

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Housing forum talks rising costs

Construction labor shortage and soaring demand taking toll after Hurricane Michael

PANAMA CITY - Inventory and construction labor shortages are why housing costs have spiked in Bay County since Hurricane Michael, a panel of experts said Tuesday.

Area housing remains at a premium more than six months after the storm's destruction as heavy demand

is raising prices for homes and rentals, housing industry experts said. Meanwhile, there isn't enough skilled labor in the area, which in turn has raised repair and construction costs as well as wait times.


The housing experts were part of The News Herald's second forum in a threepart series on recovery in the county. The first forum on Monday focused on local military leaders' outlook on recovery. The third and final forum will focus on mental health and coping and is set to begin at 6 p.m. Thursday in the Bay County Government Center.

State senators vote: Teachers may arm

Bill clears Florida chamber 22-17 with every Democrat and one Republican opposed

TALLAHASSEE -Teachers could volunteer for training and carry weapons as classroom guardians under a measure opposed by many parents, teachers and most school districts but approved Tuesday by a divided Florida Senate.

Senators who supported the measure (SB

7030) defended the move because it was among the recommendations from the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Commission. The panel spent months examining the slaughter of 17 students and staff last year at the Parkland high school and proposed responses.

But supporters also emphasized that only teachers who volunteer in districts that embrace the state's year-old guardian program - would be allowed to carry weapons. "This bill does not

Census question likely to pass court

Supreme Court justices seem ready to OK asking of citizenship on status

WASHINGTON -Despite evidence that millions of Hispanics and immigrants could go uncounted, the Supreme Court's conservative majority seemed ready Tuesday to uphold the Trump administration's plan to inquire about U.S.

citizenship on the 2020 census in a case that could affect American elections for the next decade.

There appeared to be a clear divide between the court's liberal and conservative justices in arguments in a case that could affect how many seats states have in the House of Representatives and their share of federal dollars over the next 10 years. States with a large number of immigrants tend to vote Democratic.



Today's Highlight in History:

On April 24, 1980, the United States launched an unsuccessful attempt to free the American hostages in Iran, a mission that resulted in the deaths of eight U.S. servicemen. On this date:

In 1800, Congress approved a bill establishing the Library of Congress. **In 1877**, federal troops were ordered out of New Orleans, ending the North's post-Civil War rule in the

South. In 1915, in what's considered the start of the Armenian genocide, the Ottoman Empire began rounding up Armenian political and cultural leaders in Constantinople.


In 1916, some 1,600 Irish nationalists launched the Easter Rising by seizing several key sites in Dublin. **In 1932**, in the Free State of Prussia, the Nazi Party gained a plurality of seats in parliamentary elections.

In 1970, the People's Republic of China launched its first satellite, which kept transmitting a song, "The East Is Red."

In 1995, the final bomb linked to the Unabomber exploded inside the Sacramento, California, offices of a lobbying group for the wood products industry, killing chief lobbyist Gilbert B. Murray. (Theodore Kaczynski was later sentenced to four lifetimes in prison for a series of bombings that killed three men and injured 29 others.)

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

Militants had incendiary leader

Head of group claiming responsibility for Sri Lanka attacks has posted threatening videos for years


COLOMBO, Sri Lanka The purported leader of an Islamic extremist group blamed for an Easter attack in Sri Lanka that killed over 320 people began posting videos online three years ago calling for non-Muslims to be "eliminated," faith leaders said Tuesday.

Much remains unclear about how a little-known group called National Thowfeek Jamaath allegedly carried out six large nearly simultaneous suicide bombings striking churches and hotels on Sunday.

However, warnings about growing radicalism in the island nation off the coast of India date to at least 2007, while Muslim leaders say their repeated warnings about the group and its leader drew no visible reaction from officials responsible for public security.

"Some of the intelligence people saw his picture but they didn't take action," said N.M. Ameen, the president of the Muslim Council of Sri Lanka.

Tension coursed through Colombo on Tuesday as the military took on emergency war-time powers, allowing them to conduct warrantless

searches and detain suspects for up to two weeks before a court hearing.

Such powers haven't been invoked since Sri Lanka's bloody civil war, when people feared that unclaimed bags or debris could hide a bomb. On one commuter train Tuesday morning, panicked passengers shouted over one unclaimed piece of luggage until its owner was found.

Authorities have blamed National Thowfeek Jamaath for the attack. Its leader, alternately known as Mohammed Zahran or Zahran Hashmi, became known to Muslim leaders three years ago for his

incendiary speeches online. "It was basically a hate

campaign against all non-Muslims," said Hilmy Ahamed, the Muslim council's vice president. "Basically, he was saying non-Muslims have to be eliminated."

Zahran's name was on one intelligence warning shared among Sri Lankan security forces, who apparently even quietly took their growing concerns to international experts as well.

Anne Speckhard, the director of the International Center for the Study of Violent Extremism, said a Sri Lankan intelligence

official approached her at a conference in February with a surprising question. Shewas worried about what she described as a violent, homegrown jihadi group that "would just disappear" when the government tried to crack down on them.

"The intel person kind of came up to me and said, 'You know, we're kind of worried about this new group and there's some activity going. What do you think?"" Speckhard told The Associated Press on Tuesday. "It just kind of blows my mind that's who it was."

As far as the planning, Speckhard noted that Sri Lanka was "a part of the world that developed suicide vests" during the civil war against the Tamil Tigers, a secular, nationalist group that once was the world's top suicide attacker. But the style of Sunday's attacks, targeting churches on Easter and hotels frequented by foreigners, followed that of al-Qaida and the Islamic State group.

"It is a simple attack that is well thought out," Speckhard said. "I do believe well thought out is a product of being in touch with someone from the outside."

That's a feeling shared by the Austin, Texas-based private intelligence firm Stratfor.

"The degree of sophistication in the making of the bombs indicates that the attackers did in fact have help from outside Sri Lanka, which could have come via coordination with external militant groups such as al-Oaida or the Islamic State, from Sri Lankan fighters returning from battlefields in Iraq and Syria, or from a combination of the two," a Stratfor analysis said Tuesday. "Clarity on the nature of such networks, however, will have to wait for the emergence of more details about the attacks."

The Islamic State group claimed responsibility for the Sri Lanka attack via its Aamaq news agency on Tuesday. The group, which has lost all the territory it once held in Iraq and Syria, has made a series of unsupported claims of responsibility.





COLUMBUS, OHIO **Hospital settles 3 lawsuits in** excessive dose claims

The Ohio hospital system where an intensive care doctor is accused of ordering excessive doses of painkillers for dozens of patients who died is settling three resulting wrongful-death cases, while 24 more lawsuits are pending.

The family of 78-yearold Lora Stone reached a \$250,000 settlement with the Columbus-area Mount Carmel Health System over her May 2017 death, according to court records of the settlement approved late last week. Her three daughters get almost \$55,000 each, and the rest goes to their lawyer and legal costs.

Mount Carmel confirmed two more cases were resolved, but details haven't been publicly shared or filed in court.

KIEV. UKRAINE **Zelenskiy wins Ukraine's** presidential election with 73%

Full preliminary results show TV comedian Volodymyr Zelenskiy won Ukraine's presidential election with 73% of the vote.

The Ukrainian Central Election Commission on Tuesday published the full and final count of votes in Sunday's election which also showed incumbent Petro Poroshenko with only 24%.

Zelenskiy, 41, is a political novice who is promising to build a "new country," free of graft and the old, corrupt political establishment.

Zelenskiy's campaign was extremely vague, leaving pundits wondering how he is going to tackle thorny issues like the separatist movement in eastern Ukraine and relations with Russia which

annexed Ukraine's Crimean peninsula in 2014.

DUBAI, UNITED ARAB EMIRATES Saudi Arabia beheads 37 for terrorism crimes; most Shiites

Saudi Arabia on Tuesday beheaded 37 Saudi citizens, most of them minority Shiites, in a mass execution across the country for alleged terrorism-related crimes. It also publicly pinned the executed body and severed head of a convicted Sunni extremist to a pole as a warning to others.

The executions were likely to stoke further regional and sectarian tensions between rivals Saudi Arabia and Iran.

Saudi dissident Ali Al-Ahmed, who runs the Gulf Institute in Washington, identified 34 of those executed as Shiites based on the names announced by the Interior Ministry.

PORAC, PHILIPPINES Powerful quake hits Philippines, day after deadly temblor

A new powerful earthquake hit the central Philippines on Tuesday, a day after a magnitude 6.1 quake rattled the country's north and left at least 16 people dead, including in a collapsed supermarket, where rescuers scrambled to find survivors.

The U.S. Geological Survey put the magnitude of Tuesday's quake at 6.4, while the local seismology agency said it was 6.5. The quake was centered near San Julian town in Eastern Samar province and prompted residents to dash out of houses and office workers to scamper to safety.

CAIRO **Voters approve referendum** extending president's rule

Voters in Egypt approved constitutional amendments allowing President Abdel-Fattah el-Sissi to remain in power until 2030, election officials said Tuesday, a move that critics fear will cement his authoritarian rule eight years after a prodemocracy uprising.

El-Sissi led the military overthrow of an elected but divisive Islamist president amid mass protests against his rule in 2013 and has since presided over an unprecedented crackdown on dissent. Thousands of people, including many pro-democracy activists, have been arrested by authorities.

FBI: Militia leader said group was training to kill Obama, others

The leader of an armed militia that scours the southern border for undocumented migrants had once claimed his group was training to assassinate Barack Obama, Hillary Clinton and billionaire Democratic donor George Soros, the FBI said.

Larry Mitchell Hopkins appeared Monday in U.S. District Court in New Mexico, days after a video of the group holding migrants against their will sparked outrage. The 69-yearold was arrested on Saturday in Sunland Park, New Mexico, on charges of being a felon in possession of firearms and ammunition.

The charges stem from an incident in 2017, when the FBI received a tip that he was

connected to "alleged militia extremist activity" and found nine guns in his home, including a 12-gauge shotgun, long rifles and handguns. Hopkins claimed the weapons belonged to a woman he was living with, the FBI said in recently unsealed court documents.

His attorney, Kelly O'Connell, a former conservative radio host in New Mexico, questioned the timing of the charges against his client.

"The main takeaway is this was not about anything down at the border," O'Connell said in a brief phone interview with The Washington Post. "If it was a very serious charge worthy of prosecution and incarceration, why not jump on it immediately?" He told Reuters his client intends to plead not guilty.

Elizabeth Martinez, a spokeswoman for the U.S. attorney's office in New Mexico, declined

to comment on the delay in charging Hopkins.

Citizen-led patrols have been prompted by a recent surge in caravans of Central American migrants and have been emboldened by President Donald Trump's assertion that the arrivals constitute an "invasion."

Hopkins leads the United Constitutional Patriots, or

UCP, one of several militias that have taken to patrolling the U.S.-Mexico border. The group's stated objective is to "uphold the Constitution of The United States of America" and to protect citizens' rights "against all enemies both foreign and domestic" - which mimics the oath taken by U.S. service members.

The United Constitutional Patriots came to public attention this month after the emergence of videos that showed men stopping and detaining people crossing the border.

An April 16 video, which was posted on Facebook by a woman who goes by Debbie Collins Farnsworth, showed a large group of migrants, including several children, kneeling on the ground in the total darkness, some of their faces illuminated by flashlights.

Anderson of Anderson Construction and the Bay Building Industry Association; Teri Henry, director of the Panama City Housing Authority; Michael Johnson, community development director for Panama City; and Michael Martin, community outreach manager for Habitat for Humanity of Bay County.

The forum addressed a variety of topics on housing recovery since the hurricane, but particularly high costs and the need for affordable homes in the county. Rising prices, especially for rentals, has been a hot topic on social media and in the community in the months after the hurricane.

biggest housing issues he is seeing in the community is residents being unable to find affordable housing.

"Some rent has not only doubled but tripled, and some has quadrupled," Johnson said. "A lot of people are in desperate need."

Martin said he also has seen the growth in need in the community, which has trickled down into higher demand for Habitat's services.

"We've had a dramatic increase in people trying to get in the program," Martin said

Hargaray addressed allegations some residents have made in recent months that price gouging is to blame for the rise in housing and rental costs.

Hargaray said that while home prices are up, they have risen only by about 4 percent since the hurricane. She said appraisals have kept housing market prices from rising too much, too fast.

Rental property prices, however, are based totally on market demand, she said, and prices have risen.

"Demand is what makes the price go up," Hargarary said. "The rentals are gone ... some aren't even put on a listing sometimes because they're gone so fast."

Anderson said a shortage of labor for construction also has pushed up housing costs.

"We need more labor, that's the only way prices will come down," Anderson said. "Brick masons cost two to three times what they were before the storm ... there's not enough people. ... The trades are naming their price."

To help ease the situation, Habitat has begun a program to repair homes for people who qualify, so they don't have to move, Martin said. The nonprofit also is seeking grants and other funding sources to build more homes than it does normally, he said

"Money always makes it easier," Martin said of home building. "But at this point, the grants are not there for Hurricane Michael."

Johnson highlighted several ideas the city is pursuing to ease the housing crunch, including attracting a developer to build affordable housing on 27 lots owned by the city.

"The infrastructure is already there," Johnson said. "We're looking for a developer to build out houses under \$100,000."

Different types of housing — such as 3D printed homes made of concrete and converted storage units — also are projects Johnson is working through the city and through his other role as the chairman of the housing branch of the Long-term

Recovery Task Force.

Anderson suggested more tax incentives for developers and changes in zoning codes would help stimulate affordable housing construction.

Henry said the Housing Authority has every intention of repairing the buildings it lost in the storm, which total more than 200 units. Still, the construction will take time, Henry said.

"We're working with every resource to do that," Henry said of reconstruction. "But even if the money was available today, we'd still need the workers to do it."

One positive thing Henry said came out of the storm is people are more supportive of affordable housing projects.

Three lower courts have so far blocked the plan to ask every U.S. resident about citizenship in the census, finding that the question would discourage many immigrants from being counted. Two of the three judges also ruled that asking if people are citizens would violate the provision of the Constitution that calls for a count of the population, regardless of citizenship status, every 10 years. The last time the question was included on the census form sent to every American household was 1950.

Three conservative justices, Samuel Alito, Neil Gorsuch and Clarence Thomas, had expressed skepticism about the challenge to the question in earlier stages of the case, but Chief Justice John Roberts and Brett Kavanaugh had been silent, possibly suggesting a willingness to disrupt the administration's plan.

However, over 80 minutes in a packed courtroom, neither Roberts nor Kavanaugh appeared to share the concern of the lower court judges who ruled against the administration.

Kavanaugh, the court's newest member and an appointee of President Donald Trump, suggested Congress could change the law if it so concerned that the accuracy of the once-a-decade population count will suffer. "Why doesn't Congress prohibit the asking of the citizenship question?" Kavanaugh asked near the end of the morning session.

Kavanaugh and the other conservatives were mostly silent when Solicitor General Noel Francisco, the administration's top Supreme Court lawyer, defended Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross' decision to add the citizenship question. Ross has said the Justice Department wanted the citizenship data, the detailed information it would produce on where eligible voters live, to improve enforcement of the Voting Rights Act.

Lower courts found that Ross' explanation was a pretext for adding the question, noting that he had consulted early in his tenure with Stephen Bannon, Trump's former top political adviser and immigration hardliner Kris Kobach, the former Kansas secretary of state.

The liberal justices peppered Francisco with questions about the administration plan, but they would lack the votes to stop it without support from at least one conservative justice.

"This is a solution in search of a problem," Justice Sonia Sotomayor, the court's lone Hispanic member, said of Ross' decision.

arm one single, solitary teacher," said Sen. Manny Diaz, R-Miami, sponsor of the measure.

Still, at every committee stop leading to Tuesday's vote, the measure has been criticized by the state's largest teachers union, the Florida PTA, individual parents and students, including some who survived last year's massacre.

The legislation cleared the Senate 22-17, with Democrats opposed. Every Republican voted in favor of the measure, except for Sen. Anitere Flores of Miami.

The legislation is still awaiting full approval in the Republican-dominated House, but that's virtually guaranteed as lawmakers work toward a scheduled May

In debate Tuesday, Sen. Ed Hooper, R-Palm Harbor, said that timeline convinced him that expanding the guardian program to include volunteer teachers was needed.

"Whether I think it's a great idea or not," Hooper said, "I must err on the side of saving a kid."

But many Democrats said it was unfair — and potentially dangerous — to expect teachers to respond as armed classroom defenders. Instead, law enforcement should provide campus security, they argued.

"We're telling teachers if you want protection for you and your children, you do it yourself," said Sen. Bill Montford,

D-Tallahassee.

The guardian program was included in last year's legislative response to the slayings. It allowed school staff to volunteer

for 144 hours of training, including firearms proficiency, but excluded full-time teachers from participating.

Since then, Florida's 67 school districts have struggled to meet the new requirement that at least one "safe-school officer" be assigned to each school.

While 25 counties have embraced the guardian program, only a few chose to use current school personnel to guard classrooms; the remainder mostly plan to hire additional security specialists.

Schoolresource officers are costlier for counties to supply, and there aren't enough to go around, officials acknowledge.

The legislation would allow school districts to contract with guardians through private security agencies — something many already are doing. It also requires "active assailant response" policies for each school, and sets strict timelines for districts to have mental health evaluations performed for students seen as at-risk for behavioral problems.

Several Democrats warned that bringing guns into classrooms heightened risks. Others questioned just how the program would work — with teacher-guardians having to secure their own classrooms before hurrying to retrieve their weapons in an emergency.

Some also asked why the legislation doesn't allow parents to opt out of having their child in a classroom where the teacher is an armed guardian.

"A teacher is a teacher, let's face reality," said Sen. Victor Torres, D-Orlando.

Sen. Lori Berman, D-Boynton Beach, said: "Where is the research that more guns make a school safer? There is none."

But supporters of the legislation said having someone with a gun near a classroom could prove pivotal if a gunman assaults a school.

"Who is there those first three minutes is key," said Sen. Dennis Baxley, R-Ocala. "You need someone who could respond."











Workers install tarps to protect gutted Notre Dame from rain

PARIS - Professional mountain climbers were hired to install synthetic, waterproof tarps over the gutted, exposed exterior of Notre Dame Cathedral, as authorities raced to prevent further damage ahead of storms that are rolling in toward Paris.

The looming bad weather threatens to further damage the 850-year-old cathedral whose roof was destroyed by the April 15 blaze, leaving the church to the mercy of the elements.

Architect-in-chief Philippe Villeneuve said he had to rush the installation of the protective covers that started Tuesday.

"The climbers, since it will be climbers who will do that, and the scaffolders, are ready," Villeneuve told BFMTV on Tuesday, "The beams are there, the tarpaulin on its way The highest priority is to protect the cathedral from the rain to come."

Some of Notre Dame's remaining statues were removed by crane before the tarpaulins were hoisted up. Workers in the afternoon began dragging them over to cover vulnerable parts of the structure.

Parts of the cathedral, including its partially-destroyed vaulted ceiling, had already been soaked with water after firefighters desperately fought the blaze for over 12 hours that day.

Notre Dame's vaulted ceiling was also badly damaged after the cathedral's 19th-century spire burnt up and collapsed.

Notre Dame isn't expected to reopen to the public for five or six years, according to its rector, although French President Emmanuel Macron is pushing for a quick reconstruction.

So far, investigators think the devastating fire was an accident, possibly linked to the cathedral's renovation work.

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

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Americans getting more inactive, computers partly to blame

Americans are becoming increasingly sedentary, spending almost a third of their waking hours sitting down, and computer use is partly to blame, a new study found.

Over almost a decade, average daily sitting time increased by roughly an hour, to about eight hours for U.S. teens and almost 6.5 hours for adults, according to the researchers. That includes school and work hours, but leisure-time computer use among all ages increased

By 2016, at least half of American kids and adults spent an hour or more of leisure time daily using computers. The biggest increase was among the oldest adults: 15% of retirement-aged adults reported using computers that often in 2003-04, soaring to more than half in 2015-16.

Most Americans of all ages watched TV or videos for at least two hours daily and that was mostly unchanged throughout the study, ranging from about 60% of kids aged 5 to 11, up to 84% of seniors.

"Everything we found is concerning," said lead author Yin Cao, a researcher at Washington University's medical school in St. Louis. "The overall message is prolonged sitting is highly prevalent," despite prominent health warnings about the dangers of being too sedentary.

The researchers analyzed U.S. government health surveys from

almost 52,000 Americans, starting at age 5, from 2001-2016. Total sitting time was assessed for teens and adults starting in 2007. The results were published Tuesday in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

Studies have shown that prolonged periods of sitting can increase risks for obesity, diabetes, heart disease and some cancers. U.S. activity guidelines released last fall say adults need at least 150 minutes to 300 minutes of moderate-to-vigorous activity each week, things like brisk walking, jogging, biking or tennis. Muscle strengthening two davs weekly is also advised. Immediate benefits include reduced blood pressure and anxiety and better sleep. Long-term benefits include improved brain health and lower risks for falls.

Kids aged 6 through 17 need 60 minutes of moderate-to-vigorous physical activity daily. Regular activity is even recommended for kids as

young as 3. But only about 1 in 4 U.S. adults and 1 in 5 teens get recommended amounts.

College student Daisy Lawing spends a lot of time sitting, but says she doesn't have much choice. Classes and homework on the computer take up much of her day.

"I always feel bad" about being inactive, she said Tuesday at an Asheville, North Carolina, cafe, explaining that she did a school paper about the benefits of physical

"I try to walk a lot, try to work out twice a week. But sometimes I can't because I'm too busy with school," Lawing, 21, a junior at Appalachian State University in Boone.

Peter T. Katzmarzyk of the Pennington Biomedical Research Center in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, said people who sit all day need to do more than the minimum recommended amount of physical activity to counteract the harms of being sedentary.

WASHINGTON US new-home sales climbed 4.5 pct. in March


March's sales pace was the strongest since November 2017, a sign that the market for newer properties is building some momentum.

Always watching

Coming to store shelves: Cameras that guess your age and sex

NEW YORK — Eyeing that can of soda in the supermarket cooler? Or maybe you're craving a pint of ice cream? A camera could be watching

But it's not there to see if you're stealing. These cameras want to get to know you and what you're buying.

It's a new technology being trotted out to retailers, where cameras try to guess your age, gender or mood as you walk by. The intent is to use the information to show you targeted real-time ads on instore video screens.

Companies are pitching retailers to bring the technology into their physical stores as a way to better compete with online rivals like Amazon that are already armed with troves of information on their customers and their buying

With store cameras, you may not even realize you are being watched unless you happen to notice the pennysized lenses. And that has raised concerns over privacy.

"The creepy factor here is definitely a 10 out of 10," said Pam Dixon, the executive director of the World Privacy Forum, a nonprofit that researches privacy issues.

At the National Retail Federation trade show in New York earlier this year, a smart shelf on display by Mood Media tried to detect "happiness" or "fear" as people stood in front it - information a store could use to gauge reaction to a product on the shelf or an ad on a screen. Cineplex Digital Media showed off video screens that can be placed in malls or bus stops and try to tell if someone is wearing glasses or sporting a beard, which in turn can be used to sell ads for new frames or razors.

The screens can also be placed at the drive-thru. A minivan pulling into a fast food restaurant, for example, might get an ad for a familysized meal on the video screen

For now, the cameras are in just a handful of stores.

Kroger, which has 2,800 supermarkets, is testing cameras embedded in a price sign above shelves in two stores in the suburbs outside Cincinnati and Seattle. Video screens attached to the shelves can play ads and show discounts. Kroger said the cameras guess a shopper's age and sex but the information is anonymous and the data is not being stored. If the tests work out well, the company said it could expand it into other locations.

Walgreens, which has more than 8,000 drugstores, installed cooler doors with cameras and sensors at six locations in Chicago, New York, San Francisco and Bellevue, Washington. Instead of the usual clear glass doors that allow customers to see inside, there are video screens that display ads along with the cooler's contents.

Above the door handle is a camera that can try to guess ages and track irises to see where you are looking, but Walgreens said those functions are off for now. The company said the cameras are currently being used to sense when someone is in front of the cooler and count the number of shoppers passing by. It declined to say if it will turn on the other functions of the camera.

"All such enhancements will be carefully reviewed and considered in light of any consumer privacy concerns," Walgreens said.

US move to end Iran exemptions sending oil prices higher

FRANKFURT, Germany -Oil prices have struck 2019 highs in the the wake of the U.S. move to impose sanctions on countries that buy Iranian oil, and analysts said Tuesday that oil could get still more expensive.

U.S. West Texas Intermediate crude rose 72 cents to \$66.27 per barrel while international Brent oil rose 35 cents to \$74.39 per barrel.

The U.S. announced the sanctions in November but some countries got temporary waivers that allowed them to import Iranian oil. The U.S. now says those waivers expire May 2. Prices haven't been this high since late October, before the waivers were announced.

Among those affected are China, India, Japan, South Korea and Turkey. U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo said Monday the U.S. is counting on ally Saudi Arabia and other producers to ensure sufficient supply, along with increased U.S. production.

President Donald Trump made the decision as part of the administration's "maximum pressure" campaign on Iran that aims to eliminate all of its revenue from oil exports that the U.S. says funds destabilizing activity throughout the Middle East and beyond.

Energy analysts at Raymond James & Associates are warning that the U.S. imposition of tougher Iranian oil sanctions is "unambiguously bullish" for the price of oil. The analysts said in a report Saudi Arabia will take its time to ramp up oil production to make up for the lost Iranian oil exports.

Trump announced sanctions last year, but then gave countries waivers to keep importing from Iran. The waiver announcement wrong-footed key oil producing countries in the OPEC cartel after they had increased supply in expectation of lower Iranian exports.

Tax changes, charitable giving and Robert Cray

7 as your recent tax bill dramatically different than what you expected? If so, there are several things you might want to consider as we progress

through the 2019 tax year. Why, you may ask, is an investment advisor writing about taxes? Good question. The answer is that it's not what you make that matters; it's what you get to keep. Investing without considering tax implications is foolhardy. Savvy investors and the best investment advisors think as much about taxes as they do about investments. Investment results are not knowable in advance, but the impact of tax regulations can be.

We recently added a CPA to our team, who prepares returns and crafts tax strategies for our clients. As we conferred throughout the year, here are a few tax season takeaways.

First, many folks were unprepared for how the changes in the treatment of itemized deductions impacted their tax bill. Charitable giving, in concert with other deductions, that falls short of the new \$24,000 standard deduction (for married couples filing jointly) now provides no tax benefit. Say you gave your church \$100 every Sunday all year (for a total of \$5,200 contributed). Imagine also that your itemized deductions, including charitable giving, totaled \$17,500.

This year you were not able to deduct that \$17,500 from your adjusted gross income, as it did not eclipse the \$24,000 standard deduction. Possible remedies might include Oualified Charitable Distributions, which allow you to donate some or all of your Required Minimum Distribution. A QCD is taxable neither to you, the giver, nor to the receiving charity, and is not added to your gross income. Or lumping charitable contributions into one year to reach an amount in excess of the standard deduction. Say you were planning to give your church \$50,000. You might want to give the total amount in one year to take advantage of a larger deduction, rather than give \$10,000 for five years. Naturally, every investor's situation is unique, so you'll want to confer with your advisor to make sure strategies are appropriate for your individual situation.

Another step that taxpayers might take in 2019, that

perhaps they missed last year is to ensure that their withholding amount on income is on target. Many people did not alter their withholding from IRA distributions like RMD's or from their Social Security income. Thus, they were surprised when their tax bill was quite a bit different than what they expected. Some folks got more money back than they anticipated and those dollars could have been working for them throughout the year.

Democracy on the ropes across the world

wo journalists in Myanmar, Wa Lone and Kyaw Soe Oo, were among those from Reuters awarded the Pultizer Prize for international reporting this month for documenting the plight of the Rohingya Muslim minority. But these two will not be enjoying the hugs of family and applause of colleagues. They are in jail — unjustly, in a case that can only cause outrage at what has gone wrong in Myanmar, also known as Burma.

These journalists produced haunting and dramatic coverage of the scorched-earth campaign by Burmese security forces against the Rohingya in northern Rakhine state that sent more than 700,000 Rohingya fleeing their homes and villages for neighboring Bangladesh, where they remain. The two journalists were part of a team that produced, among other things, a report about the massacre of 10 Rohingya men — two of them high school students — at the village of Inn Din in September 2017. The men were buried in a shallow grave, and Reuters reconstructed the story of how they were killed, as well as the details of the role played by two elite Myanmar infantry divisions in the ethnic cleansing.

The journalists were investigating the massacre when they were given documents rolled up in a newspaper by a police source, clearly a setup. They were then arrested for possessing secret documents. On Tuesday, Myanmar's Supreme Court rejected their appeals and let stand a seven-year sentence. Obviously, the journalists had become irritants to Myanmar's still-powerful security apparatus, and they were punished for their reporting.


The rights to free expression and a free press were pillars of Aung San Suu Kyi's cause when she stoically faced off against Myanmar's military rulers, enduring years under house arrest. Sadly, Aung San Suu Kyi, the Nobel laureate who is now Myanmar's de facto civilian leader, has proved unable or unwilling to rein in the generals. It is absurdly wrong to put the reporters in prison and not the perpetrators of repression.

Authoritarian leaders from Turkey to Vietnam are silencing the news media. The latest annual index of press freedom in 180 countries published by Reporters Without Borders "shows that an intense climate of fear has been triggered" in many places, raising the danger level for journalists. The United States fell three places in the index to 48th in the world. On the same day that the Myanmar journalists lost their appeal, President Donald Trump demanded the New York Times apologize to him "on their knees & beg for forgiveness" and declared the newspaper is "truly the Enemy of the People." Neither in the United States, nor Burma, nor anywhere between, should journalists be tarred for work that is essential to a healthy and thriving democracy.

Mueller Report's Damning Portrait of Trump

of the release of the redacted Mueller report, Americans can be grateful their president did not so blatantly violate any law that the special counsel felt compelled to indict him. Really. It's better than learning he was caught red-handed in a multitude of Class A felonies.

The public should not, however, be consoled by everything else that was revealed. The report compiles a profusion of evidence that the president is a disgrace to his office, giving exclusive consideration to his own welfare and none to the interests of the public. Felonious? Maybe not. Villainous? Without a doubt.

For Republicans to celebrate the findings is a desolate testament to Trump's ability to corrode standards so badly that even he can meet them. His partisan defenders insist on claiming the president has been vindicated, even though the investigation has led to the criminal conviction of six Trump associates, including his campaign manager and his national security adviser.

The claim of vindication comes even though the special counsel confirmed, in instance after instance, Trump behaved in ways that were dishonest, intemperate, contemptuous of the rule of law, ethically foul and

quite possibly criminal.

The question regarding obstruction of justice, in Robert Mueller's judgment, is not whether Trump is innocent or guilty. The question is whether Trump is demonstrably guilty enough to prosecute. It was, in the end, a close call.

Mueller's answer might have been "yes," except that, as the report says, "we recognized that a federal criminal accusation against a sitting president would place burdens on the president's capacity to govern." The Justice Department has long taken the position that a sitting president may not be indicted.

But the special counsel intended no exoneration of Trump. "If we had confidence after a thorough investigation of the facts that the president clearly did not commit obstruction of justice, we would so state ... However, we are unable to reach that judgment."

Over and over, the report cites actions that would have been spectacularly scandalous had they been committed by Barack Obama or George W. Bush. Trump tried to kill the investigation by leaning on FBI Director James Comey, telling his White House counsel to have Mueller fired, demanding the attorney general intervene despite his recusal, and making threats and suggesting pardons to discourage witnesses from incriminating him.

No one should be pleased to learn that in the face of the Kremlin's efforts to elect Trump, he and his campaign aides were willing beneficiaries rather than active conspirators.
Attorney General William
Barr, parroting the president
before releasing the report,
claimed repeatedly that the
special counsel found "no
evidence" of "collusion."

Oh? The investigation "identified numerous links between the Russian government and the Trump campaign" and found that "the Russian government perceived it would benefit from a Trump presidency and worked to secure that outcome, and that the campaign expected it would benefit electorally from information stolen and released through Russian efforts."

Donald J. Trump Jr., we already knew, eagerly agreed to a meeting in which he expected Russians to provide dirt on Hillary Clinton — a meeting that, Mueller notes, the president himself later lied about. What about this was not "collusion"?

in which the Russian government acted to deliver

with bogus information and
engaging in cyberattacks

Biden to announce 2020 bid on Thursday

WASHINGTON Answering perhaps the most significant question of the early 2020 election season, former Vice President Joe Biden will launch his presidential campaign on Thursday.

The move, confirmed by a person familiar with his plans, sets up the 76-year-old lifelong politician as a front-runner in the crowded Democratic contest as the party fights to determine who's best positioned to defeat President Donald Trump next year.

Biden, who spent the last five decades in

Washington but never lost touch with his working-class background, is scheduled to face union workers in Pittsburgh on Monday as part of the rollout tour, the person said,

speaking on the condition of anonymity to disclose private conversations.

While he may be popular with the white workingclass in the Midwest, it's unclear if Biden will appeal to the more liberal voters who tend to have outsized sway in Democratic primary contests.

His decision largely settles the crowded and diverse Democratic presidential field at 20 candidates, including six women, five people of color and one member of the LGBTQ community. Biden would be the most experienced politician in the race, and the secondoldest, after 77-year-old Bernie Sanders.

A handful of lesserknown Democrats, including Montana Gov. Steve Bullock, could join the race in the coming weeks or months, but Biden's decision is considered the final major piece as voters, donors and elected officials alike begin to pick their favorites.

"Come on in, the water is warm Joe," California Sen. Kamala Harris, another 2020 contender, laughed on Tuesday as she campaigned in New Hampshire. "I adore Joe Biden and I think he has to make whatever decision is best for him."

Biden, who has run for president twice before with little success, will look to organized labor for support early on.

The largest firefighters union is preparing to formally endorse Biden this week, with group leaders saying they will be "investing" heavily in the former vice president's anticipated bid.

PC hires third economic adviser

PANAMA CITY - In an effort to revitalize the local economy, the Panama City City Commission on Tuesday unanimously voted to hire another consultant.

Completing what City Manager Mark McQueen referred to as a "three-legged approach" to economic development, the city signed PFM Financial Advisors on an as-needed basis, with the total contract not to exceed \$100,000.

The city already has a

long-standing relationship with financial advisors Hilltop Security, meant to vet projects to make sure they are in the city's best interest, and in February inked a contract with HR&A consultants to assess the state of the economy pre- and posthurricane as part of the \$1.37 million strategic long-term recovery plan.

This latest agreement is about "going after and accessing monies, meaning private capitol monies and philanthropic corporations that may have monies they want to invest," McQueen said. "They go after money."

In other words, this is the contract that makes sure whatever other studies are done don't sit on the shelf, McQueen confirmed.

In a presentation to the commission, Hank Fishkind of PFM talked about sluggish economic recoveries other areas hit by hurricanes have seen, but said that doesn't need to be the case. He also touted PFM's connections to developers, builders and businesses.

"I work with them so I can bring capital in, hopefully, through contacts and

Downtown golf carts? If street legal, state says 'yes'

PANAMA CITY - For those looking to drive their golf carts around Panama City, good news - as long as it's street legal, it can be driven on any roadway with a speed limit less than 35 mph.

After hearing repeatedly from residents that they wanted the option to drive golf carts in more places, Commissioner Jenna Haligas teed up a discussion for Tuesday's commission meeting about allowing golf carts in downtown.

It turned out to be a moot

Florida law already allows for low-speed vehicles which include golf carts that have safety features such as turn signals, seat belts, mirrors, headlights and are properly registered and insured - to go on roads with speed limits less than 35 miles per hour, which would cover downtown.

"I guess my job here is done," Haligas said cheerfully.

Leading up to the meeting, Haligas had put a poll out on social media asking if people wanted to see the city allow golf carts in the downtown area. More than 250 people responded, she said, with 78% in favor.

"This is something that doesn't cost the city anything but it gains a great deal of quality of life," Haligas said. "The

LH residents encouraged to get debris out for May pass

LYNN HAVEN - More than six months after Hurricane Michael wrecked Lynn Haven, there will be one more debris

The pass will start May 1 and go through May 31. The Lynn Haven Commission approved the pass by a 4-0 vote during Tuesday's meeting. Commissioner Judy Tinder was not at the meeting because of a medical emergency.

Residents are encouraged to have as much debris out as they

"It will be a very measured pass. We've talked about maybe putting one of the haulers on the east side of town, one on the west, and doing it street by street, sort of like we've been doing the city cleanup," Mayor Margo Anderson said. "One more pass, a very almost surgical pass to pick up every bit of debris we possibly can get out by the roads. That will be C&D debris, vegetative debris, whatever is out there."

Anderson said the pass hopefully will get the "vast majority of personal debris and vegetative debris off the right of way."

"As we've said at previous meetings, we're trying not to start with penalties and code enforcement-type letters until now, six months after the storm, because we've said this before, we don't want to kick people when they're down because some people are just now getting back to Lynn Haven and starting repairs and so we want to be entirely fair and give people as much time as possible," Anderson said on if there will be penalties for people who don't get debris out until after the deadline. "Some of these cases will be decided on an individual basis, of course,

due to circumstances we don't know about."

In late March, Lynn Haven officials announced a Private Property Debris Removal program, which is accepting applications through June 1. The program — which started accepting applications April 1 – is designed for private property owners who need assistance with clearing their property from Hurricane Michael-related storm debris and for demolition projects necessary post-hurricane, according to a news release.





massive majority of people really wanted the opportunity to drive a golf cart downtown."

Golf carts that do not have the safety features that make them street legal still are not allowed in the downtown area. Those vehicles can be used

only in the city's designated golf cart friendly communities, such as SweetBay, Venetian Villa and the Cove.

That distinction is unlikely to change, as not even Haligas wanted to allow for standard golf carts to be driven downtown, fearing it would present a safety hazard. City Manager Mark McQueen said he was particularly concerned.

"My concern was extending that to just generic golf carts...

going into the business district we don't want to have those types of vehicles," McQueen said. "The character of traffic is such that I don't think having a golf cart that doesn't have all the safety apparatuses on board is wise or prudent."

Street legal vehicles, he said, he had no issue with.

Haligas pointed out that people can buy a standard golf cart and have it upgraded to be street legal.

connections," Fishkind said. "With your help, we can hopefully position this community to, as Mark said, become a place that people want to be."

His job is "to be the tip of the spear," Fishkind said.

The commission seemed somewhat concerned about the amount of people being brought to the table, with Commissioner Mike Nichols asking if it might be too early to bring in PFM and Commissioner Kenneth Brown saying "let's move with caution; don't move too fast."

Fishkind said the goal would be to have an action plan to commissioners by June 30, and warned not to let "perfect be the enemy of the good."

Commissioner Jenna Haligas, who emphasized the fluidity of the contract, also said that even before Hurricane Michael there was a need to be pushing to revitalize.

"We were in need of this before the hurricane," she said. "The people with experience, the people who are going to help us get through this, who can bring everything to the table that they have, I'm definitely on board with this and I definitely appreciate it."

She added that the research she has done indicates that about 80% of the investment in the community post-storm should come from the private sector to ensure success.

In the end, the contract was unanimously passed.

"There's wisdom in the advice and counsel of many," McQueen said. "I'm anxious to see what they can bring to the table."





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
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Groups: It's 'war' against highway measure

Toll road expansion bill is called most environmentally damaging legislation in 20 years

TALLAHASSEE

— Calling it the most environmentally damaging bill to advance in the Florida Legislature in 20 years, environmental advocates used Earth Day to draw attention to toll road legislation that critics contend would spark massive suburban sprawl.

The highway expansion is being pushed by Senate President Bill Galvano, R-Bradenton, as a way to alleviate congestion on existing roads and bring economic development to rural areas. It is poised for a final vote in the House and Senate and seems likely to pass.

But opponents are mounting a furious lastditch effort to thwart the bill by saying it will destroy important habitat for Florida wildlife and hurt the environment

in other ways, including contributing to the water quality problems that have plagued the state.

Galvano wants to build or expand three toll roads, with one stretching from north of Tampa to the Georgia border and another south from Lakeland to the Naples area. It would be largest expansion of Florida's highway system since the 1950s.

For critics, the plan represents an outdated way of thinking about transportation and development,

and one that would have devastating environmental consequences for the state.

"Do not pollute and destroy the natural areas and the rural areas that are remaining in the rest of the state," Frank Jackalone, director of the Florida Chapter of the Sierra Club, said during a news conference Monday at the group's office in St. Petersburg.

Jackalone said his group is going to "war" against the toll roads and lawmakers who support them. "What's going to happen is business as usual," if the roads get built, Jackalone said after calling the bill the worst environmental measure in his two decades leading the state chapter. "Sprawl, sprawl – development until there's nothing left."

Galvano's office pointed to a number of provisions in the bill that are aimed at making the legislation environmentally sensitive.

The bill does not outline pathways for the toll roads. Instead, the Florida Department of Transportation would create a task force for each roadway and those task forces would have to consider environmental issues when charting out where the roads will go.

The task forces also would be asked to include wildlife crossing locations in the roadway designs and to investigate acquiring conservation lands to mitigate any environmental impacts from the new roads.

But environmental advocates worry that there's no way the state can adequately mitigate the impact of the roads, which one person described Monday as "can openers into the countryside" that would dramatically alter the state's rural landscapes.

"The corridors designated for each roadway put a bull's-eye on some of the last, best natural, conservation and agricultural land in Florida," 1000 Friends of Florida President Paul Owens said.

It's "ironic" that law-makers are advancing the roadway plan at the same time they are preparing to spend hundreds of millions of dollars on environmental remediation efforts aimed at cleaning up waterways fouled by algae blooms, Owens added, saying the roadways "raise the likelihood of huge restoration costs in the future."

That's because lawn fertilizers, leaky septic tanks, broken sewer pipes and other pollution sources are byproducts of development, and the toll roads — which also would bring sewer and broadband Internet infrastructure to rural parts of the state — are partially aimed at spurring more

development.

"Each of the proposed highways, by themselves, would add to nutrient and sediment pollution in nearby waterways, and fragment wildlife corridors," Owens said. "But the negative environmental impact of each would be exponentially increased by the low-density residential sprawl development they would stimulate."

Galvano's road plan is strongly supported by the Florida Chamber of Commerce and groups representing road builders. Environmental organizations have been increasingly vocal in their opposition.

Jackalone said 56 organizations have signed a letter opposing the bill. He urged lawmakers to oppose it and Gov. Ron DeSantis to veto the bill if it makes it through both chambers.

DeSantis has been "talking the environmental talk," Jackalone said, adding he needs to "walk the walk."

"He needs to veto that bill," he said. "He needs to make sure that rural Florida and natural Florida are protected."

player Keshawn Johnson in a fatal car accident.

"She was a big piece to our team so when we lost her it was hard in practice to fill that spot," freshman point guard Reneasha Payton said. "It was hard for players who who were close to her to be able to focus again and feel comfortable on the court without her."
"She was the type of

spirit who would keep you pushing on the court. To lose her, it was a weird space because you don't have that voice telling you to keep going, don't give up," sophomore Dominique Banks said. "For me, that's my roommate and it was different. It was hard—but it was hard for everyone and I was glad that I had everyone by my side."

Then, tragedy struck again on Oct. 10 when

Hurricane Michael displaced many classmates and prevented the team from using their weight room and gymnasium for the next 30 days.

But the team pushed on, in January becoming champions of the Panhandle Conference, then winning state, and finally bringing home the National Junior College Athletic Association Women's Basketball Championship at the end of March.

"It's what we worked

for all year. We knew we could do it but with all the setbacks, it was challenging," Hutchinson said. "We took it one step at a time just believing in ourselves and leaning off of each other and buying into our coaches."

The women said they believe the adversity is what pushed them to the finish line, which is the message fifth-grade teacher Nicole Ehrhardt hoped would impress her students.

"A lot of anxiety in the kids. Some sadness, some stress. I still have kids sleeping on friend's couches. Living in hotels," Ehrhardt said. "That's still the case and I don't expect it to change anytime soon."

Ehrhardt began following the team's story from the beginning, taking considerable interest in its fight and passion. She then conceptualized bringing the team to Cedar Grove Elementary after seeing the storm's impact on her students.

"Ijust wanted to send my kids to middle school with some fight in them after this year. It's been a rough year," she said. "I wanted them to see it in person that a group of people came together and fought

through all the adversity of losing a teammate, of the hurricane, and they still were national champions."


Ehrhardt's love for her students echoed the message brought by the team — that passion and love for each other can take you anywhere.



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



In today's deal, South might have responded four diamonds to North's cue-bid, since North might just have been trying to find the best fit when holding both red suits. No harm was done, though it resulted in South rather than North being declarer

in six spades. When the defenders led clubs, the duplication of values meant South wasn't going to find it easy to take a ruff in either hand. Accordingly, the 4-1 trump break did not materially diminish declarer's chances. He won the club lead and drew trumps in four

rounds, East pitching three clubs. Now whom was declarer going to play for four diamonds? After cashing the diamond ace, declarer decided that East was slightly more likely to have four diamonds than four hearts. However, it was far more convenient for his plans to be in dummy after running the diamonds. So he cashed the diamond king and ran diamonds, coming down to a fourcard ending with three hearts and one club in each hand, West holding the same, while East had two cards left in each suit.

The next big decision was whom to play for the heart king. Since West had the length, declarer decided to cash dummy's remaining club honor and lead the heart eight, planning to let it run. When East played low, so did declarer, and West took his 10 but was endplayed to lead a heart around to South's queen.

Had East followed with the jack, declarer would have played his queen and finessed against the 10 on the next round

Omelets' nutrition, deliciousness can't be disproven

very time a new health study about eggs is published, it becomes increasingly clear that what they actually cause is whiplash. Last May we learned that eggs decrease risk for heart disease. In March we learned that three or more eggs per week will increase one's risk not only for heart disease, but also an early death.

While the expected health outcomes of eating eggs keep changing, their nutritional value doesn't. Eggs pack protein, minerals, carotenoids and all of the other materials they need to organize into a baby chicken.

I find that impressive, but I'm biased. I ate three or more eggs just yesterday, thanks to a flock of hens in the backyard and a recipe for a crepe omelet that has increased my risk for bliss.

Floating one's a rotten egg

If eggs were truly bad for one's health, consuming multiple crepe omelets per day would be a problem. But the only egg-related concern weighing on my ovovorous heart is "does it float?"

A floating egg is a rotten egg, which is an egg you want to avoid. Most hen keepers have the experience of discovering an unsanctioned nest in some random corner of the yard, filled with eggs of an uncertain age. Cracking and sniffing is one way to assess the fitness of an egg, but can also lead to PTSD, not to mention ruin breakfast.

Place the egg in question on the bottom of a pot of water. If the egg lies

prone, it's as fresh as tomorrow's news. As the egg ages, it will produce waste gases that collect in the wide end, which will rise toward the surface, while the pointy end stays touching the bottom. At this stage an egg will taste fine, although the texture won't be as tight. The yolks won't stand up like solid spheres; instead they'll

Tasty options

Assuming you have decent eggs, there should be no stopping you from making this indecently good omelet. When filled with Nutella or topped with whipped cream, it will taste like the sweetest crepe in Brittany. But when filled with savory ingredients and spattered with hot sauce, it tastes like the sunniest omelet. Salty or sweet, the crepe omelet will always taste good with a cup of coffee, which is all I truly ask of an egg. That, and to not float.

You will need a good pancake recipe for this dish. I use Krusteaz Buttermilk Pancake mix. Whichever recipe or mix you use, it will probably take an omelet or two before you figure out how much to add, as each mix will perform differently. With Krusteaz, I use 2 teaspoons per egg.

Once you have mastered the basic recipe, you will be ready to take it in any sweet or savory direction you wish. Fill it with fruit or vegetable, ricotta cheese or Philly cheesesteak. Usually, I just add grated cheddar, which melts into the egg batter. My kids have been requesting the chocolate omelet, in which cocoa powder and sugar are mixed in with the batter, and the omelet is filled with sour cream. Just remember: if it tastes good, it will taste good in a crepe omelet.

Crepe Omelet

Makes a single omelet. Scale up as necessary

- 1 large egg
- 1/4 cup milk
- · 2-ish teaspoons pancake mix
- 1/2 tablespoon butter

Crack the egg into a bowl and beat with the milk and pancake mix. Don't over-beat or go after every lump. Melt the butter in an omelet pan on medium. Add the mixture, tilting the pan around for even coverage. When bubbles appear on the edge of the disc, lay the filling across the middle, perpendicular to the direction you will fold the omelet.

The delicateness of the crepe omelet makes it difficult to fold in half like a normal omelet. Instead, fold and roll the crepe across the pan in several little movements.

When bubbles appear toward the middle, slide a spatula under an edge and give it a test. If it feels solid, turn over an inch or two of the edge. Let it sit there for a moment to set up, then fold again. You may want a second spatula to help fold it evenly.

Keep turning over, a little at a time, until it's a cylinder pushed up against the edge of the pan. (If you botch the folding part, stir it around like you meant to all along, and serve a glorious pile of scrambled eggs.)

Turn off the heat and let it sit for a minute to set up. Slide onto a plate and serve. With coffee.

Exploring grandmother's treasure trove of recipes

After my grandmother passed away in 2007, I was blessed to receive her recipes. She stored them in a large holiday tin. They are a mixed bag of every type of food from salads and casseroles to desserts.

The interesting (and fun) part of her recipes is that she very seldom took the time to write the title. Sometimes you have to finish making the recipe to discover what it is.

I was thrilled as I worked my way through the tin to recognize the handwriting of friends of hers from church and also of family members. It was like finding a treasure trove of culinary history.

The most treasured recipe for me is the one I'm going to share with you today.

How fitting it is to prepare her Carrot Cake recipe for my family for Easter.

Carrot Cake

- 1 1/4 cup salad oil (vegetable
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 cups sifted all-purpose
- 2 teaspoons baking powder • 1 teaspoons baking soda

- 1 teaspoons salt
- 4 eggs
- 3 cups grated carrots • 1 cup finely chopped pecans
- Mix the oil and sugar in a large mixing bowl using a spoon.

Sift half of the dry ingredients into the sugar mixture and blend well. Sift the remaining ingredients into the sugar mixture and mix well.

Add one egg at a time, mixing well after each addition. Add carrots and mix well and then add the pecans and stir to combine. Pour into a lightly

oiled 10-inch tube pan. Bake for one hour at 325 degrees F. Let rest in pan 10

to 15 minutes. Turn out onto

a wire cooling rack. When completely cooled, place on a serving plate and add the cream cheese glaze.

Cream Cheese Glaze

- 4 oz. cream cheese, room temperature
- ½ cup powdered sugar • 1 teaspoon vanilla extra
- 1 to 2 tablespoons milk

Add the cream cheese to a medium mixing bowl. Using an electric mixer, beat cream cheese on medium speed until creamy. Beat in powdered sugar. Stir in vanilla. Add 1 to 2 tablespoons milk and com-



A yogurt marinade is the key to juicy chicken

It is said that, given a dozen hours to do so, a yogurt marinade can tenderize chicken. Well, we don't have that kind of time, but I can tell you what a 20-minute rest in this sunny mixture does for plain old chunks of chicken breast: It coats them, act-

Spiced Chicken Skewers

2-3 servings Chicken picks up a lot of flavor in this quick yogurt-based marinade, seasoned with spices you'll find in many Persian dishes. You might have time during the prep for this recipe to soak a few bamboo skewers; if not, you'll need 4 medium-size metal skewers. I prefer using the latter, as there is no risk of stray wooden threads during the skeweredkebab dismount.

In addition to flatbread, you can serve this with rice and/or a chopped salad.

Ingredients

- ½ medium red onion
- 1 large clove garlic
- 1/4 cup Greek yogurt, preferably full fat
- 1 ½ teaspoons ground turmeric • ½ teaspoon ground cinnamon

- · Generous pinch ground cardamom (up to ½ teaspoon) • Pinch crushed red pepper flakes
- 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt, plus
- more as needed
- 1 pound boneless, skinless
- chicken breast halves • ½ to 1 whole lemon
- Warm flatbread, for serving

Steps Peel and coarsely chop the red onion and garlic. Place them both in a food processor, then add the yogurt, turmeric, cinnamon, cardamom, crushed red pepper flakes and salt. Pulse just until the onion is finely chopped, then transfer to a mixing bowl. Cut the chicken into 1 1/2-inch chunks (discarding any visible fat), seasoning them lightly with more salt. Add the chicken to the yogurt mixture and stir to coat evenly; let sit for 20 minutes at room temperature. (During this

time, you could soak bamboo skewers in a shallow pan of water if you don't have metal skewers.)

Meanwhile, cut the lemon (half or whole; to taste) into wedges approximately the same size as the chicken pieces. Position an oven rack 4 to 6 inches from the broiler element; preheat the broiler. Line a small rimmed baking sheet with aluminum foil. Thread the coated chicken pieces and lemon wedges onto the skewers so the components are just touching each other. Place the skewers on the pan; broil for about 8 minutes, turning them once with tongs halfway through. The chicken and lemon should be lightly charred in spots. Transfer to plates; pull the chicken and lemon off the skewers. Squeeze the broiled/lightly charred lemon wedges over the chicken while it's hot, and serve.

Embrace the season with these tips and recipes for a few of the season's stars

The arrival of the earliest spring produce is absolutely thrill-

ing — at least for me. But then I lead a pretty tame life. Even if seeing those first spears of asparagus and cherubic radishes doesn't send you into the same paroxysms of joy, there's still

a reason to celebrate. After a season full of heavier and more heavily sauced foods, I think it's best to keep things relatively light with spring's initial offerings. Here's some guidance for a few of the major players.

Asparagus: Nothing else says spring to me as much as a bunch of asparagus, mostly because I get really into hunting for the young, slim spears that pop up in random places around my husband's grandmother's farm.

Those come straight out of the ground to be cooked, but larger, more mature spears can have tougher bottoms. Conventional wisdom suggests snapping or cutting off the ends.

That can lead to a lot of waste, though, so consider just peeling the tougher exteriors toward the bottom.

Spring onions: No, they're not the same things as scallions or green onions. Unlike scallions, spring onions have more of a bulb at the bottom, as they're regular onions that have been

plucked out of the ground before they fully mature.

Cook's Country says scallions and spring onions can be used interchangeably in most raw uses, but their size and slightly different flavor means they won't necessarily behave the same way when cooked.

New potatoes: Like spring onions, new potatoes are harvested before they're fully grown. According to "The New Food Lover's Companion" by Sharon Tyler Herbst and Ron Herbst, "They haven't had time to convert their sugar fully into starch and consequently have a crispy, waxy texture and thin, undeveloped wispy skins." The book recommends using them within a few days of purchase.

Radishes: If you need a pop of color and something crisp and refreshing, radishes have you covered. You're probably most familiar with the widely available round, red radishes, although even more colors and shapes will start to arrive on the scene in summer. Look for firm radishes with freshlooking green leaves.

You'll want to separate the leaves and roots when you get home, or else the leaves can wilt.

Ramps: No spring specialty inspires the same kind of cultish devotion and excitement as ramps. Is it the thrill of the chase? The flavor? Whatever the answer, people can't get enough of them. Ramps are also known as wild leeks, and like other alliums, they're related to the lily.

Want to find radishes' sweet side? Fire up your ovens

Ask most people how they eat radishes, one of my favorite ingredients of the season, and I bet most of them will talk about thin raw slices: on a salad, on pizza, in a sandwich or grain bowl. Or they'll tell you about a not-so-secret French appetizer: raw radishes served with salted butter.

I love all that, for the crunch and peppery bite. But when radishes are raw, a little can go a long way. So if you're trying to dispatch a bunch or two, I recommend that you crank up the oven and roast them instead. As with so many vegetables, roasting brings out radishes' sweet side, and they

soften without getting mushy. Plus, they end up

looking like little jewels. This recipe from one of my favorite vegetarian cookbook authors, Anna Jones, includes some more

unexpected touches. Sure, there are roasted potatoes, plus a little honey and lemon. But how about something else you probably have never

roasted: French green lentils? They're already cooked when they go in the oven, where they crisp up to lend loads of texture. Fresh greens lemony sorrel if you can find it, spinach if you can't — and a quick buttermilk dressing make this dish as bright and brilliant as the first few weeks of spring.

Roasted Radishes with Crispy Lentils and Buttermilk

4 servings

INGREDIENTS

- 1 ½ cups dried French green lentils (du Puy; may substitute black beluga lentils), picked over and rinsed
- 4 cups water
- 1 pound radishes (no
- greens), trimmed • 1 pound new potatoes,
- scrubbed
- 2 tablespoons extravirgin olive oil
- 1 tablespoon finely grated lemon zest and 3 tablespoons juice (from 1 large lemon)
- 1 tablespoon honey (may substitute agave nectar)
- 3/4 teaspoon kosher salt,
- or more as needed
- 1/4 cup buttermilk (may substitute thin plain yogurt)
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 2 cups lightly packed

sorrel or spinach leaves

DIRECTIONS

Preheat the oven to 425

Combine the lentils and water in a saucepan over medium-high heat. Bring to a boil, reduce the heat until the liquid is gently bubbling and cook until the lentils are barely tender, 20 to 25 minutes. If you're cooking the lentils in advance, reserve the cooking liquid for storage. When ready to use, drain the lentils, spread them out on a clean dish towel and pat them dry.

Cut the radishes and potatoes into halves. if small, or quarters, if larger (to get them roughly the same size). Toss them on a large, rimmed baking sheet with 1 tablespoon of the oil, half the lemon juice, the honey and $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon of the salt. Roast for 15 minutes, shaking the pan once or twice to move them around.

While the radish mixture is roasting, on a separate baking sheet, mix the cooked lentils with another 1/4 teaspoon of the salt, 1 teaspoon of the oil and all the lemon zest.

Transfer the sheet to the oven with the radish mixture, and cook both until the lentils are crisped and starting to blister in places, and the radishes and potatoes are soft and starting to brown at the edges, 15 minutes.

Meanwhile, whisk together the buttermilk, the remaining lemon juice and the remaining 2 teaspoons of oil in a liquid measuring cup. Season with the remaining 1/4 teaspoon of the salt and the pepper. Taste, and add more salt as needed.

Toss the lentil, potato and radish mixture with the sorrel or spinach leaves on a large platter. Drizzle the buttermilk dressing over the top, and serve warm.

After complaints, Milk Bar renames its famous Crack Pie

The recipe will remain the same. But the name of Milk Bar's signature dessert is getting a change that some critics say is long overdue.

Crack Pie – the trademarked name for the chain's buttery, sugary pie - will now become Milk Bar Pie.

The name was a reference to crack cocaine - the gag being that the pie was just as addictive as the drug.

But an increasing chorus of critics

have pointed out that the name makes light of a serious drug epidemic, and one that had an outsize impact on the African American community.

The callousness with which people throw around the word "crack" isn't the same with other drugs.

We don't call any desserts "opioid pie," even though those drugs, which claim predominantly white lives, are highly addictive, too.

Last month, the Boston Globe's Devra First called out chef

Christina Tosi's use of the word in an essay titled "There's nothing cute about crack pie."

"It is a moment to pay attention to the way we talk about food, to stop speaking lightly about addiction and equating it with deliciousness," she wrote.

San Francisco Chronicle food critic Soleil Ho put the word on her list of "Words you'll never see me use in restaurant reviews," writing, "No matter how delicious something might be, its effect on me is nothing close to what

crack does to people and their families." Ho also pledged not to use the term "addictive" in her writing.

In a statement on Milk Bar's website, Tosi didn't reference the reason for the term's criticism, which irritated some critics.

"Our mission, after all, is to spread joy and inspire celebration. The name Crack Pie falls short of this mission," Tosi wrote in a note to her team.

She wrote that the old name was "getting in the way of letting

the gooey, buttery slice bring happiness — my only goal in creating the thing in the first place."

Other restaurants that use the term "crack" have begun to abandon it, as well.

The gastropub chain HopCat renamed its "crack fries" in December.

"While the name Crack Fries was intended to be tonguein-cheek, drug addiction is not a joke," Mark Gray, CEO of BarFly Ventures, Hop-Cat's parent company, said in a YouTube


video and blog post. "The drug crack

has devastated many of the communities that we serve." The old name still

has a few defenders on Twitter, but many people are applauding the change. Tosi's statement

said the new name will roll out in Milk Bar's 16 bakeries in the United States and Canada in the coming weeks.

A search for crack pie already redirects to Milk Bar Pie when you click on the official Milk Bar site.
