Incumbent Rock Meeks is facing challenger Terance Reed in the District 2 race for County Commission.



## Retirement fears, longevity and old friends

A major annual retirement survey was released this summer. Among its findings are the nine biggest fears that Americans have regarding retirement.

The greatest fear, shared by over half of the respondents, is outliving one's savings and investments. A larger number of those surveyed now see themselves living to age 90. A smaller but respectable percentage envision themselves as future centenarians. Bottom line? Our money must last longer as life expectancy increases. If Paul Simon was writing "Old Friends" today, he'd change the age in the lyrics.

This is the overriding financial concern we all share in retirement. Of course, we need to begin addressing this issue decades prior to our actual retirement years. The survey did note that the average age that most Americans begin contributing to retirement accounts is 27. That's not bad.

Almost half of those surveyed fear the demise of Social Security. My own opinion is that Social Security will be there for us, with some potential changes, throughout our lifetimes. The voting bloc represented by Boomers is awfully strong. The collapse of Social Security has been predicted annually since I began my practice over two decades ago. Nothing to be gained by worrying about this issue, anyway, since it's beyond our control.

Three of the next four fears involve health related issues: declining health that requires long term care; lack of access to adequate and affordable health care; and fear of cognitive decline, dementia, and Alzheimer's disease. Health issues are the financial wild card in retirement planning. People rightfully fear the price tag of escalating health problems. We are also scared of living at less than our best, living in pain, or becoming a shell of our former physical selves. In fact, according to many surveys, most of us fear being incapacitated or impaired more than we fear dying.

Folks often fear not one but a combination of these factors, even if they have amassed a significant nest egg and are enjoying a nice annual income. One of the biggest challenges in retirement is accepting that we are never going to be as financially secure as we'd like to be. Retirement means crossing the Rubicon from full-time employment to part-time work or none at all. Once we are there, things happen that we can't control. But planning well and taking care of our health can lead us in the right direction.

## Hearing loss

At age 50 I decided to get a hearing aid before I got annoying. This says more about my social sensibilities than my perceived hearing needs at the time.

I was doing fine reading lips, faking understanding and occasionally saying, "Excuse me?" I didn't want to discomfit people by making them repeat themselves.

When I got home with my new hearing aid I discovered the newspaper made a noise when I turned the page and urinating in the toilet really was a tinkle.

Over the years I got replacement hearing aids as needed, and early in the new millennium my son purchased new, "state-of-the-art," behind the ear devices for me. I said at the time these were the last ones I'd ever buy; no way could I ever afford such a purchase again.

According to the Hearing Loss Association of America, by the time Americans reach their 70s, two-thirds have hearing loss.

The majority of Americans (of all ages) with clinically significant hearing loss do not use hearing aids. In fact, only 15 to 20 percent of those with loss get help. Is it pride? Or is it price?

Senior citizens in this country are fortunate to have Medicare, but hearing needs are not considered important enough to be covered. I have had the same hearing aids for 16 years, but during that period each time I went to the specialist, I insisted I could not afford new devices and said, "Please just tweak the old ones."

Slowly my hearing acuity deteriorated. I came to dread answering the phone. I still went to meetings, happy when people spoke so that I could hear. Otherwise I read lips, used reduced cues and faked it—responding nonverbally, taking my cue from those around me.

My daughter has wanted me to come to South Florida and let a doctor she knows insert cochlear implants. He says Medicare covers the surgery. I'm skeptical, and there are risks. This alternative is absolutely right for some, but I think not for me. However, I was still mulling over this option when I received a letter in the mail inviting me for a free hearing exam.

I've been to this show; I know hearing exams are always free. I also know the end of the meeting will be a hard sell. I made an appointment, girded my loins to refuse the offer, and took my sister with me. She was to be part of the test because I hear her voice often.

First the specialist had me shut my eyes as he pronounced one-syllable words, which I repeated. I got six out of 20 right. Repeating words of multiple syllables while wearing head-

phones, I did better; I got 16 out of 30 correct. My astonished sister verified my wild misses.

When I saw the chart showing my hearing loss, I felt despair. I didn't have the old charts with me, but I recalled the

general lines for left ear and right ear (ever downward). This test showed for some sounds my loss is at 85 percent. When the loss is 90 percent, one is nearly beyond help.

The specialist explained that because I had let my hearing go so long without the needed stimulation with ever-improving hearing devices, the nerves had deteriorated more quickly than they might have with regular upgrades. A behind-the-ear model like the one I had been wearing would no longer be adequate. I would have to go back to the inside-the-ear model, which I preferred all along. The new hearing aids cost nearly half the price of my first home purchase in 1965.

I knew I had to do this, and fortunately I have the wherewithal to make arrangements for payments. But what do people do who don't have a good credit history? I'll tell you what happens to some of them. They become isolated from friends and family of their own accord, and they sink slowly into dementia. We need a healthcare system in this country that will take care of everyone equally, no matter their economic status, and take care of the entire individual, not just parts that are deemed by someone else to be essential.

More and more studies are showing the relationship between hearing loss and dementia. Improvement in cognition has been huge in experiments with Alzheimer's patients who have had their hearing problems resolved.

Dr. P. Murali Doraiswamy, professor of psychiatry and medicine at Duke University School of Medicine and coauthor of *The Alzheimer's Action Plan*, says, "Every doctor knows that hearing loss can result in cognitive problems, but they still don't focus on it as a priority when they evaluate someone with suspected dementia—which is a big missed opportunity."

Further, Doraiswamy says, "The benefits of correcting hearing loss on cognition are twice as large as the benefits from any cognitive-enhancing drugs now on the market. It should be the first thing we focus on."

Well, folks, sometimes we can't depend on our doctors. We have to be in charge of our own health. Parting with that much money for something I thought I could do without cuts me to the quick, because it slashes my budget for another necessary undertaking. It is thus with life, and I may

For about a year now, I've been hearing about the impending release of "Crazy Rich Asians".

# Harvest, preserve herbs for year round flavor

Add a flavorful boost to any meal with garden-fresh herbs. You'll quickly discover the difference fresh herbs make when preparing any meal or dessert.

Harvest herbs whenever you need them for cooking or garnishing a favorite dish. Adjust the quantity of herbs used to allow for variations in flavor intensity and your family's preference.

In general, you will need two to three times more fresh than dried herbs. So, if the recipe calls for one teaspoon of dried parsley use one tablespoon (three teaspoons) of fresh parsley leaves.

Use a pair of garden scissors or pruners for harvesting. Make your cuts above a set of healthy leaves. The wound will close faster, and the remaining plant will look better. Rinse off the clippings and remove tough stems and any discolored or damaged leaves and start cooking.

Store the extra,

unwashed leafy herbs in a vase of water and loosely cover with a plastic bag. Keep basil on the kitchen counter and cold-tolerant herbs like parsley and cilantro in the refrigerator.

Wrap thicker-leaved herbs like sage and thyme in a paper towel, set inside a plastic bag and place in a warmer section of the fridge.

Don't be afraid to keep harvesting. Regular picking encourages new growth for future harvests. Just be sure to leave enough foliage to maintain plant growth. You can harvest as much as 50 to 75 percent from established annual herbs and one third of perennial herbs at one time.

Clip off leaves and stems before the plant begins flowering to encourage more tender growth. You'll get the greatest concentration of flavor when the plant has formed buds, but before they open.

However, don't discard the flowers if you've waited too long. Enjoy the beauty and added flavor of basil, lavender,

lavender, monarda, oregano, Rosemary, sage, sweet marjoram and thyme blossoms in salads, soups and other beverages.

As the season winds down, consider preserving some of your favorite herbs to use all winter long and to give as gifts.

Drying is one of the easiest ways to preserve your herbal harvest. Collect large amounts of basil, rosemary, marjoram and sage just prior to flowering. Cut the plants back about halfway in the morning after the dew has just dried off the leaves. Rinse – do not soak – the clippings and then remove any damaged or dried leaves.

Gather the herbs into small bundles and secure with a rubber band. As the stems shrink, so does the rubber band. Use a spring-type clothespin to hang the bundles from a clothesline or hanger.

Store the bundled herbs in a warm, dry, airy place out of direct sunlight for drying.

Some gardeners cover the drying herbs with a paper bag to keep them clean.

You can also dry herbs in the microwave. Remove the leaves from freshly harvested herbs. Evenly spread two cups of washed herb leaves on a double thickness of paper towel. Microwave on high for four to six minutes, depending on your microwave.

Fully dried herbs will be brittle and rattle when stirred. Store dried herbs in an airtight container for later use. Label the container with the name of the herb and date preserved.

Then add these flavorful additions to your meals throughout the winter. You're sure to savor the flavor and memories these home-grown preserved herbs add to every meal.

# The three most important small business financial reports

After setting financial goals and a budget for your small business, it's crucial to monitor how well your company is performing. Is it on track to achieving its revenue and profitability goals? Is it controlling its costs?

Even if you've contracted the help of an accountant, it's helpful to develop your understanding of your business's financial affairs. One way to accomplish that is to become familiar with and regularly review the following reports.

- Profit and Loss Statement
- Balance Sheet
- Cash Flow Statement

### Profit And Loss Statement (P&L)

Also called an "Income Statement," your company's P&L report indicates if your business is profitable and how profitable it is during a given period of time (such as for the past month, past quarter or past year).

A P&L statement is made up of the following main sections:

- Total income
- Total expenses
- Net income (Your income

minus expenses)

It's helpful to compare recent P&L info with that of a past period of time (such as a month this year with the same month last year) to identify if your company's profitability is improving or if there might be some issues you need to address. For example, if your sales are up but your profits are down, you would want to investigate which costs have increased to the extent that they're harming your bottom line.

### Balance Sheet

Your Balance Sheet provides a snapshot report of your company's finances—assets, liabilities and equity—at a given moment in time. It summarizes what your business owns and what it owes. Investors who are considering funding your company will want to see your balance sheet before committing.

Most often, the report shows company assets on the left and liabilities plus equity on the right to represent the following accounting equation:  
Assets = Liabilities + Owners'



Equity

The totals on each side should match, hence the name "Balance" Sheet.

Running this report at any time can give you helpful insight. Most business owners—sometimes with the help of accountants—review it regularly.

### Cash Flow Statement

Your Cash Flow Statement sheds light on:

- When cash is flowing into your company
- From where cash is flowing into your company
- When cash is flowing out of your company
- From where cash is flowing out of your company

It lists your incoming and outgoing transactions, showing how your business has earned and spent money over a period of time.

It's valuable because even a business that shows a profit on its P&L statement can run into money problems if its income isn't arriving in time to be able to pay employees or to cover bills when they're due. By

looking at your Cash Flow Statement, you can detect gaps and start making changes so you'll have sufficient cash reserves and avoid shortfalls that could hurt your ability to conduct business and your reputation.

### Money Isn't Everything—But Managing It Isn't Optional.

By learning to read and interpret your P&L Statement, Cash Flow Statement and Balance Sheet, you'll have a better sense of where you are on your course to meet your financial goals. The accounting software you use probably has these reporting options built into it, or you can ask your bookkeeper or accountant to run the reports for you. You'll also find templates for financial reports at [www.citruscounty.score.org](http://www.citruscounty.score.org) and in the Search window type Business Planning & Financial Statements Template Gallery. It is critically important for you to stay on top of your finances.

## Average Florida gas price is \$2.76/g

Gasoline prices in Florida have fallen 3.4 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.76/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 8,237 stations in Florida. This compares with the national average that has fallen 3.1 cents per gallon versus last week to \$2.82/g, according to GasBuddy.

Average gasoline prices on August 20 in Florida have ranged widely over the last five years:

\$2.24/g in 2017, \$2.08/g in 2016, \$2.40/g in 2015, \$3.33/g in 2014 and \$3.48/g in 2013.

Including the change locally during the past week, prices yesterday were 52.0 cents per gallon higher than a year ago and are 0.5 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has dropped 1.7 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 50.5 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

Areas near Florida and their current gas price climate:

Sarasota- \$2.71/g, down 6.2 cents per gallon from last week's \$2.77/g.

Tampa- \$2.70/g, down 6.7 cents per gallon from last week's \$2.77/g.

Cape Coral- \$2.67/g, down 8.3 cents per gallon from last week's \$2.75/g.

"The national average price of gasoline has fallen to its lowest level since May 7, some 105 days ago when many of us were dreaming of summer road trips and falling gas prices. After all, gas as cheap as last summer has been elusive this summer, but it's not too late to enjoy this summer's lowest prices," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "Oil prices have held in the mid-\$60s per barrel, the price of which has been determined by a delicate balancing act of global optimism and pessimism surrounding a long litany of possible economic issues. As we race towards summer's finish line, we may see more pessimism weigh on oil markets, offering some relief to weary drivers who've seen the most expensive summer at the pump since 2014. Labor Day will likely claim the cheapest prices for a summer holiday this year, and I'm sure millions of motorists will take advantage."



Characters like these make "Crazy Rich Asians" an enjoyable movie. And the spoiled, meaner characters are at least fun to detest. And the two leads are no slouches either. And

What I'm saying is that there's a long list of affable characters in this movie. I want to see what happens with them next, even if their adventures here aren't really for me.

The applicant has provided reasonable assurance that continued operation of the existing equipment will not adversely impact air quality and that the project will comply with all appropriate provisions of Chapters 62-4, 62-204, 62-210, 62-212, 62-213, 62-296 and 62-297, F.A.C. The Permitting Authority will issue a subsequent final permit in accordance with the conditions of the draft/proposed permit unless a response received in accordance with the following procedures results in a different decision or a significant change of terms or conditions.

**Comments:** The Permitting Authority will accept written comments concerning the draft/proposed Title V air operation permit for a period of 30 days from the date of publication of the Public Notice. Written comments must be received by the close of business (5:00 p.m.), on or before the end of this 30-day period by the Permitting Authority at the above address. As part of his or her comments, any person may also request that the Permitting Authority hold a public meeting on this permitting action. If the Permitting Authority determines there is sufficient interest for a public meeting, it will publish notice of the time, date, and location in the Florida Administrative Register (FAR). If a public meeting is requested within the 30-day comment period and conducted by the Permitting Authority, any oral and written comments received during the public meeting will also be considered by the Permitting Authority. If timely received written comments or comments received at a public meeting result in a significant change to the draft permit, the Permitting Authority shall issue a revised draft/proposed permit and require, if applicable, another Public Notice. All comments filed will be made available for public inspection. For additional information, contact the Permitting Authority at the above address or phone number.

**Petitions:** A person whose substantial interests are affected by the proposed permitting decision may petition for an administrative hearing in accordance with Sections 120.569 and 120.57, F.S. Petitions filed by any persons other than those entitled to written notice under Section 120.60(3), F.S., must be filed within 14 days of publication of the Public Notice or receipt of a written notice, whichever occurs first. Under Section 120.60(3), F.S., however, any person who asked the Permitting Authority for notice of agency action may file a petition within 14 days of receipt of that notice, regardless of the

date of publication. A petitioner shall mail a copy of the petition to the applicant at the address indicated above, at the time of filing. A petition for administrative hearing must contain the information set forth below and must be filed (received) with the Agency Clerk in the Office of General Counsel, 3900 Commonwealth Boulevard, MS 35, Tallahassee, Florida 32399-3000, Agency\_Clerk@dep.state.fl.us, before the deadline. The failure of any person to file a petition within the appropriate time period shall constitute a waiver of that person's right to request an administrative determination (hearing) under Sections 120.569 and 120.57, F.S., or to intervene in this proceeding and participate as a party to it. Any subsequent intervention (in a proceeding initiated by another party) will be only at the approval of the presiding officer upon the filing of a motion in compliance with Rule 28-106.205, F.A.C.

A petition that disputes the material facts on which the Permitting Authority's action is based must contain the following information: (a) The name and address of each agency affected and each agency's file or identification number, if known; (b) The name, address, any email address, telephone number and any facsimile number of the petitioner; the name, address, any email address, telephone number, and any facsimile number of the petitioner's representative, if any, which shall be the address for service purposes during the course of the proceeding; and an explanation of how the petitioner's substantial interests will be affected by the agency determination; (c) A statement of when and how each petitioner received notice of the agency action or proposed decision; (d) A statement of all disputed issues of material fact. If there are none, the petition must so indicate; (e) A concise statement of the ultimate facts alleged, including the specific facts the petitioner contends warrant reversal or modification of the agency's proposed action; (f) A statement of the specific rules or statutes; and, (g) A statement of the relief sought by the petitioner, stating precisely the action the petitioner wishes the agency to take with respect to the agency's proposed action. A petition that does not dispute the material facts upon which the Permitting Authority's action is based shall state that no such facts are in dispute and otherwise shall contain the same information as set forth above, as required by Rule 28-106.301, F.A.C.

Because the administrative hearing process is designed to formulate final agency action, the filing of a petition means that the Permitting Authority's final action may be different from the position taken by it in this written notice of Intent to Issue Air Permit. Persons whose substantial interests will be affected by any such final decision of the Permitting Authority on the application have the right to petition to become a party to the proceeding, in accordance with the requirements set forth above.

**Mediation:** Mediation is not available in this proceeding.

**EPA Review:** EPA has agreed to treat the draft/proposed Title V air operation permit as a proposed Title V air operation permit and to perform its 45-day review provided by the law and regulations concurrently with the public comment period, provided that the applicant also transmits an electronic copy of the required proof of publication directly to EPA at the following email addresses: R4TitleVFL@epa.gov. Although EPA's 45-day review period will be performed concurrently with the public comment period, the deadline for submitting a citizen petition to object to the EPA Administrator will be determined as if EPA's 45-day review period is performed after the public comment period has ended. The final Title V air operation permit will be issued after the conclusion of the 45-day EPA review period so long as no adverse comments are received that result in a different decision or significant change of terms or conditions. **Objections:** Finally, pursuant to 42 United States Code (U.S.C.) 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

live another 10 years. For that decade I want to hear every friend's voice—every word—and every bird's song—every note.




