Pray for Bay marks 6 months after Hurricane Michael devastated county

PANAMA CITY — Six months after Hurricane Michael, Pastor Lynva Masslieno still sees a Bay County struggling to recover.

What he doesn't see is a community that's lost its faith.

"We're a resilient people," Masslieno said. "We lost a lot of things, but we are still here."

Masslieno, pastor of Kingdom Agenda International Ministry in Panama City, was one of several faith and community leaders who spoke at an event on Wednesday to commemorate the six-month anniversary of the Category 4 hurricane that devastated the county. Called Pray for Bay, the event was held at Tommy Oliver Stadium to give residents affected by the storm a chance to heal, reflect on how far the community had come and look to the future together.

The event was organized by Rebuild Bay County Inc., a collaboration of more than 70 nonprofits, faith-based groups, businesses and other agencies that provides coordinated management

of long-term recovery for county residents who don't have adequate resources because of the hurricane.

In addition to the speakers, the event featured live music, food trucks and booths that offered aid from groups such as Habitat for Humanity. Lisa Reynolds was one of several people from Life Management Center of Northwest Florida offering free crisis counseling at the event.

"We go door to door and offer emotional support ... we've been doing it since the storm," Reynolds said.

Reynolds said she was glad

Rebuild Bay County organized the event.

"I like it ... I think it's something we need ... a venue so we do not feel isolated," she said.

After Panama City Toyota presented a \$40,000 donation to Rebuild Bay County, several elected officials offered words of encouragement to the crowd, including Sheriff Tommy Ford.

Ford said people can't control storms, but they can control their responses and their faith in God.

Tech glitch helped Hunt disappear

3 days before quadruple shooting, 'person of interest' fled court before new sex charge could be confirmed

PANAMA CITY — Michael Hunt didn't actually fail to appear for his pre-trial hearing on charges of

unlawful sexual acts with a minor and aggravated assault three days before last week's quadruple shooting on Allen Avenue, for which he is a "person of interest."

Hunt, 53 and a registered sex offender, walked away undetected after a prosecutor announced at the beginning of his hearing that there was a new charge of sexual battery involving a minor against him, but it couldn't be found in the system and no one had a hard copy of it in hand. The defense attorney, meanwhile, said it probably was just confusion over the original charge.

Circuit Court Judge Chris Patterson agreed to place the hearing on hold, essentially, and asked Hunt to take a seat in the courtroom while his attorney and prosecutor figured it out.

Forty-five minutes later,

the warrant confirmed and in hand, Hunt was nowhere to be found and Patterson ordered him held without bond on a charge of failure to appear, because he left before the hearing was completed.

"We expect nothing but great things from the electronic filing system but sometimes we just need to go with paper," said State Attorney Glenn Hess, whose prosecutor said at the beginning of the hearing that there was an active warrant for Hunt's arrest for a new child sex charge. "This was one of those times."

One person died at the scene of the quadruple shooting and three others remain in critical condition.

Courtroom video obtained by The News Herald shows Hunt and his appointed attorney at the time, Jan Miron, standing at one podium and prosecutor Barbara Beasley at another.

As the hearing begins at 2:42 p.m., Beasley quickly tells the judge, "I believe Mr. Hunt has an active warrant. I was (unintelligible) this morning."

"A what?" Hunt says, looking back toward the audience in the courtroom.

Patterson can be heard a short time later saying, "Yeah, I'm not showing it in (unintelligible) but that doesn't mean it's not active."

Victim, 19, ID'd in quadruple shooting

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PANAMA CITY — Police have identified the victim who died in last week's shooting in the Cove that left three others seriously wounded.

Alexandra "Lexie" Elise Peck, 19, was pronounced dead on scene at the home in the 100 block of Allen Avenue after the quadruple shooting late Thursday.

No one has been charged yet in the homicide. A "person of interest" — 53-year-old Michael Harrison Hunt — was taken into custody Friday

night. He since has been charged with human trafficking, living off the earnings of a prostitute and sexual battery without force on a minor in a separate case and is being held without bond.

Panama City police have not released further information and explained why they waited to release the victim's name by citing Florida Statute 119.071, which exempts the release of the address of a victim of mass violence as a public record and exempting identifying information of a witness to a murder as a public record.

Today is Thursday, April 11, the 101st day of 2019. There are 264 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:
On April 11, 1945, during World War II, American soldiers liberated the Nazi concentration camp Buchenwald in Germany.
 On this date:
In 1865, President Abraham Lincoln spoke to a crowd outside the White House, saying, "We meet this evening, not in sorrow, but in gladness of heart." (It was the last public address Lincoln would deliver.)
In 1921, Iowa became the first state to impose a cigarette tax, at 2 cents a package.
In 1947, Jackie Robinson of the Brooklyn Dodgers played in an exhibition against the New York Yankees at Ebbets Field, four days before his regular-season debut that broke baseball's color line. (The Dodgers won, 14-6.)
In 1951, President Harry S. Truman relieved Gen. Douglas MacArthur of his commands in the Far East.
In 1961, former SS officer Adolf Eichmann went on trial in Israel, charged with crimes against humanity for his role in the Nazi Holocaust.
In 1966, Frank Sinatra recorded the song "Strangers in the Night" for his label, Reprise Records.
In 1968, President Lyndon B. Johnson signed into law the Civil Rights Act of 1968, which included the Fair Housing Act, a week after the assassination of Martin Luther King Jr.
In 1974, Palestinian gunmen killed 16 civilians, mostly women and children, in the northern Israeli town of Kiryat Shemona.
In 1980, the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission issued regulations specifically prohibiting sexual harassment of workers by supervisors.

The prosecutor then is seen pulling up the information on her smartphone, saying, "A warrant for Michael Harrison Hunt, uh, for sexual battery on a victim under 18."

Hunt at this point raises his left hand in what looks like a gesture of disbelief.

Hunt's attorney tells the judge it's likely just a continuation of the charge Hunt is in court for that day — for which his previously posted \$65,000 bond was reduced to a release on his own recognizance bond in November by another judge. Hunt had made his court appearances since then.

"What's your date of birth, Mr. Hunt?" Patterson asks.

"6-1-65, your honor," Hunt replies.

Using that as a comparison point, the prosecutor a short time later, again using her smartphone, says, "I have it right here" and says that the date of birth matches Hunt's.

"Alright, well, I'm not going to take any action yet until I see an actual *capias* has been issued so I'll wait and see what that is and maybe that will give a chance for Ms. Miron to get with (Beasley) to discuss that issue," Patterson says.

Hunt remains standing by his attorney as the prosecutor asks if they can "just recall the case (when we've) sorted it out?"

"You can," Patterson replies. "Mr. Hunt, if you

will take a seat and we'll see if we can get to the bottom of this for you."

"Yes sir," Hunt replies, and he is seen walking out of camera range toward the audience, and the door, less than 2 minutes after the hearing started.

Forty-five minutes later the video picks back up with the court clerk calling, "The State recalls Michael Hunt."

Patterson asks Miron to get her client but less than a minute later her voice can be heard from beyond camera range, "It appears Mr. Hunt has vacated the courthouse."

Patterson immediately ruled that Hunt had failed to appear by leaving early and ordered him held without bond, making Hunt a wanted man. The search that ensued turned into an all-out manhunt three

days later when four people were gunned down Thursday night in an Allen Avenue home.

Panama City police quickly declared Hunt a "person of interest" in the case and he was located the following evening and taken into custody for failure to appear, but he has not been charged in connection with the shootings.

Police have not said if they think the shootings are related to any of the previous or pending charges against Hunt or why he is a "person of interest" in the case. The scene of the crime remained roped off with crime scene tape Wednesday. In addition to the earlier charges, Hunt, now being held without bond, is facing new charges of human trafficking, living off the earnings of a

prostitute and sexual battery no physical force by offender 18 or older, victim greater than 12 years of age/less than 18 years of age.

Hunt previously served prison time from April 3, 2013, until June 1, 2015, for three drug charges — including trafficking — as well as grand theft and living off the earnings of a prostitute, according to Florida Department of Corrections records. Those records also indicate Hunt "qualified" for sexual offender status for a 1990 conviction for "US MILITARY (RAPE) GCMO 16 Us Army, NJ."

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement's Sexual Offenders and Predators Search website shows that on Jan. 3, Hunt registered his address as being 2119 E. Fifth St.,

which is the address for Polecats, a business that advertises on social media as a "Dance Studio & VIP Event Venue." On social media it appears to have a warehouse-type interior that includes a small stage and dance pole.

According to the Florida Department of State, Division of Corporations, Hunt is listed as the registered agent and manager of POLECATS LLC.

And according to the Bay County Property Appraiser's Office, that property is owned by 6316 E INDEPENDENCE BLVD, LLC., which, in turn, according to the Division of Corporations, lists its title manager as George Kingston, who owns a number of other properties downtown and in Panama City.

"What I can control is my response and reaction to bad things," Ford said. "And let us not forget what we learned in the storms of life — Bay County must never forget that we need God in the calm as much as in the storm."

County Commissioner Bill Dozier recounted the early days after the storm and the struggles that so many people faced, from the lack of water and power to the inability to communicate.

"We have come a long way since the day after

the storm," Dozier said. "Our goal now is to move forward and I'm excited about our future."

Father Kevin McQuone, with St. John the Evangelist Catholic Church in Panama City, said God would provide for residents in the county. All people had to do was not give up on Him.

"When there is a conflict between faith and feelings, I ask you to please choose faith," he said. "If we believe God created the universe ... I'm pretty sure he has dominion over Bay County."

Stacy Rodolph of Callaway came with a friend to attend the event.

"A lot of places in Callaway are still not OK and

so it's great to come to a place where I can see grass and places that are starting to come back," Rodolph said.

Rodolph was with her sister, huddled in a hallway at home, when the hurricane swept through. Her home and vehicles sustained damage, but the two women came through unscathed. It's that shared traumatic experience that also drew Rodolph to the event.

"I wanted to be around other believers who also walked through what I walked through," she said.

Currently a city manager runs daily operations in the city and confers with the commission on issues. The commission votes on ordinances and discusses community issues during commission meetings. City managers are chosen by the commission, who vote on whether to hire an applicant.

Previous City Manager Michael White recently resigned after being arrested on charges of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon in relation to alleged domestic violence and has pleaded not guilty to the charges. Vickie Gainer is the acting city manager.

"If you have a city manager, what can happen is that it takes three votes of the commission to hire or fire, so you could be looking at two full election cycles to be able to get rid of a manager that the public really didn't like," Anderson said. "It may sound a little harsh but I would say as you put out these resume requests across the country, you're going to get people who are looking to come from maybe the Midwest or some undesirable location to live here on the beach, would be one reason they would come. No. 2, most city managers who are coming from another area have lost their job from their commission because of some reason good or bad."

As Anderson gathers signatures, the city is looking for a new permanent city manager and will be accepting applications. Anderson voted against the city looking for a new city manager

while Commissioners Judy Tinder, Dan Russell, Rodney Friend and Antonius Barnes voted yes to start the search. Anderson also has previously mentioned changing to a form of mayor government in a Facebook post.

Russell said he "fundamentally" disagrees with the concept Anderson is proposing but would respect the will of the voters and "fully respects" Anderson.

"I'm willing to listen to the electorate," Russell said. "I want you to know, at the end of the day, I fully believe the electorate makes the decision. If you get the signatures and the voters vote that's the way they want it, that's the way we proceed. I personally don't think that's the way we should go but if the voters tell me that's what they want, I'm willing to listen to them."

Anderson compared a strong mayor government to the role the superintendent — who is an elected official and makes major decisions — plays for Bay District Schools.

"Look at it and think about it and know I'm not asking for just this mayor but I'm asking for the future of Lynn Haven — do you really want to continue this process of every two or three years, something with the city manager or do you want someone you elect to handle the business of the city?" Anderson said.

Tinder asked what would happen if Anderson gets the necessary signatures and the city starts getting applications for a new city manager, and if applicants would have to be told the city changed its mind. Anderson said that is a "possibility but certainly not a certainty."

Brexit: The delicate dance

Backstage at summit: Huddles, deals

BRUSSELS — Leaving the European Union has turned out to be much harder than British Prime Minister Theresa May bargained for — she can't even leave Wednesday's emergency summit in Brussels until the bloc's 27 other leaders decide what to do with her confused country.

A daylong diplomatic ballet is playing out in the European Quarter of Brussels, culminating in a closed-door dinner with fine wines and an elaborate menu at which presidents and prime ministers will talk for hours and hours until no one disagrees anymore. And only then will May find out their Brexit decision.

It wasn't immediately clear what the food options will be on the carte du jour. Whatever they are, it's sure to be a feast.

And in very European fashion, EU leaders (minus May since she isn't invited to the dinner party) will each have their turn to talk and talk and talk in between bites and sips until they reach a consensus — there isn't a formal vote — on whether to grant the U.K. an extension and for how long. The working dinner is expected to drag into the early hours of Thursday.

But first, the Dutch prime minister is playing messenger between ally May and harder-line EU leaders. The French and German leaders are having their own huddle. A mini-club of North Sea countries is gathering elsewhere.

It is all part of the backdoor politicking that's the only way the EU can ever come to a consensus. It's baffling to outsiders — but the EU has elevated it into an art.

Everyone's got their own interests to defend, but at

the end of the day, they have to all agree on one answer: The EU leaders will either let her delay Brexit until June, or force her to delay it longer — or tell her “good riddance” and let Britain risk tumbling out of the bloc this week without any future plan.

May is already being treated like an outcast: On the official summit brochure showing the photos of the leaders, she's relegated to the level of “Guest.”

May will give a speech to the 27 other EU leaders pleading for a delay, but

then has to leave the room, and wait for them to make a decision. And wait.

At the last Brexit summit two weeks ago, May spoke for close to two hours to convince EU leaders her plans were making headway in the U.K. parliament.

After she left the room, EU leaders estimated her chances to get it past the House of Commons at between 5 percent and 10 percent. Some said even that was generous.

She then waited four hours in a Brussels government

suite before the other leaders finally agreed to grant her a brief Brexit delay.

Some of Wednesday's summit drama began well before European Council President Donald Tusk officially opens the evening meeting in the multicolored main room in the Europa building, an architectural gem looking like a Grecian urn sitting in a glass box.

Earlier in the day, Belgium hosted six other nations close to the U.K. — Netherlands, Spain, France, Germany, Ireland and Denmark — at the neoclassical Egmont Palace across town, amid mountains of marble and gilded chandeliers, to plot strategy.

But not everyone liked this idea. Rumors quickly surfaced that the special “mini-summit” was a plot to set out tough terms for Britain's new extension and put the other EU leaders before a fait-accompli. Quickly diplomats had to play down the meeting, saying it was just to “coordinate” plans in case of a no-deal.

It's all in a day's work for the EU, where the fate of nations can hang in the balance at such summits.

When Greece was teetering on the brink of bankruptcy in 2015, summits could literally last for days, leaving leaders to hang around while key players were having intense eye-to-eyes. Prime Minister Alexis Tsipras famously ditched his tie to show his left-wing defiance.

NEW YORK Lawyer: Challenge to NYC's vaccination order in works

A civil rights attorney says opponents are planning a lawsuit this week over New York City's order requiring everyone in a heavily Orthodox Jewish neighborhood to be vaccinated for measles.

Lawyer Michael Sussman said Wednesday that the city overreached its authority by threatening to fine residents of four Brooklyn ZIP codes if they refuse to have their children vaccinated.

Sussman also represented a group of parents in suburban Rockland County who challenged the barring unvaccinated children from indoor public spaces. A state judge sided with the parents and issued a preliminary injunction against the emergency order.

MINNEAPOLIS Woman slain by Minneapolis officer 'yearned to help people'

The Minneapolis woman who was fatally shot by a police officer in 2017 spent a lifetime trying to help people and animals.

Justine Diamond's relatives describe her as an animal lover who originally trained as a veterinary surgeon. On the night she was killed in 2017, the 40-year-old life coach and yoga instructor called 911 to report what she thought was a sexual assault near her home.

Relatives say she “yearned to help people.” They filed a \$50 million lawsuit in her death. That complaint is on hold while former officer Mohamed Noor stands trial on murder and manslaughter charges.

Damon had dual citizenship in the U.S. and Australia.

COLUMBUS, OHIO Ban on abortions after 1st heartbeat sent to Ohio gov.

Abortion-rights supporters in Ohio fought perhaps the last battle over a twice-vetoed heartbeat abortion ban, which Gov. Mike DeWine has said he will sign.

After nearly 10 years of fighting, Democrats let loose during run-up to final House and Senate approval Wednesday with lessons from slavery, predictions of economic harm, references to the book of Genesis, and testimonials about their own rapes. Faith groups brandished banners and made pleas for religious tolerance. An advocate for reproductive rights threatened Republicans with the loss of young voters' support in 2020.

Opponents have vowed to sue.

LONDON WikiLeaks accuses Ecuador of spying on Assange at embassy

WikiLeaks on Wednesday accused the Ecuadorian government of spying on Julian Assange as tensions mounted between the WikiLeaks founder and his hosts.

The group's editor-in-chief, Kristinn Hrafnsson, told a news conference that Assange's meetings with lawyers and a doctor had been secretly filmed by Ecuadorian authorities.

Assange sought refuge in the Ecuadorian Embassy in London in 2012 and has been living there ever since.

Sweden has dropped an investigation into rape allegations against Assange, but he refuses to come out for fear of facing U.S. charges related to WikiLeaks' publication of classified documents.

CARACAS, VENEZUELA Red Cross regains entry to Venezuela jails, military prisons

The International Committee of the Red Cross has regained access to prisons in Venezuela, including highly guarded military facilities where dozens of inmates considered political prisoners are being held, as President Nicolas Maduro seeks to counter mounting criticism of his government's human rights record.

The fact that the visits include military prisons, which hadn't been previously reported, was confirmed by a human rights lawyer and family members of those detained.

International Red Cross President Peter Maurer met with Maduro on Tuesday.

Astronomers reveal first image of a black hole

WASHINGTON — Humanity got its first glimpse Wednesday of the cosmic place of no return: a black hole.

And it's as hot, as violent and as beautiful as science fiction imagined.

In a breakthrough that thrilled the world of astrophysics and stirred talk of a Nobel Prize, scientists released the first image ever made of a black hole, revealing a fiery doughnut-shaped object in a galaxy 53 million light-years from Earth.

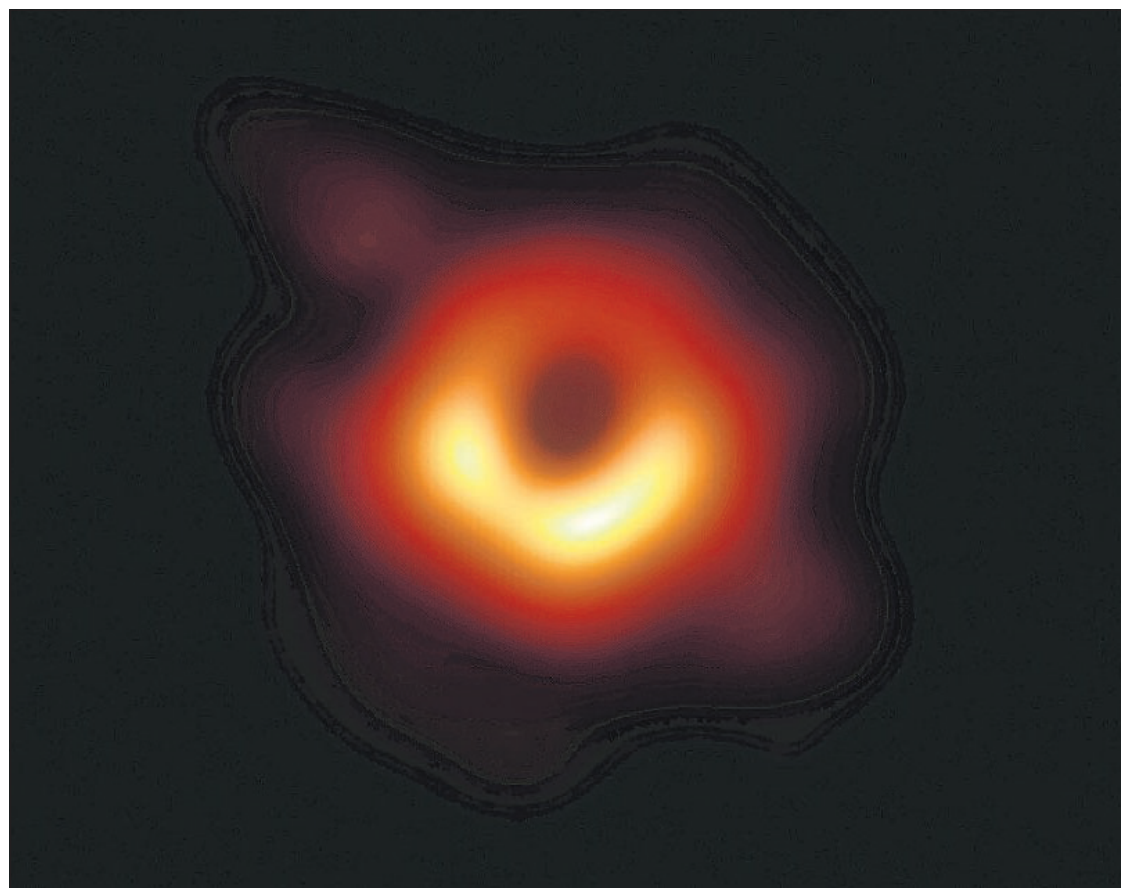
"Science fiction has become science fact," University of Waterloo theoretical physicist Avery Broderick, one of the leaders of the research team of about 200 scientists from 20 countries, declared as the colorized orange-and-black picture was unveiled.

The image, assembled from data gathered by eight radio telescopes around the world, shows light and gas swirling around the lip of a supermassive black hole, a monster of the universe theorized by Einstein more than a century ago and confirmed by observations over the decades.

Supermassive black holes are situated at the center of most galaxies, including ours, and are so dense that nothing, not even light, can escape their gravitational pull. Light gets bent and twisted around by gravity in a bizarre fun-house effect as it gets sucked into the abyss along with superheated gas and dust.

The new image helps confirm Einstein's general theory of relativity. Einstein even predicted the neatly symmetrical shape that scientists just found.

"We have seen what we

thought was unseeable. We have seen and taken a picture of a black hole," announced Sheperd Doleman of Harvard, leader of the project.

Jessica Dempsey, another co-discoverer and deputy director of the East Asian Observatory in Hawaii, said the fiery circle reminded her of the flaming Eye of Sauron from the "Lord of the Rings" trilogy.

Three years ago, scientists using an extraordinarily sensitive observing system heard the sound of two much smaller black holes merging to create a gravitational wave, as Einstein predicted. The new image, published in the *Astrophysical Journal Letters* and announced

around the world, adds light to that sound.

Outside scientists suggested the achievement could be worthy of a Nobel, just like the gravitational wave discovery.

"I think it looks very convincing," said Andrea Ghez, director of the UCLA Galactic Center Group, who wasn't part of the discovery team.

The picture was made with equipment that detects wavelengths invisible to the human eye, so astronomers added color to convey the ferocious heat of the gas and dust, glowing at a temperature of perhaps millions of degrees. But if a person were to somehow get close to this black hole, it might not look

quite like that, astronomers said.

The black hole is about 6 billion times the mass of our sun and is in a galaxy called M87. Its "event horizon" — the precipice, or point of no return, where light and matter get sucked inexorably into the hole — is as big as our entire solar system.

Black holes are the "most extreme environment in the known universe," Broderick said, a violent, churning place of "gravity run amok." Unlike smaller black holes, which come from collapsed stars, supermassive black holes are mysterious in origin.

Despite decades of study, there are a few people who deny black holes exist, and

this work shows that they do, said Boston University astronomer professor Alan Marscher, a co-discoverer.

The project cost \$50 million to \$60 million, with \$28 million of that coming from the National Science Foundation. The same team has gathered even more data on a black hole in the center of our own Milky Way galaxy, but scientists said the object is so jumpy they don't have a good picture yet.

Myth says a black hole would rip you apart, but scientists said that because of the particular forces exerted by an object as big as the one in M87, someone could fall into it and not be torn to pieces. But the person would never be heard from or seen again.

Black holes are "like the walls of a prison. Once you cross it, you will never be able to get out and you will never be able to communicate," said astronomer Avi Loeb, who is director of the Black Hole Initiative at Harvard but was not involved in the discovery.

The telescope data was gathered two years ago, over four days when the weather had to be just right all around the world. Completing the image was an enormous undertaking, involving an international team of scientists, supercomputers and hundreds of terabytes of data.

When scientists initially put all that data into the first picture, what they saw looked so much like what they expected they didn't believe it at first.

"We've been hunting this for a long time," Dempsey said. "We've been getting closer and closer with better technology."

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Florida doesn't need Galvano's toll road boondoggle

State lawmakers are considering building a unneeded toll expressway right through North Florida's springs heartland, fueling sprawl and diverting funding from more pressing transportation projects.

And while it may not seem Panhandle counties have a dog in this hunt, we do — which is why local residents should contact our lawmakers right away and register their disapproval before this grandiose scheme, which is moving fast in both the House and Senate and includes extensions to connect it to other high-speed corridors, makes it into the final version of next year's budget. Over the next 10 years, the plan lawmakers are considering would siphon at least \$1.5 billion from state road funding, and probably more (when's the last time a major road-building project didn't go over budget?)

There are better uses for that money. Adding insult to injury, this project is being championed in a relatively good budget year, but it commits lawmakers to more than 10 years of ongoing costs. Is it prudent to imagine that will continue for another decade?

The highway is a top priority of state Senate President Bill Galvano, who wants to extend the Suncoast Parkway from Citrus County to the Florida-Georgia line. He is also seeking to extend the Florida Turnpike to connect it with the parkway and to construct a new highway connecting Collier and Polk counties. Recently, House leaders signaled their own support.

Proponents claim they are trying to improve the economies of rural counties. But it is no coincidence that Thomas Peterffy, a billionaire Republican donor, owns 561,000 acres a region that could explode with massive new residential and commercial development if these roads are built.

Smart growth that includes more dense development, rather than sprawl that depletes and pollutes groundwater, should be the focus. About 18 percent of Florida's land is already developed and more than one third of the state will be developed by 2070 if current trends continue, according to smart growth advocacy group 1000 Friends of Florida.

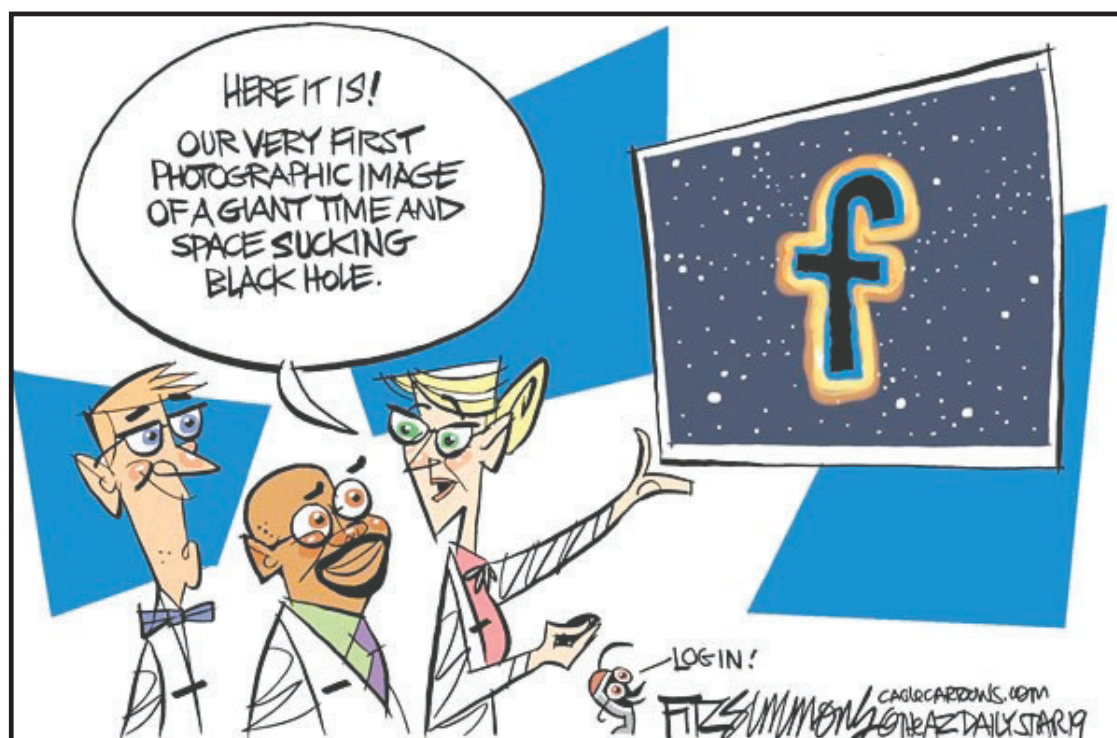
The toll road plan "would shift infrastructure investment away from metropolitan areas — where we need that investment most to serve people and to sustain jobs — to build expressways through rural and agricultural areas, where the costs will outweigh any benefits," Thomas Hawkins of 1000 Friends of Florida wrote in a column.

This year's measure would dedicate \$45 million to task forces studying the impact of the new roads, with funding eventually growing to \$140 million annually and the roads proposed to open by 2030.

The money would be better spent on more immediate improvements to existing interstates, and supporting local efforts to meet their own needs. State lawmakers should dust off the task force's report that made that and other recommendations, rather than continuing to create task forces until they get someone to validate their plan for more damaging sprawl.

What the Chicago Mayoral Election Reveals about the 2020 Race for President

Chicagoans did something that no one imagined a year ago, voting by a mammoth margin to entrust the mayor's office to an uncharismatic gay black woman who has never held elective office. Lori Lightfoot was the most surprising election winner since — well, since Donald Trump.

Chicago is not a cross-section of America, but developments and tendencies seen in America's third-largest city often reflect the general pattern of the nation's political evolution. And those on display in this election offered some clues about how the 2020 presidential election may go.

One conclusion to be drawn from the mayoral race is that large fields make for unpredictable outcomes. There were 14 candidates on the Feb. 26 ballot, including some formidable figures who enjoyed big advantages in name recognition, proven vote-getting prowess and fundraising. But given such a wide range of options, voters are unlikely to coalesce rapidly behind any of them — even those who start out looking like winners.

For a candidate, assembling a majority is not the first priority; building a small base of supporters can

be enough, at least in early contests. Lightfoot, today's landslide winner, got just 17.5% in the first round, and that was enough to put her in first place. Toni Preckwinkle made the runoff with only 16%. The candidates who didn't survive captured 2 out of every 3 votes.

We already knew about this phenomenon from the last presidential election. No one gave Trump a chance of winning early on. But he won the New Hampshire primary with 35% of the vote, and he was able to win several more primaries with far less than a majority. One key to his success was a surfeit of rivals who managed only to kill each other off until he had a commanding lead.

In the mayoral race, we found that being well-known at the start is not an indispensable attribute. A long and crowded campaign gives obscure candidates a chance to gain attention. Lightfoot's victory should be taken as encouraging by such Democratic presidential contenders as Pete Buttigieg, Jay Inslee, John Hickenlooper and even Marianne Williamson and Andrew Yang.

What is plain from this election is something that was also apparent in 2016: Voters don't place immense importance on experience in elective office, of which Lightfoot has none. Neither did J.B. Pritzker before he was elected governor of

Illinois, and neither did his predecessor, Bruce Rauner. Nor, of course, did Trump. These examples are not hopeful indicators for Joe Biden, Bernie Sanders, Amy Klobuchar or Cory Booker.

Looking at the debacles produced by veteran leaders who were supposed to know what they were doing, people find themselves more willing to take a chance on inexperienced newcomers. Trump's many blunders and inability to learn from them may eventually curb this popular impulse, but not just yet.

Fresh faces seem to have considerably more appeal than before. Lightfoot benefited from being a conspicuous departure from the straight white men, Rahm Emanuel and Richard M. Daley, who preceded her. In a runoff featuring two African-American women, Preckwinkle was better connected and more establishment-oriented, and those hard-earned traits turned out to be liabilities.

Why did Americans elect Barack Obama and then Trump, who had almost nothing in common? Because each candidate represented something very different from what came before.

But the race is not always to the swift; time and chance happen to them all. Come election night 2020, the only surprising outcome would be an unsurprising outcome.

NEW YORK CEOs of big banks face off with House Dems

The heads of seven of the largest banks in the U.S. fielded sometimes contentious questions from a House committee on Wednesday, some dealing with current risks to the financial system and other focused on more politically-charged topics.

The appearance by the chief executives of JPMorgan Chase, Goldman Sachs and five other banks represented the largest gathering of leaders of the banking industry before Congress since the financial crisis.

The CEOs told members of the House Financial Services Committee they've taken steps to improve the stability of their institutions since the financial system nearly seized up in 2008.

WASHINGTON IRS head: Average 2018 tax refund close to 2017's

The head of the IRS, overseeing the most sweeping overhaul of the U.S. tax code in three decades, says the average refund in this year's tax-filing season, \$2,833, worked out to be close to last year's.

Taxes and returns for 2018 are due on Monday.

Internal Revenue Service Commissioner Charles Rettig told Congress Wednesday that an increase is urgently needed in the agency's budget to modernize antiquated computer systems and protect taxpayers' data.

WASHINGTON US budget deficit 15 pct. higher than a year ago

The federal government reported a \$146.9 billion deficit in March, causing annual debt to rise 15 percent for the first half of the budget year compared to the same period in 2018.

The Treasury Department said Wednesday in its monthly report that the fiscal year deficit has so far totaled \$691 billion, up from nearly \$600 billion in 2018. The Treasury Department expects that the deficit will exceed \$1 trillion when the fiscal year ends in September.

Macron plays hardball on Brexit, but won't follow De Gaulle

LONDON — It took Britain more than a decade to join the European club, largely because longtime French president, Charles de Gaulle, kept saying no.

Now the U.K.'s future in

the European Union looks like it will hinge on what De Gaulle's successor in the Elysee Palace, Emmanuel Macron has to say about it.

All eyes are on a special leaders' summit in Brussels Wednesday, where British Prime Minister Theresa May is asking for another extension to Britain's departure from the EU. Originally meant to take place on March 29, it has already been delayed to April 12 because

the British Parliament resoundingly voted against the withdrawal agreement that May negotiated with the EU. May wants an extension until June 30, but others in the EU appear to favor a much longer delay, possibly going into next year.

And Macron, playing the hardest of hardballs, has shown that he's not keen on any kind of extension at all and will only back one if there are strings attached.

Europe hurt by US trade threats

FRANKFURT, Germany — The head of the European Central Bank warned that global friction over trade — such as U.S. threats to impose more tariffs — is holding back the economy as he underlined the bank's readiness to deploy more

stimulus if needed.

Mario Draghi said Wednesday that an improving jobs market and rising wages were helping the economy in the 19 countries that use the euro but uncertainties like trade disputes and Brexit are hurting it.

"Global headwinds continue to weigh on euro area growth," he told a news

conference after the central bank kept its key interest rates and policy promises on hold.

Draghi was speaking hours after U.S. President Donald Trump threatened to pile tariffs on another \$11 billion worth of goods from the European Union, ratcheting up tensions as the two sides negotiate trade terms.

Siege of Vicksburg, snowmelt, crops and hogs

"The Mississippi Delta was shining like a national guitar; I am following the river down the highway ...

Recently I crossed the Mississippi River by car at Vicksburg. The river was nearly topping its banks.

We stopped at the Mississippi Welcome Center, stood in the misty, morning air, high above the river, sipped our complimentary coffee and read the Civil War historical marker commemorating Grant's siege of Vicksburg. That Americans had lived underground for months right below our feet to avoid cannon fire from other Americans on the river's opposite side in 1863 was difficult to comprehend. The volume of swirling, angry water below us racing southward was equally difficult to fathom.

The Missouri River, the longest in North America, has flooded recently, causing historic damage. Levees have broken throughout the Midwest. Estimates of crop loss in Nebraska approached a billion dollars some weeks ago. The Missouri empties into the Mississippi near St. Louis, so high water upriver causes

more extensive flooding farther south. Record snowfall also has affected the Illinois and Ohio Rivers. A rainy spring will bring more flooding.

The economic ramifications of flooding are difficult to calibrate, but significant nonetheless. First, there is damage to crops and livestock. At this writing, I-29 in Iowa remains closed. Trains must utilize alternate routes. Rural roads are impassable. Bridges are damaged. Many farmers plant in spring and depend on overland transportation and barge shipments traveling upriver to deliver fertilizer. All of these connections are being disrupted. Crops and livestock must be transported to market eventually, so the route disruptions hurt farmers coming and going.

Some neighborhoods will be abandoned, as floodwaters ruin residential areas. Many businesses will close. The financial fallout is similar to a natural disaster like a hurricane or tornado, but with a much, much wider geographic scope and with national and global economic impact. During the Great Flood of 1927 an area the size of Scotland was flooded as the Mississippi overflowed its banks. Six states and 27,000 square miles were inundated. The Flood Control Act of 1928

soon followed, legislation which heightened and lengthened levees along the river.

The American Midwest is the largest contiguous body of farmland in the world, and it's connected to oceans and the Gulf of Mexico by a massive system of rivers and man-made waterways. Because of it, we largely take food security for granted, something many nations cannot do. The crops and livestock grown there satisfy domestic and global food needs. When Omaha, Nebraska, sneezes, Paris, France, catches a cold. The effect on food prices, jobs and the economy remain to be seen, as does the extent of the flood damage to one of our most productive regions. Margaret R. Tech leads stocks higher

Stocks closed higher on Wall Street Wednesday as solid gains by technology companies helped the market recoup some of its losses from a day earlier.

Small-company stocks also stood out, beating the rest of the market. Banks, retailers and homebuilders also notched gains. Utilities were the biggest laggard.

Investors appeared to welcome new insights from the Federal Reserve's last meeting of policymakers. The central bank released the minutes from the two-day March meeting, which showed that a majority of Fed officials believed the central bank could keep interest rates unchanged the rest of this year.

The rally was a reversal for the market following a slide on Tuesday that ended an eight-day winning streak as investors turned their attention to the next wave of corporate earnings.

The S&P 500 index rose 10.01 points, or 0.3 percent, to 2,888.21.

The 30-stock Dow Jones Industrial Average recovered from an early slide to gain 6.58 points, or less than 0.1 percent, to 26,157.16.

The Nasdaq, which is heavily weighted with technology stocks, added 54.97 points, or 0.7 percent, to 7,964.24.

Small-company stocks, which investors tend to favor when they're feeling bullish about the economy, rose more than the rest of the market. The Russell 2000 picked up 21.87 points, or 1.4 percent, to 1,581.55.

Major indexes in Europe finished mostly higher.

Despite a downturn in stocks on Tuesday, the broader market has been steadily gaining in 2019. The S&P 500 is up 15.2 percent for the year.

Bond prices rose, sending yields lower, after the government reported that a key measure of consumer price inflation remained in check last month. The yield on the 10-year Treasury note, which is used to set interest rates on mortgages and many other kinds of loans, fell to 2.47 percent from 2.50 percent late Tuesday.

‘EGGS’ SPY ON WHOOPING CRANES TO BOOST SURVIVAL

GOP, Democrats battle over restoring voting rights

TALLAHASSEE — A measure cast as a bid to follow the demands of 65 percent of voters last fall who supported making it easier for felons to regain their voting rights continued to divide lawmakers Tuesday.

The Republican-dominated House Judiciary Committee voted 12-6 along party lines to approve legislation (HB 7089) that requires felons to pay court-ordered costs and restitution before regaining their right to vote.

The provision was part of the sales pitch by those promoting Amendment 4. But now such payments have turned into a battleground, with many of the same proponents arguing that including that requirement in the amendment’s implementing legislation would continue to bar thousands of people from the ballot.

Florida has an estimated 1.4 million potential voters declared ineligible because of past felonies — the most in the nation.

“We all believe in redemption and we all believe in restoration,” Judiciary Chairman Paul Renner, R-Palm Coast, said.

But he added, “Unfortunately, we are being told after the fact that we should exclude some of these provisions,” used in the Amendment 4 campaign.

Several of those who testified before the committee said they have reshaped their lives after felony convictions but still face tremendous costs. Coral Nichols of Pinellas County said she owes \$190,000 restitution that she’s paying off at \$100 a month.

“There’s got to be a way for me to register,” she said.

The House and Senate are

City, AT&T reach Jenks deal

PANAMA CITY — After dragging out the recently completed Jenks Avenue construction project, and by extension raising the cost, AT&T has opted to settle rather than drag out the affair in court.

At Tuesday’s commission meeting, the city’s attorney in the case, Cliff Higby,

reported that AT&T was offering \$884,000 as a settlement. A lawsuit filed by the city in October alleged the telecommunications company’s failure to move its power poles in a timely manner caused more than \$1 million worth of change orders. The city sought \$984,000 in damages.

AT&T’s offer, Higby said, was a good one.

“It approximates a reasonable jury verdict or court

verdict,” he said. “It’s on the very high end of what we could receive in court. Without being too casual, it’s kind of a no-brainer.”

Commissioners unanimously voted to accept the settlement, which was contingent only on their signing. With their approval, the city will be paid within 30 days and then dismiss the lawsuit, Higby said.

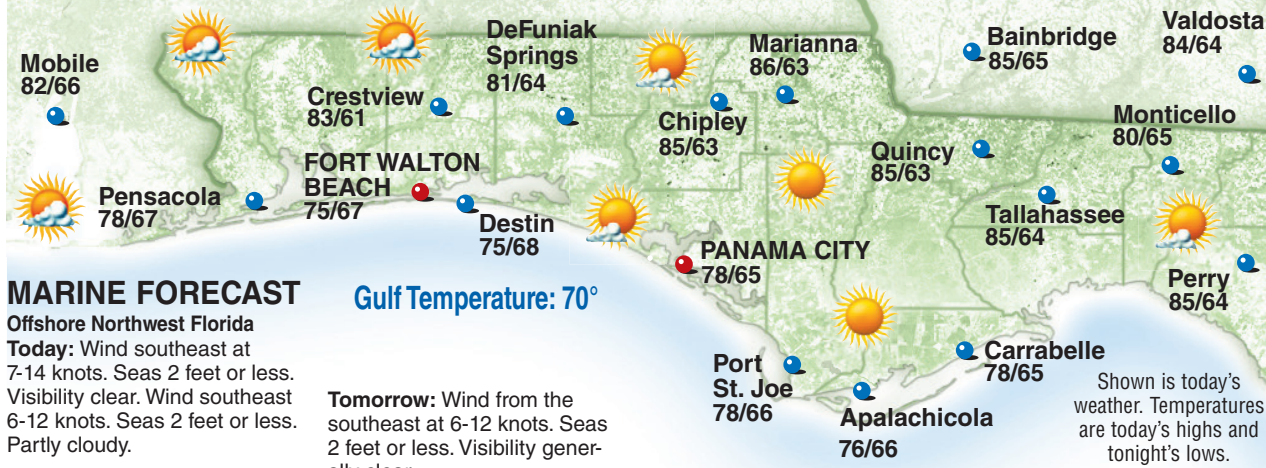

are advancing different bills, but both are unyielding on the payment standard.

The House measure approved Tuesday includes a provision empowering a judge to declare a sentence complete, even with court costs outstanding. There also are steps that an ex-offender can take with the Florida Department of Corrections to get other costs dropped.

The House and Senate also are using different standards on defining what constitutes murder and sexual offenses that still will prohibit former felons from automatically seeking to regain their voting rights.

But waiving a requirement to pay restitution to a victim of a crime looks unlikely to be pulled from the legislation, bill sponsor Rep. James Grant, R-Tampa, said.

He pointed out that the separate "Marsy's Law," Amendment 6, a so-called victim's rights measure approved by voters in November, affirmed that crime victims had a right to be compensated by offenders. Grant said that proponents want him to "redo the narrative" and "undo everything that had happened to put this amendment before voters."

DeSantis tries to build support for drug imports

TALLAHASSEE — In a move that could suggest one of his top legislative priorities is encountering stiff resistance, Gov. Ron DeSantis took time Monday to defend his push to allow the importation of prescription drugs from Canada.

DeSantis went to Sun City Center, a well-known retirement community just south of Tampa, where he repeated past statements that President

Donald Trump supports the effort, which would need federal approval to be put in place.

"Immediately he said, 'You go tell the people of Florida that I support it, you go do it, I'm for you — I want this to happen,'" DeSantis said.

DeSantis acknowledged that some people in the Trump administration might be opposed, but added, "He's the one that got the electoral votes, not them, so I'm going with the guy in charge."

But while DeSantis has

touted Trump's approval for the effort, it is not clear that the administration would agree to the proposal if it were passed by the Florida Legislature. And getting it through the state House and Senate might not be assured.

House leaders have pushed the issue forward, saying it could lower prescription-drug costs, but it has not moved as quickly in the Senate.

Senate sponsor Aaron Bean, R-Fernandina Beach, told the crowd at Sun City Center that

"the status quo will not go quietly in the night" and that drug companies were hiring many lobbyists to defeat the bill.

Later Monday, however, Bean insisted that the Sun City Center event was not designed to rally support for the legislation.

Bean told The News Service of Florida that the bill would clear the Senate Health and Human Services Appropriations Subcommittee, which he chairs, on Tuesday.

"We're on a flight

path to bring this thing together," he said.

Meanwhile, during a lengthy meeting of the Senate Health Policy Committee on Monday, senators heard a presentation from Saumil Pandya, deputy vice president of policy and research at the Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers of America.

Pandya told lawmakers that in 2017 brand list prices for drugs, after accounting for rebates and discounts, increased by about 1.5 percent.

"These are not big numbers. These are not such large things that the system could not handle going forward. It absolutely can handle it going forward," he said.

Pandya said lawmakers are hearing complaints because insured patients are unhappy with what they pay for prescriptions. And those costs, he said, are a function of insurance benefit designs.

"Insurance companies decided how much you pay for your medicine," he said.

Human skeletal remains found on Eglin

EGLIN AFB — A hiker found human skeletal remains scattered on the Eglin Air Force reservation Tuesday.

The man was hiking north of U.S. 98 near the Okaloosa-Santa Rosa County line about 5:30 p.m. when he found the bones spread out in the brush, according to the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office.

Sheriff's deputies arrived and collected evidence at the scene, the press release said.

Investigators "had to walk quite a ways into the woods to where the remains were located," Sheriff's office spokeswoman Michele Nicholson said Wednesday. "Based on the condition, they had been there for an extended period of time."

The sex, race and age of the remains have not been determined, Nicholson said. The Medical Examiner's Office will examine them and attempt to identify the person. "That is expected to be a quite lengthy process," Nicholson said.

WASHINGTON Dunn: 'We are failing' disaster victims

The lack of a supplemental disaster bill has brought "a huge shame on America," according to Rep. Neal Dunn.

On the sixth-month anniversary of Hurricane Michael, Dunn stood on the steps of the Capitol continuing his plea for recovery money for the region.

The Category 4 storm, he said, "crushed my district. One third of all the homes are unlivable, 50 percent of the retail space is gone, 90 percent of the Tyndall Air Force Base structures were damaged. Our Coast Guard Base managed to salvage a single building, but our Coasties are still working."

That Congress hasn't passed a dollar of relief for Hurricane Michael or any of the other natural disasters from 2018 is a "huge shame on America," Dunn, R-Panama City, said.

"There's a lot of reasons why Americans have lost faith in their government over the years, but there was one bedrock principle they still believed in and that is, when we had a disaster our government would come to our aid," Dunn said. "Now we are failing them in this one last article of faith."

Dunn's speech was part of a Republican rally criticizing the Democratic majority in the House of Representatives for not accomplishing more in their first 100 days.

SANTA ROSA BEACH WCSO seeking wig-wearing burglary suspect

The Walton County Sheriff's Office is looking for a man believed to be involved in "smash and grab" burglaries in three jurisdictions, including Panama City Beach.

WCSO received reports Sunday from three separate victims that their vehicle windows were broken by a punch. The thief stole a diaper bag with the victim's driver license, a purse with a pistol and several credit cards, and a Michael Kors purse with personal checks, gift cards and credit cards inside,

according to the reports.

Police said the next day a man driving a black Nissan Armada attempted to cash one of the victim's checks at Regions Bank in Panama City Beach.

"The subject, observed in surveillance video as a white male wearing a wig and glasses, presented a driver's license stolen from a smash and grab in Panama City at a park in their jurisdiction," the release said. "The tag on the vehicle was stolen from a car in a parking lot in Panama City Beach."

The man was questioned by bank employees but fled before law enforcement's arrival, according to the report.

Walton County Sheriff's Office is coordinating with detectives from the Panama City Police Department and the Panama City Beach Police Department.

"Probable cause was established to charge Jones with attempted second-degree murder and a warrant was issued for his arrest," a press release said.

TALLAHASSEE Scooter regulation debate headed to House floor

With the industry described by one lobbyist as being in its "infancy," the full House could take up a controversial bill that would limit the ability of cities and counties to regulate scooter sharing services.

The House State Affairs Committee on Wednesday approved a bill (HB 453), sponsored by Rep. Jackie Toledo, R-Tampa, that would set up a statewide regulatory framework for the industry, which involves riders using apps to hop on motorized scooters that can be left in various places.

Toledo said the bill, in part, would require cities and counties to treat scooter riders like bicyclists.

She said the bill would help prevent cities and counties from using regulations to pick "winners and losers" in the industry.

But critics such as Jeff Branch, a lobbyist for the Florida League of Cities, said local governments should be able to determine how to regulate the services.

"They (requirements) have to be crafted locally, local decisions," Branch said.

The bill has been approved by three committees, readying it to go to the full House.

A Senate version (SB 542), sponsored by Sen. Jeff Brandes, R-St. Petersburg, has cleared two committees and is awaiting a hearing in the Appropriations Committee.

'Eggs' spy on whooping cranes to boost survival

NEW ORLEANS — Scientists are using fake eggs to spy on whooping cranes in hopes of learning why some chicks die in the egg, while others hatch.

Data gathered by the spy eggs could help biologists in Louisiana and Canada preserve the endangered long-legged birds, which have made a tenuous rebound after dwindling almost to extinction in the 1940s.

"It's a fascinating way of spying on endangered species' reproduction in a way that allows us to assist in the recovery," said Dr. Axel Moehrensclager, the Calgary Zoo's director of conservation and science.

The Calgary Zoo lent eight of the spy eggs, more properly known as "data loggers," to Louisiana researchers.

The Louisiana wildlife biologists swap the egg-shaped data loggers for one of the two eggs that many cranes lay. The real eggs come to Audubon Nature Institute's Species Survival Center in New Orleans, where they're incubated until they're almost ready to hatch ... or not.

Then the biologists in Louisiana swap the real eggs back into the nests.

The electronic data loggers use infrared connections to transfer information to nearby computers. It's sent for analysis to scientists in Calgary, where the only remaining wild natural flock

of whooping cranes is based.

Whoopers are the tallest birds and rarest cranes in North America. They stand about 5 feet tall, with black-tipped wings that span almost 7 feet.

Overhunting and habitat loss cut their numbers to 21 in the 1940s, but with some help from humans the number had risen to about 850 at the end of 2018.

Louisiana is home to 74 whooping cranes in the wild.

"We've got some pairs that haven't been successful, and we want to see if we could see what might be going on with them," said Sara Zimorski, a biologist with the Louisiana

Department of Wildlife and Fisheries.

"In the bigger picture, we don't know a lot about wild nest incubation," she said. The new information might help improve provisions for captive pairs and settings for incubators.

Richard Dunn, curator at the Species Survival Center, said he hopes to learn if he needs to tweak incubator settings to more closely mimic Louisiana's climate, which is hotter and damper than the northern settings where previous studies were done.

A crane expert who's not affiliated with the Louisiana effort said those are

reasonable aims. Scott A. Shaffer, a San José State University professor, has been working with data logger eggs since 2010 to study a variety of birds in a number of places. He said the tiny, low-power sensors that reorient tablet and smartphone displays as the devices are moved have helped drive technology that checks for egg turning, allowing second-by-second studies of eggs.

The whooping crane data logger eggs record temperature, humidity and position once a minute. They also can detect when eggs are turned — an important part of keeping developing birds healthy.

They were developed by a team of Canadian and U.S. scientists who compared nests of captive whooping cranes and sandhill cranes at the Calgary Zoo's Devonian Wildlife Conservation Centre to incubators, hoping to improve the hatching rate of incubated eggs.

Their study, published in 2012, helped people raising the cranes in Canada and the U.S. to adjust incubator temperature and humidity settings, Moehrensclager said.

The Species Survival Center on New Orleans' west bank houses 36 of the 163 whooping cranes currently living in captivity, including 10 destined for a new facility under construction by the Dallas Zoo. None of the birds at Audubon has begun nesting, Dunn said.

Zimorski and fellow Louisiana wildlife biologist Phillip Vasseur put a few data loggers out last year to be sure the birds would tolerate the intrusion of eggs being swapped in and out.

Zimorski said the birds decide much of the wild deployment, since many this year are nesting in inaccessible swamps where biologists keep tabs on them through airplane flyovers.

Both Zimorski and Dunn said there's nowhere near enough data yet for any conclusions.

"We need a couple more years so we can get additional pairs and some years of repeat data," Zimorski said.

North's heart intermediates in this deal persuaded him to transfer to hearts, then offer a choice of slams by his jump to five no-trump, after which South selected hearts, of course. North could simply have invited slam with a transfer, then a quantitative jump to four no-trump. Had he done so, South's aces and trump support would have been just enough to let him jump to six hearts.

When West led the spade queen, declarer won in dummy and tested trumps by cashing the ace to guard against 4-0 breaks. Then he drew trumps, crossed to the spade king and found himself at a crossroads. A reasonable line might have been to lead a diamond to the jack, relying on the diamond finesse or the 3-3 break in that suit, with an unlikely minor-suit squeeze to fall back on.

Declarer spotted a slightly different way to make the defenders' lives just a little harder. Instead of leading a diamond to the jack, he advanced a small diamond from hand and covered West's card with the eight. When East won the trick, he was endplayed, since a diamond return would let declarer claim the rest.

Hoping for the best, East led a low club to the queen and ace. Declarer next cashed the diamond ace and king; when the suit failed to behave, he fell back on his last chance, crossing to dummy with a trump and finessing the nine of clubs.

If East had instead exited with his club jack, declarer would have won in hand and eventually finessed West for the club queen, playing for split honors.

Arnold boys have tough act to follow at state

The Florida High School Boys Weightlifting State Championships are back at Arnold High School this weekend, with the Class 2A meet taking place Friday and 1A on Saturday.

Bay County schools will take 16 lifters into Saturday's competition, with Arnold leading the way with seven, followed by Mosley with five, Bozeman with two, and Ruthersford and North Bay Haven with one each.

The host Marlins will

have a tough act to follow after watching the Arnold girls claim their first-ever state championship back in February.

Arnold's boys have won state three times — 2006, 2007, 2013 — but Marlins coach Josh Flaig said Wednesday that he's setting a more reasonable goal for this year's team.

"I would say we're probably gonna land somewhere in the top 10," he said. "If we lift well we could get into the top five, but there are at least two or three teams that have an advantage over us for sure

as far as points go."

Flaig said Citrus comes in as the likely favorite to take the team title, followed closely by Baker County. The Marlins most likely will find themselves in a group of three or four teams in the 13-to-18-point range, but Flaig said it would take a fortuitous series of events to get his team near the top of the standings.

"Maybe if a couple of top teams chase each other and make a mistake we could get in there, but it would be a long shot for us to bring it home this year," he said. "With the

girls, we knew we were in the running and we knew it would be close."

Jadan Lombard (119-pound weight class), Caleb Cortez (154), and Cade Ledman (199) come in as region champions for the Marlins along with Mosley's Nick O'Brien (219), though Flaig said that Lombard was the most likely to compete for an individual state title.

Sneads will also be in the mix for a top 5-10 finish with four region champions going to state, while Wewahtichka carries three region champs into the meet.

For the Marlins, who finished 13th last year with five points, a 15-point total would be ideal, according to Flaig, though he said his primary concern at the moment is making sure all seven of his lifters make weight before Saturday morning's weigh-in.

"If everybody makes weight I'll be happy. That will be the first victory," he said. "After that, you don't want anybody scratching out. As long as everybody makes weight and doesn't scratch

Spieth hopeful Masters memories will help

AUGUSTA, Ga. — Tiger Woods is a winner again, making him even more appealing at the Masters.

"I've worked my way back into one of the players that can win events," he said.

Rory McIlroy is the betting favorite — perhaps even the sentimental favorite. Facing a fifth chance at completing the career Grand Slam at

Augusta National, he has never started a year as well as this one. McIlroy won The Players Championship, played in the final group in three other events and has yet to finish out of the top 10 in his seven PGA Tour events.

"I'm happy with where everything is — body, mind, game," McIlroy said.

Such words sound as soothing to Jordan Spieth as birds nestled in the Georgia

pinetrees. Any other year, Spieth would be a big part of the conversation when the 83rd Masters Tournament begins on Thursday.

"I don't feel like there's any added pressure this week," Spieth said. "I feel kind of under the radar, which is really nice."

Maybe not for long.

Not since Woods has any young golfer established himself as a master at Augusta National. In

five appearances, starting with then 20-year-old Spieth's runner-up finish in his Masters debut, he has a green jacket, a share of the tournament scoring record, two silver medals for second place and a near historic closing round last year until he clipped a tree with his tee shot on the 18th hole, made bogey and had to settle for a 64.

There was no warning. There were no rumors. There was nothing to indicate what was about to happen when Magic Johnson jovially stepped in front of the media early Tuesday evening in a Staples Center hallway.

He nudged me, grinned, and said, "Bill is here, we have to have a press conference."

Then his smile disappeared, his laughter died, and he quit.

Just like that, in a move as stunning as any trick he pulled in more than two

years as Lakers president of basketball operations, Magic Johnson made himself disappear.

He made the announcement before telling owner Jeanie Buss. He held the news conference without the advance knowledge of team officials. This was his dream job, a role he could have reasonably filled for the rest of his life, yet he ended it all in nine words.

TIGER WOODS: The four-time Masters champ gave fans a brief injury scare when he dropped out of Bay Hill, but he was just being cautious. He made a strong run at Match Play Championship and would love to win at Augusta again.

DUSTIN JOHNSON: Won the World Golf Championship-Mexico event in late February with a dominating performance. He claims to be in similar form as 2017 season, when he missed Masters thanks to slip and fall at rental home.

JUSTIN ROSE: He's done everything but win at Augusta National. No worse than T14 in last five tries, and he was runner-up in 2015 and 2017.

BROOKS KOEPKA: Missed last year's Masters because of injury, but bounced back with major victories at U.S. Open and PGA Championship. Has yet to crack top 10 at Masters in three tries.

DURHAM, N.C. Barrett to enter NBA draft after one season at Duke

RJ Barrett is leaving Duke after one season to enter the NBA draft. Barrett announced his decision Wednesday in a video posted on social media. He said playing at Duke is a dream but added that "it's also a dream of mine to play in the NBA and have great success there." School spokesman Mike DeGeorge said Barrett plans to hire an agent but has not yet chosen one.

The AP All-American averaged an Atlantic Coast Conference-best 22.6 points along with 7.6 rebounds while forming half of perhaps the nation's most potent one-two punch along with classmate and roommate Zion Williamson.

Barrett is widely projected as a lottery pick.

The decision came as no surprise. After Barrett in February became the first Duke player since 2006 with a triple-double, coach Mike Krzyzewski said the ACC's leading scorer was only "going to be here a very short time."

KANSAS CITY, MO. Man charged with shining laser at Brady

A citation has been issued against a Missouri man accused of flashing a laser at New England quarterback Tom Brady during the Patriots' AFC championship game victory over the Kansas City Chiefs.

Prosecutors said Tuesday that 64-year-old Dwyan Morgan, of Lee's Summit, faces a single count of disturbing the peace, a municipal violation.

Television stations posted footage after the game showing a green light flashing on Brady late in the Patriots' 37-31 overtime victory on Jan. 20. Prosecutors say Brady was unaware of the laser. Laser pointers are banned at most sporting events because of the potential for distraction and safety reasons. The light can damage the retina after even a short period of time.

Morgan couldn't be reached by the Associated Press for comment.

NEW YORK Yanks most valuable in MLB at \$4.6 billion

Forbes estimates the New York Yankees are baseball's most valuable franchise at \$4.6 billion, up 15 percent from its figure last year.

The Los Angeles Dodgers are second at \$3.3 billion, followed by the World Series champion Boston Red Sox at \$3.2 billion, the Chicago Cubs (\$3.1 billion), San Francisco Giants (\$3 billion) and the New York Mets (\$2.3 billion).
