Elections office: If changing parties, do it now

hopes to get part of the Help America Vote Act: The initiative of the current administration to secure voting systems against tampering.

Highlands County Supervisor of Elections Penny Ogg said the \$380 million federal program will provide \$19.2 million to Florida. Out of that, she has sent a grant for \$116,074 to improve monitoring of systems, both in person and through software.

"We're working with the Clerk of the Courts Information Technology Department to ensure that security," Ogg said.

She said the act was signed on March 23. Florida's Legislative Budget Committee gave permission Thursday to disburse funds to counties, first by a base rate and then based on proportion of voting-age population.

At this point, Ogg said, the voter registration database is secure. She doesn't know of any attempts to hack into Highlands County's database.

The tabulation side is different, Ogg said: Florida is still on paper ballots and voting machines are not attached to the internet.

"Florida is a paper ballot state," Ogg said. "There are some counties with digital (machines) for the handicapped. We don't have them

She said the deadline for every county to go to paper-based systems is 2020.

The closest Highlands County comes to a digital voting machine is the AutoMARK system: It marks a ballot for someone not physically able to do so.

Highlands County once had a blended system, Ogg said. Thensupervisor Joe Campbell chose AutoMARK, which prints out a paper ballot to then be scanned by the optical scanning devices.

"There's always a paper trail," Ogg said. "Every ballot we have is paper."

It makes it easier to audit by hand after every election, she said.

Meanwhile, those wanting to change their party affiliation will want to do it this week. The deadline is July 30.

Ogg said the voter registration book will "close" that day, and anyone wanting to register in

SNL discusses lower fees on vacant lots

SEBRING — Vacant lots in Sun'N Lake of Sebring have a high foreclosure rate, and a consultant told the Sun 'N Lake Board of Supervisors that lowering the assessments on these lots would improve the ability to collect the taxes and

help stem delinquencies.

Steven McDonald, chief economist with GAI consultants, said the assessment should more closely match the lots' market value. The vacant lots are not using the community center nor the playground. They are not accessing the same level of benefits as the homes in the area, he explained.

In fact, McDonald estimates the lots are only accessing 10 percent of the benefits that Sun 'N Lake provides to residents. People who own a vacant lot are not driving back and forth to their homes every day and using the roads. They are not using the parks or the recreation that are offered, McDonald said. He came up with the proposed changes in the assessments on the vacant lots based on this 10 percent value.

In some areas, the vacant, unimproved lots are not even connected to roads or drainage. Yet, these vacant lots on less than a third of an

Sebring woman charged with drug possession

SEBRING — A traffic stop on North Ridgewood Drive turned into a drug arrest with charges for cocaine, methamphetamine and a synthetic drug.

On Wednesday, **Highlands County** Sheriff's Office charged Brenda Lee Bass, 54, of Sebring, with two counts of possession of a controlled substance without a prescription, possession of cocaine and possession of drug equipment.

While two HCSO deputies were patrolling an area of Glenwood Avenue and North Ridgewood Drive, they had Bass stop her vehicle because a bicycle on the back was obstructing the

view of the license plate, according to the arrest report.

One of the deputies reported he asked Bass to exit the vehicle while the

Man charged with ramming into ex-girlfriend's vehicle

SEBRING — A Sebring man crashed his vehicle into his ex-girlfriend's vehicle at a local store, authorities say.

On Wednesday, **Highlands County** Sheriff's Office charged Aneudy Moises Gomez, 36, of Sebring, with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon without intent to kill.

According to the arrest report, Gomez intentionally crashed his vehicle into his ex-girlfriend's gray Honda Accord. His girlfriend was reversing out of her parking space when he "intentionally rammed the vehicle," the report stated. The ex-girlfriend stated

that she believed Gomez

had seen her leaving work and followed her to the store. The ex-girlfriend also stated that she believed

the incident

occurred because she had told Gomez she was planning to remove her name from the vehicle and cancel the insurance. The eyewitness stated

in the report that the ex-girlfriend was reversing slowly and that Gomez approached her vehicle slowly until he was near her vehicle. At that point, Gomez accelerated his speed, "ramming into the back of the vehicle," while "tightly gripping the

steering wheel" and "ducking down as if to brace for impact," the report stated. The eyewitness stated, "The collision appeared to be intentional."

Gomez reportedly said that he had no idea it was his ex-girlfriend in the vehicle and it was due to him "not paying attention," the report stated.

According to the deputy, Gomez did not appear to take the incident seriously.

The store's security footage was reviewed. According to the report, the victim was seen moving slowly in reverse and Gomez was seen going "from an extremely low rate of speed to accelerating greatly, colliding with [the victim]."

Lake Placid considers ball park user fee increase

LAKE PLACID — Increasing the user fees at the Lake June Ball Fields were called into question at a budget workshop Thursday evening.

Town Recreation **Facility Supervisor Harry** Durbano said his department will be feeling the pressure to come up with the funds it needs for the 2018-2019 fiscal year because of a \$50,000 budget cut that is being proposed in Highlands County's budget.

In a budget workshop on Tuesday, the county announced it was looking to find places to cut the budget, and recreation was on

the chopping block. Last year, the county gave each town or city \$110,000. In the 2018-2019 fiscal year, they are considering a \$50,000 cut for each municipality, reducing the amount to \$60,000.

Word from the county on Friday was that during the Tuesday workshop, commissioners suggested cutting recreation funds because the municipalities could apply for funds through the county's Recreation Parks Advisory Council.

Lake Placid Vice Mayor Ray Royce had to switch hats to mayor soon after the workshop began as Mayor John Holbrook had to leave the meeting. Royce said the total user fees were about \$9,600

and those funds were supposed to go into an account established for recreation capital expenses like fixing fences.

Each sports team participant is charged a \$20 user fee per sport. Royce said they had about 500 people participating annually, to total the nearly \$10,000.

"There were more user fees that came in," Rachel Osborne, financial director, said. "There were some leagues who didn't pay yet.'

Durbano explained the football league only pays when it has all its players registered and ready to play. Osborne said that it could be over \$13,000 total.

"I think we ought to

ask staff, not tonight, but ask them to look into some portions and figure out how we are going to replace at least some portion of that \$50,000," Royce said. "We're only going to end up getting about 600-800

users. "Even if we charged another \$10, we would only end up with another \$10,000 or so," he said. "If the county is going to do that, especially since it is primarily people who do not live within the municipality who use it and we pay for all that recreation stuff."

Town Administrator Phil Williams said they have to cut parts of maintenance to the park in order to adhere to a

budget.

"I'm going to let you guys (recreation department) decide if user fees should go up and if some portion of them be dedicated to operational expenses," Royce said.

He challenged the recreation department to make sure they were having everyone pay the user fees. Williams told the Council they need to get user fees from the large tournaments such as the Dixie state tournament that was hosted this month.

It was a surprise to some Council members that the town was not being paid for the tournaments. Durbano said he had the septic tanks pumped before the tournament at

\$500 and spent \$600 in trash bags and cleaning supplies. Dixie told Durbano they would pay to have the septic systems re-pumped after the tournament.

Royce said that with tournament-type events there needs to be a fee of a couple thousand dollars to recoup some of the wear and tear on the field.

'Going forward with some of these events like travel ball, we're going to have to charge. If people have a real problem with it, I would tell people talk to their county commissioners," he said.

Commissioner Don Elwell will talk about the county budget at a Town Hall set for 6 p.m. Tuesday, July 24.

The contractor is also milling and resurfacing the existing roadway on U.S. 27 from West Townsend Street to Batts Street and on S.R. 64 from Collier Avenue to Self Avenue, installing curb and gutter, installing traffic separators, sidewalks, traffic signals, street lights, and signing and pavement markers. A single continuous lane closure on U.S. 27 will be in place during intersection construction. Additional lane closures, single-lane flagging operations, and temporary lane shifts will

occur during nighttime/ overnight hours on U.S. 27 and SR 64. Estimated project completion date is spring 2020. Motorists should expect lane closures on U.S. 27 during overnight hours from 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. and intermittent single-lane flagging operations on S.R. 64 during the daytime. All U.S. 27 traffic lanes have shifted eastward and reduced to two lanes in each direction. The entrances to Kersey Street and Prairie Street on southbound U.S. 27 and South Hart Avenue on eastbound S.R. 64 will be closed to traffic from about July 23 through Aug. 11. Please follow detour signs and watch for workers in the

construction zone.

SFSC earns gold status for second year

AVON PARK — For the second year in a row, South Florida State College earned gold status for 2018-19 from the Florida College System. Of the 28 FCS institutions, SFSC was among only five to earn

"It is thrilling to learn that SFSC received this prestigious recognition for two consecutive years," said Thomas C. Leitzel, president of SFSC. "This year's score is near perfect. The rating puts SFSC among a group of elite Florida colleges and affirms the commitment to excellence in student services combined with quality learning initiatives led by committed members of the faculty."

The FCS uses a Performance Funding Model to issue points to each of the 28 institutions. Using a 40-point



scale, the model includes four measures that are worth 10 points each: Retention Rates; Completion Rates; Job Placement/Continuing Education Rates; and Entry-Level Wages. The institutions are then placed in categories based on their point totals: gold, silver, or bronze. This year, there were five gold, 18 silver, and five bronze colleges. AP council to discuss draft budget

AVON PARK — The draft budget for the 2018-19 fiscal year shows the City of Avon Park is maintaining the property tax rate at 30 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, or .3

The City Council will discuss the draft budget at its regular meeting on Monday.

The draft budget agenda information states that staff members have been reviewing the draft budget that was previously submitted to the Council.

A list of all current staff, a total of 73, is included within the draft budget. The positions listed, as of June 21, include 17 in the fire department, two code enforcement officers, the City Council members and mayor, city manager, City Hall office workers and sanitation and utilities service workers.

The employee roster includes the city attorney, director of infrastructure, public safety director and GIS (geographic information systems) analyst. Two optional positions listed are for park

maintenance and IT administrator.

The general fund total in the proposed 2018-19 budget is \$5,109,024, which is a little higher than the original budget for 2017-18, which was \$5,081,733. The total infrastructure fund of \$1,416,841 is also a little higher than the original 2017-18 budget of \$1,326,841.


Also on the agenda, City Manager June Fisher will provide an update on the possibility of the city purchasing the Sebring Ridge wastewater system.

The owners of the utility, Chris and Julia Miller, had presented a sale price proposal of \$650,000 to the city, which includes 17 acres of land that are zoned B-3 property and seven additional lots. Without the B-3 property and lots, the sale price is \$450,000.

The City Council wanted know how much it would cost to improve the reliability of the system.







A welcome election

Filing for the Avon Park City Council election this fall begins Monday morning. Already, we can expect a race for the three seats that will be up for grabs.

Incumbents Brenda Gray, the city's current deputy mayor, and Dora Smith have announced their intentions to seek re-election. Incumbent Terry Heston has remained silent on what his plans are.

Most exciting though, are the four candidates who have pre-qualified. Charles Howell, Craig Marans, Stanley Spurlock and Maria Sutherland have all thrown their hats in the ring.

Marans, a former city firefighter, and Sutherland, the city's former administrative services director, both have municipal government experience as employees and an insight into how the City of Avon Park has operated in the past. Howell and Spurlock are each eager to learn everything they can.

We've said before that it's a shame when residents don't have the privilege of hearing campaign speeches or candidate debates. There are no new faces, no new ideas when incumbents are not challenged.

Instead of hearing what a candidate's views are on issues when a government entity has an election, reseating the incumbents simply allows for status quo for the next three years. That should never be allowed, even when the elected officials have done a good job.

Without being given an opportunity to hear from other interested parties, we could never have the opportunity to hear ideas on how to improve traffic patterns on the county's roads, whether they think a traffic enforcement unit is needed for the county, or what the county can do to attract bigger businesses and industries to the county.

The reason elections are planned for every three years is to give people with new ideas, or a different vision, an opportunity to lead. It is to give those residents who don't feel their voices are heard an opportunity to vote for someone they believe can best represent them ... someone who can actually hear their concerns.

Gray has served the city for five three-year terms. Heston has served two three-year terms, and Smith has served one three-year term in office.

The qualifying period for Avon Park City Council candidates starts at 8 a.m. Monday and ends at 4 p.m. Aug. 3.

Qualifying documents are available from the City Clerk in City Hall at 110 E. Main St.

You don't have to be a business owner, a retiree or hold a doctorate degree to understand the daily functions of a government agency. What you do need, though, is a passion for the community you want to serve and a desire to make a difference for the good of the entire community, not just your neighborhood. It will take someone with the time to invest in the work that needs to be done to prepare for and attend meetings, but if you have the desire to serve your community, the time to do so will not be an issue.

We are grateful to the six candidates who have announced their plans to seek office, but we hope the list of names to be added to the ballot will increase in the next couple of weeks.

We are in the Deadliest 100 Days for teen drivers

We are less than a month before the end of summer break for students, but we are still quite a ways off from the end what is known as the 100 Deadliest Days for teen drivers.

The 100 Deadliest Days begin on Memorial Day and last until Labor Day (Sept. 3 this year). According to the American Automobile Association (AAA), deadly crashes involving a teen driver go up by 14 percent during these 100 days. We Save Lives, another highway safety advocate group, says the increase is actually 26 percent. Either number says a lot because driving is already the most dangerous thing that most teenagers do.

Traffic crashes are the leading cause of death for teenagers. We Save Lives reports that 260 teens are killed each month in car crashes during the summer months. The leading cause of those crashes are distraction and alcohol

distraction and alcohol.
From the law enforcement viewpoint,
distracted driving is the cause of most crashes. I often hear people asking about increased enforcement and lowering the speed limit on U.S. 27 as ways to reduce crashes. As for enforcement, we have written nearly 1,300 traffic citations and made 77 DUI arrests so far

this year, the majority of those on U.S. 27. We will continue to make traffic enforcement on our roads a priority. But no matter what the speed limit is on the highway or how many deputies are doing traffic enforcement, the biggest cause of crashes will continue to be drivers not paying attention to the task at hand.

Teens are even more susceptible to being distracted drivers. And before you blame cell phones, you should know that the leading cause of that distraction is actually their passengers. Studies show that 15 percent of distracted driving crashes involving teenagers can be blamed on other passengers compared to 12 percent being caused by cell phones.

That is why it is a good idea to limit the number of people allowed in your teen's vehicle. Anyone

who has been around a group of teenagers knows how loud they can get. Imagine a driver with very limited experience behind the wheel being in the middle of a four-way conversation among their friends as they try to drive through heavy traffic.

There are several other ways to help reduce your teen driver's risk. The first is to set a good example. You are your child's biggest influence. If they regularly see you texting behind the wheel, speeding and doing other unsafe things as a driver, are you going to be surprised if they end up with the same bad habits?

Make sure they have as much experience as possible before they turn 16. In addition to a driver's education class, give them every opportunity to drive with a responsible adult in the passenger seat monitoring how they are doing. Use constructive criticism to help them learn.

Obviously, telling them that under no circumstances should they ever drink and drive is a given. They should also refuse to get into a car that is being driven by one of their friends who has been drinking or using drugs.

It is also a good idea to limit the time they are allowed on the road. Late nights and weekends are more dangerous for all drivers since that is when most alcohol-related incidents occur.

Please take the time to sit down with your teen driver and have a long talk about what you expect from them. Establish an agreement between you and your teenager about what the rules are for having the privilege of being able to drive and make it clear which infractions will cause the keys to be taken away. Don't be afraid to be strict. Turning over control of a several thousand-pound projectile to a teenager is not something to be taken lightly.

If you need even more peace of mind, there are many apps that can be used to monitor a teen's driving habits. A simple Google search can help you find one that works for your family.

Nothing can ever take away all of the risks that come with driving. But following a few of these steps can go a long way to reducing the danger for your teen.

acre have been assessed at \$294.62 per year. McDonald proposed chopping the assessment on such lots to \$67.34.

Larger lots would be charged more based on their size. For example, an unimproved lot that was approximately half an acre would be assessed at \$134, if Sun 'N Lake decided to adopt McDonald's suggestions.

McDonald also suggested that improved lots with road access also receive a reduction in assessments. He proposed that the assessment on lots with road and drainage on less than a third of an acre be reduced from \$499.43 to \$336.72.

Since the assessments are considered high on vacant lots, many homeowners have let them go. McDonald reminded the people at the meeting of the high foreclosure rates on vacant lots.

The Sun 'N Lake board of supervisors acknowledged this problem at

the meeting, however, they were concerned about the possible loss in revenue.

Sun 'N Lake Finance Director Omar DeJesus estimated that adopting McDonald's proposed changes and lowering the assessments on the vacant lots would cause the district to lose \$310,000 per year.

McDonald acknowledged the loss in revenue, but he also showed a slide from a PowerPoint presentation, which showed that Sun 'N Lake only collected 13.43 percent of the assessment fees from unimproved lots and 37.72 percent of the assessment fees from improved lots. According to McDonald, people would be more likely to pay their assessments if the bills were lower, and they would be less likely to walk away from the property.

McDonald also suggested that the district consider having the county collect the assessments. He believed that people would be more likely to pay the assessments if the bill

collection was done by the county.

McDonald told the board of supervisors that collection of assessments must be fair and equitable. Currently, the assessments for the vacant lots are not in line with their market value. Although the board acknowledged the problem, the members were not sure what the best approach would be. Should they go with McDonald's proposed amounts? Should they take a middle ground and lower the assessments but not to the degree that McDonald suggested?

The discussion about lowering the assessment on vacant lots will continue. The Sun 'N Lake district will advertise the upcoming meetings so that residents can attend and share their input.

Janie Passmore, a Realtor from Advantage Realty, told the Highlands News-Sun: "The assessments have always been an obstacle when trying to sell lots in Sun 'N Lakes, so lowering the assessments would definitely help make them more marketable."





She began stitching and building props for a theater in Providence, Rhode Island. It was soon afterward that she learned many sewing and design techniques and how to use a commercial sewing machine.

"I lost all my sewing machines and the contents of my sewing studio and all my press archives and notebooks full of original songs and other irreplaceable things in the 500-year flood on the Myakka River when I was living in Eastern Sarasota County," Reinhardt said. "That was before moving to higher ground in Highlands County in 2010. Some of the first pet pads I made for the shelter were created by using water stained materials from the flood."

After Reinhardt wore out a sewing machine, the humane society and individuals donated another.

"On small home machines, I broke a lot of needles on the heavy materials," she said. "I wrote a letter to Schmetz sewing machine needle manufacturer and they sent me a huge stash of sample needles.

"When I ran out of thread, local residents

came through again and donated a huge pile of thread in every color imaginable."

Between Irma and shoulder surgery, Reinhardt got a bit behind but thinks she has finally crawled out from under the majority of it and should be ready with plenty of blankets by winter.

'The boomerang-style bags will be something that lots of people can do, at cutting parties and workshops, painting, etc. When we are done making the bags, they will be given to HSHC to do whatever they want with them."

Tourist hotspots Vegas, Orlando get more anti-terror money

LAS VEGAS — Federal officials have awarded more money under an anti-terrorism grant to tourist hotspots such as Las Vegas and Orlando after deciding to include the number of visitors and high-profile special events when calculating the risk of an attack.

The Urban Area Security Initiative awards money by ranking cities' vulnerability based on population, valuable targets and other factors.

Officials in Florida and Nevada have argued that Las Vegas and Orlando should rank higher on the list. An Orlando nightclub was the scene of a mass shooting in 2016, and last year a gunman opened fire on a country music festival in Las Vegas in the deadliest mass shooting in modern U.S. history. Federal officials sent

Lesley Fulop, a spokeswoman for the Department of Homeland Security, said in a statement the agency's grant programs are flexible and are "used to help address evolving threats.'

Nevada Republican U.S. Sen. Dean Heller and Democratic Rep. Dina Titus, whose district includes the Las Vegas Strip, both pushed for changes to the program months before the Oct. 1 shooting on the Las Vegas Strip.

After the attack, Heller's office said he spoke to President Donald Trump about the program.

Still, Trump proposed slashing the program in his budget request earlier this year. It marked the third straight White House to say cuts were justified because some grant money sat unused.

Members of Congress instead poured another \$25 million into the program, raising funding to \$630 million.

The central Florida region plans to use the grant money for its counter-terrorism center, tactical first aid kits for mass casualties and bomb squad equipment.

The Las Vegas money is earmarked for bomb squads, hazardous material teams and a counter terrorism center.

Organizers of a Pulse nightclub memorial seek ideas

ORLANDO — The foundation that's building a memorial at the site of the Pulse shooting in Orlando has issued a request for design ideas to help honor the 49 patrons who were killed at the gay nightclub.

The onePulse Foundation on Tuesday put out the request for ideas on how best to remember the slain victims and educate visitors about tolerance. Organizers say the ideas should touch on architecture and landscape.

Submissions will be accepted through the end of August.

Gunman Omar Mateen opened fired in 2016 at the gay nightclub, killing 49 people. At the time, it was the deadliest mass shooting in modern U.S. history. However, last year's mass shooting along the Las Vegas Strip became the deadliest when 58 people were



Summer wind essential for fishing success

By DAVE DOUGLASS HIGHLANDS BASS ANGLER

The Freshwater fishing forecast for the fourth week of July gives anglers a weak full moon phase and for the first half of the week, and ideal fishing winds to go with the normal rainy season weather forecast.

However, the second half of the week, when the full moon arrives, wind speeds will be under six miles per hour (mph) for a high in the afternoons.

Fishing will be more enjoyable the first half, rather than the second half of this week and given the weak nature of this approaching lunar phase, the catch ratio might be better too. We won't know until we experience it.

Let's get into the weeds shall we. Hopefully you're rigged to go weedless. All fishing factors considered, with the moon arriving at its furthest orbit point from earth (apogee) on Friday's full moon, the sun's energy level fluctuations will be mild to calm as compared to a full moon in orbit perigee (occurs next in December through February 2019), or as compared to his month's new moon in perigee. Therefore you can expect the atmospheric pressure spike periods to be as productive as the lunar periods this week, they will not harmonize during one period.

Ideal southwest wind speeds will occur today through Wednesday, but Thursday through next Sunday we'll be wishing for wind, even during the high wind period of the afternoon. Wind speeds will not be steady either, with only occasional gusts rising above 3-4

point system and also uses handicap, to ensure as close to a level playing field as possible. The method may favor higher handicap players slightly, since one extremely poor hole won't really hurt much in the long run. In net scores, a 12 can pretty much knock a player out of contention, while with the Stableford method, it's just one hole where the players doesn't score any points.

Beatty said as more players become familiar with the format and the tournament, field sizes should increase.

"I think it will get bigger and better as time goes on," he said.

Beatty was also expecting a little more buzz about the tournament now that the Grand Prizes for both the Men's Championship winner and Women's Championship winner five-night cruises courtesy of Sebring's Cruise and Tour Supermarket, along with Celebrity Cruises have been announced.



mph to 5-6 mph. Tough conditions in Florida's summer heat and humidity.

The less wind an angler has, the stealthier they must be in presenting bait successfully. Lighter lines, tackle, and baits are essential. Long casts, quiet boat movement, and slow retrieves are required to attract fish for a strike.

Most of all, the angler must achieve the silent bait entry into the water. With no wave-action to mask the angler's presentation mistakes, fish will easily sense the abnormal foreign disturbance of a 'brick entering the water' and simply move a few feet away and take cover instead of feeding.

The extended weather forecast is also predicting 50-50 percent cloud-cover during the full moon phase to go with the still-water conditions. The more moonlight shines, the more fish successfully feed at night and conversely, don't need to feed six or twelve hours later.

Fish feed the least, annually speaking, during the Florida summer heat, due to low dissolved oxygen rates. And when they feed it's during the high oxygen period of the late afternoon.

So since we won't have sufficient wind and cloud-cover likely will 'not' dominate for the second half of this week, fishing the full moon will indeed be very...weak.

However today through Wednesday comfortable winds will make fishing enjoyable which is the determine factor in whether or not to fish this time of year. The good news is, then the winds are blowing the oxygen is good for fish to feed.

"The wind is not the cause of dissolved oxygen production, photosynthesis is."

Best Fishing Days: I was unable to determine such a designation this week. If the moon shines bright, it will be Thursday through Saturday. Otherwise whenever atmospheric pressure change occurs, that will be the best fishing period. Good Luck. I'm throwing my bait in accordance with the midmorning and late afternoon atmospheric pressure spike periods, which are forecasted to be weak as well.

Major Fishing Period: Continuing to roll the dice; the atmospheric pressure plot of the

PLEASE EMAIL US! newstips@ newssun.com previous three days reveals that the late-afternoon pressure-spike period has been triggered by the beginning of the sunset and starting today the moonrise at 4:16 p.m. will enhance this trend, causing a 4 feed intensity rating from 4-9 p.m. Daily this period moves later by about 50 minutes.

It should be noted that the moon is overhead at 9:51 p.m. today. So if you're fishing at 8 p.m. it is possible action could pick-up, especially if the moon is bright. Also the highest dissolved oxygen rate occurs during 3-7 p.m., which is what fish have been trigging off of since water temperatures have entered the middle to upper eighty degree range within the shallows.

Minor Fishing Period:
Today the moon underfoot period occurs at 9:28 a.m. and the morning pressure spike period has been occurring in harmony with it. I expect this to continue creating a feed rating of 3-4 from 8:30-11 a.m. I do not believe this period will move later by much, perhaps 30 minutes, it all depends on weather patterns.

Prime Monthly Periods: July 25-29 weak full moon, August 8-13 super new moon, 24-28 full moon.

Istokpoga.info News: The lake level is at 38.25 feet above sea level, which is the maximum for the seasonal management schedule. The minimum level currently is 37.50' but will be raised six inches by August 15. Currently three of four S68 spillway gates are open 5 inches and flowing a combined 500 cubic feet per second.

This seasonal 'rain-buffer schedule' is necessary because the lake fills six times faster than water is able to be released during major rain events.



"With Bob's history of running Le Mans and being one of the few American drivers that actually raced F1 for Ferrari, road racing is our core," Rose says. "Obviously, IMSA is the biggest sports car series in North America, and we love being here. This is definitely where we feel we want to be and get the exposure."

Rose joked that sometimes – notably in races when there is inclement weather – Bondurant drivers and the safety car sometimes get a lot of exposure.

"Sometimes in tor-

rential downpours, we actually cross the finish line first, so that's kind of cool," Rose says.
"Obviously, we don't get the trophies and whatnot, but it is kind of fun to be involved in the series to

that degree, from major incidents and accidents that happen on track to all the good and the bad that go along with it. It's cool to be a part of that process."

What's also cool are the different types of cars the Bondurant drivers have the opportunity to drive. These high-performance sports cars come from IMSA's official automotive partners, and the car that is used as the safety car at each race rotates depending upon each track's manufacturer partnership.

Then there are the IMSA Hot Lap sessions. Each year, Bondurant drivers give hundreds of rides to sponsors, VIPs – and sometimes race fans – during the IMSA Hot Lap sessions throughout the course of the season, giving lucky passengers the thrill of experiencing the racetrack from the cockpit.

Lake Okeechobee's needed storage reservoir

CLEWISTON - Rivers and canals are coated in a toxic film of bright green. Coastal beaches and shallows are awash in mounds of hairlike slime and dead fish. Satellite photos of Lake Okeechobee are ablaze with reds and yellows, indicating a massive algae bloom across the fishery's open waters.

This isn't the first year that this has happened. But the visuals have been especially graphic, an ugly reminder of how we have damaged Florida's vast, interconnected freshwater system and possibly a warning that we are but one tropical storm away from environmental disaster.

In response, Gov. Rick Scott issued an emergency order on July 9.

"As Governor, it is my duty to protect Floridians. no matter what it takes. Today, our state is once again facing a crisis from water releases controlled by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers," he said. "This has prompted me to issue an emergency declaration, so our state agencies can do everything in their power to minimize the harmful impacts these releases are having on our communities."

Additionally the White House Office of Management and Budget voiced its support for a massive storage reservoir south of the lake to help mitigate the recurring problem, as well as help restore flow to the Everglades, also damaged by the well-intended, but ill-advised replumbing of

years past. It's now up to the U.S. Senate to include money for the \$1.6 billion **Everglades Agricultural** Area Reservoir in the 2018 Water Resources Development Act.

"This must happen in 2108 if we expect real progress to be made and avoid a costly two-year delay before construction can begin," said Keep America Fishing, in issuing an action alert for anglers

to contact their senators in support of the reservoir.

"In conjunction with other projects, the reservoir is expected to reduce damaging, algae-causing discharges that inundate the communities along the Caloosahatchee and St. Lucie estuaries by approximately 60 percent once completed," it added. "It will also help send an additional 370,000 acre-feet of clean, freshwater south

towards the Everglades and Florida Bay each year."

The reservoir has been a priority for Florida Senate President Joe Negron, who is retiring in November. "This is an emergency,' he said. "Time is of the essence."

The Problem How did we get to this place?

We built canals and drained portions of the Everglades for development and agriculture. We turned our nation's second largest lake into an impoundment for similar reasons, as well as to protect nearby communities from flooding.

After we eliminated Okeechobee's natural ability to flush and cleanse itself, while replenishing the Everglades, we changed the lake's main's source of water, the

Kissimmee River, from a 100-mile meandering river with 43,000 acres of nutrient-filtering wetlands into a 50-mile channel.

With the Big O's natural drainage eliminated, something had to be done to control water levels. The Corps built locks to discharge water east and west, into the St. Lucie and Caloosahatchee Rivers.

And all the while this was going on, agricultural runoff along the Kissimmee and around the lake poured in, fueling algae blooms and accumulating on the bottom as organic muck.

Fortunately, Okeechobee's world-class bass fishery hasn't been seriously impacted – yet. Bulrush and other aquatic vegetation serve as a

Head of Audi Motorsport Dieter Gass: "We had strong race pace on both days. But it goes without saying that we had a somewhat different idea of the season opener."

The team takes home a single point from Formula E's visit to Marrakesh. Daniel Abt and Lucas di Grassi, on setting the best times in all of the free practice sessions, once again prove the speed of the Audi e-tron FE04, but lack fortune in the race: Abt drops to tenth following a drive-through penalty and his teammate is lying in fourth position behind the subsequent winner, when he has to park his car due to a technical

Lucas di Grassi: "Our car is fast but it's obviously frustrating to have reliability issues in two consecutive races.'

The premiere of the electric racing series in Santiago de Chile marks the season's low point. It is the only time in the 2017/2018 season that the team returns from a Formula E event without a single point. Lucas di Grassi's string of technical issues continues: The reigning Champion is forced to retire shortly after the car change. Daniel Abt's Audi e-tron FE04 is hit by a rival and parked before the race is over.

Team Principal Allan McNish: "I've been in racing for many years: Sometimes it goes with you and sometimes everything goes against you - the latter is certainly the case with us at the moment."

Round five in Mexico City marks the season's turning point for Audi Sport ABT Schaeffler. Daniel Abt's first victory in Formula E also marks the first success of a German driver and the first one for Audi as a factory team.

His teammate, Lucas di Grassi, at an altitude of more than 2,000 meters is faced with a grueling job: The Brazilian starts from the back of the grid because his inverter had to be opened after the race in Santiago. In spite of these difficult conditions, he shows a spirited fightback and with ninth position scores his first points of this season.

Dieter Gass: "After the problems we had in the first races, this race tastes particularly sweet. But the race was great from both drivers. Lucas drove fantastically and I'm absolutely delighted for Daniel."

In Uruguay, Champion

Lucas di Grassi returns to the podium on which he will be standing from now on in each of the seven remaining races - a new Formula E record. Along the beach at Punta del Este, the title defender fights a gripping duel with Jean-Éric Vergne during the entire race distance and celebrates second place. Daniel Abt is also clearly on course for a podium when his seat belt suddenly comes undone. After an additional pit stop, 14th place is all he is able to achieve.

Lucas di Grassi: "Our car is super fast. I look forward to the second half of the season."

Formula E arrives in Europe: Its first appearance in Rome is dominated by Lucas di Grassi and Daniel Abt who, following a less than perfect qualifying, shine with fightbacks: Di Grassi finishes second from sixth on the grid and Abt starts from ninth and goes on to finish fourth. On clinching these two top-five spots, Audi Sport ABT Schaeffler has advanced to fourth position in the teams' classification.

Dieter Gass: "A fantastic start to the European

season!' Lucas di Grassi continues his string of success in Paris. His teammate, Daniel Abt, keeps himself busy on the track around the Dôme des Invalides: The German overtakes seven cars and scores valuable points with seventh position. As successful and even spectacular as the fightbacks of the Audi drivers are, qualify-

ing remains a weakness. Daniel Abt: "I hope the fans enjoyed the show. Next time, we need to do better in qualifying and then there'll be a trophy again, too."

The former Tempelhof

airport in Berlin is the venue of the German race which, embedded in the DFB Pokal final, achieves top viewing figures. About 1.5 million viewers witness the most successful race day of a team in Formula E's near-fouryear history: Daniel Abt clinches pole position, wins in front of Lucas di Grassi, sets the fastest race lap in the process and also leads over the whole race distance. 47 of 47 possible points - no other team has achieved this before.

Allan McNish: "A clean

sweep on home soil, a day just can't be better than this. I'm incredibly proud of the entire team!"

Before the series' debut in Zurich, it's clear that if the team wants to have a realistic chance of winning the championship it will have to score a lot of points in Switzerland.

No sooner said than done: Lucas di Grassi, in the first international car race in Switzerland since 1954, in front of a record turnout of far more than 100,000 spectators, clinches his first victory of this season. Daniel Abt

is less fortunate: Rival Nelson Piquet rear-ends him right after the start. Due to the necessary change of the rear wing, Abt finishes out of the points. In Zurich, Audi Sport ABT Schaeffler reduces the gap by 11 points down to 33 before traveling to New York City for the final races.

Allan McNish: "I'm especially happy for Lucas' crew that had a difficult start to the season and how they have come back fully. And of course, after the home round in Berlin, it's also fantastic for Audi to have won the first circuit race in Switzerland in 64 years."

33 points have to be made up by Audi Sport ABT Schaeffler in the last two races in New York City. Doable - that's the general opinion in the paddock. Optimism within the team is huge. "We worked hard both on the race track and back home in Neuburg - even though it will be difficult, we now go to New York with a clear attitude and focus on the championship,"

says Allan McNish. With a one-two - Lucas di Grassi wins ahead of Daniel Abt, who also posts the fastest race lap - the team reduces the gap to five points.

The race on Sunday, which Jean-Éric Vergne wins, becomes a real thriller: All four drivers of the competing teams, Techeetah and Audi Sport ABT Schaeffler, start the race within the top five. The title race remains open up until the last second. Then it's clear: the second and third places clinched by di Grassi and Abt suffice to bring the teams' championship, with a two-point advantage, home to Germany for the first time.



protective barrier for the productive backwaters. "The bass fishing is great. People are catching lots of fish," Ramon Iglesias, general manager of the Roland Martin Marine Center, reported recently.

But Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission biologists have warned that water held high by the Corps to prevent flooding and excessive algae, which reduces light penetration, could diminish that valuable vegetation, and we may be only a tropical storm away from a tipping point where habitat is destroyed and serious impacts to the fishery are going to show up. Some anglers also think that they seen a decline in the fishery.

Meanwhile, during

summer and fall, those nutrient-rich discharges from the Big O often have combined with urban runoff and septic tank leakage to the east and west to smother coastal areas in "guacamole thick" algae, some of which is toxic.

The good news is that restoration began on the Kissimmee River in 1999, putting twists and turns back into the waterway and restoring wetlands. That has cut down on

nutrients pouring into the lake and allowed for more water storage above it.

But in a 2015 report, the South Florida Water Management District revealed that 37 percent of the algae-feeding phosphorus pouring into Okeechobee comes from farms, groves, ranches and neighborhoods as far north as the Orlando suburbs. Just 5 to 8 percent comes from sugar fields, farms, and towns around the lake.

"Ninety-five percent of the water flowing into Lake Okeechobee comes from the Kissimmee," Iglesias said.

While a reservoir to the south will help, he added, much more needs to be done in the watershed to the north, including recovery wells to store water.

But even that won't solve the problem in the short term, according to Karl Havens, Florida Sea Grant Director. "In the watershed north of Lake Okeechobee, it is estimated that the soils and wetlands contain enough nutrients from past agricultural activities to fuel high nitrogen and phosphorus inputs into Lake Okeechobee for the next 50 years.'

CIA: China waging 'quiet kind of cold war' against US

ASPEN, Colo. — China is waging a "quiet kind of cold war" against the United States, using all its resources to try to replace America as the leading power in the world, a top CIA expert on Asia said Friday.

Beijing doesn't want to go to war, he said, but the current communist government, under President Xi Jingping, is subtly working on multiple fronts to undermine the U.S. in ways that are different than the more well-publicized activities being employed by Russia.

"I would argue ... that what they're waging against us is fundamentally a cold war — a cold war not like we saw during THE Cold War (between the U.S. and the Soviet Union) but a cold war by definition,"

Michael Collins, deputy assistant director of the CIA's East Asia mission center, said at the Aspen Security Forum in Colorado.

Rising U.S.-China tension goes beyond the trade dispute playing out in a tariff tit-for-tat between the two nations.

There is concern over China's pervasive efforts to steal business secrets and details about high-tech research being

conducted in the U.S. The Chinese military is expanding and being modernized and the U.S., as well as other nations, have complained about China's construction of military outposts on islands in the South China Sea.

"I would argue that it's the Crimea of the East," Collins said, referring to Russia's brash annexation of Ukraine's Crimean Peninsula, which was condemned throughout the

Collins' comments track warnings about China's rising influence issued by others who spoke earlier this week at the security conference. The alarm bells come at a time when Washington needs China's help in ending its nuclear standoff with North Korea.

French investigators raid home of Macron's ex-bodyguard

PARIS (AP) — French investigators on Saturday raided the house of one of French President Emmanuel Macron's former top security aides, a man who was caught on camera beating a young protester in May.

Alexandre Benalla's involvement in the beating and questions about the government's handling of the affair is turning into Macron's biggest political crisis since he took office last year.

The presidential Elysee Palace fired bodyguard Benalla a day before police raided his home Saturday morning in the Parisian suburb of Issy-Les-Moulineaux, according to the Paris prosecutor's

Benalla was identified earlier this week by the Le Monde newspaper for beating a young protester during May Day protests while wearing a police helmet. He and a second man are facing potential charges and are in police custody until Sunday.

Regular parliamentary work has been paralyzed for two days with questions about why it took $2\frac{1}{2}$ months to inform judicial officials and why Benalla stayed in his post during that time. Questions over whether there was an official cover-up of his actions have also been raised, and whether Elysee employees have a measure of impunity not granted

French Interior Minister Gerard Collomb will face questions from parliament next week to see if the government failed to properly discipline Benalla.

Despite his official change to a desk job, Benalla was seen this month on the ground with police at several high-profile events, including the return home Monday of France's soccer World Cupwinning team, an event attended by hundreds of

The belated referral of the issue to judicial authorities and what was widely viewed as insufficient action at the time by the Elysee Palace has triggered a firestorm from the opposition.

Macron has continued to keep a low profile and has, thus far, not spoken about the events.

Survivor says life vests not worn on boat that capsized

BRANSON, Mo. —"Grab the baby!"

Those were the last words Tia Coleman recalls her sister-in-law yelling before the tourist boat they were on sank into a Missouri lake, killing 17 people, including nine of Coleman's family members.

A huge wave hit, scattering passengers on the vessel known as a duck boat into Table Rock Lake near Branson, Coleman said. When the Indianapolis woman came up for air, she was alone. She prayed.

"I said, 'Lord, please, let me get to my babies," she told reporters from her wheelchair Saturday in the lobby of a hospital where she's recovering after swallowing lake water. "'... If they don't make it, Lord, take me too. I don't need to be here."

Coleman recalled spotting the rescue boat and managed to reach it, "somehow." Earlier, from her hospital bed, she recounted to television station KOLR her sisterin-law's last words.

Coleman's husband and three children, ages 9, 7, and 1; her 45-year-old sister-in-law and 2-year-old nephew; her motherin-law and father-in-law and her husband's uncle all died Thursday night in the deadliest accident of its kind in nearly two decades.

Others killed included a Missouri

couple who had just celebrated a birthday; another Missouri couple on what was planned as their last extended vacation; an Illinois woman who died while saving her granddaughter's life; an Arkansas father and son; and a retired pastor

who was the boat's operator. None of the 31 passengers on

board were wearing a life jacket, according to an incident report released Saturday by the Missouri State Highway Patrol.

State and federal investigators were trying to determine what sent the vessel, originally built for military use in World War II, to its demise. An initial assessment blamed thunderstorms and winds that approached hurricane strength, but it wasn't clear why the amphibious vehicle even ventured into the water.

Coleman said the crew told passengers they were going into the water first, before the landbased part of their tour, because of the incoming storm. The area had been under a severe thunderstorm watch for hours and a severe thunderstorm warning for more than 30 minutes before the boat sank.

Suzanne Smagala with Ripley Entertainment, which owns Ride the Ducks in Branson, said it was the company's only accident in more than 40 years of operation. The company hasn't commented

Trump finds it 'inconceivable' lawyer would tape a client

BRIDGEWATER, N.J. — Donald Trump said Saturday he finds it "inconceivable" that a lawyer would tape a client, as the president weighed in after the disclosure that in the weeks before the 2016 election, his then-personal attorney secretly recorded their discussion about a potential payment for a former Playboy model's

The recording was part of a large collection of documents and electronic records seized earlier this year by federal authorities from Michael Cohen, the longtime Trump

account of having an affair with

In a tweet, Trump called

such taping "totally unheard of & perhaps illegal." He also asserted, without elaborating, in post: "The good news is that your favorite President did nothing wrong!"

Cohen had made a practice of recording conversations, unbeknownst to those he was speaking with. Most states, including New York, allow for recordings of conversations with only the consent of one party; other states require all parties to agree to a recording or have mixed laws on the matter. It was not immediately clear where Trump and Cohen were located at the time of the call.

Cohen's recording adds to questions about whether Trump tried to quash damaging stories before the election. Trump's campaign had said it knew nothing about any payment to ex-centerfold Karen McDougal.

Transparency groups and Democrats have argued that the secret efforts to silence Trump accusers, including a payment to adult film actress Stormy Daniels, should be investigated by the Federal **Election Commission as** potential violations of campaign finance laws, which require disclosure of campaign expenditures. Trump's attorneys have argued that any payments to accusers would have been made regardless of his presidential candidacy, and that no violation occurred.

The recording could also further entangle the president in a criminal investigation that

The erstwhile Trump loyalist has hired a new attorney, Clinton White House veteran Lanny Davis, and disassociated himself from the president as both remain under investigation. Cohen has not been charged with a crime.

Current Trump attorney Rudy Giuliani said the payment was never made and the brief recording shows Trump did nothing wrong.

"The transaction that Michael is talking about on the tape never took place, but what's important is: If it did take place, the president said it has to be done correctly and it has to be done by check" to keep a proper record of it,

2 more firefighters hurt battling blaze near Yosemite

MARIPOSA, Calif. (AP) -A California forest fire just west of Yosemite National Park was steadily growing Saturday after two more firefighters were injured while battling the flames in blazing summer heat to protect mountain communities in the Sierra Nevada.

The Ferguson fire was churning northward within Sierra National Forest, sending up smoke that obscured valley views in the park. Yosemite remained open, but one of its scenic routes, Glacier Point Road, was closed to stage firefighters.

Crews were getting a break from light winds but were contending with rugged terrain and sweltering temperatures, said Deputy Chief Scott McLean of the California Department of Forestry

and Fire Protection.

"The vegetation is so dry out there, and it's so hot. This fire will continue to grow," he said.

Flames have charred about 42 square miles of

Two firefighters, who were hospitalized Friday after suffering back injuries, have since been released and were expected to fully recover, said fire spokesman Rich Eagan.

A total of four firefighters have been injured since the blaze broke out July 13. A bulldozer operator was killed the day after the fire

started while trying to stop its spread.

More than 2,800 firefighters aided by a fleet of aircraft were battling the fire, but only 7 percent of its perimeter was contained.

Several areas were under mandatory evacuation orders. Residents of other communities were advised to be ready to leave if necessary, but no homes had been damaged or destroyed.

Wildfires burned or smoldered elsewhere in the state, including east of Los Angeles near the Riverside County city of Corona. Most evacuations ordered at the height of the fire Thursday afternoon were lifted that night, but firefighters had extensive work to do to complete a containment line around the 250-acre burn scar.

Man suspected of shooting officer found, killed by police

Hillary Clinton is cheered at star-studded Central Park fest

The former Democratic presidential candidate, secretary of state and U.S. senator from New York told a crowd at the OZY Fest that she'll be tweeting in coming days, helping to organize transportation for immigrants trying to reunite with their families after crossing the U.S. border illegally and being separated.

advocate of liberal causes that organized the two-day festival that was to conclude Sunday. The subject was the "politics of the moment."

"It's really distressing and alarming," Clinton said. "It should concern every American of any political party because this was a direct attack on our democracy."





Doctors Without Borders closes the first of two hospitals in Haiti

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti — In a country where more women die before, during and after childbirth than anywhere else in the Western Hemisphere, poor women in Haiti with high-risk pregnancies now have one less option for lifesaving care.

The Geneva-based medical charity, **Doctors Without** Borders — known as MSF, its French abbreviation — has closed its free, round-the-clock maternity hospital in Haiti's capital. The facility, called CRUO, an acronym for its French name, was opened after Haiti's catastrophic 2010 earthquake. It admitted its last expectant mother last Sunday — three months ahead of its scheduled closing.

"It was a temporary structure that has a life span that already has been surpassed, and requires significant investments to turn it into a permanent, more long-term structure," Michelle Chouinard, MSF's head of mission, said about the prefabricated structure that was built from shipping containers. "It's not MSF's role to remain indefinitely.'

The hospital closing is the first of two for MSF. The organization opened them after many of Haiti's health care facilities collapsed in the earthquake, and a deadly cholera epidemic hit 10 months later. The charity's 122-bed trauma hospital in Tabarre, which receives a large number of head trauma cases and broken bones related to the country's is scheduled to close permanently in June 2019.

But other medical facilities run by the charity will remain open.

"People are saying MSF is leaving. MSF is leaving. MSF is not leaving," Chouinard said. She said the group's 40-bed severe-burn center, 24-hour sexual violence center, 24-hour emergency clinic in a Port-au-Prince slum and a facility in Port-a-Piment, which was opened after 2016's Hurricane Matthew in southern Haiti, will all

Haiti is not the same as it was in 2010, when the charity was in the midst of handing over some projects to the government when earthquake forced it to put plans on hold, she said.

"MSF does have standards of care for our patients," she said, noting that running the maternity hospital, which admitted an average of 500 patients a day last year, is expensive.

In Haiti, that has meant not only providing life-saving care to women with complicated pregnancies and babies with low birth weights, but also being on the front lines of the cholera epidemic. At cholera's height, MSF was often the first to dispatch emergency response teams to far-flung reaches of the country affected by the deadly water-borne disease. In 2016, when a strike crippled the country's public hospitals, the Tabarre facility was the only respite for those unable to afford private care. That year, it treated 15,228 patients in the emergency room and performed 8,088 surgeries.

Despite the care, MSF has not been immune from criticism in Haiti, where nongovernmental organizations, or NGOs, are often accused of undermining the government because of their ability to provide services free and pay top dollar for staff. That has led to a complicated and sometimes contentious — relationship between governments and NGOs. It is especially so in Haiti where this year President Jovenel Moise, after a sexual misconduct scandal involving the staff of British charity Oxfam, singled out Doctors Without Borders.

In an interview with Reuters, Moise called for an investigation of the medical charity saying "it had to repatriate about 17 people for misconduct which was not explained."

A Doctors Without Borders spokesman at the time said it was unclear what Moise was referring to. Chouinard, in an interview with the Miami Herald after the president's comment, said MSF takes allegations of abuse and harassment "very seriously," and over the years has developed policies to address such situations, but declined to address the allegations directly.

Haitian leaders have

long been harsh critics of NGOs, while also enjoying the comfort of knowing that they fulfill a need. But critics say the reliance on NGOs weakens governments, which often don't consider the fact that funding often runs out and programs go away.

In the case of Haiti, the end of MSF's 12-year investment in battling Haiti's childbirth crisis, and the eventual closing of the trauma hospital, couldn't have come at a worse time. The country currently doesn't have a functioning government after the resignation of its prime minister and his Cabinet after this month's riots over fuel prices.

The new government, when it is formed, will have to figure out how to absorb MSF's services and costs while addressing Haiti's dysfunctional health care system. Chouinard and others say MSF had long warned Haitian health ministry officials that the maternity and trauma hospitals were temporary.

Dr. Claude Surena, former president of the Haitian Medical Association, who was part of the Health Ministry's team that led Haiti's response after the earthquake said closing the maternity hospital, which treated pregnant women with eclampsia and pre-eclampsia and was the only health facility that specialized in expectant mothers with cholera, will have a big impact. The Health Ministry, he said, will have to find a way to gradually absorb such cases and improve health care delivery.

According to the World Bank, Haiti spends less on health care per capita than its closest neighbors. The Dominican Republic spends \$180 per capita; Cuba, \$781; and the Latin American and Caribbean region overall, \$336. Haiti spends just \$13. Maternal and infant mortality rates are also five and three times, respectively, higher than the regional average, the bank said in a report it published last year while calling on Haiti's government to increase health care spending.

With 359 deaths for every 100,000 pregnancies, according to the World Health Organization's 2015 statistics, "Haiti remains the country in the Western Hemisphere with the highest maternal mortality," Chouinard said.

Egypt hikes natural gas prices by up to 75 percent

CAIRO (AP) — Egypt raised natural gas prices for households and businesses on Saturday by between 33.3 and 75 percent, the latest among tough austerity measures aimed at rebuilding the country's economy battered by years of unrest since a 2011 uprising.

The government's decision, published in the official gazette on Saturday, should come into effect starting August. It sets the price for gas consumption of up to 30 cubic meters to 0.175 Egyptian pounds up from 0.100 pounds per cubic meter, an increase of 75 percent.

Meanwhile, gas consumption between 30-60 cubic meters went up by 42.8 percent, from 0.175 Egyptian pounds to 0.250 pounds per cubic meter. Consumption of over 60 cubic meters was upped by 33.3 percent, from 0.225 pounds to 0.300 pounds per cubic meter.

The move is likely to further fan the flames of popular discontent, especially among poor and middle-class Egyptians who have borne the brunt of the government's economic reform program.

In recent months,
Egypt introduced its
latest wave of price hikes
for fuel, drinking water
and electricity. It also
raised the price of new
cellular phone lines and
monthly cellular phone
bills. Charges for issuing
passports and car licenses
also went up steeply.

The austerity policies are part of measures taken to meet demands by the International Monetary Fund for a \$12 billion bailout loan to support the government's reform plan. Egypt secured the three-year loan in 2016.

President Abdel-Fattah el-Sissi says the reforms, he implemented after he took office in 2014, have put Egypt on "the right track" and that they will spur economic growth by over seven percent in the coming years.

He urged Egyptians to be patient with the reforms, which the government says should start benefiting citizens within two years.

Train in Greece hits, kills 2 migrants near Turkish border

ALEXANDROUPOLIS, Greece (AP) — Greek police say two migrants have been killed in northeastern Greece, hit by the same local train in two separate incidents.

Police in the city of Alexandroupolis say the train on the Alexandroupolis-Ormenio line runs parallel to the Greek-Turkish border a few miles to the east. It hit two people walking on the tracks at

12:50 am Saturday, shortly after its departure from Alexandroupolis. Police say one was killed and the other seriously injured.

Migrants crossing into Greece from Turkey often use rail tracks to walk along at night.

The train driver reported the incident and was delayed. Only minutes after resuming its journey, at 2:20 am, the train fatally hit a third person.

The victims' identities or nationalities were not known.

Japanese Princess begins visit to Brazil's biggest city

SAO PAULO (AP) — Japan's Princess Mako has arrived in Sao Paulo as part of her two-week visit to Brazil to celebrate 110 years of the arrival of the first Japanese immigrants to Latin America's biggest country.

Brazil is home to the largest Japanese community outside Japan. An estimated 1.9 million Japanese or their descendants live in Brazil, most of them in Sao Paulo, South America's largest city.

Shortly after her Saturday arrival, Princess Mako toured the Japan Festival, a three-day event showcasing Japanese cuisine, culture and products.

She also planned to visit the Monument to Japanese Immigration Pioneers at the city's Ibirapuera Park and the nearby Japanese Pavilion.

Earlier in the week, she visited Rio de Janeiro's Christ the Redeemer statue and Botanical Gardens.

In all Princess Mako will visit 13 Brazilian cities.

State TV reported Saturday that Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, meeting with Iranian diplomats, praised the remarks by Hassan Rouhani and called them "a policy and

attitude by the system."

Khamenei, who has final say on all state matters, did not elaborate.

Earlier in July, Rouhani said that if Iran's crude oil exports were threatened, the rest of the Middle East's would be as well.

Rouhani did not elaborate, but Iran long has asserted it could shut down the Strait of Hormuz that a third of all oil traded by sea passes through.

The U.S. pulled out of the Iran nuclear deal in May and said it wanted allies to stop buying Iranian crude entirely.

He said Mughal faced opposition at home as his sons supported candidates from the former ruling party Pakistan Muslim League for both seats.

Under Pakistan's election laws, both elections in which Mughal was a candidate will be postponed and the process will start again after the regular July 25 elections.

Cuba approves new leader's Cabinet with old faces

HAVANA — Cuban lawmakers on Saturday approved the Cabinet named by new President Miguel Diaz-Canel, keeping most of the ministers from Raul's Castro government in place, except for in the key post of economic reform.

Cuba's national assembly was also considering a proposed reform of its 1976 constitution that would reshape its government,

courts and economy, creating the position of prime minister alongside the president, although it would maintain the Communist Party as the sole political force in the country.

Among the ministers kept in place in Diaz-Canel's Council of Ministers were three historic vice presidents: revolutionary commanders Ramiro Valdes, Ricardo Cabrisas and Gen. Ulises Rosales del Toro. Foreign Minster

Bruno Rodriguez,

Foreign Trade Minister

Rodrigo Malmierca and Finance Minister Lina Peraza will also remain in their posts.

The main change was the absence of economic reforms minister Marino Murillo who had accompanied Raul Castro for a decade while he implemented modest openings to private enterprise in the socialist economy.

Diaz-Canel replaced Castro in April.

Cuban officials say the old constitution does not reflect changes made in Cuba in recent years. The new charter would create new recognitions of the free market and private property in Cuban society, and create a new presumption of innocence in the justice system.

The proposed reform is also expected to be approved in a later national referendum.

The new constitution will maintain rights such as religious freedom but will also make explicit the principle of non-discrimination due to gender identity.

However, Trump's team has been forced to take a unique approach to the tradition, presenting the president with graphs, charts, and maps, and limiting information to bullet points, officials said.

"He likes it orally," Director of National Intelligence Dan Coats said Thursday during a discussion about Trump at the Aspen Security Forum. "He likes examples. We use models. We use charts. We use a number of things.'

The number of daily briefings on Trump's public schedule have nosedived in recent months, with only 31 listed from March through June compared with 56 over the comparable period during his first year in the White House.

ear Mr. Berko: Malls and shopping centers have fallen significantly in value. I want the names of six mall REITs selling below book value and six mall REITs that have comeback potential. Then tell me why you like them. And I want all of them to yield over 15 percent. I'll invest \$10,000 in each. — **LL**, Detroit

Dear LL: Things were so much less complicated when the world was flat!

Real estate investment trusts have trailed the S&P 500 by 45 percent in the past three years, including dividends. Put another way, the price component of the S&P 500 has gained 42 percent in that time frame, while REIT prices have declined by 3 percent. Since March, REITs have underperformed the S&P 500 by 9 percent. That's not good! Many of today's equity REITs are seriously undervalued, because they trade at 7 to 16 percent discounts or

more to the market value of their portfolios. Some regional mall REITs trade at 30 to 65 percent discounts to net asset value. So if those REITs sold all their properties at today's value and paid off their mortgages, the shareholders would receive between 30 and 65 percent more than what they paid for the stock. For example, if you paid \$10 for a REIT trading at a 40 percent discount to NAV and management liquidated its properties, you'd get your \$10 back plus a 40 percent premium. Therefore, some of the huge discounts in regional mall REITs may be an opportunity for super-speculators who can jump over tall buildings

and land on their feet. One REIT I'm comfort-

able recommending as a wild-hair speculation is CBL Properties, once one of the darlings of Wall Street. CBL traded at a record high of \$48 in January 2007 and then traded at a record low of \$2.60 in March 2009. Today CBL trades at \$5.98, which is 27 cents below the company's \$6.25 book value. CBL owns, manages, acquires, develops and leases regional shopping malls, open-air and mixed-use centers, and office properties. CBL owns 119 properties located in 27 states (mainly in the Southeast and Midwest), comprising 74 million square feet, and manages 6 million square feet of shopping centers for third parties. And after paying salaries for 560 employees from its Chattanooga headquarters, management seems to have enough dollars remaining to pay an 80-cent dividend, which yields 18.8 percent.

CBL finished 2017 with

\$4.2 billion in declining debt and \$5.7 billion in

declining total assets. I'm also comfortable recommending Washington Prime Group as a REIT that should be able to rise from the ashes in the coming 18 months. The name sounds like a classy steakhouse in D.C. Washington Prime (WPG-\$8) is fitting for speculators who chew Juicy Fruit, use Wildroot cream oil and buy Old Spice and Mum deodorant. It came public at \$17.50 in February 2015, but it's been mostly downhill since, reaching an all-time low price of \$5.60 in February of this year. However, it's comforting to know that Louis Conforti, WPG's CEO, bought 70,000 shares at \$8.50 a share between April and May of 2017 and 28,000 shares at \$6.49 in March. WPG owns, develops and manages 122 shopping centers in the U.S., comprising 65 million square feet. WPG also owns various land parcels that can be used for new

centers or expansion of existing properties. And after paying salaries of its 710 employees from its Columbus headquarters, management had enough left over to pay a \$1 dividend, which yields 16.8 percent. Last year, WPG actually earned 98 cents a share and posted a record amount of funds from operations — \$2.04 a share. Over 91 percent of WPG's 186 million shares are institutionally owned, and wonder of wonders, Standard & Poor's has posted a "strong buy recommendation on WPG. Total assets exceed debt by \$1.7 billion, and the dividend may even be safe. Hold WPG for a couple of years and you may more than double your money.

Both of these REITs and others that are having tough times — could be acquired by a competitor. Meanwhile, ask your stockbroker for his REIT recommendations.



He or she will make top-level decisions, will lead uppermanagement personnel, and will often work to get the public and investors interested in the company and confident about its future.

The COO manages day-to-day operations, dealing with customers and employees in sales, marketing, finance and more. The COO and the CEO work with the chief financial officer (CFO) to keep the company financially healthy.

Investing With Borrowed Dollars

You may not realize it, but you can invest in stocks not only with your own money, but also with money borrowed from your broker. That's

called investing "on margin." When you buy on margin, you're borrowing money from your brokerage at a variable interest rate while using the stocks in your portfolio as collateral. Imagine, for example, that you hold \$10,000 of stocks and you borrow another \$10,000 to invest in more stock. You'll have \$20,000 worth of stock in your portfolio. If it doubles in value to \$40,000, you'll have made \$20,000 (less interest charges) with only a \$10,000 initial investment.

What if your holdings fall in value by 50 percent, though? Then your \$20,000 of holdings will be worth \$10,000, and you'll still owe \$10,000 (plus interest). Your holdings dropped by 50 percent, but margin boosted that to a total, 100 percent, loss. Margin amplifies both gains

It can be tempting to invest on margin, but it's risky. If you're paying, say, 8 or 9 percent margin interest, vou'd better be confident vour stocks will appreciate by more than that, and there's never any guarantee of that. (Margin rates these days are roughly in the 5 to 10 percent range, with big borrowers getting the lowest rates.) Indeed, the stock market has averaged annual gains of no more than about

10 percent over many decades. Here's how things can get ugly: When your margined securities fall below a certain level, you'll receive a "margin call" from your broker, requiring an infusion of additional cash. If you can't raise the cash, the brokerage will sell some of your holdings to generate the needed funds. This can sting, sometimes resulting in short-term capital gains taxed at high rates. Margin can reduce your investing flexibility, too. If you've borrowed money to invest in a stock and it falls sharply, you may end up forced to sell when

you'd rather wait it out. You can do quite well in stocks without using margin, and that's the safest route.

The fact that this was a penny stock when you bought was an extra big red flag, as penny stocks (ones trading for less than about \$5 per share) are notoriously volatile and risky. By the way, the company sold that town a few months ago, unable to pay for its big plans.

Cancer-Fighting Science

If you can tolerate risk and volatility and you'd like to invest in a biotechnology company, consider cancer drug developer Exelixis (Nasdaq: EXEL). Following a two-year stretch in which Exelixis' share price rose roughly nine-fold, shares have recently lost more than a third of their

value, presenting an opportunity. What's going on? Well, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved Bristol-Myers Squibb's combination therapy of Opdivo and Yervoy for first-line renal cell carcinoma, which competes with Exelixis' lead drug, Cabometyx. In addition, the combination of Roche's Tecentriq and Exelixis' Cotellic in a phase-3 trial for patients with advanced colorectal cancer failed. While these are disappointing outcomes for

Exelixis, there's more to consider. For example, Cabometyx seems on track to possibly be approved to treat hepatocellular carcinoma following a successful phase-3 trial. With strong pricing power, peak sales for Cabometyx may top \$1 billion a year by 2021. The company is bolstering its pipeline via licensing

and acquisitions, too. According to Wall Street's consensus estimate for 2021, Exelixis is on pace to nearly triple the sales it generated in 2017 — yet it has recently been trading with a price-toearnings (P/E) ratio only in the 20s. Biotech stocks can be volatile, and they rely on gaining FDA approvals. This one is worth considering. (The Motley Fool owns shares of and has recommended Exelixis.)



Puppet Stayman has a big following among tournament players. Here it allowed East to make a leaddirecting double of three spades. South was known to hold a four-card spade suit when he bid three no trump, or he would have bid four hearts, so the lead-directing double was the only way to get West to lead a spade. The double was not clearcut, but it paid a big dividend on this

East won the opening spade lead with the ace and returned the six. South played his queen, losing to West's king. West continued with the nine of spades, overtaken by East with the 10 and won by South with the jack. The contract went one down when East had the ace of diamonds along with two more spade tricks.

South was unlucky to find East with the ace of diamonds and five spades, but he could have done better. Can you spot how? Playing a spade honor at trick two would only be necessary if East started with the ace and king of spades along with the ace of diamonds. This was most unlikely as East was a passed hand. The contract could not have been defeated had South played his remaining low spade at trick two.





Dear Heloise: I have ants scampering all over my kitchen. How can I get rid of them without using a commercial product? — Mary from Connecticut

Dear Mary: Here's how to solve this annoying pest problem and to prevent ants from finding your kitchen a tasty place to hang out in the future.

Ants are seeking good things to eat, and they love sugary food. Here's one way to get rid of them — sprinkle 1 part boric acid powder with 20 parts of sugar wherever you see them or along their trails. But don't let pets or small children come into contact with the powder.

The easy way to banish ants from countertops is to wipe up the areas with a damp paper towel and put it in a garbage can outside. Then clean the area with hot, soapy water to eliminate the scent trail that the ants follow.



Shooting suspect in standoff at supermarket

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A man who in a standoff with police inside a Los Angeles supermarket is suspected of shooting his grandmother and girlfriend earlier Saturday and led police on a pursuit — at times shooting at officers — before he crashed outside the busy supermarket and ran inside, officials said.

Police and rescue personnel swarmed the Trader Joe's Saturday afternoon and at least one person was injured but expected to survive. Police said it wasn't clear whether there were any employees or others still inside the store.

Investigators believe the suspect, whose name hasn't been released, had shot his grandmother

and girlfriend around 1:30 p.m. in Los Angeles and then fled, said Officer Mike Lopez, a Los Angeles police spokesman.

Officers spotted the suspect's car and tried to pull him over, but the man refused to stop and led officers on a pursuit.

The suspect eventually crashed his car outside of the Trader Joe's supermarket and then ran into the store. An Associated Press employee who lives in the area reported seeing a car crashed into a utility pole outside the store.

The woman who was injured was taken to the hospital in stable condition. Officials said they had 18 ambulances and 100 firefighters staged at the scene.

Treasury Secretary: Trump not threatening Fed's independence

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina — U.S. Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin said Saturday that Donald Trump was not trying to put pressure on the Federal Reserve when he criticized its decision to raise interest rates.

Speaking to reporters on the sidelines of a Group of 20 meeting in Buenos Aires, Argentina, Mnuchin said he can't comment on why the U.S. president made the comments but he doesn't think they were a mistake.

Mnuchin said he's talked to Trump and "his intention is not to in any way put pressure on the Fed," referring to the U.S. central bank.

On Friday morning, Trump for a second day criticized the Federal Reserve, breaking with a long-standing tradition at the White House of avoiding any influence, real or perceived, on the independence of the U.S. central bank.

In a tweet, he said: "China, the European Union and others have been manipulating their currencies and interest rates lower, while the U.S. is raising rates while the dollars gets stronger and stronger with each

passing day — taking away our big competitive edge."

Trump added, referring to the Fed's rate increases: "The United States should not be penalized because we are doing so well.

Last month, the Fed raised its benchmark rate for a second time this year and projected two more increases in 2018. Its rate hikes are meant to prevent the economy from overheating and igniting high inflation. But rate increases also make borrowing costlier for households and companies and can weaken the pace of growth.

High court nominee gets started answering questions

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump's choice for the Supreme Court has given members of Congress a pile of material to help them start judging the judge.

Judge Brett Kavanaugh responded to a Senate **Judiciary Committee** questionnaire that probes his career as an attorney and jurist, his service in the executive branch, education, society memberships and more.

Running 110 pages, plus appendices, his response released Saturday is an opening look at a long paper trail that lawmakers will consider as they decide whether to confirm him. The high

court appointment could would not be acceptable shift the court rightward for years to come.

A longtime figure in the Washington establishment, Kavanaugh acknowledged in the questionnaire that he had joined clubs that he said once had discriminatory membership policies.

"Years before I became a member of the Congressional Country Club and the Chevy Chase Club, it is my understanding that those clubs, like most similar clubs around the country, may have excluded members on discriminatory bases that should not have been acceptable to people then and

now," he wrote.

Asked to list the 10 most significant cases for which he sat as a judge, he cited nine in which "the position expressed in my opinion (either for the court or in a separate writing) was later adopted by the Supreme Court."

The 10th regarded a man fired by mortgage giant Fannie Mae after he filed a discrimination complaint that alleged a company executive had created a hostile work environment by calling the worker "the n-word." Kavanaugh said he included it "because of what it says about antidiscrimination law and American history."

Volunteers provide food, care in wake of Iowa tornadoes

MARSHALLTOWN, Iowa (AP) — Businesses and volunteers are pitching in to provide more than cleanup in the wake of the destructive tornadoes that swept through three cities in central Iowa earlier this week.

A meatpacking plant provided hot meals to those in need Saturday in Marshalltown, a city of 27,000 people that was hardest hit, the Times-Republican reported. The Animal Rescue League joined with local emergency management officials and a veterinary clinic to care for animals hurt or displaced.

The tornado that hit the city was among a

flurry of unexpected twisters on Thursday that injured at least 17 people and flattened buildings in Marshalltown, Pella and Bondurant.

Residents and weather forecasters were surprised by the storms, which left gaping holes in the sides of factories and homes. Vehicles were buried under topped buildings.

Among the buildings hit in Mashalltown was the city's historic, 132-year-old courthouse. The Marshalltown Historical Society said Saturday that despite the exterior damage, "there was miraculously little damage to our collection." The organization

will temporarily move its headquarters to a nearby location. The JBS pork process-

ing plant in Marshalltown also suffered extensive damage. Trailers and railcars were flipped and a static freezer that held 24 million pounds of pork was heavily damaged.

"We will probably lose all of this product," general manager Todd Carl said, but added that he expects production to resume next week.

Alliant Energy said it hopes to have power in Marshalltown fully restored by mid-week. About 4,000 customers remained without power midday Saturday.

RIP: The great American shopping mall design

As many Sears stores close across the country, I am reminded of how nostalgic I am for the great American shopping

I loved its symmetrical, windowless, floor plans and mystical matching entrances. Miles of shiny tile and palm trees! Where else could you see real palm trees growing north of the Mason-Dixon line?

Now we have Amazon with their own version of Christmas in July. And while shopping in my pajamas while binge watching missed episodes of "Supernatural" is appealing, it will never be the same as a circa 1983 shopping mall on Black Friday.

No matter where you grew up in America, thev all had the same look. At least two anchor department store tenants, like Sears, two or more floors connected by escalators, a parking deck, and a central entertainment courtyard. Where did this perfect retail Utopian template from my childhood come from?

Malls like Lakeshore Mall in Sebring are the decedents of America's first mall, Southdale Center in Edina, Minnesota designed by Austrian architect Victor Gruen in 1956. He was forced to flee Europe in the late 1930s due to Nazi occupation and wasted no time rebuilding his family's new life in New

Gruen banded together with other German speaking artisan immigrants forming the "Refugee Artists Group."

A friend of his from Vienna, Ludwig Lederer, asked Gruen to assist in the design of a leather goods store he was opening on Fifth Avenue.

Gruen's design was revolutionary at the time. A recessed arcade-style storefront with tall glass cases left and right leading shoppers into a reflective glass and marble foyer, all showered in bright spotlights. A modern departure from other storefronts on Fifth Avenue that all sat flat, flush against the street.

Gruen hated urban sprawl with its tacky signage and mismatched store fronts. He saw shoppers walking from their cars to the store then directly back to their cars, like robots. He became fascinated instead by the government's Cold War development projects for defense workers in New Mexico, which included both retail and non-retail in an all-inclusive, cohesive, community aesthetic.

Heavily influenced by the Socialist ideals of early 20th century Austria, Gruen also included a central courtyard for communal gatherings in his design for Southdale. Shoppers would be drawn to this "town center" by the only natural light in the building, skylights.

Southland included a café, a 21-foot cage filled with exotic birds, a tranquil goldfish pond, towering live trees and trellises of hanging ferns pouring from the

upper level. The 1950s suburban family could enjoy live music, table service dining or maybe a movie with friends and neighbors regardless of weather, all times of day.

His template for the great American mall would be repeated for decades all over the country including right here in Sebring.

The most fascinating details of Gruen's work on Southdale is however not in its form, rather in its function. As a student of design, I was taught in school that mall windows were deleted so that shoppers would lose track of time. That entrances near major highways like 27, were mimicked so that shoppers could find the mall easily, however not so easily locate their vehicle when trying to leave.

These attributes were just the fiscally pleasant side effects of Gruen's truly brilliant vision, not by design. Southdale Center was, in fact, a Cold War fallout shelter. The mall, constructed of over half a million concrete and brick blocks, hid an intricate underground tunnel system and included a 10,000-kilowatt generator

at the time it was built. Plans were in place to convert the stores into crop labs, the parking garage into a tent city, and was strategically placed between two major highways so assets could move to and from the facility within the bedlam of a nuclear attack. Climate control would allow the space to serve as an "arc of life" to preserve human, plant and animal species if radiation proved too harsh outside. A place of salvation for those fleeing the nearby main

streets of the Twin Cities during an apocalypse. The formula was such a huge success, future developers and architects

Home ownership is not for everyone

The homeownership rate has been increasing recently following more than 10 years of decline. According to the U.S. Census, the rate peaked in the first quarter of 2005 at 69.1 percent and then declined to a low of 62.9 percent in the second quarter of 2016. When NOHOs make a costly purchase, such as a TV set, they price it in terms of the monthly payment, which they attempt to fit into their weekly or monthly budget. They are easily seduced by offers of delayed payments and long repayment terms, ignoring the high prices that accompany such

NOHOs sometimes write me about buying a house because they have heard that owning is cheaper than renting. They would buy a house in the same way they would buy a TV set, by seeing if they can afford the monthly payment. In most cases, they have no savings but have heard that it is possible to get a loan for 100 percent

of the sale price. I try to discourage them by explaining the hidden costs and risks of home ownership and by pointing out that, as owners, they rather than the landlord are responsible for everything that goes wrong.

Property taxes a common NOHO problem

Any bump in the road is enough to throw home-owning NOHOs in the ditch. A common bump in the road is property taxes. One who wrote me had calculated her monthly obligation net of the tax deduction on the mortgage interest, and fell behind on her payment because something she did not anticipate — her tax saving did not become available to her until year-end.

who wrote me was in serious trouble almost immediately because the property tax estimate by the lender turned out to be \$200 a month too low. The NOHO said he would not have purchased the house if he had known the correct figure. His house purchase plan had no

Another NOHO

margin for error.

More often, NOHOs can manage the tax when they move in but can't manage a future tax increase. Of course, property taxes are known to rise, if not this year then next; it doesn't take a lot of foresight to expect it. But foresight is in short supply among NOHOs.

The down payment requirement

In the 1920s, NOHOs were all renters because mortgage lenders required house purchasers to put 40 percent down. Since NOHOs can't save, they can't make a down payment. The problem was that the high down payment requirement screened out many potential homeowners who were not NOHOs, especially first-time home buyers, for whom our society seems to have a weak spot. Over the years the screen has been much loosened.

On FHA-insured loans, the requirement declined from 20 percent in 1934 to 3.5 percent today. Loans purchased by

Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac today require 5 percent down, though firsttime buyers can qualify for 3 percent. Veterans can obtain VA mortgages with no down payment, and the Department of Agriculture offers them to low-income purchasers in rural areas.

An alternative way of liberalizing the down payment screen is to allow the payment to come from someone other than the borrower. We have had a number of these, and some are more likely to allow NOHOs to avoid the screen than others.

Allowing a third party to make a down payment for a borrower in most cases is a better way to screen out NOHOs than a no down payment program that relies entirely on a credit evaluation. The third party is risking its contribution based on knowledge of the borrower. This is true of contributions made by family members, for whom assistance is a vote of confidence by those who usually know the borrower best. To some degree, it is also true of investors who

negotiate a share of future property appreciation. Several programs of this sort have arisen in recent years. It is not the case with home sellers, who can be depended upon to raise the house price by enough to cover their contribution.

The NOHO cure

It isn't easy but NOHOs can cure themselves by changing their lifestyle. The key change is to reverse their practice of treating savings as a residual — what is left at the end of the pay period after all expenses have been made. The residual system doesn't work for NOHOs because they never have anything left. A way to shift priorities is to make a deposit into a special savings account immediately after receiving income, so that spending is limited to what remains. It can work for those determined to make it work.

When to do a walk through

Editor's Note: This column previously published on Jan. 7:

The term walk through carries a myth of being used only when you're buying a new developer built home and is performed before closing. Allow to me assist you in understanding the importance of a walk through for a buyer, seller, landlord or tenant on new construction or older homes. In new construction

one of the most exciting days during the home buying process is when you have your walk through, usually sche uled on the day before your closing. Just like it sounds, a walk through takes place when you and your buyers' agent explore your home-tobe and check to make sure it's in the condition

specified in your contract. Chances are, this is the first time you've been back in the property for a few weeks and the first time you've seen it without the sellers' possessions in place — unless you bought a vacant home. Hopefully, you'll still feel enthusiastic about your new home, but no matter how exhila-

move in, you should take

your time on the walk through and carefully check every room.

Typically, the walk through should take place within 24 hours of your closing so that you see the property at the last possible moment. You don't want to do the final check too soon and then discover damage from a storm that hit the day before or that the developer missed some pre-approved changes or additions.

Once you sign the closing documents any damage becomes your responsibility, even if it occurred before you officially owned the property. If your contract states that the sellers are to make repairs, it's best to schedule two walk throughs.

The first one should rated you are and eager to take place a week or so before your closing date

so that you can review requested repairs. If you are not satisfied or the sellers have not provided requested receipts and contact information for the contractors, this will give you time to negotiate a solution to the problem so that your closing won't be delayed.

You should still have your final walk through just before the closing meaning one hour prior to closing. You are to request proof of the final walk through, take photos or videos of the interior and exterior of the property.

Save the developer

When buying a preowned, occupied home, you are to cautiously observe and make notes. I call it a pre walk through to remember what stays or not with the property. Your Realtor can assist you with a list of what stays, of any repairs the seller is to have done.

After selecting the property you want, submit an offer and ask your Realtor for a list of what the seller is leaving or taking out of the property. On the day of closing ask your Realtor for a final walk through two hours prior to closing schedule time, verifying your original list of items to be left and to be removed from the property. When either or both seller and buyer are not present to close then the Realtors are to have a walk through.

your final walk through just before the closing. It is a must that the property has water and electricity services on the day of the last walk through. Some buyers are disappointed when they see the condition of the property after the sellers have vacated the home.

Most contracts state that the property needs to be "broom clean." Many people have different standards for cleanliness and broom clean means just that — swept up but not necessarily deep-cleaned. Regardless of the cleanliness of the home, there are certain steps to take during the walk through.

Bring your home report, a copy of your contract and the sellers' property condition disclosure form so you can check on specific flagged items. Check for items that the sellers agreed in the contract to convey to the buyer, such as window treatments or fireplace tools. Remember that these items have to be identified in writing, not just in an oral agreement.

Check for items the sellers left behind that you don't want. If the sellers don't want their basement bookcases, that doesn't mean you have to keep them. Check your contract to see if the shelves were mentioned. If not, it's the sellers' responsibility to remove them.

Test all the appliances to make sure they still work. Turn on the heating and air conditioning for a few minutes to see if they are operable. Bring

an inexpensive electrical tester from a hardware store to make sure all the outlets work.

It is imperative for a smooth transaction and closing to occur, that the buyer's Realtor and seller's Realtor together with seller and buyer work in a team basis. If you find that the sellers have not followed through on the contract promises, or you find a new issue that you want them to address, consider whether the problem is worth disrupting your closing.

For instance, if there's a light bulb that's burned out in the refrigerator, you can easily take care of that yourself. Even something a little more costly may be something you should think about handling on your own in the interest of closing on time.

However, if you're uncertain of the extent of a problem, such as a newly discovered leak under the bathroom sink that the sellers hid during your home inspection, you and your buyers' agent should contact the sellers' agent and negotiate a solution to the problem. If you find the sellers are unwilling to pay for a plumber, think about the cost to you in delaying your closing or in legal fees.

Your Realtor can help you determine which issues are worth pursuing and which you can resolve on your own.

Last but not least if you're a tenant you are to do a walk through as well. All the above applies to a tenant and landlord. Often tenants receive the properties without inspecting it thoroughly, due to the urgency created by landlords who request you

are out by specific time. Tenants tend to leave items of no use to them with the thought it can interest the new tenant.

A tenant's security deposit is to be use for damages and or expenses incurred by the landlord to have to rent the property due to a tenant's non-compliance. Tenants are to have a detailed list of the conditions they receive the property including photos — keep a copy and send a copy to the landlord, property manager or landlord representative.

When a tenant is to vacate the property a final walk through should accompany a report and photos showing the conditions he or she received the property — this is a must to prevent losing part of or all of a complete security deposit.

In conclusion a simple, thorough walk through when you receive a property — buying new or used or renting — can prevent costly expenses.

Quick answers on rental leases

REAL ESTATE Q & A GARY M. SINGER

I get many rental-related questions where the answers are too short to write a whole column about — but they are important questions. Here I answer several of

Question: I have rented part of a house for several years, paying monthly without a written lease, and recently the landlord significantly raised the rent. Can he do this? — Nancy

Answer: Yes. If you don't have a written lease, your rent is locked in for only the term equal to how often you pay. If you pay weekly, your lease is for a week; pay monthly and it is for a month, and so on. Since your lease is month to month, you can be

asked to leave, with 15 days' notice, after just a month. Similarly, the terms of your lease, including the rent amount, can be changed just as frequently. Fortunately, if you are not happy with the change, you can also bail out with the same short notice.

Question: I have a

written lease, and the landlord now wants me to pay the water bill too. The lease states it is his responsibility. Do I now have to pay the water? Sandy

Answer: No. The terms of the lease are enforceable by both the landlord and the tenant and cannot be changed unless both sides agree.

Question: We pay our rent on the first of the month. The landlord just sold the apartment on the fifth. Does the previous landlord need to pay us back for the rest of the month? — Kathy

Answer: No. The

proration of your rent is between the old landlord and the new one. The prior owner should have turned your rent and security deposit over to the new landlord, who is now responsible, since he is your landlord now. Your lease does not change just because the home's owner does. Everything should remain the same except for whom you write the check to.

Question: I rent a couple of apartments. How long should I keep the old paperwork for when a tenant moves out? - Richard

Answer: Both landlords and tenants should keep lease records an absolute minimum of five years after move-out. Seven years is better. Same goes for homeowners.

Turns out Donald Trump wasn't the only person that Bucs receiver Mike Evans reached out to on Twitter on

Saturday. The Bucs receiver fired back at the president after a tweet suggesting that NFL players who protest during the national anthem should be suspended. But then

he saw a story about a Florida family needing help after a father was shot and killed by two sheriff's deputies in 2014. A jury ruled in favor of the police, but awarded the family \$4.

"Is there a GoFundMe or a donation page for the family?" Evans asked on Twitter.

When multiple fans reached out with a link to the fundraising effort for family of Gregory

Hill, Evans stepped up and made a donation of \$11,000, pushing the overall online donations to the family to close to \$100,000.

Evans signed a fiveyear extension this spring worth \$82 million, saying that very day: "I plan on helping a lot of people." In April, he donated \$10,000 to a childhood friend who was injured in an accidental shooting.

Another bad look for Rays in 3-2 loss

ST. PETERSBURG -To get a sense of how shorthanded the Rays were by the final innings of Saturday night's game, all you had to do was look at the field and see Carlos Gomez playing second

It was that kind of night for the Rays, who lost another game, 3-2 to the Marlins, and apparently another player to injury, as shortstop Adeiny

Hechavarria left in the seventh inning with left oblique soreness.

Hechavarria's injury forced Rays prospect Justin Williams, just called up from Triple-A Durham, to make a challenging debut, pinchhitting against

Marlins lefty Adam Conley, and in a key situation, two on and one out.

Williams, 22, who made it to the Trop and into the dugout around the third inning, didn't deliver a moment to remember, grounding into a double play.

With CF Kevin Kiermaier (foot) and 3B Matt Duffy (back) sidelined, and only backup Adam Moore on the bench, the Rays put Williams in rightfield and moved Gomez to second. It wasn't totally wacky, as he played there once in 2015, an inning for the Brewers, and does take ground balls often.

The Marlins grabbed the lead in the fourth with a quick start against Ryan Yarbrough. Justin Bour drew a leadoff walk,

Starlin Castro singled and Martin Prado doubled for one run. A one-out grounder by Miguel Rojas scored the other.

The Rays halved the lead when Joey Wendle opened the home fourth with a homer to center, which was the Rays first hit off Miami starter Pablo Lopez.

The Marlins extended the lead to 3-1 in the seventh when Cameron Maybin homered off Hunter Wood, the third of five Rays pitchers in a game started by opener Ryne Stanek. The Rays cut it back to 3-2 on a ninth-inning homer by Ji-Man Choi that struck high off the batter's eye in centerfield.

Hey kid

Williams, 22, is

probably the Rays most advanced outfield prospect, but wasn't necessarily ready for a callup from Triple-A Durham, having hit .267 with eight homers, 45 RBIs and a .715

But with Kiermaier sidelined for a couple days (but not on the DL), and with neither INF Willy Adames nor Christian Arroyo eligible to be called up by not having at Triple-A Durham 10 days, Williams was the choice since he was already on the 40-man roster. Just getting him to the Trop was challenging enough since Durham was playing in Buffalo. "He's an exciting young player," Cash said. ... LHP Hoby Milner was optioned to Durham to make room for Williams.

had a baby boy last August.

"I haven't raced for ages and I'm happy that the run today was under 11 seconds," Fraser-Pryce said.

"Being a mother is my first priority and to come back and be flexible with my training is wonderful, and I'm so excited about next year now."

Dezerea Bryant of the United States was second in 11.04.

Ronnie Baker of the U.S. won the men's 100 in 9.90 for his fourth win of this Diamond League.

Zharnel Hughes was second in 9.93, and Commonwealth champion Akani Simbine of South Africa was third. Jamaica's Yohan Blake was fourth. Christian Coleman, who won silver at the worlds last year, pulled out with a hamstring injury.

Olympic silver and world bronze medallist Paul Chelimo of the U.S. edged the 5,000 from Ethiopian duo Edris Muktar and Yomif Kejelcha.

Michael Stich, Helena Sukova inducted into tennis hall

NEWPORT, R.I. -When Michael Stich was a teenager, he had to choose a sport — soccer or tennis.

It seems he made right choice now that he has a home in the International Tennis Hall of Fame.

The 49-year-old German and Helena Sukova were inducted on Saturday during a ceremony on Newport's grass court, the only members of the class of 2018.

"I played till I was 18," Stich said during a news conference. "There was a little bit of a decision between soccer and tennis, but I preferred tennis because I didn't have to deal with 10 other guys messing up on the pitch. It was only up to me to mess up."

Stich captured his only Grand Slam singles title in 1991, beating countryman Boris Becker, also a Hall of Famer, at Wimbledon. He was a U.S. Open finalist in 1994 and runner-up at the 1996 French Open.

He joined Becker to win gold in doubles at the 1992 Barcelona Olympics.

"It was always said that we didn't get along," Stich said. "Obviously, as we were rivals, we could get along. I think we benefited a lot from each other because we always wanted to be better than the other player," he said. "We proved it to ourselves and to everyone else that it was possible to follow our goal."

Sukova captured a combined 14 Slam doubles titles — nine in women's

and five in mixed. She was runner-up in singles at four majors - twice each at the Australian and U.S. opens.

"For me, the most important (thing) was playing the singles," she said. "I didn't really like to practice, so doubles was perfect."

The 53-year-old Czech reflected on her biggest singles win, beating Martina Navratilova at the 1984 Australian Open to end her string of 74 consecutive match victories,

including six straight Slam titles. "I had like three press

conferences every day after that," she said. "Before that, I barely had one." Hall of Famer Jim

Courier jokingly told the crowd that he checked his record against Stich before heading from his New York City home.

"I almost turned around when I saw I only won five of 12 matches against him," he said.

Stich said that when he was 6 years old his family took him to the tennis club.

"They couldn't leave me at home," he said. "They had to take me." And that's how his

love of the game began. "I had a tennis wall to play against," he said. "I got a racket and ball and they said: 'Spend two hours here and we'll pick

you up later."' It was time well spent. "The beauty of his game," Courier said, "is what really sticks with me."

With Thomas and Froome 1-2, Sky controls Tour de France

MENDE, France — With Geraint Thomas and Chris Froome sitting 1-2 in the overall standings, Team Sky has complete control over the Tour de France.

The two British riders took advantage of their powers in the hilly 14th stage in the Massif Central, allowing a large group of breakaway riders to build a lead of nearly 20 minutes then fending off the few attacks thrown their way on the short but steep finishing climb.

"We can really just ride off each other," Froome said. "I imagine for our rivals it's making their lives quite difficult, having two guys to watch like that."

While the Welshman

Thomas is attempting to win the Tour for the first time, the Kenyan-born Froome is aiming for a record-tying fifth victory in cycling's biggest race.

Fourth-placed Primoz Roglic was the only overall contender to gain time, finishing eight seconds ahead of Thomas, Froome, and thirdplaced Tom Dumoulin — with all four riders finishing more than 18 minutes behind stage winner Omar Fraile, who remained far back in the standings.

Thomas leads Froome by 1 minute, 39 seconds. Dumoulin, the time trial world champion and last year's Giro d'Italia winner, is third, 1:50 behind, and Roglic is fourth, 2:38 back.

When Dumoulin attacked with two kilometers remaining, Thomas chased him down with Froome towing along.

"(Dumoulin) can really pace himself," Thomas said. "You don't know if he is really suffering or just pacing himself. Hats off to him. It takes (courage) to do that with no teammate around."

Fraile escaped from a large group of breakaway riders on the finishing

climb, a short but steep three-kilometer ascent that was followed by a quick descent and flat finish on an air strip.

"When I saw that the breakaway was so big, I knew it was going to be a tough stage, but I picked my moment well and pulled it off," Fraile said. "I knew that I still had another gear. ... I have raced here before and I knew the course to perfection."

Fraile had time to celebrate before crossing the line, finishing six seconds ahead of Julian Alaphilippe, the Frenchman wearing the polka-dot jersey awarded to the Tour's best climber.

Jasper Stuyven of Belgium finished third, also six seconds back, and three-time world champion Peter Sagan came fourth.

It was the first career victory at the Tour for Fraile, who rides for the Astana team. His only other victory at a Grand Tour came with a stage win in last year's Giro d'Italia. The Basque rider also won the mountains classification in the Spanish Vuelta in 2015 and 2016.

Fraile became the third Spanish winner of a Tour stage in Mende after Marcos Serrano in 2005 and Joaquim "Purito" Rodriguez in 2010.

The hilly 188-kilometer (117-mile) route from Saint-Paul-Trois-Chateaux in southern France passed through the Ardeche gorges, home to cave paintings dating back some 36,000 years.

Lincicome shoots 71 but misses cut at Barbasol Championship

NICHOLASVILLE, Ky. — Brittany Lincicome walked off the 18th green after her first PGA Tour event to applause before stopping on the way to the clubhouse to sign autographs and acknowledge spectators' warm wishes.

The LPGA Tour player made sure to savor every moment of a historic weekend she wished could have lasted longer.

"I would've liked to have shot better (Thursday)," said Lincicome, who missed the cut at the Barbasol Championship after shooting a 1-under 71. She failed in her bid to become the first female player since 1945 to make the cut in a PGA Tour event.

"Obviously, today was a pretty nice day, so I guess ending with today's round is a good way to leave."

Troy Merritt, at 15 under, entered the third round leading Billy Horschel and Cameron Percy by two strokes. Richy Werenski and Andres Romero were tied for fourth at three shots back.

Lincicome, the eighttime LPGA Tour winner
with two major titles,
was the first woman since
Michelle Wie in 2008 to
play in a PGA Tour event.
Lincicome had sought
to join Babe Zaharias
(1945) as the only women
to make the cut. Hall of
Famer Annika Sorenstam
and Suzy Whaley have
also played in PGA Tour

events.
Lincicome faced a huge
hurdle after an opening 78
left her near the bottom
of the field. She had six
birdies in Saturday's
rain-delayed second

round at Champions Trace at Keene Trace Golf Club, highlighted by an eagle-3 at 17.

"I thought I hit it a little short," Lincicome added.
"I thought it was going to spin back a little bit on me. Then when it landed I was like, OK, it's on top and then it rolled back and I was like, 'Oh, my gosh.' The highlight of my week."

Lincicome also had consecutive birdies on the sixth, seventh and eighth holes before another on No. 10. But her round included six bogeys, including three on the final four holes, and she finished at 5 over 149.

Playing partner Conrad Shindler, who made the cut along with Sam Ryder, described playing with Lincicome as "a pleasure, a treat." Despite her roller-coaster performance, he felt her approach was consistent.

"She does the same thing every shot," he said. "She just knows where it's going to go. Each day, she gained confidence."

Her goal now is applying lessons learned from playing with the men back to the LPGA Tour. Lincicome couldn't immediately say whether she would return to play this event, but seemed eager for LPGA Tour and PGA Tour players to be on the same course in some form.

That remains to be seen, but Lincicome definitely appreciated this opportunity with her PGA Tour counterparts. Even without the history.

"Just being inside the ropes with the guys, hitting on the range, on the putting green, it's just a cool feeling," she said. "I feel like I'm at home here. The guys just made me feel so comfortable."

the last few years, I didn't know if that would ever happen again. But here I am with a chance coming Sunday in a major championship. It's going to be fun."

It was every bit of that on Saturday, a rare day when Carnoustie had little defense.

Justin Rose, who made the cut on the number with a birdie on his final hole, matched the Carnoustie record for the Open with a 64. Spieth set the tone in the afternoon when he decided on the way to the first tee to hit driver on the 396-yard hole. He sent it bouncing and rolling along the firm turf, down a hill and onto the green to about 10 feet away for an eagle.

Moments later, Woods began his charge to get into contention at a major for the first time in five years.

It never stopped.
Seven players had a share of the lead at one point. Kisner, who started the third round tied for the lead, was never far away but had to work hard to stay there. He made a tough par save on the 17th, and then got up-and-down

from behind the 18th green for a 68.

Schauffele, the PGA
Tour rookie of the
year last season, holed
a 30-foot putt from
behind the 18th green for
a 67.

They were at 9-under 204.

"We've got pretty much a new tournament tomorrow," Spieth said.

A dozen players were separated by four shots, which is nothing considering that the last two British Open champions at Carnoustie rallied from 10 shots (Paul Lawrie) and six shots (Padraig Harrington) on the final day.

The wind is expected to be the strongest it has been all week. And then there's the presence of Woods, playing in the third-to-last group.

Woods started quietly enough with a few birdies through eight holes. He started his move with a 40-foot birdie putt on No. 9, followed with short birdie putts on the next two holes and with a two-putt birdie on the par-5 14th, he put his name atop the leaderboard.

It was there for only 20 minutes. But it was there.

A bogey on the 16th and a par save from short of the Barry Burn on the 18th gave him a 66. He figured it would at least keep him in range. He wound up as close to the lead as he has been in a major since he was two behind at Muirfield in the 2013 British Open.

"I'm right there," he said. "I've got a chance at this, which is great."

And he has company. Kevin Chappell, who spent most of his round watching Spieth put on a show, birdied the 18th for a 67 and was two shots behind.

Francesco Molinari had a 66 and will play in the third-to-last group with Woods. They were last together three weeks ago when Woods presented him the trophy at the Quicken Loans National after Molinari shot 62 for an eight-shot victory.

Twelve players were separated by four shots, a group that includes Rory McIlroy, Tommy Fleetwood and Zach Johnson. They all dropped shots on a day when there was no time to be going backward. McIlroy was within two shots of the lead until bogeys on two of his last three holes for a 70 left him four behind.

Johnson, staying in the same house as Kisner, Spieth and four other Americans, hooked his approach on No. 12 and three-putted for a double bogey. He shot 72 and was in the group four behind. Joining them was Tommy Fleetwood, who dropped three shots in two holes on the back nine on his way to a 71.

Of the five players separated by three shots, only Spieth has experience winning a major. He will try to become the first player since Padraig Harrington in 2008 to win golf's oldest championship in consecutive years.

His move started with a sudden decision.

The opening hole is 396 yards on the card, with the fairway getting narrow between two bunkers. Spieth, who spent Saturday morning watching the Open on television, asked caddie Michael Greller on the practice range, "Do we like driver?"

Greller told him no. Play short and it's a wedge to a front pin, easy birdie chance.

Spieth walked to the tee with coach Cameron McCormick and asked him, "How about I just send it on No. 1?" "I felt good about the

range session. And he's like, 'I put my chips behind anything you decide, always.' And that kind of gave me that little extra boost," Spieth said.

basic question: how does coach Dirk Koetter decide how to prepare both Winston and Ryan Fitzpatrick to play? How do they split the reps in training camp and the preseason games?

Fitzpatrick is likely to start the first three games of the season. At 35, he has a lot of experience and a year under his belt in Koetter's offense. But Fitzpatrick will need as much work with the No. 1 offense as possible to be prepared to start Sept. 9 at New Orleans.

Winston will miss nearly four weeks of practice by the time he returns from the regular season suspension. At 24, he's a relatively young quarterback, and sitting him out — with a bigger break looming — won't help his development.

The only recent template for this is what the New England Patriots did in 2016 when Tom Brady knew he was suspended for the first four games.

Patriots coach Bill Belichick is a big believer that Brady could get great work in joint practices, so Brady was "a little less of a presence in the games," according to ESPN.com's Mike Reiss. (The Bucs have two joint practices at Tennessee). Also, Brady sliced his finger on a pair off cutters that season, so they held him out of the first preseason game. Here's how the breakdown went:

Preseason Game 1: Backup Jimmy Garoppolo started and played the first half with the No. 1 offense. Jacoby Brissett, the No. 3 quarterback, started the third quarter and finished the game.

Preseason Game 2: Brady sat out the entire game again with the finger injury as Garoppolo started and played the first half and one series into the third quarter.

Preseason Game 3:
Normally, the starting quarterback begins the game and plays into the third quarter. But Garoppolo was done after two series and Brady played most of the first half.
Garoppolo finished the first half with a two-minute drive and returned for two series in the third quarter.

Preseason Game 4: At this point in the preseason, you protect the starting quarterback from possible injury by not playing him. Garropolo sat out of the game while Brady played the entire first half.

The preseason game breakdown for snaps played went like this: Brady 0-0-16-39 = 55; Garoppolo 39-45-29-0 = 113; Brissett 28-26-23-38 = 115.

Clearly, Brady has vastly more experience than Winston while Garappolo had not started a regular season game prior to '16.

It's hard to prepare one quarterback for the season, much less two. And somewhere Ryan Griffin has to fit in there as the No. 3.

But that's not the only storyline heading into training camp.

Who will emerge as the starting running back?
The Bucs have big plans

for Ronald Jones, the second-round pick from Southern Cal. His explosiveness could transform the rushing attack. But Jones is a rookie and has much to learn before he can be trusted in pass protection on third down.

Peyton Barber is a competent inside rusher. The third-down job may be between Charles Sims, Jacquizz Rodgers and rookie Shaun Wilson.

Will Chris Godwin unseat DeSean Jackson as the No. 2 receiver?

Jackson had only 50 catches last season, but his chemistry with Winston and Fitzpatrick should be better in the second year. Godwin looked and played like a starting NFL receiver this offseason and is another big body target

for Winston. Jackson will get the first bite of the apple, but he's also been working in the slot in three-receiver packages.

What is the defensive line rotation?

Obviously, Gerald McCoy and Jason Pierre-Paul are locks. But will the Bucs go with free agent Beau Allen or first-round pick Vita Vea at defensive tackle? Does Vinny Curry hang onto the other defensive end job over William Gholston?

It's a good problem to have, but there are starting jobs on the line. How quickly they identify roles and jell as a unit could go a long way to overcoming Winston's absence.

Which rookie will emerge as the third cornerback?

Let's assume that Vernon Hargreaves hangs onto his starting right cornerback spot. When he moves inside to the slot in the sub package when teams go to three receivers, who takes Hargreaves' spot?

Auburn rookie Carlton Davis made a splashy debut in minicamp. At 6-1, he gives the Bucs length and man coverage ability. But M.J. Stewart came on late and will make a challenge.

on Saturday morning:
"You that mad the USFL didn't work out?"

The tweet had more than 1,000 retweets and nearly 5,000 likes in the first six hours, the most vocal response of any Bucs player to the president's tweet.

Evans' first national anthem protest in November 2016 was an expression of his disappointment that Trump was elected president.

"I'm not going to stand for something I don't believe in," Evans said after that protest. "I'm not big on politics. I told myself, 'If this happens, then America's not right, right now.' I said this a long time ago. When (Trump) ran, I thought it was a joke. And the joke continues. I'm not a political person that much, but I've got common sense. I know when something's not right."

Evans also protested

with teammate DeSean Jackson during the Bucs' Week 3 game at Minnesota last season, in the first game after Trump called NFL players who protested "sons of b—-." That was the team's only protest during a national anthem last season.

1906: Bob Ewing pitched the Cincinnati Reds to a 10-3 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies without a single assist by his teammates.

1923: Washington's Walter Johnson fanned opposing pitcher Stan Coveleski for his 3,000th career strikeout. The Big Train, the first player to reach 3,000 strikeouts, struck out five and allowed one run in the Senators' 3-1 victory over Cleveland.

1926: Cincinnati had four triples in an 11-run second 12-3; Scherzer, Washington, 12-5; Godley, Arizona, 11-6; inning, and the Reds beat the Boston Braves 13-1. Curt Walker tied an NL record with two triples in the inning. 1932: Philadelphia's Mickey Cochrane hit for the cycle and drove in four runs to lead the Athletics to an 8-4 win over the Washington Senators. Cochrance tripled in a run in the first inning, hit a two-run homer in the third, doubled in the sixth and had an RBI-single to chase starter General Crowder in the seventh inning. Cochrane ground out to first in the ninth.

1962: Floyd Robinson of the Chicago White Sox had six singles in six at-bats in a 7-3 victory over the Boston

1964: Pittsburgh's Willie Stargell hit for the cycle, drove in three runs and scored four times in the Pirates' 13-2 rout of the St. Louis Cardinals.

The 23-year-old Bell held off hard-charging 2012 Cup champion Brad Keselowski over the final 18 laps at New Hampshire Motor Speedway to win his second straight Xfinity Series race.

Bell pulled off the towering achievement of winning two straight Xfinity races against former champs from NASCAR's top-tier series who moonlight on Saturdays. Bell topped 2015 Cup champion Kyle Busch to win last week's race at Kentucky Speedway and he followed up Saturday in the No. 20 Toyota by keeping Keselowski at bay down the stretch for his third win this season.

"You hope to race those guys at one point, so I'm thankful that I get the opportunity here in the Xfinity Series to race with them and proud that I'm able to compete with them, let alone beat them," Bell said.

Keselowski had won the pole Saturday but was dropped to the rear of the field because he was late to the mandatory drivers meeting. It proved to be nothing more than a mild inconvenience for Keselowski in the No. 22 Ford. He stormed past the second-tier regulars and had his fourth straight Xfinity win in sight.

Bell, who drives for Joe Gibbs Racing, had the fresh tires that Kesel-owski needed and that was enough to ring in a victory lane celebration. Bell gave his checkered flag to a young fan in the stands.

"I hope it means a lot more to that kid than it is to me," he said. "You know, we get trophies, we get all sorts of trophies, so hopefully it means a lot to that kid."

JGR fields cars for Busch and Bell, one reason it's continued to have success in Xfinity.

"They've won before me, they're going to win after me," Bell said. "It's my job to make sure they win with me."

Ryan Preece, John Hunter Nemechek and Matt Tift completed the top five to complete a solid showing for the Xfinity regulars.

Vettel takes pole for German GP; Hamilton down in 14th

HOCKENHEIM, Germany — Sebastian Vettel secured pole position for the German Grand Prix while Lewis Hamilton's hopes took another blow on Saturday.

Already trailing Vettel by eight points in the title race, Hamilton starts Sunday's race from 14th place after a hydraulic failure.

A huge roar went up from German fans at the Hockenheimring as their local favorite — Vettel grew up near the track — moved to the top of the leaderboard with seconds left in qualifying.

Mercedes driver Valtteri Bottas had only just beaten Vettel's leading time when Vettel produced a stunning lap to move back in front by about 0.2 seconds.

"To do it here, just minutes from where I was born and grew up, it means a lot," Vettel said. "I'm confident for tomorrow."

Vettel has won the German GP only once — five years ago when it was held at the Nuerburgring — but never at Hockeneim.

His 55th career pole position felt even sweeter.

"Today's one of my best. I have a mixed relationship with this track. For some reason it has never come together," Vettel said. "The car was really a pleasure to drive. Some days you can feel you have something in your hands. That's the feeling I had."

Ferrari's good day was completed with Kimi Raikkonen third fastest, ahead of Red Bull's Max Verstappen.

Earlier, German fans cheered for a different reason when Hamilton's Mercedes suddenly stalled

on track in the first part of qualifying, known as Q1. It happened shortly after Hamilton slid off the track, went through some rough grass, and jumped a kerb — momentarily airborne — before coming back onto the track.

"It was the hydraulics ... the power steering failed," Hamilton said. "I was carrying a lot of speed and I couldn't really slow down."

The British driver desperately tried to push his car back to the pits so he could continue qualifying, but even with the help of track officials he realized it was a futile effort. Moments later, Hamilton was slumped over his car, head down for several moments.

"It was a shame to see him go out, and I mean it," said Vettel, who is aiming for his fifth win this

season and 52nd overall.

and probably a little good
fortune — to achieve that.

After a huge downpour drenched the track for final practice earlier Saturday, led by Monaco driver Charles Leclerc, the Hockenheimring dried out somewhat by the time qualifying started.

After veering off track, a worried Hamilton complained over his team radio that his gears would not change. Within moments, fans had the rare sight of a four-time F1 champion — who has just signed a whopping new two-year contract — pushing his own car.

After giving up, Hamilton ripped his driving gloves off in frustration as he walked away. He jumped onto the back of a scooter, taking him to the paddock area. With cameras fixed firmly on him, Hamilton walked slowly before standing completely still for several seconds, his helmet still on, seemingly unable to comprehend his misfortune.

It is the latest reliability issue to blight the oncedominant Mercedes team after Hamilton and Bottas were forced to retire from the Austrian GP three weeks ago. There have also been

communication errors and strategy mistakes.

Hamilton faces another slog through the field after being bumped off the track by Raikkonen early in the British GP two weeks ago. In that race, he clawed back from last to finish second.

Although Hamilton is way down, he still needs to watch his back on Sunday.

Daniel Ricciardo, who has won two races, starts from last place because of an engine penalty.

He incurred it because Red Bull made changes to the hybrid system, the energy store and the electronics unit for a combined total of 20 grid positions. Drivers can use two of each specific engine part during the season before penalties, but this is the third time he is using each individual element.

Minella reaches first WTA final 9 months after baby

GSTAAD, Switzerland — Mandy Minella has a chance at becoming the third mother to win a WTA singles title in the last 12 months after reaching the Ladies Championships Gstaad final on Saturday.

Minella, of Luxembourg, overcame 19-year-old Marketa Vondrousova of the Czech Republic 4-6, 6-2, 6-2 to reach her first career final at 32.

She will meet topseeded Alize Cornet of France, who beat Eugenie Bouchard 7-6 (5), 1-0 when the Canadian retired with a right thigh injury in their semifinal.

"I was congratulating her after each of her matches," Cornet said of Minella. "Being a mom, it's not easy - it's such a comeback."

Minella gave birth to a daughter in October.

The other mothers to win in the past year were Kateryna Bondarenko in Tashkent last year, and Tatjana Maria at Mallorca last month. Cornet will be going

for her sixth WTA singles title, but first in more than two years.

She was broken by
Bouchard early but broke
straight back. Cornet
saved four set points in
the seventh game, and
Bouchard saved three
in the 10th. Cornet
prevailed in a tight
tiebreaker by being the
first to win two points in
a row.

Bouchard then couldn't play on in her first semifinal in 18 months.

"If she had won the first set, maybe she would have kept going. She was playing amazing," Cornet said. "I'm glad to be in the final ... and I hope I can get to the trophy."

France upset Australia to face New Zealand in RWC 7s women's final

SAN FRANCISCO — Ellia Green walked out of a medical room in the bowels of AT&T Park and looked up at a TV screen on the wall. She couldn't have liked what she saw.

While her teammates placed their hands on their heads in disbelief, France was celebrating on the field after stunning Australia 19-12 to reach its first Rugby World Cup Sevens final. "Congratulations to the French team," Australia coach John Manenti said. "They had to fight back from a halftime deficit. To bring (Green) off, she's an impact player. She plays another minute or two, scores a try, or chases someone down, things

France replacement Anne Cecile Ciofani found some breathing room on the left side and scampered in with the match-winning try on the final play to complete the comeback.

"There's too much emotion I can tell you," Ciofani said. "It's so wonderful. It's just magic. We won against a great team. I can't explain it. Too amazing."

France will face defending champion and heavy favorite New Zealand in the final later Saturday.

The Black Ferns repelled a stiff semifinals test from the host Americans in a 26-21 victory. They didn't make it safe until Sarah Goss set up Portia Woodman for their fourth try and 26-14 with a minute to

New Zealand won all four meetings with France this season on the world series.

But Woodman said: "They're going to be unpredictable."

AmEx 2Q profits rise, but there are worry spots on lending

NEW YORK — American Express said its second-quarter profit rose 21 percent from a year ago, as the credit card giant saw more customers spending on its namesake cards and a much lower tax rate. But it had to set aside more money to cover potential bad loans, and saw its delinquency rate rise noticeably. It's a potential sign that some of American Express' customers — typically the most creditworthy in the industry — are struggling to pay their bills.

Regulators seek end to stricter oversight of Zions Bancorp

WASHINGTON — A panel of federal regulators is proposing lifting the strict government oversight imposed on Zions Bancorp, a big regional bank that received a taxpayer-funded bailout during the 2008 financial crisis. The unanimous decision by the Financial Stability Oversight Council announced Wednesday is the latest example of a push, under the Trump administration, to relieve regulatory restrictions that were put into place after the financial meltdown in hopes of averting another

Next generation: Business owners mentor their heirs apparent

NEW YORK — The plan was for Greg Goodman to sell his auto supply store and retire about the time he turned 60. Then Plan B came along — his son Chandler decided to join and eventually take over the family business instead of becoming an architect.

Goodman, now 54, is focusing on building his Alta Mere franchise in Oklahoma City rather than getting it ready for sale. He's also mentoring his son, although Chandler won't graduate from college for another two years.

"I make sure he's involved in every aspect of this business moving forward," Greg Goodman says. "I let him in on everything and every decision I make."

As small business owners contemplate retirement, many are thrilled to have the chance to teach their children or other relatives how to run their companies. There's plenty of opportunity for that to happen — the government estimates that nearly a fifth of U.S. companies are family owned. At some businesses, especially those that have been in a family for generations, children start learning some of the basics while on vacation from school.

But owners looking to pass a company to their

Bull Run, founded in

So while he takes part in day-to-day operations and weekly meetings, Tocci stresses to him that informal and offthe-cuff meetings with employees, other restaurateurs, consultants and others can help with innovation.

to be an investor, it's not necessarily the best time to be investing. After a long run of more than nine years of gains for stocks, more voices along Wall Street are saying the good times could end in the next few years.

If they're right, it will be up to investors not to turn all these newfound advantages and trading tools into implements of destruction. Even though it's easier —and less expensive — than ever to trade, sometimes the best thing to do when markets are falling is nothing.

Barry Bannister, head

of institutional equity strategy at Stifel, says the bull run that began for the S&P 500 in March 2009 may end by the first quarter of 2020. Predicted cause of death: continued interest-rate increases by the Federal Reserve.

The Fed has already raised rates seven times since 2015 off their record lows, and it says two more increases may be coming this year. Higher rates have historically put the brakes on stocks and other risky investments, and Bannister says the Fed's pace means the federal funds rate may cross a key threshold next year.

With profit margins already high, Bannister says the next decade will likely have weaker returns for stocks than the previous one.

"I think we're looking at a rotating and trading market for 10 years," Bannister said. "So the ability to move fast and be flexible is probably at a premium.'

That's good for investors who are able to take advantage of their new trading tools. Funds that cover everything from foreign bonds to low-volatility stocks to global technology companies have all been getting cheaper to own. Improved websites and lower commissions also make ETFs easier to trade. So anyone with the foresight to move from

losers to winners can do so quickly and cheaply.

But it's also important to remember that many investors, for all their confidence, have a long history of selling and buying at inopportune times.

When stocks are soaring, everyone's happy to pile into the market on the expectation that more gains are to come. The biggest year for flows into stock mutual funds was in 2000, for example, according to the Investment Company Institute. That's when the stock market hit its peak and the dot-com bubble burst.

When stocks are falling, meanwhile, antsy investors sell their holdings. That may help avoid losses, but it creates a tough decision: when to get back into the market? Many investors who dumped stocks during the Great Recession missed out on the big gains that followed.

That's why investors, as a group, have largely fallen short of the returns of the funds they invest

Consider Fidelity's Contrafund, one of the largest mutual funds by assets. It returned 10.9 percent annually over the 10 years through June 30. But not all of its investors stayed committed to the fund through that stretch. After accounting for dollars coming in

and out of the fund, Morningstar says the average investor got an 8.8 percent annual return from the fund.

So, the best approach may be to take advantage of all these opportunities in a moment of calm, before markets are falling sharply, to ensure that your portfolio is set up in a way that will leave you comfortable regardless of the market's direction. If you can't stomach the idea of the stocks in your portfolio dropping 10 percent, consider shifting more money into bonds and other less volatile investments.

Then, take comfort in knowing that this golden era of investing means you can act

generation is to not get stuck in the 'This is the way we've always done it' mode," Tocci says.

In a successful transition from one generation to the next, a parent treats a child as they would any new hire, says David Lassman, a management professor at Carnegie Mellon University's Heinz College.

"If you bring someone in from the outside, you'd say, 'Here's our business, what are our challenges, where should we go?"

Lassman says. He also suggests that owners who tend to be domineering in family situations tone that down, or their children won't be able to think for themselves or take risks as business owners

A successful transition can require an owner to let the child make significant changes to the company's business model, even selling off parts of it, says Lauri Union, a professor of entrepreneurship at Babson College. While products, services or whole divisions may go, what does remain is what Union calls the family's entrepreneurial legacy.

Union says parents need to, as she puts it, "let go.'

"There is a process for letting go — doing it too quickly can be as bad as doing it too slowly or not at all — and that process varies from family to family and business to business," she says.

Rita Tabatchnick expects her son Jason to be more than her shadow or stand-in as he becomes increasingly involved in the family's soup business, Tabatchnick Fine Foods. She is looking for him to put his own imprint on the business.

'The new generation comes up with new desires, new foods, new

technology, and you have to listen to their ideas," says. Tabatchnick, 63, who plans to retire within the next 10 years.

Jason, who began working at the company when he was 13, is on the board and participates in Rita's meetings, key phone calls and negotiations. When the company's Somerset, New Jersey, factory needed extensive renovations last year, Jason evaluated contractors' bids. When his mother had surgery recently, he took on some of her responsibilities. "He doesn't just do the grunt work," she says.

Ultimately, though, owners and their

children also need to be prepared for the possibility that the planned handoff might not work out, Union says. Children need to have the room to say, "I don't know if this is going to work for me. I may need an off-ramp," Union says. If the son or daughter takes over a company and is unmotivated, it can be hard for the business to survive.

Kathleen Kuhn is realistic about the possibility that her son Ryan might decide against taking over her HouseMaster inspection company. Ryan is doing home inspections, getting hands-on experience, and "little by little we're exposing him

to things," says Kuhn, 57. She hopes he'll be ready in four or five years.

But while Ryan approached Kuhn and said he wanted to join the Bridgewater, New Jersey-based business that Kuhn's father started 30 years ago, he also thinks about moving out of the area. She would be disappointed if she ultimately must sell the business, but she wants what's best for her son.

"As a second-generation business owner, I never wanted to force my children to choose this path. They need to want it for themselves," Kuhn

at what interest rates? How much savings do you have? Other questions to consider, according to SoFi certified financial planner Alison Norris, include: are you only making minimum payments? Are your finances a source of stress in your life?

Then look at your budget - knowing how much money you have to work with will help you figure out what is feasible moving forward, said Charlie Bolognino, a certified financial planner in Bentonville, Arkansas. The budget is the key to unlocking solutions.

"We hear we are supposed to do all these things with money save it, spend it, invest it and get out of debt — but there's only so much money to go around," said Bolognino.

Plan

Come up with a strategy you can stick with. A successful plan will address both debt and

savings in concert, to make the most of the money you do have. It's not about focusing on one issue then moving on to the next, but rather a matter of determining where your spending

A rule of thumb is to allocate 20 percent of your take-home pay to savings and debt payments. How you divvy that up will depend on your priorities.

One thing the experts agree on: make emergency savings a top priority. Don't worry about getting several months of savings set aside. Even \$500 can provide peace of mind. This allows you to handle life's unexpected emergencies, like a car repair or lost cell phone, without further running up debt.

Tackling your highest interest rate debt needs to be near the top too. The average interest rate on credit cards is around 17 percent and more interest rate hikes are anticipated in the near future, according to McClary. Compare that to the single-digit interest rate you might get from a standard savings account and it's an easy decision. "It's the best time ever

to not carry a balance," he said.

Calculate how long it will take to pay off your debt - knowing that date will remind you there's light at the end of the tunnel.

Most of the savings come from extending by 18

like federal student loans. While it may be tempting to turn your back on longer-term savings, don't - that is just trading today's financial ruin for another down the road. Don't overlook opportunities for workplace retirement savings accounts, particularly if your employer matches your contribution. Failing to give at least the amount up to that level is like leaving money on the table, said Paul Golden of the National Endowment for Financial Education.

Some employers may have additional benefits to help with saving or paying down student loans. Medical device company Abbott Laboratories recently rolled out a unique program that makes a 5 percent company contribution to the 401(k) of employees who contribute 2 percent of their pay toward their student loans. That helps them reach both financial goals of retirement savings and student loan repayment.

If you find you simply cannot make minimum payments on your debts or have exhausted your financial options, reach out for help through a nonprofit credit counseling organization.

"There's a point when you can't go it alone anymore," McClary said.
