## New crossover bridge to be built into Green Park

SEBRING — There is always something new or improved each year at Sebring International Raceway and next year it's a major change for those traveling in and out of Green Park.

Plans are in the making for a new two-way vehicle bridge, with a pedestrian walkway, over the track that will replace the old one-lane bridge.

Raceway President and General Manager Wayne Estes said Thursday that the old bridge has been in place for more than 50 years.

The budget is still being developed for the "seven-figure project," he said. It will be compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

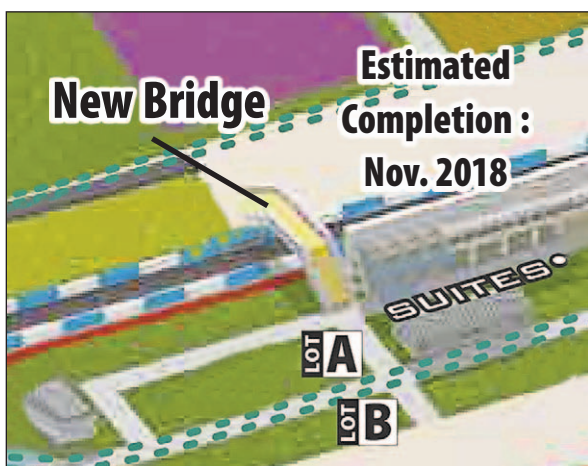
"When it is complete, there will be two vehicular lanes able to withstand tractor-trailer rigs and everything that goes in and out of Green Park for the various race car tests and things like that," Estes said. The Indy cars that use that side of the race track will be able to get across.

The work on the bridge will be done around the track schedule to minimize the effects on the car clubs that come in nearly every weekend, he said. "It will be an outstanding addition to this property."

The goal is for the new bridge to be completed in time for the Michelin IMSA SportsCar Encore event the second weekend in November, which will be a big new event for IMSA (International Motor Sports Association), Estes said.

The hope, for when the bridge is complete, is to have race fan campers in Green Park for the November event, he added. "It will be an opportunity for people to get a little bit more taste of IMSA racing."

Commenting on the current Race Week, Estes said, "We are on schedule right now to have one of the biggest years this place has ever seen. Our



ticket sales are up significantly; we've had a tremendous number of campers come in yesterday [Wednesday] when the gates opened, more than has been seen in many years.

"The weather is spectacular; the program is spectacular; the Craig Morgan concert on Friday night is attracting a lot of attention; everything is shaping up to be a perfect weekend here."

## Gathering supports students

Local church honors victims with prayer and silence

SEBRING — Students across America hoisted "Stand United" signs as they put down their pencils and pens on Wednesday and walked out of classes to protest gun violence. Activists hoped it would be the biggest demonstration of student activism yet in response to last month's mass shooting that left 17 dead at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland.

Locally, Emmanuel United Church of Christ observed a Sign of Solidarity for the Students early Wednesday to show support for students who are concerned about safety following the shooting

deaths in Parkland.

Rev. George Miller led a gathering of about two dozen in prayer followed by 17 minutes of silence in a corner of the church property with a chime each minute to honor a life that was lost.

Since local schools were on spring break during the planned nationwide observance, "Emmanuel UCC wanted to show our students locally and nationally that we stand in solidarity and support of them and their right to be heard," Miller said.

Those attending were asked to wear a white shirt as a sign of unity while leaving politics and the issues aside in support of the youth, he said.

"This show of solidarity is not about political sides or guns or the 2nd Amendment, but to let our youth know that we support

them and we hear them," Miller added.

## FLVS: student data may have been breached

SEBRING — Florida Virtual School (FLVS) recently learned of a potential data security incident involving certain information provided to the state online school by students and parents.

On its website, FLVS states this notice is a precaution to inform potentially affected individuals about the incident and to call attention to some steps parents can take to help protect themselves.

FLVS learned that unauthorized individuals appear to have gained access to some of its computer systems that stored personal information relating to certain students, parents of students, and Leon County Schools' teachers.

Although the investigation is still ongoing, based on what has been learned to date, it is believed that this incident could affect information in FLVS school records, including but not limited to

**Two critically injured, airlifted after wreck**

**AVON PARK** — An early Wednesday morning car wreck had two motorists airlifted to Lakeland Regional Medical Center in critical condition.

According to a Florida Highway Patrol report by Cpl. L.H. McClellan, Stacie C. Snipes, 26, of Lithia, was driving a 2004 Honda Civic southbound in the left lane on U.S. 27 when she neared the intersection of North Highlands Boulevard and U.S. 27. Stephanie D. Hendrick, 39, of Sebring, was headed northbound in a 2008 Chrysler Aspen, in the middle lane on U.S. 27 at the Highlands

Boulevard intersection.

Investigators do not know why, but Snipes' vehicle jumped a concrete curb and divider and traveled across the northbound lanes.

The left front of Hendrick's Aspen collided head on with Snipes' vehicle, sending the Civic spinning and finally stopping across both the center and right northbound lanes; it landed facing west.

The collision's momentum caused Hendrick's vehicle to spin off the roadway and onto the grassy shoulder to the east. It then rolled over once and landed upright facing south.

"I did not find any skid marks in the roadway," said McClellan.

The report indicates that there was no suspicion of alcohol involved. It also states that Snipes was wearing her seatbelt and Hendrick was not.

Highlands Lakes Fire Department and Highlands County Emergency Medical Services responded and the City of Avon Park Fire Department was instrumental at the scene.

Family members for both drivers were notified.

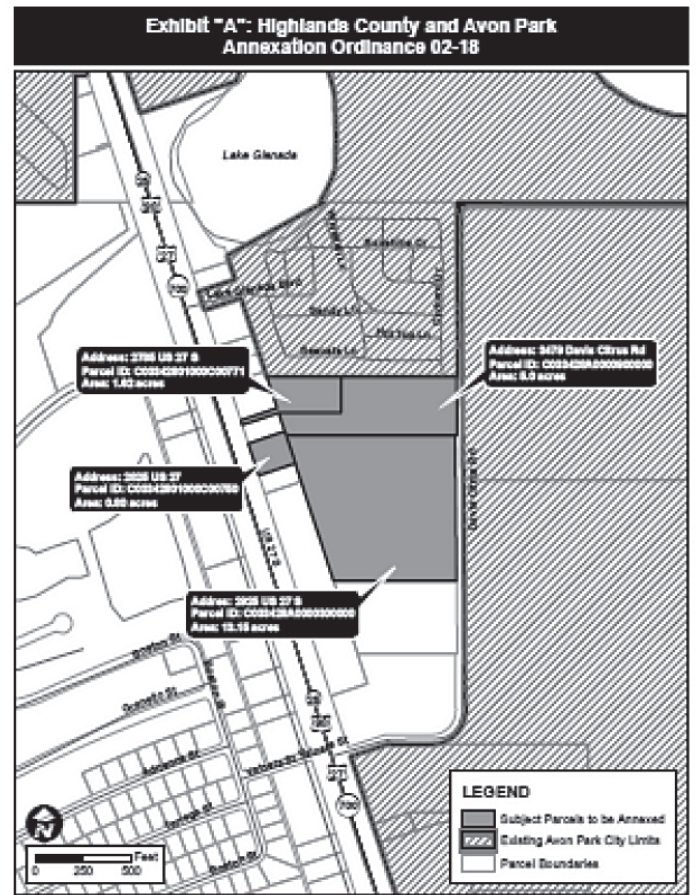

## Tip plan needs dumped

Servers in restaurants work hard for their money.

We know that because we see them scurrying from table to table at busy mealtimes to make sure customers get the service they expect.

We also know that these servers get paid much less than minimum wage.

Thanks to the Fair Labor Standards Act, employers must pay tippable employees \$2.13 an hour as long as they can prove that when they add that wage to their tips, the total adds up to the minimum wage of \$7.25.

For many of these workers, they have few benefits like paid sick leave, vacation pay or retirement contributions. They often deal with inconsistent schedules and are more likely to live in poverty.

Most of us figure that our tips are going to the servers.

Under current law, tips can only be shared with staff members who deal directly with customers, which means cooks and dishwashers don't share in tips. In cases where tips are generous, this could create pay disparities.

But a rule change proposed by President Donald Trump's Labor Department would take the tips out of the hands of servers and deliver them into the hands of restaurant owners.

According to this convoluted idea, the restaurant owner would take the tips of the servers — and then gladly, happily and willingly redistribute enough of that money back to the servers that the workers would at least make the \$7.25 minimum.

Then, according to the Trump administration's reasoning, the owners could also — and notice that word "could" — share some of the servers' confiscated tips with back-of-the-house employees (who, by the way, usually earn minimum wage).

On what planet does this cumbersome system even begin to sound logical?

The Economic Policy Institute estimates that the proposed change would allow employers to pocket between \$523 million and \$13.2 billion each year.

The estimate is based on the assumption that restaurant owners would simply keep any cash over the amount needed just to ensure servers are brought up to the minimum wage.

And let's face it — that's probably an accurate assumption.

But here's what is even more troubling: The Economic Policy Institute's analysts estimate that the average tipped worker would lose about \$1,000 each year under the proposed rule change. That's outrageous.

And the mere idea of allowing that to happen should be totally unacceptable.

The real issue — the actual problem — is America's entire tipping culture, as Shake Shack CEO Danny Meyer recently wrote in The Washington Post.

Changing the way tips are distributed, Meyer wrote, "is not the way to solve the problem. Tips themselves are the problem, and we need to stop relying on them as a means to compensate this massive workforce."

Meyer noted that our corrosive tipping culture also has the effect of increasing "the incidences of discrimination and guest-driven sexual harassment, as certain patrons expect something more in exchange for their tip than just speedy service."

Meyer's company has been eliminating tips and placing the full cost of staff compensation in menu prices — which in turn has reduced pay disparities between servers and cooks.

The benefits of eliminating tips, Meyer wrote, are obvious:

- It provides consistent, predictable wages for servers.
- It leads to a better work-life balance for servers who can't work weekends when restaurants typically have more patrons and, theoretically, more tip money to earn.
- It reduces the current unhealthy dynamic that now empowers many restaurant diners to sexually harass or otherwise behave inappropriately toward servers.

Changing such an ingrained American cultural tradition won't be easy.

Or quick.

But, as Meyer wrote, getting the government involved might actually make things worse.

Indeed, the proposed rule change would do exactly that.

The Trump administration should take this half-baked idea back to the kitchen — and then dump it swiftly into the trash can.

"Watching our family's world go up in flames was one of the hardest heartbreaks I've ever felt. As bad as everything seems, all I can seem to focus on is the fact that my beautiful babies are completely safe."

A church and two businesses are accepting donations to help the family including clothing for the children — a 5-year-old boy who wears sizes 6-7 pants and shirts and size 13 shoes, and a 3-year-old girl who wears size 4T-5T clothing and size

9 shoes.

choice. The non-profit was founded by his parents Dr. James Osborn and Amy Jo Osborn.

"Through racing, you kind of get your eyes opened to a lot of charities," Taylor said. "It's a good platform to raise money for a charity and awareness for anything. I got linked up with Austin Hatcher Foundation."

"The couple that started it because their son, Austin, was diagnosed with cancer," he said. "Once I heard their story, it was obviously heart-breaking. To understand what the kids go through; it's tough to turn away from that."

Even though Taylor was just at the Arnold Palmer Hospital for Children in Orlando on Tuesday to meet the kids and bring driver simulators for the kids with cancer, he feels like he does not do enough for the charity.

"I would like to say I do a lot for them," Taylor said. "I probably do as much as anyone can. I think that in the role as a racing driver you have an easy platform where people follow you and look to you for things. I think I have a large enough following on social media that I can raise more awareness. Any time that I can help

them raise money to go to their research, I am always willing to help."

Taylor realizes that many of the youngsters will not know who he is, but says that as soon as the kids find out that a race car driver is meeting with them, they are ecstatic.

"I love seeing the kids' faces light up. When I was at the hospital on Tuesday, I was visiting the kids," Taylor said. "A little 4-year-old girl was shy to begin with, but as soon as she opened up, she was just a normal kid that wanted to have fun. I enjoy it; I get goose bumps just thinking about it."

The kids do projects such as making and racing Pine Wood derby cars and more recently playing on the driving simulator. Taylor says that these types of activities keeps the children's minds off of their diagnosis and helps with motor skill rehabilitation.

"When a child has a brain or cancer problems, all of their motor skills are slowed down," Taylor said. "The simulators will actually be used to help for physical and mental therapy."

The foundation is working on a program that would challenge the kids from a base ability and challenge them a little bit at a time.

"It is bringing the tie-in to racing," Taylor said. "We use simulators in

racing because it's so important to have that muscle memory. Through activating your brain, you're focused. For the kids, it's something fun and it's also helping them."

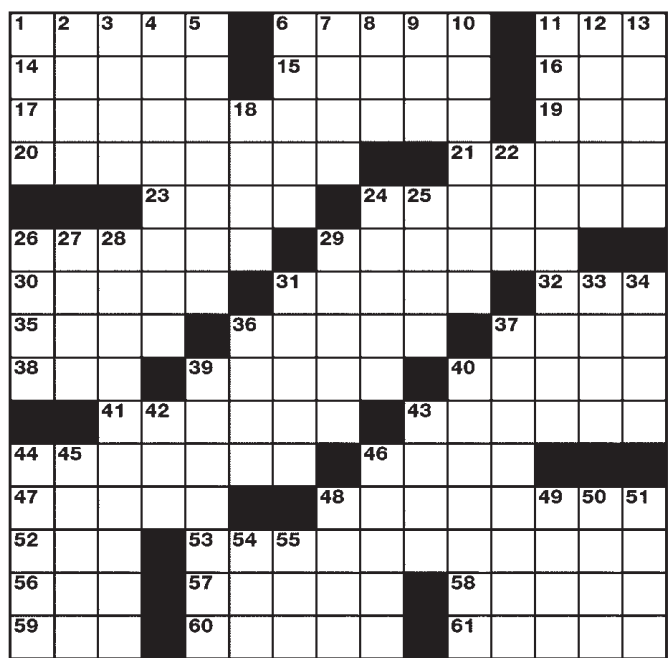

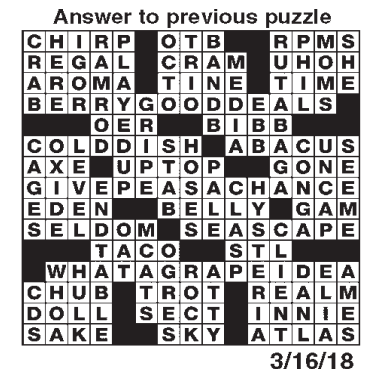

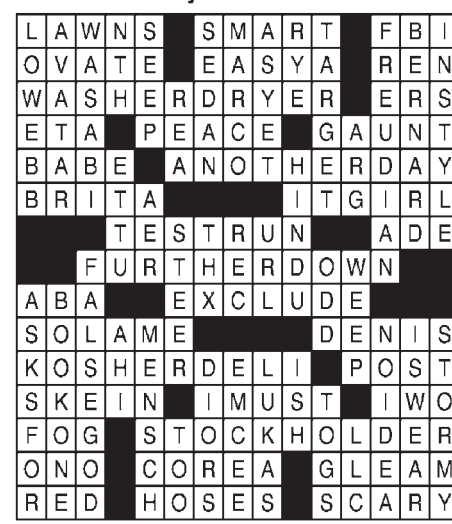

year was a huge change.

"I came here starting from zero," he said. "I came here and it was a new car, a new team, new teammates, a completely different country, a new series, new rules, all the tracks were new to me. It was a lot of work, now the second year you feel a lot more relaxed because you know what's coming."

Vanthoor said the competition in the GTLM class is amazing

"You only have works teams, so there's nobody out there who is slow," he said. "You need to be focused on the details and get the last one-tenth of a second to beat the other teams. It's a challenge, but as a driver I like it."

It's not unreasonable to expect a few more podiums, as Porsche is now in its second year with the new 911 RSR and Vanthoor is also much more comfortable.

"Last year we were in

the fight a couple times but it just didn't work out," Vanthoor said. "We always had something not go our way. This year the goal is to be better and win races and fight for a championship. I know the car a little better, how to handle the set-up. The confidence level is a lot higher than it was before."

Both Porsches looked good in Thursday's first practice session, but Vanthoor said the first practice session was just that — the first practice.

"It's first practice so you spend a lot time checking all the systems," he said. "We were testing here a couple of weeks ago so you see if things were comparable or if the conditions changed. There are two or three things that we check and improve but we did what we have to do."

Vanthoor said one of the biggest differences between racing in the United States and Europe is how the tracks are constructed and there's no question he prefers the tracks over here.

"The tracks are a lot

better in Europe," he said. "They believe safety comes first. After every corner there's 500 meters of runoff area, so you wouldn't touch anything. As race car drivers, it's boring. Why do we race cars? Because it's a challenge and it's dangerous; it's always been dangerous and always will be dangerous, but that's what we like."

"We don't want somebody to get hurt, but if you take all the challenges away there's no more passion. This championship, every track if you make a mistake you're in the gravel or you're touching the firewall and that's racing. That's what I like. That's the biggest thing I prefer over here and I think everyone in the paddock agrees."

Vanthoor said winning Sebring would be huge.

"Sebring is quite historical," he said. "In Europe I've won quite a few of the big 24-hour races, but my dream, at the end of my career, I've achieved all the historical ones, all the big races. I still have some time to do it, but it would be big."

# Tullius inducted into the Motorsports Hall of Fame

An evening of champions and legends celebrated sports car driver Bob Tullius Tuesday evening at the Motorsports Hall of Fame of America in Daytona Beach.

Praised for his talents behind the wheel of a car, Tullius also was recognized for being a transformative personality in the sport — pioneering modern factory support and the idea of commercial sponsorship.

The 87-year old Tullius smiled recalling the cocktail parties and social gatherings at local Jaguar dealerships that also punctuated several of his race weekends.

After all, Tullius told the A-list room of attendees, "Motorsports is not really about the cars, it's about the people."

The founder of the successful Group 44 Inc. team seemed to enjoy the crowd's reception as he reminisced about his racing days. He recalled one instance when people scoffed at him when he showed up to compete in

a Dodge Dart.

The audience in the ballroom at The Shores Resort and Spa on Daytona Beach chuckled as he spoke about the reaction he received from the car — the only Dart entered in one such race.

As many in the room laughed listening to Tullius' story, he smiled and acknowledged the laughter, "that's what everyone else did too, except I won the race."

A 10-time IMSA race winner, Tullius was honored by the Hall of Fame also for winning 14 Sports Car Club of America (SCCA) national championships, including three Trans Am Series titles. And the 1978 Trans

Am trophy, it should be noted, was a product of a seven-race winning streak during the season.

Tullius won at Le Mans and had a class win in the 12 Hours of Sebring as well.

The Rochester, New York native even made an attempt to start the Daytona 500 and although he ran in the qualifying race, didn't make the 500 field.

The best part of his acclaimed Hall of Fame career, he figured, may not have been all the trophies, but instead all the people he had a chance to meet around the world.

"I'm blessed to be here," he said, "And God bless all of you."

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


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# It's anybody's race at Sebring

## IMSA Continental Tire SportsCar Challenge runs today

The IMSA Continental Tire SportsCar Challenge has only been competing at Sebring International Raceway since 2014, and the records show there's no rhyme or reason as to who might claim the victory in Friday's Alan Jay Automotive Network 120.

In a total of eight class races at the iconic 3.74-mile circuit – four Grand Sport (GS) and four Street Tuner (ST) – only Stevenson Motorsports, in 2014 and 2015 with drivers Andrew Davis and Robin Liddell, has recorded multiple victories.

Six drivers entered in today's two-hour race will be going for their second victory at Sebring, but at one of the toughest tracks in the world, it's hard to come out on top.

"Sebring is incredibly difficult to win at," said 2017 ST class winner Spencer Pumpelly. "It's a unique track. The setup you employ doesn't share a lot of things in common with other tracks. Your team has to be really creative to get the car to work over the bumps."

Of all the teams in GS to watch this weekend, RS1 with Pumpelly and Dillon Machavern is at the top of the list in the No. 28 Porsche Cayman GT4 MR.

The team snatched the pole and victory at the season-opening BMW Endurance Challenge at Daytona in January after winning the 2017 GS championship.

"Sebring's got a history and to put your name on the winner's list there is a feat in and of itself," added Pumpelly. "Last year, I was finally able to do it after years of trying and hopefully I'll be able to do it again this year."

Another past winner at Sebring is Owen Trinkler, co-driver of the No. 46 Team TGM Mercedes-AMG GT4. The 2016 ST class winner moves up to the GS class in 2018 with

Ted Giovanis' squad and hopes he can repeat his past success with new teammate Hugh Plumb.

"Sebring has been good to me and I have been competitive since competing here," said Trinkler. "I competed in my first 12-hour race there in 1997. This track suits my driving style well and I actually like the bumps. So, we will see if I can keep the momentum going and grab a second win."

While there has been a lack of repeat winners at Sebring, there has also never been a repeat pole winner. However, a

variety of manufacturers have landed on the top step of the podium – Chevrolet, Ford, Honda, Mazda, and Porsche, in particular.

Hoping to add Audi to that list will be Britt Casey Jr. in the No. 77 Compass Racing Audi RS3 LMS. He and co-driver Tom Long took the first ever victory in TCR, a class which debuted in January.

"It's the hardest," said Casey about Sebring. "This is a track where you'll see weird things break that don't break usually. It's happened to me every year so far in

The primary goal of a trail system is to provide enjoyment of natural environments with little impact on surrounding areas. If hikers or campers start venturing off the trail in large numbers, the human impact to ecosystems increases. This may result in soil erosion, disruption to

wildlife, widening of trails, muddiness, contamination of bodies of water, and much more, according to hiking resource The Hiking Life. The impact of one individual may be minimal, but that impact increases dramatically with each person who veers off course.

Camp away from water.

It may be tempting to set up a lakeside camp. However, there's a good chance that wildlife uses it as a source of water and as a place to bathe. The presence of humans alongside bodies of water may scare away

wildlife. Give animals space in the early morning and late evening and keep camps away from the water.

Be aware of youngsters.

Young animals in nesting grounds can be cute to observe, but overprotective parents may be nearby. Impeding on a nest may spark aggression in parents, while some parents may abandon their young if they have been touched by humans.

## Smokey skies

You wake to a strange smell. You know something is burning, and you check around the house, nothing. You step outside and the smell is stronger and it is hazy, not from fog, but smoke. We in Florida have experienced this more than once and unfortunately it is more common than ever, and likely to get worse. We are entering the Florida fire season.

Even though we have had ample rain during the recent hurricanes, our sandy soils drain quickly and our seasonal high temperatures and lower humidity cause vegetation to dry out. The fire triangle of a heat source, oxygen and fuel is complete. A lightning strike, a trash burn getting away will be the ignition, and our recent windy conditions will add to the air supply feeding the fire.

These "wildfires" can quickly get out of control and ground crews will often get things contained if they can get to it quickly and wind conditions blow in their favor. That is on a god day. Unfortunately there have been many not so good days, especially out west in remote areas and even the populated areas of California. So what is done to contain those fires?

Smoke jumpers that parachuted or walked in are the first line of defense on the ground and they are supported by a fleet of aerial tankers dropping water or fire retardant from the air. At our last EAA Chapter 1240 meeting, member Dale Smith shared his job with the U.S. Forest Service as the Air Tactical Commander that supervises all the aircraft fighting a wildfire. It is a complicated job as he flies above the flights of a variety of aircraft working over a fire. He will be monitoring and broadcasting on 8 or more radio frequencies coordinating different aircraft over specific locations and talking to the various ground crews on the front line of the fire. Keeping all the aircraft separated and not dropping their loads directly on the ground crews takes a quick mind and the ability to handle

## Carpenter bees can damage your home

### Fives things to know to save your house

### By GEORGE MIKLOWCIC

As the weather gets warmer trees, plants and insects spring back to life. The carpenter bee is one insect that can severely damage your house.

Here are 5 things you should know about carpenter bees.

### SIGNS THAT CARPENTER BEES ARE PRESENT –

Carpenter bees swarm near wooden structures such as soffits, railings and decks. They are similar to bumblebees in size (3/4" to 1" long) but bumblebees nest in the ground and swarm close to the ground. Large bees swarming near wooden structures, the presence of perfectly round 3/8" holes bored into wood, bees



entering these holes, buzzing sounds coming from inside the wood, or sawdust floating down from those holes are all signs of carpenter bees damaging your building.

### CARPENTER BEES CAUSE SEVERE DAMAGE:

The only VISIBLE damage caused by carpenter bees are the 3/8"

round holes seen in the wood. However, carpenter bees bore (they don't eat the wood) midway into the wood, turn 90 degrees and continue boring NUMEROUS tunnels inside the wood for distances up to 6 feet. In most cases the tunnels are never visible unless the wooden structure fails and crumbles, or woodpeckers begin to excavate

the wood in search of the carpenter bee larvae.

### CARPENTER BEE BEHAVIOR –

Only the female carpenter bee is capable of boring holes and stinging people. She rarely stings unless severely provoked. The male can't sting, but darts about menacingly to ward off humans, birds and other carpenter bees that might endanger his female. Carpenter bees don't live in colonies like other bees, they are solitary insects. Offspring remain in the same general area as parents and siblings, but are more likely to live in their own tunnels close to their siblings instead of occupying the same tunnels. Carpenter bees winter in the tunnels they've bored into the wood,

# Help to protect your local parks

multiple tasks with efficiency and accuracy. It is not for the faint of heart. Lives are at stake and split second decisions need to be made.

Here are some specifics about aerial firefighting. The aerial efforts support the ground crews who are the ones that contain the fire and eventually put it out or let it burn out in a contained area. There many different types of aircraft deployed. Helicopters come in three sizes, small (Bell Jet Ranger), medium (UH-1 Huey), and heavy (Sky Crane with a 1,800 gallon tank). Then there is the fixed wing aircraft in sizes from the typical crop duster size to a jumbo jet. The smaller aircraft can refill their

water load either by hovering over a water source or fixed wing aircraft skimming the water surface and refilling their tanks in 20-30 seconds. When a red fire retardant slurry is used, the aircraft need to land at a designated fire base with the retardant loading

equipment. These bases are strategically located throughout the country. When a tanker flies in to drop a load of water or fire retardant, they need to be 150 above the fire and slowed down to about 120- 140 knots. Coming in to high will disperse the load so it's

not effective. Too fast will plaster only one side of the trees and not really prevent the fire from spreading. It is very precise flying. It is dangerous as a large fire will create its own "weather" with heat rising and swirling air currents. A fixed wing aircraft with a heavy liquid load at a low altitude and a slower speed is not easily controlled in a sudden down draft or shifting winds. That is why with the larger tankers, a smaller, usually a twin engine aircraft, flies "lead" before the tanker flies over the drop area. The lead will determine if conditions are safe for the tanker to proceed and make the drop. Immediately after the drop, the aircraft will break off in different directions and clear the area. See the attached picture with the lead and the large L-1011 tanker.

The crews and aircraft used in U.S. Forest Service firefighting are mostly "contractors" The USFS owns only three modified C-130 tanker aircraft, and they are flown by contract crews. Most planes used in aerial firefighting are retired military or commercial

aircraft modified for aerial firefighting. They are usually old and well-worn but brought up to flight worthy status.

The Air Tactical Commander, aka "Air Tact" has other things to consider beyond all the assigned tankers and ground crews. News helicopters want to get in and take video of the fires. Their long range cameras can keep them safely out of the way at a higher altitude. There is one "intruder" that will cause an immediate halt to all aerial firefighting operations, and that is a drone! When a drone comes in, they are hard to see and the Air Tact has no way of communicating with the operator, and cannot instruct them to leave the area. Besides being a federal violation of the restricted air space, they pose a hazard to other aircraft and could easily cause a crash as a drone smashes into a windscreen or engine of a tanker. A drone entering an area can cause increased loss of property and even lives as firefighting operations have to stop and the firefighting aircraft clear the area. There have been

movies about aerial firefighting and ground crews. There is no doubt that the folks involved in this effort are brave and skilled. It is dangerous work and crews can lose their lives as fires can shift quickly and over run ground crews. The next time you think about starting the trash pile fire to clear the yard, the camp fire, or even thinking of throwing the cigarette butt out the car window, think again of what might happen. It is just not worth it.

emerge in the spring to clean and enlarge the tunnels, lay 6-8 eggs in the tunnels and become less active until the eggs hatch in mid-summer. Then, the hatchlings join the parents to prepare the tunnels for the next cold weather (you'll notice them swarming again) where they will winter together. Since each pair of carpenter bees can have 6-8 offspring every year, left unchecked the carpenter bee populations around your home can increase dramatically from year to year! For instance, a pair of carpenter bees can leave 6 offspring the next year. These offspring could produce 18 offspring the next year, those bees could produce 27 offspring in year 3, and so on.

**ELIMINATING CARPENTER BEES:** Swatting is futile. A 4-step process is the most effective way to get rid of carpenter

bees. First, it's important to position carpenter bee traps wherever they swarm in the spring to reduce their population (and the ensuing damage to your home) as quickly as possible. Carpenter

bee traps are effective, but will NOT eliminate them completely. Therefore, the next step is the application of an insecticide INSIDE the round holes – positioned as far into the tunnels

as possible. Applying contact insecticides to wooden surfaces outside the holes is ineffective since rain soon removes it. On the other hand, insecticides inserted into the holes will be carried by the carpenter bees further into the tunnels to kill additional bees. Food grade diatomaceous earth is a safe, natural insecticide. The third step is best taken when the carpenter bees appear to be dormant in late spring or early summer. Insert a plug of steel wool into each hole followed by putty or a glued wooden plug. Apply paint or solid stain

over all exposed wood if possible to discourage future boring.

**PREVENTIVE PROTECTION:** Finally, carpenter bees naturally live in trees in the nearby woods. Keeping carpenter bee traps continuously positioned all year, except in the coldest weather, will discourage carpenter bees from boring new holes when they make a return visit to your home.

park visitors may inadvertently disturb local plant and wildlife. Leave nothing behind. Memories are not the only things park visitors should take with them when they leave the park. Estimates suggest that as much as 100 million pounds of garbage are generated at California's Yosemite National Park each year. Significant damage can result if even a tiny

fraction of that garbage is left behind. In addition, park officials forced to expend their limited resources on garbage pickup may not have enough resources left to address other issues, further threatening the park. Whether you're hiking or camping, make sure everything you take into the park comes with you when you leave. If you have trash, make sure it's deposited into the appropriate receptacles. Encourage activism. Outdoors enthusiasts who want to protect their beloved parks can

encourage activism in their communities. Work with park officials to organize trash pickup days at the park or organize activities for school-aged youngsters that teach them the importance of conservation and respecting the environment. NOTICE OF INTENT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD OF HIGHLANDS COUNTY, FLORIDA TO CONSIDER THE ADOPTION OF AMENDMENTS TO THE HIGHLANDS COUNTY SCHOOLS 2017-2018 STUDENT PROGRESSION PLAN AND NOTICE OF POTENTIAL PUBLIC HEARING

NOTICE is hereby given that THE SCHOOL BOARD OF HIGHLANDS COUNTY intends to adopt amendments to the HIGHLANDS COUNTY SCHOOLS 2017-2018 STUDENT PROGRESSION PLAN (hereinafter referred to as "Plan"). The School Board will discuss the adoption of the proposed amendments to the Plan at a regular meeting of the Board on April 24, 2018, at 5:30 p.m. in the Board Meeting Room, George Douglas Administration Building, 426 School Street, Sebring, Florida 33870. If requested by an affected person in writing within 28 days of the date of this notice, a development workshop will be noticed in a local newspaper. The request must be submitted to Dr. Brenda Longshore, Superintendent, at 426 School Street, Sebring, Florida 33870. The purpose and effect of the proposed amendments is to modify the Plan to update in accordance with annual review and implementation of statutory and district changes and other corrective measures as deemed necessary. The following areas of the Plan will be amended:

1. Introduction: Added statutory language for priority remedial and supplemental instruction resources based on certain criteria to include, "Students in kindergarten through grade 3 who have a substantial deficiency in reading."
2. Compulsory School Attendance (F.S. 1003.21): Deleted language from fourth paragraph that mentions if a K-5 student is placed on out-of-school or has other unexcused absences are allowed to make up work but 6-12 place on out-of-school suspension, expulsion or have other unexcused absences, they may be given missed work but will not be allowed to earn credit for making up missed work; and added #7 as a recognized school absence: "Natural/major disaster that would justify absence (requires principal approval)."
3. Pre-arranged Absences: Changed submission time from five to three days prior to the requested date of absence.
4. Declaration of Intent to terminate School Enrollment: revised to state that filing of the intent to terminate school enrollment is to be done with the district school board and parents will be notified.
5. Home Education Program (F.S. 1002.41): revised to allow home education students to enroll in courses at the zoned school if space is available. 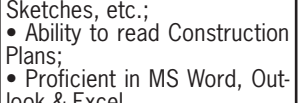

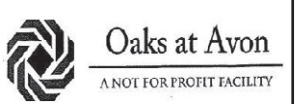

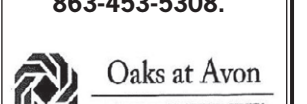

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# Deyrup gathers mountains of data on ants

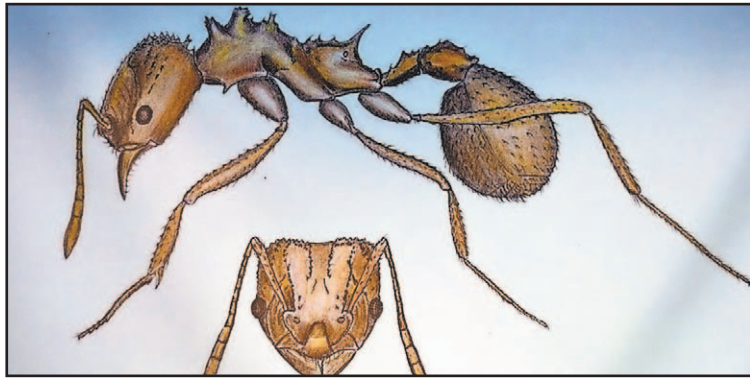
## Archbold researcher has studied ants for more than 35 years

VENUS — Mark Deyrup, arguably the most notable ant expert in Florida, spoke to a group of insect enthusiasts at Archbold Biological Station on Saturday, March 10. Deyrup has studied ants for over 35 years at Archbold, which has 128 species of ants located on its station. Since more than half of all species of ants that occur in Florida reside at Archbold, it is the perfect location for ant studies.

According to Deyrup, “Archbold is known as a place for sustainable science. It’s really a land-based institution where researchers are partners with the land — discovering and protecting it.”

Every year a greater crop of knowledge comes off the land. Insects have been studied at Archbold for over 70 years, providing enormous amounts

of data and research.

When Deyrup was just 5 years old, he began studying ants in his back yard. He always wondered how they could find their way back to their nest. Later, he discovered that part of the answer was dead reckoning, an ability found in ants, animals and people.

Deyrup stated, “Dead

reckoning is the ability to recalibrate where you must go to get back to where you came from.” In addition, ants use polarized light from the sun to help them determine directions. “Ants use polarized light, combined with dead reckoning, to find their way around,” Deyrup said.

Although exotic fire ants came to the United States in

the 1950s, Florida has always had a native fire ant. The red imported fire ant, or RIFA, was introduced in Mobile, Alabama, and it spread like crazy. They were usually spread in nurseries in big, potted plants.

According to Deyrup, when insects first invade they often have a high population and they take over like Atilla the Hun.” When they invaded the United States, our government felt confident that they could be conquered.

For people with a recent memory of WWII, they thought “it couldn’t be harder to get rid of fire ants than to get rid of the Nazis,” Deyrup said.

Mirex, an insecticide, was sprayed aerially on an enormous scale in county after county. At first, it killed the fire ants. Then scientist began to notice that the more the Mirex was sprayed, the more fire ants that came into the region. “It seemed like we were spraying

gasoline on fire,” Deyrup stated. Scientist discovered that fire ants love disturbed sites. Once the pesticide is sprayed, all the ants die off and weeds start coming back. With all the ant competition gone, the highly mobile fire ants invade.

According to Deyrup, “The more you spray and eradicate other ants, the more fire ants come in.”

Although spraying Mirex wasn’t working, it was difficult to stop the program. However, the pesticide’s devastating impact on the Gulf and the shrimp industry finally caused the spraying to come to a halt.

To discourage fire ants in back yards, people should minimize watering. Fire ants love well-watered lawns.

Although there is no inexpensive, large-scale control for fire ants, Deyrup has found that pouring a kettle full of boiling water on an ant hill to be effective.

# Enjoy many eco-friendly outdoor activities

Months spent indoors avoiding the harsh weather outside makes winter a difficult season for people who love the great outdoors. Many people find it difficult to consistently get outside when temperatures drop.

That difficulty no doubt contributes to the popularity of spring, a season widely seen as a time of rebirth and rejuvenation.

Cycling to work won’t consume any fuel or produce any emissions, and cyclists won’t be forced to sit idly in rush hour traffic.

**Hiking:** Hiking is another eco-friendly outdoor activity that can pay dividends for

both the planet and the people who call it home. Lawmakers in towns and cities with thriving hiking communities may be encouraged to support legislation that preserves hiking trails and parks and prevent potentially harmful construction from taking place. And individuals can reap a number of benefits from hiking through the great outdoors. A study published in the journal Environmental Science & Technology found that outdoor exercise such as hiking can decrease feelings of tension, confusion, anger, and

depression. In addition, hiking provides a great full-body workout that might appeal to people who have grown tired of more traditional gym-based fitness regimens.

**Fishing:** Fishing devotees tend to be wildly devoted to their craft, but one need not be an expert angler to enjoy fishing and help the planet. According to the Virginia Department of Game & Inland Fisheries, fishing supports wildlife and fisheries management. Many anglers find fishing is a great form of stress relief that provides a peaceful escape from the

daily grind.

**Running/walking:** In lieu of running or walking on a treadmill indoors, men and women can get outside and do their jogging or walking in the great outdoors. While treadmills are not necessarily big energy consumers, running or walking outdoors consumes no energy and provides a great opportunity to spend time outside, especially for professionals who spend most of their days in office buildings.

## Footbridge collapses onto busy highway

MIAMI — A pedestrian bridge that was under construction collapsed onto a busy Miami highway Thursday, crushing at least eight vehicles under massive slabs of concrete and steel and killing multiple people, authorities said.

Search-and-rescue crews drilled holes into the debris and used dogs to look for survivors. They had to work carefully because part of the structure was still unsafe. At least 10 people were taken to hospitals. The number of fatalities was not immediately known.

The 950-ton bridge had been assembled by the side of the highway and moved into place Saturday to great fanfare. The span stretched almost 200 feet to connect Florida International University with the city of Sweetwater. It was expected to open to foot traffic next year.

"We have a national tragedy on our hands," Sweetwater Mayor Orlando Lopez said.

Jacob Miller, a senior at FIU, was visiting a friend in a dorm when he heard sirens and horns honking. He went to a balcony and could see rubble coming down.

"I saw there were multiple cars crushed under the bridge. It was just terrible. I saw some people stopping their cars, trying to get out, trying to assess the situation to see if there is anything they could do to help," he said.

National Transportation Safety Board chairman Robert Sumwalt III said a team of specialists was heading to Miami on Thursday night with plans to begin its investigation Friday morning. Florida Gov. Rick Scott said he was headed there as well.

Miami-Dade Police Director Juan Perez said his department's

homicide team would take over the investigation after rescue efforts are complete.

The exact death toll was unclear. Florida Highway Patrol Lt. Alejandro Camacho told CBS News that there were "several fatalities." Carlie Waibel, a spokeswoman for Sen. Bill Nelson, said local officials told Nelson that people had died,

but a final number had not been confirmed.

An accelerated construction method was supposed to reduce risks to workers and pedestrians and minimize traffic disruption, the university said.

Renderings showed a tall, off-center tower with cables attached to the walkway to support it. When the bridge

collapsed, the main tower had not yet been installed, and it was unclear what the builders were using as temporary supports.

Robert Bea, a professor of engineering and construction management at the University of California, Berkeley, said it

## US gets tougher on Russia; new sanctions, accusations

WASHINGTON — In its toughest challenge to Russia to date, the Trump administration accused Moscow on Thursday of an elaborate plot to penetrate America's electric grid, factories, water supply and even air travel through cyber hacking. The U.S. also hit targeted Russians with sanctions for alleged election meddling for the first time since President Donald Trump took office.

The list of Russians being punished includes all 13 indicted last month by special counsel Robert Mueller, a tacit acknowledgement by the administration that at least some of Mueller's Russia-related probe has merit.

Trump has repeatedly sought to discredit Mueller's investigation into Russian interference in the presidential election, but the sanctions appeared to rely on the special counsel's legal conclusions in deciding who should be named. The sanctions freeze any assets the individuals may have in U.S. jurisdictions and bar Americans from

doing business with them.

The named Russians — 19 in all — are unlikely to have any assets in the United States that would be covered, making the move largely symbolic. But it could help inoculate the president from persistent claims he's afraid or unwilling to stand up to Russian President Vladimir Putin or to fight back against efforts to undermine America's democracy and domestic affairs.

"We're going to be tough on Russia until they decide to change their behavior," said White House

spokeswoman Sarah Huckabee Sanders. At the same time, she left open the possibility of better U.S.-Russia cooperation, arguing that "if we can work together to combat world threats on things like North Korea, then we should."

U.S. national security officials said the FBI, Department of Homeland Security and intelligence agencies determined Russian intelligence and others were behind a broad range of cyberattacks starting a year ago.

## Video: Deputy never entered building during school massacre

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — Security video shows a Florida sheriff's deputy going toward the high school building while a gunman massacred 17 students and staff members, but he then backed away and stayed outside with his handgun drawn.

The Broward County Sheriff's Office released the video Thursday showing Deputy Scot Peterson's actions during the Feb. 14 shooting. It shows him and two staff members rushing in a cart toward the three-story freshman building where the shootings happened. When they arrive, Peterson pulls his weapon and goes forward but then retreats and takes up a position outside the building.

During most of the six minutes of shooting, the camera's view of Peterson is blocked by a light pole but parts of him occasionally appear. He never went inside. There is no sound on the video.

About 11 minutes after the 19-year-old suspect Nikolas Cruz began shooting, the video shows a glimpse of Coral Springs police officers

who have arrived at the school rushing toward the building. By then, Cruz had fled. He was arrested an hour later about a mile from the school.

Sheriff Scott Israel blasted Peterson eight days after the shooting, saying the deputy should have entered the building immediately, "addressed the killer, killed the killer."

The 54-year-old deputy retired rather than accept a suspension. He is still

being investigated by internal affairs.

Peterson has denied wrongdoing. In a statement issued through his lawyer shortly after his retirement, he said he thought the shots were being fired from outside the school.

But in radio transmissions released last week it appears the 32-year veteran deputy knew almost

## UN gets \$100M in new funds for Palestinian aid after US cuts

ROME — The United Nations received pledges Thursday of nearly \$100 million in new funding for the U.N. relief agency for Palestinians after the U.S. slashed its aid, but it is still facing a nearly \$350 million shortfall this year.

A dozen countries announced new funding during an emergency donor conference called as the U.N. Relief and Works Agency experiences the worst funding crisis in its 68-year history. Stepping up were Qatar, Canada, Switzerland, Turkey, New Zealand, Norway, South Korea, Mexico, Slovakia, India and France, U.N. officials said.

U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said “an important first step was reached” with the new pledges. But he said

“a long way is in front of us” to fully fund the agency, which went into the conference facing a \$446 million gap in financing this year after the U.S., which has provided a third of the agency’s budget, announced it was withholding aid.

“If UNRWA would not exist, if these services were not provided, the security of region would be severely undermined,” Guterres told reporters. “Now it is very clear, it is absolutely essential, that the extraordinary unanimity in political support to UNRWA and its activities translates itself into cash.”

The agency, the oldest and largest U.N. relief program in the Middle East, provides health care, education and social services to an estimated 5 million Palestinians in the West Bank, Gaza Strip, Jordan, Syria and Lebanon. Hundreds of

thousands of Palestinians either fled or were forced from their homes during the war that led to Israel’s establishment in 1948.

Guterres told the conference that cutting sanitation, health care and medical services in already poverty-wracked and conflict-ridden areas “would have severe impact — a cascade of problems that could push the suffering in disastrous and unpredictable directions.”

The Trump administration announced in January it was withholding \$65 million of a planned \$125 million funding installment. It released \$60 million so the agency wouldn’t shut down but made clear that additional U.S. donations would be contingent on major reforms at the agency.

Agency spokesman Christopher Guinness said the actual cut was around \$300 million because the

U.S. had led the agency to believe it would provide \$365 million in 2018. He said the agency went into 2018 with a \$146 million shortfall that ballooned to \$446 million without the anticipated U.S. funds.

Egyptian Foreign Minister Sameh Shoukry, who co-hosted the meeting with Jordan and Sweden, was hopeful the U.S. would continue to support the agency and the creation of a viable Palestinian state that can care for its own people.

“We recognize the important contributions of the United States in the past and look forward that it continues to play its fundamental role in support of UNRWA and in also support of the peace process to enable the establishment of the Palestinian state,” he said.

The U.S. had been UNRWA’s largest donor, supplying nearly

30 percent of its budget. In announcing the cuts in January, the U.S. State Department said it wanted reforms at the agency, which Israel has strongly criticized.

Shoukry said the agency had already streamlined some of its activities but said “there is a limit to its ability to do so” given the

enormous needs faced by 5 million people.

“It is vital and it is necessary to address these very basic services, but also to provide dignity for multitudes of Palestinians and to (protect) many of them from the potential threats of radicalization and terrorism,” he told reporters.

#### Bulgaria launches natural gas hub project

SOFIA, Bulgaria (AP) — Bulgaria is creating a natural gas hub at its Black Sea coast.

The Bulgarian energy ministry says the state-owned company Bulgartransgaz signed a 1.2 million-euro (\$1.5 million) contract Thursday with a Bulgarian-Swiss consortium for a feasibility study. The European Union has pledged to provide 920,000 euros (\$1.13 million) for the project.

European Commission Vice President Maros Sefcovic says the EU supports Bulgaria’s plan “to be transformed from a transit country into a gas

trading country.”

The new project comes after the South Stream gas pipeline was scrapped in 2014. South Stream aimed to transport gas from Russia through the Black Sea to Bulgaria and then to other European countries, bypassing Ukraine. The EU opposed it because Russia’s Gazprom planned to operate the pipeline and sell the gas — violating EU anti-monopoly regulations.

#### Complaint claims Trump lawyers threatened Panama magistrate

PANAMA CITY (AP) — Lawyers for President Donald Trump’s family hotel business threatened a Panamanian judicial

official handling a dispute related to Trump Hotels’ management of a 70-story luxury hotel.

That’s according to a complaint filed with the anti-corruption division of Panama’s chief prosecutor.

The company’s lawyers dispute the claims.

Panamanian justice of the peace Marisol Carrera writes in a complaint obtained by The Associated Press that lawyers for Trump’s hotel management business accosted her in her office after she ruled against Trump’s business on a minor issue in the fight over control of the Trump-branded luxury hotel.

The magistrate has declined to discuss the matter with AP.

Trump’s team was eventually evicted from the hotel, which was stripped of his name and reopened under new management.

But the fighting continues in court.

#### 2 men sentenced in Germany for art forgery scheme

BERLIN (AP) — A German court has convicted a former businessman and an art gallery owner of fraud and falsifying documents for selling fake paintings attributed to Russian avant-garde artists including Vasily Kandinsky.

The dpa news agency reported Thursday the two men, aged 45 and 72, received jail terms of two years and eight months,

and three years respectively in Wiesbaden start court. Their names weren’t reported.

The two were originally charged with selling 19 forgeries attributed to artists like Kandinsky, Kazimir Malevich and Natalia Goncharova but the court ruled they could only prove fraud without a doubt in six cases. The men must also repay 1 million euros (\$1.25 million) in profits.

#### Zimbabwe’s ex-leader Mugabe calls his ouster a ‘disgrace’

HARARE, Zimbabwe (AP) — Former Zimbabwean leader Robert Mugabe has given his first interview since being forced from

power in November, describing his removal as a “coup” and a “disgrace.”

Mugabe, 94, told South African broadcaster SABC in the broadcast aired Thursday that he was pushed out by the military, which staged a takeover that led to Mugabe’s resignation after 37 years in power. He says “it was a coup,” adding “we must undo this disgrace.”

The former president spoke at his mansion in a suburb of the capital, Harare.

The military intervention was hugely popular in Zimbabwe and led to impeachment proceedings by the ruling party against Mugabe, who was replaced by former confidant Emmerson Mnangagwa.

## Sister of Charleston church shooter Dylann Roof made threat, had weapon on school grounds

RICHLAND COUNTY, S.C. — The younger sister of Dylann Roof, who murdered nine black parishioners during Bible study at a Charleston church, was arrested and charged Wednesday for possessing drugs and weapons on school grounds.

Morgan Roof, 18, was charged with simple possession of marijuana and two counts of carrying weapons on school grounds, according to the Richland County Sheriff's Department, which confirmed her relationship to Dylann Roof.

Morgan Roof had also made a social media post on Snapchat which

alarmed the student body.

In it, Morgan Roof said she hoped the students participating in the National Walkout Day, protesting gun violence, would "get shot."

Students across the U.S. participated in the walkout, including many at schools in the Midlands and Columbia. AC Flora was one of the participating schools.

Based on what Morgan Roof posted online, she disagreed with the walkout. What struck a nerve was her comment that "we know it's fixing to be nothing but black people walkin out anyway."

After her brother murdered nine black people at a church which he purposely selected

because of its black parishioners, he told FBI agents he was hoping to start a race war.

"Your walking out for the allowed time of 17min, they are letting you do

this, nothing is gonna change what if you think it's gonna do? I hope it's a trap and y'all get shot we know it's fixing to be nothing but black people walkin out anyway. No offense ofc buuut," Morgan Roof posted.

On the weapons and drug possession charges, a school resource officer was contacted by a school administrator, in reference to Morgan Roof being in possession of marijuana, pepper spray, and a knife, according to the sheriff's department.

No students were harmed as a result of this incident, the sheriff's department said.

Roof was taken to the Alvin S. Glenn Detention Center.

Richland County

Sheriff Leon Lott said the school's administrative staff acted appropriately by calling in the SRO to arrest Morgan Roof for violating school policy.

"Potential tragedy was avoided at AC Flora High School," S.C. Gov. Henry McMaster said in a news release. "We owe a debt of gratitude to all involved who acted so quickly and decisively."

Dylann Roof, a self-avowed white supremacist, killed nine black parishioners in June 2015 during a bible study session at Charleston's historic Mother Emanuel AME Church.

Roof pleaded guilty to nine counts of murder and three counts of attempted murder. He is on death row in Indiana.

was too early to know exactly what happened, but the decision to use what the bridge builders called an "innovative installation" was risky, especially because the bridge spanned a heavily traveled thoroughfare.

"Innovations take a design firm into an area where they don't have applicable experience, and then we have another unexpected failure on our hands," Bea said after reviewing the bridge's design and photos of the collapse.

Sweetwater police Detective Juan Llera was in a nearby meeting when the bridge collapsed.

"I heard a 'boom' like a bomb had exploded," he said. "At first I thought it was a terrorist attack."

He said he saw three construction workers who had been injured. One had a head injury and was passing in and out of consciousness, another one had a leg injury leg and the third was lying on the street unconscious. He started performing CPR on him.

"We were able to keep him alive to send him to the hospital," Llera said.

Kendall Regional Medical Center received 10 injured people. Of those, two were in "extremely critical" condition and the other eight were stable with injuries such as broken bones, bruises and abrasions, said Dr. Mark McKenney, the hospital's director of general surgery.

Of the two more serious cases, one arrived in cardiac arrest but was revived. The other had a serious brain injury, McKenney said.

The main companies

behind the \$14.2 million construction project have faced questions about their past work, and one was fined in 2012 when a 90-ton section of a bridge collapsed in Virginia.

Munilla Construction Management, or MCM, the Miami-based construction management firm that won the bridge contract, took its website down Thursday. But an archived version featured a news release touting the project with FIGG Bridge Engineers, a Tallahassee firm.

MCM said on Twitter that it was "a family business and we are all devastated and doing everything we can to assist. We will conduct a full investigation to determine exactly what went wrong and will cooperate with investigators on scene in every way."

FIGG said in a statement, "In our 40-year

history, nothing like this has ever happened before."

But FIGG was fined in 2012 after a 90-ton section of a bridge it was building in Virginia crashed onto railroad tracks below, causing minor injuries to several workers. The citation from the Virginia Department of Labor and Industry said FIGG did not properly inspect a girder and had not obtained written consent from its manufacturer before modifying it, according to a story in The Virginian-Pilot.

Court documents show that MCM was accused of substandard work in a lawsuit filed earlier this month. The suit said a worker at Fort Lauderdale International Airport, where the company is working on an expansion, was injured when a makeshift MCM-built bridge collapsed under his weight.

The suit accused the company of employing "incompetent, inexperienced, unskilled or careless employees" at the job site.

A review of Occupational Safety Health Administration records shows that MCM has been fined for 11 safety violations in the past five years. The fines totaling more than \$50,000 arose from complaints about unsafe trenches, cement dust and other problems at its Florida work sites.

Florida International University is the second largest university in the state, with 55,000 students, most of whom live off-campus. The bridge was supposed to be a safe way to cross a busy highway.

A university student was killed in August while crossing the road that the bridge was supposed to span.

Russian hackers infiltrated the networks that run the basic services an Americans rely on each day: nuclear, water and manufacturing facilities like factories.

The officials said the hackers chose their targets methodically, obtained access to computer systems, conducted "network reconnaissance" and then attempted to cover their tracks by deleting evidence of the intrusions. The U.S. government has helped the industries expel the Russians from all systems known to have been penetrated, but additional breaches could be discovered, said the officials, who briefed reporters on condition of anonymity to discuss sensitive national security information.

The officials described Russia's operation as ongoing.

The U.S. accusations and accompanying sanctions mark a stepped-up attempt by Trump's administration to show it's adequately confronting Russia over hacking, election meddling and general efforts to compromise Western democracies and

infrastructure. Trump on Thursday also joined the leaders of Britain, France and Germany in blaming Moscow for the poisoning of an ex-Russian spy who was living in England.

The sanctions prompted a swift threat of retaliation from Russia's government, which said a response was already being prepared. Deputy Foreign Minister Sergei Ryabkov suggested the Trump administration had timed the action to taint this weekend's presidential election in Russia, in which President Vladimir Putin is expected to win an overwhelming victory.

"It is tied to U.S. internal disorder, tied of course to our electoral calendar," Ryabkov was quoted as saying by the Russian state news agency Tass.

Altogether, 19 Russians were cited. Also sanctioned were five Russian companies, including the Internet Research Agency, which is accused of orchestrating a mass online disinformation campaign to affect the U.S. presidential election result.

The U.S. Treasury Department announced the sanctions amid withering criticism in the U.S. accusing Trump and his administration of failing to use its congressionally mandated authority

to punish Russia. The sanction targets include officials working for the Russian military intelligence agency GRU.

The sanctions are the first use of the new powers that Congress passed last year to punish Moscow for interfering in the election that Trump won over Democrat Hillary Clinton.

Yet Russia hawks in Congress deemed it too little, too late.

"Even more must be done," said Republican Sen. Lindsey Graham of South Carolina. GOP Sen. John McCain of Arizona called the action "overdue."

And Democrats homed in on the fact that the list of Russians hit with sanctions included all of those indicted by Mueller. That shows the administration believes the investigation is legitimate, they argued.

Senate Democratic leader Chuck Schumer of New York said the sanctions prove that Mueller's "investigation is not a 'witch hunt' as the president and his allies have claimed." He said, "It's more clear than ever that the president must not interfere with the special counsel's investigation in any way."

The Treasury Department said the

GRU and Russia's military both interfered in the 2016 election and were "directly responsible" for the NotPetya cyberattack that hit businesses across Europe in June 2017, causing billions of dollars in damage by disrupting global shipping, trade and medicine production. Treasury said that the attack caused several U.S. hospitals to be unable to create electronic medical records for more than a week.

Among those affected were Yevgeny Prigozhin,

who is known as "Putin's chef" and who ran the St. Petersburg-based Internet Research Agency, and 12 of the agency's employees. They were included in Mueller's indictment last month.

The Russian agency "tampered with, altered or caused a misappropriation of information with the purpose or effect of interfering with or undermining election processes and institutions," specifically the 2016 U.S. presidential race, the U.S. said.

### Mexico seizes mezcal bottles with snakes, reptiles inside

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Forget the worm at the bottom of your bottle of mezcal. Mexican environmental inspectors have found whole boas and iguanas stuffed into bottles of mezcal at a market in the southern state of Oaxaca.

The wide-mouth bottles were filled with "artisanal, wild agave" mezcal that was apparently meant to be drunk, albeit probably on a bet.

The federal office for environmental protection said Tuesday it seized 15 bottles with species including a blood snake, ridge head snake, yellowbelly snake and a whip snake.

For decades, college students have been downing the maguery worm found at the bottom of some bottles of mezcal. The worms were originally added either for taste or to prove the drink's authenticity.

The sale of wildlife — even pickled — is strictly regulated in Mexico.

immediately the shots were coming from inside the freshman building.

Peterson's attorney, Joseph DiRuzzo, did not return a call and email Thursday seeking comment.

John Bostain, an independent police trainer, reviewed the video at the request of The Associated Press. He said it confirms that Peterson should have entered the building: that is an almost-universal response in police training after the 1999 Columbine High and 2012 Sandy Hook school shootings. He said the question is why

he didn't: was it because of Peterson's individual character or something about the culture in the Broward Sheriff's Office that made him avoid a deadly force situation?

The sheriff's office has said Peterson underwent active shooter training in 2016 where he was taught to confront and take down the suspect. The sheriff's

office said in a statement Thursday, "The video speaks for itself."

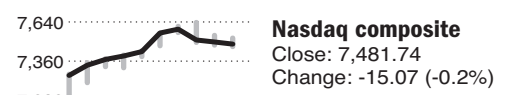
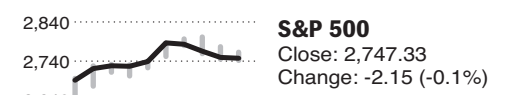

**ARKANSAS Little Rock:** Sixty-one counties have been designated federal disaster areas, making farmers and ranchers eligible for assistance.

**CALIFORNIA San Diego:** Two Tasmanian devils from Australia are settling in at the San Diego Zoo.

**COLORADO Denver:** The administrator of the state Senate has warned staff, aides and interns that policy forbids them from speaking to journalists about workplace issues.

**CONNECTICUT Hartford:** A University of Connecticut medical official has been disciplined in the case of a professor who continued to receive payment for months after he was slain.

**DELAWARE Dover:** Two recent flu-related deaths brought Delaware's season total to 30.

**MISSISSIPPI Biloxi:** The city is closing the 88-year-old Saenger Theater for repairs, WLOX-TV reports.

**MISSOURI Jefferson City:** The state Senate gave initial approval to a bill that would prohibit pregnant prisoners in some jails from being restrained while giving birth.

**MONTANA Helena:** Timothy Adams, Green Party candidate for U.S. Senate, was on the state Republican Party payroll, documents show.

**NEBRASKA Lincoln:** Hundreds gathered Tuesday to celebrate the life of former governor Charley Thone, who died March 7 at 94.

**NEVADA Carson City:** Officials say Nevada's population is quickly approaching 3 million.

**NEW HAMPSHIRE Portsmouth:** Preliminary designers for repair work on the Piscataqua River Bridge estimate construction could take until 2021.

**NEW JERSEY Atlantic City:** Revenue from table games and slot machines fell 6.5% last month compared with February 2017.

**NEW MEXICO Albuquerque:** State Democrats have 60 days to find a new leader after Richard Ellenber resigned.

**NEW YORK New York:** The city's first sake brewery has opened in Brooklyn.

# A glance at several markers can give insight into MGUS

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** In September 2016, I was diagnosed with IgM MGUS. Repeat bloodwork in November 2017 revealed both IgA and IgM MGUS. I have no measurable M protein. I have had no fatigue, bone pain or other symptoms. I am a 65-year-old female in good health; I eat carefully, do not drink or smoke and exercise almost every day. Can you comment on my risk of progression? — D.D.

**ANSWER:** Monoclonal gammopathy of uncertain significance — MGUS — is a precursor condition to multiple myeloma. It is of "uncertain significance" because not everyone will progress to myeloma, a cancer of the plasma cells, which make antibodies and live in the bone marrow. MGUS isn't rare: Three to 4 percent of the population over 50 has it. However, because some people do progress, it is important for people with MGUS to be carefully observed over time by an expert in this condition, a hematologist/oncologist.

There are three major laboratory values that can help estimate the

likelihood of progressing from MGUS to myeloma. One is the total amount of abnormal M protein in the blood: Those with levels less than 1.5g/dL are at lower risk. People with IgA or IgM subtype are at higher risk than those with just IgG. An abnormal ratio of light chains (kappa and lambda chains or part of the antibody molecule) also predicts greater likelihood. I looked carefully at the labs you sent me and found low (no) M protein and normal light chain ratio, so you have two favorable and one unfavorable factor, which puts your

risk of getting multiple myeloma at about 20 percent in the next 20 years. However, your risk may be even lower since your M protein level is so low.

In addition to monitoring your labs, you should be on the lookout for symptoms, especially fever, weight loss, fatigue, bone pain or abnormal bleeding. Your prognosis is good, but people can progress quickly, so you need to be vigilant in getting any symptoms evaluated in addition to regular checkups.

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** I am 90 years old. Until age 85, I had not needed any regular drugs.

Five years ago, my systolic blood pressure was near 140, but I was feeling fine. Yielding to pressure from my health care provider, I was put on a daily dose of lisinopril and amlodipine. That reduced the blood pressure, on average, to around 120 systolic.

Since that time, I have had cold hands and feet, plus weak, painful knees. Could there be poor

blood circulation caused by blood pressure that is too low? If so, what should I do? My advisers seem to scoff at this idea. — R.E.

**ANSWER:** It is both unprofessional and unwise to scoff at patients, as they generally know their bodies better than their doctors do, and we should listen carefully before making judgments. In your case, coldness of the hands and feet is listed as a possible side effect. Joint pain also may happen, but it may be that this is unrelated to the drugs.

I don't think it is a result of too low a blood pressure, although if you already had blockages in the arteries to your limbs, lower pressure might lead to less blood flow and thus cold hands and feet.

Some doctors like to use low doses of two medicines to reduce side effects; however, when a side effect does occur, it can be hard to figure out what is going on. With your doctor's permission, you might try stopping the amlodipine to see the effect on blood pressure and on the hand and foot coldness.

Today's deal is from an under-25 competition some years ago. The six-club response to Blackwood showed two key cards, among the four aces and the king of spades, plus a void in clubs. The six-heart bid asked for the

queen of trumps, and the seven-spade bid promised that queen. This was a good auction to a reasonable grand slam. This would have been an easy one with 3-2 splits in spades and diamonds, and had chances against some poor splits as well.

On the opening lead of a spade, heart, or diamond, South would draw trumps and test the diamonds. When they failed to split, he would ruff a diamond to establish the suit and lead the king of clubs for a ruffing finesse against the ace. When that card proved to be favorably located, declarer would have a discard for his heart loser and could claim all 13 tricks.

Young Oliver Burgess, playing in the West seat for England, gave a lot of thought to the opening lead. Dummy had advertised a club void in the auction, so Burgess decided to lead the jack of clubs! He reasoned that declarer would never play him to have underled an ace against a grand slam.

Right he was as declarer ruffed the opening lead in dummy. That used up a crucial entry to dummy much too soon. South did his best by drawing two rounds of trumps before starting on diamonds. East was able to ruff the second diamond and the contract was defeated. Nice lead!

## US, France, Germany join UK in blaming Russia for spy attack

LONDON — The United States, France and Germany joined Britain on Thursday in condemning Russia for the nerve-agent poisoning of a former spy, calling it an “assault on U.K. sovereignty,” as the Kremlin vowed to expel British diplomats soon in response to London’s moves against Moscow.

Britain says blame for the poisoning of Sergei Skripal and his daughter in the English city of Salisbury lies with the Russian state. Prime Minister Theresa May responded by expelling 23 Russian diplomats, severing high-level contacts with Moscow and vowing to take both open and covert actions against Russian dirty money and “hostile state activity.”

Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov said Moscow would “certainly” expel some British diplomats soon in retaliation.

In a rare joint statement, May and U.S. President Donald Trump, French President Emmanuel Macron and German Chancellor

Angela Merkel said “there is no plausible alternative explanation” to Russian responsibility for the poisoning.

“This use of a military-grade nerve agent, of a type developed by Russia, constitutes the first offensive use of a nerve agent in Europe since the Second World War,” the leaders said, calling it “an assault on U.K. sovereignty” and “a breach of international law.”

Trump, who has often been reluctant to criticize Russian President Vladimir Putin, said it “certainly looks like the Russians were behind it.”

Trump spoke to reporters at the White House after his administration announced new sanctions on Russian entities for alleged meddling in the 2016 U.S. presidential election.

The four-nation statement is the fruit of British efforts to enlist international support as it tries to hold Russia accountable for the March 4 attack that left the former Russian agent and his daughter in critical condition and a British police officer seriously ill.

Russia denies being the source of the nerve

agent that poisoned the Skripals and has demanded Britain share samples collected by investigators. Britain says the poison used was Novichok, a class of nerve agent developed by the Soviet Union toward the end of the Cold War.

Deputy Foreign Minister Sergei Ryabkov said Russia had halted all chemical weapons research after joining the Chemical Weapons Convention that came into force in 1997, and completed the destruction of its stockpiles last year.

The poisoning has sparked a war of words from senior politicians in London and Moscow, increasing tensions between the two countries.

Lavrov said Britain’s “boorish and unfounded” accusations against Russia were intended to distract public attention from the troubled path toward Brexit.

He accused Britain of fanning “anti-Russian rhetoric bordering on hysteria.”

“They are trying to rely on political rhetoric, on Russophobia in the hope that the entire Western world lines up behind them,” he said.

Secretary Gavin Williamson called relations between the two countries “exceptionally chilly” and said Russia should “go away and shut up.”

Maj. Gen. Igor Konashenkov, a spokesman for the Russian Defense Ministry, shot back that Williamson’s comments reflected a “high degree of his intellectual impotence,” adding: “The boorish language is apparently the only thing left in the British military arsenal.”

British Foreign Secretary Boris Johnson

said Russia targeted Skripal — a former Russian intelligence officer convicted of spying for Britain — to make it clear that those who defy the Russian state deserve to “choke on their own 30 pieces of silver.”

“The reason they’ve chosen this nerve agent is to show that it’s Russia, and to show people in their agencies who might think of defecting or of supporting another way of life, of believing in an alternative set of values, that Russia will take revenge,” Johnson told the BBC.

### Detroit man charged with killing woman during dog attack

DETROIT (AP) — Authorities say a Detroit man who fatally shot a woman while trying to stop a dog that was attacking her has been charged.

The Wayne County prosecutor’s office says 61-year-old Michael Lewis Williams is charged with careless discharge of a weapon causing injury or death and is expected to be arraigned Friday.

Fifty-five-year-old Patricia Cosby was being mauled by a stray dog on a Detroit street in October when she was shot. The dog ran away.

Prosecutors said Thursday that Williams chased the dog and fired two more shots and returned to find Cosby had been wounded.

Police have said the man who fired the shot had a license to carry a concealed weapon.

Court documents did not list an attorney for Williams.

## One-tenth of lawmakers in Congress list student loan liabilities

WASHINGTON — The 115th Congress scored as one of the richest ever, but one in 10 lawmakers still holds student loan debt, either personally or for a family member.

Fifty-three members listed a combined \$1.8 million in student loans on their financial disclosures. Twenty-eight of them posted a positive net worth while 25 showed negative net worth in Roll Call’s comprehensive Wealth of Congress project.

“I still owe \$75,000 and understand the great responsibility of repayment,” Florida Democratic Rep. Darren Soto said in a statement. “I value education and believe having the ability to attend a top law school (GW Law) was an essential part of my success.”

Twenty-eight Republicans hold student loans compared to 25 Democratic colleagues. Despite fewer debtors, Democrats paid more overall for school with their student loan liabilities totaling more

than \$1 million to the Republicans’ \$830,000. Sixteen members with student loan debt are in their first term.

House members with student loan debt exceed Senate members. Only three senators cataloged student loans. However, a formatting difference between the two chambers’ financial disclosures gives more insight into the duration of senators’ loans.

Democrat Christopher S. Murphy, the junior senator from Connecticut and graduate of the University of Connecticut Law School, recorded student loans set to term out by 2027 and 2028, while Colorado GOP Sen. Cory Gardner will likely be on the hook until 2031 after attending the University of Colorado Boulder Law. Both will be in their mid-50s when the debts are repaid.

Six members have more than \$100,000 in student loan liabilities. Top of that list is outgoing House Oversight Chairman Trey Gowdy. The South Carolina Republican listed over \$150,000 for a dependent child’s education

starting August 2015.

Rep. John Carter has paid for student loans the longest. The Texas Republican owes more than \$100,000 on loans incurred in 1988. Though he did not specify, Carter’s loans may be related to his now-grown children’s education.

Others are responsible for many years of advanced degrees. California Rep. Raul Ruiz received an M.D. and two master’s degrees in the early 2000s from Harvard University. Ruiz is paying for at least \$100,000 in debt. His wife, Monica Rivers, an emergency-medicine nurse also incurred student loans, bringing their educational debts to more than \$115,000.

Ten members of Congress ranked as millionaires even with educational liabilities. Rep. Ro Khanna listed \$50,000 in student loans, next to an estimated \$28 million in family holdings.

“I certainly have been very blessed and fortunate in my own life that I’ve been in a position where the loans are not crippling, but there are a lot of people who don’t have

that opportunity,” the California Democrat said.

The same is true for Massachusetts Democratic Rep. Joseph P. Kennedy III. Twenty-five thousand dollars in his spouse’s student loans pale next to his trust fund of more than \$19 million.

Student loans have driven some members into the red. Arizona Rep. Kyrsten Sinema posted no assets with a dollar value, while a single student loan liability put her in negative net worth territory. Her fellow Democrat, Rep. Eric Swalwell of California, has more than \$50,000 owed to Ed Financial after receiving a law degree from the University of Maryland, giving him -\$53,999 in net holdings.

Most members use federal student loan repayment services or educational institutions to finance educations, but four members sourced from private creditors. Democratic Rep. Brendan F. Boyle of Pennsylvania lists Citibank and Discover as his debt collectors. First-term GOP Reps. Andy Biggs of Arizona and Lloyd K. Smucker of Pennsylvania owe student

loans to Wells Fargo Bank. California Democratic Rep. Mark Takano said he lowered his federal loan interest rates with SoFi, a personal finance company that offers student loan refinancing.

Younger members hold more student loan debt than their older colleagues. This trend could be attributed to rising college costs along with older members successfully paying their financial commitments. Only two members with debt were born before the end of the Second World War: Carter and Missouri Democratic Rep. Emanuel Cleaver II. Neither is paying for their own education.

Only three of the 18 baby boomers with student loans appear to have financed their own education — all were past 30 when they took out the loans. Generation Xers in Congress are the most in debt both for their own education, the education of a family member or both. A quarter of all Generation X lawmakers listed student loan debt, while none of the small sample of millennial members did so.

President Donald Trump has been divorced twice.

## Trump owns up to making things up during meeting with Canadian PM

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump has owned up to making things up.

For a meeting with Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, Trump was by his own admission unprepared — deficient in the fundamentals of the Canada-U.S. trade relationship that he’d been railing about since the campaign.

He insisted to Trudeau that the U.S. was running a trade deficit with Canada, a statement contradicted by U.S. government statistics. He was winging it, he confided to donors at a private Missouri political fundraiser Wednesday night.

“I didn’t even know,” he said. “I had no idea.”

Others might be mortified at being caught short. Not this president.

For Trump the showman, the episode illustrated his skill at improvisation. Still, it was a rare admission that he will say things without knowing if they are true.

Trump’s impulse to replace fact with fiction has defined him as a politician and as a businessman before that.

Depositions reviewed by AP from his litigious years in real estate show a history of dodgy statements about his property and wealth. Asked once about overstating the number of units sold in a Las Vegas tower, he said he didn’t intend his answer to be taken literally.

Trump’s years of questioning President Barack Obama’s citizenship showed a willingness to perpetuate myth that was seen again early in his presidential campaign, when he insisted against

all evidence that Muslims took to the streets in New Jersey to celebrate the 2001 terrorist attack across the river in Manhattan.

In office, he routinely misuses numbers — trade statistics among them — and recounts events to suit his agenda even if the facts don’t fit.

Of the Pulse nightclub massacre in Florida, he said, “If you had one person in that room that

could carry a gun and knew how to use it, it wouldn’t have happened, or certainly not to the extent it did,” a statement belied by the fact that the club had an armed guard on duty who immediately exchanged fire with the gunman.

In leaked audio of the Missouri fundraiser, first reported by The Washington Post, Trump says that in his meeting

with Trudeau, he thought the U.S. must be running a trade deficit with Canada because the Canadians have been smart about trade and “we’re so stupid.”

“Nice guy, good-looking guy, comes in — ‘Donald, we have no trade deficit.’” Trump recounted. “He’s very proud because everybody else, you know, we’re getting killed.”

“I said, ‘Wrong, Justin, you do.’ I didn’t even know. ... I had no idea. I just said, ‘You’re wrong.’ You know why? Because we’re so stupid. And I thought they were smart.”

Trump went on to say that his position was ultimately vindicated when he had U.S. and Canadian aides take a closer look at trade between the two countries. That conclusion is not supported by the numbers.

White House press secretary Sarah Huckabee

Sanders on Thursday insisted Trump was right, saying: “Well the president was accurate, because there is a trade deficit and that was the point he was making, is that he didn’t have to look at the specific figures, because he knew that there was a trade deficit.”

Canadian Foreign Affairs spokesman Adam Austin offered this counter: “According to their own statistics, the U.S. runs a trade surplus with Canada.”

Trump mischaracterizes the trade balance by considering only trade in goods and ignoring services. On goods, the U.S. ran a deficit of \$17.6 billion with Canada last year. That was offset by a surplus in trade in services.

Overall, the U.S. Census Bureau reports a U.S. trade surplus of \$2.8 billion last year with Canada.

## Coats flying under the radar

PORT CHARLOTTE — Jason Coats is no stranger to being overlooked.

He was a walk-on at Texas Christian University before helping lead them to an appearance in the College World Series in 2010. Following his time at TCU, he wasn't selected in the 2012 MLB Amateur Draft until the 29th round by the Chicago White Sox.

Now, bidding for a spot on the Tampa Bay Rays' roster, Coats is very well in the mix to be the team's fifth

outfielder, but doesn't get the attention some of the others in his position do.

"I feel like that's just how I've always been," Coats said. "It's not necessarily nice being under the radar, but you can go out there and perform and just go about your business."

It was a tough year for Coats in 2017, who tore his ulnar collateral ligament (UCL) — an injury uncommon for position players — while throwing during the offseason back at TCU.

Although he would've preferred to play last year, the time off

allowed him to rediscover how much the game means to him.

"Missing all of last year with an injury kind of hurt. It was a tough year not being able to play, but I'm glad to be back out there getting ready to play again," Coats said. "(The injury) reminded me how much I love the game. I kind of drove me to work harder and get back healthy."

Manager Kevin Cash recognizes how difficult it is for a player to miss an entire season and then have to come back and fight for a spot on the team.

"We have to

remember, missing a year is not easy to do and then come in and fight for a job," Cash said. "Coats is probably putting some added pressure on himself. I think he's done well. He's carried himself well and he's carried himself well in the outfield. I think his timing is going to get better."

The 28-year-old got off to a hot start this spring, recording a hit in each of his first four games, including a home run, but since his single on Feb. 28 against Minnesota, he's been unable

depth at center is a growing factor for success in the NHL. Contenders like the Flyers, Tampa Bay Lightning, Nashville Predators, Winnipeg Jets and two-time defending Stanley Cup champion Pittsburgh Penguins all boast depth down the middle and are spreading centers all over the lineup.

The flexibility gives teams potentially game-altering matchups with the playoffs coming up in a month.

"You can never have enough center-ice men on your team for lots of reasons," Penguins coach Mike Sullivan said.

Crucial faceoffs, injuries and defensive-zone coverage are many of the reasons to load up on centers who can almost always shift to wing. Philadelphia has long followed the model of drafting and acquiring centers and moving them around, and now has nine natural centers on its roster.

The Penguins won the 2009 Stanley Cup going with Sidney Crosby, Evgeni Malkin, Jordan Staal and Max Talbot down the middle and captured it the past two years with Crosby, Malkin, Nick Bonino and Matt Cullen.

The free agent departures of Bonino and Cullen left a void that Pittsburgh filled by trading for Derick Brassard and Riley Sheahan to again look like a championship contender.

"To have the depth that we have at this point at the center-ice position is I think an important aspect of our overall game," Sullivan said. "We didn't have that coming into training camp. I think our general manager, Jim (Rutherford), has worked extremely hard at making sure that he gave us what has become now I think a strength of our team."

It's also a strength of the Eastern Conference-leading Lightning, who are overflowing with center options beyond Steven Stamkos, Alex Killorn and trade-deadline pickup J.T. Miller. The Toronto Maple Leafs also roll deep with forwards who play center or have in the past, including Patrick Marleau and recent acquisition Tomas Plekanec.

MIAMI — As part of an attempted upgrade on offense, the Miami Dolphins even decided to switch snappers.

Three-time Pro Bowl center Mike Pouncey was released Thursday as part of an offensive line makeover. Miami also acquired center Daniel Kilgore in a trade with San Francisco, and four-time Pro Bowl guard Josh Sitton agreed to terms on a two-year deal that could be worth nearly \$18 million including incentives, said his agent, Jack Reale.

Pouncey, 28, has been plagued by serious problems with both hips, and at one time said he feared the issue might be career-ending. But last season he played in all 16 games for the first time since 2012.

The Dolphins also sealed their deals with former New England Patriots receiver Danny Amendola and former Kansas City Chiefs receiver Albert

# Bucs land ex-Eagles DT Beau Allen

TAMPA — Free agent defensive tackle Beau Allen is eager to make a difference for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

The former Philadelphia run-stopper signed a three-year, \$15 million contract Thursday and has no qualms about leaving the reigning NFL champion Eagles to join a team that hasn't made the playoffs in a decade.

Allen said he's excited about the challenge of doing his part to help the Bucs get better.

"We won the Super Bowl in Philadelphia, but it wasn't all roses

before that. We had tough seasons, too," the fifth-year pro said.

"I'm not afraid of work at all," Allen added. "That's why I'm here."

The 26-year-old tackle comes to the Bucs after spending the first four seasons of his career as part of a strong interior rotation with the Eagles, who led the league in rushing defense in 2017, limiting opponents to 79.2 yards per game on the ground.

The Bucs, by comparison, ranked 23rd against the run, allowing 117.5 yards per game.

"Stopping the run is a huge part of the game,

and that's one thing we did really well in Philadelphia last year," Allen said.

"We were the No. 1 run defense and I think, to toot my own horn a little bit, I was a big part of that," he added. "We had a lot of good defensive linemen, a lot of good defensive players ... so that went into it as well."

With Tampa Bay, the 6-foot-3, 327-pound Allen fills a need for interior help created by the release of underperforming tackle Chris Baker and loss of veteran Clinton McDonald, who became an unrestricted free agent.

at 5 under through 10 holes.

Coming off a runner-up finish at the Valspar Championship that raised expectations of a victory being closer than ever, Woods started and finished strong, with one mishap in the middle.

His drive on No. 3, his 12th hole of the round, sailed to the right and went off a cart path and toward the houses. Only when he reached the ball did Woods find it rolled into the bottom of a mesh

fence. It looked like it was in play, except the poles on the waist-high fence were the boundaries, and his ball was inches outside of them.

He went back to the tee, sprayed the next tee shot under a tree and made double bogey.

## Ramblers keep ramblin'

South: Buzzer-beater lifts Loyola-Chicago over Miami

DALLAS — Donte Ingram picked the perfect spot for this game-winning shot.

Ingram hit a 3-pointer from the March Madness logo just before the buzzer, lifting 11th-seeded Loyola-Chicago over Miami 64-62 in a Thursday thriller at the NCAA Tournament.

"Well, it's pretty simple to know why we call it March Madness," said Hurricanes coach Jim Larranaga, left holding his head in stunned disbelief after Ingram's shot.

In 2006, Larranaga took 11th-seed George Mason to the Final Four. This time, it was Loyola's turn to celebrate after making its first tournament appearance in 33 years.

The long shot from well beyond the key came with just a split-second left, and was set up by a pass from Marques Townes. It happened after Lonnie Walker IV missed a free throw with a chance to give Miami a three-point lead with 9 seconds remaining.

"I thank Marques for making that pass," said Ingram, who was 3 of 8 from 3 and scored 13 points. "Any one of us could have hit that shot, but I was just fortunate enough to be in the position."

The Ramblers (29-5) matched the school record for wins from their 1963 national championship team in their first NCAA trip since losing to Patrick Ewing and Georgetown in the Sweet 16 in 1985. They advanced to face third-seeded Tennessee on

Saturday.

Loyola, with an 11-game winning streak that is its longest since winning the NCAA title, was boosted by a pregame prayer from its team chaplain, 98-year-old Sister Jean Dolores Schmidt.

She's held that post for more than two decades and, sitting courtside in her wheelchair, got hugs from the Ramblers when it was over.

"I just gave a big sigh of relief and said, 'Thank God,'" she told The Associated Press about Ingram's shot.

The sixth-seeded Hurricanes (22-10) led most of the second half in their third straight trip to the tournament, but couldn't pull away

in the final minutes and lost in the first round for the second straight year.

The buzzer sounded as Ingram's shot went in, and the Ramblers celebrated wildly in front of the raucous fans wearing maroon-and-gold scarfs in the American Airlines Center sections across from their bench.

**Tennessee 73, Wright State 47:** Admiral Schofield had 15 points and 12 rebounds as Tennessee advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament with a win over Wright State with coach Rick Barnes back in familiar territory Thursday.

Lamonte Turner had 19 points and a career-high nine

assists for Tennessee (26-8), SEC co-champions in the regular season after being picked in the preseason to finish 13th in the 14-team league. Grant Williams added 14 points and nine rebounds.

**Kentucky 78, Davidson 73:** Kentucky topped Davidson despite failing to make a single 3-pointer, snapping a nation-best streak of 1,047 games with a 3 that began in 1988. The fifth-seeded Wildcats went 0 for 6 from behind the line and didn't even try one over the final 8:46. The last time Kentucky didn't make a 3-pointer was at the Great Alaska Shoot-out against Seton Hall on Nov. 26, 1988.

### Midwest Region

**Rhode Island 83, Oklahoma 78 (OT):** E.C. Matthews hit the go-ahead 3-pointer in overtime and one more that sealed it to help Rhode Island hold off dynamic scorer Trae Young and Oklahoma. The 10th-seeded Sooners (18-14) late-season fade ended with a thud when Young failed to carry them as he had so many times this season. The phenomenal freshman led the nation with averages of 27.4 points and 8.8 assists. He scored 28 points on 9 of 18 shooting with six turnovers.

**Duke 89, Iona 67:** Marvin Bagley III dominated in his NCAA Tournament debut, pouring in 22 points to go with seven rebounds as Duke rolled by Iona. The ACC Player of the Year made 10 of 14 shots in 32 minutes, grabbed seven rebounds and knocked down his lone 3-point attempt as the second-seeded Blue Devils overwhelmed the 15th-seeded Gaels.

**Kansas 76, Penn 60:** Devonte Graham ignited sluggish Kansas midway through the first half, pouring in 29 points and lifted the top-seeded Jayhawks to a tough, grind-it-out victory over No. 16 Pennsylvania. The Jayhawks (28-7) trailed the Ivy League champs by 10 in the early stages before going on a 19-2 run late in the first half to take control.

**Seton Hall 94, N.C. State 83:** Khadeen Carrington scored 26 points, Desi Rodriguez added 20 and eighth-seeded Seton Hall beat North Carolina State in a foul-filled first-round matchup. Myles Powell added 19 points for the Pirates (22-11).

### West Region

**Gonzaga 68, UNC-Greensboro 64:** Zach Norvell Jr. hit the go-ahead 3-pointer with 20.8 seconds left to help Gonzaga escape a major scare from UNC-Greensboro. The fourth-seeded Bulldogs (31-4) trailed 64-62 with 1:48 left after squandering a 12-point lead they took early in the second half. Josh Perkins tied the game at 64, and after Greensboro's Francis Alonso forced up a miss, Gonzaga got the rebound and worked the ball to Norvell, a redshirt freshman, who spotted up from the right elbow and made the 3 for the lead.

**Ohio State 81, South Dakota State 73:** Kam Williams made a tiebreaking four-point play with 1:36 left, then added a trio of free throws after being fouled on another 3-point attempt, lifting Ohio State to a victory over South Dakota State. Fifth-seeded Ohio State (25-8) built a 13-point lead by reeling off 16 straight points midway through the second half of a game that featured 71 combined 3-pointers. South Dakota State made a late run at the Buckeyes, scoring 10 straight points to tie it at 70-all. Williams answered — by being fouled on a pair of 3-pointers. He finished off the four-point play for a 74-70 lead and made all three free throws on the second, making it 77-70 with 64 seconds left.

**Houston 67, San Diego State 65:** Rob Gray scored 39 points — the last two on a driving layup with just over one second left — to lift the Cougars to a win over San Diego State in a wild finish. The teams exchanged 3-pointers in the final minute before Gray — who also had 8 rebounds — hit the winner.

### East Region

**Villanova 87, Radford 61:** Jalen Brunson scored 16 points and No. 1 seed Villanova hit 14 3-pointers in a romp over Radford in the opening round of the NCAA Tournament. The Highlanders (23-13) posed no threat at becoming the first 16 seed to ever knock off a No. 1 in the tournament. Villanova (31-4) played to near-perfection for the first 30 minutes and everyone played a role. Mikal Bridges had 13 points, Eric Paschall scored 11 and Omari Spellman had 10 points and seven rebounds. The Wildcats play on Saturday against the winner of Virginia Tech-Alabama. Radford, out of rural southwest Virginia, must have felt like it was playing against ace pop-a-shot players. Villanova led 69-37 with 11:45 left and was shooting 75 percent (25 of 34) overall and 60 percent (12 of 20) from 3-point range.

**Texas Tech 70, Stephen F. Austin 60:** Keenan Evans scored 19 of his 23 points after half-time and third-seeded Texas Tech surged late to top Stephen F. Austin. The Big 12 runner-up Red Raiders (25-9) closed the game on a 13-2 run. Evans drove for a layup with 3:58 left, putting Texas Tech ahead to stay. When Evans split through defenders with just over a minute left, he paused briefly to give a quick pose to the camera under the basket. Evans had only four points in the first half, all on free throws while going 0 for 4 from the field. But he also ignited the highlight play of the night, throwing an alley-oop pass to 6-foot-5 freshman Zhaire Smith, who made a 360-degree spin in the air while completing the dunk.

2016 champion Villanova. "It's just a lot of fun. We're going to be competing at the highest level right now."

Indeed. The 15th-seeded Bisons (23-9) play their first-ever NCAA game against reigning national champion North Carolina in the second-seeded Tar Heels' home state.

The gap between high-seeded perennial powers and the lower-seeded upstarts usually focuses on the obvious:

The number of NBA prospects. The bigger front lines.

The speed and length on the wing.

Yet there's more to it for players who are also making their NCAA Tournament debut.

It's dealing with the buzz that reverberates around campus from earning a spot in the field of 68.

It's getting to often bigger venues and then taking everything in while going through light practices that are open to the public.

There's the rush of extra media attention and interviews leading up to the game — and of course, playing win-or-go-home games at the time of year when even casual college basketball fans

are closely watching.

Cal State Fullerton coach Dedrique Taylor leads the 15th-seeded Titans (20-11) against No. 2 seed Purdue in the East Region in Detroit, marking only the third program appearance (1978 and 2008 were the others) in the tournament.

Taylor figures only so much can be done to keep inexperienced players from feeling overwhelmed.

"I don't know if it's preventable," Taylor said. "I think more than anything we embrace it. We've worked hard for this."

"One thing that we've talked about since the conference tournament is just

trying to keep things simple, keep things as easy as possible and make easy happen. Attach something that we know we can do to your mind mentally. Focus on that and then just see what happens at that point. But I don't want these guys to not enjoy the moment, but I also obviously don't want them to get overwhelmed."

In Charlotte, South No. 16 seed UMBC drew top overall seed Virginia. That program has one player who has been part of an NCAA team in VCU transfer Jairus Lyles, though he didn't play in the Rams' only game in that 2014 tournament, while coach Ryan Odum is in the

tournament for the first time as a head coach.

Three of the teams in this inexperienced bunch play Friday in San Diego.

In the Midwest, College of Charleston (26-7) is a No. 13 seed under fourth-year coach Earl Grant and will fourth-seeded Auburn in the Cougars' first tournament game since 1999.

Murray State (26-5) is the highest seed of the trio, a No. 12 in the East bracket taking on fifth-seeded West Virginia.

He's also the Wildcats' energy-boosting leader. "You have Rawle that brings a toughness to our team that separates maybe us from some others," coach Sean Miller said.

**THEO PINSON, North Carolina:** The 6-foot-6 senior's value goes well beyond stats. He's a playmaker who can alter a game even without putting up many points. Pinson's passing is key to making UNC's small-ball offense work considering the Tar Heels have four good outside shooters around him, which opens lanes for him to finish near the rim.

**KHRYRI THOMAS, Creighton:** The 6-3 guard's athletic play has drawn the eye of NBA scouts. Second on the Bluejays in scoring (15.3 points), Thomas can change a game on the defensive end alone. He's the two-time Big East Defensive Player of the Year.

**ISIAH WILKINS and JACK SALT, Virginia:** Arguably a glue-guy combo on the No. 1 team in the country. Wilkins is the best defender and rebounder on the best defensive team in the country. Salt does dirty work at both ends, sets screens, protects the rim and taps the ball out for teammates to get rebounds.

# Rays officially announce pitching rotation

PORT CHARLOTTE — No surprises here.

Chris Archer will be the Tampa Bay Rays' Opening Day starter against the Boston Red Sox, manager Kevin Cash officially announced Thursday afternoon.

"It's always a goal of mine," Archer said. "It's such a pitching-rich organization, it's an honor every year to represent the Tampa Bay Rays on the first game of the season."

"It means a lot. We've had some really, really good pitchers."

This will be Archer's team-record fourth Opening Day start, pitching to a 1-2 record in the previous three, with his lone win coming against the New York Yankees last season.

"That's saying something about the body of work that he's put together since he's put together during the early part of his career so far here, and how much we value him and count on him to go lead us on Opening Day," Cash said.

Following Archer in the rotation, Blake Snell has been named the No. 2 starter, with a bullpen day on day three, Nate Eovaldi for game four and then Jake Faria will start the series-opener against the Yankees.

"It just allows with all the off days just to manage specifically

Nate's workload coming out of the gate," Cash said about the bullpen day. Eovaldi is making his return from 2016 Tommy John surgery and is expected to be on some sort of inning limit throughout the season.

Infielder Brad Miller and outfielder Mallex Smith — both of whom the Rays insist will be ready for the start of the season — are on the brink of returning from their respective injuries, and

"I think he'll have enough at-bats and his timing in order enough to be ready for Opening Day," Cash said.

Miller played in a minor league game for the Rays on Thursday, going 0-for-4 with a pair of strikeouts.

He hasn't played since Feb. 23 as he recovers from a broken toe on his right foot.

For Smith, a nagging hamstring injury has kept him sidelined for over a week now. Yesterday, he hit during batting practice, shagged fly balls and did some base-running drills.

Both players are expected to have the day

off today to see how they responded to yesterday's activities.

# Dominant Daria: Kasatkina routs Kerber

INDIAN WELLS, Calif. — Daria Kasatkina kept her focus for all of 58 minutes.

That's how long it took to dispatch former No. 1 Angelique Kerber 6-0, 6-2 in the quarterfinals of the BNP Paribas Open on Thursday.

The 20-year-old Russian hasn't dropped a set in four matches at Indian Wells, knocking out U.S. Open champion Sloane Stephens and No. 2-ranked Caroline Wozniacki along the way.

"Maybe, yeah, from the side or with the score it looks like it was simple, but of course it's not," Kasatkina said. "I knew that in one moment if I will lose focus just for a second, they will come back and then the big battle, five hours again, will start."

No chance against Kerber.

The German never managed a break point against Kasatkina's serve. The Russian connected on 82 percent of her first serves, winning 22 of 32 first-serve points.

"This one I will try to forget as fast as possible," Kerber said.

In the men's quarterfinals, Borna Coric of Croatia upset No. 7 seed Kevin Anderson 2-6, 6-4, 7-6 (3) for his first win in four tries against the South African.

Coric next faces either No. 1 Roger Federer or Chung Hyeon of South Korea, who were to meet Thursday night.

Besides Stephens and Australian Open winner Wozniacki, Kasatkina has beaten the other current Grand Slam titleholders in the past year: French Open winner Jelena Ostapenko and Wimbledon champion Garbine Muguruza.

That's part of the

reason for her impressive rise in the rankings over the last three years, and she's guaranteed to make her highest move yet as a result of her deep run in the desert. She came into the tournament at No. 19, two spots lower than her career-best. She could move to 15th or 16th, and has a shot at the top 10 if she would win the title.

But that's more than she cared to consider, especially against Kerber.

"Actually, my head was quite empty," she said, smiling.

Whenever she can get away, Kasatkina can be found in Barcelona. Her favorite soccer team is there, and she loves the architecture, the seaside

location, and the food, with paella and tapas her top choices. And a little bit of wine, too, even though she's not 21.

"In Europe it doesn't matter," she said. "With good company, of course, you can have a glass or two."

Kasatkina will play either No. 8 seed Venus Williams or 27th-seeded Carla Suarez Navarro of Spain in the semis.

Regardless of the opponent, she wants to play at night.

"I just want to be on the central court, prime time," she said, smiling. "In the evening, something special is coming from here, from the heart."

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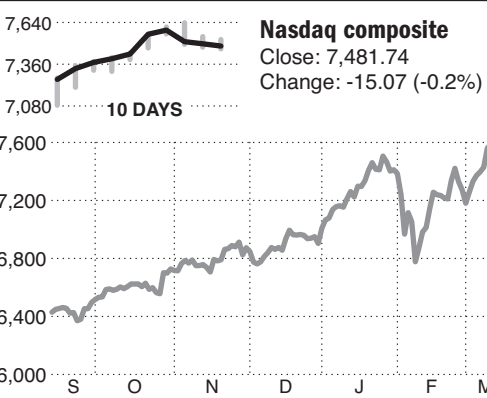
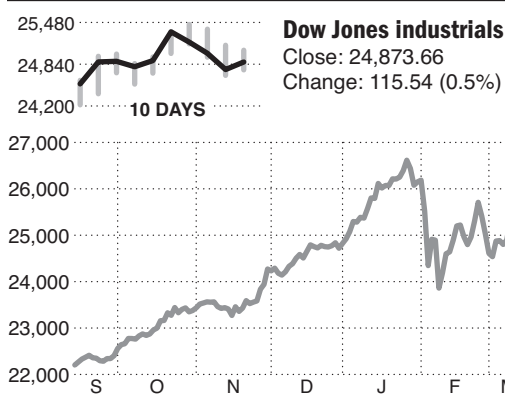
