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### LH City Manager arrested for aggravated assault

**Commission suspends** with pay in emergency **Sunday meeting**

LYNN HAVEN - Lynn Haven City Manager Michael White was been suspended with pay after he was

arrested Sunday afternoon and charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon in connection with a domestic violence.

In an emergency meeting, the Lynn Haven City Commission unanimously voted to suspend White pending the outcome of an investigation after he was accused of threatening his wife with a

gun in what the Bay County Sheriff's Office's arrest reports say was an ongoing pattern of domestic violence. Lynn Haven Mayor Margo Anderson called it a "very dark moment for Lynn Haven."

"The city takes the allegation being made against Mr. White very seriously, and is in the process of gathering information and conducting an investigation into this matter so that appropriate action may be taken," Anderson said. "For the residents of Lynn Haven, please know the city will continue to operate as usual with our residents receiving the exemplary service they have come

**Cancer Center takes** on more after some doctors leave region

PANAMA CITY - Deborah England only had two weeks of radiation therapy for lung cancer before Hurricane Michael hit.

Then, Bay Medical Sacred Heart shut down its department where England got her treatments. Her doctor was unreachable.

For two months after the storm, the Panama City Beach resident had no access to care and considered moving in with friends in North Carolina to get treatment there. Then England learned about Florida Cancer Affiliates in Panama City.

She's been on chemotherapy at the center ever since.

"Things were difficult for a while ... I feel like I was caught in the middle of things," England said. "I was pretty worried because I didn't want to stay with friends since I didn't know how long I'd have to be there."

Unlike many other area physician offices and businesses, Florida Cancer

Affiliates defied the odds and reopened just a week after the hurricane. The center took on not just its regular patients, but those whose doctors had left or had offices still shut down. And with a shortage of oncologists in Bay County still five months after the disaster, the center has continued to work overtime to meet the need.

According to Gulf Coast Regional Medical Center, there were five oncologists in the county prior to the storm. Now there are just two practicing oncologists.

"It is a concern to have so many doctors leave from one specialty, and it's taxing on the ones who stayed," said Brad Griffin, CEO of Gulf Coast Regional. "But while we are concerned ... the others who have stayed are doing a good job ... and we're supporting their recruitment efforts."

Dr. Andrew Weber, oncologist at Florida Cancer Affiliates, said his center was trying to hire two more oncologists, but the hurricane

### What the new El Niño forecast means for hurricane season

El Niño emerged in February, changing weather patterns

The long-forecast El Niño finally emerged fullfledged in February and now forecasters are giving it a 60 percent chance to persist through summer.

The Climate Prediction Center's latest forecast, which was released Thursday, gives the global climate pattern a 50 percent chance to persist into the fall.

For Florida, the periodic warming of the equatorial Pacific Ocean can mean a less active hurricane season with fewer of the powerhouse Cat 5 tropical cyclones known to build during the peak months of August through October.

While the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's official

tropical cyclone forecast isn't released until May, at least two early predictions are calling for a near normal to below normal season.

WeatherBell Analytics released its preliminary forecast this week with expectations of a less than average season. It warns that "forecasting off a forecast" of what's expected this summer can be dangerous, but in general believes there will be a "down year in the main development region."

The main development region is where so-called Cape Verde hurricanes are born. These storms can have lengthy life spans and nasty tempers. Indeed, that is where Cat 4 Harvey, Cat 5 Irma, Cat 4 Jose and Cat 5 Maria formed in 2017.

Overall, WeatherBell's forecast includes a rather wide spread with 10-15

### **More evacuations** in Midwest

Flooding continues to slam Iowa, Nebraska

ST. LOUIS – Residents in parts of southwestern Iowa were forced out of their homes Sunday as a torrent of Missouri River water flowed over and through levees, putting them in a situation similar to hundreds of people

in neighboring Nebraska

who have been displaced by the late-winter flood.

Heavy rainfall and snowmelt have led to dangerously high water in creeks and rivers across several Midwestern states, with the Missouri River hitting record-high levels in many areas. At least two deaths were blamed on flooding, and two other men have been missing for days.

### **Today's Highlight in History:**

On March 18, 1965, the first spacewalk took place as Soviet cosmonaut Alexei Leonov went outside his Voskhod 2 capsule, secured by a tether.

### On this date:

In 1925, the Tri-State Tornado struck southeastern Missouri, southern Illinois and southwestern Indiana, resulting in some 700 deaths.

In 1937, in America's worst school disaster, nearly 300 people, most of them children, were killed in a natural gas explosion at the New London Consolidated School in Rusk County, Texas. In 1938, Mexican President Lazaro Cardenas nationalized his country's petroleum reserves and took control of foreignowned oil facilities. In 1940, Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini met at the Brenner Pass, where the Italian dictator agreed to join Germany's war against France and Britain. In 1942. President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed an executive order authorizing the War Relocation Authority, which was put in charge of interning Japanese-Americans, with Milton S. Eisenhower (the younger brother of Dwight D. Eisenhower) as its director.

In 1959, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed the Hawaii statehood bill. In 1963, the U.S. Supreme Court, in Gideon v. Wainwright, ruled unanimously that state courts were required to provide legal counsel to criminal defendants who could not afford to hire an attorney on their

named storms, 4-7 hurricanes and up to 2 major hurricanes of Cat 3 or stronger. A normal season typically has 12 named storms, including six hurricanes and two major hurricanes.

"On the high end, if the El Niño isn't impressive we could see activity in line with last year," WeatherBell forecasters warned.

The last strong El Niño was in 2015 and 2016.

The onset of El Niño occurs in tandem with the relaxation of the trade

winds - those Earthskimming easterlies that have guided sailing ships across the world's oceans for centuries.

With the trade winds reduced, warm water that has piled up in the western Pacific Ocean and around Indonesia rushes back toward the east. That movement of warm water shifts rainfall patterns and the formation of deep tropical thunderstorms. The exploding storms whose cloud tops can touch the jet stream disrupt upper air patterns so winds come more out of the west.

The west winds create shear in the Atlantic, which can be deadly to budding hurricanes.

An early outlook for the 2019 Atlantic hurricane season released in December offered hope the atmosphere will take a break following two punishing years of tropical cyclone activity.

Colorado State University's first review of global climate patterns that could influence the 2019 hurricane season found a 65 percent chance that a near average or less active hurricane season will unfold, giving an above-average season a 35 percent chance of occurring.

CSU is scheduled to publish an updated hurricane forecast April 4.

damage and insufficient housing has made the task difficult. And even if the center hired two more oncologists, the county would still need more to meet the need, Weber said.

"I'd say we'd need four or five more," Weber said.

In the meantime, Weber, two radiation oncologists and one friendly therapy English bulldog named Bauer at the center, have handled much of the cancer care in the county since the hurricane. Weber said he's worked 12-hour days, six days a week for the last five months - treating patients at his center and making rounds at Gulf Coast Regional — getting only one Saturday off a month.

Weber said he's treated

many patients who lost their oncologist after the

"And they're still staggering in ... people who haven't had a follow up since the hurricane," Weber said.

But just getting the center open to treat patients was a monumental task.

Weber said that on the first day after the storm, he brought a generator, portable air conditioner. a lamp and some burner phones to contact patients. He and some staff then did yard work and cleared a path to the center for patients.

"We saw patients by flashlight for the first week until the power was

up," Weber said. And getting open and power back after just one week probably wouldn't have been possible without the help of Dr. George Helmrich, chief medical officer at Gulf Coast, Weber said.

Helmrich said it was a team effort by the hospital and the center to get the facility open quickly. Helmrich said the hospital convinced Gulf Power to put the center near the top of the list for electricity restoration.

"The hospital as a whole believed it was important to get the doctors' offices open as quickly as possible," Helmrich said. "We can't provide all the patient care at the hospital that patients need."

And it was particularly important to get the cancer center open, Helmrich said.

"Cancer patients don't have the option of delaying care or going somewhere else," he said. "And they require just continual care.

To Weber, working long hours until more oncologists are hired isn't a problem.

"My job is my life right now," Weber said. "It doesn't matter."

### 'We wish we knew your name'

Mourners pay tribute to New Zealand victims, await burials

CHRISTCHURCH, New Zealand — A steady stream of mourners paid tribute Sunday at a makeshift memorial to the 50 people slain by a gunman at two mosques in Christchurch, while dozens of Muslims stood by to bury the dead when authorities finally release the victims' bodies.

Hundreds of flowers were piled up amid candles, balloons and notes of grief and love outside the Al Noor mosque. As a light rain fell, people clutched each other and wept quietly.

"We wish we knew your name to write upon your heart. We wish we knew your favorite song, what makes you smile, what makes you cry," read one of the tributes, which contained cut-out paper hearts under a nearby tree. "We made a heart for you. 50 hearts for 50 lives."

Two days after Friday's attack, New Zealand's deadliest shooting in modern history, relatives were still waiting for authorities to release the bodies. Islamic law calls for bodies to be cleansed and buried as soon as possible after death, usually within 24 hours.

Supporters arrived from across the country to help with the burials in Christchurch and authorities sent in backhoes to dig graves at a site that was

newly fenced off and blocked from view with white netting.

Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern said authorities hoped to release all the bodies by Wednesday, and Police Commissioner Mike Bush said authorities were working with pathologists and coroners to complete the task as soon as they could.

"We have to be absolutely clear on the cause of death and confirm their identity before that can happen," Bush added. "But we are so aware of the cultural and religious needs. So we are doing that as quickly and as sensitively as possible."

Police said they had released a preliminary list of the victims to families, which has helped give closure to some who were waiting for any news.

The suspect in the shootings, 28-year-old white supremacist Brenton Harrison Tarrant, appeared in court Saturday amid strict security, shackled and wearing all-white prison garb, and showed no emotion when the judge read one murder charge and said more would likely follow.

Tarrant had posted a jumbled 74-page anti-immigrant manifesto online before the

attacks and apparently used a helmet-mounted camera to broadcast live video of the slaughter.

Ardern said the gunman had sent the manifesto to her office email about nine minutes before the attacks, although she hadn't gotten the email directly herself. She said her office was one of about 30 recipients and had forwarded the email to parliamentary security within a couple of minutes of receiving it.

Bush said at a news conference that another body had been found at Al Noor mosque as they finished removing the

victims, bringing the number of people killed there to 42. Another seven people were killed at Linwood mosque and one more person died later at Christchurch Hospital.

Thirty-four wounded remained at the hospital, where officials said 12 were in critical condition. A 4-year-old girl at a children's hospital in Auckland was also listed as critical.

Dozens of Muslim supporters gathered at a center set up for victims, families and friends across the road from the hospital, where many had flown in from around New Zealand to offer support. About two dozen men received instructions on their duties Sunday, which included Muslim burial customs.

Abdul Hakim, 56, of Auckland, was among many who had flown in to help.

"As soon as people die, we must bury them as soon as possible," Hakim said. "We are all here to help them in washing the body, putting them in the grave."

Javed Dadabhai, who flew from Auckland after learning about the death of his 35-yearold cousin, Junaid Mortara, said the Muslim community was being patient.

"The family understands that it's a crime scene. It's going to be a criminal charge against the guy who's done this, so they need to be pretty thorough," he said.

Still, it was hard, he said, because the grieving process wouldn't really begin until he could bury his cousin.

### PIKETON, OHIO Woman charged in massacre probe wants charges dismissed

Attorneys for a woman facing charges in connection with an Ohio family massacre have filed a motion to have obstruction of justice and perjury charges against her dismissed.

Fredericka Wagner's son, daughter-in-law and two grandsons are jailed in southern Ohio awaiting trial in the slayings of eight people in Pike County in April 2016.

They have pleaded not guilty to aggravated murder charges and other counts that could lead to the death penalty if they are convicted.

Wagner, 76, also has pleaded not guilty to the charges against her and is under house arrest.

### MILWAUKEE \$1M bail set for man charged with killing missing girl's mom

Cash bond is set at \$1 million for a 34-year-old man accused of killing a missing girl's mother in Milwaukee.

Dariaz Higgins appeared in court Sunday on charges including first-degree intentional homicide. Higgins is accused of fatally shooting 24-year-old Sierra Robinson and wounding another woman last week.

Higgins is the father of 2-year-old Noelani Robinson. Authorities say a child's body found wrapped in a blanket along a southern Minnesota highway on Friday night is believed to be Noelani's.

The Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension says the child died from blunt force trauma to the head. That death remains under investigation.

### BAGHOUZ, SYRIA US-backed forces admit to 'difficulties' beating IS in Syria

U.S.-backed forces fighting to recapture the last Islamic State group outpost in Syria admitted on Sunday they were facing "difficulties" defeating the extremists, saying they were being slowed by mines, tunnels and concerns over harming women and children among the militants.

The battle to capture the extremist group's last patch of territory in eastern Syria — a collection of tents covering foxholes and underground tunnels in the village of Baghouz — has dragged on for weeks amid an unexpected exodus of civilians from the

#### BUDAPEST, HUNGARY Hungarian leader tussles with EU as corruption concerns rise

As the Hungarian prime minister's conflicts with the European Union appear headed to a breaking point, calls are increasing for greater scrutiny of his government's spending of the bloc's funds.

An opposition lawmaker in Hungary has gathered more than 470,000 signatures to pressure Prime Minister Viktor Orban into joining the budding European Public Prosecutor's Office, a new agency that will begin anticorruption investigations into the use of EU funds starting in 2020.

The EU allocated Hungary 25 billion euros (\$28.3 billion) in the 2014-2020 budget period, but critics say those funds have often been spent

on overpriced or unnecessary projects that pad the pockets of Orban's allies.

### Paris cleans up riot debris as

support fades for protesters

Business owners, city employees and construction workers dug in Sunday to clean up one of the world's most glamorous avenues, after riots by ultraviolent yellow vest protesters trashed the Champs-Elysees in Paris to express anger at French President Emmanuel Macron's economic policies.

Luxury stores, restaurants and banks on the famed avenue assessed the damage after they were ransacked, looted or blackened by lifethreatening fires set by some protesters Saturday.

to expect with out interruption. I will be praying for all those involved in this matter as well as our great city."

According to the arrest report, White and his wife, Amy White, had been arguing late on Saturday, March 16, when his temper began to escalate. His wife tried to leave the room to take a shower, the report said, when White followed her into the room and pointed "what appeared to be the 22 Magnum firearm he had gifted her with; that is usually kept on a shelf over their bed," at her.

"The victim stated that after she got out of the shower she discovered a .22 caliber bullet on the floor of the shower," the report reads. "The victim said she placed the bullet on top of the shower shelf. The victim then advised once she got out of the shower, the defendant retrieved the firearm a second time, pointed it at her and then turned it on himself, asking her to

shoot him."

Afraid, the victim and Dan Russell, for assistance. Dan Russell is a Lynn Haven City Commissioner.

The report reads, "The victim stated that after the defendant realized she was on the phone calling for help, the defendant began to forcefully push her against her will out of the residence while she was still nude. The victim stated that after the defendant was unsuccessful in getting her out of the residence, he began to dress and left the residence himself."

According to BCSO documents, White fled and the victim was picked up by the Russells.

The victim, according to the report, told law enforcement that this was not the first time White had become violent, and it wasn't the first time she'd taken shelter with the Russells.

"During the past four years the victim advises other physical acts of domestic violence have occurred. Although, none have been reported to law enforcement, she has on

several occasions contacted the Russell's for reportedly called Robin refuge when violence has occurred between them," the report reads. "Statements were obtained from Dan and Robin Russell in regards to their knowledge of domestic violence between Amy and Michael White."

In his statements to police, White told a similar story.

"The defendant said that he grabbed a semiautomatic firearm and turned it on himself while loaded. He stated he then dropped the magazine, ejected the round out of the chamber, raised the firearm up in Amy's direction, and stated, 'What do you want me to do, shoot you?' He advised he then left the residence," the report reads.

White was hired by Lynn Haven in July 2017. At the time, it was known by officials, including White had previously been arrested by the Lynn Haven Police Department in 2016 on a charge of DUI, a misdemeanor. White was arrested Feb. 21, 2016, and within a week entered a no contest plea to a reduced charge of reckless driving.

White paid \$1,450 in fines and court costs and finished probation early after completing a DUI first offender school and victim impact panel. Adjuaccording to court records.

Russell, who voted to hire White, said at the time the DUI charge wasn't a concern to him, and he did not foresee any problems between White and the police, based on his interactions with White.

"Reckless driving is not that much worse than a speeding ticket," Russell said to the News Herald in 2017. "We've all done stupid things on the road."

Russell left Sunday's meeting before a reporter could ask him any followup questions.

Anderson has also supported White, saying she has a "close friendship"

and that this is "very difficult" for her. During the meeting though, she seemed concern about more potential fallout.

"There's more infordication was withheld, mation that going to be coming forward. I'll leave it right there," she said, heeding advice from the city attorney to not talk about the case until more is known.

> Anderson advised city employees and the city commissioners to also not comment publicly about the case for the time being.

Anderson also asked for, but did not get the support, to act as city manager for a period of 7 to 10 days, saying the department heads who were "blindsided" by the arrest need a point of contact. The conversation caused **Commissioner Antonius** Barnes, who had called into the meeting via phone, to hang up the phone when tempers flared, and Anderson did not win the support of Russell or Commissioner Rodney Friend. The matter will be picked back up at the regular Tuesday meeting.

Anderson said the commission was making "a mistake," saying at one point, "this week, I believe, is a time that is very timely that I make sure what Mr. White was doing is what I believed he was doing, and I have to find that out."

But ultimately, Friend and Russell felt the city could run without a city manager for 48 hours, with department heads responsible for keeping the city running. Commissioner Judy Tinder agreed with Anderson's assessment.

Anderson said she will be at her desk, if needed.

While river depths were starting to level off in parts of Nebraska on Sunday, the water is so high in many places that serious flooding is expected to remain for several days. And downstream communities in Kansas and Missouri were bracing for likely flooding.

In Iowa, the Missouri

River reached 30.2 feet Sunday in Fremont County in the state's far southwestern corner, 2 feet above the record set in 2011. People in the towns of Bartlett and Thurman were being evacuated as levees were breached and overtopped.

County Emergency Management Director Mike Crecelius said it wasn't just the amount of the water, it was the swiftness of the current that created a danger.

"This wasn't a gradual rise," Crecelius said. "It's flowing fast and it's open country - there's nothing there to slow it down."

Thurman has about 200 residents. About 50 people live in Bartlett.

Lucinda Parker of Iowa Homeland Security & **Emergency Management** said nearly 2,000 people have been evacuated at eight Iowa locations since flooding began late last week. Most were staying with friends or family. Seven shelters set up for flood victims held just a couple dozen people Saturday night.





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

## Homes for Children

A company of homeless children from the East will arrive at

TROY, MO., ON FRIDAY, FEB. 25th, 1910

### **Mini Fact:**

By the end of the Orphan Train project, 47 states had accepted children.

Do you know the word "orphan"? An **orphan** is a child whose parents have died. Today, if a child's parents are gone and no relatives can help, a foster family may take the boy or girl in.

But in the mid-1800s, there wasn't a foster care system. Many orphanages would only accept children whose families could pay.

In New York City, thousands of children lived in the streets. They survived by stealing and begging for food, or selling matches or

rags. They slept wherever they could and didn't have enough clothes to keep them warm.

Others had a parent or even two, but the parents couldn't get work to support the family.

### Trying to help

A minister named the Rev. Charles Brace and others started an organization called the Children's Aid Society in 1853. They set up schools to teach the children a trade and the difference between right and wrong. But there were too many children to help that way.

The Children's Aid Society began sending these homeless city children to families in the rural Midwest, hoping they would find better lives. The trains taking them away from New York City's poverty became known as the Orphan Trains.

### Starting a new life

Most of the children stayed on the Orphan Trains for about three days. They slept in their seats or stretched out on the floor underneath.

About 125 kids were on each train, with a few Children's Aid agents traveling with them.

### Saying goodbye

Orphan Train children had to have a lot of courage. Most were leaving behind at least one parent, and many were separated from their

brothers and sisters as well.

The Children's Aid Society believed the children would be better off if their new lives were completely separated from their old ones.

Children were not allowed to communicate with their living parent or

other family members. Most children never knew what happened to their parents. Most parents never knew if their children ended up happy.

Most Orphan Train children found good homes with loving families. But if a child was mistreated, Children's Aid agents usually found him or her a new home.

The Orphan Trains began about 10 years before the Civil War and lasted for about 75 years. In that time, roughly 200,000 children from 4 to 13 years old were placed in rural homes.



### One family's story

When Clara was about 7 years old, her parents and a sister were killed when they tried to cross a river in New York state. She and her two brothers, 5-year-old James and 3-year-old Howard, were sent to an orphanage in New York City.

Soon after, all three children were sent on the Orphan Train to different families in Kansas. Each child ended up with a different, loving family.

Clara and her brothers were lucky. They all were taken in by caring people. The siblings were able to keep in touch with one another throughout their lives.

Clara was adopted by a minister's family. Her new mother was a schoolteacher.

When she grew up, Clara married and moved to Texas.



# Suffering patients finally get relief

t took years, but the Legislature finally agreed to help Floridians suffering from painful, debilitating afflictions. And still, many of our lawmakers did so reluctantly.

On Wednesday, the Florida House, in a 101-11 vote, passed legislation lifting the ban that the Legislature previously imposed on smokable medical marijuana.

The Senate had already passed the bill, so it goes to Gov. Ron DeSantis for his approval.

DeSantis forced the Legislature's hand. He declared, shortly after taking office in January, that unless the Legislature acted by March 15, he would drop the state's appeal of a court ruling that the ban violates a 2016 state constitutional amendment legalizing medical marijuana.

The amendment, though quite specific in its restrictions, did not rule out smokable forms of medical marijuana. It was approved by 71 percent of the state's voters.

Those voters recognized that patients suffering from crippling, sometimes terminal illnesses should be able to have a doctor prescribe the relief that only marijuana, in whatever form, can provide.

As DeSantis, a conservative Republican, has said: "Whether they have to smoke it or not, who am I to judge that? I want people to be able to have their suffering relieved."

Still, it's hard to convince those legislators who think they know better than the voters, the courts and the governor.

One of them is the bill's House sponsor, state Rep. Ray Rodrigues, R-Estero, who also helped craft the Legislature's 2017 ban. As reported by the News Service of Florida, Rodrigues and others made sure the new bill placed certain conditions on smokable marijuana, like how much a patient can buy and how often.

Rodrigues told his colleagues, apologetically, "many of us feel we got it right" the first time.

Nevertheless, he said, "This bill is important because if we do not pass this bill, then the guardrails that we could place around smokable medical marijuana will not exist." "Guardrails"? The 2016 amendment set up guardrails.

The amendment specified that only a doctor could prescribe medical marijuana for "debilitating medical conditions," including cancer, epilepsy, glaucoma, HIV/AIDS, post-traumatic stress disorder, ALS, Crohn's disease, Parkinson's disease and multiple sclerosis.

The language allowed for other debilitating conditions "comparable to those enumerated, and for which a physician believes that the medical use of marijuana would likely outweigh the potential health risks for a patient."

The ballot summary made clear that violations of federal law or any non-medical use, possession or production of marijuana would not be protected. The state Department of Health was directed to "register and regulate centers that produce and distribute marijuana for medical purposes" and "issue identification cards to patients and caregivers."

Those are some pretty strong guardrails. Patients sued. Courts ruled in unconstitutional. DeSantis pushed.

Because of their actions, maybe next time the Legislature won't have to be forced to do the right thing.

## Presidential candidates should talk to journalists

arlier this month, my husband, Sen. Sherrod Brown, went on a listening tour of four early-primary states as he considered running for president. I traveled with him to Iowa, New Hampshire, Nevada and South Carolina, as did a caravan of political reporters waiting to see if he would announce that he was in. (He's not.)

After one of Sherrod's news gaggles, a reporter pulled me aside and said, "How long before you guys shut down access?"

This was in late February. At every public stop, Sherrod and I talked on the record with reporters. This has always been my husband's practice, and long before he married me. I'm less accustomed to being on this side of an interview, but it would be an act of unforgiveable hypocrisy if, after nearly 40 years as a journalist, I were to start avoiding reporters.

Besides, we trust journalists.

"Why would we stop talking to all of you?" I said.

The reporter shrugged and rolled his eyes, as if I were putting him on.

"Because every presidential candidate does," he said. "You know that."

Over the next few days, I made a point of asking veteran political reporters about this, and to a person, they agreed. Virtually all presidential candidates — and plenty of congressional candidates, too — regularly treat journalists as vermin to dodge and mislead. This is as true of Democrats as it is Republicans.

I have stood in the back of a rally and watched one of my husband's colleagues praise freedom of the press to the cheering crowd.

An hour later, at a private event, I listened to that same senator bash journalists as malicious and willfully stupid, as heads nodded.

Because I'm married to a senator, too many members of Congress, from both houses, have felt free to recite their litany of complaints about how journalists make their jobs harder. My response is always the same: If you think accountability to the American public is a hardship, journalists are not your problem. I'm not the most popular Senate spouse, but that's never been an aspiration.

One of the things I noticed during our few weeks on the trail was how hard journalists work to cover these presidential races. Sherrod had a lot of events and meetings, and long drives to get to them, but we had a crew

of staffers traveling with us. Their job was to make our lives easier. We never had to book our flights or drive ourselves, nor did we have to worry about directions or the healthy meals that miraculously appeared just when we needed them.

The journalists on the trail had to get themselves to everything. That's a lot of schlepping, and a lot of caffeine, too.

I'm pointing this out because most of the America public has no idea what they ask of the journalists they expect to keep them informed. They also don't know about all the obstruction and outright abuse inflicted on journalists by campaign staff members following their bosses' orders.

The president of the United States has repeatedly attacked journalists as the "enemy of the people."

Not all coverage is fair or accurate. Some of it is plain stupid. Journalists are human, and make mistakes. But what other profession so immediately and publicly admits its errors?

Every candidate running for president should give journalists the access they deserve. We keep saying Donald Trump is wrong to call journalists the enemy of the people. It's time to act like we mean it.

### This tax status could give single parents a break

nmarried people typically choose the "single" filing status, but tax pros say single parents may have a more lucrative option.

Filing as head of household could get you a bigger standard deduction, says Andrea Nyhan, a certified public accountant and tax principal at Gelman, Rosenberg & Freedman in Bethesda, Maryland.



Single filers get a \$12,000 standard deduction for the 2018 tax year, but single people who qualify for head of household status get \$18,000.

On top of that, heads of household can get more favorable tax rates. Taxpayers with \$50,000 of taxable income, for example, would fall into the 22 percent bracket if they opt for the single filing status, but with that amount of income their rate is just 12 percent if they qualify for head of household

"If you file as head of household, you get to keep more of your money," says Michele Cagan, a certified public accountant and author of the blog SingleMomCPA.com.

### How you can qualify


IRS Publication 501 has all the details, but in general, to qualify for the head of household filing status you must be unmarried on the last day of the calendar year and you must have provided at least half the financial support for a child, stepchild or foster child who lived with you for more than half

"Basically you have to have someone in the household who's depending on you for financial support," Cagan says.

If you're supporting a full-time college student, you might still be able to file as head of household, she says, but it can get complicated if Junior is 19 or older and a part-time student or has a job, she says.

People taking care of adult parents might also qualify for head of household status, Nyhan notes.

"You have to basically be able to claim them as a dependent, so you had to provide more than half their support and you have

to pay for their household expenses, meaning mortgage, rent, utilities, that kind of stuff," she says.

"It gets tricky with what counts as support, so you definitely want to check with an accountant before you file the status," Cagan adds.

### More to consider

If head of household sounds like it's for you, ask a qualified tax pro to go over the rules with you, and be prepared to answer some extra questions this tax-filing season. The IRS requires tax preparers to prove they verified that their clients meet the requirements for this filing status; otherwise, the preparer could face a fine.

"I have to talk to my client, make sure they qualify for head of household," Nyhan notes. "They can't just say, 'Oh, I've been head of household for five years.""

## 5 tax tasks you can do yourself

Many people will gladly pay a professional to prepare their tax returns, deal with their tax headaches and give them advice, but some things you don't necessarily need to pay somebody to do. Here are five common tax tasks you can do yourself, for free.

### 1. Find out how much you owe the IRS

You can find out whether you have a balance outstanding with the IRS and how much it is (plus your payment history) at IRS.gov/ account. Signing up takes about 15 minutes, and the IRS says you'll only need to verify your identity once. "To access their information online, taxpayers must register through Secure Access, the IRS' two-factor authentication process. This identity-proofing process rigorously protects sensitive information," the IRS says.

### 2. Get copies of your tax records

The IRS provides five types of free tax transcripts that let you peek at its records on you. You can see most line items from your tax returns for the current tax year and the prior three years, for example, or get basic data such as your marital status, how you paid and your adjusted gross income for the current tax year and for up to the past 10 years. A tax transcript isn't the same as a photocopy of your tax return. If that's what you want, get IRS Form 4506 and pay the \$50 fee for each return requested.

### 3. Get on a payment plan with the IRS

If you need a little extra time to pay your tax bill, you may be able to set up a payment plan with the IRS. The short-term plan can get you an

extra 120 days to pay with no extra setup cost. But pay your balance off as fast as you can because the IRS can hit you with penalties and interest until vour balance is zero.

If you need longer than 120 days, the IRS has payment plans for that, too. But those come with setup fees that range from \$31 to \$225. Lowincome taxpayers can get a break, and it's generally cheaper to set up a plan online rather than by phone, mail or in person.

### 4. See if you can settle your tax debt

If you can't pay your taxes, or if doing so creates a financial hardship, you may qualify for what the IRS calls an offer in compromise. That could allow you to settle your tax debt for less than you owe. Statistically speaking, it's a bit of a long shot — the IRS agrees to fewer than half of the requests — but you can use the IRS's prequalifier tool for free at irs.treasury.gov/ oic\_pre\_qualifier to see if an offer in compromise might be for you. Beware: The prequalifier tool is just the beginning of the journey you'll still need to complete a formal application (and there's a \$186 nonrefundable fee to do that).

### 5. Direct-deposit your refund

Direct deposit is a great way to get your hands on your tax refund faster, and it's easy to set up - just supply your bank information on your Form 1040 or when your tax software prompts you to. Direct deposit is free; in fact, the IRS forbids tax preparers from charging a separate fee to set up direct deposit for clients. You can even route your refund directly into up to three different savings accounts, IRAs, health savings accounts or other investment accounts for free by filing IRS Form 8888 and specifying how much to put in which account.

### When you should pay taxes with plastic

For David Rae, the value of the trips and benefits he's earned by paying taxes with credit cards more than justifies the cost of processing fees.

"I'm able to pay off my credit card, so I'm not paying interest," says Rae, a certified financial planner at DRM Wealth Management in Los Angeles, "And I really like to travel for free."

For maximizers like Rae who always pay their credit card bills in full, here are three times paying taxes with a card to earn rewards can make sense.

### 1. Your ongoing rewards are higher than the processing fee

The third-party vendors that accept credit card payments for the IRS charge processing fees ranging from 1.87 to 1.99 percent of the amount charged with certain minimums. Some services with integrated e-pay options, such as TurboTax, charge even more. Because most credit cards offer ongoing rewards that are lower than these processing fees, the costs of paying taxes this way often outweigh the benefits, notes Susan Allen, a certified public accountant and senior manager for tax practice and ethics at the American Institute of CPAs.

But, of course, there are exceptions. If your credit card rewards are higher than that processing fee, paying taxes with a card to earn rewards could make sense, Allen says. For example, you might be able to take advantage of:

- Bonus rewards on digital wallet spending. The IRS' third-party vendors accept Samsung Pay, Android Pay and PayPal.
- First-year bonus rewards. · Valuable redemptions. If you
- can squeeze at least 5 cents of

value out of each airline mile earned on your credit card, even getting just 1 mile per dollar spent on taxes could make sense.

Remember, you won't get any value from credit card rewards until you actually redeem them. Before paying a processing fee upfront, make sure you're earning rewards you'll use.

#### 2. You're earning a big sign-up bonus

Paying taxes with a credit card to come out ahead on rewards "could potentially work out if someone got a sign-up bonus that was higher than the fees associated with using credit cards to pay off taxes," Allen says.

Plenty of rewards cards offer sign-up bonuses worth \$500 or more, and some even waive the first-year annual fee. Your tax bill might help you meet the high spending requirements on these cards - often, a few thousand dollars of spending in the first few months — in one fell swoop.

### 3. You can hit spending thresholds for valuable perks

For Rae, paying taxes with a credit card helped him reach the spending threshold requirement on his Delta Air Lines credit card sooner, earning him a sizable bonus that counted toward elite status. The value of that and the miles he earned far outweighed the processing fees, he says.

"I'm flying at least once a month for work, and I like to travel a bit personally," Rae says. "So having status with the airline means I get upgrades. Occasionally, I can get upgraded to first or business class

If you carry a co-branded hotel card or airline card, you might also be able to qualify for elite status or other benefits by hitting certain spending requirements.

### As marijuana gets legalized, companies drop THC testing of employees

PALM BEACH POST - At the Ed Morse empire of auto dealerships, testing for THC no longer is part of the hiring process.

Ed Morse Automotive Group this month stopped screening for marijuana metabolites before offering positions to job candidates, says Teddy Morse, chairman and chief executive of the 1,200-employee company. Ed Morse Automotive Group still tests for signs of cocaine, heroin and other illegal drugs in the urine of prospective employees.

"I'm not condoning drug use," Morse said in an interview. "But I don't consider pot to be this evil substance. I don't think it's something we should test for anymore."

Amid a nationwide wave of cannabis legalization, some employers have rethought their positions on pot. AutoNation, the Fort Lauderdale-based chain, revealed last year that it had quietly stopped testing for weed a few

"If you tested positive for marijuana, you couldn't join our company," AutoNation Chief Executive Mike Jackson told Bloomberg News. "At a certain point, we said, 'You know what? That's wrong."

Florida is one of many states that have legalized cannabis for medical use, and more than 190,000 patients are on the state registry of medical marijuana users. Some states, including California, Colorado, Nevada and Washington, have legalized weed entirely, and employers have begun to rethink whether marijuana use should disqualify new hires.

PORT ST. JOE - Mike Morris received a phone call early this month.

On the other end of the line was Amanda McMahan, who had flown with Morris in the Tennessee Air National Guard and with whom Morris kept in regular contact. everybody who came up," Motil said. "One day a car came up and the people said they had found this flag in a ditch and what should they do with it."

Along the spine of the flag, written in marker, were more than a dozen names with ranks, clearly marking with some sort of military connection.

Motil went on Facebook trying to link any names, found one, but received no response.

### Pot, school vouchers dominate Tallahassee's talks last week

TALLAHASSEE - Let's be blunt.

Less than two weeks into his first legislative session as Florida's chief executive, Gov. Ron DeSantis is taking a well-deserved victory lap after strong-arming lawmakers into hoisting the white flag on pot.

The Republican governor gave the Legislature an ultimatum shortly after he took office in January: Get rid of the state prohibition against smokable medical marijuana, or I'll do it without you.

If lawmakers didn't act by March 15, DeSantis threatened to drop the state's appeal of a court decision that said the smoking ban violated a voter-approved constitutional amendment broadly legalizing medical marijuana.

GÓP legislative leaders, who included the smoking ban in a 2017 law aimed at carrying out the amendment, grudgingly surrendered to the governor this week, sparking a shout-out from DeSantis.

"The Florida Legislature has taken a significant step this week to uphold the will of the voters and support the patients who will gain relief as a result of this legislation. President Bill Galvano, Speaker José Oliva, Senator Jeff Brandes and Representative Ray Rodrigues have done a tremendous job, working hard to ensure the voices of Floridians are heard. I commend them for their diligence on this issue," DeSantis said in a statement Thursday.

Rodrigues, R-Estero, and Brandes, R-St. Petersburg, shepherded the legislation, which received overwhelming support from both chambers despite insistence by Galvano and Oliva that the smoking ban was - and remains - legit.

### Burning down the house

The House passed the repeal of the smoking ban (SB 182) in a 101-11 vote, sending the bill to the governor two days before the DeSantis-imposed March 15 deadline. The Senate passed the bill last week.

Despite DeSantis' insistence that the ban be repealed, Rodrigues, who was also instrumental in crafting the 2017 law that carried out the constitutional amendment, noted that "many of us feel like we got it right" the first time.

"I'm not going to have all of your votes today, and I understand that, and I respect that. My encouragement to you is to vote your conscience, but

what I would say is this: This bill is important because if we do not pass this bill, then the guardrails that we could place around smokable medical marijuana will not exist," Rodrigues said before the House vote.

While eliminating the ban, the bill includes some restrictions on smokable marijuana. It would allow patients to purchase up to 2.5 ounces of marijuana for smoking every 35 days, ban smoking of medical marijuana in public places and allow terminally ill children to smoke the treatment, but only if they have a second opinion from a pediatrician.

### Voucher plans gain steam

Vouchers have long been a controversial issue in the Legislature, with supporters saying private-school scholarships offer needed choices to families and opponents saying they strip money from traditional public schools.

But on Thursday, the House began moving forward with a dramatic expansion of school vouchers, including allowing middle-class families to apply for state-funded scholarships to

send children to private schools. The GOP-controlled House and Senate and the Republican governor all want to expand voucher-type programs and point to a waiting list of about 14,000 students in the Florida Tax Credit Scholarship program, which serves low-income children.

The House Education Com $mittee \, on \, Thursday \, approved \, a$ bill (HB 7075) that would create a new voucher program, known as the "Family Empowerment

Scholarship" program, which would be open to many middleclass families.

If approved, the program would be available to families whose incomes are up to 300 percent of the federal poverty level during the 2019-2020 school year -a calculation that equates to \$77,250 for a family of four. The threshold would gradually increase, with a family of four making \$96,572 eligible for the vouchers in the 2022-2023 school year.

Rep. James Bush, a Miami Democrat who supports school choice, said he is worried the House is moving away from the goal of the Florida Tax Credit Scholarship program, which was to help low-income children attend private schools.

"My only concern is keeping the original intent of helping lowincome children," Bush said.

### Lawmakers chip away at land preservation money

TALLAHASSEE - Lawmakers are pushing forward with plans to continue carving up millions of dollars voters more than four years ago directed to be spent on land and water protection, despite environmentalists' concerns about the way the money is being used to help the Indian River Lagoon and Apalachicola Bay.

Backers of the 2014 Florida Water and Land Conservation Initiative, who continue to challenge how lawmakers have used the money in the past, contend that some of the projects outlined in bills advanced by the Senate Environmental and Natural Resources Committee on Tuesday "chip away" at the intent of the constitutional amendment.

Aliki Moncrief, executive director of Florida Conservation Voters, said the septic-to-sewer conversion outlined in a measure to protect the Indian River Lagoon (SB 368) is needed. But the proposal goes beyond what voters approved, she argued.

"There are natural solutions and there are engineered solutions," Moncrief said. "And the Water and Land Conservation amendment, absolutely voters who stood up for that expected the natural solutions, like buying buffer lands to protect water bodies, that those natural solutions take priority when it comes to this specific pot of money."

Sen. Gayle Harrell, a Stuart Republican who sponsored the bill, argued the ballot initiative, known as Amendment 1, didn't explicitly prohibit septicto-sewer conversion.

"It makes a whole long litany of things the funds can be used for, including acquisition of land," Harrell said. "It doesn't say only acquisition of land. I believe there are many other uses for the Amendment 1 money. And I think this bill meets the intent the public had with passing the Amendment 1 money."

Sen. Debbie Mayfield, a Rockledge Republican who supported the proposal, said a dedicated source of money needs to be available to replace septic tanks.

The constitutional amendment created the Land Acquisition Trust

Fund, which for 20 years will get one-third of the revenue from an existing real estate documentary stamp tax - known as doc stamps – for land and water preservation.

State economists projected in December that the doc stamps will generate \$2.76 billion in the next fiscal year. More than \$906 million of that would go into the trust fund.

In previous legislative sessions, lawmakers earmarked annual spending of about \$200 million for Everglades protection: \$64 million for a reservoir project in the Everglades Agricultural Area; \$50 million for the state's natural springs; and \$5 million for Lake Apopka.

On Tuesday, the Senate committee backed measures calling for annual expenditures of \$50 million for maintenance of the lagoon; \$100 million for the Florida Forever program (SB 944); and \$20 million each year for the next decade for Apalachicola Bay, which had struggled with degrading water conditions even before being impacted by last year's Hurricane Michael (SB 1256).

Concerns were also raised about a proposal for the Apalachicola Bay region that includes money for land acquisition, stormwater management facilities, sewage collection and workforce housing.

Sen. Bill Montford, D-Tallahassee, said the region is one of two populated areas in Florida designated as an area of critical state concern. The other, Monroe County, has received \$28 million from the state for similar initiatives in the past three years. Montford said his request is for "comparable funding."

Hours before the Senate committee met, Brevard County state Rep. Randy Fine amended his funding request (HB 141) for the Indian River Lagoon. Fine was seeking \$50 million from the trust fund, but he dropped the request for money from the trust fund, pointing to an ongoing court battle over how the Legislature had allocated the money in the past.

"There is litigation on whether the allocations we made from that are proper," Fine said. "Taking money from the LATF (trust fund) for the purposes I had in the regular bill are exactly the sort of issues that they're suing about."

In any case, the call from Europe led to a reunion not only with the American flag, but his wife's shadow box filled

with the medals and ribbons she had earned during her stint in the military as well as Morris' training wings.

And in another bit of a happy coincidence, providing even more meaning to the flag return, Morris flew C-130s, nicknamed the Hercules, in Iraq and Afghanistan; Motil had a squadron of C-130s in Thailand during his stint in Vietnam.

Now reunited, Morris and flag are probably soon to be separated again, he said. He will likely send it to Nashville to be part of a museum dedicated to the Tennessee Air National Guard.

"Quite a number of our clients are no longer testing for THC," said Joyce Chastain, a human resources consultant and former president of the HR Florida State Council. "They don't want to lose good people."

In the context of changpot – and with unemployment at 50-year lows – even employers in staid industries like the auto business are loosening their rules about marijuana use.

"You're seeing a lot of employers moving away from firing individuals just for having THC metabolites in their system," said Erik Altieri, head of the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws in Washington, D.C. "The reality in 2019 is that employers in states with legal marijuana can't continue to enforce the same drug-testing protocol."

Ed Morse Automotive Group operates 22 dealership franchises in Florida and Texas, including Ed Morse Delray Toyota and Ed Morse Delray Cadillac in Delray Beach and Ed Morse Honda in Riviera Beach.

Morse said he's not a marijuana user himself and is no crusader for cannabis. But as a practical matter, he didn't think it made sense to continue rejecting a significant slice of the work force.

The company frequently turned down job applicants who tested positive for THC but ing attitudes toward no other illegal substance, Morse said. And he assumes that some prospective employees decided not to apply for jobs at Ed Morse Automotive Group because they knew they'd be subjected to a cannabis screening.

"I feel it's going to allow us to have a better caliber, a better quality of employees," Morse said. "Some of the most successful, capable people I know choose to smoke pot rather than drink. I just feel there are a lot of good, hard-working people who choose to use this product."

Marijuana legalization has created no shortage of puzzles for employers. Cannabis remains federally illegal, so federal contractors and many large, national companies

still test for pot.

Early in the legalization movement, courts ruled that employers – including Walmart and Dish Network – were within their rights to fire workers who tested positive for pot, even if those employees consumed cannabis in ways that complied with state law.

More recently, however, courts have begun to side with employees using cannabis under state law, said Dori Stibolt, an off the clock and remain employment attorney at productive on the job. Fox Rothschild in West Palm Beach. Courts in Massachusetts and Rhode Island ruled in favor of cannabis-using workers.

"It's a difficult time to be an employer trying to figure this out," Stibolt said.

Complicating the drugtesting question is the quirky way the body processes marijuana. Unlike alcohol and other intoxicants, which the body quickly flushes, marijuana can stay in fat cells for as long as a month. That means even an occasional weed user can test positive for pot long after the high has worn off.

"Employers were losing solid talent based on a sketchy test," Chastain

Human resources experts say legalized pot poses unexpected challenges. Some HR specialists note that companies don't fire workers who test positive for legally prescribed opioids, and they argue that a similar policy should apply to pot.

Meanwhile, pot proponents like Altieri say employers are embracing the notion that workers can consume cannabis

"If you decide to consume marijuana on the weekend in your free time, it really has no bearing on your performance,' Altieri said. "If you're showing up to work on time and otherwise doing your job, smoking a joint on a Friday night is really no different from having a couple martinis."

Stibolt, the employment attorney, said employers might be wise to test for THC only certain employees, such as those operating heavy machinery.

"Some employers are testing employees who don't really need to be tested," Stibolt said. "It doesn't really matter if your receptionist smoked marijuana a week ago."

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

### **ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF**

These days in almost every auction where the opponents bid or double, it is possible for responder to play transfers — and today's deal from the Silodor Open Pairs in Philadelphia last year was no exception. The auction might have developed in a similar fashion, with South declaring three diamonds, if West had made a pre-emptive jump to two spades, but his initial call of two hearts showed six spades of indeterminate range.

The question of how many tricks South would emerge with in three diamonds had a slightly surprising answer, though. You'd expect West to lead a doubleton club and South to take East's queen, draw trumps in two rounds, then set up a club for the ninth trick.

Instead, East managed to throw an intriguing diversion at the first trick when he played the club king, trying to suggest a different lie of that suit to declarer.

It worked to perfection! South was now sure West had three clubs and six spades, and clearly at least three hearts from the bidding. So she drew just one round of trumps with the ace and played a second club. East won the queen and could have played for the spade ruff, but that would have produced only four tricks. Instead, he cashed the heart king as West gave count, then played a third club. Declarer guessed to discard a spade, and West ruffed in with the jack and played the spade ace and a second spade to give partner the ruff and set the

### Duke, UNC, Virginia get No. 1 seeds; Gonzaga also on top line

The clock is ticking. The rest of college basketball has three weeks to figure out how to stop Duke's freshman force of nature, Zion Williamson.

Williamson and the Blue Devils got the overall top seed in the tournament, while Gonzaga and two more **Atlantic Coast Conference** teams - North Carolina and Virginia – also received No. 1 seeds. Three teams in one conference on the top line matches a record, and offers the selection committee's guess as to who has the best chance to slow down Duke.

The Blue Devils opened as

a 9-4 favorite to win it all. Williamson, the 6-foot-7 man-child averaging 22 points and nine rebounds and a near-certain top pick in the upcoming NBA draft, is putting his future on the line — along with hundreds of millions in potential earnings - all in hopes of adding his own chapter to the history of America's most dream-indulged hoops extravaganza. He's doing it only four weeks after wrenching his knee when his Nike sneaker blew out and sent him crashing to the floor. He missed five games. He wouldn't dare miss this.

### McIlroy emerges from wild day to win

PONTE VEDRA BEACH, Fla. - Rory McIlroy made two late birdies amid the wild theatrics of Sunday at The Players Championship and closed with a 2-under 70 to win the next best thing to a major.

It required a major performance down the scary stretch at the TPC Sawgrass.

McIlroy could not afford to make a mistake over the final hour because of Jim Furyk, the 48-year-old former Ryder Cup captain who nearly pulled off a stunner. Furyk, one of the last players to get in the strongest field in golf, capped off a 67 with a shot so good into the 18th that he started walking when he hit it. It plopped down 3 feet from the hole for a birdie to take the lead.

But not for long.

McIlroy, one of eight players to have at least a share of the lead in the final round, was coming off a bogey on the 14th to fall behind and was in trouble with a tee shot that found a bunker right of the fairway. He responded with his best shot of the day to 15 feet for birdie.

Then, McIlroy hit the longest drive of the round on the par-5 16th, leaving him a 9-iron from a good lie in the rough to set up a two-shot birdie and the lead.

Most important, he found dry land on the par-317th, the island green that never looks smaller than on Sunday at The Players. He was solid to the end on



No. 6 Michigan State 65, No. 10 Michigan 60: Matt McQuaid scored a career-high 27 points, Cassius Winston converted the go-ahead layup in the closing minute, and No. 6 Michigan State rallied to beat No. 10 Michigan 65-60 for its sixth Big Ten Tournament championship on Sunday. The top-seeded Spartans (28-6) rallied from a 13-point deficit in the second half

and scored the game's final 10 points to capture their first championship since 2016.

### **NO. 24 CINCINNATI 69 NO. 11 HOUSTON 57:**

Jarron Cumberland had 33 points and eight rebounds to lead Cincinnati past Houston in the American Athletic Conference Tournament championship game. Cane Broome added 15 points, and Tre Scott had 12 to help Cincinnati advance to the NCAA Tournament for the ninth straight year.. The Bearcats (28-6) also beat Houston in the final last year. Armoni Brooks led Houston (31-3) with 17 points.

YALE 97, HARVARD 85: Alex Copeland scored a season-high 25 points and Yale beat archrival Harvard for the Ivy League title and its second NCAA Tournament trip in four seasons. Yale (22-7), which lost to Harvard (18-11) twice in the regular season, used a 15-0 burst in the second half to take control on its home court.

### **SAINT LOUIS 55, ST. BONAVENTURE 53:**

Saint Louis rallied from 15-point, first-half deficit, locking down St. Bonaventure in the second half for a victory in the Atlantic 10 championship and an NCAA Tournament bid. The sixth-seeded Billikens (23-12) won four games in four days to earn their first A-10 Tournament title since 2013 and get back in the NCAAs for the first time since 2014. Bonnies guard

Nelson Kaputo, who played only the last minute, had a 3 from the corner for the win in the final seconds after a scramble, but it bounced off the back of the rim and the Billikens cleared the rebound as time expired.

### **GEORGIA STATE 73, TEXAS-ARLINGTON**

64: Malik Benlevi hit four 3-pointers and finished with 16 points, and Georgia State advanced to a second straight NCAA Tournament with a victory over Texas-Arlington in the Sun Belt Conference Tournament final. Damon Wilson scored 13, Kane Williams 12, and Jeff Thomas 11 for the top-seeded Panthers (24-9), who will be making their fifth overall NCAA Tournament appearance.

### Busch ties Petty's record with 200th career win

FONTANA, Calif. -Kyle Busch tied Richard Petty's NASCAR record with his 200th career victory across the three national series Sunday by using an impressive late surge through the field following a speeding penalty to win the Cup Series race at Auto Club Speedway.

Busch dominated the first two stages, but a pit-road speeding penalty dropped him to 18th with 73 laps to go. He carved through the field in his Joe Gibbs Racing Toyota then got help from a timely caution. Busch catapulted into the lead for good with 26 laps left by drafting off Team Penske teammates Brad Keselowski and Joey Logano.

The win was the third Cup victory at Fontana

for Busch and he's now in position to become NASCAR's overall career victories leader with his next win. Busch has earned 53 of his 200 wins in the Cup Series, along with 53 in the Truck Series and 94 in Xfinity.

Busch reached the brink of the record by sweeping last weekend's two races at Phoenix, but missed his first chance to tie Petty in the Fontana Xfinity Series race Saturday when a disastrous late pit stop prevented him from catching winner Cole Custer.

Busch was exhilarated immediately after his win. "All I do is win, win,

win, no matter what," he said over the radio. "Can you imagine if I could have got Vegas and Xfinity yesterday? How many in a row? How many?"

His team handed him a white flag with a logo emblazoned with "200 WINS," and he stood atop his car and waved it toward his large Southern California fan base before taking his customary bow.

"Feels just like No. 1," he said. "Feels just like yesterday. That was such an awesome race car. Dang. I'm glad we put on a heck of a show for these fans. To win 200, whatever it means, it means a lot to me."

"I just wish that we could keep it going, running strong, running well, and winning races."

Logano was second and Keselowski third, unable to catch the winningest driver of his era as Busch became the first repeat winner this NASCAR season.

Busch equaled Petty's victories mark in the

998th race of his 17-year career. Petty competed in 1,184 NASCAR races over 35 years.

With career totals bolstered by years of dominance in the Xfinity and Trucks series - he is the winningest driver in both series, history the 33-year-old Busch moved into a tie with the 81-year-old Petty, who believes Busch would be competitive with the best drivers of Petty's era or any era.

Everything was set up for Busch to cash in a relatively easy victory at Fontana, and the relentless competitor known as Rowdy didn't waste the chance despite a hefty piece of bad luck.

A pit road speeding penalty ruined a likely win for Busch two weeks ago in Las Vegas, but he had plenty of time to make up for his mistake at Fontana.

Detractors point to Busch's many advantages in the Xfinity and Trucks series while observing that Petty's 200 wins all came in NASCAR's top series, compared to just 53 for Busch.

Busch's defenders note his impressive win percentages and the fundamentally different nature of NASCAR competition these days, when a larger field of elite drivers competes in every race as opposed to the fields of varying depth and quality faced by Petty.

No matter who wins the barstool debate, Busch claims he doesn't think much about his place in history in terms of numbers. He expected to have a small celebration before turning his focus to Martinsville next week and the yearlong chase of his second career Cup Series championship.

considered picking them again this year even though they're not in the field.)

When you get to the end of this story, you will know this year's NCAA champion. Do not scroll down yet. You must read the method to March Madness, though by teasing you with Duke vs. North Carolina you probably have a good idea where this is going. (If you don't, perhaps you should save your money and not enter any pools this year, including swimming ones.)

But before we begin, a few guidelines ...

### **UNDERDOG**

WATCH: If you have every 1-2-3-4 seed making the Sweet 16 on your bracket, you're doing it wrong. At least one double-digit seed has made it to the tournament's second weekend 37 times in the last 40 seasons. More specifically, a No. 11 seed has reached the round of 16 in each of the last five seasons (with three of those

No. 11s making it to the regional final, and with Loyola Chicago getting to the Final Four last year).

**THINK 11 OVER 12:** It used to be that the No. 12 over No. 5 upsets were all the rage. It's more like the No. 11 vs. No. 6 now. There have been 10 upsets in a 6-11 game over the last four years, and only three in 5-12 games.

**7 OR BETTER:** A team seeded No. 7 or higher has made the Final Four in each of the last six seasons. Before that, it happened only three times in the previous 25 seasons.

THERE WILL BE A NO.1 SEED: At least one No. 1 seed has made the Final Four in 37 of the last 40 seasons.

**BUT THERE WON'T BE FOUR:** In those same 40 seasons, most No. 1 seeds - 59 percent of them – lose before the national semifinals. The only year where all four No. 1 seeds made the Final Four was 2008.

So now that we've covered some of the basics, let's whittle this thing down to a manageable

Since a seeding structure went into place for the 1979 tournament, no team seeded No. 9 or higher has ever won the national championship. Same goes for every No. 5 seed. Florida in 2000, Indiana in 2002 and Butler in 2010 all reached the title game as No. 5 seeds and they all lost. (Apologies, then, to Mississippi State, Auburn, Wisconsin and Marquette. They're this year's 5 seeds and are obviously cursed.)

That means, through the process of elimination, we can safely delete all the 5 seeds and all the 9 through 16 seeds. Just like that, our 68-team bracket is down to a tidy 28-team list of contenders.

Out of those 28, 17 have never won a national title. There hasn't been a first-time champion since Florida in 2006. Don't expect that to change this year. So now we're down

With the exception of Arizona in 1997, every champion for the last 30 years has entered the tournament with at least 24 wins. That eliminates Maryland, Louisville and Syracuse.

Down to eight.

Duke and Michigan State in the East. Michigan in the West. North Carolina, Kansas and Kentucky in the Midwest. Villanova and Cincinnati in the South.

Obviously, one of those eight will win the title. And it won't be Kansas, Cincinnati, or Michigan. None of them are going deeper than the Sweet 16.

Perhaps it's time to make the actual picks.

**EASTFIRSTROUND:** Duke, UCF, Mississippi State, Virginia Tech, Belmont, Yale, Minnesota (Richard Pitino is not going to lose to Rick Pitino's most recent school) and the excellent brand that is Michigan State.

EAST SECOND **ROUND:** Duke (though alum Johnny Dawkins, the UCF coach, will scare his alma mater), Mississippi State, Belmont and Michigan State. Yes, Belmont is the official No. 11 seed pick to go deep this year.

**EAST SEMIS/FINAL:** Duke and Michigan State get to the final. Duke wins.

WEST FIRST ROUND: Gonzaga, Syracuse, Murray State, Florida State, Buffalo, Northern Kentucky, Nevada, Michigan.

WEST SECOND ROUND: Syracuse (sorry, Zips), Florida State, Buffalo, Nevada.

WEST SEMIS/ **FINAL:** It would be so neat to say Syracuse and

Buffalo so two schools that are a two-hour drive apart have to fly 3,000 miles to play each other. But it'll be Florida State and Nevada. Here's your upset: Nevada wins.

SOUTH FIRST ROUND: Virginia, Oklahoma, Oregon, UC Irvine, Villanova, Purdue, Cincinnati and Tennessee.

**SOUTH SECOND** ROUND: Virginia, Oregon, Villanova and Tennessee - though this will be a ridiculously tough game for the Vols since Cincinnati will be playing in Ohio.

**SOUTH SEMIS/** FINAL: Virginia and Villanova meet, in what many people thought would be the title game last season. Virginia wins.

MIDWEST FIRST **ROUND:** North Carolina, Washington, New Mexico State, Kansas, Ohio State, Houston, Wofford and Kentucky.

**MIDWEST SECOND ROUND:** North Carolina (barely), Kansas (barely), Houston, Kentucky.

MIDWEST SEMIS/ FINAL: Patently unfair to North Carolina that they'll have to face Kansas in Kansas City, but the Heels will prevail anyway.

They'll face Kentucky. Carolina wins.

This takes us to the Final Four.

We've got the three No. 1 seeds from the Atlantic Coast Conference and a No. 7 seed in Nevada.

Duke vs. Nevada, go with Duke.

Virginia vs. North Carolina, go with North

Voila! Finally, we get our UNC-Duke matchup in the tourney.

We could have saved a whole bunch of space and simply said this: This is the third time that Minneapolis has hosted the Final Four. (1951 doesn't count, since the last four teams went there but only for a title game and a third-place game, not a true Final Four.)

The other years Minneapolis played host to the Final Four were 1992 and 2001.

Duke won in 1992. Duke won in 2001.

Duke wins again in 2019. Zion Williamson will make sure his oneyear mark on college basketball is indelible, and Mike Krzyzewski will get his sixth national championship.

much on the line," McIlroy said. "I'm thankful it was my turn this week."

Furyk didn't know he was in The Players until one week ago, and he was on the verge of winning until McIlroy came through in the end. Furyk started the back nine with two birdies to get in the mix and finished strong. His only regret was a 3-foot par putt on the 15th.

Even so, it showed he has plenty of game left after devoting two years as Ryder Cup captain. The runner-up finish moves him high enough in the world ranking to qualifying for the Match Play in two weeks.

"A shot here, a shot there, maybe could have

been a little different," Furvk said. "But ultimately, left it all out there. It was also nice to get in contention, to get under the heat, to have to hit shots under a lot of pressure, and then to respond well to that and hit some good golf shots. Shiffrin wins giant slalom
to seal World Cup title

Another race won, another crystal trophy earned, another World Cup record written by Mikaela Shiffrin in her historically great season.

Shiffrin won a giant slalom Sunday to seal the season-long standings title and, shedding a few tears while sitting in the finish area, lifted a record-tying fourth World Cup crystal globe in the same season.

"There were many moments in the last eight years where I was thinking maybe I would never get this GS globe," Shiffrin said, explaining her emotions. "I wanted to be proud of my skiing and really deserve that."

A fourth discipline title in one season matched the women's World Cup record jointly held by Lindsey Vonn (2010, 2012) and Tina Maze (2013).

Shiffrin's 17th World Cup race win this season also extended her own record for men and women. At age 24, her 60 career wins trails only 26 behind Ingemar Stenmark's all-time total.

### JUPITER, FLA. Back tightness to sideline Cards' Carpenter a few days

Back tightness is expected to keep St. Louis third baseman Matt Carpenter out of the lineup until Wednesday.

Carpenter first noticed the issue on Saturday, when he wasn't scheduled to be in the lineup. The three-time All-Star was scheduled to play Sunday, but the Cardinals elected to be cautious. St. Louis has a scheduled day off Tuesday.

# This is the life I wanted'

### Duke's Zion Williamson embraces the hype

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Of all Zion Williamson's memorable feats throughout the past several months — the dunks, the blocked shots, the highly-disseminated destruction of a particular piece of Nike footwear — perhaps the most significant happened at the ACC tournament: through his mere presence, Williamson energized the Thursday late game, and made it appointment viewing.

Such a thing is no small task. Most years, the Thursday late game, the tournament's final quarterfinal, looks and feels anticlimactic. It always begins around 9:30 p.m., after a long and full day of basketball, and more often than not it plays out before thousands of empty seats.

The best finish of the 2011 ACC tournament came in that same game in the same round, when Virginia Tech and Florida State dragged on late into the night before Derwin Kitchen's buzzer-beater for the Seminoles was waved off after a replay review. The announced attendance that night was more than 23,000, and perhaps one-tenth of it remained for the end of the Hokies' victory. Seated on the baseline, even ACC Commissioner John Swofford looked a little dazed in the second half, and he was far from alone.

That's how the final second-round and quarter-final games usually are: tired crowds, empty seats, resting eyes. Which leads to Thursday, which was none of that. Williamson, the Duke freshman, was playing in his first game since Feb. 20, and the blown-shoe-heard-round-the-world.

Duke's eventual victory over Syracuse at the end of a long day became the main event instead of the afterthought, with the usual — meaning completely unusual, for a college basketball player — amount of attention on Williamson from the moment he left the locker room, to the court and back again, where a fleet of cameras and microphones

awaited.

Asked recently if he could recall witnessing another player receive the kind of attention that Williamson has, Swofford, who has been the ACC's commissioner since 1997, offered simple insight: "No, I haven't," he said.

"No, I naven't," he said.

"He's a very unique player," he said. "We're in a social-media time that is relatively new. When you combine those two things, you get Zion.

Williamson is, at once, both a freshman college basketball player who is going through the kind of growth - mental and emotional, especially that many college freshman experience; and yet he is also a national phenomenon: a spectacle whose fame has made his last name somewhat obsolete. Indeed, Williamson these days is simply "Zion," and living life as Zion means living in the fishbowl - every eye and iPhone focused on him.

This was especially true at the ACC tournament, where Williamson returned after missing all of Duke's previous five games. He missed all but seconds of a sixth after — in a moment of sporting infamy — his left foot tore through his Nike sneaker in the first minute of Duke's first game against North Carolina, a UNC victory at Cameron Indoor Stadium on Feb. 20.

In the weeks since, the Legend of Zion only grew, even in his absence. His injury, a right knee sprain, dominated the national college basketball conversation as much as his play had during the previous months. The question of whether he'd return or whether he should sit out the remainder of the season in an act of self-preservation became a story in itself – even if to Williamson it was never much of a question at all.

"Man, can't do that to my teammates," he said on Friday night, dismissing another question about why he didn't shut himself down for the season. "I made a commitment to my brothers when I first went to Duke. And what people don't see on camera is you go through a lot during the summer and through these practices....

"You just can't turn your back on them, because of the injuries."

Indeed, Williamson's return meant the return of college basketball's greatest force. His impact on the court has become clear enough in part through the viral highlights - the stunning display of athleticism he often unleashes, especially on plays around the rim - but quantifying the Williamson Effect off the court is more difficult. In an age of social media and round-the-clock sports coverage he has, arguably, become the focal point of more hype than anyone in college basketball history.

••• Williamson, for his part. hasn't shied away from it, either. He plays under a spotlight that's so powerful that others might crumble beneath it. In his first two games after his absence, though, he scored a combined 60 points and looked as though he hadn't missed any time at all. Then he answered, again and again, the same familiar questions: ones about the shoe that he victimized, and others about what it was like to be back, and vet others about what it was like to play a full game against UNC.

And that was before the media swirl had even really started.

"Going to the gas station, I go in there (and) I'm going to at least be in there 10 minutes because somebody wants to have a conversation," Williamson said. "I mean, I can't even go to the bathroom sometimes without people bothering me.

"But yeah, I did take a look at myself in the mirror and said, this is the life I wanted to be a part of. My parents told me all this would happen, so it's not much of a shock, but when it happens you're like, you've got to take a step back and you go, wow — I guess I'm onit."

Someone tried to continue the conversation, to ask another question, but the Duke official standing near by had been keeping time, and time was up: "We're done," he said. "We're done, guys — we're done."

Barkley and Smith rile up college basketball fans, and they don't care

NEW YORK — There is a certain predictability to the NCAA tournament. Over the next three weeks, there will be brackets aplenty, most of them busted, and sweetheart Cinderellas. There will be Luther Vandross' song and the ever-present paradox of a billion-dollar television deal for an event starring amateurs.

And there will also be lots of opportunities to listen to Charles Barkley and Kenny Smith. Since CBS and Turner Sports partnered on a rights deal in 2011, the two basketball analysts annually take a break from their award-winning NBA studio show on TNT to offer their thoughts and analysis of the college game.

"The toughest thing is you have to watch so many games and you get so many different reports on different players," Barkley said. "It's kind of like homework, except now I have to do my own homework. When I was in college, they did it for me."

The arrangement brings notable star power to whatever studio in which Barkley and Smith find themselves. Barkley's wit is legendary; Smith is polished and insightful; and host Ernie Johnson, who joins them in the move, is the consummate professional.

But that doesn't mean the NBA experts - particularly Barkley - haven't riled up college hoops fans over the vears with a sense that they have helicoptered in for the sport's marquee event. The litany of faux pas includes the time when Barkley complimented the play of Kansas star Cliff Alexander during a game he wasn't playing in (and when he confused Big Ten teams Iowa and Purdue ahead of the tournament). Smith, for his part, drew his own ire last season when he complimented the defense of former Duke star Marvin Bagley. (Bagley was generally considered not quite a defensive stalwart.)

"When I first started doing this, I used to just watch the NBA and ACC," said Smith, a former North Carolina star. "I became more of a college basketball fan, starting like year three. This year, I've watched Kentucky play more than I've watched the Knicks."

His colleagues have adjusted their approaches, too. Barkley starts his prep work Jan. 1 and each week after that he receives a report from the Turner research staff on every conference in the country. He estimated he's watched around 100 college games this year.
