

Council hopes to get employees above poverty level

As the city's budget season winds down, the Williston City Council is scrambling for ways to bring its lowest paid employees above the poverty level.

At its second budget workshop last week, the council spent the better part of its session listening to a proposal by City Manager Scott Lippmann that would raise salaries.

The concerning part? The city will need more than \$198,000 in additional funds to make it happen.

Lippmann spent a considerable amount of time creating an updated pay scale that could raise salaries to at least \$25,000 annually. The manager said that base rate is the poverty level for a family of four.

Councilman Justin Head said the proposal took a "skewed approach" because while \$25,000 may be the poverty level for a family of four, there are city employees who are single or who may have more than four in their household.

"This causes me heartburn," Head said. "That 18 percent will be paid by someone – the resident – who got a 2 percent increase – maybe."

"Some of these people didn't get raises for seven years," Lippmann said, explaining why some employees would get significant pay increases while others would not.

To reach the \$25,000 level, some employees would receive an 18 percent salary increase under the proposed plan.

The manager started the proposal with a pay scale that was put into place by a manager prior to him, he said. Lippmann has been the city manager almost six years.

"What is a fair living wage to attract the caliber and quality of employees that we need and retain them?" He asked.

Lippmann said he did not research the salaries and wages of other cities when making his pay scale proposal. Comparing apples to apples becomes difficult, he said, when trying to find

cities that provide comparable services to Williston because most of those cities are much larger and have larger tax bases.

Councilman Charles Goodman said if the plan helped attract and retain employees, he could support it – maybe even with a millage rate increase. That remark drew chuckles from several in the workshop because Goodman has often opposed any millage increase during his tenure on the council. Last year, he wanted a higher millage rate due to health care costs and a 3 percent across the board employee raise but was out voted by the rest of the council.

This year the council set its tentative rate at 6.25 mills, an increase over the 2017-2018 rate of 5.8627 mills.

A tentative millage rate can be reduced but it cannot be raised. The council will hold its first hearing to set the final millage rate at 6:50 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 11. The final hearing before budget and millage approval is 6L50 p.m. two weeks later on Sept. 25.

Utility Supervisor CJ Zimoski said he has a difficult time finding and retaining qualified workers for his departments. Often he says, someone takes a position with Williston, gets trained and then is able to find a comparable job for better pay.

BOCC discusses satellite waste stations

Levy County Commissioners got right down to business Tuesday barreling through the agenda.

The first order of business was Commissioner John Meeks signing off on the Preliminary Plat of the Replat of Tract 27, Starting Point. The 10.29 acres has a zoning designation of Agriculture/Rural Residential (ARR). McMillen Surveying, which represents Aranda Brothers, Inc. of Ocala, left the meeting with the go ahead.

Nature Coast Business Development Council (NCBDC) Executive Director David Pieklik gave an update on projects in Levy County. Pieklik said he is meeting with a regional manufacturer who is searching to relocate an entire operation. "They're out of space; they're looking at options," he said and added, "The company is open to a vocational education relationship and is looking at a location near Chiefland (Middle) High School.

A veteran's organization is eyeing up the old Williston Middle School property as well, he said, again, for repurposing that building for vocational training of veterans. Pieklik said the director of the project he is dealing with said if they couldn't fill

the training classroom with veterans, they would fill them with people who need training.

"We talked about the existing needs of skilled labor," Pieklik said. They are looking at certification courses in health-care and information. A Marion County company looking to build an aerospace facility is also involved in discussions with the NCBDC.

Florida Companies to Watch program has selected Young Boats of Inglis as a finalist for its list. "They're 21 years in operation," Pieklik said. "They've got eight product lines now, and now they're opening a repair and restoration service."

The commission unanimously approved the reappointment of Marlon Gayle as the Levy County Public Sector Representative to the Board of Directors for the Central Florida Community Action Agency.

In an effort to save money and buy in

bulk, the Levy County Road Department received approval to switch to synthetic blend motor oil on its fleet of vehicles which will save money with less frequent oil changes and the bulk buying discounts.

There were no public comments at the close of the meeting but commissioners and citizens engaged in discussing the creation of landfill satellite locations after Commissioner Matt Brooks raised the topic.

"Residents have voiced their opinions, we've had dumping issues, it's not getting any better," said Brooks, who said he has been consulting with Administrative Director of Levy County Solid Waste Rod Hastings at the landfill on the waste disposal needs of residents in Levy County.

"We need to look at where we are going to move as a county as far as solid waste goes."

Brooks said the price range for a satellite location is between \$50,000 to \$75,000 per location.

"The locations would be secure, have drop off times and location announced to the public. It is something we are seriously looking at."

Commissioner John Meeks commended

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Florida gas prices go up

Gasoline prices in Florida have risen 0.4 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.78/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 8,237 stations in Florida. This compares with the national average that has fallen 1.4 cents per gallon versus last week to \$2.82/g, according to GasBuddy.

Including the change locally during the past week, prices yesterday were 11.7 cents per gallon higher than a year ago and are 2.6 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has dropped 4.4 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 18.3 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

Areas in Florida and their current gas price climate:

Sarasota- \$2.75/g, down 2.1 cents per gallon from last week's \$2.77/g.

Tampa- \$2.76/g, unchanged from last week's \$2.76/g.

Cape Coral- \$2.76/g, unchanged from last week's \$2.76/g.

"We've closed the door on the most expensive summer at the pump since 2014, finishing the period from

Memorial Day to Labor Day with an average of \$2.87 per gallon, a full 55 cents higher than last summer, but still 71 cents per gallon cheaper than 2014. Much of the blame for the summer's higher gas prices can be blamed on OPEC's long-term decision to cut oil production to better balance supply and demand, pushing prices higher," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "Now that summer is over, gas prices are likely to seasonally decline by the end of the year, but with Tropical Storm Gordon likely to impact the sensitive Gulf Coast region, gas prices may move higher before we see the seasonal down trend emerge. We're carefully watching the storm for possible disruptions to refineries and gas stations, and will continue to do so until hurricane season ends. Motorists in affected regions can download the GasBuddy app as we'll continue to work around the clock updating motorists, helping them escape major events like this one."



Oscar, Felix and the musical sound of laughter

The sound of audiences laughing at his material provided the affirmation that his own childhood denied him. My favorite film adaptation is "The Odd Couple," released in 1968 and starring Walter Matthau and Jack Lemmon. Characters Oscar Madison and Felix Unger cohabit Madison's New York apartment while Unger and his wife endure a separation. Madison is a total slob who is driven insane by Felix and his obsessive neatness.

Mike Nichols won his first Tony Award for directing it. "Barefoot in the Park" made Robert Redford a star. And Burt Bacharach scored his musicals. His plays enjoyed 9,000 performances on Broadway in a 15-year period (1965 to 1980), with four running simultaneously in 1966. He wrote "Brighton Beach Memoirs," "Biloxi Blues," "Lost in Yonkers," "The Prisoner of Second Avenue," "Plaza Suite" and many more.

Neil Simon was born in the Bronx on July 4, 1927. His salesman father left and returned repeatedly. Eventually the family dissolved and Neil was shuffled off to live with relatives. Several of his plays, including "Lost in Yonkers," draw from his early life experiences. Simon was awarded a Tony and a Pulitzer Prize for that play.


After his discharge from the Air Force, he began writing comedy sketches for Phil Silvers and Sid Caesar. His first play, "Come Blow Your Horn," was written in 1961 and enjoyed 677 performances.

Simon wrote about middle class people, their foibles and funny mannerisms, and the struggles of families, marriage, and everyday living. After his first wife died of cancer in 1973, he married actress Marsha Mason and wrote what he considered his favorite play, "Chapter Two," based on their marital strife. "Biloxi Blues" was developed from Simon's own military experiences in Denver.

Simon died recently at age 91. From a relatively impoverished and dysfunctional upbringing, Neil Simon rose to the top of his profession as a playwright. He took the everyday agony and unhappiness surrounding him, and turned it into professional success through good humor, hard work and immense natural talent. Perhaps it is hyperbole, but one critic called him the most prolific playwright since Shakespeare.

There is a common misconception that rich, successful Americans inherit their place in society from their similarly wealthy parents. While exposure to handling financial issues can provide a leg up, a person must develop his or her own financial and career success, regardless of background. Many times, the desire to escape and deal with dysfunctionality or poverty can provide remarkable financial motivation to achieve.

Operation Finale

Of, Labor Day weekend is notoriously bad for the box office. Not just bad in relation to other holiday weekends, but bad in relation to other weekends, period.

Here were the top four movies this past weekend, in order: the third weekend of "Crazy Rich Asians", the fourth weekend of "The Meg", the sixth weekend of "Mission Impossible - Fallout", and then and only then did we get a new release in fourth place with "Operation Finale".

And I can see why the film's box office is so small, it's only playing on about 1,800 screens and involves some heavy subject matter, but isn't getting the kind of reviews or buzz that would make it an awards contender. But even though it's not going to be a blockbuster or an Oscar winner, there's an effort being made here that I can definitely appreciate.

Oscar Isaac stars as Peter Malkin, an Israeli spy disgraced after a botched mission where he and his team killed the wrong Nazi.

Some members are happy that they at least killed a Nazi, but Malkin shoulders the blame for failing to bring down Adolf Eichmann, the "Architect" of the Final Solution.

Years later, a new lead emerges. Eichmann may be living in Argentina. Malkin assembles a team and they get themselves a nice little Argentinean setup with a safehouse and secret identities and so forth.

They abduct the suspect (Ben Kingsley) outside his home and get to work trying to confirm that he is indeed Eichmann. The interrogation lasts about half a minute after Eichmann falls for the old "Questioner gets a detail wrong and suspect corrects them, giving themselves away" trap. If we're supposed to take Eichmann seriously as an evil genius, he can't be falling for elementary tricks like that.

Some members of the team want to kill Eichmann, but officially the mission is to drag him to Israel where he'll get a fair trial and then be killed.

A problem with their plan means that the team will have to watch Eichmann for ten days in the safehouse. They'll also have to get him to sign a form agreeing to travel to Israel, not something the Nazi is exactly keen on doing.

Not only is it an impossible task, but it seems like an unnecessary one, given that they're planning to fudge his identity for the local authorities anyway. It's a flimsy excuse for Malkin to want something from Eichmann, which sets them up for a series of head games.

The specialist explained that because I hadn't given my ears enough stimulation over the past decade or more, he would not allow the hearing aids to give me the full stimulation at first. He didn't even give me a volume wheel! In fact, he told me he'd show me how to use all the cleaning instruments "next time."

He calibrated the hearing aids, and I got to see what I paid for. Technology! A remote device picked up what my hearing aids were doing, checked the feedback in my ears, and showed everything on a monitor. He adjusted the hearing aids so I could hear him easily. Too bad everyone doesn't speak as distinctly as the specialist.

I set out with a heart full of hope, recalling my comfort while wearing in-the-ear aids for many years. What I didn't remember was that when I started back in 1989, I began with one. I built up to two. A rude awakening was afoot.

The first full day of wearing the aids, I was miserable. Anyone whose ears get stopped up while in the air on a long flight will understand how I felt—stopped up ears, sounds of people talking far, far away. If I hadn't known how important this is, I might have jerked them out ... the hearing aids, not people talking.

The more I learn about the impact hearing loss has on the brain, the more amazed I am. I'm still trying to find a reference about the visual cortex becoming occupied with hearing when the nerves in the ear aren't up to the job. While I was trying to find a link to that Johns Hopkins study, I read another fascinating study from the same entity linking loss of hearing and the visual cortex.

An experiment was done with children who had been blind from birth. When they listened to a story being

read, the visual cortex of each of them lighted up. This was not true when the same experiment was done with sighted children. The results also did not show up with blind people who once could see. I am amazed that the visual cortex can be so closely associated

with hearing.

Incidentally, that experiment with the blind children did not have the same results when math problems were being read. You can take that for what it's worth.

By the second day with my new hearing aids, I was good to go. I no longer felt as though my voice was pushing against my ears. However, I was still saying, "Excuse me?" I was still having trouble hearing when I wasn't looking at the speaker's lips.

It's difficult to wait for the whole shebang, but I have only myself to blame ... myself and a healthcare system that doesn't find hearing to be sufficiently important to include in necessary care. I know there are thousands of people who put off getting hearing aids because they can't afford them.

All I can do about that is to urge everyone at any age to listen to your ears. Hearing tests are always free. Find out for certain whether you need help, and find a way to pay for hearing aids if you possibly can.

If you strain to hear, you strain your brain. If you have nerve damage and your ears are failing you, the visual cortex is going to try to help you hear. I have to learn more about this phenomenon. As I get used to my new hearing aids and have them tweaked week after week, I'll continue learning about the brain and its flexibility.

Watch this space.

My first article began two weeks ago when my cousin's husband was diagnosed with cancer. Within two weeks of diagnosis, he passed from that same illness. She and her family are devastated.

As she and I stood at his casket in my funeral home, she reached out and touched his hand. In a barely audible voice, she whispered to me, "I only hope he knew that I loved him." As tears swelled over the boundaries of my eyes, I assured her that he had.

How very sad to wonder if your spouse knew the depth of your love for him/her. As I drove in the car with my husband the next day, I reached for his hand. I looked at him and asked, "Sweet Pea, do you know that I love you more than life itself and that without you, my life would be over, and I would wither away in loneliness and sadness?" My husband looked at me and asked if there were something he should know about? I assured him that all was well, but that it was very important for me to know, that he knew, that my love for him was greater than my desire to live without him by my side.

As a funeral director, I see survivors who fail to express their love for their loved ones before life slips away suffer

Higher + Deeper + Wider + Longer: The Magnitude of God's Love

It's crazy, if you think about it. The God of the universe --- the Creator of all things --- loves us with a reckless, radical, unconditional, self-sacrificing love. I don't know if it is entirely possible on this side of heaven to fully understand the magnitude of God's love for those who love Him. But I do know that God's written word tries in every way to convey that message to us. In fact, in one of the Apostle Paul's prayers for the Ephesian believers, he prays, "[That you] may be able to comprehend *with all the saints* what is the *width* and *length* and *depth* and *height* --- to know the love of Christ which passes knowledge" (Eph. 3:18-19, Emphasis mine). So then, how big, how great, how high, how deep, how wide, and how long is God's love?

"God's love is bigger than anything we can ever imagine." Probably one of the best illustrations for the bigness of God's love is found in a sermon I heard not too long ago. In the sermon, the pastor uses an illustration pertaining to the size of the New Jerusalem that is spoken of in the Book of Revelation.

Perhaps the most unrecognized writer within all of Christendom is the little known, but widely read, Frank William (F.W.) Boreham. F. W. Boreham wrote some 55 books and more than 3000 editorials for the *Hobart Mercury* and *The Melbourne Age*. He was a master story teller and showed better than any other Christian author that God could be relevant in ways never before considered.

Frank Boreham preached on the Book of Revelation for many years and used to speak about this holy city and the size of it and he tried ever so to get an understanding of it. In his congregation there was an Australian engineer who became fascinated with the numbers associated with the holy city. So he went back to his office and he began to do some homework putting all of this information together. And one day he came to his pastor and he said, "Do you ever think about the size of this city?"

And not waiting for a response, the young engineer proceeded to share his statistics. He said, "Man, it's amazing! It's astounding! It beats everything I have ever heard of. John says that each of the walls this city measure 12,000 furlongs. Now if you worked that out, it will give you an area of 2

million, 250 thousand square miles at the base. The size of these dimensions are 1,500 miles each way.

Did you ever hear anything the like of that? The only city I have ever saw that was four square was Adelaide in South Australia and it was a nice city, but you and I know that Adelaide is only one square mile. Each of the four sides covers

only one square mile. London covers an area of a hundred and forty square miles. But this city, the city four square is 2,250,000 times as big as the city of Adelaide. It is 15,000 times as big as London. It is 20 times as big as all of New Zealand. It is 10 times as big as Germany and 10 times as big as France. It is 40 times as big as all England. It is ever so much bigger than India. Why it's an enormous continent within itself. But remember, that's just the ground level, because it is just as high as it is long and wide."¹

I don't know about you, but it is hard to imagine a city that big. Now how big is God's love? The love of God is bigger than the heavenly city of New Jerusalem. It is higher, deeper, wider, and longer than anything imaginable.

Here's something else I know about the magnitude of God's love ---- "God's love is greater than anything that we have ever or ever will experience." The Word of God makes a very bold statement concerning God's love for His children. It says, "Behold what manner of love the Father has bestowed on us, that we should be called the children of God!" (1 John 3:1 NKJV). The word "behold" comes from the Greek word that means "to know, see." It literally says, "Be sure to see this!" "Don't miss this! It is an observable, objective fact!"

The writer of these words did not want those who would read them to miss them --- "Be sure to see what manner of love God has bestowed on us, that we should be called the children of God!" The greatest experience anyone can ever have is being saved from eternal damnation by a loving God who adopts them as His child.

"God's love is higher, deeper, wider, and longer than any created thing." I believe there is no better passage of Scripture, other than Jesus dying on the

cross, which helps us to understand the magnitude of God's love than that of Romans 8:31-39. Please look at it with me:

What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare His own Son, but delivered Him up for us all, how shall He not with Him also freely give us all things? Who shall bring a charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is he who condemns? It is Christ who died, and furthermore is also risen, who is even at the right hand of God, who also makes intercession for us. Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword?

As it is written: "For Your sake we are killed all day long; We are accounted as sheep for the slaughter." Yet in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us. For I am persuaded that neither death nor life, nor angels nor principalities nor powers, nor things present nor things to come, nor height nor depth, nor any other created thing, shall be able to separate us from the love of God which is in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8:31-39 NKJV)

The greatest point that I find in this passage is that "no created thing" is able to separate us from the love of God." It gives me great hope and assurance that God is the only uncreated of all things, thereby meaning that He would be the only thing that can separate us from His great love. The Bible says that His love endures forever. How is it that God's love can endure forever, because there is nothing stronger than His great love!

How beautiful is God's love that His Son would lay down His crown, surrender His throne in heaven so that you and I could be found! How awesome is His love that He would conquer death and the grave so that we could have life everlasting in heaven. Love that can move mountains, yet knows us by name. His love is higher than the heavens above, wider than whatever we can dream of, deeper than any ocean imaginable, and will last for eternity. Do you know His love?

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
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

"And they're not just staying in the same line of work," Zimoski said, explaining of his crew left for a hardware store because the pay was better.

Goodman suggested Lippmann's pay scale be added to the Sept. 11 agenda for a council vote since the council cannot take action during a workshop.

Most agreed, but Council President Nancy Winger said she simply could not support it due to it costing the city \$198,000 more.

The money, she was told by Lippmann and finance director Stephen Bloom, would have to come from reserves and

contingencies. Winger said monies are already being taken from reserves for other projects and expenses

choose Lippmann's plan, Bloom said the 3 percent would not be added to most employees thereby saving about \$48,000.

Winger said \$150,000 was more palatable. Bloom also pointed out

that there are contingencies built into the budget each year and many are never spent, so that \$150,000 figure might be pared down as well.

According to the budget documents prepared for the council, the city will employ 93 people in FY 2018-2019, including the council and mayor. Other departments include: Administration 9, Police 25, Fire 28, Public Works 20 and Airport 5.

In large bowl using mixer, beat butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs one at a time. Add vanilla, oat flour mixture and pumpkin; beat until just blended. Stir in walnuts and chocolate chips. Spoon mixture into prepared pans.

Bake 50-55 minutes, or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes. Remove from pan. Cool completely.

In small bowl, stir confectioners' sugar and milk until smooth. Drizzle mixture over pumpkin bread.



learns how the Nazi lives with himself, by using justifications like how his role mostly consisted of paperwork and of course, that he was just following orders.

Eichmann also learns about Malkin, coaxing personal information out of him just to set him up for an act of extraordinary pettiness later.

Eichmann is under no delusion that the team is going to get his signature one way or another, but he's going to have his version of fun mak-

ing them work for it. "Operation Finale" can boast two first-rate performances from Isaac and Kingsley. It's also tight and exciting in parts, as it really has the 60s spy stuff (the most stylish era for spy stuff) down pat. But the plot rarely flows the way it's supposed to, as early storylines are forgotten midway through, the identification scene seems rushed, the obstacle with the signature seems contrived, and the ending is reminiscent of the imperfect climax to "Argo" (though this film does it better). Still, this

is a decent movie opening at a time that traditionally represents a low point for studio output. It's worth watching, even though few others will choose to do so.

Grade: B-

"Operation Finale" is rated PG-13 for disturbing thematic content and related violent images, and for some language. Its running time is 123 minutes.

She told me so numerous times.

Unfortunately, it was not a dream. In reality, she was standing there, beside me, wondering when the last time was that she told her husband that she loved him. Now

her opportunities are gone. She cannot reach over as they watch TV and cuddle up to him and say, "Sweetheart, I love you." She cannot take a cool glass of water out to him as he mows the lawn in the hot summer sun, and give him that sweet look between husband and wife that says, "I was thinking of how much I love you and appreciate all that you do for us." She cannot even bake him his favorite dessert or fold his laundry for him. Now she waits and tears herself apart because she wonders if he knew that she loved him.

Please do not put yourself in this situation. Take the time every day to reach out to those you love and express your love to them. Do not find yourself stand-

ing beside the casket of your loved one wondering if they knew your love existed. That is a miserable place to be. That will be the destruction of your peace, your life, and of your soul.





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
