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Chiefland to vote on Sunday alcohol sales Oct. 22

As Hurricane Michael steered toward the Gulf Coast on Oct. 9, more than 75 Chiefland residents made it a priority to attend a workshop at Chiefland City Hall to discuss the pros and cons of allowing alcohol sales in Chiefland on Sundays.

More than two dozen people addressed the commission and spoke on the record.

Many residents acknowledged that they like to drink socially, and often family and friends are only off on weekends, so meeting up on a Sunday would be convenient if they didn't have to leave town.

One longtime resident thanked the commission for the opportunity to speak and said she was worried that the character of Chiefland would change if alcohol was sold on Sundays. She read a description from the City's website and urged the commission to consider that World Health Organization statistics emphasize the negative impacts of excessive alcohol consumption.

United State Air Force Veteran Charlie King said he and his brothers went to war to fight for freedom. "I do not understand telling people you do

not have the right to drink or when you can have it," King said and most attendees applauded his remark. "Why have to drive out of town and give those tax dollars to someone else.

"Chiefland has got a lot of stuff that needs to be done and we need a dollar to do it with," he added. "Let's quit this foolishness and get out of the Dark Ages."

Key points emphasized by proponents of Sunday alcohol sales included: raising funds to help the schools, fire department and police department, and increasing job opportunities by encouraging businesses to open in Chiefland. Some citizens said they shouldn't have to leave Chiefland to eat out or see a movie or bowl because those businesses won't build in a town with restrictive codes.

One business owner said she would like to host billiard events on Sundays, but without alcohol sales, it makes booking an event in Chiefland a challenge.

Two bartenders spoke about wanting to be able to work a shift on Sunday. One said the ordinance affects their income by blocking a day in the week that they can't work.

Resident Jacob Piazza said he has spent half his

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CR 40 widening project advances

The Levy County Commission voted to move forward with a road widening and resurfacing project for a 6.6-mile stretch of County Road 40 in South Levy.

According to Alice Lalonde, administrator for the Levy County Road Department, the project will be funded by a \$2.65 million grant from the Small County Outreach Program (SCOP).

The Florida Department of Transportation describes the SCOP as assisting "small

county governments in repairing or rehabilitating county bridges, paving unpaved roads, addressing road-related drainage improvements, resurfacing or reconstructing county roads, or constructing capacity or safety improvements to county roads."

"This is the second half of our CR 40 widening project," said Commission Chair John Meeks. "Our Legislature decided to give State Road 40 back in the '80s," Meeks said. "It's become our responsibility

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Beast Feast a big fundraiser for schools

The Levy County Schools Foundation helps direct more than \$100,000 per year to Levy students and classrooms through grants and scholarships, a critical supplement for school funding in the district.

On Saturday, Oct. 20, the LCSF is holding one of its two major fundraisers, the 9th Annual Beast Feast, at the Etheridge Produce Farm in Williston. Beast Feast features local civic and business leaders gathering to prepare and serve wild dishes such as frog legs, mullet and

swamp cabbage.

If wild game doesn't float your boat, there will also be Chick-fil-A chicken nuggets.

The evening has netted more than \$15,000 in the past. Tickets are \$20 for adults and \$10 for students. The evening includes door prizes and drawings.

In addition to Beast Feast, LCSF raises money through its annual STARS Gala in February, through grants from large businesses or foundations, such as Duke Energy, Capital City Bank and Suncoast Credit Union, and through a state matching

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grant program funded by the Florida Legislature.

Annie Whitehurst, the new LCSF executive director, said the Foundation has never had trouble reaching the threshold to receive matching funds from the state.

"That's because of our generous community," Whitehurst said at the meeting of the Suwannee Valley Rotary Club on Oct. 11.

"I had no idea the amount of funding the students of Levy County would lose if we didn't have an Education Foundation."

LCSF, part of the Consortium of Florida Education Foundations, formed in 1989, after legislation passed allowing school districts to raise private funds.

Whitehurst succeeded Donna Turner as director on August 1, after serving as a volunteer board member for three years. She's based in Williston now, but she went to elementary school in Chiefland and then middle and high school in Bronson, so she calls herself a "Levy County girl." She found herself with some extra free time when one of her children recently entered PreK.

"It just kind of worked out for me to step up and take on this role," Whitehurst said. "I'm still learning a lot. There are a lot of behind-the-scenes

things that I never had any idea of when I was on the Board."

LCSF provide more than \$43,000 in scholarships to Levy students last year, Whitehurst reported. It also supplies grants for classroom and school projects, and supports a new teacher mentoring program, where retired teachers help current teachers in the classroom. Teachers are required to build libraries in their classrooms, and LCSF for two years now has helped new teachers in that effort. Last year, 42 teachers benefitted from the program.

The projects that LCSF has been behind have included everything from providing grants for new technology to help students with dyslexia - in the form of a pen-sized wand - and an ecological lab unit

at Chiefland Middle High School.

"We don't have the funding from our county budget to provide tools like that," Whitehurst said.

LCSF has helped Yankeetown build a library of materials so that it can compete with the rest of the county in Battle of the Books.

"They were so sweet and super excited," Whitehurst said. "They're holsting the competition in March."

Another literacy program LCSF funded at Yankeetown featured a character-building reading program to help emphasize kindness.

Other LCSF grants are applied county wide.

CFEC crews help restore power in panhandle

Central Florida Electric Cooperative (CFEC) of Chiefland sent six line workers on Oct. 12 and four project managers on Oct. 14 to assist Gulf Coast Electric Cooperative in Wewahitchka, Florida to help restore power and repair damage caused by Hurricane Michael.

The crew brought equipment including two bucket trucks, one digger derrick truck with a load of poles, and a one-ton flatbed truck. CFEC Vice President of Member Services Tony Wasson said a second team went up Sunday and "we already have a team waiting to go. We're certain the line crews will need to be rotated out."

"CFEC was fortunate to receive help from cooperatives across the country when we restored power from Hurricane Irma," said CFEC Vice President of Engineering and Operations Ben Dawson. "Cooperation among cooperatives is critical to restoring power as

quickly, and as safely as possible."

"They'll run typically from Saturday to Saturday," Wasson said about each crew that is dispatched. "Most likely their putting in 16 hour days," he said. "They're going to get the max out of them."

"Any crews that go from any co-op take as many materials up as they can," Wasson added. "They took a lot of poles from here."

Wasson said they haven't been able to reach most of the crew members since communication systems are down in the affected areas. "Haven't been able to talk to them," Wasson said. "We figured it would be like that."

The Citizen was able to reach one veteran lineman via Facebook messenger on Monday night. He said he was surprised by the damage the crew has seen. "I have worked for CFEC for 23 years as of January," Dusty Aldrich said. "I have worked many storms, and this is the worse I have seen."

The monthly meeting of the Levy-Gilchrist Retired Educators was held Oct. 15 at The Gathering Table in Chiefland. We discussed the amendments which will be on the ballot, and Mr. Alphonso Johnson and President Rick Reed helped outline the contents, pros and cons, and voter recommendations.

Mr. Larry Bachle, treasurer, discussed still trying to find a bank that would waive its monthly fees. Mrs. Paula Marczynski was our hostess, and she brought us enough chocolate from Angel and Phelps in Daytona Beach so that all attendees and our guests were able to take some home. What a treat!

Our program this month featured Mr. Charles Waters of the Bell Woodturners. He brought many fine examples of the beautiful bowls, vases, platters, spinning tops and ornaments that he has made over the years. Woodturning is a work of the heart. Green wood is started and then put away for as long as 5 years to dry. When it is finished, it becomes a one-of-a-kind creation. Mr. Waters uses mostly local wood (sweet gum, holly, mahogany, live oak, cherry) and has used some exotic wood like camphor (which he says can quickly overcome you with its aromatic smell.)

He says most lathe work is either spindles or woot turning. He and other members of the group cut up wood into blocks for bowls, and used a variety of chisels. He even created a laser caliper to measure (at any time) the thickness of a vase he is working on as he hollows it out. The Bell Woodturners meet on the second Thursday at 7 p.m. at the Bell Community Center. They maintain about 30 members. They display their work locally and hold a yearly sale and demo. They also travel all over, going to demos and classes.





Today, and for the next few days, I'll be checking gear like bows and guns and other stands. I'm also getting my warm clothes ready for the next two months. And these same things happen about every year. Sometimes I'm ready earlier and sometimes I just have to wait until the buck activity picks up. While it may seem my preparation is sporadic and unmeasured, it's really not. It revolves around what I'm seeing on my trail cameras.

That's why putting them out is my first order of business every year. I start using them early because they give me the exact information I need. I need to know if there are any shooter bucks hanging out around my stand locations when the season starts. If there is, all my preparation begins early and if not, I linger a little longer. It doesn't matter if it's hot, raining, or if the sun doesn't go down until 9:30; the only thing that matters is if there is a deer I want to hunt.

Everything else revolves around that. In the same way, we all have a locus in life. We have something that everything else centers around. It causes us to rearrange our schedule and make new plans. It's something that much of our time and resources are spent on. It is not only what we love but what we love planning for. It is both the event and the journey. The good thing is that we can have more than one. One might involve your recreation, another one work, and yet another one family. Each of these can have their own unique draw. But I hope, above all else, your driving force involves your relationship with Jesus. After all, it was him that said if we would seek him first, all of these other things would be added to us.





I'm not for socialized medicine but I'm for everyone having access to healthcare. If it takes socialized medicine to insure this then I'll vote for it to happen. I'm totally against the powers that be at an insurance corporate office deciding that I can't have a surgery if my doctor says it's imperative for my health and even life. I am opposed to someone at a government Medicare office saying that Medicare won't pay for a heart surgery; a chemo treatment, dialysis or whatever is needed for anyone's health and life. I am opposed to killing babies on the front end of life and I'm opposed to killing old people at the back end of life. Life should be given every opportunity.

We are fortunate if we get to live awhile. The longer we live we will deal with blood pressure, cholesterol, blood sugar, polyps, nodules and so forth. Finally, something takes us out and this good life we enjoyed is over. Thus while we are alive we do all we can do to live wisely and to do our best. We trust that our doctor will do all that he can do and we look to God in faith that beyond this life is a much, much better place where our dear friends and family await our entrance to where they have gone on before.

You're the first line of defense against breast cancer

No one knows your breasts better than you do.

That's why a regular self-exam can be a valuable screening tool in detecting lumps and other abnormalities that could be signs of breast cancer.

Here are four simple steps to a breast self-exam:

Step 1: Do a visual inspection by removing your shirt and bra and stand in front of a mirror with your shoulders straight and your hands on your hips.

Are your breasts their usual size, shape and color? Is there any visible distortion or swelling? Is there any dimpling, puckering or bulging of the skin? Do you see any redness or rashes? Has a nipple changed position?

Is there any fluid (watery, milky, yellow or blood) coming out of one or both nipples?

Step 2: Raise your arms and look for the same things as in Step 1.

Step 3: Do a manual inspection lying down. With your right arm behind your head, use your left hand to feel your right breast, using the tips of your fingers. Begin at the nipple and "travel" with your fingertips in a circular motion until you cover the entire breast. (Or, you can move your fingertips up and down in vertical rows, like you're mowing the lawn).

What you're feeling for is a lump that feels like a hard pea or marble.

Repeat on the left breast, with your left arm behind your head.

Step 4: Do it again on each breast while sitting or standing, also with your hand behind your head.

Tips:

It's best to do a self-exam the same time each month, either several days after your period ends or a date that's easy to remember, your birth date or the first Saturday of the month, etc.

If you find a lump, don't panic: Not every lump is cancerous, and many women have lumps or lumpy areas that are normal for them.

However, tell your doctor or health care provider of any change that is new and worrisome to you. Remember, it's always better to be safe than sorry.

(Born Organized) and he constantly put me down because of the disorder. I knew I was losing myself. I knew what a clean tidy home feels like because my mom was organized and growing up I enjoyed the luxury and peace she created for us by having a beautiful, clean organized home.

I was miserable and on June 16, 1977 I hit bottom. I told my sister the truth about what was happening in my home, knowing she'd understand because she was disorganized too. On that fateful day she'd also hit bottom. (Her story is in our book, "Sidetracked Home Executives: from pigpen to paradise.")

We made a list of household chores, put each chore on a 3x5 card, got 3x5 dividers 1 through 31 for the days of the month and put the cards into a filing box along with a weekly plan where each day had a special focus.

In six weeks, we had our homes running like a computer that's just been defragged. We let the cards give us direction. We let the cards nag the children and husbands, instead of our voices and we miraculously discovered we had more free time to relax, refresh and reboot every day.

We wrote the book about our transformation from pigpen to paradise and became known across the country as the slob sisters.

Today it's so easy to set up your own system (back then we had to type out each card) because we have a Word file with all the jobs and a template for the 3x5 cards. You just have to print the cards on card stock, cut them and put them into a file box.

As I think back to that decision to get my act together, there is one and only one reason I was successful. The reason. That's right; my reason to get organized was so that I'd have more free time to play. It was a very selfish reason, but it ended up helping millions! I'm amazed at the ripples that decision created! I never dreamed I'd be writing for newspapers, appearing on television and enjoying the community of sister SHEs (Sidetracked Home Executives) through my website, cluborganized.com.

If you're on the fence about getting organized now or putting it off until tomorrow, the sooner you decide to do it for you, not your husband, your peers, your mother or mother-in-law, but for you, the sooner you'll have more free time for yourself. You have so much to GIVE the world, but you have to TAKE time to focus on what makes you happy in order to give the world what you and only you have to share.

It's called enlightened selfishness and it's the same concept they use in the airline business. "If there is a loss of cabin pressure an oxygen mask will come down. Put your mask on first and then assist your child or someone dependent on you."

be able to go watch football on Sunday and drink a beer, and not have to go to Gainesville. That's ridiculous."

Opponents of changing the ordinance emphasized the recognition of Sunday as a holy day in Chiefland. One citizen said he had a bias against alcohol consumption. "On one hand, I am a retired Southern Baptist pastor who believes in the church covenant and abstinence," he said. "Secondly, I'm the son of an alcoholic father. Thirdly I am a first responder EMR. I have seen firsthand results of drinking and driving. If it saves one person on one day, then it's worth the loss of income."

Commissioner Chris Jones took the floor and said that he had been going to church most of his life and he challenged anyone to find where in the Bible it addresses not drinking alcohol. "Separation of church and state is the most important factor here," Jones said. "I understand the Bible from a spiritual standpoint and a theological standpoint. My reason for wanting this passed is for economics. But no person should be judged just because they decide to take a drink."

The final statement of the workshop came from Mayor Betty Walker. "We need to think more out of the box," she said. "I've been in Chiefland for 72 years and we're still in the box. Think about your kids, grandkids. It's time to change."

The Commission decided to put the topic on the agenda of the Oct. 22 meeting.

ty ever since." The 6.6-mile stretch is from Bird Creek Boat Ramp to U.S. Highway 19.

"We're trying to get it moved through, so we can work on this in conjunction with the boat ramp project and get all done at the same time," Meeks said.

The Board approved casting a wider net than usual to attract qualified applicants for Request For Proposals (RFPs) to engineer, design, plan, survey, permit, inspect, and other administrative related service that the project will require.

LaLonde said the County expanded its advertising reach because of the where the stretch is located within in the County. "We decided to reach out farther," La-

Londe said about advertising in three news publications representing Levy, Citrus and Alachua counties.

County Attorney Anne Bast Brown said the County will be using a staff committee to review proposals and the presentations by contenders for the project will not be open to the public.

"Engineers can't sit in (other presentations) and they'll come one at a time," Brown said. "We've waived that in the past."

The staff committee will rank applicants and provide a recommendation.

The project will resurface and widen the road from 20 to 22 feet to accommodate all vehicles better, but especially vehicles hauling trailers and boats, Meeks said.

"We found that widening helps with issues of breaking off. There's a lot of boat traffic on that road, and sometimes they hog the centerline. Hopefully, the widening will make it a safer trip."

1 in 8 women, 1 in 1,000 men: Breast cancer by the numbers

- About 1 in 8 U.S. women (about 12.4 percent) will develop invasive breast cancer over the course of their lifetime.
 - In 2018, an estimated 266,120 new cases of invasive breast cancer are expected to be diagnosed in women in the U.S., along with 63,960 new cases of non-invasive breast cancer.
 - About 2,550 new cases of invasive breast cancer are expected to be diagnosed in men in 2018. A man's lifetime risk of breast cancer is about 1 in 1,000.
 - About 40,920 women in the U.S. are expected to die in 2018 from breast cancer, though death rates have been decreasing since 1989. Women under 50 have experienced larger decreases. These decreases are thought to be the result of treatment advances, earlier detection through screening, and increased awareness.
 - For women in the U.S., breast cancer death rates are higher than those for any other cancer, besides lung cancer.
 - Besides skin cancer, breast cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer among American women. In 2017, it's estimated that about 30 percent of newly diagnosed cancers in women will be breast cancers.

Worried about breast cancer?

Exercise more, drink less, put down the cigarettes

With 1-in-8 odds of being diagnosed with breast cancer, almost every woman wonders if she will be "the one" to get breast cancer in her lifetime.

Although some risk factors cannot be changed, some can be lowered with lifestyle modifications and changes.

Risk factors that cannot be changed:

The two biggest risk factors for most breast cancers are: being a woman and getting older. Most breast cancers are found in women age 50 and older.

Genetics play a part. Women who have inherited changes or mutations to genes, such as the BRCA1 and BRCA2, are at higher risk for breast and ovarian cancers.

Starting your period before age 12 and/or starting menopause after

age 55 raises a woman's risk because of a longer exposure to reproductive hormones.

Dense breast tissue makes tumors more difficult to see on a mammogram and so tumors are sometimes not detected.

Family history of breast cancer. If your mother, sister, daughter or aunt has had breast cancer, your risk of also being diagnosed with the disease at some time in your life is raised, although it's not a given that you will get breast cancer.

Women who took the drug diethylstilbestrol (DES) between 1940 and 1971 during pregnancy or whose mothers took DES while pregnant with them are at a higher risk. DES was prescribed to prevent miscarriages.

Risk factors that can be changed:
Exercise. Not being physically active raises your risk of getting breast cancer.

Weight. Being overweight or obese after menopause raises your risk of the disease.

Alcohol. Studies show that a woman's risk for breast cancer increases with the more alcohol she consumes.

Smoking. Smoking cigarettes increases the risk for breast cancer and other cancers.

HRT. Hormone Replacement Therapy that contains both estrogen and progesterone and taken during menopause for longer than five years can raise breast cancer risk.

Reproductive history. A first pregnancy after age 30, never breastfeeding and never having a full-term pregnancy can raise the risk of breast cancer.

CMHS upsets Bucs to advance to district finals

The Chiefland volleyball team came back to win three straight sets Oct. 16 in Williston to beat Branford for the first time this season and advance to the District 1A-7 championship.

The district final is Oct. 18 in Williston at 6 p.m. The Lady Indians face either top-seeded Trenton or No. 4 seed Williston. They split with the Lady Tigers and swept the Lady Red Devils in the regular season.

The district semifinal win over the Lady Buccaneers also earned Chiefland, in its first year under Coach Katie Jones, a bid to the state playoffs, which begin Oct. 23 with the regional semifinals.

Chiefland defeated No. 6 seed Dixie County Oct. 15 in the district quarterfinals 3-1

(25-7, 26-24, 23-25, 25-16).

The Lady Indians also beat Branford 3-1 (23-25, 25-16, 25-17, 25-17). Prior to Tuesday, CMHS lost a pair of matches 3-1 apiece to the Lady Bucs. CMHS was more dominant in its latter sets against Branford than it was against the Lady Bears, who hung around and forced long sets with an error-prone Chiefland squad on Monday.

Jones predicted a close match with the Lady Bucs after the win over Dixie County, but figured her team's offense and defense would have to pick up their game against Branford. Chiefland's calling card this season has been tenacity, as it's lacking in seasoned varsity experience with just two seniors. Jones saw improvement from her group over the season.

The Lady Indians are back in the playoffs for the first time

since 2016. They advanced to the Class 1A state final four in 2015.

Chiefland suffers first loss

Adam Gore and the Chiefland coaching staff were concerned their team needed to get back to its foundation and regain the mental edge that served the Indians so well coming out of the gate.

They were hoping it wouldn't require a loss, however.

In Hawthorne, Oct. 12, Chiefland took its first loss on the season in a 42-14 defeat to the No. 4 Hornets, dropping the Indians to 6-1.

CMHS is at Bronson Friday, Oct. 19, before returning home Oct. 26 against Gainesville-St. Francis Catholic. The Indians, who finish the regular season Nov. 2 at home versus Williston, remain alive for a first-round playoff bye.

Gore has preached before and after every game this year that the more physical team wins the game. It was no different after the loss to Hawthorne, as two of his own players reminded him right after the game.

"The most physical team won," Gore said. "Hats off to Hawthorne."

"We pride ourselves on being physical, and for whatever reason we didn't show up tonight. As a coaching staff, we've kind of been seeing this coming. We've been thinking a lot of ourselves."

"We don't want it in this form, but we need to lock back in on what makes us. We're not going to just

be able to rely on our athletes. We've got execute, play tough, play physical, play with a lot of effort."

The game was tied 7-7 at halftime after the teams exchange back-to-back touchdowns.

Hawthorne looked to retake the lead in the waning seconds of the half after hitting a 23-yard pass to get to the Chiefland 16-yard-line. But three straight sacks by the Indian defense and a personal foul call against HHS set the Hornets back.

Hawthorne responded in the third quarter with a couple of touchdowns off short fields, including one on the heels of a punt snafu by Chiefland.

CMHS junior Ty Corbin then returned a kickoff 85 yards for a touchdown, which, followed by a Noah Nguyen PAT, cut the lead to 21-14.

But quarterback Kahleil Jackson connected for the second of his three long touchdown passes on the night later in the third to extend the lead.

The Hornets took advantage of more favorable starting field position – the Indians were frequently attempting punts from deep on their own side of the field – for another score early in the fourth, before Jackson capped the scoring with a 50-yard TD pass to former Williston receiver Jeremiah James.

"There for a stretch in the third quarter, it didn't matter what we called," Gore said. "When a team controls the line of scrimmage, that's just the way it

is. We couldn't dig deep. We had a couple of bad things happen to us there and we wanted to sulk on it instead of fight."

"We got tight coaching in the second half as far as play calling," Gore said. "We battled bad field position all night long."

The Indians were flagged for 170 yards on 15 penalties, while Hawthorne took 14 penalties for 120 yards.

Gore wasn't interested in excuses over the penalties, nor the fact the team missed practice time due to Hurricane Michael. The team also lost standout defensive end and running back Wyatt Hammond to an injury in the second quarter.

"We're just thankful we got a chance to play," Gore said. "Our thoughts and prayers are definitely with (the Panhandle)."

Corbin ran 6 yards for Chiefland's first touchdown, which was set up by a De'Shamar Shepherd fumble recovery.

It's obviously impossible to tell at this time, but one definite winner and one possible winner have already emerged. No. 4 Constitutional Amendment, Article VI, Section 4

Voting Restoration Amendment

This amendment restores the voting rights of Floridians with felony convictions after they complete all terms of their sentence including parole or probation. The amendment would not apply to those convicted of murder or sexual offenses, who would continue to be permanently barred from voting unless the Governor and Cabinet vote to restore their voting rights on a case by case basis.

The precise effect of this amendment on state and local government costs cannot be determined, but the operation of current voter registration laws, combined with an increased number of felons registering to vote, will produce higher overall costs relative to the processes in place today. The impact, if any, on state and local government revenues cannot be determined. The fiscal impact of any future legislation that implements a different process cannot be reasonably determined.

Supermajority Vote Required to Impose, Authorize, or Raise State Taxes or Fees

Prohibits the legislature from imposing, authorizing, or raising a state tax or fee except through legislation approved by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature in a bill containing no other subject. This proposal does not authorize a state tax or fee otherwise prohibited by the Constitution and does not apply to fees or taxes imposed or authorized to be imposed by a county, municipality, school board, or special district.

Rights of Crime Victims; Judges

Requires judges and hearing officers to independently interpret statutes and rules rather than deferring to government agency's interpretation. Raises mandatory retirement age of state justices and judges from seventy to seventy-five years; deletes authorization to complete judicial term if one-half of term has been served by retirement age.

First Responder and Military Member Survivor Benefits; Public Colleges and Universities

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
Ask the Guys
