Voter precincts change

Voters in Precincts 7 and 2 need to be aware of changes in location to cast ballots in this year's elections.

Supervisor of Elections Tammy Jones asked for the changes and the Levy County Commission approved the relocations.

Jones said construction of the Williston City Hall has prompted the move of Precinct 7 to the GFWC Williston Woman's Club House on State Route 121, or 1049 NE 6th Blvd.

The Precinct 2 polling place will move from Faith Baptist Tabernacle to 3231 NE 167 Court or County Road 335A. The new location is county owned land and has a small polling building.

Jones said new voter information cards will be mailed to voters in those precincts and there will be a publicity campaign.

Boaters brave Wild Hog Canoe Race

The extremely low water level in the Waccasassa River made last year's Wild Hog Canoe Race, its 40th anniversary, a tough slog for canoers and kayakers.

The water was up for this year's event, held April 28, making for a smoother ride.

But it's never easy, as the 107 boaters who participated this year can attest.

One of the early finishers was lamenting the spider web he passed through as he swatted away one of those spiders from his head after arriving on the banks.

The charity ride, which starts at the Waccasassa Bridge along Highway 24 and leads to the event site just north of Gulf Hammock along U.S. 19, is 15 miles and generally takes at least two hours for the full distance. Riders can go solo or as duos, and there are divisions that categorize participants by their ability, experience, age and boat type.

The boaters face a handful of obstacles along the way, including a couple of logs toward the finish that require competitors to submerge their bodies



Teacher strikes: 'Blowin' in the Wind'

Teachers in West Virginia have returned to the classroom after a nine-day wage strike. Teachers in Oklahoma staged a walkout earlier this month. At this writing, teacher walkouts in Arizona and Colorado are planned for the next few days. There's a sense that these public employees have been dissatisfied for some time now. Why these protests are coalescing simultaneously is anyone's guess. Perhaps it's, thank you Robert Zimmerman, "Blowin' in the Wind."

Oklahoma's minimum teacher salary starts at \$31,600 and can range up to \$46,000. Granted, it costs far less to live in rural Oklahoma than in New York, a state whose teachers are compensated better than any other. So, some argue that teachers in states like Oklahoma should be paid far less. But \$31,000, even in Oklahoma, doesn't afford a lavish lifestyle.

How much should we pay those who educate our young people? If we really care about the quality of education our kids are receiving, should we demonstrate that concern by reallocating funds in state budget sessions?

Many people say, "What's in it for me? I don't have kids," or, "My kids are grown. Why do I care about teacher salaries and school funding?" And it's an understandable stance. But here's a thought: even if we don't currently have children in school, we can all appreciate living in better communities. A better educated population saves us money. It's a good economic decision. Investing in teacher salaries and schools means less unemployment, less crime, more productive taxpayers, more educated decisions being made about health care choices. These are all issues which end up costing us taxpayers a huge amount of money.

So is increasing teacher pay the only answer? No, of course not. Education, like all industries, faces a myriad of challenges beyond compensation. Difficult, complicated issues hound our educational institutions at every level. But one wonders what caliber of instructor could be recruited if starting salaries approached, say, \$75,000 a year? How would our young people be impacted? In what ways would it reshape our culture?

In many countries, teachers are widely respected, and it is understood that their calling is an indispensable and valuable one. Here, we ask quite a lot of our teachers, including serving as bullet proof warriors and oftentimes funding their own materials when school supplies aren't available, but we don't compensate them particularly well. As an investment advisor, I work with educators, and I haven't met one who didn't come out of his or her own pocket countless times to buy needed educational supplies or for students.

Paying teachers more is like funding public libraries. They don't normally turn a profit. But who wants to live in a community without one?

The villain's visage first appeared midway through the credits of the superteam's first adventure back in 2012.

Pushing Up Daisies

One of my daughters telephoned me the other day and asked how she might help a friend of hers. Not long ago, my daughter's friend miscarried her baby. Naturally, her friend is experiencing associated grief and motherly anguish. As the daughter of a Funeral Director and Grief Counselor, my daughter understands quite well the trials her friend will experience. What she did not understand was how to protect her friend from well-intentioned ignorant people.

Because social illiteracy is rampant in death's theatre, well-intentioned individuals often offer poor advice or utter words that increase suffering rather than comfort the bereaved. Obviously, no one wants to increase a survivor's anguish, therefore, it benefits everyone to demystify proper sympathy expressions. Unfortunately, one does not generally realize they are committing a faux pas until it is too late. It is for these reasons that I offer this list of "Not the Best Things to Say to Survivors vs. Better Expressions of Sympathy." I am also adding a short list of Kind and Thoughtful Gestures, for good measure. It is my hope that condolers, especially those surrounding my daughter's recently bereaved friend, will be able to apply these lists to be able to more comfortably, and better express, their sympathies in the future.

NOT THE BEST THINGS TO SAY TO SURVIVORS

- Get over it.
- It's time to move on.
- It's been long enough.
- He/she wouldn't want you to cry.
- Why are you still crying over this?
- You need to get rid of his or her things.
- You need to put this behind you.
- It just wasn't meant to be.
- You must be strong.
- You are still young, you can always remarry.
- Heaven needed another angel.
- God needed (or wanted) him/her more than you did.
- God never gives you more than you can handle.
- Everything happens for a reason.
- It's in God's hands.
- I thought you'd be more upset.
- At least you never knew the baby.
- Time heals all wounds, or, it gets better over time.
- He/She is in a better place.
- At least he/she isn't suffering any

longer.

- You still have the other twin.
- It will be okay.
- I know how you feel.
- You do have other children.
- This too shall pass.

The above statements are not helpful as they are judgmental and belittle the gravity of the survivor's pain. They also demonstrate a complete lack of understanding and/or caring.

BETTER EXPRESSIONS OF SYMPATHY

- I don't know how you feel, but I love and care for you, and I am here to help you in any way that I can.
- I am sorry for your loss. (Rather impersonal, but when you are near tears yourself, sometimes, it's all you can utter.)
- I don't know what to say. I'm sorry (insert the decedent's name) is gone. He/She was a good neighbor, great friend, valued employee, trusted co-worker (insert the appropriate title or description). I will miss him/her.
- I wish I had the right words. Just know that I care.
- I'm sorry you have to go through this. or I'm sorry this has happened.
- You are in my thoughts and prayers.

These responses are better because they do not tell the mourner how to feel or act. They simply recognize their loss and state that you care.

KIND AND THOUGHTFUL GESTURES

- Would it be okay for me to bring dinner over next Friday?
- You know, we box at the same post office. Would it be OK if I brought your mail to you for the next two weeks?
- I am looking for a project to teach my grandson the value of service. Would you mind terribly if he and I mow and weed your lawn for the next two months?
- Or in colder climates... Would you mind terribly if he and I shovel your snow this winter?
- I'm taking my car in for an oil change next Wednesday, I'm wondering if I might take yours as well?
- Would it be OK for me to call you occasionally, just to chat, or maybe we could go out for coffee?
- I heard you are going to take two weeks and visit your daughter in Kentucky. I'd be happy to watch your home while you're gone.

These gestures are wonderful because they offer assistance to the bereaved when they are in a state of confusion and in great need of assistance. They also do not judge or insinuate incompetence.

To condole is to express your genuine feelings of sorrow to the bereaved. Your goal is to comfort and give useful assistance to them; not advice.


looks like, after these many years, I would have perfected the art of killing a tom. But, I can take you to where two gobblers roost.

Gas prices constant for a week

Average retail gasoline prices in Florida have not moved in the past week, averaging \$2.72/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 8,237 gas outlets in Florida. This compares with the national average that has increased 4.3 cents per gallon in the last week to \$2.81/g, according to gasoline price website GasBuddy.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Florida during the past week, prices yesterday were 32.0 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 9.7 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has increased 15.2 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 42.9 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

According to GasBuddy historical data, gasoline prices on April 30 in Florida have ranged widely over the last five years:

\$2.40/g in 2017, \$2.20/g in 2016, \$2.57/g in 2015, \$3.72/g in 2014 and \$3.43/g in 2013.

Areas near Florida and their current gas price climate:

Sarasota- \$2.67/g, down 1.2 cents per gallon from last week's \$2.68/g.

Tampa- \$2.65/g, down 3.4 cents per gallon from last week's \$2.68/g.

Cape Coral- \$2.68/g, down 1.8 cents per gallon from last week's \$2.69/g.

"The national average is now at its highest point since November 2014 with average gas prices advancing in nearly every state," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "The only good news for motorists? We're nearing a turning point in the U.S.- gas prices are perhaps just a dime away from hitting a peak for the short-term, pending OPEC's meeting in June. With refineries well positioned for the summer months, we look for some relief by mid-June, but do expect this summer to remain one of the priciest in the last few as average prices climb close to the psychological \$3 per gallon barrier."



in the water and lift their boat over the wood.

"I did all right until those two poles over there (toward the finish)," said Steve, a kayaker from the senior division. The 65-year-old said this was his third time competing, and first time in about 30 years. This was his first solo trip.

"We were down here a few weeks ago and saw the sign, and my friend was out of town, so I thought I'd do it myself," Steve said. "I understand some of these guys are pretty competitive. I'm not thinking of breaking any records."

The event was as busy and festive as ever, as

many like to attend without entering a boat in competition. There are horse rides, a mechanical bull, a zipline, inflatable playhouses, vendors, musical entertainment from the Orange Blossom Ramblers, and, of course, plenty of food.

"I think we had the largest bank crowd ever," said Keith Maynard, president of the WHCR. "We were super happy and super humbled by all the people that were there."

"The water level was almost perfect this year. It made for a lot faster race."

Braden Schopke, a UF student who shared a canoe with fellow student Jordan Thorp, concurred. "The water was significantly higher this

year which made it much easier."

Schopke, who was competing for the second time, and Thorp, who was making her debut in the Wild Hog, finished fourth in the mixed class.

"I really tried not to have expectations," Thorp said. "If I thought about everything that's been in this water, I wasn't going to do it."

Larry Murph and Annette Ray, a senior canoe duo in their fourth year of racing the event, enjoyed their outing, noting the unique character of each race.

"It was easier than last year for sure, more water in the river," Ray said. "You didn't hit the rapids. You still had to get out and go over trees,

but the water made it easier. It changes every year."

While the number of riders dropped some from last year's record tally of 133, Maynard expects the total funds raised to be roughly similar to last year, which also set a new record at \$21,000.

The funds go to the Levy ARC, a work center in Otter Creek which serves adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Maynard's organization also depends significantly on donations and various yard sales throughout the year.

to move the movie along), but he feels bad about it. Funny that he cares so much about population control in the most overcrowded superhero movie in history.

The humor and action are exactly on par with what you'd expect from one of these movies.

Egos clash over whose powers and plans are superior to others, and there's much teasing among the new teammates.

As with most Marvel villains, Thanos has an army of indistinguishable creeps at his disposal so the heroes can take turns showing off their powers fighting them, though he himself can

fight them all off rather easily.

This movie really hopes you like the gag where a stooge is seconds away from a kill only to be suddenly stabbed from behind and then fall away to reveal an unlikely rescuer, because it's done multiple times here.

"Avengers: Infinity War" moves along a predictable path until it gets to an ending I didn't predict.

I knew the franchise had been sauntering toward a showdown with Thanos, I just didn't know how many movies that showdown would encompass. Turns out it's more than one, which means the conclusion to this installment is unsatisfying.

I don't necessarily dis-

approve of the unsatisfying conclusion, not every superhero movie needs to end with things wrapped up in a neat little package with just a hint of an upcoming conflict.

There's another Avengers movie scheduled for 2019, so I'll have to wait until then to see if the MCU is willing to let things be right in the world again.
