With storm season nearing, now's the time to start preparing

As Florida springs forward and gets closer to the summer season, hurricane and tropical storm preparedness should always be a top priority. The official season starts June 1, and with the events of Hurricane Irma still in many Levy County residents' rearview mirror, here are some facts and tips to assure that you are prepared for the upcoming season.

The Levy County Emergency Management Operations (EOC) wants to

will assure residents that there have been no major cuts to funding and regardless of funding, search and rescue missions will still be a top priority among first-responders following a natural disaster. Assistant Director of Emergency

will figure out a way to do it".

It is important to stress that the EOC has not, and will not send first-responders during the storm event, only after the storm has passed to ensure the safety of its rescuers.

"After the storm, we will still be conducting all the standard search and rescue issues: police, fire, EMT, all of that will stay the same. That is top priority," Peaton said. Search and rescue missions always, including past hurricane seasons, are enacted after the storm has passed and it is deemed safe for first-responders. "We will definitely conduct all of our search

APRIL 2: Hear what you want in the city

"You've done all the hard work. Now come and listen to the strategy developed based upon your input. Share your comments and thoughts to finalize the strategy."

That's the opening on a flyer distributed this week by Megrath Consulting as the firm winds down into the closing weeks of the city of Williston's comprehensive plan, mandated by the state of Florida.

Participants are encouraged to come to the MP building on the campus of the old Williston High School Monday, April 2 from 5-7 p.m. to hear what's been said.

The plan is a tool to help guide city leaders to make decisions about growth, infrastructure improvements, land use changes and other facets dealing directly with Williston.

Ordinance bans pot dispensaries

The Levy County Commission on March 20 adopted an ordinance banning medical marijuana dispensaries in unincorporated areas while treating its growing and cultivation like other nurseries.

The unanimous passing of the ordinance, based on a motion from Mike Joyner and a second from Matt Brooks, came after the second of two public hearings on the matter held at the courthouse in March.

The ordinance is consistent with the board's earlier proposal, based on one of the recommended options from county attorney Anne Bast Brown. In seeking guidance for the ordinance from the board, Brown noted that the state's current direction on the issue provided legal buffering for the banning of dispensaries, but that the county could be at a severe

legal disadvantage if it discriminated against medical marijuana nurseries.

The ordinance, which replaces the moratorium on medical marijuana, treats growers and cultivators of medicinal marijuana like any other agricultural industry, subject to zoning and land-use regulations.

Medical marijuana businesses are currently limited by vertical integration requirements that demand the same company grow, cultivate and sell its product.

Although dispensaries are banned, Levy residents with a proper referral can already



order medical marijuana products through the mail to be delivered from outside the county. The smoking of marijuana is still banned statewide, as medical marijuana in Florida constitutes pills and oils and other non-smoke forms.

Florida voters overwhelmingly approved by more than 71 percent a state constitutional amendment in November 2016 expanding the legalization of medical marijuana, which was previously limited to those who were terminally ill.

The board previously expressed regrets over the legal position they were in on the matter, lamenting potential negative side effects and slippery slope scenarios, but the commissioners wished to avoid costly and unwinnable lawsuits.

Gas prices continue to climb

Average retail gasoline prices in Florida have risen 2.1 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.53/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 8,237 gas outlets in Florida. This compares with the national average that has increased 4.7 cents per gallon in the last week to \$2.60/g, according to gasoline price website GasBuddy.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Florida during the past week, prices yesterday were 25.2 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 1.9 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has increased 9.2 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 32.3 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

According to GasBuddy historical data, gasoline prices on March 26 in Florida have ranged widely over the last five years: \$2.28/g in 2017, \$2.06/g in 2016, \$2.42/g in 2015, \$3.57/g in 2014 and \$3.67/g in 2013.

The Williston Pioneer will be closed March 30 in observance of Good Friday.

Red Devils roll in Chiefland

The Williston baseball team entered spring break with a head of steam, winning seven straight, capped by a 14-4 rout at Chiefland March 22.

The Red Devils, led by former Williston skipper Jim Smith, improved to 9-2 overall and completed their regular season sweep of CMHS with the win. The club next plays at Bronson April 3.

The Red Devils, who've yet to lose to a school below Class 6A, collected 13 hits and tallied at least two runs in all but one inning against the Indians.

Senior right-hander C.J. Strange held Chiefland hitless in three innings of work, as he fanned two batters and walked a pair in earning the win on the mound.

Matthew Webb led the Red Devils at the plate, going 4 for 5 with a pair doubles, three runs scored, two steals, a couple of RBI and a walk. Chandler Neal was 2 for 4 with a triple, five runs, four RBI and five stolen bases for Williston. Grayson Geiger also had a triple for WMHS.

Christian Rey, who boasts a team-high 18 RBI and a .419 batting average, picked up the save on the bump, allowing one hit and striking out four in two innings of relief. The slugging duo of Webb and Rey had a combined 10 extra-base hits heading into the break.

Senior Seth Thomas scored twice for Chiefland, and Keegan McLelland (2 for 4) drove in a pair of runs on a double in the fifth. Five different Indians saw action on the mound. CMHS fell to 4-5 overall.

The CMHS Interact Club teamed up with the Indians' baseball program to host Veterans Night. Veterans in attendance from Chiefland, Williston and Bell, which was facing the Lady Indians in softball that night, were honored on the field before the game for their service.

Tariffs on paper will hurt newspapers and our readers

You have read about the new tariffs on imported aluminum and steel, and on products from China. Now it seems our own business — newspaper printing and publishing — will take some casualties in a trade war over paper.

This month, the U.S. government piled huge tariffs onto the imports of newsprint from Canada, including those from our biggest supplier. As a result, the price will jump from \$600 to \$800 for every ton, and we use about 17,000 tons every year.

That increase is more than 30 percent, and would add more than \$3 million to the Tampa Bay Times' annual newsprint bill.

You can multiply our example across the American newspaper industry, which is already facing strong headwinds. Historically, advertising provided the lion's share of newspaper revenue, but in just 10 years, the recession and other market forces have cut those ad revenues by more than half.

Newspapers remain vital civic assets — nobody else will report on your community with the depth and breadth of a newspaper — but publishing them is not an easy business, and these tariffs will make it even harder. This is a kick in the teeth.

These tariffs will hurt our readers, because they create pressure to raise our prices, and they will force publishers to re-examine every other expense. Maybe we will drop some puzzles and comics — no big deal, unless we cut one that is your favorite.

These tariffs will also hurt our employees, because payroll is the only expense that is bigger than newsprint. To help offset the extra expense of paper, publishers will eliminate jobs. Make no mistake: These tariffs will cause layoffs across American newspapers, including this one.

These tariffs started with a single American newsprint manufacturer who complained that Canadian companies were "dumping" their product in the U.S. at below-market prices. In the current political climate, that complaint found a friendly ear in Washington.


Other American manufacturers opposed these tariffs because they know they will damage newspapers and reduce the demand for newsprint. But now that the tariffs are taking effect, the American companies are hiking their own prices, so we have little room to shop around.

Just about every American newspaper and all our trade associations are joining the fight to challenge these tariffs, but even if we succeed, it will take months to reverse this terrible decision. Meanwhile, prices will go up. Jobs will be lost. Important stories will go uncovered.

If you believe that newspapers do essential work, we would be grateful for your support. Please let your members of Congress and senators know that these reckless tariffs must be repealed — not just because they hurt newspapers, but because they will damage the customers and communities we serve.

Thank you for hearing us out.

Bob At The Movies

Pacific Rim Uprising

2013's "Pacific Rim" was a movie about giant robots called Jaegers that fought giant city-leveling monsters called Kaiju. Yes, the story was officially about the human pilots of the Jaegers and their quest to save the world, but the appeal of these movies has always been giant robots at war with giant monsters.

Now comes "Pacific Rim: Uprising," a sequel where the Jaegers fight both Kaiju and other Jaegers, so... its existence is justified?

John Boyega stars as Jake Pentecost, the son of Idris Elba's character from the original. He's an incredibly gifted Jaeger pilot (a Jaeger master, if you will), but he had a falling out with his father and the military, and now he no longer applies himself, using his advanced Jaeger knowledge only to steal old parts to sell on the black market.

A botched heist leads to him and an aspiring Jaeger pilot named Amara (Cailee Spaeny) fending off authorities for a short time in a makeshift Jaeger before getting arrested. Luckily Jake's adopted sister Mako (Rinko Kikuchi, returning from the first film) can get them off the hook if they join the military, with Jake as an instructor and Amara as a cadet.

Jake resents the military because everyone expects him to live up to his father's legacy, and because he has to work alongside former partner Nate (Scott Eastwood) after the two had a falling out over a girlfriend (Adria Arjona).

The upside is that he might not have to be there very long. A corporation run by the shadowy Shao (Jing Tian) is building an army of drone Jaegers that could make human-operated machines a thing of the past. It seems as though Shao has finally figured out that robots so huge that they have to be operated by two pilots simultaneously might not be the most dependable defense system.

Comic relief scientist Dr. Geiszler (Charlie Day) now works for Shao while former partner Dr. Gottlieb (Burn Gorman) works for the military. The two are shaken up following a mind-meld with Kaiju in the original movie, though Geiszler is coping much better than Gottlieb. The drones turn on humanity, leading Jake to lead the cadets in saving the world from both the drones and the returning Kaiju.

The film at least makes the right decision in having Boyega be the lead. He's funny, inspiring, and charming with a great accent. The rest of the cast is not so great. Eastwood continues his

streak of being a bland bohunk, Arjona has no character besides giving Jake and Nate a reason to fight, and Spaeny pales in comparison to similar recent characters in "Logan," "War for the Planet of the Apes," and even "Transformers: The Last Knight". This is a franchise that wants to be a better version of "Transformers", so it can't afford to fall behind its reviled rival in any

respect. Day and especially Gorman pull their weight as the scientists, though the film wastes what could have been a great third act for Day's character.

Watching "Pacific Rim: Uprising", I saw very little reason for the movie to exist. We have plenty of giant robot movies already, and having jaegers fight other jaegers doesn't exactly do much to up the ante. Only three characters from the first movie are back, were people really clamoring to see the continuation of their

stories?

The only thing that makes the movie somewhat relevant is that the original was directed by Guillermo del Toro, who here serves as a producer. Del Toro just won an Oscar for "The Shape of Water", so he's a hot commodity right now. Very little of his imagination is on display here, though I did come up with some "Shape of Water"-inspired off-color jokes about a character and their kaiju roommate. I can't say that I recommend this movie for del

Toro fans, action movie fans, or even original "Pacific Rim" fans. The best I can say is that I recommend it for John Boyega fans.

Grade: C-

"Pacific Rim: Uprising" is rated PG-13 for sequences of sci-fi violence and action, and some language. Its running time is 111 minutes.



and rescue and we wouldn't stop know that everyone is safe," Peaton said.

The EOC also wants to stress the importance of enrolling in the Alert Levy Emergency Notification System. To enroll in this system, you can access it by visiting its website at www.levy-disaster.com. This notification service will provide you with information during and after a storm via home phone, cell phone, text message or email. Conveniently, you can also enroll by texting "ALERTLEVY" to 888777 for SMS alerts.

The EOC website also provides information to the nearest available shelter and its occupancy. Peaton also recommends following the Levy County Emergency Management's Facebook page at www.facebook.com/lcdem for the most up-to-date coverage.

In the event that you decide to "hunker-down" in the event of a storm, Peaton recommends that you have an Emergency Disaster Kit. These items include essentials such as water, food, medication/first-aid, and toiletries that can sustain you and your family for at least 72 hours. More information can be found on www.floridadisaster.org.

For weather updates, Peaton recommends residents to visit www.levy-weather.com. "People can view the weather in their area with the closest weather station, we have five weather stations situated around Levy County," Peaton said, stating that these stations are, "owned and

operated by the county service".

Peaton also wants to assure the public to call the EOC if they have any and all questions pertaining to hurricane season preparedness and other emergency services at (352) 486-5219, or by emailing them via questions@levydisaster.com.

"Please listen to your local officials in

times of disaster," Peaton said, "There are so many rumors that fly around, during and after a storm, especially when it comes to FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency). It is always best to contact a government official instead of listening to information that you receive third-hand."
