## President visits Panhandle

LYNN HAVEN — President Donald Trump and first lady Melania Trump both got a bird's-eye and ground-level view Monday of the havoc wreaked by Hurricane Michael as it smashed across the Northeast Florida Panhandle and into Georgia last week.

Along with Florida Gov. Rick Scott, Federal Emergency Management Association officials and Mayor Margo Anderson, the Trumps toured a neighborhood in the hard-hit town of Lynn Haven, where the damaged roofs of many homes were covered with blue tarps. The scent of pine sap from broken trees still filled the air.

"To see this personally ... total devastation," Trump said as he walked through a residential area along 7th Street.

The storm cut a damaging swath through that section of residential Lynn Haven, where snapped power poles and downed power lines lay along the streets among limbs and vegetation blown off trees by Hurricane Michael, which made

landfall Wednesday along the northeastern Gulf Coast.

"It was almost like a giant tornado — a really wide tornado," the president said in describing the hurricane.

Among the people the Trumps and Scott visited Monday during their quick tour was Michael Rollins, a white-haired gentleman who rode out the storm with his pets. Standing in front of

his house, its roof covered with blue plastic, Rollins spent several minutes talking with Trump and the other officials who toured the neighborhood.

At one point, Rollins told Trump about the tree that narrowly missed his home when it fell.

"It just about got it," Trump said.

Rollins told the Trumps,

Scott and the FEMA workers that the city's response to the hurricane has been heartwarming.

"The whole community has come together," he said.

The Trumps arrived at Northwest Florida Beaches International Airport in Panama City on Marine One, the presidential helicopter,

## Michael lays bare weaker building codes

Panhandle lags behind rest of state

TALLAHASSEE — Unlike in South Florida, homes in the state's Panhandle did not have tighter building codes until just 11 years ago; it was once argued that acres of forests would provide the region with a natural barrier against the savage winds of a hurricane.

Many of those structures did not withstand the fury of Hurricane Michael, which slammed into the area last week with winds of up to 155 mph, leaving acres of flattened houses and other buildings in its wake before roaring across the Georgia border inland.

"We're learning painfully

shortly before noon Monday, accompanied by three Marine Corps MV-22 tilt-rotor aircraft loaded with representatives of the national media. The president and first lady initially arrived in the area aboard Air Force One, the presidential jet, which landed at Eglin Air Force Base in Fort Walton Beach shortly after 10 a.m.

Awaiting the president's arrival on the tarmac at the Panama City airport were Mexico Beach Mayor Al Cathey and Panama City Mayor Greg Brudnicki, both of whom lead cities heavily damaged by Hurricane Michael. National media representatives flew over Mexico Beach before landing at the airport.

After a 20-minute motorcade from the Panama City airport to Lynn Haven, the Trumps spent about 40 minutes in the town before returning to the airport and boarding Marine One bound for a similar tour somewhere in Georgia, where Hurricane Michael also caused considerable damage. The route from the airport to Lynn Haven provided a hint of the extent of damage later seen in the city. All along the motorcade route, uprooted and snapped trees lined the roadway, and at least two utility crews were working to restore electrical power.

After visiting residents at their homes, the Trumps toured an aid distribution center in Lynn Haven where local volunteers were cooking meals and handing out water. Parked amid the tents pitched across the in-town parking lot was a FEMA vehicle, outside of which sat a number of FEMA personnel, speaking individually with victims of the hurricane.

"These are the people that make it work, and they make it work beautifully," Trump said, gesturing toward the FEMA personnel.

Asked during his tour of Lynn Haven to compare Hurricane Michael with other recent hurricanes, Trump suggested it was the worst in recent memory.

"Look behind you," he said, gesturing to the heaps of fallen trees and snapped power lines surrounding the impromptu distribution center. "This is incredible."

Assessing the federal response to Hurricane Michael thus far, Trump

gave high marks to his administration.

"We're doing a lot ... more than anybody would have ever done," he said.

After meeting briefly with the FEMA personnel, Trump rounded the corner at the front of the vehicle, and the hundreds of people visiting the impromptu distribution center broke into cheers and applause. Trump and the

first lady spent a few minutes handing out bottles of water as dozens of people, with cell phones held high, worked to get a memento of the day the president came to town.

Throughout the

president's trip into and out of Lynn Haven, people at intersections blocked for the motorcade, and elsewhere along the route, stood cheering and waving as the president passed by.

Trump left Lynn Haven

with an optimistic thought, saying he expected that it wouldn't take long for people to start rebuilding their homes, businesses and lives.

"Thirty days, you won't even recognize it," he said.

# Experts: Hurricane Michael failed to end red tide in gulf

MIAMI BEACH — Hurricane Michael failed to break up a patchy and toxic algae bloom that has lingered in the Gulf of Mexico off Florida's shoreline for the last year, experts said Monday, meaning the red tide outbreak could continue to cause problems in the weeks ahead.


Hurricanes can break up algae blooms, but they also drop fresh water and increase nutrient-rich runoff from land, which can make them worse, said Robert Weisberg, a professor of physical oceanography at the University of South Florida.

Michael blew red tide at the water's surface into shore, but deep ocean currents that have been feeding the bloom since the summer also have persisted, he said.

"The factors that contributed to red tide outweighed the ones that would reduce it," Weisberg said.

The red tide began last October off southwest Florida after Hurricane Irma swept up the state, killing massive numbers of fish, along with scores of sea turtles and the state's beloved manatees.

The bloom also causes

respiratory irritations in people which, coupled with the stench of rotting marine life, sent many tourists inland away from the beaches, seaside attractions and restaurants with outdoor seating.

The bloom then seemed to spread up the Gulf coast into Florida's Panhandle over the summer,

and finally around the Miami area on the east coast earlier this month.

By late last week, the red tide appeared to have faded along most of Florida's beaches, according to data from the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

However, the algae was found in high concentrations off some Tampa

Bay-area beaches, along with dead fish.

Satellite imagery showed an "anomaly" in the waters off the Panhandle, where Michael made landfall Wednesday, and off the southwest coast, said Tracy Fanara, a program manager for environmental health at Mote Marine Laboratory in Sarasota.

Water samples this week likely will confirm red tide in those areas, she said. Whether fish kills or respiratory problems follow on those shores depends on which way the wind blows.

"On the southwest coast, we didn't get much wind or rain onshore from Michael, but offshore it wasn't enough

to dissipate the bloom," she said.

Red tide is caused by an organism called *Karenia brevis*, which occurs naturally in the waters off Florida. Blooms regularly occur off the state's Gulf coast, but they are rare on Florida's Atlantic side. In an average year, a red tide may bloom in the fall and run its course through the winter months.

The effects of the current bloom have varied from week to week, and not every beach has been hit. But in August, it stretched over 150 miles (240 kilometers) along Florida's Gulf coast, and it appeared to intensify after Tropical Storm Gordon plowed across the Gulf in early September, according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

NOAA researchers have called this red tide "unusually persistent."

"Hurricanes in the past have not caused the blooms to dissipate, though the number of cases where blooms and hurricanes occurred at the same time is small so we will be watching to see what effects Hurricane Michael has on the current bloom," NOAA spokesman Jerry Slaff said in an email Monday.

## No cellphones, no gas, no end to misery

PANAMA CITY — Residents of hurricane-ravaged communities in Florida's Panhandle turned to volunteers and each other for help Monday, the fifth day without cell service, electricity or, in many cases, shelter.

Trevor Lewis, a member of a six-person search-and-rescue unit, said he watched storm victims "cry out in joy" when his team let them use their cellphones to contact loved ones for the first time in days.

"The amount of stress that people are in, not just from losing everything, but not having phones, power, food, water, puts a huge toll on the emotional factor of people stuck in these houses," Lewis said. "And it really ups the ante a whole lot more."

As President Donald Trump visited the devastated zone, the death toll from Michael's march from Florida to Virginia stood at 17, with just one confirmed death so far in Mexico Beach, a town of about 1,000 people that was nearly wiped off the map in a direct hit from the hurricane and its 155 mph winds last week.

City Clerk Adrian Welle told local media that 46 people in Mexico Beach were still unaccounted for. That number had previously been 285, but officials think many left right before the storm hit.

Trump took a helicopter tour over Mexico Beach and also saw the badly damaged Tyndall Air Force base. After landing in Panama City,

he visited Lynn Haven, another hard-hit city.

Across the stricken Panhandle, nerves were frayed as storm victims confronted shortages of gas and other supplies.

Limon Wilson sat for an hour with his car parked at a gas pump with no fuel outside hard-hit Panama City. His home in the city was badly damaged, with a tree through the roof. He was trying to find shelter for his four children and other family members.

"We've been trying to rough it at home for the last few days. But it's hot," Wilson said as his 8-month-old daughter sat on his knee.

As of Sunday, more than 190,000 homes and businesses in Florida were without electricity, along with about 120,000 in Georgia.

It was unclear how many people were missing. Because of widespread cellphone outages, authorities said some people who are safe may not be able to let friends or loved ones know.

A Houston-based organization called CrowdSource Rescue

that takes calls from worried family members and sends the details to rescue crews on the ground said it has helped find nearly 1,500 people since Michael struck. But co-founder Matthew Marchetti said it was still looking for more than 1,350 in the hurricane-affected area.

Lewis was part of a team that spent days doing more than 100 wellness checks on people reported missing by family members in Lynn Haven.

"Just the desperation in the family members' voices that hadn't contacted their loved one for a few days was bad," he said. "Then we get on scene and find their family members and they have no food, no water, no power."

Lewis' crew, the self-funded group Salty Water Rescue Services, which is made up of local law enforcement and fire rescue officials from Cocoa Beach, found a woman in her 80s who had no food and just a few bottles of water left. They evacuated her and put her on the phone with a family member.

that we shouldn't be doing those kinds of exemptions," said Don Brown, a former legislator from the Panhandle who now sits on the Florida Building Commission. "We are vulnerable as any other part of the state. There was this whole notion that the trees were going to help us, take the wind out of the storm. Those trees become projectiles and flying objects."

Hurricane Andrew a generation ago razed Florida's most-populated areas with winds up to 165 mph, damaging or blowing apart more than 125,000 homes and obliterating almost all mobile homes in its path. The acres of flattened homes showed how contractors cut corners amid the patchwork of codes Florida had at the time. For example, flimsy particle board was used under roofs instead of sturdier plywood, and staples were used instead of roofing nails.

Since 2001, structures statewide must be built to withstand winds of 111 mph and up; the Miami area is considered a "high velocity hurricane zone" with much higher standards, requiring many structures to withstand hurricane winds in excess of 170 mph.

Though Michael's winds were particularly fierce, any boost in the level of safety requirements for builders could help homes better withstand hurricanes.

Tom Lee, a home-builder and legislator, says past hurricanes have shown time and time

again that the stricter codes help. He said after such previous storms, he could see during flyovers which homes were built before the new code.

"The structural integrity of our housing stock is leaps and bounds beyond what it was," Lee said.

The codes call for shatterproof windows, fortified roofs and reinforced concrete pillars, among other specifications. But it wasn't until 2007 that homes built in the Panhandle more than 1 mile (1.5 kilometers) from shore were required to follow the higher standards. Hurricane Michael pummeled the region with devastating winds from the sea all the way into Georgia, destroying buildings more than 70 miles from the shoreline.

Gov. Rick Scott said it may be time for Florida to boost its standards — considered the toughest in the nation — even further.

"After every event, you always go back and look what you can do better," Scott said. "After Andrew, the codes changed dramatically in our state. Every time something like this happens, you have to say to

yourself, 'Is there something we can do better?'"

Mexico Beach, the Gulf Coast town destroyed by Michael, lacked a lot of new or retrofitted construction, said Craig Fugate, the former director of the Florida Emergency Management Agency and a former emergency management chief for the state of Florida. The small seaside community had a lot of older mobile homes and low-income year-round residents working in the commercial fishing and service industries.

"Quiet, idyllic, what I call 'Old Florida,'" Fugate said. "This is not a bunch of high rises or brand new developments."

Bill Herrle, who owned a house near the shoreline in Mexico Beach until it was destroyed by the storm, said he wasn't sure it made a difference when the homes there were built. He said the storm took out his house, built in the mid-'80s, as well as newer buildings put up recently.

"It wiped out both the older and newer homes. It looks like my entire street is razed," said Herrle, who was not in Mexico Beach during the storm.



### PANAMA CITY BEACH Gulf Power: Panama City Beach power restored

Gulf Power announced Monday that more than 95 percent of customers in Panama City Beach east of State 79 to the Hathaway Bridge have been restored 18 hours before estimated restoration time.

This brings the total number of customers who have been restored since Hurricane Michael’s landfall on Wednesday to about 62,000. Work continues around the clock as crews repair and rebuild the electric infrastructure in the areas severely affected by Hurricane Michael.

### GULF COUNTY St. Joe Gas shuts down for first responders’ safety

St. Joe Gas Company shut down its entire gas system Friday in Gulf County so first responders could go door-to-door without having to worry about gas leaks.

Gas employees from St. Joe Natural Gas Company and others from as far as Miami are working now to restore gas service in all areas, according to a press release from Gulf County. The county is urging residents to not tamper with any gas lines or attempt to restore service.

Those who see a gas company vehicle can flag it down and report a problem. The company has limited phone and internet service, the press

# Police warn looters

PANAMA CITY — In some of the hardest hit areas of Bay County, armed robbery is becoming a rampant problem.

Communication challenges between the departments is making it near impossible to provide exact arrest numbers, but officials with both the Panama City Police Department and Bay County Sheriff’s Office confirmed arrested have been made.

“The east side of town is just getting heavily inundated with looting,

crime,” said Panama City Lt. John Morris. “We are in a state of emergency, and we have people that are going out there trying to take advantage of the situation and it’s ridiculous to be honest with you.”

Reports range from people stealing boxes of cigarettes or breaking into homes to rob people at gunpoint to potential shootings in Lynn Haven, Springfield and Panama City Beach.

To control the situation, law enforcement officers are pouring in from all over the state to help with patrolling, doubling and tripling up

in vehicle.

Panama City, for example, currently has units from Pensacola, Gainesville, Gulf Breeze and Fort Walton working with them and expects to be getting additional units for Miami soon, Morris said.

Panama City has taken a zero tolerance approach toward looting.

“We, at the police department, are going to take you to jail,” Morris said. “And you’re going to sit in jail, because right now the court system isn’t working well so you’re going to sit in jail and you’re going to sit in jail for awhile.”

# Panama City Port to partially open by end of week

PANAMA CITY — As it continues to wait for word from some employees after Hurricane Michael, Port Panama City expects to start providing limited service by the end of the week, port Director Wayne Stubbs said in a statement released Monday.

was restored Saturday, and internet service is expected to be up by Tuesday. Meanwhile Monday, Gulf Power said electricity has been restored for more than 95 percent of customers in Panama City Beach. The utility is continuing to gradually restore power in other parts of its service area.







## Warren DNA analysis points to Native American heritage

BOSTON — Sen. Elizabeth Warren on Monday released the results of a DNA analysis that she said indicated she has some Native American heritage, a direct rebuttal to President Donald Trump, who has long mocked her ancestral claims and repeatedly referred to her

as “Pocahontas.” The Massachusetts Democrat and potential 2020 presidential contender challenged Trump to make good on his pledge to donate \$1 million to charity if she provided proof of Native American heritage, a moment that was caught on video. Trump falsely denied ever making the offer.

The analysis was done by Stanford University professor Carlos D. Bustamante, a prominent expert in the field. He concluded that the great majority of Warren’s ancestry is European but added that the results “strongly support” the existence of a Native American ancestor. In his report, Bustamante said he analyzed

Warren’s sample without knowing the identity of the donor. He concluded that Warren has a pure Native American ancestor who probably lived six to 10 generations ago, and that it was impossible to determine the individual’s tribal connection. Warren, who has said her Native American roots were part of “family lore,” also released a video produced by her Senate re-election campaign. In it, she said: “The president likes to call my mom a liar. What do the facts say?”

Bustamante replied: “The facts suggest that you absolutely have Native American ancestry in your pedigree.” The analysis is not the first evidence of Warren’s heritage. An 1894 document previously unearthed by the New England Genealogical Society suggested Warren’s great-great-

great-grandmother, O.C. Sarah Smith, was at least partially Native American, making the senator as much as 1/32nd Native American. The genealogy group has said it has no conclusive evidence of her ancestry, and a spokesman said Monday it would not comment on the genetic findings.

If Warren’s ancestor were six generations removed, she would be 1/64th Native American. But if her ancestor had been as much as 10 generations removed, that would make the individual a great-great-great-great-great-grandparent and render Warren only 1/1,024th Native American, according to Blaine Bettinger, a genealogist and author who specializes in DNA evidence.

Such a finding could potentially further excite Warren’s critics instead of placating them. Warren’s effort to address questions about her ancestry and the release of the video are her latest moves telegraphing a likely presidential run in 2020. During the summer, she also released a decade’s worth of tax returns, drawing a contrast with Trump’s unwillingness to release his own tax documents. The moves seem to anticipate the type of criticism she might face against opponents in a Democratic primary or in a possible general election matchup against Trump.

## General: 'Tyndall is coming back'

The 93 airmen who rode out Hurricane Michael at Tyndall Air Force Base came away unharmed, according to U.S. Air Force leadership, who commended them for their service in the face of an unprecedented natural disaster.

Standing amid the ruins of the hurricane-ravaged base on Sunday, where some of the U.S. military's most advanced weaponry is housed, Heather Wilson, secretary of the United States Air Force, declared all missions have been "stood down" and resources were

being allocated to rebuild the airfield, which is home to the 325th Fighter Wing and a squadron of F-22 stealth fighters.

A special operations team re-opened the airfield's runway immediately after the storm.

"I want to reinforce the point that our ability as an Air Force to defend the nation and to do our job has not been impacted by this storm," said Gen. Dave Goldfein, the chief of staff of the Air Force. "Now we are focused on the airmen, their families, to making sure we get operations back up and running."

The evacuation of 11,000 airmen and their families,

and all airworthy aircraft, occurred over 48 hours, from when Michael became a tropical storm to a Category 4 hurricane at landfall midday Wednesday.

In that time, Tyndall Commander Col. Brian Laidlow had to marshal his forces and get his leadership in place to move personnel and equipment out of harm's way.

"When he gave the order they knew how to execute," Goldfein touted. "Their execution was excellent."

But those airmen no longer can return to the base because it is unsafe. Civilian workers have been placed on

### First Baptist holds first service after Michael

PANAMA CITY — There was no pulpit, no hymnals and no pews when the congregation of First Baptist Church of Panama City gathered Sunday to worship for the first time since Hurricane Michael. The hurricane had stripped it all away.

But faith endured. Not knowing for sure what would be there, 200 people made their way to the church at the heart of the city at 10:15 a.m. Sunday, the church's normal start time, to give thanks for what they had and pray for those in need.

"It's good to see you," said Senior Pastor Dr. Craig Conner to a round of applause while standing on the back of a pickup truck.

Then, they picked the one hymn everyone would know — Amazing Grace — and looked for guidance to begin rebuilding.

Currently, Regency DRT (Disaster Response Team) is drying out First Baptist's facility, which the church is still referring to as their "new" auditorium. Mark Broersma, owner of Regency DRT and a member of the church,

## Help is available in areas ravaged

State and federal government officials are stepping up to help Panama City-area residents affected by Hurricane Michael with insurance claims and emergency housing.

Florida Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis announced Monday that his office's Division of Consumer Services will, in conjunction with FEMA, open an insurance village to assist area residents with storm-related claims.

The insurance village will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Friday in the parking lot of the Sam's Club at 1707 W. 23rd St. in Panama City and as of Monday 24 insurance companies will be represented.

"With thousands still without electricity, and communications systems mostly nonexistent, people can come to this insurance village to get the answers they need to begin the rebuilding process," Patronis said in a news release.

Claimants will need to provide a driver's license or other form of identification, insurance cards and insurance policy information/documentation, pictures or documentation of the property being claimed as a loss from Hurricane Michael and any additional insurance-related information readily accessible.

# Michael brings neighborhood closer together

PANAMA CITY — In the 10 years that 89-year-old Bill Turner lived in the 1600 block of Billings Avenue, he never met many neighbors. He partially blames himself for not getting to know his neighbors.

He knows them now. Turner said local children came to clean his house after the seven holes formed in the roof. Other neighbors are dropping off food and water daily and checking on the elderly man who rode out Hurricane Michael in his living room.

“Never had I dreamed,” said Turner, who didn’t think the storm would be bad. “They’re always telling us it’s bad — this one was bad. I had a lovely carport. In the middle of the storm I looked out the window and a big huff came along. All of a sudden I saw my carport rise.”

The steel wreckage flew over his house and landed in his front yard behind the remnants of the white picket fence that raced his front yard.

“You want to cry,” Turner said. “That doesn’t do any good. I don’t have the money to put up another carport. I guess I’m going to let the fence go too.”

The one thing Turner is happy about are the visitors.

“Lovely people have been stopping by and dropping off extra things for me to eat,” he said. “I’m meeting all kinds of lovely people. ... Teenagers, I call them youngsters. They came over and ran inside and cleaned up my floor. I didn’t want them to do it because I was worried they could get hurt. I was walking through it and I almost fell over. You forget there are wonderful people in the world with all the lying and cheating.”

A block away, Gayle

Johns and Cheryl King said their street was cleared of tree debris earlier Sunday, which allowed them to drive out for water and supplies. They distribute them to neighbors, many elderly, who can’t leave. Johns said by the time she realized Michael would rake the city with 155 mph winds, it was too late to leave.

“The rain was starting to come in through the porch,” said Johns, who took a short video from the porch as trees fell around here.

King said they prepared the bathroom as an emergency shelter, but did not use it. She described the time it took for the storm to pass as “gut-wrenching.”

“Your stomach it was just, you don’t know what’s falling, where it’s going to land or where the wind is going to go,” she said.

Johns said tensions are rising throughout the city, but her neighborhood has been civil. She goes out several times a day to get sea water to flush toilets and gather drinking water to share.

Carl Rudder lives next to Johns and King and is acting as the neighborhood chef, grilling turkey and fish for hot meals. He is one of the few homeowners on his street and a retired Navy field corpsman.

Three weeks ago his homeowners insurance was canceled because asbestos was discovered in his house.

“All these homes used to be all the old shipyard houses built out of pine and asbestos,” Rudder said. “These are the strongest houses in Bay County.”

Rudder’s house had some roof damage, but came through the storm without significant damage.

“The good lord was on my side,” Rudder said. “I was in their praying. I had the best insurance.”

administrative leave with pay and benefits.

Goldfein said the “good news” is the Air Force has survived major storm damage before — Hurricane Hugo at Shaw Air Force Base in 1989

and Hurricane Andrew at Homestead Air Force Base in 1992.

Homestead was destroyed, and rebuilt.

“The base is coming back,” Goldfein said of Tyndall.

Morale was high among the airmen who rode out the storm, according to Wilson, who said they were asked if there was

something they needed to make their stay more comfortable.

“Here are airmen who have been here riding out the storm, many haven’t had a hot shower since before the storm hit,” Wilson said.

“Not a single one of them could think of anything they needed. That’s America’s Air Force.

I’m proud to be serving alongside of them.”

Wilson, Goldfein, and Chief Master Sgt. Kaleth Wright inspected the base Sunday afternoon.

They were able to visually inspect the aircraft and equipment left behind, but would not say whether they were damaged.

Goldfein said the

“highly-sophisticated” planes needed to be powered up to determine whether they were damaged.

Almost all of the structures on the base had roof damage, according to Wright, who said civil engineers would be brought in to take a look at the facilities.

“We’ve got civil

engineering operations here now,” Wright said. “We’ve got command and control back up now. We have security in here from Moody Air Force Base. The wing commander asked for additional support from outside, extra maintenance; he’ll get what he needs to get things going again.”

said the damage to the sanctuary is “not catastrophic, but significant.”

“We’re hoping to have the auditorium usable in two to three weeks,” he said.

He also is hoping to have the facility day care open about the same time, which will help care for the children of local families and will help get people back to work.

Church officials have been encouraging their congregation to register as “safe” with the Red Cross website and to use

Facebook as a means of communication.

This is the opportunity, Conner said he believes, for the congregation to help the physical needs of the community by providing water, food and yard help.

During the service, he compared the fear of the storm to that of Jesus’ disciples without their leader.

Conner said he wants people to understand that it is OK to feel depressed but it is not OK to remain that way.

“It doesn’t do us any good to deny reality. We need to deal with reality,” he said. “I want them to understand it’s OK to be consciously anxious, but not gripped by fear.”

Insurance Company. Gov. Rick Scott also announced Monday that FEMA had approved transitional sheltering assistance for families in Bay County.

“TSA provides FEMA funded short-term lodging in hotels and motels for eligible disaster survivors who are unable to return home for an extended period due

to disaster-related damages or inaccessibility of their communities,” a news release from Scott’s office said.

FEMA has begun notifying eligible families in Bay County about their sheltering options, the news release said. The agency can be reached at 1-800-621-FEMA (3362).

“Yesterday, I surveyed damage in Bay County, as well as Calhoun and Liberty counties, with FEMA Administrator Brock Long so he could see firsthand the damage and total loss suffered by our Gulf Coast and Panhandle communities,” Scott said in the release. “So many families

have lost everything and now, with FEMA approving Transitional Sheltering Assistance in Bay County, families will be able to begin to move into more comfortable sheltering accommodations and move forward in the recovery process.”

The governor’s office also announced Monday that about 700,000 gallons of fuel is staged to be distributed at 13 fueling stations to support restoration efforts and there currently are 82 fueling trucks being used to distribute fuel.

AT&T and Verizon have been working around the clock to restore cellphone services, the release said.

## ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

In this three no-trump contract, it might seem that declarer will come to either eight or 10 tricks, depending on how the clubs behave, since the defenders will be able to set up and cash spades if they can get in twice more.

After winning the first or second spade, leading a club to the king will need that suit to break 3-3, which happens only slightly more than a third of the time. Better odds are to lead to the nine — that succeeds whenever West has the club 10.

But here, South knows from the bidding that East has all the missing honors, and he can exploit this fact to give East an insoluble problem. After winning the spade lead in hand, he leads a low diamond to dummy's jack and advances the club nine.

If East rises with the ace (probably his best move in abstract), he establishes the clubs for declarer, as long as the latter holds the queen-jack. Even if South has only four clubs, three club tricks would see South home. Conversely, if East covers the nine with the 10, then South's queen wins. Now declarer abandons clubs and knocks out the heart ace as his route to nine tricks.

The Morton's Fork position is named after King Henry VII's Lord Chancellor, John Morton. His novel approach to fundraising was based on the hospitality his potential victims offered him. Should the fare be uninspiring, his host must have salted some money away and must therefore be able to spare some for the king. If his host was generous, he




