# **Front** yard to table?



Florida Senate approves bill to ensure rights to grow veggie gardens.

A proposed state law aims to keep local governments from having any say on what you grow in your front yards.

The bill, known as the vegetable garden bill, is sponsored by Sen. Rob Bradley, a Republican representing District 5 in northwest Florida.

Senate Bill 82, which passed the Senate with a 35-5 vote Thursday, March 21, will prohibit local governments from

regulating vegetable gardens and overrides any existing ordinance regulating frontyard vegetable gardens, if passed by the Legislature.

The House version of the bill, House Bill 145, has been approved by one of three committees and needs House approval before it would be sent to Gov. Ron DeSantis for his signature.

Bradley believes being able to grow your own food is a basic property right and government regulations constitute a "vast overreach." He filed the bill after hearing of a court battle in Miami Shores involving an ordinance that prohibited front-yard vegetable gardens.

Following the legal dispute, a couple was forced to uproot a garden they had maintained for two decades because of the threat of code-enforcement fines amounting to \$50 per day.

"The world's changing when it comes to food," Bradley said. "There's a big interest in locally sourced food, organic products and folks growing their own food. The idea that a government would intervene to prohibit someone from taking matters into their own hands and growing their own fresh fruits and vegetables to take care of their own family and their own nutritional needs much like our forefathers have done — I think that is an action by local government that goes too far."

But some opponents of the bill said the bill should at least

allow local governments to restrict the size and locations of the gardens to protect the property values of surrounding homes. Others believe the bill is an infringement on Home Rule and unnecessary.

"Once again, the Legislature wants to intrude upon local government's and its residents' right to decide what is best for their community," Windermere Mayor Gary Bruhn said.

The town has no ordinance regarding gardens, but Bruhn believes the issue is better handled using common sense, particularly in cases that might impact a neighbor.

"If someone wants a garden in their backyard, I don't see an issue," he said. "I believe the issue is when people want to put a garden in their front yard and it would impact neighboring property values. Local government has a responsibility to maintain certain standards regarding property maintenance and upkeep. To take it to extremes, a property owner might want to turn their front lawn into a cornfield."

Do Good Farm founder Josh Taylor, who grows a sustainable farm and hydroponics garden in his Winter Garden home, believes governments should remove restrictions of any form for growing food on residential properties.

If the bill becomes law, it will go into effect July 1. It does not forbid local governments from regulating fertilizer use, water use during drought conditions and ordinances intended to control invasive species.

# **West Orange laces** up for Relay for Life

The American Cancer Society is holding the West Orange Relay for Life Saturday, March 30, at the Chain of Lakes Middle School.

They thought it was just a flu.

Twelve years ago, Keillian Carpenter and her friend grew sick. For three weeks, they suffered from lethargy. And both their parents assumed it was the flu.

"We were both really good friends throughout our whole childhood," Carpenter said. "And we both just got really sluggish. We felt we had less energy, just flu-like symptoms, and that's kind of what it was written off as by both our parents. So we were like that for about two or three weeks. We started missing school, and we were both very involved with sports, and we just weren't on top of our game."

When her friend was finally taken to the doctor, the doctors immediately realized something was very wrong when they saw the color of his blood. After some more tests, he was diagnosed with leukemia.

Days later, Carpenter also was diagnosed with leukemia. They went though their cancer battles together, but in the end, her friend didn't survive.

"I didn't join the American Cancer Society and Relay for Life

for myself or for my own celebration," said Carpenter, a Winter Garden resident who has volunteered with ACS for 12 years. "It was for him. We were diagnosed at the same time, but he lost his battle. He went into remission, but then he lost his battle with cancer in his junior year of high school. So this has always been to keep his memory alive and to also make sure no mother or father ever has to lose their child again."

Carpenter now serves as the event lead for the West Orange Relay for Life, which is hosted by the American Cancer Society and raises funds to support cancer research and resources for cancer patients.

Thirty countries participate in the community-based events, which also celebrate cancer survivors and remember lost loved ones. At the relays, teams and individuals to camp out at a school, park or fairground and take turns walking or running around a track or path. Each team has at least one participant on the track at all times and participates in fundraising in the months leading up to the event.

In 2017, United States-based Relay for Life events raised a total programs benefit patients just as of \$230 million. About \$6.3 bil-

lion has been raised in the U.S. since the movement was founded in 1985. And all the money contributes to the organization's lifesaving research and programs, Carpenter said.

"The research is such an amazing part of the (ACS), she said. "There are many cancerresearch foundations, but (ACS) stands apart from those charities because of all the programs we offer, like the Road to Recovery program. When (ACS) noticed people were missing treatment sessions or doctor visits because they didn't have vehicles or the means to put gas in their car to get their treatments, they started a program that allows volunteers to go to your house, pick you up and take you to your doctor and chemotherapy visits."

The organization also provides housing for patients and their caregivers for those who need cancer treatments at a specific location to help them save on hotel and/or commuting costs.

"They also saw the need for housing," she said. "Like here, in Gainesville and Tampa, or Texas which is currently a huge hub for cancer treatment. But not everyone who needs treatment in those specific areas lives locally, so ACS opened the American Cancer Society Hope Lodge program, which houses cancer patients and their caregivers so that they're closer to their needed treatments without dealing with the cost of commuting or hotels. ... # Kabooki Sushi rolls into Dr. Phillips

Chef Henry Moso is bringing his culinary creations near Restaurant Row and will be opening his restaurant's second location in early May.

There's an old saying that perfectly describes Chef Henry Moso's dedication to his craft: Love what you do for a living, and you'll never work a day in your life.

"That word, 'work,' has never existed to me" Moso said. "I enjoy doing (what I do)."

Moso, 28, is the owner and executive chef of Kabooki Sushi, where he specializes in serving up contemporary Japanese cuisine. He opened his first restaurant location in east Orlando about six years ago and will be opening the second in early May in Dr. Phillips at 7705 Turkey Lake Road.

In 2006, Moso left his home country of Laos at age 16 and moved to the Orlando area. His mother owned two restaurants, Bangkok Square and Origami Sushi, near UCF at the time, and it was at those restaurants where he started his career. Like his mother, he started as a dishwasher and worked his way up the ranks. A hard worker from the start, Moso eventually saved up enough from washing dishes to buy his own car.

"I started as a dishwasher like her, and I was enjoying it - to be honest — to be able to earn a paycheck and be able to save up money and buy whatever I want to buy," Moso said. "I remember I saved up \$10,000, because I wanted a (Nissan) 350Z at that time. I bought a brand-new 350Z (with) my own money."

Moso said although he had to balance going to school and working almost full time, he always enjoyed doing it. When he opened his own restaurant at age 22, he combined the culinary experience he gained from working at his mom's restaurants with something else he loved: Japanese culture and cuisine.

Kabooki features locally sourced, seasonal ingredients combined with some of the best seafood imported from Japan. Moso said his culinary creations stray far away from some of the typical, sauce-covered sushi rolls one may find at other Japanese restaurants.

"Ifeellike sushi is all about experience," Moso said. "That (experience) is what we aim for. ... I want the rice to be warm, the fish to be

not too cold – people think the fish has to be cold, but that's not true. The fish has to be a perfect room temperature in order to taste the perfect amount of texture, oil, flavor of the fish (and) things like that. My goal is to deliver the best experience, whether it's on the countertop or the table."

Moso said Kabooki in east Orlando attracts customers from all over Orange County. Although the restaurant is far from all the tourist hotspots, it's not uncommon for tourists to visit his restaurant. Because of that demand. Moso decided to open his second location for Kabooki in Dr. Phillips to be closer to the tourists and West Orange sushi aficionados.

"I feel like there's a lot of opportunity out here (in Dr. Phillips)," Moso said. "A majority of our customers are from Windermere or Sand Lake. Sometimes, it surprises me by how much business I miss. ... We only have a 44-seat restaurant (in east Orlando) that's serving 100 to 150 (customers) from 5 to 10 p.m."

Opening a second Kabooki Sushi location is a testament to the passion and dedication that Moso has for his craft. It's commonly known running a restaurant yields a low profit margin, but the success of Moso's first restaurant has afforded him the opportunity to open his second on his own dime.

"When I first opened, it was so hard," Moso said. "I started on a shoestring budget. I didn't have a lot of support as far as financially. ... This (second) restaurant, everything that you see inside it is all me. There's no investor. There's no bank loan. Everything is from my own money."



# **Rising star**

he moment he hit the stage at Country Thunder – to the tune of hundreds of cheers - Noah Schnacky's signature smile lit up his face.

It was the first time the Windermere-area native had been invited to play the main stage at the annual country-music festival in Kissimmee, and he was both thrilled and right at home on stage.

#### FINDING HIS CALLING

Schnacky, 22, has been in the entertainment industry since childhood. Following in the footsteps of father Lance - a singer/ songwriter/musician and actor he spent many years working in all different facets of entertainment. In the last few years, though, Schnacky found his voice in his passion for music.

"Ever since I was little, I've been in the entertainment industry, and my dad was involved in the country music scene when he was younger," he said. "I grew up going back and forth ever since I was 12, recording things in Music Row and falling in love with country as a genre. My parents were really good to me and tried me in all different facets of entertainment. We tried theater, some Broadway stuff and some TV stuff, but I never really connected with anything like I did

Schnacky always knew he loved the idea of putting on a performance but didn't understand why he loved it so much until he realized music was his calling. He studied under vocal coach Mark Goff, who has assisted with the careers of The Backstreet Boys, N\*SYNC, Britney Spears and Creed, among others. His first original single, "Miami to L.A.," was released in

He attended Sunset Park Elementary and Bridgewater Middle before switching to Florida Virtual School for high school to accommodate his travels to Los Angeles for work opportunities. After high school, he came to a crossroads: He could go to college or start pursuing music right away.

"College is something that will be there regardless (of time), and I wanted to at least give music a shot," he said. "I decided to pursue music and my dad said, 'If you're gonna do music, we're not going to just put it out and hope for the best. We're doing it right."

Thanks to advice from a member of Taylor Swift's team — "If you want a million fans, go and shake a million hands," Schnacky said he capitalized on social media, collaborating and networking.

"When I was 17 and 18, I would spend a good amount of time on social media trying to gain fans by being in their lives," he said. "I was responding to hundreds and thousands of DMs for hours on hours on every single night. It's not very sexy, but I believe in that in reminding them how much they mean to me."

#### **BREAKING THE MOLD**

It wasn't until Noah's 21st birthday Jan. 27, 2018, that he and his team decided to release his debut single, "Hello Beautiful." In just six months, "Hello Beautiful" had more than 15 million streams on Spotify.

"We released it, and the fans absolutely blew us away," he said. "We released the song, and in eight days, it had a million streams on Spotify alone, completely organic. We quickly got playlisted by Spotify and by Apple Music."

Since "Hello Beautiful," Schnacky also has released his second single, "Maybe We Will." He released them separately to bring attention to the two songs he believed in most.

"We wanted to shake things up, and that's what we did with the first song," he said. "What we found after the first song was released was that we were getting calls and taking meetings, but we felt that at that moment, they still didn't believe ... the power that was behind what we'd built.

"When we released 'Maybe We Will,' it had a super similar story," he said. "It was starting to get a lot of recognition and was quickly picked up on The Highway Playlist on Sirius XM. After that was when we really could go to these meetings and say, 'This is who were are and what we represent; and that it was working. Now a year later, we're about at 50 million streams between the two songs."

And despite the success he

has enjoyed thus far, Schnacky believes he's just getting warmed up. After being in the studio writing and recording for the last year, he has at least seven songs waiting to be released. Although his current two singles were released independently, he recently signed with Big Machine Records - and his label mates include Thomas Rhett and Danielle Bradbery.

He also is gaining both national and international recognition in the world of country music. Schnacky made his Nashville liveperformance debut at the 2018 CMAFest, performing at both Blake Shelton's "Ole Red" and on the Radio Disney Country Stage. Just a few weeks ago, he performed at C2C: Country to Country on the BBC Radio 2 Stage, introducing himself to country-music lovers in the United Kingdom. From there, he performed at CMC Rocks in Queensland, Australia, among fellow country stars such as Luke Combs, Florida Georgia Line,

be sensitive to sudden or loud noises. Others are hypersensitive in that seeing, hearing or feeling something makes them feel uncomfortable.

Recently, the management team at Cinépolis Luxury Cinemas Hamlin took notice and inspired the company's new program, Sensory-Friendly Screenings.

"It was with (the team's) initiation and support that we were able to pilot and test the program at the Winter Garden location," said Ryan Clawson, general manager of Cinépolis Luxury Cinemas Hamlin. "The team collectively saw the difficulty parents face when seeing a movie or going out to dinner and took the opportunity to help the community."

According to Cinépolis, the Hamlin location was chosen as the pilot because of Clawson and his team's passion and support of the initiative.

A sensory-friendly screening consists of free space to roam about within the auditorium and a positive atmosphere to be expressive. The lights are dimmed but not fully off, the volume is set to a lower decibel and no trailers are shown. Additionally, moviegoers get to enjoy their film from the comfort of Cinépolis' reclining

And although individuals with autism may commonly deal with sensitivity issues, Clawson said his theater's sensory-friendly screenings are not limited to just that audience.

"The screenings are not specifically targeted at one group," Clawson said. "They are for the purpose of inclusion. Anyone who wants to see a screening in a more welcoming and sensory-friendly environment is encouraged to attend."

Cinépolis joins AMC Theatres in offering sensory-friendly screenings for those with special needs. AMC teamed up with the Autism

# AdventHealth breaks ground on Winter Garden hospital

The 100-bed pavilion will be the only inpatient hospital in the city when it opens.

About two years down the road, Winter Garden residents needing inpatient health care won't have to leave the city limits to access it.

AdventHealth broke ground Thursday, March 14, on the newest phase of its medical complex across from Winter Garden Village at Fowler Groves. When AdventHealth Winter Garden's new, 100-bed inpatient pavilion opens, it also will be the city's only inpatient hospital.

"Winter Garden is a very fastgrowing community, and we have a very bright future," said Winter Garden Mayor John Rees. "The presence of AdventHealth is an important part of that future. ... For the first time in a long time, when this hospital opens, residents of Winter Garden will be able to access an extensive range of services without leaving our city."

The seven-story, 300,000square-foot building complements the existing 24-bed emergency room and medical office building also on site.

"This is an exciting day - it's

exciting for AdventHealth and it's very exciting for Winter Garden," said AdventHealth Winter Garden CEO Carl Dupper. "At AdventHealth our goal is to bring wholeness to the communities we serve. We do this by providing considerate, loving, compassionate care to you and your family care that's also close to home. We're extremely proud of the work we've done in Winter Garden to provide this type of care to all of West Orange County."

create about 700 jobs, with an average annual wage of more than \$60,000. Winter Garden District 4 Commissioner Colin Sharman said the economic impact from the first phase of AHWG was 200 employees and the opening of the medical-office building has since added onto that.

The AHWG emergency department staff has seen tens of thousands of patients since the facility's opening in 2016, according to AdventHealth, and by the end of 2019 it is projected to have treated more than 100,000 patients total.

"The construction of the (newest) expansion is going to bring even more jobs, and the permanent facility will have more permanent employees, making a big impact on the community and our

economic situation here in Winter Garden," Sharman said.

AdventHealth staff also is looking forward to another important aspect of the impact its services will have on the community bringing health care closer to home. Staff said that when residents have health care that is close to home, it is more convenient for both patients and families.

"We take care of patients every day that need services that are outside of our emergency department and beyond what we can provide," Dr. Miles Bennett, medical director of the emergency department. "Until now those patients unfortunately had to be transferred to another facility. Once this inpatient pavilion opens, we'll be able to treat those patients close to

home rather than having to transfer out of our community."

Overall, Dupper said, he and his staff are looking forward to better serving the health care needs for residents of both Winter Garden and West Orange County.

"When patients come to our emergency department, we want them to be able to get their full care in Winter Garden and not have to go to Orlando or another center of care," Dupper said. "This is where you live, work, play, eat, sleep, and this is where you should also get your health care. We're excited to join you in your health care journey and we're going to serve you well in the years to come."







a very athletic person — I don't like to just sit around, I like to move — and the weight room is one of those places where I can do that. Not only do I lift weights in here, but I also box with Coach Kurtz, and I also run with him."

Huizenga enjoyed some beach time to start her break, but the future University of Tennessee swimmer came back to campus Wednesday, March 20, to spend the next few days getting her workouts in — both in the weight room and in the pool.

Although it may not seem like it, this workout for Huizenga is actually a walk in the park when you consider her usual workout routine during a school day. It's a routine she has built since she first started swimming in sixth grade.

"On Monday, I'm up at four o'clock in the morning for swim practice — which starts at 4:45 a.m. — and I'll swim until 6:30 a.m.," Huizenga said. "I'll go to school until one-ish, and then I'll come and lift here for an hour for class and I'll also come lift during the day — during my study hall. Then on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, I'll run, and Tuesday and Thursday, I'll box."

As Huizenga worked on some stretches toward the back of the weight room, junior Jonah Best powered through some weight work, as "California Love" by Tupac and Dr. Dre pumps in the background.

The junior is an offensive lineman on the football team and a member of the weightlifting and lacrosse teams.

"It's just to better prepare myself for the future," Best said. "We have a big football season coming up, and I got to get all the work in that I can. Spring football starts in the middle of April, and then actual football starts at the end of summer."

Of course, there's the inherent drive to get bigger and stronger, but Best said a television monitor sitting high above him provides motivation, as well. That monitor, in its glowing glory, shows a list of numbers and names — it's the official keeper of records and accomplishments that happen in the weight room.

"I just kind of want to get my name all over that record board," Best said with a grin. "Because I know a lot of kids that have graduated who are still on there, and so every day, I text them, and I'm like, 'I'm getting close, I'm going to take your name off that thing.' That's my goal, because they can't come back and do anything about it."

As the athletes work through their routines, Kurtz, the school's strength and conditioning coach, keeps a watchful eye. If an athlete has a question or needs tips on bettering their technique, Kurtz is there to offer an answer and inspiration.

His presence is a welcome one, and he said there is not a thing he would rather be doing than helping these young athletes. "I just started in June, and I've been extremely pleased with the buy-in that we've gotten immediately," he said." It's a testament to these kids. When people have asked me how it's been going, it's gone better than expected. Now my challenge is to keep them continually being motivated throughout the whole year, throughout the summer, because strength training and working out is a grind."

While Best works with the heavy weights, Zavien Williams is in and out of the weight room as he works with a mixture of weights and running drills.

Although he is a member of the Lakers basketball team, Williams is currently in track season, which changes his workout a little bit.

In the weight room, Williams works a bit on upper-body strengthening, while during track practice, it's a lot of endurance and leg work as he and the Lakers prepare for the upcoming district meet.

At the moment, the track team has gone through a little bit of a lull, as track season is a grueling one — right now, it's a lot of rehabbing, Williams said. Despite the hardships, however, there Williams is in the weight room — pushing himself to get better.

"There is a saying in my house if we're just sitting there, 'What are you doing to get better?'" Williams said. "Because you can always get 1% better every day."

it's the fitness and community aspects offered by GYMGUYZ.

In Eddie's case, fitness is second nature. He spent 11 years playing in the MLB for the Cleveland Indians, Houston Astros and Cincinnati Reds. Throughout those years, he spent many hours training and working out.

"Ever since I got drafted at 17 years old, and now I'm 50, I've been exercising that whole time, and obviously fitness was a part of my job," Eddie said. "I'm also on the other side of fitness — I've had about 13 surgeries on my body, so I understand the importance of fitness when you get older."

Just as the fitness aspect played a vital role in getting Eddie into the franchise, Jay also has that same passion — though his comes from a serious health issue. At age 50, Jay was diag-

nosed him with prostate cancer.

"It was a total surprise to me there was no reason why I would be at any risk for it, but I got it," Jay said. "And so I had to decide to make some lifestyle changes—to eat better and to really take fitness more seriously.

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


