CRA looks at downtown facelift

SEBRING — The Community Redevelopment Agency is looking at finding ways to give the downtown area a facelift.

Some features that affect the appearance of downtown Sebring are "beginning to look a little old," said Kristie Vazquez, Community Redevelopment Agency director, at a CRA board meeting Monday night.

One of the concerns voiced at the meeting involved maintaining landscaping, particularly on the Circle.

Board member Kelly Cosgrave said that at one time a Public Works employee was assigned the job of maintaining the landscaping. But, she said, that person may have moved on to other positions and a dedicated position may not exist.

Sebring City Councilman Charlie Lowrance said that some of the maintenance of the landscaping may have been affected by the extra work required following Hurricane Irma.

Another point of discussion was the light posts. Vazquez said the paint on the light posts is deteriorating.

She indicated that restoring the appearance of the light posts is something that the CRA will consider in the future.

Board member David Leidel said the board also needs to look at the brightness of the lighting as the downtown is dark at night.

The CRA also plans to look at the

SEBRING — Liz Barber has eight nonprofit groups confirmed to staff tasting booths at the upcoming Sebring Soda Festival, April 6-7.

Some of them, like Habitat for Humanity, will work two booths on the Sebring Circle, but not all. Barber would like to get 50 booths covered. The event has 200 varieties of craft soft drinks for visitors to sample and the more booths, the better.

"We'll have long lines otherwise, and no one likes long lines," Barber said to the Tourist Development Council at its monthly meeting Thursday.

The TDC has already budgeted \$20,000 in partnership to promote the event outside of Highlands County and provide entertainment. The band playing at the event will be the Moon Rays, a doo-wop band that has even played a birthday party for recording

'I let my family down'



A \$20 crack deal sent Alethia Jones to prison for life

A 12-year-old boy stood in the driveway begging his mother to stay home. His confused look still haunts Alethia Jones.

She had never found the strength to stifle the addict in her head. This July evening in 2004 would be no different.

Alethia climbed in her sister's green Buick and headed toward the Nancesowee Hotel, where a man they'd never met was waiting to buy drugs.

"My sister said roll with me one last time, and I promise I'll take you home," said Alethia. She never made it back.

Alethia was 40 years old when she sat in the passenger seat as her sister sold a small rock of crack cocaine to an undercover detective.

She is now serving a life sentence for her role in the \$20 drug deal.

Alethia's addiction stoked the lengthy criminal record that the state used to put her away. She'd been hooked on crack since the 1980s. She lost her leg in a stabbing over drugs at age 26 and burned through as much as \$700 a day to feed her habit.

With no option for appeal, Alethia now looks forward to the few times a year her grown children visit the state penitentiary. She prays for a day outside the razor fences.

"I let my family down," Alethia said. Based on Florida's formula for criminal punishment, Alethia's recommended sentence would have been three to 10 years behind bars.

But prosecutor Richard Castillo

pursued heightened penalties for dealing drugs within 1,000 feet of a church — a designated "drug-free zone" that enhances the severity of punishment. He painted her as a career criminal with no remorse.

An all-white jury agreed. The statistics show that throughout his career, Castillo has been harder on black defendants.

His office insists he has only been harder on people with longer records who committed more serious crimes.

A Herald-Tribune review of his 521 drug cases since 2004 shows he dropped far more against white defendants. He also helped to secure

sentences for black defendants that called for twice as much time behind bars.

No one was treated more harshly than Alethia.

Advocates for drug policy reform point to her case as an example of a broken system where punishment no longer fits the crime.

There are nearly 15,000 drug offenders housed at state correctional facilities. They represent almost a quarter of new admissions to Florida prisons, which cost \$2.4 billion a year to operate, according to the

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Local man critical after scooter accident

SEBRING — Octavio Aguiar, 74, of Sebring, was taken to Lakeland Regional Health Medical Center in critical condition Monday afternoon as a result of injuries from a motor scooter accident on State Road 66 near Markland Lane.

According to a Florida Highway Patrol press release, Aguiar was traveling west on SR 66 on

his 2012 Taota Scooter when for unknown reasons the vehicle left the roadway. Aguiar veered off to the right and lost control and the scooter overturned. Aguiar separated from the scooter and came to a rest on the north shoulder of SR 66, according to the press release. The scooter came to rest further west on the north shoulder.

The report did not indicate a rate of speed but did show that

Aguiar was not wearing a helmet. It is unknown if there was alcohol related to the accident and next of kin have been notified.

As of Feb. 26 there have been 171 crashes in Highlands County, 100 in January and 71 so far in February, according to Florida's Integrated Report Exchange Systems. There has been 152 injuries and five traffic fatalities.

Man accused of illegal contracting

SEBRING — A Lake Placid man was arrested after authorities said he repaired docks, but lacked a license, according to a warrant.

Christopher Lee Farquhar, 36, 534 Lake June Road, Lake Placid, was arrested by the Highlands County Sheriff's Office and charged with contracting without a license during a state of emergency.

The investigation of Farquhar began after Crime Stoppers received a tip that Farquhar was

repairing docks, despite that he lacked a license for contracting work.

Investigators warned Farquhar he couldn't continue repairing docks with out a license, the warrant said. But people told the Sheriff's Office that Farquhar was continuing to do work. The city of Sebring had issued a stop work order to prevent Farquhar from continuing to work on docks, the warrant said.

A Facebook page solicited dock jobs, despite Farquhar lacking a license, the warrant said.

Oak Manor gets meeting on paving

SEBRING — Oak Manor Drive residents will get a meeting with Road and Bridge Supervisor Kyle Green tonight, on the progress for their paved road.

Residents on a 0.13-mile of road have a meeting scheduled with Green at 5:30 p.m. at DeSoto City Community Center, 6305 County Road 17 S. They hope to work with Green on the details of getting their shell road paved, a project approved by the Board of County Commission last year, but still not started.

According to emails between Green and resident representative Santos de la Rosa, Green is looking for consensus among the property owners on the road who agree to participate in the assessment for the project, a breakdown

of how much it will cost each property owner, a tentative construction timeline and funding options, including options for an assessment among the property owners.

Green has estimated the project at \$70,000, including administrative costs.

De la Rosa first made a request for road paving more than 10 years ago.

Last April, then-commission chair Don Elwell said De la Rosa's request "kind of started the whole issue of having a written policy in place," meeting minutes stated. Elwell then asked Green to get the project underway without a written policy.

County commissioners agreed in July 2016 to pay half of the then-\$40,000 estimated paving costs, and find a way to assess the dozen or so residents on the road for their half,

perhaps through taxes over the next 10 years.

From July 2016 and April 2017, however, De la Rosa said he didn't hear from Green. The county commission then told Green in 2017 to get an estimate and paperwork together and get back to the residents quickly to set up an assessment.

Meanwhile, they had Green working on a definitive policy to get roads paved throughout the county.

On May 16, 2017, commissioners voted 4-1, with Commissioner Greg Harris dissenting, to have property owners participate at 50 percent, with costs not to exceed \$70,000. The cost included interest and costs to set up a special district.

Florida's poor record on mental health is showing

The Parkland school shooting that left 17 students and faculty dead has pushed the topic of mental health to the forefront once again.

Nikolas Cruz, a former Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School student, was able to take his high-powered gun onto school grounds and open fire. He did this despite numerous red flags that something was not right in his world.

He slipped under the radar — and there are numerous fingers to point as to why.

The bottom line, however, is Cruz and thousands of others need help. And they're not getting it.

Florida's school safety budget was slightly more than \$75 million annually before the recession. It dropped to \$67 million in Charlie Crist's final year as governor, and then to \$64.5 million in Rick Scott's first budget of 2011-12. It remains that amount today.

That is money that could be allocated for hardening schools and hiring more school resource officers. But, it could also bring more mental health professionals into school to watch for signs that would hint of trouble ahead.

"We have one psychologist for every 1,800 students and one guidance counselor for every 400 students," Charlotte County Schools spokesman Mike Riley said in a recent Sun story.

And that's no nearly enough.

But the problem goes much deeper than schools.

Sun reporter Anne Easker recently wrote that from 2016 to 2017, mental health services at the Charlotte County Jail increased by 40 percent, according to its annual report. Inmates received 7,505 mental health services, compared to just 5,099 in 2016.

"More and more people are coming into jail self-reporting histories of mental health diagnoses and medication use," said Martha Harbin, a spokesperson for Corizon Health, the jail's medical provider. More and more people are jailed and reporting histories of mental health diagnoses and medication use.

In addition to counseling by Corizon's licensed mental health counselors, another 575 psychiatric exams took place at the jail last year, up from 548 in 2016.

Charlotte County Behavioral Health has met with some success with its Community Action Team program that serves Charlotte, DeSoto and parts of Lee counties. The program — which is funded year to year by the Legislature — tries to intervene with those with mental health issues before the problem escalates.

The program gives youth ages 11 to 21 access to in-home professional care for a variety of mental health issues, including bi-polar, depression and suicidal thoughts. Plans called for the program to service up to 60 children over the course of a year.

Mental health has been a priority at the jail after two different inmates died by suicide, jumping from the top tier of their pods onto the concrete floor below. To combat similar incidents, the jail recently completed a mesh fence around the top tier, making it impossible for inmates to jump off.

There were 12 suicide attempts the jail in 2017, but none were successful.

And, at the end of March, the jail will also open its new infirmary, with space dedicated specifically for inmates with mental illness.

Florida ranks 47th in the nation for per-capita spending on mental health.

It's time that shameful statistic is addressed.

While I feel sorry for them, it reminds me of why we do not allow crime victim's families to select the punishment for their family member's assailants.

These are children, children who have survived and witnessed the slaughter of other children; their friends, their neighbors, their teammates. What's worse is this experience occurred in a school, a place where no child should have to feel on guard.

It is not surprising that their response lacks rationale. An emotional reaction to such an event is only natural, but we do not legislate our emotions. When we are angry, we often misdirect our anger.

Similarly, when someone's family member is hit and killed by a drunk driver, one may feel inclined to attack the alcohol industry, or even the automobile industry. They could proclaim that too many people die each year from cars.

While acknowledging that there are many responsible car owners, they may argue that it would be better to outlaw cars even if it prevented just one more death? The same

argument could be made against alcohol.

The problem with that mentality is that it places the blame for the tragedy on an inanimate object. Blaming inanimate objects defies logic. Left alone there are thousands, nay, millions of guns sitting on shelves, in safes, and in holsters all over the United States right now, not going off. Just as it takes a driver of a car to strike a pedestrian or another car, it takes an evil person to shoot a gun at another person.

If we allow guns to be the scapegoat, and assign them the role of the whipping boy, we will allow the true culprit to go free, the problem will go unsolved, and history will repeat itself.

It was truly shocking to discover a sheriff's deputy was on scene during the shooting. I have yet to come across a law enforcement officer that I would describe as a coward.

As a volunteer firefighter I have had the honor of working side by side law enforcement while responding to calls. The officers I have met in this county wouldn't hesitate charging into the school and terminating a threat like that in a heartbeat.

Failing to even attempt to stop the shooter would be akin to a firefighter sitting back and watching a house burn down. The deputy's flagrant dereliction of duty makes this story even more gut-wrenchingly outrageous.

What went wrong in Parkland was a massive failure on behalf of the FBI, and in this case their failure had tragically dire consequences.

What also went wrong was cowardice on the part of Deputy Peterson of the Broward County Sheriff's Office.

To some this answer is unsatisfactory, it seems too simplistic, or it fails to allay their confirmation bias. Instead of looking at each shooting as a unique situation, radical ideologues trot

out their agenda, to blame guns.

What if assault rifles were banned, would that change someone's desire to murder?

Look to history for the answer, there was an assault rifle ban in the 1990s, gun violence did not wane, it in fact ticked upward. Why let history repeat itself?

There is nothing wrong with asking the question whether a tragedy is attributable to firearm legislation (or lack thereof), but be prepared if the answer is no.

Freedom and liberty are powerful, they can be used to spread wealth, health, and prosperity or to perpetuate unthinkable evil. Many brave Americans have given their life to protect these great bastions of our society.

Having an armed individual at a school, especially if there have been recent threats, is something that could be done immediately, like tomorrow. One innocent person with a gun is all it takes to stop an evil one.

The answer should be more freedom, more liberty, not less. Allow teachers and/or administrators to protect our children. Right now, we already have gun laws, we have gun restrictions, schools are designated as "gun-free zones", obviously that doesn't work.

Gun-free zones restrict the liberty of the law abiding. Why not expand their liberty? Unshackle those who are willing and able to protect our children in school. Liberty matched with courage yields heroism. Let us give the heroes a fighting chance.

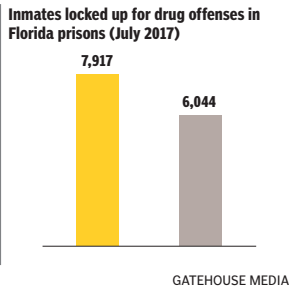
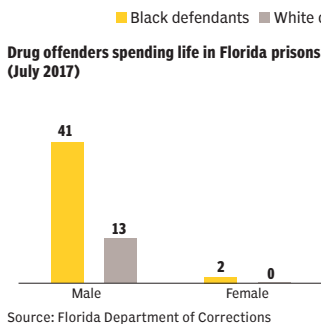

Florida Department of Corrections. That includes 56 drug offenders, like Alethia, who will remain in lockup for life. More than three-quarters are black. The prosecutor's office for Florida's 10th Circuit declined requests for interviews for this story. But in a written statement, Assistant State Attorney Jacob Orr defended Castillo's prosecutorial fairness, pointed to the judge's discretion in sentencing, and said prosecutors in his office would have "proceeded differently" if Alethia's case came before them today.

In response to questions from the newspaper, the State Attorney's Office initiated an internal audit of Castillo's drug prosecutions. "Assistant State Attorneys must analyze each prosecution on a case by case basis," Orr wrote in the email. "Our charge is to seek justice, taking into account all relevant factors and potential outcomes. Race is not a relevant factor to a prosecutor's decision making process. The

State Attorney's Office for the 10th Judicial Circuit strives to treat each defendant fairly based on the facts of their case, their prior record, the injury to the victim, the impact on the community, and the future protection of the citizens of the 10th Circuit, regardless of the race of the defendant."

Alethia has long acknowledged her struggles with addiction. Courts have sentenced her to probation, house arrest, jail and prison. But she's never been to drug rehabilitation or received the kind of substance abuse treatment the state offers to other offenders.

She will spend the rest of her life at Lowell Correctional Institute, a women's prison just north of Ocala, at a cost of about \$20,000 per year — or as much as \$1.2

million if she lives to the age of 90.

With no chance for parole, a pardon from the governor is her only way out.

"It's just one of the many examples of a drug policy that's not serving its initial purpose," said Raymer Maguire, manager for the Florida Campaign for Criminal Justice Reform, founded by the American Civil Liberties Union and the Southern Poverty Law Center.

"These were created to address the most serious dealers and traffickers. But now, we are locking away people like Alethia, who were caught with very small amounts of drugs, to decades or sometimes life in prison."

curbing around the Circle. Some of that has also deteriorated over time, Vazquez said.

The CRA is also looking at outdoor seating for people wanting to dine downtown and some sort of a stage area in Circle Park for performances.

Vazquez said one consideration is possibly relocating the veterans

memorials to another area in the Circle to reallocate space.

The board is looking at various options for the downtown dining area including tables covered by umbrellas.

In other matters, board members indicated no immediate action to push forward the long-stalled dog park proposal. The CRA had hoped to get a grant to build the dog park on city-owned property, but that fell through. Vazquez will continue looking for

another grant.

The CRA also has dropped a proposed drainage project for Washington Heights, Vazquez said. The project had been on hold for years because of difficulty in obtaining some land that was a necessary component.

However, Vazquez has been told other projects have eliminated the necessity of the work.

The CRA will address other concerns that may arise in the Washington Heights area, she said.

The event will also have celebrity mixologist Brenda Terry do a cocktail demonstration and food pairings at the Pop & Fizz Cocktail Pairing Party after the day event: 6-9 p.m. at the Jack Stroup Civic Center.

Ruman is ready to race

2-time Trans Am champion seeking return to top spot

Amy Ruman has been a model of consistency in the Trans Am series, having finished in the top of the season standings since 2011. Included in that is back-to-back championships in 2015 and 2016, in which she became the first female professional road racing champion in the United

States.

After winning her two championships, her third-place finish isn't sitting real well and she's determined to return to the top spot in the TA class — Trans Am's top class — in 2018.

"Last year was a lot of ups and downs," Ruman said. "We re-bodied the car and struggled with setups."

Ruman was also taken

out of several races by overzealous competitors — the price you end up paying when you have a bull's eye on your back after winning two consecutive titles.

"We had some tough breaks," she said. "I think this year might be different."

Ernie Francis Jr. ran away with the title last year, having a season similar to Ruman's 2015

campaign when she won eight races. So she knows how difficult it is to have back-to-back seasons where pretty much everything goes right.

But Ruman also said it's good for the series when somebody like Francis has a banner year.

"He's an up-and-coming driver and it sheds

"Dhruv played well today in singles and doubles," said Sebring boys tennis coach Ryan Myhre. "His game style is maturing and he's learning how to build points and rely on his solid first serves to find ways to win points. Pranav

maintained his composure and overcame some inconsistency to get the win. Our number three player Rohin Patel was out today due to a lower back strain, which allowed Gavin Szoka to move up to play number three singles and he came away with a dominating performance by controlling the points with big serves and a solid attacking style."

Sebring's Trace Lackey won the No. 4 singles match over Blaine Austin by scores of 6-1, 6-0, while Yoan Amaro cruised to victory at No. 5 singles over Reshoun Ngafdoon by scores of 6-0, 6-0.

"Trace dominated his opponent with consistent play from the baseline and net," Myhre said.

A slugfest is predicted for Ross Barnett Open

RIDGELAND, Miss. — Unseasonably warm weather in central Mississippi is creating an ideal scenario for what most excites bass fishermen, just in time for the first Bass Pro Shops Bassmaster Central Open on Ross Barnett Reservoir.

"The tournament is setting up to be a slugfest and in the best of ways," said Mississippian Brock Mosley, among a contingent of 360 anglers eager to compete in the B.A.S.S. event.

The tournament begins March 1 and concludes March 3, during what should be late winter in the South. Instead, record daytime high temperatures and excess rainfall are moving big bass into shallow water. The warmer it gets, the better the bass bite.

"Rarely in February do we have 80-degree days that make it more like springtime fishing conditions right now," added Mosley, 29, a Bassmaster Elite Series pro who grew up fishing the lake. "The lake is fishing really well from end to end, and the largemouth already are in prespawn patterns."

Mosley validated his claim by referring to a recent single-day tournament whose winner caught 21 pounds. For the Open event, he predicted the winner should average 18 pounds each of the three days. A trophy bass heavier than 10 pounds is possible.

Coincidentally, 54 pounds won the last Ross Barnett Open held in March 2015. That tournament also occurred under prespawn conditions.

"Everyone will be able to choose what technique best suits their style of fishing, it's just that good right now," explained Mosley. "Plus, the lake should fish really well from end to end."

That will be good news with 180 boats set to compete on the 32,000-acre fishery. With an average depth of 12 feet, shallow-water fishing strategies will come into play.

Key main-lake areas will be narrow creek channels leading to expansive underwater flats covered in aquatic vegetation. Those areas favor prime habitat for spawning bass. A year-round population of largemouth also exists in the Pearl River, where Dustin Connell won a Bassmaster Elite Series event last April.

Another consideration is the lunar phase favorable to spawning activity. The full moon occurs on March 2. Mosley predicted that could jumpstart a migration of largemouth into shallow water.

"That will come down to being in the right place at the right time," he explained. "There are a lot of local anglers in the tournament who will know where to be under those conditions."

Ross Barnett had a strong connection to B.A.S.S., even before Ray Scott founded the organization 50 years ago. In 1967, Scott was rained out of a weekend fishing trip at Ross Barnett, where in his motel room he thought of a momentous idea — elevating

It's a commonly used phrase, for sure, but for Sean Rayhall, who recently joined 3GT Racing to drive

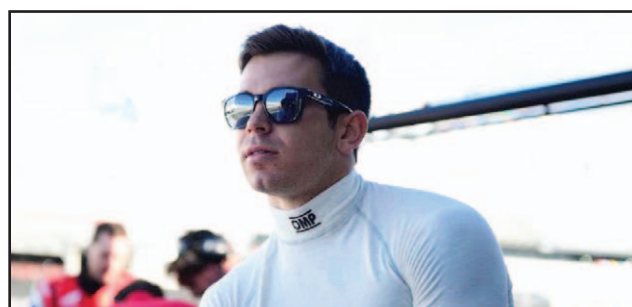

some light on the series," she said.

driving career to a close at the Rolex 24.

"It came about, sure enough, our trailer was parked next to Gentilozzi's trailer and he came up to me after the race," Rayhall explains. "We got to chatting and he said, 'Are you signed for the rest of the NAEC?' I said, 'No. I think HART wants me, but I'm not really sure what the deal is.' He said, 'Don't sign anything.' I was like, 'All right. Why?' He said, 'I'll give you a call this week.'"

"He gave me a call on Wednesday, had a small talk, and Monday we did a deal. It's pretty funny how it was just kind of right place, right time. I don't even know if our trailers weren't parked together if that would have happened. It's kind of out of sight,

out of mind, but being back in the IMSA paddock has been good to me so far, obviously. I'm just really fortunate to be back here."

Rayhall is one of the most successful racers to come through the IMSA Prototype Challenge Presented by Mazda, parlaying a 2013 title into a full-season ride WeatherTech Championship ride in the Prototype Challenge (PC) class in 2014. Since then, Rayhall has driven the DeltaWing in the WeatherTech Championship Prototype class, and won the 2017 LMP3 championship in the European Le Mans Series (ELMS).

Rayhall thinks his performance in the 2014 season — two wins, two pole positions and podium results in half of that year's races — also played a role. Among the drivers he competed against that season was Hawksworth, who was driving for Gentilozzi's team.

2 doubles with a 6-0, 6-0 blanking of Austin and Ngafdook.

"Auburndale graduated a number of seniors last year and came to Sebring with an entirely new and young team," Myhre said. "Our guys played well and are working hard to improve."

1. Harvick's house

Kevin Harvick has dominated Atlanta Motor Speedway for five years, but scored only his second career victory there Sunday. His first win there was a few weeks after replacing Dale Earnhardt early in the 2001 season. Sunday, he led 181 of 325 laps, including the final 25.

2. Earnhardt tribute

After winning Sunday, Harvick slow-rolled his No. 4 Ford past the grandstand holding three fingers out the window in tribute to Earnhardt. The No. 3 (Earnhardt's car number)

won the Daytona opener, and Harvick got his second win at Atlanta. "It's just how it's meant to be," Harvick said.

3. Fords rebound

Team Ford went to Daytona with high expectations, but left without the big trophy. At Atlanta, Ford drivers swept the top-three finishing positions and led the most laps. "Yeah, we looked pretty good, but Atlanta is a unique beast," Ford driver Joey Logano said. "There's only one Atlanta."

DAR sees wedding dresses of the decades

During their annual spring luncheon on Feb. 24 at the Chateau Elan, the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) learned about each decade of American history starting with the 1860s until the present. Their guest speaker, Leigh Ann Brown, presented the history lesson by showing a beautiful vintage wedding gown that represented a typical gown worn by women during that decade. As she described the gown, she described the political and social events that occurred during that time period. She also discussed the changing roles of women since the Civil War.

The Civil War was a great catalyst for change. All of the available men, ages 16 and up, were sent to fight in the war. Women were left behind and forced to figure out

how to run the family farm or business on their own. Brown stated, "After the Civil War, women began to ask, 'Why is it that only my son

to be independent.

Brown pointed to a blue wedding dress and asked the crowd, "What was the most common color for a wedding dress?" To give the crowd a hint, she reminded them of the old adage "something borrowed, something blue." Throughout history, most women wore blue because it represented purity and fidelity, and they could not have afforded a one-time use white dress.

By the early 1900s, as women became more educated and were holding jobs, they began to have money for white wedding dresses. In the Edwardian era, the material became more light and fine.

During the 1910s, women became involved in the suffrage movement, and some of their dresses reflected a more business-like style. Wedding styles changed drastically during the 1920s as women embraced the flapper-style dresses and growing economic and social freedom.

The economic distress of the Great Depression caused many women to embrace practicality, and as a result, many of the blue wedding dresses returned. Fast forward to the 1980s and the economic boom, and women were throwing big wedding extravaganzas. Instead of a blue dress for practicality, women were spending tens of thousands of dollars on wedding events. Women's success in the workplace allowed them to spend more freely.

Today's wedding dresses reflect the economic freedom women are now experiencing. Brown stated, "Twenty-first century brides can be anything. The world is wide open to them."

Companies face mounting pressure to pick sides in gun debate

NEW YORK — As the gun debate heats up following the massacre at a Florida high school, companies are under growing pressure to pick a side: whether to stand by the National Rifle Association or walk away.

Metlife, Delta and more than a dozen others have decided to end benefits deals offered to the organization's members. Others, including FedEx, are staying put. The decision to stay or go for many companies involves walking a fine line that can impact their image for better or worse.

"How well can they position themselves so that they're being viewed as honest and supportive of what is a national crisis and not walking away from the Second Amendment?" said Robert Passikoff, president of Brand Keys, a consumer research firm.

The calls for boycotts have been cutting both ways, with gun rights and gun-control supporters threatening to take their dollars elsewhere, depending on a company's decision.

FedEx is the latest company to respond to consumer

pressure, saying it will maintain its discount for NRA members and supports the right to own firearms, but does not believe civilians should own assault rifles.

That response shows the nuances many companies are dealing with in the current debate over guns. Several other companies have also affirmed support for gun rights, but decided to cut ties with the NRA over its positions. Over the weekend, Delta said it would end its discount rates deal for NRA members' group travel and requested it be removed from the organization's website. But, it also said it continues to support the Second Amendment.

Delta's balancing act in particular sparked a harsh response from Georgia's Republican Lt. Gov. Casey Cagle. He threatened to use his position to derail the \$38 million-per-year sales tax exemption on jet fuel that would primarily benefit Delta Air Lines, calling it an attack on conservatives. Delta is based in Atlanta.

The NRA has also pushed back, calling the departure of its corporate partners a "shameful display of political and civic cowardice."

Other companies that have cut ties with the NRA

include First National Bank of Omaha, Hertz, Avis, Budget, Enterprise, Best Western, Wyndham, United Airlines, Chubb, and Starkey Hearing Technology. Still, many others have maintained their relationship, including FedEx and the less-well-known Hotel Planner and eHealth.

The decisions come during an uptick in consumer activism, fueled by social media empowering more people to voice their opinions and values. Companies have become more aware of public sentiment that can be amplified over Twitter and other platforms.

That activist consumer atmosphere — coupled with the Feb. 14 Parkland, Florida, school massacre and the always heated gun-control debate — make this a potentially tricky situation for companies looking to protect their image and bottom line.

"It's a different communication paradigm than it was five years ago and that's the thing," Passikoff said. "The sense of immediacy has increased."

The boycott movement is not just about image. Companies have to take into account their other constituents, particularly shareholders and whether ties to the

NRA will have any impact on their financial performance.

Elliot H. Lutzker, chair of the corporate law practice group at Davidoff Hatcher & Citron LLP, said the boycott movement may have little impact on companies financially. Several of the hospitality firms that have cut ties can figure out just how much of an impact cutting a discount benefit will have and act accordingly.

"It's really a question of fiduciary duty," he said.

The real power lies with credit cards and media companies, he said. Specifically in allowing or blocking purchases of firearms and NRA advertisements.

So far, credit card companies have resisted calls by some consumers to limit their cards' use to purchase guns. Visa said it strives to make its payment services available to everyone within the confines of national and international laws.

"We do not prohibit transactions on our network for the purchase or sale of lawful products and services, including guns in the United States," the company said in a statement. Other credit card companies did not respond to requests for comment.

Manafort's case saddled by side issues, disputes with judge

WASHINGTON — U.S. District Judge Amy Berman Jackson was not amused.

A lawyer for Paul Manafort, the former campaign chairman for President Donald Trump, was trying to justify the multimillion-dollar value of his client's home as part of a bail package. Rather than producing tax assessment or property records, the lawyer submitted to the judge a printout from Zillow, the online real estate website.

"Zillow is actually considered to be pretty accurate, Your Honor," said Kevin Downing, Manafort's attorney. Jackson swatted that aside, insisting she needed "something, some piece of paper beyond just what I got."

On many days, the high-profile, high-stakes prosecution of Manafort — a case already outside the central election-meddling focus of special counsel Robert Mueller's Russia investigation — is

mired in side issues that have left the judge exasperated.

Whatever Manafort's strategy, his team's efforts appear largely reflective of the former international consultant's frustration with what he sees as an out-of-control prosecution — and

a burdensome house arrest from which his attorneys, despite several attempts, have been unable to free him. The halting pace of the case in Washington is about to face another obstacle: With new charges filed in Virginia, Manafort is now going to have to balance a wholly separate case with a different judge and possibly another trial.

Lawyer Downing and Judge Jackson have clashed over the attorney's provocative public statements, Manafort's own ghostwritten opinion piece in Ukraine and even the format of the court filings submitted by the defense. There were also weeks of requests by Rick Gates, Manafort's recently flipped co-defendant, to attend his children's sporting events, disputes over his involvement in a friend's fundraisers and multiple defense lawyer substitutions.

"We've been dealing with the minutiae of bond and soccer practice and

Report: Anti-Semitic incidents soar by 57 percent in 2017

The Anti-Defamation League is reporting a 57 percent increase in anti-Semitic incidents in the U.S. last year, the highest tally that the Jewish civil rights group has counted in more than two decades, according to data it released Tuesday.

The New York City-based organization found 1,986 anti-Semitic incidents last year, up from 1,267 in 2016. That's the highest total since 1994 and the largest single-year increase since the group began collecting this data in 1979.

The ADL said the sharp rise includes 952 vandalism incidents, an increase of 86 percent from 2016. The group also counted 1,015 incidents of harassment, a 41 percent increase from 2016.

ADL national director and CEO Jonathan Greenblatt said the "alarming" increase appears to be fueled by emboldened far-right extremists as well as the "divisive state of our national discourse."

"Less civility has led to more intolerance," he told The Associated Press.

Greenblatt also acknowledged that heightened awareness of the problem likely led to increased

reporting of anti-Semitic incidents.

Anti-Semitic incidents at schools and on college campuses nearly doubled for the second year in a row, with 457 such incidents reported in non-Jewish schools last year, the ADL report says.

"We should see this as an alarm, a very loud alarm that should get the attention of all of us," Greenblatt said.

The ADL and other groups have reported a surge in the number of incidents in which far-right extremist groups have posted racist and anti-Semitic fliers on college campuses. ADL

spokesman Todd Gutnick said the report's tally only counts incidents in which fliers had explicitly anti-Semitic messages.

The ADL also counted 19 anti-Semitic physical assaults last year, a 47 percent decrease from 2016.

The harassment incidents included 169 bomb threats against Jewish institutions, nearly all of them by two men. The ADL report said more than 150 bomb threats against Jewish community centers and day schools last year were allegedly made by an 18-year-old Israeli-American Jewish hacker, who was arrested in Israel last March. Separately, a

former journalist from St. Louis pleaded guilty to making a string of fake bomb threats to Jewish organizations last year in the name of his ex-girlfriend in an effort to disrupt her life.

In a note about its methodology, the group said, "ADL is careful to not conflate general criticism of Israel or anti-Israel activism with anti-Semitism. However, Israel-related harassment of groups or individuals may be included when the harassment incorporates traditional anti-Jewish references, accusations and conspiracy theories. Also

Kushner's security clearance downgraded per Kelly policy

WASHINGTON — The security clearance of White House senior adviser Jared Kushner, President Donald Trump's son-in-law, has been downgraded, according to two people informed of the decision.

Kushner had been operating with an interim clearance at the "top secret/sensitive compartmented information" level for more than a year. Now he is only authorized to access

information at the lower "secret" level, according to a White House official and a person familiar with the decision, both of whom spoke on condition of anonymity. Neither source was authorized to discuss the decision publicly.

Chief of staff John Kelly ordered that White House officials with interim clearances pending since before June 1, 2017, lose their access to the nation's deepest secrets if they hadn't received permanent clearances by last Friday. A White House official confirmed

to The Associated Press that Kelly's order has been implemented.

Trump could have reversed Kelly's decision and unilaterally offered Kushner a clearance, but deferred to Kelly.

"I will let General Kelly make that decision and he's going to do what's right for the country and I have no doubt he'll make the right decision," Trump said Friday, when he addressed the security clearance issue for the first time.

Kushner's attorney told the AP that Kushner's

ability to do his job won't be affected by any change to his clearance.

"Those involved in the process again have confirmed that there are dozens of people at Mr. Kushner's level whose process is delayed, that it is not uncommon for these clearance reviews to take this long in a new administration, and that the current backlogs are now being addressed," said Peter Mirijanian, a Kushner spokesman.

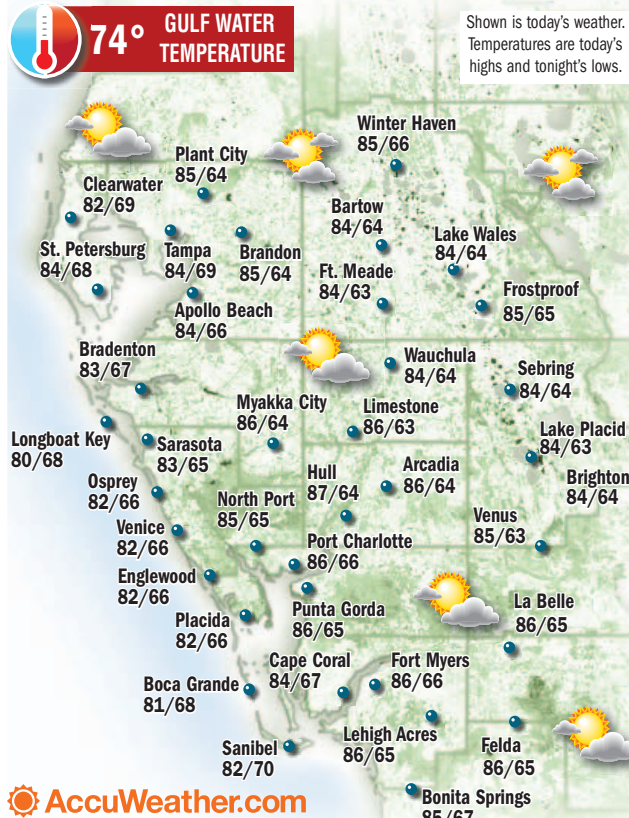

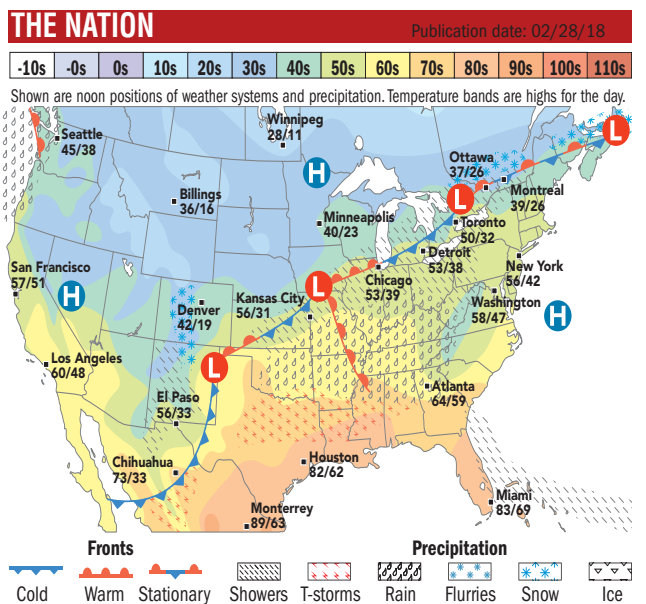

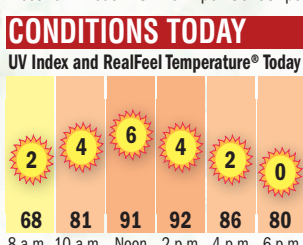

Trump names campaign manager for re-election bid

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump never stopped campaigning after winning the White House and now he's making fresh moves to establish his re-election effort.

The president on Tuesday named former digital adviser Brad Parscale as campaign manager for his 2020 election bid, a sign he is prioritizing loyalty as he works to secure his own political future in what is shaping up to be a bruising midterm election cycle for the GOP. The rise of Parscale, largely unknown in politics until just two years ago, has been inextricably linked to Trump's own political success.

In a statement, the Trump campaign said Parscale will lead "advanced planning" for the 2020 effort, and that the campaign also will be engaged in the midterm elections.

But the announcement turned heads on Capitol Hill, where Republicans have been lobbying the president for months to keep focused on the November 2018 contests — with leaders and political aides warning Trump that Democrats could gain subpoena power over his administration if Republicans lose the House or Senate.

The campaign also announced that former deputy campaign manager Michael Glassner will serve as chief operating officer, while the president's daughter-in-law, Lara Trump, will serve as senior adviser.

Trump, whose poll numbers have lagged recent predecessors, has left little doubt about his intention to seek re-election. He filed the paperwork to organize his re-election committee on Inauguration Day, held his first campaign rally on Feb. 18, 2017, and has mused publicly about potential Democratic challengers.

Parscale has long been close with the Trump family, a priority for the president as he begins planning his re-election strategy, according to a person familiar with campaign planning but not authorized to speak publicly about private discussions.

The Austin-based digital consultant, an ally of Trump son-in-law and senior adviser Jared Kushner, ran the Trump campaign's digital operations in 2016, which included sophisticated social media targeting.

Trump reaches deal with Boeing on new presidential planes

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump has reached an informal deal with Boeing to provide the next generation of presidential aircraft, the White House says.

Deputy press secretary Hogan Gidley said Tuesday that the president negotiated a \$3.9 billion "fixed price contract" for the new planes, known as Air Force One when the president is on board. It follows years of negotiations between Boeing and the U.S. Air Force — and Trump's personal intervention since his election.

In December 2016, Trump tweeted that costs for the program were "out of control, more than \$4 billion," he added. "Cancel order!"

The White House now says the original cost estimate was actually over \$5 billion for the two airplanes and development program.

Boeing chief executive Dennis Muilenburg met multiple times with Trump to discuss the Air Force One contract, most recently last week.

Gidley said the agreement would save the taxpayers more than \$1.4 billion.

Boeing, in a statement, said it is "proud to build the next generation of Air Force One, providing American Presidents with a flying White House at outstanding value to taxpayers."

"President Trump negotiated a good deal on behalf of the American people," they said.

The agreement includes the two 747-800 aircraft, and the cost of modifying the commercial planes with the equipment needed to support the president, including external stair, large galleys and a secure communications suite.

House GOP leaders dismiss Trump plan to arm teachers

WASHINGTON — House Republicans declined Tuesday to sign onto President Donald Trump's proposal for a federal mandate to arm teachers in the wake of the Florida school massacre, and also made clear their aim is to oppose further restrictions on guns.

House Speaker Paul D. Ryan, R-Wis., speaking as Congress returned from a long break after the Feb. 14 killing of 17 students and teachers by a former student armed with an AR-15 rifle, said decisions about teachers' use of weapons should rest with local authorities.

"That is really a question for local governments, local

school boards," he said of the proposal to arm educators, which Trump repeatedly has promoted since last week.

"As a parent myself and as a citizen, I think it's a good idea. But as speaker of the House, we should respect federalism and respect local jurisdictions."

Ryan instead cited "system failures" and mental health issues as "the kinds of things we are going to be discussing with our members, with the Senate and with the president." He did not include gun restrictions in that list.

"There are a lot of questions that need answers," Ryan added. "What we want to do is find common ground to make a difference."

The day's events suggested an election-year struggle for House and

Senate Republicans — how to confront rising national support for gun restrictions, and the powerfully emotional testimony of the high school victims, without reversing their long support for expansive gun rights.

Teenage survivors of the shooting at Marjorie Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Fla., have led a dramatic public fight to expand background checks before guns can be purchased and to limit the availability of semiautomatic weapons such as the one used by 19-year-old Nikolas Cruz. But Ryan and other leaders made clear that congressional Republicans consider local law officials' handling of warnings about Cruz to be their prime focus.

"There was a colossal colluded with the Russian government."

Among those who heard the message was the judge, who three days later scolded the lawyers.

"This is a criminal trial, and it is not a public relations campaign," she said in the first of a series of tense courtroom encounters. "So I want to make it clear, from this point on, that I expect counsel to do their talking in this courtroom and in their pleadings, and not on the courthouse steps."

Just weeks later, the issue arose again when prosecutors revealed that Manafort, from the confines of house arrest, had helped ghostwrite an opinion piece on his foreign consulting that was slated to be published in an English-language newspaper in Ukraine. Compounding the problem, the government said that one of Manafort's collaborators was believed to have ties to Russian intelligence.

Though prosecutors said Downing had assured them he'd take steps to prevent publication, the lawyer insisted

breakdown in the system locally," Ryan said, citing Cruz's run-ins with law enforcement and the FBI's failure to investigate after its tip line received detailed allegations that he might be planning a mass shooting.

"Of course we want to listen to these kids, but we also want to make sure that we protect people's due process rights and legal constitutional rights while making sure that people who should not get guns don't get them."

Trump last week also proposed raising the minimum age for purchasing long guns from 18 to 21. But after a weekend meeting with several executives of the National Rifle Association, he has dropped that proposal for a federal age minimum,

which the organization opposes, from his public remarks. His spokeswoman, Sarah Huckabee Sanders, suggested Monday that its fate was up in the air.

The president has persisted in pushing for legislation encouraging the arming of teachers, which the NRA supports, though it has generated opposition from teachers, law enforcement officials and politicians of both parties.

Trump said that while teachers should not be forced to carry weapons, those who are "adept" at shooting should — and should be eligible for bonuses if they do. Addressing wary governors this week, he said the federal government could help pay for bonuses.

public relations and people changing their minds about where they want to live and unsettled questions concerning representation since October, and it's unacceptable," Jackson recently said, lamenting to lawyers that they hadn't yet set a trial date.

Separately, as the pre-trial doings proceed, Manafort is suing special counsel Mueller, accusing him of overstepping by indicting him for conduct "unmoored" from the Russian interference. Manafort is accused of acting as an unregistered foreign agent and orchestrating an international money laundering conspiracy to hide millions of dollars he earned from his foreign political work in eastern Europe.

Manafort spokesman Jason Maloni took more shots at the prosecution's fairness last week, suggesting its tactics violated Manafort's constitutional rights. And after Gates' guilty plea, Manafort himself waded into the

debate despite Jackson's gag order, maintaining his innocence against "untrue piled-up charges."

Attacking the prosecution is common in cases like this, but former Justice Department prosecutor David Weinstein said judges shouldn't be antagonized.

"If you continue to thumb your nose at the system itself," he said, "that's going to have a negative effect on the way the judge treats any statements you make."

Downing did not return a message seeking comment. Maloni declined comment.

Tensions surfaced from the first court appearance last October, when Downing, a former Justice Department lawyer and an imposing courtroom presence with pinstripe suits and well-coiffed hair, exited the courthouse into a sea of news cameras to proclaim his client's innocence.

"There is no evidence," Downing declared in a message that echoed the president's own oft-repeated contention, "that Mr. Manafort or the Trump campaign

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included are cases of picketing of Jewish religious or cultural institutions for purported support for Israel."

There were six incidents in which Jewish institutions were victims of vandalism and harassment for their purported support of Israel, Gutnick said.

Rabbi Shmuel Herzfeld, of Ohev Shalom-The National Synagogue in Washington, said neo-Nazis in the U.S. are emboldened "in a way I have not seen in my lifetime."

"It's scary," said Herzfeld,

whose synagogue received a bomb threat in April. "I think there is no question that it's on people's minds, and there is more of it out there."

The ADL is urging Congress to pass legislation to expand federal protections against bomb threats to religious institutions. The legislation, approved by the U.S. House of Representatives in December, awaits action in the Senate, the ADL said.

Greenblatt also urges "all public figures" to speak out against anti-Semitism "whether you're the president of the United States or the head of the local P.T.A."

President Donald

Trump was widely criticized for saying there was "blame on both sides" after violence erupted in August at a white nationalist rally in Charlottesville, Virginia, where 32-year-old Heather Heyer was killed when a man drove his car into a crowd of demonstrators. Greenblatt said Trump's statements about the rally were a "serious failure of moral leadership" and a "low point" of his presidency.

"There's no question we would love to see the president call out anti-Semitism as consistently and clearly as he does other issues," Greenblatt said.

The ADL says it compiles its incident data

from news reports and information provided by victims, law enforcement and "community leaders."

"We just don't report something we've heard. We call, we check and we verify," Greenblatt said.

There are three levels of security clearances. Disclosing information deemed "confidential" would "damage" national security. The unauthorized disclosure of "secret" information could cause "serious damage" to national security. "Top secret" disclosures would cause "exceptionally grave damage" to national security.

The White House's handling of security clearances has come under intense scrutiny in the wake of revelations that former White House staff secretary Rob Porter had worked for more than a year with only interim clearance. Porter, whose job gave him constant access to the most sensitive of documents, had been accused of domestic

abuse by his two ex-wives. The White House has repeatedly changed its timeline about who knew what and when about the allegations, and the scandal has weakened Kelly's standing, both among staffers and the president.

Kushner has been forced to repeatedly correct omissions in his "SF-86," the government-wide form used to apply for clearances, as well as his financial disclosure forms, which experts said could delay or even nix his chances of earning a clearance through the normal process. Kushner has also come under scrutiny in special counsel Robert Mueller's ongoing investigation into Russian interference in the 2016 election.

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once included the U.S. relationships with China and Japan and a host of domestic priorities, including infrastructure, trade and economic development. With a top-secret clearance, Kushner would have had access to information about covert operations and intelligence sources and methods. With a secret clearance, he would still have access to

Man with red sauce on face charged with meatball theft

HAZLE TOWNSHIP, Pa. (AP) — Police say a damning clue led to the arrest of a Pennsylvania man charged with stealing a pot of meatballs — red sauce smeared on his face and clothes.

Police say the victim reported his meatballs missing and told officers at around 2:30 p.m. Monday that he saw Potter standing in front of his house with red sauce on his face and clothes. The pot was found on the street.

It's unclear if Potter washed the sauce off before he was arrested a short time later.

Potter's attorney did not immediately respond to a voicemail seeking comment.

Puerto Rico: Treasury cuts \$4.7B disaster relief loan to \$2B

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico — Puerto Rico's governor said Tuesday that the U.S. Treasury Department has cut a \$4.7 billion disaster relief loan available to the U.S. territory by more than half, and he demanded help from Congress.

Gov. Ricardo Rossello said federal officials reduced the amount to \$2 billion without providing an explanation nearly five months after Congress approved the loan. He warned the move puts Puerto Rico in a "dangerous financial dilemma" and that his administration could be forced to cut some essential services as the island continues to struggle after Hurricane Maria.

"Any material interruption to Puerto Rico's public services will only exacerbate outmigration of its population to the mainland and further deepen and prolong Puerto Rico's decade-old fiscal and economic crisis," he said.

Tens of thousands of Puerto Ricans fled to the U.S. mainland after the Category 4 storm, which hit as the island was struggling to restructure a portion of its \$73 billion public debt load amid an 11-year recession.

Rossello said it seems the Treasury imposed certain loan restrictions to make it "extremely difficult for Puerto Rico to access these funds when it needs federal

assistance the most." He also said Treasury officials told his administration last week that they do not intend to forgive the loan.

Congress had approved the loan in October to help Puerto Rico recover from the storm, which killed dozens of people and caused up to an estimated \$94 billion in damage. Some 15 percent of power customers remain in the dark, and more than 700 families are still living in hotels across the island. Last week, Puerto Rico's power company obtained a \$300 million emergency loan that will help keep it operating only through late March, according to a federal control board overseeing the island's finances. The board said it plans to request more loans in upcoming weeks.

It is unclear why the \$4.7 billion federal loan was reduced. A Treasury spokesperson did not immediately return a message for comment.

In January, officials with the Treasury Department and the Federal Emergency Management Agency sent Puerto Rico officials a letter stating they were temporarily withholding the loan because they did not believe the government was facing a cash shortage as it had previously warned. Federal officials said the money would be released via the Community Disaster Loan Program once the island's central cash balance decreased to a certain level.

Rossello said talks with Treasury officials are ongoing even as he has asked Congress to intervene.

Taxes and Retirement Savings

Dear Mr. Berko: I have \$362,000 in my 401(k) account. It took me 22 years to accumulate that amount. Now I'm told that Washington is considering a tax on the current value of everybody's retirement accounts to help pay for the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act. Is this true?

My wife and I recently moved back to Fort Lauderdale and discovered you're no longer on the air with your great call-in radio show. Why? We've tried to remember your great definition of the word politics. Could you repeat it for us?

— JS, Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

Dear JS: It takes a daunting amount of preparation to host a call-in radio talk show for two hours twice a week. And after a dozen delightful years of hosting a fun-filled financial program on WFSB and writing this column, something had to give. The column won!

My definition of politics comes from two words: "poly-," a combining form of Greek origin meaning "many," and "ticks," a noun denoting bloodsucking parasites. It's so apropos today! With very few exceptions, it's difficult to imagine a more fitting definition of Congress, as well as a great many elected officials in our 50 state legislatures. However, it also poignantly speaks to the intelligence and indolence of the voters who put them in office. Resultantly, the voter shoulders a great deal of the blame for a lot of our nation's problems. And yes, Congress wants to mess with our retirement accounts in hopes of finding enough revenue therein to pay for the tax cuts.

The first scheme that's being floated (still in subcommittee) is to restrict

the amount of money all workers could save pretax in 401(k) plans to \$2,400 annually. Today workers in a 401(k) can save up to \$18,000 a year, and those who are older than 50 can save \$24,000. Because contributions are pretax, workers who have been saving \$18,000 annually would pay taxes on an additional \$15,600 of income. This additional tax would help pay for the tax cuts.

A second plan notes that Americans have saved over \$7.6 trillion in 401(k)-type defined contribution plans, plus \$8.6 trillion in individual retirement accounts, some 70 percent of which was rolled over from 401(k) accounts. That totals \$16 trillion (nearly enough to pay off our national debt), and this amount grows larger each year. So far, this \$16 trillion is virgin territory; it's an untouched and untaxed asset that has nearly every "pollutician" in Washington salivating.

Members of Congress want to figure out a way to tax this money and help pay for the tax cuts. And they want the money now. So they devised an ingenious second scheme to tax those trillions now rather than wait for the money to be slowly withdrawn five or 15 years hence. The incentive is to pay lower taxes (10 percent) on your retirement plan distributions now rather than wait until you retire

and pay a much higher tax rate. Congress figures that if it offered a low tax rate of 10 percent on 401(k) money transferred to tax-free Roth accounts, it would theoretically generate new taxes of \$1.6 trillion. And that would easily pay for the tax cuts. That's an expalidocious idea, and I'd take advantage of that offer in a Sioux City second!

However, it would be only a stopgap measure, because the revenue from this potential tax would be a one-time event. It wouldn't address the growing deficits plaguing the nation because Americans are too lazy to become informed voters. That's why there are so many crooks in Congress. Eventually, Congress will propose a value-added tax. This is a consumption tax imposed by 160 countries across the oceans, fleecing citizens to pay for government pet programs. This consumption tax is placed on a product whenever value is added at a stage of production and at the point of retail sale. The United Kingdom, for example, has a flat 20 percent value-added tax, while the VATs in Germany, France, the Netherlands and Spain range between 5 percent and 21 percent.

A 5 percent VAT here in the U.S. would produce an extra trillion dollars annually for members of Congress to use to pay for repairing our infrastructure or otherwise spend while lining their personal pockets.

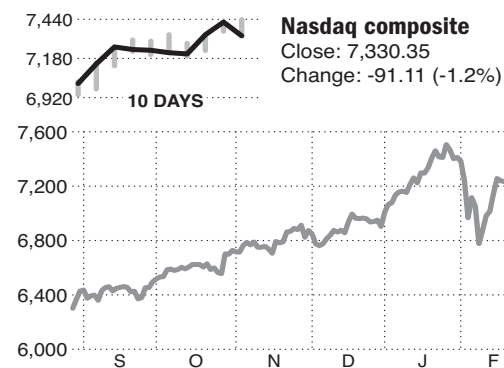
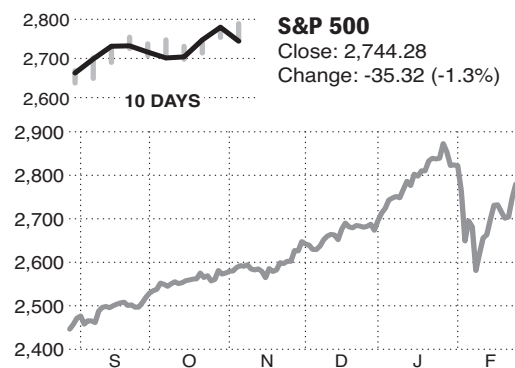

Here's what to do after chronic kidney disease diagnosis

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am a 76-year-old woman. I read your column daily, but I do not remember reading anything about chronic kidney disease. I have just been diagnosed with CKD and have been reading as much as I can get my hands on. This is very frustrating, since much of what I find is contradictory. However, my biggest concern is that the doctor sent me to a nephrologist, who told me that I have CKD, stage 3 — and then nothing!

In my reading, I have found that this is a common complaint of people who have CKD. One is diagnosed, after having several expensive tests run and money made for the medical institutions. Then nothing is done until one is at stage 5 and needs either a transplant or dialysis — again, moneymakers for the medical institutions. The sad thing is that stage 5 probably could be prevented through education and active care.

What can be done to raise awareness of CKD, and what can be done to provide better care for

patients who have been diagnosed, before they reach stage 5? — L.M.

ANSWER: The definition of "chronic kidney disease" is based on the kidneys' ability to filter out the toxins the body makes. One chemical, creatinine, has been a good marker for kidney function. The lower the creatinine level, the better kidney function and higher the "creatinine clearance," the number that defines the stage of chronic kidney disease. Stage 3 CKD is a creatinine clearance between 30 and 59 (yours is 44, according to the lab report you sent me).

However, as people get older, kidney function decreases. The rate is variable, but it averages around 7.5 per decade. Because of this, many people will get to the point of a diagnosis of CKD when they have normal kidneys that have aged as expected. I think this is the case in you.

Unfortunately, there are no treatments proven to slow, halt or reverse the loss in kidney function associated with normal aging. I don't believe your doctors are looking to make money for the medical center, they are looking to see whether you might have any cause other than "normal aging" as a cause of kidney damage. The labs you sent show no such cause, which means there is no specific treatment.

What distresses me about your story is the poor communication you received. Knowing that your kidney results are most likely a function of normal aging, that there are no treatments necessary and that it is unlikely you will progress to stage 5 (end-stage,

requiring dialysis or transplant) would likely have been very reassuring.

DEAR DR. ROACH: Your column from January about thymus cancer states that the thymus is located in the neck. Perhaps you meant the thyroid, which is in the neck. The thymus is under the sternum (at least that is where mine was removed from)! — R.H.

ANSWER: You are right about the thymus location. I did mean the thymus, but I was thinking of its starting place in human embryo development. It originates in the neck (just like the thyroid and parathyroid) then settles in the anterior superior mediastinum, the front upper part of the chest, at about the level of the heart and in front of the lungs. It often is removed in people with myasthenia gravis, where its removal may help long-term control of the disease, or with a tumor of the thymus. I can offer as excuse only that it's really important in early development in the immune system and has very little role in adults.

DEAR ABBY: My boyfriend, "Al," and I have been together for two years off and on. We dated casually for six months before we decided to be exclusive. Unbeknownst to him, I was also sleeping with someone else, "Brandon."

Cheers, protests as German court lets cities ban diesel cars

BERLIN — Handing environmentalists a landmark victory, a German court ruled Tuesday that cities can ban diesel cars and trucks to combat air pollution, a decision with far-reaching and costly implications in the country where the diesel engine was invented in the 1890s.

The ruling by the Federal Administrative Court stirred fears from motorists, auto dealers and other businesses worried about the financial impact. And Chancellor Angela Merkel's government scrambled to reassure drivers it would seek to prevent such drastic measures by pushing other ways to reduce urban pollution.

Diesel automobiles are a popular alternative to

gasoline-powered ones in Germany, with about 9 million diesel cars and several million trucks, buses and other vehicles affected by the ruling.

Overall, 1 in 3 passenger cars in Germany, home to such automakers as Daimler, Volkswagen and BMW, are diesel-powered, though the cleanest, most modern models would probably still be allowed even if cities decided on a ban.

"It's a great day for clean air in Germany," said Juergen Resch, head of the group Environmental Action Germany, which had sued dozens of German cities for failing to meet legally binding emissions limits.

While diesel cars produce less carbon dioxide and tend to get better mileage than gas-powered vehicles, they emit higher levels of nitrogen oxides,

or NOx, contributing to respiratory illnesses and 6,000 deaths annually, according to government figures.

Two German states had appealed lower court decisions that suggested bans on particularly dirty diesel cars would be effective. Germany's highest administrative court rejected that appeal Tuesday, effectively instructing two cities at the center of the case — Stuttgart and Duesseldorf — to consider bans as part of their clean air plans.

What comes next is an open question.

It's not clear whether cities will actually move to ban diesels. And if they do so, it remains to be seen whether automakers will be forced to upgrade exhaust and software systems or buy back vehicles; if the government will offer consumers incentives; or if owners will be left on their

own, forced to bear the costs.

The Leipzig-based administrative court said cities won't be required to compensate drivers for being unable to use their diesel cars.

Speaking on behalf of automakers, Matthias Wissmann, president of the German Association of the Automotive Industry, stressed that the government could ease the uncertainty by not leaving it to cities to decide on a case-by-case basis.

"We hope it comes to sensible national regulations," he said.

European cities considering diesel bans like Copenhagen and Paris will be watching how the situation plays out in Germany as they make their own decisions.

Jeff Schuster, an analyst with the consulting firm LMC Automotive

near Detroit, said diesel bans could spread to other polluted European cities. But he said the market in Europe, China and elsewhere was already headed in that direction because of the big push toward electric vehicles and the damage done by the Volkswagen diesel-emissions

cheating scandal. Diesels make up a smaller part of the American auto market, and so any bans in Europe would have little effect on the U.S., Schuster said. For the past two years in the U.S., only 2.7 percent of registered vehicles were diesel, according to Kelley Blue Book.

UN humanitarian chief calls Yemen conditions 'catastrophic'

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The U.N. humanitarian chief is warning that conditions in Yemen are "catastrophic" after three years of war, with 22.2 million people needing aid. And the U.N. envoy is accusing both the Saudi-backed government and Shiite rebels of prolonging the conflict.

The U.N. officials painted a dire picture of the Arab world's most impoverished country plunging into the world's

worst humanitarian crisis and facing massive destruction as a result of what special envoy Ismail Ould Cheikh Ahmed called the parties' continuing "destructive pattern of zero-sum politics."

Undersecretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs Mark Lowcock warned the Security Council that "famine remains a real threat."

Cheikh Ahmed disclosed that a peace agreement had been about to be reached, but the parties refused to sign at the last minute. He called for fresh negotiations.

Despite outcry, Iranian minister addresses UN rights body

GENEVA (AP) — An Iranian government minister facing European Union and Swiss sanctions for human rights violations has criticized U.S. and Saudi policies at the U.N.'s top human rights body, defying calls for him to stay away.

Justice Minister Seyyed Alireza Avaei's visit was criticized because he's faced EU sanctions for six years for his role in arbitrary arrests, denying prisoners' rights and

increasing executions in Iran.

At the Human Rights Council on Tuesday, Avaei blasted the U.S. decision to recognize Jerusalem as Israel's capital, calling it "illustrative of gross violation of human rights" of Palestinians.

He criticized a blockade of Yemen by a Saudi-led coalition involved in a three-year "war of aggression" there.

About 100 demonstrators denounced Avaei outside the U.N. Geneva.

The U.S. delegation said it was "appalled" Iran sent him.

UN official concerned by allegations of torture in Turkey

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) — A top U.N. official has expressed concerns over increased allegations of torture and ill-treatment in police custody in Turkey.

Nils Melzer, the U.N. special rapporteur on torture, said Tuesday he was alarmed by allegations that people detained for suspected links to U.S.-based Muslim cleric Fethullah Gulen or to outlawed Kurdish rebels were "exposed to brutal

interrogation techniques" including beatings, electrical shocks and threats.

A U.N. statement quoted Melzer as saying: "no serious measures appeared to have been taken by the authorities to investigate these allegations or to hold perpetrators accountable."

There was no immediate response by the Turkish government which in the past declared commitment to a policy of "zero tolerance" to torture.

Turkey accuses Gulen of masterminding a failed coup in 2016 — an allegation the cleric denies.

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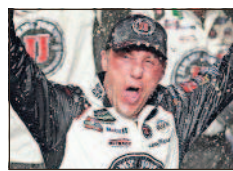

Union files grievance with League

Rays will win 'more than you think' in 2018

PORT CHARLOTTE — Tampa Bay Rays principal owner Stu Sternberg was scheduled to talk to media Tuesday afternoon.

That timing turned out to be great — or maybe terrible for Sternberg — because earlier in the morning, the Tampa Bay Times reported the players union has filed a

grievance to Major League Baseball claiming the Rays (among other teams) have failed to comply with the league's requirement in how they spend their revenue-sharing money.

"I was genuinely surprised when it happened," Sternberg said at Charlotte Sports Park on Tuesday. "We've run our organization in a very open, transparent fashion since the day I've come in. I don't know what happens from here. It's kind of uncharted territory for me. I think we're beyond what compliance is."

Under the terms of the collective bargaining agreement, teams must spend their revenue-sharing money to improve the on-field product, but "not necessarily on major-league payroll" as Marc Topkin of the Tampa Bay Times pointed out. According to Topkin, the Rays benefit from revenue sharing more than most teams, and are believed to receive about \$45 million a year.

"We have received the grievance and believe it has no merit," an MLB

spokesperson told The Times.

The Rays aren't the only team in the grievance. The union also claims the Pittsburgh Pirates, Miami Marlins and Oakland A's have also not been compliant with the CBA.

As Sternberg points out, the Rays payroll might be on the low side, but it's actually more than their payroll on opening day last year. Not only that, but they made a spending push last season, too.

'They start to lose hope'

Free agents play Japanese amateurs in exhibition scrimmage

BRADENTON — Tyler Clipard wore a black jersey with a white players' union logo and pitched hitless ball for two innings against amateurs in the green shirts of the East Japan Railway Company.

He had the poorest personal results of his nine major league seasons, yet ended the year with a celebration in the clubhouse of the World Series champion Houston Astros. This is not how the 33-year-old right-hander envisioned spring training.

"We know that my year last year was a bad year, but at the end of the day how bad was it? And it wasn't as bad as some that got significant contracts," he said Tuesday after appearing in the first of two exhibition games for free agents scheduled for this week at the IMG Academy.

Thirty-eight players have attended the camp since workouts started Feb. 14.

When Steve Yzerman played in the NHL, he used to constantly remind himself: "Don't think. Just play."

It must have worked because Yzerman is one of the greatest players to ever lace up the skates.

But these days as general manager?

"As a (GM), you'd better think a little bit,"

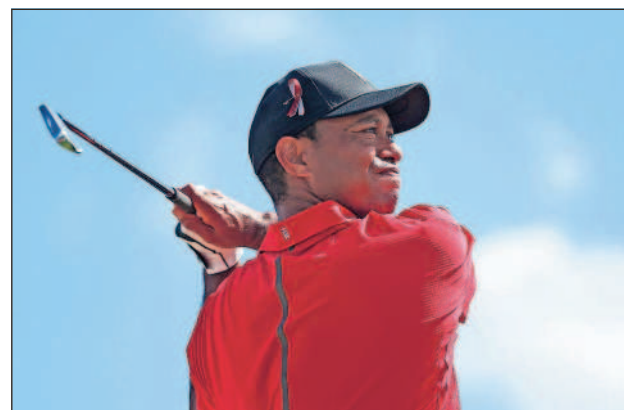

Compelling Tiger Woods casting a shadow larger than ever

Tiger Woods is bigger than ever in golf, and he already was plenty big when he was winning at a rate never seen.

The Honda Classic broke its attendance record last week with a confirmed 224,624 spectators over seven days. The tournament attributed the record increase to the return of

Woods and the drama of a sudden-death playoff won by Justin Thomas.

It could have stopped after Woods. Not even Thomas would argue with that.

Television ratings for the Honda Classic were up 43 percent from the previous year, when Rickie Fowler won.

No surprise there, either.

Woods no longer moves the needle in golf. He is the needle.

Even when he finishes 12th.

What made Woods so compelling at PGA National was that he was only four shots behind going into the weekend, and that on the toughest course of the season — more than a full shot harder than the next one — Woods never shot worse than 71.

He still finished eight shots behind and was never closer than four shots of the lead over the

back nine. The possibilities were there, just not the performance.

Not yet, anyway. And perhaps that's why coverage of the Honda Classic — video, digital and print — touted results by Woods that were impressive, promising and everything in between, almost to a point that Thomas winning in clutch style was an afterthought.

Hall scores again, Devils end Penguins' home winning streak

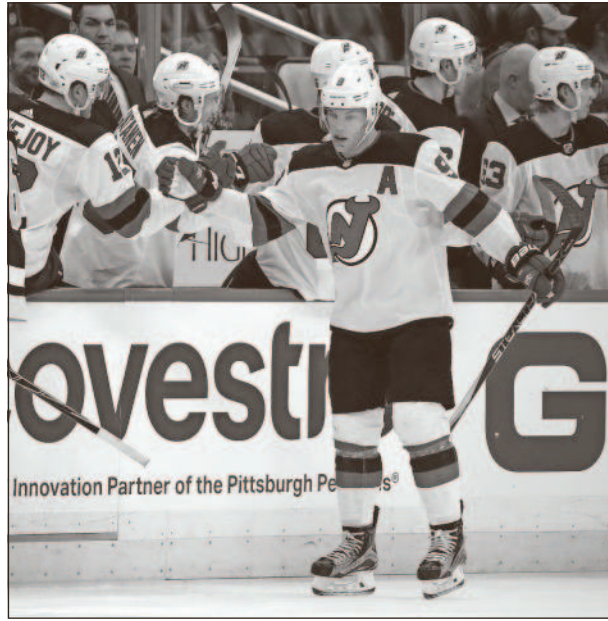
PITTSBURGH — Taylor Hall equaled the Devils' franchise record with points in 15 straight games, Stefan Noesen scored the only goal of the third period and New Jersey beat the Pittsburgh Penguins 3-2 on Tuesday.

Noesen, playing in his 100th NHL game, broke a 2-2 tie with his ninth of the season five minutes into the third. He tipped Andy Greene's attempt from the side boards behind Penguins goaltender Casey DeSmith.

Hall equaled a career high with his 27th goal and had an assist. Hall, who missed three games with a hand injury, has points in the last 22 games in which he's played, scoring 15 goals and 32 points during that span. He's the fifth player in the last 25 years with at least one point in 22 consecutive appearances.

Sidney Crosby scored his 21st goal and Matt Hunwick tallied his fourth for the Penguins, whose 11-game home win streak ended.

The Penguins, who have won 11 of 15 overall,

lost in Pittsburgh for the first time since Jan. 4. It was the longest home winning streak since a franchise-record 13-game run during the 2013-14 season.

Kyle Palmieri scored his 17th goal for the Devils, who are fighting for an Eastern Conference wild card spot. New Jersey won six of eight after losing eight of its previous 11.

CAPITALS 3, SENATORS 2: Evgeny Kuznetsov scored

his 18th and 19th goals of the season to lead the Washington Capitals to a victory over the Ottawa Senators. Tom Wilson also scored for Washington, which leapfrogged Philadelphia to regain first place in the Metropolitan Division by one point. The Capitals are 3-0 this season against struggling Ottawa. Matt Niskanen assisted on both of Kuznetsov's goals, each coming less than a minute after the end of a successful Capitals penalty kill.

Philipp Grubauer made 28 saves for Washington in his 18th start of the season. Erik Karlsson had a goal and an assist a day after Ottawa held onto the All-Star defenseman at the NHL trade deadline. Mike Hoffman added his 18th goal on a second-period power play for the Senators, who lost their fifth straight. They have dropped 22 of their last 25 on the road.

BRUINS 4, HURRICANES 3, OT: Charlie McAvoy scored 1:08 into overtime and Rick Nash had a goal in his home debut for Boston as the Bruins rallied past the Carolina Hurricanes. Tommy Wingels, Riley Nash and McAvoy each had a goal and an assist for Boston, which avoided losing three straight for the first time this season after falling behind 3-1 late in the first period. Brock McGinn, Teuvo Teravainen and Sebastian Aho scored for Carolina, and Justin Faulk had two assists. Scott Darling stopped 28 shots for the Hurricanes, who are 0-5-1 in their last six games. Tuukka Rask made 29 saves for the Bruins, who overcame a rocky first period and got big nights from two new additions.

James leads Cavaliers past Brooklyn

CLEVELAND — LeBron James scored 31 points and finished a month averaging a triple-double for the first time in his career, and the Cleveland Cavaliers defeated the Brooklyn Nets 129-123 on Tuesday night.

James had 12 rebounds and 11 assists for his 12th triple-double of the season and 67th of his career. He also reached 8,000 assists and became the first player in NBA history to reach that milestone, along with 30,000 points and 8,000 rebounds.

Rodney Hood's three-point play with 40 seconds remaining gave Cleveland a 123-121 lead. James and George Hill hit two free throws each in the final 16 seconds to seal the win.

Jarrett Allen's two free throws gave Brooklyn a 119-117 lead with 1:18 to play. Jordan Clarkson's 3-pointer

put Cleveland ahead, but Allen Crabbe's runner in the lane put the Nets up 121-120.

HEAT 102, 76ERS 101: Dwyane Wade scored a season-high 27 points, the last of those coming on a jumper that gave Miami its only lead of the fourth quarter with 5.9 seconds left, and the Heat rallied to beat the Philadelphia 76ers. Wade had 15 of

his points in the fourth quarter, and the Heat won a game where they never led by more than three. Goran Dragic scored 21 for the Heat, who got 16 points from Tyler Johnson and 15 points and 11 rebounds from Hassan Whiteside. Joel Embiid scored 23 points for Philadelphia, which got 21 from Dario Saric. The 76ers led by as many as 10 in the fourth and had a chance

to win at the buzzer, but JJ Redick's wide-open 3-point try bounced off the rim. Redick finished with 15 for the 76ers.

HORNETS 118, BULLS 103: Kemba Walker scored 31 points and Dwight Howard added 24 after returning from a first-quarter back injury as the Charlotte Hornets knocked off the Chicago Bulls to win their season-best fifth game in a row. Zach LaVine led seven Bulls players in double-digits with 21 points as Chicago (20-41) dropped its fifth consecutive game. The Hornets improved to 28-33 as their suddenly hot shooting helped them continue their push to make the playoffs. In all, Charlotte sank 53.7 percent of its field-goal attempts, and 42.9 percent from 3-point range. Walker hit 11-of-19 attempts -- including 6-of-10 of 3-pointers -- while Howard missed only two shots in 12 attempts. Nicolas Batum also added 10 points, 12 assist and seven rebounds.

Saint Joseph's stuns No. 17 Rhode Island behind Demery's 21 points

KINGSTON, R.I. — The party was four nights ago — when Rhode Island celebrated its first outright Atlantic 10 title in school history.

One game later, it was completely wiped away by a miserable performance.

James Demery scored 21 points, Taylor Funk had 17 and Saint Joseph's stunned No. 17 Rhode Island 78-48 on Tuesday night.

"The other night with the ceremony, I think that we maybe for a couple of days were taking victory laps," URI coach Dan Hurley said. "You can't do that. You can't do that in sports, especially when you have a ranking next to your name — with people coming at you hard." Shavar Newkirk added

14 points for the Hawks (14-15, 9-8 A 10), who posted their first true road victory over a ranked team since beating No. 15 Georgetown on Jan. 2, 1979.

Jared Terrell scored 19 points with seven rebounds and E.C. Matthews had 13 points for Rhode Island (23-5, 15-2). It was the Rams' second loss in four games after a school record 16-game winning streak.

"We've got to take responsibility," Matthews said. "This could be a good lesson that we've got to go about it the right way."

URI shot just 28.1 percent in the game.

Taking their home court again for the first time after they clinched their first outright A-10 title in school history and edged up a spot in this

week's AP poll, the Rams came out ice cold from the field, missing 25 of their 31 shots in the opening half.

"I did not have these guys emotionally ready to play on Senior Night and that's on me," Hurley said. "It was an epically bad shooting performance."

Saint Joseph's led 35-16 at halftime.

The Hawks came into the night ranked 313th in the nation in 3-point field goal percentage at just 32 percent, but they hit their first four and opened a 13-point lead just before the second media timeout. URI went 4 for 24 from the field in the opening 14 minutes.

Saint Joseph's closed the half by scoring nine of the final 11 points.

Playing mostly zone, the Hawks seemed to keep the Rams from

getting into any offensive rhythm. URI's many missed shots didn't help either.

No. 16 TENNESSEE 76, MISSISSIPPI STATE 54: Tennessee stayed in the hunt for a Southeastern Conference title thanks to a stellar second-half performance on the road. Admiral Schofield had 24 points, Lamonte Turner added 12 and the 16th-ranked Volunteers pulled away for a victory over Mississippi State. Schofield also had seven rebounds and shot 9 of 18 from the field for the Volunteers (22-7, 12-5 SEC), who made 13 of their final 15 field goal attempts. Quinndary Weatherspoon led Mississippi State (21-9, 9-8) with 17 points. Nick Weatherspoon had 11 points and Aric Holman finished with 10 for the Bulldogs.

College basketball has some great rivalries. Kentucky and Louisville have a heated one. So do Xavier and Cincinnati.

Arizona-Arizona State and Kansas-Kansas State don't like each other much, either.

This week features not only what many consider to be the greatest college basketball rivalry, but one of the best in any sport.

Duke-North Carolina.

The two meetings — three if they face off in the ACC tournament — are always must-watch programming and Saturday's game is no different.

Duke (24-6, 12-5) is up to No. 5 in the AP Top 25 after winning five straight games, but lost to unranked Virginia Tech Monday night.

North Carolina (22-7, 11-5) moved up a spot to No. 9 this week after stretching its winning streak to six games.

The not-so-neighborly teams separated by about 10 miles played an entertaining game their first meeting on Feb. 8.

North Carolina won it

82-78 after rallying from a 12-point deficit at the Smith Center.

"Once everybody got going, we proved to ourselves how good we can be," said North Carolina's Kenny Williams, who matched his career high with 20 points in that game.

Duke will be at home and has star freshman Marvin Bagley III back after he missed two weeks with a sprained knee.

Find a way to watch this one.

Wichita State's move to the American Athletic Conference was a big boost to the Shockers, putting them in a strong conference that should help them come NCAA Tournament seeding time.

It also has strengthened the conference and created some stellar matchups.

A big one comes on Sunday, when No. 10 Cincinnati plays at No. 11 Wichita State.

The Bearcats (25-4, 14-2) lead the ACC by a game over the Shockers (23-5, 13-3), who won the teams' first meeting 76-72 at Cincinnati. Landry Shamut scored 19 points and Wichita State ended the nation's longest home winning streak at 39 games in that game.

The Bearcats will certainly be looking for payback in this budding rivalry.

NHL: Trade Deadline

Contenders deal high draft picks at NHL trade deadline

Red Wings general manager Ken Holland has suddenly come to appreciate how valuable first-round draft picks are when a team's not in playoff contention at the NHL trade deadline.

"I've been on that on the other side," Holland said, recalling Detroit's heydays in the late 1990s and early 2000s, when the Red Wings were competing with Dallas, Colorado and New Jersey in vying to add top talent to strengthen their playoff run. "When those teams made a move, we were aware of it."

The Red Wings were far from that position, sitting in a tie for 12th and five points out of contention, when the trade deadline struck on Monday afternoon. Though Holland wasn't discounting Detroit's chances of making a late-season push, he wasn't exactly dealing from a position of strength.

Rather than adding a player, the Red Wings subtracted. They traded established forward Tomas Tatar to the Western Conference-leading Vegas Golden Knights for three draft picks, including a first-round selection.

"This wasn't a rental in this case," Holland said of Tatar, a three-time 20-goal-scorer

with three years left on his contract. "But the trading of the first-round picks speaks to those teams that have had great years and feel that they've got to do something that really impacts their team."

The Golden Knights weren't the only contender giving up high draft picks on a day 18 trades were completed.

Six first-round selections — two of them conditional — were dealt Monday, the most to move on the final day of NHL trading since at least 2008, according to league figures. And no first-rounders had moved on each of the previous two trade-deadline days.

San Jose Sharks general manager Doug Wilson attributed the amount of first-rounders dealt to how tight the playoff races are, particularly in the Western Conference. Before games on Monday, six points separated the Sharks, who sit second in the Pacific Division standings, and Colorado, which was 11th in the West.

"It's supply and demand of those players that can make a difference," Wilson said after trading a conditional 2019 first-round pick to acquire Buffalo's Evander Kane. "Some people would say pricey, but it almost always is pricey at this time of year when you have competitive juices flowing."

Woods was pleased with how he played, all things considered, and there is a lot to consider — three back surgeries in a span of 18 months, and not knowing five months ago if he'd ever be able to compete at a high level, and playing against a full PGA Tour field for only the third time this year.

He also knows how to keep score.

And that might explain the text message Woods sent to Thomas on Monday: "Don't worry about it. You're still the one holding the trophy."

Thomas was not the least bit surprised, nor

concerned, about such an intense focus on Woods. He could hear it from the third green Sunday when he was looking over a short birdie putt and a burst of cheers came through the trees from the eighth green where Woods made birdie.

The walk to the fourth tee goes across the tee box at No. 9, where Woods had just teed off. The gallery with Woods — perhaps four times the size that was following the last group — stretched all the way to the clubhouse. Thomas couldn't help but notice of his fans peel off to watch Woods.

Why not? "I'd do the same thing," he said. "I'd go watch Tiger Woods. I was out

there trying to win a golf tournament. The fact people want to go watch Tiger Woods doesn't bother me. I don't blame them. He's earned that."

It's really nothing new. Stewart Cink once told of the time he played in the Junior World Championship in San Diego. When his round was over, his mother would go back onto the course and watch Woods.

Golf is in a different place than when Woods picked up his 79th victory on the PGA Tour in August 2013, his most recent victory. Thomas had just turned pro. Jordan Spieth had just earned a full PGA Tour card. Jon Rahm was going into his sophomore year

at Arizona State. Since then, five players have taken turns at No. 1 in the world.

During his longest stretch out of golf with his bad back, the refrain was that golf needed Tiger Woods. When he was on the verge of returning at the end of 2016, the talk was that golf was in a good spot and Woods could only make it that much better.

Sure, Yzerman gave up potentially a big chunk of Tampa Bay's future, but he picked up two key pieces, including a much-needed defenseman. And all he gave up off his current roster was Vladislav Namestnikov — a nice player for sure, but a player the Lightning can get along just fine without.

Well done. All in a day's work for a man who has established himself as the best general manager in the business.

He took over a franchise that was a mess and has guided that team to the Stanley Cup final and two other Eastern Conference finals. This is Yzerman's eighth season, and this will be the Lightning's fifth postseason appearance during that tenure.

Every move he makes seems to turn to gold.

He hired the right coach in Jon Cooper.

He convinced Steven Stamkos to spurn offers to return home to Toronto and sign a long-term deal with the Lightning. At the same time, he locked up star defenseman Victor Hedman for years to come.

He has stocked the team with young stars such as 24-year-old Nikita Kucherov, the NHL's leading scorer, and 21-year-old Brayden Point.

Forced to chose between veteran goalie

Ben Bishop and emerging young standout Andrei Vasilevskiy, he made the right call going with the now 23-year-old Vasilevskiy, who leads the NHL in wins this season and should be between the Lightning pipes for the next decade.

Remember the Jonathan Drouin mess? Yzerman was masterful, ignoring the plea of fans to let Drouin "rot" after Drouin quit the team. He stuck by his principles, urged Drouin to return, let Drouin build his value back up, then traded him for 19-year-old defenseman Mikhail Sergachev, who looks like a future All-Star.

Last year when it was time to either buy or sell before the trade deadline, he again went with his gut. He ignored others in the organization who thought the Lightning could make the playoffs and, perhaps, get on a roll. He knew better. It wasn't easy, but he traded popular veterans such as Bishop, Brian Boyle and Valteri Filpula. That created room for players such as Point and Yannick Gourde. It also created room under the salary cap to allow him to do all the things he has done this season.

As a general manager, he has done it all.

Well, except one thing. He hasn't won a Stanley Cup.

That's what Monday was all about. Thanks to Yzerman and his staff arming the franchise with so many good youngsters, he had parts to spare when he went

looking to bolster his NHL club for the Cup run.

He gave up some really good prospects and potentially two first-round picks to get McDonagh and Miller. But he didn't completely gut his system.

The Lightning still has plenty to like about the future.

But he knows the time is now to win a Stanley Cup. After all, isn't that the whole point?

And you can bet that Yzerman's bold move not only improved the Lightning's roster, but sent a message that was well received in the locker room. A message that says, "We're going for it, boys."

"I think it's great," Lightning defenseman Dan Girardi said. "He has faith in the group we have, but this time of year, if you want to go far, you may need to add a couple of pieces and he did that for us. Now we need to show him he made the right moves."

Yzerman is one who rarely shows emotion. But even he admitted that Monday's drama of phone calls, negotiations, waiting and more and more phone calls and then pulling off a splashy deal was, dare we say, fun.

"It's enjoyable," Yzerman said. "It's exciting. It is kind of fun, I guess. But we're not doing it to have fun. It's a business for us."

These days, business is good in Tampa Bay.

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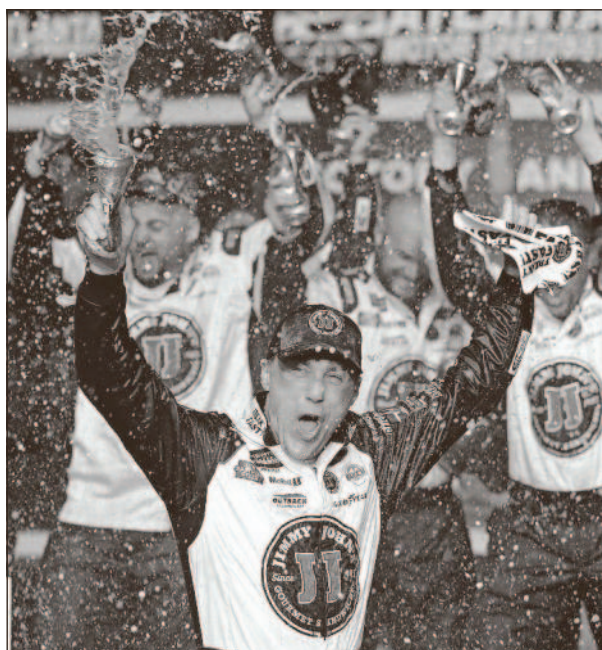

NASCAR veterans aren't pulling over for the rookies

Kevin Harvick put the brakes on the "New NASCAR!" movement with a dominating victory on a weathered old racetrack.

Away from Daytona, the veterans showed the young new drivers how to race on the dogged surface at Atlanta Motor Speedway. Harvick put on a clinic, and the top eight finishers were the familiar faces that seem to compete for wins every week.

All the new kids who sparkled in the Daytona 500 had their hands full at Atlanta, a track that requires an entirely different skill-set. In the season-opening showcase, the idea is to go as fast as you can while avoiding the mishaps of others.

But the style of racing at Daytona, as well as Talladega, comes just four times a year. The rest of the NASCAR schedule is where the true talent rises. So at Atlanta, where experience matters, the finishing order showed five former series champions — four Daytona 500 winners — cross the finish line in order.

"This is a racetrack that takes a lot of experience, and there's a lot of things that you have to know about your car and know about the racetrack to get the car around," Harvick said. "This is where experience pays off."

That doesn't fit the fresh narrative that came out of Daytona, where the new crop of NASCAR drivers ruled. Alex Bowman won the pole, Chase Elliott and Ryan Blaney won qualifying races, Blaney led the most laps in the Daytona 500, Austin Dillon won the race and Bubba Wallace finished second in his debut. At 27, Dillon is the oldest driver in that bunch.

Harvick, meanwhile, is 42.

The shift in focus to the new generation is not lost on anyone who follows NASCAR, particularly the veteran drivers. Some have nitpicked about the marketing push behind this "New NASCAR!" and they had to have felt the change in dynamic at Daytona.

Denny Hamlin, a former Daytona 500 winner who finished third in the 500 and fourth at Atlanta, shared his thoughts on Twitter on Monday night by posting a video of pro bowler Pete

Weber screaming "Who do you think you are? I am!" after winning his fifth U.S. Open title in 2012. Hamlin added his own message: "All the old drivers after Sunday."

A reply chided Hamlin that Elliott is the future, and "In a couple years you will be watching him win from your recliner," the fan wrote. Hamlin didn't back down. "Agree. But I won't be on that recliner for some time," he posted.

This isn't about jealousy, rather reality. The older drivers know their laps are limited, but they aren't going to simply go away. Experience matters and it's going to take seat time for the newcomers to figure out how to contend on a weekly basis.

Elliott, for example, is winless in the Cup Series but has seven runner-up finishes. He's still working on closing races. Kyle Larson was the same, and when he finally figured it out, he knocked out four wins last season and was a legitimate title contender.

Harvick noted there's going to be a balance all season between the radically different ends of the spectrum. The younger drivers may have better finishes this weekend at Las Vegas because the track is "a little calmer with things that you don't have to have in your memory bank."

Clint Bowyer, who finished third behind teammate Harvick at Atlanta, believes there will be a better mix at Las Vegas because "it's qualifying laps every single lap, and those kids will show back up."

And when they do, there will be room for both new and old. Harvick, who has started the transition from race car driver to analyst with a radio show on Sirius and a recurring spot in Fox's broadcast lineup, understands its going to take everyone for NASCAR to go through these current growing pains.

"We're in a great spot in our sport because we have these young guys that are fired up and can drive the car fast and have great stories and have ties to great family heritage," he said.

"The diversity from young to old is something that we haven't had in a long time, and we're going to corral everybody to make sure that they realize that we all need each other in order to make this sport what we all want it to be."

NFL may cap defensive pass interference penalty at 15 yards

The NFL's competition committee is considering a major change to the defensive pass interference penalty, with the possibility of capping the penalty at 15 yards, no matter how far downfield the flag is thrown.

As it stands, pass interference is one of the key difference between college football — where such a foul is no more than 15 yards — and the NFL, where a long penalty is awarded at the spot of the foul, sometimes for 50 yards or more.

It's a move that might make NFL teams less likely to throw deep — with the new rule, a defensive back who knows he's been beaten deep has incentive to maul a receiver and concede 15 yards rather than risk a long touchdown.

The Bucs did not have a good pass defense at all

in 2017 — they gave up a league-worse 260 passing yards per game, with the lack of a pass rush giving opposing quarterbacks ample time to find open receivers.

Tampa Bay, did, however, do a remarkable job of avoiding pass interference penalties — they were flagged for just six all season (only the Cardinals and Jaguars, with five each, had fewer) for

an NFL-low 50 yards, total. Jacksonville was next-best with 52 yards, but that came impressively along with the NFL's No. 1 pass defense in yards allowed.

Only one of those flags against the Bucs was more than 15 yards — an 18-yard penalty on Robert McClain in Week 11.

Team doctors to use video to assess concussions

SOCHI, Russia — World Cup teams have been told video replays will be extended to their doctors to assist the diagnosis of injuries, including concussions.

FIFA's top medical official told The Associated Press that a second team doctor will be allowed access to match footage to evaluate injuries in real time to supplement any on-field diagnosis.

It is the latest sign of FIFA embracing technology, with video assistant referees set to make their World Cup debut at the June 14-July 15 tournament in Russia.

FIFA is strengthening procedures to treat head injuries following cases at the 2014 World Cup where players tried to stay on the field after a concussion.

Doctors from the 32 finalists in Russia were briefed on the changes at meetings in the Black Sea resort of Sochi by FIFA medical committee chairman Michel D'Hooghe.

"To help the doctor we have now introduced a system whereby an assistant of the doctor or a second doctor will sit in front of a television

screen and can help the doctor in taking his decision," D'Hooghe told the AP, "because he can review very clearly, very concretely what happened on the field, what the doctor sitting on the bench perhaps could not see.

"This is a supplementary help for the doctor to make his diagnosis and to say if (the player) can go on. This is the first time that we will try it. I am confident that it will certainly be a help for the medical care of our players."

Soccer is emulating professional rugby, which already uses video reviews to check

incidents where concussion is suspected.

Team doctors embraced the move to improve player welfare by placing a medic with a monitor in the media tribune.

"It's called video assistant replay medical," Egypt team doctor Mohamed Abou Elela Aboud told the AP.

"During the game, team physicians are sitting on the flat level ... so maybe the impact cannot be seen. It's much better to see (on replays) because you have very little time to assess and to do the questionnaire and tests regarding the concussion."

from their defenses not being accountable for long pass interference penalties? Eight NFL teams had at least 200 yards in DPI penalties — the most was the Giants, with 273 yards, including eight flags for 20 yards or more. The Bengals — who had a league-high 18 DPI penalties accepted — were next with 267 yards, followed by the Chiefs (236), Lions (221), Texans (212), Saints (210), Cowboys (210) and Seahawks (207).

The Patriots, as mentioned, had only six DPI penalties last season, but five were longer than 15 — for 20, 21, 30, 34 and 34 yards — and the kind that would go away with the rule change.

In theory, taking away the threat of a long penalty reduces the value of a deep-play receiver — defensive backs have less risk in playing more physical with contact downfield, knowing the damage done by a flag is less.

This will be the first World Cup where games can be stopped for three minutes to fully assess head injuries.

"In Brazil we had problems in cases of concussion where at a certain moment the doctor asks for the replacement of a player and the player says, 'No I want to go on,'" D'Hooghe said. "So that was a little bit of a chaotic situation. Now we have a new rule, the three-minute rule."

That gives more authority to the doctor to determine the impact of a collision.

"After these three minutes the referee only looks at the doctor, he doesn't look at the player who could have been unconscious," D'Hooghe said. "In the case of a serious health problem it's logical the doctor decides."

Medical staff can now also intervene without the say of the referee if they suspect a sudden cardiac arrest.

"When a player collapses without any contact then a doctor can immediately go on the field," D'Hooghe said. "In that situation the first two minutes are the most important ones."

Davis Cup revamp plans get mixed response

The Australians are surprised. The Brits are skeptical. The French are downright angry.

"They have just killed the Davis Cup," French tennis player Nicolas Mahut said in reaction to bold plans to transform the 118-year-old competition into a one-week, 18-nation World Cup of Tennis.

The International Tennis Federation is trying to bring some glamor and relevance to the team event, as well as lure back top players who often choose to skip Davis Cup matches amid a crowded tennis calendar.

In this latest attempted revamp, the World Cup of Tennis would be played in one location over seven days in the traditional

week of the Davis Cup final in November, rather than across four weekends in February, July, September, and November. There would be a total purse of \$20 million.

"The essence of this historic competition is to play away or at home," Mahut, a member of France's Davis Cup-winning team last year, told French newspaper L'Equipe. "I was the first to say we needed to reform it. But not to destroy it."

Mahut's captain, Yannick Noah, tweeted on Tuesday: "They sold the soul of an historic event. Sorry mister Davis."

Proposals for the World Cup of Tennis have been devised in conjunction with investment group Kosmos, which was founded by Barcelona and Spain soccer player Gerard Pique. The partnership is

worth \$3 billion over 25 years.

Pique personally presented the proposal to the ITF board in Barcelona on Saturday, and ITF President David Haggerty told The Associated Press that Pique has had a "positive" response from top players like Andy Murray and Novak Djokovic.

Those two players have yet to comment publicly on the plans, but second-ranked Rafael Nadal has been quoted by Spanish newspaper Marca as saying: "It's a good initiative and it could work."

Craig Tiley, chief executive of Tennis Australia, said his organization was "taken by surprise by the announcement."

"As one of the founding nations of Davis Cup, we have a lot of unanswered questions," Tiley said.

"Will this proposal

effectively extend the season for a large section of the playing group? What are the players' thoughts generally? Does this ultimately end the 'home and away' nature of the current competition? There's just so much we don't know."

The ITF said the proposal, which was unanimously endorsed by its board, is "subject to further development" before it is submitted at the body's annual general meeting in Florida in August. It needs approval by a two-thirds majority.

Britain captain Leon Smith acknowledged that change was necessary to "ensure longevity and status" of the Davis Cup, which was established in 1900, and was glad to see the ITF looking at significant investment from other sources.

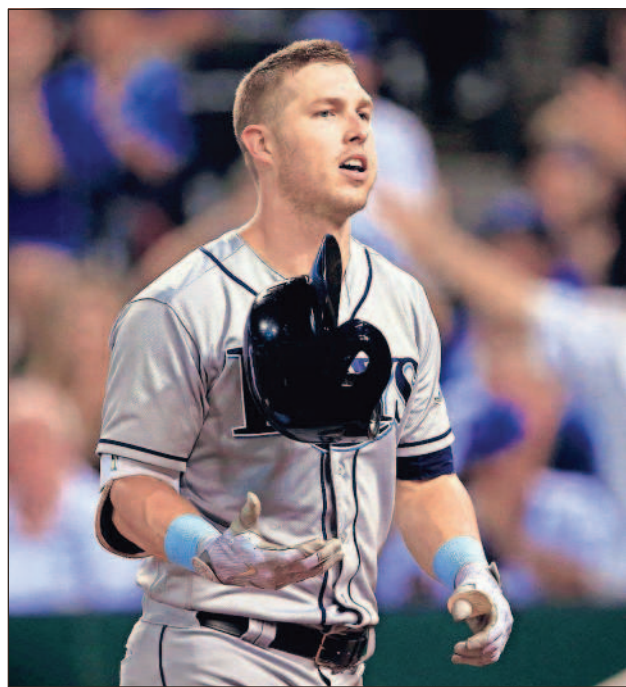
BRADENTON — Corey Dickerson didn't initially believe the news.

Tampa Bay Rays general manager Erik Neander called Dickerson late on the night of Feb. 17 to inform the five-year veteran he had been designated for assignment. That meant the Rays had 10 days to trade Dickerson, outright him to the minor leagues or release him.

"I kind of thought I was dreaming at first," Dickerson said.

It marked quite a turn of events for a player who was the American League's starting designated hitter in last year's All-Star Game.

"It was tough," Dickerson said. "It was embarrassing and the reason I say that is you have to explain to your friends and your family

why it happened and what it means. Most of them don't understand what DFA means and some of them think

you're not good enough, which is bothersome."

The Rays wound up trading Dickerson to the Pittsburgh Pirates last

week for right-handed reliever Daniel Hudson, minor league second baseman Tristan Gray and \$75,000, which offsets part of Dickerson's \$5.95 million salary. Dickerson joined the team Monday.

Three hours after the trade, Dickerson's wife gave birth to a boy named Miller in their hometown of Meridian, Mississippi.

"It was one of the biggest days of my life, my family's lives," Dickerson said with a smile. "It was a crazy day. I got traded at 2 p.m. and our second son was born at 5 p.m."

Dickerson is looking to playing left field for his new team.

"When the trade finally happened, I was excited," Dickerson said. "I'm the type of person who looks at what's next. I just like to compete. I'm a very competitive person, so I'm always looking to turn the page quickly."

"I think we've almost always over-performed expectations," Sternberg said. "We've not gotten to the payroll with our highest payrolls, and we got to the World Series with one of our lowest payrolls. So, how many games will the 2018 Rays win? "More than you think," according to Sternberg.

Sternberg, while positive about his team's chances in 2018, is excited for the future, and rightfully so.

"I will say this, I know we are in tremendous shape — as good of shape as we've been in this organization — for the next five years," Sternberg said. "All of these kids aren't going to turn into all-star baseball players, but they're populating a system that right now I wouldn't trade for any other system in baseball. I can only believe the system is going to get stronger as we move forward."

They wonder why they are on the outside while several teams have jettisoned veterans to fill a higher percentage of their roster spots with lower-salaried youth.

The players' association filed a grievance Friday against the Miami Marlins, Oakland Athletics, Pittsburgh Pirates and Tampa Bay Rays, accusing the teams of failing to appropriately spend revenue-sharing money.

"Isn't the goal to win the World Series every year? I think every team should want to win the World Series every year," 35-year-old left-hander Tom Gorzelanny said. "You're not trying to go out there and say I'd rather save money than win games."

Two players agreed to minor league deals after attending camp: right-hander Carlos Torres with Cleveland and left-hander Tommy Layne with Boston. First baseman Mike Napoli had been on the roster for the exhibition, but left for Arizona and a physical needed to finalize a minor league contract with the Indians. Second baseman Neil Walker arrived this week.

This camp is similar to the one run by the union at Homestead, Florida, following the end of the 1994-95 strike. Dave Gallagher attended then as a player and signed with Philadelphia. Now he is a coach under manager Bo Porter.

"They start to lose hope," he said. "And it's a little bit humiliating." The starting lineup included center fielder Alejandro De Aza, catcher Jarrod Saltamacqua, designated hitter Juan Francisco, first baseman Tyler Moore, right fielder Luke Scott, third baseman Chris Johnson, shortstop Omar Infante, left fielder Nolan Reimold and second baseman Tyler Ladendorf. The free agents won 2-0 in five innings, allowing just one hit. Several scouts looked on from the small stands, which had three rows of blue seats and nine rows of metal bleachers.

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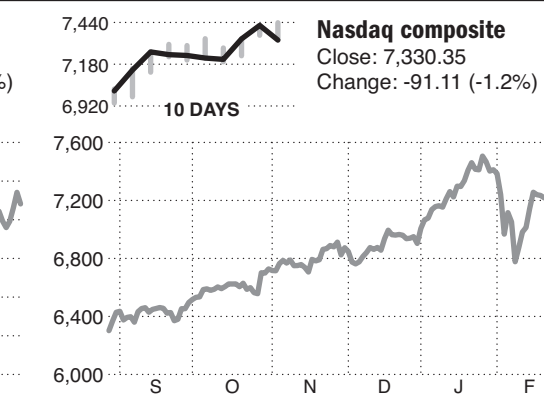
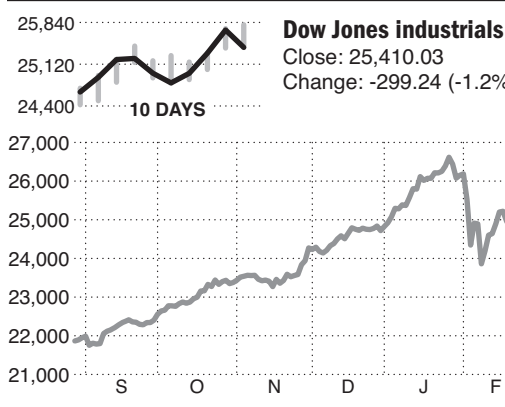
