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Luke Bryan Farm Tour brings country music back to Whitehurst Cattle field

As a crowd of about 13,000 gathered on Whitehurst Cattle Company acreage bordering Levy, Alachua and Marion counties, a drone flying overhead documented the Oct. 4 benefit concert from above.

Country Artist Jon Langston, the concert opener, paid tribute to Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers with a performance of Petty's "Won't Back Down." And the crowd joined in.

"That's what I'm talking about," Langston said. "Y'all came to party!"

Langston then performed his hit "She Was the Right Girl at the Wrong Time" and told the crowd how he became a songwriter.

"I started writing songs in college 'cause I got hurt playing football," Langston told the crowd. Then he performed "Forever Girl" and the crowd sang along. "Man I got chills up here," he said. "I love you all so much." Then he continued with his Billboard hit "When It Comes To Loving You."

Dubbed the most successful songwriting trio in the history of country music with more than 70 number one songs, The Peach Pickers team of Rhett Akins, Dallas Davidson, and Ben Hayslip took the stage next. The team has written for top artists including Blake Shelton, Jason Aldean, Tim McGraw and Luke Bryan. Akins wore a Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers T-shirt. They took the crowd on a country hits journey including "Dirt On My Boots," written by Rhett Akins, Jesse Frasure and Ashley Gorley and made popular by Jon Pardi.


The band teased Bryan who was behind stage. "He's in a lounge chair eatin' boiled peanuts listening to this show, drinking a beer. Let's give Luke a little taste of what's to come later on." Then the band started singing Bryan's hit "You've Got Your Hands Up" along with the crowd.

The Peach Pickers went back to 1995 and launched into "That Ain't My Truck."

When Chase Rice took the stage, so did his rock guitarists

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Chiefland Fire upping equipment

The Chiefland City Commission unanimously gave permission for Chiefland Fire Department Chief James Harris to accept an \$11,512.50 award from the Florida Firefighter Assistance Grant Program.

Harris received notice of the award on Sept. 26 from the Bureau of Fire Standards and Training in Ocala, and said the funds will be used to purchase five sets of Personal Protective Equipment.

While Harris was at the podium during the Oct. 8 regular meeting, the commission asked about a fire truck that was donated to CFD from the Division of Forestry of Guantanamo Bay. Harris told the commission that after some

minor repairs, he expected the engine to be up and running soon. "It's an oil pump and battery," Harris said. "We need to get that fixed and cleaned up," he added. "We're going to use it for a spare truck in case one of ours goes down."

Once the new engine is operational, Harris said it could affect the Insurance Services Office (ISO) rating of the department. The ISO rating is made on a scale from 1 to 10. A lower ISO rating often translates to lower insurance coverage rates charged to owners and tenants of both residential and commercial buildings. More equipment means better response ability.

According to Harris, CFD's current ISO rating is 4. To establish a

Chiefland man dies in single-car crash

A Chiefland man died early Tuesday morning, Oct. 9, after his vehicle went into a spin and struck a tree. According to a Florida Highway Patrol report, Kentrail Young, 36, was traveling north on SW 5th Street, north of SW 4th Ave., in Chiefland at around 4:25 a.m., when his Chrysler 200 car went into a counter-clockwise rotation and went off the roadway on the west side. Young's vehicle then collided with a tree before coming to a rest facing east. He was pronounced deceased at the scene.

And the crowd roared the loudest.

The Luke Bryan Farm Tour made a stop and performed for 18,000 fans at the same location in back in October 2014.

The Oct. 4, 2018 concert was strategically scheduled to not interfere with crowds attending the Florida vs. LSU game on Oct. 6 and, for the first time in the history of Williston Middle High School, the annual homecoming parade was held on a Tuesday so that Luke Bryan and Farm Tour fans could attend the concert without missing the festivities.

"We normally have our parade on Thursday and we knew we were going to take a hit in attendance and we wanted everyone to be able to attend everything," said WMHS Assistant Principal Hillary Cribbs. "So we moved the parade to Tuesday, and it was just as full as it normally is, and that's never been done before."

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community's rating, ISO evaluates three areas. Fifty percent of the score takes into account a local fire department's

staffing, training, geographic distribution of firehouses and adequacy of the fire equipment. Forty percent of the score looks at water supply, including the placement and condition of fire hydrants and the amount of water available to put out fires. And 10 percent of the score measures the efficiency of emergency

communications including the 911 system and the number of emergency dispatchers. "They give you a number for your community," Harris said about how ISO ranks each area. "It will give us more credit for our community," he said about the additional engine that could also serve as a pump truck. "And it's lime green."

UF Scientists share research project activities, results with NCBS visitors

Approachable University of Florida experts stood behind their efforts with detailed graphics, and hands-on samples of equipment and specimens related to Nature Coast environmental studies in areas including sea grass ecology, hard clam aquaculture, oyster clusters and reef restoration during a display at the Nature Coast Biological Station in Cedar Key.

In honor of the NCBS efforts since opening a year ago, the event on Sept. 22 was a way for researchers to interact with the public and explain their projects and upcoming research studies that continue to provide data and information to carry out the research station's mission of "enhancing the conservation and sustainability of natural resources throughout the Nature Coast through collaborative research, enhanced public engagement, field-based courses, and hands-on training workshops." NCBS Director Dr. Michael Allen is a professor of Fisheries and Aquatic Science in the School of Forest Resources and Conservation at UF. "Our biggest priority for this biological station is to look at how changes in land use in the Suwannee Basin are going to influence fresh water flow and ultimately how that is going to influence the estuarine environment and fisheries resources and wildlife."

Allen's research focuses on population dynamics and ecology of fishes. He has evaluated habitat requirements for fish populations, and identified fisheries management strategies for recreational

fisheries in lakes, reservoirs, and marine environments.

"This part of the coastline is not at threat for more development right on the coast because most of the land that is not developed is protected already," Allen said about the Cedar Key area. "But there're changes going on inland," he added. "Big changes in groundwater pumping, big changes in agricultural practices, big changes in land use, so those are going to have implications. Our medium term goal is to address that and really understand how fresh water flow is going to change."

Allen said one current NCBS project involves working with local fishing guides on spotted sea trout to try to understand factors that influence strong and weak classes.

The collaborative effort and outreach of the NCBS with local fisherman, aquatic industry farmers, volunteers and UF students has been crucial for the success of studies and projects, he said.

"We're super excited about the Lone Cabbage Reef which is up and running," he said. "They just brought in a bunch of grad students to help."

According to UF Wetlands Ecology and Management Professor Dr. Peter Frederick, "civilization was made on oysters."

Frederick explained the Lone Cabbage Reef restoration project, a 3-mile long oyster reef chain consisting of 22 reef elements. The 8-year-long project recently finished the construction phase and costs \$6.8 million, which was funded by the Deepwater Horizon oil spill settlement and a majority of the construction utilized

local contractors.

"All of the contractors for this were local," Frederick said. "So that's about \$3.5 million that came into the local economy."

The restoration project involves many phases and that includes post-construction monitoring scheduled through 2025.

"This summer we've basically done three things," Frederick said. "We've moved the oysters off of the reef, moved them to a safe place. A lot of people in Cedar Key helped with that. Then we started putting rock on the reef."

"We finished the last of rock on the reefs. Now that means we have a leaky dam. The leaky dam holds fresh water up against the area creating intermediate salinities. That makes it more productive in many ways. It's better for oysters, it's better for small fin fish, it's better for crabs, and the reef will be better at breaking waves."

With funding from SeaGrant, UF PhD Student Kwanmok Kim, of the

Department of Wildlife Ecology and Conservation, School of Natural Resources and Environment is exploring the answer to the question: Can artificial oyster clusters provide habitats for macroinvertebrates?

Macroinvertebrates are organisms that lack a spine and are large enough to be seen with the naked eye.

Kim is studying Interdisciplinary Ecology and is conducting his research by using 3D molds to create artificial oyster clusters. "A 3D mold is just one way to make a cluster," he said. "I also use liquid plastic to make the mold, and I put concrete cement mixtures inside to make oyster clusters."

Kim is studying the spaces between oyster clusters, which are an important refuge for prey species such as crabs. The shapes and sizes of these interstitial spaces are crucial to understanding species interaction in the ecosystem, he said.

Kim said he is using at least 10 types of artificial

clusters made of cement that have different size variations and will see results of species population after three months.

Allen picked up a sample of an oyster cluster and was impressed by the realistic detail that Kim was able to create on his 3D samples. "Look at the barnacle detail," Allen said. "That looks just like a real oyster."

I am not saying my faith makes me perfectly understand everything, but it does give me the same picture as the sun; that no matter what may seem unclear and indistinguishable, it will burn away the longer I am in His presence.

Stolen weapons turn up at pawn shop

A Fanning Springs man received multiples charges of a possession of a firearm by a convicted felon after four firearms he sold to Cash Munny Pawn were flagged as stolen.

Officers were called to the Chiefland pawn shop Oct. 2 when Steven Paulk, 32, accompanied by Lawanna Stephens, 26, both of Fanning Springs, attempted to sell four firearms – shotguns and rifles. Paulk told an investigating officer he was told the firearms were not stolen at the time of purchase, and said he wasn't aware of how to run a check on whether they were stolen. He revealed another gun was located in their pair's trunk at the shop, which was also determined to have been stolen.

Paulk said he purchased the weapons in

Fanning Springs. The seller's name was known by investigators to be a suspect in numerous recent burglaries and thefts in Levy County.

According to the Chiefland Police Department report, Paulk said he and Stephens were looking to sell the weapons in order to cover hotel room costs because they were no longer able to stay in their Fanning residence, where they were keeping the firearms. He told officers he was a felon and was seeking to get his gun rights restored. A search of his criminal history later revealed four prior felony convictions.

After Paulk and Stephens were later interviewed at the Chiefland Police Department, officers received information from the pair on the location of a sixth firearm which was also reportedly stolen.

Bubble valuations, IPO's and awful letdowns

"I'm riding high...and who can deny; That whatever goes up must fall."

"I'm Building Up to An Awful Letdown" as performed by Fred Astaire

Investors with a sense of history are carefully observing a trend that last reared its head about 18 years ago and resulted in serious consequences for many.

The last time cyclical-adjusted valuations of companies were as high as they are now was just before the dot-com bubble in the year 2000. As we all remember, that bubble was driven by tech companies that went public in advance of achieving actual profitability. In other words, people were hungry to invest in companies that appeared to have limitless potential, but had yet to prove that they could become profitable enterprises. So the investment was actually in a company's possible future, not

in its proven performance. I remember so well that period of time in the late nineties, when any investor could and often did (for a time) make money by throwing a dart at exciting new tech stocks.

The heavy thud of that tech bubble crashing to the ground in 2000 can still be heard by investors with a long memory. In that year, some 400 Russell 3000 companies were trading at ten times revenues or more. To put this in perspective, if a company earns a third of what it sells, it would take an investor who pays ten times revenue three decades to earn his money back. Now, some 340 Russell 3000 companies are trading at ten times revenues or

above. We're not back to 2000 levels, but we're getting close.

In addition, some 83% of the companies going public today lost money in their last fiscal year. So investors are currently plowing money into businesses which may have cash flow, but have not proven to be profitable or sustainable in the long term. According to University of Florida IPO expert David Ritter, this percentage of non-profitable IPO's is a record.

Ritter was recently quoted in a Wall Street Journal article, stating that "They (analysts) see similarities with the dot-com bubble of nearly two decades ago that left many investors with enormous losses. The prior high-water mark for money-losing companies going public was 2000, when 81% of stock-market debutantes were unprofitable..."

Stock prices of these tech companies often rose significantly during the

dot-com boom after the Initial Public Offering, and represented an opportunity for investors to garner what seemed like an easy dollar. Call it IPO fever. Unfortunately, it's like a game of musical chairs: you don't want to be the investor standing alone without a place to sit when the market determines that these stock valuations are no longer accurate- and the bubble bursts.

Start-Up funding options explored

In our last Ask SCORE column, we touched on the various methods to fund a new start-up or buy an existing business. This column will focus on two of those mentioned – Family & Friends and Crowdfunding.

Family and friends can usually be counted on to supply much-needed moral support when starting a new small business. Should they be considered potential sources of start-up funding as well? Unlike banks and other third-party lenders, family and friends are already familiar with your character, skills, and resources. They also generally have a greater emotional interest in helping you achieve your small business dreams.

On the other hand, things like misunderstandings, late or missed repayments, diminished expectations, and other problems can create rifts in relationships that may be difficult, if not impossible, to mend. Other family members could be drawn into the dispute, turning what once seemed a great idea into a broad, multi-generational nightmare.

How can you tap this potentially helpful source of startup funding with the least risk to your cherished relationships? Here are some tips:

Make a solid case for funding by investing the same level effort in preparing a funding pitch to friends and family members as you would to a bank – a completed business plan. At the very least a completed Business Model Canvas.

Set and agree on terms that includes a schedule for repaying both the loan and any interest. Resist the temptation to agree to a lender's offer to "pay me back when you can."

Set and agree on expectations. Some friends and family members may be under the impression that by doing you a favor with some funding, they're entitled to certain benefits such as a job, free products or services, or a say in how the business is run. What begins as a seemingly innocent "perk" can become expensive, and touch off the very relationship problems you hoped to avoid.

Communicate. Once your start-up is underway, communicate regularly with family and friends about

your progress. This will help reinforce their trust in your business venture, while also putting you in a better position to renegotiate the agreement or ask for additional funding if needed.

Nearly every day, it seems, there's another "success story" about how crowdfunding—raising money from the public at large, usually via the Internet—has helped someone finance a movie, build a smartphone app, or create a cool new computer game. Dozens of crowdfunding sites have emerged in recent years, with Kickstarter, Indiegogo, Crowdfunder, and Rocket Hub among the leaders.

Does all that attention mean that crowdfunding is a viable financing source for a start-up or buying an existing small business? Probably not...at least not yet.

While crowdfunding is an exciting and potentially significant form of financing new businesses and product development, it is too new and still subject to regulatory restrictions to be a significant source of capital for small company.

The majority of crowdfunding initiatives have fallen well short of their goals. Also, crowdfunding has yet to pass federal financial regulators concerns about potential fraud. Currently, individuals can invest no more than \$2,000 or 5 percent of his/her annual income. They must also work through an intermediary that is registered with the Security and Exchange Commission (SEC), a certification many smaller crowdfunding sites don't have.

However, that doesn't mean crowdfunding isn't worth exploring. Success in crowdfunding hinges on how good a case one can make to prospective investors. Many entrepreneurs use brief videos that may attract many viewers for their entertainment value, but raise little in the way of cash. Crowdfunding investors also expect something worthwhile in return for their investment, based on the amount contributed.

a funny story about something that happened at their wedding," Bernice said.



Chiefland football rolls on homecoming night

There's a lot to distract a team during homecoming week.

The Chiefland football team needed one more pep pregame pep talk to get its sights set on the task at hand, and, as they've done all season, showed they have a wide variety of ways to win football games.

Hilliard, which entered the game having combined for just two points in its previous four games, was no match for the Indians, as the latter cruised to a 43-6 win on Oct. 5 to improve to 6-0.

Chiefland worked the edges and sprinkled in some shovel passes to attack the Red Flashes. After junior quarterback Ty Corbin ignited the game with a 39-yard touchdown on the third play from scrimmage, he found Kirk Williams, the Homecoming King, in the flats for an 18-yard scoring pass.

Moments later, junior Jarrett Jerrels intercepted a Hilliard pass to help set up his own 2-yard touchdown run, following an end-around by receiver Amonte' Young.

A Wyatt Hammond sack for a safety put the CMHS lead at 23-0, and then Williams took in

another score, this time on a 36-yard rush.

A PAT by Noah Nguyen, who was 5 for 5 on extra points, made it 30-0 by the end of the first quarter. Nguyen and punter Hector Barajas continue to stand out for Chiefland's special teams efforts.

Jalen Rutledge scored on a dazzling 76-yard run, only to watch it get trimmed by 22 yards due to an illegal block. Still, it was enough to catapult a 22-yard receiving score by Hammond on a shovel pass, forcing a running clock for the remainder of play.

Rutledge intercepted a pass in the opening quarter.

Jason White tacked on another touchdown for CMHS on a 35-yard run in the second quarter.

Chad Williams added another interception for the "Shark Tank" Chiefland defense just before halftime.

Hilliard gained minus-27 yards in the first half.

"We knew they weren't going to be able to move the ball on us and we got the perimeter on them on offense to get what we wanted," Coach Adam Gore said.

"We came down here early and we were flat and we had to light into them a little

For the third time this season, Chiefland is facing a team ranked in the top 5 in Class 1A.

The Indians hit the road for the fifth time in seven games Friday, Oct. 12, to face an undefeated Hawthorne squad that's score 50 or more points in each of its games.

The Hornets, led by former football and basketball Florida Gator Cornelius Ingram, are bolstered this season by a couple of standout transfers, who were added to a squad that finished 7-2 last year, and was two touchdowns from going undefeated.

Leading Hornet rusher Uzeeke Fields, who gained more than 1,000 yards for Interlachen last season, is averaging 13.5 yards per carry. Jeremiah James, a former Williston receiver, leads Hawthorne in receiving yards. The team has three receivers with at least 12 catches apiece.

Senior quarterback Kahleil Jackson leads the Hornets' spread passing attack, averaging more than 250 yards per game through the air while tallying 22 touchdown passes against just two interceptions.

"They've got speed galore, weapons galore," CMHS

Coach Adam Gore said. "The (Jackson's) really good.

"They're going to put some heat on us and we'll see how we respond. I'm looking forward to it, the kids are looking forward to it."

Gore knows his team is road tested, and expects it will prepare well as it has all season. The Indians, however, faced an extra challenge in the run-up to the game as Hurricane Michael scrambled plans.

"We're no stranger to the road," Gore said. "Let's get on the bus and let's go play 'em. We're going to play physical and may be the best team win."

"Either way, as a coaching staff, we trust our guys to play. I get naps before games now, and the reason why is I trust them to show up and play their tails off."

If Hawthorne is the best offense Chiefland has faced, the Indian defense is the best defense the Hornets will have lined up against. The "Shark Tank" is a flexible unit with its hybrid ends and ability to run on the edges as well as stuff the middle.

Junior quarterback Ty Corbin and senior running back Kirk Williams continue to anchor the offense with their respective breakout seasons for CMHS, but Chiefland has several playmakers that have the potential to break out for a big game

on any given night.



1. In the hole



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

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
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Ask the Guys
