

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Bay bases' battles sound familiar

Military leaders discuss housing, missions after **Hurricane Michael**

PANAMA CITY - Housing, missions and whether Hurricane Michael repair work will stop were some of the topics local military leaders tackled Monday during a News Herald forum held at

the Bay County Government Center.

Col. Brian Laidlaw from the 325th Fighter Wing at Tyndall Air Force Base, Capt. Aaron Peters from Naval Surface Warfare Center Panama City Division and Bay Defense Alliance President Tom Neubauer answered questions from readers and News Herald editors about how the bases are recovering from the Category 5 storm, and where the installations go from here.

Tyndall took the brunt of Michael's hit along with Mexico Beach, and NSWC PCD and Naval Support Activity Panama City and other tenant units also sustained damage.

"Our challenges on the base are very similar to the challenges the local community is facing day in and day out," Laidlaw said. "From our perspective, we had 867

Taxpayer spending on disaster fund explodes amid climate

The Washington Post Hawaii needs funding

after volcanic eruptions sprayed lava on homes, bridges and roads. Thousands of farmers in Georgia and Florida were wiped out last year by Hurricane Michael, one of the strongest hurricanes to ever make landfall in the United States.

In March, Nebraska and Iowa suffered among the worst floods in their history. California is trying to rebuild after last year's deadliest and most destructive wildfire in its history. And Puerto Rico is still looking for emergency reconstruction money after Hurricane Maria killed thousands in 2017.

Firefighters battling South Walton blaze

SANTA ROSA BEACH Crews are battling a wildfire that spans 100 acres of a wooded area between Goldsby Road and Mack Bayou Road in Santa Rosa Beach, officials said.

According to a 5:40 p.m. news release, the fire was 90 percent contained, with evacuations lifted. Earlier, Goldsby Road was closed and 25 homes in the area were evacuated, according to the Florida Forest Service.

Malaina Brown, who lives in one of the neighborhoods evacuated, said it was scary and stressful.

"The fire truck people just said you need to get in your cars and go," she said. "I'm like, 'Wait a minute, we need some time.' "

The service has 11 tractor plow units on scene and two engines, along with a fixedwing aircraft. A helicopter capable of dropping water on the fire was en route, according to forest service officials.

Today is Tuesday, April 23, the 113th day of 2019. There are 252 days left in the year. Today's Highlights in

On April 23, 1954, Hank Aaron of the Milwaukee Braves hit the first of his 755 major-league home runs in a game against the St. Louis Cardinals. (The Braves won, 7-5.) On this date: In 1616 (Old Style calendar), English poet and dramatist William Shakespeare died in Stratford-upon-Avon on what has traditionally been regarded as the 52nd anniversary of his birth in 1564. In 1789, President-elect George Washington and his wife, Martha, moved into the first executive mansion, the Franklin House, in New York. In 1898, Spain declared war on the United States, which


responded in kind two days

later.

In 1943, U.S. Navy Lt. John F. Kennedy assumed command of PT-109. a motor torpedo boat, in the Solomon Islands during World War II. (On Aug. 2, 1943, PT-109 was rammed and sunk by a Japanese destroyer, killing two crew members; Kennedy and 10 others survived.) In 1968, student protesters began occupying buildings on the campus of Columbia University in New York; police put down the protests a week later. The Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church merged to form the United Methodist Church.

In 1969, Sirhan Sirhan was sentenced to death for assassinating New York Sen. Robert F. Kennedy. (The sentence was later reduced to life imprisonment.) In 1971, hundreds of Vietnam War veterans opposed to the conflict protested by tossing their medals and ribbons over a wire fence in front of the U.S. Capitol.

Housing recovery forum tonight

PANAMA CITY - It's impossible to talk about Hurricane Michael without talking about the housing crisis it created.

It's crippling the workforce, as businesses say their employees are struggling to find affordable places to live. It's the No. 1 reason people cite for leaving the area, or the biggest stumbling block for people looking to return. And, it's the largest expense most people are facing following the Category 5 storm.

To learn more about what can be done to alleviate the housing crisis, The News Herald is hosting a forum at 6 p.m. today at the Bay County Government Center. It's one of three free recovery forums The News Herald is hosting

Speaking will be Michael Johnson, chairman of the housing branch of the Bay County Recovery Task Force; Ida Hargarary,

Central Panhandle Realtor Association president; Garrett Anderson, BBIA and Anderson Construction: Teri Henry, director of the Panama City Housing Authority; and Yvonne Petrasovits, director of Doorways Northwest Florida.

FOUNTAIN Honest witness says it's 'not in me' to cooperate

A deputy "observing traffic" spots a car with a tag that indicates it was reported stolen in Panama City Beach.

The deputy gets behind the vehicle and attempts a traffic stop, activating his emergency lights and siren. It didn't work.

"The vehicle accelerated away from me, northbound on Hwy 231, at speeds nearing

90mph," the deputy wrote. "I pursued the vehicle, with my lights and siren still activated, as the vehicle traveled northbound on Hwy 231, westbound on Gardenia St, northbound on Center St, and then westbound on Silverlake Rd. The pursuit was terminated at the intersection of Silverlake Rd and Center St due to concern for the safety of the public."

The deputy, however, headed back to see if he could figure out where the vehicle had come from and while on Pine Ridge Road, he spots a car "matching the physical characteristics of the vehicle that had just fled from me, backed in to an unmarked address near the intersection" where the chase had taken place. "The vehicle was running, and I observed a white female standing near the passenger side of the vehicle. I observed a white male standing near a camper door, moving items around in a backpack. I exited my patrol

vehicle and drew my agency issued firearm."

The deputy orders the two to the ground and they comply.

A second deputy arrives and the man and woman are separated for questioning.

The woman gives one name at first, then "corrected herself" and gave a different name, saying "she changed her mind about lying about her information."

DeSantis to Trump: Pay 90% of debris removal

PANAMA CITY -Gov. Ron DeSantis is continuing to push for the federal government to pick up a greater share of Hurricane Michael recovery costs.

The same day the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration upgraded the storm to a Category 5, DeSantis wrote a letter to President Donald Trump asking that the federal government pick up 90% of the cost of debris removal and emergency protective measures. Currently, the federal government is slated to pick up 75%.

"This determination further validates the impact that this storm continues to have on the state of Florida," DeSantis wrote. "By approving this request you would provide much-needed security and financial relief at both the local and state level."

While the cost share typically is 75%, exceptions have been made in the past. After Hurricane Katrina and Hurricane Rita, for example, the federal government picked up 90% of the



But congressional feuding over disaster aid is unlikely to stop even after the current impasse is resolved. In a typical year, taxpayer spending on the federal disaster relief fund is almost 10 times higher than it was three decades ago, even after adjusting for inflation, according to a Washington Post analysis of federal data.

Experts say the surge in disaster spending reflects the effects of climate change

and the growth of people and infrastructure in disaster-prone regions, such as the Gulf Coast. The federal government released a more than 1,000-page report last fall finding that climate change is affecting the U.S. economy.

The disaster relief fund, administered by the Federal **Emergency Management** Agency, accounts for about 44 percent of all emergency disaster money, according to an analysis of federal data by Pew Charitable Trusts, a nonpartisan organization.

"We're seeing a lot more extremes, both in where we're allowing people to build and in the climate," said Elizabeth Zimmerman, former associate administrator at the Office of Response and Recovery at FEMA.

High housing costs are affecting potential new hires at NSWC PCD, Peters said.

"My sticking points are personnel. I hire about 175 to 180 people per year and getting some of those new hires fresh out of college, it's hard for them to find places to stay right now," Peters said. "What used to cost maybe \$1,200 is now \$1,800. For them coming straight out of college, it's tough to find a good place that's affordable. That's one of the challenges we have right now."

As for where the bases stand now in comparison to where they were right after the hurricane, Laidlaw said there has been a lot of progress. He cited the 44 buildings that have been restored to pre-storm conditions, people still in the tent cities are expected to move into permanent buildings by the end of the month and the popular dining hall is open. So far, \$450 million has been spent working on

Tyndall also is still the "preferred alternative" for the MQ-9 Reaper wing and is looking at having three squadrons of F-35s move in.

Neubauer explained the situation with the F-22s and F-35s. Three F-35 squadrons are expected to come to Tyndall in the coming years, and the F-22 training unit was moved to Eglin after Hurricane Michael. The F-22s could be permanently relocated to Joint Base Langley-Eustis in

Virginia. People "think we've lost something but when the secretary (of the Air Force) said that we've been recommended for up to three squadrons of F-35s, there's a lot to that. First of all, we've got to think when the F-22 was built, there were supposed to be 648 of them. That was the original plan. By 1994, they brought that number down to 442 and down to 295 in 2001, all budget issues. They wound up with a total of 187 jets," Neubauer said. "The endgame for the F-22 was not large.

"The number of aircraft you're going to see produced with F-35s is going to be 1,768, I think is the number. That's a fastgrowing enterprise and that's where the Air Force is focusing their entire fighter force. Tyndall will be part of a fast-growing enterprise rather than one that's going to be capped at one of three bases."

"Words matter on this one. The secretary of the Air Force didn't say work stops on Tyndall on May 1. We have currently on contract hundreds of millions of dollars worth of projects to get after recovering the base," Laidlaw said. "Those are real contractors working every day generating some of those results I alluded to earlier. That work doesn't stop.

"What we don't have authority to do is to spend new money on new projects when it's uncertain how we're actually going to pay for those projects, so it's no new recovery projects will start after May 1 until we know how we're going to pay for them," he said. "At this point, no one has told us on base we need to stop any of the projects that are currently ongoing. They're on contract. They're already funded."

down they, or someone else, eventually has to pick it back up," she said.

Though Parker Elementary escaped relatively unscathed from the hurricane compared to other campuses, Williams said her students noticed even the smallest changes.

"It's home," she said. "So no matter how small it is, they noticed the difference as soon as it came in."

So the Earth Day cleanup also turned into a way for students to conquer the hurricane, and prove that, no matter what age, anyone can make a difference.

"They're third-graders, and sometimes they think they can't do anything," Williams said. "They were always saying, 'What can I do? ... we can all make a difference."

While Williams' class worked inside, Lisa Miller's fourth-grade class was working outside, making a difference by the front flower bed, which also has seen better days since the hurricane. The plants had been trampled and the beds all torn up in the recovery response, Miller said, and with the weather feeling noticeably more spring-like, it was time for something new.

"It's kind of the way it's been with the hurricane," Miller

said. "After the hurricane and all that destruction, there's that hope at the end that you'll get something new now."

With little plants all lined up and waiting to go in the ground, Miller's class swept the sidewalk clear, then set about digging out the weeds and clearing a space. The boys, she said, are more into destruction, so she sent them ahead to get rid of the big obstacles, while the girls pulled out the smaller weeds and got ready to plant.

Right on cue, one of Miller's students, a boy in a bright red shirt, lifted a plant into the air triumphantly, calling for Miller's attention and asking what he had just ripped from the ground.

"I think you just pulled out a regular plant," Miller called back, laughing. "But that's OK! Just put it back, please."

The student, it seems, decided that it was time for something new to grow.





1992, the federal government picked up 100%, as DeSantis reminded the president in his letter.

"Hurricane Michael should be no different," DeSantis wrote.

During his campaign, DeSantis frequently touted his connection to Trump, a relationship he said he would be able to use to benefit Florida. It already has helped, he said, when he asked the president to sign off

on the federal government footing 100% of the debris bill for the first 45 days, which was approved.

If Trump moves ahead with the 90% cost share, it would save local governments tens of millions of dollars in their cleanup bills. Presently, they are expected to pay 12.5% of the cost, but if the federal government goes to 90%, local governments' share would drop to 5% of the

Bay County currently is on the hook for \$82.6 million under the 12.5% split. At 5%, that number drops to \$33 million.

That doesn't factor in other storm-related costs, such as repairing government-owned buildings and repairing or rebuilding broken infrastructure.

"The cost for Northwest Florida to recover will definitely exceed our threshold," DeSantis

The push is backed by local officials who have been talking for months about how relief on the debris pickup bill would ease the burden on themselves and taxpayers.

"We desperately need this," Sen. George Gainer wrote in a tweet.

She then told the deputy a story that would not be supported by the facts.

In her version, she said she was just by Ivydell Road minding her own business when her brother pulled up and "gave her the vehicle." She told the deputy that her brother "did not tell her anything about the vehicle, except to take it back to the address on Pine Ridge Rd. She could not advise where she was (when she first saw the car), or what she was doing. Her version of events did not appear coherent or make sense."

The deputy next spoke with the man, who said it was the woman who had been driving the car into Panama City that morning to pick him up, and that she then dropped him off on Pine Ridge Road. He said after that, the woman's brother needed a ride somewhere and those two

drove off. He said the woman "returned in the vehicle shortly thereafter, and told him to get his things together so they could leave."

The man said the woman has been driving the vehicle recently, but refused to provide a sworn statement, saying it was "not in me to cooperate with law enforcement."

The deputy wrote that the woman said she "wanted to stop but did not" when the deputy tried to pull her over because her brother "told her to 'go' because he didn't want to go back to prison."

The deputy determines the woman's driver's license is suspended, and a search of the vehicle turned up "various calibers of live ammunition and a glass bowl with a brown residue" that tested positive for methamphetamine.

The woman is charged with fleeing and eluding w/ lights and sirens activated and driving with a suspended/revoked license.

A deputy dispatched to a disturbance at a bar arrives to spot a man "inside of the building yank the front door out of the hands of the female bartender."


The door, however, did not open.

PANAMA CITY **Great white shark** appears to turn back in **Gulf trek**

Apparently having had her fill of the northern Gulf of Mexico, Miss Costa, a great white shark estimated to be as long as 15 feet, has turned around and is tracking back toward the Florida Peninsula.

Since March, Miss Costa - who is tagged and tracked by the research organization Ocearch – had been on a steady march north through the Gulf. Last week, she was pinged 60 miles south of Panama City, the farthest she had traveled into the emerald green seas. The group records a "ping" when the shark's dorsal fin breaks the surface.

But on April 15, Miss Costa appeared to have turned around. On Friday, she pinged south of Apalachicola, heading toward the Big Bend region.

Great whites aren't a common sight in the Gulf of Mexico, and Ocearch officials have said they hope Miss Costa's journev sheds light on what the giant sharks do there in the warmer waters.

Miss Costa was tagged in 2016 off the coast of Nantucket, Massachusetts. At the time, she was 12.5 feet long and more than 1,600 pounds -asub-adult for a species where females outgrow males. She likely has matured into full adulthood since, and probably is between 14 and 15 feet long, Ocearch said.

Guarding against the next Russian hack

hether President Donald Trump obstructed justice is a crucial question, the answer to which special counsel Robert Mueller III implied but did not state clearly. What is crystal clear in his 448-page report is a conclusion that Trump, charged with making the highest-level national security decisions, has routinely denied: "The Russian government interfered in the 2016 presidential election in sweeping and systematic fashion."

One reaction from Congress must be to weigh the evidence of obstruction. The other must be to ensure Russia — and any other hostile actor — does not succeed in interfering again.

Mueller, confirming the long-standing conclusions of the U.S. intelligence community, found the Kremlin ran a social media campaign that evolved from a program "to provoke and amplify political and social discord in the United States" and "to sow discord in the U.S. political system through what it termed 'information warfare'" into one "that favored presidential candidate Donald J. Trump and disparaged presidential candidate Hillary Clinton." Meanwhile, Russian military intelligence hacked the Democratic National Committee's servers and the Clinton campaign, then released damaging material at strategic times.

It remains outrageous that Trump, having benefited from the Kremlin's meddling, continually plays down Russia's election-year activities — and, indeed, has pursued a closer relationship with Russian President Vladimir Putin — even while the leaders he picked to run the U.S. intelligence community repeat that Russia is culpable and likely to try again.

There are two approaches to defending against further intrusions. First is deterrence, which relies on making hostile actors think twice about trying to meddle. Congress passed a raft of retaliatory sanctions over Trump's objections following the 2016 affair, which was a start, and the president later issued an executive order promising other retaliatory measures that would harm the economy of any government that tried in the future to interfere.

Under normal circumstances, the executive order might be enough. But Trump's persistent affinity for Putin means that he cannot be trusted to follow through. Congress should write into law that the U.S. government must retaliate against any fresh foreign attack on our democracy. Sens. Marco Rubio, R-Fla., and Chris Van Hollen, D-Md., reintroduced this month their DETER Act, which would do this.

The other strategy is hardening the country's democratic infrastructure against any attempted intrusion. Trump should have made this a high priority when he entered office. Instead, he focused attention on phantom voter fraud. More recently, his obsession with restricting immigration has stoked chaos at the Department of Homeland Security, which is responsible for domestic cybersecurity — particularly after he purged its leadership.

There is no reason to expect the Russians would stop at what they did before; Moscow can be expected to exploit other vulnerabilities its hackers identified. Mueller's report found that they infiltrated a company that made commonly used voter roll software, and seem to have penetrated Florida election administration networks.

Please blur the Kraft day-spa videos

s a fractured nation argues over the redactions in the Mueller report, another high-profile First Amendment battle is being waged way south of Washington, D.C.

Prosecutors and defense lawyers in Palm Beach County have squared off over the planned release of police videos allegedly showing New England Patriots owner Robert Kraft and other defendants engaged in sex acts at a "day spa" in Jupiter.

Kraft has pleaded innocent to soliciting prostitution. If indeed he received only routine rubdowns on his two chauffeured trips to Orchids of Asia, one might suppose he and his attorneys would want the tapes promptly released to exonerate him.

But they desperately, frantically, do not want the tapes released.

Under Florida's Sunshine Law, however, such evidence is a public record. The media will fight, as it should, to get copies. Kraft's lawyers will fight to suppress.

With the exception of gleeful fans of the Miami Dolphins and other Patriots rivals, it's difficult to imagine why anyone in their right mind is dying to see videotape of a 77-yearold man with his pants around his ankles wriggling on a massage table.

Seriously, folks, hasn't America been through enough?

My guess is there are millions of people, like myself, who — despite a profound reverence for the Constitution, especially the First Amendment — would reach into their pockets and pay good money to not have to see whatever Kraft was doing at the Orchids of Asia.

As a compromise, I would respectfully propose a GoFundMe page captioned, PLEASE, YOUR HONORS, SPARE US FROM THE BOB KRAFT TAPES!

The proceeds from the online campaign could be donated to organizations that help sex-trafficking victims, or to the favorite charities of Palm Beach Circuit Judge Joseph Marx and County Judge Leonard Hanser.

Last week, Marx temporarily blocked prosecutors from releasing the day-spa videos. A hearing is set for April 29.

Hanser, who is the trial judge in Kraft's case, will likely be forced to rule on the same issue.

The last time such a spirited constitutional debate arose over body-part videos was five years ago, following the DUI arrest of Mr. Justin Bieber in (where else?) Miami Beach.

Bieber had been pulled over while street racing in a yellow Lamborghini, and he unwisely made some loud remarks that the officers construed as confrontational. He was taken into custody, booked and later asked to provide a urine sample.

The Miami Beach police station is equipped with many wall-mounted cameras, and several clips of a now-docile Bieber were recorded. One of them captured the singer holding a container and approaching the designated urinal.

Subsequently, a court clash commenced between his legal team and attorneys for this newspaper and other media outlets. Some of the public — including Bieber's adoring young fan base — clamored for a peek at what became known as the "pee tape."

Bieber, however, was reluctant to have the moment shared.

WASHINGTON Home sales fall 4.9 pct. in slow start to spring

Sales of existing U.S. homes fell in March after a huge gain the previous month, held back partly by a sharp slowdown among the most expensive properties.

The National Association of Realtors said Monday that home sales fell 4.9 percent to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 5.21 million, down from 5.48 million in February. The drop followed an 11.2 percent gain the previous month, the largest in more than three years.

Tesla gears up for completely selfdriving cars amid skepticism

SAN FRANCISCO -Tesla expects to have full self-driving cars in which humans won't have to touch the steering wheel around the second quarter of next year.

The company made the announcement during an investor conference at its Palo Alto, California, headquarters Monday, in which it outlined its bold but risky bid to transform Tesla's electric cars into driverless vehicles.

CEO Elon Musk told investors that the company's computer to enable its electric cars to become self-driving vehicles is powered by the best processing chip in the world.

Tesla had never made its own computer chip before it hired an ex-Apple engineer three years ago to design it. Now, Musk boasts the chip is better than any other on the market "by a huge margin."

Experts say they're skeptical whether Tesla's technology has advanced anywhere close to the point where its cars will be capable of being driven solely by a robot, without a human in position to take control if something goes

"It's all hype," said Steven E. Shladover, a retired research engineer at the University of California, Berkeley who has been involved in efforts to create autonomous driving for 45 years. "The technology does not exist to do what he is claiming. He doesn't have it and neither does anybody else."

More than 60 companies in the U.S. alone are developing autonomous vehicles. Some are aiming to have their fully autonomous cars begin carrying passengers in small geographic areas as early as this year. Many experts don't believe they'll be in widespread use for a decade or more.

Musk's description of Tesla's controls as "Full Self-Driving" has alarmed some observers who think it will give owners a false sense of security and create potentially lethal situations in conditions that the autonomous cars can't handle. They also say they're waiting for Musk to define self-driving and show just under what conditions and places the vehicles can travel without human intervention.

Some Tesla critics say Musk is making the full self-driving announcement to distract from poor earnings expected Wednesday. Analysts polled by FactSet predict a \$305.5 million first quarter net loss based on disappointing deliveries. Even bullish analysts expect bad

Wedbush analyst Daniel Ives, who expects Tesla shares to outperform its peers, wrote in a note Monday that while positive news is expected Monday, he foresees "a train wreck quarter."

Meanwhile, Musk continues to use both his Twitter account and Tesla's website to pump up a new computer now

in production for full selfdriving vehicles. Once the self-driving software is ready, those with new computers will get an update via the internet, Musk has said. Currently the self-driving computer costs \$5,000, but the price rises to \$7,000 if it's installed after delivery.

On Monday, Musk said Tesla has a huge advantage over autonomous vehicle competitors because it gathers a massive amount of data in the real world. This quarter, he said Tesla will have 500,000 vehicles on the road, each equipped with eight cameras, ultrasonic sensors and radar gathering data to help build the company's neural network.

The network allows vehicles to recognize images, determine what objects are and figure out how to deal with them.

That's different from the self-driving systems being built by nearly every other company in the industry, including Google spinoff Waymo, General Motors' Cruise Automation, and Ford-affiliated Argo AI. They all use cameras and radar covering 360 degrees, and also have light beam sensors called Lidar to the mix as a third redundant sensor, as well as detailed three-dimensional mapping.

"Vehicles that don't have Lidar, that don't have advanced radar, that haven't captured a 3-D map are not self-driving vehicles," Ken Washington, Ford's chief technical officer, said during a recent interview with Recode. "They are great consumer vehicles with really good driver-assist technology."

But Musk trashed Lidar on Monday, calling it a "fool's errand."

"They're expensive sensors that are unnecessary," he told investors. "It's like having a whole bunch of appendixes."

Amnon Shashua, CEO of Israeli autonomous vehicle computing company Mobileye, says cars with 360-degree cameras and front facing radar could drive autonomously, but they would not be as safe as human drivers. Careful humans can drive 10 million hours without a mistake leading to a fatal crash, but cars without full redundant sensors cannot, he said.

Tesla already has been offering a system called "Autopilot" that can control cars on a limited basis with constant monitoring by a human driver. But questions already have been raised about Autopilot's reliability after its involvement in three fatal crashes.

In one, neither the driver nor a Tesla Model S operating on the company's Autopilot driver-assist system spotted a tractortrailer crossing in front of it on a Florida, highway in

Samsung delays folding phone launch after breaking issues

SAN FRANCISCO Samsung is pushing back this week's planned public launch of its highly anticipated, \$2,000 folding phone after reports that reviewers' phones were breaking.

The company had been planning to release the Galaxy Fold on Friday, but instead it will now run more tests and announce a new launch date in the "coming weeks."

The delay is a setback for Samsung and for the smartphone market generally, which had been pinning some hopes on the folding phone to catalyze innovation in the industry. The Galaxy Fold, with its \$1,980 price tag, was not intended to be a mass market hit, but many hoped it would hint at a new wave of smartphone advances - an area that has been lagging in recent years.

But device reviewers quickly found issue with the Galaxy Fold, which is about the size of an average smartphone when folded, and the size of a small tablet when its two sides are pulled apart.


Several journalists reported the inside screens flickering, freezing and finally dying on their test units within the first couple days. Two reviewers mistakenly removed an outer plastic layer that was meant to stay on and reported scratches on the screen afterward.

An early inspection showed there could be issues when pressure is put on the exposed areas of the hinges that open and close the phone, Samsung said in a statement announcing the launch delay Monday. It also found an issue where "substances found inside the device affected the display performance."

Fiction becomes reality in Ukraine

New Ukrainian leader's campaign had pages from sitcom script

MOSCOW - The presidentelect of Ukraine does not have a political record that foreign governments and companies can search for clues. For now, a 51-episode TV sitcom might offer the clearest view of what kind of leader Volodymyr Zelenskiy will be.

Zelenskiy, a career comedian, foretold his future when he took the starring role in "Servant of the People." The series, created by Zelenskiy's production company, follows $a \, high \, school \, teacher \, who \, finds$ himself elected to Ukraine's highest office thanks to a recorded rant that goes viral.

The show, which premiered in 2015, is the first Ukrainian series bought by Netflix. In an interview earlier this year, Zelenskiy told foreign journalists he wanted to put "a dream country" on the small screen. The latest season was filmed and aired after Zelenskiy declared his candidacy for the real presidency on New Year's

Further blurring the line between fiction and reality, he named his political party "Servant of the People." The TV character and the first-time candidate also overlapped at times on the campaign trail:

SEPARATISM AND THE WAR IN THE EAST

The dispute over Russia's

annexation of Crimea and a deadly separatist war in eastern Ukraine are likely to dominate Zelenskiy's

Zelenskiy, a Russian speaker from central Ukraine, said earlier this year he doesn't see military force as an option for bringing either area back under Kiev's wing. He said the government should reach out to welcome the eastern territories to a new Ukraine.

"We need to send a message that we are all Ukrainians,...that you're one of us," he said.

In the latest season of

"Servant of the People," Zelenskiy's character, Vasyl Holoborodko, assumes the presidency of a country split into 28 independent states, some of which resemble actual separatist fiefdoms in eastern Ukraine.

"Enough with the old slogans: north, west, south. We're one country, we're all Ukrainians," the fictional President Holoborodko tells two separatist leaders in one episode of the TV show.

Holoborodko rejects the idea of bribing or intimidating the separatists into reuniting. At the end of the latest season, Ukraine's east and west come back together following a joint effort to help coal miners trapped underground.

OVERHAUL OF GOVERNMENT

After an exit poll predicted he won nearly three out of every four votes, Zelenskiy on Sunday reiterated a campaign promise to fire Ukraine's prosecutor general for an appointee of his own. He called the chief prosecutor part of "the old team."

In the first season of "Servant of the People," the president character pushes

out existing officials with reputations for corruption and abusing power.

"You and your allies have been at the helm for nearly a quarter of the century," Holoborodko tells the fictional prime minister in Episode 6. "And what changes do we see? Zero. Zero changes, zero reforms."

But Holoborodko is despondent because he can't find a single honest professional to appoint. He ends up putting his school friends in top posts, attracting accusations of cronyism.

During an actual presidential debate Friday, Zelenskiy was surrounded by literally the same people the actors who played his Cabinet ministers on TV. The president-elect has not announced who he wants to appoint, but no peers from acting or comedy have shown interest in following Zelenskiy into politics.

PERKS AND PRIVILEGES

Zelenskiy said as early election returns came in that he would cut the presidential administration budget, get rid of the perks that come with public office and move the seat of government out of central Kiev so "there is no traffic."

"I would like to find a place in Kiev or outside Kiev so that there would be no motorcades, and I would like to get rid of the motorcades altogether," the comedian

FALLS CHURCH, VA. **Appeals court rejects Chelsea** Manning's effort to leave jail

A federal appeals court on Monday rejected a bid by former Army intelligence analyst Chelsea Manning to be released from jail for refusing to testify to a grand jury investigating Wikileaks.

The three-paragraph, unanimous decision from a three-judge panel of the 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Richmond rejects both Manning's argument that she was erroneously found in civil contempt of court and her request for bail while the contempt decision is litigated.

Manning has been jailed at the Alexandria Detention Center since March 8 after refusing to testify to the Wikileaks grand jury.

PORAC, PHILIPPINES Philippine quake knocks over building; at least 3 dead

A strong earthquake killed three people and trapped at several others Monday in a collapsed building that housed a supermarket in a northern Philippine province, where an international airport terminal was closed due to damage, officials said.

Mayor Condralito dela Cruz of Porac town in Pampanga province, north of Manila, said rescuers pulled two survivors from the collapsed building, where other trapped people could be heard screaming for help as rescuers struggled to save them.

An Associated Press photographer saw a third survivor and the body of a woman being extricated by rescuers from the rubble late Monday.

KABUL, AFGHANISTAN **US voices disappointment at** delay in Afghan talks

U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo called Afghanistan's president over the weekend to express Washington's disappointment over the indefinite postponement of Afghan talks with the Taliban, according to a statement released Monday.

The talks were scheduled to start this coming Friday in Qatar, where the Taliban maintain an office, but were scuttled after a falling-out between the two sides over who should attend.

The gathering would have marked the first time that Taliban and Kabul government officials sat together, a potential milestone in efforts to reach a negotiated end to the war in Afghanistan, America's longest, and the eventual withdrawal of U.S. troops.

KHARTOUM, SUDAN **Sudan's army says holding** talks with all political forces

Sudan's military rulers said Monday evening that they are communicating with all political forces to name a prime minister and form a civilian government "as soon as

possible." A military spokesman, Lt. Gen. Shamseldin Kibashi, made a brief announcement on state TV but did not comment directly on protest organizers' demands from a day earlier for the immediate transfer to a civilian government.

Tensions escalated after talks broke down Sunday between protesters and the military council, which has ruled the country since President Omar al-Bashir was forced from office April 11 after nearly four months of mass protests against his 30-year rule.

DALLAS Officials say 6 people died in **Texas small plane crash**

All six people aboard a small plane were killed Monday when the aircraft crashed into the rocky hills of a central Texas ranch while preparing to land, authorities said.

The twin-engine aircraft went down just before 9 a.m. as it was approaching an airport in Kerrville, a city about 70 miles northwest of San Antonio, according to Federal Aviation Administration spokesman Lynn Lunsford.

The pilot and the five other people aboard the plane were all killed, said Sgt. Orlando Moreno, a spokesman for the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Military gets special powers after bombings

Intelligence agencies had warned of attack possibility

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka Sri Lanka's president gave the military sweeping police powers starting Tuesday in the wake of the Easter bombings that killed nearly 300 people, while officials disclosed that intelligence agencies had warned weeks ago of the possibility of an attack by the radical Muslim group blamed for the bloodshed.

The suicide bombings struck three churches and three luxury hotels Sunday in the island nation's deadliest violence since a devastating civil war ended in 2009. The government shut down some social media, armed security forces patrolled the largely deserted, central streets in the capital of Colombo, and a curfew went into effect.

The military was given a wider berth to detain and arrest suspects powers that were used during the civil war but withdrawn when it ended.

Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe said he feared the massacre could unleash instability and he vowed to "vest all necessary powers with the defense forces" to act against those responsible.

Adding to the tension, three unexploded bombs blew up Monday inside a van parked near one of the stricken churches as police were trying to

defuse them, sending pedestrians fleeing in panic. No injuries were reported. Dozens of detonators were discovered near Colombo's main bus depot, but officials declined to say whether they were linked to the attacks.

The government blocked access to Facebook, WhatsApp and Instagram after the blasts, creating confusion and doing little to reassure residents and visitors that the danger had

A nationwide state of emergency was scheduled to begin at midnight Monday (0630 GMT; 2:30 p.m. EDT) the president's office said, following the attacks that killed at least 290 people, with more than 500 wounded, according to police spokesman Ruwan Gunasekara. The three stricken hotels and one of the churches, St. Anthony's Shrine, are frequented by tourists, and dozens of foreigners were among the dead.

Tourism Minister John Amaratunga said 39 foreigners were killed, although the foreign ministry put out a different figure, saying the number of dead was 31.

The U.S. State Department confirmed that at least four Americans were among the dead and several others were seriously wounded, but it did not release any identities. The Sri Lankan government said other foreigners killed were from the U.K..

International intelligence agencies had warned that the little-known group, National Thowfeek Jamaath, was planning attacks, but word apparently didn't reach the prime minister's office until after the massacre, exposing the continuing political turmoil in the highest levels of the Sri Lankan government.

Health Minister Rajitha Senaratne said the intelligence agencies began issuing the warnings on April 4; the defense ministry wrote to the police chief with information that included the group's name; and police wrote April 11 to the heads of security of the judiciary and diplomatic

President Maithripala Sirisena, who was out of the country Sunday, had ousted Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe in October and dissolved the Cabinet. The Supreme Court later reversed his actions, but the prime minister has not been allowed into meetings of the Security Council since October, which meant he and his government were in the dark about the intelligence.

It was not immediately clear what action, if any, was taken after the threats. Authorities said they knew where the group trained and had safe houses, but did not identify any of the suicide bombers, whose bodies were recovered, or the two dozen other suspects taken into custody.

All the bombers were Sri Lankans, but authorities said they strongly suspected foreign links, Senaratne said.

Also unclear was a motive. The history of Buddhist-majority Sri Lanka, a country of 21 million including large Hindu, Muslim and Christian minorities, is rife with ethnic and sectarian conflict.

In the civil war, the Tamil Tigers, a powerful rebel army known for using suicide bombers, was crushed by the government and had little history of targeting Christians. While anti-Muslim bigotry fed by Buddhist nationalists has swept the country recently, there is no history of Islamic militancy. Its small Christian community has seen only scattered incidents of harassment.

Two other government ministers also alluded to

advance knowledge. Telecommunications Minister Harin Fernando tweeted: "Some intelligence officers were aware of this incidence. Therefore there was a delay in action. Serious action needs to be taken as to why this warning was ignored." He said his father had heard of a possible attack as well and had warned him not to enter popular churches.

Mano Ganeshan, the minister for national integration, said his security officers had been warned by their division about the possibility that two suicide bombers would target politicians.

Cardinal Malcolm Ranjith, the archbishop of Colombo, said the attacks could have been thwarted.

The coordinated blasts took place in the morning at St. Anthony's and the Cinnamon Grand, Shangri-La and Kingsbury hotels in Colombo, as well as the two churches outside Colombo. They collapsed ceilings and blew out windows, killing worshippers and hotel guests, and leaving behind scenes of smoke, soot, blood, broken glass, screams and wailing alarms.

A few hours later, two more blasts occurred just outside Colombo, one at a guesthouse where two people were killed, the other near an overpass, said Brig. Sumith Atapattu, a military spokesman.

the arrival of talented freshman Isabel Ceydeli, as well as theplayers' ability to bond and come together quickly in the face of adversity.



Washington — which won 10 road games a year ago on its run to the first Stanley Cup title in club history — went 0-3 on the road in this series after winning both regular-season meetings in Raleigh.

Antetokounmpo scores 41, leads Bucks to sweep of Detroit

Giannis Antetokounmpo scored 41 points, and the Milwaukee Bucks beat Detroit 127-104 on Monday night, completing a fourgame sweep of the Pistons and advancing to the second round of the playoffs for the first time since 2001.

Milwaukee closed the third quarter with a 17-3 run, taking a 10-point lead into the fourth after the Pistons had led much of the way. Detroit set an NBA record with its 14th consecutive playoff loss, a skid that began in 2008.

The Bucks will face Boston in the second round. The Celtics are coming off a sweep of their own against Indiana.

"I think it's important that we take a second tonight. Enjoy it," Bucks coach Mike Budenholzer said. "It's a good night for Milwaukee. It's a good night for the Bucks."

Reggie Jackson scored 20 of his 26 points in the first half for Detroit. Blake Griffin fouled out with 7:06 remaining after scoring 22. The home fans gave him a nice ovation—then many headed for the exits. Griffin missed the first two games of the series with knee problems.

"Blake played his heart out with basically one leg," said Pistons coach Dwane Casey, whose voice was hoarse at his postgame news conference. "He fought through a lot of pain, swelling."

Griffin was on the bench for much of Milwaukee's crucial run. He sat for the final 4:35 of the third. Antetokounmpo scored 16 points in that quarter, half of which came on free throws.

Detroit led 20-8 early on after a dunk by Griffin. The Pistons were up 62-56 at halftime but still couldn't prevent a fourth straight blowout at the hands of the team that had the NBA's best regular-season record. Milwaukee won the four games by a total of 95 points, and no game was closer than 16.

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

Mastering the standard suit combinations is something that requires time, trouble and the occasional visit to the textbooks. And it is not always so easy to distinguish one position from the

Here South sensibly offered clubs as an alternative strain— even the 5-3 fit might have played best if declarer needed to ruff out spades. North was happy to play the suit slam, but after the lead of the heart nine, South saw there was no obvious advantage to playing there — that is, un-less declarer went for an endplay rather than attempting to squeeze a third trick out of spades.

That said, how would you maximize your chances of developing three tricks from the spades? Declarer's decision to run the spade jack, then later play the ace and king in an attempt to drop the 10, was not a success.

This was a better try than cashing both top spades, I believe, though that would have worked as the cards lie, as would taking two finesses or even leading a low spade toward the jack. But the best technical line is to draw trumps, cash the spade ace and continue with the nine, plan-

ning to let it run if East plays low. You next plan to run the spade jack if West follows with a small card. While this line fails if East blithely plays low on the second round from queen-empty-fourth or even queen-third, this still represents the best odds play. And you could argue that if he does find this defense, he deserves to beat you.
