Mandatory evacuation begins

PANAMA CITY — Starting at 6 a.m. today, 120,000 Bay County residents living in evacuation zones will be under mandatory evacuation orders as Hurricane Michael approaches.

The order covers zones A, B and C, which includes all of Panama City Beach and

areas in town close the bay and other bodies of water.

Bay County Sheriff Tommy Ford said during a meeting of the Bay County Commission Monday that while people will "not be dragged out of their homes," people who opt to stay behind may be on their own when conditions deteriorate.

"Prepare for your personal need. Stock up your water," said Bay County

Commissioner Bill Dozier said. "If somebody was to stay here, they need to be able to take care of themselves for a period of time. ... Don't expect the government to help take care of you. You need to take care of yourself."

"We've practiced this many times. This is game time. This is the real thing. This is a significant threat to life and safety," Ford said.

"People need to start leaving now. The roads are going to get more and more congested as time goes on. I promise we will try to get people back in as soon as possible."

Ford, Dozier and others urged people to get on the road as soon as possible, and if people elect to stay behind prepare to be self sufficient.

Michael to make landfall as major hurricane

PANAMA CITY — As more than 100,000 Bay County residents and numerous visitors prepare to evacuate today for the first time since Ivan, Hurricane Michael was gaining strength in the Gulf of Mexico, eyeing the Panhandle for landfall Wednesday

afternoon.

Hurricane Warnings were issued covering the entire Florida Panhandle Monday afternoon, with Storm Surge Warnings following, possibly bringing "life threatening inundation" to the Gulf Coast of the state, according to the National Hurricane Center. Michael could hit as a Category 3 storm.

Storm surge in Bay County

is expected to be between four and eight feet. Winds over 100 mph are possible with this storm and conditions are expected to start deteriorating by Tuesday evening.

Gov. Rick Scott was at the Bay County Emergency Operations Center Monday morning, warning residents

City may sue ZHA for damages in City Hall project

PANAMA CITY — Blaming the consultant's "inactions" for the burgeoning cost of turning the Trustmark Building into a new city hall, the Panama City Commission is considering suing ZHA for damages.

This comes after the price of construction jumped from an anticipated \$4 million to \$8.4 million in February, bringing the total costs to \$16 million to move in and about \$20 million with the debt service factored in.

The financial burden of the project was one of the factors that led the Commission to consider steeply raising the millage rate earlier in the budget process before settling on a smaller increase, and has caused mistrust between local citizens and the city.

The whole affair is one that could have been avoided, attorney Cliff Higby wrote to the city, if ZHA had adequately done the work they were contracted to perform.

In a letter to the city, a consulting engineer retained by Higby to review the materials wrote, "it is readily apparent that the fundamental problems that generated the added cost on City Hall stem from the planning and pre-construction period and the actions, or more accurately

stated, near complete inactions by ZHA."

At the request of the city, Higby reviewed the the contract and the paperwork ZHA submitted to the city with the help of the construction management expert. Their recommendation was the city "provide formal notice of default to ZHA" and keep digging.

Some of the problems listed in the letter include:

- Failing to evaluate the building.
- "Effectively abandoning" the project during the design and construction phase, when "ZHA performed no more than a fraction of the roles it was contracted and paid to perform." As an example, the consultant said there should be two to three file cabinets of work, but instead there was "an overly minimalist and incomplete file."
- No report supporting the \$4 million estimate, making the city "unaware of the lack of effort but forth by ZHA."
- A lack of adequate staffing dedicated to the project when "the single staff member on the project left."

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TODAY IN HISTORY

Today is **Tuesday, Oct. 9**, the 282nd day of 2018. There are 83 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On Oct. 9, 1776, a group of Spanish missionaries settled in present-day San Francisco.

On this date:
In 1910, a coal dust explosion at the Starkville Mine in Colorado left 56 miners dead.
In 1914, the Belgian city of Antwerp fell to German forces during World War I.
In 1930, Laura Ingalls became the first woman to fly across the United States as she completed a nine-stop journey from Roosevelt Field, N.Y., to Glendale, Calif.
In 1936, the first generator at Boulder (later Hoover) Dam began transmitting electricity to Los Angeles.
In 1958, Pope Pius XII died at age 82, ending a 19-year papacy. (He was succeeded by Pope John XXIII.)
In 1967, Marxist revolutionary guerrilla leader Che Guevara, 39, was summarily executed by the Bolivian army a day after his capture.

In 1985, the hijackers of the Achille Lauro cruise liner surrendered two days after seizing the vessel in the Mediterranean. (Passenger Leon Klinghoffer was killed by the hijackers during the standoff.)
In 1995, a sabotaged section of track caused an Amtrak train, the Sunset Limited, to derail in Arizona; one person was killed and about 80 were injured (the case remains unsolved).
In 2001, in the first daylight raids since the start of U.S.-led attacks on Afghanistan, jets bombed the Taliban stronghold of Kandahar. Letters post-marked in Trenton, N.J., were sent to Sens. Tom Daschle and Patrick Leahy; the letters later tested positive for anthrax.
In 2006, North Korea faced a barrage of condemnation and calls for retaliation after it announced that it had set off a small atomic weapon underground; President Bush said, "The international community will respond."


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Evacuation zones

5 evacuation questions answered

What does a mandatory evacuation mean and what happens if you decide to stay after a mandatory evacuation is issued?

It means get out now, according to local officials and law enforcement. The mandatory evacuation goes into effect Tuesday at 6 a.m., though officials encouraged people to leave Monday if they can.

Sheriff Tommy Ford said they won't drag people out their houses if they choose to stay, but first responders may not be able to get to people staying.

For those who won't heed the order, Bay County Commission Chairman Bill Dozier them to get supplies now and be self-sufficient.

"Prepare for your personal need. Stock up your water," Dozier said. "If somebody was to stay here, they need to be able to take care of themselves for a period of time. ... Don't expect the government to help take care of you. You need to take care of yourself."

Where are zones A B C ?
Zones A, B and C are the three levels of evacuation in Bay County.

Zone A is closest to the water. The zones cover nearly all of Panama City Beach and portions of Panama City, Lynn Haven and Parker.

Traditionally Zone A would be evacuated first, then Zone B, then C, but Bay County is evacuating all zones at once.

Will there be evacuations at Tyndall?

All aircraft will be

evacuated at Tyndall Air Force Base and Tyndall has been ordered.

In coordination with Bay County officials, Tyndall Air Force Base officials have ordered the evacuation of all non-mission essential military and civilian personnel from the base due to Hurricane Michael. All personnel including those in Tyndall base housing must be off the installation no later than 3 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 9.

A press release said, finance will reimburse members for an evacuation of at least 100, but

no more than 500 miles from Tyndall AFB.

The aircraft will reposition to Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio, and Fort Worth Alliance Airport, Texas. Evacuated aircraft and designated personnel will return when the storm danger has passed.

What are authorities recommending for people coming to the area for vacation?

With an evacuation order in place – which impacts all of Panama

City Beach – officials are advising people to pick another time for their vacation.

"It's certainly not the best time to come down. Look at revisiting your plans to vacation here in Bay County and Panama City Beach," said County Commissioner Bill Dozier.

"Sometime next week this will move past us and clear out. Continue to keep an eye on the local websites in Panama City Beach. They'll find another time for their vacation."

Where are emergency shelters on Panama City Beach?

Deane Bozeman School 13410 FL-77, Panama City is being opened as an emergency shelter Tuesday at 10 a.m.

Bay County uses public schools for storm shelters. The locations are picked based on the nature of the event as well as school constructions and renovations. To find out which school is being used in any given event, call 784-4000 or stay tuned to local media.







Deane Bozeman School will open as a shelter at 10 a.m., but Chief of Emergency Services in Bay County Mark Bowen recommended the shelter only be used as a last resort if people have nowhere else to go.

Officials also recommended people keep up with local news reports and social media accounts of local agencies, including Bay County Florida Emergency Services. Residents can also sign up for Alert Bay, a safety notification system, at alertbay.org.

Anyone planning a vacation or scheduling a condo rental should not come and instead stay where they are, Dozier said.

"It's certainly not the best time to come down. Look at revisiting your plans to vacation here in Bay County and

Sen. Bill Nelson and Congressman Neal Dunn attended Monday's meeting.

Hurricane Michael is expected to make landfall Wednesday afternoon as a possible Category 3 storm. The latest track has the storm coming ashore somewhere between Panama City and Apalachicola, bringing storm

surge between four and eight feet.

"I've talked to FEMA and the National Hurricane Center," Nelson said. "It is going to gain in strength as the warm Gulf of Mexico fuels the hurricane. This is no fooling time."

Dunn advised people to listen and follow evacuation orders from local offices and law enforcement and said his office will help with bureaucratic logjams that come with getting help from agencies.

Beach nourishment is expected to occur after the hurricane passes.

Earlier stories on the project based on public records obtained by The News Herald showed the city had been warned by appraisers about leaks and the building being "functionally obsolete," as well as the city paying well over what the building was appraised at.

When the little paperwork ZHA could provide was reviewed — at the time of The News Herald's inquiries ZHA President Rick Mellon said he believed ZHA did a report, but couldn't find it on the company's servers — errors were found in the report, including many of the spreadsheets being for a different project ZHA was working on and incomplete cost estimates.

For example, in addition to the \$4 million move-in option, ZHA provided a \$10.5 million gut option and a \$13 million total gut option for the building. However, the scope of work outlined in the \$10.5 million option and \$13 million is nearly identical. The key difference is that the \$10.5 million option did not include unavoidable fees, such as architectural engineering work and hiring a general contractor, and the more expensive option did. No one could offer an explanation for why the mandatory costs were included in the "total gut" option but not the "gut" option.

ZHA is contracted to be paid \$76,440 for its work on the project.

The Panama City Commission is expect to discuss Higby's letter and pursuing damages during their 8 a.m. meeting on today.

to take the storm seriously and begin preparations before it is too late.

"We know that storms like Michael can be absolutely devastating and life-threatening," Scott said "We have to take this very seriously. Families should take this opportunity to get three days of food and water and make sure all medications are ready. Check on your neighbors and listen to local officials."

Bay County Chief of Emergency Operations Mark Bowen said unfortunately, due to timing and the storm's

rapid development, "We haven't had as much time to watch it as we'd like."

Still, he said, residents are in good hands.


"We are quite prepared for this," he said. "This is the worst storm we've seen since Ivan."

Following the mandatory evacuation order issued Monday afternoon, roads quickly clogged up and lines formed around nearly every gas station in town. However, many drivers reported gas stations running out of fuel. Many stores also reportedly ran out of water and other supplies, but additional trucks were expected overnight at many of the big box retailers and shelves should at least partially be restocked this morning.

After brushing Cuba and the Yucatan Peninsula Monday, Michael began crawling through the Gulf at about 6 mph, heading north to north-northwest. The storm is expected to pick up speed in the Gulf, turning northeastward before making landfall.

Hurricane-force winds currently extend about 35 mph out from the center of the storm, and tropical storm-force winds 175 miles out.

Scott declared a state of emergency in 26 Florida counties across the Panhandle and Big Bend region Sunday, and the county declared a state of emergency as well. Panama City is also expected to declare a state of emergency.

PANAMA CITY Gulf Power bringing in back up

Gulf Power is preparing for Hurricane Michael.

"We have identified more than 500 line and tree-trimming resources that are available through Southern Company. At this point, we have requested 200 of these resources," spokesman Rick DelaHaya said. "We already have 330 line (distribution, transmission, substation) and tree-trimming contractors on our own Gulf Power system that will be working to restore power. Add that to the 1,187 Gulf Power employees and we'll have more than 1,700 people ready to go to work to restore power to our customers."

DelaHaya urged customers to charge cell phones, have plenty of water on hand and food stocks and heed any warnings by officials. Gulf Power will get the power on as quickly and safely as possible, and if the storm is as big as is predicted, customers should be prepared to be without power for hours up to a couple of days depending on the severity, he said.

"Also, now is the time to download the free Gulf Power app to keep updated on power outages and restoration times. And follow us on social media, especially Twitter for the most up to date information on the storm," DelaHaya said.

The company has also lined up assistance from other energy providers and Gulf Power's annual economic symposium has

been postponed, a news release stated.

PANAMA CITY BCSO prepares for evacuations

Long shifts are ahead for Bay County Sheriff's Deputies as the county braces for Hurricane Michael.

Sheriff Tommy Ford had placed deputies on 12 hour shifts beginning today and all leave has been cancelled, according to a press release. Deputies will be patrolling in zones until such time weather conditions make it too dangerous to be on Bay County roads.

"For those considering evacuation, I can't stress strongly enough the importance of leaving as early as possible," Sheriff Tommy Ford said. "Those that can leave today should do so. Evacuation routes can quickly turn into traffic nightmares. Please evacuate now."

The BCSO will continue to patrol evacuated neighborhoods to discourage criminal activity.

BCSO stressed that when weather conditions make driving too hazardous, deputies will not be able to respond to any calls for service until weather conditions permit. It is impossible to predict when this will occur or how long it will last.

SUNRISE Michael forces postponement of school shooting hearing

The commission investigating the Florida high school massacre announced Monday that it is postponing this week's scheduled meeting because of Hurricane Michael.

Some members of the Marjory Stoneman Douglas Public Safety Commission are law enforcement, education

and state officials from the Florida Panhandle, where the storm is forecast to make landfall by Wednesday as a hurricane.

This week's three-day meeting had been highly anticipated, as the then-Florida sheriff's deputy who didn't rush into the building as a gunman killed 17 high school students and staff members was scheduled to testify about his actions on Feb. 14.

Former Broward Sheriff's Deputy Scot Peterson,

then the school's resource officer, had been scheduled to testify about security camera video that shows him hurrying to the three-story freshman building, drawing his handgun but then remaining outside even though Broward County sheriff's officials say his training taught him to charge in and shoot the gunman.

President Donald Trump and others have called him a coward for not doing so, something he has vehemently denied.

He will also be given a chance to discuss that training and whether it was adequate.

But recent word the Florida Department of Law Enforcement is investigating possible criminal misconduct in the law enforcement response to the shooting might enable Peterson to invoke his Fifth Amendment right against self-incrimination. His attorney, Joseph DiRuzzo III, did not respond to emails and calls seeking comment.

Michael generates 'bad feeling'

There's something about Michael.

Hurricane Michael Monday raised the hair on the arms of people not prone to being alarmists, sent drivers scurrying to the gas pumps and supply stores earlier than usual and prompted residents to actually ask for maps to see if they are in evacuation zones.

Some veterans of storms here dating back to Elena in 1985, Opal in 1995 and Ivan in 2004 - none of which actually landed in Bay County - who have seen hurricanes and tropical storms dance around the Gulf of Mexico year after year without much alarm had an uneasy feeling Monday about Hurricane Michael.

News Herald Editor Mike Cazalas felt it but couldn't put a finger on it, other than the storm bears his name and is landing close to his birthday. He's been through more than a few false alarms.

Sheriff Tommy Ford felt it, emphasizing late Monday, "In your stories, please try to get across that there's something about this one, it's not ordinary," he said. He's weathered more than a few hurricanes as a law enforcement officer over the decades.

Former House Speaker Allan Bense felt it, saying during a conversation Monday, "I've got a bad feeling about this one, I just don't know why, but I'm worried about it." He's seen multiple businesses that are weather-dependent through more than a few hurricanes and was the House Speaker when Ivan hit.

So we're not taking this one lightly and we hope you aren't either, and that you are paying attention to the evacuation orders and advice from local safety officials.

So, by way of example, here's what those cited above are doing.

The editor is evacuating to the office for the first time in over a decade when landfall nears. The sheriff has cancelled all time off and put everyone on 12-hour shifts. Bense, who sits on the board of Gulf Power and also has various business holdings here, said power crews were already mobilizing and his businesses that involve heavy equipment were being shut down. They are not taking this lightly.

Here's what we are doing at The News Herald given the above:

- Starting Sunday night we made our website, news-herald.com, available for free to everyone whether they are a subscriber or not. We'll keep the latest news there no matter the print product's deadline or progress.

- Today's paper was out on a normal deadline, 11 p.m. Tonight we are going to press early, 7 p.m., to ensure our carriers can safely deliver a dry paper and have time to take care of themselves and their families before Michael makes landfall. That's why you'll be missing some late sports scores in Wednesday's paper.

- We're not sure what time we will go to press Wednesday, it depends on exactly where the storm hits and if it holds to a predicted early afternoon landfall. But there's a chance the paper might be later than usual arriving Thursday if there are widespread power outages, or if roads are not safe, etc.

- We're gathering food and water and offering shelter to employees who are not safe or do not feel safe in their homes.

- Those who need to tend to families and personal matters are doing so, safety is key. Others will be here throughout the storm no matter what the conditions because that's what they do and they're in a position to be available to be of service.

- We're sending reporters and photographers where needed to our sister papers to the east - the Port St. Joe Star and the Apalachicola Times, to assist them. At the same time, our sister paper to the west, The Northwest Florida Daily News, is assisting with our website and making content gatherers available should we need it.

In short, we are going to put out a paper and we are going to keep our website updated with the latest throughout the storm, but at this writing Monday we don't know when Thursday's paper will hit.

But we hope that you are taking the storm as seriously as we are.

This one very well may be different, but we'd rather we all be wrong than the alternative if we're all caught unprepared.

Red tide threatens to swamp Scott's Senate campaign

Imagine you're Florida's Gov. Rick Scott, for example, locked in a tight race to unseat Bill Nelson from the U.S. Senate.

Your campaign needs you out there, visible and upbeat, for photo ops and commercials extolling your leadership qualities. But where can you go?

A pernicious red tide has affected 135 miles of prime coastline on the Gulf side of the state, while slimy blue-green algae fueled by discharges from Lake Okeechobee is sliming estuaries and waterways on the other side.

Your campaign advisers have warned that you cannot, under any circumstances, be seen or photographed anywhere near this double-whammy of ecological disasters, especially the red tide.

Piles of rotting fish on the shore? Bad optics, Rick.

Ditto for dead manatees and sea turtles.

Truly awful - even worse than scenes of puffy-eyed tourists, wheezing and hacking as they retreat toward half-empty motels.

So, what do you do if you're a polluter-friendly candidate who's been arduously trying to reinvent yourself as an impassioned environmentalist?

Stay far away from the

water, Florida's trademark attraction. Stage your events and TV ads elsewhere - warehouses, factories, Wawa stores, whatever. Declare emergencies in the suffering counties, and send some money for research and tourism recovery.

Emphasize in press releases that you, Rick Scott, aren't personally responsible for the red tide. It's an itty-bitty organism called *Karenia brevis*, and it's a naturally occurring phenomenon. The red tide has been blooming almost 11 months, and nobody knows how many millions of dollars the economy has lost.

In Manatee County alone, work crews have removed 289 tons of dead fish since early August.

"Let's get to work!" you chirp in your political ads.

But that's a steep challenge for a beachfront restaurant owner beset with the reek of decomposing mullet and turtles. So maybe he serves three limes with every Corona - one for the beer, and two for plugging each customer's nostrils.

Scientists don't all agree on the combination of triggers for red tide, but this season's version is believed to have been made worse by massive plumes of effluent from the Mississippi River, fertilizer nutrients flushed from Florida coastal developments and hotter temperatures in the Gulf of Mexico.

If you're candidate Scott, the warm water issue is problematic because you've been openly skeptical about

climate change. The use of the term was even banned from environmental agency correspondence, emails and reports early in your administration.

Worse, you've got a pathetic record when it comes to protecting Florida waters - \$700 million slashed from oversight programs. You also repealed a law requiring regular inspections of septic tanks.

And many voters might remember how you and the Republican Legislature shrunk the Department of Environmental Regulation, pauperized and politicized the water management districts, fired expert scientists and rewrote regulations to allow Big Sugar and other corporate interests to police their own polluting practices.

Billions of gallons of fertilizer-laced water continues to pour from Lake Okeechobee toward the Gulf and Atlantic coasts, fueling the notorious "toxic blue-green algae" that visually has become the national postcard for your administration.

If you're Rick Scott, one strategy is to blame the federal government and Nelson in particular for not doing enough to fortify the dike around Lake O. Upgrading a toilet bowl is easier than cleaning the water that flows in and out of it, which would require the state to enforce a few pollution laws.

If you're candidate Scott, it's important to look like you're doing something.

LONDON Execs cooling on deals amid trade uncertainty

Executives around the world are cooling to the idea of mergers and acquisitions in the face of rising trade tensions, notably between the U.S. and China, a leading adviser on international corporate deals said Monday.

In its half-yearly assessment of corporate mergers and acquisitions, or M&A, EY found that only 46 percent of executives are planning a takeover in the next 12 months. That's down 10 percentage points from a year ago and marks the lowest level in four years.

"Geopolitical, trade and tariff uncertainties have finally caused some dealmakers to hit the pause button," said Steve Krouskos, a global vice chair at EY. "Despite stronger-than-anticipated first-half earnings and the undeniable strategic imperative for deals, we can expect this year to finish with much weaker M&A than how it started."

SAN FRANCISCO — Facebook is launching the first electronic device to bear its brand, a screen and camera-equipped gadget intended to make video calls easier and more intuitive.

But it's unclear if people will open their homes to an internet-connected camera sold by a company with a questionable track record on protecting user privacy.

Facebook is marketing the device, called Portal, as a way for its more than 2 billion users to chat with one another without having to fuss with positioning and other controls. The device features a camera that uses artificial intelligence to automatically zoom as people move around during calls.

Since Echo's release nearly four years ago, both Google and Apple have followed Amazon in releasing smart speakers designed for use with their other digital services — some of them, at least. These speakers can serve as hub-like controllers for "smart" homes as people install appliances, lighting and security systems that can be controlled over the internet.

Portal represents Facebook's entry into that fray. But pointing an artificially intelligent camera

into peoples' homes could well raise other privacy questions.

"The first thing consumers are going to wonder is 'how much sensitive data is this collecting about me?'" said John Breyault, vice president of public policy of telecommunications and fraud at the National Consumers League, a Washington-based consumer advocacy group that has received donations from Facebook and other tech companies.

On Monday, Twitter users were quick to point to Facebook's privacy fallacies and what they saw as the company's impudence in asking people to trust it with a camera called Portal inside their homes. Some compared it to the always-on, always-watching tele-screens in George Orwell's dystopian novel "1984." Others saw the gadget's appeal — but not if it comes from Facebook.

It's a particularly trying time for Facebook to release a home camera. Earlier this year, the company had to acknowledge that as many as 87 million people may have had their data accessed by Cambridge Analytica, a data mining firm that worked for the Trump campaign and aimed to use the data to influence elections. More recently, Facebook revealed that hackers managed to pierce its security to break into 50 million accounts.

Facebook says it won't "listen to, view or keep the contents" of video calls, adding that the Portal camera won't use facial recognition or identify people in the video calls. The device will allow users to disable the camera and microphone with a single tap and to lock it with a numerical passcode. There's also a physical camera cover to prevent recording.

Portal will not display Facebook ads "at this time," the company said, although it noted that third-party services such as music streaming might embed their own ads the same way they do on other devices.

The company says Facebook's privacy policy applies to Portal, since it uses Messenger for voice and video calls. Facebook executives have repeatedly said that the company does not use the contents of messages or calls for advertising purposes and will not do so in the future. Still, there are other, less direct possibilities for the future.

"This is going to gain (Facebook) not only a place in the smart home, but also data they may not have been able to collect before or understand before," said ABI Research analyst Jonathan Collins. This includes people's location, activities and interests — "all the reasons companies want to get into the home."

Stocks mixed, but tech slides

NEW YORK — U.S. stock indexes found their footing after a sharp early loss Monday and finished mixed. Technology companies sank for the third day in a row.

Stocks slumped in morning trading following big declines late last week. Some of the largest losses went to technology companies, including payment and credit card companies. Indexes in Europe also dropped as Italy vowed to ramp up spending that will increase its deficit.

A sharp increase in bond yields last week had startled investors and prompted them to shift money out of stocks. Bond markets in the U.S. were closed for the Columbus Day holiday and stock trading was relatively light.

Banks, which often rise along with interest rates, continued their advance. High-dividend companies, which tend to fall when yields go up, recovered some of their losses from last week.

The S&P 500 index dipped 1.14 points to 2,884.43. The Dow Jones Industrial Average reversed an early loss of 223 points and rose 39.73 points, or 0.2 percent, to 26,486.78.

The Nasdaq composite sank 52.50 points, or 0.7 percent, to 7,735.95. The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks slipped 2.60 points, or 0.2 percent, to 1,629.51. The Nasdaq and Russell are each coming off their worst week since late March.

Among payment technology companies, PayPal slid 3.2 percent to \$80.55 and Mastercard fell 2.3 percent to \$208.26. Elsewhere, Microsoft lost 1.1 percent to \$110.85.

Alphabet, Google's parent company, fell 1 percent to \$1,155.92 after it said a flaw in its Google Plus social network may have exposed personal information of as many as 500,000 people. It will end Google Plus for consumers next year.

Google found the problem in March, and the Wall Street Journal reported that the company didn't disclose it at the time, partly to avoid scrutiny from regulators and damage to its reputation. The company didn't comment on that report.

Overseas, Italy's deputy premier vowed to press ahead with a plan to increase spending and the country's deficit even after the European Commission expressed "serious concern" about the notion.

Italy's FTSE MIB dropped 2.4 percent and Italian bond prices dropped, sending yields higher. Germany's DAX fell 1.4 percent and the CAC 40 in France sank 1.1 percent. In Britain, the FTSE 100 fell 1.2 percent.

Working past 65 easier to do if you graduated college

NEW YORK — Close to one in five Americans who's 65 or older is still working, the highest percentage in more than half a century. And the one who's still working may be better off.

As more and more Americans delay retirement, it's those with a college degree that find it easiest to keep working past 65. Their less-educated peers, meanwhile, are having a more difficult time staying in the workforce.

It's a crucial distinction because financial experts say both groups would benefit from working an extra year or more to improve their retirement security. By staying on the job, older

Americans can build up their savings, which in too many cases are inadequate. Plus, they can allow bigger Social Security benefits to accrue. Besides, many older Americans like the idea of staying engaged by working.

Less-educated Americans, though, aren't always able to follow this path, even though they tend to have less in retirement savings. Instead, many are forced to retire before their mid-60s because of poor health, the inability to do jobs that require a lot of physical activity or other reasons.

"If less-educated people were retiring early and comfortable in their retirement years, good for them, but we know they aren't," said Matt Rutledge, research economist at the Center for Retirement Research at

Boston College.

There is a widening gap in retirement ages between college and high-school graduates, Rutledge says, one that is most apparent when looking at the average age of retirement for men. The increasing number of women in the workforce in recent decades can skew the overall figures.

Men with college degrees are retiring at an average age of 65.7, according to Rutledge's calculations based on government data. That's nearly three years later than men with only high-school degrees, who are retiring at an average age of 62.8.

In the late 1970s, though, the two groups were retiring at nearly the same age: 64.6 for college graduates and 64.1 for high-school graduates.

Brazil leans toward vision of Bolsonaro

RIO DE JANEIRO — The far-right former army captain who looks likely to become Brazil's next president promised nothing short of a complete overhaul of Latin America's largest nation, vowing Monday to combat the evils of corruption by gutting government ministries and privatizing state companies. He also pledged to promote traditional values that would roll back the rights of gays and other minorities.

With his pledge of "Brazil above all," Jair Bolsonaro has catapulted from the fringes of Congress, where he served as a member of marginal parties for 27 years, to a stone's throw from the presidency. A rabble rouser who has reminisced fondly about dictatorship and promised an all-out war on drugs and crime, he just missed outright victory in Sunday's vote and will face former Sao Paulo Mayor Fernando Haddad of the leftist Workers' Party in an Oct. 28 runoff.

Bolsonaro only needs a few more points to secure victory, and Haddad's supporters vowed Monday to launch a tough fight to make up ground after their candidate finished a distant second.

The election was a seismic shift for this nation of more than 200 million people,

where the left has won the past four elections but deep divisions have opened in the wake of a massive corruption scandal and the 2016 impeachment of then-President Dilma Rousseff. Brazil's move fits into a global trend among voters — in the United States and Europe, among other places — who are choosing anti-establishment and often far-right or populist candidates who target minorities and promise a return to "traditional values."

"The evils and damages of corruption hurt the people in many ways. It's they who don't have a bed

in the hospital, who don't have security in the streets or money in their pockets," Bolsonaro tweeted Monday. "A corrupt government encourages crime in all spheres."

His solution? "Reduce the number of ministries, get rid of and privatize state companies, fight fraud in (a popular social welfare program for low-income families) ... decentralize power giving more economic force to the states and municipalities," he said on Twitter, one of his favorite forms of communicating.

Bolsonaro's Social and

Liberal Party was a tiny, fringe group until the candidate began surging in the polls through his use of social media and carefully orchestrated rallies. Bolsonaro has often praised Donald Trump, and his campaign took many pages from the U.S. president's playbook, from his echoing of Trump's "America First" slogan, to bashing the mainstream media to using the candidate's adult children as proxies.

Bolsonaro's party took a whopping 52 seats in the lower house of Congress — up from just one in the last election — giving it 10 percent of that house and

making it the second-largest party after the Workers' Party, with 56.

If elected, Bolsonaro has promised a total overhaul of Brazil's government. The proposals that have attracted the most attention — and criticism — focus on how he would slash rising crime rates. Brazil has long been the world leader in homicides, with a record 63,880 people slain last year, according to the Brazilian Public Security Forum, an independent think tank.

To this thorny problem, Bolsonaro has proposed simple solutions: Give police more freedom to shoot first and give ordinary people freer access to guns. Critics have expressed concern that police violence, already a major contributor to the high homicide rate, will only worsen if police are given carte blanche.

"Bolsonaro is very good at picking a one-sentence summary of the issue and a one-sentence solution to the issue and then one name to resolve it," said Matthew Taylor, an associate professor of Latin American politics at American University.

While Brazilians say that deteriorating security is one of their major concerns, crime — and efforts to crack down on it — have become almost a metaphor in Bolsonaro's campaign. He has painted a Brazil not only at war with criminals but, in many ways, with itself.

MOSCOW Russia challenges US compliance with treaty

Russia on Monday challenged the U.S. claim that it has fulfilled its obligations under a pivotal nuclear arms deal, a new argument that could further fuel tensions between Moscow and Washington.

The Russian Foreign Ministry said it "can't confirm" the latest U.S. State Department data indicating that the U.S. has complied with the thresholds set by the 2010 New START treaty. It limits each country to no more than 1,550 deployed nuclear warheads and 700 deployed missiles and bombers.

The ministry said the U.S. removed 56 Trident II submarine-launched intercontinental ballistic missiles and 41 B-52H strategic bombers from its count of nuclear

arsenals after re-equipping them to carry conventional weapons.

KENNEBUNKPORT, MAINE Former first daughter Barbara Bush gets married

Former first daughter Barbara Bush has gotten married. Her father, former President George W. Bush, escorted his daughter down the aisle while her grandfather, former President George H.W. Bush, watched the ceremony at the family's Walker Point compound in Kennebunkport, Maine, on Sunday.

The 36-year-old married 37-year-old screenwriter Craig Coyne.

Her twin sister, Jenna Bush Hager, told NBC's "Today" show on Monday Barbara wore something borrowed — a bracelet her grandfather had given to his wife on their 70th

wedding anniversary.

EMIGRANT, MONT. New mining claims banned on prized land near Yellowstone

U.S. Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke approved a 20-year ban on new mining claims in the towering mountains north of Yellowstone National Park on Monday, after two proposed gold mines raised concerns that an area drawing tourists from the around the globe could be spoiled.

As Zinke signed the mineral ban at an outdoor ceremony in Montana's Paradise Valley, a bank of clouds behind him broke apart to reveal the snow-covered sides of Emigrant Peak. The picturesque, 10,915-foot mountain has been at the center of the debate over whether mining should be allowed.

STEVENS POINT, WIS. Man pleads not guilty to killing wife, hiding body

A Wisconsin man on Monday pleaded not guilty to killing his wife last year and hiding her body, which hasn't been found.

Jason Sypher, of Plover, entered the pleas to first-degree intentional homicide and hiding a corpse in Portage County Circuit Court. Krista Sypher, 44, disappeared in March 2017.

Prosecutors in August brought charges against her husband, who had reported her missing.

In the criminal complaint, police contend that Sypher engaged in several suspicious activities around the time his wife disappeared.

Reprieve for Rosenstein

Trump says he's not firing official whose future has been uncertain

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump declared a reprieve Monday for Rod Rosenstein, saying he has no plans to fire his deputy attorney general whose future has been the source of intense speculation for two weeks.

"I'm not making any changes," Trump told reporters as he returned to the White House after traveling with Rosenstein to an international police chiefs' conference in Florida. "We just had a very nice talk. We actually get along."

The flight provided an opportunity for their most extensive conversation since news reports last month that Rosenstein had discussed the possibilities in early 2017 of secretly recording

Trump to expose chaos in the White House and invoking constitutional provisions to have him removed from office.

Those reports triggered an avalanche of speculation about the future of Rosenstein — and also the special counsel's investigation into possible coordination between Russia and the Trump campaign. The deputy attorney general appointed former FBI Director Robert Mueller to his special counsel post and closely oversees his work.

Trump said earlier in the day that he had "a very good relationship" with Rosenstein and was eager to speak with him aboard Air Force One on the flight to Florida. They did talk, for about 45 minutes, but not alone, a White House spokesman said. The subjects: violent crime in Chicago, support for local law enforcement, border security, the conference they were flying to and "general DOJ business,"

spokesman Hogan Gidley said without elaboration.

"I didn't know Rod before, but I've gotten to know him," Trump said at the White House earlier.

The Justice Department has denied that Rosenstein had proposed invoking the 25th Amendment of the Constitution, which would involve the Cabinet and vice president agreeing to remove him. And the remark about secretly recording the president was meant sarcastically, the department said.

Even so, Rosenstein told White House officials that he was willing to resign and arrived at the White House a week and a half ago with the expectation that he would be fired. He met in person with White House chief of staff John Kelly and spoke by phone with Trump during a tumultuous day that ended with him still in his job.

Rosenstein and Trump had been expected to meet at the White House

days later, but that meeting was put off so that the president could focus on the confirmation hearing of Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh.

Trump had previously said that he would prefer not to fire the Justice Department's No. 2 official and that Rosenstein had told him he did not say the remarks attributed to him. Advisers had also cautioned Trump

against doing anything dramatic in the weeks before the midterm elections next month.

Kelly was present for Monday's conversation between Rosenstein and Trump, the White House said, as was Rosenstein's top deputy at the Justice Department, Ed O'Callaghan.

The speculation over Rosenstein's future concerned Democrats, who

feared that a dismissal could lead to Trump curtailing Mueller's probe. Although Trump has at times criticized his deputy attorney general, he has reserved his sharpest verbal attacks for Attorney General Jeff Sessions, who recused himself from the Russia investigation in March 2017 because of his own earlier involvement with the Trump campaign.

Trump apologizes to Kavanaugh

WASHINGTON — Supreme Court Justice Brett Kavanaugh was sworn in — again, for the cameras, this time — Monday night at a White House ceremony, but not before President Donald Trump slammed Kavanaugh's opponents for a "campaign of personal destruction."

In a ceremony that could have been a unifying moment for the nation, Trump instead delivered remarks that even he acknowledged began "differently than perhaps any other event of such magnitude."

"On behalf of our nation, I want to apologize to Brett and the entire Kavanaugh family for the terrible pain and suffering you have been forced to endure," Trump said, addressing the bitter partisan fight over Kavanaugh's nomination that became a firestorm after the emergence of sexual misconduct allegations, which Kavanaugh emphatically denied.

With all the sitting justices in attendance, along with Kavanaugh's family and top admiration officials, Trump said Kavanaugh had been the

victim of a "campaign of political and personal destruction based on lies and deception."

But, he told the new justice, "You, sir, under historic scrutiny, were proven innocent." Critics have argued the investigation was not thorough enough to merit that conclusion.

Kavanaugh officially became a member of the high court Saturday and has already been at work preparing for his first day on the bench Tuesday.

In his own remarks, Kavanaugh, who has faced criticism that he appeared too politicized in his Senate testimony, tried to assure the American public that

he would approach the job fairly. He said the high court "is not a partisan or political institution" and assured he took the job with "no bitterness."

"The Senate confirmation process was contentious and emotional. That process is over. My focus now is to be the best justice I can be," he said.

It was the end of a deeply contentious nomination process that sparked mass protests, an FBI investigation and a national reckoning over power, gender, sexual assault and the line between violence and adolescent transgression. And it comes less than a month before pivotal midterm elections that

will determine which party controls Congress.

Ceremonial swearing-ins are unusual for new justices. Only Samuel Alito and Stephen Breyer participated in White House events after they had been sworn in and begun work as justices, according to the court's records on the current crop of justices.

Bronx, where the 108-win Red Sox can put away the wild-card Yankees for good and advance to the AL Championship Series against Houston. Rick Porcello is scheduled to pitch for Boston against CC Sabathia.

Boosted by noisy fans in their homer-friendly ballpark, the Yankees entered 7-0 at home the past two postseasons — against out-of-division opponents. But the Red Sox, frequent visitors of course, were hardly intimidated.

Holt, making his first play-off start this year, opened the fourth with a single off Severino and capped the outburst with a triple to right field. Holt also doubled home a run in the eighth — he finished with five RBIs and four of Boston's 18 hits.

must now go to work on making America care about these fresh faces.

The task isn't too hard with Elliott, the 22-year-old son of Hall of Famer Bill Elliott. Ol' "Awesome Bill" won NASCAR's most popular driver award 16 times before he removed his name from balloting. All those fans flocked to Dale Earnhardt Jr., but he's retired now so Chase Elliott automatically got his Daddy's fans.

Still, Chase Elliott is never going to be the next Jeff Gordon, a pop culture icon and crossover in sports, media and entertainment. Elliott doesn't have the personality for it — remember, he's Bill Elliott's kid and Bill Elliott was hardly the most verbose driver of his time. The appeal of the younger Elliott is largely for fans who already enjoy NASCAR.

Blaney is a third-generation racer and North Carolina native who does

Brees makes history in style, Saints thrash Redskins 43-19

NEW ORLEANS — Drew Brees' 62-yard touchdown pass to rookie Tre'Quan Smith made him the NFL's all-time leader in yards passing and sent the New Orleans Saints well on their way to a lopsided 43-19 victory over the mistake-prone Washington Redskins on Monday night.

Brees entered the game needing 201 yards to eclipse Peyton Manning's previous mark of 71,940 yards. He had 250 yards and two touchdowns by halftime and finished 26 of 29 for 363 yards and three touchdowns. The 39-year-old quarterback, who looks prolific as ever, has yet to throw an interception

this season. He did, however, make his eighth career reception on his own deflected pass, and pushed across the line of scrimmage to add an extra yard to his career total.

The Saints' Smith, a third-round draft choice last spring, caught two touchdown passes from the 18th-year pro. Brees also hit Smith for a 35-yard score down the right sideline early in the third quarter.

Any hope Washington had of coming back was all but snuffed out when Justin Hardee, a special teams regular who was in the game because of Marshon Lattimore's concussion symptoms, snagged Alex Smith's underthrown pass at the Saints' 19-yard line and returned his first career interception to the Washington 4.

That set up change-of-pace QB Taysom Hill's 1-yard touchdown run that put the Saints (4-1) up 40-13.

Smith completed 23 of 39

passes for 275 yards for the Redskins (2-2). He ran for a short touchdown late in the first half that pulled Washington within 26-13.

The Redskins came in allowing fewer than 190 yards passing per game and spoke of doing what they could to prevent Brees from making history. Instead, they helped Brees pile up first-half yards with third-down penalties that extended two touchdown drives.

Josh Norman's defensive holding penalty during Brees' incomplete pass on third-and-4 from the New Orleans 42 helped the Saints on their first scoring drive, capped by Mark Ingram's short touchdown run.

In the second quarter, Montae Nicholson's unnecessary roughness penalty for leveling Ingram on Ryan Kerigan's third-down sack of

Oklahoma fires defensive coordinator Mike Stoops

Oklahoma fired defensive coordinator Mike Stoops on Monday after the Sooners struggled to stop Texas during their first loss of the season.

Ruffin McNeill, the

assistant head coach and defensive tackles coach, will be the defensive coordinator for the rest of the season.

The No. 11 Sooners (5-1) lost 48-45 on Saturday, allowing 501 yards to the Longhorns in Dallas.

"More of a gut feeling that this was the appropriate response right now, that we,

more than anything, needed a different voice in that room," Oklahoma coach Lincoln Riley said during a conference call.

McNeill was defensive coordinator at UNLV from 1992 to 1998, and at Fresno State in 1999. He later served in that same role with Texas

Tech from 2008 to 2009 before taking over as head coach at East Carolina from 2010 to 2015.

Riley brought McNeill to Oklahoma as assistant head coach before the 2017 season. Riley's confidence in McNeill played a role in the decision to fire Stoops.

"I felt like that we had people in that room that could bring a spark to us, and Ruffin's certainly a big part of that," Riley said.

Riley was McNeill's offensive coordinator at East Carolina.

PHOENIX Phoenix Suns fire GM McDonough

The Phoenix Suns fired general manager Ryan McDonough on Monday, eight days before the season begins.

James Jones and Trevor Bukstein will share the GM duties on an interim basis for the Suns. Jones is the team's vice president of basketball operations and Bukstein was assistant GM under McDonough, who had been in Phoenix since 2013 and was under contract through 2020.

Suns owner Robert Sarver said in a statement announcing the firing that he made the decision "after much thought and a long evaluation of our basketball operations."

The Suns took Deandre Ayton with the No. 1 overall pick in this year's draft and gave Devin Booker a \$158 million extension during the offseason. Phoenix has had four straight losing seasons and no playoff berth since 2010.

SAN ANTONIO Spurs setback: PG Murray lost to torn ACL

Dejounte Murray was driving past James Harden and on his way to the basket, showing one of the skills that made the San Antonio Spurs convinced he's the right point guard for their team.

And then Murray's knee gave out.

In an instant, the entire trajectory of the Spurs' season might have changed.

Murray's season is almost certainly over, after the Spurs learned Monday that their starting point guard has a torn ACL in his right knee. The team hasn't revealed when Murray will have surgery, nor has it determined a timetable for his return, but ACL reconstruction and rehabilitation is a process that typically takes around a full year.

LAUSANNE, SWITZERLAND CAS: Contamination caused Olympic doping

The Court of Arbitration for Sport has lifted a provisional ban imposed on one of the two Russian athletes who tested positive for doping at the Pyeongchang Olympics.


CAS said Monday that a contaminated product caused bobsled driver Nadezhda Sergeeva's positive test for trimetazidine in South Korea in February.

The CAS anti-doping panel created for the 2018 Games had disqualified Sergeeva from her 12th-place finish.

Sergeeva's case with the panel continues, but any final sanction can be reduced to take into account the seven-month provisional ban she already served.

In April, a Russian federal medical official said "organizational fecklessness" led to Sergeeva's mother, a doctor, giving her unapproved heart medicine containing trimetazidine.



A game of feet

Heroes and villains among NFL placekickers in Week 5

NEW YORK — Some teams can't kick about their kickers. Others might want to kick them off the roster after this weekend.

With the rare exceptions of Indianapolis' Adam Vinatieri and Baltimore's Justin Tucker, there aren't any placekickers whose place in Canton, Ohio, is a topic of discussion. Even Vinatieri and Tucker missed kicks in Week 5.

For every hero with his soccer-style boots, there are flops. Graham Gano nails a career-best 63-yarder to lift Carolina past the Giants — tied for second-longest field goal in NFL history — and Greg Joseph sends a flutterball through the uprights to give Cleveland a 12-10 win over Baltimore. Meanwhile, Mason Crosby has the worst Sunday of his 12-year career with four botched field goals and a missed extra point in a 31-23 loss at Detroit.

Want more? Maybe not, but here goes:

- Chris Boswell missed the extra point after the Steelers' first touchdown, the third he's missed this season. Boswell missed three in his previous three seasons with Pittsburgh.

- Caleb Sturgis' PAT attempt after one Chargers touchdown bounced off the upright for his fourth miss of the season and third in the past two games. The sixth-year kicker has equaled the amount he had over three seasons in Philadelphia from 2015-17.

"The extra point did bother me a little bit, but

we'll figure out what happened there," Chargers coach Anthony Lynn said. "He's been kicking with a lot of confidence, so I'm not concerned about it."

- The Browns' Joseph clanked an extra point off the right upright, the third extra point missed by Cleveland this season. The rookie then pulled a 55-yard field goal left for the win with 5 seconds left in regulation before connecting in OT.

- Tucker, the most accurate kicker in NFL history, had a 48-yard field goal attempt blocked by Cleveland rookie Denzel Ward on the final play of the first half. He made three kicks, however, proving he's still the league's most reliable.

- Detroit's Matt Prater missed a 55-yard field goal, badly, sending the football way right. But the strong-legged Prater is one of the best long-range kickers around and holds the record with a 64-yarder for Denver in 2013.

- Cincinnati kicker Randy Bullock had a 37-yard field goal try blocked by Vincent Taylor of Miami in the second quarter. The Bengals still rallied from a 17-0 hole to win.

- Cairo Santos of the Rams had a chance to tie the score at 31 in Seattle but missed a fourth-quarter extra point. He got a chance to redeem himself and did on a 39-yard field goal for the winning points.

- This one is not kicker Stephen Hauschka's fault, and he was being celebrated later with a 46-yard field goal to lift Buffalo past Tennessee. But it was an

example of the weird day kicking teams were having.

The Bills botched a field goal late in the first half — either it was a blown fake or an issue getting the ball down for the kick. Holder Corey Bojorquez stood up after taking the snap and tried a short pass back to Hauschka under pressure from Brynden Trawick of the Titans.

- Not to ignore the punters, Atlanta's Matt Bosher had a kick blocked late in the third quarter when Pittsburgh's Roosevelt Nix bulldozed in.

Clearly, the most forgettable performance came from Crosby, who was crushed by it.

"I don't get this much attention unless it's really bad or extremely good," he said. "This one is unfortunately really bad. I'm going to have to really look at this one and this one hurts a bunch. I left a lot of points on the field for this team."

"I look back and I'm thinking, in my childhood, in high school, this is definitely one of the worst ones and I'm bummed about that."

What really bums out fans is when coaches play for the field goal. It's far worse in college, where the dependability of placekickers is shakier than Crosby was Sunday indoors at Detroit.

But it infiltrates the NFL, too. And when the kickers flop consistently, they lose their jobs.

And like Hauschka and Santos and Sturgis and Bullcock, they somehow pop up elsewhere. Until they start missing again.

Too much SEC? 8 is more than enough

The college football fans who are convinced there is bias for the Southeastern Conference in The Associated Press college football poll have a lot to complain about this week.

The SEC placed a season-high eight teams in the Top 25 released Sunday, including the only three ranked teams that have lost twice.

Maybe the haters have a point?

No. 21 Auburn has been slogging along offensively all season and dropped to 4-2 after losing at Mississippi State on Saturday night. The Bulldogs snapped a two-game losing streak against the Tigers and landed at No. 24 in the new rankings.

Texas A&M (4-2) re-entered the rankings after a 20-14 victory at home against previously unbeaten Kentucky in another grinder of a game. The Wildcats slipped five spots to No. 18. No. 14 Florida jumped eight spots for beating LSU, which slipped from No. 5 to No. 13.

Meanwhile, other teams such as Stanford, Oklahoma State and Virginia Tech, slipped all the way out of the rankings Sunday after a second loss. TCU, which has lost only to Ohio State and Texas, is buried in the others receiving votes.

Iowa (4-1) was first out of the Top 25. Washington State (5-1) is not even close.

The Crimson Tide is allowing 4.9 yards per play, which is 28th in the nation and would be the worst mark for the Tide's defense since 2007.

The defending World Series champions advanced to the AL Championship Series for the second straight year — with surprising ease — by completing a division-round sweep of Cleveland on Monday with an 11-3 lashing in Game 3 helped by two key throwing errors from Indians reliever Trevor Bauer.

"No one takes anything for granted here," Verlander said. "That's the DNA of the guys in this clubhouse. This team has a propensity to do big things in big spots. This is an atmosphere that breeds winning."

"We have the most complete team in baseball."

Marwin Gonzalez hit a two-run double off Bauer in a three-run seventh inning, and the Astros scored 10 runs in their final three at-bats to turn a series that was supposed to be competitive into a complete rout.

"We're the reigning world champs, and we really have a good ability to show up for the day," Houston manager A.J. Hinch said. "So proud of our guys, the work they put into the winter. It was a short winter for us. As you can see, our guys are pretty hungry to

NLDS: Machado, Dodgers finish off Baby Braves

ATLANTA — When the Los Angeles Dodgers bolstered their already power-packed lineup with slugging shortstop Manny Machado, this is just what they had in mind.

Plenty of long balls. Another deep run in the postseason.

Next stop, the NL Championship Series for the third year in a row.

Machado drove in four runs — three of them with a seventh-inning shot into the left-field seats — and the Dodgers finished off the Atlanta Braves with a 6-2 victory Monday in the NL Division Series.

Los Angeles took the best-of-five series 3-1 and advanced to face the Brewers. Game 1 is Friday night in Milwaukee.

Coming off a tense victory in Game 3, the Baby Braves grabbed the lead on pinch-hitter Kurt Suzuki's two-run single in the fourth.

But David Freese, the 2011 World Series MVP with St. Louis, came through again in the postseason. He delivered a pinch-hit single of his own in the sixth off Jonny Venters (0-1), driving home Cody Bellinger and Yasiel Puig for a 3-2 lead with a grounder past backup shortstop Charlie Culberson after Atlanta allowed Puig to steal second uncontested.

Machado finished off Atlanta in the seventh, launching a 1-2 pitch from rookie Chad Sobotka over the Dodgers' bullpen — his team's eighth homer of the series. A free-agent-to-be acquired from Baltimore in July, Machado also had a run-scoring double in the first.

does have the personality to draw new fans. When Hollywood sends a young starlet to the race track to promote a project, NASCAR does its best to get a meet-and-greet with Blaney because he's current and capable of engaging in a topical conversation.

NASCAR has a slew of Blaneys and Elliotts — there is Daytona 500 winner Austin Dillon, his younger brother, Ty, Kyle Larson, and Bubba Wallace, the only

black driver at NASCAR's top level. Consecutive wins the last two weeks from two of them has simply underscored the pressure the series has to make these drivers relevant.

The first step is to get the drivers in front of the public. NASCAR hasn't done a great job the last few years of forcing its drivers in front of the media on a weekly basis, which is the only way to build familiarity. The drivers also need to relate, somehow, to both existing fans and potential fans.

Some of the drivers, including Blaney, have made a point recently to pick a child from the stands as the

recipient of the checkered flag. When Blaney won two races ago at Charlotte, he gave the flag to a little boy in Kyle Busch gear. The next day, the father brought his son to the Team Penske shop, where the boy not only got a T-shirt of his new favorite driver but but they got to meet Blaney and pose for pictures, too.

The day before Blaney's victory, 17-year-old Hailie Deegan became the first woman to win a NASCAR K&N West Series race with a bump-and-run move on her own teammate. She earned a bright yellow trophy in the shape of a water tower that weighed about 50 pounds

and it immediately became her most prized possession.

The trophy went with her the day after her victory — on a pair of commercial flights, shoved under the seats in front of her. Her victory celebration was a long day of travel to get to North Carolina to promote the win.

Deegan was feted all over the NASCAR community and wrapped up her time with a stop in the studio at Fox Sports 1. As she was leaving the studio in her rental car, she captured for her social media followers a helicopter landing with another NASCAR driver arriving for his studio appearance. With a

laugh, Deegan praised her Toyota Camry rental car.

Fans can't relate to the many NASCAR stars because they stopped being blue collar as soon as they bought million-dollar motorhomes to give them a haven away from the public at the tracks. Then they got private planes to get out of the track as soon as possible.

NASCAR needs to reshape the image of a successful race car driver and make the fans care about them once again. The first step is turning them loose for the public with the expectation that the drivers start working a little bit harder to sell themselves as the future of the sport.

Stoops had been defensive coordinator since 2012, when his brother, former Sooners

coach Bob Stoops, hired him. It was Mike Stoops' second stint working as an assistant for his brother. Before serving as Arizona's head coach from 2004-11, he was co-defensive coordinator for Oklahoma and his brother from 1999-2003.

The Sooners have struggled defensively the last two seasons, finishing 80th in 2016 and 82nd in 2017 in the country in yards per play allowed. Oklahoma is 17-3 under second-year coach Lincoln Riley and the Sooners have scored an average of 41 points in those games, including a 54-48 loss to Georgia in the College Football Playoff semifinal at the Rose Bowl last season.

ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

Following a one-no-trump opening call, what do transfer breaks mean after a red-suit transfer? Some use the jump to three as a maximum with four trumps, and a call of two no-trump as three good trumps and a maximum. Additionally, though, new suits can be used to show a source of tricks (or a doubleton, if you prefer). Regardless, you'd expect South to play in four spades here.

After the diamond queen is led to the king and ace, the defenders have two choices, each producing an elegant winning line for declarer.

Say East continues with a second diamond. Then, when West wins and shifts to a spade, declarer draws trumps and plays the club king, a club to the ace and a third club. If East follows, declarer puts in the 10 and claims 10 tricks, because if West wins, he is endplayed to concede a ruff-sluff or to lead a heart into the tenace, and declarer can discard a heart from dummy on the master club. If East shows out on the third club, declarer takes the queen and leads a fourth club, discarding from dummy to endplay West again.

What if East shifts to a heart at trick two? Declarer takes the ace, draws trumps, ruffs out the clubs, if necessary, then leads his second diamond from hand, to endplay West in a different way.

East's best defense at trick two is to lead the diamond nine. If the 10 and eight were switched, East could retain the lead and exit in either hearts or clubs to have a chance to defeat the game.

ANSWER: North is unlikely to have even as much as the doubleton ace in spades. Since he did not rebid his clubs initially, he might have given preference to spades at his third turn if he could. You have a choice of forcing calls in the red suits to probe: Three diamonds looks best. You can revert to five clubs if partner raises, but you do not want to suggest half a heart stopper, as a call of three hearts might do.
