One dead, 2 seriously hurt in Saturday crash

STAFF REPORT

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SEBRING — One person was killed and two were seriously injured after a three-vehicle crash on the intersection of U.S. 27 and Bayview Street at 1:50 p.m. Saturday, authorities

Vicki Griffith, 58, of Breese, Illinois, who was a passenger in one of the vehicles, a Chevrolet Venture, was killed, Florida Highway Patrol said. The driver, Arrin Griffith, 23,

also of Breese, Illinois, and a second passenger, Gertrude Eck, 81, of Sebring, were both taken to Lakeland Regional Hospital in serious condition, FHP said.

The Chevrolet Venture was southbound on U.S. 27 in the left turn lane approaching the intersection of Bayview Street.

A second vehicle, a Jeep Cherokee, was going north on U.S. 27 in the center lane and was approaching the same intersection. The driver of

the Venture moved into the intersection to make a left turn onto Bayview Street and came in the direct path of the Jeep, FHP said.

The driver of the Jeep tried to steer to the right to avoid a collision. The front of the Jeep then collided with the right side of the Venture, authorities added. The driver of the Jeep Cherokee, Fredrick Lodsin, Bokeelia, was taken to Florida

Sebring retired general helped plan mission showcased in movie

SEBRING — The first time you meet Sebring's retired Maj. Gen. Geoffrey Lambert you get the impression that he must have been an accountant, working a desk job.

The quiet, unassuming man actually was the head of the U.S. Special Forces and the Green Berets composed of 9,500 men serving secretly throughout the world in the early 2000s.

When you read the book "Horse Soldiers" or attend the movie "12 Strong," now playing at the Lakeshore Mall theater, you get a different

The reason? The book and movie tell the story of 12 heroes who freed the fourth largest Afghan city of Mazar-i-Sharif of the Taliban. And they did it on horseback. Lambert played a significant role in planning the mission in response to the 9/11 World Trade Center attack.

"12 Strong" is a fascinating story of how a small force of U.S. Army Special Forces traveled to Afghanistan and forged a partnership with the Northern Alliance, resulting in the liberation of the city. A statue of a soldier on horseback stands at Ground Zero as a memorial of the liberation.

Lambert and his compatriots had to decide whether an unconventional warfare was feasible in expelling the Taliban from Afghan. It was decided that the Marines and regular Army could not get there fast enough nor had the background to complete such a mission.

Lambert had served both as an Army Ranger and in Special Forces. He knew the difference in their approaches to warfare. Rangers are taught the art of attack with no questions asked, whereas Special Forces are experts in unconventional warfare. Special Forces units know everything about an area and the people where their groups were assigned. The Fifth Special Forces Group, Fort

Campbell under the command of Col. John

Mulholland were trained to relate to existing Afghan warlord generals like Gen. Abdul Rashid

Lambert said, "The Special Forces knew the culture and the habits of the people." He humorously added, "even how to talk to Afghan

Lambert abroad. also played a role in the movie becoming reality. Ten years ago he - along with Doug Stanton, author of the "Horse Soldiers," and Lambert's daughter Candice,

who is a stylist to many Hollywood stars — met with producer Jerry Bruckheimer as champions, trying to sell him on the idea to produce a movie of the mission. Bruckheimer's staff had mixed feelings.

"I never heard back and figured nothing would ever happen. What a surprise, because here in 2018 the movie '12 Strong' produced by Bruckheimer is in theaters nationally," Lambert

When asked if the movie tells a realistic story, Lambert said, "80 percent. But the fight of the horse soldiers against tanks was a bit overdone and the copters in the actual war were flying in pitch darkness."

Two small vignettes in the movie are meaningful too. When Special Forces went to Afghanistan one man carried a small piece of the World Trade Center in his pocket, and when they accomplished their mission the small relic was buried in the Afghan soil. Those attending

Constitution panel could look for clemency fix

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Constitution Revision Commission may wade into the state's process for restoring voting rights of ex-felons, after a federal judge ruled the current clemency process is unconstitutional.

Members of the commission's Ethics and Elections

Committee unanimously agreed Friday to explore ways to consider the issue, either through additional committee meetings or by amending a proposal when the full commission meets in March.

On Thursday, U.S. District Judge Mark Walker found the current process — in which ex-felons must wait years to have their clemency cases

considered and only a small number are successful in getting rights restored — to be arbitrary and unconstitutional. He also asked the state and lawyers who challenged the system to file plans to resolve the problem by Feb. 12.

"I don't know if there is anything we can do, should do, where we would go from here, et cetera," said Commissioner

Hank Coxe, a Jacksonville lawyer who heads the commission's Ethics and Elections Committee. "But we're here, it just happened and so we have it."

Commissioner Sherry Plymale of Palm City said she and other members of the committee have an understanding of the problems in the current system, after they participated in an in-depth

review of the clemency process. "We were unhappy particu-

larly with the number of people that are in the queue, which was thousands," Plymale said. "I felt all along that we needed to find an opportunity to work

Volunteer played key role in saving dogs

SEBRING - When employees at the Highlands County Humane Society arrived at the shelter more than two weeks ago, they saw three Chihuahuas running outside the grounds and two dead from being run over by vehicles.

Apparently, someone had dumped all five dogs in hopes that the Humane Society would take in the canines. As was discovered later, "they all knew each other," said Judy Spiegel, president of the Humane Society.

"It was a very sad situation," Spiegel said.

The three Chihuahuas were running in the vicinity of the Humane Society.

"But they would not let us get to them," Spiegel

apparent the other two could only be trapped, she said.

It took days for that to happen, but Humane Society volunteer Andrew Parnassa refused to give

up, Spiegel said.

Every day, traps would be set. But those traps would have to be monitored regularly because other animals, such as stray cats, opossums, and raccoons, would get in.

Parnassa would check the traps several times each night and release any animals so the traps would be open for the dogs, Spiegel said.

Over a period of several days, the two remaining dogs were trapped, Spiegel said.

The two female Chihuahuas knew each other and became inseparable, she said. One would cry if the other one wasn't available.

One family adopted both females and another

family took in the male, Spiegel said.

As for Parnassa, Spiegel said, he goes above and beyond whatever they would expect from a volunteer.

"He volunteers every day of the week from four to six hours," Spiegel said.



The day Babe Ruth played in Avon Park

The stands at Charles R. Head Field were overflowing, and the air was filled with electricity that only Babe Ruth could command.

People had traveled over winding, bumpy dirt roads that bright spring day in 1928 to get their once-in-alifetime look at "the Babe."

There had been major league baseball teams playing in Avon Park before that time, but no game or superstar drew nearly as much attention as the mighty Babe Ruth did the day he came to town.

Whether they had to travel by horse and buggy, Model T or on foot, few were going to be deprived of the opportunity to see Ruth at the height of his career. The New York Yankees'

homerun king was in Avon Park for an exhibition game with the Saint Louis Cardinals, who trained in

Avon Park for two years. "I had never seen the

main stadium more than two-thirds full before, even though we had some big stars here," recalled retiree George Haynie."They came from Wauchula, Arcadia, Sebring and all over. There were more people there than the entire population of Avon Park."

The big stars who played in Avon Park included Dizzy Dean, Grover C.

Alexander, Pepper Martin and Frank Frisch.

"It was really something to see Babe Ruth play," he

The excitement of the crowd was boosted by the fact that the previous season he came to Avon Park Babe Ruth set a major league record by hitting 60 home runs. That record stood for more than three decades.

The fans who came to see Ruth were not deprived of seeing first hand the ballplayer's awesome power. Ruth hit a triple to deep center field and in his last turn at bat he sent the ball sailing over the left field fence.

Ruth's efforts were in vain. The Yankees lost the game to the Cardinals.

But the Yankees were later to avenge the springtime loss. In the World Series in the fall of '28, the Bronx Bombers swept the

Help fill the gap

Last week, a young person stood up to take part in local government. The child, a first-grader from Avon Elementary School, joined her mother, a teacher, in expressing their hope that the city of Avon Park and the Heartland Cultural Alliance can reach an agreement regarding the city's Community Center.

The city and the HCA came close, but not close enough ... yet.

HCA representative Ted Puckorius asked the city for a deal better than the \$380 a month, with stringent conditions involving a security system and not allowing classes on the weekend. After all, he pointe out, the HCA was only wanting to a space on the first floor of the center for acrylic art classes for elementary students.

Instead of a monthly rate, the HCA would like a daily rate.

Puckorius said the HCA wants only to use the room two days a week, and maybe not every week.

Avon Elementary teacher Dena Sboto told council members there is a strong need for an art program. Students who struggle in reading and math can find something to excel at in art.

Her daughter told council members how she likes to draw, color and paint. She threw in the fact that her little sister is a good artist too.

It's great that Sboto brought her daughter to the council meeting, not just to address the members about her love of art, but to also observe government in action. It's a lesson that every child should be exposed to and take part

We can understand why the HCA would balk at the monthly rate instead of being offered a daily rate.

Furthermore, we agree with Puckorius that the city should be the one to pay for the building's security system. It is, after all, a city-owned building

The city has had a great working relationship with the HCA, offering the group the second floor of the Community Center for its Peter Powell Roberts Museum. Open for limited hours, the museum is a beautiful facility showcasing the work of Roberts, a master artist with an unbelievable story to be shared.

The facility also houses beautiful pieces of petrified wood, a bookshelf filled with work from local authors, and a number of other art pieces from local artists that are available for sale.

We feel certain that the two groups will be able to reach a compromise, despite what appears to be hesitancy from at least two council members. Deputy Mayor Brenda Gray suggested instead of seeking space at the Community Center, the HCA should check with the School Board of Highlands County to see if it could provide space. Councilman Terry Heston threw into the mix that whatever is agreed would have to be done for other groups should they make the same request.

We understand the city wanting to restrict activities from taking place on the weekend, when the city most frequently rents the center for about \$300 a day. If the building isn't being used any of the other days, a little bit of money is better than letting it sit empty with no money

City Manager Julian Deleon feels an agreement can be worked out. We like that kind of attitude when it comes to the city working with non-profit corporation dedicated to promoting art and culture in the county, regardless of which group it is.

The Heartland Cultural Alliance is trying to fill the gap left when arts was pulled out of elementary school programs.

Coming up with a compromise will help the HCA do that, and both groups would be helping young children like Sboto's little girl.

Hospital Heartland with minor injuries, FHP said.

The force of the impact caused the Venture to rotate clockwise in a northeasterly direction and overturn. It then collided with the front of a Chevrolet Avalon, which was stopped westbound on Bayview Street in the straight/ right turn lane for a red traffic light at the intersection, FHP said.

The Venture came to final rest on its left side facing in a southwesterly direction. The Avalon came to final rest facing west on Bayview Street in the straight/right turn lane. The driver of the Avalon, Rosemarie Tippin-Beringer, 79, Sebring was not injured, authorities said.

After the collision, the Jeep rotated clockwise and traveled in a northerly direction, coming to a final rest in the northbound right turn lane of U.S. 27.

The impact caved in the passenger side of the Venture and sent it

tumbling, according to a marker for Travis Alan witness. It landed on its driver's side.

West Sebring volunteer firefighters were able to extract the rear seat passenger of the Venture through the back hatch, but had to cut off the roof to reach the front occupants.

When deputies secured the scene with yellow tape, it wound around a lamppost adjacent to a Florida Department of Transportation memorial

Freer. The 18-year-old Sebring man died June 30, 2007, at that same intersection, on the same side of the road. The marker, in bold letters, advised motorists to "Drive Carefully" in his memory.

The driver of the Venture was cited with failure to yield right of way making a left turn, FHP said.

which ex-felons are seeking to have civil rights restored, including the right to vote, according to commission analysts.

In Walker's order, the federal judge noted that 154,000 Floridians had their rights restored under former Gov. Charlie Crist, who set up a process in which cases could be reviewed by the state parole commission.

But Gov. Rick Scott changed that policy after he took office in 2011, leaving the rights-restoration decisions up to him and the three members of the state Cabinet, although the governor has sole power to reject any application.

Since that time, only 3,000 applications have been granted, with Walker noting the process has resulted in nearly 1.7 million Floridians being denied the right to vote, including more than one out

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of every five voting-age African-American residents.

"I do think we owe it to an awful lot of people in Florida to have this process work a lot better than it does," Plymale said. "Even if they don't want to restore rights, OK. But they're not even getting a hearing, which is really not fair.

Former Senate President Don Gaetz, a Niceville Republican who is a member of the ethics and election panel, expressed regret that lawmakers did not address the issue during his 10 years in the Legislature.

"We didn't do what perhaps we could or should have done if we had known then what we know now," Gaetz said. "It's obvious that the clemency process in our state is not only broken but it's scandalously broken."

The commission considered several proposals aimed at automatically restoring voting rights for ex-felons. But those proposals

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were withdrawn when the political committee Floridians for a Fair Democracy obtained enough petition signatures to place an initiative, known as Amendment 4, on the fall ballot. That amendment would automatically restore voting rights to felons who have served their sentences, excluding those convicted for murder or sexual offenses.

As commissioners debated the ex-felon proposals, several members raised the possibility of "ballot confusion" if the commission placed a measure on the 2018 general election ballot in addition to Amendment 4.

Coxe, the chairman of the ethics and elections panel, said if the commission now takes up a proposal, he expects it to be focused on the clemency process rather than on the automatic restoration of voting rights.

"I'm not concerned about ballot confusion if one deals with clemency and it clearly does," Coxe





the Special Forces and they safely brought him home for trial. He was eventually sent to prison. Another significant and dangerous part of the mission was how the soldiers were ambushed by the Taliban and surrendered as prisoners. "Horse Soldiers" gives an entire chapter to that encounter.

Lambert's military and current life reflects the motto of the Special Forces since 1952 — "De Oppresso Liber" translated from the Latin, "Free the Oppressed."

The general began his career as an enlisted private working his way to become a sergeant. When he left the service he could not get his heart out of being a solider and 19 months later — after attending college on the GI Bill — he came back as a second-lieutenant and became a hard-charging ranger in the jungles of South America.

Later he found the assignment as a Special Forces commander much finer as they fought guerrilla wars requiring the men under his command to be both soldiers and diplomats. He retired as a two-star general with

tremendous pride in the military.

Lambert especially mentioned two former officers whose military lives were predominately portrayed in the movie. "I met John Mulholland when he was a second lieutenant. I realized in 1979 that he was special. I could delegate an entire fight to him and he was an expert in the Middle East. He could always figure out what the hell to do," he

said. Mulholland eventually became the assistant director of the CIA as a three-star general.

The other was Mark Nutsch. For years, and in the movie, he was known as team leader Capt. Mitch Nelson. "I am so proud of him and his heroism. One time I took him and his entire family to the Kansas

Legislature where he spoke to the representatives and senate about his military career," Lambert said.

"The Special Forces-Green Berets were created in 1952. In 1962 President Kennedy awarded them the Green Beret head gear. JFK was so proud of them," Lambert said. "They were the one's carrying his casket to Arlington Cemetery and there is a Green Beret display in his presidential library.'

Lambert also mentioned two other well-known Americans whose love of and work for the military is hardly known. Actress Bo Derek has come to Fort Bragg very often and spends hours with the troops. The other is past presidential candidate Ross Perot. "He has given untold encouragement as well as sums of money to

aid the soldiers and their families in many, many ways, all without fanfare," Lambert said.

The two-star general proudly said of the Fifth Special Forces Group: "My Green Berets were launched deep into enemy territory to befriend, recruit, advise, and then lead their Afghan counterparts to attack the Taliban. The horse soldiers succeeded brilliantly with a highly decentralized campaign, reinforced with modern airpower's precision weapons, forcing the Taliban government's collapse in a few months."

The film is based on "Horse Soldiers," written by Doug Stanton, New York Times best-selling author and Pulitzer Prize winner for another book, "In Harm's Way."

Lambert is quoted often in the book. He and Stanton became good

In the afterword to the hardcover edition of the book, Lambert says that Stanton received more access to the Special Forces community than any author writing about this post 9/11 conflict.

Stanton had a unique style," Lambert said. "He would research his story characters in tremendous depth. He would go live with them, study them

and their families, get to know their strengths and quirks. He'd go fishing with them and try to delve into the depth of their being prior to ever beginning his writing.'

Lambert, now retired, and his wife, Bonnie, now reside in Sebring and are active, enjoying golf and tennis as well as staying close to two of their four children who reside in Tampa.

Their lives are rather laid back now compared to his years as a high ranking expert in unconventional warfare and Bonnie's as a

general's wife. He retired from the military in 2004 and worked in the private sector for a bit.

Lambert has many memories of his career as a soldier. He also has one memento at his home from the battle to free Mazar-i-Sharif. It is a saddle from a horse ridden by one of the 12 horsemen.

When asked, "Why do you now live here in Sebring?"

"This is the place we love. It's a place that exemplifies basic American values," he said.




Coaching wrestling in his first season, Lake Placid's Jason Holden noted that he is filling in since the coach from last year is overseas this year.

"I fished Lake Hatchineha, caught a few decent ones early and then the bite just quit on me. I ran into Toho at noon and ended up catching three quality fish."

With the Kissimmee Chain unsettled by fluctuating temperatures before the tournament, plus a cold front arriving the afternoon on Friday, Lane mostly targeted hydrilla in 2 to 4 feet. The dense habitat allowed fish to move in and out with changing weather, while

remaining in the same general area.

Report shows flu season continues to intensify

NEW YORK — It looks like Groundhog Day for the nation's flu report, too: It's gotten worse and there are weeks of suffering ahead.

The government's report out Friday showed the flu season continued to intensify last week.

One of every 14 visits to doctors and clinics were for fever, cough and other symptoms of the flu. That's the highest level since the swine flu pandemic in 2009. Last week, 42 states reported high patient traffic for the flu, up from 39.

Hospital stays because of the flu also increased.

Experts had thought this season might be bad, but its intensity has surprised most everyone.

"It's been the busiest I can remember for a long time," said Dr. Doug Olson, an ER doctor at Northside Hospital Forsyth, in Cumming, Georgia. Another hospital in the Atlanta area this week set up a mobile ER outside to handle flu cases.

Not just another flu season

widespread since the 2009 influenza A(H1/N1) pandemic. "This year's

influenza season in the U.S. has been dominated by the H3N2 virus. This is a

highly-virulent organism that is causing fatalities throughout the country," Dr. Jorge Gonzalez, chief medical officer at Florida Hospital Heartland Medical Center, said. "This season, Influenza A is stressing capacity in emergency departments, hospitals, urgent care facilities, and physicians'

"Most deaths have been attributed to complications from the virus such as pneumonia and respiratory failure," Gonzalez said.

Influenza is a contagious

The heavy flu season has also put a strain in places on some medical supplies, including IV bags, and flu medicine.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention tally shows hospitalization rates surged to surpass the nasty season of the winter of 2014-2015, when the vaccine was a poor match to the main

So far, however, deaths this season from the flu and flu-related pneumonia have lagged a little behind some recent bad seasons. There are as many as 56,000 deaths connected to the flu during a bad year.

The flu usually peaks in February. This season had an early start, and health officials initially thought it would also have an early peak. But so far it hasn't worked out that way.

And there are some signs the flu season will continue to get worse. The CDC's forecast though wasn't quite as precise as Punxsutawney Phil's; the groundhog "predicted" six more weeks of winter on Friday.

As for the flu: "There may be many weeks left for this season," said the CDC's Dr. Dan Jernigan.

Some good news: Illnesses seem to be easing a bit on the West Coast. Oregon joined Hawaii last week as the only states where flu wasn't widespread. Friday's report covers the week ending Jan. 27.

In the U.S., annual flu shots are recommended for everyone age 6 months or older. This season's vaccine targets the strains that are making Americans sick, including the key H3N2 virus. How

respiratory illness caused by flu viruses. It can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death. The best way to prevent the flu is to get a flu vaccine each fall. Another way to avoid the flu is to make proper handwashing a habit. Avoid touching your face with your hands, and clean surfaces

with disinfectant frequently. While there is no guarantee

that you won't get the flu, your chances drop significantly if you take these precautions.

6 natural remedies for varicose veins

Sometimes it seems like varicose veins come out of nowhere when you're least expecting it. Most people over the age of 60 have some degree, and usually they're not a big deal. But they could be, it depends on the general health of your pipes. When I say "pipes" I mean your veins, they are the pipes that push blood throughout your

It is estimated that more than 40 million Americans have varicose veins. They mostly impact the legs and feet. It's different from spider veins, which are not nearly as noticeable unless you have "Drinker's Nose," which causes spider veins to appear on the nose. People are sometimes worried that they'll be exposed as a heavy drinker or smoker because of these.

Varicose veins can become serious and cause pain, throbbing, swelling, and increased risk of blood clots. If these angry swollen veins occur in the region of your anus, it's called a hemorrhoid.

Unfortunately, your risk to developing problematic veins increases as you age. If your mom or dad has them, chances are you'll get them too. I'm going to quickly share six ways to help with varicose veins right now. But if you have a serious condition, I urge you to read my longer article (3,400 words) that offers more treatment options. You can get that by signing up for my free newsletter at suzycohen. com and I'll email it to you.

1. Weight

You can take some pressure off your legs by losing weight. The less pressure, the less puffy, twisted and distended your veins are. You see, your veins are weak, and the burden of having 50 to 100 pounds adds pressure to your veins, and making the blood pool.

2. Weird shower

You will love me, then hate me. When you are taking a shower, alternate between comfortably hot water, then colder water. You can do this to your legs only if you want to versus your whole body, and try each temperature for 10 or 20 seconds each. You should probably ask your doctor about this first. It helps your veins 'practice' the process of constriction and dilation.

3. Collagen

Collagen makes you elastic, so think of collagen allowing for healthy firm skin and a tight neck. Without enough collagen, your blood vessels and skin begin sagging.

4. Water

Make sure you are hydrated throughout the day. Did you know that coffee dehydrates you? It makes you more prone to leg cramps through the 'drug mugger' effect of magnesium and other minerals. Energy drinks rob the same vein-loving minerals.

Two are better than one

During a "morning coffee hour" talk at Whisper Lake, I was asked if I had ever written about "Why you should wear two hearing aids instead of just one?

We have two legs, two feet, two arms, two eyes and two ears. If we break an arm, we realize how difficult it is to do little things like putting in our contacts. If we pull a hamstring or twist an ankle, we move slower and more deliberate to diminish the pain.

Our hearing is also much sharper with both ears. Each ear helps us to have a balanced, full-bodied sound experience. Usually, when you get a hearing loss it is with both ears. Hopefully, your whole life you have had the benefit of normal hearing on both sides of your head. The sounds that went into each ear stimulated both sides of your brain.

When someone gets a hearing loss, all the natural attributes of the human auditory system diminish.

Not only are basic sounds softer to you, they may not be identifiable. When correcting your hearing loss, it is important to correct both ears.

The shape of our ears and placement on our head allows for 180-degree sensitivity. By wearing a hearing aid in each ear, you get the best directionality of sound. You can tell when a car is coming up from behind you on your right hand side while riding a bike.

Sounds and auditory input that goes in the left ear gets processed by the right hemisphere and vice-versa. It takes the entire brain to process all the letters and sounds of the alphabet.

For instance, the difference between "chew" and "shoe" sounds are processed differently by the brain. By providing the brain with all of the consonants and vowels, the brain has the best ability to separate speech from noise.

Hearing aids in each ear or binaural hearing enable you to stimulate both ears, while wearing only one hearing aid can allow the other aid to deteriorate further from lack of use. This is called the auditory deprivation effect. Hearing with both ears does not take as much effort as with just

one hearing aid.
Our ears help to provide us with our balance. Imagine walking and not being able to hear your left foot step on some gravel but your right one you can hear? It puts your brain off balance. You have to look down to observe the difference ... you may lose your balance.

You feel "off-balance." Wearing hearing aids on both sides is very important to understand people in group settings.

If you only wear a hearing aid on your right side but have people on both sides, when someone talks on your left side, the sound has to jump over your head to get to the hearing aid. At this point you loose volume about 15-20

decibels, almost a third of the volume in which the person is speaking.

It's really mathematical. If you increase the speech signal with a hearing aid to only one ear, but you have a hearing loss on both sides, when you

get into a noisy environment you will have two noise signals to only one speech signal. Thus the noise wins and you can't understand.

You only have one life. Wearing two hearing aids entire brain provides you the best chance of getting "back to normal" as possible.

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
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

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


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Understanding, treating long QT syndrome

DEAR MAYO CLINIC: I recently read that long QT syndrome is quite common. What is it, and how is it diagnosed? I have read that fainting may be one sign of the disorder. Can long QT syndrome be treated?

ANSWER: Long QT syndrome is a heart rhythm disorder that is diagnosed due to symptoms, an abnormal 12-lead electrocardiogram (ECG), or as a result of a family history of the disease. Once it's diagnosed, long QT syndrome often can be treated effectively.

Your heart circulates blood throughout your body each time it beats. The chambers of your heart contract and relax to pump the blood. These actions are controlled by electrical impulses that travel through your heart. After each heartbeat, your heart's electrical system recharges itself in preparation for the next heartbeat.

In long QT syndrome, the heart muscle takes longer than normal to

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MAYO CLINIC NEWS NETWORK electrically recharge after it not know it. In addition, contracts. An ECG or EKG can detect this problem. Most people don't have routine ECGs, though, so catching it with this test if you haven't had any symptoms, or if you don't have a family history of the

disorder, is less common. Congenital or inherited long QT syndrome affects about 1 in 2,000 people. That statistic, however, is likely an underestimate, because people can have the disorder for years and

some unexplained deaths, such as those by drowning or unexplained vehicle accidents, may be the result of sudden cardiac arrest triggered by long QT syndrome.

One of the most frequent symptoms is fainting. The disorder triggers fainting when the heartbeat becomes irregular - usually during exercise or other physical exertion, or when you become scared, excited

or angry. If the heartbeat continues to be dangerously fast and erratic for a prolonged period of time, long QT syndrome also can lead to seizures.

At this time, universal screening does not include long QT syndrome. In most cases, it's diagnosed with an ECG after someone experiences a warning symptom.

Once long QT syndrome is diagnosed, treatment usually starts with a medication called a beta-blocker. Other medications to counteract irregular heart rhythm may be used in conjunction with beta-blockers.

If medication isn't enough, a surgery called left cardiac sympathetic denervation may be recommended. During this minimally invasive procedure, nerves that release a chemical called noradrenalin onto the heart's muscle are removed.

The surgery significantly reduces the risk of a long

QT-triggered faint, seizure or sudden death.

Sometimes, despite medications and/or surgery, a person with long QT syndrome may be at unacceptably high risk for sudden death.

In those situations, a defibrillator may be implanted under the skin of the chest. The device can stop a potentially fatal irregular heart rhythm by delivering an electric shock to reset the rhythm back to normal.





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

well it worked won't be known until later this month. An early report from Canada for the same flu shot shows protection against that bug has been poor, just 17 percent.


Canada's flu season so far has been milder with more of a mix of strains. But CDC officials said effectiveness figures in the U.S. may end up in the same range.

Some researchers say part of the problem may be that most flu vaccine is made by growing viruses in chicken eggs; the viruses can mutate in the eggs, making the vaccine less effective in people.

The cold winter in many parts of the country may also have played a role, keeping people indoors and helping flu bugs to spread, said Dr. David Weber, a University of North Carolina flu expert.

Whatever the reason, "it's a whopper of a flu season," said Mimi Dreifuss, a North Carolina nurse who got sick this week.

Dreifuss, 61, worked



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in a pediatrician's office for years and didn't catch the flu. She retired last year and didn't get a flu shot figuring she was no longer around sick children. This week she had a 101 temperature and was diagnosed with the flu.

"I'm feeling kind of foolish," said Dreifuss, of Bynum, North Carolina.



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

North Korea slams Trump's State of the **Union address**

SEOUL, South Korea — North Korea on Sunday slammed President Donald Trump's State of the Union address and said its nuclear capabilities would "deter Trump and his lackeys from showing off on the Korean peninsula."

In his address last week, Trump said that "no regime has oppressed its own citizens more totally or brutally than the cruel dictatorship in North Korea."

"We need only look at the depraved character of the North Korean regime to understand the nature of the nuclear threat it could pose to America and to our allies," Trump said.

On Sunday, a North Korean foreign ministry official shot back at the president.

"If Trump does not get rid of his anachronistic and dogmatic way of thinking, it will only bring about the consequence of further endangering security and future of the United States," the official said, in comments carried by the North's official Korean Central News Agency.

The official disputed Trump's claim in his address that the United States had "made incredible progress and achieved extraordinary success" over the last year, calling it "the height of Trump-style arrogance, arbitrariness and self-conceit."

Trump also said in his speech that the U.S. was "waging a campaign of maximum pressure" to prevent North Korea from being able to attack the U.S. with nuclear weapons.

The foreign ministry official said that North Korea's "self-reliant defense capability with the nuclear force as its backbone will, however, completely deter Trump and his lackeys from showing off on the Korean peninsula."



2 Amtrak workers killed, 116 hurt in SC crash

CAYCE, S.C. — An Amtrak passenger train slammed into a freight train parked on a side track in South Carolina early Sunday, killing two Amtrak crew members and injuring more than 110 people, authorities said. It was the third deadly wreck involving Amtrak in less than two

The Silver Star was on its way from New York to Miami with nearly 150 people aboard around 2:45 a.m. when it plowed into the CSX train at an estimated 59 mph, Gov. Henry McMaster said. The crash happened around a switchyard about 10 miles south of Columbia.

The governor said investigators have yet to determine how the Amtrak train ended up on that stretch of

'The CSX was on the track it was supposed to be on," McMaster said.

The National Transportation Safety Board sent investigators.

The conductor and engineer aboard the Amtrak train were killed, the coroner's office said. And 116 people were taken to four hospitals, according to the governor.

The main trauma hospital in the area had three patients in critical or serious condition, with the rest treated for minor injuries such as cuts, bruises and whiplash, said Dr. Steve Shelton, Palmetto Health director of emergency preparedness.

The locomotives of both trains were left crumpled, the Amtrak engine on its side. One car in the middle of the Amtrak train was snapped in half, forming a V off to one side of the

"It's a horrible thing to see, to understand the force involved,' McMaster said after touring the scene.

Many passengers were asleep when the train began shaking violently and then slammed to a halt, passenger Derek Pettaway told CBS.

Thild abductions rise amid South Sudan's grinding civil war

AKOBO, South Sudan – It's been almost two years since Deng Machar's three young children were abducted from his home and likely sold for cattle. Sitting in South Sudan's opposition-held town of Akobo, the 35-yearold pointed to the dirt beneath his feet.

"They were playing right there," Machar said. "It would be easier if they were dead because then I could forget."

Machar said his 4-year-old daughter and 5-year-old son were likely sold for cattle after being seized by men from the rival Murle tribe. He doubts his 2-year-old son is still alive. Eleven children in all were abducted from this area that day and none has

been seen since. It is a little-

acknowledged tragedy in South Sudan's fiveyear civil war. Child kidnappings between clans have increased as people become more desperate amid widespread hunger and a devastated economy, human rights groups say.

"Child abductions and trafficking in South Sudan is a real issue that requires an urgent response by the government," said Edmund Yakani, executive director of the nonprofit Community **Empowerment for** Progress Organization.

While tracking child kidnappings is challenging amid the conflict and mass displacement, he said his organization has confirmed abductions in several parts of the

country. Those include 11 children seized last year in Abyei in the north, five taken between 2012 and 2014 in the Wau area in the west, and seven in 2016 and 2017 in the Yei area in the south, near the Ugandan border.

The United Nations says its child protection team confirmed abductions in the regions of Unity, Central Equatoria, Jonglei, Upper Nile and Western Equatoria last year, though it didn't have a total number.

Although inter-clan fighting, cattle raiding and abductions are deep-seated throughout this East African country, Yakani called it a particular problem in Jonglei state, where the town of Akobo is located and where many in the Murle tribe base "their

livelihood" on selling children.

Boss says get a credit card

I recently got a new job that requires monthly expenses of almost \$5,000 that are reimbursed. I can't swing that kind of money right now, and my company told me to get a credit card to cover things. I'm trying to get out of debt, and I don't like this idea. What should I do?

Dear John,

Your company should be fronting the money for these expenses. When you talk about the cost of doing business, it's the responsibility of the company — not the employee — to pay expenses.

If I send someone on the road to make money for my company, I pay the bills. It doesn't matter if you're talking about hotel rooms, airfare, or rental cars, those are my expenses. If it's someone who travels a lot, we give them a company debit card. If it's just an occasional thing, we'll give them money out of petty cash. But a company shouldn't treat its employees this way. That's just plain wrong.

It's a mystery to me how some segments of Corporate America have sold their employees on the idea of being the company bank. Ultimately, the decision is yours. If you don't mind covering your company's expenses and getting reimbursed, but you don't want to go into debt, you'll have to save and build up a

\$5,000 business expense fund in a separate checking account. This should be used only for business expenses, and what's spent should be replenished immediately when they reimburse

You're in an unusual spot, John. Personally, I think this is an unprofessional way to run a business. But if you like your job, and want to stay without taking on any more debt, the good news is you'll only have to fill up your expense account one time.

The bank won't approve it if she is on the loan, and his income alone isn't enough to get the amount they need. His parents are well-off, and they have offered to co-sign on the loan. Is this a bad idea?

Dear Rhonda,

It's a really bad idea. Those two have no business thinking about a house right now, and his parents are about to make things even worse with their loving, misguided help.

If you need a cosigner, you're nowhere near ready to buy a home. They need to slow down. I mean, they're just engaged. They don't even need a house at this point. They should get married, live in a cheap apartment for a while, and work on paying off their debts. After that, they need to save up an emergency fund of three to six months of expenses, then start setting cash aside for a huge down payment on their first, modest

Billionaire takes property tax stand over geese

Billionaire Tom Golisano says he tried stringing up fishing line, spraying smelly repellent and even posting a wolf decoy, but nothing could rid his lakeside vacation home of the Canada geese that turned his lawn into a minefield of poop.

His next line of attack? Refusing to pay his \$90,000 school tax bill until officials in the Finger Lakes town of South Bristol find a way to control the birds.

"This past summer it was horrible. We'd drive in and find 100 to 200 geese parked on our lawn," said Golisano, founder of payroll company Paychex and former owner of the Buffalo Sabres hockey team. "You can't walk barefoot, can't play Frisbee, can't have your grandchildren run around... Here I am paying all this money in taxes and I can't use my property because of the geese droppings.

Golisano's stand over bird poop is just one part of his one-man protest campaign against a taxation system he believes is flawed and inequitable. He's pledging to file a

class-action lawsuit on behalf of other upstate homeowners who believe they are being overtaxed. And he recently launched a website, TaxMyPropertyFairly.com, to give ordinary taxpayers the tools to challenge their property tax bills.

Golisano contends that tax assessors often lack the training, time and expertise to accurately assign property values that determine what share of the local tax collection each homeowner pays.

Escaping high taxes was part of the reason Golisano changed his permanent home address to Naples, Florida, nearly a decade ago. In 2010, he spent \$200,000 in legal fees to get the property taxes on his home in Mendon, near Rochester, reduced from \$200,000 to

He said western New York is notorious for high property taxes. While his wife, tennis Hall of Famer Monica Seles, pays about \$4,000 a year in taxes on her New York City condo assessed at \$800,000, Golisano said a home with that assessed value in Rochester-area Monroe

County would have a \$28,000 tax bill.

Golisano's fight over the bird poop in the town South Bristol, population 1,600, is based on the argument that the value of his Canandaigua Lake property is driven down by the flocks of wild geese that congregate there and it's government's duty to solve the problem.

Town Supervisor Daniel Marshall disagrees. "It's a resident's problem to take care of, not the town's," he said. Marshall said no other shoreline residents have complained about the geese. "It is a lake, after all."

For now, the tax fight remains unresolved. Golisano says his next step is to seek a reduced property assessment based on the goose scourge.

Golisano, whose net worth is listed by Forbes at \$3.4 billion, is renowned for his generosity to health care, higher education and opportunities for those with intellectual and developmental disabilities. There are three children's hospitals named for him, in Rochester, Syracuse and Fort Myers, Florida.

Democratic, GOP lawmakers: Memo doesn't clear Trump in probe

— Democratic and
Republican lawmakers
said Sunday that a GOPproduced congressional
memo on FBI surveillance
powers did not clear
President Donald Trump
in the Russia investigation, and they expressed
hope that special counsel
Robert Mueller's work
would continue without
interference.

The top Democrat on the Republican-led House Intelligence Committee that released the memo called it "a political hit job" and questioned whether GOP Rep. Devin Nunes, the committee chairman, had coordinated with the White House in drafting it.

"The goal here is to undermine the FBI, discredit the FBI, discredit the Mueller investigation, do the president's bidding," said Rep. Adam Schiff, D-Calif. Schiff said he raised motions to have the committee question the FBI first and review the full supporting material before releasing the memo but was "voted down" by Nunes and other GOP committee members.

"I think it's very possible his staff worked with the White House," he said.

Nunes has for months faced criticism about his close ties to the White House. He had previously apologized for sharing with the White House secret intelligence intercepts related to a

probe of Russian election interference before talking to committee members. When asked during a committee meeting in late January whether he had coordinated the memo with the White House, he at first said "as far as I know, no," then refused to answer when asked whether his staff members had communicated with the White House.

The memo, released Friday, alleges misconduct on the part of the FBI and the Justice Department in obtaining a warrant under the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act to monitor former Trump campaign foreign policy adviser Carter Page and his ties to Russia. Specifically, it takes aim at the FBI's use of information from former British spy Christopher Steele, who compiled a dossier containing allegations of ties between Trump, his associates and Russia.

Rep. Chris Stewart, R-Utah, said the memo doesn't end the need for the Mueller investigation.

"I think it would be a mistake for anyone to suggest that the special counsel shouldn't complete his work. I support his work. I want him to finish it. I hope he finishes it as quickly as possible. This memo has frankly nothing at all to do with the special counsel," said Stewart, a member of the House Intelligence Committee.

Denying a political motive, Republican committee members defended the release of the GOP memo as appropriate. Saying it did not vindicate Trump, as the president asserted Saturday, they signaled the possible release of Democrats' dissenting memo in the coming weeks and said the GOP memo would have no impact on Mueller's ongoing probe.

Rep. Will Hurd, R-Texas, said he had opposed the release of Democrats' memo last week on national security grounds but fully expected a fresh vote on the matter after Democrats make revisions.

"The information wasn't ready to go, and so we decided to release ours," he said. "People can criticize that, that decision, but I think providing oversight and shining a light on these issues is important."

Trump tweeted Saturday that the memo puts him in the clear.

"This memo totally vindicates 'Trump' in probe," he said. "But the Russian Witch Hunt goes on and on. Their (sic) was no Collusion and there was no Obstruction (the word now used because, after one year of looking endlessly and finding NOTHING, collusion is dead). This is an American disgrace!"

The underlying materials that served as the basis for the warrant application were not made public in the memo. Even as Democrats described it as inaccurate, some Republicans quickly cited the memo — released over

the objections of the FBI and Justice Department
— in their arguments that Mueller's investigation is politically tainted.

The memo's central allegation is that agents and prosecutors, in applying in October 2016 to monitor Page's communications, failed to tell a judge that the opposition research that provided grounds for the FBI's suspicion received funding from Hillary Clinton's presidential campaign and the Democratic National Committee. Page had stopped advising the campaign sometime around the end of that

Steele's research, according to the memo, "formed an essential part"

summer.

of the warrant application. But it's unclear how much or what information Steele collected made it into the application, or how much has been corroborated. Steele was working for Fusion GPS, a firm initially hired by the conservative Washington Free Beacon to do opposition research on Trump. Steele didn't begin work on the project until after Democratic groups took over the funding.

Republicans say a judge should have known that "political actors" were involved in allegations that led the Justice Department to believe Page might be an agent of a foreign power — an accusation he has consistently and strenuously

denied.

The memo confirms the FBI's counterintelligence investigation into the Trump campaign began in July 2016, months before the surveillance warrant was sought, and was "triggered" by information concerning campaign aide George Papadopoulos. He pleaded guilty last year to lying to the FBI.

The confirmation about Papadopoulos is "the most important fact disclosed in this otherwise shoddy memo," Schiff said in a tweet Saturday in response to Trump's assertion that the document vindicated him.

Schiff and Hurd spoke on ABC's "This Week." Stewart spoke on "Fox News Sunday."

WASHINGTON — The White House will withdraw the nomination of Kathleen Hartnett White, the former Texas environmental official named to lead the Council on Environmental Quality, a White House official said

Sunday.

Democrats and some Midwestern Republicans worried that Hartnett White's previous comments calling the EPA's Renewable Fuel Standard unethical would lead to a weaker biofuels program.

Her nomination was advanced by the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee on a party-line vote in November, but she was unable to gain enough Republican support for a floor vote.

The Washington Post first reported the planned withdrawal Saturday.

Environment and Public Works Committee Chairman John Barrasso of Wyoming, who has praised Hartnett White as having "broad" experience in environmental issues, did not respond to a request for comment.

Hartnett White is a former member and commissioner of the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality. The White House council coordinates federal environmental policy and actions among agencies and with states.

At a Nov. 8 hearing

before the committee, Hartnett White was pressed by senators of both parties on several past statements, including her defense of carbon dioxide emissions and rejection of climate change science. Democrats argued that her views were too "extreme" and that she had shown "disrespect" for science and environmental laws.

The committee's top Democrat, Thomas R. Carper of Delaware, threatened to try to block her confirmation.

"My colleagues in Congress know well that I am one of the first to reach across the aisle to find reasonable, principled compromises, but in this case, it was abundantly clear very early on that heading up the Council on Environmental Quality wasn't the right job for Ms. White," Carper said in a statement Saturday.

Environmentalists, who had been alarmed by her nomination, celebrated the news.

"Kathleen Hartnett White is a conspiracy theorist and anti-science extremist who would threaten public health as the White House's top environmental adviser,' Sara Chieffo of the League of Conservation Voters, said in a statement. "This is a victory for science, and Trump would do well to listen to our voices and nominate someone who will put communities, not polluters, first."

Baltimore parking ticket amnesty program nets \$2M in 2 days

BALTIMORE (AP) — A parking ticket amnesty program in Baltimore has netted more than \$2.1 million for city coffers over a two-day period.

The Baltimore Sun reports that the totals collected as of Friday evening only reflected electronic payments.

The newspaper says there were also lines at city offices as residents came to pay outstanding tickets in person but those amounts have not yet been calculated.

Baltimore Mayor Catherine Pugh announced the initiative last month. It's the first parking ticket amnesty program the mid-Atlantic city has organized in roughly 15 years.

Virginia museum to auction off letter by Alexander Hamilton

PORTSMOUTH, Va. (AP) — A letter written by Alexander Hamilton will go to the highest bidder at an auction to raise money for restoration work at a Virginia museum.

The Virginian-Pilot reports the letter, written by a Founding Father of the United States and the first secretary of the Treasury, was written Sept. 14, 1794.

In the letter, Hamilton makes a military request for wagons during the Whiskey Rebellion. That was a violent uprising in the 1790s in western Pennsylvania that arose in response to a federal tax on whiskey production.

The newspaper says the money raised by auctioning the letter will benefit the Hill House Museum, a historic home in Portsmouth furnished with family belongings collected through generations.

The auction will take place March 22 at Quinn's Auction Galleries in Falls Church.

Michigan State faculty moving ahead with no-confidence vote

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP)

— Michigan State University faculty are moving ahead with a motion to hold a no-confidence vote on the school's board of trustees in response to the board's decision to hire former Gov. John Engler as interim president.

Members of the university's Academic Congress overwhelmingly approved a measure Saturday to hold the vote at the Faculty Senate's next meeting.

If that vote passes, faculty would call on the trustees to step down immediately.

Faculty members say the board rushed to appoint Engler and they criticized his lack of academic experience.

Engler was hired as interim president last Wednesday after longtime President Lou Anna Simon resigned Jan. 24 amid a growing outcry over the university's handling of the sex assault scandal involving former university sports doctor Larry Nassar.

Chicago museum's T. rex Sue to be moved for new display

CHICAGO (AP) — A

Tyrannosaurus rex fossil that's been on prominent display at Chicago's Field Museum is being moved to make room for a cast of the biggest dinosaur ever discovered.

Officials with the Field Museum say the T. rex named Sue, which has been at the museum since 2000, will be moved on Monday. The specimen will be updated and moved upstairs to a private suite opening in 2019.

The changes are part of an overhaul to the lakefront museum's main hall.

A 122-foot-long titanosaur, a Patagotitan mayorum from Argentina, is expected to arrive in June. It'll take up a third of the main hall with its head peeking over a 28-foot, second-floor balcony.

Police investigate death of toddler found on porch in Ohio

AKRON, Ohio (AP) — Police

in Ohio are investigating how a 2-year-old girl died after her she was found unresponsive by her mother on the front porch of an apartment in freezing weather.

The Akron Beacon Journal reports the toddler was found Friday afternoon and was taken to Akron Children's Hospital, where she died. The Summit County Medical Examiner's Office in northeast Ohio will determine how the child died.

Temperatures in Akron on Friday ranged between 12 and 19 degrees. WJW-TV is reporting the mother told a 911 dispatcher she found the

toddler "frozen" outside.
Police have not identified the girl or her mother. A neighbor at the 76-apartment complex managed by the Akron Metropolitan Housing Authority said the woman also has

AP Exclusive: US Rep visits El Salvador to meet deported man

HOUSTON (AP) — A Texas congressman has flown to El Salvador to meet with a constituent who was deported there last March despite not having a criminal record, according to his family.

U.S. Rep. Al Green met with 32-year-old Jose Escobar on Saturday at the airport in the Salvadoran capital San Salvador.

Green, a Houston Democrat who has been a staunch critic of President Donald Trump, says he told Escobar he was doing everything he could to return him to his two children and his wife, Rose, who attended the meeting.

Rose Escobar and the children still live in Houston. She says her husband's deportation has been hard on them and she worries about him.

Jose Escobar and his family arrived in the U.S. in 2001, when he was 15. They had been granted temporary protected status, which was given to Salvadorans who were victims of earthquakes that year. The Trump administration ended the program, saying the conditions under which it was created no longer applied.

SpaceX's hot new rocket ready for test flight

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — SpaceX's hot new monster rocket makes its launch debut this week, blasting off from the same

pad that hoisted men to the moon a half-century

The Falcon Heavy won't surpass NASA's Saturn V moon rocket, still all-time king of the launch circuit. It won't even approach the liftoff might of NASA's space shuttles.

But when it departs on its first test flight — as early as Tuesday — the Heavy with its three boosters and 27 engines will be the most powerful working rocket out there today, by a factor of two. Picture SpaceX's frequent-flyer Falcon 9 and its single booster and then times that by three; the Heavy's three first-stage boosters are strapped side by side by side.

The Heavy represents serious business for the private space company founded 16 years ago by Elon Musk. With more than 5 million pounds of liftoff thrust — equivalent to 18, 747s jetliners — the Heavy will be capable of lifting supersize satellites into orbit and sending spacecraft to the moon, Mars and beyond.

Using another airplane analogy, SpaceX boasts a Heavy could lift a 737 into orbit, passengers, luggage and all.

The company already has some Heavy customers lined up, including the U.S. Air Force.

"I can't wait to see it fly and to see it fly again and again," said the Southwest Research Institute's Alan Stern. He's the lead scientist for NASA's New Horizons spacecraft which made an unprecedented flyby of Pluto and is now headed to an even smaller, icy world on the fringes of the solar system.

Cape Canaveral hasn't seen this kind of rocket mania since the last space shuttle flight in 2011. Huge crowds are expected for the afternoon launch from Kennedy Space Center. Visitor center tickets for the best up-close viewing, called "Feel the Heat" and "Closest Package," sold out quickly.

"When you're talking about what would be the biggest and largest operational launch vehicle in the world, that adds another dimension of excitement," said Phil Larson, an assistant dean at the University of Colorado at Boulder, who used to work for SpaceX and the Obama administration.

The Heavy is capable of delivering, in one fell swoop, 140,660 pounds (63,800 kilograms) of cargo to low-Earth orbit, nearly 60,000 pounds (26,700 kilograms) to high-Earth orbit, 37,000 pounds (16,800 kilograms) to Mars, or 7,700 pounds (3,500 kilograms) to Pluto.

But for this inaugural flight, the rocket will carry up Musk's cherry-red Tesla Roadster. In addition to SpaceX, he runs the electric car maker Tesla.

"Red car for a red planet," Musk tweeted in December, when announcing the surprise cargo.

Fresh-off-the-drawingboard rockets typically carry steel or concrete blocks in place of true cargo.

"That seemed extremely boring," Musk explained.

NASA officials said the Falcon Heavy is just the latest evidence of the Kennedy Space Center's transformation into a multi-user spaceport, a turnaround after decades of space shuttles taking center stage.

A variety of rockets will be needed — besides NASA's still-under-construction Space Launch System megarocket — as astronauts venture out into the solar system, said Kennedy's director of center planning and development, Tom Engler. Blue Origin, led by Amazon's Jeff Bezos, for instance, is developing a big, reusable orbital-class rocket named New Glenn after the first American to orbit the world, John Glenn.

Cocoa Beach Mayor Ben Malik, a banker by day, noted that jobs are making a big comeback, with so many private rocketeers and other aerospace businesses hitting town. The area suffered thousands of layoffs when the 30-year space shuttle program ended.

"We are not only back, but the region is much more diversified," Malik said. "We are becoming a high-tech hub."

Stern sees the Heavy opening the door to more exploration, both human and robotic, given its heft and cost savings. SpaceX's launch failures of Falcon 1 and Falcon 9 showed the company has "a very strong backbone." While Falcon 1 was completely on the SpaceX tab, Falcon 9 benefited from the company's contracts with NASA for space station shipments.

This persistence resulted in SpaceX becoming, in 2010, the first private company to launch a spacecraft into orbit and then safely guide it back to Earth, something only

large governments had accomplished. Two years later, SpaceX became the first commercial supplier of the International Space Station. Now the company is aiming for the first commercial crew launch.

At the heart of SpaceX's cost savings is its rocket-recycling campaign. Two of the Heavy's first-stage boosters are repeats, having flown on Falcon 9s. The company will attempt to recover all three boosters; the two old boosters will aim for side-by-side vertical touchdowns at Cape Canaveral, while the new, beefed-up center core will attempt to land on a floating ocean platform.

Rocket makers typically discard their leftover boosters in the ocean. Now those boosters often come back and land, at least when it's SpaceX, complete with sonic booms just like the old shuttle days.

Unlike most rockets out there, the Falcon Heavy receives no government funding. The Mars-obsessed Musk has taken it upon himself and his California-based aerospace company to bankroll the hulking rocket. At a sticker price of \$90 million, the Heavy is a relative bargain. NASA's bigger and more powerful SLS is expected to exceed \$1 billion a flight.

Musk upped the ante by putting his Tesla atop this first Heavy; he's been warning for months the rocket might not make it higher than the launch tower.

If the flight succeeds, it will be the first true automobile hurled into space. It's destined for a perpetual orbit around the sun that will swing out as far as Mars. The car's soundtrack will be playing David Bowie's "Space Oddity."

"It is a catchy way to

get attention," said Stern while driving his blue Tesla Model S in Boulder, Colorado, last week.

Musk is already looking ahead to an even bigger SpaceX rocket that would phase out both the Falcon 9 and Heavy.

Retired NASA historian and Smithsonian curator Roger Launius cautioned SpaceX has "a long history of overpromising," although eventually succeeding. The Heavy's debut, for example, has been delayed for years. Musk has acknowledged the Heavy proved harder to build than anticipated.

"I'm in favor of more capacity to get off this planet, so I cheer when anyone has a successful new rocket," Launius wrote in an email.

He promised to be "properly congratulatory" if and when success comes.

Most suspended Ohio State fraternities

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)

— Nearly all the Ohio State
University fraternities whose
activities were suspended in
November mostly due to hazing
and alcohol allegations have
been cleared to resume recruitment events and, in many cases,
also social events.

The university suspended activities for the Interfraternity Council's 37 members after 11 chapters came under investigation early in the school year. One fraternity has since been

suspended for three years.

The university says it's working with fraternities to address high-risk behaviors by changing the culture within those groups. To resume activities, chapters were required to have school-approved plans for conducting activities safely, including committing to hazing prevention efforts and alcohol-free recruitment.

recruitment.
A spokesman for Ohio State's Office of Student Life says it's pleased fraternities are creating plans that reflect interest in moving in a positive direction.

Trump throws wrench into grad students' hopes for unions

NEW YORK (AP) — When the National Labor Relations Board ruled in 2016 that graduate teaching and research assistants have the right to unionize, it paved the way for union elections at Columbia, Yale, the University of Chicago and other

But Columbia announced last week that it won't bargain with the graduate students who voted for union representation.

Experts say administrators there and at other schools may be anticipating that a pro-management NLRB stocked with appointees of Republican President Donald Trump will reverse itself and rule that graduate students are not workers.

Other universities that have filed appeals rather than negotiating with teaching and research assistants may also be waiting for the labor board to issue a new ruling.

New Jersey could be first to ban menthol cigarettes

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) — New Jersey could soon become the first state to ban the sale of menthol cigarettes.

Democratic Assemblyman Herb Conaway, who is also a physician, recently introduced the legislation. It was approved Monday by the state Assembly's Health and Senior Services Committee and now heads to the Appropriations Committee for further consideration.

He said, the cooling effect of menthol allows smokers to draw more toxic substances into their lungs and hold them there.

Opponents say the ban would cost small retailers millions of dollars in lost sales and hurt state coffers.

The measure would amend existing state law that bans the sale of flavored cigarettes.

A food retailers' group says menthol cigarettes account for 35 percent to 40 percent of their total sales.

Woman at top of her game seeks girls with a cyber-aptitude

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Connecticut's public safety commissioner is helping promote a national contest designed to find young women who have the skills needed to enter to the world of cybersecurity.

Dora Schriro is working with the nonprofit SANS Institute and the Girl Scouts of America to get teens registered for the "Girls Go Cyberstart" program, an online puzzle and problem-solving

game that will start on Feb. 20.

It's open to girls in 18 states

and American Samoa.

The top prize is a trip to a
women-in-cybersecurity conference in Chicago. Others will win
computers and tablets.

But Schriro says the main goal is to identify girls with an aptitude and start them down a career path in the maledominated field.

The cause of the accident is under investigation.

Campaign for poor holds 1st national action

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — The renewed version of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.'s campaign to lift poor people is holding its first national mobilization, with actions planned in 32 states and the nation's capital.

Poor people, clergy and activists in the Poor People's Campaign plan to deliver letters Monday to politicians in state

capitol buildings.

The letter demands that leaders confront a systemic racism that they say is evidenced in voter suppression laws and poverty that hurt a larger percentage of minorities, women and children

but a larger number of whites.

The campaign is led by the Revs. William Barber of North Carolina and Liz Theoharis of New York. It officially began Dec. 4, 2017, 50 years after King started the first Poor People's Campaign. King was assassinated a few months later.

Prosecutors say Lovell climbed
out her bedroom window one
night in January 2016 to meet
Eisenhauer, who was then 18
and a freshman engineering
student at Virginia Tech.

Three days later, her body was found just over the state line in North Carolina.

Eisenhauer's friend, Natalie Keepers, also a former Virginia Tech student, is charged as an accessory in Lovell's death. Her trial is scheduled for September.

Warren Buffett on hand as Navy commissions newest warship

SAN DIEGO (AP) — The U.S. Navy on Saturday commissioned its newest warship, the USS Omaha, a futuristic, \$440 million vessel named for the Nebraska hometown of billionaire Warren Buffett, who was on hand for the ceremony.

The Omaha, a 218-foot-long

littoral combat ship, was com-

missioned at its new home port in San Diego.

Buffett's daughter, Susie Buffett, who was designated as the ship's sponsor, gave the traditional order for officers and crew: "Man our ship and bring

"Aye, aye, ma'am," they replied and ran to the ship as a band struck up "Anchors Aweigh."

The aluminum-clad Omaha is designed for missions close to shore. It has high-tech computer capabilities and can be reconfigured for various missions, including anti-submarine warfare and anti-mine operations.

"She is a beautiful ship," said Cmdr. Michael Toth, the commanding officer. "To be at her helm is more akin to flying an aircraft with a pilot and a co-pilot than to conning a traditional

Other dignitaries at the ceremony included Nebraska Gov. Pete Ricketts, Omaha Mayor Jean Stothert and former Nebraska Gov. and U.S. Sen. Bob Kerrey, a Navy veteran and Medal of Honor winner.

"I am proud to share our name, our heritage and our community values with USS Omaha and its commander, and we wish you safety on your missions," Stothert said.

Ricketts, whose state is landlocked, issued what he said was a unique honor in designating the entire crew collectively as "an admiral in the great Navy of the state of Nebraska."

The ship is the fourth to carry the Omaha name since 1869. The last vessel was an attack submarine that was decommissioned in 1995.

"She represents the strength and the fortitude of her city and her state," U.S. Navy Secretary Richard V. Spencer said at the ceremony. "This ship is ready to deliver the fight tonight."

Activists block light rail carrying spectators to Super Bowl

MINNEAPOLIS — Activists protesting police brutality chained themselves along a light-rail line carrying ticketholders to the Super Bowl on Sunday, halting trains in both directions.

Metro Transit's Green Line was shut down a little after 2 p.m., about three hours before kickoff, by a group of activists at the Stadium

Village station.

Chinyere Tutashinda, a spokeswoman for the activists, said they were also protesting authorities' decision to dedicate the city's two light-rail lines to Super Bowl ticketholders on Sunday. Nonticketholders had to use buses instead.

Black Lives Matter and several other groups planned two separate events and a march Sunday afternoon. About 300 people had gathered

at a park a couple of miles south of U.S. Bank Stadium, and planned a march that would have them arrive at the stadium near 5 p.m.


A Metro Transit spokesperson says 17 people were taken away after they blocked a lightrail line carrying Super Bowl ticketholders to the stadium.

Transit spokesperson Howie Padilla said no one was hurt in the protest, which blocked trains for about two hours ahead of Sunday's kickoff.

Metro Transit had buses standing by to get ticketholders to the stadium in time.

The activists said they were protesting police brutality, as well as the light-rail trains being taken over by Super Bowl spectators rather than being available to ordinary citizens.

Padilla says Metro Transit doesn't expect the 17 activists to face charges. He says Metro Transit respects people's right to free speech and demonstration.

snake's escape leads to school early dismissal

BRENTWOOD, Mo. (AP) — Around 400 students at a suburban St. Louis school got part of the day off Friday after a 9-footlong boa constrictor wriggled out of her aquarium, setting off a frantic search.

The St. Louis Post-Dispatch reports that a teacher alerted officials at Brentwood high and middle schools of the escape around 10 a.m. The 70-pound snake went missing from an enclosure in a biology class. Students were sent home a short time later.

A broken hinge on the enclosure was blamed on the escape. The snake was found beneath the floor, wrapped around pipes. The ceramic floor was ripped up to retrieve

A biology teacher adopted the snake years ago and kept her at school. When she retired she left the snake for the school to keep.

we'd derailed," he said. Elliot Smith told The State newspaper of Columbia that he was staying with a friend when they heard what sounded like a propane tank exploding.

"The sound was so loud, you instantly knew it was bad," he said. Smith said he and his friend saw passengers limping along the tracks, while others tried to get everyone out of the cars.

Amtrak officials gathered up luggage and other belongings and within hours put passengers aboard buses to their destinations. Before being sent on their way, those who were not hurt were taken to a shelter set up at a middle school, and local businesses provided coffee and breakfast.

"We know they are shaken up quite a bit. We know this is like nothing else they have ever been through. So we wanted

cold, get them out of the weather — get them to a warm place," sheriff's spokesman Adam Myrick said.

The dead were identified as engineer Michael Kempf, 54, of Savannah, Georgia, and conductor Michael Cella, 36, of Orange Park, Florida.

Lexington County Coroner Margaret Fisher's voice caught as she released the names of the dead. "Any time you have anything that happens like that, you expect more fatalities. But God blessed us, and we only had the two," Fisher said.

On Wednesday, a chartered Amtrak train carrying Republican members of Congress to a strategy retreat slammed into a garbage truck at a crossing in rural Virginia, killing one person in the truck and injuring six others.

And on Dec. 18, an Amtrak train ran off the rails along a curve during its inaugural run on a route south of Tacoma, Washington, killing three

people and injuring dozens. It was going nearly 80 mph, more than twice the speed limit.

After the latest crash, Democratic Sen. Richard Blumenthal of Connecticut said the nation's railroads must be made safer, declaring, "Business as usual must end." He said proven technology, including positive train control, cannot continue to be

delayed.

Positive train control can automatically slow or stop speeding trains. Regulators have been pushing for years for such equipment, and some railroads have installed it, but the deadline has been pushed back repeatedly at the industry's request.

The worst train crash in recent South Carolina history took place in

2005 when a freight engineer parked a train on a side track near a textile mill in Graniteville and forgot to flip the switch back to the main track.

A freight train passing through went barreling down the side track and slammed into the parked train, killing nine people, most of them millworkers choked by chorine gas leaking from a damaged tanker car.

Israel to legalize settlement outpost deep in West Bank

JERUSALEM — Israel on Sunday said it plans to legalize an isolated West Bank outpost in response to the murder of one of its residents in a shooting attack last month.

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu told his weekly Cabinet meeting that his government will legalize Havat Gilad to "allow the continuing of normal life there."

"Whoever thought that through the reprehensible murder of a resident of Havat Gilad, a father of six, that our spirit can be broken and we can be weakened, is making a bitter mistake," Netanyahu said.

Last month, Rabbi Raziel Shevah, 35, was shot dead from a passing vehicle as he drove near his home in the unauthorized settlement outpost near the Palestinian city of Nablus. The Israeli military is still searching the area for suspects.

Israel captured the West Bank, along with the Gaza Strip and east Jerusalem in the 1967 Mideast war, areas the Palestinians want for a future state. Israel has established about 120 West Bank settlements, which it considers legal. In addition, about 100

settlement outposts have been erected without official approval but Israel generally tolerates them. Most of the international community considers all Jewish West Bank settlements illegal.

Havat Gilad, a community of a few hundred Israelis, is among these rogue outposts and is located deep inside the West Bank, away from areas Israel expects to keep under any peace deal with the Palestinians. Critics see their expansion as complicating peace efforts.

The anti-settlement group Peace Now called the effort to legalize the outpost a "cynical exploitation of the murder."

Meanwhile, Israel on Sunday demolished a two-classroom school in a Bedouin community in the West Bank, saying the EU-funded structure was built illegally without proper permits and that it was in a precarious condition. The school served nearly 30 third and fourth grade students who were moved to a nearby guesthouse and barbershop to continue classes.

A statement from Cogat, the Israeli defense body responsible for Palestinian civilian affairs, nated with authorities.

said the demolition came after a challenge in Israel's Supreme Court was overruled.

Roberto Valent, an official with the U.N. humanitarian agency OCHA, said he was "deeply concerned" by the demolition. In a statement, he said the Israeli-issued permits were "nearly impossible to obtain" and that demolitions such as Sunday's, among other Israeli policies, "have created a coercive environment that violates the human rights of residents and generates a risk of forcible transfer."

The demolition took place near the settlement of Maaleh Adumim, in the 60 percent of the West Bank known as Area C that remains under full Israeli control. Israel has imposed severe restrictions on Palestinian development in this area, home to dozens of Israeli settlements.

The EU funds the construction of many homes, schools and other structures in the area and says the projects are needed for humanitarian reasons and economic development.

Israel says that any assistance to Palestinians in Area C must be coordi-

for cattle or use them personally," said Thiro Akungurouth, a Murle youth leader who knows some of the abductors.

One child, no matter what their age, can sell for 20 cows, worth about \$7,000, he said.

Children who aren't sold are kept by families without kids while girls are groomed for marriage, Akungurouth said. Stigma remains against childless families in South Sudan. Abducted girls often are married to their captors.

Authorities in Akobo said 37 children have been seized in the surrounding areas since 2016, more than in the first three years of the war combined. It was not clear how many children have been abducted across the country during the civil

One opposition governor blamed South Sudan's government for the increase in kidnappings, saying it's trying to create a wedge between the Murle and Nuer tribes to advance its military agenda.

"It's happening more now because the government is instigating a rift and telling the youth to attack by distributing arms and ammunition," Koang Rambang, the

governor of Bieh state, which until last year was part of Jonglei, told the He specifically faulted

the country's First Vice President Taban Deng Gai for "instigating more abductions,' citing 10 children who were seized in January while Gai toured the largely opposition-held Jonglei.

South Sudan's government denied it, saying Gai was in the region only to promote peace. The government also said it had given "directives to the concerned governors of those states to get rid of those activities," said Maal Maker Thiong, who works in the office of the presidency.

But as the civil war drives the nation deeper into despair, children continue to be the worst affected.

Although South Sudan in 2015 signed onto the Convention on the Rights of the Child, which states that all parties should take appropriate measures "to prevent the abduction of, the sale of or traffic in children," the country's warring factions repeatedly have been accused of committing grave violations against children, including the forced recruitment of child soldiers.

"The abduction of children is abhorrent. They are vulnerable and deserve our protection," the chief of the U.N. mission in South Sudan, David Shearer, told the AP. He said the U.N.'s human rights team was due to visit Akobo to assess the situation and advocate with local authorities and armed groups to prevent the practice.

Over the years some organizations have tried to work with the tribes, encouraging them to return the kidnapped children and halt the practice.

Last month, a conference held between the Nuer and Murle tribes in the village of Burmath outside Akobo discussed the possible return of some of the children, including three who were abducted on Jan. 17.

"We tell the chiefs that this is having negative consequences and that they need to stop this and live peacefully," said Ruei Hoth, one of the conference organizers.

As desperation among South Sudanese continues, however, people are skeptical that the abduction and sale of children will end.

"I don't think abductions will stop," said Tut Banguot, an aid worker in Akobo. "People have no resources and no salaries, they aren't working and so they get children and trade them for commodities.

Same-sex marriage a key issue as Costa Ricans elect leader

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica

(AP) — Costa Ricans voted Sunday in a presidential race shaken by an international court ruling saying the country should let same-sex couples get married.

Evangelical candidate Fabricio Alvarado recently vaulted into first place in the polls after he took a strong stance against gay marriage, which about two-thirds of Costa Ricans also oppose.

His closest rivals are agri-businessman Antonio Alvarez of the opposition National Liberation Party and Carlos Alvarado of the governing Citizens' Action Party.

But the outlook was cloudy because none of 13 candidates were polling at more than 17 percent and surveys indicated that more than a third of likely voters were undecided.

If no candidate reaches 40 percent, the top two finishers advance to an April 1 runoff.

The January decision by the Inter-American Court of Human Rights has come to play a central role in the campaign. The court also ordered the country

to grant same-sex couples rights such the ability to inherit estates and adopt children.

Political analyst Francisco Barahona told The Associated Press that it came as an "external shock" for Costa Rica, a majority Roman Catholic nation with an increasing evangelical population.

Fabricio Alvarado, a 43-year-old journalist, preacher and Christian singer, called the ruling a "sovereign violation" and saw his support balloon in the polls as socially conservative voters gravitated to that message.

Carlos Alvarado — no relation — is the only major candidate to openly back gay marriage and has picked up some support recently from socially liberal voters. A 38-year-old also trained as a journalist, he got his start in politics as communications director for Citizens' Action and also was labor minister under current President Luis Guillermo Solis.

Alvarez, a two-time president of the Legislative Assembly and a Cabinet minister under the first presidency of Oscar Arias in 1986-1990, says he opposes gay marriage but backs recognizing certain other rights for gay couples.

Voters will also be selecting the 57 delegates that make up the Assembly.

Tillerson says **US** considers Venezuela oil sale restrictions

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) – Secretary of State Rex Tillerson says that the U.S. is still considering restricting the sale of oil from crisis-torn Venezuela.

Tillerson said Sunday in Argentina's capital that the U.S. wants

"free, fair, and verifiable elections" in Venezuela, and wants to apply enough pressure to end the crisis in the South American country.

But he also said that he wants to find ways to mitigate the negative impact that sanctions would have on U.S. oil companies, Venezuelans and other regional countries that rely on Venezuelan oil. Venezuela sits atop

the world's largest oil reserves and is the third-largest supplier to the U.S.

International pressure has been increasing on Venezuela over the government's decision to push up presidential elections to April under conditions that opponents say overwhelmingly favor President Nicolas Maduro.

Palestinian-American brings #MeToo campaign to West Bank

RAMALLAH, West Bank — A young Palestinian-American is the driving force behind a nascent #MeToo movement in this patriarchal corner of the world, selling T-shirts, hoodies and denim jackets with the slogan "Not Your Habibti (darling)" as a retort for catcalls and writing down women's complaints from her perch in a West Bank square.

Yasmeen Mjalli wants to encourage Palestinian society to confront sexual harassment, a largely taboo subject.

"What I am doing is to start a conversation that people are really afraid to have," said Mjalli as she put her merchandise on hangers in a clothing store.

The 21-year-old has faced backlash from conservatives and from some activists who say fighting Israel's occupation is the priority for Palestinians.

Her parents, who grew up in a Palestinian farming town, immigrated to the United States and returned

to the West Bank five years ago, weren't pleased, either.

'To be able to have peace with them, I have to check my feminism at the door, which is very difficult because that's really who I am," said Mjalli, who moved to the West Bank last year, after graduating from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro with a degree in art history.

Mjalli and other activists say that starting a conversation about sexual harassment doesn't mean copying the #MeToo movement in the United States, where victims are speaking out in growing numbers.

Cultural differences require a different approach.

Women across the Arab world have made strides toward equality, outnumbering men in many universities and joining the work force in growing numbers. Yet they struggle to break free from the constraints of patriarchy.

Traditional Arab societies assign rigid gender roles, with men as guardians of their female

Mjalli estimates she has sold close to 500 pieces, with about 70 percent of her sales in the diaspora.

Skeptics expect limited impact on Palestinian society.

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STATE-BY-STATE

News from across the USA

ALABAMA Montgomery: State law-makers are working on a compromise proposal for limited oversight of faith-based day cares by requiring once-a-year inspections.

ALASKA Kodiak: The local trawl fleet has ended its protest over the price for its pollock harvest, *The Kodiak Daily Mirror* reports. Processors raised the offer to 11 cents a pound, up from 10 cents.

ARIZONA Phoenix: Waymo has announced plans to launch autonomous riding sharing services in the Phoenix area later this year.

ARKANSAS Arkadelphia: A Chinese company is increasing its investment by \$500 million in a planned paper mill that will create 350 jobs.

CALIFORNIA San Francisco: City prosecutors plan to toss out or reduce thousands of criminal convictions for marijuana dating back decades. A 2016 ballot measure legalized recreational pot use in California.

colorado Denver: Scientists are developing robots that may one day go through old mines to help prevent environmental disasters. The Colorado mountains have dozens of inactive mines filled with polluted water.



CONNECTICUT Hartford: Gov. Dannel P. Malloy has proposed reinstating highway tolls and increasing the state gas tax by 7 cents to help fix roads and bridges.

DELAWARE Wilmington: A federal judge ordered a medical imaging firm to pay \$16.2 million for filing false claims for Medicare reimbursement.

FLORIDA Tavares: A man convicted in a child pornography case is accused of attempting to hire a 75-year-old hit man called "the Rabbi" to kill the judge who sentenced him to 20 years in prison.

GEORGIA Atlanta: Georgians may soon be able to order mimosas or buy beer on Sunday mornings under proposed state legislation. Currently, restaurants and retail stores can't sell alcohol until 12:30 p.m. on Sundays.

HAWAII Honolulu: The city is testing its first electric bus as part of a sixweek pilot project, *Hawaii News Now* reports. The battery-powered bus is on loan.

He's the best-dressed runner in the marathon

On a typical weekend, you might find Trevor Sununu building a computer or making movie props, like a flamethrower or Thor hammer, just for fun.

Anything odd, DIY or slightly challenging is just his cup of tea.

That's why Sununu, a Florida State University biology student and avid runner, was trying to break the Guinness World Record for running in a three-piece business suit Sunday at the Tallahassee Marathon.

In the Tallahassee running realm, he has been known to wear American flag short-shorts and a single sleeve on his left arm instead of a shirt — no matter the weather.

The feat joins a list of other peculiar Guinness records, like fastest marathons dressed as a witch, an astronaut or elf.

"I've always liked doing the interesting, not-as-easy-to-do thing," Sununu said. He was aiming for the most recent record of 2:42:59 by a runner in Germany, according to the Guinness World Records website.

"Once in a while we'll have a race where people will run in costume," said Sheryl Rosen, chair of the marathon's organizing committee under Tallahassee's Gulf Winds Track Club. "But this is the first time in the 12 years I've been with Gulf Winds that I've seen someone try to break a record."

In recent years, he ran in a Batman costume for a superherothemed race and competed in the Krispy Kreme Doughnut Dash 5K.

Sunday's weather, with a low of 48 and a high expected in the low 70s, was brisk for the 26.2-mile run

Sununu said he hopes his run will inspire others to take on a task they never thought they could do.

"I'd like to inspire people, not just kids but everyone, that even if it's silly in some way like running in a suit, you can always try to push yourself, and do something fun and amazing and silly, and accomplish what you'd like to do."

Sununu sees his effort as a victory in itself.

"Even just trying to do it and setting out on a goal can be very fun and accomplishing," he said. "You can always try to push yourself further."

'Virtual colonoscopy' uses CT scanner to look at the colon

DEAR DR. ROACH: I had a Coloquard test and was told that there is blood in my stool. My doctor tried to do a colonoscopy, but told me he was unable to complete it due to my colon being very twisted. He sent me to the hospital for a "virtual colonoscopy." He assured me that it was not invasive and that I would only get dye in my vein. The hospital he sent me to does not perform this test, and also told me that there is no test on the colon that is not invasive. Is this really true? If so, what was my doctor talking about? — C.L.

ANSWER: Coloquard is a test that looks for both blood and abnormal DNA in the stool. A positive result should be followed up with a definitive test.

There certainly is such a thing as a virtual colonoscopy. It is more properly termed "CT colonography," as it uses the CT scanner to take high-resolution pictures of the colon. It is not invasive in the sense that no instrument is inserted: however, the test still might be unpleasant. That is because, at

ANSWER: My personal experience with physician assistants is that they give excellent care. Several well-done studies have shown that the level of care provided by physician assistants (and nurse practitioners) is indistinguishable from care provided by MDs, with the exception that NPs and PAs tend to provide more health education and counseling, and may recommend smoking cessation more often.

Any clinician has a range of medical conditions he or she is competent to practice in. Physicians tend to have a broader range of expertise than most PAs and NPs (this is not universally the case, however). When directly supervised by a physician, the PA has the expertise of the physician immediately available.

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

Eagles soar past favored Pats to capture first title

MINNEAPOLIS The Philadelphia Eagles' flight from last to first ended up with a Lombardi Trophy.

In a record-setting shootout between Nick Foles and Tom Brady, the backup quarterback led a pressure-packed 75-yard drive to the winning touchdown, 11 yards to Zach Etrz with 2:21 to go Sunday night. Then a defense that had been shredded throughout the second half made two final stands to win 41-33.

Brandon Graham strip-sacked Brady and Derek Barnett recovered, setting up rookie Jake Elliot's 46-yard field goal for an 8-point lead.

Brady got his team to midfield, but his desperation pass fell to the ground in the end

The underdog Eagles (16-3), even injured starting quarterback Carson Wentz, came bolting off the sideline in ecstasy while Brady

sat on the ground, disconsolate.

It was the first Super Bowl title for Philadelphia (16-3), which went from 7-9 last season to the franchise's first NFL title since 1960.

Super Bowl MVP Foles orchestrated it with the kind of drive NFL MVP Brady, a five-time champion, is known for. The Eagles covered 75 yards on 14 plays and had to survive a video replay because Ertz had the ball pop into the air as he crossed the goal line.

The touchdown stood - and so did thousands of greenclad Eagles fans who weren't going to mind the frigid conditions outside US Bank Stadium once they headed out to celebrate.

But not before a rousing rendition of "Fly Eagles Fly" reverberated throughout the stands once the trophy was presented to owner Jeffrey Lurie. Later, fans danced along with the "Gonna Fly Now," the theme



Linebacker Edwin Jackson among 2 killed on highway

INDIANAPOLIS -Indianapolis Colts linebacker Edwin Jackson was one of two men killed early Sunday when a suspected drunken driver struck them as they stood outside their car along a highway in Indianapolis, the team and police said.

The Colts said in a statement Sunday that the team is "heartbroken" by Jackson's death and that the 26-year-old "was loved by all in the Colts organization."

State police identified the victims as Jackson, who grew up in Atlanta, and 54-year-old Jeffrey Monroe, of Avon, Indiana. Police say they were killed when a suspected drunken driver struck them as they stood outside their car along Interstate 70 on Indianapolis' west side.

Police said that it's believed that Monroe was a ride-sharing operator who was transporting Jackson when Jackson became ill. Monroe pulled over to the side of the highway and got out to help Jackson

when both were struck by a pickup truck that also hit Monroe's car, police said.

The pickup's driver, a 37-year-old Indianapolis man, tried to flee on foot but was quickly captured, State Police said. The man was believed to be intoxicated and was driving without a license, police

He was taken to the Marion County Jail, where blood-alcohol test results were pending.

The 6-foot, 234-pound Jackson attended Georgia Southern. He was signed by the Arizona Cardinals in May 2015 and released by the team about three months later. Jackson was signed to the Colts practice squad in December 2015 and then by the Colts to reserve/future contract in January 2016.

He was placed on injured reserve by the Colts last September.

The Colts said in their statement that they "admired" Jackson's "outgoing personality, competitive spirit and hard-working mentality."

WASHINGTON -Perseverance paid off the Alex Tuch and the Vegas Golden Knights.

Tuch scored the go-ahead goal with 5:12 remaining, and the Golden Knights defeated the Washington Capitals 4-3 Sunday in a matchup of division leaders.

Vegas rallied three times from one-goal deficits to beat Washington for the second time this season.

"We never gave up. I thought we played our best game in two weeks, I really did, even though we were behind most of the (day)," Golden Knights coach Gerard Gallant said. "It was only a one-goal lead every time, so we kept battling and we worked hard and that's something our team has done all year long."

On Tuch's shot from in close, Capitals goalie Philipp Grubauer tied to corral the loose puck, but knocked it into the net with his catching hand. Washington challenged the play for goaltender interference, but the goal stood.

Mannarino beats Haase to put France into quarterfinals

ALBERTVILLE, France – Adrian Mannarino sent defending champion France through to the quarterfinals of the Davis Cup, rallying from a set and 5-3 down Sunday to beat Robin Haase of the Netherlands 4-6, 7-6 (5), 7-5, 6-7 (2), 7-5 in a topsy-turvy World Group encounter.

After 4 hours, 20 minutes of an arduous contest featuring 34 break-point chances, Haase's miscued volley at net went out and gave Mannarino match point.

He took it following a brief rally when Haase failed to return a whipped forehand into his feet. Mannarino punched the air as the French team celebrated wildly and poured water over Mannarino's head.

The exhausted Haase walked straight off court having played 10 1/2 hours over three days.

France has an insurmountable 3-1 lead ahead of the final reverse singles later Sunday and plays Italy in the last eight in April.

The 25th-ranked Mannarino had more winners than Haase - 61 to 47 - but was wasteful in converting only four of his 26 break-point chances, while Haase took three of his eight. Mannarino had 21 aces to Haase's

Mannarino, a late replacement for the injured Lucas Pouille, made up for his upset defeat on Friday to

Thiemo de Bakker, ranked 369th. Richard Gasquet made it 1-1 by beating Haase, before Nicolas Mahut and Pierre-Hugues Herbert beat Haase and Jean-Julien Rojer on Saturday for a 2-1 lead for France.

Early on, Haase looked sharp against a cautious Mannarino.

Many big-name skaters headed to Winter Games for final time

Meagan Duhamel and Eric Radford are focused squarely on the Pyeongchang Olympics, where the pairs team from Canada will contend for a gold medal inside Gangneung Ice Arena in the next couple of weeks.

That hasn't stopped them from pondering what will happen afterward.

The 32-year-old Duhamel and 33-yearold Radford, two-time world champions, are under no pretenses that this isn't their final major competition. They may continue to compete after the Winter Games, and both have expressed an interest in exhibition skating, but South Korea will in many ways serve as an exclamation point on their impressive careers.

"As we've advanced in our career and become more experienced, and wiser - I think it's a cliche but the story of our careers is that anything is possible if you don't give up," Radford said. "You hear that all the time but we're an example of pure determination and hard work making success happen."

As the Olympics approach, Duhamel and Radford aren't the only figure skaters reflecting on their careers. Nor are they the only ones pondering what will come next after South Korea.

There's three-time world champion Patrick Chan of Canada and his teammate Keegan Messing, both of whom are likely participating in their last Olympics. Two-time world champ and reigning European champion Javier Fernandez of Spain, at 26 one of the gold medal favorites, also could be in his final games.

That's just the men's

competition.

While 15-year-old Russian Alina Zagitova stands at one end of the ladies' spectrum, there is 31-year-old Carolina Kostner at the other. The Italian is a former world champion, five-time European champ and a strong contender to land on the podium in her last Olympics.

Duhamel and Radford are among the pairs favorites along with two other established teams: Aliona Savchenko, who just turned 34, is a five-time world champion and will team with 29-year-old Bruno Massot to represent Germany; and 30-yearold Vanessa James and her partner, 26-year-old Morgan Cipres, give France a chance to land on the podium.

In ice dance, Canadian favorites Tessa Virtue and Scott Moir returned from a brief retirement to take another shot at gold. The 28-year-old Virtue and 30-year-old Moir stood atop the podium at the 2010 Vancouver Games, and then took silver four

years later at the Sochi Games.

"It's hard not to be sentimental at this point in our season and careers, when you're near the end," Virtue said. "This whole comeback process has been so fulfilling and rewarding. We're trying to embrace it all, the pressure and anxiety and stress that is building."

"This is the year we've been dreaming and thinking about for a long time," added Virtue, who along with Moir will carry Canada's flag into the opening ceremony. "It's here and it's imminent, so we're trying to remember this is such a privilege. We're in a fabulous position. We just have to embrace it all, the highs and lows, and be present for every step."

There is always turnover in figure skating, especially when top competitors are often teenagers who already have peaked by their early 20s. But often those stars flame out away from the Olympic ice, between cycles, and it can happen so quickly they are never

given a proper send-off. That's what makes

this year's Pyeongchang Olympics unique.

Sure, the sheer number of elite skaters approaching or surpassing 30 is noteworthy, but most of them have acknowledged this is their final major event. They have built worthy resumes that will no doubt be remembered for years, and for which fans in South Korea will no doubt applaud.

"I've really learned, if anything, to embrace every single day that I get the chance to come in and train and skate and do something I'm good at," Chan said, "and that feels great to do."

So what comes after skating?

Duhamel has always been interested in choreography and coaching, and would like to work for the International Skating Union as a technical specialist. Radford, her partner, likewise wants to become a technical specialist, and perhaps even work on the ISU's technical committee.

with 10 different teams, including the Montreal Expos. The portly right-hander has posted 21 career wins against Texas, the most by any pitcher.

A four-time All-Star, he won the 2005 AL Cy Young Award with the Angels.

Texas was 78-84 last year. Rangers pitchers and catchers are set to hold their first spring workout Feb. 15 in Surprise, Arizona.

Philly cops use hydraulic fluid on poles to deter climbers

PHILADELPHIA -While Philadelphia Eagles fans prepare for the Super Bowl, police are working to keep any victory celebrations firmly on the ground.

The Philadelphia Inquirer reports that police officers were out Sunday afternoon rolling hydraulic fluid onto light poles to keep celebrating fans from climbing them in case of an Eagles victory.

Officers who declined

to give their names reported greasing about 100 poles up and down Broad Street. They dubbed themselves the "Pole Patrol" rather than the earlier "Crisco Cops" that applied shortening that failed to stop some fans after the NFC championship victory.

Philadelphia's police commissioner earlier vowed a safe but effective alternative before the big game. He said police had to assure the safety of fans "as well as the people who they could fall down on."

Rob Gronkowski for 4 yards before Stephen Gostkowski's extra point gave New England its first lead, 33-32.

Then Foles made them forget Wentz – and least for now — with the gutsiest drive of his life,

including a fourth-down conversion to Ertz at midfield.

Foles has been something of a journeyman in his six pro seasons, but has been spectacular in four career playoff games. He finished 28 of 43 for 373 yards and three TDs.

The combined 1,151 yards were the most in any modern NFL game, and Brady's 505 were the most in any playoff contest. The 40-yearold master finished 28 of 48 and picked apart the Eagles until the final two series.

It was such a wild game that Foles caught a touchdown pass, and Brady was on the opposite end of a Danny Amendola throw that went off his

fingertips.

Eagles coach Doug Pederson brought home the championship in his second year in charge. Belichick is 5-3 in Super Bowls and his teams have only a plus-4 overall margin in those games.







"Wanted to end the game so we could go watch the Super Bowl," Celtics coach Brad Stevens said.

Stevens spoke while wearing a Patriots hat. He was joined by Eagles fan and Celtics player Marcus Morris, who sported an Eagles jersey.

"I called game when Al hit the turnaround, just so you know," Morris said.

Stevens smiled, adding: "Al feels a lot like Tom Brady today,

right?" Several jerseys for Brady and fellow Patriots star Rob Gronkowski were in the crowd at TD Garden. An Eagles fan

shown on the Jumbotron repeatedly got booed.

Horford wound up with 22 points and 10 rebounds, helping Boston win its fourth in a row.

"He (Stevens) had called a play for Jaylen (Brown) but they were ready for it so he kept yelling keep the ball, keep the ball," Horford said. "It's a shot I work on a lot and it felt good when it left my hands."

Horford hit a gamewinning shot with 3.7 seconds left against Houston earlier this season and also hit a buzzer-beater for Atlanta to beat Washington during the 2013-14 season

Damian Lillard shot just 6 for 19, but scored Portland's final eight points, including a 3-point play with 7.2 seconds remaining to give the Blazers a 96-95

C.J. McCollum led the Blazers with 22 points and Lillard added 21.

"They executed well down the stretch, made some tough shots," McCollum said. "Credit them for battling back and then down the

stretch they seemed to match every basket."

Boston trailed 85-79 with 5:37 to go before going on an 11-0 run, sparked by consecutive 3-pointers from Semi Ojeleye, Jayson Tatum and Horford.

Tatum had 17 points and Brown scored 16 for the Celtics.

"That shot epitomizes the work he puts in," Brown said. "He embraces those opportunities and steps up to the challenge."

Terry Rozier had with 11 points on 5-of-18 shooting after recording a triple-double and a career-high 31 points in his previous two games starting in place of Celtics guard Kyrie Irving.

Maryland uses late surge to beat Wisconsin 68-63

COLLEGE PARK, Md. – Anthony Cowan Jr. scored 23 points, Kevin Huerter added 19 and Maryland squeezed past Wisconsin 68-63 Sunday to stretch the Badgers' losing streak to five games.

The defeat ended Wisconsin's Big Tenrecord run of 17 straight winning seasons in conference play. Using a starting lineup that featured three freshmen and two juniors, the rebuilding Badgers (10-15, 3-9) rallied from a 10-point halftime deficit before fading.

Huerter's driving layup with 1:25 left put the Terrapins up 62-60. After a Wisconsin misfire on the other end, Huerter bounced a runner off the glass.

Brad Davison answered with a 3-pointer for the Badgers with 10.6 seconds left. Cowan then made two foul shots for a three-point cushion,

and Maryland's Dion Wiley sealed the victory by swatting away a layup try by Davison.

The Terrapins (16-9, 5-7) ended a three-game skid and won for only the second time in seven games.

Ethan Happ scored 18 points for Wisconsin, which has lost eight of nine. The Badgers are 1-8 on road, including 1-6 in the conference.

After being outscored 18-1 by Northwestern at the outset of Thursday night's game, Wisconsin flipped the script and bolted to an 18-11 lead.

Maryland went ahead with an 11-3 run, then scored the final 11 points of the first half to go up

The advantage stood up until Davison and Nate Reuvers each scored four points in an 11-2 spree that put Wisconsin on top with 9:42 remaining.

Maryland won despite 9-for-22 shooting in the second half.

and rhythm thing."

The Hawks rallied from a 93-87 deficit in the final 2:16.

Bazemore was wide open in the left corner and hit for a 98-96 lead. Tim Hardaway Jr. then stepped on the line trying to inbound, giving the ball back to Atlanta.

After Dewayne Dedmon made one of two foul shots, Hardaway missed a potential tying 3-pointer.

"We don't know how to finish games. We don't know how to win games at the end," Knicks star Kristaps Porzingis said. "We didn't close out the game strong again and another loss."

Bazemore led the Hawks with 19 points. Mike Muscala scored 15 and Taurean Prince had 13.

added 14, Jarrett Jack and Kyle O'Quinn each scored 11, and Enes Kanter finished with 10 points and 12 rebounds.

Muscala hit a 3-pointer with 46 seconds left to pull the Hawks within one. O'Quinn missed a shot on the Knicks' next possession and Bazemore followed with his go-ahead basket.

"A great win on the road," Hawks coach Mike Budenholzer said. "We got the stops late. We always talk about it being 48 minutes. Today it took all 48."
