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Judge: Wilson video allowed

Overstreet rules sheriff's office video showing Wilson's role in passing contraband between inmates was lawfully obtained

not be observed," Overstreet wrote, noting that capturing the video without audio did not violate attorney-client privilege. "... The video recordings do not reveal any confidential attorney-client communications (either written or verbal)."

In his order, Overstreet noted that jail policy states that attorney-client interactions are subject to observation for "safety and security." He also cited the conditions surrounding

the incident - including the attorney room's "large window," open to a busy hallway with an officer stationed outside and Wilson's behaviors - as reasons he had no expectation of privacy at the time.

"The occupants of an interview room and the desk in an interview room are easily observable from the outside of the room, and the conduct that was recorded would have been equally observable from the hallway," Overstreet

added. He noted the manner in which the activity was taking place, writing Wilson "and the women pass the contraband furtively."

It was one of two decisions issued Friday by Overstreet that solidify the case and arguments a jury will hear during Wilson's trial. He faces charges related to helping two Bay County Jail inmates pass "kites," or folded pieces of paper, and then lying to

Florence lashes Carolina coast

At least four people dead as hurricane makes landfall

WILMINGTON, N.C. - Blowing ashore with howling 90 mph winds, Florence splintered buildings, trapped hundreds of people and swamped entire communities along the Carolina coast Friday in what could be just the opening act in a watery, two-part, slow-motion disaster. At least four people were killed.

Forecasters warned that

drenching rains of 1 to 3½ feet as the hurricane-turned-tropical storm crawls westward across North and South Carolina could trigger epic flooding well inland over the next few days.

As 400-mile-wide Florence pounded away at the coast with torrential downpours and surging seas, rescue crews used boats to reach more than 360 people besieged by rising waters in New Bern, while many of their neighbors awaited help. More than 60 people had to be rescued in another town as a cinderblock motel collapsed at the height of the storm's fury.

Florence flattened trees, crumbled roads and the assault wasn't anywhere close to being over, with the siege in the Carolinas expected to last all weekend. The storm knocked out power to more than 890,000 homes and businesses, according to poweroutage.us, which tracks the U.S. electrical grid.

North Carolina Gov. Roy Cooper called Florence an "uninvited brute" that could wipe out entire communities as it grinds across the state.

"The fact is this storm is deadly and we know we are

Education and work programs earn about \$700K from Triumph

BAY COUNTY - Education and job programs in Bay County are getting a total of \$701,780 in grants courtesy of Triumph Gulf Coast, which announced projects across the region Friday.

The Tom P. Haney Technical Center is getting a \$615,000 grant to update its HVAC training program, which includes a pilot program requiring Haney to "offer skills upgrade training to graduates using the new equipment and certification programs," the news release stated.

Haney is excited for the opportunity to continue improving educational training in the program, said Alex Murphy, chief community relations officer for Haney.

"These funds will be crucial for needed upgrades which will benefit students, as well as potential employers hiring our graduates," Murphy said.

The Triumph Gulf Coast Board also approved moving to a term sheet negotiation with The Bay Youth Summer Work Program, which helps local youth with business opportunities and educational training. The funding request of \$86,780 represents 67.8 percent of the total project cost and the match is provided by community contributions and Gulf Coast State College, the news release stated.

Triumph Gulf Coast is a nonprofit corporation that administers funds in Northwest Florida counties for recovery after the 2010 Deepwater Horizon oil

Today's Highlight in History

On Sept. 15, 1972, a federal grand jury in Washington indicted seven men in connection with the Watergate break-in.

On this date

In 1776, British forces occupied New York City during the American Revolution.

In 1807, former Vice President Aaron Burr was acquitted of a misdemeanor charge two weeks after he was found not guilty of treason.

In 1935, the Nuremberg Laws deprived German Jews of their citizenship.

In 1940, during the World War II Battle of Britain, the tide turned as the Royal Air Force inflicted heavy losses upon the Luftwaffe.

In 1942, during World War II, the aircraft carrier USS Wasp was torpedoed by a Japanese submarine; the U.S. Navy ended up sinking the badly damaged vessel.

In 1950, during the Korean conflict, United Nations forces landed at Incheon in the south and began their drive toward Seoul (sohl).

In 1961, the United States began Operation Nougat, a series of underground nuclear explosions in the Nevada Test Site, two weeks after the Soviet Union resumed testing its nuclear weapons.

In 1963, four black girls were killed when a bomb went off during Sunday services at the 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, Alabama. (Three Ku Klux Klansmen were eventually convicted for their roles in the blast.)

In 1981, the Senate Judiciary Committee voted unanimously to approve the Supreme Court nomination of Sandra Day O'Connor.

In 1982, Iran's former foreign minister, Sadegh Ghotbzadeh, was executed after he was convicted of plotting against the government. The first edition of USA Today was published.

State, feds hunt for gas blast cause

LAWRENCE, Mass. — Investigators worked Friday to pinpoint the cause of a series of fiery natural gas explosions that killed a teen driver in his car just hours after he got his license, injured at least 25 others and left dozens of homes in smoldering ruins.

Authorities said an estimated 8,000 people were displaced at the height of Thursday's post-explosion chaos in three towns north of Boston rocked by the disaster.

Most were still waiting, shaken and exhausted, to be allowed to return to their homes.

Gov. Charlie Baker said Friday that hundreds of gas technicians were being deployed throughout the night and into Saturday to make sure each home is safe to enter.

Even after residents return and their electricity is restored, gas service won't be turned on until technicians can inspect every connection in each home — a process that could take weeks.

"This remains a tremendous inconvenience for many people," Baker said. "It's essential for the crews to get this right."

The National Transportation Safety Board sent a team to help investigate the blasts in a state where some of the aging gas pipeline system dates to the 1860s.

The rapid-fire series of gas

explosions that one official described as "Armageddon" ignited fires in 60 to 80 homes in the working-class towns of Lawrence, Andover and North Andover, forcing entire neighborhoods to evacuate as crews scrambled to fight the flames and shut off the gas and electricity.

Gas and electricity remained shut down Friday in most of the area, and entire neighborhoods were eerily deserted.

Authorities said Leonel

Rondon, 18, of Lawrence, died after a chimney toppled by an exploding house crashed into his car. He was rushed to a Boston hospital and pronounced dead Thursday evening.

Rondon, a musician who went by the name DJ Blaze, had just gotten his driver's license hours earlier, grieving friends and relatives told The Boston Globe.

"It's crazy how this happened," said a friend, Cassandra Carrion.

The state Registry of Motor Vehicles said Rondon had been issued his driver's license only hours earlier Thursday.

Massachusetts State Police urged all residents with homes serviced by Columbia Gas in the three communities to evacuate, snarling traffic and causing widespread confusion as residents and local officials struggled to understand what was happening.

Some 400 people spent the night in shelters, and school

was canceled Friday as families waited to return to their homes.

Gov. Charlie Baker said state and local authorities were investigating but it could take days or weeks before they turn up answers. He declared a state of emergency for the affected area so the state could take over recovery efforts.

Baker authorized the utility Eversource to take management control over the effort to restore services.

The Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency blamed the fires on gas lines that had become over-pressurized but said investigators were still examining what happened.

Capturing the mounting sense of frustration, Democratic U.S. Rep. Seth Moulton tweeted that he had called the utility's president several times with no response. "Everyone wants answers. And we deserve them," Moulton said.

Columbia Gas President Steve Bryant wouldn't comment on the suspected cause of the blasts, deflecting questions about his company's response but saying it had "substantive, lengthy conversations" with the authorities.

The Massachusetts gas pipeline system is among the oldest in the country, as much as 157 years old in some places, according to the Conservation Law Foundation, an environmental advocacy group.

DALLAS Cop shot in head, suspect killed during bar robbery

A gun battle between police and group of robbery suspects outside of a Fort Worth bar early Friday left one suspect dead and

an undercover officer fighting for his life, authorities said.

The undercover officer, Garrett Hull, was in critical condition at a hospital, Fort Worth police Chief Joel Fitzgerald said at a news conference.

The suspect who was killed, Dacion Steptoe, was the one who shot Hull after Steptoe and two accomplices left a bar they had just robbed, the chief said.

The two other suspects were arrested and none of the 10 people who were in the bar were hurt.

SAN FRANCISCO Gov. 'Moonbeam' says Calif. to launch climate satellite

California Gov. Jerry Brown said Friday that the state plans to launch its "own damn satellite" into orbit to battle climate change. The man the late Chicago columnist Mike Royko famously dubbed "Gov. Moonbeam" made the announcement at the conclusion of a two-day climate summit he organized in San Francisco.

Brown said state officials will work with the San Francisco-based company Planet Labs to develop a satellite to track climate-change causing pollutants. Brown said the earth-imaging company has launched 150 satellites.

"With science still under attack and the climate threat growing, we're launching our own damn satellite," he said.

LOS ANGELES Drug kingpin busted in massive smuggling operation

A Colombian drug kingpin who participated in a violent ring that used planes, speedboats and submarines to smuggle hundreds of millions of dollars in cocaine faced federal trafficking charges Friday in a Los Angeles courtroom, prosecutors said.

Victor Hugo Cuellar-Silva is among nearly four dozen defendants charged in a vast conspiracy to ship tons of cocaine from South America through Mexico to the U.S.

Cuellar-Silva, who was extradited Thursday from Colombia, was a high-ranking member of the drug ring headed by Mexican fugitive Angel Humberto Chavez-Gastelum, who is one of the most-wanted drug traffickers in the world, prosecutors said.

BEIRUT Defying dangers, Idlib residents protest Syria's Assad

In cities and towns across Syria's last opposition-held province, Idlib, residents poured into the streets on Friday to demonstrate against President Bashar Assad's government in defiance of an expected offensive to retake the territory.

In the provincial capital, Idlib city, and in towns including Kafranbel, Dana, Azaz, Maaret al-Numan and al-Bab, demonstrators filled the streets after noon prayers and chanted against Assad, raising the tricolor green, white and black flag that has become the banner of Syria's 2011 uprising, activists said.

"The rebels are our hope; the terrorists are Bashar, Hezbollah and Russia," read a banner

carried by residents.

GAZA CITY, GAZA STRIP Israeli troops kill 3 Palestinians, including boy

Three Palestinians, one of them a 12-year-old boy, were killed by Israeli fire Friday as thousands of protesters gathered along Gaza's perimeter fence with Israel, health officials said.

The Gaza Health Ministry said at least 80 Palestinians were wounded by live fire and that six of them were in serious condition. The Israeli military said about 13,000 protesters massed at several points along the fence, some burning tires and hurling rocks, grenades and firebombs. An Israeli officer suffered light wounds from pipe bomb shrapnel.

days away from an ending,” Cooper said. Parts of North Carolina had seen storm surges — the bulge of seawater pushed ashore by the hurricane — as high as 10 feet, he said.

A mother and baby were killed when a tree fell on a house, according to a tweet from Wilmington police. Also, a 77-year-old man was apparently knocked down by the wind and died after going out to check on his hunting dogs, Lenoir County authorities said, and the governor’s office said a man was electrocuted while trying to connect extension cords in the rain.

Shaken after seeing waves crashing on the Neuse River

just outside his house in New Bern, restaurant owner and hurricane veteran Tom Ballance wished he had evacuated.

“I feel like the dumbest human being who ever walked the face of the earth,” he said.

After reaching a terrifying Category 4 peak of 140 mph

earlier in the week, Florence made landfall as a Category 1 hurricane at 7:15 a.m. at Wrightsville Beach.

By Friday evening, Florence was downgraded to a tropical storm, its winds weakened to 70 mph as it moved forward at 3 mph about 15 miles north of Myrtle Beach, South Carolina.

spill, according to the organization’s website.

Other funding was awarded in Gulf, Franklin and Santa Rosa counties. Triumph Board appointee Allan Bense said funding will go towards jobs, industry and improvements in Northwest Florida, and applications must prove their projects are worthwhile and have other funding coming in.

“I’m proud of what we’ve done,” Bense said. “We’re being thoughtful with how we allocate money.”

Over in Franklin County, the Triumph Board also voted to “move to term sheet negotiations on a proposal from City of Apalachicola for improvements to the Scipio Creek Basin boat

yard, landing docks, and the historic Popham house.”

“This proposal is expected to improve usability for the commercial shallow draft fishing fleet and to improve the boat building program and associated Maritime Museum, a foundational tourism asset. The Triumph request of \$1,100,000 represents 24.7 percent of total project cost of \$4,454,596 over the 15-year (2010 – 2025) implementation of the multi-facility Port of Apalachicola strategic plan,” the news release stated. “It is expected that the project will allow retention of existing jobs and creation of new ones in the shrimping and off-shore fishing sector, as well as net new employees at the boatyard and new full- and part-time employees at the Maritime Museum.”

investigators about it. A tentative trial date is scheduled for Monday on a felony charge of possessing contraband within a detention facility and a misdemeanor count of perjury in an unofficial proceeding, court records stated.

Wilson, formerly the second-in-command at the State Attorney’s Office, could face up to five years in prison if convicted of the third-degree felony.

In recent days, Wilson’s defense team made attempts not only to have the video of the alleged exchange excluded from the trial but also sought to be able to pursue a defense that political retaliation prompted the prosecution. However, Overstreet dashed their hopes on both fronts.

Wilson’s defense attorney, Lisa Anderson, had argued the video should be excluded because it was “surreptitiously recorded” without authorities obtaining a warrant. Anderson gave several reasons — including BCSO’s inmate visitation policy that states attorney-client communications will not be monitored — in an effort to make the case Wilson had a reasonable expectation of privacy and the case boiled down to illegal search and seizure.

“In effect, the observing officers were not in a place where they had any right to be since their covert presence and observation served as an impermissible intrusion into an attorney-client consultation,” Anderson wrote. “Thus, Mr. Wilson’s expectation of privacy was objectively reasonable, and (BCSO) intrusion via visual observation was a violation of his Fourth Amendment rights.”

Anderson also pursued the defense that Wilson’s arrest

was a case of political retaliation, or “selective prosecution,” because BCSO obtained legal advice from his former boss and former political rival, State Attorney Glenn Hess, before installing the cameras.

Wilson, 46, was the chief assistant attorney for seven years under Hess. As the primary elections approached in August 2016, Wilson abruptly resigned, saying Hess did not fulfill an agreement to bow out at the end of his second term and hand Wilson a shot at the office.

Wilson took on his former boss to be top prosecutor over Bay, Calhoun, Gulf, Holmes, Jackson and Washington counties, and lost to Hess by a 58 percent to 42 percent margin, but vowed to make another run for state attorney in 2020.

It was about a year later Wilson became the subject of a BCSO investigation at the Bay County Jail.

In an August 14, 2017

recorded jailhouse call, an inmate named Clista Robbins told Wilson in vague terms that she thought something was in her car — “if it’s there, it’s there” — and Wilson said he would get rid of it.

The inmate then tells him not to get rid of it and asks if he understands what she means. Due to the possession of prescription narcotics charges Robbins had been arrested on and the belief that she and Wilson had a romantic relationship, BCSO expanded their investigation. It eventually led authorities to install video cameras — without audio capability — into an attorney interview room where they could video Wilson and his clients.

In the September 2017 video that will go before a jury, Wilson apparently assists two inmates — sisters Clista Robbins and Christy White — pass “kites” while meeting with him at separate times in the attorney interview room. Robbins and

White, in a separate recorded call, refer to the note as a “half kite” and indicate there was more to the delivered package than what deputies recovered. When questioned under oath about his actions, Wilson categorically denied the allegations as “absolutely false,” but at that time he was not aware of the video.

After word spread days later among Wilson’s “friends” that he’d been caught on video and his arrest was imminent, Wilson attempted to recant his denial to BCSO. However, investigators told his attorneys that a recantation — or revising his statement — would be akin to admitting a felony.

Wilson was arrested about three weeks later on a misdemeanor of perjury and felony introduction of contraband into a detention facility. After months of legal battles in the case, Wilson’s trial is expected to last two days.

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Kavanaugh denies misconduct allegation

WASHINGTON — Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh on Friday denied an allegation of sexual misconduct from when he was in high school, seeking to defuse a potential threat to his confirmation as a handful of key senators remained silent on whether they would vote for him.

In a statement released by the White House, Kavanaugh said: "I categorically and unequivocally deny this allegation. I did not do this back in high school or at any time."

Senate Republicans insist Kavanaugh's confirmation remains on track. But the allegation has inflamed an already intense political battle over President Donald Trump's nominee. It also pushes the #MeToo

movement into the court fight, less than two months before congressional elections that have seen a surge of female Democratic candidates.

The New Yorker magazine reported that the alleged incident took place at a party when Kavanaugh, now 53, was attending Georgetown Preparatory School. The woman making the allegation attended a nearby school.

The magazine says the woman sent a letter about the allegation to Democrats. A Democratic aide and another person familiar with the letter confirmed Friday to The Associated Press that the allegation is sexual in nature. Two other people familiar with the matter

confirmed it concerned an incident alleged to have occurred in high school. They were not authorized to speak publicly and spoke on condition of anonymity.

The AP has not confirmed the details of the incident alleged in The New Yorker's account.

Rallying to Kavanaugh's defense, 65 women who knew him in high school issued a letter saying Kavanaugh has "always treated women with decency and respect." The letter was circulated by Republicans on the Senate Judiciary Committee.

"We are women who have known Brett Kavanaugh for more than 35 years and knew him while he attended high school between 1979 and 1983," wrote the women, who said most of them had attended all-girl high schools in the area. "For

the entire time we have known Brett Kavanaugh, he has behaved honorably and treated women with respect."

The show of support for Kavanaugh was organized by his former law clerks. Three women reached by AP said they were first asked to sign the letter on Thursday. The swift pushback comes after the Senate Judiciary Committee's top Democrat, Dianne Feinstein of California, notified federal investigators about information she received about the nominee.

Feinstein won't disclose the information publicly, but the FBI confirmed it has included it in Kavanaugh's background file at the committee, now available confidentially to all senators.

Kavanaugh's nomination has divided the Senate and the new information complicates

the process, especially as key Republican senators, including Susan Collins of Maine and Lisa Murkowski of Alaska, are under enormous pressure from outside groups seeking to sway their votes on grounds that a Justice Kavanaugh might vote to undercut the Roe v. Wade ruling. One activist group favoring abortion choice, NARAL, called on Kavanaugh to withdraw from consideration.

The Judiciary Committee, which has finished confirmation hearings for Kavanaugh, still plans to vote next Thursday on whether to recommend that he be confirmed by the full Senate, a spokesman said.

The White House called Feinstein's move an "11th hour attempt to delay his confirmation."

Collins held an hour-long phone call with Kavanaugh on Friday, her

spokeswoman confirmed. It had been a previously scheduled follow-up to an initial visit that Kavanaugh made to her office in August. It was not immediately clear if they discussed the new information.

If Collins or Murkowski should vote for Kavanaugh, he is likely to be confirmed. Every other Republican in the Senate is expected to vote yes — and some Democrats from Trump-won states may join them — though it remains to be seen if the misconduct allegation will cost him any support.

Feinstein said in a statement Thursday that she "received information from an individual concerning the nomination." She said the person "strongly requested confidentiality, declined to come forward or press the matter further, and I have honored that decision."

Adviser says Iran failed detained US resident

TEHRAN, Iran — A top adviser to Iran's president on human rights said that the government "failed" to help a U.S. permanent resident imprisoned over spying allegations that she personally invited to the country for a conference.

In a wide-ranging interview with The Associated Press, Shahindokht Molaverdi acknowledged the limits a civilian government faces when challenging the actions of the judiciary in the Islamic Republic, especially when

dealing with cases involving the imprisonment of foreigners and activists. She cited the case of Nizar Zakka, a Lebanese-born internet freedom advocate living in the U.S., who she invited to a conference in September 2015. The hard-line Revolutionary Guard later arrested Zakka on his way to the airport, and he was later sentenced to 10 years in prison on spying charges in a closed-door

trial before a Revolutionary Court.

"This is in no way approved by the government," Molaverdi said. "We did all we could to stop this from happening, but we are seeing that we have failed to make a significant impact."

Molaverdi is an outspoken official within the government of elected President Hassan Rouhani, a relatively moderate cleric within Iran's Shiite theocracy. In Rouhani's first term, she served as his vice president for women and family affairs, and in his second term

become his special assistant on citizenship rights.

Political analysts within Iran saw Molaverdi's reassignment as Rouhani responding to hard-liners' criticism of her comments on women's rights and other issues.

She's condemned police overreach in dealing with women loosely wearing their mandatory headscarves and demanded access for women to sporting events. She gave an interview in 2016 in which she said all the men in a single, unnamed village in Iran's eastern Sistan and Baluchistan province had been executed for drug offenses.

Molaverdi said she has friends working on women's rights issues who have been arrested by Iranian security forces. She blamed a "complete miscoordination" between Iran's civilian government and its judiciary, which like its state media and security forces is believed to be controlled by hard-liners.

"Actions by one branch can ignore or neutralize efforts by another branch," she said. "This is an art and a very delicate job and sometimes the situation gets out of our hands, but anyway the goal of all of us is to stop this from happening and to minimize this."

Iran's executive branch under both hard-liners and more-moderate presidents has had difficulty freeing prisoners, especially foreigners. That can happen both from the hard-line judiciary exerting its power and disputes between Iran's Intelligence Ministry, answerable to the president, and the county's paramilitary Revolutionary Guard, answerable only the supreme leader.

"The executive branch is clearly aware of the limitations it operates under and will pick its battles with the judiciary carefully," said Ellie Geranmayeh, deputy director of the Middle East program at the European Council on Foreign Relations.

How Maria led to months of agony for Puerto Ricans

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico — Ramona Gonzalez did not drown when Hurricane Maria drenched Puerto Rico. She did not die in the tempest, or from destruction wrought by the storm's 154 mph (248 kph) winds.

Instead, this disabled, 59-year-old woman died a month later, from sepsis — caused, says her family, by an untreated bed sore.

In all, the storm and its aftermath took the lives of unfortunates like Gonzalez and thousands of others, many of whom could have been saved with standard medical treatment. This was a slow-motion, months-long disaster that kept Puerto Ricans from getting the care they needed for treatable ailments, even as President Donald Trump lauded his administration's response.

A year after Maria roared across the Caribbean, reporters for The Associated Press, the news site Quartz and Puerto Rico's Center for Investigative Journalism have put together the most detailed portrait yet of the agonizing final days of victims of the storm,

interviewing 204 families of the dead and reviewing accounts of 283 more to tell the stories of heretofore anonymous victims.

Trump cast doubt on the storm's widely accepted death toll Thursday, tweeting that "3000 people did not die" when Maria hit after a near-miss by Hurricane Irma in September, 2017. He said the death count had been inflated "by the Democrats in order to make me look as bad as possible," by adding unrelated deaths to the toll from causes like old age.

But the joint investigation reflects how Puerto Rico's most vulnerable fell victim to dire conditions created by the storms.

Disabled and elderly people were discharged from overwhelmed hospitals with bedsores that led to fatal infections. Medical oxygen ran out.

People caught lung infections in sweltering private nursing homes and state facilities. Kidney patients got abbreviated treatments from dialysis centers that lacked generator fuel and fresh water, despite pleas for federal and local officials to treat them as a higher priority, according to patient advocates.

Along with post-storm conditions, each death has a complex mix of causes that can include serious pre-existing conditions and individual decisions by patients, caregivers and doctors, making it difficult to definitively apportion blame in every case.

But critics say many could have been saved by better preparation and emergency response.

US retail sales up just 0.1 pct.
after previous gain

U.S. retail sales barely rose in August as consumers slowed their spending after a robust month of shopping in July.

The Commerce Department said Friday that the value of purchases ticked up just 0.1 percent last month, the smallest increase in six months.


But the sluggish figure may prove only a temporary blip.

It partly reflected falling prices for items like clothing, and it followed a strong gain of 0.7 percent in July.

Consumer confidence soared to its highest level in 18 years in August as Americans expressed a more optimistic outlook on the economy.

That suggests that retail sales could rebound in the coming months.

Keeping their hands out of the cookie jar

Apple, Firefox tools aim to thwart Facebook, Google tracking

NEW YORK — Facebook and other companies routinely track your online surfing habits to better target ads at you. Two web browsers now want to help you fight back in what's becoming an escalating privacy arms race.

New protections in Apple's Safari and Mozilla's Firefox browsers aim to prevent companies from turning "cookie" data files used to store sign-in details and preferences into broader trackers that take note of what you read, watch and research on other sites.

Lance Cottrell, creator of the privacy service Anonymizer, said Apple's effort was particularly significant, as it takes aim at a technique developed by tracking companies to override users' attempts to delete their cookies.

Safari makes these protections automatic in updates coming Tuesday to iPhones and iPads and a week later to Mac computers. Firefox has similar protections on Apple mobile devices and is rolling

Many of these are from Facebook and Google, which are expected to command a combined 57 percent of the \$107 billion U.S. digital advertising market this year, according to the research group eMarketer.

out them out to personal computers in the coming months.

To get the protections, you'll have to break your habit of using Google's Chrome browser, which by some estimates has more than half of the worldwide browser usage. Safari and Firefox have less than 20 percent combined.

Even then, Safari and Firefox can't entirely stop tracking. For starters, they won't block tracking when you're using Facebook or Google itself. Nor can they help much when you use phone or tablet apps, unless the app happens to embed Safari, as Twitter's iPhone app does.

But Will Strafach, a mobile security expert who is designing data security tools for phones, said imperfect

protection is better than no protection. He notes that burglars can still break down a door, but that doesn't mean you shouldn't bother locking it.

Cookies and other trackers can be used by companies to keep track of who you are as you move from website to website. The companies can build a digital profile as you, say, read about Democratic or Republican viewpoints, buy a particular brand of pet food or indulge in the entire season of "Keeping Up With The Kardashians."

News, video and other third-party sites use Google and Facebook cookies to customize ads to your hobbies and interests, rather than hawking products you might never buy. That's why you might see an ad for shoes soon after searching for them elsewhere.

Safari will try to automatically distinguish cookies that are useful from ones that are there just to track you. Apple notes that cookies can appear in unexpected places, such as sites that embed "like" and "share" buttons. Now, those cookies will be blocked until you click on one of those buttons, in which case you'll be prompted for permission to allow the tracking. If you don't, your "like" won't register.

Court ponders next steps in DeVos lawsuit

WASHINGTON — The Trump administration on Friday asked the court for another chance to delay an Obama-era policy meant to boost protections for students defrauded by for-profit schools.

The request comes two days after the court

ruled that Education Secretary Betsy DeVos' move to freeze the regulation known

as borrower defense was "arbitrary and capricious."

That decision dealt a severe blow to her efforts to ease regulations on the for-profit college industry.

Attorney Adam Pulver with Public Citizen, an advocacy group, said defrauded students are facing "continuing everyday harm" and asked the court that the delayed regulation be enforced immediately.

But lawyers for the Department of Education asked Judge Randolph Moss to give the agency a chance to correct the mistakes the court identified in how the delay was put in place.

It also asked that in case the court does rule that the Obama regulation must take effect, that it grant the department 60 days to prepare.

Judge Moss did not say when he would issue a ruling.

Massachusetts Attorney General Maura Healey, who took part in the lawsuit against DeVos along with a group of Democratic attorneys general from a number of states, said Wednesday's ruling was "a victory for every family defrauded by a predatory for-profit school."

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Use sensible approach on climate change

There is a conservative approach to climate change, one that takes a pragmatic path to protecting our most valuable asset: Earth. The approach is businesslike. And it boils down to this: Just as people buy insurance to protect themselves from auto, fire and health catastrophes, mankind should take precautions to protect the world against the catastrophic effects of climate change.

It's a risk management approach, something that most in Jacksonville — Florida's business city — should appreciate.

It embraces this reality: reducing carbon in the atmosphere can actually help our economy by encouraging innovation, energy independence, national security, air quality, health and jobs.

Former U.S. Rep. Bob Inglis, a Republican from South Carolina, is among the growing number of Americans who accept the growing evidence that climate change is real.

Inglis has proposed a revenue neutral tax on carbon; it would include returning revenue to taxpayers and rolling back environmental regulations like the Clean Power Plan.

Meanwhile, longtime establishment Republicans like George Schultz, James Baker and Hank Paulson want corporate America to take the initiative on climate change; they prefer that to having government try to mandate corporate behavior.

Of course, the skeptics say Americans should just ignore all of the warning signs.

But instead of asking the rest of us to close our eyes to what's obvious, these skeptics need to finally open their eyes.

Florida and flooding

"There's no such thing as a home that doesn't flood in Florida," Larry LaHue, senior planner for Volusia County Emergency Management, recently told the Daytona Beach News Journal.

"There's high risk and low risk," LaHue added, "but there's no such thing as no risk."

In fact, Federal Emergency Management Agency officials warn that their flooding maps should not be used to calculate risks.

Hurricanes Matthew and Irma woke up much of Florida, especially Northeast Florida, to the dangers of storms; storm surge, coupled with rising seas, produced impacts not seen in generations.

Of Florida's 67 counties, 49 are at high risk for flooding, according to Florida's mitigation plan.

But sunny-day flooding already is a fact in Miami Beach, and flooding incidents are increasing in local places like Mayport.

"Officials across Florida have yet to get a firm grip on what rising sea levels could mean for the state's future flooding woes," the News Journal reported.

Take a tropical storm, add a storm surge, then sea level rise, high levels of rainfall and high tides — and you have a recipe for disaster.

Surge in renewables

Coal and gas fuel are facing increasing competition from renewable energy sources, reports Bloomberg New Energy Finance. For example, the cost of lithium-ion batteries has plunged by 79 percent since 2010.

Batteries are the real game changer; they are a more reliable source of consistent energy than wind or solar.

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Obama reminds us why Trump is president

How hard can that be? Saying that Nazis are bad," former President Barack Obama asked a crowd in Illinois last week. Well, probably no harder than saying the words "radical Islam," I imagine.

Or maybe it's slightly less difficult than not sending billions of dollars to Holocaust-denying terror regimes that have both the means and intent to murder Jews — in 2018, not 1942. And it's definitely a lot easier than not meeting, posing, and then smiling for a picture with Louis Farrakhan. But thanks for the lecture.

Obama may well find the presence of a few hundred pathetic white supremacists more perilous than a deadly worldwide ideological movement with millions of adherents. But just as Obama's sins do not excuse President Trump's inexplicable answer to the Charlottesville riot, Trump's words don't excuse the most divisive modern president, a man whose unilateralism and contempt for the process and the Constitution helped create the environment in which Americans now find themselves.

While Obama's self-reverential speech was crammed with revisionism,

the most jaw-dropping contention from the former president was probably a defense of his record on free speech: "I complained plenty about Fox News," the scandal-ridden Obama explained, "but you never heard me threaten to shut them down, or call them 'enemies of the people.'"

That's the thing. We often hear Trump's hyperbolic, and sometimes destructive, attacks on the press.

It's worth remembering that it was Obama who called out the Supreme Court during a State of the Union speech for defending the First Amendment in the Citizens United case, and his allies who still argue that state should be able to ban political documentaries — and, yes, books.

Let's also not forget Obama's Internal Revenue Service admitted to, and then apologized for, cracking down on conservative political groups. It was the Obama administration that blamed the Benghazi attack on free speech, apologizing to tyrannies for the excesses of free expression, and then, for good measure, threw the amateurish filmmaker behind "The Innocence of Muslims" into jail.

Most of all, let's not forget that Obama did a lot more than complain about Fox News. The administration was so preoccupied with the cable news network (the only major station that could reasonably be seen as the opposition) that top-ranking administration officials like Anita Dunn,

Rahm Emanuel and David Axelrod all engaged in a concerted effort to openly delegitimize its coverage.

That was unprecedented, but OK. Less OK, though, was that not long after that effort, Attorney General Eric Holder decided to spy on a Fox journalist — shopping his case to three separate judges, until he found one who let him name reporter James Rosen as a co-conspirator in a crime of reporting the news.

We also know that the administration spied on Associated Press reporters, although the scandal received only a fraction of the coverage afforded an average Trump hyperbolic tweet. Is it any wonder that many of us view the panic-stricken reaction to everything Trump does as contrived and hypocritical?

None of Trump's actions thus far rise to the level of any of these Obama attacks on free expression. Not a single person has been prevented from reporting the news and leveling any criticism he desires. If anything, the policy positions and Supreme Court picks of the administration have strengthened First Amendment protections.

The former president's haughty finger-wagging reminds us that the Trump presidency is, in big part, a manifestation of the resulting fracture from the systematic destruction of process and subversion of political standards by Obama's administration and its allies.

Paul Manafort pleads guilty, will cooperate

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump's former campaign chairman Paul Manafort agreed Friday to cooperate with the special counsel's Trump-Russia investigation as he pleaded guilty to federal crimes and avoided a second trial that could have exposed him to more time in prison.

The deal gives special counsel Robert Mueller a key cooperator who steered the Trump election effort for a pivotal stretch of the 2016 presidential campaign. The result also ensures the investigation will extend far beyond the November congressional elections despite entreaties from the president's lawyers that Mueller bring it to a close.

It is unclear what information Manafort is prepared to offer investigators about the president or that could aid Mueller's investigation into Russian interference in the 2016 election. But his involvement in key episodes under

scrutiny, and his leadership of the campaign at a time when prosecutors say Russian intelligence was working to sway the election, may make him an especially valuable witness.

The agreement makes Manafort the latest associate of Trump, a president known to place a premium on loyalty among subordinates, to admit guilt and work with investigators in hopes of leniency.

Then came Friday's extraordinary development when Manafort agreed to provide any information asked of him, testify whenever asked and even work undercover if necessary.

Mueller has already secured cooperation from a former national security adviser who lied to the FBI about discussing sanctions with a Russian ambassador, a campaign aide who broached the idea of a meeting with Russian President Vladimir Putin; and another aide who was indicted alongside Manafort but ultimately turned on him. Trump's former personal lawyer has separately pleaded guilty in New York.

Bay County sets budget for fiscal year

PANAMA CITY — The Bay County Commission approved the county budget for the fiscal year during a public hearing Tuesday, without raising the millage rate.

The county's overall budget is around \$326 million and the countywide millage rate is 4.4362, the same as last year.

Commission Chairman Bill Dozier said Bay County has the seventh lowest millage rate in Florida.

"The budget we passed, we had a small increase this year," Dozier said. "It's a 1.67 percent increase on the bottom line number. The property values increased a small amount. It's a very good budget this year."

"It's fair across the board. We're going to be able to accomplish quite a few things."

The passage of the half-cent sales tax is figured into the budget and will "help tremendously," Dozier said.

Infrastructure will be

maintained and roads will be paved, Dozier said.

The adopted budget for the 2017-18 fiscal year was around \$318 million.

Transit this year is budgeted around \$5.8 million, while the library is around \$3.4 million.

Mosquito control is budgeted around \$1.5 million and solid waste is around \$16.9 million.


Several outside agencies are also budgeted \$349,500 in total.

Included in the list of agencies are Anchorage Children's Home which will get \$45,000 and Second Chance of Northwest Florida which will get \$10,000.

No one from the public objected to or even spoke about the budget or millage rate during Tuesday's hearing.

Commissioner Guy Tunnell said the budget process went smoothly this year.

A final budget hearing similar to Tuesday's meeting will be held Sept. 18 at 5:01 p.m. at the Bay County Government Center, 840 West 11th Street in Panama City.

Flooding likely cause of unhatched sea turtles

Over 100 unhatched eggs were recovered from this loggerhead sea turtle nest near Public Beach Access 64 by Panama City Beach Turtle Watch during a nest excavation.

It is suspected that the unhatched turtles died because of flooding related to heavy rainfall from Tropical Storm Gordon.

Heavy flooding over sea turtle nests can drown unhatched turtles in their shells.

There are about a dozen remaining sea turtle nests in the area that could have been impacted from flooding. Turtle Watch is monitoring the remaining nests and will excavate the nests three days after their projected hatching date.





Where does Florida rate on obesity levels compared to US?

A new report shows Florida has a lower adult obesity rate than many other states.

Just under 30 percent of adults living in Florida are obese, ranking the state 36th in the U.S.

The report was released Thursday by Trust for America's Health and the Robert Wood Johnson

Foundation. West Virginia has highest rate with 38 percent, and Colorado the lowest with 22.6 percent.

No state had a statistically significant improvement in its obesity rate over the past

year. The report says Iowa, Massachusetts, Ohio, Oklahoma, Rhode Island and South Carolina saw their adult obesity rates increase significantly between 2016 and 2017.

Health experts say obesity drives an estimated \$149 billion annually in health care spending and an extra \$66 billion in lowered economic productivity.

SpaceX changes plans

CAPE CANAVERAL — SpaceX said it has signed the first private moon traveler, with some changes to its original game plan.

The big reveal on who it is — and when the flight to the moon will be — will be announced Monday at the company's headquarters in Hawthorne, California.

It's not the same mission SpaceX founder Elon Musk outlined last year. The original plan called for two paying passengers to fly around the moon this year, using a Falcon Heavy rocket and a Dragon crew capsule.

At the time, Musk said the pair approached SpaceX about sending them on a weeklong flight and paid a "significant" deposit for the trip.

The new strategy is to still fly around the moon, but using an even bigger SpaceX rocket still in development that has its own dedicated passenger ship. And now, it appears there will be only one person aboard.

Given that this new BFR rocket, as it's dubbed, has yet to be built, the flight presumably is at least a few years off.

SpaceX put out the teaser via Twitter late Thursday, and Musk also tweeted out the news. Company representatives declined to offer additional details Friday.

Musk's ultimate goal is to colonize Mars. This lunar mission — a flyby, not a landing — represents "an important step toward enabling access for everyday people who dream of traveling to space," SpaceX said

in a tweet.

On its website, SpaceX is touting the "first passenger on lunar BFR mission," implying there will be more.

This could be humanity's first lunar visit since 1972, depending on how NASA's latest moon plans shape up. Twenty-four NASA astronauts flew to the moon from 1968 through 1972, and only 12 of them strolled its dusty surface. Next

July will mark the 50th anniversary of the first manned moon landing by Apollo 11's Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin.

NASA is shooting for its own flyby of the moon, with a crew, around 2023. The space agency aims to build a gateway in the vicinity of the moon, complete with staff, during the 2020s. It's envisioned as a base for exploration of the moon, Mars and beyond.

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
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2 face sex-with-juvenile charges

PANAMA CITY — Two Panama City men have been arrested for allegedly paying a juvenile for sex, according to reports from the Bay County Sheriff's Office.

Michael Hunt, 53, and Jervonte Johns, 24, face charges of unlawful sexual activities with a minor and lewd and lascivious molestation.

Panama City Police Department officers were investigating an unrelated case when a juvenile

disclosed to them she had been having a sexual relationship with two adult males.

The incidents took place in the county, so the information was given to the sheriff's office, BCSO

reported.

Contact was made with the victim and an interview was conducted by the Gulf Coast Children's Advocacy Center.

The victim disclosed that Hunt had originally

approached the victim to offer her a job at his business, Polecats, deputies wrote.

They began a sexual relationship after that, officers added.

Investigators spoke to witnesses that told them Hunt would come to the victim's home almost daily to pick her up.

The victim stated they would drive to an apartment parking lot and engage in sex and Hunt would pay her, deputies wrote.

Hunt is a registered sex offender with similar charges in the past, they

added.

Investigators spoke with Hunt who denied knowing the victim. Hunt was arrested on Sept. 12.

Also during the interview conducted by GCCAC, the same victim gave information concerning a barber at a barbershop in the Panama City Mall, identified as Johns.

The victim stated Johns gave her a pill which made her feel intoxicated. He then drove her in his car to an isolated area possibly on Highway 20 and forced her to engage in a sexual act, deputies

wrote. He also paid her, they added.

Another BCSO Criminal investigator aware of these cases realized that Johns was a suspect he had been trying to locate and identify, deputies wrote.

In this investigation the victim, also a juvenile, has stated she had engaged in sexual relations with a man she knew only as Jervonte who lived in an apartment complex on Harrison Avenue, and worked as a barber, deputies wrote.

Johns was arrested Thursday.

UCF improperly used \$38M on project

TALLAHASSEE — The University of Central Florida's chief financial officer stepped down Thursday after an audit revealed the school improperly used \$38 million in state funding to construct a campus building.

UCF President Dale Whittaker told the state university system's Board of Governors on Thursday that the school has replenished the state money, while taking steps to investigate the problem and to prevent similar occurrences in the future.

The use of state operating funds to build the 137,000-square-foot Trevor Colbourn Hall, which opened this semester at UCF, was in violation of state policy that restricts that money to activities like instruction, research, libraries, student services or maintenance.

The improper use of the funds is the first major leadership test for Whittaker, who took over Florida's largest state university in July. And the issue could have ramifications for the entire university-system budget, as it will provide fodder for lawmakers who have been skeptical about the universities' control of large reserve funds.

It drew the immediate ire of Board of Governors members, who oversee the 12-school system.

"This is a serious breach of trust. And trust is something that is earned. So we've got a journey ahead to earn back that trust,"

Syd Kitson, chairman of the board's budget committee, told Whittaker.

"It's about our trust. And when something like this goes off the tracks, it destroys the trust of the whole system," said Ned Lautenbach, chairman of the board.

He and Kitson said the incident may impact the university-system budget process. "We're going to have a more difficult time, as we should, with the Legislature, making sure we know what the hell we're doing here and we're on top of things," Lautenbach said. "I am personally very disappointed in this."

Whittaker said he first learned about the problem last month when the Florida Auditor General's Office alerted the school to its discovery during an audit that the \$38 million in construction funding for Colbourn Hall violated state policy. The building project, which dated back to at least 2014, and funding were under the control of William Merck, the UCF chief financial officer and vice president for administration and finance.

After the auditor's notification, Whittaker said Merck took "immediate and full responsibility" for the misuse of the money. He said he accepted Merck's decision to retire and removed any "fiduciary" oversight from the vice president, although he remained at the school.

Following Whittaker's report to the Board of Governors, which was meeting Thursday in Sarasota, the school announced Merck had left his job. He was

paid \$342,348 a year.

After he learned about the problem, Whittaker said he developed a plan to replace the money with appropriate funding the university was holding in various reserves. The replacement funds included \$36.7 million from the university's "auxiliary funds," including investment earnings, and \$950,000 from concession funds.

The replenishment plan was approved by UCF's board of trustees last week in an emergency meeting.

"It was not easy pooling together multiple sources of funds, but I wanted to immediately correct the funding situation at one time, not phased over multiple years," Whittaker told the Board of Governors. "At the same time, I directed our team to ensure students are not adversely affected by these financial moves."

He also instituted a policy for future building projects that would require certification from multiple administrators, including the president and general counsel, that funding is "appropriate for that purpose."

UCF has also hired the Atlanta law firm of Bryan Cave Leighton and Paisner to conduct an independent investigation of the incident, looking at issues such as how other projects may have been funded and how many people were aware of how the Colbourn Hall project was being financed.

"Most importantly, it's evident that the controls governing how decisions were made at the institutional level broke down, and clear information about funding sources was not transparently shared," Whittaker said.

He said the independent

review would "examine our processes, delegations of authority, procedures and personnel."

Whittaker said the school may take further steps once it receives the law firm's report.

Whittaker began his remarks to the Board of Governors by saying he wanted to address "completely and transparently how UCF has fallen short of expectations," while outlining the steps the school is taking to prevent future incidents.

"The bottom line is this: In my presidency, something like this will never happen," he said.

In addition to questions for Whittaker, the Board of Governors members raised questions about the role of the UCF board of trustees, which has oversight over the president and spending at the university.

Marcos Marchena, chairman of the UCF board, said he was involved in the financing decisions for Colbourn Hall, which originally involved a plan to renovate the former Colbourn Hall, one of the oldest facilities on campus. Over several years, the renovation project evolved into a plan to build a separate new building, after officials learned it would be more cost-effective.

Marchena said at each step of the way "representations were very clear that we had the necessary funds and the appropriate funds."

"Looking back, I wish I had asked that extra question. But we asked a lot of questions. We were misled. And we're going to take steps, as President Whittaker said, to try to make sure that it doesn't happen again," he told the Board of Governors.

False fire alarms trigger
at Parkland high school**

False fire alarms at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School have been triggering memories of a mass shooting that killed 17 on Valentine's Day.

Broward County school officials say the Parkland school has had a code red drill, two fire drills and five false alarms since school started Aug. 15. Officials say three alarms sounded when students pulled the fire alarm.

Superintendent Robert Runcie tweeted Wednesday that officials are working with the Coral Springs-Parkland Fire Department to "resolve" the fire alarm issues. He says fire officials will be assigned to the school to monitor fire alarm panels.

The Sun-Sentinel reports that on some days, two fire alarms have sounded. That's the same pattern as the day of the shooting when the alarm was set off during the shooting.

Florida candidate
gets probation**

A former Republican candidate for the Florida Legislature will avoid prosecution for falsely claiming she had a college degree if she serves 90 days of probation and completes 25 hours of community service.

The Sarasota Herald-Tribune reported that Melissa Howard signed a deferred prosecution agreement Friday. The agreement means Howard won't be formally charged with a crime. She had faced a misdemeanor count of misrepresenting her academic standing at a

university.

In the weeks before last month's primary election, Howard posted a photo of herself with what looked like a Miami University diploma. The Ohio school later sent reporters a statement saying she attended the school but never graduated.

Howard eventually admitted she didn't graduate from the school and dropped out of the race.

Woman leaves newborn
at Florida fire station**

Authorities say a woman left her "hours old" baby in the arms of a firefighter at a South Florida fire station.

The SunSentinel reports the baby was left at Fire Station 38 in Davie on Thursday morning. Under the state's Safe Haven law, parents are allowed to leave newborns at a fire station or a hospital emergency room with no questions asked.

Police were not called when the mother left the child, who was wrapped in a towel.

Battalion Chief Daniel Moran says "moms in crisis should know it's completely anonymous and in the best interests of the child" to bring babies to authorities if they can't take care of them.

Moran says the baby was about 6 pounds and "in good condition."

She will be put up for adoption.

Rubio: Bredesen tries to
'pull a fast one'**

Republican Sen. Marco Rubio says Democratic former Tennessee Gov. Phil Bredesen is "trying to pull a fast one" on voters by promising to be moderate if he's elected to the Senate.

The senator from Florida made the comments to reporters Friday after attending a campaign event for Bredesen's opponent, Republican Congresswoman Marsha Blackburn, in Tennessee.

Rubio said Democrats like Bredesen run promising that they're middle of the road, but vote 99.9 percent of the time with lawmakers that Tennesseans would never vote for themselves.

Bredesen campaign spokeswoman Alyssa Hansen said that like Bredesen, Tennesseans are independent thinkers and don't need out-of-state politicians telling them what to do.

Mayor accuses
school of sexism**

The mayor of West Palm Beach is asking the county's school district to discipline an administrator who removed her daughter from classes for wearing ripped jeans and lectured her to consider male classmates' hormones when choosing her wardrobe.

In a Facebook posting on Thursday, West Palm Beach Mayor Melissa McKinlay said her daughter was sent to in-school suspension at Forest Hill High School, missing a day of core classes. She posted a picture of her daughter's jeans, ripped at the knee.

McKinley says while the jeans may have "slightly" violated the dress code, she called the male administrator's comments "girl shaming" and sexist.

Principal Mary Stratos told the Palm Beach Post she'll investigate the alleged administrator's alleged comments. She defended the school's dress code as gender-neutral.

Group: Officials destroying crosses in China


BEIJING — China's government is ratcheting up a crackdown on Christian congregations in Beijing and several provinces, destroying crosses, burning bibles, shutting churches and ordering followers to sign papers renouncing their faith, according to pastors and a group that monitors religion in China.

The campaign corresponds with a drive to "Sinicize" religion by demanding loyalty to the officially atheist Communist Party and eliminating any challenge to its power over people's lives.

Bob Fu of the U.S.-based group China Aid said over the weekend that the closure of churches in central Henan province and a prominent house church in Beijing in recent weeks represents a "significant escalation" of the crackdown.

"The international community should be alarmed and outraged for this blatant violation of freedom of religion and belief," he wrote in an email.

Under President Xi Jinping, China's most powerful leader since Mao Zedong, religious believers are seeing their freedoms shrink

dramatically even as the country undergoes a religious revival. Experts and activists say that as he consolidates his power, Xi is waging the most severe systematic suppression of Christianity in the country since religious freedom was written into the Chinese constitution in 1982.

Fu also provided video footage of what appeared

to be piles of burning bibles and forms stating that the signatories had renounced their Christian faith. He said that marked the first time since Mao's radical 1966-1976 Cultural Revolution that Christians had been compelled to make such declarations, under pain of expulsion from school and the loss of welfare benefits.

A Christian pastor in the Henan city of Nan-yang said crosses, bibles and furniture were burned during a raid on his church on Sept. 5.

The pastor, who asked not to be identified by name to avoid repercussions from authorities, said several people entered the church just as it opened its doors at 5 a.m. and began removing items.

He said the church had been in discussions with local authorities who demanded it "reform" itself, but no agreement had been reached or official documents released.

Chinese law requires religious believers to worship only in congregations registered with the authorities, but many

millions belong to so-called underground or house churches that defy government restrictions.

A local official reached by phone at the Nan-yang city government disputed the account, saying officials respected religious freedom. The man declined to give his name, as is common with Chinese bureaucrats, while a person answering phones at the local religious affairs bureau said they were "not clear" about the matter.

In Beijing, the Zion church was shut on Sunday by around 60 government workers who arrived at 4:30 p.m. accompanied by buses, police cars and fire trucks, the church's pastor, Ezra Jin Mingri, said Monday. Zion is known as the largest house church in Beijing, with six branches.

The officials declared the gatherings illegal and sealed off church properties, Jin said, after already freezing the pastor's personal assets in an apparent attempt to force him to comply with their demands.

"Churches will continue to develop. Blocking

the sites will only intensify conflicts," Jin told The Associated Press by phone.

A notice posted Sunday on the website of the Chaoyang district government in Beijing said the Zion Church had been closed because it failed to register with the government.

All of China's officially recognized religions appear to have been affected by the crackdown.

In the most extreme example, an estimated 1 million Uighurs and other members of Muslim minority groups in the country's northwest have been arbitrarily detained in indoctrination camps where they are forced to denounce Islam and profess loyalty to the Communist Party.

The government says it is taking necessary measures to eliminate extremism, but denies setting up the camps.

China has an estimated 38 million Protestants, and experts have predicted that the country will have the largest Christian population in a few decades.

"We had a hard time all night long, we didn't tackle well, we didn't block well," Tillman said.

"We had an epidemic of missed tackles. (McLaughlin) was a patient runner, but when there was a cutback lane we'd be in a spot to make a tackle and we'd stop our feet and go to arm tackling."

McLaughlin also had a punt return to a touchdown. Rutherford plays another Class 1A power when it hosts Port St. Joe next week at Bozeman.


under center, but he came back in after getting cleared by the team's medical staff and accounted for 387 yards of Syracuse's offense and all three touchdowns.

He opened the next tournament in Cleveland, Ohio, with a 4-over 74, however, and ultimately missed the cut by two shots. That dropped Seiffert to a tie for 46th on the money list and nos. 26-50 qualify for playing privileges on the Web.com Tour next season.

Seiffert's failure to play into the weekend in the third of four tournaments will drop him farther down the money list and jeopardize his chances for next year.

During the past two years the former all-Atlantic Coast Conference performer at Florida State has attempted to Monday qualify for events on both the PGA and Web.com tours.

The fact that Seiffert tied for ninth in the PGA's Travelers Championship in June after Monday qualifying lends credence to the thought that he should not be counted out in the final event next week.

How will Gators respond today?

Florida was expected to rout Colorado State — until last week

Back when everything seemed positive, anyone scanning Florida's schedule trying to project the Gators' won-loss record this season likely would have not hesitated when they came to the third game.

They would take one look at the opponent and instantly check the "W" box next to Colorado State.

Eight days ago, today's game in The Swamp seemed like a sure thing, a gimmie win for the Gators. But not now, not after what happened one week ago today.

Exposure is what happened. Kentucky exposed the Gators as not being nearly as good, or nearly as tough and physical, as they thought they were coming off their opening rout of Charleston Southern.

The Gators were man-handled by the 'Cats, losing both lines of scrimmage. And when you lose the line of scrimmage, you usually lose the game, which Florida did.

Getting beat up by Kentucky means one thing: every game is going to be an

adventure from here on out, and there are no sure wins on the schedule, maybe not even Idaho late in the season.

Colorado State obviously isn't the gimmie win everyone had been assuming up until last week.

While the Gators were getting pushed all over the field in the 27-16 loss to Kentucky, the Rams were rallying from a 27-9 deficit in the second half to stun another SEC school, Arkansas, 34-27.

Following the deflating loss, the Gators have had to endure a long week where their physicality and toughness — their manhood — have been questioned by everyone, including their coaches

Meanwhile, out west, the jacked-up Rams went through preparation soaring with confidence, looking forward to this chance to take down a second straight SEC school.

"That win certainly gives them a lot of confidence coming in here this week," UF coach Dan Mullen said. "How they won the game, coming from behind. In two of their games, furious comebacks. That can build a lot of confidence in a team that they're always in the game. No matter

what's going on, they have the opportunity to come back and compete."

The Rams' confidence was up after their big win. It probably went through the roof when they were watching tape of Florida's performance against Kentucky.

Where the Rams are the strongest (the passing game), the Gators are the most vulnerable (a depleted secondary that is missing its best player, Marco Wilson).

Colorado State quarterback K.J. Carta-Samuels, a graduate transfer from Washington, and his receivers have been lighting up every secondary they've faced.

Carta-Samuels and wide receiver Preston Williams, a transfer from Tennessee, have become a lethal combination.

Carta-Samuels is fifth in the FBS in passing yards per game (367.3) and fourth in completions per game (28.0), while Williams is fourth in receptions a game (9.0) and fifth in reception yards a game (130.3).

Carta-Samuels and Williams hooked up 12 times for 154 yards and two touchdowns in the upset of Arkansas.

Two series later, Bay knotted it up by taking advantage of a short field and getting a 7-yard touchdown run from Emmanuel Holmes, with Tanner Reese's extra point tying the game 7-7 with 8:58 left in the second quarter.

The Marlins answered right back with a touchdown of their own, as Hardrick scored from 13 yards out to make it 14-7 with 4:26 to half. Arnold tacked on another score right before the half thanks to another fourth down conversion. Facing a fourth-and-2 from the Bay 24, Ledman took the shotgun snap and moved to his right as if to run an option play and instead pitched it back for a reverse to Risalvato, who raced up the left sideline to pay dirt

what people say," Dungey said. "They have the most athletes, so it's going to be a tough matchup. But I'm confident we have guys that with each week get better and better and better."

FSU has started Taggart's first season at the helm with two lackluster performances.

The Seminoles were shut down 24-3 at home by then-No. 20 Virginia Tech in the season opener to fall out of the top 25 and last week had to rally late to beat FCS foe Samford, also at home, behind quarterback Deondre Francoise (320 yards and three TDs passing).

That's a boost for the Orange's confidence as they try to snap a 10-game losing streak in the series.

"The really cool thing about football is that the most talented team doesn't win all the time," Orange coach Dino Babers said. "The team that plays the best wins. We are going to go out and try to play the very best game and see where that leads us."

Other things to know when Syracuse hosts Florida State on Saturday:

FAST AND FURIOUS

Syracuse's up-tempo offense has scored 117 points in the first two games to rank sixth nationally, and Dungey has hit five different players with TD passes, led by Jamal Custis with three.

"They just go very fast," FSU defensive back Levonta Taylor said. "We've just got to do our job. We know how the game is going to flow. We're going to go out there with something to prove."

AKERS GROUNDED

RB Cam Akers was a force in last year's game against Syracuse, rushing for 199 yards on just 22 carries and scoring twice on the way to a 1,000-yard season as a freshman. So far this year behind an inexperienced offensive

line he has 158 yards on 28 carries, an average of 5.6 yards per carry. That's deceiving because one of his runs was for 85 yards against Virginia Tech, which means he's gained just 73 yards on the other 27 rushes, an average of 2.7.

"I think he's just got to relax a little bit and trust his training," Taggart said.

DEFENSE NEVER RESTS

All but one of Syracuse's 18 scoring drives in the first two games lasted less than three minutes, which means the defense hasn't had much time to rest. The Orange defenders are allowing 454.5 yards per game to rank 108th nationally, but they do have five interceptions, one more than all of last season, to rank second nationally. Freshman Andre Cisco has three of the picks.

SECOND-HALF SEMINOLES

Florida State ranks 120th in pass defense (341 yards per game) and 95th in total defense (422), and the Seminoles have fizzled a lot in the first half. Half-time adjustments by the staff have been effective, though.

FSU has only surrendered 10 points in the second half on 14 drives [- -] a touchdown to Virginia Tech and a field goal to Samford.

STELLAR SPECIAL TEAMS

Syracuse's special teams have operated at a high level in the first two games. The punt coverage team forced a fumble against Wagner and blocked a kick for the second straight game, and walk-on redshirt freshman place-kicker Andre Szmyt is perfect on 15 extra points and four field goals.

"I can't put an emphasis on what that means to this football team," Babers said. "They're really on top of their A game. If we can say that when this season's over, we'll probably be smiling and we may be somewhere sunny."

Serena talks fashion, not fouls, at Las Vegas event

LAS VEGAS — Tennis star Serena Williams talked about her fashion business, not tennis fouls during an appearance before a business convention in Las Vegas.

The 23-time Grand Slam champion said not a word Friday about gender equality in sports or an argument she had last weekend with the chair umpire at her U.S. Open finals match in New York.

Williams said previously she was treated more harshly than a male player would have been after smashing her racket and arguing with match official Carlos Ramos during her finals loss to Naomi Osaka in New York.

She received three code violations and was penalized one game. She was later fined \$17,000.

Williams spent 25 minutes talking onstage with Sarah Robb O'Hagan, chief executive of Flywheel Sports, at the National Retail Federation trade show.

A seminal game that hardly anyone knows about

ATLANTA — It was a seminal moment in the civil rights movement.

In hindsight, one of the most significant games in American history.

Yet most people have never heard the baseball story.

Not even Hank Aaron, who is all too familiar with this nation's resistance to racial equality.

"I didn't know anything about this game," the Hammer conceded.

Well, it's about time that everyone learns what happened in Orlando, Florida on Aug. 9, 1955.

For the first time, an integrated Little League Baseball game — a group of white kids playing a team of African-American youngsters — was held in the Jim Crow South.

"We knew it was different. But when it came right down to it, we were just competing against that other team," said Willie Preyer, who played center field for the all-black Pensacola Jaycees. "It hadn't dawned on us, the significance of it. We just wanted to play baseball. We wanted to go down there and win. We wanted to show our talents."

The 12-year-olds certainly didn't see themselves as civil rights pioneers, even in a country that was barely a year removed from the epic "Brown vs. Board of Education" decision from the Supreme Court, a country that would be rocked less than three weeks later by the brutal murder of black teenager Emmett Till for supposedly whistling at a white woman in Mississippi.

"We just played the game," said Stewart Hall, first baseman for the all-white Orlando Kiwanis team. "When it was over, there was no more discussion about it. We just went on to our next game. It was

almost routine."

Of course, there was nothing routine about the moment.

That same summer, a group of black Little Leaguers captured the South Carolina state championship by default, simply because no white team would agree to play them. It looked like the same thing would happen to the Pensacola Jaycees, who advanced to their state tournament only because every white team in the Florida Panhandle decided to forfeit.

But when they got to Orlando, the Jaycees finally found a willing opponent.

And, fortunately for us, the new documentary "Long Time Coming: A 1955 Baseball Story" has brought this amazing snippet in the American experience back to life.

The movie debuted in April at the Florida Film Festival. It will be shown again Saturday night at the Carter Center in Atlanta, followed by a Q&A featuring Aaron, Hall and another member of the Jaycees team, Admiral "Spider" LeRoy. The creators are trying to line up a distributor to release their film to a wider audience.

In a nation torn apart by racial, ethnic and political divisions, the timing couldn't be better.

Those 12-year-old boys — now in the later innings of life — could be the perfect messengers of hope and reconciliation.

"It's not about what kind of ballgame it was," the 75-year-old Hall said. (For the record, Orlando prevailed 5-0). "It's a marvelous message of what happens when people come together, sit down and start talking with some civility. Then you can work through your problems, your issues. When a bunch of guys from Orlando and a bunch of guys from Pensacola got a chance to meet up again, we just became brothers. That's what I hope everyone sees."

Indeed, at the end of the 87-minute film, the producers arranged a reunion

in Pensacola between 13 surviving members of the teams. They met at the center of a youth baseball field, approaching each other from opposite dugouts, the first time they had seen each other in more than six decades.

In a matter of minutes, all those years melted away.

"I had butterflies. We were all nervous about what we were going to say," Hall said. "But what you saw, the first time seeing each other, not a thing in the film was scripted. Everything happened naturally. It was electric. It was emotional. It only took a few moments before we were all hugging and laughing and crying."

The documentary provides a circuitous route to that touching moment — focusing first on the game itself, then racing through a quick recap of key moments in the civil rights movement, finally flashing forward to where these now-elderly men ended up and, more tellingly, how they would come to think about the world after all those years.

Baseball greats such as Aaron, Cal Ripken Jr., Gary Sheffield and Davey Johnson, along with civil rights pioneer Andrew Young, are brought in to add some context to what this game — and baseball itself — meant in the struggle for equality.

"You could say that God kind of had his hands on me, directing me on the right path," Aaron said in an interview this week with The Associated Press. "I don't know any other way I would have gotten out of Mobile, Alabama except for baseball."

You see white men who look back on their childhood as idyllic.

You see black men who remember nothing but ugliness and barriers.

You see men from both teams fretting about the nasty turn America has taken in recent years.

We need to remember those small but epic steps forward. We could use a lot more of them.

Longer season?

Hurricane stokes talk of extending college football season

With an eye toward player safety and scheduling flexibility, the NCAA last year considered ways to lengthen the college football season so every team would have 14 weeks to play 12 games every year.

It didn't come to pass.

The topic popped up again this week as Hurricane Florence prompted the cancellation, postponement or relocation of more than a dozen games, just two weeks after two other games were called off because of lightning in the Midwest.

A longer season with more open dates would increase the chances of rescheduling games impacted by weather.

But issues that kept coaches from supporting a permanent 14-week season — mainly, having to start preseason camp in July — are still a factor and unpredictable weather is not likely a big enough headache to change things.

"Every year this is going to happen a couple times," said Jon Nese, a meteorologist for Penn State and a former storm analyst for The Weather Channel. "It doesn't leap off the page to me as something that is a primary discussion item."

This season, for the first time, each Football Bowl Subdivision conference will play a conference championship game on the first Saturday in December.

With that in mind, the NCAA oversight committee in 2017 did a deep dive on what it would take to allow teams to have two open dates every season.

"Aspirationally, what we wanted to do was build in some recovery time for the players during the course of the season and try and do it in a way that was equitable," said Big 12 Commissioner Bob Bowlsby, the former chairman of the oversight committee. "In the end, the 14-week season with the two byes just wasn't going to work from a practical standpoint so we moved away from it."

The problem: There was no good way to compress preseason practice into August. When the NCAA eliminated two-a-day practices, a long-time staple of preseason football, it also cut down the number of total practices allowed from 29 to 25. That way teams could continue to

start practice in early August and give players the required amount of time off.

To play games the week before Labor Day weekend and still work in 25 practices, teams would have to start practicing in July.

Bowlsby said some 14-week schedule scenarios had teams opening practice as early as July 20, even before some players would be done with courses they often take to lighten the academic load during the season.

"For some universities it was actually before their summer school classes were over," Bowlsby said.

Todd Berry, the executive director of the American Football Coaches Association, said coaches were concerned about preseason practices bumping into media day obligations in July as well as camps for high school players that are typically held the last week of the month.

And while the intent behind a 14-week season was to create more open dates, it also opened the possibility of adding another regular-season game down the road.

"Our coaches were stressed out about that," Berry said.

A solution could be further decreasing the number of preseason practices to about 20.

"Our group went to 25 and felt like that was the minimal amount," Berry said. "Just getting people's bodies ready to make safe tackles and safe blocks takes some time."

Creating space to reschedule games that might get postponed by potentially dangerous weather, a task that is near impossible now, never came up in the 14-week season discussion, Bowlsby said.

Last year, hurricanes Harvey and Irma caused cancellations and rescheduling in college football. Hurricane Matthew disrupted the 2016 season. But meteorologists caution about seeing this spate of storms as a trend.

"You'd have to take a look at a really large range of time to really start to pick up on any patterns or correlations," said Lara Pagano, a meteorologist with the Weather Prediction Center of the National Weather Service. "So at this point we really can't say one way or another, but I'm sure a lot of researchers and climatologists will be taking a look at that over the years to come."

Truex craves big finish at Furniture Row

LAS VEGAS — Martin Truex Jr. could have been down this week while he prepared for the start of the NASCAR playoffs. After all, his race team is going out of business soon, and nobody has confirmed where he'll drive next year.

Instead, the defending Cup series champion was excited as he returned to Las Vegas. Furniture Row Racing's days are definitively numbered, but he wants the entire crew to seize the opportunity to go out with a once-in-a-lifetime bang.

"I feel like we're in a great place," Truex said. "We definitely want to repeat, no question about it."

The 10 playoff races to end the NASCAR season are also a long farewell for Furniture Row, the plucky underdogs who somehow won it all last year. Owner Barney Visser is closing up shop — but not before Truex gets a shot at repeating his 2017 achievement, starting Sunday at Las Vegas Motor Speedway.

Truex knows that the only thing more improbable than

last year's championship run by a one-car team from Colorado would be a second title under even more difficult circumstances.

"I think you could take it one of two ways," Truex said. "You could hang your head down and say, 'This sucks. Why are we in this position?' and get mad at the world, or you can look at each other and say, 'Let's go do this.' I think all of us, we look at that and say, 'Hell yeah. Let's go do this. Let's send Barney out on top and let's give him the best going-away gift that we ever could.'"

Truex is gunning for the first repeat Cup championship run since Jimmie Johnson got his fifth straight in 2010. Truex and crew chief Cole Pearn have a genuine chance to pull it off: Their car has been in a three-man derby with Kyle Busch and Kevin Harvick atop the standings for most of the season, with Truex winning four races and posting 15 top-5 finishes.

But it's all bittersweet as one of the most incredible success stories in recent motorsports history comes to an end this winter with the end of Furniture Row.





LSU TRAVELS TO AUBURN IN GAME WITH HIGHER STAKES THAN ORIGINALLY EXPECTED

KEYS FOR LSU

Run downhill: The Tigers have relied in recent years on big-time backs like Leonard Fournette and Derrius Guice. They come into this game ranked 11th in the league in rushing offense, and will need a ground game to keep Auburn's defense honest.

Take it away: LSU is tied for first in the conference in turnover margin at plus-five, while Auburn has lost four fumbles. The visiting Tigers will need to create some turnovers to give themselves the best chance to win.

KEYS FOR AUBURN

Sustain drives: Auburn is ranked 12th in the SEC in third-down conversions, getting a first down just 11 of 28 times for 39.3 percent. The home Tigers will need to do better in this category against a salty LSU defense.

Be ball hawks: New LSU quarterback Joe Burrow is completing less than 50 percent of his passes so far but hasn't thrown an interception. Auburn leads the league in interceptions with four, and has returned one for a touchdown. Auburn needs to keep Burrow

from gaining any momentum in the passing game.

PREDICTION

Auburn 24, LSU 17: This has been a crazy series: Les Miles was fired after losing at Auburn in a whacky finish a couple of years ago, and Auburn jumped out to a 20-0 lead last year before LSU rallied to win. This game will probably have something memorable occur, but all that will matter is the final score. Auburn has just a little too much firepower to lose to LSU at home.

ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

In reporting on this deal in the Daily Bulletin from the Yeh Bros Cup in 2017, the editors spoke just a little too soon when they indicated that declarer might need second sight to bring home his game.

As Geir Helgemo showed, basic numeracy might suffice in the right circumstances. A total of 10 declarers brought home four spades — though twice it was declared from the North seat, when the club tenace was protected and declarer had significant extra chances.

The play in four hearts in the match between Sweden and Monaco saw the Monaco West lead a diamond rather than a club. The Swedish declarer missed his chance when, after winning cheaply in hand, he knocked out the heart ace. He won the next diamond, then completed drawing trumps and led out the spade king. At this point, he realized the avoidance play of a low spade to the nine would fail if East won and played a third diamond, leaving the spades blocked. So, he played the spade ace and a third spade. West could win and play a club through to doom the contract.

In the other room, the defenders did lead clubs. East cashed his ace and led a low club. After the defenders played on trump, declarer found East, a passed hand, with two aces and, inferentially, the club jack (or West would have led the club queen to trick one). West was likely to hold the spade queen, or East might have opened. So Helgemo advanced the spade jack from his hand, and could now play the spade suit for no loser.






