GOP agrees to FBI probe of nominee

Nominee clears Senate committee, but final vote delayed up to week for investigation

WASHINGTON — After a dramatic flurry of last-minute negotiations, Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh cleared a key procedural hurdle Friday, but his confirmation prospects were still deeply uncertain as Republicans agreed to ask for a new FBI investigation into sexual assault allegations.

Under pressure from moderate members, Republican leaders said they would allow the new probe for up to one week, slowing their rush to confirm Kavanaugh shortly after the new high court term opens on Monday.

It was unclear whether President Donald Trump backed the new timeline, cobbled together in private negotiations Friday. The talks were forced by Sen. Jeff Flake, a moderate Republican who surprised colleagues by announcing his support for Kavanaugh early Friday only to call for further investigation a few hours later.

Trump, who previously accused the Democrats of

obstruction and opposed the FBI probing the allegations against his nominee, said merely that he would “let the Senate handle that.” In fact, it’s the White House that would have to ask the FBI to investigate.

Friday’s developments unfolded a day after Kavanaugh and an accuser, Christine Blasey Ford, testified in an emotional, hours-long hearing that was televised nationwide. Kavanaugh angrily denied the allegation that he assaulted Ford while they were both in high school, but she said she was

Wilson’s law license suspended

PANAAM CITY — As former chief assistant State Attorney Greg Wilson awaits his sentencing for helping two Bay County Jail inmates pass communications, The Florida Supreme Court has effectively suspended his license to practice law.

The order was handed down Thursday after The Florida Bar filed a notice of determination of guilt against Wilson. He was found guilty as charged Sept. 19 of possession of contraband in a detention facility for helping the inmates — sisters Clista Robbins and Christy White — pass a “kite,” or folded piece of paper, inside the jail. Wilson then lied to investigators about his role in the exchange, for which he was convicted of perjury in an unofficial proceeding. He is scheduled to be sentenced Nov. 5 by Circuit Judge Michael Overstreet.

Wilson, the former second-in-command of the State Attorney’s Office,

could face up to a combined six years in prison on the charges, although many local veteran attorneys have said it is unlikely he will be incarcerated.

Trump signs spending plan to avoid government shutdown

\$854B package will keep government open through Dec. 7

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump signed an \$854 billion spending bill on Friday to keep the federal government open through Dec. 7, averting a government shutdown in the weeks leading up to November’s pivotal

midterm elections.

Trump signed the legislation to fund the military and several civilian agencies without journalists present as the fate of his Supreme Court nominee, Brett Kavanaugh, continued to hang in the balance.

The House and Senate approved the spending plan earlier this week.

Trump said in a statement the legislation would “rebuild our military, protect our communities, and

deliver a better future for all Americans.”

But the passage — which avoids a shutdown before the elections that will determine control of Congress — also comes without significant new funding for Trump’s long-promised and long-stalled wall along the U.S.-Mexico border, a fact he’s called “ridiculous.”

Trump has expressed deep frustration for months over Republican lawmakers’ failure to deliver on

the centerpiece of his 2016 campaign, and had been threatening a government shutdown to try to force their hands.

“I want to know, where is the money for Border Security and the WALL in this ridiculous Spending Bill, and where will it come from after the Midterms?” Trump tweeted last week, saying Republicans “MUST FINALLY GET TOUGH!” against Democrats



Today's Highlight in History

In Sept. 29, 1978, Pope John Paul I was found dead in his Vatican apartment just over a month after becoming head of the Roman Catholic Church.

On this date

In 1789, the U.S. War Department established a regular army with a strength of several hundred men.

In 1829, London's reorganized police force, which became known as Scotland Yard, went on duty.

In 1910, the National Urban League had its beginnings in New York as The Committee on Urban Conditions Among Negroes.

In 1938, British, French, German and Italian leaders concluded the Munich Agreement, which was aimed at appeasing Adolf Hitler by allowing Nazi annexation of Czechoslovakia's Sudetenland.

In 1943, General Dwight D. Eisenhower and Italian Marshal Pietro Badoglio signed an armistice aboard the British ship HMS Nelson off Malta.

In 1957, the San Francisco-bound New York Giants played their last game at the Polo Grounds, losing to the Pittsburgh Pirates, 9-1. The Brooklyn Dodgers played their last game before moving to Los Angeles, losing to the Phillies 2-1 in Philadelphia.

In 1977, the Billy Joel album "The Stranger" was released by Columbia Records.

In 1982, Extra-Strength Tylenol capsules laced with deadly cyanide claimed the first of seven victims in the Chicago area. (To date, the case remains unsolved.)

In 1987, Henry Ford II, longtime chairman of Ford Motor Co., died in Detroit at age 70.

In 2000, Israeli riot police stormed a major Jerusalem shrine and opened fire on stone-throwing Muslim worshippers, killing four Palestinians and wounding 175.

Does #MeToo face a backlash?

Kavanaugh-Ford hearing creates mixed reaction over future of the movement

NEW YORK — Some skeptics of #MeToo activism are hoping Brett Kavanaugh's angry, tearful denial of sexual assault allegations might help fuel a backlash against the year-old movement. But advocates for victimized women say it's now too powerful to be derailed.

The mixed reactions followed Thursday's vehement assertion by Kavanaugh and his Republican allies that he was the victim of a "political hit job" by Democrats. They suggested that Kavanaugh's accuser, Christine Blasey Ford, was being exploited for partisan purposes.

In a Philadelphia Inquirer column on Friday titled "Kavanaugh creates #MeToo moment for accused men," conservative writer Christine Flowers expressed empathy for the embattled federal judge, who is President Donald Trump's nominee to fill a Supreme Court vacancy.

"Through those real tears, the rage came through like a laser and a sword," Flowers wrote. "And for a moment, I felt as if, finally, one man had found the courage to say my life matters."

As for Ford, Flowers wrote: "I think she allowed herself to be used as a valuable tool in the unleashed fury of the

#MeToo movement."

On Twitter, in the aftermath of the televised Ford-Kavanaugh hearing before the Senate Judiciary Committee, there was widespread use of the #HimToo hashtag — which has been used to convey the idea that too many men are being falsely accused of sexual misconduct. Many of the new tweets included hashtags supporting Kavanaugh, including one by conservative activist Candace Owens.

"I'm loving the hashtag #HimToo," Owens tweeted. "It appears to be a movement built of men who have had their lives and families destroyed by false allegations

and a lack of due process."

#MeToo activists acknowledge their movement faces resistance.

"If anyone had any illusions that the #MeToo movement's work was easy, the toxic backlash that we are seeing this week from Brett Kavanaugh, Republican senators and the White House should correct that misimpression," said Emily Martin, a vice president of the National Women's Law Center.

"But we also know, from everything we have seen in the past year, that whatever happens with this nomination, the voices of women and other survivors will not be silenced," Martin said in an

email. "I know that ultimately the transformative power of this movement will prevail."

Already, there are indications that many other women have been emboldened by Ford's willingness to testify publicly about her alleged assault as a 15-year-old.

RAINN, an anti-sexual violence organization, estimated that its National Sexual Assault Hotline saw a 200 percent increase Thursday over normal volume. In Washington state, a woman accused a legislator of raping her 11 years ago, saying she was inspired to speak out as she watched the Ford-Kavanaugh hearing. "I'm done being silent," tweeted

Candace Farber.

However, Noreen Farrell, executive director of San Francisco-based Equal Rights Advocates, worried that some sexual abusers also might feel emboldened if Kavanaugh eventually is confirmed for the Supreme Court.

"With the right pedigree, ample resources to secure the backing of high-profile friends, and the right air of entitlement, many privileged predators will continue to rise to position of immense power influencing the lives of women," Farrell said.

Jess Davidson, who leads the advocacy group End Rape on Campus, worried that the Kavanaugh developments might be "re-traumatizing" for victims of past sexual assaults.

"It's an exceptionally difficult time for survivors," she said. "But it's also reinvigorating — showing why we need to do so much more work."

Jason Hilden, a former police officer who's now a stay-at-home dad of two, said he had been a supporter of the #MeToo movement, but now feels it has "gone too far."

"Women, for the longest time, have been put on the back-burner, in terms of sexual assault," said the 39-year-old Hilden, of Evansville, Indiana. "I hate it when people say, 'Well, she brought it on herself,' and things like that. I hate that. But it's gotten to the point that anybody can say anything, and it's believed now."

Police say robbery suspect linked to four murders

A man suspected in nearly a dozen armed robberies is now facing murder charges in connection to four deaths in Oklahoma, including two people who investigators initially thought died in a traffic accident, Oklahoma City police said Friday.

Mario Normore, 27, has been jailed for almost a year on 10 counts of robbery with a firearm involving several businesses and two banks, according to court records. On Friday, police announced that prosecutors have agreed that Normore also be charged with four counts of murder.

Formal murder charges had yet to be filed as of Friday afternoon, a delay that isn't unusual in Oklahoma.

Appeals court affirms ruling that IBM owes Indiana \$78M

Indiana's Court of Appeals on Friday upheld a judge's ruling that IBM owes Indiana \$78 million in damages stemming from the company's failed effort to automate much of the state's welfare services.

The decision affirmed Marion Superior Court Judge Heather Welch's August 2017 award to the state in the long-running case, but the three-judge court also found that IBM is entitled to interest on nearly \$50 million in state fees that Welch ruled Indiana owes the company.

Welch had rejected IBM's request for interest on those fees, but the appellate court reversed the decision and sent the matter back to Welch to determine the amount of interest IBM is owed.

Arkansas congressman's son arrested on gun, drug charges

The son of an Arkansas congressman has been arrested on multiple drug and gun charges.

Benton County jail records show that 31-year-old James Phillip Womack was arrested Thursday night on 11 counts, including possession of methamphetamine or cocaine with intent to deliver.

Womack is being held without bond Friday. He is the son of Republican Rep. Steve Womack, who represents northwest Arkansas' 3rd Congressional District.

James Phillip Womack pleaded guilty in 2010 to conspiracy to deliver a controlled substance. Rep. Steve Womack said in a statement that his son is accountable for the choices he's made.

COPENHAGEN, DENMARK
Denmark manhunt shuts down bridges, ferries to Copenhagen

A nationwide police manhunt paralyzed Denmark on Friday after authorities briefly cut off the eastern island of Zealand, where the capital of Copenhagen sits, from the rest of the country as well as from Germany and Sweden.

Bridges from Zealand to the central island of Funen and to neighboring Sweden were closed down for about two hours, and ferry crossings to Germany and to Sweden were also halted. Shutting down these key crossings caused major traffic jams near the bridges to Sweden and the mainland. The Copenhagen police later said all bridges and ferry crossings had been reopened but heavily armed police officers were screening cars at bridges and ferries.

BERLIN
3 wounded in stabbing in southwestern Germany

A 19-year-old Afghan asylum seeker stabbed three people Friday in a town in southwestern Germany before being arrested, authorities said. His motive wasn't immediately clear.

One of the victims suffered life-threatening injuries in the afternoon attack in a central square in Ravensburg, police and prosecutors said in a joint statement.

They said that the victims, all three of whom were taken to a hospital, were two Syrian asylum-seekers aged 19 and 20 and a 52-year-old German man.

Two were attacked at a bus stop and the other about 50 yards away.

professional fate hangs in the balance, the state's high court has effectively suspended Wilson's license to practice law by ordering him to find his current clients new legal representation and not take on more clients.

"This suspension shall be effective (30) days from the date of this order so that (Wilson) can close out his practice and protect the interests of existing clients," The Florida Supreme Court ordered. "If (Wilson) notifies this court in writing he is no longer practicing and does not need (30) days to protect existing clients, this court will enter an order making the suspension effective immediately."

Chief Justice Charles T. Canady has appointed Linda L. Nobles, chief judge of the First Judicial Circuit, to act as "referee" in any disciplinary action brought by The Florida Bar against Wilson. Nobles will hear

arguments in the case, file a report within 90 days concerning the appropriate sanctions to be imposed and issue a recommendation to the Florida Supreme Court.

Recommendations could range for admonishment to disbarment.

The Florida Bar filed its notice Thursday with the Supreme Court that a determination of guilt would be forthcoming.

They opened a file on Wilson shortly after his arrest in October 2017 for perjury and introduction of contraband into a detention facility.

In the immediate wake

of Wilson's conviction, though, The Bar has yet to complete its investigation.

Karen Y. Kirksey, spokeswoman for The Bar, said that investigation is now "at staff level." The Bar's "discipline roadmap" explains that to mean that further investigation is warranted and is in the hands of one of five branch offices of The Bar. Since the investigation is pending, no reports are currently available to the public.

And a timeline in unavailable for when those could be expected,

Kirksey said.

"All cases are different," she said. "It just depends on the situation."

Wilson, 46, started his career as a Panama City police officer and climbed the ranks of law enforcement to eventually reach a crescendo as the second-in-command at the SAO.

He spent seven years in that role under State Attorney Glenn Hess until 2016 when he abruptly resigned from the office and challenged his former boss in a primary battle for top prosecutor over Bay, Calhoun, Gulf, Holmes, Jackson and Washington counties.

Wilson said the decision came after Hess did not fulfill an agreement to bow out at the end of his second term and hand Wilson a shot at the office.

Wilson lost to Hess by a 58 percent to 42 percent margin, but he vowed to make another run for state attorney in 2020 and turned to private legal practice in the meantime.

It was about a year later Wilson became

the subject of a BCSO investigation at the Bay County Jail after officers stumbled across an Aug. 14, 2017, recorded jailhouse call they suspected involved controlled substances.

In the call, Robbins told Wilson in vague terms that she thought something was in her car — "if it's there, get it," she said — and Wilson responded he would get rid of it. Because of the possession of prescription narcotics charges Robbins had been arrested on and the belief that she and Wilson had a romantic relationship, BCSO expanded its investigation.

It eventually led authorities to install video cameras — without audio capability — in an attorney interview room where they could video Wilson and the two sisters.

In the video captured in September 2017, Wilson furtively accepts a folded note from Robbins during one meeting and then passes it to White in a different meeting. When questioned under oath about his actions, Wilson categorically denied the

allegations as "absolutely false," even reciting his rights to himself at one point, but at that time he was not aware of the video.

He was arrested about three weeks later.

Hess recused himself and his office from the investigation because of ties with Wilson, and State Attorney Jack Campbell of the 2nd Judicial Circuit was appointed to prosecute the case.

Because BCSO consulted with Hess about the legality of the cameras in the confidential room, Wilson's defense attorneys attempted to argue political retaliation played a factor in the decision. But Overstreet denied the request, saying the groundwork for a "selective prosecution" defense had not been established. Despite the court order against the argument, Wilson's defense attorneys repeatedly called the case a "ruse" in closing arguments and attempted to show a law enforcement bias against him.

After Wilson was found guilty as charged, Campbell said his investigation was solely focused on the jailhouse calls and exchange captured on video.

Hess said to his knowledge that similar misconduct did not take place during Wilson's time in the SAO.

Court records indicate Wilson, in his role as an attorney, has six criminal cases pending and three civil cases.

NEW YORK Carnival shares fall as fuel costs cut into outlook

Carnival Corp. on Thursday reported jump in fiscal third-quarter revenue and profit, but warned that higher fuel costs will likely weigh down profit throughout the year.

Carnival's shares fell \$4.41, or 6.6 percent, to \$62.58 in morning trading.

The Miami-based company's profit rose 28 percent to \$1.71 billion, or \$2.41 per share. Earnings, adjusted for asset impairment gains and non-recurring gains, came to \$2.36 per share.

Revenue jumped 5.8 percent to \$5.84 billion.

Both profit and revenue topped Wall Street expectations of \$2.31 per share and \$5.82 billion, respectively.

But, the cruise line operator said higher fuel costs cut into the current quarter's bottom line and it expects those costs to continue impacting profit.

At a crossroads

Tesla faces a reckoning with CEO Elon Musk's job in jeopardy

SAN FRANCISCO — The very attributes that have fueled a mania around Elon Musk — his vision, brash personality and willingness to take risks — could prove to be his downfall.

The Tesla CEO who made his fortune and his renegade-genius reputation by bursting through the barriers of conventional thinking faces a humiliating comedown as government regulators try to oust him from the company in a lawsuit accusing him of duping the electric car maker's stockholders.

But extracting Musk from the company he has become synonymous with could devastate Tesla.

Musk's fans maintain that Tesla would be insane to get rid of him, arguing it would go down as a huge mistake similar to the one Apple made in 1985 when it ousted its own visionary founder, Steve Jobs, only

to bring him back with the company on the brink of bankruptcy 12 years later.

"People who create disruptive companies tend to be somewhat abnormal, and that is what leads to these Herculean accomplishments," said Keith Rabois, a venture capitalist who used to work with Musk during one of his early incarnations at PayPal. "They are all a little bit off central casting in their own way, but that sort of is what lets them walk through these walls or over these walls when most people are terrified."

The Securities and Exchange Commission filed a complaint against Musk on Thursday, alleging he falsely claimed in an Aug. 7 tweet that he had secured financing to buy out Tesla and take it private at \$420 per share, a substantial premium over the stock price at the time.

The SEC is asking a federal court in New York to bar Musk from serving as an officer or director of any public company. The case is not expected to go to trial until early next year.

The fraud case comes amid a squall of disquieting tweets and other troubling disclosures that have raised

questions about whether Musk should remain at the helm of Tesla, a company valued at \$46 billion.

Musk has "gone from looking like the visionary genius to looking like the out-of-control guy who probably is on the borderline of a breakdown," said Erik Gordon, a professor at the University of Michigan Ross School of Business.

Even before the SEC went after his job, Musk had raised hackles by ridiculing stock market analysts for posing fairly standard questions about Tesla's shaky finances, and then called a diver who helped rescue 12 boys on a Thai soccer team from a flooded cave a pedophile, triggering a libel lawsuit against himself.

The challenges already facing Tesla might become even more daunting without Musk as CEO because its fortunes are inextricably tied to those of its leader.

Musk's charisma and accomplishments as a disrupter of several industries are worth \$130 per share — or about \$22 billion — to Tesla, Barclays analyst Brian Johnson wrote in a note. He called it the "Musk premium."

Facebook says 50M accounts were affected by breach

NEW YORK — Facebook reported a major security breach in which 50 million user accounts were accessed by unknown attackers.

The attackers gained the ability to "seize control" of those user accounts, Facebook said, by stealing digital keys the company uses to keep users logged in. Facebook has logged out the 50 million breached users — plus another 40 million who were vulnerable to the attack. Users don't need to change their Facebook passwords, it said.

Facebook said it doesn't know who was behind the attacks or where they're based. In a call with reporters on Friday, CEO Mark Zuckerberg said that attackers would have had the ability to view private messages or post on someone's account, but there's no sign that they did.

"We do not yet know if any of the accounts were actually misused," Zuckerberg said.

The hack is the latest setback for Facebook during a tumultuous year of security problems and privacy issues. So far, though, none have significantly shaken the confidence of the company's 2 billion global users.

This latest hack involved a bug in Facebook's "View As" feature, the company said in a blog post. That feature lets people see how their profiles appear to others. The attackers used that vulnerability to steal those digital keys, known as "access tokens." Possession of those tokens would allow attackers to control those accounts.


"We haven't yet been able to determine if there was specific targeting" of particular accounts, Guy Rosen, Facebook's vice president of product management, said in a call with reporters. "It does seem broad. And we don't yet know who was behind these attacks and where they might be based."

Neither passwords nor credit card data was stolen, Rosen said.

He said the company has alerted the FBI and regulators in the United States and Europe.

Sharing the world's waters

The International Seapower Symposium, which took place last week at the Naval War College, offers a forum for the top military maritime authorities from more than 100 countries to come together to discuss issues of mutual interest. The leaders discuss such matters as shipping lanes through the Arctic, countering raids by pirates or cooperating on humanitarian missions.

"Make no mistake; this desire to sail together in support of our fellow citizens — regardless of the winds, waves and weather around us — is the current that has drawn us here to Newport," said Adm. John Richardson, chief of naval operations.

The symposium bubbled into the news when China summoned its delegate, Vice Admiral Shen Jinlong, home from Newport amid growing tensions with the United States. It was one step in a series that highlighted the increasing disagreements between this country and China.

With the help of an enormous trade imbalance, China has been massively increasing its military, leading some American strategists to fear a day could come in the not-too-distant future when China, with its huge population and economy, will have hegemony over the United States.

Apart from the tariffs imposed by the White House to counter Chinese trade practices, the countries have disagreed about a range of military issues, including who controls the South China Sea, where China has built airstrips and warned other countries not to interfere with the waters it considers its own. The United States, by contrast, has long been a proponent of free movement on the seas.

The Treasury Department recently sanctioned China's military procurement agency for buying military aircraft and missile systems from Russia. China, in turn, refused the U.S. request to have the amphibious ship Wasp call on Hong Kong next month.

Still, while the United States and China are increasingly at odds, it remains valuable to have a global summit of naval forces and coast guards.

Navy secretary Richard V. Spencer, a host of this year's symposium, described its goal of promoting international maritime cooperation.

"We seek a true partnership based upon the concept of shared risks producing shared rewards," he said. "A partnership in which no single nation is the expert, and the ability to lead resides within all of us. When we work together this way, we can produce an equation where one plus one equals three, and everyone benefits."

The symposium also provides an occasion to reflect on the significance of the Naval War College itself. The naval research, education and leadership center has been graduating students since 1885. Today, according to the college, about 300 active-duty admirals, generals and senior service leaders are alumni.

"Every day, our allies and partners join us in defending freedom, deterring war and maintaining the rules which underwrite a free and open international order," Mr. Spencer said.



Red tide likely to return if we don't take action now

In the not too distant past, property was cheap on Panama City Beach because the land was unsuitable for farming.

In the 1930s, Gideon Thomas, the namesake of Thomas Drive, changed that. Recently, property has sold for more than \$60,000 per Gulf-front-foot.

In the not too distant future, if there were a persistent red tide it could once again make the land cheaper. Potential visitors would wonder if it's safe.

Red tide is a harmful algae bloom scientifically known as *karenia brevis*. At certain levels, it releases a powerful neurotoxin that kills fish and marine life and is aggravating to human lungs and flesh.

Karenia brevis has plagued beaches in Southwest Florida for almost a year now. *Karenia brevis* is a species distinct from the freshwater blue-green algae, cyanobacteria, coming out of Lake Okeechobee.

In Northwest Florida, our incumbent politicians are attempting to calm concerns. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, for example, explains that red tides are "natural" and date back to Native American days.

Still, the typical Beach visitor is unaccustomed to seeing an endless line of dead fish along the shore, as has been the case some days earlier this month. And, difficulty breathing and the rotten smell are not good for tourism or property values.

Record keeping was less rigorous before the 1990s and virtually nonexistent in the early part of the 20th century, so it is hard for scientists to compare. But a look at the FWC website shows more reports of fish kills from red tide in recent years. In Bay County, fish kills occurred in 2015.

Around the world, harmful algae blooms are causing significant marine death in places as far flung as China and California. The widespread occurrence of severe harmful algae blooms is itself a clue as to the cause.

As anyone who has baked bread with yeast knows, heat is an essential element for the micro-organism's growth.

Around the world, median ocean temperatures have increased due to climate change. Fossil fuel consumption has increased the levels of atmospheric CO₂ from 280 ppm to over 400 ppm since 1875. The CO₂ and other greenhouse gasses in the atmosphere act like an atmospheric blanket trapping more heat from sunlight.

For the first time in recorded history, the surface waters of the Gulf of Mexico never fell below an average daily temperature of 73 degrees in the winter of 2017. Certain species of phytoplankton like *karenia brevis* get a competitive edge in warmer water.

Karenia brevis feeds off phosphorus and nitrogen, ingredients common to fertilizer and animal and human waste. Human development along the shorelines and in river basins has increased stormwater runoff.

In addition to the development of more paved surfaces, the precipitation from storms is now more severe and there is more runoff.

Fertilizer and waste runoff from the Mississippi River basin has created a low-oxygen dead zone in the Gulf that approximates the size of Connecticut. In 2017, scientists measured the hypoxic zone at over 8,776 square miles, its largest size ever. Fish and shellfish cannot survive on the low oxygen. Algae blooms, however, prosper in the nitrogen and phosphorous rich environment.

As most swimmers know, natural bodies of water are cooler at deeper levels. Oceans have a natural process of upwellings that mixes water levels and moderates temperatures. The relatively severe increase in surface water temperatures has aggravated stratification in the water column, leaving the warmer water at the top and the denser, cooler water at the bottom and with seemingly less mixing from upwellings.

Just as everybody with an "Open East Pass" bumper sticker knows, marine environment is healthier with a steady water exchange.

For thousands of years,

the Gulf Stream has drawn warm water from the Gulf of Mexico and carried it northward toward Europe. Scientists predict climate change will change this dynamic conveyor belt of ocean heat. So far, although some scientists report a weakening of the Gulf Stream, most would agree its future decline does not portend well for the effort to moderate the temperature in the Gulf of Mexico over the next 100 years.

What shall we do?

Act sooner, not later. Most problems are more efficiently solved with earlier intervention.

Insist that policy makers be guided by science. Most climate change deniers or minimalists are Republicans. Voters need to hold them accountable for the damage they are doing to our present and future environment or convince them to work on solutions.

Work together across state and national lines. A flood in Houston or fertilizer runoff in the Mississippi River basin washes in nutrients that can kill fish in Florida. States and the federal government have to prioritize effective conservation. The Farm bill touted by Congressman Neal Dunn needs to strengthen the provisions for preventing fertilizer and animal waste runoff not weaken them. The Paris Climate Accord is an example of international climate cooperation. Sadly, under President Trump the United States is now the only nation to have announced its intent to not participate.

Through rigorous federal restrictions, the Red Snapper population has seemingly recovered. So, citizens and our representatives can make a difference.

Harmful algae blooms threaten our coastal communities with enormous economic dislocation and hardship. Whether Republicans like it or not, effective environmental regulation in the form of limiting stormwater runoff and reducing CO₂ emissions are actually necessary to protect our economy, our health and our coastal way of life.

As we have already seen, much can change in 90 years.

China, Russia take up globalism as US sheds it

UNITED NATIONS — Days after U.S. President Donald Trump denounced globalism before world leaders at the United Nations, China and Russia positioned themselves Friday as defenders of internationalism that are keeping promises when Washington is backing away from them.

Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi denied his country was trying to eclipse the U.S. as a world leader, but his speech at the U.N. General Assembly was a stark contrast to Trump's "America First" message.

It came amid rising tensions between the U.S. and China, which Trump accused this

week of interfering in the upcoming U.S. midterm election.

China denies the claim. Russia is also facing

U.S. accusations of election meddling, and Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov denounced the claims as "baseless."

He lashed out at U.S. policies in Iran, Syria and Venezuela, while vigorously defending multilateral organizations such as the U.N. and warning against unilateral moves by the U.S. or other countries.

"We see the desire of several Western states to retain their self-proclaimed status as world leaders and to slow down the irreversible, objective process of establishing multipolarity," or multiple centers of power, Lavrov said. "These powers do not hesitate to

use any methods, including political blackmail, economic pressure and brute force."

China often portrays itself as an advocate for "win-win" international cooperation, and Wang was hardly the only leader to defend the concept of multilateralism at this week's U.N. gathering of presidents, prime ministers, monarchs and other leaders.

But coming in the wake of Trump's proclamation that Americans "reject the ideology of globalism," Wang's speech sounded a note of rebuttal from a competing power.

"Should we seek to uphold the architecture of

the world order or allow it to be eroded upon and collapse?" Wang asked. "China's answer is clear-cut. ... China will keep to its commitment and remain a champion of multilateralism."

In a week when Washington raised tariffs on Chinese products and Beijing responded in kind, Wang insisted that "China will not be blackmailed or yield to pressure" and warned that "protectionism will only hurt oneself, and unilateral moves will bring damage to all."

"State-to-state relations must be based on credibility, not on willful revocation of commitments," he said.

who he said are obstructing law enforcement and border security.

GOP leaders had warned Trump a shutdown could be deeply damaging to Republicans in the midterms and said they preferred to resolve the issue after the Nov. 6 elections.

But Trump had questioned that logic, arguing a shutdown could, in fact, be beneficial politically.

Trump in his statement applauded the \$1.6 billion the bill includes for wall funding — far short of the \$5 billion he was seeking — but also blamed Democrats for failing to agree to more.

"Unfortunately, the radical Democrats refuse to support border security and want drugs and crime to pour into our country," he railed.

In an interview with Hill.TV, he said his recent visit to the 9/11 Memorial in Pennsylvania to commemorate Flight 93 had renewed his resolve to build the wall, and alluded to potential immigration action he said he planned to take in the coming week.

The spending plan includes \$675 billion for the Defense Department, with money for new F-35 Lightning fighters, Apache and Black Hawk helicopters, and Navy battleships, and increases military pay by 2.6 percent, the largest pay raise in nine years. It also increases spending for Health and Human Services, Education, Labor and other agencies, including a 5 percent boost for the National Institutes of Health.

"100 percent" certain he was her attacker.

Flake, a key moderate Republican, was at the center of Friday's drama and uncertainty. In the morning, he announced that he would support Kavanaugh's nomination.

Shortly after, he was confronted in an elevator by two women who, through tears, implored him to change his mind.

The stunning confrontation was captured by television cameras.

After huddling privately with his colleagues, Flake announced he would vote to advance Kavanaugh's nomination to the full Senate only if the FBI were to investigate the allegations against the judge. Democrats have been calling for such an probe, though Republicans and the White House have insisted it's unnecessary.

The committee vote was 11-10 along party lines.

Flake said that after discussing the matter with fellow senators, he felt it "would be proper to delay the floor vote for up to but not more than one week."

Attention quickly turned to a handful of undecided senators. West Virginia Democratic Sen. Joe Manchin said he supported Flake's call to push off a full Senate vote until the FBI investigates Ford's allegation. He said the probe should happen "so that our country can have confidence in the outcome of this vote."

It was unclear if

Republican Sens. Susan Collins of Maine and Lisa Murkowski of Alaska would do the same.

With a 51-49 majority, Senate Republicans have little margin for error on a final vote, especially given the fact that several Democrats facing tough re-election prospects this fall announced their opposition to Kavanaugh on Friday.

Sens. Bill Nelson of Florida, Joe Donnelly of Indiana and Jon Tester of Montana all said they would vote no.

During Thursday's hearing, Democrats repeatedly peppered Kavanaugh with questions about whether he would support an FBI investigation.

He demurred, saying he would back whatever the committee decided to do.

The FBI conducts background checks for federal nominees, but the agency does not make judgments on the credibility or significance of allegations. It compiles information about the nominee's past and provides its findings to the White House, which passes them along to the committee.

Republicans say reopening the FBI investigation is unnecessary because committee members have had the opportunity to question both Kavanaugh and Ford and other potential witnesses have submitted sworn statements.

If the FBI does reopen the background investigation, agents could interview accusers and witnesses and gather additional evidence or details that could help corroborate or disprove the allegations.

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

Callaway cuts millage rate, hikes starting pay

CALLAWAY — The City of Callaway approved its fiscal year budget Tuesday, reducing ad valorem taxes and increasing starting pay for employees in the process.

Commissioners gave the thumbs-up for the budget during a public hearing.

The total city-wide budget is \$20,024,193 and the millage rate is 1.99 mills.

Ad valorem taxes are being reduced by 10 percent.

Starting minimum pay for city employees is now \$11.50, an increase from the previous rate of \$10.25.

The increases of salaries, benefits and an increased benefit package come with a cost of more than \$550,000, according to City Manager Eddie Cook.

"Starting pay was technically below poverty level and we needed to get that raised up," Cook said. "We

did adjust salaries for most of the current employees. We looked at each particular salary, mostly in the lower-tier level employees because we had adjustments that needed to be made since several years have gone by since adjustments have been made."

All capital projects are funded and the city still is on track with its five-year plan.

The trolley system also is funded so people can get to doctor appointments and "stuff like that," Cook said.

"We did increase the employees for the city in the departments of leisure service, utility billing and code enforcement," Cook said. "And all of this, we are still continuing to budget reserves for our future needs."

"We feel like we've presented a very strong budget that will allow us to do what we need to do while maximizing the taxpayers' dollars."

Resident David Agosta agreed.

PANAMA CITY BEACH — If you or someone you know is facing sudden financial crisis, there are resources available to get you back on your feet.

Beach Care Services is a non-profit organization serving those living across the bridge by providing temporary assistance, and what started as a small a relatively under-the-radar operation is now a major player in charity community.

"We just help with locals and

people who have needs," said president Skip Stoltz.

The organization began in 1999 in order to serve the residents of the beach side of the county. Previously, the area had very few resources for people who weren't living in town, so the organization was founded to fill the void. The organization provides short term assistance to locals, which can manifest in a variety of ways. "Rent, dental, power, trolley passes," said Stoltz, to name a few.

Though assistance is generally financial, and temporary, the organization also provides

clients with resources and logistics as well as recommendations for other organizations to get individuals back on track to maintaining their own livelihood. The organization has helped people from all walks of life to help keep them from losing their homes, their jobs, and even their lives, and operates solely on donations from civic groups, churches, members of the community, as well as annual fundraising events hosted around town, such as the Duck Race and





Driver gets 15 years for killing pedestrian, fleeing

PANAMA CITY — A Bay County man has accepted his role for fleeing the scene after fatally running over a pedestrian and been sentenced to 15 years in prison, according to court records.

James Christopher Atwell, 32, pleaded no contest Thursday to leaving the scene of a fatal accident and driving with a suspended license while causing death. He and Brittney Leigh Pippin, 26, were arrested after Florida Highway Patrol officers arrived May 31 near County 2321 and Resota Beach Road to find that a 49-year-old pedestrian, Cleveland Long II, had been struck by a vehicle and left for dead. Atwell was sentenced by Circuit Judge Michael Overstreet to 15 years in prison for his role in the incident, which will be served concurrent with a sentence of the same length for violating the terms of his probation on a previous traffic arrest, court records show.

Pippin still faces a charge of accessory after the fact to leaving scene of fatal crash. A trial date has not been set, but correspondence filed Friday on the part of Long's family states they are asking for firm punishment for her role.

"Whether she was driving or

not, she still took part in leaving the accident and not reporting it to the proper authorities," wrote Ruth Jenkins, Long's mother-in-law. "If you look at her criminal record she has not been a good girl either."

According to FHP reports, the crash happened about 6:50 p.m. May 31 on a stretch of Resota Beach Road in Southport. Long was walking on the westbound shoulder of the road, about 1,000 feet from the County 2321 intersection, while Atwell was driving a Ford F-150 westbound with Pippin in the passenger seat. Troopers said Atwell ran the F-150 off the roadway and clipped Cleveland with the front of the truck. Atwell and Pippin then allegedly fled the scene, FHP reported.

Long was rushed to a hospital but died from his injuries. Another driver who had just passed him walking on the roadside saw the collision in his rear-view mirror. As that driver pulled over, he noted the description of the truck and the direction it headed as it fled the scene, FHP reported.

from the witness, FHP and the Bay County Sheriff's Office officers located the vehicle on Kingswood Road about 1 a.m. with considerable damage.

"There was damage to the front right portion," troopers wrote. "The damage continued rearward, pushing the front right fender toward the front right passenger door, making it difficult to open the front right passenger door. The damage continued along the passenger lateral portion to the right rear passenger fender."

The owner of the truck told authorities the truck had not been damaged before he let Pippin and Atwell take it to a gas station for cigarettes, FHP reported.

Pippin and Atwell were found later in the day. Both claimed to have been inside a gas station when the truck was hit by a vehicle they could not identify, but they told troopers differing stories.

At the time of the crash, Atwell was on probation for a December 2016 incident in which he fled from an officer investigating a call of a reckless driver of a truck in Callaway.

Pippin, too, was on probation for grand theft and forgery from a January 2018 case in which she wrote a check to herself for about \$450 from another person's checkbook.

efforts of teachers. I think it's also important for teachers to have an opportunity to be honored," said Sharon Michalik, director of communications for Bay District Schools. "Today, the responsibilities of the classroom are huge."

According to Michalik, quite a few changes have been made to this year's requirements, such as dropping resume requirements, shortening writing requirements, and adding a short video to allow nominees to explain why they are passionate about teaching.

The requirements have also shifted to allow teachers to be able to ask for a reference from their community such as a student, a parent, a principal, or former principal, to vouch for the nominee's leadership skills.

"It's a way for us to draw more stakeholders into the process," said Michalik. "A way for teachers to have someone else speak for them, which could be even more powerful than having the teacher speak for themselves."

Michalik says these

changes will streamline the process and make it more fun, easy, and concise for teachers and the district committee, which will be selecting the top five finalists. "We wanted to personalize it a little more and make sure that the committee really gets to know the teachers," said Michalik. "There's an old saying that the kids don't care what you know until they know you care."

Michalik says there are hundreds of teachers in the district that deserve to be honored for their hard work throughout the school year, and this program is a great way to both honor teachers and allow teachers to see how much the community appreciates their work, as much of the district's program would not be possible without funding from local businesses and community members.

"Not every community has a formal dinner and prizes and money," said Michalik. "We're very blessed that we live in a community that will step up and support teachers as it does."

The top five finalists will be announced on October 22nd and the district's overall Teacher of the Year will be selected on Dec. 6 at the Teacher of the Year banquet.

Allegiant celebrates passengers

Passengers break out in cheers when airline refunds tickets

EGLIN AFB — Celebration took flight at Gate A3 at Destin-Fort Walton Beach Airport on Thursday.

To commemorate its 40 millionth passenger to Florida since 2005, Allegiant Air awarded free flights to passengers waiting to board Flight 1902 to MidAmerica St. Louis Airport.

When Allegiant spokeswoman Courtney Goff announced the flight refund, passengers sprung from their seats and cheered amid a flurry of high fives and hugs. "Oh my God," Rose Beiermann of Belleville, Illinois, said of the news. "We just thought someone important was coming off the flight." Karen Mallory, who was traveling with Beiermann, said their women's group of four travel yearly together, usually to Mexico. But this year they decided to visit Destin for the first time.

"Nobody wanted a connecting flight, so

that's how we found Allegiant. It was one trip and it's been amazing," Mallory said. "Now we have half of our trip to come back next year."

Before the big announcement, passengers were treated to sandwiches and gifts, compliments of the airline, and even played a bit of trivia to get the celebration started.

"We are trying to get really involved and meet and greet with all the passengers and just let them know that not

only do we appreciate them for continuing to fly Allegiant, but they're the ones that have helped us reach this great milestone," Goff said. "We have flown 40 million people into the state of Florida, which is huge considering Allegiant has flown 80 million nationwide, so half of that is just to the state of Florida."

Before the official announcement, Okaloosa County Airports Director Tracy Stage credited Allegiant and

their passengers for boosting tourism and jobs in the county.

He noted that tourism spending reached \$83 million in this year, and since Allegiant added the VPS hub two years ago, 600,000 passengers and 130 jobs have been brought to the area.

"The impact that you've had on our community is staggering," Stage said. "It really goes to show the commitment that Allegiant has to this airport and to their customers."

Gulf County, Port Authority are seeking dredge funds

PORT ST. JOE — Pieces of the port puzzle continue to land on the table to await proper placement.

The Board of County Commissioners unanimously agreed Tuesday to join the Port St. Joe Port Authority in a pre-application to Triumph Gulf Coast, Inc. for funding to dredge the federally-authorized shipping channel.

The pre-application would seek \$15 million of the estimated \$35 million needed to dredge the shipping channel to

federally-authorized depths.

The Port Authority, using roughly \$1 million in grant funds from the Florida Department of Transportation, has completed design for the infrastructure needed for the spoil disposal and entered into an agreement with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers on the actual dredge work.

What had been initially estimated at a cost of nearly \$50 million has come down, said Guerry Magidson, chair of the Port Authority, to the neighborhood of \$35 million.

"We are finding traction (for this project)," Magidson said. "I think we can

bring the price down even more."

The pre-application follows the Triumph board's decision to enter into term sheet negotiations with the county concerning a floating dry dock off the former paper mill site. The dry dock would facilitate the expansion of Eastern Shipbuilding into Gulf County.

The Triumph board, in agreeing to term negotiations, capped any grant award for the dry dock project at \$13 million.

The BOCC Tuesday also approved going out for bids on the dry dock project, which the Triumph board requested as the first step in understanding the true costs of the project.

A few weeks ago Jim handed me a book of short but true stories written by Joe. The second of those stories

Pope urges Chinese Catholics to trust

VATICAN CITY — Pope Francis urged Chinese Catholics on Wednesday to trust him and make concrete gestures of reconciliation following a landmark deal over bishop appointments that is aimed at ending decades of estrangement between the Vatican and Beijing.

In a letter to the Chinese faithful, Francis also called for greater dialogue between local priests and government authorities to ensure that ordinary church activities can be carried out, while encouraging the opening of "a new chapter" in official bilateral cooperation.

China's estimated 12 million Catholics are split between those belonging to the government-backed Chinese Catholic Patriotic Association, which is outside the pope's authority, and an underground church loyal to the pope. Underground priests and parishioners are frequently detained and harassed.

The letter appeared aimed at acknowledging the deep reservations of some underground faithful, for whom the deal represents a sell-out to the Communist

government and betrayal of their decades of loyalty to the pope.

Francis acknowledged these Chinese "sense themselves somehow abandoned" and expressed his "sincere admiration" for their fidelity over the years. But he asked them to trust him.

The aim, he said, is to "initiate an unprecedented process that we hope will help to heal the wounds of the past, restore full communion

among all Chinese Catholics, and lead to a phase of greater fraternal cooperation."

The letter follows the deal signed Saturday governing the naming of bishops in China, an issue that has split the church and vexed relations for decades.

The agreement regularizes the status of seven bishops who had been appointed by Beijing over the years without papal consent, and sets out a process of dialogue going forward to name new ones. Francis says he, not Beijing, ultimately will name new bishops.

While the deal addressed a crucial aspect of church governance in China, it didn't address more pastoral issues of unifying split communities, which the letter published Wednesday aims to do.

"The Catholic community in China is called to be united, so as to overcome the divisions of the past that have caused, and continue to cause, great suffering in the hearts of many pastors and faithful," Francis wrote. "All Christians, none excluded, must now offer gestures of reconciliation and communion."

Francis — and before

him Pope Benedict XVI and St. John Paul II — had tried to unite the two communities, including a letter Benedict penned to the Chinese faithful in 2007. Years of negotiations kicked into high gear over a year ago, culminating in the deal signed Saturday.

Unlike Benedict's 2007 letter, which labeled the Patriotic Association "incompatible" with Catholic doctrine and took a hard line in asserting the exclusive right of the pope to name bishops, Francis' tone was far more conciliatory and focused on moving past previous differences. He didn't even name the Patriotic Association or insist on his right to name bishops.

He has told reporters, however, that after a period of dialogue he would ultimately name new leaders of the church.

The letter provided some detail of the process involved, which includes ordinary priests and lay faithful taking part in the nomination process. That lay participation is unknown in the West, where such nominations are put to the Vatican for consideration by the local hierarchy and the local Vatican ambassador.

Bucs stay winless in Homecoming loss

SAND HILLS — When your season is going south, it really doesn't make any difference that it's your Homecoming game.

Or that you're playing a lightly regarded opponent in Lighthouse Christian Academy that left behind seven suspended players in Pensacola.

Nor did North Bay Haven's 12-10 defeat on Friday night at Bozeman have anything to do with outgaining the Stingrays by 329 yards to 138.

What was pertinent, is that the Buccaneers were playing

their third and fourth quarterbacks of this still young season, and behind a reconfigured offensive line that also has been decimated by penalties.

Therefore Lighthouse, 2-3, was able to score a touchdown and safety with its defense, and had two other touchdowns, one by its special teams and another by its defense, called back by penalty to keep the game always competitive.

The Bucs, 0-5, were able to overcome some deficiencies on defense via effort and just plain hustle. That couldn't be said on offense, where despite the quick feet of sophomore

quarterback Trey Johnson helping them move downfield, they never were able to display the consistency or polish to make the Stingrays pay a price.

Also critical was the hidden yards that favored Lighthouse by a wide margin. Six times NBH started a possession at or inside its 10 because of an inability to field Kevin Fountain's end-over-end punts that often bounced an extra 20 yards toward the Bucs' end zone after hitting the ground.

One of them provided a fitting ending to the game after Johnson had passed 22 yards

Strong finish pushes Dolphins past Marlins, 28-7

PANAMA CITY — Even when county rivals face off with district and playoff ramifications in play, it's often bragging rights that still serve as the biggest motivator for coaches and players.

Mosley's 28-7 win over Arnold at Tommy Oliver Stadium on Friday night put the Dolphins at 6-0 overall and in strong position atop the District 1-5A standings at 2-0. However, the Dolphins seemed more excited after the win about avenging a spring jamboree loss to the Marlins than moving one step closer to the postseason.

"It's a big win because it's a cross-town rivalry and it's always fun to beat Arnold," Mosley quarterback Michael Maddox said. "Our thing all week was that (the jamboree) was a half, but this was four quarters. They did beat us in the spring, but we knew we had something to prove and we proved it tonight."

Maddox completed 11 of 15 passes for 201 yards and two touchdowns, with Daveno Ellington hauling in six passes for 133 yards and two scores, including a 65-yard touchdown on the first play of the game. Jacarri Greene and Don McKay combined for 158 yards and two touchdowns on the ground, and keyed a dominant second half effort in which Dolphins outgained the Marlins 225 yards to 24.

It was a statistically even game at halftime even as Mosley led 14-7, with each team at 185 yards of total offense with one turnover. It

remained a one-possession game through three quarters, but the fourth and final quarter belonged only to the Dolphins.

Maddox finished off a 12-play, 94-yard drive by throwing a quick pass to Ellington, who stiff-armed a defender and bulled his way across the goal line for a 24-yard touchdown. The extra point by Connor Cunningham made it 21-7 with 11:20 left in the game.

A Josh Ligenfelter sack of Arnold quarterback Cade Ledman at the Arnold 7-yard line on the ensuing Marlins series forced a punt and gave Mosley great field position at its own 48. Greene opened

the drive with a 33-yard run and found the end zone from 4 yards out four plays later to make it 28-7 with 6:10 on the clock.

All in all, the Dolphins outgained the Marlins 129 yards to minus-7 over the final 12 minutes of action.

"It's a four quarter football game," Brown said. "We thought after the spring that we were the better team and that if we played another half we would've worn them down and that's what we did tonight. The tougher team won and we were able to finish the game."

Greene finished with 83

KEYS FOR SOUTH CAROLINA

Stop Snell: Kentucky junior running back Benny Snell leads the SEC in rushing at 135 yards per game, averaging 6.2 yards per carry with seven touchdowns. The Gamecocks rank 11th in the conference against the run, and will need to do better here.

Maintain balance: South Carolina isn't a league leader in rushing or passing offense, but has a very balanced attack. Jake Bentley is a capable passer, but the Gamecocks can't win on his arm alone.

USC will need to keep Kentucky's defense guessing.

KEYS FOR KENTUCKY

LSU basketball player Sims killed in shooting

BATON ROUGE, La. — LSU basketball player Wayne Sims was died after he was shot during a fight involving several men early Friday near the campus of another university in his hometown of Baton Rouge.

Sims, 20, was shot

around 12:25 a.m. and died from his wounds at a hospital, Baton Rouge police Sgt. Don Coppola Jr. said.

The shooting happened near Southern University's A.W. Mumford Stadium, where homecoming festivities are taking place this weekend.

Police have begun circulating a video of a fight among several men in a street which they believe led to the shooting of Sims. Police did not identify Sims in the video, which also shows cars stopping to avoid the melee, but Coppola said police are primarily interested in identifying

a man seen wearing red pants with a white stripe.

"Investigators are looking to identify that individual, along with any others in the video, to see if they have further information on who is responsible for taking the life of Sims," Coppola said.

LSU basketball coach

Will Wade, speaking alongside Athletic Director Joe Alleva at LSU's Pete Maravich Assembly Center on Friday morning, said the team is "devastated" and "in shock."

"This is your worst nightmare as a coach. This is what you worry about at all times," said Wade, who informed

the team of Sims' death when they met for what was supposed to have been a 6:30 a.m. workout Friday. "There's problems everywhere, so you just want to educate your guys as best as possible to stay away from those situations and unfortunately, sometimes, these lessons are the toughest."

FSU, Louisville looking for first ACC victory

Florida State and Louisville hoped to be contending in the Atlantic Coast Conference's Atlantic Division at this point of the season.

Instead, both are in search of their first conference victory when they met this Saturday. They are a combined 0-3 in league play.

"There's definite frustration, there's no question about that," said Louisville coach Bobby Petrino, whose team gained just 214 yards in a 27-3 loss at Virginia in its ACC opener. The yardage and scoring totals were lows for the Cardinals under Petrino.

"We have players that are competitors and certain things aren't happening the way we expected, (or) they expected. ... The way you make confidence is you make plays, you have success."

Doing so requires addressing concerns on both sides of the ball, particularly at quarterback after ineffective play by the starter forced a switch for the third consecutive week. Malik Cunningham's first career start lasted just over a quarter in Charlottesville before he was replaced by Jawon Pass, who also struggled.

Petrino hasn't said whether Pass or Cunningham will begin behind center against FSU but offensive consistency remains the mission.

"We have an understanding who's going to start and how we're going to play him," Petrino said. "It

doesn't do us any good to tell everybody that. But we do need to improve and get better there, and obviously everybody understands that."

Louisville has won the past two meetings and FSU wants to be ready for either QB - or both - to avoid a third straight loss to the Seminoles that would end any hopes of division contention.

The Seminoles (0-2 ACC) hope to follow up their 37-19 nonconference win over Northern Illinois with a significant victory for first-year coach Willie Taggart. The Seminoles outgained NIU 473-221 and held NIU to just six yards rushing, their lowest total since limiting Colorado to minus-27 in 2007. Their run defense ranks 11th in FBS at 97.5 yards allowed per contest.

Their next step is doing it again to string together wins for the first time.

"We have talent on this football team," Taggart said. "We as coaches have got to help teach them how to win again and play winning football."

Other things to watch as FSU visits Louisville:

FRANCOIS FACTOR

Seminoles junior QB Deondre Francois has thrown for an ACC-best 1,083 yards and ranks second in yards per game at 270.8. He threw for a season-high 352 yards against NIU but faces a Cardinal pass defense ranked sixth in the ACC at 198 yards allowed per contest.

GETTING HEALTHIER

Louisville's injury-plagued defense will welcome back sophomore linebacker Dorian Etheridge, who missed the past two games with a sprained ankle. Held out last week at Virginia as a precaution after dressing, he's eager to return after being a sideline spectator. "I was seeing everything," he said, "talking to them out there and trying to be a good teammate. But it's nothing like being out on the field."

RUSH HOUR

FSU needed 57 carries to gain 121 yards last week and enters with the ACC's rushing attack at 102.75 yards per contest. Cam Akers (274 yards) and Jacques Patrick (153) have combined for just one touchdown and Taggart acknowledged that it's a work in progress.

MOVING ON

FSU's last visit here in 2016 ended with the emergence of Louisville QB Lamar Jackson as the Heisman Trophy favorite after he accounted for 362 yards of offense and five touchdowns in a 63-20 rout. Jackson, then-FSU coach Jimbo Fisher and many players from both sides are gone and the memory of that game seems to have faded, at least for some remaining Seminoles. "That's the past," defensive tackle Fred Jones said. "We can't do nothing about that. But we can set up for our future."

Mullen returns with Florida to face Mississippi State

STARKVILLE, Miss. - Most of the focus heading into today's Florida-Mississippi State game, of course, has been on Dan Mullen and his much-anticipated return to Starkville.

Mullen has been OK with that. In fact, he's encouraged it.

"It takes pressure off everyone else," he said. "Our guys can focus on the opponent, beating an excellent team. Our guys have a lot going on and a lot to worry about."

"So, I guess if any other outside focus is on me, it takes it off our guys and lets them prepare for the game."

Knowing the outside focus would be on his return, Mullen has been accommodating throughout the week, answering all kinds of questions about his nine years in Starkville and what kind of reception he expects tonight from the fans and his former players.

But while he's been doing a lot of talking about his homecoming, he apparently hasn't spent much time actually thinking about it or worrying about what he might be personally facing tonight in Davis Wade Stadium.

Mullen has moved on. It's all about football now, and getting ready for a tough opponent that just happens to be No. 23 Mississippi State, his former team.

"Like any SEC road game, you're going to a really tough environment against one of the most talented teams out there," Mullen said. "Emotionally, for me, it's not much."

"My focus is really on the game and trying to make sure our team comes in ready to go and execute at a high level. That's really been my main focus, the game on the field."

When it comes to the actual game, there's probably a bigger, potentially more impactful storyline to this than Mullen's return.

It's the storyline about how well Mullen knows the Bulldogs - and how well they know him.

MSU has a new head coach who has installed new offensive and defensive schemes, but the players in those schemes are, for the most part, the same players Mullen recruited, coached and helped develop.

He knows their tendencies, their weaknesses, their strengths. He knows how they'll react to certain situations. He knows what makes them comfortable and uncomfortable.

Mullen has been able to pass along significant intel to his players on the Bulldogs.

"You have an understanding of the personnel on the team and familiarity with the players," Mullen said. "As you're watching them do things, that helps a little bit."

"Instead of having to spend a lot more time studying every strength of the guys on the field, you already have a good idea of what their strengths and weaknesses are."

There's one strength the Gators are well aware of: MSU is a tough, physical team in all phases.

"We've talked about it," Mullen said. "We've got to make sure our guys understand it. We played a lot more physical last week than the week before, but this is going to be a whole different challenge. We're playing a team where the whole program was built on being a tough, physical team."

Mullen knows that because he knows the Bulldogs.

On the flip side, they know him, also - his schemes on offense and defense, his tendencies.

That knowledge has led Mullen and his staff to alter some things this week.

"We have a little bit," he said. "We've tried to change a lot of terminology, of signals, of all kinds of different stuff, because the players know a lot of the different things that we do."

"But, unfortunately, they're going to have comfort against the schemes, because that defense has gone against our offense. Their offense has gone against our defense. So there's going to be some comfort with them against the scheme in which we run."

"We're a little bit different this year than we were last year, but overall there's still a lot of similarities, so that gives their players on the field an advantage."

The Bulldogs have another significant advantage - the home field. It's going to be crazy loud - a hostile environment that Mullen helped create, and now has to contend with.

"It will be fun," he said. "I'm looking forward to it."

Europe surges to Ryder Cup lead

SAINT-QUENTIN-EN-YVELINES, France — Three matches in the books, three red points on the board, and Tiger Woods was still on the golf course.

This was exactly the start the Americans wanted in the Ryder Cup.

And then Europe finished even better.

Four hours later, the cheers at Le Golf National ramped up to a feverish pitch as Europe swept all four matches Friday afternoon for a 5-3. It was the first time Europe swept a session since 1989, and the first time ever at the Ryder Cup in foursomes.

“We didn’t come here to win the foursomes,” Francesco Molinari said. “We came here to win something else.”

Molinari and Tommy Fleetwood were the only Europeans to play both matches, and they won them both. They combined for five birdies over their last seven holes to polish

off Woods and Patrick Reed and salvage something from a morning that belonged to the Americans. They took down Jordan Spieth and Justin Thomas in the afternoon.

“It was a bit of a roller-coaster ride,” European captain Thomas Bjorn said. “We know it’s a marathon, and we’re delighted with the way the day turned out because it was a fairly tough morning. We go home happy tonight, but we refocus and look forward to tomorrow.”

The change was noticeable in the body language.

The Americans walked tall and had reason to feel as though nothing could go wrong, especially Tony Finau. It was his amazing fortune that turned the tide in the morning. He and Brooks Koepka were 1 down to Justin Rose and Jon Rahm on the par-3 16th when Finau’s 8-iron appeared headed for the water. Instead, it landed on the 12-inch wide boards that frame the green, soared into the air as the gallery gasped,

and plopped down 3 feet from the hole.

They wound up winning on the 18th when Rose hit into the water, the only time Finau and Koepka led all match.

In the afternoon, the mood changed in the mild air and freshening wind. Spieth was shaking his head after all those putts that dropped in the morning slid by the edge of the cup in the afternoon. Ian Poulter’s eyes grew wider with each hole he won with Rory McIlroy in the afternoon.

“You see a change in body language,” U.S. captain Jim Furyk said. “I’m sure the Europeans’ body language significantly changed to all smiles and boisterous and hugs and high-fives, and I’m sure the looks on some of my players were not quite the happiest, and dead opposite this morning.”

Furyk tried to see the big picture.

“It was four points out of 28 that we played for,” he said. “We are not happy with it. I think we use it as motivation tomorrow.”

Young & restless

Rebuilding teams leaning on youth

Jason Botterill has experienced both sides of the spectrum in confronting the challenges of building a competitive NHL team versus trying to sustain one.

In Buffalo, the Sabres’ second-year general manager is attempting to rebuild from scratch a team in the midst of a franchise-worst, seven-year playoff drought. In his previous job as assistant GM in Pittsburgh, the test was keeping together a Sidney Crosby-led core of a team that became the first in nearly 20 years to repeat as Stanley Cup champions in 2016-17.

Botterill noted the common denominator for both comes down to scouting.

“You’re always searching for talent,” Botterill said. “So it gets back to the importance of finding players that are going to join your system.”

Teams at the bottom need to stockpile young talent, and hope it eventually jells. The Sabres, for example, enter this season with the top new player to watch in 18-year-old defenseman Rasmus Dahlin, the No. 1 pick in this year’s draft.

Other rebuilding teams are counting on their youngsters to make immediate impacts.

In Ottawa, the Senators are turning to rookie first-round pick Brady Tkachuk. In Vancouver, there’s center Elias Pettersson. The Carolina Hurricanes, meanwhile, are counting on forward Andrei Svechnikov, the No. 2 pick, to help a franchise snap a nine-season playoff drought — the NHL’s longest active streak.

There’s pressure on the league’s elite, too.

RASMUS DAHLIN, Buffalo Sabres defenseman

He’s a smooth-skating, heads-up play-making Swedish-born blue-liner, who has shown a fearless ability of jumping into the rush. Dahlin will require time to adapt to the smaller NHL ice surface and has shown signs of being a little too cavalier with the puck in committing turnovers. He is improving as a defender, and expected to quarterback the top power-play unit. The Sabres intend to allow Dahlin to learn from his mistakes in giving him plenty of playing time this year.

ELIAS PETERSSON, Vancouver Canucks center

With Vancouver’s 2018 first-round draft pick defenseman Quinn Hughes committed to playing this season at Michigan, there’s plenty of buzz over Pettersson, the No. 5 overall pick in 2017. He’s coming off a season in which he helped Vaxjo win the Swedish Elite League championship and earned regular-season and playoff MVP honors.

RYAN DONATO, Boston Bruins forward

After spending three seasons playing at Harvard for his father, former NHL player Ted Donato, the 22-year-old got a head start on his NHL career by scoring five goals and nine points in 12 games for the Bruins last season.

WARREN FOEGELE, Carolina Hurricanes left wing

Though the jury remains out as to whether Svechnikov will spend the entire season in Carolina, the Hurricanes are high on Foegele, their 2014 third-round pick.

NASCAR’s youth movement pushing out veteran drivers

Ryan Newman was released from Richard Childress Racing, Kurt Busch won’t be back at Stewart-Haas Racing and reigning series champion Martin Truex Jr. is a free agent because his Furniture Row Racing team is shutting down after the season.

Kasey Kahne and Elliott Sadler are retiring at the end of the season. Casey Mears never got a retirement tour, his job prospects simply dried up and he moved his family to Arizona over the summer.

That’s how it goes these days in NASCAR. The former “Young Guns” who

came in as a youthful wave of new energy early this century are now a bunch of aging graybeards fighting to hang on to their rides.

The youth movement continued Friday when JTG Daughtery Racing opened the weekend at Charlotte by introducing 27-year-old Ryan Preece as Allmendinger’s replacement. A few hours later, Richard Childress named Daniel Hemric, another 27-year-old, to Newman’s seat.

Both drivers have navigated a challenging ladder system in which competitive opportunities can be few and far between. Some of those “Young Guns” put together careers that have lasted 15 years or more with their earnings well into eight digits. The latest crop has had to wait for seats to open, had to secure their own sponsorship and sometimes drive for free.

That Hemric and Preece were promoted on the same day was not lost on either.

“Everybody says the path or whatnot of how we got here may not have been ideal, but at the end of the day you did whatever you

could with what you had,” Hemric said. “And when you hear about things that can’t be done, I think today is a huge step in that direction to show that it can be.”

Hemric said he was hopeful the moves would inspire young racers in this uncertain market to keep going and trust their decisions.

“If you do that, no matter how it shakes out, you’ll lay down at night knowing you gave everything you had. I think that’s what today is all about,” he said.

NASCAR is full of blue-collar kids who have scrapped to get to this level. Preece had a full-time job in the Xfinity Series in 2016 but was never going to win in the cars he was given. So he gave up the seat and took a chance that if he could get just a handful of races in one of Joe Gibbs’ cars, he was certain he could win.

Preece got a four-race deal for 2017 and won in his second start. It led to a few more races with Gibbs this year, another victory, and now a spot in the Cup Series next season. The path was Preece’s shot-in-the-dark at making it big.

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
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
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

The elegantly named stepping-stone squeeze makes an appearance in today's deal. South refused to stop short of six spades, and West led the diamond 10 against the slam.

Declarer won with the ace, drew trumps in four rounds and tested the clubs, West showing out on the second round. All would have been well had diamonds been 3-3, since declarer could have overtaken on the third round. But if West held four diamonds alongside the heart ace, South realized that he might come under pressure on the last trump.

If West threw a diamond, declarer would be able to overtake his jack with the queen, scoring his 12th trick with dummy's fourth diamond.

If, instead, West threw the heart queen, declarer would cash his remaining top diamond and throw West on lead with a heart to the ace, to force him to lead to dummy's diamond queen. West's only other option would be to pitch the heart ace. This would beat the contract if East held the heart king, but as the cards lay, it would allow South to score his heart king.

Oddly enough, if East had held four diamonds and four clubs, declarer could have caught him in the stepping-stone squeeze instead! The fifth round of trumps would have forced him to throw his last heart, retaining four diamonds and his club guard. South could then have cashed the diamond K-J and thrown East in with the fourth round of clubs to give dummy the diamond queen. Yes, in that instance, a simple minor-suit squeeze would work as well.

ANSWER: Normally, one responds in a major when partner opens a minor, but with a hand this weak, the last thing you want to do is to encourage your partner to soar to the stratosphere. So respond one diamond to try to slow partner down; he should be less likely to jump in support of a minor than a major. This same argument might work no matter what the level of the opening club bid.
