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Williston Pre-4th is Tuesday

The city of Williston will again lead off the Independence Day festivities with its annual July 3 parade down Noble Avenue.

Floats and marching units will mark the nation's birthday with a parade at 5 p.m.

After the parade, the action moves to Williston's Horseman's Park for an evening of free entertainment and fellowship.

In addition to rides, activities and vendors, there will be watermelon giveaways. At dark the skies will light up with a fireworks show. Horseman's Park is three miles south of Williston off U.S. Highway 41 at 803 S.W. 19th St.

The fun doesn't stop on Tuesday.

Wednesday, July 4 Cedar Key will hold its annual Independence Day celebration, culminating with the "best small city fireworks display" over the water.

The day of festivities kicks off with the Fourth of July Parade of Golf Carts at noon.

Spectators can watch the fireworks from Dock Street or City Park – or pretty much anywhere on the island – starting at 9:15 p.m.

Bronson will also host a fireworks show Wednesday in the Park at 20 Picnic St. The setup will begin around 7 p.m., with fireworks expected to launch shortly after dark. Signage will be in place to inform attendees where they can park and watch the fireworks.


AARP, CEE to host forum July 28

Gov. Rick Scott speaks to Levy GOP

The highest-profile guest speaker in the history of the Levy County Republican Executive Committee's annual Lincoln-Reagan Memorial Dinner guaranteed its largest ever turnout.

Gov. Rick Scott joined Republican Party officials, supporters, office holders and candidates representing Levy County and the area June 23 at Bronson Middle High School as the headline speaker for the banquet.

Scott, who is leaving the governorship due to term limits, is the overwhelming favorite to be the Republican opponent to incumbent Bill Nelson in the U.S. Senate race this fall.

At the dinner, the two-term Florida governor touted his record on the economy, education and the state budget, and outlined a few proposals from his senatorial campaign. Scott lamented the lack of cooperation in congress, arguing the federal government would be more effective if it emulated the more collaborative tendencies of state and local government.

"How do we improve the way D.C. works?" Scott asked rhetorically. "It's way too partisan up there. You should expect your government to work together."

"I'm running for senate because, I believe, even though we've had a lot of success here, there are a lot of things we ought to be doing at the federal level, and it's hard to get things done."

County candidates set for August elections

Voters of all affiliations will have say in decisive primaries

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A pair of Levy County Commission races and a School Board race highlight the county election season, which could be completely determined by the end of the primary on Aug. 30.

The qualifying deadline for county-wide offices was June 22.

The two County Commission seats both feature a pair of Republicans squaring off, so the races will be decided in the primary, which will be open to voters of all affiliations.

School Board races are nonpartisan and appear on the primary ballot. If there are at least two candidates, the top two vote-getters in the primary will appear on the general election ballot unless a candidate receives a majority of the total vote, in which case she is declared the winner.

Vying for the open School Board seat – District 5, also known as the Yankeetown seat – are Gary Bennett, of Morriston, and Ashley Breeden Clemenzi, of

Williston. The seat is currently held by Rick Turner, who is not running for reelection. School Board members serve four-year terms.

County Commission District 2 (Chiefland) will see a race between



incumbent Rock Meeks and challenger Terance Reed, both of Chiefland. Meeks, as of June 25, had raised \$4,950 in campaign contributions, while Reed had garnered \$2,850.

The County's District 4 (Cedar Key) election features incumbent Lilly Rooks, of Cedar Key, and challenger Ryan Bell, of Chiefland. Rooks had received \$5,200 in contributions by June 26, and Bell

received \$700.

Unopposed county-wide qualifying candidates include: County Judge Tim Browning, School Board District 1 member Cameron Asbell and School Board District 3 member Brad Etheridge, as well as the five members of the Soil and Water Conservation Board – Thomas Harper, David Benton, Wilbur Dean, Joshua Berry and Jacob Sache.

In state partisan races and federal races, voters must belong to a party to vote in its primary election. Florida will see a couple of high-profile races in the fall, including for U.S. Senate, where unopposed incumbent Bill Nelson figures to face Gov. Rick Scott, the favorite on the Republican side.

With the departure of Scott at Governor due to term limits, 20 candidates have qualified to run as his successor. There are seven candidates qualified for agriculture commissioner, and five more vying for the Office of the Attorney General, where Pam Bondi is departing.

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Be storm ready by shopping now

Now that Hurricane Season is here, it is more important than ever to make sure that you have a fully stocked disaster supply kit. Sometimes, this can be easier said than done. We all know that we live in a time where money can be tight, and it may be a little hard to go out and buy everything you need for your disaster supply kit in one trip. Food Groups for Shopping Guide

Meat Group Items – Canned tuna, chicken/turkey, or meat, soup with beans or meat, sardines, chili with meat or beans, ravioli/spaghetti, ham/pork, stew, Vienna Sausage, peanut butter,

commercially prepared beef or turkey jerky.

Milk Group Items – Powdered milk (will need extra water), canned and boxed pudding (from the store shelves not the refrigerator section, nutritional drinks (e.g. Ensure or

Pediasure).

Vegetable Group Items – Canned vegetables, soups of all types, canned 3 bean salads.

Fruit Group Items – Canned fruit of all types, dried fruits (raisins, dates, apricots, etc.), and 100% fruit

juice

Comfort Foods – Quick energy snacks such as trail mix, granola and fruit bars, cookies, hard candy, lollipops, instant coffee, tea bags.

Scott discussed parts of his own biography, including growing up in poverty in a single-parent household. The Governor's proposals included term limits for members of congress, a line-item veto for the President, and a requirement of a two-thirds majority to raise taxes – a proposal that Florida voters will see on the ballot this fall among the constitutional amendment proposals.

Scott said the growth in population in the state and elsewhere should allow for a more dispersed tax base, allowing government to collect as much or more revenue without raising taxes. He said the line-item veto he possessed as governor helped make the state's budget more efficient, a result he'd like to see at the federal level.

"There's no reason all the things we all believe in can't be done," he told his fellow Republicans before leaving the stage.

Scott was introduced by Levy County Sheriff Bobby McCallum, who applauded the

Governor's support for sheriffs as well as his availability and counsel in the wake of the recent deaths of the Gilchrist County deputies and the 2016 death of Chiefland Mayor Teal Pomeroy.

Rep. Neal Dunn, who is running to retain his seat in District 2 of the U.S. House, spoke after Scott at the dinner.

"We need some people that know how to make good deals, good decisions and follow up on them. And I have just the guy for you – Gov. Rick Scott," Dunn said to an applause. "He turned Florida around and he did it in the face of an economy that's the worst anybody here has seen in their lifetime."

Dunn and Chiefland business owner Stoney Smith, the vice chair of

the Levy County Republican Executive Committee, who delivered the opening and closing remarks of the evening, each praised Scott's handling of the state's hurricane and storm disasters.

Dunn trumpeted the Party's recent record on a variety of issues, ranging from the budget to the military.

Juanita Melchior, the LCREC Precinct 1 committeewoman, said some proceeds from the Lincoln-Reagan Memorial Dinner go towards scholarships for local students as well as helping them purchase animals. The dinner has moved from different locations over the years. Sen. Marco Rubio was the guest in Chiefland a few years ago.

For U.S. Representative, incumbent Neal Dunn is running unopposed on the Republican side, and will either face Bob Peters or Bob Rackleff from the Democratic side.

There will also be 13 proposed constitutional amendments on the ballot in the fall, ranging on topics from taxes and School Board term limits to offshore drilling and voting rights for Floridians convicted of some felonies.

The registration deadline to be eligible to vote in the primary is July 30. Early primary voting is Aug. 13 to Aug. 25; the primary is Aug. 30.

Arbor Outlook

While in high school I worked at my parents' lunch restaurant in Lake Zurich, Ill., then a sleepy little town that has since become a booming suburb of Chicago. Even though restaurants are oftentimes bad investments, my parents opened one anyway. My Mom said, and I remember it well: "People have to eat." Mom built a solid business which she later sold when she and my Dad traded frigid Illinois winters for sunny Florida.

I was thinking about my Mom's "people have to eat" rationale recently while researching the large, publicly traded homebuilders. The shares of these companies have fallen since the start of the year, presumably because interest rates have risen slightly and because the pace of sales has slowed a bit. I believe that the country's largest homebuilders have a multi-year growth runway ahead of them, so naturally the falling share prices further piqued my interest. Rising rates or not, people have to live somewhere, as well as eat.

In the past, homebuilding was a relatively low margin, capital intensive, boom-and-bust industry dominated by thousands of local builders. Small homebuilders still put up the majority of new houses in America, but that's changing quickly. The ten largest homebuilders have been growing their market share and now construct almost a third of all new homes. Industry consolidation is often a sign that the remaining players will become more profitable since they face less aggressive competition.

Less competition isn't their only advantage, though. Homebuilding costs are rising, which should also benefit the larger players because they can borrow money cheaper than smaller builders; buy materials in bulk and save money; and spread their design and labor costs over more projects. All this means more profit per home than subscale competitors.

Additionally, the largest homebuilders are moving to an "asset light" business model which has substantially improved their returns on capital. Instead of having their money tied up in land that may or may not be developed in the near future, some homebuilders are increasingly using purchase options to reserve land they may buy rather than buying the land outright.

This sometimes means they end up paying a few percent more for a parcel of land. But by securing construction sites this way, companies can build more homes where the demand (and prices) are currently highest and forego projects that may not be as profitable. In the old days when a project got scrapped, the homebuilders had to find a buyer for their land, which isn't always an easy task. Now, when a project doesn't work out, they walk away from the land and forfeit the small option payment.

Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom

Back in 2015, "Jurassic World" briefly set the box office record for biggest opening weekend of all time with \$208 million before climbing to #3 on the overall domestic chart.

It seemed as though people couldn't get enough of dinosaurs chowing down on some arrogant human victims.

Now comes "Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom", which opened this past weekend to a relatively tame \$150 million.

People still want to see the dinos, but it's a little less special this time. It's a serviceable metaphor for the movie itself - the dinosaurs aren't exactly "boring," but we have a pretty good idea of what we can expect from their antics. The humans, on the other hand, may qualify as boring.

Chris Pratt and Bryce Dallas Howard are back as raptor wrangler Owen Grady and dino lover Claire Dearing, respectively.

Jeff Goldblum also returns as Dr. Ian Malcolm, but don't get too excited, he only cameos to get in some soundbites for the film's advertising.

At the start of the film, the island that hosted the Jurassic World theme park is in danger from a previously-unknown active volcano. Claire desperately tries to get the government to rescue the endangered species, but they refuse to do so because the dinosaurs are owned by a corporation. At least that's the official reason, it's probably more because the creatures tend to show their gratitude by eating registered voters.

Salvation comes in the form of mysterious billionaire Benjamin Lockwood (James Cromwell) and his assistant Eli Mills (Rafe Spall).

They're willing to bankroll a mission to rescue the dinosaurs from the precarious island and give them a new home in a nature preserve. OK, everybody who believes that they're not up to something more sinister, please do a backflip now.

Still, it might be the last chance for the dinos, so Claire recruits old flame Owen as well as tough-cookie veterinarian Zia (Daniella Pineda) and whiny techie Franklin (Justice Smith) for the mission.

They get to the island and Owen

tries to use peaceful methods to get his old raptor friend Blue to come quietly with them, but the goons on Mills' payroll just shoot everything with tranquilizers and stuff them in inhumane cages, leaving our heroes for dead.

The dinos' destination is not a lush preserve, but Lockwood's estate, where they'll be sold to the highest bidder, likely someone who will use their DNA for nefarious purposes.

The climax of the film is our heroes running around the Lockwood estate, working to protect the dinosaurs worth protecting and saving the humans worth saving. One of those humans is Lockwood's "granddaughter" (Isabella Sermon), who was the reason why Lockwood was considered too crazy and immoral to share the company of original dino-breeder John Hammond. A lot about this portion of the movie is silly, but at this point, silliness is this movie's friend. It wasn't really getting anywhere taking itself seriously.

The latter half of "Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom", where the carnivorous dinosaurs treat the Lockwood estate like their personal buffet (one teases a particularly heelish captor with its tail, bring new meaning to the phrase "playing with your food") somewhat makes up for the lackluster first half. We know the reluctant Grady is going to go on the mission, we can guess who's going to turn out to be a bad guy, and we dread everything about the annoying Franklin, yet these elements are stretched out for way too long. But the part where the dinosaurs are captured, which seems like the setup for some exciting adventures, is done almost entirely offscreen. Oh well, at least we can look forward to the inevitable devouring of a snooty auctioneer played by Toby Jones. If you're dying for some dino action, you'll find it here, but there's not much that hasn't been covered by other "Jurassic" movies.

Grade: C

"Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom" is rated PG-13 for intense sequences of science-fiction violence and peril. Its running time is 128 minutes.

America, I am afraid. The January incident with NBA Rookie Sterling Brown has raised this fear another notch, because he is my son.

Yes, that man is younger than my son, and taller, and a professional basketball player.

But when I see him, I see my son.

Yes, he parked illegally, and selfishly.

But how that young man behaved when he saw a police officer at his car is what my son would do, what we have talked about doing, what we brought him up to do.

He spoke to the officer, he remained calm, and most importantly, he did what the officer told him to do.

Then backup was called, orders were yelled, more backup arrived, six officers surrounded Sterling Brown, they shone flashlights through his car, suddenly an officer yelled to take his hands out of his pockets, another officer grabbed his hand, he was pushed to the ground, he was tazed, at one point an officer pulled a gun, he was handcuffed, an officer stood on his ankle, he lay face down on the winter pavement. All in a matter of minutes.

I was terrified for my son watching that unfold. I am afraid. If my son is stopped by law enforcement, we have talked about what to do. Be polite, stay calm, answer their questions, and do what the officer tells you to do. But now where does our discussion go? That did not turn out well for Sterling Brown. And it could have turned out much, much worse for him at any one moment in that Walgreens' parking lot.

Now, what do I tell my son? How do we coach our children through this?

How do we teach them to not be afraid when surrounded by six officers?

Who is his backup? My son has been stopped, questioned, backup called, then let go without a ticket.

More than once. Thankfully not by the same officer who Sterling Brown encountered.

In the end, Mr. Sterling Brown was given a ticket for his infraction.

Which is all that should have happened after he walked out of that Walgreens.

Note: I am a private citizen, and I have not viewed all the bodycam footage or heard all the audio, and there is always more to the story for both sides. This is not to lay blame to to lay open my heart.

"Oh, that must be the wonderful aroma of broccoli cooking on the stove. Isn't it marvelous?"


Hoping she would catch my attitude of disdain and disgust, I said, "You're not cooking broccoli for supper tonight, are you?"



We're very pleased to provide you with this year's Annual Water Quality Report. We want to keep you informed about the excellent water and services we have delivered to you over the past year. Our goal is and always has been, to provide to you a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. Our water source is ground water from wells. The four wells draw from the Floridan Aquifer. Our water is obtained from ground water sources and is chlorinated for disinfection purposes.

In 2017, the Department of Environmental Protection has performed a Source Water Assessment on our system. These assessments were conducted to provide information about any potential sources of contamination in the vicinity of our wells. There are five potential sources of contamination identified for this system with low to high susceptibility levels. The assessment results are available on the DEP Source Water Assessment and Protection Program website at www.dep.state.fl.us/swapp.

This report shows our water quality results and what they mean.

If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact CJ Zimoski at our office between the hours of 7:30AM and 4:00PM, Monday through Friday at 352-528-3060. We encourage our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. If you want to learn more, please attend any of our regularly scheduled City Council meetings. They are held on first and third Tuesday of each month at 7:00PM.

The City of Williston routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws, rules, and regulations. Except where indicated otherwise, this report is based on the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1 to December 31, 2017. Data obtained before January 1, 2017, and presented in this report are from the most recent testing done in accordance with the laws, rules, and regulations.

In the table below, you may find unfamiliar terms and abbreviations. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

Action Level (AL): The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements that a water system must follow.

Maximum Contaminant Level or MCL: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal or MCLG: The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level or MRDL: The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal or MRDLG: The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l) – one part by weight of analyte to 1 million parts by weight of the water sample.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter (µg/l) – one part by weight of analyte to 1 billion parts by weight of the water sample.

Picocurie per liter (pCi/L) - measure of the radioactivity in water.

“ND” means not detected and indicates that the substance was not found by the laboratory analysis.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. This City of Williston is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at <http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead>.

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- (A) Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- (B) Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.
- (C) Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses.
- (D) Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.
- (E) Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil gas production, mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the EPA prescribes regulations, which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791.

Thank you for allowing us to continue providing your family with clean, quality water this year. In order to maintain a safe and dependable water supply, we sometimes need to make improvements that will benefit all of our customers. These improvements are sometimes reflected as rate structure adjustments. Thank you for understanding.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbiological contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

We at the City of Williston would like you to understand the efforts we make to continually improve the water treatment process and protect our water resources.
