It's a feast of economic good news

Levy boasts 16,702 jobs

Just in time for Thanksgiving, today's release of the region's employment numbers offers plenty of economic good news to feast on.

While the October unemployment rate in the CareerSource Citrus Levy Marion region was unchanged over the month at 3.7, it was down nearly a full percentage point compared to the same time last year.

The labor force was 202,179, representing a slight expansion of 316 over the month, the number of those working increased by 309 to 194,611 while the number of unemployed remained virtually unchanged at 7,568, an increase of just 7.

But it is the comparison to October 2017 that shows the strength of the region's economic recovery, according to Kathleen Woodring, CareerSource CLM's executive vice president.

Over the year, the region's labor force expanded by 4,204, the number of workers increased by 5,759 and the number of jobless dropped by 1,555.

According to today's release of the October employment summary by the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, Levy County continues to hold the lowest jobless rate in the region at 3.3 percent, Marion County's rate is unchanged at 3.6 percent, and Citrus County's rate is also unchanged from the previous month at 4.3 percent. Florida's not seasonally adjusted jobless rate – a measure that matches the way local rates are calculated – remains at 3.0 percent, a decrease of 0.9 percentage point over the year.

Citrus County's labor force grew by 228 to 48,591, the number of employed rose by 224 to 46,486 and the number of unemployed remained virtually unchanged, increasing by 4 to 2,105. Compared to October 2017, when the jobless rate was 5.2 percent, that's an increase of 1,268 in the number of those with jobs and a decrease of 387 unemployed.

Levy County's labor force expanded by 88 to 17,265, the number of those with jobs increased by 482 to 16,702, and the number of unemployed edged up by 6 to 563. That's an

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
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Thanksgiving Trivia:

Runners, get ready

Ugly Sweater race deadlines Nov. 29

Starting out with a few threads, organizers for the Ugly Sweater 5K have woven the event into one of the more popular road races in both Marion and Citrus County the past two years.

After a record-breaking event a year ago, the Rainbow River Runners, in partnership with the DHS Booster Club, are expecting another record setting turnout in what they say will be the "best" year yet. A year ago, the Ugly Sweater 5K and 1-Mile Fun Walk drew 308 participants for both the 3.1-mile race and the 1-Mile Fun Walk, shattering the previous best of 147. This year's event will be at 8 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 1, at Blue Run Park.

So why such success? That's easy, according to Virginia Hatch, race director and president of the Rainbow River Runners.

"It's not just a race; we want it to be a giant holiday party," she explained. "We want everyone to come out and have a great time, and I think we've been able to accomplish that. This year, it's going to be the biggest and best yet."

A tall order for sure, Hatch said, but she is confident that it can be done. Because of the increase in participants a year ago, the run club began working in earnest a year ago to tweak the event. Two of the major changes, she explained, are adding a new age division for younger participants in the 5K. In addition, the first

300 participants who cross the finish line will receive a custom finisher medal. But, for a unique twist, Hatch said, runners and area run clubs are encouraged to form teams so they can vie for the team trophy, which will be scored like a cross country meet in which the six fastest times will be used.

"It's something extra we can offer runners," Hatch said about the decision. "We've seen it done at a few other races throughout the year and it just adds a friendly competition among run clubs, but also with other sports teams and school clubs."

The finisher medal, though, is a special touch, she said.

"Runners love bling," she said, noting such an item had been discussed in previous years, but the surge in numbers made the decision easy to add it to this year's race.

Now while the connotation is that it is an "Ugly Sweater," participants do not have to run in one, though she said people do go "all out." But there is the "Ugly Sweater" competition during the raffle and awards ceremony.

Most important about the event, Hatch said, is the youths of the community are the ones who benefit. All monies from the race the past two years have been donated to the Dunnellon High School general athletic fund, more than \$10,000 in total. Also, she said, there is a competition to encourage elementary, middle and high school students, sports teams

and clubs to participate in the event. A cash prize to the school, club or team with the most participation in either the run or fun walk is also a way to encourage youths and their families to participate.

To encourage youth participation, school-aged children can register for \$10 each and must do in paper format (available on the Rainbow River Runners Facebook page). The discounted rate does not include a T-shirt or goody bag, which will be given to the first 300 registered participants. Otherwise, fees are \$25 now through Friday, Nov. 23, for the 5K, and \$30 the week leading up to the race. Cost is \$20 for the 1-Mile Fun Walk through the day of the event. Proceeds benefit the Dunnellon High

School athletics programs.

Registration forms are available at the Dunnellon Chamber & Business Association office at 20500 E. Pennsylvania Ave., or the Riverland News office at 20441 E. Pennsylvania Ave., or register online at runsignup.com/Race/FL/Dunnellon/UglySweater5KandMileFunWalkRun.

"We'd be remiss if we didn't thank the dozens of sponsors who support this endeavor for the community," Hatch said. "We encourage the community to come out and have a great time for a great cause."

Florida gas prices fall

Gasoline prices in Florida have fallen 6.7 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.51/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 8,237 stations in Florida. This compares with the national average that has fallen 5.6 cents per gallon versus last week to \$2.62/g, according to GasBuddy.

Average gasoline prices on November 18 in Florida have ranged widely over the last five years:

\$2.48/g in 2017, \$2.10/g in 2016, \$2.15/g in 2015, \$2.85/g in 2014 and \$3.21/g in 2013.

Including the change locally during the past week, prices yesterday were 3.8 cents per gallon higher than a year ago and are 24.8 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has dropped 24.1 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 7.5 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

Areas near Florida and their current gas price climate:

Sarasota- \$2.39/g, down 8.7 cents per gallon from last week's \$2.48/g.

Tampa- \$2.32/g, down 8.5 cents per gallon from last week's \$2.40/g.

over-the-year increase of 240 employed and drop of 101 unemployed when the rate was 3.9 percent.

Marion County's labor force experienced no change over the month, remaining at 136,323; the number of those with jobs rose by 3 to 131,423 and the number of unemployed fell by 3 to 4,900. Compared to October 2017, when the jobless rate was 4.5 percent, there were 4,251 more employed and 1,067 fewer unemployed.

Nonfarm employment in the Ocala metropolitan statistical area was 105,600, an increase of

800 jobs over the month and 4,000 more than a year ago, for a 3.9 percent annual job growth gain. Woodring said the report highlights several positives for the region:

- The Homosassa Springs MSA had the fastest annual job growth rate compared to all metro areas in the state in state government at 6.7 percent, adding 300 new jobs.
- The Ocala MSA continued to hold the second fastest annual job growth rate compared to all metro areas in the state in education and health services, at 5.9 percent, adding 1,100 jobs.
- The Ocala MSA tied for second fastest annual job growth rate

in trade, transportation and utilities at 3.9 percent. An increase of 900 new jobs.

- The Ocala MSA had the state's third fastest annual job growth rate in leisure and hospitality at 8.1 percent, a gain of 1,000 new jobs.

All grew faster in the Ocala metro area than statewide over the year, as did manufacturing at 6% (+500 jobs) and professional and business services at 4.4% (+400 jobs). Mining, logging and construction, at 4.3 percent (+300 jobs) also gained over the year.

Financial activities and other services each lost 100 jobs compared to October 2017, while information and gov-

ernment industries were unchanged.

According to the employment data for October, unemployment rates remained unchanged in 35 counties, rose in 17 and fell in 15.

The county with the highest unemployment rate in the state was Hendry County at 5.4 percent.

Citrus County again tied with Sumter County for the third highest rate, Marion County again tied with Miami-Dade County, but nudged up two spots to claim the 10th highest rate and Levy County tied with four other counties with the 20th highest rate.

Auschwitz, tragedy and the Dance of Life

Now, at age 93, she performs the rumba, the fox-trot, the merengue and the tango.

All of us face significant life difficulties, including financial challenges and concerns. Many of us obsess over market movements, investments and our bank balance. Few of us, however, have experienced the cruelty and loss that has plagued the life of Manhattan resident Helena Weinrauch.

Corey Kilgannon of the *New York Times* recently chronicled her story. It began in Poland. Hitler invaded in 1939 and Helena and her loved ones, along with other Jewish families, were marked for death.

Helena "passed" briefly as a gentile and danced with a Nazi officer at a social gathering. But her pose was discovered, and the officer, angry at being deceived, assigned her to concentration camps (including Auschwitz) rather than immediate execution, thinking this a punishment worse than death. Her parents and her sister and other relatives were murdered.

A march from Auschwitz in freezing conditions almost killed her. British soldiers rescued her from a pile of dead bodies when they took control of the camp at Bergen-Belsen near the war's end. One soldier noticed that her body was warm and that she was still breathing. She weighed 60 pounds.


Later she moved to New York and married Joseph Weinrauch, a German native who had also escaped the Nazi's reign of terror. Tragedy hounded Helena, though. Her only child, daughter Arlene, died of breast cancer in the 1990s. Her husband Joseph died in 2006. She was completely alone.

A flyer arrived in the mail a few years back, offering free dance lessons. On the designated evening, she walked to the studio from her apartment and found other dancers, mostly in their 20s and 30s. A friendly instructor encouraged her to try anyway, and showed her a few simple movements.

Soon she began hiring instructors to accompany and dance with her at venues outside the studio. She loved it. Now she dances several times a week. "When I dance, I forget what happened to me and it makes me feel for a few minutes or hours that I am happy," she says.

In the face of tragedy, Helena Weinrauch not only survives, but celebrates through dance. This story is worth repeating, as we express thanks for all the good in our lives and draw inspiration from those, like Helena, who have the ability to transcend unspeakable horrors.

Fantastic Beasts

The "Fantastic Beasts" series exists as a way for J.K. Rowling to build on the extremely lucrative Wizarding World franchise without continuing to shove Harry Potter down our throats.

Taking place in the 1920s, the prequel series follows magical animal expert Newt Scamander (Eddie Redmayne) as he tries to go about caring for the wondrous creatures without getting sucked into a major conflict in the wizarding community.

But no matter how hard he tries, trouble always seems to find him.

In 2016's "Fantastic Beasts and Where to Find Them," he accidentally stumbled upon a plot to infiltrate the U.S. wizard government by evil European wizard Grindelwald (Johnny Depp).

Grindelwald was arrested at the end of that film, but the opening moments of "The Crimes of Grindelwald" see him escape back to Europe so he can... commit crimes.

Everybody wants a piece of Newt Scamander. The British Ministry of Magic, where his brother Theseus (Callum Turner) works, wants him to take on a position with them, dangling badly-needed travel papers as bait.

His old friends Jacob (Dan Fogler) and Queenie (Alison Sudol) play the role of intrusive houseguests. And Albus Dumbledore (Jude Law) wants him to go to Paris to make a move against Grindelwald without the Ministry's consent.

Newt initially refuses until he learns that his American love interest Tina (Katherine Waterston) is also in Paris, and he desperately wants to reconnect with her ever since she cut off communication after a newspaper article mistakenly identified him as the fiancé of Leta Lestrange (Zoe Kravitz), who is in fact engaged to Theseus, but is also his former girlfriend.

Grindelwald, for his part, is rebuilding his empire. He still has the loyalty of about half the wizards in Europe, and he's still in the ear of the extremely powerful, yet internally tormented Credence Barebone (Ezra Miller).

Credence survived his apparent death in the first movie, and has since fled to Europe where he's been working at a sideshow with his cursed friend Nagini (Claudia Kim) while he looks for answers about his family history.

Grindelwald wants to use Credence to kill Dumbledore and Dumbledore needs people like Newt to stop Grindelwald because they are unable to personally harm each other due to a bond in their shared past (officially it's

a spell, but there's an unspoken emotional component as well). Thus they need to find loopholes in order to move against one another.

The film is really heavy on plot, with little room for fun along the way. I miss the sections of these movies where the characters just babbled about, say, wizard candy for several minutes.

We don't even get much of the Fantastic Beasts this time around, outside of a scene where Newt goes home for a minute or two before being interrupted.

I guess my favorite creature in the movie is a sort of lion/dragon hybrid, but they're all so irrelevant that it's hard to get excited about any of them, as the film has to throw more characters and exposition at us that I'll have forgotten by the time the next movie rolls around. That's this mov-

ie's lot, it wants to set up things that will be exciting and clever in future installments, but at the expense of being bloated and overwritten itself, thus decreasing interest in those future installments and the franchise as a whole.

There's magic to be found in "Fantastic Beasts: The Crimes of Grindelwald." The sets, costumes, special effects, and actors are all up to the standards of the Wizarding World. But it's the overstuffed script by J.K. Rowling herself that makes this an ultimately bland entry. I'll see the future films, of course, but this franchise needs to turn itself around on the next film or else the whole series is going to get written off as a creative misfire.

Instead of being angry about a situation, I'm thankful. Instead of mulling over in my head of what I'd like to really say to *That person*, I choose to be thankful.


I'm not thankful for my situation, I chose to be thankful in my situation.
