2 with Bay ties die in storm

One woman moved there after being displaced by Hurricane Michael

PANAMA CITY — She lost her home in Hurricane

Michael. She lost her life in the Beauregard, Alabama tornadoes on March 3.

Sheila Creech, 59, of Panama City Beach, was among the 23 killed when an EF4 tornado brought 170 mph winds and carved a mile-wide path of destruction through the tiny town.

According to reports in

the Montgomery Advertiser, Creech and her partner, Marshal Lynn Grimes, 59, were camping Sunday when the tornado struck, killing them both. Grimes' 11-year-old daughter, who was camping with them, was injured in the storm and suffered two broken legs.

Creech had been living

in Panama City Beach until Hurricane Michael damaged her apartment, according to reports. She was staying with Grimes at his home in Beauregard — the two had recently rekindled their romance online after sharing two children together but breaking

DeSantis opens Legislature

TALLAHASSEE — Republican Ron DeSantis opened the 2019 Legislature with a State of the State address that coursed Tuesday over schools, the environment, illegal immigration and even foreign policy, as the first-year governor outlined a wide landscape he sees ripe for action.

In his speech, DeSantis spoke for a longer-than-usual, 35 minutes to a joint session of the House and Senate.

He quoted late Beatle George Harrison on the economy — citing lyrics from “Taxman” — and touched on topics ranging from school vouchers and state licensing

In DeSantis's opening remarks, he pledged to “stand with” Hurricane Michael impacted areas during the Legislative session to help cut through red tape to expedite relief efforts and rebuild.

Here's what Bay County's representatives had to say:

Sen. George Gainer: “Governor DeSantis has not missed an opportunity to declare his commitment to the restoration of the Panhandle. This is invaluable as I work here in Tallahassee for strategic relief

He also provided a pep talk to the GOP-led House and Senate.

in rebuilding our communities. Thank you Governor.”

Rep. Jay Trumbull: “As we begin the 2019 legislative session, I want to thank Governor DeSantis, our CFO Jimmy Patronis and our legislative leadership for making a commitment to post-Hurricane Michael recovery. I will not rest until we have secured the support we need, and I looking forward to finalizing those conversations over the next seven weeks.”

“I think we here in this chamber are the right leaders at the right time,” DeSantis said. “After all, many are called to serve in elected

Bay County unveils code enforcement plan post hurricane

PANAMA CITY — Bay County property owners have from now through October to show progress on needed Hurricane Michael cleanup before any code enforcement actions are taken, officials said Tuesday.

TODAY IN HISTORY

Today is Wednesday, March 6, the 65th day of 2019. There are 300 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On March 6, 1857, the U.S. Supreme Court, in Dred Scott v. Sandford, ruled 7-2 that Scott, a slave, was not an American citizen and therefore could not sue for his freedom in federal court.

On this date: In 1475, Italian artist and poet Michelangelo was born in Caprese in the Republic of Florence. In 1836, the Alamo in San Antonio, Texas, fell as Mexican forces led by General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna stormed the fortress after a 13-day siege; the battle claimed the lives of all the Texan defenders, nearly 200 strong, including William Travis, James Bowie and Davy Crockett. In 1912, Oreo sandwich cookies were first introduced by the National Biscuit Co. In 1944, U.S. heavy bombers staged the first full-scale American raid on Berlin during World War II. In 1953, Georgy Malenkov was named premier of the Soviet Union a day after the death of Josef Stalin. In 1964, heavyweight boxing champion Cassius Clay officially changed his name to Muhammad Ali. In 1970, a bomb being built inside a Greenwich Village townhouse by the radical Weathermen accidentally went off, destroying the house and killing three group members. In 1983, in a case that drew much notoriety, a woman was gang-raped atop a pool table in a tavern in New Bedford, Massachusetts, called Big Dan's; four men were later convicted of the attack. In 2008, a Palestinian killed eight students at a Jewish seminary in Jerusalem before he was slain; Hamas militants in the Gaza Strip praised the operation in a statement, and thousands of Palestinians took to the streets of Gaza to celebrate.

Tornado dead range in age from 6 to 89

BEAUREGARD, Ala. — The youngest victim was 6, the oldest 89. Relatives said one extended family lost 10 members.

The 23 people killed in the nation's deadliest tornado in nearly six years came into focus Tuesday with the release of their names by the coroner.

They included 6-year-old Armando Hernandez Jr., known as "AJ," torn from his father's arms two days after singing in his first-grade class musical; 10-year-old Taylor Thornton, who loved horses and was visiting a friend's home when the twister struck; and Jimmy Lee Jones, 89, who perished along with his wife of six decades, Mary Louise, and one of their sons.

"Just keep those families in your prayers," Lee County Coroner Bill Harris said, two days after the disaster.

The search for victims, pets and belongings in and around the devastated rural community of Bearegard continued amid the din of beeping heavy machinery and whining chain saws. But Sheriff Jay Jones said the list of the missing had shrunk from dozens to just seven or eight.

"We've got piles of rubble that we are searching just to make sure," said Opelika Fire Chief Byron Prather Jr. "We don't think we'll find nobody

there, but we don't want to leave any stone unturned."

Four children were killed, ages 6, 8, 9 and 10.

The youngest, AJ, had taken shelter in a closet with his father and older brother when the tornado hit, said Jack Crisp, the boy's uncle. The punishing winds tore the family's home apart, Crisp said, and pulled both boys from their father's arms.

"He had them squeezed tight, and he said when it came through, it just took them," Crisp said. "It just demolished the house and took them."

The boy's father and brother both survived. AJ

did not.

Jackie Jones said she and her siblings rushed to her parents' house after the storm passed and nobody answered the phone. "They usually answer on the first ring," she said.

The siblings found the home reduced to its foundation. One of their two brothers who lived at the house survived and was taken to a hospital. But Jimmy Lee and Mary Louise Jones, married for more than 60 years, had died along with their 53-year-old son Emmanuel.

Those three deaths meant cousins Cordarrly and

Demetria Jones lost their grandparents and an uncle. They said seven others killed were their cousins by blood and marriage.

"Everybody in this area just about was related," said Demetria Jones, 28. "It's devastating."

The body of David Wayne Dean, 53, was found by his son in a neighbor's yard after the twister demolished his mobile home. He was known as "Roaddog" because of his love for Harley-Davidson motorcycles.

"He was done and gone before we got to him," said his sobbing widow, Carol Dean, who was at work at

Walmart when the storm hit. "My life is gone. He was the reason I lived, the reason that I got up."

The tornado was an EF4 with winds estimated at 170 mph (274 kph) and carved a path of destruction up to nine-tenths of a mile (1.4 kilometers) wide in Alabama, scraping up the earth in a phenomenon known as "ground rowing," the National Weather Service said. It traveled a remarkable 70 miles or so through Alabama and Georgia, where it caused more damage.

Ninety people were injured in the Bearegard area, authorities said. Most have been released from the hospital.

President Donald Trump said he will visit Alabama on Friday to see the damage. "It's been a tragic situation, but a lot of good work is being done," he said at the White House.

Along the two-lane country road where some of the victims died, firefighters used heavy machinery to overturn pieces of houses that were blown into a gully. A car sat atop the remains of one house. A red-brick foundation was all that was left at another lot.

The search took its toll around Bearegard, an unincorporated area of roughly 10,000 people near the Georgia line. Church chaplain Ike Mathews walked down a road lined with broken trees and debris as he went to check on members of his congregation and emergency workers.

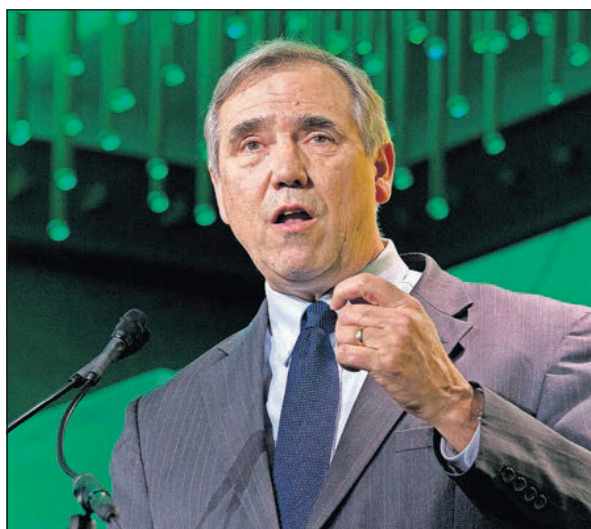

Thousands on strike in Sudan calling for president's ouster

A one-day strike shuttered businesses and emptied streets in the Sudanese capital of Khartoum and other parts of the country on Tuesday, activists said, as pressure mounted on longtime autocratic President Omar al-Bashir to step down following more than two months of deadly protests.

Initially sparked by rising prices and shortages, the unrest quickly turned to calls for al-Bashir to resign after two decades in power. A heavy security crackdown has killed scores since the current wave of demonstrations began in December, the most serious protests against al-Bashir.

'Happy thoughts' helped lost California girls survive ordeal

Two girls who were lost in a dense Northern California forest for nearly two days say they survived frigid nights by huddling under a tree branch and a huckleberry bush and by thinking "happy thoughts."

Leia Carrico, 8, and her 5-year-old sister Caroline, said in an interview Monday they went on a hike last Friday past a marker that their parents told them not to pass because they wanted an adventure but lost their way home.

"I just wanted a little more adventure, I said to go a little farther," Caroline said.

Leia said her sister cried the entire first night and she told her to think happy thoughts as they huddled under a tree branch close to the ground.

CARACAS, VENEZUELA

Venezuela's adversaries seek to show resolve in crisis

Appearing a day after his rival returned home to a tumultuous welcome, President Nicolas Maduro denounced his opponents in a speech Tuesday at a military ceremony but did not refer by name to opposition leader Juan Guaido. The man who says he is the rightful president, meanwhile, escalated his campaign to topple Maduro with an appeal for support from state unions, long reliant on government handouts.

The dueling scenes, evidence of the rift in a country in crisis, came as Venezuelans and the world awaited the next moves of two adversaries maneuvering for an edge in what could be a protracted struggle.

PARIS

Macron's plea for Europe lays down battle lines for May vote

French President Emmanuel Macron drew both support and skepticism Tuesday with a clarion call to voters in 28 nations to choose a stronger European Union and reject populists, amid concerns that euroskeptics could achieve unprecedented success in upcoming European Parliament elections.

In a column published for Tuesday's editions throughout the bloc, Macron advised voters in the May 23-26 EU parliament elections to reject national parties that "offer nothing," laying down the battle lines for the vote.

Instead, he called on people to support parties who want to strengthen Europe.

ISLAMABAD

Search for Italian, Scot climber resumes on Pakistan peak

Armed with drones, Spanish and Pakistani mountaineers searched Tuesday despite diminishing hopes for two European climbers who went missing over a week ago on the world's ninth-highest mountain in bad weather, officials said.

The search for Italian Daniele Nardi and Briton Tom Ballard, missing for more than a week on Nanga Parbat — known as "Killer Mountain" because of its dangerous conditions — produced no leads on Monday, increasing fears the pair may have perished.

Though the latest search by rescuers remained unsuccessful, the operation was likely to continue Wednesday.

in March so recipients in Bay County can cover rate jumps triggered by the approaching tourism season. But with the TSA program set to expire on April 11, and so many people still without alternative housing options, county officials want to convince FEMA to extend the aid up to 90 days.

"We need an extension because people in

that program still need more time," said Philip Griffiths, chairman of the Bay County Commission. FEMA raised payouts to \$240 per night from \$188 a night this month for residents in the TSA program. According to FEMA, of the 431 people are in the program because of Hurricane Michael, 385 are from Bay County.

Joel Schubert, assistant county manager, said the county has asked the state to request the program be extended 90 days past the April deadline. Schubert said the state would soon

finalize the letter request and submit it to FEMA.

FEMA requires that requests like program extensions come from a state, not a local government like the commission.

"We're going to push for that 90-day extension ... we want to try to give these people every possibility," Schubert said. "Meanwhile, we're working with faith-based and other nonprofits to give them some options."

Rep. Neal Dunn, R-Panama City is also aware of the county's hopes to extend the

program and stands ready to help, Shelby Hodgkins, spokeswoman for the congressman, wrote in a recent email to The News Herald.

"Dr. Dunn is supportive of measures to address the housing issues, such as a TSA extension, and stands ready to help in any way he can," Hodgkins wrote.

Leo Skinner, spokesman for FEMA, said his agency was working closely with the state and hotels to help people in TSA and would likely consider an extension of the program.

"In other disasters, FEMA has approved

extensions and in others it has not, it just depends on the situation," Skinner said.

Skinner said FEMA was looking at other options for people in the program. Of the Bay residents in the program, 45 people were slated to move into FEMA's other housing program that provides temporary trailers, Skinner said. Another 50 people have been identified as eligible for housing through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, he said.

"We take this very

seriously because we do not want anyone living on the street," Skinner said.

Schubert said the extension would be preferable in the meantime, given that other FEMA housing options have been slow to date. He noted that as of Friday, while FEMA has installed about 700 temporary trailers in the county, they're not all being used because the agency hasn't finished registering eligible families.

"About 500 families are licensed in ... they do not have all the families licensed in," he said.

manager, said that code enforcement officers would keep up with property owners in the coming months after the initial assessment to document progress. The county will work with owners who try to improve their properties

but are slowed for different reasons, Majka said.

"For instance, we know some people are just now getting settlements from insurance," Majka said. "It could be well after October before most of these properties get back in compliance."

For properties that show no progress, particularly those foreclosed on or are a health hazard, more

aggressive steps will be taken, he said.

"We will do a clean and lien process," Majka said. "This is what we plan to do to move forward."

Commissioners agreed they wanted to show compassion and do everything possible to work with owners trying to clean their properties.

"But we've got to move forward," Commissioner William Dozier said of code enforcement. "If we don't start some type of measure, there will be areas that will continue to be left in shambles."

Philip Griffiths, chairman of the commission, agreed with Dozier that the county had to push forward.

"It's time to start executing a plan," Griffiths said.

During the meeting, the commission also agreed that Majka and Griffiths should negotiate hiring at least a state and possibly federal lobbyist to hopefully get as much hurricane relief money for the county as possible.

"What's most important to me is we have the right person on the ground to articulate what's most important to us," Majka said.

About 40 local, hurricane recovery-related bills have already been filed in the Florida Legislature on behalf of school boards and municipalities. The county, Majka said, should do whatever possible to make those funding requests happen for the area.

Majka noted that he

didn't want to hire lobbyists on a retainer, just for the current legislative session, which began on Tuesday.

"Once we get to July, if there's any reason to extend a contract, we can come back and talk about it," Majka said to the commission.

Commissioner Robert Carroll said he supported having a lobbyist, but emphasized that the entire commission should lobby to legislators on behalf of the county too.

"We need to be 100 percent committed to going to Tallahassee," Carroll said.

Later in the meeting, the commission voted to apply for a portion of \$15 million recently set aside from Gulf Coast oil spill settlement money to help cover

tax revenue losses from the hurricane.

Last month, the Triumph Gulf Coast Board, which oversees the use of settlement money from the 2010 Deepwater Horizon disaster, allocated the money for Bay, Gulf, Franklin and Wakulla Counties — areas hit by the hurricane and eligible for settlement money. The counties must apply for the money and can only use it to cover up to 50 percent of their ad valorem property tax revenue losses expected from the hurricane.

The county estimates a \$4 million loss in property tax revenue because of the hurricane.

"Our goal is not to raise taxes, so we need this to offset the loss," Griffiths said of the Triumph money.

up in their younger years — while her apartment was repaired. According to news reports, she and Grimes had plans to get married next year.

Another former Bay County resident was also among those killed. Felicia Woodall, 22, lived in Panama City for years and had recently bought a home in Beauregard with her fiancé, Ryan Pence, 22. The home was completely destroyed in the tornado, according to social media posts by

family members and both Woodall and Pence were killed.

"It's so sad," said long-time friend Amber Finley. "I don't know that I have ever met a nicer person."

Government teams surveying storm damage confirmed Tuesday that at least 18 tornadoes struck on Sunday in

Alabama, Florida, Georgia and South Carolina alone. The youngest victim was 6-years-old, the oldest 89, and one family lost seven members. Four of the victims were children. Sheriff Jay Jones said the list of the missing had shrunk from dozens to just seven or eight.

office, but only a few are actually entrusted with authority by the voters.

“Fewer still are presented with the opportunities we see before us today,” he concluded.

Since being sworn-in just short of two months ago, DeSantis has emerged as an active executive, issuing orders aimed at improving environmental oversight, revamping school testing, suspending local officials for alleged misdeeds and stepping-up the state’s battle with opioid abuse.

DeSantis noted Alexander Hamilton’s views as an inspiration, saying the statesman thought that “energy in the executive is the leading character in the definition of good government.”

“I believe it, and I’ve worked to exemplify it,” DeSantis told lawmakers.

A former three-term member of Congress from Palm Coast, where he was part of the arch-conservative Freedom Caucus and a protégé of President Trump, DeSantis urged lawmakers to also vigorously tackle the issues facing Florida.

“How can we accomplish this task?” DeSantis said. “I answer simply: Be bold.”

Before DeSantis spoke, the new leaders of the House and Senate had their turn to lay out plans for the 60-day session.

House Speaker Jose Oliva, R-Miami, touted legislation he is pushing that would overhaul a wide range of health regulations, opening the industry to more

competition that he says will drive prices down and make insurance more affordable.

He also called for stricter oversight of university building projects. Misuse of taxpayer operating money for construction at the University of Central Florida has already led to the resignation of UCF President Dale Whittaker and prompted an internal investigation of spending at the University of Florida.

Senate President Bill Galvano, R-Bradenton, who wants state transportation officials to begin planning for three major highway projects, steered clear of his priority list, instead urging lawmakers to work together, and maximize each session day.

But he said the quality of legislation is what will endure.

“History will not judge us based on the number of bills we pass, or the steps toward fulfilling a personal agenda,” Galvano told senators. “History will judge us based on the quality of our actions.”

DeSantis, though, also focused on quantity.

He repeated his signature pitch for \$625 million for water resource projects and Everglades restoration in a state still reeling from last summer’s toxic algae outbreaks that killed fish and drove away tourists.

But the governor was only getting started: He segued into talk about promoting Florida’s economy, in part, by rolling back state licensing requirements, while also giving Galvano’s road projects some support.

It was here that the “Taxman” reference came up. “If you get too

cold they tax the heat, if you take a walk they tax your feet,” DeSantis echoed, while pledging to keep Florida a low-tax state.

DeSantis also repeated his call for legislation that would require local law enforcement agencies to assist federal immigration officials in detaining suspected undocumented immigrants.

The so-called ban on sanctuary cities is opposed by many Democrats, religious organizations and Hispanic communities, who fear it could lead to racial profiling.

DeSantis also used the State of the State to renew his condemnation of the Maduro regime in Venezuela, communism in Cuba, and blasted efforts to boycott Israel over its occupation of the West Bank as a “cover for anti-Semitism.”

On education, DeSantis highlighted his \$423 million teacher bonus plan – a reworking of the current Best and Brightest program that could make 40,000 “highly effective” teachers eligible for as much as an extra \$10,000 each, an idea supported by many from both parties.

The governor also promoted his plans for another new private school voucher program – to cover a 14,000-student waiting list for an existing voucher program—a move roundly ridiculed by House and Senate Democrats.

“Let me give a message to the governor,” said Rep. Shevrin Jones, D- West Park. “Although you outlined an education agenda, you forgot about one thing. You forgot about our public schools.”

General: US has no plan to stop Russia from building missiles

The top American general in Europe said the U.S. military does not yet have a plan to prevent Russia from building more nuclear-capable intermediate-range missiles once a treaty between Washington and Moscow banning the rockets ends in five months.

Army Gen. Curtis Scaparrotti told the Senate Armed Services Committee on Tuesday that the United States and its allies were still looking at options after the Trump administration withdrew from the Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces Treaty on Feb. 1, triggering a six-month period before its formal dissolution.

“We in fact have told our allies in NATO that we will do this planning in collaboration with them. We have begun that. So, I don’t know that we have a plan today,” said Scaparrotti, supreme allied commander for Europe and head of the U.S. European Command. “I know that we are working on what we think that plan might be.”

Scaparrotti suggested that the United States should consider some sort of new or revived treaty with Russia to set limits and create stability. “From my point of view,

when you have a peer competitor, and particularly a modernizing one that will be challenging you, such as Russia, we should look toward treaty capabilities in order to provide some stability, to provide signals and communications and limits that we understand and that we can work from,” he said.

Russia is not challenging the United States in Europe only in the nuclear space. Moscow has brokered a deal to provide Turkey with an S-400 missile-defense system, provoking ire in Washington by making

inroads with a U.S. NATO ally. Scaparrotti said Tuesday that the United States should withhold the F-35 fighter jet from Turkey as long as Ankara proceeds with buying anti-aircraft systems from Russia.

The issue is part of a broader standoff with Russia in Europe, with the INF Treaty the latest flash point.

Signed by President Ronald Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev in 1987, the treaty banned the production, deployment and testing of nuclear and conventional

ground-launch missiles with ranges between 500 and 5,500 kilometers (311 and 3,418 miles).

The United States pulled out of the treaty last month, alleging violations by Russia that included the deployment of the Novator 9M729, a ground-launch cruise missile that Washington warned was contravening the treaty. Russia denied the accusations and in turn accused the United States of violating the pact with missile defense installations — an allegation the State Department rejected.

Democrats confront divide over Israel

Omar comments the flashpoint as party's divisions come to the forefront

WASHINGTON — Back in January, the Democrats welcomed their brash young newcomers to Congress with smiles and hugs. That was before the new colleagues dragged the party's simmering divisions over Israel out in the open.

Provocative comments from Rep. Ilhan Omar of Minnesota have thrust the Democrats into an uncomfortable debate over Israel policy a few weeks before a high-profile conference where senior Democrats typically make a show of support for the Jewish state. Increasingly, the rift appears as much generational as ideological, with newly elected Democrats showing less deference to

the party line.

Omar became the flashpoint after she suggested last week that Israel's supporters are pushing U.S. lawmakers to take a pledge of “allegiance to a foreign country.” It's at least the third time she has forced older, pro-Israel Democrats who run the House into awkward territory over U.S.-Israeli policy.

Republicans have been happy to stoke the furor, with President Donald Trump calling Omar's remarks “a dark day for Israel” and posting a photo of himself in Jerusalem. Inside the Democratic family, meanwhile, leaders are in a bind, torn between a need to admonish Omar for her comments and their desire to defend one of the first Muslim women ever elected to Congress.

This time Omar is not apologizing. And this time pro-Israel Democrats led by Speaker

Nancy Pelosi are not just warning her about the dangers of Jewish tropes. They're expected to offer a resolution condemning anti-Semitism on the House floor.

“Accusations of dual loyalty generally have an insidious, bigoted history,” a draft of the resolution reads in part. “The House of Representatives acknowledges the dangerous consequences of perpetuating anti-Semitic stereotypes and rejects anti-Semitism as hateful expressions of intolerance that are contradictory to the values that define the people of the United States.”

The text, which includes a history of bigotry against Muslims and blacks as well as Jews, sounds unobjectionable by itself. But the fact that senior Democrats felt obliged to put the House on-record on the topic points to a transformation in the country

— mostly among Democrats — about supporting the Jewish state.

In a poll by the Pew Research Center in January of last year, 46 percent of Americans said they sympathized more with Israel and 16 percent with the Palestinians in their Middle East discord.

But Democrats are about evenly divided, with about a quarter sympathizing with each side and the rest saying they side with neither or don't know — and in recent years they have become less likely to sympathize with Israel than they were in the past. Liberal Democrats were nearly twice as likely to say they sympathize more with the Palestinians (35 percent) than with Israel (19 percent). Older Americans were much more likely to say they sympathize with Israel than with the Palestinians, with more division among younger Americans.

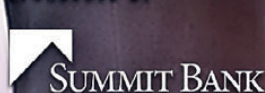

Tornado forecasting improves, but still deaths keep coming

WASHINGTON — Sometimes in forecasting tornadoes, you can get everything technically right, and yet it all goes horribly wrong.

Three days before the killer Alabama tornado struck, government severe-storm meteorologists cautioned that conditions could be ripe for twisters in the Southeast on Sunday. Then, an hour before the tragedy, they warned that a strong tornado could occur in two particular Alabama counties within 30 to 60 minutes.

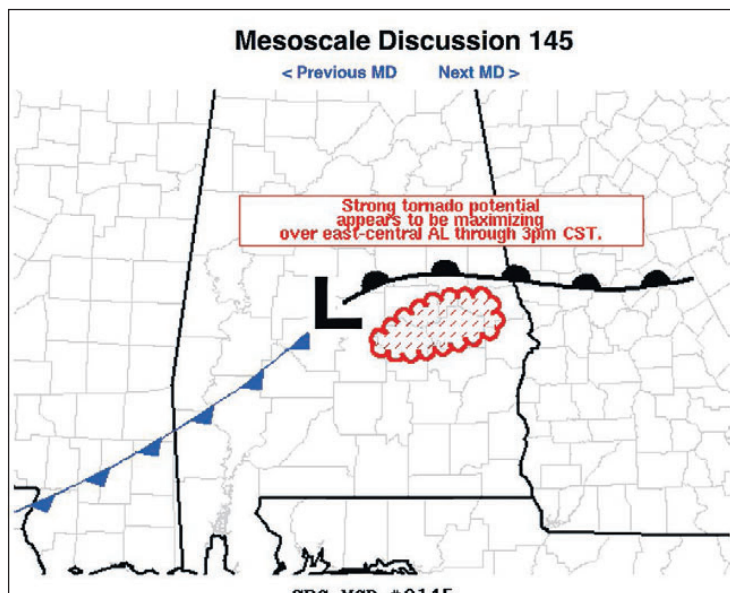
And that's what happened. Yet 23 people died.

To a meteorologist, the forecast was the equivalent of a hole-in-one in golf or a slam dunk, but with so many people killed, "was it a success or a failure or both?" asked Colorado State University meteorology professor Russ Schumacher.

Forecasters "painted a pretty clear picture that something bad was going to happen," Schumacher said, and "there's certainly success in that. On the other hand, we don't like to see entire communities to be turned upside-down like this. So there's more to be done."

Predicting with any precision where a tornado is going to go is still beyond the limits of meteorology, which is why warnings went out for a large two-county area when a tornado might be only half a mile wide. And getting people to listen and take precautions is another matter altogether.

Forecasting tornadoes combines the hard physics of meteorology, the softer

human factors of social science and more than a dash of chaos.

At the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Storm Prediction Center in Norman, Oklahoma, forecasters look for certain ingredients that can make a tornado. These include warm moist air coming from the south and stormy weather chugging from the west that can bring instability. That's when you can get supercells, which is where tornadoes come from.

But maybe only 10 to 20 percent of supercells spawn tornadoes, said prediction center forecast operations chief Bill Bunting. There are other factors at work, including erratic wind behavior known as wind shear, the amount of cold air present, even the size of the rain droplets, meteorologists said. And then there are the unknown factors at play.

Given all that, the best meteorologists can do is say seven to eight days out — four to five is more usual — when conditions will be ripe for tornadoes, Bunting said. And even that doesn't mean they will happen. And certainly not over all of the large area that meteorologists give in their several-day-out alerts.

From 1994 to 2017, the weather service's "false alarm" rate for tornado alerts was 74 percent, while last year it dropped to 69 percent, according to weather service spokeswoman Maureen O'Leary.

The problem is that a tornado is a rare, small, fleeting event, harder to predict than giant phenomena like hurricanes or big winter storms. A one-mile variation in a tornado's path can mean the difference between plowing up a field and wreaking havoc in a populated area, Bunting said.

Recent study says measles vaccine does not cause autism

The notion that vaccines might cause autism was refuted nine years ago, when a British medical panel concluded in 2010 that Andrew Wakefield, the doctor with undisclosed financial interests in making such claims, had acted with "callous disregard" in conducting his research.

But in 2019, professional epidemiologists are still devoting time and resources to discrediting Wakefield's work, which set off a steep decline in vaccinations, including in the United States, where Wakefield moved in 2004. An increasing number of parents are exempting their children from immunization for religious, personal and medical reasons, in a trend that public health experts warn is threatening to reverse the progress that allowed officials to declare measles eliminated in the U.S. in 2000. In January and February of this year, 206 individual cases were confirmed in 11 states — more than the number of cases in all of 2017.

The latest evidence unequivocally denying any link between autism and the vaccine for measles, mumps and rubella — a two-dose course that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says is 97 percent effective — came Monday in a paper published in the *Annals of Internal Medicine*.

Researchers at Copenhagen's Statens Serum Institut examined data for Danish children born from 1999

through the end of 2010, more than half a million people all together. The epidemiologists and statisticians then used population registries to link information on vaccination status to autism diagnoses, as well as to sibling history of autism and other risk factors.

The findings show that the vaccine does not increase the risk of autism, lending new statistical certainty to what was already medical consensus. The researchers further concluded that vaccination is not likely to trigger the developmental disorder in susceptible populations and is not associated with a clustering of cases appearing after immunization.

"The appropriate interpretation is that there's no association whatsoever," Saad Omer, a professor of global health, epidemiology and pediatrics at Emory University, said in an interview with *The Washington Post*.

In an editorial accompanying the study, however, Omer and a colleague asked whether vaccine research was best conducted as a "response to the conspiracy du jour." Limited resources, they suggested, might be better spent on promising leads in autism research than on continuing to engage with "vaccine skeptics."

Omer nevertheless hailed the Danish paper as "the largest, or one of the largest, studies on the subject." Its only limitation, he said, was one basic to all observation studies, that "you can't intentionally vaccinate people or prevent them from vaccinating to study the effects, which would be unethical."

ANKARA, TURKEY US ends trade deals with India, Turkey

Turkey and India reacted with a mix of anger and resignation Tuesday at the United States' decision to end a preferential trade program with the countries that will see some tariffs return on goods.

U.S. Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer announced Monday that India and Turkey will within 60 days no longer qualify for a zero-tariffs status that is given to some poor countries to help them grow. The decision came at U.S. President Donald Trump's direction.

Turkey's trade minister slammed the decision, saying it would only harm American small- and medium-sized enterprises and manufacturers by raising costs.

NEW YORK Target hits on all cylinders in the 4Q

Target's expanded online delivery options, new brands and updated stores helped drive shoppers to spend more during the critical holiday shopping season.

Target, which is trying to narrow the gap between itself and online leader Amazon, enjoyed a 31 percent spike in online sales. Comparable sales, which include sales at stores opened at least a year and online sales, rose 5.3 percent. It was the best performance since 2004 and surpassed the 5 percent growth that industry analysts had expected, according to a survey by FactSet.

WASHINGTON US new-home sales rose 3.7 percent in December

Sales of new U.S. homes climbed in December to their highest pace in seven months, a sign that lower mortgage rates are helping the real estate market.

The Commerce Department said Tuesday that new-home sales rose 3.7 percent in December to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 621,000. November's sales were revised down to 599,000 from an annual rate of 657,000.

For all of 2018, new-home sales rose 1.5 percent.

Holiday season defines retail's winners, losers

NEW YORK — The 2018 holiday season turned out to be a mixed bag for retailers, with some of them defying a gloomy government report in December that raised concerns that shoppers were hunkering down everywhere.

Retailers like Walmart, Target and Best Buy that have been responding faster to a more competitive landscape with expanded delivery services and spruced up stores are enjoying strong sales. Off-price chains like T.J. Maxx parent that offer treasure hunt experiences have remained a sweet spot.

But mall-based clothing chains and department stores — particularly those that target the middle-income shoppers — continue to muddle along. Macy's had weak holiday sales, ending a year-long recovery after a three-year slump. J.C. Penney and Gap are both closing more stores after lackluster holiday sales.

2019 is expected to be challenging as economic growth is expected to slow. The once-strong housing market is cooling. And smaller tax refunds could put a damper on the current quarter results, hurting sales of big ticket items like TVs.

If shoppers pull back, analysts say that the healthy

retailers will face some pressure to get them to spend. But for the already struggling chains that have been in a slump despite a strong economy, their prospects will become even worse.

"If you are sitting in the mall and you are watching all the stores closing around you, it has to be disheartening," said Ken Perkins, president of Retail Metrics, a retail research firm. "But there are a handful of big box stores that will be able to weather any downturn. They have the capital to pick up market share as others struggle."

Here's a closer look at the winners and losers:

OFF-PRICE STORES TO REMAIN STRONG

Off-priced chains gained market share and expanded rapidly during the depths of the Great Recession and stayed strong during the economic recovery. Retail consultant Craig Johnson doesn't see their fortunes fading anytime soon.

TJX Cos., which operates T.J. Maxx, Marshalls and HomeGoods, posted a 6 percent increase in sales at stores opened at least a year for the fiscal fourth quarter as more shoppers walked through their doors.

The off-price concept has been a bright spot at Macy's and Nordstrom.

Macy's is rapidly expanding its off-price concept called Backstage and CEO Jeff Gennette said its 120 stores with Backstage concepts are enjoying a more than 5 percent sales lift. Meanwhile, Nordstrom said that sales at its off-price division grew 4 percent but slipped 1.6 percent at full-priced stores during the latest quarter.

MUDDLING IN THE MIDDLE

Mall-based clothing chains like Gap as well as mid-priced department stores like J.C. Penney haven't benefited from a strong economy because they haven't differentiated themselves from a sea of sameness, Perkins said.

Many are continuing to try to shrink their way to profitability. J.C. Penney said it was closing 18 stores, while Gap said it would shutter 230 Gap brand stores over the next two years. That would leave the Gap chain with roughly 427 stores, a little more than half of what it was a year ago. Gap Inc. is also splitting itself, announcing last week that it will create two independent publicly traded companies: low-priced juggernaut Old Navy and a yet to be named company, which will consist of Gap, Banana Republic as well as less well-known names like Athleta and Intermix.

China sets robust growth target to shore up cooling economy

BEIJING — China announced a robust annual economic growth target and a 7.5 percent rise in military spending Tuesday as it convened an annual legislative session overshadowed by a tariff war with Washington.

Seeking to defuse U.S. and European complaints the Chinese system is rigged against foreign companies, Premier Li Keqiang promised in a speech to the National People's Congress that they will be "treated as equals" with their Chinese competitors.

Li, the country's top economic official, set this year's growth target at 6.5 percent, reflecting determination to shore up a cooling

state-dominated economy and prevent politically dangerous job losses. Such a growth rate, if achieved, would be among the world's strongest. Yet it would be slightly below last year's 6.6 percent growth in China and would mark a new three-decade low.

The slowdown in China, the world's second-largest economy after the United States, is likely to hold back international growth.

"China is still a very large locomotive pulling the global economy," said Sung Won Sohn, chief economist at SS Economics in Los Angeles. "As the Chinese economy slows, this will have an impact around the world. We are already seeing that impact."

Still, Eswar Prasad, an

economist at Cornell University, suggested that a more manageable pace of growth in China could benefit the global economy in the long run.

"Slower but more balanced growth in China, especially if it was driven by domestic consumption demand and involved fewer financial system risks, could be a net positive for the world economy," Prasad said.

At the legislative session in Beijing, Li promised to "promote China-U.S. trade negotiations," but gave no details of talks aimed at ending the fight with President Donald Trump over Beijing's technology ambitions and complaints it steals or pressures companies to hand over technology.

Industry, tech pull US stocks slightly lower

A mostly listless day on Wall Street ended Tuesday with stocks closing slightly lower as losses in industrial, technology and financial stocks outweighed gains elsewhere in the market.

Stocks wavered between small gains and losses through much of the day, with communications companies and retailers bucking the overall market decline. Mixed data on new U.S. home sales pulled homebuilders lower.

The stagnant trading came as investors looked ahead to a busy stretch of economic data releases later this week and the Federal Reserve's next interest rate policy meeting in two weeks. Meanwhile, traders continued to wait for new details on the trade talks between the U.S. and China.

Stock prices already reflect the recent investor optimism that the world's biggest economies are close to reaching a deal, noted Bill Northey, senior investment director at U.S. Bank Wealth Management.

"We'll know those details when they're announced," he said. "That's part of what the market is digesting."

The S&P 500 index dropped 3.16 points, or 0.1 percent, to 2,789.65. The Dow Jones Industrial Average fell 13.02 points, or 0.1 percent, to 25,806.63. The Nasdaq composite slipped 1.21 points, or 0.02 percent, to 7,576.36. The Russell 2000 index of smaller companies gave up 7.15 points, or 0.5 percent, to 1,568.28.

Major indexes in Europe finished higher.

The U.S. and China have pulled back from an immediate escalation of their damaging trade war since they started negotiating last month. President Donald Trump postponed a deadline for raising tariffs on more Chinese goods, citing progress in a series of talks.

Media reports on Monday suggested the nations could strike a deal this month.

Gun sale laws need consistency

The phrase “if the law supposes that, the law is an ass,” has been misstated and misused over the years. But one interpretation resonates with the American public, as it applies to United States law governing the sale of firearms. As it stands, the law appropriately requires licensed gun dealers to ensure that background checks are conducted before they sell potentially deadly weapons.

The background-check requirement does not, however, apply to firearms transactions that occur at gun shows or via the Internet.

In light of this inconsistency, the law is an ass.

After all, a gun sale is a gun sale and, possibly with a few exceptions, the same requirements imposed on licensed dealers should apply at gun shows and online — in order to provide consistency and promote public safety, all within the bounds of the Second Amendment.

This week, the U.S. House of Representatives recognized that having different requirements for gun sales, based on the seller or the venue, is asinine.

To that end, the House voted 240-190 to expand the background-check mandate, applying it to gun shows and Internet sales.

The takeover of the House by Democrats following the 2018 elections set the stage for the vote. When Republicans were in control of the chamber, they wouldn't give the measure a fair hearing. But when House Resolution 8 made it to the floor this week, it passed — largely along partisan lines.

Republican Vern Buchanan was one of eight Republicans who supported the resolution.

“Our laws cannot be effective if there are gaping loopholes that allow criminals and deranged individuals to purchase firearms at gun shows or over the Internet without being subject to background checks. ... I voted for H.R. 8 to close these loopholes — a proposal supported by over 90 percent of gun owners in America, according to respected polling organizations,” Buchanan stated.

Unfortunately, leaders of the Republican-led Senate have said they're unlikely to take up a similar measure — even though it contains a sensible provision to require the F.B.I. to alert Immigration and Customs Enforcement officials if an undocumented illegal alien attempts to obtain a firearm. The White House has signaled its opposition as well.

The use of background checks is not a panacea for America's gun-violence crisis. It remains too easy to obtain firearms, including guns that have been stolen from law-abiding citizens, on the nation's streets. It remains too easy for unstable individuals to assemble high-powered weaponry and stocks of ammunition suitable for warfare.

The requirements for background checks have withstood political and legal challenges. They are well-established parts of federal and state laws. If anything, their accuracy and efficacy should be improved.

Most of all, the requirements should be consistently applied regardless of the sellers or method of transaction. H.R. 8 would do just that.

such as Salvation Army. My favorite outreach is the loving hugs that anybody can give every day.

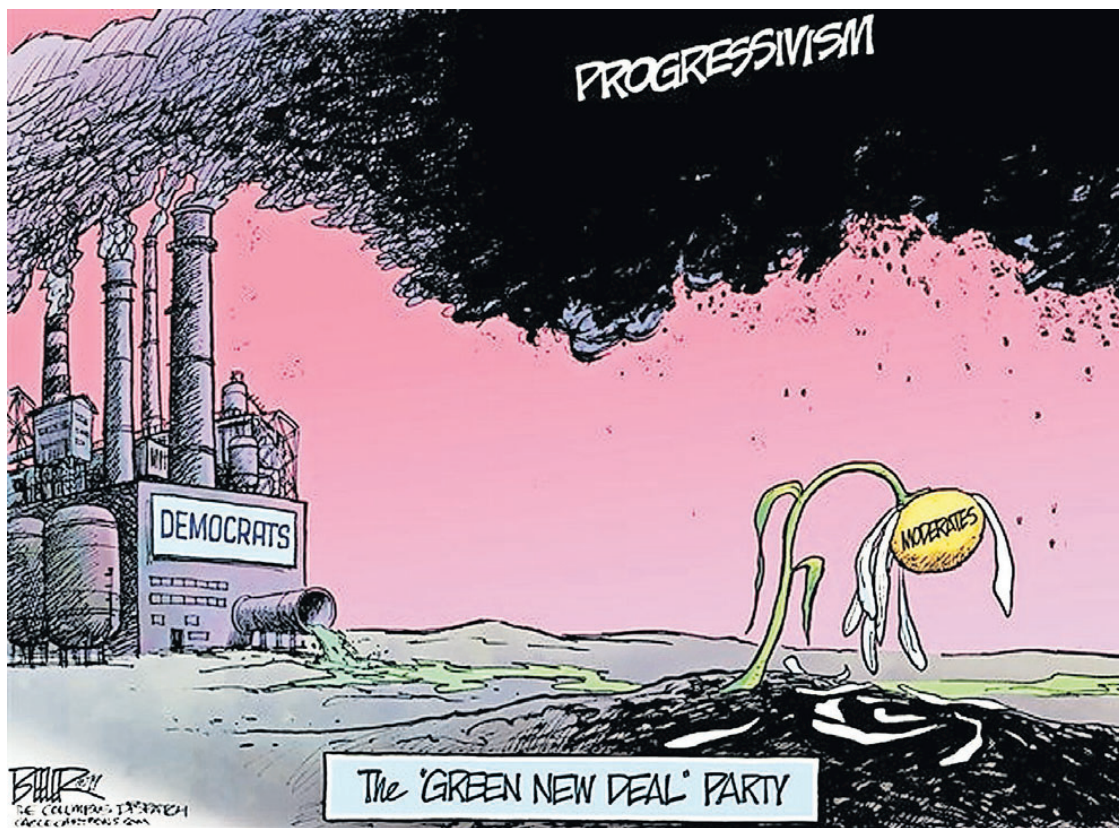
According to FEMA's article, there is some common reaction to disasters by age birth- 2 years:

The case against Bernie Sanders

For Bernie Sanders, 2020 is a whole new ballgame. This time, he doesn't face a heavily favored, lavishly funded foe in the primaries. He can appeal to a party that has moved left. His signature issue, “Medicare for all,” is virtually liberal orthodoxy. He has even more donors, who have showered his campaign with donations.

Here's what hasn't changed: Bernie Sanders. He is still the same overbearing ideologue he always has been, a self-righteous scold who ignores the achievements of capitalism and the failures of socialism while offering voters a rich menu of wild promises. Not that I can't find a few redeeming positions. Sanders opposed the Iraq War. He has supported legal status for immigrants brought here illegally as children. He opposed the surveillance of domestic phone records under George W. Bush and Barack Obama. He regards the idea of intervening militarily in Venezuela as insane.

But his flaws are deep and irreparable. Sanders is a staunch leftist who demonstrated his affinity for Marxism in the 1980s, when he extolled the public transportation and cultural programs produced by Soviet communism, gushed that Fidel Castro had “totally transformed the society” of Cuba, and excused the thuggish tactics of the Marxist-Leninist Sandinista regime in Nicaragua. His economic policies

betray his crude image of capitalism — which may have generated great inequality but also has produced a vast increase in living standards, even for the poor. A wiser student of history would notice that in the U.S., it was largely private enterprise, not central planning, that “totally transformed the society.” The reason social democracies in Europe can redistribute wealth is that their largely capitalist systems have created so much of it. Sanders takes a hostile view of America's reliance on free markets, but countries such as Germany, Britain, Canada and Denmark enjoy roughly as much economic freedom as the U.S. does.

On specific policies, Sanders is habitually in a tug of war with reality. His “Medicare for all” plan, despite the name, would be far more generous in its coverage — and far more expensive per patient — than the existing Medicare program. It also would provide more benefits

than the single-payer Canadian system that enchants American progressives.

“Even by Sanders' own estimate his plan would require a larger increase in federal taxes than the United States has ever had in peacetime,” notes Princeton scholar Paul Starr in the left-of-center American Prospect magazine.

Sanders claims it would reduce the nation's health care spending through cost controls and administrative savings. An analysis by the liberal Urban Institute, however, found that it would actually raise total health outlays by \$6.6 trillion over a decade.

When it comes to international trade, there is not much daylight between him and Donald Trump. The president had words of praise after Sanders announced his candidacy: “I am being very tough on trade. He is tough on trade.”

New Orleans celebrates Mardi Gras

NEW ORLEANS — From children clamoring for tossed strands of beads, to revelers dressed up as “blind referees” poking fun at the NFL, to high school bands marching down the street, people in New Orleans celebrated Fat Tuesday with flair and fun.

Mardi Gras season began Jan. 6 and featured weeks of parades, fancy-dress balls, king cakes and generalized frivolity city-wide. Fat Tuesday is the culmination of Carnival. The festivities kicked off in Tuesday’s pre-dawn hours with the Northside Skull and Bone Gang in skeleton costumes waking people to celebrate the day. The fun continued throughout the day and across the city with parades, costumes and balls.

“I feel like a rock star for a day,” said Van Bender, carrying a sequined replica of the Death Star from the Star Wars movies and joined by friends carrying sequined images of Darth Vader, Boba Fett and a Stormtrooper. He said there’s a sense of joy on Fat Tuesday. “It feels like peace on Earth. Everyone’s filled with love. Everyone gets along. Everyone helps each other.”

After rainy weather affected some parades Sunday, Tuesday dawned cold but sunny. People — some of whom came out before sunrise to stake a good spot along the parade route — bundled

up under multiple layers. Lorenzo Bridgewater of Slidell, Louisiana, got out at about 4:30 a.m.

“I doubled up my jeans, doubled up my socks. I’m wearing a sweater underneath this and underneath that a thermal with a shirt over it. So I’m pretty layered up,” he said.

Pete Fountain’s Half-Fast Walking Group was again a crowd favorite. The clarinetist died in 2016, but the walking group he led for years still meets each Carnival Season at Commander’s Palace restaurant and strolls the parade route. Lance Pierce, of Leonardtown, Maryland, got up early, ahead of friends, to see the group.

“I enjoyed watching Pete before he passed, coming down here and playing so that’s my thing. Everyone else is kind of sleeping in, taking it easy, getting their costumes ready to go. But I like to come out here and watch the guys come by,” he said.

Then the Zulu Social Aid & Pleasure Club paraded, followed by the Rex Parade. Zulu’s practice of wearing black makeup during its parade drew criticism amid recent national headlines that two Virginia politicians once wore blackface.

Zulu issued a statement in February saying their parade costumes bear no resemblance to those worn by “blackface” minstrel performers at the turn of the century. Rather, the group said, the costumes are

designed to honor garments worn by South African Zulu warriors.

Zulu’s custom-designed coconut throws are perennial favorites with fans who vie for the chance to get one.

The Rex parade stopped for a toast at a home along St. Charles Avenue that has been an important stop for the Rex king along the parade route since 1907.

A fire on Feb. 20 caused massive damage to the three-story, 150-year-old mansion whose occupants over the years have included four kings and a queen of Rex. Local media showed a sign that had jokingly been hung up outside the mansion, reading, “We are ready for Ash Wednesday.”

This year’s Carnival season also featured numerous jabs at the NFL and its commissioner Roger Goodell, over the now-infamous “no-call” during the Jan. 20 NFC Championship game between the Los Angeles Rams and the New Orleans Saints.

A Rams defensive back leveled a Saints receiver with a helmet-to-helmet hit at a crucial point in the game, and the Rams went on to win and go to the Super Bowl. They lost to the New England Patriots.

NFL officials acknowledged flags should have been thrown. That’s done little to assuage Saints’ fans who chose to express their anger and disappointment in costume. The French Quarter was filled with costumed

“blind referees” wearing signs like “Blind as a bat” or walking with canes.

“It’s been forty-four days since that day. And we’re still mad,” said Jerry Dellucky, from Hammond, Louisiana. He and some friends were dressed as blind referees and yellow penalty flags. “Football is our passion down here. And we don’t get over it.”

One parade featured a walking group called the “Robbin Refs” who wore referee outfits and black masks. On the back of their uniforms? A photo of Goodell with a red clown nose. The Krewe d’Etat parade featured

a float called “Willful Blindness” with a blind referee on the front holding a cane.

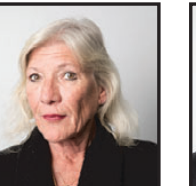

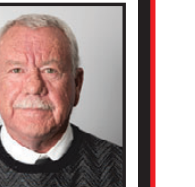

Resentencing trial date set for cop killer

Death penalty changes send convicted murderer back to court

PANAMA CITY — The man convicted of killing Panama City Beach Police Sgt. Kevin Kight will fight for his life in front of a jury later this year, as a trial date has been set for his resentencing.

Robert Bailey will again

go before a jury on Dec. 9, 2019 according to court records. In January, motions to preclude the state from seeking the death penalty again were denied by the court, and State Attorney Glenn Hess has stated that the state will “absolutely” seek capital punishment

again in this new penalty phase.

Bailey was sentenced to death in 2007 by a 12-person jury, but because the decision was split 11-1, Bailey’s death sentence was overturned when the US Supreme Court declared the state’s method for imposing the death penalty unconstitutional. In 2017, Bailey was granted a new sentencing.

Springfield man sells furniture on the cheap

SPRINGFIELD — If you’re looking to replace a living room set for cheap, Casey Compton is your man.

Compton, a Springfield resident, has set up a unique endeavor that’s a mix of business and community service. Compton salvages furniture from condos and furniture stores and sells them at steeply discounted

prices.

He pays guys to fix up the furniture and then sells them for cheap—sometimes depending on what people can pay. He took \$300 for a \$3,000 living room set one time because that was all the woman could afford, he said.

Some of the items Compton stores in his yard include bookshelves, coffee tables and furniture made from PCV pipes. He used a busted-up car, damaged in Hurricane Michael,

to deliver items because making sure people get items is that important to him. Compton is willing and able to make deliveries by strapping items to the little car that’s a far cry from a big moving truck.

“I would get a trailer-load and go out there to the projects and pull right up to the front and say, ‘Does anybody need furniture? Just grab what you need,’” said Compton. “And people just come out and grab it. This

one little woman was on the front porch — she was real slow coming out there, she was elderly — she said, ‘I prayed for you. God sent you here this morning.’ I looked in her house. She had a little black-and-white TV sitting on the milk crate and one chair. We done her whole apartment.”

Compton came down to the area about nine years ago from Alabama to retire,

Springfield on tight budget for recovery efforts

SPRINGFIELD — Springfield may be less than five square miles, but it’s facing an out-sized debris bill from Hurricane Michael.

As of Monday morning, 602,000 cubic yards of debris have been picked up, Mayor Ralph Hammond said during the Monday City Commission meeting.

“Again, we’ve got probably this month and March and April to go through before we’re done, and then possibly into May,” said Hammond. “I’m expecting by the time it’s over with—they do the stumps, they do the streets, the final pass—we’re looking at probably \$12 million.”

The final debris pass for Springfield, Callaway, Parker, Mexico Beach and unincorporated Bay County will start March 11.

Hammond also spoke about the city’s finances. Insurance money has not yet come in for the city.

“Financially, we’re not hurting but we’re not good. We’re holding our own,” said Hammond. “I just don’t know how much longer we can hold our own. We’re paying our bills and employees. At this point that’s all I can ask for, and then as the money comes in I’ll keep the commission informed.”

Like other areas hit by Hurricane Michael, Springfield is waiting on reimbursement funds from FEMA. In an emailed statement, FEMA said in terms of public assistance, “Springfield currently

Bill filed to fix election problems

Poor ballot design in Broward County. Inadequate voting machines in Palm Beach County. Problems statewide with tight recount deadlines and mismatched vote-by-mail signatures.

All of these issues and more are addressed in a bill that advanced in the Florida Senate Tuesday. The legislation seeks to ensure that problems identified during Florida’s 2018 election are not repeated.

The extraordinary mid-term election resulted in three statewide recounts that

exposed a series of flaws in how votes are tallied, bringing more embarrassment to a state with a long history of voting problems. It also resulted in court rulings invalidating aspects of Florida elections law.

“We have - cycle after cycle in this state - have issues and problems,” Senate President Bill Galvano, R-Bradenton, said Tuesday. “And it doesn’t mean you have to reinvent everything but it’s certainly a worthy exercise to look at improving things.”

Galvano said the Senate’s package of election reforms are “necessary” and “need to take place.” Elections experts

agree. A representative for the Florida State Association of Supervisor of Elections said Tuesday that the organization would like to see changes, but supports the legislation.

“Barring all that... we are happy to support the bill as it’s currently written,” said FSASE President Paul Lux, a Republican who serves the Okaloosa County Supervisor of Elections.

But it’s unclear whether the bill, which has 10 different “major” provisions according to an analysis by Senate staff, can pass the House, where leaders believe many of the

Josephine Brooks McGlamery "Jo," 94, died March 1 at her home in Chipley, Fla. She was born April 3, 1924 in Stovall, Ga., the eldest child of the late Patrice Laviga Brooks and Ruby Lee-voy Thompson Brooks.

Josephine grew up near Chipley, Ga. (Pine Mountain) aside from a few years spent in the Rio Grand Valley during the Great Depression. problems that occurred in 2018 were the result of incompetence.

“A lot of what went wrong during the election already had laws that applied to it; we just had people that were not following the law,” House Speaker Jose Oliva, R-Miami Lakes, said.

“I think some adjustments may be helpful but I don’t know that sweeping reform is necessary,” Oliva added.

Facing skepticism in the House regarding the need for major reforms, senators tried to play down the significance of the legislation that advanced through the chamber’s Ethics and Elections Committee Tuesday.

Sen. Dennis Baxley, an Ocala Republican who chairs the elections committee, repeatedly described the legislation as a “glitch” bill that offers targeted fixes for a few specific problems, not a drastic overhaul.

“Truly the effort is to wind up with a glitch bill that just smooths things out and doesn’t create any kind of friction or open doors to perceived advantage of some group or another,” Baxley said. “To truly stay in the area of just tightening all the nuts and bolts and making it work better, that’s our objective.”

Among the changes in the bill:

- Requires county elections offices to put ballot instructions in a prescribed location. Many Broward County voters appeared to skip

the U.S. Senate race between Rick Scott and Bill Nelson because of poor ballot design. Broward County’s 2018 ballot instructions ran the length of the left hand side of the ballot, with the U.S. Senate race placed beneath the instructions. That would not be possible under the proposed legislation.

- Outlaws vote-counting machines that can’t “simultaneously count and sort ballot overvotes and undervotes in multiple races.” The inadequacy of Palm Beach’s machines led to problems with the county’s recount.

- Pushes back the primary election so that it occurs 11 weeks before the general instead of 10 weeks to “provide more time for ballot cure and to redress possible glitches.”

- Extends the recount deadlines by a week. The tight deadlines stressed many elections offices and may have contributed to irregularities in the vote counts. Palm Beach missed the recount deadline. Hillsborough County did not submit recount results after the vote total did not match the original count. Sarasota County’s recount vote total also did not match the original count. Sarasota County Supervisor of Elections Ron Turner said the Senate elections bill has “several good proposals... that appear to address some important election deadline and timeline issues.”

- Gives voters whose absentee ballots are rejected for issues such as a mismatched signature more time to “cure” their ballots. The current cure deadline is 5 p.m. on

the day before the election. The new deadline would be 11 days after the election. The bill also would require elections officials to make additional efforts to notify voters when their ballot is rejected. Nelson challenged the current state law on curing absentee ballots and was successful in court. The bill seeks to address some of the concerns raised in the court ruling, which was upheld on appeal.

The legislation advanced with unanimous support, although Democrats pushed back against the idea put forward by many elections officials and GOP leaders that the election went smoothly overall, and that state law just needs a few tweaks.

Sen. Jose Javier Rodriguez, D-Miami, said the legislation is not a major election reform package, but it still is substantial and the need for it shows how poorly the election went.

“I think that when your electoral system’s on the front page of every newspaper in the country for weeks there’s zero way we can claim that the election went well,” Rodriguez said.

Democrats would like to see further reforms. Rodriguez said the bill contains the “bare minimum” that needed to be changed after the 2018 election.

Whether the “bare minimum” will be too much for House GOP leaders remains to be seen. Lux said he believes the House will come around.

“I think we will not have trouble finding a companion for this” in the House, Lux said.

Tie-down ropes wrapped around the rotor likely to blame for helicopter crash

PANAMA CITY BEACH — Tie-down ropes wrapped around the rotor head were likely to blame in a helicopter crash last year that sent a lightweight mosquito helicopter into the Gulf of Mexico near Carillon Beach according to a report released by the National Transportation Safety Board on Tuesday.

"In addition, a tie-down rope and blade sock used to secure the helicopter rotor blades on the ground was found tightly wrapped around the swash plate and pitch change links of the main Rotor," the report reads.

On May 2nd, the helicopter, a Robinson R22 used by Boatpix.com, rapidly lost altitude on a flight from Perry to

Destin Executive Airport, landing in the Gulf tail rotor first. Though the helicopter was equipped with two floats, the craft was swamped and overturned. The pilot, Randall Gross, escaped with minor injuries.

According to Coast Guard recovery personnel on scene, when the helicopter was pulled ashore, "he noticed that the ropes, or lines were wrapped tightly around the rotor head and were not placed by the recovery crew to aid in the recovery. The helicopter came out of the water with the ropes entangled."

But in interviews with NTSB investigators, Gross stated he properly removed the tie-down ropes and blade sock as part of his pre-departure check, storing them under the seat in the cockpit.

"The left seat folds up and there is a compartment that holds the tie down," the investigator wrote. "When asked if it was possible that the rope got caught onto something, thus preventing the seat from closing, he said maybe, but was certain he stored it correctly."

The pilot of the second helicopter flying with Gross that day told investigators he did not recall seeing Gross remove the rope and blade sock, as he was too focused on his own pre-flight checks.

Gross and the second pilot had been flying in formation over Carillon Beach at about 10 a.m. and were requesting permission to enter Eglin airspace when the Robinson R-22 began to lose speed and altitude.

"He pushed the cyclic forward to gain some more speed, but the cyclic

appeared jammed," the report reads.

Turning into the wind, the pilot realized he would need to make a forced landing and, rather than land on the nearby beach full of people, steered the craft as it fell 800 feet into the Gulf of Mexico.

According to the report, Gross reported 467.7 hours of flight experience, all of them in a helicopter of the same make and model as the one he was flying in May when he crashed. The helicopter's engine had 4,988.6 hours of total time and the frame had 6,988.7 hours of total time, according to the last maintenance reports filed with the Federal Aviation Administration, but the current logbooks were lost in the accident.

The weather that day was clear, with no visibility issues.

Board to vote on Stoneman Douglas superintendent's future

FORT LAUDERDALE — The mother of a Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School shooting victim who is now on the county school board is pushing to have the superintendent fired, saying he “has a history of leadership failures.”

Lori Alhadeff placed a measure on Tuesday's Broward County school board agenda calling for Superintendent Robert Runcie's dismissal. Alhadeff, whose 14-year-old daughter Alyssa died in the Feb. 14, 2018, massacre, has the support of other families of the 14 students and three staff members killed.

It doesn't appear her measure has enough votes on the nine-member school board, however. A majority says he has improved the district's academic standing since his hiring in 2011 and the shooting wasn't caused by his policies. The district is the nation's

sixth-largest with 327 schools and 270,000 students.

The state gave Broward a “B” in its latest district grades, noting that it has a graduation rate of 84 percent, a 10 percentage point increase over five

years. The district says it has increased the number of security officers and cameras and taken other security measures districtwide since the shooting.

Before the shooting, however, crimes, bullying and other

school problems were routinely under-reported by Stoneman Douglas and other district schools and few did voluntary security assessments. Stoneman Douglas reported zero incidents of bullying among its 3,200 students between 2014 and 2017 and three incidents of vandalism, for example.

At a recent community meeting, Fred Guttenberg, whose 14-year-old daughter Jaime died in the shooting, told Runcie, “I can't help but blame you. My daughter is dead and this community is coming apart.”

Runcie responded, “I know that no matter what we keep doing, I'll keep hearing, ‘It's not enough,’ and I know why I hear that, because I can't bring your daughter back.” Runcie's base annual salary is \$342,000. His contract runs through June 2023.

Alhadeff has clashed with Runcie since her election last year. She wanted to hire a college instructor and accountant

who is a Runcie critic to be her secretary — each board member is given one — but the superintendent rejected her pick. He said the woman didn't have the required secretarial experience, although other board secretaries don't either. The board attorney blocked Alhadeff's “no” vote on Runcie's appointment of a new district security chief, saying Alhadeff's stated reasons, including that she didn't believe he had been fully vetted or other qualified candidates considered, were insufficient.

“Mr. Runcie is trying to control the conversation,” said Alhadeff, who represents the Parkland-area district that includes the school.

According to the South Florida Sun Sentinel, at least five board members support Runcie. He declined to be interviewed and none of the members supporting him returned calls and emails seeking comment.

has submitted 27 projects and is working with FEMA and the state to provide the required documentation for all projects in order for these items to proceed within the PA process.”

Hammond said the city isn't putting all its eggs in one basket.

“We're working different revenue sources. We've got the state coming in. We're going to talk to them about a low-interest state loan,” said Hammond.

City Attorney Kevin Obos said the loan is a community disaster loan to help cities cover loss of operating expenses.

Bailey, 35, had been sentenced to die for fatally shooting Kight twice during a routine traffic stop in 2005 over an expired license. According to the arrest affidavit, Bailey — a gang member with a history of both crime and mental illness — told a passenger in the car, “I'm not going

back to prison, even if I have to pop this cop.”

The case one was one in a string of Florida death penalty cases to have its sentence tossed after the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in 2016 that the state's process for imposing the death penalty was unconstitutional, and that the jury's decision needed to be unanimous.

“In this case, due to the jury's nonunanimous vote of 11-1 to recommend a sentence of death, this court cannot conclude

beyond a reasonable doubt that the jury unanimously found that the aggravating factors were sufficient to impose a sentence of death or that the aggravation outweighed the mitigation,” the decision said.

Kight is remembered at the Sgt. Kevin Kight Memorial Bike Parade, a semi-annual event held during each of the Thunder Beach bike rallies. His friends have described him as a “rare guy” who would help anyone.

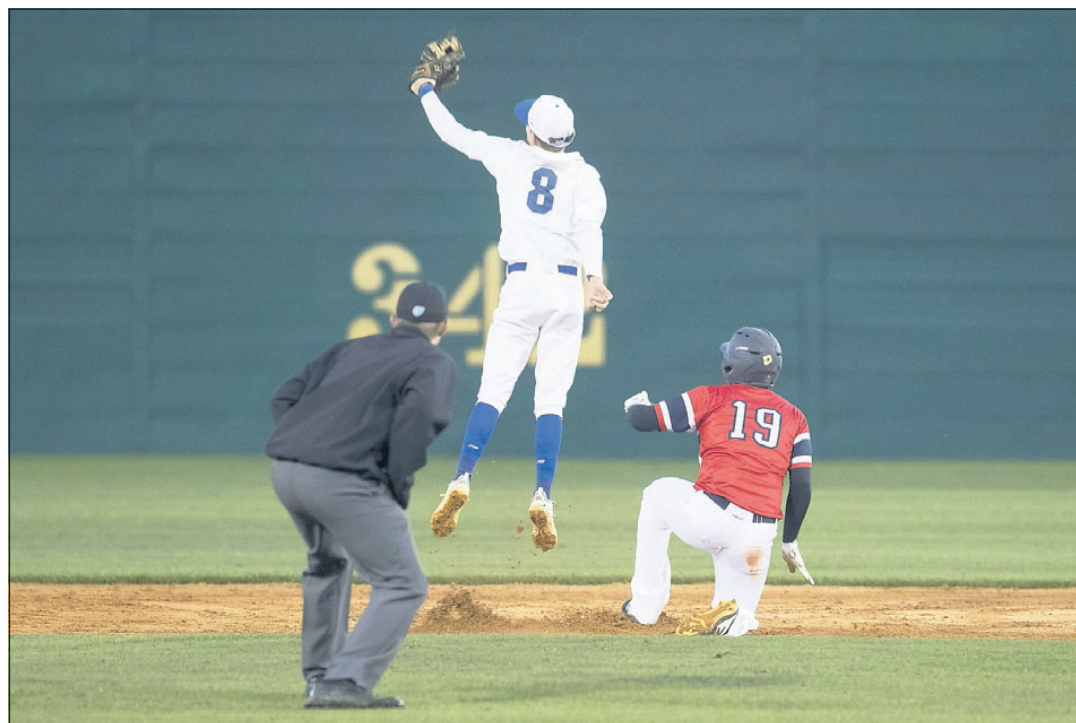

3 get prison in college basketball recruiting scandal

NEW YORK — A former Adidas executive and two others who paid families to persuade top college basketball recruits to play for schools sponsored by the shoe brand were sentenced to prison Tuesday by a judge who said he wanted to send a "great big warning light to the basketball world."

U.S. District Judge Lewis A. Kaplan said he had to balance the need for a stern message with the realization that others who did similar crimes were not prosecuted in a widespread college basketball recruiting scandal that has tainted two dozen schools.

Former Adidas executive James Gatto, business manager Christian Dawkins and Merl Code, a former Adidas consultant, were convicted in October of conspiracy to commit wire fraud for funneling illegal payments to families of recruits to Louisville, Kansas and North Carolina State.

Gatto, 48, of Wilsonville, Oregon, got nine months in prison; Dawkins, 26, of Atlanta, and Code, 45, of Greer, South Carolina, got six months each. Code and Dawkins were each also ordered to pay \$28,261 in restitution to the University of Louisville.

The judge said each can remain free until a federal appeals court decides whether to uphold their convictions.

Prosecutors say coaches teamed with Gatto and others to trade hundreds of thousands of dollars in bribes to influence star athletes' choice of schools, shoe sponsors, agents and even tailors.

NCAA President Mark Emmert has said an independent enforcement body to adjudicate major infractions cases could be in place by August.

Kaplan said leniency for the defendants, who faced as much as three years in prison under federal sentencing guidelines, could only go so far.

"These defendants all knew what they were doing was wrong," he said.

The judge added that he wanted to send "a great big warning light to the basketball world."

"I deeply regret my actions," Gatto said in a shaky voice.

Tre Jones added 13 points for a sluggish Duke team missing star freshman Zion Williamson for a fourth straight game with a sprained right knee. The Blue Devils (26-4, 14-3 Atlantic Coast Conference) overcame 41 percent shooting and a 16-for-26 showing from the free-throw line to win their 10th straight in the in-state series.

Williamson's absence, coupled with a rough game from No. 3 option Cameron Reddish, left Barrett as essentially a one-man show for Duke. The Blue Devils — 26-point favorites — trailed by 10 with 16 minutes remaining and never led by more than three until the final three minutes.

Brown had 21 points and 10 rebounds, and he pulled Wake Forest within 69-68 with two free throws with 43.9 seconds left. Duke bled the shot clock before the left-handed Barrett hit a right-handed jumper in the lane to put the Blue Devils up by three with 17.3 seconds remaining.

"He said that people aren't expecting us to do much because of the hurricane situation and stuff like that," Heller said. "And he said this is really our chance to go out there and have one of those opportunities (to prove others wrong) in life."

The Tornadoes seemed to take that speech to heart at the district meet when five Bay High wrestlers Cameron Butler, Corban Cherry, Kyle Roper, Jeremiah O'Neal, and Heller qualified for the regional round.

One of those wrestlers, O'Neal, almost didn't make it to regionals. With a month remaining in the season, he made a decision to quit the team. Heller said he knew O'Neal was close to having a strong finish to his sophomore campaign.

"I told him if he needed me that I'm there for him and that I just wanted him to finish this season out," Heller said. "I said that if

you didn't want to do it next year that's fine."

When the season began, Heller wasn't in that kind of leadership position, but when Deaton demoted one of his captains for violating team rules, the heavy-weight transfer was the obvious choice despite his short history with the team.

"He's always there to help everybody on the team," Deaton said. "I mean if they're down he gets them up. If they need something he checks on them. If somebody is late he calls them. The kid, he goes above and beyond."

Heller said he's never been as thankful to be a captain as he was the moment he watched Cherry, a freshman and midseason addition, win his first match towards the end of the regular season.

ATLANTA Joseph still suspended as Ga. Tech clings to hopes

Georgia Tech coach MaChelle Joseph's suspension has carried over into the postseason, and the fallout adds more doubt to the team's fading NCAA Tournament hopes.

The Yellow Jackets will carry a three-game losing streak into their ACC women's tournament opener against North Carolina on Thursday. The losing streak includes two losses since Joseph was placed on leave for what the school described as "a pending personnel matter."

Kierra Fletcher and Francesca Pan, two of Georgia Tech's top four scorers, left the team at the same time Joseph was forced out.

Assistant coach Mark Simons, serving as acting head coach, told The Associated Press on Tuesday Fletcher and Pan made the decisions to leave the team.

Simons would not say if he has had any communication with Joseph.

PEORIA, ARIZ. Padres' Jankowski to miss several months

Padres outfielder Travis Jankowski will miss the first couple months of the season after breaking a bone in his right wrist while diving to catch a fly ball against Texas.

Padres manager Andy Green said Tuesday an MRI revealed the fracture and Jankowski will have surgery this week. Jankowski was poised to be a fourth outfielder and defensive replacement.

Wil Myers, Franmil Reyes, Hunter Renfroe and Manuel Margot were expected to break camp in the outfield, and Franchy Cordero could take Jankowski's place as a versatile left-handed bat.

Jankowski missed almost all of 2017 with a broken bone in his right foot. He hit .259 in 117 games last season, but his biggest value came with his defense and speed. He stole 24 bases in 31 chances.

GLASSBORO, N.J. Professional wrestler King Kong Bundy dies

King Kong Bundy, the 6-foot-4 professional wrestler best known for facing Hulk Hogan in WrestleMania 2, has died. He was 61.

Bundy died Monday, said promoter and long-time friend David Herro. He posted on Facebook: "Today we lost a Legend and a man I consider family." The cause of death and other details were not disclosed.

Bundy, whose real name was Christopher Pallies, was born in Atlantic City, New Jersey. The 458-pound wrestler made his World Wrestling Federation debut in 1981.

He faced Hogan in 1986 in a steel cage match at WrestleMania 2, which Hogan won. WWE said he was one of the "greatest ... big men to lace up a set of boots."

Finishing kick

Indiana just got back over .500, and an NCAA Tournament bid could follow

In our latest NCAA tournament bracket projection, Indiana, with a record of 15-14, has meandered back into the field of 68 after upending Wisconsin and Michigan State last week.

There's a logical question about the inclusion of a team that was under .500 just a week ago: Why?

For starters, the edge of the field isn't exactly littered with dynamos. But more to the point, the Hoosiers are 6-9 against Quadrant 1 opponents - as many Quadrant 1 victories as Auburn, Central Florida, Clemson and North Carolina State put together. (As a reminder, quality of victories are sorted into tiers to help the tournament selection committee compare team résumés. Quadrant 1 victories are wins at home against teams ranked in the top 30 of the NET metric, over top-50 teams on neutral courts, and over top-75 teams on the road.)

Indiana's checks in at No. 55 in the most recent NET rankings, so there's nothing to suggest the Hoosiers shouldn't be under consideration. More important is the NCAA basketball committee's trend over the last four seasons to reward teams for their quantity of high-end victories.

The calculations have changed a bit. Not only has the RPI given way to the NET, but last year marked the debut of the quadrant system in place of giving credit for top-50 and top-100 victories regardless of where they were secured. The RPI was a sorting tool, and there's a good chance the NET will be used similarly.

No team over the last four seasons with a top-75 RPI and at least five top-50 or Quadrant 1 victories was left out of the tournament. Only three top-75 teams with four top-shelf victories (2017 Clemson, 2018 Baylor and 2018 Southern Cal) were excluded.

All of which is to say Indiana is very much still in the picture. And if it can pick off Illinois and Rutgers this week, there's a strong chance it ends up in the field even if it picks up a 15th loss in the Big Ten tournament.

Many of the smaller conferences start their postseason tournaments this week, their regular-season champions already crowned.

The major conferences still have a week's worth of tournament time and there's still plenty to be decided.

The AAC, ACC, Big 12, Big Ten, Big East, Mountain West and SEC are all still up for grabs, so it's going to be a big week in AP Top 25.

Here's a rundown of where some of the major races stand:

ACC

No. 2 Virginia (27-2, 15-2) took a half-game lead over No. 3 North Carolina with its 26-point win over Syracuse on Monday night. That means the Tar Heels will need to beat Boston College on Tuesday to remain tied heading into the weekend. After that game, North Carolina faces a stiff test on Saturday in a rematch with rival No. 4 Duke.

BIG 12

If Kansas is going to win a 15th straight Big 12 title, it's going to need a lot of help. The 13th-ranked Jayhawks (22-7, 11-5) entered the final week of the regular season a game behind No. 8 Texas Tech and No. 18 Kansas State. The Red Raiders blew out Texas and the Wildcats rolled over TCU, so Kansas will be 1 1/2 games back heading into Tuesday's game against Oklahoma.

BIG TEN

Michigan and Michigan State renew their rivalry on Saturday. No matter which team wins, it may not matter in the Big Ten race. The seventh-ranked Wolverines and ninth-ranked Spartans may be ranked higher than No. 11 Purdue, but it's the Boilermakers who are in control of the Big Ten race. Win their two games this week, against Minnesota on Tuesday and Northwestern on Saturday, Purdue (22-7) can win its second Big Ten regular-season title in three seasons.

SEC

No. 5 Tennessee's win over No. 6 Kentucky on Saturday not only put the Vols back in the mix for an NCAA Tournament No. 1 seed, but also tied them with No. 10 LSU atop the SEC at 14-2. The Wildcats are a game back at 13-3, so this week could be real interesting. Tennessee plays Mississippi State on Tuesday, at Auburn on Saturday. The Tigers play at Florida on Wednesday, host Vanderbilt Saturday.

US wraps up SheBelieves Cup with win over Brazil

TAMPA, Fla. — Tobin Heath scored in the first half and the United States finished the SheBelieves Cup with a 1-0 victory over Brazil on Tuesday night.

It was the final game of the four-team, round-robin tournament played in three cities. England defeated Japan 3-0 in the early game at Raymond James Stadium on Tuesday to win the SheBelieves Cup title.

All four teams are in the top 10 of the FIFA rankings and will play in the World Cup in France later this year. The Americans, ranked No. 1, are the defending champions of soccer's most prestigious tournament.

The United States played to a 2-2 draw with Japan in the tournament opener in Chester, Pennsylvania, and then tied England 2-2 in Nashville on Saturday. Brazil, ranked No. 10, lost all three of its matches.

Alyssa Naeher, the presumed U.S. starter in goal for the World Cup, injured her shoulder in the opener against Japan. Adrianna Franch got her first cap for the United States in the draw against England.

But on Tuesday, coach Jill Ellis opted to start goalkeeper Ashlyn Harris, who is a Florida native. Harris stopped a free kick from Orlando Pride teammate Marta late in the match.

The United States went ahead 1-0 in the 20th minute when Heath buried a rebound while Brazil's goalkeeper was out of position. It was Heath's 27th international goal.

Alex Morgan remained one goal away from reaching 100 for her career, which will tie her with Tiffeny Milbrett for sixth on the team's career list. She had a header in the 73rd minute that she lofted just wide.

Morgan led the team with 18 goals last year and she has 26 goals over her last 30 national team matches.

ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

My ventures to the local club often yield curious results, but this deal from the Common Game six months ago produced a more unusual conclusion than usual. Readers are asked to guess which card won trick 13 in four hearts. As you might expect from the introduction, best play was not necessarily involved. And yes, readers may guess which seat I was occupying, if they like.

West led the spade jack against four hearts, and East encouraged with the eight, letting South win the queen and lead a club to the king. Ducking the club ace was a correct defense by West.

Now declarer made her first slight slip by leading the diamond 10 (maybe low to the jack was better, though that is debatable). This was covered by the queen and ace.

At this point, it seems right to play for diamond ruffs, but declarer made a serious error by cashing the heart ace and leading to the jack. When you want to ruff, don't draw trumps. East won the queen to continue with the spade king, and declarer took the ace, drew the last trump, led a diamond to the jack, and exited in spades.

Now West won and played the 13th spade. South ruffed and led the diamond nine, allowing East to take his king and get out with a club. At trick 12, South ruffed and led her last card, the diamond four, and East triumphantly scored his five, more to his surprise than you might have expected.

ANSWER: With weak trumps and no guarantee your soft cards are working properly, a simple raise to two spades is better than a cue-bid raise. You wouldn't need a dramatic improvement, however, to upgrade it to a cue-bid. Making the heart jack the queen would be enough for me.

WHAT TO DO IN A POWER OUTAGE

In the event that your house loses power, the food in your refrigerator and freezer could become an area of concern depending on how much time you are without power. Here are some guidelines from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration:

- Keep the refrigerator and freezer doors closed as much as possible to maintain the cold temperature. The refrigerator will keep food cold for about four hours if it is unopened.

- Discard any perishable food (such as meat, poultry, fish, eggs, dairy or leftovers) that has been at temperatures above 40 degrees for two hours or more.

- A full freezer will keep the temperature for approximately 48 hours (24 hours if it is half full) if the door remains closed.

So delicious

Cornmeal gives this soda bread a Southern drawl

It's early March, which means most of us are either complaining about the weather or plotting out St. Patrick's Day plans. Whether that means cozying up at home with a pot of lamb stew and slice of soda bread or heading out to the bars for green Guinness (please don't), this late winter holiday offers a slight respite from the stir-crazy nature of the month.

Soda bread can be made in what feels like mere minutes (especially if you've been spending most of your time baking long-rising no-knead bread and pizza). At its most basic, it is made from flour, salt, leavening and buttermilk. Swap in cornmeal for the flour and you'll have the most bare-bones, traditional cornbread you can make. These are breads borne of necessity, made from affordable pantry ingredients and only occasionally doctored up with extras.

Sure, most soda breads you'll find bouncing around bakeries this time of year contain all manner of sweeteners and nutty or fruity additions, but, at its core, it is a basic bread. And a delicious one, if you make it right.

To give our soda bread a slight Southern accent, we've taken a cue from its cousin and added a scoop of yellow cornmeal to the mix.

This addition makes for a slightly more dense bread, with a subtle sweetness and hint of nuttiness. We've also followed the direction of the brilliant Stella Parks at Serious Eats, who makes her soda bread with more than a pint of buttermilk — her ultra-wet-and-sticky dough bakes up far more bread-like than the more common muffin-ish soda breads. You'll be able to slice it for a sandwich or dunk it into a stew without crumbling.

The trick to keeping the dough contained is to bake it in a parchment-lined Dutch oven, or, if you've got it, a deep cast iron skillet with a lid on top. As with our no-knead bread, this vessel traps the steam evaporating from the baking bread, which helps to create a deeply golden brown, crackling crust that'll splinter and fly across your cutting board.

In fact, bake this bread once and you may just become addicted to its ease, simplicity and well-rounded flavor. You just may keep baking it long past March 17.

And that's a good thing.

Southern Soda Bread

Serves: 6 to 8

- 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup cornmeal
- 1 3/4 teaspoons kosher salt
- 1 1/8 teaspoons baking soda
- 2 1/4 cups buttermilk

Heat the oven to 450 degrees. Line the bottom of a large Dutch oven with parchment paper; it is fine if the paper comes up the sides of the pot.

In a large bowl, thoroughly whisk together the flour, cornmeal, salt and baking soda. Stir in the buttermilk until the dough is moistened and no dry flour remains. The dough will be very sticky.

Pour the dough into the Dutch oven and use a spatula to mold it into the shape of a round loaf. Use a sharp knife to deeply score the loaf into quarters.

Cover the pot and bake until the bread is golden brown, about 45 minutes. Remove the lid and continue to bake until it is deep brown and the center registers 210 degrees, about 10 minutes. Turn the bread out onto a wire rack, remove the parchment paper, and then flip so that the bread is right side-up. Let cool for at least 30 minutes before serving. The bread is best eaten on the same day it is baked, but you can keep it for up to 2 days in an airtight container; toast leftovers before serving.

Note: We used yellow cornmeal and Diamond Crystal brand kosher salt in this recipe.

We'll put this carrot soup against the best you've had

This is what I have learned from testing carrot soup recipes: Even folks who really like carrots sometimes will pause at a pureed bowlful in which that vegetable is the star ingredient. That includes people who enjoy carrots raw but not cooked, and those who are underwhelmed by the texture and/or flavor of pureed carrots.

Carrot Soup

Servings: 2 to 3 (makes about 4 cups)

INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 medium onion
- 2 cloves garlic
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 3/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1 pound carrots (no tops)
- 1/2 cup canned coconut milk or whole milk (see NOTE)
- 3 cups water

- 1/2 cup pecan halves
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin (may substitute ground coriander)
- 1 teaspoon celery seed
- 1/2 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes
- 1/2 teaspoon whole black peppercorns
- Sour cream or plain Greek yogurt, for serving

STEPS

Cut the onion into 1/2-inch dice. Peel and mince the garlic. Melt the butter in a deep pot

over medium-low heat. Stir in the onion, garlic and 1/2 teaspoon of the salt; cover and cook for 6 to 8 minutes, until the onion has softened. Meanwhile, scrub the carrots well, then trim and cut them into thin rounds. Increase the heat to medium; stir in the carrots, milk and water. Once the liquid begins to bubble at the edges, cover and cook for 20 minutes, until the carrots become tender. While the carrots are cooking,

toast the pecans in a small dry skillet over medium-low heat for a few minutes, until fragrant and lightly browned. Transfer to a cutting board to cool; coarsely chop them, if desired. Add the cumin, celery seed, crushed red pepper flakes and black peppercorns to the skillet; toast for a few minutes until fragrant, then pour into a dedicated spice grinder or use a mortar and pestle to crush and blend them.

Uncover the pot and add all but a pinch of the toasted, crushed spices; use an immersion (stick) blender to puree the mixture into a smooth soup. Stir in the remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt.

Divide among individual bowls. Garnish with the remaining toasted spices, a dollop or swirl of sour cream or yogurt and the toasted pecans.

NOTE: If you're using coconut milk, you may want to first transfer the can's contents to a container and homogenize it with an immersion (stick) blender or use a regular blender.

Here's a clever way to make chicken potpie with a better-for-you crust

Chicken Potpies with Crumble Crust

You'll need individual ramekins or baking dishes that can hold 1 1/2 to 2 cups each.
Servings: 4

INGREDIENTS

For the filling

- 3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, plus more as needed
- 1 pound boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cut into 1/2-inch chunks
- 3/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 1 small onion, diced
- 2 ribs celery, diced
- 5 ounces (about 10) small button mushrooms, stemmed and cut into quarters
- 8 ounces green beans, trimmed and cut into 1/2-inch pieces
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 cups low-sodium chicken broth
- 1 1/2 cups cold low-fat milk (1%)
- 1/3 cup whole-grain pastry flour
- 3/4 cup fresh or frozen green peas
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley
- 1 teaspoon chopped fresh thyme (may substitute 1/2 teaspoon dried thyme)

For the crust

- 2/3 cup whole-grain pastry flour, plus more as needed
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1 tablespoon cold low-fat milk (1%)
- 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 tablespoon cold unsalted butter, cut into small pieces
- 1/2 teaspoon chopped fresh thyme (may substitute 1/4 teaspoon dried thyme)

STEPS

For the filling: Preheat the oven to 425 degrees. Use a little oil to grease the inside of the ramekins or baking dishes and place them on a baking sheet. Season the chicken with 1/4 teaspoon each of the salt and pepper. Heat 1 tablespoon of the oil in a large, high-sided skillet over medium-high heat. Once the oil shimmers, add the chicken and cook for about 5 minutes, stirring once or twice, until it is nicely browned. Transfer chicken to a plate. Add another tablespoon of oil to the skillet, then add the onion, celery and mushrooms; cook for about 4 minutes, stirring occasionally, until the mushrooms have released their moisture and it has evaporated. Add the green beans, the garlic, the remaining 1/2 teaspoon salt and the remaining 1/4 teaspoon of pepper; cook for 1 minute more. Pour in the broth; increase the heat to high. Pour the milk into a liquid measuring cup, then stir in the flour until it has dissolved. Pour the mixture into the pan; cook, stirring, until the mixture comes just to a boil. Reduce the heat to medium-low; cook for 2 minutes, stirring occasionally, the return the

chicken to the pan along with the peas, parsley and thyme. Stir until evenly distributed. This is your potpie filling; divide it among the ramekins or baking dishes.
For the crust: Whisk together the whole-grain pastry flour and the salt in a medium bowl. Whisk the milk into the oil in a small bowl until it is well integrated. Add the butter to the flour mixture and work it in with your fingers or with a pastry cutter until the butter is the size of small pebbles. Drizzle with the oil mixture, then add the thyme. Combine with a fork until crumbly, then use your fingers to bring it together so all the flour is evenly moistened. Lightly flour a work surface. Shape the dough mixture into 4 small rounds. Place them on the work surface, then use the heel of your hand to flatten each round as thin as possible. Tear flakelike pieces of the flattened dough, using one round per dish, and arrange on top of each potpie to make a rustic, crumbly topping that covers the filling. Transfer the baking sheet to the oven; bake (upper rack) for about 20 minutes, or until the mixture is bubbling and the crust is golden brown. Cool slightly, serve.

Meat producers want the word 'meat' to mean something

At 7 p.m. on a Tuesday night last May, Fancy Rad-ish, a vegetarian restaurant in Washington, D.C., was hopping. A willowy 20-something dressed in a flowing jumpsuit stood by the door chatting with two asparagus-thin friends in off-the-shoulder tops. So it was easy to spot Kevin Kester.

Kester, then the president of the National Cattle-men's Beef Association, is wearing his light brown cowboy hat and a gold, steer-shaped pin emblazoned with the stars and stripes on the lapel of his blazer.

For the beef industry's top lobbyist, trips to Washington, D.C., often involved meat-laden dinners at restaurants like the Capital Grille, Mastro's, Ruth's Chris or Fogo de Chão, where he usually ordered a porterhouse because, he said, "it has both the New York strip and the filet. And it's a very large steak."

I'd invited him here to see how he would fare at a restaurant that prides itself on vegetarian "charcuterie." But I quickly learned that Kester has no beef with vegetarians. In fact, he enjoys many a vegetable himself: "Avocado, yes. Beets, yes. Radishes, yes," he said as he scanned the menu. By the time he had drained his pineapple-pandan soda and dutifully swallowed part of the last course, an avocado topped with pickled cauliflower, I'd learned that what worried him — and what brought him to Washington

often — was "fake" meat.

By fake, Kester meant the plant-based burgers from Beyond Meat and Impossible Foods, which have elbowed their way into grocery-store meat cases next to the sirloins and ground round. In January, Impossible Foods, which is backed by Bill Gates, announced that it is developing a plant-based "steak" that bleeds. Even more worrisome is the much-ballyhooed, but not yet commercially available, "lab" or "cultured" meat, cultivated from animal cells without raising or slaughtering an animal.

Fighting fake meat is NCBA's top priority for 2019. According to the Center for Responsive Politics, in 2018, it spent \$766,500 on the midterm elections, nearly all of it going to Republicans. The cattlemen are trying to persuade federal officials to more closely oversee meat alternatives.

The Food and Drug Administration regulates plant-based "meat" and the U.S. Department of Agriculture regulates meat. The meat industry wants the USDA to inspect lab-grown products and regulate what they are called: Kester and his colleagues want to ban terms such as "clean meat," which seems to imply that your steak is dirty.

In November, the USDA and FDA announced a joint framework for cell-based meat regulation. In a statement, NCBA called it a positive step but still a skeleton: "Now the federal agencies need to put (real) meat on the bones."

On January 28, 2019, Gulf Power submitted an application for the authorization to install 7FA.05 upgrades to the Smith Unit 3 combined cycle combustion system (Emission Unit (EU) Nos. 004 and 005) at the Lansing Smith Electric Generating Plant. This turbine upgrade project includes the installation of the General Electric (GE) dry-low NOX (DLN) 2.6+ system, 3SAR turbine rotors and the implementation of Enhanced Hot Day Operations. As part of the proposed modification, the evaporative cooler mode of operation will be removed but partial wet compression will be added. In addition, the hours of operation for steam power augmentation mode plus OpFlex Peak mode will be increased from 1,500 hours per year per unit to 3,000 hours per year per unit. The upgrades will provide approximately a 20% increase in output power per turbine. For ease of compliance with the nitrogen oxide (NOX) continuous emissions monitoring system, the NOX pound per hour (lb/hour) limitations are being revised from 82.9 lb/hour, based on a 30-day rolling average, to 10.6 parts per million volume, dry (ppmvd) at 15 percent (O₂) oxygen (O₂), also based on a 30-day rolling average. For steam power augmentation and OpFlex peaking modes, the 30-day rolling limitation of 113.3 lb/hour is also being revised to 15 ppmvd at 15% O₂ based on a 24-hour block average which

excludes startup and shutdown. The combustion turbines and duct burners shall comply with 40 CFR 60, Subpart KKKK after completing construction and as required and defined for startup, shutdown, and malfunction. 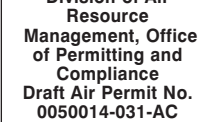

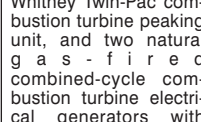
