30th North Central Florida Peanut Festival Saturday

Celebrate the harvest Williston-style

Longtime Williston residents remember the days of a peanut harvest parade led by farmers on their tractors. In 1988, the Williston Woman's Club jumped on board and orchestrated the first Peanut Festival. As it grew and required more work, the Williston Chamber of Commerce took over as the host and this Saturday the Chamber will sponsor the 30th annual North Central Florida Peanut Festival in Heritage Park.

From 9 a.m. until 3 p.m., more than 100 vendors from food to crafts and information will be on hand to greet thousands of visitors to the city.

The action starts in the pavilion with

opening ceremonies and continues throughout the day.

Butch Batts and the Southbound Band are the day's featured entertainment and Butch will act as the festivities' emcee.

The Chamber of Commerce's booth, located by the pavilion, is the hub for the festival and the place where someone will end up with \$2,000 cash in the Big Cash Giveaway.

While parents pore over jewelry, woodwork, clothing and food, children will delight with facepaint, games and a dig for fossils, sponsored by the Florida Museum of Natural History.

Nine arrested at block party

Acting on information that a block party was scheduled east of Williston this past week, the Levy County Sheriff's Department beefed up patrols in the area and ended up arresting nine individuals – most of them on drug charges.

According to information from the department's blog, the party was advertised among unnamed sources and promoted local rappers. Between 3,000-5,000 people were expected to attend.

"Having to allocate unscheduled resources to an event this size that has no official planning or identifiable organizers adds additional monetary stress to an already stressed budget", Sheriff Bobby McCallum said.

Don't be a statistic

This year more than 266,120 new cases of invasive breast cancer will be diagnosed in American women. That's over 14,000 more cases than last year.

Additionally, 63,960 new cases of carcinoma in situ, a noninvasive cancer that is the earliest form of breast cancer, will be diagnosed.

More than 40,920 women and 460 men will die this year from breast cancer.

One out of eight women, about 12 percent, will develop breast cancer in her lifetime.

Breast cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death in women. Only lung cancer kills more women each year. The chance that a woman will die from breast cancer is about 1 in 38, about 3 percent.

The Florida Agritourism Association (FATA) held its annual meeting to discuss economic trends in September at Williston's Red White & Blues Farm.

The blueberry farm, owned by Terry Robinson, is not only a large producer and shipper of several varieties of blueberries, it is also a venue for parties, weddings and reunions.

Businesses supporting the farm's hosting of the meeting included Drummond Community Bank, Ag Pro of Chiefland, Williston Pioneer, Farm Credit, Klover Leaf Western Wear and Levy Jones Inc.

Terms associated with breast cancer

Abscess — Localized collection of pus, usually from an infection.

Alopecia — Alopecia simply means hair loss. The loss can occur due to many reasons, but it is often a side effect of chemotherapy.

Areola — The circular pigmented area around the nipple.

Aspiration — The removal of tissue or fluid from a lump or a cyst with a needle and syringe.

Asymptomatic — Not presenting symptoms.

Benign — Benign tumors are not cancerous. They do not invade nearby tissue or spread to other parts of the body.

Biopsy — A biopsy is when the doctor removes a sample of tissue or cells. The sample is then examined under a microscope to check for cancer cells. There are excisional, incisional and needle biopsies.

Breast cancer — Breast cancer is a cancer that starts in the breast. The major types are: ductal carcinoma in

situ (DCIS), infiltrating ductal carcinoma, invasive lobular carcinoma, lobular carcinoma in situ (LCIS), medullary carcinoma and Paget's disease of the nipple.

Breast conservation surgery — A type of surgery used to remove the cancerous area of the breast while only taking a small area of normal tissue that surrounds it.

Breast reconstruction — This is a type of plastic surgery that artificially rebuilds the breast's contour after a mastectomy.

Calcifications — These are small calcium deposits that can show up in a mammogram. Certain formations of these can indicate the possibility of breast cancer.

Carcinoma — This type of cancer starts in the lining or covering of a gland or an organ.

Chemotherapy — A type of drug therapy used to destroy cancer cells.

Besides skin cancer, breast cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer among American women. In 2017, it's estimated that about 30 percent of newly diagnosed cancers in women will be breast cancers.

In women under 45, breast cancer is more common in African-American women than white women. Overall, African-American women are more likely to die of breast cancer. For Asian, Hispanic, and Native-American women, the risk of developing and dying from breast cancer is lower.

As of January 2018 there are more than 3.1 million women with a history of breast cancer in the U.S. This includes women currently being

treated and women who have finished treatment.

A woman's risk of breast cancer nearly doubles if she has a first-degree relative (mother, sister, daughter) who has been diagnosed with breast cancer. Less than 15 percent of women who get breast cancer have a family member diagnosed with it.

Death rates from breast cancer have been dropping since about 1989, with larger decreases in women younger than 50. These decreases are believed to be the result of finding breast cancer earlier through screening and increased awareness, as well as better treatments.

The *Williston Pioneer* proudly recognizes October as Breast Cancer Awareness Month and urges all women (and some men — about one man in every 1,000 gets breast

cancer) to perform monthly self checks, see a physician and have a mammogram.

Don't be a statistic. Be a well-educated consumer.

7 THINGS to KNOW ABOUT GETTING a MAMMOGRAM

A mammogram is an important step in taking care of yourself and your breasts. Knowing what to expect may help you navigate the process more smoothly. So here's what you need to know before you go:

A mammogram is an x-ray of the breast that's used to find breast changes. X-rays were first used to examine breast tissue nearly a century ago. Today, the x-ray machines used for mammograms produce lower energy x-rays and expose the breast to much less radiation compared with those in the past.

WHAT IS A MAMMOGRAM?

WHERE TO GET IT

Find a center that specializes in mammograms. The US Food and Drug Administration certifies mammogram facilities that meet high professional standards of quality and safety. Ask to see the FDA certificate if one isn't posted near the receptionist's desk. And when you find a facility you like, stick with it. Having all your mammograms at the same facility will make it easier for doctors to compare images from one year to the next. If you've had mammograms done at other facilities, have those images sent to your new facility.

WHEN TO SCHEDULE IT

It's best to schedule your mammogram about a week after your menstrual period. Your breasts won't be as tender or swollen, which means less discomfort during the x-ray.

WHAT (AND WHAT NOT) TO WEAR

Wear a 2-piece outfit because you will need to remove your top and bra. Do not apply deodorant, antiperspirant, powder, lotion, or ointment on or around your chest on the day of your mammogram. These products can appear as white spots on the x-ray.

WHAT TO EXPECT

The entire procedure takes about 20 twenty minutes. The breast is compressed between two plastic plates for a few seconds while an x-ray is taken. It is repositioned (and compressed again) to take another view. This is then done on the other breast. Flattening the breast can be uncomfortable, but is needed to provide a clearer view.

GETTING THE RESULTS

You should get your results within 30 days. If you don't, you should call to ask about them. If doctors find something suspicious, you'll likely be contacted within a week to take new pictures or get other tests. But that doesn't mean you have cancer. A suspicious finding may be just dense breast tissue or a cyst. Other times, the image just isn't clear and needs to be retaken. If this is your first mammogram, your doctor may want to look at an area more closely simply because there is no previous mammogram for comparison.

Under the Affordable Care Act, Medicare and almost all private insurance plans now cover yearly mammograms, with no co-pay or other out-of-pocket costs. Medicaid also covers mammograms. For uninsured or low-income women, free or low-cost programs are available. Some programs are held during Breast Cancer Awareness Month in October, while others are year-round. Call the American Cancer Society at 1-800-227-2345 to find a program near you.

LAST DAY TO REGISTER TO VOTE FOR GENERAL ELECTION OCTOBER 9, 2018

If you're a first-time registrant in the State of Florida, in order to be eligible to vote in the General Election you must file a completed **Florida Voter Registration Application** by **October 9, 2018**. Registrations that are mailed must be postmarked by this date. If you're already registered but need to update your address, submit your changes by telephone, on-line, on a voter registration application or by written letter that includes your signature and date of birth. Failure to update your address prior to Election Day may result in delays at the polls. If you have not voted since the last election, you should check your voter registration status on-line, www.VoteLevy.com, or call 352-486-5163.

With the 2018 elections fast approaching it's important that you update your signature if you haven't done so already. Signatures can change over time due to aging or medical conditions. When there are significant changes to your signature or identifying "mark" you need to update that signature with our office.

For those who vote by mail your signature on file becomes even more important. Once your vote by mail ballot is returned to our office, the signature on your ballot certificate envelope is immediately compared to the signature on your voter record.

To update your signature you'll need to complete a Florida Voter Registration Application Form. Application forms can be found at all of the libraries within Levy County or on our website at www.VoteLevy.com. Voters can also request an application form to be sent to their home by calling the Elections Office at 352-486-5163.



Recently uncoupled women often evolve through three stages after the death of a spouse. The acronym G.A.P., which stands for Grief, Adaptation and Perseverance, accurately describes the stages of transition that many women experience. During this time there is a significant disruption in normal lifestyle and familiar living patterns.

The first stage is grieving. Most recently widowed women are far too unsettled to tackle any major financial issues immediately. In some cases, women are living alone again for the first time in decades and find themselves feeling literally unmoored. Not only are they grieving the loss of a loved one, they are challenged on multiple fronts with new responsibilities.

Everyone is different, but in general, we recommend no major life changes be made immediately following the death of a spouse. However, some basic financial issues must be addressed and if a woman has already established a relationship with a

Failure produces success

Death can be a frightening, lonely, and painful experience. I see death every day of the week. In fact, I have seen death every single day of the past decade.

In witnessing this plethora of death, I have gained a unique perspective on the ultimate pain of loss, as well as the struggles through its ensuing grief. Of late, I have found the number of proportionate deaths within the generations younger than my own, soaring. These deaths seem directly related to lifestyles that have negatively affected physical and/or mental health. It seems that a good number of prime-aged adults either do not realize or do not care, about consequences related to actions and choices: even when that consequence is death.

I find that persons devoid of consequential beliefs often act irresponsibly toward themselves and others. They seem oblivious to the pain they impose upon those who love them and disrespectful toward a higher being. Upon their death, those who share their inconsequential belief system suffer the demons of loss and grief through inconsolable hopelessness. It seems that more times than not, their solutions are based on wrangling their pain, as they do their responsibilities, into suppression. This myth of recovery is not one of healing; it is one of self-deception and may impose confusion, derangement, paranoia, and neurosis into the life of the survivor.

In all fairness, I see these same behaviors in older generations. It is a reality, however; that I see the consequences of death in greater numbers among prime-aged adults. It pains and worries me that so many of them self-inflict their deaths due to selfish acts of abuse upon themselves. Additionally, it frightens me beyond comprehension, as I have children and grandchildren within this demographic. As their mother and grandmother, I see the impact of the inconsequential lifestyle infiltrating their tolerance and becoming acceptable to them. Before long, I fear that they may succumb to the same end as those I see lying on my embalming table.

What then is the answer to this life-threatening lifestyle of inconsequential behavior? When my grandmother was a young child, she was deprived of life's comforts due to extreme poverty. As a young woman, she suffered through the great depression. As a married woman and mother, my grandmother suffered the fallout of marriage to an alcoholic. These experiences, although loathsome, made her strong both physically and psychologically. In today's world,

my grandmother would be enslaved through governmental programs. She would be heavily medicated, bombarded with assistance dollars that she did not earn, diagnosed with all sorts of syndromes and indulgences that would be the fault of others rather than herself, and living in some sort of project housing. In short, her self-respect and dignity would be robbed from her by programs designed to enslave her to a life of dependence rather than encourage self-reliance and dignity. In her time, she merely handled her responsibilities.

My grandmother loved me and bore life's burdens for me before I was ever born. Her sufferings made her selfless and filled her soul with love and gratitude. She was self-reliant and did not waste time with feeling sorry for her self. Her life was very different and much more painful than my own.

Perhaps therein lies the mystery. My children and grandchildren live far away from their parents and grandparents. Although they have suffered disappointments in life, neither they nor I, have suffered the trials of production based survival. Furthermore, should we behave irresponsibly; we need not even suffer our deserved shame among our peers. Our survival is not based on merit or accomplishment; it is based on dysfunction and frailty. The poorer our performance, the greater our undeserving reward. Undeserving programs isolate human beings from each other by robbing us of our need to rely upon each other, as well as the dignity found through self-reliance, self-achievement, self-improvement, and accomplishment.

I see young people all around me suffering unparalleled sadness, isolation, mental illness, and premature death. I have lamented over what to do to affect positively, and save the needless loss of life in the generations that follow my own. It occurs to me that perhaps speaking the truth to make them strong, rather than giving handouts, which make them weak, might save them.

It is time that we irradiate this growing epidemic of self-inflicted, premature death among the prime aged and younger adults within our society. To accomplish this we must do what we have failed to do - allow them to experience the consequences of childhood failures. Failing builds strength and character. It promotes better choices and greater responsibility. In short, the experience of failure produces a future of success.

I want to see the success of lives lived to old age, not prime age.

Bob At The Movies

Night School

"Night School" is the latest vehicle for Kevin Hart, who stars alongside red-hot comedic actress Tiffany Haddish. Haddish hasn't yet worn out her welcome with me, but Hart certainly has.

I can't remember the last time I saw him in a live-action role where he wasn't insufferable. Part of the problem is that he's one of those actors who's constantly allowed to improvise his own dialogue, which means he gets to riff and ramble until he decides the scene is over.

The result is usually a plodding, painful, unfunny film. But the result this time is a plodding, painful, actually-kind-of-funny film, no thanks to Hart.

Hart stars as Teddy, a barbeque huckster who dropped out of high school as a teenager when he decided he didn't need book smarts to get through life. Cut to present day and he's actually very successful.

He drives a Porsche, he's in line to inherit his place of business, and he's about to marry the woman of his dreams (Megyn Echikunwoke).

But then an accident with a champagne cork and an open gas line derails his plans. He needs a new job fast, and if he wants to get anything decent, he'll have to get his GED. And to do that he'll have to go to, you guessed it, Night School.

Night School is a nightmare for Teddy. He has to take classes at his old high school, where a disgruntled former classmate (Taran Killam) is now the principal.

The class is full of weirdos, one of whom (Al Madrigal) is a waiter who got fired in a scheme to get out of paying a pricey restaurant bill. And the teacher (Haddish) actually expects him to learn the material instead of letting him cruise through the course like he wants.

On top of all that, he suffers from a number of learning disabilities that prevent him getting anywhere academically. Teddy's going to have to use his street smarts to full effect if he wants to get out of doing things the honest way. As you can probably guess, he does eventually learn the value of doing things the honest way.

Hart is his usual annoying self in this movie, and Haddish is mostly dragged down to his level, especially in scenes where the two interact with each other (many of which are exchanges where the two were clearly filmed separately).

But there is some decent humor in this movie, even in that improvised rambling style that Hart does so badly. That's because there are laughs to be mined from Teddy's classmates, including Madrigal as an immi-

The seeds of relativism

In our postmodern age, the philosophy of total indulgence in immoral pleasures has become the societal norm. It seems no matter where you look, including in many churches, you will find the teaching of moral relativism. Moral relativism is the teaching that there is no absolute system of morals or ethics, that you can do whatever you feel like doing as long as no one gets hurt. Lying, stealing, cheating, and "hooking up" with no strings attached is fully acceptable under our new "enlightened" way of relativistic thinking --- get whatever you can because life is short and enjoy it to the fullest. For those that have fallen for such lies, there are dangers to be aware of:

"Relativism commits treason against a holy God." Ask anyone today, "What is truth?" and you're probably going to get many different answers. Try it on a university campus and you're likely to get ran off. The concept of truth has clearly fallen on hard times, and the consequences of rejecting it are ravaging human society.

Relativism is an all-out attack on the objective reality of God. The sheer existence of God creates the possibility of truth. Truth finds its origin in God, its incarnation in Jesus Christ, and its present manifestation in the written Word of God, the Bible. However, when someone says that there is no standard of truth and falsehood for everyone, they are speaking like an atheist. In essence, they are rebelling against a holy God.

When a society rebels against the very concept of a divine law and a divine law Giver, there will be chaos in the streets. As one person has stated, "It will be a time of 'anything goes.'"

"Relativism breeds hypocrisy and duplicity." There is no better passage of Scripture that explains this than that which we looked at last week --- Romans chapters 1 and 2. In Romans chapter 1, Paul proclaims God's wrath upon those who practice unrighteousness and ungodliness though they

know the truth they suppress it. In chapter 2, he continues but now Paul looks to those who are moral hypocrites. He says, "Therefore you have no excuse, O man, every one of you who judges. For in passing judgment on another you condemn yourself, because you, the judge, practice the very same things. We know that the judgment of God rightly falls on those who practice such things. Do you suppose, O man—you who judge those who practice such things and yet do them yourself—that you will escape the judgment of God?" (Romans 2:1-3 ESV)

This is the very reason I don't put too much stock into what the Hollywood elite and the majority of the leaders in congress have to say about morality. Far too many of them are too busy trying to tell the public what is morally right and wrong, while at the same time doing the same thing they politicize against. But sadly, we see this same exact scenario being played out in many churches and denominations. The leaders preaching against immorality but then being immoral. And we wonder why so many lost people aren't interested in being saved, but too, we are aghast that society has moved so far away from believing in the absolutes of right and wrong.

"Relativism changes the role of language." My friends, "Words are powerful!" We now find ourselves living in a society where we use our language to hurt others. In a society built on relativism, it will be difficult to trust what people say. They may say one thing when in reality they mean something entirely different. In a society that holds fast to relativism, it will be terribly difficult in finding the truth in what people say. Have you ever wondered why there is such a divisive discourse on political topics these days? There it is! We are having a hard time in finding out "who" is telling the truth and "what" the truth is.

"Relativism disguises greed with flattery." Dr. John Piper comments,

"When relativism has abolished the truth as the governor of language, language itself goes on sale. If we can get more money by telling people what they want to hear, we will give them what they want.

Relativism is the perfect atmosphere for turning language into pretext for greed by flattering people with what they want to hear. This is no surprise to Paul. 'The time is coming,' he says, 'when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, and will turn away from listening to the truth'" (2 Timothy 4:3-4).

"Relativism disguises pride with humility." If you believe in a truth that all people must embrace in order to be saved, you will be called arrogant or intolerant. On the other hand, relativism is put forward as the mark of humility. In a society that rejects absolute truth, the only vice that cannot be tolerated is intolerance. The greatest virtue in today's world is tolerance—being open to every belief.

"Relativism enslaves those who use it." The relativist's way of thinking leads people away from a love of the truth and back into slavery to sin. "Jesus said to those Jews who believed Him, 'If you abide in My word, you are My disciples indeed. And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free'" (John 8:31-32 NKJV). Jesus' sacrifice did not free us "to do our own thing;" rather he freed us from doing our own thing so that we could serve Him!

"Relativism destroys freedom." When relativism takes firm root in a nation, everyone begins to do what is right in his own eyes without regard for submission to truth. When this happens, society begins to break down and chaos ensues. Virtually every structure in a free society depends on some measure of submission to the truth. When we fail to acknowledge the truth as a society, we will lose the freedom to speak the truth.

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Just get the mammogram

It's coming on six years that a skilled surgeon and her students removed the breast that was trying to kill me. I don't miss it. If the other one gets any ideas it's going too.

Five years of taking medication to stave off any chance of the cancer coming back.

That's usually a landmark for those who have had cancer. If it does not come back, or creep into new places, you are generally considered at low risk for a recurrence.

I just had to be different. I remember the five year mark and the discussion with my doctor. I was young enough to think I could be immortal and could beat back anything.

I know better. I have watched too many women who learned during routine mammograms they had tumors, and after surgery that they would need radiation (a taste of how hell will burn your soul) and chemo (yes let's all lose our sense of taste and smell among other things).

Right now a friend's mother is in the battle of her life. She will win. This fine lady is tougher than cancer.

And so many improvements have been made in the last four decades. Gene testing of the tumor said I had a 5 percent or less chance of it recurring and my daily medication tamps that down some. That is reassuring. Wish I had that when the first tumor was removed at 19.

For now I have one side of my body that has probably one lymph node working to replace the many that once handled bodily fluid. No blood pressure taken or blood drawn or shots on that arm because the nodes that would react and process it are gone.

That one little node sometimes falls behind in its work and causes some swelling on that side of my body, but it's a trouper. I wonder if I will need to wear a compression sleeve in the future to nudge the fluids along to find other spots to be pumped and processed.

oncologist.

The last visit will be in April, the fifth anniversary of the surgery. Or maybe not. I have heard that the medicine I take now has a recommended 10-year protocol.

All this for something 0.8 mm in size that was "invasive" and ready to take over if it grew just another 0.2 mm.

And it was caught by a routine mammogram.

Nothing was routine about it. It rocked my life. It worried my husband, family and friends. And I am so grateful for the prayers.

Right after that a number of women told me they had not gotten a mammogram. In years. Ever.

In every "pink" paper I say this: Get a mammogram now. Do not put it off.

So I am asking again.

You have not gotten a mammogram yet?

Go back and read what I went through and others go through every day fighting for that bit of life to have another birthday, anniversary, meet the first grandchild, attend a child's wedding, and simply enjoy a great meal, a great view of a day of being healthy again.

Get the damn mammogram.

If it's bad news, all of us in Levy will support you until there's good news.

flags can fly from atop the monument.

The company sent a new pattern to the city but it too was wrong, according to CJ Zimoski, the city's utilities supervisor. City staff redrew the pattern and sent it back to the company last week.

Whether the company comes back to Williston or sends how staff can correct the problem is anyone's guess, according

to Councilman Charles Goodman, who is afraid the company will walk away from the project.

Goodman also reminded Hethcoat this is Ken Schwiebert and the CRA's project but Hethcoat said to him, "And who is in charge of the CRA? The city council."

The company was to be paid in three draws: one at the beginning, the second when the monument was installed and the third 30 days after completion.

To date the last

installment of about \$16,000 has not been paid and will not be until the CRA accepts a finished complete project.

Goodman also said legal action would cost more money and it would not see that the project is finished this year.

The fact that Matthews Granite is trying to rectify the wrong is progress, Goodman told Hethcoat, who countered, "This has gone on too long."

Core biopsy — A procedure to remove tissue or fluid from a lump or a cyst with a large bore needle and a syringe.

Dimpling — One of the things breasts exams look for is dimpling. Dimpling causes a pucker, dip or small hollow area in the breast's skin.

Ductal carcinoma in situ — Cancer that starts and remains in one or more of the breast's milk ducts. It is ductal carcinoma in situ when it has not penetrated through the duct's walls or into any surrounding tissue.

Dysplasia — An area or group of cells that appear abnormal in size, shape and appearance but are not cancerous.

Estrogen receptor assay — A diagnostic procedure to see if a tumor's growth is dependent on estrogen.

Excisional biopsy or total biopsy — This is a procedure where the entire suspected lump and some of the surrounding normal tissue are removed.

Fibroadenoma — This is a fibrous benign growth in the breast that feels like a firm lump.

Fine needle aspiration — A procedure to remove tissue or fluid from a lump or a cyst with a thin needle and a syringe.

Hormonal therapy — A course of cancer treatment that removes, blocks or adds hormones.

Hyperplasia — These are a group of normal-looking cells whose reproduction is too high. This can be due to a mutation that creates an abnormal area or "growth."

Invasive cancer — These are cancers that are capable of growing beyond their original site and end up invading neighboring tissue.

Malignant — Types of cells that show uncontrollable growth or growth that has recurred after removal. Malignant cells are those that may invade the surrounding tissue or metastasize (spread) to distant tissue.

Mammogram — A diagnostic X-ray that shows the internal structure of the breast. It is used to screen or locate cancers of the breast.

Mastectomy — A surgical procedure that removes part or all of the breast.

Modified radical mastectomy — Surgical procedure that removes the breast, skin, nipple, areola and most of the axillary lymph nodes on the same side. The chest muscles are left intact.

Needle aspiration or needle biopsy — The term used for the procedure that removes a specimen of suspected tissue by use of a needle.

Partial mastectomy — A surgical procedure that doesn't remove the whole breast. It takes only part of the breast in which the cancer

occurs and a small amount of the healthy tissue around it.

Prosthesis — An artificial substitute for a missing body part. Breast implants that are used to reconstruct the breast after a mastectomy would be considered a prosthesis.

Radiation therapy — A type of treatment for cancer that uses radiation to destroy the cancer cells.

Radical mastectomy — A surgical procedure for breast cancer that removes the breast, skin, major and minor pectoral muscles, and all axillary and internal mammary lymph nodes on the affected side.

Recurrence — This is when a cancer has reappeared after it has appeared to disappear or been previously removed.

Remission — This is when the symptoms and signs of cancer appear to have disappeared.

Sarcoma — A type of cancer that arises in connective tissue.

Staging — A way of describing the extent of cancer that is used to determine the course of treatment. It is based upon the size of the tumor, the involvement of lymph nodes, and whether there is any metastasis.

Systemic — Cancer that has spread to other parts of the body.

trusted advisor prior to her husband's passing, she can rely on the advisor to handle most of these tasks, like changing names on accounts and filing for benefits from pensions and life insurance policies. If not, it's often during this period that widows hire an advisor.

The second stage is adjustment. After a time, many women begin a period of financial and emotional adaptation. They may still grieve, but they become more comfortable thinking about selling their home or moving near family. Some begin to take a significant interest in their financial future at this juncture. Most understand intuitively that their money must last a lifetime, and they become more engaged about discussing with their advisor things like how their portfolio can provide additional income. They also usually reach a comfort level with living on only one Social Security check, as

well as living alone on a budget.

Lastly, women in transition must persevere. The recognition that they alone are responsible for their financial future is a significant awakening, one that many women acknowledge in various ways by year two. About 700,000 women become widowed annually in the U.S. Many rely on their church and other structured groups for social outlets. Not all want to remarry. In fact, older widowers are ten times more likely than women to remarry after the death of a spouse. As people are living longer, many women will find themselves living alone for upwards of 20 years. Smart couples prepare for such an eventuality before the death of a spouse.



The movie is littered with problems, like Haddish not being that good of a teacher (if literally none of the people in your class understand the material, the

problem is with you), entire scenes and subplots that could be cut (Teddy has to get a part time job wearing a chicken suit - ha ha?), and Kevin Hart basically being Kevin Hart.

In fact, I'd even go so far as to say that this is a flat-out bad movie. But it's a bad movie that I liked, and therefore I have no choice but to say that you might like

it too.




