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Solid Waste, Fire Protection get fee increases

With the setting of annual assessment rates on the docket, the Board of County Commissioners held a four-hour public hearing Sept. 6 with approximately 30 Levy citizens in attendance.

After receiving feedback from numerous attendees, the Board passed a new rate for Solid Waste that shifts the burden of costs from user tipping fees to a \$116 assessment fee. Fire Protection Services and EMS assessments also saw an increase in their respective rates.

Fire Protection was first on the agenda. "The fire rate was raised to \$90 in 2012 and has not been raised since," BOCC chairman John Meeks said. "Keep in mind, all dual-certified firefighters receive a portion of their pay from this."

Heather Senoza, an associate of Jeff Rackley, who conducts revenue studies based on proposed fees, presented the fees proposed by the Board in July: \$129 for residents; \$0.36 for commercial; \$0.15 for industrial and \$12 for agricultural lands.

Jared Blanton, the County Finance Director, responded to a request for an explanation of how the current \$90 fee would not fund fire services.

"The \$90 fee only provides 52 percent of the funding for fire services," Blanton said. "Without the \$129, I am forced to transfer from the General Fund to keep paying the bills, essentially."

Rackley added to Blanton's response, "The \$129 will fund 75 percent of the five-year average."

Joanne Olvera, a concerned citizen, questioned why multiple tax assessments have to be raised in the same year. She specifically mentioned the 1-cent gas tax. Blanton said the county is below other counties on gas taxes.

"The reason we are here today is we are at the point we almost have to send people home," John Meeks said. "We have made a conscientious effort to not have to do any of this."

Commissioner Rock Meeks added that 3.5 years ago the Board started going through the budget "line by line" and made many budget cuts.

Commissioner Matt Brooks also added that, starting in 2006, the Board was "hit hard by unfunded mandates. The Safe Schools Act was brought up as a recent example."

After a couple of public comments regarding the state mandates, the motion was made and passed unanimously to secure the annual Fire Protection Services rate at \$129.

The BOCC moved on to setting the yearly fee for EMS services. Back in July, the BOCC set the proposed fee at \$150 per residence. The current rate is \$119 per year. A portion of the new fee will go towards raises for the EMT's and paramedics that work for Levy EMS.

Levy County resident Gina Watkins lamented how the EMS workers need raises because "many of these workers don't make enough money to live."

Blanton noted that the EMS is doing well because they have a reserve fund with significant funding. John Meeks supported Blanton's comment by noting that collections of ambulance fees had risen from 20 to 60 percent.

"That is high from what I have been told," Meeks said.

After more discussion from the attendees of the hearing, the Board agreed to leave the annual rate at \$119. John Meeks said a seventh ambulance station was built with the current fee in place, and some Board members cited the increase in the Fire fee and the amount of available reserve funding for EMS reasons in favor of not raising EMS

They are for the fiscal year 2018-2019.

Remembering Lindon J. Lindsey

EDITOR'S NOTE: This interview with Lindon J. Lindsey was conducted by Toni C. Collins, Levy County author and historian, on October 20, 2009. The following account is in Lindon's own words and spins the story of his life. Lindon has been a dear friend since I first moved to Levy County in 1997. We were drawn together because of our mutual interest in promoting the history and heritage of Levy County. Lindon, who passed quietly on Sept. 6 at age 92, will be sorely missed by all who knew him.



THE EARLY YEARS...

What was it like growing up in Cedar Key in the 1920s and 1930s? For one person, it was a magical time when the world was a kinder and gentler place.

Lindon Lindsey, a renaissance man 83-years young, was one of nine children born in Cedar Key to Lindon Harrison Lindsey and his wife, Effie (Curry) Lindsey in 1926. Although times were often tough in the small island community of 550 people, the family never missed a meal.

Effie's family farmed around Wilcox in Alachua County, so every summer the Lindsey children worked on the farm and a lot of food was put up in jars. Lindon's grandfather worked at the sawmill in Vista and as a young boy, Lindon's father worked there also. When the mill closed down, his father turned to commercial fishing like many of his neighbors.

The weekends were the most memorable for the family. On Friday night, Lindon's father took his sons with him and they fished all night. When they returned in the morning with their load of fish, they would take the back seat out of their Model "A" automobile and fill the space with ice and fish. The family covered the roads less traveled in Levy and Alachua Counties to trade the fish for whatever anyone had to barter. Sometimes it was eggs or sausage or bacon and sometimes a pair of shoes or a shirt. Throughout the negotiations, there always seemed to be just enough money to buy gas for the auto.

Although each of the family members had a job, Lindon felt his job was by far the most interesting and certainly not hard work. After dinner in the evening and on weekends, he would walk the streets of Cedar Key selling peanuts.

Back then children could walk the streets at any time and the neighbors would look out for you. But, if a local kid did something wrong, by the time that kid got home, his or her Mama or Daddy already knew about it. Lindon and his friends could never figure out how their parents would learn about their bad deeds so quickly when there were no telephones on the island.

Lindon was not quite eight years old on July 7, 1932, when the Interstate Commerce Commission made the decision to abandon the Archer to Cedar Key branch of the Seaboard Air Line Railway. Although he was quite young, he knew it was not a good thing for Cedar Key because he overheard the conversations among the residents as he walked around town selling his peanuts.

However, the residents of Cedar Key recovered. But the loss of the railroad encouraged many of the young men between 18 and 23 to sign up with the Civilian Conservation Corps. Even though it meant traveling away from their homes and families, the young men did what they had to do so the family back home could receive a

monthly allotment check.

HURRICANE...

Living on an island projecting out into the Gulf of Mexico did have its down side. In July of 1936, the island was buffeted by the fifth tropical storm of the season. Although the 145-mile-per-hour storm continued on to hit the panhandle, the water on 2nd Street was knee deep and there was a lot of damage.

At the time, the Lindsey family lived in a one-story house on 3rd Street between "E" and "F" Streets, one of the highest points on the island. To warn the residents a storm was close, a government hurricane spotter plane would fly over the Cedar Key dock and drop a block of wood wrapped in a red flag. At this warning, many of the neighbors came to the Lindsey home for safety.

As the storm roared overhead, everyone crowded into the back bedroom of the house to try and escape the deafening noise. The group collectively held their breaths as they watched the two-story house next door slighter off its foundation and slowly slide toward the corner of the house where everyone was gathered. Miraculously the house next door came to rest within three feet of the Lindsey home. When the sun came out, the island community dug out, repaired and replaced, and life went back to normal.

In 1940, Lindon was fortunate enough to land a job delivering groceries on a three-wheeled bicycle for the Suwannee Merchantile Store, a chain store out of Quitman, Georgia. He was paid \$12.00 a week. His work day started at 7 AM and on many occasions, he was still delivering groceries at midnight.

THE WAR COMES TO THE ISLAND...

The island community became very aware of the war in the fall of 1943 when the Army established a military post at the site of the Cedar Key post office and the Coast Guard opened an office at City Hall. The Army also entered into an agreement with the Levy County government to use the George T. Lewis Air Field for training purposes. A bombing range was set up on the mainland where the Lower Suwannee National Wildlife Refuge is located today.

At that time, one of Lindon's brothers, Blake was dating a girl named Margarite Ann Beckham, the daughter of Vanny and Willie Beckham. In order to show off for Margarite and her sister Gladys, Blake told them he knew where there was a bomb. What he did not tell them was the bomb had been found first by his sister, Dorothy.

The girls knew that Dorothy was the one who found the bomb and they suggested Dorothy go with them out to Corrigan's Reef to see it. The foursome took a boat out to the reef and sure enough there was a bomb, part on the oyster bar and part in the water.

After seeing the bomb, the four decided to put it into the boat and take it back to town. Along the way, they met up with Blake and Lindon's father who was going out fishing. Blake put his coat over the bomb so his father would not know what they were doing.

When the boat was tied up at the Cedar Key dock, the group decided to leave the bomb in the boat until the next morning when they would put it in the three-foot crawlspace under Margarite's house at Hungry Bend. Off they went to eat dinner.

While they were gone a little boy found the bomb and told his parents. The parents sent word around to the Coast Guard Office and they came up and looked at the bomb. Not knowing what they were dealing with, they decided to clear the neighborhood and would not let anyone near the dock.

Just about that time, Blake and Dorothy got to the dock and the Coast Guard would not let them pass by. Dorothy got really mad and informed them it was her bomb since she was the one who found it. That argument did not work - the Coast Guard was not going to give the bomb to Dorothy.

At this time, another of Lindon's brothers, Jesse, who was serving with the Coast Guard and was stationed at Yankeetown showed up. When the Coast Guard heard about the bomb, they decided that Jesse should be the one to stand guard over the bomb. Although Dorothy didn't say another word about the bomb being hers, it

took Jesse a lot of years to get over the embarrassment of having to stand guard over a bomb.

The next day the Coast Guard notified everyone in town, and especially the school, that they were going to take the bomb out to the bombing range on the mainland and dispose of it. When they dropped the bomb, all of the windows in Cedar Key rattled. This exhibition went a long way in demonstrating to the local children how dangerous un-detonated bombs could be.

The teenage years went by pretty quickly. Days were spent listening to the locals talk of the war and nights were spent sitting on the big dock dreaming of the future. Every once in a while, there would be a dance at the Island Hotel where Lindon and his friends would dance the night away.

In May of 1944, Lindon and ten fellow classmates graduated from the Cedar Key High School. Graduation was held in the First Baptist Church because the school building had not been rebuilt after it burned on December 21, 1943. Every year since 9th grade, Lindon has been voted the outstanding citizen by his fellow students. At graduation he was awarded the Citizenship Cup.

OFF TO WAR...

On July 24, 1944, Lindon and four Cedar Key men - James Allen, Peachman Alford, Charles Crevasse, and Leo Castell, stepped aboard the Gainesville bus to report to the U.S. Navy. Although the group got separated at Camp Perry boot camp in Virginia, while in Sicily, Lindon met up with a Cedar Key man, Varnell Campbell. Campbell told Lindon Peachman was in the hospital and James and Charles were on a ship.

While stationed in Oran, Algeria, as a fireman, Lindon became interested in photography. The firehouse was across the street from a warehouse that had a small dark-room in it. The man who ran it gave Lindon a key and let him have free run of the place to do his photo work.

HEMOCOMING...

In 1946, Lindon was discharged and started his long trip home. He recalled that he was lucky enough to catch a flight from London to Washington and then went by train to Jacksonville where he caught a bus for Cedar Key. As the bus approached the No. 4 Bridge, he knew he was home. Even with his eyes closed, the smell told him the tide was out and that smell was better than any woman's perfume could have been.

Upon his return to Cedar Key, Lindon took up net fishing with John Richburg and started to keep company with a lovely young lady named Margarite Ann Beckham. Soon he and Margarite decided to run away to



Georgia and get married. Lindon was 21 and Margarite was 16.

When the pair got to the Florida-Georgia state line, Lindon exercised caution and made Margarite get out of the car and walk across to Georgia. **See LINDSEY Page 8A**

Given to God

Community pays tribute to friend, coach, patron

Humble, kindhearted, fair, invested. More than 300 friends and family members who filled the pews and stood along the surrounding walls of Bronson First Baptist Church listened to these words used by Jimmy Durden's friends and family members as they spoke at his funeral service on Sept. 4.

"He's left a legacy of so many friends that go beyond just the family," said Pastor Earnest E. Johnson as he began the service for his brother-in-law Larry James "Jimmy" Durden, Jr. by declaring it a celebration of Durden's life.

"As you can see around you," he pointed the filled-to-capacity church, "how many lives he touched.

"We're given one moment on a piece of paper that says in that moment that we are born," Johnson said. "We're given another piece of paper that says the moment that we passed.

"Those two dates, those two points of time, there's that dash in the middle. We're here today to celebrate that dash," Johnson said. "If you knew Jimmy Durden, you knew there was a whole lotta living that went on in that dash."

Durden passed away on Aug. 30 at Shands Medical Center in Gainesville after a battle with cancer. He was 54. Durden was born in Gainesville and was a lifelong resident of Bronson. He was a member of the Gulf Hammock Church of God.

According to Durden's family, he spent most of his spare time working at racetracks and volunteering on local ball fields as a

coach and advocate for youth sports. He was a flagman at Bubba's Speedway in Ocala, and also spent time as a flagman for Bronson Speedway. He was a softball coach for Bronson High School, Bronson Youth League and the Tri-County All-Stars. He was fire chief for the Gulf Hammock Fire Department and he was past director of the Bronson Youth League. Durden's hobby was racing, but his top priority was always his family.



He is survived by his mother Barbara Joyce Durden, two sons Aaron James and wife Christina Durden, Kyle James and wife Emma Durden, one daughter Ashley and husband Justin Hobbs, two sisters, Linda Darlene Durden, Wanda Kaye and husband Earnest Johnson, seven grandchildren, Emily, Allie, Briley, Bryson, Aaron, Jaxtyn, and Arthur, pre-deceased by his father, Larry James Durden, Sr. and sister, Dena Marie Lambert.


Durden's close friends, such as Tony Parker, spoke at the service about Durden's commitment to his family and his community.

"Jimmy had a lot of friends," Parker said. "He loved a lot of people, and a lot of people loved Jimmy.

"Jimmy was a big boy," Parker declared. "I'm sure he could be a little intimidating the first time you met him. But if you gave Jimmy the opportunity, talked to him for one minute, you would have seen and felt the gentleness of his sincerity, personality, character. The biggest thing about Jimmy was his heart. I admired him a lot," Parker said.

Parker and Durden spent a lot of time together at local racetracks. "Jimmy had a different relationship with the drivers than most flagmen," Parker said. "Kind of like a

parent-child relationship. He had no favorites.

"I've come out of the number four turn more than once to look up and see that flag pointing at me, and Jimmy slapping his butt," Parker said as the audience laughed. "That means I had to go to the rear."

Parker said he admired Durden's commitment to local youth. "I talked to Jimmy just a few days before he found out his treatment wasn't going to work," Parker said. "He was talking about his plans for the Youth League at a time when life was so uncertain and he was fighting the biggest battle of his life. He was still putting someone else ahead of himself."

Parker said that Durden didn't just sit on the sidelines. "He got in the game," Parker said. "He got involved.

"God tells us to love one another and care for one another," Parker said. "Jimmy has done God's work here on earth and gave all he had to give.

"He raised three awesome children and seven grandchildren," said Parker.

He said Durden referred to the youth he mentored as 'my kids' and that Durden believed in the youth. He and knew that in order to make a difference, that's where he would have to start, Parker said.

"The results of Jimmy's love and sacrifice for kids will have a ripple effect that will travel through many generations to come."

Jimmy Jones, Durden's friend for close to 40 years, echoed these sentiments. They went to school together, played sports together and coached Bronson Youth League teams together.

Durden graduated from Bronson High School in 1982. "He was a Bronson Eagle true and true," said Jones who was with Jimmy when he passed away. "He was always for Bronson. Family number one, Bronson number two."

Jones said Durden was the first person he saw when he came home from war. "We sat on the A & A restaurant," he recalled. "I lost my Dad. Jimmy was the first person to sit and comfort me. We talked about life, and what we were able to conquer through this youth league."

The two would represent Bronson Youth league at meetings. "We'd sit in these meetings, he would talk about the youth of Bronson to these other cities and counties. He'd say 'I think we've got about 40 teams. Let's get these youngins what they need.'

"You just hate to lose a person that so many people leaned on, that we might have taken for granted," Jones said.





assessments. Commissioner Mike Joyner offered the only

vote in opposition.

Finally, the Board moved on to the most controversial topic of the evening: a proposed \$116 assessment fee for Solid Waste.

The current fee is \$0, with tipping fees primarily funding the county dump.

At the request of the BOCC, Blanton summed up how the county got into the predicament of having to have General Fund transfers to run the landfill.

“Over the years, operational deficits developed. Old dumping sites had to be monitored. We’ve been monitoring and maintaining these sites for years. Fees have not been raised since 2007. From 2007 to 2017, there was a 34 percent increase in our costs.”

John Meeks reminded attendees that the proposed assessment rate would allow all Levy residents to use the landfill for dumping household trash at no costs. Appliances (white goods) will also be free of tipping fees, as will residential trash hauled by garbage companies, leading to an expectation by the Board that costs for residents using hauling companies will go down. Brooks said Williston’s hauling prices are expected to be discounted by \$2.67.

John Meeks said he spoke about the issue to Trip Lancaster, the owner of Waste Pro, and Mayor of Fanning Springs, and Lancaster said he would not be able to lower the costs more than 25 percent.

There was a common concern among all the citizens who commented about the costs for those using hauling companies, and disabled and senior citizens having to pay the new assessment fee when they don’t produce much trash.

There were also concerns from those who live in mandatory trash hauling cities.

City of Chiefland Manager Mary Ellzey said Chiefland residents pay \$15.47 per month for garbage services and a new contract was just approved in 2016. Ellzey said

the contract was supposed to be for eight years.

J.D. Holmes III, a Bronson resident, commented, “I wish the State of Florida said everybody pays something. The taxpaying people get stuck. My biggest question is how long will this last? What is going to be next? This \$116 won’t make it where we don’t eat, but I know it hurts. We have got to do something. Will this lower our ad valorem taxes?”

John Meeks said in response that it’s his goal to lower property taxes next year.

Holmes continued, questioning the possibility of exploring a partnership with Gilchrist County.

Commissioners discussed their exploring of options to make rates cheaper at a later date. Brooks said the Board will further explore the option of rolloff dump sites. John Meeks also expressed his desire for moving towards mandatory garbage pickup countywide in years to come.

Rooks also commented about the possibility of waivers for disabled and low income individuals for the following tax year.

Earlier in the meeting, Mario Rivera, a Bronson resident since 1978, raised similar concerns over assistance for low income families. John Meeks responded to Rivera’s inquiry saying the matter will be handled on a case-by-case basis, and said he’d already received some letters from individuals concerned they would not be able to pay the taxes.

After two hours of deliberation, Joyner made a motion for \$116 Solid Waste assessment and it passed 4 to 1, with Rooks as lone dissent.

The BOCC finished up by setting the Roadway Maintenance Service Assessment, a fee that only applies for maintenance in certain Levy subdivisions and those living in those areas.

Residents for whom the fee applies received letters in the mail, and the issue took only 5 minutes to settle, with the Board voting to keep the fee the same as last year. Rooks was the only Commissioner to vote against the motion.

There will be another public hearing Sept. 18 at 6 p.m. to set the Solid Waste tipping fees and cover other tax categories.



"Everybody in here has a story about Jimmy," Jones said. "We're all smiling and nodding."

Racing With Jesus Chaplain Joe Kelly took the podium and said he met Durden at Bubba Raceway Park in Ocala five years ago.

"As a chaplain, you can pick out certain people," he said. "I could see the presence of Christ in Jimmy."

"That's a man we could all aspire to be like. Such a gentle person," he said. "Very humble. He ran the racetrack, but at the same time he spoke with authority."

Kelly said it was Durden's idea to hold a service at the track on Sundays.

"He said it was needed in the racing community, and encouraged me to go to other racetracks.

"When Jimmy started to get sick, as a chaplain you feel like it's your duty to call people and pray for people," Kelly said. "I felt like he was the one leading and praying for me."

"Every conversation ended like this: God's got this."

Nature Coast Services, LLC and Old Florida Distributors, Inc. will see

total monthly rent increases starting Oct. 1 from insurance premium adjustments.

Chiefland Commissioners discussed the Landscape and Tree Protection ordinance adopted in 2010. The ordinance proposed a permit fee of \$50 for the first tree removed, with an additional \$10 per tree up to maximum permit fee of \$140 to cut down trees on commercial property in city limits. If the property owner failed to obtain permit prior to tree removal from commercial property, the fine would be doubled and the owner would be required to replace the tree.

However, the actual permit fees were never adopted due to commis-

sioners not wanting to add another tax or fee at that time.

During Monday's meeting the ordinance resurfaced and will be brought back in the future for finessing as well as possible permit fees attached.

City Manager Mary Ellzey attended the Levy County Commission meeting recently and informed the Chiefland Commission of the county's special assessment for the landfill. The County set the Solid Waste tax assessment at \$116 - up from \$0 - to provide revenue for the landfill in lieu of tipping fees.

Chiefland City residents pay an annual waste removal to the city of \$185, that is billed monthly. The combination of both would cost city residents a little over \$300 annually for household waste removal. Ms. Ellzey hopes to see discounts offered through Waste Pro since tipping fees will no longer be charged to commercial haulers at the county's landfill.

Road warrior Indians celebrate home opener

Jasper-Hamilton County Trojans (0-3) at Chiefland Indians (3-0), 7:30 p.m.

Finally, the Chiefland varsity football team gets a home game. Not that the Indians are complaining. Instead, they're enjoying their best season in recent memory, with three straight convincing road wins on the resume. But it's the first night since the preseason classic against Bell that the Indians will get to show off their wares in front of the home crowd. The CMHS faithful traveled in droves to Mayo last Friday. Hamilton County is struggling. It's been outscored 147-0

through three games. Its opponents are a combined 11-1, if you count Chiefland. The Trojans' previous three opponents were all from higher classifications, including Class 4A Villages and 5A Suwannee. Chiefland pulled out a 10-0 win in Jasper last season on a masterful defensive outing. The teams were playing on short rest due to the schedules being scrambled from Hurricane Irma. Seth Stebbins led the Trojans the last three seasons and is now the head man at Bronson. Doug Clayton is now at the helm at HCHS. The game can be heard at 93.1/96.3 FM or 940/1240 AM, or at Suncoastradio.com, starting at 7 for the pregame.

Bronson Eagles (0-2) at P.K. Yonge Blue Wave (Gainesville)

(2-1), 7:30 p.m.

The Blue Wave stormed out of the game with big wins over Wildwood (25-6) and Keystone Heights (41-14), before its fortunes turned for the worst at Hawthorne in a 51-19 loss pm Sept. 7. The Eagles are getting at least on big scoring play from Cole Langston each game. Coach Seth Stebbins was pleased with the recent play on special teams by Louis Montero. "We're taking small steps toward improving," Stebbins said. "We have a lot of young inexperienced player and they will have some growing pains along the way, but the important thing is they are improving." P.K. Yonge is senior-led at its skill positions, and boasts a balanced attack on offense, including 5.6 yards per carry and 157 yards passing per game. This is Bronson's first road game of the season.

Miracle whipped

CMHS powers past Lafayette in Mayo to say perfect on season; whole cast contributes to best win yet

To stop Lafayette's prolific offense, Chiefland needed

more than its defense to play a part. The Indians offense stepped up the task, gobbling up huge times of possession and long-yardage drives,

keeping the dominant CMHS defense — dubbed "The Shark Tank" this season for their attacking, predatory style — rested for the challenge.

In the third quarter, it looked like the Hornets might cut their deficit in half. But the defense held, and the offense strung together an 88-yard drive, overcoming several penalties, to put the game away.

Chiefland left Mayo Sept. 7 with a 37-14 win and a perfect 3-0 mark, looking forward to its first home game of the season the next Friday.

Lafayette figured to be one of the toughest opponents the Indians would face, but Chiefland hid its

struggle well.

Chiefland quarterback Ty Corbin tossed a couple of touchdown passes, hooking up with Amonte Young and L.J. Jenkins for scores, and scoring another on his own with a 15-yard scamper.

Through four games, including the preseason, Corbin and Young have yet to not connect for a score. It was Jenkins' first catch of the season, and it was a great one, as the senior tipped the ball to himself while reaching around the back hip of the defender in the end zone.

Junior Jarrett Jerrels, a frequent go-to inside the 10-yard-line, scored twice, on 1- and 8-yard carries.

Though he didn't score, senior Kirk Williams was the bell cow back for Chiefland rushing 15 times for 87 yards. Williams is an edge speedster in just his second year playing football, but his style was more smash-mouth against Lafayette, as he took on defenders' best contact and trudged forward.

He was still doing it on the outside mostly.

"We were telling Kirk (Williams) and other backs, it's going to be a little bit wider than you're used to," said Gore, in reference to the team's decision to take its power game to the perimeter.

"I had to," Williams said of his heavy workload. "I had to run the ball, just over and over and over. I didn't score, but it's all right, I got so many yards."

Fullback Hunter Barrand, meanwhile, ripped off multiple long runs to come in for 72 yards on 10 carries.

Corbin added 77 yards on both the ground and the air, for 144 total.

Junior Jalen Rutledge boasted a couple of 12-yard runs, and Sedrik Moultrie, a standout defender who platoons on offense, added a 17-yard run.

Moultrie also scooped a diving interception on defense.

The even distribution on

offense is a feature, not a bug.

"They're selfless, they share the load," Gore said. "It feels really nice coaching a football team where the leadership's good. I know they're going to be ready to go. We've got good kids."

"This senior group wants to go out on top, wants to go out winners. I'm proud of the they listen, they're so coachable."

Lafayette was averaging more than 250 yards passing per game, but mustered just 64 yards in the air against the Shark Tank.

The CMHS defense made a critical stop near the end of the first half, as the Hornets threatened to cut into a 17-6 advantage, with the ball inside the CMHS 20.

They ended up missing a field goal attempt, leaving Chiefland with an 11-point edge at the break.

Noah Nguyen, earlier, knocked through a 40-yard field goal for Chiefland, and was 4 of 5 on extra points, with one being blocked.

1. Kyle's championship



Cash: I doubt if she'd appreciate being referred to as "used" either, so I'd be careful how you present that new car. No gift can make up for insulting a woman's age.

Carry: My wife taught me that lesson years ago. Now on her birthday cake, I make sure to never have more than 29 candles.

Cash: I commend you on the great idea of driving the new car until it had 60 miles. It would have been a great surprise for your Mom. However, a car with 85 miles does not have to be considered "used".

Carry: The laws in each state govern what is considered a "new" or "used" vehicle. In your state of Virginia, if the dealer drove the car in order to transfer it from one dealership to another or from their storage facility to the showroom, then the car would accumulate mileage, but still be considered "new".

Cash: However, if the vehicle were test driven by another customer or sold and returned, then the car would have to be classified as "used".

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Serve up something quick on busy weeknights


Cooking with a microwave need not be limited to frozen dinners. Take, for example, this recipe for "Italian Pork Chops" from "Incredibly Easy Italian" (Publications International, Ltd.). Italian Pork Chops
Serves 4

- 2 cups uncooked long-grain white rice
- 4 large pork chops
- 1 teaspoon basil, crushed
- 1 26-ounce can Del Monte® Spaghetti Sauce with Mushrooms or Chunky Italian Herb Spaghetti Sauce
- 1 green bell pepper, cut into thin strips
- Salt for seasoning
- Black pepper for seasoning

1. Cook rice according to package directions.
2. Preheat broiler. Sprinkle meat with basil; season with salt and black pepper, if desired. Place meat on broiler pan. Broil 4 inches from heat, about 6 minutes on each side, or until no longer pink in center.
3. Combine sauce and green pepper in microwavable dish. Cover with plastic wrap; slit to vent. Microwave on high for 5 to 6 minutes, or until green pepper is tender-crisp and sauce is heated through. Add meat; cover with sauce. Microwave for 1 minute. Serve over hot rice.



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
