Levy residents can help map internet strength




Third generation rancher sets stage for life lessons

On the other side of the pen, a new generation of bull riders is gearing up. Spurs, vests, helmets, chaps.

Valdosta promises early spill notice, makes upgrades to sewage facilities

Levy County Commission Chair John Meeks brought back some answers after a visit with Valdosta, Georgia officials where sewage spills were taken to task. On March 19, the Board unani-

mously adopted a resolution that insisted that Valdosta answer concerns about making progress on sewage spill prevention.

Meeks said those concerns about spillage were put into perspective and that facility upgrades have continued de-

spite the fact that Valdosta has received no financial aid from FEMA or state agencies after a calculated 6 billion gallons of rainfall landed inside the municipality over a three-day period resulting in a sewage spill that affected downstream counties.

'The incident happened in December and sparked the outrage that we have as citizens of Florida," Meeks said.

But what he learned in an hourlong time period with Valdosta officials and Georgia Tech engineers clarified the situation. "They're doing as much as

they can," Meeks said about made major investments in improvements.

"Back in 2008, they had three hurricane events and asked for FEMA funding, but were denied after repeals," he said. Valdosta had applied for \$94 million in relief funds and was approved at first, then denied and turned away after appeals.

Some improvements include building an 8-million-gallon additional retention pond, pumping smoke into the sewer system to

munity Assistance Partnership and Rural LISC have teamed to develop the "TestIT' app to collect data that can be used to advocate for funding for broadband infrastructure in unserved rural areas.

"With the app. users can test their broadband speed from anywhere. Snapshots from individual tests will be collected within a database, allowing connectivity data throughout county to be analyzed.'

'Every time you do this test your data is uploaded," Meeks said. "They don't steal your photos; they don't steal your social security number. They take this data and present it to Congress and say, 'Quit denying it, quit sugar

coating it, quit letting the industry, all the people with money, lobbyists tell us it's not a problem.'


What I found, on more than one occasion, is that I can't pick up a signal at all," Meeks said and proceeded to run a test on the spot.

"None, nothing, zip," he said. "I just did a test on my phone.'

The first time he rode a bull he was 11 years old, the junior at CMHS said.

"We were bucking calves, younger bulls and I was like, I would like to get on one," Cole said. 'And I just ended up getting on that day.'

Cole arrived early on this Sunday afternoon and helped his father piece some fencing together. "Fixing the arena up... It's a lot of work for sure," he said.

Cole will be competing in this weekend's event. It's the Sunday drop in practices that keep him on his toes because when he's not on a bull, he's in the arena grabbing the bulls' attention after other riders make their escape.

Sunday turnouts can be unpredictable, Cole said. "Sometimes we'll have 8 or 9 or none," he said. "It depends on what is going on. A bunch of us come up here, everyone gives each other tips. It's a big get together and everybody gets on bulls.'

Cole considers bull riding a hobby, but said he plans to get in the management side of the business like his father.


With four riders ready to go, a bull is selected for the first round and CMHS Student William Fortner settles in first. Fortner, 15, is just starting out and trying to gain experience.


A few seconds out of the gate and Fortner is looking his bull right in the eye. Cole charges in and convinces the bull to turn away just in time.

The riders gather in a circle and regroup while another bull is lined up for the second rider Rocky Nix, a pro rider from Colorado who hasn't been on a bull since Januarv

Nix, 24 is a member of the Professional Rodeo **Cowboys Association** (PRCA) and competes on broncs and bulls. He tore his MCL and broke his wrist at the same time during a competition and hasn't been able to ride since January.



down here," Nix said and found out about Sunday practices by word of mouth. "A kid helping a farrier told me about it,' he said.

Nix is dressed in his chaps with crosses on them and across the back of his vest reads, "Philippians 4:13." He was eager to get back on a bull and held on for one of the longer rides of the day. He landed on his feet but lost balance as he hit the ground. Cole dashed out to distract the bull and ended up having to jump the fence himself to avoid contact. Nix was all smiles afterward.

Cole was up next, switching from cleats to boots and spurs. He came out strong but made contact with the bull and made a clean jump off.

To round out the first set, CMHS Junior Kirk Griffin was up. Griffin said he hopes to be a professional rider and is already running open circuits.

He lives "two minutes down the road" from Carter's Arena, he said, and has been coming to practice on Sundays for about six months now even though he started riding close to two years ago.

His advice to up and coming riders: Make sure you wear a helmet.


"You go in there with a positive attitude," Griffin said. "You're gonna do good, you're not gonna get hurt, things are gonna go good," he added. "But who knows what's

Florida agricultural leaders are calling for deeper exploration of farmers, ranchers, and forest landowners as suppliers of environmental protection as well as of food and fiber.

The Florida Climate-Smart Agriculture Work Group has declared its ambitions to craft a plan for how the state's 26 million acres of agricultural lands can adapt to changing conditions and produce more clean water and air

build a healthier, more resilient food system and a healthier, more sustainable planet," said Co-Chairs Lynetta Usher Griner and Jim Strickland.

Solutions from the Land (SfL), a non-profit that promotes farmer-inspired solutions to global challenges, in partnership with the University of Florida's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (UF/IFAS), is sponsoring the initiative. The project aims to as-

sist Florida agriculture and forestry leaders in examining the vulnerabilities and opportunities created by changing climatic conditions in ways that are relevant to their daily lives and those of their customers. It will also seek to mobilize thought leaders to advocate for needed changes in land use practices, research, education, and policy. "Solutions from the Land is working across the country to bring America's farms, ranches, and forests to the forefront of resolving food system, energy, environmental, and climate challenges and achieving global sustainable de-

velopment goals," SFL President Ernie Shea said. "We are honored to be in Florida helping visionary agricultural leaders and their partners demonstrate the full range of goods and services they can deliver from the land.'

Funded by a Turner Foundation planning grant, the project was initiated earlier this year when SfL and UF/IFAS held a climate-smart agriculture discussion with some of Florida's most respected agricultural leaders. The discussion included a review of the impacts that extreme weather events and changing climatic conditions are having and are expected to have on the state's agriculture and forestry sectors. Work Group members came to the consensus view that Florida agriculture was undergoing transformational change and that extreme weather events and changing conditions were a threat multiplier that required additional discussion. The group discussed a need for and benefits of developing an agricultural and forestry adaptive management

strategy for the state based on climate-smart agriculture principles and agreed to develop an action plan for implementing the strategy. At their second meeting in Gainesville on Wednesday, Griner and Strickland were affirmed as the inaugural co-chairs of the Work Group. Griner, along with her husband, Ken, owns and operates Usher Land and Timber, based in Chiefland. She is the 2018 Swisher Sweets/

I have yet to sell that line to her, but I still try. Of course, if I could sell her this I could sell her anything. So much for trying.


I am not sure which cookie she bakes that I like the most. I usually say, "The cookie I like the most is the one I'm eating at the time."

"Those cookies were for our fellowship this coming Sunday. What happened to them?" Oh boy.

"I couldn't resist those cookies and so I had just one."

"If you had just one, where did the rest go?"

At this point, to come up with an explanation that would satisfy her inquiry was well beyond my pay grade.

I did not recall eating all those delicious cookies. Each cookie tasted better than the one before. I tried to explain, "Those were the best cookies in the whole wide world. The best cookies you have ever baked."

She just gave me one of "those stares."

After apologizing for my misdeed, I thought of a Scripture verse along this line.

"There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man: but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it" (1 Corinthians 10:13).

The worst temptation is the one you think is not a temptation and one you can handle on your own. If it were not for temptations, I would not know how gracious God is in his forgiving power.

Be ever ready to believe the best of each other

"Peter wants a divorce," my friend said, taking rapid breaths.

It pained me to see her struggling to keep from falling completely apart. "I'm so sorry, Stacey." When our eyes

when our eyes met, her mascara was long gone. "It hurts, Sheryl. And what makes it

worse is knowing some people will believe Peter – that it's all my fault. I don't think I can handle this."

Her words pierced my heart as I bemoaned the added anguish I knew she would suffer from those who didn't know the whole truth.

How often do we find ourselves the object of false judgment? Or on the flip side, being one of those speaking falsehoods about another?

It reminds me of the second part of 1 Corinthians 13:7 (ESV): "Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things." The Amplified Bible, Classic Edition, expands "believes all things" this way: "[Love] is ever ready to believe the best of every person."

How can we be ever ready to believe the best of every person, especially when the conversation turns against them? We can begin by deciding ahead of time that we'll never start rumors or listen to them. To redirect a conversation going in the wrong direction, try saying something like: "Oh, I hope that's not true. But just in case, I'll put (name of person) on my prayer list." This is better than remaining silent, because sometimes our silence implies our agreement.

And what about believing the best of those we see every day? If our husband makes a costly investment mistake, do we lose faith in him, or do we continue to believe in his ability to succeed? If a friend constantly shows up late, do we focus on that one (albeit irritating) flaw, or can we ask God to help us recall (and believe in) her good qualities?

Refusing to listen to rumors and form negative opinions about people takes effort. But when we choose to believe the best of someone (and help others to do the same) – and faithfully pray for them – we could keep that person from falling into a depth of despair that might lead to devastating consequences.

Knowing someone still believes in them – knowing they're worth defending – could give them the hope and dignity they need to persevere.

every decision has at least two components: sacrifice and risk. Some decisions, the easiest ones, come with very little sacrifice and very little risk. These are the ones that most of us make every day. They keep us in our comfort zone and that is really where we all like to live.

I asked myself as I thought about what had just transpired that morning if my decision to stay put was based on my unwillingness to sacrifice to climb a difficult hill, or if it was based on the fear that I would run into the bird that I was trying to get close to.

The night before, we had seen a gobbler and a hen move into a certain part of the woods. We surmised they would certainly roost there. So, our plans were to be their wake-up call the next morning. The next day we were in place as the sun began to rise. The woods all around us was being filled with a chorus of gobbles.

None of them, however, were coming from this particular bird that we were set up on. We stayed and waited. We continued to wait as we called softly to let him know we were around. Still no response. The other gobblers wanted us to come to them, but we remained steadfast until we determined that somehow this bird had eluded us.

Our plan now was to try to get on one of the other gobblers that had been calling but we had waited too long. They had already found other hens. So, there we were, empty-handed, frustrated, and sulking in the price of a bad decision.

While sitting on the side of that hill, I pondered on some lesson from what had just happened. It seemed that very quickly my mind went to this subject of decisions. You see Was I afraid of that risk? I'm not sure, but I was reminded of this: the greatest successes and results will always come from the greatest sacrifices and risks. In investments, the greatest return on one's money also comes with the greatest possibility of losing one's money.

So, as you can imagine, most people prefer to remain in the safe confines of the local FDIC insured bank. In turkey hunting, most people choose to stay on level ground instead of climbing a difficult hill. They prefer to stay several hundred yards from a gobbler's roost instead of moving close and risking being seen. The truth is, the one closest is more likely to garner the kill.

My friend, remember that while most of your decisions in life will take very little sacrifice and risk, if you are truly going to enjoy the most thrilling victories, you will have to put something on the line. Your risk may not always pay off but at least you won't be sitting on the side of a hill somewhere, wondering what might have been if you had only moved.

Pattycake is just one of the many cats rescued by Furever Friends Rescue, Inc. in Chiefland.

Furever Friends Rescue was started in January 2018 because a group of friends saw the need for a cat and dog rescue group in Chiefland especially and in Levy County in general.






Immigration Court System Reform Needed

Congress needs to act now on immigration.

In the nearly 20 years I have been practicing immigration law, I have witnessed first-hand the systemic problems faced by our immigration court system which, although most people don't realize, is controlled by the Department of Justice – making judges vulnerable to political pressure from the Attorney General who also oversees prosecutors.

In order for us to offer real justice in immigration court, Congress needs to pass legislation creating an independent judiciary.

Current court backlogs of three to five years are antithetical to swift justice and ironically allow those who are awaiting court dates to have work authorization and driver licenses in our state while deepening their roots here.

Contrary to popular belief, being in this country without authorization is not a crime. Therefore, the Attorney General must stop criminalizing undocumented immigration. The country's top attorney should know that the

Fourth Amendment requires the appointment of government attorneys at taxpayer expense if an undocumented is classified as a criminal. Does the AG want justice and or a taxpayer burden?

Second, for generations, immigration has been a mighty engine of growth in the United States. Like myself, immigrants come to join family, to work, and

to find protection from danger. We all contribute to our shared economic growth. But under this administration, processing delays have increased 46% over two years, forcing families to wait longer and hurting business growth. Moreover, Requests for Evidence and case denials for specialty occupations are at all-time highs. Such policies hurt American businesses and make our


country less competitive, and only encourage high skilled workers to make Canada, Germany and Australia great.

Congress must hold USCIS accountable to its mission to ensure the agency best serves American businesses, families and our nation.

Tips to avoid utility scam phone calls



Tax changes, charitable giving and Robert Cray

bill dramatically different than what you expected? If so, there are several things you may want to consider as we progress through the 2019 tax year.

Why, you may ask, is an investment advisor writing about taxes? Good question. The answer is that it's not what you make that matters; it's what you get to keep. Investing without considering tax implications is foolhardy. Savvy investors and the best investment advisors think as much about taxes as they do about investments. Investment results are not knowable in advance, but the impact of tax regulations can be.

We recently added a CPA to our team, who prepares returns and crafts tax strategies for our clients. As we conferred throughout the year, here are a few tax season takeaways.

First, many folks were unprepared for how the changes in the treatment of itemized deductions impacted their tax bill. Charitable giving, in concert with other deductions, that falls short of the new \$24,000 standard deduction (for married couples filing jointly) now provides no tax benefit. Say you gave your church \$100 every Sunday all year (for a total of \$5,200 contributed). Imagine also that your itemized deductions, including charitable giving, totaled \$17,500.

This year you were not able to deduct that \$17,500 from your adjusted gross income, as it did not eclipse the \$24,000 standard deduction. Possible remedies may include Qualified Charitable Distributions, which allow you to donate some or all of your Required Minimum Distribution. A QCD is taxable neither to you, the giver, nor to the receiving charity, and is not added to your gross income. Or lumping charitable contributions into one year to reach an amount in excess of the standard deduction. Say you were planning to give your church \$50,000. You may want to give the total amount in one year to take advantage of a larger deduction, rather than give \$10,000 for five years. Naturally, every investor's situation is unique, so you'll want to confer with your advisor to make sure strategies are appropriate for your individual situation.

Another step that taxpayers may take in 2019, that perhaps they missed last year is to ensure that their withholding amount on income is on target. Many people did not alter their withholding from IRA distributions like RMD's or from their Social Security income. Thus, they were surprised when their tax bill was quite a bit different than what they expected. Some folks got more money back than they anticipated and those dollars could have been working for them throughout the year.

Attorney General Ashley Moody is issuing a Consumer Alert regarding utility scam calls. Utility scams occur when an imposter claims to be a utility company representative and threatens to shut off power, gas or water unless payment is made immediately. The scammers tell consumers the only way to keep services from being turned off is to immediately pay the amount owed on an overdue bill—often through wire transfer or a money card.

Moody said, "These deceitful utility scammers can sound persuasive on the phone and will use scare tactics to trick consumers into making false payments. Consumers should be suspicious of any unsolicited phone call demanding money and report any suspicious activity to our office."

Utility scammers target individuals and businesses. While individuals seek to avoid the discomfort and inconvenience of disrupted utility services, businesses often cannot afford utilities to be abruptly disrupted; interfering with the ability to serve consumers.

To avoid utility scams, consider the following tips:

- Just hang up. Then call the utility provider at the phone number listed on a billing statement to confirm the authenticity of the call, inquire about the status of the account and report the fraudulent communication;

- Do not trust the number listed on caller ID. A process known as spoofing allows scammers to change the information displayed on caller ID to give the appearance that the call is coming from a utility provider;

- Never provide personal or financial information over the phone; and

 Be wary of anyone demanding immediate payment via wire transfer, prepaid debit or gift cards.

Utility companies will not force consumers to pay over the phone as the only option and do not demand one specific type of payment. If a caller demands credit card information or payment by wire, gift card, Green Dot, MoneyPak or reloadable card, then the call is a scammer. Consumers behind on payments can contact the utility provider directly to see if the provider has any hardship programs or payment plan options to keep services running.

Consumers who believe to be a victim of a utility scam can report the incident to the Florida Attorney General's Office by filing a complaint online at MyFloridaLegal.com or by calling 1(866) 9NO-SCAM. near Destin, FL. Do you know a lonely person?

Recently I saw a news item on "CBS This Morning" that hit home with me. A Chicago police officer driving through a neighborhood saw a middle-school child running fast along the sidewalk. Stopping to see what the

situation was, the boy cried that he missed his school bus. Feeling compassion, the cop called his mom, to see if she could take him to his school. She couldn't, so the officer drove him to his school entrance, making a fuss with his lights flashing to clear the way through the throng of students.

That week, he visited the boy's home to see that he was okay. Mom had tried to have a birthday party for him, inviting his friends. But no one came, and he had no party. This cop felt bad that the child was lonely and could use a friend. Back at the police station, he shared his story with fellow officers. Together, they gathered some presents and birthday cards, and threw an impromptu party at his home, with his mom's help. It attracted community attention to his situation, and his classmates met the challenge.

In the TV news interview with that child and the officer, the boy had smiles, good feelings and gratitude. When he was asked, "What do you want to be when you grow up?" he said, "A policeman!"

In America today, more and more people report feeling left out and lonely. Why's that? We're more separated from one another, because of growing cities and suburbs. It can be difficult to get together with others, especially if you're dependent on a car or a school bus. Depression and suicide are on a rise, everywhere. People stay home watching television, not participating in organized sports or school activities. Some who aren't so athletic or gregarious can be left out. Bullying is still a growing social problem, which hits young folks harder. "Tell an adult" often does not solve the problem.

What can you do? Loneliness is a problem that can, and should, be addressed for anyone who is lonely, whether they're a victim, a parent, or a counselor, teacher, or a police officer who is there to "protect and serve." Or by you! Here are some things you might try.

Identify the problem. Why is this person lonely? Realize your personal power to decide to help, and to take action. See something, do something! We're all a community, and when one of us needs help, we can jump in and do the right thing. Feeling lonely can be painful. It is a problem that can be addressed and treated. Be sensitive to others' situations and feelings. Reach out. Step up to the plate. Don't let any fears or other priorities keep you from helping your fellow human being. Reach out of your "comfort zone," and use a chance to help as an opportunity. Find out how you can help.

When I was little, I was taught "Don't speak to a stranger." But as an adult, I've learned that "There are no strangers." It's okay to chat in an elevator, or to stop and help an old person bending over and holding onto a railing, breathing hard, who I helped this week. Could you set up a "buddy bench," or commandeer a public bench in the community, with a sign welcoming support or friendship?

I can remember times when I was a child and could have really used an offer to help me, and a kind word. As a child, we don't know all the ways to deal with loneliness or being left out. Now that we're adults, let's use life's lessons to make the world a little better because you're here. Thanks for what you can do!

Trenton veteran stays active despite disabilities

Mike Worner, a 55-year-old veteran from Trenton, has been disabled since he was 22 years old. Worner is a quadriplegic who cannot use his legs and only has use of his fingers on one hand

While working on a submarine in the Navy, Worner one day had to go ashore to retrieve supplies and was hit by a newspaper delivery vehicle traveling 70 MPH. He was serving on the USS Dallas in Groton, Connecticut during the time of the accident.

After his accident, Worner, who served two years in the Navy, tried everything he could to learn to walk again. At the point he realized that he would not be able to walk, he began to adapt to his lifestyle as a quadriplegic, not allowing his disability to get in the way of his favorite activities

Worner isn't the only one in his family overcoming odds. Worner's mother, Karen Alberts, took over care of her son after his accident. Alberts, who is currently 74 years old, takes care of Worner along with three other caregivers, and quilts to make money to care for her son. According to Worner's caregiver, Cory, his mother has a prosthetic leg, from her leg to a shark bite while, but still does all the landscaping at Worner's home. Alberts was an Abalone shell diver when she was younger.

Alberts' perseverance has seemed to rub off on her son, as he maintains an incredibly active lifestyle for a quadriplegic -- Worner bowls, swims, sings karaoke, dances and plays a simulated guitar for fun.

Worner swims with his legs weighted down and his head supported by floats, Cory said, and uses head motions to move in different directions. He dances by standing in his wheelchair and bowls using the ball ramp. Worner also goes to the Veteran's Memorial Hospital in Gainesville once a week to play a simulated guitar on a tablet.

Worner is hopeful that the Camp Valor Project, a proposed veterans service facility at Otter Springs, will be able to serve veterans such as himself in the area. Worner and Cory are very concerned that many veterans just refuse to go to the hospital in Gainesville because of the long wait. It's especially disconcerting because



of the ever-increasing suicide rate among veterans across the US. Construction on Camp Valor is projected to start at the end of this year.

Worner said, "Camp Valor will be great." Worner was also happy that the facility would have wheelchair access and activities available at the center. He is hoping to have an active role at Camp Valor once the facility opens. "Mike is always willing to help everyone and serves as inspiration to so many," Cory said.

Cory said Worner and his mother took a chance hiring her when they didn't know her. Later on, they hired her daughter as a caregiver. They allow her to bring her newborn son to work with her in their home. Worner loves children and holds the baby everyday.

According to Cory, Worner and his mother go above and beyond being kind to others.

"Once you meet Mike Worner, it changes you," Corv said. "If you think you can't do something, he shows you that you can do anything.

detect leaks, lining 1.600 manhole covers at 40 a year to keep acids from creating leaks, putting in a real time monitor in all stations and facilities where any sort of line connections exist.

'So if they have an issue," Meeks said, "instead of a blow at the plant like a tidal wave, they can reroute it and go out and see what the problem is. "All of these improvements they have funded without state or federal funds. Meeks said he

learned a lot after hearing, "that side of the story," and added,

"It doesn't help those people in Madison County and Hamilton County that have E. coli and human fecal matter in their well, but it does make you aware that they are doing things to improve the issues.

The biggest improvement outside of adding structures and upgrades involves the spill reporting protocol.

"They have agreed that they will notify

us of a spill immediately," Meeks said. "In the past they've been waiting until they determine the size and complexity.

"They will notify the Florida Department of Health and will notify every county coordinator of the 12 counties,' he added. "And will continue to monitor everything at the State line.

Meeks emphasized the economic impact that even the perception of polluted water can have on Levy County. "We're not just talking about recreation, but a thriving aquaculture in Cedar Key.'

Bess the Book Bus is a calling for Rotary visitor

The Suwannee Valley Rotary Club welcomed a special guest on April 18, as Jenn Frances, owner and manager of Bess the Book Bus, showed how she introduces the love of reading to children across the United States.

Frances, who has a degree in child psychology, began her book bus business 16 years ago when she was looking for a career change.

"I was very unfulfilled in what I was doing," she recalled. "I started journaling and I was having trouble sleeping." Frances the idea just came to her one day and she felt it was what she was meant to do.

Frances started the book bus in the Tampa area and now makes nation-wide trips to visit schools and detention centers. Her visits begin with read-alouds with the students. Frances says the story time is very interactive. After the read-alouds, the students shop on the book bus. Each student is allowed to pick one book. Frances also goes to community events. There is no charge for the books. Frances says she has given away over

71,000 books through the book bus program.

Book drives online help raise funding for the bus; we work with publishers." Frances said First Book, a publishing company, redistributes mid-runs and often books that don't sell well get donated to the bus. She went on to explain that some of the companies give

her the books for only the cost of shipping. Frances also said Townsend Press donates books completely for free. She also works with a grant writer to receive extra funding for the book bus.

Frances was also able to get her bus donated after a long period of writing letters to vehicle companies.

"I rarely ask the schools for money because they have so many other things to worry about," Frances said. "We usually work through sponsorships for the schools. She said a sponsorship cost \$350 per 100 children and \$2 per additional child." Some of the well-off schools treat the bus as if it were a field trip and the students pay a fee, Frances said.

The Suwannee Valley Rotary Club is making plans to have the Book Bus come to Chiefland Elementary School next school year. In the meantime, Frances donated more than 60 books to the Rotary's reading buddies that read at the elementary school.

Frances says her career is very rewarding. She loves to see the children's faces light up when they are book shopping. "Kids love to walk down the school hall holding a book because it identifies them as a reader," Frances said.

Bess the Book bus serves students pre-K through high school, but Frances says she usually doesn't get to work with high schools as often due to their busy class schedules.

Weatherford steps down after 30 years at CAAA

Tayne Weatherford can remember when baseball was the only sport available for Chiefland youth. While he oversaw the evolution of the Chiefland Area Athletic Association (CAAA) - an umbrella organization that houses baseball, softball, football, basketball and soccer leagues at Charles Strickland Recreational Park that became a relic of the past.

Weatherford officially stepped down as president of CAAA in April after serving three decades on the board. Looking back, he's most proud of helping facilitate more access to more sports for young Chiefland athletes.

"Being able to offer sports for children in our area, and knowing we can make a difference in their lives, that's what meant the most to me," Weatherford said. "Anytime you ride by Strickland Park, there is something going on.

"I'm thrilled because I was born and raised here and I've seen it when we didn't have the programs.

Weatherford is fresh off his retirement from the Association so he still feels the shock of it after investing so much of his - and his family's - time at the Park. His friends who are used to seeing him at the Park are also struggling to get used to the idea.

"It's been a big, big eye opener already," Weatherford said. "I've had a lot of friends text me, 'Wayne, you're not here! Where are you at? Are you all right?'

"It'll hit me later. I'm supposed to be at the park and I'm not there. I think everybody has a time in their life when they say, 'Okay, when is enough?' It's just time. I just think it's time for new blood."

The death of Chiefland Mayor Betty Walker in late February hit home for Weatherford and played a big part in his recent decision. The two were good friends and often encouraged each other to slow down for the sake of their respective health.

'She was like my momma," Weatherford said. "She kept telling me, 'Wayne, you've got to get out of it.' And I kept telling her, 'You've got to quit. You've got to slow down.

"She was very instrumental in the sports pro-

gram," Weatherford added. "She guided me a little bit on anything that had to do with the city."

Weatherford said he's proud of how the City of Chiefland included him on any issues pertaining to the Park. "It made me feel so

special because I felt like I was a part of them," he said.

Weatherford and his wife Lena were coaching at Chiefland High School – first basketball, then softball - when he got involved with the youth program. He was motivated by what he saw at the high school level, as girls struggled to adjust to the transition to fast pitch softball.

"It hadn't developed in this area," Weatherford said. "We were new, fresh, everyone was trying to learn the sport.

Once it got off the ground, things really took off. Weatherford coached two state champions in 12U Babe Ruth Softball and helmed three straight teams that represented Florida in the Southeast Regional tournament from 2000 to 2002. Those players, which included

Weatherford's daughter, Megan, would set the foundation for a Class 3A state final four Chiefland High School team in 2007 as well as a 2008 team that lost just one game. Another CAAA softball team, an 8U club not coached by Weatherford, also represented Florida in the Southeast in 2001.

Weatherford stepped down from coaching the CMHS softball team in 2017, after five final fours and three state titles. He said his connection to the high school garnered him more respect from the younger players.

'They think you know more than really do," Weatherford said with a laugh.

CAAA hosted a state T-Ball tournament for 15 years, and Weatherford and his family ran an annual Halloween carnival for close to that long, starting after the 9-11 attacks in 2001. He was the state president of Babe Ruth Softball for four years. Weatherford can remember when the league moved from McCallum Park to Strickland. "I'm so proud of the improvements at Strickland Park," he

said. "We've got a conference room full of memorabilia. It's just a beautiful park."

Weatherford's late mother, Gloria, ran the concession stand back during the transition, dishing out her beef skewers and homemade slushies. Family and CAAA are intricately linked for Weatherford. "My son used to tell everybody we own the park because we were there so much," he said.

The new board elected Ryan Hinote the new president Lee Bell the vice president. Both have extensive ties to CAAA. Bell is the basketball and football commissioner and Hinote has been the football commissioner.

Weatherford admits his own soft-heartedness got in the way of what might've been

best for CAAA at times, as he refused to turn anyone away, even if they couldn't afford the fees.

Weatherford said he was fortunate to have so many big-hearted collaborators at CAAA. "There have been some tremendous board members Brandy Horne, Prentice Spann, Oz Barker, Jimmy Anderson, Charles Brock and Donna Brock, the names go on and on of those who did their part in our league.'


Nowadays, Weatherford gets a kick out of meeting the children of the players he used to coach as children.

"All the kids I got to know, it made my life," he said. "A lot of people have different things they want to do, hunting and fishing and things like that, and I picked this. That's what I wanted to do, forever.'

monthly basis to check on safety, and to be a mentor and collect information and identify resources.

'They are there to be an advocate for the child," Siedzik said. "And to make sure court orders are followed."

According to Siedzik, data has proven that children with a volunteer will spend less time in foster care, do better in school, are less likely to return to foster care, receive more services, and more likely to be adopted if they can't be placed back home.

The Foundation is funded through direct grants which are used to support the children and help with recruitment and training.

Currently there are 29 children in Gilchrist County and 96 in Levy County in the program. Five children in Gilchrist County don't have a dedicated childcare advocate and 35 children in Levy County are in need

of advocates.

"With the lack of volunteers, we're not able to provide sufficient services," Siedzik said.

Becoming a volunteer starts with filling out a form and taking 30 hours of training. Twelve hours are spent in a classroom, some hours are on computer and then shadowing visits round out the process.

Volunteers are generally assigned up to two cases and are often the only constant person for a child going through the process.

According to Senior Child Advo-

cate Manager Michael Whiting, "It's a blessing," that there are a high number of grandparents keeping kids out of the foster care system in Gilchrist and Levy counties.

For kids who don't have family members stepping in, "were asking for support to help recruit and train and get community involved," Siedzik said.

"We try to help these kids to move on to be very successful in their lives.







1. Catching Chase

Chase Elliott is 10th in Cup Series points and looking for his first win. He spoke with media early during the Easter break about his season to date. The plates have been replaced with tapered spacers, which are virtually the same thing as restrictor plates, but allow for a more even airflow to the engine. The plates were used for the very last time in the Daytona 500.

New tech elements at All-Star **Race? Why should I care?**

Along with its annual (it seems) tweak to the All-Star Race format, NASCAR announced last week that the cars will include two new tech features that figure to be part of the Gen-7 cars that will roll off the haulers in 2021. If you're just a casual fan, at first glance it probably doesn't seem interesting to you: A single-piece carbon-fiber splitter/pan to presumably stabilize aerodynamics; and radiator ducts exiting the hood instead of the engine compartment, thus reducing engine temps.

And at second glance?

There's a cost-control element to these changes, and not just for the current teams within NASCAR. As other manufacturers are courted to enter NASCAR, a big lure is cost containment. So consider this one of the many steps being taken to bring back Dodge and maybe introduce another foreign brand to the game.
