## Pair sentenced in fatal marijuana robbery

PANAMA CITY — As an Alabama man awaits his sentencing for the fatal shooting of a 16-year-old Arnold High School student during a marijuana robbery, his two friends have received their sentences for their role in the crime.

Gertavious Montrez Canada, 25, and Rodney Racquez Jones, 19, were sentenced Monday while 22-year-old Demarcus Montrel Giddens awaits his sentencing. The three men were arrested after authorities arrived Aug. 20 to the CVS, 7112 U.S. 98, to

find Jason Ian Price had been shot almost point blank in the chest with a Draco AK-47 during an attempted robbery for marijuana. Canada and Jones both testified at Giddens' trial last week that he was the triggerman and have now

**TODAY IN HISTORY**

Today is Tuesday, Oct. 2, the 275th day of 2018. There are 90 days left in the year.

**Today's Highlight in History:**

On Oct. 2, 1944, German troops crushed the two-month-old Warsaw Uprising, during which a quarter of a million people had been killed.

**On this date:**

**In 1780**, British spy John Andre was hanged in Tappan, New York, during the Revolutionary War.

**In 1919**, President Woodrow Wilson suffered a serious stroke at the White House that left him paralyzed on his left side.

**In 1941**, during World War II, German armies launched an all-out drive against Moscow; Soviet forces succeeded in holding onto their capital.

**In 1950**, the comic strip "Peanuts," created by Charles M. Schulz, was syndicated to seven newspapers.

**In 1967**, Thurgood Marshall was sworn as an associate justice of the U.S. Supreme Court as the court opened its new term.

**In 1970**, one of two chartered twin-engine planes flying the Wichita State University football team to Utah crashed into a mountain near Silver Plume, Colorado, killing 31 of the 40 people on board.


**In 1971**, the music program "Soul Train" made its debut in national syndication.

**In 1984**, Richard W. Miller became the first FBI agent to be arrested and charged with espionage. (Miller was tried three times; he was sentenced to 20 years in prison, but was released after nine years.)

**In 1986**, the Senate joined the House in voting to override President Reagan's veto of stiff economic sanctions against South Africa.

**In 2002**, the Washington, D.C.-area sniper attacks began, setting off a frantic manhunt lasting three weeks. (John Allen Muhammad and Lee Boyd Malvo were finally arrested for killing 10 people and wounding three others; Muhammad was executed in 2009; Malvo was sentenced to life in prison.)

## Fisherman catches 330-pound Warsaw grouper

PANAMA CITY — For as long as he can remember, commercial fisherman Brandon Lee Van Horn has wanted to catch a really big fish.

Not your run-of-the-mill big fish, but a really big fish — the kind you tell your grandkids about one day or that strangers take pictures of, or that ends up

in the newspaper. On Monday, Van Horn's years on the Gulf paid off when he showed up at the dock of Greg Abrams Seafood with a 330-pound Warsaw grouper, 313 pounds after it had been gutted.

"You have no idea how much that fish means to me," he said. "I will probably never catch another one that big ever again."

Van Horn started fishing

at 8 years old on his grandfather's charter boat and "just fell in love with it. It's just in my blood."

These days, he fishes for a "little bit of everything," but mostly smaller species like vermillion snapper. He fishes with line and reel, fighting each fish to the surface, though he does use bandits that have hydraulic



**She wanted to go the hospital, he took her to Chick-fil-A**

Chick-fil-A is many things to many people. Chick-fil-A, however, is not interchangeable with a hospital.

Bay County sheriff's deputies were dispatched to a Panama City address last week on a report of a battery. They met the victim, who said she'd just been in an altercation with the father of her child while at her parent's house. The couple was getting ready to leave when the victim's boyfriend got in the car and started backing it up while the victim was standing next to it, unintentionally running over her foot.

Accidents happen, but when the victim's parents said they were going to call law enforcement, the boyfriend picked up the victim and put her in the car, taking off with her and their child. During the drive, the victim asked multiple times to be taken to the hospital, but her boyfriend was apparently thinking with his stomach, not his brain.

"(The victim) stated they stopped at the Chick-fil-A and (the boyfriend) still refused to take her to the hospital," the report reads.

Even after leaving Chick-fil-A, the boyfriend still refused to take the victim to the hospital, according to the report, pulling instead into a parking lot on Highway 22. It was there the victim decided she'd had enough, got out of the vehicle and began walking home, injured foot and all.

The victim declined to press charges. The case is closed.

The victim told the deputy he'd tried everything — asking his neighbor to stop







been sentenced to four years and 15 years in prison, respectively, court records stated.

Giddens, who was convicted of first-degree murder and attempted robbery, is expected to be sentenced Tuesday to life in prison.

Jones had expected to receive 20 years in prison, but prosecutor Bob Som-bathy said his testimony against Giddens "exceeded expectations." At trial, Jones was able to provide the jury with an account that Giddens had unveiled his plot to rob a group of teens for marijuana beforehand. As they fled the scene and went to change clothes, Giddens showed no remorse when asked why he shot Price, Jones said.

"He looked at me and said '(expletive) that (expletive), bro,'" Jones told the jury. "I told him he was tripping."

The trio, along with several others, had made the four-hour drive to Panama City Beach from Auburn, Alabama, earlier in the day with no particular plan in mind or any hotel room booked. After a disagreement with their

driver, Jones and the group walked to the Taco Bell at the intersection of U.S. 98 and Thomas Drive, where they met a group of local high school students.

Jones asked the group if he could buy some marijuana, and one of them made a call. As the group walked across Wildwood Road to the nearby CVS, Jones said Giddens hatched the plan to rob the students.

Jones was around the side of the CVS "scaling up" or weighing some marijuana when he heard a scuffle and saw Giddens confront Price — who had arrived at the CVS moments before — with a firearm, putting the gun to his chest and pulling the trigger. At the sound of the gunshot, Jones said he panicked and punched the male who delivered the marijuana, stealing his watch and his phone before fleeing with Giddens.

Jones also said in his testimony that he knew Giddens had the firearm, believed to be a Draco AK-47 pistol, in his backpack during the trip.

Canada pleaded no contest to principal to attempted robbery, and Jones pleaded no contest to principal to robbery with a deadly weapon. They both have been ordered to not have contact with any of the victims' families.

African-American city commissioner and a still-active member of the community. Miller was one of the residents who supported the splash pad going to Cain-Griffin and cut the ribbon at Monday's opening.

"When I first came out to Lynn Haven, there was nothing here. I'm doing it for the kids. Our kids need somewhere to go and relax and have fun and stay out of trouble," Miller said. "It's great. It's super. With the kids and people and parents coming into Lynn Haven, it's going to be well used. It's not going to be one just sitting there, because the community is growing strong."

City officials have planned a second splash pad for a while. The second play area was originally going to be built at the sports complex but commissioners changed their mind on the location after residents advocated for Cain-Griffin Park on 17th Street instead, so neighborhood kids in the area could enjoy it.

Rachel Chandler was driving around Lynn Haven when she noticed a new splash pad opening she said as her grand-kids enjoyed running through the water on the hot afternoon.

"They're having a blast. This is wonderful," said Chandler, who lives nearby. "We will

frequent this place quite often."

for the best but that from what he's seen so far, he has begun to suspect the worst.

"If the ocean didn't get her, I think she may have been kidnapped," he said.

According to Panama City Beach Police reports, Nancy Meither and her husband, Jerel, were sitting on the beach Friday night watching the sunset. At about 10 p.m., Jerel Meither went to their room to go to bed and Nancy Meither remained behind on the beach and told him she'd be up. However, Nancy Meither never made it back to the

room, PCBPD reported.

"Mr. Meither stated once he woke up he noticed Mrs. Meither never came to the unit," officers wrote. "Mr. Meither states he went to the beach and noticed her chair was still there but not the cup she was drinking out of."

PCBPD reported that Nancy Meither does not have any medical issues. She also did

not have a cell phone on her and has not been checked in to any local hospitals. Jerel Meither also told police that they only had been in town for three weeks with no other family living in the area, so Nancy would not have anywhere else to go, police reported.

Mike Meither said his mother is not the type of

person to go swimming in the Gulf of Mexico by herself. He also said it would be unusual for her to wander off on her own.

The Panama City Beach Police Department has been circulating pictures of Nancy Meither. They are asking anyone with information on her whereabouts to contact them at (850) 233-5000.

# Nelson gets key endorsement in fight for Puerto Rican votes

TALLAHASSEE — A little more than a month out from the November election, the courtship of Puerto Ricans in Florida intensified Monday, with the island's governor throwing his support behind U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson in what could be seen as a blow to Nelson's opponent, Republican Gov. Rick Scott.

Gov. Ricardo Rosselló's endorsement of Nelson unleashed pushback from Scott, who's made nine trips to storm-ravaged Puerto Rico since Hurricane Maria wreaked havoc on the U.S. territory a year ago.

During a press conference with Nelson in Orlando, Rosselló, a Democrat, called the decision to back Nelson a "tough" one.

Scott has "also been a friend," Rosselló acknowledged.

"But I am here, in spite of that, because I believe in Bill Nelson. I am grateful for his long-standing relationship for the people of Puerto Rico," he said.

Rosselló and other Puerto Rican leaders have sharply criticized President Donald Trump, who has close ties to Scott, for the administration's response to the storm, which wiped out electricity island-wide and resulted in 3,000 deaths, according to George Washington University researchers. Trump has also been disparaged for accusing Democrats of inflating the number of fatalities.

Nelson was instrumental in nailing down federal aid following Maria, Rosselló said.

"I am grateful because in our toughest time, you stood in the forefront and helped the people of Puerto Rico," he said, calling Nelson "a great friend and a great champion of the people of Puerto Rico."

Rosselló also praised Nelson for "fighting for general equality for the people of Puerto Rico and having us finally have a chance to have first-class citizenship as citizens of the state of the union," a move the governor has championed as he throws his support behind candidates on the November ballot.

The three-term Democratic senator returned the gratitude expressed by Rosselló.

"I am profoundly grateful, governor, that under difficult circumstances you would want to speak out and be clear on your preference," Nelson said.

In Scott's numerous visits to the island following Maria, he frequently has appeared side-by-side with Rosselló. As recently as 10 days ago, the two governors attended a ceremony marking the one-year anniversary of the deaths and destruction caused by the massive storm.

But Scott's campaign pushed back against the endorsement even before the Democrats' Monday morning news conference, releasing a Spanish-language ad starring three Latinos who said they are Democrats but are voting for Scott.

Shortly after Nelson's announcement, Scott's team issued a news release with the names of dozens of Puerto Rican leaders who are backing the Republican in his attempt to unseat Nelson.

"To our fellow Puerto Ricans in the State of Florida: Governor Rick Scott has always been there for the people of Puerto Rico when we need him. Without excuses, with a GENUINE disposition to help and protect Boricuas, he was there for us after Hurricane Maria struck the island," Puerto Rico Senate President Thomas Rivera Schatz said in the release.

In the competition for

Boricua endorsements, Nelson has also snagged the support of Rosselló's father, former governor Pedro Rosselló, as well as the younger Rosselló's predecessor, Alejandro García Padilla. The mayors of Puerto Rico's two largest cities, San Juan and Ponce, are also backing the Democrat.

Rosselló on Monday also threw his support behind Democratic gubernatorial candidate Andrew Gillum, who is facing Ron DeSantis, whose Trump endorsement helped the former congressman cruise to victory in the Republican primary in August.

For Nelson, the support of Rosselló "is big for those people who believe in statehood" for Puerto Rico, according to Marcos Vilar, executive director of Alianza for Progress, a progressive organization focused on Puerto Ricans in Central Florida, where the highest concentration of Boricuas live.

"There's a significant amount of people who believe that Puerto Rico should be a state, and Rosselló represents the statehood movement," Vilar said in a telephone interview Monday. "So, for the people who don't believe that Puerto Rico should be a state, its value is not as important. It doesn't have as much weight."

Scott also supports Puerto Rican statehood, but Trump recently said he does not. Because he is linked so closely with Scott, the president's position may have tipped Rosselló — who'd been criticized for staying on the sidelines in the Senate race — toward Nelson, Vilar said.

The issue of "status," shorthand for statehood, is a big divider for Puerto Ricans, he said.

The political committee affiliated with Alianza has endorsed Gillum but hasn't taken a position on

the U.S. Senate race, Vilar said.

The Sunshine State is home to more than 1 million Puerto Ricans. They are considered a critical November-election voting bloc in Florida, where nail-bitingly close elections have become the norm.

According to the University of Florida's Bureau of Business and Economic Research, between 30,000 and 50,000 Puerto Ricans relocated to the Florida

after Maria. While that projection is far lower than originally anticipated, a growing number of Puerto Ricans have migrated to Florida over the past decade, BEBR found.

Puerto Ricans make up about 21 percent of Florida's 2.3 million Hispanic voters. With population growth and post-Maria migration, the number of Puerto Rican voters in Florida could be between 460,000 and 580,000, according to Matt Isbell,

a data consultant who works for Democrats.

More important than endorsements, Vilar said, is the work groups like his are doing to register Hispanics and make sure they get to the polls in November.

Groups such as the Hispanic Federation and Mi Familia Vota this year registered more than 75,000 new Hispanic voters in Florida, and up to 60 percent of those are Puerto Rican voters, Vilar said.

# 'AOB' insurance fight goes to Supreme Court

TALLAHASSEE — A fierce debate about the insurance practice known as "assignment of benefits" could play out at the Florida Supreme Court.

Pointing to conflicting opinions in the state's appellate courts, attorneys last week filed notices asking the Supreme Court to take up a St. Lucie County case about a water-damage insurance claim. In a somewhat-unusual circumstance, attorneys representing parties on both sides — an insurer and a restoration company — want the Supreme Court to weigh in.

Assignment of benefits, or AOB as it is widely known, has been one of the most-controversial insurance issues in the Capitol in recent years. In assignment of benefits, homeowners in need of repairs sign over benefits to contractors, who ultimately pursue payments from insurance companies.

While assignment of benefits is nothing new, it has become high-profile

because of increased claims for water damage to homes, particularly in South Florida. Insurers argue that the process has become riddled with fraud and litigation, driving up insurance rates. Contractors and trial attorneys contend that assigning benefits helps homeowners hire contractors quickly to repair damage and forces insurers to properly pay claims.

A decision last month by the 4th District Court of Appeal in the St. Lucie County case was a victory for the insurance industry because it upheld a restriction on assignment of benefits. But that decision conflicted with a ruling last year by the 5th District Court of Appeal.

It is too early to know whether the Supreme Court will take up the dispute. But one of the common rationales for the Supreme Court to hear cases is to resolve conflicts in lower courts.

The St. Lucie County case involves a breach-of-contract lawsuit filed by Port St. Lucie against Ark Royal Insurance Co. Policyholders John and

Liza Squitieri sustained water damage to their home, and Liza Squitieri contracted with Restoration 1 of Port St. Lucie to do cleanup work and assigned the benefits to the firm, according to the appeals-court ruling.

Ark Royal, however, refused to pay the full amount requested by the restoration firm, pointing to an insurance contract that required approval from the husband, wife and the Squitieris' mortgage company, PNC Bank, for benefits to be assigned to the contractor. Restoration 1 sued the insurer for breach of contract but lost in circuit court and the 4th District Court of Appeal.

A panel of the appeals court upheld the provision requiring the mortgage company and the couple to approve the assignment of benefits, saying "it is impossible to brand the contested provision as superfluous — as both of the insureds (the husband and wife), as well as the mortgagee (PNC), have a vested interest that a reputable, legitimate third-party contractor perform repairs on the home."

## Case of mistaken identity offers a warning for political life

Conservative talk-radio host Glenn Beck has a new book out, "Addicted to Outrage." At this particular moment, it's instructive. Beck, using his own experience as a recovering alcoholic as a guide, posits that many of us have become literal anger addicts. Believing our political beliefs are infallible, Beck argues, we receive some sick satisfaction — an actual physical high — from slapping down those who disagree with us, usually from the safe harbor of social media. "Outrage Addiction is destroying our nation," Beck writes, partly because it includes the "enabling element that makes it almost impossible to overcome: It is viewed as a virtue and as proof of our social value. ... it is seen as a demonstration of our moral, cultural and intellectual awareness."

This corrosive belief may be spreading beyond politics, however, as the folks at Eli Towing in Davenport can understand.

John Morrow, Eli Towing's manager, told WFLA last week the company was besieged by a couple hundred ruthless phone calls, featuring plenty of foul language and damaging reviews on Facebook. Why?

Well, it seems a driver for Eli Towing was gouging people on the cost of sandbags, WFLA reported.

Yet the alleged culprit was Eli Towing — in South Carolina.

Amid Hurricane Florence, an Eli Towing driver in South Carolina had picked up bags from a high school and instead of distributing them for free, as appeared to be the purpose, he was actually charging people \$6 to \$10 dollars a bag. Local police are investigating.

Yet in the meantime, Morrow and the Eli Towing staff in Polk County bore the brunt of misguided outrage and now have to do damage control for something they didn't do. They took to social media to clarify the situation.

Morrow and his people, however, offer us a good example of how to rebound.

On Saturday, Eli Towing's crews accepted donations for Florence victims at the Love's Truck Stop in Davenport. They planned to deliver the goods to victims in the Carolinas sometime this week.

"We want to go up there and do the right thing since he couldn't do it," Morrow told WFLA.

That healthy attitude deserves applause. More of us should strive toward that.

But as witnessed on Capitol Hill recently, and have routinely seen for the past couple of years, anger is consuming us. And many of us have become so invested in arguing our political point — and winning — that it's spinning us off into the absurd. On Friday, for example, liberal feminist author Jill Filipovic, angered by GOP support for Judge Brett Kavanaugh, tweeted, "Divorce your Republican husbands." It got 2,000 retweets. Was she serious? Many thought so. Or was she being flippant? Perhaps. Does it matter?

Rage over politics has already split up marriages, ended careers, divided workplaces, ruined families. It's now cleaving our country apart. Additionally, we sadly creep ever closer to normalizing violence. In June 2017, a deranged supporter of Sen. Bernie Sanders, outraged over President Donald Trump, shot a handful of people as Republican lawmakers were practicing baseball. He almost killed Rep. Steve Scalise of Louisiana. That's the extreme case. More routinely, though, we see confrontation and threats of violence or death as a genuine part of our political "discourse."

"Somewhere," Beck writes, "we began judging people not by their character or their actions, but by their political affiliation and beliefs."



## Scott doesn't want his campaign swept away by (red) tide

In politics, they call it bad optics.

Imagine you're Florida's Gov. Rick Scott, for example, locked in a tight race to unseat Bill Nelson from the U.S. Senate.

Your campaign needs you out there, visible and upbeat, for photo ops and commercials extolling your leadership qualities. But where can you go?

A pernicious red tide has affected 135 miles of prime coastline on the Gulf side of the state, while slimy blue-green algae fueled by discharges from Lake Okeechobee is sliming estuaries and waterways on the other side.

Your campaign advisers have warned you cannot, under any circumstances, be seen or photographed anywhere near this double-whammy of ecological disasters, especially the red tide.

Piles of rotting fish on the shore? Bad optics, Rick.

Ditto for dead manatees and sea turtles.

Swollen corpses of bottle-nosed dolphins? Hideous optics. Truly awful — even worse than scenes of puffy-eyed tourists, wheezing and hacking as they retreat toward half-empty motels.

So, what do you do if you're

a polluter-friendly candidate who's been arduously trying to reinvent yourself as an impassioned environmentalist?

Stay far away from the water, Florida's trademark attraction. Stage your events and TV ads elsewhere — warehouses, factories, Wawa stores, whatever. Declare emergencies in the suffering counties and send some money for research and tourism recovery.

Emphasize in press releases that you, Rick Scott, aren't personally responsible for the red tide. It's an itty-bitty organism called *Karenia brevis*, and it's a naturally occurring phenomenon. We're just having a really vile, stinky year.

The red tide has been blooming almost 11 months, and nobody knows how many tourists have been scared away, or how many millions of dollars the economy has lost.

In Manatee County alone, work crews have removed 289 tons of dead fish since early August. Honestly, even one ton of putrid fish isn't great for business.

"Let's get to work!" you chirp in your political ads.

But that's a steep challenge for a beachfront restaurant owner beset with the reek of decomposing mullet and turtles. So maybe he serves three limes with every Corona — one for the beer, and two for plugging each customer's nostrils.

Scientists don't all agree on the combination of triggers for red tide, but this

season's version is believed to have been made worse by massive plumes of effluent from the Mississippi River, fertilizer nutrients flushed from Florida coastal developments and hotter temperatures in the Gulf of Mexico.

If you're candidate Scott, the warm water issue is problematic because you've been openly skeptical about climate change. The use of the term was even banned from environmental agency correspondence, emails and reports early in your administration.

Worse, you've got a pathetic record when it comes to protecting Florida waters — \$700 million slashed from oversight programs in your first term. You also repealed a law requiring regular inspections of septic tanks, indisputably one of the worst causes of near-shore pollution throughout the state.

And many voters might remember how you and the Republican Legislature shrunk the Department of Environmental Regulation, pauperized and politicized the water management districts, fired expert scientists and rewrote regulations to allow Big Sugar and other corporate interests to police their own polluting practices.

Billions of gallons of fertilizer-laced water continues to pour from Lake Okeechobee toward the Gulf and Atlantic coasts, fueling the notorious "toxic blue-green algae" that visually has become the national postcard for your administration.

### TRENTON, N.J. Pfizer's CEO Read to be replaced by COO Bourla

The biggest U.S.-based drugmaker will change leaders in January when Pfizer Chief Operating Officer Albert Bourla replaces CEO Ian Read, who has led the company for nearly eight years.

Pfizer Inc. said Monday that Read will become executive chairman of Pfizer's board of directors.

The move comes after Pfizer's board in March gave Read an \$8 million bonus contingent on boosting Pfizer's stock price and staying on for up to a year. That allowed Read time to groom Bourla, who had been appointed last January to the newly created chief operating officer post.

# 'Win-win-win'

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump hailed his revamped North American trade agreement with Canada and Mexico as a breakthrough for U.S. workers on Monday, vowing to sign it by late November. But it still faces a lengthy path to congressional approval after serving for two decades as a political football for American manufacturing woes.

Embracing the U.S.-Mexico-Canada Agreement, which the Canadians joined just before a Sunday midnight deadline, Trump branded it the "USMCA," a moniker he said would replace the 24-year-old North American Free Trade Agreement, or NAFTA. With a satisfied smile, the president said the new name had a "good ring to it," repeating U-S-M-C-A several times.

But he noted that the agreement would need to be ratified by Congress, a step that could be affected by the outcome of the fall elections as Democrats seek to regain majorities in the House and Senate. When a reporter suggested he seemed confident of approval after his announcement, he said he was "not at all confident" — but not because of the deal's merits or defects.

"Anything you submit to Congress is trouble, no matter what," Trump said, predicting that

Democrats would say, "Trump likes it so we're not going to approve it."

Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau said Monday that his country was in a more stable place now that it had completed the negotiations. He said the deal needed to be fair since one trading partner was 10 times larger. He said Canada did not simply accept "any deal."

"We got the right deal. We got a win-win-win for all three countries," Trudeau said.

Likewise, outgoing Mexican President Enrique Pena Nieto said via Twitter that the deal negotiated over the past 13 months "achieves what we proposed at the beginning: a win-win-win agreement."

Despite Trump's jibe at the Democrats, their comments on the agreement were largely muted, though many lawmakers said the way the provisions of the deal are enforced would be critical.

## GE, seeking new path as a century-old company, ousts CEO

BOSTON — General Electric ousted its CEO, took a \$23 billion charge and said it would fall short of profit forecasts this year, further signs that the century-old industrial conglomerate is struggling to turn around its vastly shrunken business.

H. Lawrence Culp Jr. will take over immediately as chairman and CEO from John Flannery, who had been on the job for just over a year. Flannery began a restructuring of GE in August 2017, when he replaced Jeffrey Immelt, whose efforts to create a higher-tech version of GE proved unsuccessful.

However, in Flannery's short time, GE's value has dipped below \$100 billion and shares are down more than 35 percent this year, following a 45 percent decline in 2017.

The company was booted from the Dow Jones Industrial Average this summer and, last month, shares tumbled to a nine-year low after revealing a flaw in its marquee gas turbines, which caused the metal blades to weaken and forced the shutdown of a pair of power plants where they were in use.

GE warned Monday that it will miss its profit forecasts this year and it's taking a \$23 billion charge

related to its power business.

The 55-year-old Culp was CEO and president of Danaher Corp. from 2000 to 2014. During that time, Danaher's market capitalization and revenues grew five-fold. He's already a member of GE's board.

It's a track record that GE appears to need after a series of notable changes under Flannery failed to gain momentum immediately, although some analysts wonder whether Culp's history of accomplishments will be enough to reverse the direction of the company.

The challenges GE faces — including the power sector's cyclical, structural and operational challenges — are not easily or quickly fixable, but "GE should be commended for selecting a credible, seasoned GE outsider as chairman/CEO who is likely to more candidly and quickly identify how bad things may be and what needs to be done about it," said Gautam Khanna, an analyst at Cowen Inc., in a note to investors.

Investors will want Culp to "clean house, and fast," said Scott Davis, founding partner of Melius Research, in a research note where he compared GE's recent history to a slow but fatal train wreck.

## Rally over Canada deal fades; stocks mixed

NEW YORK — Stocks barreled higher in the early going Monday after the U.S. and Canada agreed to a new trade deal, but the rally ran out of momentum later in the day, leaving major indexes mixed.

Oil prices neared four-year highs and smaller companies suffered their worst losses in three months.

Large industrial and basic materials stocks made big gains, and energy companies rose as crude oil and natural gas reached their highest prices in years. Car companies also rose as investors anticipated that tariffs on imported cars are less likely now.

Many investors saw the new trade deal, the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement, as an update of the 1994 North American Free Trade Agreement, not a major overhaul.

General Electric soared after it ousted Chairman and CEO John Flannery, while Tesla reversed a big

loss Friday and made its largest gain in five years after founder Elon Musk settled a lawsuit brought by securities regulators, allowing him to remain CEO.

The S&P 500 index rose as much as 23 points during the day, then finished with a gain of 10.61 points, or 0.4 percent, at 2,924.59. The Dow Jones Industrial Average jumped 192.90 points, or 0.7 percent, to 26,651.21. The Nasdaq composite lost 9.05 points, or 0.1 percent, at 8,037.30.

Mexico's main stock index rose 0.8 percent and while Canada's added 0.2 percent. Mexico and the U.S. announced a trade agreement in late August and despite a few harsh remarks by President Donald Trump and Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, experts expected Canada would join the pact, as Canada is the U.S.' second-largest trade partner and a deal without Canada would have affected the supply lines of companies in numerous industries.

## Quake survivors clamor to flee city

PALU, Indonesia — As officials began burying hundreds of dead in a mass grave Monday, thousands of survivors of a devastating earthquake and tsunami converged on the airport of this heavily damaged Indonesian city and clamored to leave, saying there was little to eat and their homes were unsafe.

The confirmed death toll of 844, mostly from the city of Palu, is expected to rise as authorities reach areas that were cut off by the disaster. The magnitude 7.5 earthquake struck at dusk Friday and generated a tsunami said to have been as high as 6 meters (20 feet) in places.

Search-and-rescue teams combed destroyed homes and buildings, including a collapsed eight-story hotel, for any trapped survivors, but they needed more heavy equipment to clear the rubble.

Many people were believed trapped under shattered houses in Palu's Balaroa neighborhood, where the earthquake caused the ground to heave up and down violently, said disaster agency spokesman Sutopo Purwo Nugroho.

In the city's Petobo section, the quake caused loose, wet soil to liquefy, creating a thick, heavy mud that caused massive damage. "In Petobo, it is estimated that there are still hundreds of victims

buried in mud," Nugroho said.

Residents who found loved ones — alive and dead — over the weekend expressed frustration that it took rescue teams until Monday to reach Petobo.

Desperation was evident across Palu, a city of more than 380,000 people on the island of Sulawesi.

About 3,000 residents flocked to its airport, trying to board military aircraft or one of the few commercial flights, local TV reported. Video showed some of them screaming in anger because they were not able to get on a departing military plane.

"We have not eaten for

three days!" one woman yelled. "We just want to be safe!"

Nearly 50,000 people have been displaced from their homes in Palu alone, Nugroho said, and hospitals were overwhelmed.

The Indonesian air force confirmed that a Hercules aircraft carrying an unspecified number of survivors was able to leave Palu for South Sulawesi's capital of Makassar.

Indonesian President Joko "Jokowi" Widodo authorized the acceptance of international help, Nugroho said, adding that generators, heavy equipment and tents were among the most-needed

items. The European Union and 10 countries have offered assistance, including the United States, Australia and China, he said.

"We will send food today, as much as possible with several aircraft," Widodo told reporters in the capital, Jakarta, adding that a supply of fuel was also set to arrive.

Hundreds of people were lined up for fuel at gas stations across Palu, with waiting cars snarling traffic amid neighborhoods with fences painted with the red and white colors of the Indonesian flag.

Groups of children, some smiling but others with anxious expressions, stood in the middle of roads holding boxes

for cash donations. Signs were displayed along roads, saying "We need Food" and "We need support." Another asked about the whereabouts of their local political leader.

Three days after the powerful waves struck, the coastline at Palu remained strewn with rubble and a few brightly colored cargo containers poking out of the water. Those buildings that still stood near the water were ruined shells.

A heavily damaged mosque was half submerged, and a shopping mall was reduced to a crumpled hulk. A large bridge with yellow arches collapsed.

The city is built around a narrow bay that apparently magnified the force of the tsunami as the waves raced into the tight inlet. Nugroho said water was reported as high as 6 meters (20 feet) in places.

Rescuers searching a collapsed building Monday night were able to remove 38-year-old Sapri Nusin alive from the rubble.

Indonesian TV showed a conscious Nusin talking to his rescuers from the National Search and Rescue Agency, known as Basarnas, as they worked by flashlight. He was carried away on a stretcher, although his condition was not known.

Elsewhere in Palu, Edi Setiawan said he and fellow residents rescued five children and four adults, including a pregnant woman. His sister and father, however, did not survive.

#### Germany: Widow kept husband's body for 1½ years

Prosecutors in the northern city of Hamburg say a widow kept her husband's body hidden inside her home for 1½ years after he died because she couldn't bear to part with him.

German news agency dpa reported Monday that police found the man's body inside the couple's apartment last month after being alerted by a building administrator who had become suspicious because he hadn't seen the man for a long time.

Dpa says the 73-year-old woman left her husband, who died at age 74, wrapped in cloth and paper inside a locked room.

A spokeswoman for the Hamburg prosecutors' office called the find "tragic."

### SANT JULIA DE RAMIS, SPAIN

#### Catalans display devotion to independence on anniversary

Activists blocked railway lines, students skipped classes and supporters of Catalonia seceding from Spain marched in large numbers Monday to mark the anniversary of a referendum that was part of a thwarted bid for independence last year.

The evening march in Barcelona, the region's capital, drew what local police estimated was a crowd of 180,000 people. A spontaneous spin-off demonstration produced a tense face-off between police and lingering protesters, capping a day of noisy and largely nonviolent demonstrations.

The anniversary of the event that sparked Spain's gravest political crisis in decades was marked by a fractured Catalan independence movement

amid delicate talks on the region's future with the country's the center-left Socialist government.

### CHARLOTTE, N.C.

#### Republican convention set for August 2020 in Charlotte

The Republican National Convention will be held in North Carolina's largest city in August 2020 and party leaders said Monday they'll gather with an eye on nominating President Donald Trump for a second term.

Party chairwoman Ronna McDaniel announced at a news conference that the convention will be held in Charlotte on Aug. 24-27.

Mayor Vi Lyles said Charlotte has a chance to show it can host both major political parties. Charlotte hosted the Democratic National Convention in 2012.

### DETROIT

#### Charges in death of man 'abandoned' at Detroit-area jail

A police officer and two paramedics failed to help a man who was convulsing for more than an hour and eventually died from cocaine toxicity at a Detroit-area jail, a prosecutor said Monday as she filed involuntary manslaughter charges against the trio.

William Marshall was in custody for drug possession when he died in the Westland police lock-up in December. Wayne County prosecutor Kym Worthy said a state police investigation showed an "inexcusable and criminal disregard for human life from those who have a duty to serve him, protect him and render aid."

She said video of the incident was a "critical part of the evidence."

### RALEIGH, N.C.

#### Court: Fight can proceed over 'bathroom bill' replacement

A lawsuit challenging the replacement for North Carolina's "bathroom bill" is moving forward, with a judge finding evidence that transgender plaintiffs are being harmed by a prohibition on new local antidiscrimination laws.

Federal Judge Thomas Schroeder, however, rejected another key argument: that uncertainty created by the current law effectively discriminates against transgender people.

The lawsuit was originally filed against the 2016 law HB2, which in many public buildings required transgender people to use restrooms matching their birth certificates.

# Cancer-care discoveries win Nobel for medicine

Two researchers from the U.S. and Japan won the Nobel Prize in medicine on Monday for discoveries that have revolutionized cancer care, turning the body's immune system loose to fight tumors in an approach credited with saving an untold number of lives.

James Allison of the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center and Tasuku Honjo of Kyoto University learned how cancer can put the brakes on the immune system — and how to release those brakes.

Their work, conducted separately during the 1990s, led to the development of drugs known as “checkpoint inhibitors,” first used to treat the deadly skin cancer melanoma but now used for a growing list of advanced-stage tumors, including those of the lungs, head and neck, bladder, kidney, colon and liver.

The drugs marked an entirely new way to treat tumors, a kind of immunotherapy that uses the patient's own body to kill cancer cells. Up until then, the standard arsenal consisted of surgery to remove the tumor and radiation and chemotherapy to poison the cancer.

The research was “a landmark in our fight against cancer,” the Nobel Assembly of Sweden's Karolinska Institute said in announcing the award. The two scientists will share the 9-million-kronor (\$1.01 million) prize.

“Not all patients respond to this, but for the ones that do, it has made a huge difference to their lives,” Dr. Arlene Sharpe, co-chair of microbiology and immunobiology at Harvard Medical School, told The Associated Press. “There are patients over a decade ago who had an incredibly poor prognosis and now, a decade out, they are living normal lives.”

Dr. Jedd Wolchok, chief of the melanoma and immunotherapeutics service at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center in New York, said: “An untold number of lives ... have been saved by the science that they pioneered.”

Indeed, a drug based on Honjo's research was used to treat former President Jimmy Carter, who was diagnosed in 2015 with melanoma that had spread to his brain. A year later, he announced he no longer needed treatment.

Allison, 70, who was in New York hotel for a scientific meeting, said at a news conference that the Nobel committee evidently had trouble reaching him to break the news. But his cellphone lit up with a call from his son at 5:30 a.m., when the names of the winners were released.

And soon, “there were people beating on my door at 6 in the morning with Champagne,” he said.

At a news conference in Kyoto, Honjo, 76, told how a member of his golf club once walked up to thank him for the discovery that was used to treat his lung cancer.

“He told me, ‘Thanks to you I can play golf again,’” he recalled. “That was a blissful moment. A comment like that makes me happier than any prize.”

Scientists had been trying for a century to harness the immune system against cancer,

but it was a struggle. Normally, key immune system soldiers called T cells seek out and attack invaders. But for poorly understood reasons, it was hard to rev them up against cancer.

In an interview Monday, Allison said he wasn't trying to cure cancer but to understand how T cells work when, at the University of California, Berkeley, he was studying a protein named CTLA-4. He learned that the protein could put the brakes on T cells, creating what's called an immune “checkpoint.”

He then created an antibody that blocked the protein's action — in other words, it released the brakes so the T cells could do their job.

Working separately, Honjo discovered another protein, called PD-1, that also hampers T cells' ability to attack cancer, but in a somewhat different way.

# Dems go after Kavanaugh's credibility

WASHINGTON — Democrats are raising new questions about the truthfulness of Brett Kavanaugh's sworn testimony to the Senate, shifting tactics against President Donald Trump's Supreme Court nominee as they await the results of the FBI's background investigation into sexual misconduct allegations.

Chuck Schumer, the Senate Democrats' leader from New York, accused Kavanaugh of delivering a “partisan screed” during the Judiciary Committee hearing last week. He said Kavanaugh seemed willing to “mislead senators about everything from the momentous to the mundane” to ensure his ascension to the high court.

“The harsh fact of the matter is that we have mounting evidence that Judge Kavanaugh is just not credible,” Schumer said Monday.

Not so, argued Senate Republican leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky, contending the Democrats are simply looking to “move the goalposts” to prevent Kavanaugh's confirmation. He pledged that the full Senate would begin voting on Kavanaugh's

nomination this week. “The time for endless delay and obstruction has come to a close,” he said.

Kavanaugh's confirmation hinges on a handful of key Republican and Democratic senators who have not yet fully tipped their votes. One of them is Republican Jeff Flake of Arizona, who was greeted by hundreds of liberal protesters, victims of sexual assault among them, during an appearance Monday in Boston.

Flake and Sens. Susan Collins of Maine and Sen. Lisa Murkowski of Alaska were instrumental last week in holding up Kavanaugh's confirmation vote. They forced the White House to open a supplemental background investigation of sexual misconduct allegations against the judge.

The votes of the three Republicans and those of red-state Democrats Joe Manchin of West Virginia and Heidi Heitkamp of North Dakota will largely determine whether Kavanaugh is confirmed.

Flake said he would ensure it's a “real investigation,” by the FBI as Democrats demanded that Trump give them a full readout of his instructions to the agency.


# California internet law sparks US lawsuit

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — California Gov. Jerry Brown has approved the nation's strongest net neutrality law, prompting an immediate lawsuit by the Trump administration and opening the next phase in the battle over regulating the internet.

Advocates of net neutrality hope California's law, which Brown signed Sunday to stop internet providers from favoring certain content or websites, will push Congress to enact national rules or encourage other states to create their own.

However, the U.S. Department of Justice quickly moved to halt the law from taking effect, arguing that it creates burdensome, anti-consumer requirements that go

against the federal government's approach to deregulating the internet.

“Once again the California Legislature has enacted an extreme and illegal state law attempting to frustrate federal policy,” U.S. Attorney General Jeff Sessions said in a statement.

The Federal Communications Commission

repealed Obama-era rules last year that prevented internet companies from exercising more control over what people watch and see on the internet.

The neutrality law is the latest example of California, ground zero of the global technology industry, attempting to drive public policy outside its

boundaries and rebuff President Donald Trump's agenda.

Brown did not explain his reasons for signing the bill or comment on the federal lawsuit Sunday night.

Supporters of the new law cheered it as a win for internet freedom. It is set to take effect Jan. 1.

“This is a historic day for California. A free and open internet is a cornerstone of 21st century life: our democracy, our economy, our health care and public safety systems, and day-to-day activities,” said Democratic Sen. Scott Wiener, the law's author.

It prohibits internet providers from blocking or slowing data based on content or from favoring websites or video streams from companies that pay extra.

## 'One heck of a rivalry'

**Taggart familiar with Florida State-Miami series**

TALLAHASSEE — Willie Taggart is no stranger to Miami-Florida State week. The lifelong Seminoles fan grew up loving the rivalry.

And now he's going to really see what it's about.

The first-year Florida State coach will lead the Seminoles (3-2, 1-2 Atlantic Coast

Conference) for the first time against the No. 17 Hurricanes (4-1, 1-0) on Saturday. Taggart still remembers what it was like to have a Saturday morning or afternoon game as a kid, then racing home to see the Seminoles and Hurricanes square off in a matchup that almost always had national championship implications. "Soon as that game was over,

we were all watching TV," Taggart said. "It's one heck of a rivalry. You'll see some big hits, some big plays, guys flying around. It's a game you don't necessarily have to get guys fired up for. They understand the importance of this game."

Taggart will become the 24th head coach, and the ninth from Florida State, to have been part of a Hurricanes-Seminole game. His 23 predecessors in that department have gone 9-14 in the games where they got their first taste of the rivalry.

Miami's Mark Richt lost his debut in the series — as a head coach, a player and as an assistant.

Florida State beat Miami when Richt was a freshman quarterback playing for the Hurricanes. Miami topped Florida State in 1985 when Richt was starting his coaching career as a graduate assistant for the Seminoles. And in 2016, when Richt was in his first season as head coach at his alma mater, the Seminoles topped his Hurricanes.

## Brewers beat Cubs for NL Central title

CHICAGO — Christian Yelich got three more hits in falling just short of the Triple Crown as the Milwaukee Brewers won their first NL Central title since 2011, beating the Chicago Cubs 3-1 on Monday in a tiebreaker game.

Lorenzo Cain hit a go-ahead single in the eighth inning to help Milwaukee win its eighth in a row and earn home-field advantage throughout the NL playoffs. The Brewers will host the wild-card winner starting Thursday in the best-of-five Division Series.

Chicago stays at Wrigley Field for Tuesday night's wild-card game. The Cubs will play the loser of Monday's second tiebreaker between Colorado and the Los Angeles Dodgers for the NL West title.

Yelich singled home Milwaukee's first run and won the NL batting title with a .326 average. He had 110 RBIs, one behind the Cubs' Javier Baez, and finished

# Mahomes rallies Chiefs past Broncos

DENVER — Patrick Mahomes rallied the unbeaten Kansas City Chiefs back from a 10-point deficit in the fourth quarter for a 27-23 win over the Denver Broncos on Monday night.

The Chiefs (4-0) took a two-game lead over the Broncos (2-2) in the AFC West with their sixth straight win over their rivals.

Down 23-13, Mahomes directed a 12-play, 75-yard drive that ate up more than six minutes and culminated with a 2-yard TD toss to tight end Travis Kelce, then added a 60-yard touchdown drive, handing off to Kareem Hunt for the 4-yard score with 1:39 remaining.

It was the first time since 2004 that the Broncos blew a 10-point fourth-quarter lead at home.

In between Kansas City's scoring drives, the Broncos, who had run roughshod over the Chiefs all night — a 7.2-yard average per run — suddenly abandoned their ground game in favor of three-wide receiver sets that resulted in a quick three-and-out.

Then, struggling punter Marquette King shanked a 35-yarder out of bounds, giving the Chiefs the ball at their 40 with 4:35 left.

Mahomes overcame a couple of flags that put Kansas City in a second-and-30 hole from their 31 and completed a 35-yard pass to Demetrius Harris down to the Broncos' 11 at the 2-minute warning.

The play should never have counted because the play clock expired before the snap, but referee Craig Wrolstad's crew missed it.

After the Chiefs took the lead, the Broncos reached the Kansas City 28, but Case Keenum overthrew an open Demaryius Thomas near the goal line racing down the right sideline. Then rookie

Courtland Sutton caught a first-down pass but overhanded it back on a failed hook-and-ladder that resulted in a turnover on downs with 5 seconds left.

Phillip Lindsay's 1-yard TD run broke a 13-all tie late in the third quarter, and Brandon McManus extended the lead to 10 with a 46-yard field goal.

The officials had another big blunder when Mahomes was about 1 yards past the line of scrimmage when he scrambled and hit Kelce for a 29-yard catch to the 3 early in the second half. Broncos coach Vance Joseph appeared to be reaching for his red challenge flag but never threw it.

Denver's defense bailed out its coach by forcing the Chiefs to settle for Harrison Butker's chip-shot field goal tied it up at 13.

The Broncos averaged a whopping 8.5 yards per carry in the first half but kept stopping themselves with pass

plays even though Keenum had completed 14 of 19 throws at the half.

Royce Freeman took a toss from Keenum and slipped seven tackles on his way to a 14-yard touchdown in which he dragged linebacker Anthony Hitchens across the goal line to tie it at 10. The

big play of the drive was a 42-yard catch by Sutton.

The Chiefs also had a big play on their first touchdown drive as Hunt rumbled 45 yards, setting up Mahomes' 8-yard keeper to put the Chiefs on top 10-3.

Denver led 13-10 at halftime.





Orlando Arcia, batting in the eighth slot, had a career-high four hits, and Josh Hader closed out another dominant relief performance for the Brew Crew.

"We know what's at stake," Richt said Monday in his weekly appearance on WQAM-AM in Miami. "It's more than an ACC game. It's a state-pride game."

Jimbo Fisher and Larry Coker, both of whom won national championships, won their first games in the Miami-FSU series. Howard

Schnellenberger, Jimmy Johnson and Dennis Erickson all won national titles at Miami, but started 0-1 in the series against the Seminoles. Even Bowden, also a national champion and someone who has more wins than anyone who has ever coached at either school, dropped his debut against the Hurricanes — 47-0.

Saturday's outcome probably won't make or break Taggart's legacy at Florida State. It may, however, loom large over how his first

season in Tallahassee winds up getting remembered.

Taggart has coached against Miami once, when his South Florida team lost 49-21 to the Hurricanes in September 2013. Richt and Taggart haven't faced off as coaches, put Taggart said Monday that the two have spoken a few times in the offseason at ACC meetings and on the phone.

Now as Florida State's coach, Taggart looks to win back the "state title," something the Seminoles claimed

from 2013-16 with victories over Miami and Florida.

"When it comes to winning the state championship, it starts with this game here," Taggart said. "Our guys understand the importance. I'm excited about it. This is why you signed up to come to a place like Florida State, to play in games like this."

Notes: Taggart said Monday that OL Derrick Kelly returned to practice and is day-to-day with a leg injury. The Seminoles

have started five different offensive-line combinations in their first five games and if Kelly can play Saturday it would give Florida State some much-needed stability. Meanwhile, Richt indicated that Miami S Jaquan Johnson (hamstring) and LB Shaquille Quarterman (ankle) could be ready to go this weekend, but said WR Ahmmon Richards needs more time. Richards has been sidelined since the Week 1 loss to LSU with what's been called a bone bruise in his knee.

## Mullen, Gators counting on fan support at The Swamp vs. LSU

With Florida coming home after winning back-to-back SEC road games in hostile environments, coach Dan Mullen is calling out Gator fans to step up their game.

He's challenging them to fill The Swamp on Saturday for the LSU game and create the kind of atmosphere the Gators once had when he was the offensive coordinator under Urban Meyer and UF was playing for championships.

"You look at the student government already getting in with wearing blue and all of that," Mullen said. "They come in and they're on their feet, jumping up and down, going crazy in the game. I think the rest of the crowd

feeds off that. That's one of the things that I want us to get back to, having the student body really dominating the environment."

Mullen said he wants The Swamp environment to be like it used to be when he was here before. Saturday would be a good time to start because LSU is ranked No. 5 in the nation and this is one of the biggest UF home games in several years.

Also on Saturday, the Gators will be honoring the 2008 national championship team that Mullen was part of,

and quarterback legend Tim Tebow will be present and going into the program's Ring of Honor.

"I expect it to look like that (2008)," Mullen said.

Mullen remembers what it was like back then. He was reminded of it last Saturday night in Starkville, where Mississippi State fans created a similar environment to what the Gators once had.

The stadium was packed, and it was loud. Extremely loud throughout the entire game, and even before.

Mullen helped create

that hostile atmosphere in Starkville during his nine years as the Bulldogs' head coach.

"I know having gone somewhere else where you had to build it," he said. "We built it through the student body. Anybody of the Gator Nation that went to last week's game in Starkville probably saw that. The student section was packed an hour before kickoff."

"You can build it through that way, and the rest of the crowd feeds off of that. That's one of the things that we really want to work on. That's one of the things I've gotten around

## Buehler, Dodgers top Rockies 5-2; 6th straight NL West title

LOS ANGELES — Rookie Walker Buehler tossed one-hit ball into the seventh inning, Cody Bellinger and Max Muncy launched two-run homers, and the Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Colorado Rockies 5-2 in a tiebreaker to earn their record sixth consecutive NL West title.

The defending NL champion Dodgers became the first major league team to win six straight division crowns since the Yankees captured nine AL East titles in a row from 1998-2006.

Los Angeles now hosts Atlanta in the best-of-five NL Division Series beginning Thursday.

Denied their first division title in franchise history, the Rockies head to Wrigley Field to play the Chicago Cubs in the NL wild-card game on Tuesday night.

Pitching in 90-degree heat, Buehler was oh-so-cool in closing out a regular season that ended with Game 163 after both teams had identical records of 91-71.

The soft-spoken, 24-year-old from Lexington, Kentucky, has been so steady of late that manager Dave Roberts had no qualms about giving Buehler the ball for the crucial game that helped decide the Dodgers' postseason fate.

He settled in quickly, retiring his first six batters in a row, and never did allow a run.

Buehler (8-5) had his no-hit bid broken up in the sixth on Charlie Blackmon's single, one of his two hits for the Rockies.

Buehler even helped himself offensively, hitting a single in the sixth for his first professional RBI and extending the Dodgers' lead to 5-0.

After giving up a two-out walk to Carlos Gonzalez in

the seventh, Buehler exited to a standing ovation from the announced crowd of 47,816. He waved his right hand and quickly strode to the dugout as fans chanted his last name. The right-hander struck out three and walked three.

Despite posting the best road record in franchise history (44-38), the Rockies couldn't get untracked. They didn't advance a runner past second base until the ninth when Nolan Arenado and Trevor Story homered back-to-back off closer Kenley Jansen.

Jansen then retired the next three batters in a row.

The Dodgers' two homers extended their franchise and NL-leading total to 235 on the season.

Bellinger got the Dodgers on the board with his 25th homer in the fourth, a two-out shot to left that made it 2-0. Muncy struck out leading off but was safe at first on a passed ball by catcher Tony Wolters. After Manny Machado and Yasmani Grandal struck out, Bellinger connected on a 1-0 pitch from German Marquez (14-11).

Joc Pederson doubled to deep right-center leading off the fifth. One out later, Muncy hit his 35th homer to left-center, extending the lead to 4-0 and chasing Marquez.

Marquez (14-11) gave up four runs — two earned — and five hits in 4 2/3 innings. He struck out nine and walked two.

The Dodgers played their first tiebreaker since 1980, when they lost to Houston for the division title.

The Rockies were on a roll coming into the club's second tiebreaker and first for the NL West title, having won nine of 10 since being swept at Dodger Stadium from Sept. 17-19.

One week in the suburbs of Paris felt like they were going in circles around the Arc de Triomphe.

They had the strongest team based on the nine players who had experience winning major championships. They had the strongest team considering all 12 were among the top 25 players in the world ranking.

They didn't stand a chance against Europe, which registered a 17 1/2-10 1/2 victory. Only four times since 1979 has the Ryder Cup been decided by seven points or more, and Europe won three of them.

Starting with the Friday afternoon sweep of the foursomes sessions, Europe won eight consecutive matches at one point and built a 10-6 lead that was too much for the Americans to overcome on a golf course with tight fairways and thick rough, and before more than 50,000 people ready to celebrate any shot that hit the green.

Europe dominated the singles, just like they did nearly every session. Even the lone session the

Americans won required a little luck when Tony Finau's tee shot hit the wooden plank on the edge of the water at the 16th hole and plopped down 3 feet away.

It's easy to criticize the Americans after another loss.

Tiger Woods went 0-4, shut out for the first time in his eight appearances in the Ryder Cup. "That's four points to the European team," Woods said. "And I'm one of the contributing factors to why we lost the cup. And it's not a lot of fun."

He now has a 13-21-3 record in the Ryder Cup and briefly tied the record for most losses in Ryder Cup history. The good news for Woods is that Phil Mickelson was still on the golf course. Mickelson also got shut out, playing only two matches at Le Golf National and losing them both, giving him a record of 18-22-7.

The second one stung the most because it was the official cup-clincher for Europe.

Francesco Molinari,

the star of these matches, capped off his 5-0 week by beating Mickelson in singles. Mickelson had to win the last three holes to earn a halve, and instead hit his tee shot into the water on the 16th and immediately removed his cap.

The celebration was on, and it sounded familiar.

"It's difficult to talk about it because it means so much to me over the years, and I did not play well this year," said Mickelson, who built his year around winning the U.S. Open to complete the career Grand Slam and winning the Ryder Cup on European soil, neither of which he had ever accomplished."

That remains the case. In the U.S. Open, he is remembered for whacking a moving ball with his putter out of frustration at Shinnecock Hills. In the Ryder Cup, he is remembered losing the match that officially gave Europe the points it needed to win.

"This could very well, realistically, be my last one," he said.

### NEW YORK Report: Reed vents over Spieth, Furyk in Ryder Cup

Patrick Reed blames Jordan Spieth for them not playing together at the Ryder Cup and told The New York Times that U.S. captain Jim Furyk was not smart to sit him out twice.

Europe won the Ryder Cup 17½-10½ at Le Golf National outside Paris. Europe now has won nine of the last 12 times, and it was the third time in its last five victories that it won by seven points or more.

Spieth and Justin Thomas went 3-1, the only American tandem to play all four matches. Reed was paired with Tiger Woods in fourballs, losing both matches, and sitting out both four-somes matches. In an interview with the Times an hour after the closing news conference, Reed said he was fully expecting Furyk to pair him with Spieth again.

### CHARLOTTE, N.C. Reid won't drop grievance vs. NFL

Eric Reid isn't planning on giving up his fight against racial injustice in America or his battle with the NFL.

He just doesn't know if his protests against injustice will include kneeling for the national anthem. Reid, who signed a one-year contract last week with Carolina, said Monday he is "still considering other ways" to protest and continue to raise awareness.

The former Pro Bowl

safety did not elaborate on his plans, but did say he will not drop his grievance against the NFL that alleges teams colluded to keep him out of the league because he protested alongside Colin Kaepernick.

"Nothing will ever change unless you talk about it," Reid said of his ongoing fight for racial justice with his friend Kaepernick, who remains unsigned. "We're going to continue to hold America to the standards that it says on paper — that we're all created equal. Because it's not that way right now. But we're going to keep pushing toward that."

### ROME Rossi escapes ban after positive doping test

Former Italy forward Giuseppe Rossi escaped a ban on Monday despite failing a doping test.

The American-born Rossi tested positive for an eye drug that can be used as a masking agent. The anti-doping prosecutor was seeking a one-year ban but the 31-year-old Rossi was given only a reprimand following Monday's hearing. The test was in May after the Rossi played for Genoa at the end of the last Serie A season.

"Today a nightmare of four months is over," Rossi wrote on Twitter. "Now I just want to think about football and keep doing what I love more than anything else."

## ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

It is easy to pay lip service to the idea that juniors are the future of the game, but over the last few decades, we have rarely seen our organizations putting their money where their mouths are.

Getting bridge teachers into schools is one very important way to introduce children to the game. Getting them to learn the rules of bidding may take second place to allowing them to play cards and get a feel for the game. Once that starts to happen, who knows where it may take them?

I'm pleased to say that today's deal, sent to me by Suleyman Kolata, comes from a juniors event: a Swiss teams tournament at the 20th Iskenderun Bridge Festival in Hatay, Turkey. Sitting West was Tuana Altun, age 8, playing with her brother Toygar Tuncay Altun. Tuana heard the auction as shown, to six hearts. What would you have led?

Tuana found the killing club lead for an 11 IMP gain, since her teammates had played in game rather than slam. Consequently, this victory helped them win the under-16 teams. When her father asked Tuana about her lead and continuation of a club after winning the heart ace, Tuana said that the bidding had told her that the opponents held a big club fit. She felt confident that if her partner could not ruff at the first trick, her trump control would give her a second chance.

For the record, 23 out of 31 tables made the heart slam here.
