105 new laws now in effect

July's entrance Sunday also heralded the addition of 105 new laws in the Sunshine State.

Some of those include:
Opioids: Physicians will be limited to prescribing a three-day supply for acute pain, unless strict conditions are met for a seven-day supply.

Marriage: Anyone under 17 will not be allowed to marry. Anyone marrying a 17-year-old must be no more than two years older, while minors will need parental consent.

State Symbols: The Loggerhead Turtle permanently becomes the official state saltwater reptile and the Florida Cracker Horse (Marshackie) the official state horse.

Protection from bullies: If a child is bullied at school, parents will now have the opportunity to obtain a voucher to send the child to a private school.

School safety: Superintendents must designate a school safety specialist and school boards are expected to know how many people they intend to train in a voluntary but controversial guardian program that authorizes some trained personnel to carry guns.

PUSHING IT BACK

Station 72 welcomes new pumper truck

"This is a big deal for our community," Fire Chief Lamar Stegall told more than 35 people Friday who came to witness the "pushing in" of the new fire pumper.

The 2018 Typhoon Pumper, built by E-One in Ocala, was put into service with a ceremonial dedication harkening back to days of old when pumpers were pulled by horses that couldn't back in and had to be pushed back into their holding spots.

"Without the support of the community, this purchase would not have been possible," Stegall said. Because of it, he said, the city will maintain its ISO rating of 4, which is unheard of for a department that has no paid staff. Stegall says the rating saves homeowner \$500-\$600 annually on home owners' insur-

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State puts halt on Coastal Connector

The state has put a halt to any further work on the controversial Coastal Connector proposed routes that would have connected Suncoast Parkway 2 from its terminus in Citrus County to either Interstate 75 or U.S. 301 in Ocala.

Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) Secretary Mike Dew, in a letter to Ocala Mayor Kent Guinn late Friday, said his department "will postpone the recommendations from the Coastal Connector planning study."

The FDOT instead will pick up where it left off two years ago with the I-75 Relief Task Force and try and fix capacity issues on the

interstate. "(FDOT will) 'increase our resolve to implement the I-75 task force recommendations aimed to provide relief

to existing traffic on I-75 and to enhance the inter-regional connectivity between west central and northeast Florida," Dew wrote.

The proposed Coastal Connector routes proved unpopular with residents and government officials almost from the time FDOT

unveiled them a couple months ago. Citrus and Marion county commissioners opposed the routes.

Marion County said the routes would have gone through some of the horse ranches in the area. Dew said the state is sensitive to the equine industry in Marion County and the "economic engine" it provides.

Citrus County commissioners said the routes would have gone through highly populated and sensitive environmental areas. The board earlier this month voted unanimously to tell the state to stop the Suncoast Parkway extension at State Road 44 until it comes up with a

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Driver improvement course taught at BMHS Comes to Williston July 18-19

Do you know of somebody who texts and drives?

Is this something you find safe or dangerous? Hopefully it's something you know is very dangerous.

Did you know that there was a course that helps you learn about the dangers of texting and driving? The way that I heard about the course was through the community and also my stepdad who is a deputy with the Levy County Sheriff's Office.

I was on the fence about going to the class because I did not know what was in store for me. I attended this class at Bronson Middle High School on Wednesday, June 27 so I could learn about the dangers of driving, as well as to learn the responsibility of being focused while driving.

The purpose of this class is to inform teenagers about the dangers of driving while intoxicated, distracted, and impaired driving. Adults are even allowed to take this class if they are interested in it.

For example during the class we went outside and drove golf carts through a course that the Levy County Sheriff's Office set up



for the class. The course was made out of cones put together as turns, serpentine, and straight ways.

During the course I was there was one driver could not keep control of the golf cart and drove into the fence. Hopefully by the end of this class that driver learned the importance of paying attention while driving.

During this course we drove regular, drove while texting, and drove with drunk goggles on. During this class I learned that it is not safe to drive while texting or while you are drunk. I learned that if I

ance premiums. The new vehicle replaces one that was totaled when someone ran into it while the department was answering a call in 2016.

Council approved the truck and partial financing in September 2017

for the pumper. The balance of the \$400,000 cost comes from a USDA grant.

The payback term is 20 years, which is coincidentally the lifespan of the pumper. However, former Mayor Gerald Hethcoat said last fall that the truck will last longer than that.

locally supported plan to move it northward.

Prior to that, commissioners had supported extending the parkway to County Road 486. Their vote backed a resolution opposing the Coastal Connector routes.

Dew said the department is programming Project Development and Environmental (PD&E) studies that

will incorporate additional capacity on two segments of I-75 from the Turnpike to County Road 234 in Micanopy.

The first study will begin in fiscal year 2019-20 and should cost \$6.3 million, Dew said. The subsequent segment is planned to begin in fiscal year 2020-21 at an estimated \$6.6 million.

"Construction on these critical capacity projects is anticipated to begin 2025," Dew said,

On a recent journey to Omaha my husband utilized some free time to explore the city. Omaha is an exceptionally attractive and clean place, its hilly, urban sectors punctuated by unique architecture, plenty of green space, and a thriving downtown restaurant district.

A few blocks from a main thoroughfare he found himself in a lovely, tree-lined neighborhood, with large lots and well-kept lawns, many featuring solid, brick homes built almost a hundred years ago. A realtor informed him that it was Warren Buffett's neighborhood. So, like millions of others, he drove by and took a photo of Mr. Buffett's house. So, sitting at my office desk and holding my phone, I find myself looking at the primary residence of America's most famous investor.

The home certainly doesn't qualify as a mega-mansion, even though it is extremely spacious. It actually looks fairly similar to many of the other homes in the neighborhood. There have been additions to the house over the years, and plenty of remodeling work. But the bones are the same as when Buffett paid \$31,500 for it in 1958. It's now worth about \$650,000.

So what is Warren Buffett doing living in "only" an upper middle class, non-gated neighborhood? Someone worth \$87 billion can live wherever he chooses. Well, apparently Buffett likes the familiarity and feel of his long-time home. It's a classic example of wanting what we have. And of being satisfied with what is already ours, especially if it makes us happy.

So many of us (myself included) aspire to acquire, simply for the sake of "movin' on up" in the eyes of others. What most of us really seek is peace and quiet, familiarity and happiness. How many of us, for example, have traded in a perfectly good used car, one that runs well and suits our needs, just because its "newness" has faded? Glittery new purchases are often accompanied by burdensome price tags, and we can find ourselves stuck with difficult, expensive payoffs long after the shine of newness recedes.

I am not naive enough to think that Mr. Buffett doesn't own other homes. He does, including an \$11 million house near the ocean in Laguna Beach, CA. It's instructive to note, however, that Buffett paid \$150,000 (in 1971) for the house, so it proved an excellent investment. That home is currently for sale, because he and his family seldom can gather to use it.

Her family prepared their program, printed their service folders, produced their memory movie, assembled and delivered their own floral arrangements, along with other tasks customarily performed by the funeral home. They were indeed frugal people and as funeral day approached, there was nothing to suggest that her funeral would surpass ordinary.

Her visitation began Friday evening. Guests trickled in a few here and a few there; they did not linger. They offered their condolences to her son and then took their leave. About halfway through the evening, he asked to use a microphone.

Suddenly, guests stopped leaving. They assembled in the chapel and each found a seat. Little by little, as guest after guest took the lectern, it became clear that the woman lying in state had been extraordinary while living. One after another, they would speak of her generosity to them: groceries delivered to many upon hard times, air conditioners freely given to those suffering blazing temperatures while combating illnesses and recuperation, financial support to friends

who suffered monetary setbacks while they worked to regain self-reliance, and emotional support and donations to those suffering bereavement. She shared her heart and sustenance freely with those in crisis.

Her funeral was the following morning. I expected a small gathering. Her family, neighbors, friends, and community began arriving 90 minutes before services were due to begin. Before I knew it, our chapel was at capacity. I opened the overflow to accommodate the large gathering. Within minutes, all seats were occupied. I began seating guests in the foyer; soon it was filled as well. I brought out event seating and her services began.

Her eulogy was delivered. It was filled with deeds of love and selfless acts of generosity. The woman lying in the plain white casket had freely given everything she had to anyone standing in need. Upon her death, entry-level merchandise was purchased for her burial, but her funeral was far from mediocre. Her generosity and service to others cloaked her funeral with gratitude and expressions of love. I was humbled and deeply honored to bury this woman of profound character.

Her deeds surpassed the value of rubies. (Proverbs 31:10-20)

I was out doing errands Thursday when I got a text from friend and former co-worker, Lou Jones. "Shooting at Annapolis paper," it read. "Several shot."

My heart dropped. Once I returned to the office and was able to check into what was going on, I was numb.

I've been in this business a long time - and I've known journalists who were targeted for their reporting: Tires slashed; a Molotov cocktail thrown through a window of a newspaper office; telephone curses and in-your-face screaming.

My own car was keyed two years ago as it sat in the city hall parking lot. Over 20 years ago, I required a deputy to escort me to my car each night due to threats I received after a series of articles I wrote. The risk is real. Most of us in this business know it. We accept it and we push forward. Why? Because we believe in what we do.

Those of us in small towns may not ever win Pulitzers or have our stories made into movies, but let me assure you what we do is as important as any paper that circulates 200,000 newspapers a day.

Small town newspapers are the breath and history of your community. We are a generational business patronized by your grandparents, your parents and now you.

It saddens me when someone tells me they don't read the Williston Pioneer.

It hurts when I overhear someone call my paper a mullet wrapper. Like those journalists in Annapolis, most of us - me included - continue to work in a thankless arena because we believe in what we do.

We cover our communities and through our efforts, we like to believe we make our communities better. We know we make them better. No matter where I've moved, I always purchase the local paper first. I read it cover to cover. Doing that made me more involved in my town before I ever met the first person. Because of a local paper, I knew who was president of Rotary, who was ill and needed a transplant, how progressive the school was, how the city council spent my tax dollars. All relevant to a newcomer - and a longtime resident, as well.

Newspapers are part of the foundation of this country. Men like Thomas Paine and Benjamin Franklin helped shape this republic, just as the Williston Pioneer has helped shape Williston since 1879. I chose to be in Williston. My company offered me options but this is where I wanted to be. I have no regrets about that choice. And despite the risks - even in a small town - I'll continue to do it. Why? I believe in Williston. I believe in newspapers. I believe in what I do.

Sicario 2

I never saw 2015's "Sicario" in theaters, I only knew it by its reputation as a movie that was unfairly overlooked at the Oscars that year.

I watched the film in preparation for its sequel "Day of the Soldado", and maybe it was because the version I saw was edited for television or maybe it was because I watched it from my comfy bedroom instead of the edge of my seat in a theater, but I have to say I was not impressed.

It was entirely predictable that the Josh Brolin and Benicio del Toro characters would turn out to not be upstanding government agents and that the Emily Blunt character would go through a by-the-numbers disillusionment storyline.

It probably didn't help that I knew Brolin and del Toro would make it out of the movie alive since they're in "Day of the Soldado" (Blunt's fate was up in the air as she's not in the sequel), so some of the suspense was unfairly killed there, but I don't think it would have affected my enjoyment much if I didn't know.

The "Sicario" series had already wasted two hours of my time before I even saw "Day of the Soldado", and then the new film wasted two more.

The film sees shady operative Matt Graver (Brolin) tasked by the U.S. government to pit two Mexican drug cartels against each other in hopes that they'll wipe each other out. Graver recruits his old friend Alejandro Gillick (del Toro) to help. Gillick, the titular Sicario (hitman), helped on the original mission because he got to get revenge on the man who killed his family. This movie needs a reason to bring Gillick back, so we get a shoddy explanation about how the original villain killed his family on orders from an unseen cartel boss from this movie.

The plan is to kidnap Isabel (Isabela Moner), the daughter of a cartel boss, who gets the most memorable scene in the movie where she bullies her principal who's trying to discipline her for fighting.

There's also a follow-up plan to pose as the Mexican government in a phony rescue operation so Isabel is returned to her father thinking that the other cartel is responsible.

The plan goes awry when Graver and his team are betrayed by the actual Mexican government, which makes things worse for U.S.-Mexico relations. Graver is ordered by his boss (Catherine Keener) to clean up the entire operation, including eliminating Gillick and Isabel. Gillick wants to protect the child, so he hatches a plan to smuggle her into the U.S. where she can disappear. But that plan is threatened by Miguel

A reckless love stops in the road

When it comes to love, the Bible has some pretty radical instructions. Take for instance these sayings, "But I say to you who hear: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, and pray for those who spitefully use you. . . . And just as you want men to do you, you also do to them likewise. But if you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners do the same."

Now before you get bent all out of shape over these sayings, I want you to know that it was Jesus who spoke these very words in the first place. It wasn't long after He gave these instructions that He gave an example of this type of love. It was then that Jesus gave us the Parable of the Good Samaritan.

In the Parable, Jesus is confronted by a certain lawyer, an expert in the law, a man who made it his business to know and understand the details of the Jewish religion. He had studied the Old Testament Scriptures, especially the Law. He stands up to 'test' Jesus, saying, "Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?"

The lawyer's question was a valid one but it came with a bad motive because he wanted to trap Jesus. More than likely, the lawyer knew the answer but he wasn't living up to it.

Instead of answering the lawyer out right, Jesus sends him back to the Scriptures. He tells the certain lawyer, "What is written in the law? What is your reading of it?" Jesus asked him to go back to the Bible, tell Him what it said, and then tell Him how he interpreted it.

So the lawyer answered Jesus, "You shall love the Lord your God with all of your heart, with all of your soul, with all of your strength, and with all of your mind," and "your neighbor as yourself." The lawyer's answer was biblically correct. He quoted from Deuteronomy 6:5 and Leviticus 19:18. He correctly understood that the law demanded total devotion to God and love for one's neighbor but he didn't know how to implement it. But too, he had a misunderstanding of who his neighbor was.

Jesus told the lawyer that he had it right. And He said to him, "You have answered rightly; do this and you will live." (Luke 10:28 NKJV).

Jesus' response didn't satisfy the lawyer. He wanted to further try Jesus. He wanted to justify himself and show everyone that he was loving his neighbors. The lawyer said to Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?"

To fully answer the lawyer's question about who was his neighbor, Jesus told those listening a story. He said:

"A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among thieves, who stripped him of his clothing, wounded him, and departed, leaving him half dead" (Luke 10:30 NKJV).

As the certain man lay naked and half dead on the road, the first person to pass by was a priest. Jesus said, "A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side." I don't know about you, but this doesn't sound right! Why would a priest, a teacher of the law pass someone who was in need? Some have said that he did not want to defile himself with the wounded man. Maybe he just wanted to get out of there thinking the robbers were still around? We really don't know, but we would like to think that a man of his caliber, a man who was supposedly to be a man of God, would have stopped and rendered aid but he didn't! He just walked on by, in other words he just avoided the problem.

The next person that comes along does no better. Jesus said, "Likewise a Levite, when he arrived at the place, came, and looked, and passed by on the

other side." It's similar to someone driving down the highway and sees a terrible accident. You see the people lying by the roadside, bleeding and in bad need of help, but you take a look and drive on by.

Knowing exactly what He was doing, Jesus said,

"But a certain Samaritan, as he journeyed, came where he was. And when he saw him, he had compassion. "So he went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine; and he set him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. On the next day, when he departed, he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said to him, 'Take care of him; and whatever more you spend, when I come again, I will repay you.' (Luke 10:33-35 NKJV)

This must have come as a shock to the legal expert. By using a Samaritan as the hero, Jesus disarmed those who were listening. The Jews and Samaritans were enemies. However in the story, it was not a Jew helping a Samaritan but a Samaritan helping a Jew 'who had been ignored by his fellow Jews!' The Samaritan saw only a person in dire need of help, and help him he did. In fact, the Good Samaritan went above and beyond the minimum required. He dressed the man's wounds with wine and oil. He put the man on his animal and took him to an inn for a time of healing and paid the innkeeper with his own money. He then goes beyond common decency and tells the innkeeper to take good care of the man, and he would pay for any extra expenses on his return trip.

As someone has said: This parable is a stinging, damning indictment of all forms of social, religious, and

racial bigotry. It confronts head-on the sin of racism. It is a powerful attack on all forms of prejudice and feelings of superiority.¹

Jesus drew a sharp contrast between those who knew the law and those who actually followed the law in their lifestyle and conduct. Jesus then asked the lawyer, "So which of these three do you think was a neighbor to him who fell among thieves?" In his response, the lawyer could not even bring himself to say the word "Samaritan," instead he answered *the one who showed mercy*. His hate for the Samaritans (his neighbors) was so strong that he couldn't even refer to them in a proper way. Jesus then tells the lawyer to "go and do likewise," meaning that he should start living like that old Samaritan.

No one would ever remember the Good Samaritan if he'd only had good intentions. He was willing to get involved. We may quote scripture and recite platitudes on love and God, but unless we are willing to get involved in the lives of others, we are only blowing smoke.

(Elijah Rodriguez), a teenager who's an up-and-comer in the smuggling operation and knows Gillick isn't the insignificant peasant he's pretending to be.

The movie goes through all the twists and turns you'd expect from a U.S. vs. Mexican cartel thriller, minus capitalizing on opportunities to develop its characters. Wait, there is one twist I didn't expect. A character gets shot in the head and survives. The last 10 minutes of the movie is that person

trying to get to safety while in an unconceivable amount of pain like a cut-rate version of "The Revenant" (the 2015 film that deservedly did well at the Oscars).

There's a lot of violence in "Sicario: Day of the Soldado", but that doesn't make it exciting or interesting. It just makes it hard to watch, or at least it would if the perpetrators, victims, heck, even the violence itself weren't so bland. I can't remember the last time I left a movie so miserable. The hacky comedies "Overboard" and "Life of the Party" back in May made me leave infuriated, but

that's not the same thing (and to be clear, this movie is not as bad as those, thanks to competence on technical levels like cinematography and editing). This movie is a two-hour joyless slog that doesn't have the heart or personality to pull off its "uncompromising" dreariness.

Grade: C-

"Sicario: Day of the Soldado" is rated R for strong violence, bloody images, and language. Its running time is 122 minutes.


