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Council will delve further into fire assessments

A presentation Tuesday night by a company that helps government entities determine how to develop special assessments left Williston City Council members with more questions than they felt could be answered during a regular meeting.

Jeff Rackley of Government Services Group (GSG) spoke at length how his firm can walk Williston through the process to determine its own fire assessment after Fire Chief Lamar Stegall asked the council to consider it last month.

Currently the fire department is funded through the city's budget from ad valorem taxes and through a special assessment paid by property owners in the unincorporated areas serviced by the Williston Fire Department.

Should the council opt to levy its own assessment, it would no longer include the fire department in its general budget. Stegall said May 8 this could affect the city's millage rate.

The easiest way to collect an assessment, Rackley said, is as part of the tax collection process, although the city could send its own separate bills or add it to its current utility bills.

Using the ad valorem tax collection process, he said, 95-98 percent of the assessments could be collected, compared to only 70-90 percent if a separate bill is used.

If the assessment is added to the utility bill, there's always the chance of missing vacant or unoccupied property, Rackley added.

As the discussion continued, council members learned that it takes several months to enact an assessment to be collected on the ad valorem tax bill, and it would be 2019 before it could be done.

He said the city could choose to do the separate billing by the end of 2018 and then merge over into the tax collection phase next year.

However, as he talked more questions arose, including fees associated with the process.

GSG's fee could be upward of \$20,000, Rackley said and City Attorney Fred Koberlein asked the council to remember the legal fees that will be associated with contracts, ordinances and advertising – perhaps as much as \$10,000. GSG could also con-

Child murder suspect found in Bronson

Just after 8:30 p.m. on June 3, the Alachua County Sheriff's Office received a report from the Hall County Sheriff's Office in Georgia, stating the suspect involved in the murder of a 6-month-old child was in Alachua County. That suspect, Carlton James "CJ" Mathis, 28, also had a felony warrant from Georgia on unrelated burglary charges.

Unable to locate Mathis at the location provided in Alachua County, ACSO deputies continued to investigate and learned Mathis may be in the Bronson area. The Alachua County Sheriff's Office SWAT team joined the Levy County Sheriff's Office in locating the suspect in Bronson.

Just before 4:30 a.m. on June 4, Mathis was seen leaving a residence and getting into a red sport utility vehicle at Bronson Villas & Villages.

As SWAT personnel stopped the vehicle, Mathis threatened the driver of the vehicle with a handgun, forcing a

SWAT operator to shoot Mathis. Additional SWAT personnel immediately treated Mathis for his wounds and he was transported to an area hospital; a second occupant of the vehicle and another SWAT operator received minor injuries from glass and/or shrapnel.

As events unfolded, the Dothan Police Department in Alabama served a search warrant in their city and located what are believed to be the remains of the child that prompted the search for Mathis.

Following his release from the hospital, Mathis was booked in the Levy County Jail on charges of aggravated assault, held for his warrant in Georgia, as well as the outcome of the homicide investigation.

As required by policy, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement is conducting the investigation of the shooting incident. The SWAT operator involved is on administrative leave at this time.

In addition, all voters will be mailed a personalized sample ballot prior to the start of Early Voting for both the Primary and General Elections, which will include the voter's polling place information.



My husband and I fell into this conversation during a recent holiday respite. While both of us wish we could have avoided some mistakes and missteps and make better use of our time, neither of us said "Yes, I'd like to go back and relive most of my life."

Adrift

"Adrift" is two movies in one – a mushy romance and a harrowing high-seas adventure tale.

I guess it's like "Titanic" minus the large scale, \$165 million from the budget, and about \$550 million from its domestic gross (a generous projection based on its \$11 million opening weekend).

The film is opening on the weekend following "Solo", and even though that film is performing far below expectations, it's easy to see why many films wanted to avoid the slot.

Tami goes below deck, where she's tossed around the cabin and knocked out for over 24 hours. When she awakens, there's no sign of Richard. Tami fears the worst, but her fiancé soon appears clinging to an overturned dinghy.

With very little understanding of how to steer the damaged vessel, Tami manages to make it over to Richard and pull him onboard. His ribs are cracked and his leg is shattered, but he's alive, sort of.

Unfortunately, he can't be of much help. It's up to Tami to get both of them out of this situation, despite being the less knowledgeable of the two when it comes to seafaring. Through determination and a resolve she didn't know she had, Tami eventually manages to save 100 percent of the people on the boat.

The film bounces between Tami and Richard's relationship and the peril following the hurricane. It's a nice balance – rough scene, sweet scene, rough scene, sweet scene. It's a good idea to structure the movie this way because neither the romance nor the stranded-at-sea sto-

Solomon understood this better than anyone when he wrote, "All the days of the afflicted are evil; but he that is of a merry heart hath a continual feast" (Proverbs 15:15). And, "A merry heart doeth good like a medicine: but a broken spirit drieth the bones" (Proverbs 17:22).

If I were a doctor, this would be my prescription. Laugh three times, and then call me in the morning with a new joke.
