

City approves police raises, RV park land-use amendments

The Chiefland City Commission on Aug. 13 approved pay increases for several jobs within the Chiefland Police Department.

The new rates take effect Oct. 1, and include: dispatcher \$1,500; police officer \$2,500; corporal \$2,500; and sergeant \$3,000.

City Manager Mary Ellzey and George Corwine, President of the North Central Florida Police Benevolent Association, have been negotiating the

pay increases as well as allowing officers to drive patrol cars home as long as they reside within Levy County.

Beauchamp and Edwards Certified Public Accountant Letter of Engagement, which includes increases from the current estimated fees of \$12,900 to \$13,200, was approved unanimously by the commission. The additional charges are for non-recurring procedures due to the transition of the city's bookkeeping staff.

The City Commission approved a pair of ordinances amending the land use codes for Southern

Leisure RV park sites. City Commissioner Teresa Barron casted the sole no vote on the second and final reading of both ordinances, saying she felt the impact of the two RV parks had not been thoroughly evaluated.

Ordinance 18-05 amends Chiefland Comprehensive Plan for property owned by Southern Leisure RV Resort from Commercial to Residential, High Density. Ordinance 18-06 amends Land Development Code from C-2, Highway Commercial to R-2, Residential, also owned by Southern Leisure.

Primary election is Aug. 28

Multiple county offices will be decided in Primary; three judicial candidates vie

Along with selecting their preference for candidates to represent their party in the fall, voters participating in the August 28 primary election will decide three county-wide races in Levy.

The two Levy County Com-

mission races and a School Board race are Universal Primary Contests, meaning the winner would have no opposition in the fall election, as both candidates are from the same party. The races are open to all eligible voters, regardless of party.

Incumbent Lilly Rooks is facing opponent Ryan Bell in

the District 4 contest. Incumbent Rock Meeks is facing challenger Terance Reed in the District 2 race for County Commission.

Gary Bennett and Ashley Breeden Clemenzi are vying for the District 5 seat on the School Board of Levy County in a nonpartisan race that will also be decided in the primary.

Early voting in Levy County started August 13 and lasts through August 25. The early voting site is at the Supervisor of Elections Office in Bronson, at 421 S. Court Street. The voting hours are 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Vote-by-mail ballots are due by August 28.

Watch for children now that school has begun

Safety Tips for Bus Riders and Parents:

- Arrive at the bus stop a few minutes before the bus is scheduled to arrive.
- When waiting for the school bus, children should stay back from the road and never sit on the road or curb.
- When the bus stops, wait for the driver's signal that it is safe to cross the road or board the bus.
- Teach children to never speak to strangers at the bus stop or get into the car with a stranger. Make sure they tell the bus driver, teachers at school, and parents if a stranger tries to talk to them or pick them up. Know the bus driver's name and bus number.
- When crossing the street, look left, right and left again. Never walk behind the school bus and stay away from the bus wheels at all times.
- Children should sit properly in the seat facing the front and remain seated at all time. Children should listen to the driver and never put their head, hands or arms out the window.
- Children should avoid running to or

from the bus.

Motorist Traveling near School Bus and School Zones:

- All drivers moving in either direction on a two-way street must stop for a school bus displaying a stop signal and must remain stopped until the road is clear of children AND the school bus stop arm is withdrawn.
 - On a highway divided by a raised barrier or an unpaved median at least five feet wide, drivers moving in the opposite direction do not have to stop for the bus. Painted lines or pavement markings are not considered barriers. Motorists should always slow down and watch for students loading or unloading from the bus.
 - Be alert and watch for children especially in early morning hours where darkness is a factor near schools, bus stops, and school buses.

July jobless rate unchanged over the month, reflects strong gains over the year

The unemployment rate in the CareerSource Citrus Levy Marion region was 4.9 percent in July, the same as it was in June, but 0.4 percentage point lower than the region's rate of 5.3 percent a year ago.

The labor force was 201,458, up 2,473 over the year, employment increased by 3,150 to 191,532 and there were 9,926 unemployed, 677 fewer than July 2017.

According to the release of the July employment summary by the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, Levy County continues to hold the lowest jobless rate in the region at 4.3 percent, followed by Marion County with 4.7 percent, and Citrus County at 5.7 percent. Florida's not seasonally adjusted jobless rate – a measure that matches the way local rates are calculated – is 4.0 percent, an increase of 0.1 percentage point over the month.

For the fifth consecutive month, the Ocala/Marion County metropolitan statistical area had the fastest annual job growth rate compared to all other metro areas in the state in education and health services, at 7.1 percent. The Ocala MSA had the third fastest annual job growth rate compared to other metros in manufacturing, at 7.2 percent.

CareerSource CLM's CEO Rusty Skinner said that once again the report reflects "mixed movement" for each county in the area. Skinner stressed that the monthly fluctuations, which are not seasonally adjusted "tend to not reflect employment and labor force strength."

"Each county has shown positive labor force and employment growth since July 2017," he said. "This long-term picture is also reflected in the tightness of the labor market, with openings exceeding job candidates."

Marion County's labor force grew by 545 over the month to 137,082, the number of those with jobs increased by 482 to 130,587, and the number of unemployed fell by 63 to 6,495. Compared to July 2017, when the unemployment rate was 5.1 percent, the labor force has grown by 2,392, the number of employed has increased by 2,833 and the number of unemployed has dropped by 441.

Citrus County experienced shrinkage of its labor force by 1,011 to 47,515 and a decrease in the number of employed by 991 to 44,802, while the number of unemployed fell by 20 to 2,713. Compared to July 2017, when the jobless rate was 6.1 percent, that's an increase of 200 with jobs and a decrease of 180 unemployed.

Levy County's labor force expanded by 44 over the month to 16,861, the number of those with jobs rose by 33 to 16,143 and the number of unemployed decreased by 11 to 718. That's an over-the-year increase of 117 in the number of employed and drop of 56 in the number of jobless when the unemployment rate was 4.6 percent.

According to the employment data for July, unemployment rates rose in all 37 counties, dropped in 11 and remained the same in 19.

Citrus County's dropped a notch from the third highest unemployment rate to the fourth highest among Florida's counties, Marion County fell two spots for the 14th highest and Levy County tied with six other counties to hold at the 23rd highest rate.

Among the metro areas, the Homosassa Springs/Citrus County MSA had the second highest rate behind the Sebring MSA's 5.8 percent and the Ocala MSA tied with the Port St. Lucie MSA with the fifth highest rate.

Nonfarm employment in the Ocala/Marion County metropolitan statistical area was 103,900, an increase of 100 jobs over the month and 2,800 jobs over the year for a 2.8 percent growth rate.

The Ocala MSA, which led the state's metros with the fastest annual job growth rate in education and health services, posted 19,700 jobs in education and health services, an increase of 100 jobs over the month and 1,300 more than in July 2017.

Manufacturing, which held the third fastest job growth rate, posted 600 new jobs over the year.

Both industry sectors grew faster in the metro area than statewide over the year. So did professional and business services (200 new jobs for an increase of 2.2 percent); trade, transportation and utilities (+400 jobs for a 1.7 percent increase); and government (+100 jobs for a 0.7 percent increase).

Leisure and hospitality also gained 500 jobs over the year.

Industries losing jobs over the year were mining, logging and construction (-200); and other services (-100 jobs).

Information and financial activities were unchanged over the year.

Nonfarm payroll employment in the Homosassa Springs MSA was 32,400, down 1,400 jobs over the month but an increase of 200 jobs (+0.6 percent) compared to July 2017.

The Homosassa Springs MSA had the second fastest annual job growth rate compared to all other Florida metros in government at 3.1 percent.

The region's employment summary for August will be released on Friday, Sept. 21.

Judge strikes Amendment 8 from ballot over wording

A Leon County circuit judge Monday knocked a proposed education constitutional amendment off the November ballot, saying the wording failed to inform voters of its impact on the creation of charter schools.

The proposed amendment, placed on the ballot by the Constitution Revision Commission, would impose eight-year term limits on school board members and would require the promotion of "civic literacy" in public schools.

But the provision that drew a legal challenge from the League of Women Voters of Florida would have allowed the state to operate and control public schools "not established by the school board," wording that opponents said would have led to the expansion of charter schools. The proposal was aimed at overturning a 2008 appellate court decision that found the Legislature's creation of a statewide commission to authorize charter schools was unconstitutional.

"The failure to use the term voters would understand, 'charter schools,' as well as the use of a phrase that has no established meaning under Florida law, fails to inform voters of the chief purpose and effect of this proposal," Circuit Judge John Cooper wrote in a 12-page ruling, removing Amendment 8 from the Nov. 6 ballot.

Cooper called the challenged provision "a significant change" that was not explained by the Amendment 8 ballot summary, which is wording that voters would see when they go to the polls.

"The current Constitution and implementing laws provide district school boards the exclusive right to make the initial determination of whether schools, charter or not, are needed and desirable in their counties," Cooper wrote. "Without understanding the current role of school boards in approving new schools, voters cannot understand the important change they are making to local democratic control of education."

He also said the ballot measure "incorrectly implies" that it is strengthening or maintaining the school boards' role "instead of weakening it by removing a power."

But the legal fight about Amendment 8 could be far from over, with the expectation that Cooper's ruling will be appealed. Erika Donalds, a Constitution Revision Commission member who was the key proponent of Amendment 8, called the court's ruling "disappointing."

Donalds, a Collier County School Board member who leads the group 8isGreat.org, which is promoting the amendment, said the League of Women Voters "fundamentally opposes empowering families to choose the education setting that best fits their child."

"Despite the speculation and bunk they've spread, I hope voters will be able to make their own decision in November," Donalds said in a statement. "It is disgusting how many misrepresentations the opposition is willing to put forth to block student-centered school choice options."

Cooper said voters would have had "a clearer choice" if the Constitution Revision Commission had advanced the charter-school provision as "standalone revision," rather than grouping it with two other constitutional changes. The commission, which meets every 20 years, is not bound by the one-subject mandate that applies to constitutional changes advanced by the Legislature or by voter petition.

"It chose to bundle the three proposals together to increase, in its view, their chances of passage," Cooper wrote. "But this court can only permit it to do so if it fully and accurately described all three proposals in the ballot title and description. That it failed to do."

Cooper also found the ballot measure to be "affirmatively misleading," since the summary talks about giving the state the power to operate and control schools, but it does not mention authority could be given to other entities, including private companies.

He said the measure was "conspicuously silent about who or what" would be responsible for schools not established by local school boards.

"Contrary to the language of the ballot summary, the amendment was intended to permit that power be given to a wide variety of third parties, potentially including private entities," Cooper wrote.

Opponents of the measure praised Cooper's decision.

"Amendment 8 would have used the feel-good language of civic education and term limits to lure voters into voting 'yes,' while wresting local control of schools," Patricia Brigham, president of the League of Women Voters, said in a statement. "We were confident that the courts would see through the charade and are thrilled that they agree."

Along with Cooper's ruling, Amendment 8 is one of six Constitution Revision Commission ballot proposals facing a separate challenge at the Florida Supreme Court. That lawsuit is asking for the state's highest court to remove the amendments from the November ballot, arguing that the commission overstepped its authority by combining multiple constitutional changes into single ballot items.

A circuit judge has already ordered the removal of Amendment 13, another commission proposal that would ban commercial greyhound racing in Florida. That decision is now being appealed at the state Supreme Court.

In total, 13 proposed state constitutional amendments were placed on the Nov. 6 ballot, including the eight advanced by the commission and five advanced by the Legislature or through petition drives. Each amendment would require support from at least 60 percent of the voters to be enacted.



FWC expands access to boating safety exam

Access to Florida's Boater Education Temporary Certificate Program has been expanded, thanks to work done by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) to make allowances for online course providers to offer the required courses over the internet. In August of 2017, the FWC amended Florida Administrative Code 68D-36.108 to allow the temporary certificate exam to be offered in an online version. This change makes it easier and more convenient for both vessel operators and vessel liveries to comply with Florida's boater education laws, which require liveries to verify that customers born on or after Jan. 1, 1988, have met Florida's boating safety education requirements before allowing them to rent their vessels.

Online temporary certificate exam providers will create a system that allows 24-hour, seven-day a week accessibility to the exam using tablets, laptops, or other electronic devices. This added convenience will make it easier for both visitors and residents by allowing them to take the test before a vacation to Florida.

Currently, one online boating safety education provider, Boat Ed, has completed the process to offer the

exam online. Boat Ed has been a leader and innovator in boating safety education since 1995. Study or learning materials are available on the Boat Ed site to prepare students for the exam, improve their boating knowledge and increase their chances of successfully completing the exam on the first try. The exam costs \$3 and study materials are available for an additional charge. A link to the exam can be found at Boat-Ed.com/FloridaRental/. Prior to this change, paper exams were the only option and were required to be completed and passed by rental vessel operators. The ability for liveries to continue to offer paper exams has not changed with the addition of this online option. Liveries can still purchase and administer the paper exams, as long as their contract and insurance are valid.

The temporary certificate exam is a knowledge check, not a full education course. It cannot be converted into a boater safety identification card that is valid for life. Temporary certificates are not valid in any other state and do not meet boater safety education requirements in other states. The online exam will be 25 questions, randomly selected from a

large pool of questions. The cost for the exam will remain \$3. Upon successful completion of the exam, students will be provided an electronic proof of their successful completion and their passing score. A livery will be able to inspect this proof to ensure that a prospective vessel renter has met Florida's boating safety education requirements.

The new change offers various benefits to liveries:

- Liveries are not required to contract with any other company to use the online exam.
- A link that will send customers directly to the online exam can be provided by liveries.
- Liveries are not required to continue purchasing paper exams from the FWC.
- The burden of mailing paper tests back to the FWC is removed with the online option.
- Liveries will be able to provide speedier service to customers who take the exam in advance of renting.

The FWC encourages liveries to transition to the new online exam system to increase accessibility and streamline the testing process for renters interested in enjoying Florida's beautiful waterways by boat.

Foster and adoption class addresses growing need for partner families

The Partnership for Strong Families held a foster and adoption class Aug. 7 at the Chiefland United Methodist Church aimed at recruiting more partner families in a crucial time of need.

Twenty community members attended the event. Hannah Green, the Recruitment and Outreach Specialist for the Partnership, shared data from the Tri-county area that indicates an ever-growing need for more foster and adoptive parents.

"Dixie County currently has one foster family. Levy has three foster families and Gilchrist has six," Green said. "There are 151 children in the Tri-county that are in out-of-home care (in care of someone other than their biological parents); 80 of these children are from Levy County; 40 children from the Tri-County Area in need of adoption," Green said.

Nicole Hernandez, also with the Partnership, went over the steps to becoming a foster parent, which include:

- 1) Call the recruitment specialist at 352-244-1684.
- 2) Inquiry process – the recruitment specialist will get to know your family and determine the best time to begin the process.
- 3) Background application and screenings – background checks and fingerprinting will be completed.
- 4) The first home visit will occur two weeks prior to starting PRIDE classes.
- 5) Attending PRIDE training – a 30-hour course that mentally prepares parents for fostering.
- 6) The second home visit will occur and the

specialist will gather health checks, income information, references and vaccination information.

7) The partnership sends your information to the state for final approval.

8) You become a licensed foster parent.

The adoption process is very similar, with a few additional steps, such as matching your family to the appropriate child.

Jenn Burgess, who is in charge of supporting foster parents throughout the process, including for items such as school supplies and clothing, discussed the support foster parents receive.

"We have really worked hard to give our foster parents support," Burgess said. "We serve an average of 1,300 children in our area."

Burgess helps parents with additional issues they experience with foster children.

"Obviously, we put a lot of children with their relatives," Burgess said.

The Partnership works to keep children in the area they were raised, but it can be a challenge.

"If the child has no relatives to stay with, and we don't have enough foster families, the child has to be moved to another county," Burgess said.

Burgess reminded all attendees that letting go of the children is the toughest part of fostering, but that "love is selfless." Burgess said a foster parent may be the only view of a healthy family that a child sees, and the impression could greatly impact the child.

The Partnership encouraged community members to sign up for upcoming foster classes, which are offered through November on Thursdays in Trenton and through October on Tuesdays in Gainesville. Contact Nicole Hernandez at 352-213-7219 to sign up for a class.

The 3 Most Important Small Business Financial Reports

After setting financial goals and a budget for your small business, it's crucial to monitor how well your company is performing. Is it on track to achieving its revenue and profitability goals? Is it controlling its costs?

Even if you've contracted the help of an accountant, it's helpful to develop your understanding of your business's financial affairs. One way to accomplish that is to become familiar with and regularly review the following reports.

- Profit and Loss Statement
 - Balance Sheet
 - Cash Flow Statement
- Profit And Loss Statement (P&L) Also called an "Income Statement," your company's P&L report indicates if your business is profitable and how profitable it is during a given period of time (such as for the past month, past quarter or past year).

A P&L statement is made up of the following main sections:

- Total income
- Total expenses
- Net income (Your income minus expenses)

It's helpful to compare recent P&L info with that of a past period of

time (such as a month this year with the same month last year) to identify if your company's profitability is improving or if there might be some issues you need to address. For example, if your sales are up but your profits are down, you would want to investigate which costs have increased to the extent that they're harming your bottom line.

Balance Sheet

Your Balance Sheet provides a snapshot report of your company's finances—assets, liabilities and equity—at a given moment in time. It summarizes what your business owns and what it owes. Investors who are considering funding your company will want to see your balance sheet before committing. Most often, the report shows company assets on the left and liabilities plus equity on the right to represent the following accounting equation:

$$\text{Assets} = \text{Liabilities} + \text{Owners' Equity}$$

The totals on each side should match, hence the name "Balance" Sheet.

Running this report at any time can give you helpful insight. Most business owners—sometimes with the help of accountants—review it regularly.

Cash Flow Statement

Your Cash Flow Statement sheds light on:

- When cash is flowing into your company
- From where cash is flowing into your company
- When cash is flowing out of your company
- From where cash is flowing out of your company

It lists your incoming and outgoing transactions, showing how your business has earned and spent money over a period of time.

It's valuable because even a business that shows a profit on its P&L statement can run into money problems if its income isn't arriving in time to be able to pay employees or to cover bills when they're due. By looking at your Cash Flow Statement, you can detect gaps and start making changes so you'll have sufficient cash reserves and avoid shortfalls that could hurt your ability to conduct business and your reputation.

Money Isn't Everything—But Managing It Isn't Optional.

By learning to read and interpret your P&L Statement, Cash Flow Statement and Balance Sheet, you'll have a better sense of where you are on your course to meet your financial goals. The accounting



Honoring a beloved service dog

What does the life of one dog matter within the priorities of human existence?

On March 2, many in my world and many others came together at the UF Small Animal Hospital to give Honor Memory Awareness and Appreciation for the life of one special German Shepherd 'Wonder' Dog named Honey.

She came into this world on January 22, 2010, and lived her life as a Trained and Certified Medical Service Dog (MSD) for Vietnam Veteran Michael Gaither of Chiefland for all her eight years on this earth.

In addition to her duties of assisting him and enriching his life, she saved his on many occasions by calling 911 to waking him with one paw and pulling his oxygen mask back to his face when it fell off in his sleep. Honey was very much a smart dog. She earned many medals from AKC for her service to Michael and our prestigious War Dog Medal for her service to our Veterans. Our Governor, Hospice, the Masons, the Levy County BOCC and the Chiefland City Council and a Levy County Judge honored her.

One could never be sad in Honey's presence.

On March 2, her Duty and Watch ended as she crossed over the Rainbow Bridge to her eternal reward where Angels now sing for her. Her doctors at UF Small Animal Hospital treated her for two separate diseases. When it was determined by her doctors and Michael that she was beyond the scope of veterinary medicine and her conditions were declining, humane euthanasia was recommended.

My heart today is filled with gratitude to thank all the wonderful people who helped Honey end her life in a calm, peaceful, patriotic, prayerful and respectful manner. Law enforcement agencies and their K-9 teams in both Levy and Alachua Counties came together and gave her a Last Ride Honor from her home and a Last Salute Honor as she took her walk into the entrance to UF Small Animal Hospital.

In addition to dedicating her life to Michael, she was an Ambassador for the U.S. War Dogs Assn. with her participation and support of veterans' events and the Kids for K9's educational program we sponsor. Honey took the fright away from children who feared Working Dogs and taught them the value of all our Hero dogs who serve mankind. Our Military and Law Enforcement depend on them to keep us safe secure and free. Children learned more about how dogs protect us from enemies, help prevent and solve crimes and find missing children and Alzheimer's and Dementia patients. They learn the many ways they serve our veterans who have health and mobility limitations to taking away the demons they face in their dreams from Post-Traumatic Stress. They learn how they find our fallen to bring them home to be laid to rest with honor. They learn how they help us see and hear and how they assist us in life's challenges and comfort us in tragedies. On March 2, the grounds of U.F. Small Animal Hospital felt a tsunami of tears as a large crowd of people came to honor a life well lived and well served. A Judge said prayers for her and bagpipes honored her with spiritual and patriotic songs. She touched the lives of so many and left her paw prints on their hearts.

Now she has gone where all the good and Hero dogs go - a life that truly mattered and one that made a positive difference in our world. Honey will always be loved, missed and never forgotten. God took back her beautiful soul and we must trust His reasons 'WHY'. May she now and for all eternity Rest and Play in Peace.

Water utilities are excessive burden for taxpayers

The County many years ago took over the operations of two water utilities that that were previously abandoned private utilities.

As per state statute, the county took over the operation and were tasked with the option of finding another entity to run it, or run it themselves. This, unfortunately, left a financial burden for the taxpayers of Levy County. Revenues are way less than needed to cover payroll and operating expenses. In fact, this year's proposed budget shows that the county proposed \$189,000 needed from the general fund and reserves to offset the revenue shortfall, which is about 10 percent more than the budget year 2017-2018 supplement of \$170,000. Payroll alone for both utilities are \$102,000 a year.

This shortfall has gone on for too many years and the BOCC needs to act on minimizing and or eliminating this use of General Fund monies to cover these utilities losses. The BOCC should review rate charges, as today the service charges are about \$20 per 3,000 gallon in

monthly base rate for these two utilities. The communities of Inglis and Cedar Key charge between \$27 and \$30 per 3,000 gallon in monthly base rate.

The second option is to explore private utility operators that exist in the state to determine if they can operate these two utilities. One suggestion is

U.S. Water, and there are most likely others. While this is not a popular issue for the users of these utilities, the fact is county residents are paying for others' residential water use. The users of these utilities got a raw deal when the operators abandoned these residents, but it is long overdue that the BOCC act on this ever increasing drain on General Fund revenues.

Chiefland heads to Trenton for showdown opener

Chiefland Indians (0-0) at Trenton Tigers (0-0), 7:30 p.m.

“It’s a big one next week. It’s the next one, that’s why it’s big.”

That’s how Chiefland head football coach Adam Gore described the Indians upcoming game after his team’s 50-0 win over Bell in the preseason.

If you need another reason to call it big, well, it’s Trenton.

The Indians head 15 minutes up Highway 129 Friday aiming to snap an eight-game losing streak against their rival. Last year’s 37-21 loss was the closest margin in the series since 2013, and saw CMHS cutting a 28-0 deficit to 28-21 early in the fourth quarter.

Chiefland comes out of the preseason with a head full of steam, thanks to an upgraded and more experienced roster and a couple of dominant wins in the spring and in the classic.

Trenton, meanwhile, is younger than its last couple of upper-class-laden teams. The Tigers have their third head coach in as many years, former assistant Ben Jacquemin; they’re led behind center by heralded sophomore Jacob Guthrie. TMHS, which took a 27-0 loss in three quarters of varsity preseason action against Fort White, figures to be strong again on the offensive line.

If the Tigers are experiencing any growing pains, they won’t get any sympathy from Chiefland. A flu bug tore through the much more inexperienced Indians the week of the Trenton game last year, and their starting quarterback was held out of action. It was Gore’s first game leading the Indians, who haven’t beat the Tigers since 2009. They lost 58-12 on the most recent trip to Trenton, in 2015.

Trenton finished 8-3 last season, making the playoffs in their Class 4A region before suffering a lopsided loss to Dunnellon in the opening round of the playoffs. The Tigers are required to compete at 4A for two years for a recruiting violation. They were Class 1A state champions in 2013 and 2015. The head coach of those pair of titles, Andrew Thomas, is at the helm at Trinity Catholic in Ocala.

Chiefland blasts Bell

The preseason doesn’t count, but it’s usually a revealing snapshot of a team’s standing.

In that case, Chiefland is in good shape heading into the regular season, as the Indians excelled in all phases to post a 50-0 win over Bell.

While the true gauge of Chiefland’s caliber will be rendered in its first five games, which include four road contests and three playoff opponents, the team went some way in reestablishing — after a convincing spring win over Wildwood — why there’s a more confident buzz around this team than in recent memory.

A new piece to the Indians’ puzzle, Newberry transfer Amonte Young, dazzled the home crowd with three big catches, including a pair of jump ball touchdowns, while quarterback Ty Corbin threw for a touchdown and ran for two more while leading the team in rushing with 115 yards.

The offense racked up 430 yards while the defense allowed just five yards. Arthur Lee and Aidan Home collected interceptions. Senior kicker Noah Nguyen was 6 for 6 on PATs, and Jerrels, a big hitter at linebacker, added a two-point conversion run.

Kirk Williams, Jarrett Jerrels and freshman Tristan Sloan, who had a 70-yard scamper and 103 rushing yards on the night, added rushing scores for Chiefland, and Trent White, a sophomore quarterback from Texas, tossed one of Young’s touchdowns.

The game had a running clock in the third quarter.

The only negative of note for Chiefland was the team’s nine penalties for 90 yards, which Coach Adam Gore said he wants to see cut in half.

“The only problem I have is the 15-yard (penalties) and where they are,” Gore said.

The Indians were able to work on their depth, especially on the offensive line, which had the most question marks heading in after suffering some depletion in preseason camp.

“They’re really unselfish,” Gore said of his skill players, who were mostly limited to five or six touches at the most. “I didn’t hear any guy complain at all or even come to me on the sideline and say give me the ball.

“When Sloan hit that 70-yarder for a touchdown, the first and second string kids were jumping up and down just as much as the coaches were. That says a lot.”

Bronson dominates in all phases

Bronson has been on the wrong side of a running clock more than its share of times the last three seasons.

Now it’s enjoying being on the other side of that equation.

The Eagles scored in all phases of the game to fly past Merritt Island Christian 64-12 in preseason action at John Rutledge Field on Aug. 17.

Junior Levi Warmack led the way with five rushing touchdowns on eight carries, while senior Cole Langston scored on an interception return, a punt return and on a couple a pass receptions.

“It was a good all-around effort for the preseason game,” said first-year Bronson head man Seth Stebbins, who was at the helm at Hamilton County the past three seasons. “(It was) a lot of good, a lot of bad. The offensive line really dominated the football game. That’s kind of where we won the football game, on both sides up front.”

Bronson was able to

insert its younger players in the second half, a few of whom impressed Stebbins to possibly earn more playing time in the near future. Stebbins praised the play of back-up sophomore quarterback Rafael Alicea.

“He played really, really well and surprised us,” Stebbins said. “He played more snaps at quarterback than our starter.”

The Cougars, a Class 2A private, have a combined five wins the past three seasons, but that’s four more than Bronson.

The Eagles have a bye in the opening week, before playing host to Mayo-Lafayette Aug. 31. The Hornets finished 9-1 last season before losing to Dixie County in the playoffs.

“We’ve got a tough one, not this week, but next week,” Stebbins said of the Lafayette game. “We’d rather be playing (the opening week), you like to keep going. Generally speaking, you want that break around week 6 or 7, when you’re beat up, but it is what it is and we’ll survive it.”


DARLINGTON THREE THINGS TO WATCH





things you should consider. The first is to check your town's ordinances to see what they require for above ground pools. They may have certain requirements such as a fence or permit.

Cash: As you may suspect, there are maintenance costs associated with owning a pool such as chemicals, replacement parts and electricity to run the filter. Since these do vary based on the size of the pool, ask the owner if he can give you an idea of his annual costs.

Carry: Before you take the pool, spend a lot of time looking it over. You don't want to bring home a headache simply because

it's free. **Cash:** Since the pool is currently full, you have a good opportunity to see it in action. Check the liner for tears or damage and carefully look over the pool filter. If the pool is several years old, you may start to see rust or corrosion that can lead to costly repairs.

Carry: If everything seems in good shape, recruit as many friends as possible. Moving all the heavy parts can take some time.

Cash: Considering you have to empty and dismantle the pool, you should set aside at least a full day to bring it home. After all, it is much larger than a fish tank.

Fast Facts

Taking a Dip

When the weather gets hot, adding a pool to your yard can seem like a great idea. But how does it affect your property value? According to the National Association of Realtors, an in-ground pool can add an average of 7.7% to your home's value. This percentage does vary depending on your region. However, above ground pools do not have the same effect. They typically add no value to a home and in some cases can reduce the value by up to two percent.

Life Guard

There is nothing kids love more than splashing in the pool on a hot summer day, but it's important to keep them safe. Sadly, each year about 300 children under the age of five drown in pool related incidents. So if you have a pool in your yard, take the proper safety precautions. The Consumer Product Safety Commission recommends installing a 4-foot fence around all sides of the pool. Any gates should open outward and be self-closing and self-latching. If your house forms one side of the fenced in area, add alarms to your doors to let you know when they are unexpectedly opened.




