Be Prepared

Don't wait until disaster strikes; now is the time to act

If you don't have your disaster preparedness kit together now – six weeks into hurricane season – then what are you waiting for?

Every home should be ready when an emergency happens. Last week John MacDonald and David Peaton from the Levy County Department of Emergency Management explained to guests of the Williston Chamber of Commerce the role of their department and how both residents and business owners can prepare for whatever comes their way.

Peaton said one of the most common myths surrounding his agency is that EMA workers spend six months of the year twiddling their thumbs and only move into action during hurricane season June 1-Nov. 30.

Not true, he stressed. Hurricanes are but one issue his department deals with, he said, adding sinkholes and flooding also fall within its realm.

Workers with Emergency Management are constantly monitoring reports from the National Weather Service and the National Hurricane Center, Peaton said, and then they study how it applies to Levy County before disseminating it.

Peaton cited initial reports that last year's Hurricane Irma was forecast to devastate Levy County before it made landfall.

And though the eye did pass over the county, the storm turned east saving most of the county from extreme loss, Peaton said.

"Pay attention to those forecasts," he urged, "but don't take them as gospel."

Peaton also reminded people that they do not need bottled water. You have a well, or are on city water, he said, stockpile your own water in containers. Reserve some for drinking, the rest for household usage. And, he stressed, you don't

have to have water. Juice is also an often overlooked substitute in emergency situations.

"FEMA is not coming to help you with supplies and money," he said, adding FEMA is not a resource but is support during recovery.

Last year, some county residents were disturbed about the mandatory evacuation, he said. It means that if you do not leave when ordered, first responders will not risk their lives to help you until after the storm passes.

"Your personal preparation is what is most important," he said, adding your disaster kit should be stocked with enough goods to last three to five days. "You cannot depend on government for everything."

The county hopes to roll out a dedicated phone line this year that will let residents know what businesses are open during and after storms. After a storm 40 percent of businesses do not reopen, Peaton said. "We want businesses to reopen."

Residents are encouraged to register for the emergency notification alerts by visiting AlertLevy.com. Alerts are sent via phone call, text or email, based on the individual's preference.

Eagles aim to soar high this season

The conclusion of the 2017-2018 Bronson Eagles football season had many fans and players wondering if the Eagles' football program would ever return to normal.

After three straight seasons with three different head coaches and the inability to find a constant stride, many were left to wonder.

Bronson Middle High School Principal Gary Masters decided it was time to find a coach who could turn this program around.

Mr. Masters formed a committee,

consisting of himself, the boys' Athletic Director and members of the Eagle Quarterback Club to search for a new leader for the program.

The committee met and reviewed multiple resumes and interviewed multiple coaching candidates before agreeing on Coach Seth Stebbins.

Coach Stebbins takes the reins of a team that has only managed to find the win column one time over the past three seasons.

Coach Stebbins comes to Bronson after leading the Hamilton County Trojans for the last three seasons. During those three seasons, Coach

Stebbins took the Trojans to the state playoffs in 2016.

In addition to coaching at Hamilton County, Coach Stebbins has also been on the football coaching staff at Suwannee High School and Branford High School. Coach Stebbins' career has not only been on the football field, but he has also coached weightlifting, track and field and basketball.

Before Coach Stebbins began his career in education and coaching, he attended Troy State University where he played football and received a degree in Social Studies and Physical

Education.

When asked what his vision was for the upcoming season and what he expected from the Bronson Eagle football team, Coach Stebbins' answer was short, but to the point, "To compete."

According to Coach Stebbins, the mission statement of the program is "The Bronson football program strives to make a positive difference in the lives of student athletes so that they can achieve their highest potential on the field, in the classroom and in the community. We will use foot-

Gas prices soar

Gasoline prices in Florida have risen 7.7 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.78/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 8,237 stations in Florida. This compares with the national average that has increased 1.3 cents per gallon versus last week to \$2.87/g, according to GasBuddy.

Average gasoline prices on July 16 in Florida have ranged widely over the last five years: \$2.14/g in 2017, \$2.14/g in 2016, \$2.64/g in 2015, \$3.52/g in 2014 and \$3.56/g in 2013.

Including the change locally during the past week, prices yesterday were 64.3 cents per gallon higher than a year ago and are 2.4 cents per gallon higher than a month ago.

"While just over half of the nation's states saw average prices moving lower, the other half saw prices fall. A very mixed week as oil prices collapsed Wednesday, opening the door for a round of late-week price drops, but motorists shouldn't be fooled- it may not last long," said Patrick DeHaan. "Two things are for sure in one's lifespan: death and taxes, but you can add uncertainty at the pump, especially this summer. President Trump has talked about tapping into the nation's Strategic Petroleum Reserve to put downward pressure on oil prices, but this would be a grave mistake and only lead to minuscule drops at the pump and only temporarily. Last week's plummet in oil prices came thanks to Libya signaling it would resume oil exports, if there's anything to learn here it's that President Trump has little power over global supply and demand, and if anything, there's few options for the President to bring real change to gas pumps: slow motorists appetite for fuels, see sustainable increases in production or slow down the abrasive and inflammatory rhetoric that spooks the oil market. Until then, there's only one predictable outcome for gas prices for the remainder of the summer: volatile."

Wakulla's sparkling gem

Editor's note: This is the second in a series on outdoor water activities available in northwest Florida.

People travel from all over the world to visit Wakulla Springs. Edward Ball Wakulla Springs State Park is home to one of the largest and deepest freshwater springs in the world and features an abundance of wildlife, including alligators, deer, and manatees.

According to the Florida Spring Institute, it is the largest spring basin in terms of depth and volume and provides the source of water for the Wakulla River.

Several of the early Tarzan movies were filmed at Wakulla Springs as was the 1950s classic "Creature from the Black Lagoon."

The historic lodge at Wakulla Springs State Park was built in the 1930s by Edward Ball. The soda fountain in the Lodge's gift shop is the world's longest continuous marble counter.

Cobots, robots and recreating the Fab Four

Recently I read about a fast food restaurant chain that is investing millions into computerized food service. The customer programs his food selection, then robots make each hamburger to order, adding desired condiments and even slicing whole pickles with millimeter precision.

Artificial intelligence has also been utilized recently in an attempt to recreate a Beatles song. Critics called the final product somewhat "emotionless", and noted that it sounded more like the Beach Boys than the Beatles, but the very fact that we've got the technology to attempt such an endeavor is disconcerting to human artists.

Our ability to control, regulate and direct AI represents a significant signpost toward a healthy economy in the 21st century. So the viability of using cobots, or collaborative robots, in the manufacturing sector is especially encouraging. A 2016 study by the International Federation of Robotics reveals that fewer than 10 percent of jobs can be completely automated. Of course, that statistic suggests that 90 percent of tasks can be at least partially automated. Most of those jobs are currently filled by low wage, low skilled workers.


Traditional robots require extensive programming. They are often cumbersome, relatively immobile and dangerous for nearby workers, and many perform their functions locked away from employees. Perhaps most importantly, their presence was a threat to employees because they replaced human hands.

Cobots work in tandem with human workers and can help boost productivity, which then increases overall employment. Designed to shut down if a person crosses their path, cobots minimize worksite injury. Most require no sophisticated coding and are generally lighter and more mobile than traditional robots. Just under a quarter million global industrial robots were sold last year, and only five percent of these were cobots. But cobots, sometimes called flexible robots, could soon become an important component of the profitability of small manufacturing plants.

As economist Gary Schilling has written, "Collaborative robots that work alongside humans... are getting cheaper and easier to program. And they're safer and more user-friendly than earlier models that had to be caged to protect humans... Cobots are being used in warehouses and are much cheaper in moving goods than miles of conveyor belts."

Integrating technology like cobots into industrial manufacturing makes imminent sense to me, from a human standpoint. We simply cannot afford to invent and program ourselves into a state of high unemployment. But using technology as a complimentary feature on the factory floor is an evolved solution that can simultaneously assist us in achieving maximum efficiency and high employment.

But there are also some new players in the game. Cruise director Ericka (Kathryn Hahn) immediately catches Dracula's eye with her beauty, charm, and similar life goal of providing hospitality to monsters.

There's just one problem: she's the great-granddaughter of notorious monster-hunter Abraham Van Helsing (Jim Gaffigan) and she hates monsters every bit as much as he does. Yes, I know that was foolish, considering I was supposed to be on the road in five hours, but what can I say?

I have the gift of gab and I hadn't seen him in 40 years. There was much to talk about.

The next morning, I was on the road by 7:15. It's a 11 1/2-hour trip, barring accidents or incidents. I had told Tom to allow me 13 because I planned to stop often and walk around, as advised years ago by Police Chief Dennis Strow.

I got gas. I stopped in Tennessee at a scenic overlook. I photographed butterflies at the North Carolina Welcome Center, where I grabbed a bag of chips and a Coke.

Even with the stops, the GPS noted I was making good time and should arrive in Williston at 7:30 p.m.

Wrong. Traffic was moving at 13 mph when

I merged onto I-95 in South Carolina. I knew it would be bad because of the July 4 holiday. I wasn't prepared for what happened next.

Just as my stomach started protesting loudly, "Feed me!", traffic came to a complete stop. The kind of stop where you put your car in park and turn off the engine.

And I sat. And sat.

That's when I noticed my phone was draining quickly. I shut off all the apps, turned the car back on and nothing.

And I mean nothing. My air conditioning decided to blow hot air and the phone wouldn't charge. Upon further investigation, I saw my phone cord had broken. Turning the car off again, I exited the vehicle and combed through my half dozen tote bags until I found my battery backup. *Voila!* The phone was charging.

I sat some more. Sweated even more, despite the windows being down. I became thirsty. By now, my Coke was the temperature of coffee at the Waffle House. I drank it anyway.

I dug out my Kindle and finished reading a novel. I found a real book and perused it.

God's Word tells us, "Come now, and let us reason together," says the LORD, "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red like crimson, they shall be as wool. If you are willing and obedient" (Isaiah 1:18-19a NKJV).

Let me say that God's love for us is reckless with radical forgiveness. Are you seeking the forgiveness of God? If so, I would suggest you begin with recognizing your sinfulness. Romans 3:23 tells us, "For all have sinned and have fallen short of the glory of God" (NKJV). 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

To make Chili Rub: Stir together aromatic bitters, chili powder and salt; let stand 10 minutes.

Cut pork shoulder across grain into 1 1/2-2-inch thick slices; trim excess fat. If needed, cut into chunks to remove some fat.

Rub meat with chili mixture. In 8-quart pot or 9-10-inch wide, high-sided saute pan with lid, heat oil. Add meat and brown on both sides, about 15 minutes total. Remove meat and place on plate; keep warm.

To make Bitters Sauce: Combine tomato sauce, brown sugar, apple cider vinegar, aromatic bitters, chili powder and garlic cloves; stir well. Pour into hot, empty pan. Simmer 5 minutes, stirring and scraping bottom of pan.

Return meat to pan; spoon sauce over meat. Cover and cook 1 hour and 15 minutes on low, rearranging meat halfway through cooking. Transfer meat to plate; cover with foil to keep warm.

To thicken sauce, if desired: Let sauce cool in pan 5 minutes then whisk in cornstarch. Bring to boil; continue to cook and whisk until slightly thickened.

To serve: Pull meat apart with two forks or fingers. Serve warm on buns, drizzled with sauce.



Orange Butter Sponge Cake

- 8 ounces butter, plus additional for buttering pan
- 2 cups cake flour, plus additional for flouring pan
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups granulated sugar
- 4 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 tablespoon Angostura orange bitters
- 1 cup freshly squeezed orange juice
- powdered or extra-fine sugar, for dusting

Heat oven to 350 F.

Butter and flour two 9-inch cake pans. Sift flour three times and add baking powder and salt. Set aside.

With electric mixer, cream butter and sugar until light and creamy, about 10 minutes. Add eggs one at a time, beating well between additions. Add vanilla and orange bitters.

Divide flour mixture into four portions. Set electric mixer on medium low and add flour alternately with orange juice, starting and ending with flour. Mix just until incorporated after each addition.

Divide batter evenly between cake pans and bake 35-40 minutes, or until cake pulls away from sides of pans. Remove from oven and cool 5 minutes in cake pans before turning out.

I went inside, asked the clerk what had happened. "Oh, that's a 3-2-1," she said. "What?" I asked. "It's a 3-2-1. Don't worry. You won't be charged." "But I need gas," I wailed, just as I received two text messages from Chase - credit card fraud. "Your card has

been declined \$150 at Pilot. If you did not use this card, text . . ." "Oh, we can run your card here," the clerk interrupted my growing frustrations. It was 9:50 p.m. I crept through Lawley and Waldo (AAA removed their speed trap designations the next day!) and finally at 11:36, I pulled into the driveway of Ten Broeck Manor, over 16 hours after starting my journey. The husband and dog were waiting for me, but they turned in shortly after. I collapsed on my pillow and don't remember nodding off, although my Fitbit says I did at 12:42 a.m. And then it was Monday and back to work. And then my shoe rack fell in the closet and the hogs came that night. But those are stories for another day.

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LAST DAY TO REGISTER TO VOTE FOR PRIMARY ELECTION JULY 30, 2018

If you're a first-time registrant in the State of Florida, in order to be eligible to vote in the Primary Election you must file a completed **Florida Voter Registration Application** by **July 30, 2018**. Registrations that are mailed must be postmarked by this date. If you're already registered but need to update your address, submit your changes by telephone, on-line, on a voter registration application or by written letter that includes your signature and date of birth. Failure to update your address prior to Election Day may result in delays at the polls. If you have not voted since the last election, you should check your voter registration status on-line, www.VoteLevy.com, or call 352-486-5163.

With the 2018 elections fast approaching it's important that you update your signature if you haven't done so already. Signatures can change over time due to aging or medical conditions. When there are significant changes to your signature or identifying "mark" you need to update that signature with our office.

For those who vote by mail your signature on file becomes even more important. Once your vote by mail ballot is returned to our office, the signature on your ballot certificate envelope is immediately compared to the signature on your voter record.

To update your signature you'll need to complete a Florida Voter Registration Application Form. Application forms can be found at all of the libraries within Levy County or on our website at www.VoteLevy.com. Voters can also request an application form to be sent to their home by calling the Elections Office at 352-486-5163.
