

Council favors SROs at every school

SEBRING — The Sebring City Council favored Tuesday night moving toward having full-time school resource deputies at each of the three schools in the city limits.

Council members said that while the state may eventually provide funding for that, they feel the need to act sooner, in the wake of the school shooting in Broward County.

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But, with the Sebring Police Department working to fill positions and the expected loss of some officers, either through retirement or because of people moving to different agencies, the council didn't immediately take action to add two more positions.

Sebring currently has one school resource officer to serve Sebring Middle School, Woodlawn Elementary School and the Kindergarten Learning Center.

Once the Police Department needs money to fill more positions, the council will make the money available, council members said.

Sebring Police Chief Karl Heglund said he plans to try to find a way in the meantime to increase coverage at all three campuses.

Board passes on grade classification plan

SEBRING — A plan to automatically advance high school freshmen and sophomores to the next grade level, without successfully completing the coursework, sparked discussion at Tuesday's School Board of Highlands County meeting.

The Zero Grade Progression plan was part of the overall Student Progression Plan, which is updated by the district and approved each year by the School Board.

In part, the Zero Grade Progression plan states, "a student begins high school as a freshman, the second year of high school attendance will carry a designation of sophomore, the third year of high school attendance will carry the designation of junior."

School Board Member Donna Howerton said she spoke to teachers at Sebring and Avon Park high schools about the Zero Grade Progression plan, which automatically moves ninth-graders to 10th grade and moves 10th-graders to 11th grade.

Some teachers are concerned and she is concerned, Howerton said, on how this may affect teacher evaluations.

"If you have a ninth-grade student who hasn't passed their classes in the ninth-grade, we are going to go ahead and place them in the 10th grade, then that teacher in the 10th grade is going to be subject to

evaluations.

At this time, Howerton has not said

there are any plans to widen College Drive, which would take agreements between the county and the college.

The county commission handed the job of building the road over to county crews by a slim 3-2 vote on the night of Feb. 20 during a special meeting.

Commissioners Don Elwell and Jack Richie favored priority on paving county roads and finishing Sebring Parkway Phase II, respectively.

Road crews have a deadline of Dec. 31, 2019, set by the Florida Department of Transportation, to finish the work.

Otherwise, the county forfeits \$3 million from FDOT to cover part of Howerton's total estimated in-house cost of \$9.77 million.

By working in-house, Howerton said, the county should save \$2.53 million from the estimates given by the contractor — which quit the job in a mutual cancellation with the county.

Highlands biggest tailgate party at SIR

SEBRING — Amidst the roar of the cars on the track, recreational vehicles, cars and tents are temporary homes for race fans, even though the race is a week away. The cloying stench of smoke from a nearby muck fire wasn't enough to deter loyal fans of the Mobil 1 Twelve Hours of Sebring Presented by Advance Auto Parts from participating in arguably the largest tailgate party in Highlands County.

Barbecue grills were turned into low-tech kitchens, the grassy area next to RV steps were turned into makeshift living rooms and the areas between the temporary homes were gathering places.

Bobby Griffin drove his

camper into the lot at Carroll Shelby Road near Gate Four a few days ago.

"If you don't get here early, you aren't going to get a good spot," Griffin said. "I got here a day earlier than last year, and I am a lane further [out]."

Griffin knows all the ins and outs to the 12 Hours of Sebring; he has been attending them since 1960 when he pulled in with his Volkswagen Bus. For 58 years, he hasn't missed a race — even when his daughter was born on race day in 1965. Several hours later, he left his wife and newborn daughter in the safe keeping of nurses and took off from St. Mary's Hospital in West Palm Beach to catch the race.

"My wife still brings that up from time to time," Griffin said.

Griffin used to attend NASCAR races but has dropped all races except the 12 Hours of Sebring.

Sebring Parkway Phase III moves forward

SEBRING — Highlands County has to move some gopher tortoises.

County Engineer Clinton Howerton Jr. said there were 28 burrows in the right of way for Sebring Parkway Phase III. After road crews cleared and graded the parts of the road that they can, without disturbing the burrows, he now has to have them relocated to let heavy equipment finish preparing the route.

It's already had a lot of work done, as he showed the Board of County Commission during Tuesday's regular meeting. Using a drone, for which Howerton obtained an appropriate level pilot's license, he filmed the route heading north from the 90-degree turn on the existing Parkway, wide enough for the planned four-lane divided highway.

From there, a wide track of graded sand stretches north toward Manatee Drive, which comes off State Road 17 and enters the right of way a little north of Ben Eastman Road.

Manatee then exits the right of way just north of Scenic Highway, heading west.

Howerton pointed out, as seen on the video, how Highlands County Road and Bridge Department has a "shell mountain" staged northwest of the Manatee-Scenic Highway junction, along with road equipment.

Just north of that, houses on the west side of the right of way belong to some of the opponents and critics of the project, concerned with potential noise and storm runoff from the road, when completed.

Howerton has pledged to them he'll have all storm drainage run south, away from the homes and toward retention areas.

The graded surface continues north from the Manatee Drive curve, veering right and narrowing at spots to avoid apparent natural features, like tortoise burrows. It skirts between Little Red

Water Lake to the east and both Crystal Lake Club and Lake Denton to the west, before veering left on approach to Memorial Drive.

Howerton's drone video hovers just east of the spot where he and Road and Bridge Supervisor Kyle Green plan to install a large roundabout, to keep traffic moving on both the Parkway and on Memorial and College Drives, the intersecting roads.

Once there, traffic will funnel back onto two-lane roads, either to head north to Avon Park or west through and past the South Florida State College campus to reach U.S. 27.

Opponents and critics have said the potential level of traffic will cause problems for both of the smaller roads, which may have to be widened as a result. Neither one has the right of way to become wider.

Conditions too primed for wildfires

NWS, FFS: 'Don't burn anything'

SEBRING — The Mini Ranch Road muck fire continues to burn.

Both Florida Forest Service and National Weather Service officials

are asking Highlands County residents, "Please don't burn anything else."

Rains from Tuesday night and Wednesday morning did not help, and barely touched the surface, literally.

Florida Forest Service Public Information Officer Melissa Yunas said the rain gave just enough moisture to wet

the surface, but not seep into the soil.

Deep in the soil is what's burning: Deposited, decomposing vegetation called "muck," that once lit can burn for months until heavy rains return, Yunas said.

On Wednesday, the Forest Service had four engines and two firefighting bulldozers on the Mini Ranch

fire, Yunas said. State Wildland Firefighters ran hose lines to saturate the soil and used both machinery and hand tools to clear vegetation.

Forest Area Supervisor Joe deBree said firefighters mopped up hotspots, up to 100 feet inside the burned zone, focusing on areas behind homes off Moon Ranch Road.

"There is also

significant heat on the east side of the fire, near the sod fields," deBree said. "We're trying to eliminate the potential for the wind to carry burning embers to the other side of the containment line."

At 1:40 p.m., Yunas said, the 300-acre blaze was 55 percent contained, still hot. Meanwhile, the

Weather Service sent out "Red Flag Warning" text alerts, on how the combination of 15 mph winds and 24-34 percent humidity increased the likelihood that new fires would spread rapidly.

In short, both the Weather Service and Forest Service are asking people not to burn anything right now.

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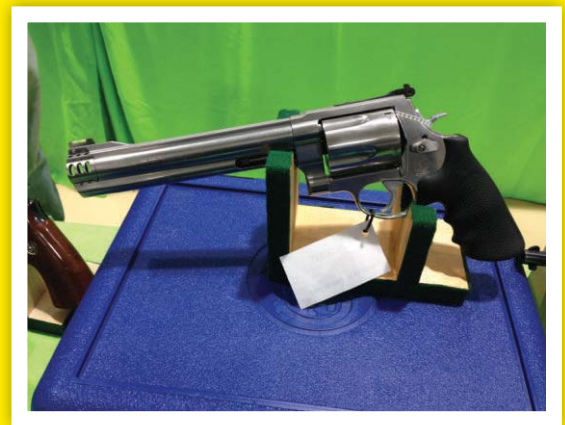
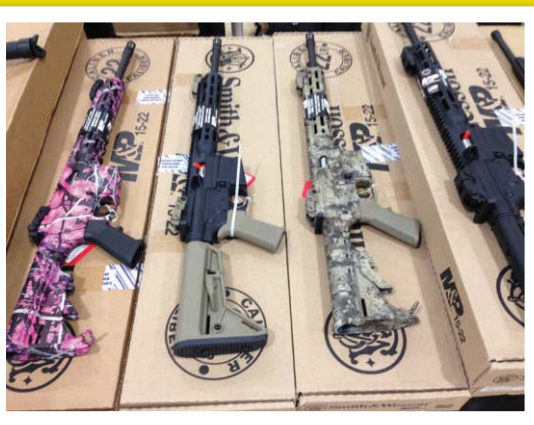

Protest gathering for gun show

SEBRING — Saturday and Sunday, Sebring will have its last big gun show of the season at the Highlands County Fairgrounds, and protesters will be there.

Members of Highlands County Indivisible will stage a peaceful protest at 11 a.m. Saturday, marching along Sebring Parkway outside the Fairgrounds, between South Commerce Avenue to Kenilworth Boulevard.

The Fairgrounds have hosted gun shows in the past, and had one in January this year. This event offers an opportunity for attendees to take a 90-minute concealed weapons class and a chance drawing on an AR-15 semi-automatic rifle.

It happens to be the same type of weapon used by 19-year-old Nikolas Cruz in the Feb. 14 attack on his former high school, Marjory Stoneman

Douglas High School in Parkland. He shot and killed 17 in the attack.

Hundreds of thousands of AR-15s were made and sold. Some were used in mass shootings:

- November 2017 in a church in Sutherland Springs, Texas, 26 killed.
- October 2017 at an open-air concert in Las Vegas, 58 killed.
- June 2016 in the Pulse nightclub in Orlando, 49 killed.
- December 2015 in San Bernardino, Calif., 14 killed.
- December 2012 at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Conn., 27 killed.

Protest organizer Lois Schlabach said the march on Saturday is in solidarity with students from the Parkland high school who have called for greater controls on gun sales, including the AR-15.

"We admire very much the courage of the students and their ability to speak intelligently on this subject," she said. "It's up to us as adults to show solidarity

with them."

Schlabach also credited the students' teachers for teaching them how to speak out on issues that concern them.

"I recognize that youthful idealism I had at a young age," Schlabach said, referring to protests of the Vietnam War.

A ban on such weapons was not renewed when it expired in 2004. The danger of weapons designed to kill is that they leave few survivors, she said.

Schlabach said a physician in Parkland treating wounded from the shooting opened a patient to repair an organ and found nothing left to repair: a fatal injury.

"If you are a school child afraid to go to school because of the weapons in the hands of domestic terrorists," something should change, Schlabach said. "Even NRA members are in favor of universal background checks, but we cannot move our legislators."

Foundation for greater school safety

The Florida Senate Monday laid the groundwork for sane, workable legislation that might make schools safer while minimizing to some degree the threat of firearms in the hands of potentially unstable people.

By a 20-18 margin, the Senate passed a broad-based school safety bill and moved it on to the House. It is likely to be picked apart and weakened by hardliners there, which is unfortunate but not surprising.

Nevertheless, we are encouraged that a set of sensible safety patches may be patched together by the time the Legislature convenes in coming weeks.

Among the measures approved in the Senate:

- SB7026 extends the three-day waiting period for the purchase of all forms of firearms. Only handguns are now subject to a three-day waiting period.
- The bill bans bump stocks — after-market devices that convert semi-automatics into automatic weapons. Bump stocks make shooting, and killing, quicker and easier. We would have thought a bump stock-ban was the clearest and simplest reaction to the massacre last October at the country music festival in Las Vegas, after a sniper with bump stock-boosted weapons killed 58 and wounded 851. Only talk, but no action came from it, thanks again to gun lobby opposition. Pathetic. Florida needs to act on its own.

- The bill also addresses various breakdowns in the mental health system, specifically individuals released after Baker Act custody. It would prohibit anyone judged to be mental health risks from owning firearms for 12 months.
- The bill bars teachers who “exclusively perform” classroom teaching from carrying concealed weapons. Thankfully, it would, however, allow support staff and coaches to carry, under clearly defined circumstances and guidance of law enforcement.

We believe it is extremely unwise and unsafe to arm anyone on campus other than certified law enforcement officers. In this case, though, decisions on expanding school marshal programs and arming limited numbers of school personnel would be left to the discretion of local school boards. That seems a reasonable compromise.

- The measure also allocates \$97 million for armed resource officers, which seems inadequate.

Pinellas County Sheriff Bob Gualtieri, a board member of the Florida Sheriff's Association, told the Tampa Bay Times the real price tag for armed school resource officers in each of Florida's 4,000 schools was closer to \$400 million: Total costs for the average school resource officer comes to roughly \$100,000 annually. That puts enormous burdens on local school districts.

One measure the bill also includes is an increase in the age for all gun purchases from the 18 to 21 years old. Right now, Floridians must be 21 years old to buy a handgun; this would extend the threshold by three years for all firearms.

This measure — opposed, as with all gun restrictions, by the National Rifle Association — is directly relevant to the mass murder of 17 at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland. The alleged killer, 19-year-old Nikolas Cruz, had been able to purchase the AR-15 assault-style weapon used to massacre students and school personnel during his short, six-minute rampage.

The bill excludes military and law enforcement officers.

Overall, the Senate bill seems a sensible response to the Parkland tragedy and the heightened security threats on campus.

Our own Senator Denise Grimsley voted against the school safety bill. She isn't convinced that “restricting law-abiding citizens' access to guns would solve the problem.” As a whole, the bill does not address prevention, she said.

The bill faces a rough path in the House, but it has people from both sides of the aisle talking.

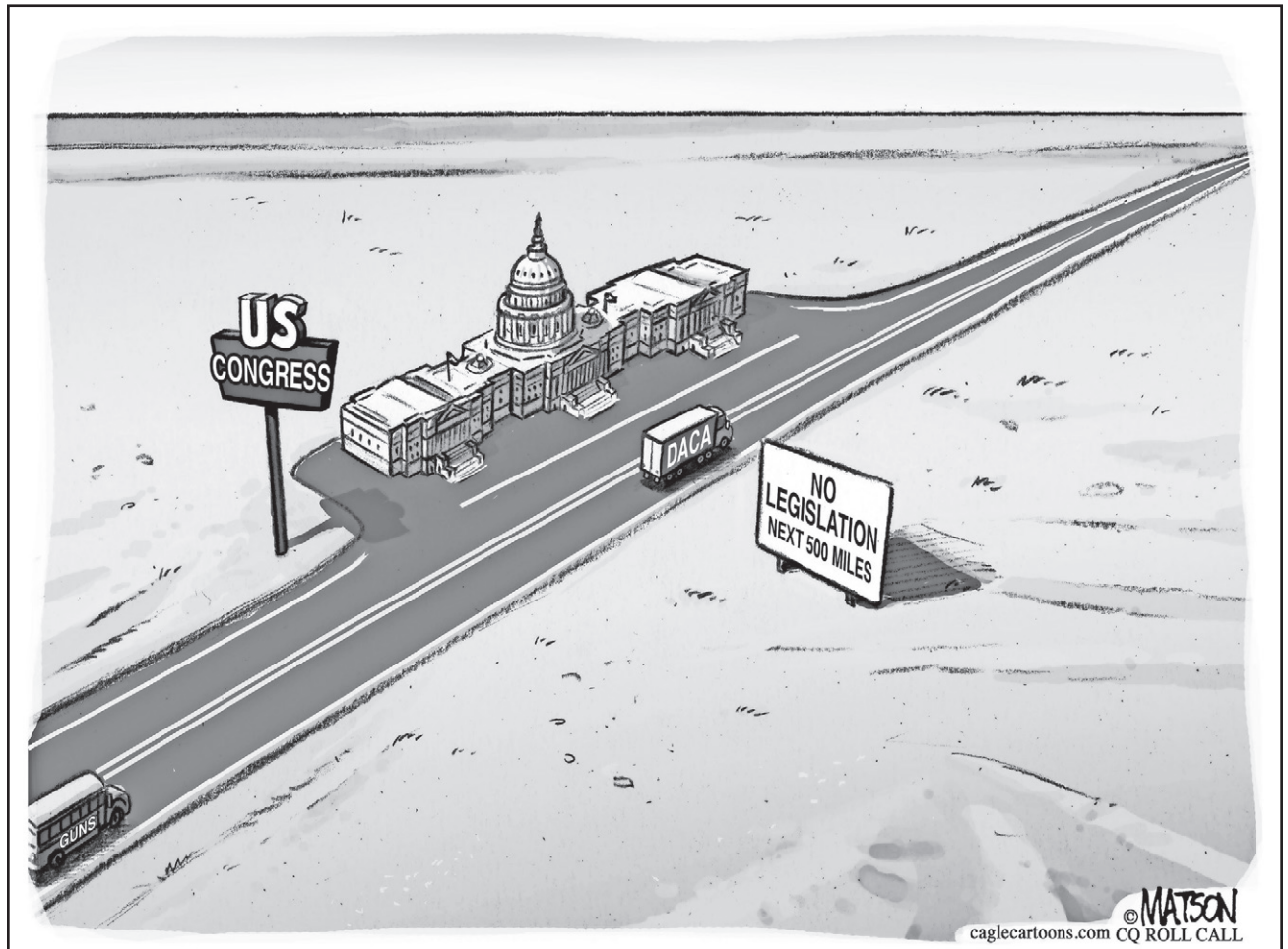

what that child might be lacking in the ninth grade," she said.

There may be concerns about the number of students who advance from ninth to 10th grade, but she does not believe this is the answer, Howerton said.

Some teachers are not aware of this change, Howerton said, so there should be more time for teachers to review it and see how it would affect students and teacher evaluations.

Howerton recommended voting on it in April.






School Board Attorney John McClure said this was the first hearing on rule development and it would be re-advertised for rule adoption at a subsequent meeting. He noted it was a lengthy and expensive advertisement.

Deputy Superintendent Andrew Lethbridge said Highlands is an anomaly concerning retention data across the state due to the number of students that are registered as being retained in the high schools.

"In fact, I think we were the number one district because of how we have been doing it," he said. "This is not social promotions."

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continue to be required to take the coursework, but have not passed, Lethbridge said.

Currently if a ninth-grader did not pass algebra, the next year they are still listed as a ninth-grader, but they are moving on and taking geometry while taking algebra at the same time, he explained.

The proposed change would classify the student who did not pass algebra as a 10th-grader in their second year at high school, Lethbridge said. The coursework would not change from

what the district is currently doing.

Assistant Superintendent of Elementary Programs Anne Lindsay noted the Zero Grade Progression would be implemented in the 2018-19 school year.

She suggested deleting it from the Student Progression Plan so the School Board could approve the Student Progression Plan and consider the Zero Grade Progression provision at a later date.

The board agreed with a unanimous "yes" vote.

at all schools, the cost would be about \$1.3 million, including startup costs, Highlands County Sheriff Paul Blackman, who attended the meeting, said.

After the startup costs, it would be about \$900,000 per year, he said.

Blackman said school resource officers in Highlands County are armed. They've been told that if there's a shooting incident, the school resource officers are expected to enter the building, rather than wait for backup.

That instruction was in response to criticisms of the Broward County school resource deputies

who didn't enter the school.

Sebring City Councilman Charlie Lowrance questioned whether teachers and staff could be trained to possess guns.

Superintendent of Schools Brenda Longshore, also in attendance Tuesday, said she is "not eager to go down that path."

She said she would "rather our educators educate" and trained law enforcement officers provide protection.

Longshore said first she would look at other means of protection such as entry gates into the schools.

Nevertheless, Lowrance said, he believes it's something that should be considered.

"Nobody wants their child in that position (in

a school shooting incident)," Lowrance said.

Blackman didn't advocate the idea of having teachers trained to possess firearms in classrooms, but said his office would train them if the district moves in that direction.

Longshore and Blackman talked about the increasing use of surveillance cameras that make it easier for authorities to determine what is going on at a school.

She said they've added 300 security cameras and upgraded others. They will be adding more to take care of some blind spots, she said.

Dispatchers at the Highlands County Sheriff's Office are able to pick up security camera feeds and see what is happening in the school, Blackman said.

on the throttle and turn left."

Griffin much prefers the Sebring track.

"There's just something about the sound of the flat road races," he said. "Every year I meet the same people. It's like a reunion. We are a big family here."

As he cooked his ribs "low and slow" on the grill for his dinner, he explained that he, like Griffin, used to attend Daytona but now only attends the 12 Hours of Sebring.

"Sebring is very fan-friendly," Wagnstrom said. "Everyone gets together and has a good time. You see the same people year after year."

Wagnstrom's site isn't as elaborate as many. He has taken the back and passenger's seats out of his car and sleeps there. It doesn't seem to bother him; he's busy catching

inside Sebring's famed "Green Park." The party starts just a few minutes after the first camper pulls in Wednesday morning – after weeks of waiting in line to score prime infield real estate. Green Park, which encapsulates the infield area from Turn 5 to Turn 10 is etched in motor-sport lore.

"There's a lot of crazy people and things going on all around the race track," said defending Mobil 1 Twelve Hours of Sebring champion Jordan Taylor, who drives the No. 10 Konica Minolta Cadillac DPi-V.R. "I think everyone needs to walk through Green Park at least once in their life. It is known all around the racing community, and whether you're a competitor or fan, I think it's something you need to experience. That's the real heart of the Sebring 12-hour."

"Usually in the race, you'll come down to the Hairpin (Turn 7), and someone has set something on fire," adds No. 4 Corvette Racing Chevrolet Corvette C7.R driver Oliver Gavin, a six-time Sebring class winner. "That could be anything from a car to a couch. You see all kinds of vehicles pulling all kinds of trailers behind."

And while it's definitely a festive environment, the fans are dedicated, and the drivers have gotten to know some of them over the years. One loyal group some have grown particularly fond of are the fans – young and old – who set up camp each year in Turn 10.

"We usually go out to Turn 10 every year during qualifying," says No. 3 Corvette Racing Chevrolet Corvette C7.R driver Jan Magnussen, defending GTLM winner who has five career Sebring victories and is making his 20th start this year. "That's the most 'Sebring' think I experience every year. It's a great group of people who hang out together each year and have a good time."

"They're there for the racing and there for the socializing. They even have water fights with our kids, so it's a great time. I'm looking forward to it again. You see a lot of the same people every year, but you also meet lots of new people."

"Every year that I've raced in the Twelve Hours, I've made the trip

"The group comes from all around the world, so it's cool to stop by every year and catch up – and of course – collect their new year's key ring. I've had some different teammates over the years, so I now try and bring my new teammates over to really let them experience what Sebring is all about."

While Green Park may be party headquarters at Sebring, the inhabitants tend to get out and about during race week. The previously mentioned autograph session, which this year takes place in the IMSA WeatherTech SportsCar Championship paddock at 11 a.m. Friday, March 16, is one such occasion.

"They're all great," said Gavin. "There are cows, monks, and who knows what else?"

"The monks and the cows are cool, but my favorite are the Vikings," said 2017 GT Daytona (GTD) class winner Ben Keating, who returns this year in the No. 33 Mercedes-AMG GT3. "I mean, Vikings are

warriors. Sebring is a battle. I feel like the Vikings represent the Sebring culture best of all."

"My personal favorite Sebring tradition, however, is the giant race car with stadium seating that cruises around the infield. I am pretty certain they took the box off an old RV or something, installed the stadium seating, and put a giant rendering of a race car on both sides. I think this is the ultimate fan transportation and represents the love of Sebring fans."

La Bomba

"La Bomba!" exclaims Corvette Racing Program Manager Doug Fehan, who was deeply moved the year he saw it festooned in Velocity Yellow and full Corvette C7.R regalia. "La Bomba was any number of things, but when La Bomba rode by and it was the yellow C7 Corvette race car, we realized that we had reached the pinnacle of success at Sebring."

"When you can get recognized by La Bomba, that's as good as it gets. That's probably more important than winning the race."

It's a feeling that Keating wants to experience himself.

"I don't know what race car it will be this year, but I think having the No. 33 Mercedes-AMG GT3 represented on this rig

IndyCar season opens at St. Pete

With the Trans Am/SVRA racing weekend behind us and the Mobil 1 Twelve Hours of Sebring Presented by Advance Auto Parts a week away, those wanting to get their racing fix this weekend can make the journey over to St. Petersburg for the first race of the 2018 Verizon IndyCar Series. Pirelli World Challenge will



also be there and between the two series, fans can get an early glimpse at many of the drivers who will be in Sebring next month.

When the IndyCars take to the streets of St. Petersburg for the opening practice session of the 2018 season, a full field of the new race cars will be on display.

You'll have to excuse Jay Frye if he walks around the Firestone Grand Prix of St. Petersburg paddock and pit lane with a sense of accomplishment.

"We have four new teams and owners joining the field for the Verizon IndyCar Series at St. Pete and those four teams are fielding three full-time cars and two cars running anywhere from four to eight races this year," said Frye, INDYCAR's president of competition and operations.

The St. Petersburg field features 24 entries in all. Among them are seven drivers who have won Indy car championships, 13 Indy car race winners and seven 2018 Sunoco Rookie of the Year candidates, including four drivers who will make their series debut.

But more important to Frye are the four new entrants that have committed to helping grow the sport. The teams are Carlin, Harding Racing, Juncos Racing and Michael Shank Racing with Schmidt Peterson.

"Seeing the results of all the hard work that these owners have done to get here is really exciting and their role in the growth of the series is something to be proud of," Frye said. "Michael Shank, Ricardo Juncos, Trevor Carlin and Mike Harding are part of the future of the sport and we're happy to have them."

One driver to keep an eye on is Simon Pagenaud, who will be in Sebring next week to compete in the No. 6 Acura Team Penske Prototype.

The 2016 Verizon IndyCar Series champion put together a run of consistency in his title defense last year that included 13 top-five and 15 top-10 finishes — both career highs — to accompany with two wins, one pole and 187 laps led. But it wasn't enough to prevent Team Penske teammate Josef Newgarden from snatching away the championship.

Looking to the 2018 season that begins this week in St. Petersburg, Florida, Pagenaud's aim is to get back to the form that won him the Astor Cup two seasons ago when he set personal standard with five wins, seven poles and a staggering 406 laps led.

"I think (2017) was great, probably one of my best Indy car seasons. Looking at the average result, it was the best average, but it did not win me the championship, unfortunately," said Pagenaud, driver of the No. 22 Menards Team Penske Chevrolet in IndyCar.

"That means I need to win more races. Obviously, '16 was an example. We had worse (overall) results, but more wins (than last year), so we have to find ways to be a little bit more aggressive at times, maybe. That can be good, that can bad, because that means my consistency might not be quite as good. It might be worth taking a risk and seeing how it goes this year.

"I think the (new universal aero kit) package is going to make it very different in terms of the racing, so we have to wait and see."

One big reason for the Gasparilla Music Festival's success is that they're not afraid to do things a little differently. That starts at the very top, as the festival organizers — the Gasparilla Music Foundation — is a 501(c)-3 non-profit organization with the goal of supporting local performers, local eating establishments, music education and the Tampa area as a whole.

"We're a non-profit and we really promote regional arts and culture," said Gasparilla Music Foundation Executive Director David Cox.

Cox said the goal is to have close to 50 percent of the bands who perform at the festival be regionally based, such as from Tampa, Naples, Orlando and Gainesville.

Allowing them to play the festival is a good way to give the bands exposure, both to fans and other musicians.

"We're trying to give them a good spot," Cox said. "They really love it."

GMF is also more family oriented than your typical music festival, which is by design.

"We try to expose families to our music festival so they come back and enjoy it every year," Cox said.

Young performers and those aimed at kids will play early both Saturday and Sunday, and on Sunday the Kids Fest takes place in a partnership with Glazer Children's Museum, which features Disney's Imagination Movers for two shows, along with free admission to the museum and plenty of other activities aimed at

youngsters. Children under 12 are admitted to the festival free, as Cox said making the festival affordable was the best way to attract families.

While the date for the \$40 two-day ticket has passed, general admission tickets are still available for \$60 for both days or Saturday (\$40) or Sunday (\$30) only.

"We wanted to keep our ticket prices as low as possible," Cox said. "Tickets on Sunday start at \$30, so a family of four two small kids, can attend for \$60 and we'll have 20 bands and lots for the kids to do."

Cox said the event sponsors and membership group were the ones who helped make the festival possible and it couldn't be done without their help, along with a devoted group of volunteers.

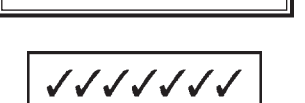

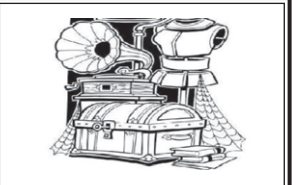

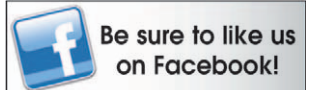

School safety bill moves forward

Trump administration escalates California immigration feud

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — U.S. Attorney General Jeff Sessions brought the Trump administration's feud with California to the doorstep of the state Capitol on Wednesday, suing over its so-called sanctuary state law and dramatically escalating a war with the liberal powerhouse in a sharp exchange of words with Democratic Gov. Jerry Brown.

Sessions was defiant as he spoke to local law enforcement officials about the lawsuit, citing a series of California laws that he says are unconstitutional and violate common sense.

"I can't sit by idly while the lawful authority of federal officers are being blocked by legislative acts and politicians," he said, straying from his prepared remarks.

Brown didn't hold back in his response, calling Sessions a liar and saying it was unprecedented for the attorney general to "act more like Fox News than a law enforcement officer." He accused Sessions of "going to war" with California to appease President Donald Trump.

"What Jeff Sessions said is simply not true and I call upon him to apologize to the people of California for bringing the mendacity of Washington to California," the governor told reporters.

The lawsuit is the latest salvo in an escalating feud between the Trump administration and California, which has resisted the president on issues from marijuana policy to climate change and

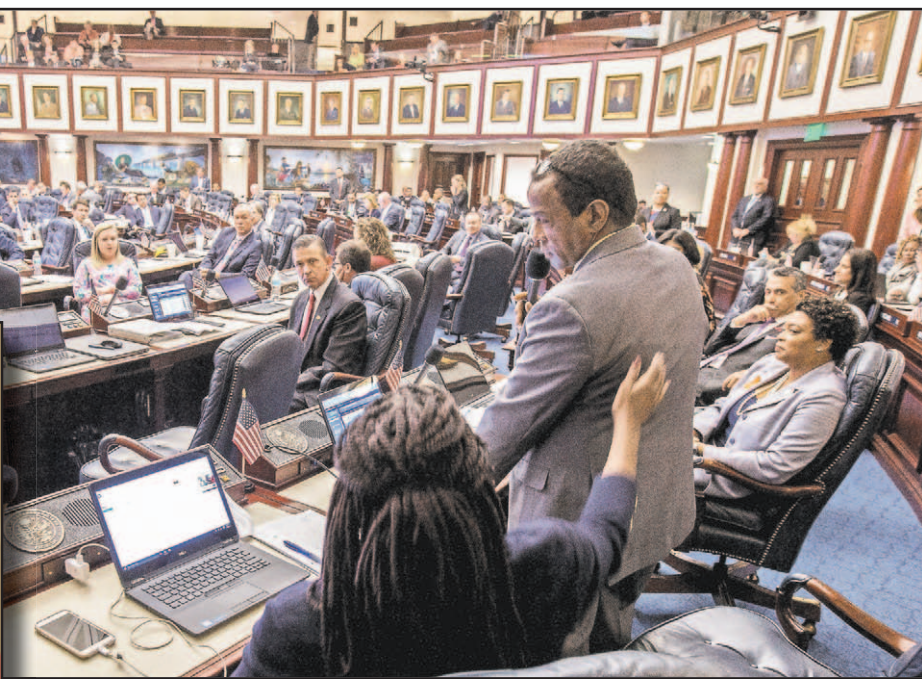
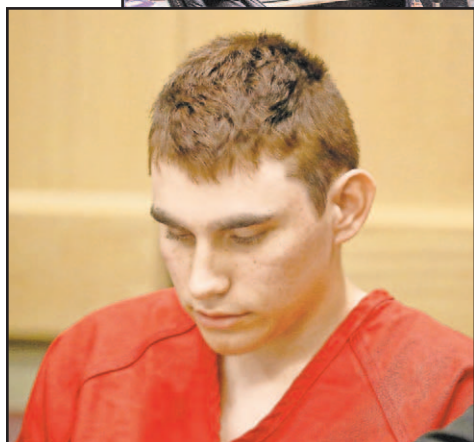

Gun legislation passes Florida House, goes to governor

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — The Florida House passed a school safety bill Wednesday that includes new restrictions on rifle sales and a program to arm some teachers, sending the measure to the governor for his signature.

The vote of 67-50 reflected a mix of Republicans and Democrats in support and opposition. The measure, a response to the shootings at a Parkland high school that left 17 dead, is supported by the victims' families.

Andrew Pollack, who lost his 18-year-old daughter Meadow in the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School shooting, and Ryan Petty, who lost his 14-year-old daughter Alaina, said there

was enough good in the bill that it should pass.

Democratic Rep. Kristin Jacobs said she did not like the idea of arming teachers, but she voted yes. Republican Rep. Jay Fant said raising the minimum age to buy a rifle from 18 to 21 was unconstitutional, and he voted no.

"There is a cultural divide in this room, in this state and across the country. And there's a bill before us that is not perfect," said Jacobs, whose district includes Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School.

The bill would raise the minimum age to buy rifles from 18 to 21 and create a waiting period on sales of the weapons. It would also create a so-called guardian program that would let school employees and many teachers carry handguns if they go through law enforcement training and if

the school district decides to participate in the program.

Other provisions would create new mental health programs for schools; establish an anonymous tip line where students and others could report threats to schools, ban bump stocks and improve communication between schools, law enforcement and state agencies.

Fant, who is running for attorney general, said the gun restrictions violate the constitution.

"I just can't imagine that Nikolas Cruz can commit such a heinous crime and then as a result we tell, potentially, a 20-year-old single mother living alone that she cannot purchase a firearm to defend herself," Fant said.

The Florida Senate narrowly passed the bill Monday. Gov. Rick Scott declined to say Wednesday whether he would sign the legislation.

Scott has repeatedly said he doesn't support arming teachers and pushed lawmakers to adopt his proposal, which called for at least one law enforcement officer in every school and one for every thousand students who attend a school.

"I'm going to take the time and I'm going to read the bill and I'm going to talk to families," Scott told reporters.

Shooting suspect Cruz was formally charged with 17 counts of first-degree murder Wednesday, which could mean a death sentence if he is convicted.

The indictment returned by a grand jury in Fort Lauderdale also charges the 19-year-old with 17 counts of attempted murder for the Valentine's Day massacre at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland in

UK police: Russian ex-spy was attacked with nerve agent

LONDON — A Russian ex-spy and his daughter fighting for their lives in an English hospital were attacked with a nerve agent in a targeted murder attempt, British police said Wednesday.

The case has further strained relations between Russia and Britain, which has said it will respond strongly if the Russian government is linked to the attack. It has overtones of a 2006 fatal attack on a former Russian spy that was blamed on the Kremlin.

In that incident, a radioactive poison was used. The choice of a nerve agent in the latest case follows the use of the banned nerve agent VX to kill the estranged half-brother of North Korea's leader last year.

Sergei Skripal, 66, and his 33-year-old daughter Yulia were found unconscious on a bench in the southwestern English city of Salisbury on Sunday, triggering a police investigation led by counterterrorism detectives. Baffled police initially said the pair had come into contact with an unknown substance.

"Having established that a nerve agent is the cause of the

symptoms leading us to treat this as attempted murder, I can also confirm that we believe that the two people who became unwell were targeted specifically," Metropolitan Police counterterrorism chief Mark Rowley said.

Police said the two "remain in a critical condition in intensive care after being exposed to the substance."

Police have declined to speculate on who might be behind the attack. The Russian government has denied any involvement in the attack on Skripal, a former Russian agent who had served jail time in his

homeland for spying for Britain before being freed in a spy swap.

Rowley said a police officer who treated Skripal and his daughter at the scene was in serious condition. He did not provide the officer's name or specifics about his condition.

Rowley didn't say what nerve agent was suspected in the attack. Nerve agents are chemicals that disrupt the messages sent by the nerves to the body's organs. They can be administered in gas or liquid form, causing symptoms including vomiting, breathlessness, paralysis and often death. Officials have not offered a prognosis for

Skripal and his daughter.

Sally Davies, the chief medical officer for England, said there was a low risk to the public.

Police and forensics officers continued to scour several sites in and around Salisbury on Wednesday. Police kept residents away from an Italian restaurant and a pub in the city, and cordoned off part of a business park about nine miles (14 kilometers) away, near the ancient stone monument of Stonehenge. Detectives appealed for information from anyone who visited either the

Geometric clusters of cyclones churn over Jupiter's poles

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Jupiter's poles are blanketed by geometric clusters of cyclones and its atmosphere is deeper than scientists suspected.

These are just some of the discoveries reported by four international research teams Wednesday, based on observations by NASA's Juno spacecraft circling Jupiter.

One group uncovered a constellation of nine cyclones over Jupiter's north pole and six over the south pole. The wind speeds exceed Category 5 hurricane strength in places, reaching 220 mph.

The massive storms

haven't changed position much — or merged — since observations began.

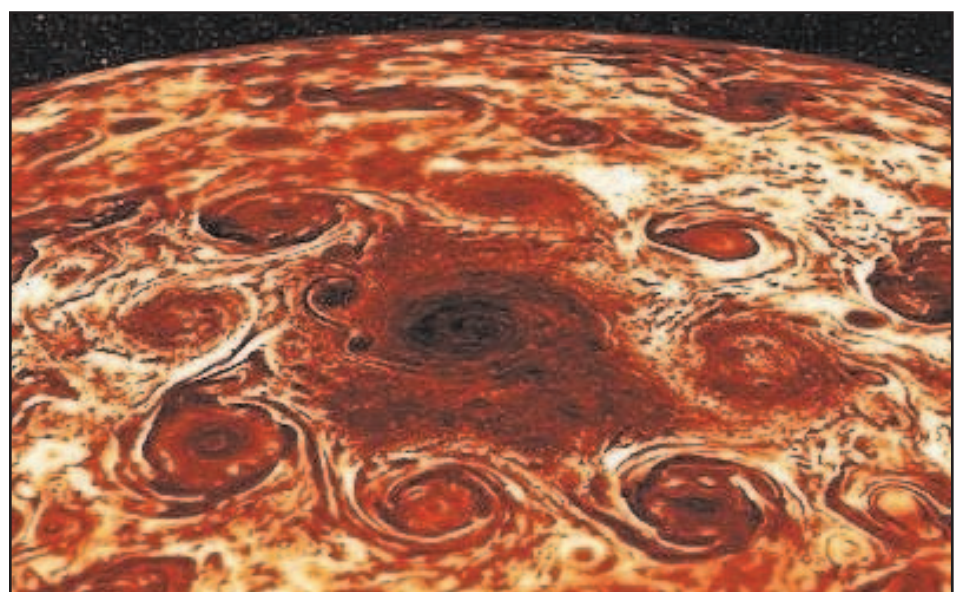
Team leader Alberto Adriani of Italy's National Institute for Astrophysics in Rome was surprised to find such complex structures. Scientists thought they'd find something similar to the six-sided cloud system spinning over Saturn's north pole.

"We were wrong about it," he said via email. Instead, they found an octagon-shaped grouping over the north pole, with eight cyclones surrounding one in the middle, and a pentagon-shaped batch over the south pole. Each cyclone measures several thousand miles across.

The fifth planet from our sun, gas giant Jupiter is by far the largest planet in our solar system. Launched in 2011, Juno has been orbiting Jupiter since 2016 and peering beneath the thick ammonia clouds. It's only the second spacecraft to circle the planet; Galileo did it from 1995 to 2003.

Another of the studies in this week's journal Nature finds that Jupiter's crisscrossing east-west jet streams actually penetrate thousands of miles beneath the visible cloud tops. Refined measurements of Jupiter's uneven gravity field enabled the Weizmann Institute of Science's Yohai Kaspi in

which 17 people died and more than a dozen others were wounded.

Cruz's public defender has said he will plead guilty if prosecutors take the death penalty off the table, which would mean

a life prison sentence. Prosecutors have 45 days to decide whether they want to seek the death penalty.

James and Kimberly Snead, the couple who gave Cruz a home after his mother died late last year, testified before the grand jury. James Snead and the couple's attorney, Jim Lewis, wore silver "17"

pins to honor the victims of the shooting.

The couple is "trying to do the right thing" and is mourning along with the rest of the Parkland community, Lewis said.

"We'll let justice take its course at this point," Lewis said. "They still don't know what happened, why this happened. They don't have

any answers. They feel very badly for everybody."

Cruz told investigators he took an AR-15 rifle to his former school on Feb. 14 and started shooting into classrooms.

Jail records released by the Broward Sheriff's Office show Cruz was being held in solitary confinement. Officers described Cruz as avoiding

eye contact with deputies but also being cooperative and engaged with his visitors.

The report said Cruz "often sits with a blank stare," asked for a Bible to read and appeared to be "smiling and giggling" during one visit with his attorneys. Investigators and psychiatrists also have visited Cruz in his

single-person cell in the jail's infirmary, where officers note his activities every 15 minutes.

His brother visited him twice, along with Roxanne Deschamps, who took in both teens after their mother died in November. Cruz lived with Deschamps only briefly before moving in with the Sneads.

defiantly refuses to help federal agents detain and deport immigrants. U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement has said it will increase its presence in California, and Sessions wants to cut off funding to jurisdictions that won't cooperate.

The governor and state

Attorney General Javier Becerra, who has sued the Trump administration numerous times, held a news conference just blocks from where Sessions spoke at a hotel, but they never interacted.

Sessions also used his speech to sharply criticize Oakland Mayor Libby Schaaf for warning the public about an unannounced raid by federal deportation officers recently in California.

Sessions said it allowed hundreds of "wanted criminals" to avoid arrest.

"How dare you?" Sessions said of Schaaf at a California Peace Officers Association meeting in Sacramento. "How dare you needlessly endanger the lives of law enforcement just to promote your radical open borders agenda?"

Schaaf later echoed the refrain to slam Sessions for tearing apart families

and distorting the reality of declining violent crime in a "sanctuary city" like Oakland.

"How dare you vilify members of our community by trying to frighten the American public into believing that all undocumented residents are dangerous criminals?" she told reporters.

Sessions received a polite if not warm reception from law enforcement officials, even when he

told them his goal was to make their jobs safer. They applauded politely as he was introduced and after his speech, and more than a dozen gave a standing ovation at the end in a room of about 200 officials.

But many sat expressionless, some listening with arms crossed or chins on their folded hands, and his 25-minute speech was never interrupted by applause

or protest.

Outside, dozens of demonstrators chanted "stand up, fight back" and "no justice, no peace" and some blocked traffic on a major thoroughfare. There was a heavy police presence but no arrests.

"This is a reminder that California does not see his federal policies," said Steven Lynn, 33, a Sacramento graduate student. "We are a state of immigrants."

Zizzi restaurant or the Bishop's Mill pub in Salisbury on Sunday.

Residents saw their usually placid town, famed for its 13th-century Gothic cathedral, turned into the center of a criminal probe with Cold War echoes.

With nerves still on edge, ambulances and emergency vehicles rushed to a building beside the Zizzi restaurant, which remains cordoned off. Witness Toni Walker said emergency services escorted two women from the building. Police and ambulance services declined to comment and it wasn't immediately clear if the incident had anything to do with the ongoing investigation.

Home Secretary Amber Rudd chaired a meeting

of the government's emergency committee, known as Cobra, to discuss the investigation, which is now in the hands of counterterrorism police.

"We need to keep a cool head and make sure we collect all the evidence we can," Rudd said. "And then we need to decide what action to take."

Moscow officials, angered by allegations of Russian state involvement, accused Britain of using the case to fuel an "anti-Russian campaign" and further damage ties with Britain.

"What happened to Skripal has been immediately used to further incite an anti-Russian campaign in Western media," said Russian Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Maria Zakharova.

Skripal, a former colonel in Russia's GRU military intelligence service, was convicted in

2006 of spying for Britain and imprisoned. He was freed in 2010 as part of a widely publicized spy swap in which the U.S. agreed to hand over 10 members of a Russian sleeper cell found operating in America in return for four Russians convicted of spying for the West.

He and his daughter were found collapsed on a bench near a shopping mall Sunday in Salisbury, 90 miles southwest of London.

Foreign Secretary Boris Johnson told lawmakers Tuesday that if Moscow is shown to have been involved, the government would act — possibly downgrading England's participation in this year's soccer World Cup in Russia.

While police say they are keeping an open mind about the case, it has reminded many in Britain of the 2006 poisoning of former spy

Alexander Litvinenko.

A British inquiry into his death found that Russian agents poisoned him by lacing his tea with radioactive polonium-210 and that the killing was probably approved by Russian President Vladimir Putin. Russia has denied any involvement in the Litvinenko case, and refused a request by Britain to extradite his accused killers.

Litvinenko's widow, Marina, wrote Wednesday in the Times of London that her husband's killing made clear to Britain's emergency services that they need to act quickly when "someone suddenly falls mysteriously ill."

"I am happy my story has raised awareness about the potential danger posed by Moscow, and this could help to save somebody's life," she wrote in an opinion piece.

Rehovot, Israel, and his colleagues to calculate the depth of the jet streams at about 1,865 miles.

"The result is a surprise because this indicates that the atmosphere of Jupiter is massive and extends much deeper than we previously expected," Kaspi said in an email.

By better understanding these strong jet streams and the gravity field, Kaspi said scientists can better decipher the core of Jupiter. A similar situation may be occurring at other big gas planets like Saturn, where the atmosphere could be even deeper than Jupiter's, he said.

Jonathan Fortney of the University of California, Santa Cruz, who was not involved in the research, called

the findings "extremely robust" and said they show "high-precision measurements of a planet's gravitational field can be used to answer questions of deep planetary dynamics."

Using similar techniques, Juno could help scientists determine the depth of Jupiter's Great Red Spot, a colossal swirling storm, Fortney said in a companion article in the journal.

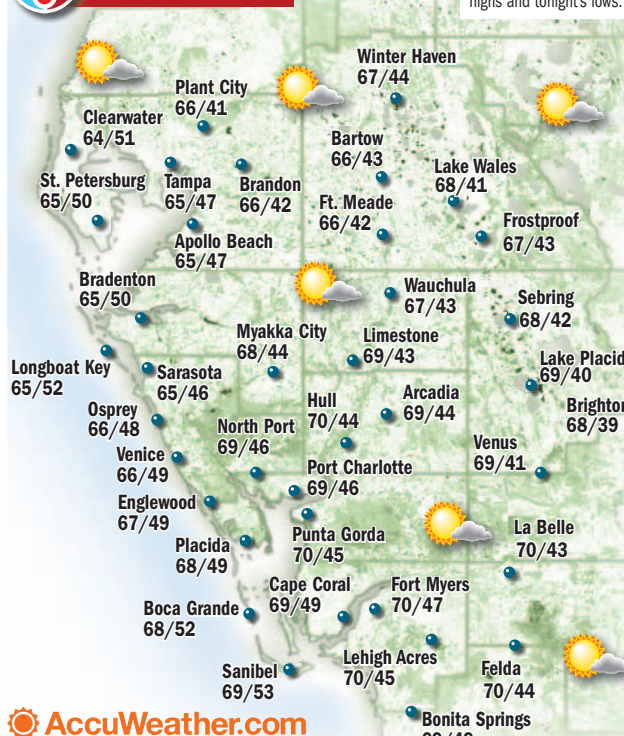
NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory researchers Glenn Orton and Fakhreddin Tabataba-Vakili, who both took part in the cyclone study, said all these new discoveries "show Jupiter from a new perspective" unseen before Juno.

"We cannot say how many mysteries are left to uncover," they wrote in an email. "We are already finding way more fascinating results than we ever expected!"

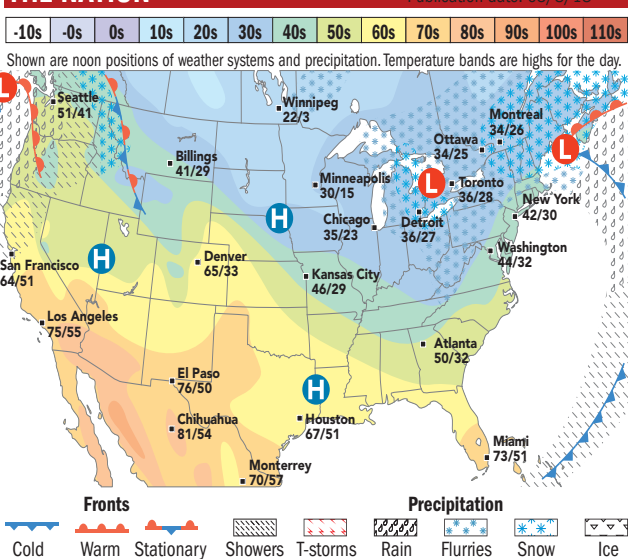

Watchdog report: Failed VA leadership put patients at risk

WASHINGTON — “Failed leadership” at the Department of Veterans Affairs during the Obama years put patients at a major hospital at risk, an internal probe finds — another blow to Secretary David Shulkin, who served at the VA then and is fighting to keep his job.

The 150-page report released Wednesday by the VA internal watchdog offers new details to its preliminary finding last April of patient safety issues at the Washington, D.C., medical center.

Shulkin acknowledged to reporters that the problems were “systemic,” but said he was not aware of the issues at the Washington hospital. He pledged wide-scale change across the VA.

Painting a grim picture of communications breakdowns, chaos and spending waste at the government’s second largest department, the report found that at least three VA program offices directly under Shulkin’s watch knew of “serious, persistent deficiencies” when he was VA undersecretary of health from 2015

to 2016. But it stopped short of saying whether he was told about them.

Shulkin, who was elevated to VA secretary last year by President Donald Trump, told government investigators that he did “not recall” ever being notified of problems.

Among the changes he promised — unannounced audits of its more than 1,700 medical facilities from health experts in the private sector, immediate hiring to fill vacancies at local hospitals and plans in the coming months to streamline bureaucracy and improve communication.

Shulkin pointed specifically to VA medical centers in the New England, Arizona and Washington D.C. regions that needed improvements to address patient safety. “Not to act when you identify systemic failures I think would be negligent,” he said.

Shulkin has been struggling to keep a grip on his job since a blistering report by the inspector general last month concluded that he had violated ethics rules by improperly accepting Wimbledon tennis tickets and that his then chief of staff had doctored emails

to justify his wife traveling to Europe with him at taxpayer expense.

He also faces a rebellion among some VA staff and has issued a sharp warning to them: Get back in line or get out. “I suspect that people are right now making decisions on whether they want to be a part of this team or not,” he said last month.

On Wednesday, the White House affirmed its continued support for Shulkin despite the controversies swirling around him, saying he has done a “great job” implementing changes at VA. “We’re proud of the work that we’ve done and we’re going to continue to do everything we can to ... help veterans in this country,” said spokeswoman Sarah Huckabee Sanders.

The latest IG investigation found poor accounting procedures leading to taxpayer waste, citing at least \$92 million in overpriced medical supplies, along with a threat of data breaches as reams of patients’ sensitive health information sat in 1,300 unsecured boxes.

No patient died as a result of the patient safety issues at the Washington

facility dating back to at least 2013, which resulted in costly hospitalizations, “prolonged or unnecessary anesthesia” while medical staff scrambled to find needed equipment at the last minute, as well as delays and cancellations of medical procedures. The report also noted improvements made at the Washington facility since the IG’s first report in April, when Shulkin replaced the medical center’s director and pledged broader improvements.

Still, VA inspector general Michael Missal cautioned of potential

problems without stronger oversight across the VA network of more than 1,700 facilities.

“Failed leadership at multiple levels within VA put patients and assets at the DC VA Medical Center at unnecessary risk and resulted in a breakdown of core services,” Missal said. “It created a climate of complacency. ... That there was no finding of patient harm was largely due to the efforts of many dedicated health care providers that overcame service deficiencies to ensure patients received needed care.”

Police say Conn. man drove stolen car to court to face stolen car charge

HARTFORD, Conn. — A Hartford man due in court to answer a charge of stealing a car apparently stole a car to get to court, police said.

Jonathan Rivera, 25, was at Superior Court in Hartford on Wednesday to answer a charge of first-degree larceny and tampering with a motor vehicle involving the theft of a car in Hartford on Feb. 17.

As he waited to appear before a judge, Hartford Parking Authority agents scanning license plates for parking violators got a hit on a white 2014 Subaru Legacy parked near the courthouse. The license plates had been reported stolen and the car itself had been stolen from Newington, police said.

Police kept an eye on the car, and when Rivera left court, got in and tried to drive away, they moved in and arrested him.

Appeals court gives green light to ‘climate kids’ lawsuit

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — A federal appeals court has given the green light to a lawsuit filed by young activists who say the U.S. government is failing to protect them from climate change.

The lawsuit brought by 21 children and young adults asserts the government has known for decades that carbon pollution causes climate change but has failed to curb greenhouse gas emissions. They are seeking various environmental remedies.

A three-judge panel of the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals on Wednesday rejected the government’s request for an order directing a lower court to dismiss the case.

Julia Olson, an attorney for the plaintiffs, said in a statement that the group will put the federal government’s “dangerous energy system and climate policies on trial.”

Navy begins under-ice submarine exercise off Alaska coast

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — The U.S. Navy has started testing and training of submarines under sea ice off Alaska’s north coast that takes place every other year.

Three U.S. submarines and a British sub will take part in the five-week exercise that the Navy calls ICEX 2018.

The Navy will set up a temporary command center camp on sea ice in the Beaufort Sea about 150 to 175 miles north of Prudhoe Bay to oversee the under-ice navigation and torpedo exercises.

Vessels participating include the USS Connecticut from Bangor, Washington, the USS Hartford from Groton, Connecticut, and the British Royal Navy’s HMS Trenchant.

The last Arctic exercise by the U.S. Submarine Force was conducted in 2016, when a crack in ice through the camp forced an early evacuation.

France’s Macron laments Trump’s recognition of Jerusalem

PARIS (AP) — French President Emmanuel Macron says U.S. President Donald Trump’s recognition of Jerusalem as Israel’s capital was an “error” and France has no plans to follow in his footsteps.

Macron met Wednesday with France’s leading Jewish group, which urged France to make a similar recognition.

The French leader said he didn’t think Trump has “helped with resolving the conflict” between Israelis and Palestinians. He called the U.S. move “a real error in this context.”

Macron said that if France did the same, “we would lose this status of honest broker, which is the only useful one for the region” — a status that the U.S. can no longer enjoy.

The Palestinians claim part of Jerusalem for the capital of an eventual state and have rejected U.S. mediation in peace efforts.

Mexico City: Water cutoffs in capital worsened by sabotage

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Intentional sabotage may be contributing to recurrent water shortages in Mexico City that have caused protests on the streets of the city of 9 million people, officials said Wednesday.

In recent weeks, officials have blamed dry faucets in many neighborhoods on everything from power shortages to failing pipes and the spring dry season.

But Mayor Miguel Angel Mancera said some group has been shutting off water distribution valves at about 50 points in the sprawling megalopolis. Mancera did not say who was believed to be responsible, but said anyone caught closing valves would be arrested.

The mayor said the city is purchasing lockable covers for the valves.

Residents will vote for Mexico’s president and the city’s mayor in July 1 elections, and some fear the sabotage may be politically motivated.

Saudi women take the wheel, test-driving a new freedom

JIDDAH, Saudi Arabia — Fatima Salem giggles with hesitation when it’s her turn to drive through a small parking lot lined with bright orange cones and arrows. Like millions of Saudi women, she plans on applying for a driver’s license when the kingdom lifts its ban on women driving in June. But first, she has to learn how to drive.

“I’m a little nervous,” the 30-year-old master’s student said. Francesca Pardini, an Italian former racecar driver, helps calm her nerves, reminding Salem to check the mirrors and buckle up. Once on the road, Pardini reached over to help straighten out the wheel after a left turn, and they both lurched forward when Salem stepped on the brakes before a stop sign.

The right to drive, which people in other countries gain as teenagers after a similar ordeal — derisively

referred to as driver’s ed — has been denied to Saudi women. Dozens who dared to protest and defy the ban over the years were jailed, prosecuted and stigmatized.

A stunning royal decree issued last year by King Salman announcing that women would be allowed to drive in 2018 upended one of the most visible forms of discrimination against women in Saudi Arabia, where guardianship laws still give men the final say on whether a woman can travel abroad, obtain a passport or marry.

The king’s 32-year-old son and heir, Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, has pushed through a number of other reforms to relax some of the country’s ultraconservative rules, including allowing women into stadiums to watch sports, bringing back musical concerts and promising a return of movie theaters this month after a more than three-decade ban.

The reforms are aimed

at improving Saudi Arabia’s image abroad, attracting foreign investors, increasing women’s participation in the workforce and boosting local household spending as lower oil prices force the kingdom to undertake sensitive austerity measures.

The ban on women driving has been costly for Saudi families. The wealthy hire and house male drivers, often from South Asian countries, while others make due with taxis and ride-hailing services. Still, for many women, commuting to work or running basic errands requires a husband or son who can make the drive.

At the female-only campus of Effat University in Jiddah, dozens of young Saudi students dressed in long, loose black robes — still the required dress code — braved the afternoon heat for a chance to learn how to drive on their own.

The university organized training this week

for students to learn the basics of how to operate a car. For most of the young women, the hour-long training, sponsored by Ford Motor, is the first time they’ve ever sat in the driver’s seat. Female-only universities across Saudi Arabia are expected to offer women full driving courses once the rules and guidelines from the government are announced.

“I felt out of place. I’ve never sat on that side of

the car. Usually I always sit in the back or on the right side, but it felt good. You feel, like, in control,” said Sara Ghouth, an 18-year-old freshman. “I want to drive a car. I want to be independent.”

Car companies see the lifting of the ban as an opportunity to promote their brands and rev up sales in Saudi Arabia, a country of around 20 million citizens where around half are women.

Charlottesville sued as permit for rally denied

The white nationalist who organized last year's deadly Unite the Right protest in Charlottesville, Va., is suing city officials over refusing a permit for an anniversary rally this summer.

The Aug. 12 rally devolved into widespread violence when police said "alt-right" James Alex Fields rammed his car into a crowd of counter-protesters, killing Heather Heyer and injuring 19 others. Fields, charged with first-degree murder, faces up to life in prison.

Citing last year's violence and their inability to manage crowds, Charlottesville officials refused to give organizer Jason Kessler a permit for an anniversary rally in Emancipation Park, where last summer's demonstration was held in part to protest its renaming from Lee Park after the general.

In his lawsuit filed Tuesday against the move, Kessler blamed Charlottesville for last summer's violence, saying the city did not properly separate his original rally from what he called "illegal" left-wing counter-protesters. Because the city previously allowed much larger rallies, Kessler said, the content of his speech is being targeted, in violation of the First Amendment.

"Of course, the key difference is that white rights aren't allowed a platform but white genocide is," Kessler said in his lawsuit.

White nationalists argue that white people should rule the U.S. and that diversity is tantamount to genocide against whites. Kessler said the rally would be "memorializing the sacrifices made by political dissidents in Lee Park."

Charlottesville officials could not be immediately reached for comment on the lawsuit. In their rejection of Kessler's request for a permit, the city said it was concerned far more people than expected would show up.

The city said, "The applicant requests that police keep opposing sides separate and that police 'leave' a 'clear path into event without threat of violence' but the city does not have the ability to determine or sort individuals according to what 'side' they are on and no reasonable allocation of city resources or funds can guarantee that event participants will be free of any 'threats of violence.'"

This week, white nationalist Richard Spencer spoke to a small group of supporters at Michigan State University after they were escorted into the venue by police braving some 500 counter-protesters. Violence broke out, and police arrested more than 20 people.

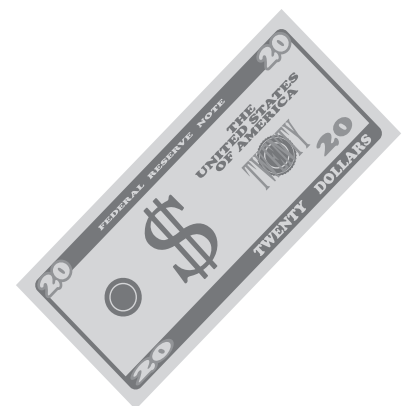

MAI a lung infection that closely resembles tuberculosis

DEAR DR. ROACH: I'm a 65-year-old woman in relatively good health. I've been diagnosed with a nontuberculous mycobacterial lung infection (mycobacterium avium-intracellulare, or MAI) leading to bronchiectasis. I'm taking three antibiotics (rifampin, azithromycin and ethambutol). I've been referred to specialists in both infectious diseases and pulmonary medicine.

After several CT scans, the doctors have determined that I have significant damage to the middle lobe of my right lung and to the top of the upper lobe of the right lung. The infectious disease doctor recommends surgery to remove the middle lobe and the damaged area of the upper lobe, because the damage is so great that the antibiotics cannot reach it and therefore cannot cure the disease (because there is insufficient blood flow). It looks like my choice is to either have the surgery or stay on antibiotics for the rest of my life. The surgery gives me a chance of a cure, but no guarantee. Your

opinion would be very much appreciated. — L.B.

ANSWER: The mycobacteria are a class of infectious organisms, the most medically important of which is *Mycobacterium tuberculosis*. However, several others can cause diseases that somewhat resemble tuberculosis.

The one you have, MAI, seen most in women in their 60s and 70s. In fact, the specific entity of right middle lobe disease with bronchiectasis and scarring, usually from MAI, is called Lady Windermere's syndrome. It's named

after a character in an Oscar Wilde play. Treatment usually involves antibiotics, which may take years to clear up the infection.

I spoke with an infectious disease specialist with more experience than I have, who said that surgical treatment is not unusual.

I can't provide a medical opinion about your specific case: Only your doctors can do so, and only after a thorough review of both you and your scans. I agree with you that surgery is never to be taken lightly, and in a 65-year-old, it's important to think twice before any surgery. I certainly would get a surgical referral from your doctors and discuss with the surgeon the risks and benefits. If you already have been on treatment for six months without clear bacteriological improvement, that alone is an indication for surgical referral, as is extensive localized disease, which it sounds like you have. I also should point out that even after surgery, some people still need long-term antibiotics.

DEAR DR. ROACH: In a recent column, you suggested

omeprazole for the treatment of GERD. I had heard that it could contribute to dementia, so I checked with my pharmacist, and he seemed to agree. What do you think? — J.D.

ANSWER: Long-term proton pump inhibitors such as omeprazole increase risk of pneumonia, diarrhea and poor absorption of minerals such as calcium.

Whether they increase risk of dementia is not clear: One study said they might; others have not, and my opinion is that they are unlikely to have a major effect. What is clear is that these drugs provide a major benefit in the short term for many people and generally are safe. However, long-term use should be reserved for people who really need them (say, those with permanent damage to the esophagus, like Barrett's esophagus) or those who do not do well on alternatives, including with a good trial of proper diet, advice on not eating before bed and a careful evaluation of any medications that might worsen symptoms.

Rays to use four-man rotation

PORT CHARLOTTE — There's never a dull day at Tampa Bay Rays training camp.

Just when things look like they're beginning to settle down, manager Kevin Cash let loose a secret the team has been holding on to.

"Our plan, we're not going to five (starting

pitchers)," Cash said. "We're going to try to stay at four. We're going to have some bullpen days in there and we're going to try to do that for a long period of time. We're going to learn a lot the first six weeks. We're going to schedule in a bullpen day as our fifth starter."

Cash had originally indicated earlier in the spring that the four-man

rotation would just be for the first six weeks of the season. With nine off days in the early parts of the season, the Rays could only need the four starting pitchers of Chris Archer, Jake Faria, Blake Snell and Nate Eovaldi, while still allowing them to pitch on their normal rest.

"I think it is different, but we're also a different kind of team," Eovaldi

said. "We have a lot of guys in the bullpen who can be starters. So we have a lot of guys who can go multiple innings out of the bullpen. I think that makes a huge difference as opposed to having five or six starters and hoping they go six or seven innings and then you have a bullpen guy going one or two."

Tiger plays at Innisbrook for the first time since 1996

PALM HARBOR — It's 10 minutes shy of 7 a.m., the sun has barely risen and already more than 100 people have gathered around the first tee of the Copperhead Course at Innisbrook. Up comes the man of the hour. Actually, make that the man of the year for the Valspar Championship.

"Please welcome ... Tiger Woods."

Never has Innisbrook seen anything quite like this. Arguably the greatest golfer of all time touches the bill of his cap, ever so slightly nods his head and waves to a wide-eyed crowd that seems more awestruck than enthusiastic. It's a

crisp Wednesday morning and Woods is playing in a pro-am with three really lucky amateurs, including the president of the tournament's title sponsor.

Woods places the ball on his tee. One cellphone camera after another pops into the air as Woods pulls back his driver. A violent THWACK strikes the ball.

"Holy (expletive)," whispers a man in the crowd. "Gawwwwd! Would you look at that."

The drive is dead, solid perfect and about a million miles down the fairway.

Others shout out, as if they all know Woods personally.

"Way to go, Tiger!"

"Nice ball, Tiger."

"Atta boy, T!"

"Hey, Tiger, good luck this

week."

And so begins a round of golf with the most famous golfer of his generation, maybe of any generation. Get ready to witness the power of Woods, who is playing at Innisbrook for the first time since 1996. Not that Woods remembers it.

"Not a lot," Woods said. "It was 22 years ago."

That's why, almost every hole, someone in the crowd shouts, "Thanks for coming, Tiger."

Woods responds with a smile.

"Fantastic so far," Woods said when asked about how the crowd is treating him. "They were nice (Tuesday) and they were great (Wednesday)."

Andrei Vasilevskiy battling fatigue as first-time No. 1

Andrei Vasilevskiy is the Lightning's team MVP.

He's been the team's backbone. And that's often a heavy load to carry.

So you can't blame Vasilevskiy, 23, for admitting that he's a bit tired, both mentally and physically. He's in uncharted territory in his first full season as the Lightning's No. 1 goaltender. His 55 games are a career-high, with five of his past six starts going to overtime.

Vasilevskiy said fatigue has impacted his play, giving up 68 goals in his past 21 starts (3.23 per game) after allowing just 64 in his first 33 (1.93). Though, to be fair, how the team plays in front of him has a big part in that.

"Tiredness is something that I probably never faced before," Vasilevskiy said. "I mean, 50-plus games. When you play in 20-plus games, it's like you think, 'Oh, I'm good, I can play 60-plus.' But now when

I'm on 50-plus, I'm like, 'That's tough.'

"So that's why sometimes I'm probably not as sharp, like probably the first half of the season. That's why I have to adjust and be on the top of my game."

Vasilevskiy isn't saying coaches are overworking him — he's the first to tell them he'd love to play in every game. Plus, every No. 1 goalie has to go through this a first time; former Lightning star Ben Bishop did, too, as did Thursday's opponent, the Rangers' Vezina Trophy-winner Henrik Lundqvist.

"You learn by playing and dealing with yourself — your emotions, the ups and downs and how to manage the energy," said Lundqvist, who has played in 60-plus games eight times. "It's hard for someone to tell you what to expect. You deal with it. You battle. Playing a lot of games, yeah, it's a grind. It's a battle. You just have to mentally be prepared for that."

AP Sources: Eagles get Michael Bennett from Seattle

The Super Bowl champion Philadelphia Eagles bolstered their formidable pass rush with another top-level defensive lineman.

The Eagles acquired three-time Pro Bowl defensive end Michael Bennett from the Seattle Seahawks on Wednesday, three people familiar with the trade told The Associated Press. The deal won't be officially announced until the NFL's league

year opens next Wednesday. The people spoke on condition of anonymity because they weren't authorized to release the trade information.

Seattle gets wide receiver Marcus Johnson and a fifth-round pick, while Philadelphia also receives a seventh-round pick.

Bennett had 8 1/2 sacks last season and 54 in his nine-year career. The 32-year-old Bennett has three years remaining on his contract, with a base

salary of just \$1.65 million in 2018. That number jumps to \$6 million in 2019 and \$7.5 million in 2020.

The Eagles will have to make roster moves to accommodate Bennett because they already are over the salary cap. Defensive end Vinny Curry is a likely candidate to be traded or released. Curry started 19 games this season, including playoffs, had three sacks and has three years left on a five-year, \$47 million deal.

Bennett joins a deep

front unit that includes Fletcher Cox, Brandon Graham, Derek Barnett, Chris Long and Tim Jernigan. He probably won't face double-teaming as much and could thrive in defensive coordinator Jim Schwartz's aggressive system.

The outspoken Bennett has been heavily involved in social activism and fits in nicely in Philadelphia's locker room with Long and safety Malcolm Jenkins, who are leaders in those areas.

Rockets extend winning streak to 17, beat Bucks

MILWAUKEE — James Harden scored 26 points, Eric Gordon had 18 points and two momentum-swinging 3-pointers in the third quarter, and the Houston Rockets beat the Milwaukee Bucks 110-99 on Wednesday night for their 17th straight win.

The Rockets passed the Boston Celtics for the longest winning streak in the NBA this season. Houston hasn't lost since Jan. 26 at New Orleans.

The latest victory came on the second of a tough back-to-back stretch of road games that started with a 10-point victory at Oklahoma City. No wonder the Rockets looked sluggish at times against the Bucks.

Trailing by about 10 points for most of the fourth quarter, Milwaukee got within 104-99 with 1:06 left on Sterling Brown's layup.

Chris Paul answered with a short floater in the lane with 45 seconds left after driving on Jason Terry to silence Bucks fans who were pleading "Defense! Defense!"

Houston obliged after forcing the Bucks to waste 15 seconds on the ensuing inbound pass and settle for an off-balance 3 that missed. The Rockets led comfortably from there.

Giannis Antetokounmpo scored 30 points. Khris Middleton finished with 18 points for Milwaukee, while Brown had 15.

Paul had 16 points and 11 assists for Houston. Harden and his teammates answered every Bucks charge.

Milwaukee used an 11-0 run to get to within 73-69 with 3:25 left on Brown's corner 3. The Bucks did most of their damage during the spurt around the bucket, with Antetokounmpo leading the way.

The NBA's most prolific 3-point shooting team countered with another display of clutch perimeter shooting.

The Rockets would beat the Bucks down the floor to set up open shots on the wing. Gordon knocked down two 3s, and P.J. Tucker added another 3 to help Houston close the third with a 14-7 run for an 87-76 lead.

Houston got off to a sloppy start at the Bradley Center with a seven-turnover first quarter, a night after tying its season high with 22 turnovers in the 10-point win at

Oklahoma City.

The end of the first half offered a glimpse of what was still to come. Harden hit a deep 3 just before the halftime buzzer from well beyond the arc with a defender in his face for a 58-46 lead.

RAPTORS 121, PISTONS 119,

OT: DeMar DeRozan scored 42 points, then fed Fred VanVleet for the tiebreaking jumper from the left corner with 1.1 seconds remaining in overtime to lift the Toronto Raptors to a 121-119 victory over the Detroit Pistons on Wednesday night. The Raptors became the first NBA team to clinch a playoff berth this season. Toronto trailed by 17 in the second quarter but was able to outlast Blake Griffin and the Pistons in a back-and-forth thriller. With the score tied late in overtime, Detroit's Reggie Bullock missed from the perimeter. DeRozan pushed the ball up the court and found VanVleet open in the corner. His

shot from just inside the 3-point line gave Toronto the lead. Griffin, who had tied the game with less than a second remaining in regulation, missed a 3-pointer on the final possession of overtime. The Eastern Conference-leading Raptors have won six straight and 13 of 14. Detroit has lost four in a row and 10 of 12.

JAZZ 104, PACERS 84: Rudy Gobert had 23 points and 14 rebounds, Donovan Mitchell finished with 20 points and six assists, and the Utah Jazz stayed hot with a 104-84 victory over the Indiana Pacers on Wednesday night.

The Jazz improved to 15-2 over their last 17 games. Ricky Rubio finished with 18 points and seven assists for Utah, and reserve Jae Crowder added 16 points. Joe Ingles had 11 points and 10 assists. The Pacers had won three straight. The lone bright spot for Indiana on offense was Myles Turner, who finished with 24 points. Bojan Bogdanovic and Victor Oladipo each scored 13 points, and Cory Joseph had 12 points and six rebounds.

BULLS 119, GRIZZLIES 110:

Lauri Markkanen scored 22 points, Zach LaVine and Kris Dunn added 21 apiece, and the Chicago Bulls hung on to hand the Memphis Grizzlies their 15th straight loss, 119-110 on Wednesday night. Justin Holiday added 14 points — going 5 for 5 from the field and nailing four 3-pointers — after the NBA prodded the Bulls to start playing him and Robin Lopez again. Memphis' Dillon Brooks scored 20 of his 29 points in the fourth quarter.

But the Penguins scored three straight goals to take a 4-2 lead into the third.

Oleksiak tied it at 2 with 10:36 remaining with a slap shot that got through the screen of Crosby and Jake Guentzel and past Peter Mrazek.

Sheary gave the Penguins a 3-2 lead with his first of the night, finishing a 2-on-1 break with Crosby with 5:35 remaining in the period. Mrazek made a good pad save on Crosby's initial shot. But the rebound went right to Sheary, who backhanded it in for

But this is an important issue facing the Lightning's most important player; how Vasilevskiy and coaches handle this grind will go a long way in determining whether they hoist a Cup in mid-June.

Coaches try to play backup Louis Domingue at least once every four games. And coach Jon Cooper noted that with eight straight home games and two in seven days next week, there are chances to give Vasilevskiy a break. That'll put Vasilevskiy at the mid-60 range as far as starts, which is typical for No. 1s.

"In the end, it's how you get your goaltender ready for the playoffs," Cooper said. "As a coaching staff,

you look at pockets of schedule that can help. ... There's no question that 'Vasy looks after himself, physically. It's the mental grind that is the aspect of the game everybody goes through.'"

Vasilevskiy said he plans on getting more treatment after games as opposed to riding the exercise bike; that's what he did after Saturday's 7-6 shootout win over the Flyers.

"As 'Vasy' always says, 'Stretch and hydration,'" Cooper said.

Cooper said Vasilevskiy has done a great job adjusting his between-starts routine since taking over for Bishop last February; for example, Vasilevskiy will take some optional skates off.

"Sometimes you tell him, 'You're not going

on the ice today,'" Cooper said.

It's not easy. Vasilevskiy has a legendary work ethic and is a relentless competitor. Teammates joke Vasilevskiy approaches post-practice shootout attempts like a playoff game. So coaches sometimes have to save him from himself.

"It's probably, I wouldn't say my weakness, but I have to stay away from hockey a little bit," Vasilevskiy said. "I have to take more rest. Usually, I'm working pretty hard in practice and off the ice. Now it's 50-plus games, and soon I hope it's going to be 60-70-plus, so I have to be fresh, I have to be sharp to help our guys get points and stay on the top of my game."

Vasilevskiy ranks second in the NHL in starts and total ice time, third in shots faced

(1,768). In eighteen of Vasilevskiy's past 24 starts, the Lightning has allowed 30 or more shots. To Cooper, the quality of shots matter more. Either way, Vasilevskiy hasn't had many easy games recently.

"When you're tired physically, you probably will be mentally tired, too," Vasilevskiy said. "I have to take more treatments, more rest then, eating well, sleeping well. And sometimes just get away from hockey to keep my mind in good shape.

"It's a tough job, and the first season I'm playing this much. I'm kind of discovering more new things in my body now. When I played 50-plus games, I feel much different than when I played 20 games in a season. It's all good experience for me. So I will have to adjust to it and be fine."

Rams trade Ogletree to Giants for 2 picks

LOS ANGELES — The Los Angeles Rams have agreed to trade line-backer Alec Ogletree to the New York Giants for two draft picks, a person with knowledge of the deal told The Associated Press.

The person spoke on condition of anonymity Wednesday because NFL trades can't be announced until March 14. ESPN first reported the deal.

Los Angeles gets the Giants' fourth-round and sixth-round picks in the 2018 draft. The NFC West champion Rams also will send a seventh-round pick in 2019 to the Giants along with Ogletree, their defensive captain and last season's leading tackler.

Ogletree has spent his entire five-year NFL career with the Rams, who drafted him out of Georgia in the first round in 2013. He led their defense in tackles during four of his five seasons, only failing to do so in 2015 when he played in just four games due to a broken leg.

He had 95 tackles and two sacks last season while moving into coordinator Wade Phillips' 3-4 defensive scheme. He also provided leadership on the defense, both during the Rams' turbulent relocation season from St. Louis and again

last season, when they ended their 12-year play-off drought.

Ogletree signed a four-year, \$42.7 million extension with the Rams just last October, getting \$30 million in guaranteed money.

While Ogletree is a speedy linebacker who has been quite productive, he has been an inconsistent tackler at times, and he never appeared to be an ideal fit in Phillips' defense.

Ogletree also was a key player in the Rams' spotty run defense. Los Angeles finished last season fifth-worst in the NFL at

stopping the run, allowing 122.3 yards rushing per game and frequently struggling with stops between the tackles, where Ogletree needed to shine.

Ogletree will fill the Giants' need for quality veteran linebackers as they rebuild from their 3-13 season, arguably the worst in franchise history. Starting linebackers Devon Kennard and defensive captain Jonathan Casillas could leave as free agents.

The Giants had two fourth-round picks in the upcoming draft, including a compensatory selection.

AP source: Jerry Jones to pay NFL \$2 million for legal fees

Jerry Jones has agreed to pay the NFL more than \$2 million in legal fees resulting from two disputes the Dallas Cowboys owner had



with the league, a person with direct knowledge of the settlement tells The Associated Press.

The amount to be paid was resolved Wednesday. The person spoke on condition of anonymity because the NFL did not announce details.

Commissioner Roger Goodell held an appeal hearing with Jones on Monday. That came a few days after Goodell assessed the financial penalties for Jones'

lawsuit to overturn the suspension of Cowboys star running back Ezekiel Elliott, and for a lawsuit Jones threatened to stop Goodell's newly approved contract.

Many owners were consulted on seeking restitution, including members of the finance committee. Some finance committee members are on the compensation committee that was at the center of what became a legal back-and-forth over Goodell's deal.

The restitution is rooted in a 1997 resolution that states owners can seek repayment for legal fees if a fellow owner is responsible for getting them involved in legal action.

Jones' attempt to derail Goodell's extension, which came after Elliott was suspended over domestic violence

allegations, led to a volley of threatening letters from lawyers for both sides.

After eventually relenting, Jones said after the owners meetings in December that he got what he wanted with an agreement to consider changes to the power of the commissioner's role through the league's constitution. Jones denied that his attempt to scuttle the contract was tied to Elliott's suspension, but made repeated references to Goodell's power to punish players.

Jones and the Cowboys were supportive of Elliott's lawsuit, which was led by the players' union and resulted in federal court hearings in three states over a span of two months. The suit eventually failed and Elliott served the suspension.

Tim Lincecum to wear 44 with Rangers in honor of late brother

SURPRISE, Ariz. — After wearing No. 55 for his entire major league career, Tim Lincecum will switch to 44 with the Texas Rangers in honor of his late older brother.

Sean Lincecum's funeral was Saturday, which delayed Tim Lincecum from taking the physical needed to finalize his \$1 million, one-year contract with the Texas Rangers, a deal that allows him to earn up to \$4 million if he is healthy all season and becomes the team's regular closer. The two-time

"I always looked up to my brother," Lincecum said. "He was an idol for me. He just had a lot of bad runs with the choices he made in life."

"I think it's a great opportunity," Lincecum

said. "It was a difficult decision with the Dodgers and the Rangers, but it came down to those two teams. I thought the Rangers would be a better fit. The conversations that we had just made me feel a little bit more warm and fuzzy inside."

Lincecum is fascinated about becoming a closer.

"I feel like I could do that," the two-time Cy Young Award winner said. "I've done that in the Cape (Cod League) and at the college level. It is going to be, obviously, different, but I feel like I could tap into that mentality."

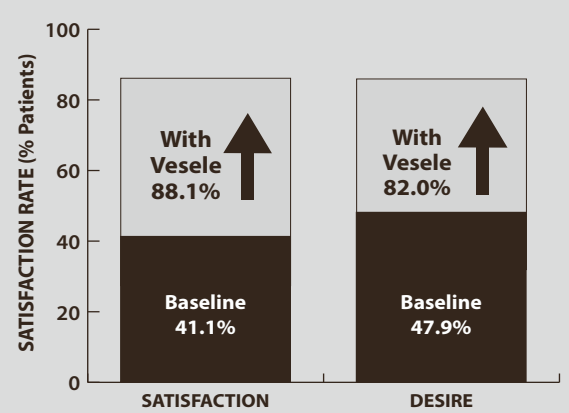

Leonard plans on returning soon

SAN ANTONIO — Kawhi Leonard plans on returning this season and wants to remain with the Spurs for life, refuting reports of dissension with the star forward and the only franchise he has played for.

Leonard has missed all but nine games this season with right quadriceps tendinopathy, which initially flared up late in the offseason.

Leonard made the remarks during an impromptu, four-minute press conference Wednesday morning following Spurs practice. He will not travel with the team on the upcoming three-game road trip to Golden State, Oklahoma City and Houston, but said a return is imminent.

“Soon,” Leonard said of his return. “I don’t have a set date right now, but I’ve just got to keep doing what I’m doing. The progress that I’m making has been great. So, I’ve just got to keep doing what I’m doing.”

He has been riding

a stationary bike and participating in three-on-three drills to simulate the physical contact of games, but has done so with staff members and “not my players.”

Leonard denied an ESPN report that he was unhappy with the Spurs’ handling of his injury and was possibly seeking to leave the team once his contract ends next season. When asked if he wanted to remain with the Spurs for his entire career, Leonard said, “Yeah, for sure.”

The ESPN report said friction had developed because Leonard saw his own doctors and was opting to not play even though he was medically cleared by the group.

“Everything was done as a group,” Leonard said. “I don’t feel like nothing was friction. I talk to Pop (coach Greg Popovich) every day. He knows what the progressions were, he knew what I was doing the whole entire time, as well as the front office. We made a group decision, so it wasn’t me just going out and saying I’m going to go do this.”

DENVER — Kevin Love has received more than 4,000 messages since opening up about his struggles with mental health issues.

“Overwhelming is a good word to use,” the Cleveland Cavaliers forward said Wednesday after the morning shoot-around before a game against the Nuggets. “I’m trying to read through all the emails and all the texts and respond to everybody in the right way.”

Love considered it therapeutic to write his essay for The Player’s Tribune in which he addressed such

things as his panic attack during a game this season and how he’s spent most of his life afraid to accept there was something wrong with him.

“It did take me a while (to write). I didn’t know if I was going to address it potentially in the summer, but I’m glad I did it now,” said Love, a five-time All-Star who’s currently sidelined by a broken hand. “Everybody is going through something. Everybody has things that you can’t see, you can’t touch, that they’re walking with every day. ... We need to beat down that stigma about mental health and be able to come out and talk things out.”

Louisville holds off FSU

NEW YORK — David Padgett stalked the sideline, shouting instructions to his Louisville players and urging them on relentlessly as they built a 26-point lead in the second half.

Knowing how badly they needed to win, the Cardinals certainly played that way. And it turned out, that huge cushion came in handy.

Quentin Snider scored 19 points, Ray Spalding had 18 and Louisville knocked off Florida State 82-74 on Wednesday in an Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament game with major NCAA implications.

“I’m sure this significantly helps our resume,” said Padgett, the interim coach who took over when Rick Pitino was fired before the season. “I know if we’re able to come out and get a win (Thursday) against the No. 1 team in the country that I would surely think they’re in.”

Deng Adel added 15 points and eight rebounds for the ninth-seeded Cardinals (20-12), who won for the first time in ACC postseason play and advanced to face top-ranked Virginia in the first quarterfinal Thursday.

A week ago, Louisville had a four-point lead against the Cavaliers with 0.9 seconds left — only to let a marquee victory slip away.

“This is our chance,” Snider said.

Trent Forrest and PJ Savoy each had 14 points

off the bench to pace No. 8 seed Florida State (20-11), which trailed 64-38 with 11 ½ minutes remaining.

“I think we came out a little bit lackadaisical,” freshman Ike Obiagu said.

A furious rally by the Seminoles whittled the margin to eight with 3:26 to play, but Louisville regrouped and hung on behind Snider.

The senior point guard had six assists and five rebounds without committing a turnover in 35 minutes.

“We didn’t panic,” Padgett said. “Our guys did a great job.”

Reserve forward Dwayne Sutton added 10 points, six rebounds and three blocks for Louisville, which reached 20 wins for the 16th straight season. Kansas, Duke and Gonzaga are the only other schools working on at least 15 in a row.

Louisville, which finished 10 for 16 from 3-point range, took control with a quick 14-1 spurt midway through the first half and outscored the Seminoles

27-5 over the last 11 minutes to go into the break with a 41-22 advantage.

That marked the fewest points in a half this season for Florida State, which was third in the ACC in scoring at 82 points per game. FSU missed 15 of its final 17 field goal attempts before halftime and shot 8 for 30 overall (26.7 percent) in the opening period.

“I just think that we played against a team that was really dialed in, tuned in, and we weren’t quite as sharp as we needed to be,” Seminoles coach Leonard Hamilton said. “If we have an opportunity to go to the NCAA Tournament, I’m sure that we’ll play with a lot more sense of urgency to bounce back from what we thought was a poor performance today.”

BIG PICTURE

Louisville: Trying to salvage a tumultuous, scandal-plagued season by at least making the NCAA Tournament, the Cardinals might have needed this one

more than Florida State. Louisville had dropped four of five and seven of 10, including an excruciating 67-66 loss to Virginia at home last Thursday. After losing the regular-season finale at North Carolina State two days later, Padgett acknowledged his team couldn’t afford a quick exit in Brooklyn. Whether the Cardinals need to upset Virginia, too, remains to be seen. ... Louisville had been 0-2 in ACC Tournament games. ... Adel scored in double figures for the 23rd consecutive game.

Florida State: Looking to make consecutive trips to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2012, the Seminoles have reason to believe their resume is worthy. They beat Florida, Virginia Tech and Louisville on the road, plus North Carolina, Clemson and Miami at home. ... Florida State has lost five of eight and six of 10. ... FSU had won six straight ACC Tournament openers.

HISTORY LESSON

The previous time these programs faced each other in a league tournament was 1991, when Florida State rallied from 20 points down to defeat Louisville for the Metro Conference championship. The Seminoles and Cardinals squared off five times in the title game of the old Metro Conference. Louisville leads the all-time series 34-11 after taking two of three meetings this season, with each winning on the other’s home court.

Boston College upsets NC State

NEW YORK — Jerome Robinson made a pull-up jumper with 17 seconds left to break a tie, and then forced a turnover on an inbounds play moments later, and Boston College upset North Carolina State 91-87 on Wednesday in the second round of the Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament.

Suzuki spent the first 11 major league seasons with the Mariners, earning 2001 AL Rookie of the Year and MVP, winning a pair of batting titles and becoming a 10-time All-Star. He was traded to the New York Yankees midway through 2012, played parts of three seasons with the Yankees, then

spent three seasons with Miami.

He has a .312 average and 3,080 hits. Suzuki appeared in 136 games last year and hit .255 with a .318 on-base percentage.

"The addition of Ichiro gives our team another versatile and athletic outfielder," general manager Jerry Dipoto said in a statement. "His incredible work ethic, preparation and focus will enhance our environment in many ways. He's truly one of the great players in the history of the game and his unquestionable presence is a valuable addition, both on the field and in the clubhouse."

Archer thinks it's a good idea to help maximize a strength of the Rays.

"The situation that we're in, where we have a lot of starters, a lot of guys who are capable of throwing multiple innings, and have proven they can," Archer said. "It's using our strength to our advantage. Like some teams, their offense is their strength. Ours is

definitely our pitching."

This news puts into context something Cash said on Monday about the bullpen situation: "We're going to have more than two (relievers) who can provide more than two innings of work."

Throw out all the original predictions of who will fill out the Rays bullpen. Now, instead of the traditional one-inning reliever, the Rays are in need of guys they feel comfortable with throwing two or three innings

and then also being able to bounce back two days later to pitch again.

Starting pitchers like Chi-Wei Hu, Ryan Yarbrough, Yonny Chirinos, Anthony Banda and Austin Pruitt all now have a better shot at making the Opening Day roster as a reliever than previously believed.

Still assuming traditional relievers like Alex Colome, Sergio Romo and Jose Alvarado are locks to make the Opening Day roster, and assuming Matt Andriese will be first in line to be the long reliever, that leaves three spots remaining.

The Rays could either fill all three of those spots with the previously mentioned starting pitchers, but we know at the very least two of them will be there to start the season.

This would leave one or two spot open for relievers like Dan Jennings, Chaz Roe, Vidal Nuno, Daniel Hudson, Adam Kolarek, Jonny Venters, Dan Runzler and Ryne Stanek.

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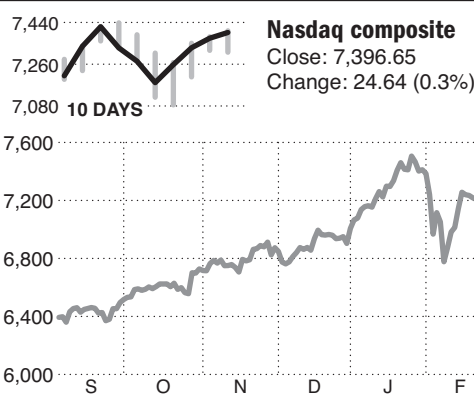
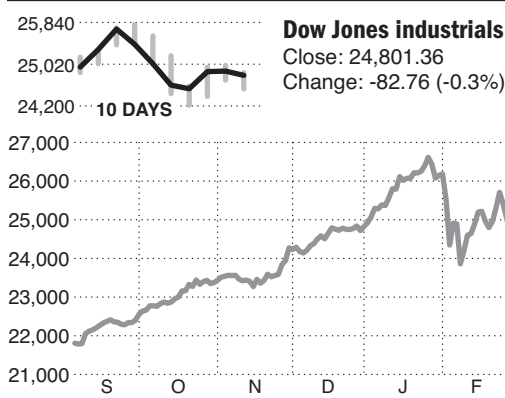
