### Air Force spouse Alicia Barnett's hurricane relief effort goes viral

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CRESTVIEW — The first 980 packages were a surprise for Alicia Barnett. And things soon would get even more overwhelming.

Like many people, Barnett was struck by the devastation of Hurricane Michael. And, as an Air Force spouse, she was concerned about airmen and families dealing with the near-total destruction of Tyndall Air Force Base.

"If that had happened to my family, I would have wanted someone to ask what I needed," Barnett said. So, as a "Key Spouse" at Eglin Air

Force Base — an initiative that supports Air Force families — Barnett began monitoring social media and reaching out to see what Tyndall families needed.

Then, using Facebook's Key Spouse page — Barnett's husband is Staff Sgt. Benjamin Barnett, an Eglin airfield manager — Barnett got involved with the creation of gift registries at Target and Amazon. She arranged for deliveries to her home, with plans to distribute donations to Tyndall airmen and families in the immediate area.

"I was expecting a couple of people to donate," she said.

Then, Barnett got a call from the Post Office.

"They said, 'We have eight pallets for you,'" she said.

## Repair delays stress renters

Property maintenance staffs working around the clock to assess, repair damage from Hurricane Michael

PANAMA CITY — Panama City is a vacation spot for more than a thousand renters. Now, it's a logistical nightmare that has left hundreds waiting for answers on when damages to their temporary homes will be repaired.

Swendy Elder is a long-term renter who has been living in a Panama City home for more than a year. When she returned home after Hurricane Michael, she found the roof had been damaged, causing leaks into the master bedroom.

While she has power, Elder said she waited more than a week for a maintenance team to assess her home. She said she contacted the management company repeatedly, but while she waits, leaks caused by the damaged roof are causing mold.

"They're supposed to be managing the property for the owners and the renter, and I'm not getting any answers," Elder said.

Elder rents through Counts Oakes Resort Properties, an LSI Vacation Rentals company

## Domestic violence surges after Hurricane Michael

BAY COUNTY — On one night, a man took aim at his one-time romantic interest and her new boyfriend. On another, a man doused his sister-in-law with lighter fluid and attempted to set her ablaze.

In the two weeks in eastern Bay County since Hurricane Michael, the unprecedented storm has stirred up many ugly scenes of domestic violence. Numerous arrests and at least

one death have resulted in the community, already robust with domestic violence. And many dark cases might have yet to see the light of day.

"I think there are several we didn't have the ability to receive," said Bay County Sheriff's Office Investigator Amy Burkette. "Because of the lack of communications in those first days, there were even people with serious injuries we couldn't hear from. So, it's likely there are many more we don't know about."

Burkette, of the Domestic

Violence Unit, has been on the night patrol for the east side of Bay County since Hurricane Michael swept away the area's utility infrastructure. While water and cellphone service has been widely restored in the area, many homes have yet to receive power. And as a result of the combined conditions, domestic violence has spiked.

BCSO Lt. Koren Colbert, supervisor of the Domestic Violence Unit, said the crimes that ensue after a major disaster typically occur in phases. First come thefts of resources,

then come domestic violence and the final blow to the community comes in the form of scams. In the domestic calls officers have seen recently, conditions of lacking communication, running water and power have conspired with living in confined quarters with family members, Colbert said. "It's the stress," she said. "I also think that people think law enforcement is busy with other matters, so they may be more emboldened."

Drugs and alcohol often play a factor in the 250 arrests for

domestic violence the county averages each month. With the added factors, officers are seeing a month that should outpace that average.

In the most recent incident, Charles Bruner, 66, was arrested on charges of aggravated domestic battery, violation of a restraining order and attempted arson. Officials reported Bruner was at his brother's home Sunday night in eastern Bay County when he doused his sister-in-law with

# Almost every structure damaged on Tyndall

TYNDALL AIR FORCE BASE — Col. Brian Laidlaw has a satellite image on his cellphone showing the eye of Hurricane Michael making landfall. Peer deep into the left side of the eye and you can see two parallel lines. Those are his runways. You see some structures. Those are his hangars.

Somewhere in there on that Wednesday afternoon two weeks ago was the colonel himself, the commander of Tyndall Air Force Base. He rode out the storm along with 92 other personnel after thousands of people under his command had evacuated.

The hurricane peeled off the roof of Laidlaw's bunker. When the eye arrived and the winds calmed, everyone went outside to survey the damage, and they got a glimpse of blue sky. They retreated as the second eyewall approached. When they emerged again, just before sunset, they beheld total devastation.

Every structure on the base was damaged, its airplane hangars shredded and largely roofless.

While most of the base's 55 F-22 fighter jets were flown away in advance of the storm, some remained in those hangars because of maintenance issues. Air Force officials have declined to say how many remained, citing operational security, nor how damaged they might be.

Each F-22, known as the Raptor, is worth more than \$140 million. The planes are considered highly nimble at both supersonic and subsonic speeds, and keep a small radar signature that makes it difficult for adversaries to track. They were first used in combat against Islamic State ground targets in 2014, and flown at high altitudes over Syria because their advanced sensors could track Russian aircraft over the battlefield. The Raptors were all in hangars when the storm hit, but they likely suffered at least some surface damage, and that could impair their radar-deflecting technology.

Asked if he could he have done anything differently in advance of the hurricane to safeguard the elite stealth fighters, Laidlaw made clear that his highest priority was the safety of the people he commands.

"No one got killed and no one got hurt. You'll see what my base looks like. But my people are good," Laidlaw said as he drove around Tyndall in an SUV with a blown-out window. "I can fix things. I can't fix people."

The natural disaster has prompted some fears in Florida that the Air Force could shutter the base, which sits adjacent to badly damaged Panama City and along the same coastline as Mexico Beach, which was almost wiped from the map.

Lawmakers have sought assurances that the service will rebuild Tyndall,

a pillar of the region's economy and a significant Panhandle employer. Air Force officials have said that's their plan, drawing comparisons to Keesler Air Force Base in Biloxi, Mississippi, which was devastated during Hurricane Katrina in 2005 and did not fully recover for about five years.

Significant damage to Homestead Air Force Base in Florida during Hurricane Andrew in 1992 prompted the temporary transfer of aircraft squadrons to other bases. It was initially targeted for closure afterward, but officials eventually kept it open as a reserve base.

Tyndall is a huge base with significant strategic operations. It's effectively a city, with 4,500 airmen under Laidlaw's command — the 325th Fighter Wing, known as the Checkertails. Tyndall has not received much media coverage since the hurricane hit because it was closed to media until recent days; local television stations got their first look over the weekend, and The Washington Post went on a tour of the base Monday.

The base did not get completely obliterated the way Mexico Beach did, in part because it was on the left side of the hurricane's eye, and because of Michael's rotation, the storm surge was to the right of the eye. Most of the damage to Tyndall was from the 155-mph sustained winds.

Some of Tyndall's enormous hangars are visible from U.S. 98, which cuts through the 29,000-acre base. There are unpopulated woodlands — now filled with jackknifed pines, snapped neatly roughly a dozen feet above the ground — along a long stretch of the base.

An official 2018 Economic Impact study estimated Tyndall contributes \$596 million to the local economy each year, and that its facilities would cost \$3.4 billion to replace. Yearly military payrolls were \$276 million, with an additional \$94 million for civilians and local businesses.

There were 1,340 buildings on the base before the storm, totaling 5.6 million square feet, including 1.3 million square feet of privatized housing. There also are 62 miles of paved roads, 609,000 feet of electric lines, and about 1.2 million feet of water, sewer and stormwater lines.

The influence of Tyndall extends far beyond the base perimeter. Many civilian employees live in nearby bedroom communities that were chewed to pieces during the storm. Just across the bridge that connects Tyndall to Panama City, Leon's Donuts survived, and owner Lin Tung, 67, said he will stay in business because he can't afford to move elsewhere. More than a third of his customers came from Tyndall, he said.

"You decide to live here, and a hurricane is one of the things that happens," Tung said. "We were due for one for a long time."

Just up the road in a demolished mobile home park, Jacquie Merrill, 47, who works in flight medicine at Tyndall as a civilian employee, said her home was destroyed by Michael. A major setback for Tyndall would be a major setback for her.

"I'd lose my job — on top of my car and my home and everything else," she said.

The base's public information officer, Don Arias, points out a remarkable fact about the base's history: The government broke ground here on Dec. 7, 1941.

What happened two weeks ago, on Oct. 10, was not exactly Pearl Harbor, but Hurricane Michael did virtually sneak up on everyone. The storm wasn't even a tropical depression for much of the Columbus Day holiday weekend. Many of the base personnel were expecting a three-day break.

That Friday before the weekend, Laidlaw held a staff meeting. He asked about the upcoming weather. There was some kind of disturbance swirling down near the Yucatan, but he was told the tropics were clear.

The forecast quickly evolved in an alarming direction. Unlike Hurricane Florence, which

gave North Carolina almost a week to prepare as it lumbered across the Atlantic, Michael grew rapidly into a hurricane as it rolled north and hit unusually warm Gulf of Mexico water.

Laidlaw recalled that it was on Sunday when he knew he had a problem, and that evening he began pulling jets from their hangars to fly to other bases. The situation grew even more dire when the forecast evolved again, showing Michael becoming a Category 4 hurricane. On Monday at 5 p.m., Laidlaw ordered a mandatory evacuation of the entire base as well as any personnel in nearby communities, a total of 11,000 people. The last of the operational F-22s were flown away Tuesday morning. Tuesday night at 11:30 p.m., he made a final circuit of the base, making sure everything was locked down tight. At midnight, everyone remaining began to shelter in place.

They had trained for hurricanes. But usually they had more time: This went from HURCON 4 to HURCON 1 remarkably fast.

In the aftermath, the first order of battle was clearing a runway. The

Air Force sent in a Special Operations team. Then came more relief personnel, and by Monday of this week there was a full-blown tent city and finally a huge white tent where everyone could get hot food instead of MREs. About 800 personnel were on site, a number rising by the day.

But most of his people remain scattered. Laidlaw said his wife and children have relocated to a base in Pensacola.

The commander deflects questions about the base's long-term prospects. "I'm not looking past the next 24 to 48 hours," he said. "For me right now, it's what can I do to take care of these people, their families. How do I help them put their lives back together? My people right now, they want to know where they're going to live. They want to know where their kids are going to school. They want to know what base they're going to move to."

Driving around, he gave fist bumps to his people, asking about morale, bantering, trying to keep spirits up.

He said the same thing to everyone: "You need anything, you let me know."

Already busy with the couple's five children, the delivery of nearly 1,000 packages was a shock to Barnett.

"It was sort of 'No — oh, no!'" she said.

For a while, Barnett tried to handle the deluge of packages that FedEx, UPS and the Post Office delivered. She got some help from neighbors, and her children, in sorting items for her to deliver to displaced Tyndall airmen and their families. Then came the moment she

understood she'd need help.

"It was when the Target registry called and said, 'We have 900 boxes coming to your house,'" she said.

At the same time, Barnett's story reached the Air Force Enlisted Village in Shalimar, a nonprofit organization that provides housing to widows of enlisted Air Force personnel. Already involved in its own massive relief effort, coordinating both donations and deliveries of relief supplies to the hurricane-ravaged area, the AFEV agreed to take Barnett's packages.

Volunteers sort through both and determine where they are most needed.

Using computers, they scroll through requests for assistance.

"We (also) get intelligence on what they (storm victims) need when the drivers come back," said Scott Delveau, AFEV's development director and coordinator of the relief effort.

On Tuesday afternoon, a large room in the welcome center was stacked high with canned vegetables, cases of soup, and relief kits packed by members of the Mormon Church, among hundreds of other boxes being readied for Wednesday delivery.

"We didn't realize it was going to be to the scope that it is," said Brooke McLean,

president and CEO of the Air Force Enlisted Village.

At the end of this week, the AFEV is closing down its relief efforts, because the welcome center will be used as a polling place for early voting in advance of the Nov. 6 general election. Friday is the last day that donations will be accepted at AFEV, and Saturday will be the last day for deliveries, Delveau said.

Meanwhile in Crestview, Alicia Barnett continues to receive about 20 packages each day, and remains committed to getting the items to people who need them.

"As long as I get donations, I will get them where they need to go," she said.

lighter fluid and then tried to set her on fire.

A fight ensued, with Bruner allegedly brandishing a knife against his brother, and he was unsuccessful at igniting the fuel. Officers arrived some time later, and Bruner was taken to the Bay County Jail.

Nights earlier, a man — whose name was not immediately available — held his former romantic interest and her current boyfriend at gunpoint, threatening their lives. He fired two shots at both of them, missed and later was taken to jail on two counts of attempted murder, officials reported.

In Panama City last week, officers responded to what authorities believe to be a murder-suicide. A husband and wife were found dead from gunshot wounds in their SweetBay home. Police are not looking for a shooter.

Days before that, officers responded to a shooting on Alpine Way in Callaway Heights where a child custody struggle resulted in a gunshot wound to the head. Christopher King was arrested in connection with shooting the

boyfriend of his estranged wife. The victim was said to be stable but needs surgery to remove the bullet from his head. King will be charged afterward.

Because communications have been down for officers, details from reports are not readily available. In recent days, the reports officers have documented in their cars have begun to slowly make their way to the hands of domestic violence investigators, Colbert said.

They will begin the process of looking into the backgrounds of suspects for a variety of factors for red flags to determine priority. Those include recent histories of escalating violence, possessiveness and cruelty to animals.

Colbert said domestic violence is a complex issue the county faces. She suggested that relatives forced to be in close quarters by the conditions left by Hurricane Michael take a breather from one another when tensions run high. Volunteering also can gain perspective and relieve anxiety for those in seemingly dire situations.

"Try to do something productive," Colbert said. "Help others in need instead of feeling sorry for yourself and taking it out on your spouse."

that has more than 1,000 properties throughout Bay County. Candace Easdale is the owner and CEO of LSI Vacation Rentals, and said that her maintenance staff is working around the clock to visit every home damaged by the storm.

That's no small feat, considering Easdale estimates that less than half of 1 percent of the homes have no damage.

"We've got about 750 homes that are long term," Easdale said. "They've gotten to see about 400 of those properties as far as inspection, and of that only one of them had no damage."

The volume of homes that need repairs is causing some of the delay getting to homes like Elder's, but waiting for an insurance adjuster is the main reason damages cannot be fixed right

away, Easdale said.

"Unfortunately, there's a delay between when we'll go and inspect the property and see what the damage is and see what needs to be done, and then the insurance company has to send an adjuster out to see it before they can start doing repairs," Easdale said. "That's causing a lot of lag and I'm sure a lot of frustration, but we're doing the best we can."

In terms of communication delays, Easdale said her company is confined to one office in Panama City Beach at Pier Park, since its long-term rental office in Panama City is without internet. She said the company is flying out representatives from a Las Vegas office to help with the demand.

For homes without power, Easdale said her maintenance staff cannot turn the power back on. A licensed electrician has to sign off on the home before the power company will turn on utilities. Easdale said the company

outsources electrical and plumbing, and many of the renters' homes are on a waiting list.

"There's a few things that are a matter of supply and demand; unfortunately the supply is not there and the demand is there," Easdale said.

The maintenance staff has been working around the clock since the hurricane, Easdale said. Everyone who can inspect homes for damage is out in the field.

"Our maintenance staff has literally been going 24/7; they have not had a single day off," Easdale said. "They honestly started the second the winds died down to 40 mph. They were out there before the hurricane had even officially passed through the city. They're doing everything they can to get to everyone as quickly as they can."

Easdale said for tenants who no longer can live in their rentals, she is trying to set them up in short-term rentals. Those

are located in Panama City Beach, and very few are damaged. But for renters who take that option, they will end up paying a bit more because of the location of the homes.

Century 21 Commander Realty Realtor Charlie Commander said amid the chaos, his office has been open every day since Oct. 15. Commander said the company is working to put tarps on homes and restore electrical service.

"I promise we are trying our very best," Commander said. "We're working 14-16 hours a day."

For Elder, Counts Oakes is working on getting a tarp to her home to cover her roof. She's frustrated, but she understands she is not alone.

Renters who need assistance can contact Counts Oakes at 850-234-0366. For Century 21 Commander Realty renters, that office is at 2710 State 77 and is open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

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
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
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

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## How to navigate negative campaign ads

**F**or voters, this is the cruelest season. Negative ads are filling radio and TV airwaves, dominating Internet sites and filling mailboxes. The claims are ugly and often distorted. Sometimes they are outright lies.

There's a reason candidates (and, during this season, supporters and opponents of Florida's 12 proposed constitutional amendments) choose the negative or deceptive path. They do it because it works. Voters tend to assume someone, somewhere, is holding campaign ads to a standard of truthfulness or even fairness. That is rarely the case; the reality is that candidates and campaigns have a First Amendment right to say what they want in political ads and any outright deception or slander usually can't be dealt with until long after the votes are counted.

Increasingly, the worst attacks are from third-party players — so-called independent or issue advocacy groups. Because they are disconnected from official campaigns and frequently dissolve after Election Day, it will be tough to hold them accountable.

So what are voters to do? Can they avoid rewarding the worst behavior? As it turns out, they can. It requires a little extra work, but in a nation where people have fought, protested, even died for the right to vote, it should be worth it.

The secret weapon: be curious and informed.

The curious part boils down to a very simple question: "That sounds bad. But is it true?" Sometimes it is — and negative information that's accurate can be highly useful.

But a voter who believes everything is a voter ripe to be hoodwinked. Be particularly wary of claims that make little sense — for example, what Florida candidate in their right mind would be uninterested in senior citizens' issues? Certainly, candidates can disagree on the best solutions, but a claim that a candidate "doesn't care" about a major and obvious Florida priority should usually be viewed with a generous amount of skepticism.


The informed part can be trickier. Fortunately, there are ample trustworthy, reliable sources like newspapers doing their best to provide unbiased and realistic examination of issues and candidates.

For state and national races, there are other unbiased, trustworthy repositories of information. Fact-checking sites like Politifact and Factcheck.org have won numerous awards for evenhanded examinations of candidates' claims. The League of Women Voters of Florida — though it takes positions on things like constitutional amendments — also takes care to provide unbiased summaries. Finally, newer sites like Ballotpedia provide copious links to relevant information, including argument on both sides of many state-level issues and candidates as well as official campaign-finance information.

Don't let someone steal your vote by plying you with misinformation; resources are there for you. And if enough voters take arms against a sea of negative campaigning, they may well end it.

## Ignore Trump frenzy; focus on issues instead

**I**t's getting harder by the day to tune in to MSNBC. My chief complaint isn't the leftist slant. It's the news channel's obsession with the latest idiocy to emerge from the Trumpian yap. Anyone who wants to express dismay that Trump called a woman "horseface" is certainly entitled to, but not on my time's dime.

There's little shock or news value here. Donald Trump's rap sheet of insults toward women is long. Watching the respectable media endlessly debate every attention-seeking gibe as if it were momentous news is depressing.

Of greater concern is their focus on the insignificant, letting it crowd out coverage of the administration's toxic policies. The big story is exploding deficits. Pumping out trillion-dollar deficits in the middle of a strong economy is fiscal insanity.

The reckless tax cuts are the main driver. Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell already is weaponizing the deficit to force cuts in Medicare and Social Security.

Republican talk of new middle-class tax cuts is pre-election baloney. No details

— not on the cuts themselves, not on paying for them (ha-ha-ha). Anyhow, more tax cuts would blow the deficit still higher, sharpening the dagger pointed at cherished middle-class programs.

Of course, Trump would rather we fixate on "horseface" or his other anti-social mutterings. That's how he distracts us from policies that hurt ordinary Americans.

Recall Trump's recent visit to Montana, where he praised Rep. Greg Gianforte, best known for physically assaulting a reporter. "Any guy that can do a body slam, he's my guy," Trump bellowed as his crowd cheered lustily.

In my book, a guy who loses it after being asked a question on health care is weak on anger management. That said, Gianforte did apologize for the incident, and the reporter is fine.

In making the story all about Trump, the news channels missed an opportunity to cover Gianforte's highly unpopular positions on a burning issue in the rural West: the people's right to enjoy their gorgeous wilderness.

A multimillionaire from New Jersey, Gianforte joined other wealthy out-of-staters in buying vast tracts in Montana and then trying to keep locals — used to more neighborly landowners — off their properties. Gianforte sued the state to remove a public easement that gave hunters,

anglers and hikers access to the East Gallatin River via his property. He accused Montana of using "extortion" to keep the path open.

More ominously, Gianforte has introduced two bills in Congress that would strip protections from 800,000 acres of federally owned land in Montana. It includes some of the state's most beloved and iconic landscapes, among them the Centennial Mountains and the Terry Badlands. Much of the land was recommended for wilderness designation by pre-Trump Interior Departments.

The bills would open it to industrial uses, such as logging, mining and oil and gas development. Guess whose friends could profit handsomely.

Gianforte's "public meeting" on the matter was actually an invitation-only meeting. Less than 24 hours before, he played the trick of saying anyone could come. Those opposed, if they learned of the change, had little time to get themselves there. Montana is a big place.

So too bad the recent coverage centered on Gianforte's long-ago outburst. And that was only because Trump gave it a thumbs-up.

Trump undoubtedly plans new verbal eruptions to push us off the trail of things that matter. Condemning them is easy. Ignoring them would be a gift to the civic culture.

## O'Connor announces dementia diagnosis

WASHINGTON — Sandra Day O'Connor, the first woman on the Supreme Court, announced Tuesday in a frank and personal letter that she has been diagnosed with “the beginning stages of dementia, probably Alzheimer’s disease.”

The 88-year-old’s letter was addressed to “Friends and fellow Americans.” And it was a farewell of sorts from a woman who was not only a trailblazer for women in the law but also for much of her quarter century on the high court a key vote on issues central to American life.

O'Connor said doctors diagnosed her some time ago and that as her condition has progressed she is “no longer able to participate in public life.” After her 2006 retirement from the high court O'Connor had appeared around the country championing an educational organization she founded and serving as a visiting appeals court judge, among other activities. But she stopped speaking publicly more than two years ago.

“While the final chapter of my life with dementia may be trying, nothing has diminished my gratitude and deep appreciation for the countless blessings in my life,” she wrote. She added: “As a young cowgirl from the Arizona desert, I never could have imagined that one day I would become the first woman justice on the U.S. Supreme Court.”

O'Connor’s announcement of her diagnosis came a day after an Associated Press story in which her son Jay O'Connor said that his mother had begun to have challenges with her short term memory. The story noted that O'Connor had stopped making public appearances and recently turned over an office she had kept at the Supreme Court to newly

retired Justice Anthony Kennedy. Jay O'Connor also said that hip issues have meant his mother now primarily uses a wheelchair and stays close to her home in Phoenix.

O'Connor wrote that since “many people have asked about my current status and activities” she wanted to be “open about these changes.”

O'Connor was a state court judge before being nominated to the Supreme Court in 1981 by President Ronald Reagan, who fulfilled a campaign promise by nominating a woman to the high court. O'Connor’s letter Tuesday was reminiscent of Reagan’s 1994 letter announcing that he had Alzheimer’s disease. He died in 2004.

During her more than two decades on the court O'Connor was often the deciding vote in important cases, providing the crucial fifth vote when

the court divided 5-4. On the Supreme Court, her votes were key in cases about abortion, affirmative action and campaign finance as well as the Bush v. Gore decision effectively settling the 2000 election in George W. Bush’s favor.

O'Connor grew up on a ranch on the border of Arizona and New Mexico called the “Lazy B” and went to Stanford for college and law school. Although she graduated third in her class from law school she had difficulty finding a job as a lawyer at a time when there were few women in the legal profession. Despite those early challenges, she became the first woman to lead the Arizona state senate before becoming a judge.

O'Connor was 51 when she was confirmed 99-0 to the Supreme Court. She was 75 when she announced her retirement from the court in 2005.

Her decision to step down was influenced by a decline in the health of her husband, John O'Connor III, who himself had been diagnosed with Alzheimer’s disease.

In 2007, O'Connor’s family made public that John O'Connor had struck up a romance with a fellow Alzheimer’s patient at the assisted living center where he had moved. Scott O'Connor, one of the justice’s three sons, told a Phoenix television station that his mother was “thrilled” her husband was “relaxed and happy.” John O'Connor died in 2009.

O'Connor’s departure from the court and her replacement by Justice Samuel Alito moved the court to the right, and O'Connor wasn’t always happy with the court’s direction after she left.

Asked in 2009 how she felt

about the court retreating from or undoing rulings she was instrumental in shaping, she responded: “What would you feel? I’d be a little bit disappointed. If you think you’ve been helpful, and then it’s dismantled, you think, ‘Oh, dear.’ But life goes on. It’s not always positive.”

In retirement O'Connor was an enthusiastic advocate for iCivics, an organization she founded that promotes civic education in schools through free, educational online games. O'Connor wrote Tuesday that she felt strongly about working to advance civic learning and engagement “because I’ve seen first-hand how vital it is for all citizens to understand our Constitution and unique system of government, and participate actively in their communities.”

“There is no more important work than deepening young people’s engagement in our nation,” she wrote.

Chief Justice John Roberts said in a statement that he was “saddened to learn” that O'Connor “faces the challenge of dementia.”

“Although she has announced that she is withdrawing from public life, no illness or condition can take away the inspiration she provides for those who will follow the many paths she has blazed,” Roberts wrote.

All eight other current justices and the three other retired justices also issued statements praising O'Connor. Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, who in 1993 became the second woman to join the court and is now one of three women justices, wrote of O'Connor that: “In her work and days, she strived mightily to make what was momentous for women in 1981, the year she was appointed to the Court, no longer extraordinary, but entirely expectable.”

## China-US ties sinking amid acrimony over trade, politics

BEIJING — “Both ignorant and malicious” was how the official China Daily newspaper recently described comments by U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo, offering a stinging insight into the current bitter tone of discourse between the countries.

The White House’s move to expand Washington’s dispute with Beijing beyond trade and technology and into accusations of political meddling has sunk relations between the world’s two largest economies to the lowest level since the Cold War. A major speech by U.S. Vice President Mike Pence on Oct. 4 was the clearest, highest-level sign that U.S. strategy was turning from engagement to confrontation. Pence accused China of interfering in the midterm elections to undermine President Donald Trump’s tough trade policies against Beijing, warned other countries to be wary of Beijing’s “debt diplomacy” and denounced China’s actions in the South China Sea.

“What the Russians are doing pales in comparison to what China is doing across this country,” Pence told an audience at the Hudson Institute think tank in Washington.

Both sides are trading increasingly sharp accusations over human rights and global hegemony, exposing an ideological divide that pits the two on a path of confrontation with

no clear resolution in sight.

While a military clash has not been ruled out, American-based analysts envision a continuing push-and-pull for dominance between Trump and his Chinese counterpart, Xi Jinping, China’s most dominant — and repressive — leader since Mao Zedong. Xi’s aggressive foreign policy and authoritarian ways have altered views of China across the board.

“What has happened is a sea change in U.S. perceptions of China,” said June Teufel Dreyer, an expert on Chinese politics who teaches political science at the University of Miami. While Chinese officials privately say they’re concerned about the sharp deterioration in ties, especially given the massive links between the two in trade, immigration and education, it appears Beijing is more than willing to go toe-to-toe under the new circumstances.

Increasingly, the perception that as China grew more prosperous it would fall in line with global values and international law has been exploded. Into that breach has come hardening U.S. rhetoric toward Beijing and actions to counter, deter or defy China’s moves in the international sector, particularly its “Belt and Road” trade and infrastructure initiative that seeks to expand Beijing’s economic and political footprint from Cambodia to Cairo.

Trump’s first national security strategy, released last year, also labeled China a “revisionist power” alongside Russia.

## Issue of married priests gains traction under pope

VATICAN CITY — As the Vatican copes with the growing clergy sex abuse scandal and declining number of priests worldwide, it is laying the groundwork to open formal debate on an issue that has long been taboo: opening up the priesthood to married men in parts of the world where clergy are scarce.

Pope Francis has convened a meeting of South American bishops next year focusing on the plight of the church in the Amazon, a vast territory served by far too few priests. During that synod, the question of ordaining married men of proven virtue — so-called “viri probati” — is expected to figure on the agenda.

This week, a two-hour documentary on Italian television is likely to contribute to the conversation. “The Choice: Priests and Love” profiles more than a dozen men in four European countries who are either living clandestinely with women, have created their own unsanctioned church communities where married priests preside at Mass, or left the Catholic priesthood altogether to marry.

The documentary, to be aired Wednesday on Discovery Italia and previewed

to The Associated Press, makes the case that many of these men would gladly return to the priesthood and offer their pastoral services.

Their plight has found a sympathetic ear in Francis, who has long expressed a willingness to consider “viri probati” to address pastoral needs in the Amazon. He has also expressed sympathy for priests who have made the anguished choice to leave.

Vocatio, an Italian association of these “married priests,” wrote Francis earlier this month pledging their solidarity as he copes with the global fallout of the sex abuse scandal, and once again offering their services in ministry.

“We would like you to take into consideration

— without prejudice or pretense — the opportunity of allowing us an active presence in diocesan activity, given our experience and competence in the sacraments we have lived: ministry and matrimony,” the group wrote.

The head of Vocatio, former priest Rosario Mocciano who married civilly in 1977, estimates there are about 5,000 men in Italy alone who have left the priesthood, a third of whom would seek a return to married ministry if allowed. He said he was hopeful for progress under Francis and some sympathetic Italian bishops, saying they brought “a new air and atmosphere” to a long-standing problem.

## Lynn Haven takes big hit from Michael

LYNN HAVEN — Hurricane Michael showed no mercy on Lynn Haven, which, in addition to dealing with damage to housing and businesses across the city, will have to replace its police department and commission chamber buildings destroyed in the storm.

Structures along the main highway, Ohio Avenue, had roofs or other parts torn away. City Hall was heavily damaged, and the city likely will lose its police department and commission chamber

buildings, City Manager Michael White said almost two weeks after the hurricane tore through Bay County.

The roof collapsed on the commission chambers.

"The library will be a wash," White said Tuesday while overseeing current operations.

City services are being handled in a trailer at the library and business licenses and permits are being handled at the Lynn Haven Senior Center.

White said he would try to save a majority of City Hall, though a back corner of the building doesn't have

a roof. The city is working with insurance companies and FEMA on the next steps for the government buildings. Portable trailers might have to be put up, White said.

Despite the building damage, city staff has picked up street debris.

"All the roads are clear," White said. "We've had them clear for several days."

Residents who enjoyed Lynn Haven's parks are in for bad news.

"Sheffield (Park) got destroyed," White said. "All the parks got destroyed."

### After Hurricane Michael, Mexico Beach forms wedding backdrop for first responders

MEXICO BEACH — On Sunday, Justin Lee Richter got a message he did not expect to see.

At the time, Richter was in the process of rebuilding parts of his life after Hurricane Michael. His property suffered damage. Even his office at Mowery Elevator had been destroyed. But

on Sunday, Richter got a message from Cori Clark, a detective at the Panama City Police Department who he had been friends with for almost 15 years.

She was inviting him to her wedding in Mexico Beach to Bryon Hughes, a firefighter for the Mexico Beach Fire Department. The two were to be wed at sunset later that day on the beach.

"She basically said 'You know what? We're just going to do it and if you can make it, that's fine and if you can't, you can't,'" Richter said.

Before Sunday, the idea of Clark and Hughes having any kind of wedding seemed impossible. The couple had been planning their wedding for more than a year before Hurricane Michael changed everything. Since the storm made landfall Oct. 10, the couple had been working nonstop to respond to and help those affected by the damage.

It seemed like the wedding would have to be canceled. One of Clark's dogs that was going to be part of the wedding had died in the storm days before. Many family

members of both Clark and Hughes could not leave to go anywhere.

Sara Lynsey, the wedding photographer and Clark's friend, said that once the worst of the storm and damage were behind Panama City, Clark began to have a different attitude.

"I think once everything got a little better, she started realizing that 'Yeah, maybe we can pull this off. It's not going to be what we planned, but let's get married,'" Lynsey said.

PANAMA CITY BEACH — While Hurricane Michael has certainly changed how many morning commutes look, the historic storm has also changed how they will sound from now on, as several popular radio stations will be off the air permanently.

Five days after the storm, Powell Broadcasting, a radio staple in the Bay County area, announced that due to substantial damage to their Panama City Beach facility, they would cease operations, pulling out of the local market for good.

"It is with a sad heart that we have announced that Powell Broadcasting of Panama City has ceased operations," the company wrote in a Facebook post. "We have loved servicing our community and we will miss being a part."

Driving around weekday mornings, the eclectic and reliable variety station 105.1 Bob FM had given way to crooning country tunes laced with a healthy dose of static from the barely audible 105.1 WPFL out of Pensacola. Hot 107.9, too, has found a somewhat stronger country music signal — a far cry from the top 100 hits the station was known for at the peak of Spring Break.

## Boyette and Casey to close after 60 years

### Spared hurricane damage, but calling it quits

PANAMA CITY — Roach spray and rodent control to keep pests out of homes with gaping holes, screws to reattach knobs to cabinets, bits of pipe to reestablish running water, electrical parts to try to turn the power back on — these will be some of the last items sold from Boyette and Casey.

Since 1958, the little hardware store has been seated in the heart of Millville. Tiny, the store often felt like a holdover

from another era, but somehow customers could almost always find what they needed in the narrow, packed aisles organized more like a home workshop than a big box store.

But as owner Lee Casey said, "all earthly things must come to an end," and Hurricane Michael convinced Casey — who had put the store on the market months ago — this is the time to go out of business.

"It's bittersweet," he said. "I've been here since I was 13, when I'd come work after school, but it's time. The hurricane helped me make the decision."

The store itself actually fared well in the storm — the walls held, the roof stayed

put and the inventory stayed on the shelves. The only real damage was a power pole work crews from Wyoming and Michigan were lifting on Wednesday.

But all the damage around Boyette and Casey, for better or worse, created an opportunity for Casey, who said business has seen a slow decline since 2006. A roofing company that specializes in helping low-income residents in disaster areas noticed the building on the market and reached out about buying the property.

"They're a really good bunch of people," Casey said.







But there is good news. Residents have running water which isn't under a boil water notice, White said. "If they got power, they can flush," White said. "But flush and use water sparingly." The city is providing meals and supplies for residents at City Hall and at Tyndall Federal Credit Union at 1601 S.

State 77. Updates and recovery information are being regularly posted on the City of Lynn Haven Facebook page, where people also can find out how to donate to recovery efforts. The city commission also is holding public meetings at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the Lynn Haven Elementary School cafeteria. The community is invited to attend. White said Lynn Haven can rebuild. "We've got a strong backbone," said White.

"They specialize in coming into low-income areas and helping out. There are so many people who aren't insured in this area, he will work with." People to help Millville's largely low-income residents repair their homes is exactly what Casey thinks the neighborhood will need to recover long term, but in the short term, the hardware still is still open — albeit with a going out of business sale of 20 percent off — doing what it can to help the community push forward. Before power came back after the storm, the store opened for the first time on Oct. 16, "just to see if we could do it," Casey said. With the help of a generator and by going back to cash-only purchases, they did it, selling mostly generator parts the first day, then electrical and plumbing supplies, and now a little bit of everything. Marlowe Lowe was there to buy pest control and supplies to clear the debris

from her father's house "just around the corner" on Wednesday. Nearly all her life, she's come to Boyette and Casey when there was something broken around her home that needed fixing. "Thirty years ago, my dad had an account here," she said. "We lived just a couple blocks over." A regular, Lowe seemed to know half of the people who walked into the store, asking them about the state of their homes and telling them about the three trees on her house. The conversation was casual as if they were talking about the weather, which in a way they were. Lowe and many of the other customers who came through the door said they were sad to see the beloved store go out of business, but were also starting to look to the future. Lowe, for one, was starting to think about the annual Millville Christmas Parade, wondering if Casey would continue his support before he closed. "Come see me after this," Casey said. An official closing date for the store has not been announced.

Christen Harris, a paramedic with Okaloosa County EMS who was the maid of honor, had been friends with Clark since they both were 7-year-olds in Panama City. Like Clark and Hughes, Harris has worked days on end since the storm to help people and clean up damage. "It had gotten to this point where this hurricane had taken so much from everyone that there had to be some positive at some point," Harris said. "The decision just finally got made that, 'We're doing this regardless. We're not letting this day go and letting the hurricane take one more day away from us.'" Getting the wedding together was a quick affair. Mexico Beach had been closed to incoming traffic because of the devastating storm damage, but because of the couple's emergency responder credentials, they and other friends in the law enforcement and firefighter communities were able to hold the wedding along the beach. Before the storm, Clark and Hughes had planned to have their wedding at a rented house on the beach in Mexico Beach. The house no longer is there because of the storm, but the

couple got married by a jetty near the canal, Hughes wearing his firefighter bunker pants and Clark wearing a Kevlar vest for the occasion. After the ceremony, Richter walked behind the couple as they passed the debris of Mexico Beach. At one point, Richter remembers how Hughes picked up Clark's wedding dress above the sewage water and debris they walked through. For Richter, it's an image he never will forget. "The stark contrast between the destruction and the beauty of them getting married, it was pretty special," he said. "It was the best wedding I've been to." Since Sunday, pictures of the wedding have been widely shared on social media. Lynsey said she feels the wedding was

an important thing for people who have been through the worst of the storm. "I think we all feel like our city is destroyed, so it's great to have some sense of normalcy," she said. "I think that's what it is: hope, that sense that we're all going to be OK." Harris said she felt that the wedding and witnessing the love between her two friends was part of her rebuilding her life after the storm. "Everybody needs to hurt and everyone needs to grieve, but you can't unpack and live there," she said. "This was all of us not unpacking and living there. This was, 'This is still our home, this is still our lives, these are our friends, these are our families.' We were just very fortunate that we were still able to make it happen."

operated several popular FM radio stations in the area, including WASJ 105.1 Bob FM, WRBA 95.9 Kick Rock, WKNK 103.5 Kick'n County and CHR Hot 107.9. According to 1360 KSCJ

Sioux City, the station's 150-foot Studio/Transmitter Link tower snapped in half, puncturing a hole in the roof and flooding the building with rain water. On Wednesday, construction crews were patching the roof of the Gwyn Drive studio, while the nearby tower still hung, looking as if it had been melted in the sun. Powell Broadcasting declined to comment on their

decision to cease operations. Last month, the company had filed with the Federal Communications Commission to sell Hot 107.9 to Christian music giant Educational Media Foundation for \$472,000. That deal had yet to be approved by the FCC and it is unknown how the damage to the station and tower will affect that sale.

## Second utility seeks pause in sending bills in storm region

TALLAHASSEE — A utility that serves storm-ravaged counties in rural Northwest Florida asked state regulators Tuesday for permission to suspend sending bills to customers while power restoration continues.

Florida Public Utilities Co., which has about 13,000 customers in Jackson, Calhoun and Liberty counties, pointed, in part, to problems delivering mail after Hurricane Michael barreled through the region Oct. 10. Florida Public Utilities Co. said it is continuing to work to fully restore power.

“Many of the homes and businesses served by FPUC have, however, been so severely damaged that they are either totally destroyed

or rendered uninhabitable as a result of the storm,” the utility said in the filing at the Florida Public Service Commission.

“Likewise, access to some locations in FPUC’s territory remains limited due to downed trees, other debris, and related hazardous conditions. Even in those areas in which mail service has been reinstated by the U.S. Postal Service, many customers are unable to take delivery due to the condition of their premises. Likewise, many customers’ premises are so damaged that even as power lines and facilities are re-energized, these premises cannot receive power due to the damage they have sustained.”

Under the proposal, the utility would suspend sending

bills to customers in each county until electric service has been restored to all customers in that particular county. The filing said billing would likely begin again first in Liberty County, followed by Jackson and Calhoun. Customers would not face late fees or interest on bills.

The proposal is similar to a request made last week by Duke Energy Florida, which provides electric service in Bay, Gulf, Franklin and Wakulla counties.

The Public Service Commission is expected to take up Duke’s request during an Oct. 30 meeting, with commission staff members recommending approval. The utilities need approval from regulators because of a state rule that requires utilities to bill customers monthly.

## Services restored in Panama City

PANAMA CITY — And on the 14th day, there was water, light, sewer and garbage.

Following Hurricane Michael, the city of Panama City has restored utilities to residents in the city limits, announcing Wednesday that the boil water notice previously in place since Oct. 10 has been rescinded.

Despite many citizens having water restored to their homes days ago, the boil water notice remind active until the city was able to identify and repair all leaks made to the system, as many pipes were broken during the hurricane with trees being uprooted by the winds.

“One of the biggest things we had to do was locate all of the leaks,” said Panama City’s Public Information Officer, Caitlin Lawrence.

The water system was flushed over three days to restore a healthy chlorine residual and water quality was then tested at 40 locations around Panama City to ensure the absence of numerous pathogens in the city water before the boil water notice could be lifted.

The city sewer system is also fully operational.

According Lawrence, if you live in Panama City and aren’t receiving water to your house, there is likely a leak in your home’s water system. Citizens need to contact a plumber for repairs and once these repairs have been made, the water can be restored to the property.

Similarly, if a property isn’t receiving electricity, an electrician is needed to make repairs before the property can receive power. However, power has been restored throughout Bay County for those who can receive it.

Residential and commercial trash pick up has also been restored, but is currently not operating on a weekly schedule. Instead, pickups are working through the city in a continuous wave, so citizens are asked to leave their blue bins by the road if they need to be serviced.

If your bin hasn’t been serviced, it is likely from obstacles in the road preventing trucks from coming by. Now that streets are becoming more and more clear throughout the city, trash pickup will resume shortly for all residents

The city’s debris contractor, Crowder Gulf, is working to remove yard or debris from homes destruction from all over the city. Citizens are

asked to keep debris on property and out of the roads so collectors are able to travel the roads and service people more easily. The city also asks citizens keep home debris to manageable sizes for pickup.

“We could not have restored utilities at the pace we did without the assistance from the numerous municipalities throughout the state who have worked disasters such as this before, our local support from Marshall Brothers Construction and their Subs, and Dewberry,” said Chris Lightfoot, Department of Utilities Director. “The dedication and hours worked between City Staff and all of these people are the reason we are where we are 14 days post Michael.”

## New documents contradict Democratic nominee Gillum

TALLAHASSEE — Florida Democratic gubernatorial candidate Andrew Gillum has asserted he paid his way on trips to Costa Rica and New York City that are now the focus of an ongoing ethics investigation, but newly released documents appear to contradict the Tallahassee mayor.

Text messages, video, pictures and other documents surrounding the trip were turned over Tuesday to the state’s ethics commission that is probing the trips due to a complaint filed by a local businessman and persistent critic of Gillum.

In one exchange, Gillum is told that he is getting a ticket to the high-profile Broadway show “Hamilton” courtesy of “Mike Miller and the crew.” Miller was the alias of an FBI undercover agent who met Gillum through a lobbyist and one-time friend of the rising Democratic star politician. Gillum replies back that getting the ticket is “awesome news.”

The documents were turned over to the Florida Commission on Ethics by Christopher Kise, a well-known Tallahassee attorney representing lobbyist Adam Corey. Kise was once Florida’s solicitor general and served on the transition team of Republican Gov. Rick Scott when he won in 2010.

Gillum has steadfastly denied any wrongdoing in the ethics probe, which is separate but related to an ongoing FBI investigation into city government. Under Florida law, local officials cannot accept gifts worth more than \$100 from a lobbyist or a company that hires a lobbyist.

“I don’t take free trips from anybody, I’m a hard-working person,” Gillum said on Sunday during a testy debate with Republican Ron DeSantis after the former congressman kept asking him who paid for the “Hamilton” tickets.

Gillum issued a statement contending the records “vindicate and add more evidence” that he paid his way or was with family members who paid for expenses. The Gillum campaign back in September, which released receipts related to the trips, insisted that Gillum received the Broadway ticket because his brother swapped a concert ticket for it. Kise has called that “nonsense.”

In a Facebook video posted late Tuesday, Gillum said that while the tickets were reserved by friends of Corey and he assumed that they were paid by Marcus Gillum, his brother.

“So far as I know, that was the deal,” Andrew Gillum said.

Gillum, who could become Florida’s first African-American governor, also added that criticism from his opponents that he is unethical or doing something illegal “reinforce, frankly, stereotypes about black men.”

The trips to Costa Rica and New York City came to light after the FBI investigation broke into the open in June 2017. That’s when a federal grand jury subpoenaed five years of records from Tallahassee and a local redevelopment agency.

In February, a federal search warrant was accidentally made public on a court website and detailed

that the FBI launched its corruption investigation in 2015 and that agents posed as out-of-town real-estate developers and medical marijuana entrepreneurs in order to gain access to various city officials. The warrant stated that agents were focusing on City Commissioner Scott Maddox, a former head of the Florida Democratic Party, and his former chief of staff. Maddox has denied any wrongdoing.

The FBI earlier this year also asked for more records, dealing primarily with an upscale restaurant that is located in a city-owned building. The Edison received \$2 million in financial assistance from the city and the local community redevelopment agency.

One of the owners of the restaurant was Corey, who once served as Gillum’s campaign treasurer and has known him since college. Gillum vacationed at a luxury resort in Costa Rica in May 2016 with Corey, as well as another investor in the Edison. During that trip, Corey set up a meeting between Gillum and people who ended up being FBI undercover agents.

The records turned over by Corey show that Gillum paid for airfare to Costa Rica with his credit card. But an invoice prepared by Corey’s office for the Costa Rica villa that everyone stayed at has Gillum’s and his wife’s names crossed out, with the words “Hold on billing” listed next to the amount. Kise has said that Corey was never given any money for the trip by Gillum.

The records also include information on other trips involving Corey and Gillum and include texts between “Mike Miller” and Corey about setting up meetings with Gillum.

The state ethics commission is not expected to wrap up its investigation until after the Nov. 6 election. In a statement, Kise said that his client chose to release the records since they would eventually become public once the investigation is over. The statement does not answer lingering questions as to why Corey was working in tandem with FBI undercover agents.

“Mr. Corey has been unfairly and inaccurately portrayed in the media as being engaged in improper or criminal actions,” Kise said.

When asked about Corey during the debate, Gillum said that “we all have friends that sometimes let us down.”

Republicans, who have already run ads assailing Gillum over the ongoing investigations, seized on the latest disclosures.

“It’s now abundantly clear that Andrew Gillum has repeatedly lied about taking free gifts and trips from lobbyists,” said Stephen Lawson, a spokesman for the DeSantis campaign.

# White Republicans try to keep young minority voters at bay

**ALTAMONTE SPRINGS** — Everywhere Donna Wilkenfeld looks in this lush suburban Orlando neighborhood, the 56-year-old transplant from Tennessee sees neighbors who she suspects share her passion for the Republican Party, especially its stance against illegal immigration and the party's unflinching support for President Donald Trump.

"People are sick and tired of people who can't even speak English, who have been here 30 years and are milking dry all of our resources," said Wilkenfeld, who is white and plans to be the "first one out the door" to vote in the Nov. 6 election. "I think a big surprise is coming — a big red wave is coming."

But just a few blocks away from the house on East Citrus Street where Wilkenfeld settled in hopes of soon retiring, 37-year-old Sara Suero looks around and sees a completely different image of Florida's Seminole County, a rapidly growing suburb on the front line of Democratic efforts to tip the Sunshine State in their favor and Republicans' attempts to keep it in theirs.

Suero, who is of Puerto Rican and Costa Rican descent, counts numerous African-American, Asian and mixed-race families as her neighbors. She also is eager to vote.

"Even though (Trump) says he is not racist, he is racist ... and he only cares about himself," said Suero, who is raising three mixed-race children and is leaning toward voting for Democratic candidates this year. "I think he is a spoiled brat."

As voters here in America's most notorious swing state prepare to elect a new governor and help decide which party

controls the U.S. Senate, the clash of views in this middle-class neighborhood represents the battle over Florida's direction in Trump's America.

It's a struggle that increasingly pits older white voters, including transplants with hopes of retirement, against the state's rapidly diversifying youth in a demographic battle that presents challenges for both parties in a state gaining almost 1,000 new residents a day.

This year, the stakes are particularly high for a midterm election as Tallahassee Mayor Andrew Gillum seeks to become the first Democratic governor in two decades. Gillum, who also would be Florida's first African-American governor, is hoping to boost turnout among the minority and younger voters who tend to vote far less frequently than the older white voters on whom the Republican nominee, former congressman Ron DeSantis, is depending.

The same voter division defines the Senate battle, as incumbent Democrat Bill Nelson tries to fend off an aggressive challenge from Republican Rick Scott, the incumbent governor. A half-dozen House races also are competitive.

A Washington Post review of U.S. Census data shows just how divided the state has become demographically, and how much Democratic hopes here largely rest on motivating younger voters to head to the polls.

Florida's population of non-white young adults continues to surge and now outpaces the growth of older white residents. The trends create even more uncertainty in a state already known for close elections, especially in fast-growing areas such as Seminole County.

According to census estimates, 40 percent of Florida's

20 million residents now are over the age of 50, and slightly more than two-thirds of them are white. Those residents have formed the backbone of recent Republican victories here.

In the 2016 presidential contest, Trump carried Florida by 113,000 votes after 64 percent of white voters supported him, according to exit polls.

But 57 percent of Florida residents under the age of 30 now identify as a minority — a percentage that leaps above 70 percent in Miami-Dade and Broward counties, the state's two most populated.

About 7 in 10 of those non-white Florida voters supported Democrat Hillary Clinton in 2016, according to exit polls.

As Democrats look to rebound both this year and in future elections, they have been closely examining whether the state's minority population will rival or surpass the influence of older whites — while retaining their partisan allegiance.

Census data offers conflicting indicators. The data shows Florida's minority population grew at more than five times the rate of the white population between 2010 to 2017 — 22 percent versus 4 percent, according to Census estimates.

The growing minority population includes a surge of younger minorities who now are reaching voting age. Florida's population of minorities who are between the ages of 20 and 30 grew 18 percent since 2010 — surpassing the growth of white residents over the age of 50. That group grew by 13 percent.

Those younger residents provide a potential trough of Democratic-leaning voters — but white voters over 50 still outnumber this demographic nearly 4 to 1.

"Florida is interesting because it's one big moving part of constant change," said Brad Coker, managing director

of Florida-based Mason-Dixon Polling & Strategy. "But at the end of the day, despite all of that change, it doesn't really change that much."

Still, Democrats are trying to ride trends benefiting them in a neighbor-to-neighbor battle in Seminole County, which hasn't supported a Democrat for president since Harry Truman in 1948.

Once known for one of nation's largest celery crops, this county directly north of Orlando grew rapidly in the 1970s and 1980s as retirees, often conservative, flocked here to escape northern winters.

In 1988, former president George H.W. Bush, a Republican, won almost three-fourths of the vote here. The county includes the city of Sanford, which grabbed national headlines in 2012 after a neighborhood watchman shot and killed an unarmed black teenager, Trayvon Martin, in a case that highlighted the state's controversial "Stand Your Ground" gun law.

Since then, Seminole County's 462,000 residents have continued to diversify — the non-Hispanic white population has plunged from 75 percent in 2000 to 61 percent this year, according to census estimates.

The decline in the white population is largely driven by an influx of residents under the age of 30, about half of whom identify as Latino, black, Asian or mixed-race.

Those younger, more diverse residents have been eroding Republicans' grip on Seminole County. Although 55 percent of white voters over the age of 50 remain registered Republicans, according to the county elections bureau, only 13 percent of nonwhite voters under age 50 are registered with the party.

In 2016, Trump carried Seminole County by just 3,500 votes, about 1.5 percentage

points. The same year, Stephanie Murphy, a Vietnamese American Democrat, defeated a 12-term Republican incumbent in a congressional district that includes Seminole County and a small part of neighboring Orange County.

Rob Bial, chairman of the Seminole County Democrats, said he expects an energized local party to lift Nelson and Gillum to victory in the county this year.

After registering several thousand new voters since 2016, Seminole Democrats have come within 8,000 registrants of reaching parity with the GOP. But about 28 percent of Seminole County voters have no party affiliation, part of a broader trend among Puerto Ricans in Florida who are choosing not to register with either major party.

"What we saw after 2016 is a combination of voters, not just minorities, but a lot of folks who considered themselves to be socially liberal and fiscally conservative, make a choice that 'the GOP and this party of Trump isn't for me anymore,'" Bial said.

But John Horan, who chairs the all-Republican Seminole board of commissioners, believes the county's GOP tilt will continue for years to come.

On issues such as taxes, Horan said the electorate has grown more conservative during the past decade. In 2014, 52 percent of Seminole County voters supported a one-cent increase in the sales tax to fund enhanced county services, compared with the 72 percent who voted for it in 2001.

"It's all about demographics, and on that issue of taxes we have a lot of people who like that we have a low-tax environment and feel they are getting their money's worth in Florida," said Horan.

## ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

"Maybe if you didn't try to be so clever, you wouldn't end up looking so stupid."

In the 1998 Cap Gemini World Pairs Invitational, today's slam hand struck a chord with me. In Victor Mollo's Bridge Menagerie, Themistocles Papadopoulos was reputed to be the only man capable of false-carding with a singleton. This deal's declarers had to decide if their defenders were capable of precisely such a feat!

Of the eight tables playing in this event, seven declarers managed to reach six hearts. Slam is excellent — it can basically be claimed if trumps split. However, when declarer laid down a top heart from the South hand, the nine appeared from West. Now the question was whether this was a singleton or the "standard" expert false-card from an original holding of jack-nine-fourth, to persuade declarer that this was a singleton.

The problem here is that if you make the wrong guess and play the defender to have a singleton when he has four, that player will be able to gloat over you for the rest of his life. This was a good deal for the Berkowitz family, since David Berkowitz's partner, Larry Cohen (playing against one of the very strongest pairs in the event), and Lisa Berkowitz (competing against the other female pair in the room) were the only declarers to succeed. They were prepared to pay off to this apparent "brilliance," by continuing with a second top trump from dummy and so made their slam.

The rest of the field played for their opponents to be superstars by leading a small heart to the queen, and all went down.

### UF's defense out to defuse explosive plays

For long stretches of time this season, Florida's defense has seemingly been impenetrable, overwhelming opposing offenses with big plays, turnovers and a long succession of three-and-outs.

But time and again, just

when it looks like the defense has taken over the game — boom, the opposing offense torches the defense with an explosive play (or two or three).

In the loss to Kentucky, there was the 54-yard TD pass given up on third-and-16, and a 29-yard TD pass on second-and-16 and the 24-yard TD run by the quarterback.

Early in the fourth quarter against LSU, it was a 31-yard run up the middle, followed

by a 47-yard run that suddenly set up the go-ahead touchdown.

In the win at Vanderbilt two weeks ago, there was the simple screen pass that turned into a 75-yard touchdown play.

Explosive plays.

The Gators have given up their share, and they're looking to eliminate them heading into Saturday's SEC showdown with Georgia.

## Robinson Named Orange Bowl-FWAA Courage Award Nominee

### Sophomore lost family home in Panama City during Hurricane Michael

MIAMI LAKES — Florida State's Janarius Robinson is this week's nominee for the 2018 Capital One Orange Bowl-FWAA Courage Award. Robinson, a redshirt sophomore defensive end, starred for the Seminoles in their win Saturday over Wake Forest, his first game back after losing his childhood home to Hurricane Michael.

"It's been better getting back to practice after going through what I've been going through for the last week," Robinson said last week, according to The Athletic. "It's a time for me to get

my mind away and off of the things that have happened. I come out here, get my mind off of it and get back to work with my brothers."

Robinson's hometown of Panama City, Fla., was one of the hardest-hit areas of Hurricane Michael. His family had evacuated to Georgia beforehand, and when they returned Friday, the house — which was originally owned by Robinson's grandmother — was gone.

The 6-foot-5, 259-pound Robinson returned to practice last Tuesday and on Saturday notched a career-best six tackles, including one sack, in the Seminoles' 38-17 win over the Demon Deacons.

A GoFundMe page was created with NCAA approval to help the Robinsons, with a goal of raising \$75,000. As

of Oct. 22, it has raised more than \$107,000.

The Courage Award was first presented by the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) in 2002. A select group of writers from the FWAA vote on the winner each year. The requirements for nomination include displaying courage on or off the field, including overcoming an injury or physical handicap, preventing a disaster or living through hardship. The winner of the award will be included in festivities during Capital One Orange Bowl week and receive his trophy at an on-field presentation.

## Bay-Mosley game canceled

The Bay High-Mosley football game originally scheduled for Friday at Tommy Oliver Stadium has been canceled. Tornadoes coach Mike Watkins confirmed the decision Wednesday, citing a lack of certainty about how many players would be available as well as a lack of access to basic equipment at the school.

Another decision on whether to continue with the Bay football season at all was to be made after a meeting Wednesday afternoon with players and parents. The Tornadoes have just one game remaining on the schedule against Choctawhatchee at Fort Walton Beach on Nov. 2.

"We still don't know if we've got a whole team," Watkins said. "Maybe we can try to scramble and get one or two (games). I just don't know, but we want to discuss all of those things with players and parents without making a final decision."

The decision not to

play this week was decidedly less difficult for Bay, according to Watkins, who said he was sorry that the game couldn't be played, but that there really wasn't much of a choice for the Tornadoes.

"Bay High is basically shut down and condemned," he said. "They don't want me even in to look at my equipment. It's still standing water in the varsity locker room. Just talking to the kids, so many of my guys are displaced and out of state. It's disappointing that all of this has happened, but we've got to put the safety and welfare of the kids first. There's no medical care here if kids were to get hurt. There are so many more variables to consider other than a group of kids just saying, 'let's go play.'"

Mosley athletic director Josh Vandergrift confirmed that the Dolphins will not try to schedule a game in its place and will have an open week. Dolphins coach Jeremy Brown said the team will practice throughout the week in anticipation of next week's scheduled game against Leon.

Purdue's Edwards headlines  
preseason AP All-America team

Carsen Edwards went through the NBA draft combine and multiple workouts before deciding to return for his junior season at Purdue.

The Boilermakers are sure happy he did after losing four seniors and most of their scoring.

The prolific guard was the leading vote getter in The Associated Press preseason men's All-America team released on Tuesday, appearing on 63 of 65 ballots from a national media panel. Edwards was joined by North Carolina forward Luke Maye, Duke freshman R.J. Barrett, Kansas big man Dedric Lawson, Nevada's Caleb Martin and Wisconsin's Ethan Happ.

The 6-foot-11 Edwards was a third-team All-American last season after averaging 18.5 points, 3.8 rebounds and 2.8 assists. He's expected to play a bigger role as the leader and go-to player on a young team.

Edwards is Purdue's first preseason AP All-American since JaJuan Johnson in 2010-11.

“He’s a very dynamic player. He’s unique from a physical standpoint,” Purdue coach Matt Painter said. “He’s kind of got the body and the explosiveness like a Saquon Barkley. He plays through his offense. I think for guys like that, as you get older, you get more experience, more responsibility, but you don’t change who you are.”

Like Edwards, Maye was a third-team All-American who entered his name into the draft before withdrawing. Last season, the 6-foot-8 forward averaged 16.9 points and 10.1 rebounds while shooting 49 percent from the floor and 43 percent from 3-point range.

Maye hit the shot that beat Kentucky to send the Tar Heels to the Final Four as a sophomore during their 2017 title run.

“I don’t know how much more we can ask of him,” North Carolina teammate Kenny Williams said. “I mean, 17 and 10, that’s hard to do, especially in the ACC.”

Barrett arrived at Duke as the marquee player in coach Mike Krzyzewski’s latest stellar recruiting class. An athletic 6-7 forward from

Canada, he was widely regarded as the top recruit in the 2018 class and has been projected as the No. 1 overall pick in next year's NBA draft.

“Besides his ability, he has a passion to compete,” Krzyzewski said. “This young man has it. I love him and I’m glad I’m going to have the opportunity to spend some time with him.”

Lawson averaged 17.5 points and 9.6 rebounds in two seasons at Memphis before opting to transfer to Kansas. The 6-8 swingman is expected to have a huge impact on the Jayhawks after sitting out last season, both in leadership and multiple roles on the floor.

“He needs to be able to play everywhere for us,” Kansas coach Bill Self said. “There’s times where he can be our best point guard. I think there are times he could be our best low-post scorer, so we’ve got

to move him around and come up with some creative ways to do that.”

Martin and Happ are the first players to tie for the fifth spot on the AP All-America team since 2012-13.

Martin became Nevada's first preseason All-American after testing the NBA draft waters with his twin brother, Cody, during the offseason. The 6-7 senior averaged 18.9 points, 5.4 rebounds and 2.6 assists while leading the Wolf Pack to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament.

Nevada has its highest preseason ranking in program history at No. 7 entering this season.

Happ was another player who withdrew from the NBA draft after going through the evaluation process. The 6-10 senior averaged 17.9 points, 8.0 rebounds and 3.7 assists per game while shooting 52.8 percent.

## Raptors, Spurs can both claim trade victory

The early returns are in, and we now have a winner from the summer blockbuster trade between San Antonio and Toronto.

Both sides look victorious.

Sometimes, trades really can benefit all parties involved — and this already looks to be one of those. Kawhi Leonard looks healthy again and has been fantastic in his first three games with the unbeaten Raptors (4-0), averaging 25.7 points and 9 rebounds per game. DeMar DeRozan is averaging 29.3 points and 9 assists for the Spurs, with a career-high 14 of those assists coming in Monday's overtime win over the Los Angeles Lakers.

Remember all those questions over the summer? Will Leonard like Toronto? Will DeRozan embrace the Spurs?

Asked and answered — so far.

There's still virtually an entire season left to play, but neither Leonard nor DeRozan is showing any sign of unhappiness right now. And that's why both teams — for now, at least — can say the trade was a very good idea.

The bigger risk was taken by Toronto, who gave up an All-Star in DeRozan for a former (and now probably current) MVP candidate in Leonard who missed almost the entirety of last season with a leg injury that turned into one of the NBA's top mysteries of 2017-18. Leonard got a game off for maintenance last week, and his Spurs and Raptors teammate Danny Green — part of the trade as well — says he's still going to get better.

“He’s still not back to where he normally is, but he’s getting glimpses of it,” Green said. “He’s starting to get back to himself, get into his rhythm. And you know, he usually doesn’t miss many shots.”

Green said it might not be until December that Leonard is back to his old form.

That must be a terrifying sentiment to opponents. Leonard is shooting 46 percent, or only about 3.5 percent down from what he did during his tenure in San Antonio.

DeRozan is shooting 44 percent, basically right in line with his numbers from Toronto. Granted, again, it's early, but his scoring numbers are way up so far — and so are his assists, which is particularly vital to the Spurs since they lost two point guards before the season started with injuries. Dejounte Murray will not play this season because of a torn ACL, and Derrick White has heel pain that still has him sidelined.

# Red Sox beat Dodgers in World Series opener

BOSTON — The Fenway Funhouse proved too tricky, too cold and just too much for the beach boys.

Andrew Benintendi, J.D. Martinez and the Boston Red Sox came out swinging in the World Series opener, seizing every advantage in their quirky ballpark to beat the Los Angeles Dodgers 8-4 on a chilly, windy Tuesday night.

Benintendi had four hits, Martinez drove in two early runs and pinch-hitter Eduardo Nunez golfed a three-run homer to seal it. The 108-win Red Sox got a solid effort from their bullpen after an expected duel between aces Chris Sale and Clayton Kershaw never developed.

From the get-go, old Fenway Park caused all sorts of problems for the Dodgers.

Mookie Betts led off for the Red Sox with a popup that twisted first baseman David Freese as he tried to navigate the tight foul space near the stands and gauge the gusts. Lost, he overran the ball and it dropped behind him.

"You never really know," Benintendi said. "The flag will be blowing one way, and the wind is actually blowing the other. You have to be on your toes pretty much."

Given a second chance, Betts lined a single that set up a two-run first inning.

"It was important for us to score first and kind of put some pressure on them," he said.

In the seventh, newly inserted left fielder Joc Pederson looked hesitant as he chased Benintendi's soft fly, rushing toward the seats that jut out down the line. The ball ticked off his glove for a ground-rule double, and soon Nunez connected off Alex Wood to break open a 5-4 game.

"We didn't play the defense that we typically do. I thought we left some outs out there," Dodgers manager Dave Roberts said. "And it didn't make Clayton's job any easier."

The crowd and cold temperatures were no picnic for Los Angeles, either.

The oddly angled ballpark became an echo chamber even before the first pitch. Chants of "Beat LA!" began early, Kershaw got heckled with a sing-song serenade and Dodgers villain Manny Machado heard loud boos all evening.

Only one person wearing Dodger blue drew a cheer: Roberts, saluted in pregame introductions for the daring steal that turned the tide in Boston's 2004 playoff comeback against the Yankees.

"I think we had the advantage tonight with the weather and stuff. We've been playing through it," Red Sox pitcher Nathan Eovaldi said.

It was 53 degrees at first pitch and it dropped into the mid-40s by the end. That was the coldest game for Los Angeles this season and quite a contrast from last year's World Series, when it was a record 103 degrees for the opener at Dodger Stadium against Houston.

"We won Game 1 last year and lost the Series, so maybe we'll try it out this way. See if we can win one," Kershaw said.

Game 2 is Wednesday night, when it's supposed to be even colder. David Price, fresh from beating Houston

in the ALCS clincher, starts against Hyun-Jin Ryu.

Both teams rely heavily on analytics, and it showed: With each manager searching for the most beneficial matchup, the clubs combined to use 12 pitchers and six pinch-hitters.

Benintendi scored three times for Boston, trying for its fourth championship in 15 seasons.

Matt Kemp homered and Justin Turner had three hits for the Dodgers, aiming for their first crown since 1988. Machado drove in three runs, and his RBI grounder in the fifth inning made it 3-1.

Boston retook the lead in the bottom half when Xander Bogaerts hustled to beat out a potential inning-ending double play — Dodgers reliever Ryan Madson seemed to celebrate a little too early.

Rafael Devers followed with an RBI single, making it 5-3 and giving himself an early birthday present. He turned 22 at midnight, three minutes before the game ended.

Martinez, who led the majors with 130 RBIs, gave the crowd a scare when his foot slipped rounding second base on a run-scoring double in the third. He fell hard, but soon got up.

Steve Pearce, ruled safe at first on a replay review, scored from there on Martinez's

double. The ball hit a metal garage-type grate on the far center-field wall and took a weird carom, giving Pearce extra time to score.

A garage-style grate, used for groundskeeping vehicles and such. What other park has that in play?

A day before this opener, Kershaw and most of the Dodgers pooh-poohed the prospect that Fenway would cause them trouble. Most of them had never played at the oldest ballpark in the majors, built in 1912, but said they were sure they'd be OK.

It didn't quite turn out that way in their first trip to Fenway since 2010.

Besides, clubs coming to Beantown have other things to worry about.

"I think the biggest challenge for a team coming in here is you're playing the Boston Red Sox," Eovaldi said Monday.

The only other time the Dodgers and Red Sox met in the World Series was 1916, when Babe Ruth helped pitch Boston to the championship. Those games were at Braves Field, the bigger home park of the city's National League franchise.

Kershaw and Sale each started out wearing short sleeves, but neither warmed to the possibility of the marquee matchup. In similar outings,

both were pulled before getting an out in the fifth.

Kershaw took the loss in his first appearance at Fenway, tagged for five runs on seven hits and three walks. The three-time NL Cy Young Award winner fell to 9-9 in the postseason, his October results falling short of his brilliant regular-season resume.

"All the way around it wasn't a good night," Kershaw said.

Sale threw 91 pitches in his first outing since the ALCS opener. He was hospitalized last week for an unspecified stomach illness.

Matt Barnes, the first of six Boston relievers, got the win. Eovaldi pitched the eighth and Craig Kimbrel worked the ninth as the Red Sox bullpen held the Dodgers to one run on three hits in five innings.

Boston manager Alex Cora won in his first try guiding a club in the Series. This also marked the first World Series game between teams led by minority managers.

## Yay for Yaz

Red Sox great Carl Yastrzemski bounced the ceremonial first pitch, and decided that just wouldn't do. So he called for another ball, and the 79-year-old Hall of Famer threw a strike to injured Boston star Dustin Pedroia.

## First up

The Red Sox have won Game 1 in six straight World Series, dating to 1975 vs. the Big Red Machine. ... Boston is 8-0 this postseason when scoring first. ... The team that wins the opener has won 62 percent of the championships.

## Up next

Price had been 0-9 in 11 postseason starts before pitching six scoreless innings to help close out the Astros in Game 5. Ryu was 1-1 with a 3.40 ERA in three playoff starts this year.

"It's huge (that we eliminate them)," UF coach Dan Mullen said. "Explosive plays usually lead to points. So, it's a big thing."

It's a huge thing this week, because explosive plays are what led to the 42-7 rout at the hands of the Bulldogs a year ago.

The Gators gave up touchdown runs of 74, 45 and 39 yards.

That's far too much explosiveness to overcome.

Middle linebacker David Reese said the Gators have to be mentally sharp this week to avoid getting burned by big plays again.

"Huge," he said. "That's mental. It's all mental. As long as we know what we've got to do, meet extra with our coaches, we'll be OK. It's the

type of week where you've really got to zone in and hit your books, really know what you have to do so you don't second guess when you're out there on that field.

"Even if they get that explosive play, we've just got to make it hard for them to score. If we're hard to score on, we're going to be hard to beat. Even if we give up an explosive play, we've got to keep our head up and don't let them in (the end zone)."

Explosive plays — plays of 20 yards or longer — tend to be game changers in the SEC, and certainly in a big game like this one.

So, going in, advantage Georgia. The Bulldogs lead the nation in the fewest explosive plays allowed (14). The Gators are 34th in the nation, with 27.

The team that gives up the fewest, or makes the most, explosive plays has the better chance to succeed, UF coach Dan Mullen said.

"In this league, it's hard

to put together 12-, 15-play drives and come away with points," he said. "We look at them at both sides of the ball. You look, if we've hit a bunch of explosive plays, we probably were able to put some points on the board. If we did not give up explosive plays, we probably held them to a

low-scoring output.

"The quality of defense as you play top teams — to sit there and just say, 'Hey, our goal, our plan is to drive it 16 plays every time we have the ball' — that's great, but it's probably unrealistic with the type of teams that play in this league."

They have a style of play that they have to play to or the community won't respect them."

Arnold won last year's meeting between the teams 24-14 in Panama City Beach. If the Marlins are to win the rematch at Shark Field, Wright said they'll have to keep some of the Tiger Sharks' more explosive players like running backs Russell Russ and Jasmin Thomas, receivers Kendre Gant and Cameron Harmon, and quarterback

Josh Butts in check.

"We just want to get their playmakers on the ground," he said. "Anybody wearing a single digit (number) can take it to the house. They've got a guy (Butts) who runs the show and is a gritty competitor. I felt we played them real well here a year ago, but it's a different deal down there. I wish we were playing them

here, I'll just say that. They're awfully good down there."

Wright said he evacuated before the storm with his family and had difficulty communicating with all of his players and coaches after coming back. Some of the players whose parents lost their homes have left to enroll at other schools in other districts and in some cases other states, while there are two coaches who are displaced and no longer able to be with the team and a third out of town still waiting to get power back.

The Marlins have been able to practice on their home

field since Monday, forging a path through a clearing off of Alf Coleman road to get to Gavlak Stadium at Arnold High School, which has been used as a staging area for Gulf Power. Whatever difficulties the Marlins have faced, Wright said it has been worth it to see the reaction of his players as they prepare themselves to play football again.

"We knew we had some challenges to work through," he said. "All in all, it's been a challenge, but it has been rewarding to see these kids get back to doing what they enjoy doing."

## Koepka's biggest feat as No. 1 is getting there

Reaching No. 1 in the world felt even sweeter to Brooks Koepka because of how he got there. Golf is about winning, and the world ranking is merely a result of that. For all the math involved in a formula that tries to measure performance over two years, it's a lot easier to understand when the new No. 1 is posing with a trophy. Dustin Johnson knows that feeling. So does Rory McIlroy.

others listed in the Official World Golf Ranking. This was the sixth tournament where Koepka had a chance to reach No. 1. He was poised to get there at the start of the FedEx Cup playoffs until Johnson birdied his last four holes for a 61 to stay No. 1 by a slim margin. The next week, Johnson closed with a 64 to finish one shot ahead of Koepka. And the following week, Rose went from No. 4 to No. 1 with his playoff loss in the BMW Championship. Koepka shot 78 in the second round at East Lake to squander another opportunity. He tied for seventh at the Dunhill Links Championship. And then, finally, he won the CJ Cup with a birdie-par-eagle finish for a 29 on the back nine. Inevitable? There was another multiple major champion who would say otherwise. Because while golf celebrates a new No. 1 — the fourth this year, matching the most in a single year since 1997 — Koepka becoming the 23rd player at No. 1 is another reminder that the list does not include Phil Mickelson. Lefty looked to be a lock to reach No. 1 in 2010, when Woods was recovering from the downfall in his personal life and the gap was shrinking by the week. Mickelson won the Masters to get back to No. 2. He was runner-up at Quail Hollow. The Players Championship was the first time in his career that he had a mathematical chance to be No. 1. Needing a victory, he bogeyed three of his opening six holes, closed with a 74 and tied for 17th. Then it was off to Colonial, where he had won two years earlier. He missed the cut. At the Memorial, he tied for fifth. "I don't know the ranking system or world points or how that works, nor do I care," Mickelson said that year. "I just know that if I continue to play well, ultimately in the long run, it will happen." But it never did.

**Control the pace:** The Hawkeyes dominated time of possession last week in a 23-0 victory over Maryland. Iowa's offense maintained possession for 40 minutes, 55 seconds — more than two-thirds of the game. The Terrapins ran 39 plays compared with Iowa's 76. If Iowa can dictate the tempo against Penn State, it would serve the dual purpose of wearing down a shaky Lions defense while allowing QB Nate Stanley to pick his spots for success.

**Stay sharp on defense:** Iowa ranks third nationally in total defense, allowing 258.1 yards per game. The Hawkeyes held Maryland quarterback Kasim Hill to 47 passing yards

last week. Granted, Penn State's Trace McSorley poses a more significant threat than Hill.

**KEYS FOR PENN STATE**

**Challenge Iowa's defensive front:** Penn State's offense has cooled since a 4-0 start in which it averaged 55.5 points per game. The Nittany Lions have scored only 76 points in their past three games, two losses and a narrow win at Indiana. Penn State's offensive line must challenge Iowa's front seven to give running back Miles Sanders a chance.

**Catch the ball:** McSorley has lacked help from his receiving corps, who have been inconsistent and unreliable in accruing more than 20 drops. McSorley

has tried to combat the Nittany Lions' lack of passing success by making plays with his feet, but his young receivers will need to do more to counteract the dropping dilemma.
