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Red tide fading off Bay beaches

Friday's report moves area to 'low' levels and shows drop in fish kills

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BAY COUNTY — New water samples tested by state officials Friday showed a 5- to 25-percent decrease

in the red tide concentration off Bay County and a change in status from "medium" to "low" regarding levels of the *Karenia brevis* organism, according to a Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) status report.

"In Northwest Florida, *K. brevis* was observed in Okaloosa, Bay, Gulf, and Pasco

counties, with up to 'medium' concentrations observed in Gulf County only," according to the FWC update. "Relative to last week, cell counts generally decreased in Bay County."

One hotelier reported clear waters behind the lodging and people taking advantage of it. Other areas that were bothersome earlier in the week also

appeared to have improved Friday. That is a marked difference from samples taken the previous week during which numerous fish, eels and other marine life washed ashore and some beach-goers complained of irritated eyes and lungs, both symptoms of the presence of red tide.

There were no documented reports of "respiratory

irritation" in Bay County for this period. There were nine fish kills reported here during that time, most of them Monday, with none since Wednesday. Affected species included largemouth bass, red drum, sheepshead and catfish.

The Sept. 8-14 reports

"I've been here since the beginning," Downing said during a busy Thursday. "It's calm. It's not stressful and

hectic. I've managed to make a few friends. I like working here.

GOP to accuser: Reach deal or vote is Monday

WASHINGTON — The Senate Judiciary Committee chairman rejected key conditions Friday that Brett Kavanaugh's accuser wants if she is to testify about her claim of sexual assault, and said his panel would vote Monday on Kavanaugh's Supreme Court nomination without an agreement.

Sen. Chuck Grassley, R-Iowa, said he was giving attorneys for Christine Blasey Ford until 10 p.m. Friday to come to a "reasonable resolution" or his Republican-run panel

would vote on sending Kavanaugh's nomination to the full Senate. "We are unwilling to accommodate your unreasonable demands," Grassley said in a written statement.

There was no immediate public response from Ford's lawyers. That silence and Grassley's offer, which did not rule out further compromise, left uncertain whether Ford would appear and tell lawmakers and a captivated nation about her allegation that an inebriated

On Sept. 22, 1949, the Soviet Union exploded its first atomic bomb.

On this date

In 1792, the French First Republic was proclaimed.
In 1862, President Abraham Lincoln issued the preliminary Emancipation Proclamation, declaring all slaves in rebel states should be free as of January 1, 1863.
In 1911, pitcher Cy Young, 44, gained his 511th and final career victory as he hurled a 1-0 shutout for the Boston Rustlers against the Pittsburgh Pirates at Forbes Field.
In 1927, Gene Tunney successfully defended his heavyweight boxing title against Jack Dempsey in the famous "long-count" fight in Chicago.
In 1950, Omar N. Bradley was promoted to the rank of five-star general, joining an elite group that included Dwight D. Eisenhower, Douglas MacArthur, George C. Marshall and Henry H. "Hap" Arnold.
In 1959, Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev arrived in Iowa for a two-day stopover, during which he visited a corn farm, held talks with former Illinois Gov. Adlai Stevenson, and ate his first hot dog.
In 1961, the Interstate Commerce Commission issued rules prohibiting racial discrimination on interstate buses.

Optics key in fight over Kavanaugh hearing

WASHINGTON — The congressional showdown taking shape between Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh and the woman who has accused him of sexual assault is a battle of optics as much as truth, and it comes at the height of campaign season.

At issue are logistics — Christine Blasey Ford's security, her questioners, the placement of reporters and who is allowed in the hearing room.


The back-and-forth also is about how majority Republicans and Democrats answer women who allege assault and the men who deny the accusations in the #MeToo era.

Leading the way for the GOP is President Donald Trump, the former reality show star who on Friday attacked Ford's credibility and zeroes in on people who "make me look as bad as possible."

Snapshots of the Washington drama as early voting begins in some states ahead of the Nov. 6 elections:

Accusation and denial

Kavanaugh was headed toward confirmation to the Supreme Court until Ford identified herself to The Washington Post, alleging that he steered her into a bedroom and tried to undress her when both were teenagers in suburban Maryland in the 1980s. He has staunchly denied her account.

Most everyone in Congress agreed at first that both should have a chance to tell their stories under oath to the Senate Judiciary Committee. The Republican-controlled panel set a hearing for Monday. Kavanaugh accepted, and has spent most of the week at the White House preparing. But Ford said Monday is impossible for her, offering instead to testify later in the week under certain conditions.

Their allies and opponents are issuing ferocious statements, further electrifying the election season atmosphere.

Both families — Kavanaugh's and Ford's — have said they're getting death threats.

The leader

Trump spent most of the week unusually restrained and heeding the tone set

publicly by counselor Kellyanne Conway. Ford, Conway said, should not be ignored or insulted and should be heard. Trump likewise avoided casting doubt on her account, at one point even acknowledging the possibility that Ford could make a credible case if she testifies.

Then early Friday, Trump questioned Ford's credibility and challenged her to provide more evidence than the notes from a therapist reviewed by The Post.

He tweeted, "I have no doubt that, if the attack on Dr. Ford was as bad as she says, charges would have been immediately filed with local Law Enforcement Authorities by either her or her loving parents. I ask that she bring those filings forward so that we can learn date, time, and place!"

He also repeated a question he asked on Fox News

Thursday night in Las Vegas: "The radical left lawyers want the FBI to get involved NOW. Why didn't someone call the FBI 36 years ago?"

There could be many reasons for that, starting with the fact that it's not clear Ford's alleged account would have been a federal crime. Even now, no one is really asking for a criminal investigation. Ford and Democrats want the FBI to add to Kavanaugh's background check with more interviews about her allegation. Trump has refused to ask for that.

The fallout

Trump's abrupt change of course put off at least one person he may need to confirm Kavanaugh in the Senate: Republicans narrowly control, 51-49.

"I was appalled by the president's tweet," said Sen.

Susan Collins, R-Maine. "I'm not saying that's what happened in this case — but we know allegations of sexual assault are one of the most unreported crimes that exist. So I thought that the president's tweet was completely inappropriate and wrong."

The terms

Kavanaugh has said he wants to deny Ford's accusation in sworn testimony, and as soon as possible. As of Friday, he was scheduled to do so on Monday.

Ford says she wants to appear, but has issued a series of conditions that Conway said Friday sound more like demands. The committee is considering Ford's terms:

- Security, including by U.S. Capitol Police that could mirror Kavanaugh's.
- Reporters kept at a distance, as they are for Kavanaugh and most other high-profile hearings.
- Monday is too soon. She says she needs time to secure her home and family.
- She does not want Kavanaugh in the room when she testifies.
- She wants the panel to subpoena Mark Judge, the other person Ford says was in the room when Kavanaugh allegedly attacked her. Judge has said he never saw Kavanaugh behave as Ford has described.
- Ford would prefer that senators, and not an outside counsel hired by Republicans, question her. Having an outside counsel would seem too much like a trial, her attorney told the committee.

Records: Suspect in golfer's death struggled after prison

Police in an Iowa college town had repeated interactions with a troubled drifter in the weeks between his release from prison and his alleged killing of a star student golfer from Spain.

Ames police reports show that 22-year-old Collin Richards struggled with drug and alcohol abuse, mental health problems and homelessness after he got out of prison in June. Records show that Richards' name also came up in a criminal investigation in which several officers served a warrant at the home of one of his associates in August.

Richards is charged with first-degree murder in the killing of Iowa State University student Celia Barquin Arozamena on Monday.

BILLINGS, MONT.

Plan to block new mining near Yellowstone endorsed

U.S. officials recommended approval on Friday of a plan to block new mining claims for 20 years on the forested public lands that make up Yellowstone National Park's northern boundary.

Regional Forester Leanne Marten submitted a letter to the Bureau of Land Management endorsing the plan to withdraw 30,000 acres in Montana's Paradise Valley and the Gardiner Basin from new claims for gold, silver, platinum and other minerals, U.S. Forest Service spokeswoman Marna Daley said.

A final decision is up to the office of U.S. Interior Sec. Ryan Zinke, who favors the withdrawal. Zinke said in a statement that it could be finalized in coming weeks.

GAZA CITY, GAZA STRIP

Gaza officials say Palestinian killed at border protest

Gaza's Health Ministry says a Palestinian has been killed and dozens injured by Israeli fire at a border protest.

Israel's military said Palestinians hurled grenades, explosive devices and rocks toward troops and one soldier sustained light injuries from shrapnel. It said aircraft struck several targets in Gaza in response Friday.

Gaza's militant Hamas rulers are working to escalate weekly protests with additional days and locations since Egypt-mediated cease-fire talks stalled this month.

Hamas has been leading protests since March in part to draw attention to a decade-old Israeli-Egyptian blockade imposed after it took control of the territory in 2007.

ISTANBUL

Turkey says it will patrol north Syria town with US forces

Turkey will soon conduct joint patrols with U.S. forces in the strategic northern Syrian town of Manbij, once a stronghold of the Islamic State group, a top Turkish official said on Friday.

The announcement came as Turkey's Defense Ministry said in a Friday statement that the borders of Idlib's demilitarized zone were determined in a meeting with their Russian counterparts during a three-day meeting.

This week's agreement between Russia and Turkey to set up a demilitarized zone around Syria's northwestern Idlib province to separate government forces from rebels averted a last major opposition stronghold in the country.

BANJA LUKA, BOSNIA-HERZEGOVINA

Lavrov says Russia won't interfere in Bosnia election

Russia won't interfere in next month's elections in Bosnia, an ethnically-divided Balkan nation where Moscow maintains strong influence among the country's Serbs, Russia's foreign minister insisted Friday.

Sergey Lavrov said after talks with officials in Sarajevo, the Bosnian capital, that Russia will respect the outcome in the Oct. 7 general election and won't be backing any party.

Analysts have warned that Lavrov's visit ahead of the vote could be seen as support for the nationalist Bosnian Serb President Milorad Dodik, an ally of Moscow.

Police practicing searches find actual body in RI river

WARWICK, R.I. — A police dive team searching for a mannequin hidden in the Pawtuxet River as part of a body-recovery drill on Wednesday instead found an actual human body, authorities said.

The team found a man's body under the bridge in Pawtuxet Village, said Warwick's police chief, Col. Stephen M. McCartney.

Investigators were not

treating the case as a suspicious death, McCartney confirmed later on Wednesday.

Investigators tentatively identified the man, a 55-year-old Warwick resident. The police would not release his name before notifying the next of kin, McCartney said.

The Warwick dive time trains monthly, he said.

The team's commander, Sgt. Robert Hart, called for a police response to the river at 1:07 p.m., McCartney

said. The training session transitioned into a recovery operation with at least one diver patrolling the river area for an extended period of time Wednesday afternoon.

News of the discovery broke when the Cranston police said they were assisting the Warwick police with a report of a body found in the Pawtuxet River near Naragansett Parkway.

Kavanaugh trapped her on a bed, muffled her cries and tried removing her clothes when both were teenagers in the 1980s.

Grassley's stance underscored a desire by President Donald Trump and GOP leaders to usher the 53-year-old Kavanaugh onto the high court by the Oct. 1 start of its new session and before the November elections, when Democrats are mounting a robust drive to grab congressional control.

The Judiciary panel's top Democrat expressed fury at Grassley's position, and maintained Democrats' effort to build the battle into a larger election-year question about the treatment of women.

"Bullying a survivor of attempted rape in order to confirm a nominee — particularly at a time when she's receiving death threats — is an extreme abuse of power," said Sen. Dianne Feinstein of California.

Friday was the latest in a string of tumultuous days for Kavanaugh, whose ascension to the Supreme Court seemed a sure bet until Ford emerged last weekend and provided

details of the alleged assault. Kavanaugh, a District of Columbia Circuit Court of Appeals judge, has repeatedly denied the accusation.

Earlier, Trump ended a week of constraint and sarcastically assailed Ford, tweeting that if the episode was "as bad as she says," she or "her loving parents" surely would have reported it to law enforcement.

Trump's searing reproach of the California psychology professor defied the Senate Republican strategy, and the advice of White House aides, of not disparaging her while firmly defending his nominee and the tight timetable for confirming him.

also showed background concentrations for Gulf County in one sample, but the recent report stated the county now has background to medium concentrations in six samples.

Earlier this month, red tide

invaded Panama City Beach and neighboring counties, though not at the concentrations found in South Florida and without the massive loss of marine life seen there.

Red tide can harm people via improperly harvested shellfish and from breathing in toxins or through skin contact. The FWC three-day forecast in the status update predicts a shift to the east of surface waters and a shift to

the northeast for subsurface waters.

About 40 fish kills attributed to red tide have been reported in Bay County since the organism arrived. Fish kills can be reported to the FWC at myfwc.com/fishkills or by calling 800-636-0511.

Vinny & Bay's, nestled in downtown Panama City at 310 Harrison Ave., is celebrating its one-year anniversary today.

The business is named for Baylee Hanson, who has Down syndrome and has worked there since it started.

"Working here is really cool," said Hanson, who plays UNO with regular customers. "I've made new friends. It's really cool. I make coffee drinks and milkshakes."

The downtown coffee shop was the dream of Madeline Lovejoy, who said the one-year anniversary is "super exciting" since the community has given "tons of support."

Lovejoy and Hanson are best friends.

"We have regular customers. It's really cool to see customers who don't know

what's going on and see their reaction," Lovejoy said. "But we've also had people who know exactly what's going on here and they travel from all over to come here. I had a lady who came from Minnesota. She has a daughter with autism, and she has never been able to leave without her. She finally got a chance to take a vacation by herself and she chose to come to Panama City just to come to Vinny & Bay's."

The business has exceeded Lovejoy's expectations since she thought it just would be

something small for the community. Instead, it's become something bigger.

For Nichol Downing, Logan's mother, the coffee shop had transformed her son from someone she never saw smile or sing to someone who has done karaoke.

"He now goes down the street by himself. It makes Logan feel really good to be treated normal. He's really, really smart and people don't see that right off because he's not very outgoing and they underestimate his abilities. This place gives him a

chance to show people he can do things. He just wants to be accepted and treated fairly," Nichol Downing said. "A lot of times (special needs people) are hidden because people don't respond well to them. It teaches people they're people just like everyone else and they have feelings like everyone else."

"They want to be treated like everyone else. They don't want to be treated like they're special."

Lovejoy hopes to expand the coffee shop to other locations.

Sheriff: Shooter had mental illness, legally owned gun

ABERDEEN, Md. — The woman who killed three people and wounded others before shooting herself to death at a Maryland drug-store warehouse had been diagnosed with a mental illness and used a legally purchased gun in the rampage, a law enforcement official said Friday.

Harford County Sheriff Jeffrey Gahler told news reporters Friday that the suspect, 26-year-old Snochia Moseley of Baltimore County, had been diagnosed with a mental illness in 2016. "That's as far as I'll go with it," he said, declining to give any more details on her mental state.

He said Moseley had become increasingly agitated in recent weeks, and relatives had been concerned for her well-being.

Gahler said she used a handgun that she legally purchased in March to fire a total of 13 rounds Thursday morning, and died after shooting herself in the head.

Gahler identified the

three people Moseley fatally shot as Sunday Aguda, a 45-year-old man from Baltimore County; Brindra Giri, a 41-year-old woman from Baltimore County; and Hayleen Reyes, a 41-year-old

woman from Baltimore. He also identified the survivors as Hassan Mitchell, a 19-year-old man from Harford County; Wilfredo Villegas, a 45-year-old man from Montgomery County; and Acharya

Purna, a 45-year-old man from New York.

He also gave more details about how the violence unfolded.

Moseley had been hired for the holiday season and had been working there for less than two weeks. She entered the building at 6:30 a.m. As people lined up to come in the building, Gahler said she cut in line and words were exchanged, but it was a "little incident." She left around 7:21 a.m. Moseley, who had worked security jobs in the past, drove to her White Marsh home and got a handgun, pepper spray and handcuffs. She arrived back at the parking lot around 8:35 a.m. and entered the front door around 8:52 a.m.

He says she pulled a hooded shirt over her head and began shooting, striking and killing Aguda outside the building.

Inside, where there were about 65 people, she fatally shot Giri and Reyes and also shot Mitchell, Villegas and Purna, who survived. She shot herself twice before police arrived, he said — once with a grazing wound and then with the fatal shot. She was already down when officers arrived and an officer moved her from the scene, not knowing that she was the shooter, he said.

When asked how Moseley could legally buy a gun after being diagnosed with a mental illness, officials said it had not been determined that she had a "propensity for violence to self or others."

The sheriff said the motive is still a mystery and may remain so.

"There's just no way to make sense of something so senseless," he said. "There's still a lot of questions that we don't know."

New evacuations ordered in SC because of Florence flooding

WILMINGTON, N.C. — A new round of evacuations was ordered in South Carolina as the trillions of gallons of water dumped by Hurricane Florence meanders to the sea, raising river levels and threatening more destruction.

With the crisis slowly moving to South Carolina, emergency managers on Friday ordered about 500 people to flee homes along the Lynches River. The National Weather Service said the river could reach

record flood levels late Saturday or early Sunday, and shelters are open.

Officials downstream sounded dire alarms, pointing out the property destruction and environmental disasters left in Florence's wake.

"Although the winds are gone and the rain is not falling, the water is still there and the worst is still to come in the Pee Dee," South Carolina Gov. Henry McMaster said Friday, referring to the eastern part of the state.

Georgetown County Administrator Sel Hemingway warned the area may see a flood like it has never seen before. "We're at the end of the line of all waters to come down," he said.

Gov. McMaster

estimated damage from the flood in his state at \$1.2 billion in a letter that says the flooding will be the worst disaster in the state's modern history. McMaster asked congressional leaders to hurry federal aid.

North Carolina Gov. Roy Cooper said he knows the damage in his state will add up to billions of dollars, but said with the effects on the storm ongoing, there was no way to make a more accurate estimate.

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Tanzania leader orders arrests as ferry death toll reaches 130

KAMPALA, Uganda — Hundreds of solemn people watched Friday as body after body was pulled from a capsized ferry that Tanzanian authorities said was badly overcrowded and upended in the final stretch before reaching shore. The death toll was above 130 but horrified witnesses feared that would rise as a second day of searching neared an end.

“This is a great disaster for our nation,” President John Magufuli said. He announced four days of national mourning and urged calm in the East African country with a history of deadly maritime disasters. And he ordered arrests of all responsible as a criminal investigation began.

In a televised address, the president said the ferry captain already had been detained after leaving the steering to someone who wasn’t properly trained, The Citizen newspaper reported.

The MV Nyerere’s capacity was 101 people but the ferry had been overloaded when it capsized Thursday afternoon, the government’s Chief Secretary John Kijazi told reporters.

At least 40 people had been rescued, he said, but the number on Friday barely rose. Dozens of security forces and volunteers wearing gloves and face masks had resumed work at daybreak after suspending efforts overnight, hauling bodies into wooden boats.

“More than 200 people are feared dead,” based on accounts from fishermen and other witnesses, because passengers had been returning from a busy market day,

Tanzania Red Cross spokeswoman Godfrida Jola told The Associated Press. “But no one knows” just how many people were on board.

It was obvious that more bodies were trapped in the overturned ferry, the president said, according to The Citizen report. He said even the cargo far exceeded the 25 tons allowed.

Tanzanian ferries often carry hundreds of passengers and are overcrowded, and shifts in weight as people move to disembark can become deadly. Images from the scene showed the ferry’s exposed underside not far from shore.

Bodies were lined up on plastic sheeting as hundreds of people pressed near the water’s edge, watching the search efforts.

Pope Francis, the United Nations secretary-general, Russian President Vladimir Putin and a number of African leaders expressed shock and sorrow.

“His Holiness Pope Francis expresses his heartfelt solidarity with those who mourn the loss of their loved ones and who fear for the lives of those still missing,” the condolence telegram said, according to the Vatican.

The MV Nyerere, named for the former president who led the East African nation to independence, was traveling between the islands of Ukara and Ukerewe when it sank, according to the government agency in charge of servicing the vessels.

Worried residents on Friday waited for any word of survivors.

UK leader May hits back on Brexit plan

LONDON — British Prime Minister Theresa May accused the European Union on Friday of creating an “impasse” in divorce negotiations by bluntly rejecting her blueprint for Brexit, sending the value of the pound falling as worries about a chaotic U.K. exit from the EU soared.

With British newspapers

declaring that May had been “humiliated” by EU leaders, the prime minister used a televised statement from 10 Downing St. to insist she was prepared to take Britain out of the bloc without a deal if it did not treat the country with more respect. Declaring that “we are at an impasse,” May said the EU must lay out “what the real issues are and what their alternative is.”

“Throughout this process, I have treated the EU with nothing but respect,” she said. “The U.K. expects the same. A good relationship at the end of this process depends on it.”

The pound fell 1.5 percent to \$1.3066 on May’s comments, which seemed to make the prospect of an economically disruptive “no deal” Brexit more likely.

May’s strong words belied her weak position: She is a prime minister without a parliamentary majority, caught between the EU and a pro-Brexit wing of her Conservative Party that threatens to oust her if she makes a compromise too far.

May’s combative remarks were calibrated to appease euroskeptical Conservatives ahead of what’s likely to be a bruising annual party conference at the end of the month.

May’s statement followed a fraught EU summit in Salzburg, Austria, which dashed hopes of a breakthrough in stalled divorce talks with only six months to go until Britain leaves the bloc on March 29.

European Council President Donald Tusk said at the meeting that parts of the U.K.’s plan simply “will not work.” French President Emmanuel Macron called pro-Brexit U.K. politicians “liars” who had misled the country about the costs of leaving the 28-nation bloc.

The judgment of British newspapers was brutal. The broadly pro-EU Guardian said May had been “humiliated.” The conservative Times of London said: “Humiliation for May as EU rejects Brexit plan.”

The Brexit-supporting tabloid Sun branded bloc leaders “EU dirty rats,” accusing “Euro mobsters” Tusk and Macron of “ambushing” May.

UK Brexit Secretary Dominic Raab said the bloc had “yanked up the handbrake” on the negotiations.

But despite all the heated British rhetoric, the EU’s position was not new.

May’s “Chequers plan” — named for the prime minister’s country retreat where it was hammered out in July — aims to keep the U.K. in the EU single market for goods but not services, in order to ensure free trade with the bloc and an open border between the U.K.’s Northern Ireland and EU member Ireland.

Florida's unemployment rate is staying the same.

State officials announced Friday the unemployment rate was 3.7 percent in August. That's slightly lower than the national rate of 3.9 percent.

The latest estimates say there are about 375,000 unemployed people out of a workforce of more than 10.2 million.

Florida added 20,500 jobs in the last month.

The state has added 220,200 total jobs since August 2017. During the same time period California added nearly 349,000 jobs while Texas added more than 394,500.

Florida's overall growth rate for the last 12 months was 2.6 percent, which was 9th in the nation. Okaloosa and St. Johns counties had the lowest unemployment rate at 2.9 percent.

Is \$1,100 too much for an iPhone? Just get an older one for less

The \$1,100 price tag on Apple's latest iPhone turned heads when the company announced it last week. But for less than half as much, you can still get a good camera, a decent-sized screen and other popular features. Just buy a two-year-old iPhone 7. That phone was Apple's first to come with water resistance and its first to lose the standard headphone jack. Its 4.7-inch screen is adequate and on par with other smartphones, even though its resolution falls short of high definition. And the phone still has a fingerprint sensor and a home button, both of which have vanished in the latest iPhones. Here's what to consider if you're thinking of bargain-hunting in the iPhone history bin.

IPHONE 7 (\$449): The big jump in iPhone cameras came a generation earlier with the iPhone 6S, when Apple went from 8 megapixels to 12 megapixels in resolution. With the iPhone 7, the front camera goes from 5 megapixels to 7 megapixels, so selfies don't feel as inferior. Headphones go into its Lightning port, which is used for both charging and data transfer. It's a pain when you want to listen to music while recharging the phone. For that, you need \$159 wireless earphones called AirPods.

IPHONE 7 PLUS (\$569): This larger version of the iPhone 7 has a second camera lens in the back, allowing for twice the magnification without any degradation in image quality. It also lets the camera gauge depth and blur backgrounds in portrait shots, something once limited to full-featured SLR cameras. The dual-lens camera alone is a good reason to go for a Plus, though the larger size isn't a good fit for those with small hands or small pockets.

IPHONE 8 (\$599): New color filters in the camera produce truer and richer colors, while a new flash technique tries to light the foreground and background more evenly. Differences are subtle, though. The year-old model, similar in size to the iPhone 7, restores a glass back found in the earliest iPhones. That's done so you can charge it on a wireless-charging mat, which also solves the problem of listening to music while charging. But with more glass, it's important to get a case and a service plan.

IPHONE 8 PLUS (\$699): Again, the Plus version has a larger screen and a second lens. For those shots with blurred backgrounds, a new feature lets you add filters to mimic studio and other lighting conditions.

COMING SOON: Consider waiting a month for the iPhone XR. Its display lacks the vivid colors, contrast quality and resolution of the XS, but the price tag is nicer at \$749. As with the XS models, you'll get an edge-to-edge screen to minimize wasted space.

Sell personal car to help pay business debt?

Dear Dave: My husband started his own one-man, small business as a handyman a little less than a year ago.

He has netted \$17,000 in that time, but the business has about \$13,000 worth of debt.

We've always kept personal finances and business separate, but what would you think about us selling one of our paid-for cars to help with the business debt? — Robin

Dear Robin: There's nothing wrong with small beginnings.

On top of that, you should always keep your business and personal finances separate.

Aside from the debt, it sounds like he's off to a good start.

I think you'll be able to

pay off the debt from your future income. If your husband started his business less than a year ago, he has spent that time trying to get things off the ground and working with very little name recognition.

If he's good at what he does, and he continues to work hard and market himself properly, he should be able to double what he made in the past year.

To do that, however, he's going to have to spend some time in accountant mode.

He needs to figure out the types of jobs he makes the most money on for the time he puts into them. I know a guy in our area who made more than \$100,000 as a handyman in the past year.

I'm talking about \$100,000 in profit! His prices are higher than most in that line of work, but he's the best. He provides superb quality work, and he's always polite, on time, and on schedule.

If your husband does the research and crunches some numbers, I think

he can dial it in and make a lot more money than he's making now. Find that sweet spot, and he will continue to grow the business! — Dave

Forgive the debt?

Dear Dave: Recently, I loaned some money to a good friend. He's going to help me with a big home project during the next few weekends, so do you think I should pay him for the work or forgive the debt? — Marvin

Dear Marvin: First, I don't recommend loaning money to friends or family. Once in a while, things may work out and everyone ends up happy. But in most cases, it changes the dynamic of the relationship. The Bible says the borrower is a slave to the lender, and there's a lot of truth in that — financially and emotionally.

The big question is whether you've already agreed to pay him for the work.

Another consideration is how he views the situation.

Economy keeps growing even with oil prices

DALLAS — America's rediscovered prowess in oil production is shaking up old notions about the impact of higher crude prices on the U.S. economy.

It has long been conventional wisdom that rising oil prices hurt the economy by forcing consumers to spend more on gasoline and heating their homes, leaving less for other things.

Presumably that kind of run-up would slow the U.S. economy. Instead, the economy grew at its fastest rate in nearly four years during the April-through-June quarter.

President Donald Trump appears plainly worried about rising oil prices just a few weeks before mid-term elections that will decide which party controls the House and Senate.

"We protect the countries of the Middle East, they would not be safe for very long without us, and yet they continue to push for higher and higher oil prices!" Trump tweeted on Thursday. "We will remember. The OPEC monopoly must get prices down now!"

Members of The Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries, who account for about one-third of global oil supplies, are scheduled to meet this weekend with non-members including Russia.

The same coalition of OPEC and a few outsiders has limited production since January 2017 to bolster prices, but they agreed in June to a slight increase to offset declining output from Iran.

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Revealing more on Russia probe is the right move

Despite the warnings of the pending apocalypse from his Democratic opponents, or accusations that he is trying to undermine a high-profile criminal investigation into his own activities, President Donald Trump was right on Monday to order the declassification and release of more documents from the Department of Justice's investigation into his 2016 campaign.

Trump directed the release of the redacted portions of the FBI's warrant application to the government's secret intelligence court to monitor his one-time adviser Carter Page. Trump also wants the Justice Department to make available documents pertaining to interviews with high-ranking DOJ official Bruce Ohr, as well as text messages about Russia by Ohr and former FBI officials James Comey, Andrew McCabe, Peter Strzok and Lisa Page.

Typical of the reaction from anti-Trump quarters was that of California Democratic Congressman Adam Schiff, who called the president's action an "abuse of power" that is intended to "advance a false narrative" — to wit, that the FBI, under President Barack Obama, targeted an opposing political campaign.

Where Congressman Schiff and those who think like him get this wrong is that in this specific instance the president's interest coincides with the national interest.

When all this began two years ago, the public was sold a narrative that said members of Team Trump and perhaps Trump himself worked with Russian operatives to steal the election from Hillary Clinton.

True, Special Counsel Robert Mueller has rung up plenty of indictments and some convictions. But as Deputy Attorney General Rod Rosenstein announced in February and July, when Mueller's indictments of Russian hackers became public, no American citizen was accused of a crime, nor were any elections affected.

As for Trump's past associates, former Trump campaign manager Paul Manafort and his former partner Rick Gates, have been convicted of financial crimes committed years before Trump's election bid. Others in his sphere — Michael Flynn and George Papadopoulos — have been convicted of lying to FBI agents, but unrelated to the 2016 election.


Meanwhile, we do know mostly through digging by House Republicans conducting congressional oversight of the Justice Department, that senior officials investigating Trump's supposed collusion harbored a staunch anti-Trump animus and wanted Clinton to win. For example, Strzok, the lead investigator in Clinton's email scandal, watered down the report that could have led to criminal charges against her and then shelved that investigation to chase the still-elusive specter of Trump's collaboration with Russia.

The clamor we're hearing now should sound familiar to anyone paying attention. It surfaced months ago when other documents relative to the investigation were made public. . Mueller, meantime, plods along, spending tons of taxpayer money and producing dubious results.

We need the full, true story of what happened two years ago. Transparency is good, if President Trump benefits by this latest disruption to the swamp, so will America. We're sure the republic will survive.

New editorial, old story

The stories of chaos, craziness and betrayal going on inside the Trump White House are nothing to worry much about.

White House staffers attempting to influence, question or thwart a president's ideas or goals are as old as George Washington, Richard Nixon and Ronald Reagan.

As we've recently seen, it's just a lot easier today for un-named White House insiders to get their criticism or embarrassing stories instantly published.

Bob Woodward's gossipy best-seller "Fear" was built mostly on anonymous sources, unattributed quotes or second-hand anecdotes. Omarosa's crazy White House tell-all "Unhinged" was only slightly less credible.

But the New York Times hit a new low in its war on Trump when it published an anonymous op-ed piece written by a Trump adviser who claimed that he and some of his fellow White House "resistance" members were so concerned with the president's actions and mental state that they contemplated using the 25th

Amendment to remove him.

Maybe it's all true. Maybe it's not. We'll find out the real story someday, but it's certainly not new.

After my father was shot in 1981, some of his top advisers were seriously worried about his mental stability.

According to Bill O'Reilly in "Killing Reagan," they considered using the 25th Amendment to remove him on grounds of mental incapacity and even gave him a test.

My father passed the test with flying colors and, according to the history books, did his job pretty well afterwards.

No one read about those concerns in a New York Times op-ed piece as they were occurring.

Likewise, no one read about how he trumped his top advisers on his decision to invade Grenada.

When he called a White House meeting to vote on the idea, the final tally was 7-3 to not invade. My father was one of the three. Two days later, the world woke up to see TV images of American forces capturing the island.

When one of his shocked advisers called and said, "Mr. President, I thought we had a vote and we decided not to go," my father said, "Yes. we did. But my vote cancelled your seven."

No one at the time read about that "fight" with his White House staff in the papers, just as they never

learned how his advisers tried to prevent him from speaking two of his most famous lines.

They kept deleting "Mr. Gorbachev, tear down that wall" from his Berlin Wall speech and they also tried to stop him from referring to the Soviet Union as "the Evil Empire."

The most important "fight" my father had with his advisers came in 1986, however, when he met with Mikhail Gorbachev at the nuclear missile summit in Reykjavik.

There was pressure to sign a treaty. My father's staffers were worried about his political legacy. Preferring a weak deal to no deal, they urged him to sign a treaty he did not think was good enough.

My father shocked his advisers, the media and most everyone in the Free World by saying "nyet" to Gorbachev in Iceland and walking out of the summit without signing anything.

Many thought he was nuts, of course. But his decision turned out to be a great geopolitical move that became a key turning point in the Cold War.

If the Washington Post had published an anonymous op-ed from one of my father's worried advisers at the time, I bet history would not have turned out so well.

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

Bay attorney facing disbarment

Rhonda Clyatt has appealed findings that she cost clients money, visitation with children

PANAMA CITY — A circuit judge has recommended a local attorney be disbarred for criminal activity and repeated misconduct over the course of years practicing law, according to official reports.

Rhonda S. Clyatt, 61, filed a notice Sept. 7 that she would be appealing the findings. A Florida Bar complaint has been pending against her since July 2017 in connection with a litany of alleged misconduct dating to 2011 while she was licensed to practice law. Circuit Judge John Miller of Pensacola, acting as the “referee” in the case, has now recommended that Clyatt is guilty and that she should face disbarment, according to official reports.

It’s unclear when the case will be turned over for a final decision as The Bar’s disciplinary proceedings are pending Clyatt’s appeal, spokeswoman Karen Kirksey said. A final order as to her fate would be handed down from the Florida Supreme Court.

Clyatt is listed as a “divorce and family” attorney with an office located downtown Panama City. She could not be immediately reached for comment.

It isn’t the first time a complaint has been filed against her and been pursued by

“referees” of The Florida Bar. The previous complaint was filed in 2007 and eventually Clyatt was found not guilty of alleged misconduct.

In the most recent complaint, The Bar has identified nine counts of misconduct perpetrated by Clyatt, and Miller recommended she is guilty of eight complaints.

On one occasion, Clyatt pleaded guilty to DUI in 2016 and was on probation for a year. The Bar reported that she failed to report her arrest in a timely manner, according to official reports.

“According to (Clyatt), she was addicted to opioids at the time of her arrest,” Miller wrote. Clyatt “testified that she had been drinking wine out of a plastic cup while she was driving because she had run out of lortab. (Clyatt) crashed into another vehicle.”


In many cases, The Bar found evidence Clyatt was not properly communicating with clients — sometimes even lying to them about actions in their cases — and was consistently late or missed court appearances to represent their interests. She missed court deadlines, failed to file requests by clients in some cases and declined to refund client’s retainer fees when their cases were stalled or damaged by her inaction. In a child custody case, Clyatt’s practices cost a father visitation of his 7-year-old for an entire summer and more, records indicate.

“The case was tried in December 2015,” Miller wrote. “The court denied (the father’s) request for modification of custody and for relocation of the minor

Closed campus concept

PANAMA CITY BEACH — While “hardening” projects continue across the county to secure school campuses against shootings and intruders, the different ages and layouts of the schools makes each one a different challenge.

The Arnold High School campus was constructed 18 years ago with the intention of having an open, college campus-type feel. This included separate entrances for the main office, gymnasium, and fine arts building, which are often used for community events.

According to Lee Walters, director of facilities for Bay District Schools, this design poses a problem

in today’s climate.

“The last thing we want to do is go and put a big fence right across the front of it and go, ‘Alright nobody can come here anymore.’ That’s what we’ve tried to avoid,” Walters said in

an interview last week. “We’ve stepped our fencing back. Now, there is decorative aluminum fencing across the face of the front office and it sort of blocks

Library will use grant to collect oral histories of segregation

PANAMA CITY — Thanks to a grant from the Florida Humanities Council, the Bay County Public Library soon will be filling in gaps in its collection through an upcoming project on segregation in Northwest Florida and the people who lived during that time.

“This project is an oral

history project to capture the first-hand accounts of those who lived through segregation and integration,” said Laura Moree, project director and head of Local History and Genealogy at the Bay County Public Library, 898 W. 11th St.

The project is titled “A Determination to End This: Segregation Stories From Northwest Florida.” The grant of \$4,600 will go toward purchasing equipment to

record the oral histories and tablet computers, such as iPads, to eventually serve in listening kiosks once the collection has been completed. Moree also hopes to hold a panel discussion and possibly a program for children and teens in February.

“One of our gaps in our collection probably would be that period of time, especially items related and information







relating to segregation in Bay County, and integration," said Moree. "People who lived that period are passing away and we don't want to lose that information. We don't want their stories to go with them."

The title for the project was crafted from a 1916 quote by George West, who many consider the founder of Panama City. West is quoted in the Panama City Pilot saying that there was a "determination to end this segregation of the races

and mixing neighborhoods." West was angry about neighborhoods integrating because he believed the property value of the neighborhoods would decline.

However, upon discovering the quote, Moree saw something deeper in West's anger. She saw people's determination to ignore West's desire to keep neighborhoods segregated. "The fact that people were ignoring that," said Moree. "People were ignoring it, and I thought, even at that time in 1916."

"I want this project to be positive and to help the community not only to acquire primary source material but to

also just be a way for us to learn about the past," she continued. "To discuss things, even recent events."

Moree said she hopes to begin recording and collecting oral histories in November.

"We're going to try to make it as informal as possible, ask open-ended questions about what they remember, how life was like, especially relating to their experience with segregation and any integration stories that they had," she said. "We want it to be comfortable, almost like a story-core feel to it."

The project is a collaborative effort of the libraries in the Northwest Regional Library

System, which includes Bay, Gulf and Liberty counties. Moree said she believes collaborating to incorporate the entire region, not just Bay County, will help provide more information than keeping the histories to just Bay County, as many people have moved around the region throughout their lives.

"If anyone's interested or wants to be interviewed, just let me know," she said. "We're not ready to start the interviews yet, but I definitely would like to be in touch with people who are interested."

child ... opposing counsel made it an issue at the final hearing that the father had not requested summer visitation in California with his son."

Clyatt later admitted to not filing a motion for summer visitation. The Bar found evidence that Clyatt then excessively billed the client. Clyatt also defrauded the court by moving a piece of property at the center of a divorce case into her name when it was supposed to be used to pay alimony, official reports state.

"Incredibly (Clyatt) testified that she saw nothing wrong with accepting the deed because there was no 'recorded lien' on the property, and that her understanding was 'the first one to the courthouse wins,'" Miller wrote. "The referee finds this to be astonishing."

Clyatt was found not guilty of allegations that she misrepresented a client during a criminal trial.

The Bar found several aggravating factors in their determination to recommend disbarment, including her lengthy experience as an attorney since 1982 and that she caused actual harm to her clients. They also weighed in the fact that Clyatt had been struggling with addiction during many of the events and has since taken steps to recover. However, the aggravating factors "far outweigh" the mitigating ones, Miller found.

off two corridors that gave you free access to the whole campus."

Walters says the fencing, which will be used to help funnel people through the campus' remote-access entry point in the front office, is the biggest change. That is where visitors will be identified and asked about their purpose for being on campus.

Walters also said the campus will be outfitted with plenty of panic hardware to open exit points so it still will have plenty of options for getting out if there's an emergency on the inside, such as a fire. Panic hardware is implemented in commercial buildings everywhere because it is designed to allow large numbers of people to exit quickly. "You hit the bar and it opens. Like at the bottom of a stairwell," he said. "The whole intent is, one action opens the door."

Walters said his team already is planning how they are going

to secure the campus' northern side, which has an access road wrapping around the back of the campus, and now must be blocked off. Walters said he believes it will require a remote access gate with cameras to allow the front office to monitor who is requesting entry.

School officials ultimately will make the decisions as to who gets to come on campus.

"I can put all kind of gates and fences but if you don't close them and lock them, then we haven't really accomplished anything," he said. "It's still a joint effort."

Walters expects the projects to be completed before the

beginning of the next school year. Parents don't need to worry about changes in pickup and drop-off locations, which largely will remain the same.

"We're trying to keep all of our items really low key but still there if need be," he said. "The biggest change that (students have) noticed is having the officers on campus, and it's a positive change."

After each school in the district has been hardened, they each will have 6-foot-tall perimeter fencing, bullet-resistant glass and remote entry access in the front office, multiple security cameras, and a security officer. Improved

perimeter and parking lot lighting also is being assessed. Walters said a project manager for the district is assessing schools to identify areas where bullet-resistant film needs to be installed, which would help keep glass from breaking to potentially "buy time" for officers to enter the scene.

"If you think about a campus like Arnold, it's so big and spread out, we're looking at technology like the gun detection. You think about a gun being so loud, but if I'm in a classroom on the other side of campus, I can't hear it," he said. "We haven't implemented any of those systems yet but we're definitely looking at the next step."

Walters said the team is constantly reviewing school security needs, as the market for school hardening has grown exponentially since the Parkland shootings in February. He said the district already was considering securing main offices with remote entry access, but it never was to prevent mass shootings. Since the shooting, projects have started and won't stop until they are finished.





Shooting suspect nabbed after high-speed chase

LYNN HAVEN — A suspect in an apartment complex shooting has been arrested after a month-long pursuit ended with an attempted traffic stop for speeding and a high-speed car chase, according to official reports.

Jarquez J. Whitley, 29, appeared in court Friday in connection with the case. He had been sought by the Panama City Police Department since the beginning of August when a gunshot rang out at Royal Arms Garden Apartments, 1420 Balboa

Ave., leaving 21-year-old Juwan Cummings with gunshot wound to the abdomen. Whitley now is facing several charges, including aggravated battery, after he led Lynn Haven Police Department officers on a high-speed pursuit, officers reported.

According to LHPD reports, an officer on Thursday spotted a speeding silver Honda driving north on Minnesota Avenue. The officer activated his emergency lights to initiate a traffic

stop. The driver of the Honda quickly began accelerating and weaving in and out of traffic erratically in an attempt to elude the officer, LHPD reported.

A pursuit ensued, with the driver leading police down State 77 and then onto Maulden Drive until the driver attempted to make a turn and ended up disabling the car, officers reported.

"The driver, attempting a turn, hit a curb and blew out his right front tire," officers wrote. "The driver immediately abandoned the vehicle and fled west on foot in the direction of Bradley/Bradford Circle."

During the pursuit, officers ran the tag of the car and it came back to an address on Bradley Circle. When officers arrived to that address, they saw Whitley jump a fence and go into the house. Police reported they knew Whitley was wanted in connection with the Panama City shooting and arrested him.

Capt. Paul Powell said because the investigation into the shooting at Royal Arms Garden still is open he could not disclose what police believe led to the gunfire. Cummings suffered life-threatening injuries, and police have reported Cummings was

targeted.

"Those are two people that really don't like each other," Powell said. "That's the best way I can explain it."

PCPD's investigation began with a call to shots being fired at the apartment complex the afternoon of Aug. 6. Originally, officers were mistakenly told the shooting involved two children. In the back of the complex behind the "J" building, officers found a spent cartridge fired during the shooting near a small play area.

Whitley was identified as the shooter and officers determined he had fled after firing the shot. His

vehicle later was recovered in Lynn Haven, but Whitley's whereabouts were unknown until the attempted traffic stop Thursday.

Whitley is being charged with fleeing and eluding by LHPD. He also faces charges of aggravated battery, felon in possession of a firearm and possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony in connection with the shooting.

Groups challenge Gov. Scott's move to appoint justices

TALLAHASSEE — In a widely anticipated move, two voting-rights groups asked the Florida Supreme Court on Thursday to block an attempt by Gov. Rick Scott to appoint replacements for three justices whose terms will end as the governor's tenure comes to a close in January.

Scott this month initiated the selection process

to replace Justices Barbara Pariente, R. Fred Lewis and Peggy Quince, who will be forced to leave the Supreme Court in January because of a mandatory retirement age.

Scott is running for U.S. Senate this year, and his successor as governor will take office in January. The key question is whether Scott or his successor should have the power to appoint the new justices.

The outcome of the case could shape the makeup of the Supreme Court for years, if not decades. Pariente, Lewis and Quince are part of a liberal bloc, which now holds a slim 4-3 majority, that has thwarted Scott and the Republican-dominated Legislature on numerous occasions since the governor took office in 2011.

Thursday's challenge by the League of Women Voters of Florida and Common Cause mirrors a lawsuit the groups filed last year, asking the court to prohibit Scott from filling judicial vacancies that are caused by terms expiring in January 2019.

In December, the Supreme Court dismissed the lawsuit, saying it was too soon to rule on the issue.

But since Scott "has now acted on his stated intention" to appoint the three justices and has set the process in motion, the groups Thursday asked the high court for a "writ of quo warranto," which is used to determine whether a state officer or agency has improperly exercised power.

Scott on Sept. 11 directed the Supreme Court Judicial Nominating Commission to begin a process that includes accepting and reviewing applications, interviewing candidates and making nominations for appointment. The deadline for applications is Oct. 8, and the commission will have until Nov. 8 — two days after the general election — to submit a list of candidates to the governor. In announcing that Scott

had initiated the nominating process, his office said Scott would invite the governor-elect to interview the court nominees after the general election. The governor's office pointed to an "expectation" that Scott and his successor would be able to agree on appointments.

If that happens, it would follow the lead of outgoing Democratic Gov. Lawton Chiles and Republican Gov.-elect Jeb Bush in late 1998 agreeing to appoint Quince to the Supreme Court.

But the chances of reaching agreement could hinge heavily on the outcome of the Nov. 6 gubernatorial election between Democrat Andrew Gillum and Republican Ron DeSantis. Gillum is running as a progressive Democrat and, if elected,

might have a hard time reaching agreement with the conservative Scott. The new governor will take office Jan. 8.

"In our understanding of the Constitution, the next governor will appoint the next three Supreme Court justices," Gillum's campaign said in a statement after Scott initiated the Judicial Nominating Commission proceedings.

In Thursday's filing, lawyers representing the voting-rights groups wrote that Scott "made clear that he will purport to unilaterally make the appointments if the governor-elect does not agree to grant him veto power over the appointments, despite his previous concession to this (Supreme) Court that he will have no such authority."

Restaurant owner who set 1991 arson out of prison

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — A 200-seat New Smyrna Beach seafood restaurant was an albatross for owner Forrest “Biff” Utter, who never could crawl out from underneath a pile of debt.

Things were so dire, he borrowed \$3,000 from an employee at the restaurant to pay his liquor bill.

Foreclosure loomed, so he torched the North Causeway dining spot the morning of Sept. 2, 1991, hoping to obtain a lucrative sum from a newly opened insurance policy.


The decision to burn Stormy’s Seafood Restaurant cost the lives of two New Smyrna Beach firefighters and cost Utter his freedom for the better part of two decades. He would be convicted in a federal court — twice — of arson and other charges.

Now 74, Utter served his time and was released from federal custody June 8. Utter, who lives in Volusia County, didn’t return phone messages for this story.

Meanwhile, in the late summer of 1991, the city of New Smyrna Beach mourned the loss of two of its native sons, Mark Wilkes and Doug Sapp, both 28-year-old firefighters.

“To lose two firefighters in a fire like that — it breaks your heart, first off,” New Smyrna Beach Mayor Jim Hathaway said. “And secondly, it leaves an indelible imprint on each of us here in New Smyrna who were here during that time frame.”

Wilkes and Sapp were best friends. They went to high school together. Wilkes wanted nothing more than to become a firefighter from the time he was a boy. Sapp had other interests growing up,

but in the end, he became just as intensely devoted to the job as his friend.

Sapp even remodeled the Fire Department’s “Old No. 5” engine, which became a fixture during parades.

Hathaway said he still has a photo hanging in the office of him riding that fire engine during a Fourth of July parade years ago.

On Labor Day morning in 1991, a police detective drove by the Stormy’s building and noticed smoke billowing from the rooftop. It was reported to dispatch at 12:19 a.m. Two fire crews from the nearest station were dispatched, five firefighters in all, including Wilkes and Sapp. It took them two minutes to get there.

At first, the fire wasn’t raging. It was more of a smolder. The pair was responsible for ventilating the building to let out some of the heat and smoke, but that became too daunting.

A commander on the scene ordered everyone inside to retreat because the smoke was so thick. A short time later, Wilkes and Sapp lobbied their commander to let them go back inside. They wanted to try again. They

were given the green light.

After they re-entered, a “flashover” occurred. That’s when a fire spreads rapidly across an empty space due to excessive heat. The entire 4,000-square-foot building ignited in a matter of seconds. Wilkes and Sapp never had a chance. They died from asphyxiation when their air hoses melted. They were cut off from their air packs.

It took more than three hours before firefighters could find their bodies in the main dining area.

Sapp was single, but Wilkes left behind a wife and a 1-year-old daughter.

Funeral services for Wilkes and Sapp were held at First United Methodist Church of New Smyrna Beach. More than 5,000 firefighters from all over North America were in attendance. They stood and saluted as two fire engines carried their fallen comrades to their grave sites in Edgewater.

At that time, the city of New Smyrna Beach rarely, if ever, was packed with that many people during the course of a single morning.

“The fire community poured into town,” said

Chase Squires, who was a reporter with The Daytona Beach News-Journal at the time.

“I can remember trucks coming in down (State Road 44) from all over,” he said. “From my vantage point ... the street was just filled with mourners from in the town and out of town. (There was) the sound of helicopters above us, and you could barely hear the speakers outside the church from just the sea of humanity that was out there. It was a major milestone for the town, for sure.”

The old Stormy’s lot has remained vacant since the rubble was cleared in 1992.

One week after the fire, on Sept. 9, the city’s Fire Marshal announced someone had deliberately set the fire. Investigators looked into Utter’s possible involvement. He had owned or leased properties in Kentucky during the 1970s and 1980s that had burned down. Additionally, the Internal Revenue Service had filed liens totaling more than \$131,000 against Utter and his silent partner from 1986 through the middle of 1991. They had failed to pay personal income and payroll taxes.

There was also the \$150,000 payoff he was expecting to receive from the insurance claim from the fire. But the insurance company sensed something was wrong and never paid it.

Law enforcement sensed something, too, and in June 1994, almost three years after the fire, federal authorities charged Utter and his then-71-year-old mother, Alice Pauline Duncan, with arson resulting in death, conspiracy to commit arson and using fire to commit conspiracy and arson.

Duncan was acquitted, but

Utter was convicted at trial in December 1994 and was later sentenced to 15 years in prison.

In October 1996, Utter’s conviction was overturned by a federal appeals court. He was released, but the government decided it would try again.

In January 1999, Utter was found guilty again of the same charges — and this time he was sentenced to 25 years in prison.

“I’m happy with the verdict,” Wilkes’ widow, Mary, told the media after the trial. “It will help a little, but it won’t help raise a daughter.” She hugged the prosecutor after it was all over. She chose to move to another county and raise her daughter, who is now 28 years old.

Michelle Utter, the estranged wife of Biff Utter’s only son, said the family was crushed after he was sent back to prison.

“Of course, everybody was upset,” she said. “I know my husband was, as well. They didn’t think it was a fair trial.”

Biff Utter sometimes struggled re-acclimating to society after being behind bars for so long, his ex-daughter-in-law said. He had been in prison since before Y2K, so he missed all of the technological breakthroughs of the new millennium — from iTunes to Facebook.

It took some time for him to learn how to operate a smartphone.

“He had to be shown how to use it,” Michelle Utter said. “(He) had to call numerous times to ask how to use his phone. It had Google Maps and things like that. ... One of my (sons) had to actually show him how to use the phone.”

DeSantis, Gillum piling up state matching funds

TALLAHASSEE — Gubernatorial candidates Ron DeSantis and Andrew Gillum continue to be the biggest beneficiaries of Florida's matching-funds program, which has doled out \$5.36 million to statewide candidates this year.

DeSantis, the Republican nominee, received \$96,938 from the program Friday, while Democratic candidate Andrew Gillum got \$62,390, according to figures posted

online by the state Division of Elections.

DeSantis has received a total of more than \$1.152 million from the program, which matches individual contributions of \$250 or less.

Since winning the Aug. 28 Republican primary, DeSantis has received \$176,426 from the state. Among the almost 2,000 separate contributions that came into DeSantis' campaign from across the country during the first week in September, about 1,800 were of \$250 or less.

Gillum has received \$620,631 through the matching-funds program, including \$125,567 since the Aug. 28 primary. In September's first seven days, Gillum

received 13,661 contributions of \$250 or less.

Gillum, DeSantis and three other statewide candidates are taking part in the matching-funds program.

The governor's race has accounted for just more than \$4 million of the overall total, with two candidates who lost in the primaries — Democrat Gwen Graham and Republican Adam Putnam — also tapping into it.

Among the candidates for attorney general, Republican nominee Ashley Moody received \$760 in matching funds on Friday and has received \$380,935 from the state.

Democratic candidate Sean Shaw got a check for \$10,391 on Friday and has received \$233,093 from the program.

In the race for state chief financial officer, incumbent Republican Jimmy Patronis received a check for \$4,200 on Friday. Patronis has received \$309,305 through the state program.

Democratic candidate Jeremy Ring has not taken part in the voluntary program.

The amount of matching funds in this year's elections appears likely to dwarf the amount in the 2014 midterm elections.

In 2014, two candidates for governor and four candidates seeking Cabinet positions drew \$4.1 million from the matching-funds program during the primary and general elections.



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Use of drug database increases amid opioid fight

TALLAHASSEE — One of Florida's main weapons to thwart "doctor shopping" has been expanding substantially after the passage of a tough new law aimed to address the continuing opioid crisis.

State officials said Thursday that more than 92,000 health care providers had registered to use an electronic database that tracks patients who are prescribed controlled substances.

The August total is more than double the number of providers who were registered to use the system the previous year.

Bruce Culpepper, a consultant for the Florida Department of Health, told members of the Health Information Exchange Coordinating Committee about the "major uptick in activity" in response to the new law, which for the first time requires doctors to consult the database before writing prescriptions.

The providers made 4.75 million inquiries into the database during August, said Culpepper, who coordinates the department's health information exchange activities.

Moreover, Culpepper said Florida has been working with neighboring

Alabama and Georgia, as well as Kentucky, on integrating Florida's prescription drug database with their programs.

The Florida Legislature gave the green light to the monitoring program in 2009. The state required pharmacists to enter information about most controlled substances the following year when the database became operational.

But it wasn't until this year that lawmakers also required doctors to use the database to ensure that patients weren't "doctor shopping," or seeking prescriptions for addictive drugs from multiple physicians.

Teacher suspended for giving test answer

DeFUNIAC SPRINGS — A Walton County teacher who gave her students the answer to a question on a standardized test last year has been suspended by the state.

Gina Ealum, a former fourth grade Exceptional Student Education teacher at West DeFuniak Elementary School, administered the Florida Standards Assessment to her students on April 20, 2017.

She read and analyzed a math problem "beyond what was necessary to prove accommodations,"

copied the problem onto a piece of paper and worked out the problem, according to documents from the Florida Education Practices Commission.

Two months before the test, Ealum had signed a test administration and security agreement saying she would not read or review test items except to provide student accommodations.

According to the settlement reached with the Florida Department of Education on Tuesday, Ealum's teaching certificate has been suspended for six months and she will remain on probation for two years after she

begins teaching again.

Conditions of her probation include paying fines to the Education Practices Commission, having her immediate supervisor provide the Department of Education with a copy of each written annual performance evaluation and being prohibited from administering or proctoring secured assessments without another administrator present.

Ealum is still listed as an ESE teacher on the school's web site.

Walton County Superintendent of Schools Russell Hughes could not be reached for comment.

More meaningful wedding?

Consider hosting your reception at soup kitchen

I've never been happier to be kicked out of my seat — and it happened at my brother's wedding.

It's an age-old story that weddings cause many happy couples to lose sight of what matters. A recent viral story featured a bride who asked her guests to contribute \$1,500 each to her \$45,000 destination wedding in Aruba, according to reports. Only eight friends came through, she said in her Facebook status. She became "livid" when her then-boyfriend suggested that, in light of these failed attempts, they instead get a quickie wedding in Sin City. They no longer are a couple.

Even for more-level-headed individuals, weddings can be expensive and stressful, especially when the community has certain expectations of what should take place. I'm an Orthodox Jew, and our weddings are no exception — especially since we throw seven wedding parties, the biggest affair the first night and then one a night for six more nights. Usually, family and friends

host the last six — each one called a sheva brachot — by renting out a restaurant or even hosting a mini-banquet in their homes.

But my family wanted to send off my oldest brother — the first of my siblings to get married — in a way that found a little more meaning amid the chaos. When my father suggested a few days before the big banquet that we host a sheva brachot at a Masbia kosher soup kitchen, it was such an obvious idea that I wish I had thought of it myself. Masbia has a few New York City locations, each designed as a restaurant, to help give its client base dignity.

Rather than burn money at an expensive eatery, we could hold the party in a Masbia dining room, bring the regulars in on the fun, offer our guests something different and give a donation that would more than cover the costs.

The week before my brother's wedding, I shuttled him around in an effort to keep him happy. I was the "bestest Mensch," to borrow Dwight Schrute's term from "The Office," referring to the Yiddish and German word for man. The groom was to be treated like a king. Sushi lunches were bought, last nights on the town were arranged,

and three stops in one day at the suit store were completed. My credit card had friction burns, especially because I bought wedding attire I'd never wear again. But I didn't mind spending for a happy occasion, and the prospect of a party at Masbia kept me going. It was something we actually wanted to spend money on, not simply the Most Expensive Party Ever.

While planning the soup kitchen affair, I called Alex, the executive director, with a list of concerns. Would wearing suits, a show of wealth, make the regulars feel out of place? Could we take pictures? Would there be enough food for everyone? I didn't want to get in the way of operations or cause the organization undue expense. And I wanted the regulars to feel a part of it.

He laughed it off and told me not to worry, reminding me that fun was contagious. I wanted to secure musical entertainment but also wanted all the money we spent to be given to Masbia.

I chased a dozen dead ends. The ones that were available couldn't play free of charge. I posted on my network of WhatsApp groups of hippie Jews who like to play music to come burn the roof down.

Everyone was excited, but no one confirmed their attendance.

Plus, I was hearing that some guests didn't understand the point or were uncomfortable with the idea of eating food that might not be that tasty. The event seemed poised to be a complete disaster, with no one showing up.

The first wedding party was beautiful. More than 400 people attended, including family from Canada and Israel. Guests drank (cost: \$1,000), we posed for a photographer (more money than I feel I could publish), and the wedding singer and four-piece band killed it (same). Family WhatsApp groups overflowed with smiling Reiters.

Then, the day before the Masbia party, I visited the site and met with Alex face-to-face. He informed me that he invited his "Shabbos crowd" and arranged with a caterer to have better food than usual. But on the morning of the Masbia sheva brachot, nothing seemed like it would fall into place. Few confirmed guests, and no confirmed musician. Two hours before showtime, I received a text asking for an address. David, a friend of a friend who plays guitar, could make it.

I am ecstatic to share this Glory Sighting I've been working on. I first shared this vision in April. For those who read that, you might have thought I had forgotten or given up, but nope, just discerning the feasibility of getting this great ministry up and running here in our county. The Family Promise exploratory gathering will begin at 2 p.m. Monday at St. Andrew UMC fellowship hall, 2001 W. 11th St., Panama City.

First, for those of you unfamiliar with Family Promise or my effort to bring them to Bay County, you can take a look at their website: www.familypromise.org. This organization with a great measure of community support is positively changing the hopes of children through helping lift their families into independence, responsibility and literally a new future. Family Promise delivers life-saving services: prevention, shelter, and stabilization to families in need.

Here's the problem: There literally are hundreds of school-age children in our Bay County school district with no permanent home address. In 2014, the state reported 1,184 homeless students in Bay County.

That was double the amount of all five

surrounding counties combined. In 2015, a snapshot on a particular day reported 308 homeless students in our county with an additional 100 in our surrounding counties. I sat down with a Bay District school leader who explained the many deep problems birthed from that primary problem.

Family Promise has a limited mission, and as far as I have found, their work does not duplicate local ministries, organizations or government entities. When we cooperate under a central guiding passion and leadership, we solve a problem that affects us all; solving the problems of so many of our school-age children without a bed with their name on it. This could lead to solving a community problem too big for any of us by lifting families toward independent living and contributing to their communities, literally re-writing their children's future. We all get to be a part of it, and we all will share the blessings while giving God all the Glory.

I should add here that my efforts in this regard are mine alone. Neither they nor Family Promise are connected with any denomination or government entity. Family Promise did not initiate this effort to put an affiliate in Bay.

This meeting on Monday will be for information purposes only. No one will be expected or even asked to make a decision to support, but requested to return and share this initiative with your organizations to determine interest in partnership. It could take close to a year to be fully up and running so there is no urgency to commitment to anything but a willingness to consider being a part.

You can bring as many people with you as you want, and/or send others in your regard. I hope to see and meet you Monday at the St. Andrews UMC's first-floor dining hall.

The Panhandle's regional director (who hails from Bay County/Mexico Beach, I might add) will share all about their ministry, and one of their national directors will be present. Both at their own expense.



SAND HILLS — The good news for Rutherford in its 31-0 loss to Port St. Joe on Friday night reads somewhat distorted without a corresponding game summary.

The Class 4A Rams, now 1-4, actually took a dramatic step forward defensively.

The main problem with that theory, however, is that is where the 1A Tiger Sharks truly excel. The outcome was their third shutout on the young season, and Port St. Joe, 4-0, has allowed the miserly total of 9 points in its four victories.

Not only did the Tiger Sharks yield only 52 total yards and three first downs,

they did not allow the Rams to take a snap inside their 34-yard line.

And that foray, which ended in one of Rutherford's six punts, was only one of two series in which the Rams crossed midfield.

The Rams were within 17-0 midway through the fourth quarter when a punt by Joel Bogaert pinned Rutherford at its 2 when return man Brian Edwards initially fumbled the ball and then was swarmed by Port St. Joe's coverage unit.

Rutherford quarterback Reggie Tubbs and running back James Caldwell miscommunicated on a handoff on first down and safety Kendre' Gant picked up the loose ball in the end zone for an easy Port St. Joe touchdown.



Bowles insists Jets won't let loss linger

NEW YORK — This isn't exactly where the Jets expected to be right now. At least, not this way.

Todd Bowles' bunch is 1-2 after an embarrassing

flop in Cleveland, falling 21-17 on Thursday night to a Browns team that hadn't won since 2016. Two losses in five days have New York looking for answers and hoping things don't quickly spiral before the season is even a

month old. "It's a 24-hour rule and you've got to have tough skin," Bowles said Friday morning. "We're a tough-minded team and it's not going to drag. We've got a couple of days to get some rest and get some guys

back and get healthy and move on to Jacksonville next week — no different from if we had won the ballgame.

"We'll be fine that way. I think we're mentally tough."

Judging from the

mistakes, penalties and missed opportunities in the Jets' losses to Miami last Sunday and then at Cleveland, the team hasn't backed up its coach.

That assessment will certainly be tested, though. New York's upcoming

schedule includes some tough defenses — at Jacksonville, vs. Denver, vs. Indianapolis, vs. Minnesota and at Chicago — that will be licking their chops at the prospect of facing rookie quarterback Sam Darnold.

Franklin suffers 2 injuries in loss to Sneads

EASTPOINT — If discretion is the better part of valor, then Franklin County Coach Tony Yeomans is indeed a brave man, despite his team falling 38-20 Friday night.

After his squad trailed Sneads 19-7 entering the second half, three things happened in quick succession in the first three minutes. The Pirates scored back-to-back touchdowns, and the Seahawks sustained their second game-ending ankle injury to a starter, this time with junior lineman Cam Wynn joining sophomore linebacker Charlee Winchester on the sidelines and then on to a

hospital for X-rays.

A referee asked Yeomans if he wanted a running clock, and he agreed.

"I wasn't doing it to quit on the team, I was doing it to survive," said the coach. "I couldn't afford to lose another starter."

The Pirates' two touchdowns to open the third quarter, a fumble return for 65 yards by senior defensive back Courtavious Garrett, and then a 3-yard rushing touchdown a minute later by sophomore Calvin Stringer that came after senior defensive guard Ryan McLeod pounced on an errant pitch, looked to put the game out of reach.

With the running clock moving, and a 31-7 lead, Sneads coach Bill Thomas

had substituted in his younger players.

But two touchdowns by the Seahawks made it 31-20 with four minutes left to play.

First, a 30-yard burst by senior running back Colton Evans brought the Seahawks into the red zone, and then freshman quarterback Colin Amison scrambled into the end zone from 11 yards out, near the end of the third quarter.

Then with time running out in the fourth, senior defensive end Tonnor Segree scooped up a fumble and ran 60 yards for a touchdown.

"I had subbed some guys in, and they scored real quick and then they stopped running the clock for a little bit," said Thomas. "I about

lost my religion with the refs. I told them 'You said you were going to run the clock, now run it.'"

Sneads sophomore running back Alonzo Hill capped the scoring with a 55-yard-touchdown run with a minute left, and Trent Smith nailed the extra point.

Thomas, an Apalachicola native who once coached the Sharks, said he understood Yeomans' decision to let the clock run. The Seahawks have lost 11 players to injuries, nearly all starters, dating back to the preseason.

"This summer we thought about this game as being probably the biggest game of the year for us," said Thomas. "His goal tonight was to survive the season."

"We would have had to still come out and hump the ball right at them with the clocks running, with our seniors, until the game's at hand. If I'm doing that with the type of offense we run, you're going to get banged up," Thomas said. "He can't afford to lose nobody else."

The Pirates scored on their first drive with Stringer rushing for an 8-yard score.

The Seahawks tied it up when senior running back Rufus Townsend swept in from 40 yards out.

Sneads junior running back Seth Scott scored later in the first quarter, and then Stringer scored his second TD, from 11 yards out.

"We played good, we just had too many turnovers," said Yeomans.
