quandre Diggs intercepted his ill-advised lob down the left sideline on the first play from scrimmage and returned it 37 yards for a touchdown 20 seconds into the game.

The former USC star shook off the rough start by completing 16 of 21 passes for 198 yards and two touchdowns. He helped the Jets set a franchise record for points on the road, surpassing the 47 points they scored in 1967 against the Boston Patriots, and outplayed 30-year-old Matthew Stafford.

Stafford threw four interceptions — one shy of his career high — and left the game briefly in the third quarter after being hit from the front and back. He was mercifully taken out of the game midway through the fourth quarter and replaced by Matt Cassel with Detroit down 31. Stafford was 27 of 46 for 286 yards and a TD pass to Golden Tate early in the third quarter

to tie it at 17.

The Jets dominated in all phases. They scored 31 straight in the third quarter to pull away, sending Detroit's fans for the exits and setting off a jolly green party in the Motor City.

It was the highest-scoring third quarter in team history and trailed only the 34-point second quarter the Brett Favre-led team scored in 2008 against Arizona.

New York scored on the ground and through the air, on defense and on a punt return. The Jets could've scored even more in the final minutes but turned the ball over on downs after kneeling to take time off

Packers' McCarthy: Team await info on Rodgers

GREEN BAY, Wis. — Green Bay Packers coach Mike McCarthy needs more information on the extent of Aaron Rodgers' knee injury to determine the quarterback's availability for next week's game against Minnesota.

Rodgers was sore when the team returned to Lambeau Field on Monday, McCarthy said. The Packers reviewed the thrilling 24-23 win on Sunday night over the Chicago Bears, in which Rodgers threw three touchdown passes in the fourth quarter after returning from an injury.

The Packers return to the practice field on Wednesday, when the first injury report for Week 2 is due.

"We do have some information and no decision has been made. We're still collecting all the information," said McCarthy, who added he did not think it would take the whole week to determine Rodgers' availability.

He did allow for a new morsel of information about the two-time NFL MVP. It was a short turnaround for everyone on the team after an emotional late-night victory.

"I don't think anybody's feeling great right now ... But yeah (Rodgers) is sore.

He's walking around in a pair of shorts and tennis shoes and socks if that helps you with your story," McCarthy joked. "I mean I don't know what else to tell you."

Rodgers left in the second quarter against the Bears on a cart after slipping to the turf during a sack and reaching back for the back of his left leg. Rodgers had ACL surgery on his left knee in college.

But he was cleared to return at halftime and came back out

for the Packers' first series of the third quarter.

Operating a no-huddle offense, but staying primarily in the pocket, Rodgers engineered a comeback from a 20-0 deficit early in the third quarter.

It was the first time in franchise history that the Packers won after trailing by 17 points or more entering the fourth quarter, according to the Elias Sports Bureau. "It was going to have to take something

really catastrophic injury-wise to keep me off the field in the second half," Rodgers said after the game.

The Packers had to make a similar adjustment late in the 2014 season, when Rodgers was hobbled by a calf injury.

"But he seemed like he moved a little more than I remember back in '14," left tackle David Bakhtiari said.

Rodgers said he would undergo more tests on Monday, but that he was

planning to play next week against the Minnesota Vikings.

"No, I plan on playing. Yeah," he said.

Backup DeShone Kizer took over behind center while Rodgers was being evaluated in the locker room in the second quarter. The second-year quarterback accounted for two turnovers to Khalil Mack, having been stripped of the ball by Mack on a sack, and throwing an interception returned 27 yards for a score by the star linebacker.

Kizer, who was acquired in the offseason in a trade with Cleveland, started 15 games last year for the winless Browns. It included a 33-16 loss to the Vikings on Oct. 29 in London. Kizer was 18 of 34 for 179 yards that day, while also rushing for 18 yards and a touchdown on five carries.

Kizer won the backup job in Green Bay after Brett Hundley was traded to the Seattle Seahawks after the preseason.

"You've got to prepare as if you're the starter every week," Kizer said Monday.

Asked if he planned to get Kizer more work this week, McCarthy said "Well I mean DeShone will work, I don't think there's any question about that. He'll work a lot this week. Like I said, we're not that far."

Bradley's fourth career win meant a bit more than the others — yes, even the major he won in 2011 — because he held more than a trophy and a \$1.62 million check. He also got to give his young son Logan a victory toss in the air on the 18th green for the first time. Bradley, who shot a final round 6-under 64 to finish at 20-under 260, thrust his arms toward the gray sky and drizzle in celebration and waved his family toward him.

"I've won before, and I win and I finish, and I go home, just me," Bradley said. "Now, I get to go back and we get to have fun and enjoy it together. It's just a completely different experience."

Rose left Aronimink with a new reality as well. Though he was runner-up at the FedEx Cup playoff event, he didn't come up short in the world ranking. Rose moved No. 1 in the world ahead of Dustin Johnson and became the 22nd player to reach the top spot since the ranking began in 1986.

Rose could have won in regulation, but his 16-foot par putt on the final hole lipped out to force the playoff.

He fell short again in the playoff, missing a 5-foot par putt that would have kept him alive. The 38-year-old Rose had grown to love suburban Philadelphia golf courses with wins at the 2010 AT&T National at Aronimink and the 2013 U.S. Open at Merion.

He didn't get a trophy on this trip. But a No. 1 ranking will do for Rose, who and

joins Nick Faldo, Lee Westwood and Luke Donald as the only Englishmen to reach the top spot. He is the No. 2 seed behind Bryson DeChambeau among the top 30 who advance to the Tour Championship starting Sept. 20 at East Lake in Atlanta, giving him a clear shot at the \$10 million prize.

"I'm delighted to be world No. 1," Rose said. "Boyhood dreams, you know what I mean?"

Bradley also had a number in mind — 30. He started the week at No. 52 and needed to crack the top 30 to be eligible for East Lake.

"A lot has happened to me over these six years," Bradley said. "I kind of fell off the radar there for a little while. It's tough to go from being on Ryder Cup teams, being on Presidents Cup teams to being outside the top 100 in the world."

Bradley, who birdied the 16th and 17th holes to make his move, finished with his

fourth career victory and first since the 2012 WGC-Bridgestone Invitational. He gets a trip to Maui to start next year for the winners-only Sentry Tournament of Champions.

"I was watching the leaderboard pretty closely. I don't normally," he said. "It made me feel calm, which is rare. That was good."

Bradley had to wait nearly two days before chasing down Rose.

Rain soaked the course on Sunday, canceling play and forcing the Monday finish. It rained only lightly on Monday and players had few complaints about the condition of the course, even if the walking paths became a muddy, soggy mess for the gallery.

As usual, it crowded around Tiger Woods.

Woods caused some more noise — he's been doing that a lot in recent months before the largest galleries at every course — and got within one shot of the lead when he birdied the par-5 ninth to go out in 31.

But he missed the green on 10 and made bogey. He found a bunker on the par-3 14th for another bogey. And this was the kind of day when more than one mistake was going to be costly. Woods wound up with a 65 and finished three shots back.

Such was the scoring at Aronimink that Woods had a 72-hole score of 263 for the sixth time of his career. The other five times he won; this one got him a tie for sixth.

"I thought I needed to shoot something around 62 today to have a chance," Woods said. "And I don't think that would have been good enough."

Turns out, a 62 would have put him in the playoff.

The matches are Sept. 28-30 outside Paris.

The eight Americans who qualified on their own were Brooks Koepka, Dustin Johnson, Jordan Spieth, Justin Thomas, Rickie Fowler, Bubba Watson, Webb Simpson and Patrick Reed.

Throw in Woods and Mickelson, and that gives the U.S. team a lineup that has combined for 31 majors.

That doesn't mean as much in foursomes and fourballs, on a European course before the singing and chanting of Europeans fans.

European captain Thomas Bjorn went with veterans for his four captain's picks, adding

Henrik Stenson, Ian Poulter, Paul Casey and Sergio Garcia to a team that had five rookies qualify on points.

Europe's qualifiers were Rory McIlroy, Francesco Molinari, Justin Rose, Thorbjorn Olesen, Jon Rahm, Tyrrell Hatton, Tommy Fleetwood and Alex Noren.

Finau, who turns 29 on Thursday, was invited by Furyk to play as part of a small group at Le Golf National on the weekend before the British Open. Finau, who has one career PGA Tour victory, said he was ready for the pressure of the Ryder Cup.

"I never thought I was on that team until I got that call," he said. "I made sure I played that way; I played like I always had something to prove. And I let the guys on the team know that I'd be a great pick and I'd be ready to go."

"It's definitely cool to accomplish something like this and to be able to play as well as I have under the circumstances, it's something I'm extremely proud of."



Three-time Pro Bowl tight end Delanie Walker will have surgery on his right ankle in the next few days, and Tennessee coach Mike Vrabel said the Titans will decide if the veteran might be able to return later this season.

The Titans placed Walker on injured reserve Monday and signed tight end MyCole Pruitt off Houston's practice squad.

Walker was hurt with 3:33 left in the Titans' 27-20 loss in Miami when Dolphins safety T.J. McDonald tackled him at the end of a 15-yard reception.

Walker was carted off after having his right ankle wrapped in an air cast.

Governing body defends umpire after Serena flap

The International Tennis Federation is defending the chair umpire who gave Serena Williams three code violations during the U.S. Open final, saying his "decisions were in accordance with the relevant rules."

Williams was cited by Carlos Ramos three times Saturday during her 6-2, 6-4 loss to Naomi Osaka: for getting coaching signals; for breaking her racket, which cost her a point; and for calling Ramos a thief, which cost her a game.

On Sunday, the tournament referee docked Williams \$10,000 for

"verbal abuse" of the chair umpire, \$4,000 for being warned for coaching and \$3,000 for breaking her racket.

The ITF said in a statement Monday that Ramos' citations were "reaffirmed by the U.S. Open's decision to fine Serena Williams for the three offenses."

The governing body of tennis added that: "Ramos undertook his duties as an official according to the relevant rule book and acted at all times with professionalism and integrity."

NEW YORK Big 3 back to Nos. 1-2-3; Osaka now at No. 7

The Big 3 is once again 1-2-3.

Novak Djokovic's U.S. Open title moved him up three spots to No. 3 in the ATP rankings Monday, behind Rafael Nadal and Roger Federer, making that trio the top three for the first time in 3½ years.

Naomi Osaka jumped 12 places to a career-high No. 7 in the WTA standings thanks to her first Grand Slam title. The runner-up, Serena Williams, is back in the top 20 at No. 16, after being No. 26 before the U.S. Open — and outside the top 400 as recently as May, following the former No. 1's time away because she had a baby.

Djokovic's rise from No. 6 thanks to claiming his 14th Grand Slam title continues his own steady progress in recent months.

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
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
