Darkness, silt in lake hampered divers

Drowning victim from outside county

LAKE PLACID — Lake Placid Police Officer Ryan Burress estimates he got to H.L. Bishop Park in “about a minute” after a radio call of a drowning child.

En route, dispatchers corrected the call: 37-year-old Billy Dawson Jr. of Clewiston tried to swim across the lake inlet and went underwater.

His family, on a park bench and distraught, pointed Burress to the swim area where Dawson disappeared for approximately five minutes.

“The dad said he was his oldest boy,” Burress said.

Burress notified dispatch, took off his body camera and radio, and waded to neck-deep water, where the bottom immediately dropped off.

“I couldn’t feel anything or see anything,” Burress said. “I couldn’t see my own hands in the water.”

Deputy Sheriff Ruben Carranza arrived. Both he and Burress dropped equipment and, Burress said, uniforms, to swim to 12-foot-deep water and search.

Burress, with Lake Placid Police a year as of Monday, had served with the U.S. Marine Corps and was a diver. He’d boated to sandbars in the northwest corner of

Mullen’s “Purple Heart Truck” dedicated to Florida’s wounded soldiers

BOWLING GREEN — Larry Mullen is a lifelong Florida resident. He was born in Fort Lauderdale, and currently lives in Bowling Green.

Having once served in the U.S. Army at Fort Campbell, Kentucky, he now finds himself on a new mission that slowly took on a life of its own.

Mullen is the owner of a Chevy Suburban that he has transformed into a rolling monument to those who have been wounded in defense of this nation — the recipients of The Purple Heart Medal.

As Mullen finds information on veteran-related events online and through social media, he travels to these events seeking Purple Heart recipients to sign his “Purple Heart Truck.”

His quest began in April when he attended a veteran event in Lake Placid where he got his first signature.

“The first time I took it to any show was down in Lake Placid when they had the traveling crosses to honor the vets from the state of Florida [who have lost their lives serving in the Middle East],” Mullen said.

“My pastor, he’s with The Rotary Club, they did the Freedom Flight. I went there at 4 a.m. before they left from the Wauchula First Baptist Church,” he said. “I had three people sign it there that morning.”

“I just built the truck and didn’t have any real use for it so I figured I’d go to these vet events,” Mullen said. “I found out there’s so many vets

that had Purple Hearts, I just wanted to honor them in some way, so I just started having them sign the quarter panel.”

As Mullen relates, “I just started out [wanting] to put a flag on it. Then I was on the internet looking at all the military decals and thought ‘well this decal would look good on the vehicle.’”

“I knew I wanted to paint the kneeling soldier at the cross on the back,” continued Mullen. “That was the next thing I did after the flag. Then after that I went, ‘well I need something more’ and I saw the big POW flag decal and I thought, ‘I’ll put that on the back door.’ Then I saw the Pledge

of Allegiance and I put that on. I never planned any of it, it just came together.

“Originally, the flag covered the whole thing but I looked at it and I thought, ‘that just doesn’t look good,’” said Mullen. “That’s why I shortened it up to the back door. I made the roof black [the truck is mostly white] to symbolize ‘good and evil, black and white.’ With the American flag holding back the black [the darkness]. That’s just the way it came out.”

“A lot of people look at it. I try to explain to them that freedom is coming out of the hood scoop,” he said. “I tried to make it look like the flag was

coming out of the hood scoop and going around, across the side of the vehicle. It comes to the area where you have the dog tags.

“Then you have the insignia, ‘freedom is not free,’ and it shows the Purple Hearts and the soldier praying, and the POWs and the MIAs and The Pledge of Allegiance,” Mullen said. “It kind of all blends in from freedom to the Pledge [of Allegiance] to the United States.”

“I just thank all the vets that served in the military. You can put down my name because I own the truck but I want it understood that it’s the vets who deserve

Purple Heart Day observed today

Many Floridians may be unaware that in July of 2017, Gov. Rick Scott signed a proclamation declaring Aug. 7 as “Florida Purple Heart Day.”

Purple Heart Day is an observance that commemorates the creation of the Purple Heart Medal. The holiday also encourages people to pay their respects to fallen soldiers, to listen to the stories of soldiers and veterans, and to thank them for their service to the nation.

The Purple Heart is the oldest American military decoration for military merit. It is awarded to members of the U.S. armed forces who have been killed or wounded in action against an enemy. It is also awarded to soldiers who have suffered maltreatment as prisoners of war.

What is now known as The Purple Heart was originally called the Badge of Military Merit. The honor was created by Gen. George Washington on Aug. 7, 1782 and awarded to three soldiers of the Revolutionary War.

These are the only known recipients of the Badge of Military Merit: Sgt. Elijah Churchill, Sgt. William Brown and Sgt. Daniel Bissell Jr.

After the Revolutionary War, the decoration was largely forgotten. It wasn’t until 1927 that an attempt to revive the citation was made by Gen. Charles P. Summerall, the U.S. Army chief of staff. Summerall sent a draft bill to Congress but was unsuccessful in his bid to reinstate the

Local dentist has a mission to help

AVON PARK — Avon Park dentist Richard Wood returned Saturday from his second week-long trip to provide dental care for those in need in Honduras.

Wood was part of a team of 20 who worked as volunteers on the mission including doctors, dentists, dental assistants, nurses and those providing eyeglasses.

They usually fly on a Saturday, make preparations at a base location, such as a church or mission, on Sunday and attend a local church service. Each day they go to a different location, a village or remote area, to treat the residents in the area who live on meager earnings and don’t

have nearby access to health care and dentistry services.

“When you see how people live there 365 days a year, it is a blessing to be living the United States,” he said Monday as he was back at work at his dental practice, Heartland Complete Care Dentistry, 1100 W. Stryker Road, Avon Park. “Their income level and what they earn per day and how they survive on it is just a mystery to me.”

Wood has participated in other medical mission trips to Bolivia, Honduras, Nicaragua and Cameroon, Africa, with the Tampa-based Christians for Worldwide Evangelism, which was formed in October of 1991 through the efforts of lay workers — men and women, skilled and

unskilled.

Wood’s wife, physician Betsy Wood, has also served on a couple of mission trips.

All of the evangelism group’s board members and volunteers donate their time and resources. They receive no monetary compensation for their efforts. Projects are paid for by tax deductible donations. Each volunteer pays their own way.

They have to take with them everything they will need or use, including food and water and an electrical generator, Wood said. On the second day after the group got set up and ready to go, there was a power failure for the whole day.

“We always have challenges,” he said. “They got the generator; it was

School Board special meeting today to consider health clinic

SEBRING — The School Board of Highlands County will hold a special meeting this morning at 9:30 a.m. with the sole agenda item to consider a contract with a medical firm for an employee health clinic. The School District's Insurance Committee met and interviewed four prospective clinic vendors — Florida Hospital, Cigna, Marathon Health and Treasure Coast Medical Associates; with Treasure Coast receiving the highest rating. The Insurance Committee unanimously recommended the district

draft a contract with Treasure Coast Medical Associates Inc. with the district's cost being about \$600,000 annually for three years, which is based on \$33 per employee, per month, plus pharmaceuticals and lab work billed at cost. School Board Finance Director Richard "Bo" Birt stressed it will be a free clinic for School Board employees and their eligible dependents. "This is going to be a real good thing for our employees," he said. "Where other districts have done this, the employees absolutely love it." Treasure Coast's CEO

and President Michael Adelberg offered his background and described his plans for a clinic at the July 31 School Board meeting. He is a board certified emergency physician with 30 years of management experience in addition to clinical care experience. Treasure Coast Medical Associates operate the Okeechobee Urgent Care Clinic and the Stuart Urgent Care Clinic, which is located in Jensen Beach. His plans for the Sebring clinic included purchasing and renovating an existing doctor's office building near Highlands Regional

Medical Center. The clinic, which would be open seven days a week and include a pharmacy, would provide services for School Board employees, retirees and their eligible dependents and would also serve as a private sector urgent care. The draft contract for the clinic was not included in the July 31 School Board meeting agenda and School Board Attorney John McClure said he did not have a copy of it to review so the School Board scheduled the special meeting to consider the contract. The contract calls for the clinic to begin its services in January 2019.

Ex charged with stolen trailer

AVON PARK — A woman clearing her things out of her ex-boyfriend's house allegedly used his utility trailer to do so. When he reported it stolen to the Highlands County Sheriff's Office, deputies investigated and arrested 39-year-old Jill Christine McIntyre on a charge of grand theft of a vehicle. As McIntyre was being booked into the Highlands County Jail, a deputy found two plastic bags of a white, crystal-like substance

hidden in her brazier. The substance field-tested positive for methamphetamine leading to charges of possession of the drug and of drug equipment, and of attempt to smuggle contraband into a detention facility. The trouble started on Friday, according to arrest reports. The ex-boyfriend had filed an ejection notice with Highlands County courts to have her removed from his home. It was served on Thursday, reports said. Since she and he have a no-contact order, he stayed

away while she loaded her things and left. Once family members told him she had left and he could return, he came back to find his trailer missing, reports said. At that time, he called deputies and told them the trailer actually belonged to his mother, who allowed him to use it. When deputies talked with his mother, reports

said, she said she had never given the ex-girlfriend permission to use her trailer. Deputies then met with McIntyre, where they found the trailer, according to reports, full of furniture and covered with a blue tarp. McIntyre spoke with deputies, but her comments were redacted from reports.

No excuse for murder

Few situations are ever improved once politics play a part, and we're seeing this unfold over in Clearwater — with possible adverse implications for gun-rights' proponents throughout Florida.

Outside a Clearwater convenience store on July 19, 47-year-old Michael Drejka, who witnesses said had displayed a history of behaving like a self-delegated czar of parking lot etiquette at the store, angrily confronted a woman who had parked in a handicapped parking space — although she apparently had no handicapped tag or sticker, and despite plenty of other regular spaces being available. The woman's boyfriend, Markeis McGlockton, 28, witnessed this encounter, and in defense of his girlfriend and their 5-year-old son who was in the car, he shoved Drejka to the ground. Drejka then pulled a gun and shot the unarmed McGlockton, even though he seemingly backed away from Drejka once he saw the weapon. McGlockton, a father of three, died shortly afterward.

The outcome was a tragedy. But Pinellas County Sheriff Bob Gualtieri compounded the sad incident by announcing the following day that Drejka would not be arrested because his actions appeared justified under the state's 2005 Stand Your Ground law.

Gualtieri cited the law's "largely subjective standard," and further alleged that Drejka might sue if arrested, based on changes lawmakers made to the statute in 2017. "It cuts towards this guy's belief, in his mind, that he's going to be harmed again, and he had to shoot to defend himself. And those are the facts. And that's the law," Gualtieri told reporters.

Yet conservative state lawmakers, defense lawyers and NRA spokeswoman Marion Hammer all have told the media that none of that is true. But because Gualtieri chose to substitute his immediate judgment for that of prosecutors, all sorts of trouble is taking root.

Because Drejka is white and McGlockton is black, critics immediately spied another racially charged case akin to that involving George Zimmerman and Trayvon Martin — a comparison made worse because many of the law's critics have failed to explain that Zimmerman never invoked Stand Your Ground as his defense. He instead claimed self-defense, which led to his 2013 acquittal on murder charges.

Thus, Stand Your Ground critics now are calling for the law to be changed or repealed. They do so while stoking racial animus and promoting claims that the law is racist — although in the past critics have claimed the law is flawed because it allowed gangbangers in minority neighborhoods to declare open season on each other without consequence. In fact, after Martin's slaying in 2012, the Tampa Bay Times analyzed nearly 200 Stand Your Ground cases and concluded that there was "no obvious bias in how black defendants have been treated." The Times reported at the time that black defendants declaring Stand Your Ground in deadly shootings went free 66 percent of the time, compared to 61 percent for white defendants.

Meanwhile, U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson now is piling on by literally trying to make a federal case out of a local law enforcement matter. Nelson is leading a cadre of Democratic federal lawmakers, including some who have no connection to Florida, in urging the Justice Department to tap its civil rights division to investigate the McGlockton shooting. And the Rev. Al Sharpton, one of America's foremost race-baiters, is expected to be in Clearwater on Aug. 5 to, as Sharpton tweeted, protest McGlockton's death.

The bottom line of all of this is that Gualtieri has opened the door for legal mayhem that, if carried to fruition, could end up depriving law-abiding citizens of the right to defend themselves.

To clarify, Stand Your Ground does not excuse murder. The law originally was based on the premise that defendants had to justify their use of force. That changed in 2017, when lawmakers put the burden on prosecutors to show the force was not justifiable. But however such cases proceed, the decision to prosecute the person who resorted to force belongs first to the state attorney and then a judge — not law enforcement.

Pinellas-Pasco State Attorney Bernie McCabe is reviewing the case. McGlockton's family, anti-gun activists and some Democratic lawmakers are increasing the pressure for Drejka's arrest. If McCabe believes a murder case can be made against him, we trust he will be arrested, despite Sheriff Gualtieri's assertion, and a vigorous prosecution would ensue. That would be appropriate.

We support Stand Your Ground, but recognize it is not a license to kill, and should not be abused to support bogus or irresponsible claims of force. Despite what many may think, the people who believe that most fervently are gun owners who now worry their critics have another motive to strip them of their constitutional rights.

Who owns your DNA information?

Recently, I visited the doctor. After the nurse left the room, another young woman came in asking for a swab. Is this DNA testing, I asked? Yes it is. "What for?" I asked. "For potential medicine interactions," she says. "Isn't that what any pharmacist can tell me?" I ask. "Yes," she says. No kidding, that was her answer.

"Do you share this information with the insurance company?" I ask. "Why, yes, they cover the test." I bet they will. "What company do you work for?" I ask. I work for CQentia, she says. She did not work for the physician I was seeing at all.

A DNA test for a specific problem can be cheaply done in the office with, for example, what is called a blot test. This company is collecting the patient's entire DNA. Insurance companies would love to get their hands on that. They can test and learn of pre-dispositions or "pre-existing

conditions" before you know they even tested you. You can see, the information would be very valuable for sale to insurance companies. Even if not sold, this represents an unacceptable breach of privacy because no company is safe from hackers.

I declined the test. My care was just as good without it.

I suggest the you exercise extreme caution when someone asks to take a swab from you. If it is for DNA testing, they are collecting information on every gene in your body.

Who owns your DNA information? You do. Keep it that way.

the lake, he said, but had never swum Bishop Park. "It was a lot deeper than I initially thought," Burress said.

Each gasp of air only lasted about 10-15 seconds underwater, he said, and left only a couple of seconds at the bottom to reach out.

"It's black at the bottom. You couldn't see a thing," Burress said. "By that time, there wasn't much we could do."

He said Dawson's mother and girlfriend were screaming, in tears.

"I told them we would locate him. We'll do what we can," Burress said.

Lt. Jack Bailey with the Highlands County Sheriff's Office Dive Team said turbidity of the water, bringing silt from the bottom, hampered the search.

"(Sunday) our visibility was minimal," Bailey said.

Dawson reportedly went under at 10:45 a.m. Bailey said he got notification to "gear up" at 11:30 a.m. The team found Dawson at

1:40 p.m., in 15 feet of water.

A lot of that two-hour period, Bailey said, is getting prepped, which includes gathering gear from storage and driving to the site.

"We do try to expedite getting in the water," Bailey said.

When the dive team arrived, Bailey said, the Sheriff's Office and Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission had boats in the water. The Sheriff's Office boat has side-scan sonar, but brush piles and other debris can create false positives.

They were told several "probability spots," and Dawson was found in one of them.

Each diver had radio links with the shore, boats and each other, Bailey said.

Diving on a search has far more danger than sport diving, he said, because a diver can get snagged.

"We always have a safety diver," Bailey said.

They did methodical sweeps, from a central point, of an area roughly 250 feet long by 200 feet wide, to be sure they didn't miss anything.

Bailey said his dive partner ran into debris and had to adjust his sweep.

Usually swept away in shallow water by waders, silt tends to start collecting at 6 feet deep and gets thicker from there, Bailey said, as much as 6 inches. Outboard motors can stir it up, Bailey said, but most search boats have trolling motors and search boat operators know not to move under power in a search zone.

"It wasn't that bad of a time frame," Bailey said: They found him that afternoon.

Dawson's drowning showed eerie similarities to last year's drowning at Bishop Park. Anthony M. Matthews, 28, of Sebring slipped under the surface at 6:15 p.m. May 29, 2017 — Memorial Day — while wading toward friends. Sheriff's divers found Matthews at 8:25 p.m. in 10-12-foot-deep water by a steep drop-off.

"I just feel for the victim's family," Bailey said of Dawson's loved ones. "You're out enjoying a weekend before school and have something like this happen. I pray for them."

bone dry; but, the local pastor who came with us, he found some gasoline and we fired it up and was rolling."

All of Honduras is tropical with a rainy season from May to November and a dry season from November to May.

"So with the dry season we deal with dust and the rainy season we deal with mud," Wood said.

They were fortunate

that the trip was not scheduled the prior week because bus drivers were protesting the high cost of gas, Wood said. "They blocked many roads, but fortunately when we got there it had quieted down and we could go where we needed to go."

The evangelism group keeps a close eye on the political stability of the countries where there are planned mission trips.

A Nicaragua trip planned for later this year has been cancelled because of the political

climate there, Wood said.

This is one small way he can give back, he said about the reason for his participation in the medical mission trips.

"God blessed me tremendously considering I grew up on the islands [Trinidad and Tobago] and was able to send myself through medical school," Wood said.

The whole mission of Christians for Worldwide Evangelism is to spread the Gospel and to provide some temporary health care.

honor.

Summerall was succeeded by Gen. Douglas MacArthur in 1931. MacArthur took up the cause and on Feb. 22, 1932, George Washington's bicentennial birthday, the U.S. War Department announced the creation of the "Order of the Purple Heart."

Originally, the Purple Heart was not only awarded for wounds sustained during military conflict, but for meritorious service of other sorts as well. The Legion of Merit medal was created in 1942. As a result of this, awarding the Purple Heart for meritorious service was no longer necessary and was discontinued.

According to the purpleheart.com, the Purple Heart, per regulation, is awarded in the name of the President of the United States to any member of the Armed Forces of the United States who, while serving under

competent authority in any capacity with one of the U.S. Armed Services after April 5, 1917 has been wounded, killed, or has died after being wounded.

The Purple Heart is a heart-shaped purple medal with a gold border. The front has a profile of George Washington, while the back has the words "for military merit" inscribed on it. The medal is attached to a piece of purple silk with a silver border.

It is estimated that about 1.8 million Purple Hearts have been awarded to American servicemen and women.

Today, in addition to being awarded to those who fight wars overseas, the Purple Heart is also given to military personnel who display bravery and valor as prisoners of war and while fighting certain types of domestic terrorists.

The Purple Heart has undergone many changes with respect to the criteria for being awarded. At first, the Purple Heart was exclusively awarded to Army and Army Air

Corps personnel and could not be awarded posthumously to the next of kin.

In 1942, President Franklin Roosevelt signed an executive order allowing the Navy to award the Purple Heart to Sailors, Marines, and Coast Guard personnel. Also in that year, the Purple Heart was made available for posthumous award to any member of the military killed on or after Dec. 7, 1941.



Bhatia repeats as Junior PGA champ

Since 1976, there has never been a back-to-back winner in the Boys Junior PGA Championship. Well, go ahead and add yet another “never before” to Akshay Bhatia’s name.

Bhatia, 16, of Wake Forest, North Carolina, holed out a slow-moving, sidwinding 40-foot chip for eagle, from off the 18th green, at Valhalla Golf Club—to miraculously rally from one-down over runner-up Tommy Stephenson, of Carlsbad, California and clinch the 43rd Boys Junior PGA

Championship on the 72nd hole.

In the process, he became the first-ever back-to-back Champion, as well as the first two-time victor. All of this in an event that has hosted the likes of Tiger Woods, Phil Mickelson, Jordan Spieth, Justin Thomas and David Toms, to name a few members of the Who’s Who list.

Following a tee shot straight down the fairway on No. 18, Bhatia striped a 3-iron from 228-yards out to the back edge of the fringe. He angled his chip away from the hole and rode the ridge dramatically down to glory.

Before the ball sank, Bhatia raised his club in celebration followed by a Tigeresque fist-pump, as the gallery roared in absolute amazement.

“To make the chip was unreal,” said Bhatia.

A bogey on Hole No. 17 left him one shot behind Stephenson, who was in the clubhouse at 10-under par and a one-shot lead.

“It was one of the ‘clutchiest’ moments of my career,” said Bhatia.

In addition, Bhatia clinched an automatic spot on the 2018 United States Junior Ryder Cup Team, which will travel to Disneyland Paris in

LUMBERTON, N.C. — Team Florida lost to Louisiana by a score of 2-1 in extra innings in Sunday’s second round of the Dixie Youth Ozone World Series in Lumberton, N.C.

Team Florida took an early lead, but Louisiana battled back to tie the game and then pushed across the winning run in the bottom of the seventh inning to end the tense contest.

“It was a close game,” said Team Florida head coach Will Sebring. “It was a pitcher’s duel and we gave them everything we had and they gave us all they had. Louisiana is a good team and so are we and we have to bounce back and get ready for our next game.”

The tough loss moved Team Florida into an elimination game on Monday evening against Tennessee. The winner of that game will play again today while the loser was done in the double-elimination tournament. Results from the game were not available at press time.

GTD class to get Sprint Cup for 2019

The 2019 IMSA season will see the debut of a new, seven-race competition called the “IMSA WeatherTech Sprint Cup” for GT Daytona (GTD) class competitors within most IMSA WeatherTech SportsCar Championship sprint events two-hour, 40-minute in length or shorter.

“The IMSA WeatherTech Sprint Cup is a product of constructive feedback from a series of conversations with GTD stakeholders,” said IMSA President Scott Atherton. “Beginning next season, GTD competitors have the opportunity to compete for three different IMSA titles. The IMSA WeatherTech Sprint

Cup offers GTD drivers and teams a relatively cost-effective option to compete at the top level of North American sports

car racing. We are grateful to WeatherTech Founder and CEO David MacNeil for his enthusiastic support of this new program.”

The IMSA WeatherTech Sprint Cup will use the same points system and sporting regulations as the GTD class uses for the 10-race WeatherTech Championship GTD season but creates new opportunities for class competitors. Teams will have two-driver lineups every round, including a minimum of one Bronze- or Silver-rated driver paired with another Bronze or Silver or a maximum of one Gold or Platinum driver. Drivers, teams and manufacturers all will earn points based upon the overall finishing position of the car in the GTD

class, all accumulating toward season-ending awards.

The first race for the IMSA WeatherTech Sprint Cup will be the two-hour, 40-minute round at Mid-Ohio Sports Car Course on May 5 and will conclude at WeatherTech Raceway Laguna Seca – another two-hour, 40-minute race – on Sept. 15.

The 100-minute Chevrolet Detroit Belle Isle Grand Prix will count toward the IMSA WeatherTech Sprint Cup for the GTD class, and not toward the overall, 10-race WeatherTech Championship season. That event, which is subject to final approval from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, is scheduled for

He is certainly no stranger to great theatre. Last year, he scorched the Boys Junior PGA Championship record book with the lowest round ever (61); lowest 54-hole score ever (199); and eclipsed Pat Perez's all-time Championship record for lowest 72-hole total score—a record that stood for 24 years—by five strokes (22-under par 266).

While Bhatia's score was more in check at Valhalla, his chip-in will live in the Championship's lore. “It's really cool because there's a lot of history here and a lot of great PGA moments.”

Stephenson, 17, had himself quite a round

as well, coming in with a 6-under par 66 for the day (70-71-71-66 277). His round featured consecutive chip-in birdies on Nos. 7 and 8, which fired up a see-saw leaderboard match between him and Bhatia. Stephenson carded seven birdies versus one bogey to finish at 10-under par for the Championship, including a birdie on No. 18 that nearly brought him the title.

“The ball just went in the hole,” said Stephenson, a Fresno State commit. “I putted amazingly well, and the ball just kept going in. I stayed in control.”

Kentuckian Canon Claycomb, 16, of Bowling Green, jumped up seven spots on the leaderboard with a 5-under par 67—and an 8-under par Championship total (70-74-69-67 280)—to tie for third with Alexander Yang

(69-71-70-70 280), 15, of Carlsbad, California.

In a tie for fifth at 7-under par 281 were Travis Vick, 18, of Houston (69-71-71-70 281); and Luke Kluver, 18, of Norfolk, Nebraska (67-70-74-70 281).

William Moll, who was tied with Bhatia entering the final round as co-leaders finished in a three-way tie for ninth.

An Ace and An Albatross: Cole Ponich, 18, of Farmington, Utah, recorded his fourth career hole-in-one, with an ace on Hole No. 14. Pierson Hunt, 16, of Hartland, Wisconsin, carded a rare double-eagle on the par-5 7th hole.

Having a home-based business has allowed Dorothy Renfro the freedom to care for her children and grandchildren over the years as she serves her community.

Dorothy Renfro's soul is fed with needles and thread

AVON PARK — Dorothy Renfro has lived here since 1977. When she started working for a friend of her husband's some 20 years ago she had no prior knowledge of the embroidery business.

"He called me and we went from there. It was pretty much self-training along the way," she said.

After Bob Fox taught her everything he knew, Renfro took to running a four-head machine she joked was almost as big as she was. "It was atrocious and had three or four colors of thread. A lady named Fran had originally run it while I helped do things like fold shirts and fill orders."

Since that early beginning, Renfro, who goes by Dot and runs Dot's Custom Embroidery, moved up in both skill and machinery.

"The machines have changed and the prices changed right along with them," she laughed. Some now have 16-24 heads, and if you've got the room, there may even be something bigger.

Renfro looks forward to attending the annual Imprinted Sportswear Show (ISS) in Orlando each year and finds herself amazed by the new technologies that makes its debut.

Despite the changes in equipment and most notably, software, Renfro prefers a nine color-nine needle

machine with proven prowess. "Most of my customers have been with me for a decade or more and know I use a colorfast, polyester thread that is both beautiful and extremely durable."

Renfro also used to work extensively with the Ridge Area ARC before they closed screen printing operations.

She continues to work with clients across the nation such as the Missouri State Parks, a champion Blue Bully dog breeder in Southern Tennessee and more local businesses, municipalities and non-profits than can be listed.

"I embroider fingertip

towels for the Missouri parks for trout fishing tournaments and all sorts of show circuit items for the Tennessee dog breeder," she said.

Local restaurants like the Wild Hog in Sebring and medical providers such as Florida Hospital, Sebring dentist Dr. David Willey and the South Florida State College dental and nursing program are some local clients.

Renfro creates all sorts of unique products within her home-based business and has done golf bags for the Bill Jarrett golf tournament and promotional items for the Sebring International

Raceway and Stone Law Group.

"I've done many things for local sports teams too, such as ball caps, team shirts and cheer bags," she said.

From Frostproof to Avon Park and Sebring, Renfro has her work all over the county.

"I enjoy creating logos so much. The machine amazes me every time a new product is stitched." Each new design gets several trial runs to ensure the end result is perfect and Renfro is satisfied with the look.

8 great (and healthy) homemade popsicles

I am not a fan of stuffing children with sugar; therefore, my kids rarely got to indulge in those traditional freezer pops many of us grew up with. (When you really break it down, those ice pops are essentially just frozen sugar water with chemicals on top.) But my kids did not suffer from the heat of summer without a chilling treat!

Remember those Tupperware popsicle molds? Maybe you still have a set (I do!). During the summer, I always had those puppies in the freezer filled with healthy cool food alternatives to the sugar and food-dye laden pops in boxes.

Now that my kids are all grown up, I've started making more sophisticated versions of those summertime treats to help us cool off on hot summer days. Below, I've included some of my favorite ways to make homemade popsicles that the whole family will love. (Note: All of these recipes are intended to be poured into popsicle molds and frozen for at least 4 hours. They should all yield between 4 and 8 popsicles. No molds? Use little Dixie cups and popsicle sticks!)

Pina colada. Blend 1 cup coconut milk with 1 cup pineapple and about a quarter cup of shredded coconut for an absolutely delicious pina colada popsicle! Add a bit of maple syrup if you like. Oh this would be fabulous served with a little shot of coconut rum. ;)

Strawberry creamsicle. Same idea as above, but using 1 cup of strawberries instead of the pineapple and skip the shredded coconut.

Berry popsicles. Blend 1 cup of whatever milk you like with 1 cup of peaches. After pouring into molds, add blueberries and sliced strawberries, along with any other chunks of fruit you like.

Frozen banana strawberry pops. Blend 1 pound of strawberries with 1 nice ripe banana, 1/2 cup of whatever milk you like, and 1/2 cup of vanilla or plain yogurt. Creamy, cool, delicious.

Greek popsicles. Blend 1 cup of Greek yogurt with 2 cups of fruit. (Strawberries or mango would be delicious.) If you like it sweeter, add a little honey or maple syrup. A squirt of lemon juice in this would be delish.

Green tea popsicles. Green tea is fabulous in a popsicle. Dissolve a couple of spoons of maple syrup or honey into 1 cup of hot green tea. Add the sweetened tea to the blender and add in a pound of peeled/pitted fruit (peach or mango would be lovely). I would add a bit of fresh grated ginger to this as well. Yummy antioxidants.

Avocado popsicles. Betcha never thought to make a popsicle out of avocados. And then again, maybe that's just me. Avocados make absolutely scrumptious popsicles. So creamy and yummy and addictive. Mash an avocado seriously well and whisk in 1 cup of water sweetened with 1/4 cup of maple syrup or other sweetener, a good squirt of lemon or lime juice, and a pinch of vanilla. Whisk until smooth.

Lemon pie pops. 2 cups of vanilla Greek yogurt blended with the juice and zest of 2 lemons, and a little bit of sweetener makes for a very delicious popsicle.

See? No need to buy boxes of those sugary ice pops. Make your own wholesome freezer treats that everyone in the family (regardless of age) will love!

Cheering cherries: 4 recipes for this versatile fruit

Cherries are a very versatile fruit and can be used in many different types of dishes.

When I was a child, my favorite flavor was red. If pressed to be specific, I always said my favorite was cherry.

When I became a man I put away childish things, but I still love cherries. At this time of year, when they are so abundant, I can never quite get the stains of cherry juice off my fingers.

Cherries are sweet, of course, and they make basically any dessert better. But they also can be part of

savory dishes, too — they add a hint of cherry magic that accentuates the savoriness of the other ingredients. And they are reason enough to order an old fashioned, a Manhattan or an amaretto sour.

So with red-stained hands, I raised a Manhattan to toast cherries, the most glorious of summer glories. And then I made a bunch of dishes that have cherries in them.

I began with Cherry Chipotle Chili, and not entirely because of the alliteration. I was instantly

intrigued by the addition of sweet cherries to the spice and the smokiness of the chipotle peppers. I thought the classic combination of sweetness, smoke and heat — think of a spicy barbecue with a sweet, tomato-based sauce — might be good.

I had no idea. This may be my new favorite way to make chili.

At least, that's how I felt on the second day. It was also pretty good when I first made it, but the sweetness of the cherries was a bit assertive; it stood out from the smooth blend of the other flavors.

But by the next day, the cherries had had a chance to mellow and join the assembly of tastes. On the second day, you get just a hint of sweetness and the flavor of cherries was happily assimilated into the whole.

This is a chili recipe to keep.

I stayed in the savory realm with my second dish, Grilled Pork Tenderloin With Cherry Salsa. Pork and cherries are a natural combination, and I liked the fact that the cherries would come in the form of a chunky sauce.

I was also attracted to the recipe by the fact that the tenderloin is marinated briefly before grilling. Marinating a tenderloin is never necessary, but it doesn't hurt. This marinade has the bite of lime juice mixed with shallots, along with plenty of cilantro.

Those ingredients are also featured in the salsa, along with the freshness of cherries and a bit of pepper for extra punch. The salsa is great on its own — one taste-tester said she wanted to make it to serve with tortilla chips — but here it also amplifies everything that is so wonderful about grilled pork tenderloin.

For my first sweet dish, I made a pastry that is not too sweet, despite its name. Sweet Cherry-Filled Buns are a type of vatrushka, a bun that is popular in Russia and Ukraine. In other parts of Central Europe, it would be called a kolache or something similar. It is kind of like a danish, in fact, only the dough is less sweet.

Vatrushki are usually filled with farmers' cheese, but they are also often filled with fruit. That's where the cherries come in. Why use any other fruit when there are cherries?

These buns are made with yeast, so they rise three times. That makes them deliciously puffy without being too dense. The filling is just cherries with sugar sprinkled on top, and they have a crumb topping for a little extra richness.

My last sweet dish was cherries jubilee. Of course it was cherries jubilee. You can't write about cooking with cherries unless you make cherries jubilee. Everybody loves cherries jubilee.

And to the best of my recollection, I had never actually had cherries jubilee before. And neither had the people who tasted it. It must be one of those hugely popular dishes that no one has eaten since 1979.

Now that I've made it, I don't understand why it has disappeared from menus. It's easy to make, it tastes great and it catches on fire. What's not to love?

Plus, it has ice cream. The recipe dates back to the most august of all chefs, Auguste Escoffier, who created it in 1897

for Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee, her 60th year as sovereign.

Escoffier's original recipe calls for cherries to be poached in a simple syrup. The syrup is then thickened, and hot kirsch (a cherry brandy) is poured over it and set aflame.

The modern version is not much different. The syrup is now buttery and no longer thickened, and if you do not have kirsch you can use ordinary brandy. Orange zest and a hefty splash of fresh orange juice add a citrus zing that lightens the sauce, and of course it is now served on ice cream.

The flames? They are just the cherry on the sundae.

GRILLED PORK TENDERLOIN WITH CHERRY SALSA

Yield: 6 servings
 1 cup coarsely chopped fresh cilantro, divided
 1/2 cup minced shallots, divided
 6 tablespoons fresh lime juice, divided
 1/4 cup vegetable oil
 2 pork tenderloins about 2 1/2 total pounds
 1/2 pound fresh cherries, stemmed, pitted and halved
 1 fresh Fresno chile, red jalapeño or Holland chile, or 1/2 green jalapeño, thinly sliced crosswise
 1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil
 Salt and black pepper
 Note: Both the marinade and the salsa can be made 1 day in advance. Do not marinate the meat until 15 minutes before cooking.

1. Prepare a grill to medium-high heat. Combine 1/2 cup of the cilantro, 1/4 cup of the minced shallots, 4 tablespoons of the lime juice and the vegetable oil in a resealable plastic bag. Add pork; seal bag and turn to coat. Marinate at room temperature for 15 minutes, turning occasionally.

2. Meanwhile, combine remaining 1/2 cup cilantro, remaining 1/4 cup shallots, remaining 2 tablespoons lime juice, cherries, chile and olive oil in a medium bowl. Season salsa lightly with salt and pepper and set aside to let flavors meld.

3. Remove tenderloins from marinade and season generously with salt and pepper. Grill, turning frequently, until a thermometer inserted into meat registers 145 degrees, about 15 minutes. Let rest 10 minutes. Cut into thin slices and serve with salsa.

CHERRY CHIPOTLE CHILI

Yield: 6 servings
 2 tablespoons olive oil
 1 pound lean ground turkey
 3/4 teaspoon salt, preferably kosher
 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
 2 medium carrots, diced
 1 medium yellow onion, diced
 1 tablespoon chopped garlic
 1 tablespoon chili powder
 1 (28-ounce) can diced tomatoes
 2 cups pitted black cherries
 2 canned chipotle peppers, diced, plus sauce
 2 bay leaves
 1 (15-ounce) can white beans, such as cannellini or navy, rinsed and drained
 1/4 cup nonfat plain Greek yogurt, optional
 Chopped fresh cilantro, optional

1. In a large pot, heat oil over medium-high

heat. Cook turkey with salt and pepper, stirring, until browned, 5 to 10 minutes. Add carrots, onion and garlic; cook, stirring occasionally, until carrots soften, 3 to 5 minutes. Stir in chili powder. Add tomatoes, cherries, chipotle peppers, bay leaves and 1 cup water; bring to a boil.

2. Reduce to a simmer; cook, stirring occasionally, 45 minutes. Add beans; cook 2 minutes. Remove bay leaves. Divide chili among 6 bowls. Top each with 1 tablespoon yogurt and garnish with cilantro, if desired, before serving.

Yield: 16 servings
 1 cup warm milk, 100 to 110 degrees (no hotter)
 1/2 tablespoon active dry yeast
 3 3/4 cups all-purpose flour, divided, plus more for dusting
 7 tablespoons plus 2 teaspoons granulated sugar, divided
 2 eggs, one at room temperature, the other beaten with fork (for egg wash)
 1 tablespoon butter, melted
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 pound sweet red cherries, pitted
 4 tablespoons (1/2 stick) cold butter, diced

1. In the bowl of an electric mixer, add the warm milk and sprinkle the top with the yeast. Let sit 5 to 7 minutes for the yeast to bloom.

2. Stir in 1/2 cup of the flour and 2 tablespoons of the sugar, and whisk until blended. Let rise in a 100 degree oven for 20 minutes, or at room temperature for 30 to 45 minutes.

3. Whisk in the room-temperature egg, 2 tablespoons of the sugar, the melted butter and the salt. Attach the dough hook and add 2 3/4 cups of the flour, 1 cup at a time, mixing with the dough hook after each addition until fully incorporated. Add the last bit of flour slowly; the dough will be perfect when it no longer sticks to the side of mixer — do not add any more flour past this point (you may not need the full 2 3/4 cups). Continue mixing the dough with the dough hook on low speed for 15 minutes.

4. Cover the bowl with plastic wrap and let rise in a 100-degree oven for 1 hour or at room temperature for 2 hours, until tripled in volume.

5. Transfer dough to a nonstick surface, such as a piece of parchment paper, and cut it in half. Cut each half in half, then each of those pieces in half, and then each of those resulting pieces in half. You should have 16 pieces of equal size. Shape the dough into balls.

6. Butter 2 baking dishes, either round cake pans or a 9-by-13-inch pan and an 8-by-8-inch pan. Place balls of dough, evenly spaced, in the baking dishes. Use a narrow drinking glass, small ramekin or your impeccably clean fingers to make a well in the center of each one.

7. Place 3 or 4 cherries into each well and sprinkle each bun with 1/2 teaspoon of the sugar. Let rise in a 100-degree oven for 20 minutes or 30 to 40 minutes at room temperature, until they look puffy.

8. Preheat oven to 360 degrees. In a medium bowl, combine the cold, diced butter, the remaining 1 cup of all-purpose flour; use a pastry cutter or rub together with your fingers until small crumbs form.

9. Brush the buns with the egg wash and sprinkle the tops generously with the crumb mixture. Bake 20 to 22 minutes, or until the tops are golden brown.

3. Scoop ice cream into serving bowls. Pour cherries over ice cream and serve immediately.

means new customers can meet with her one-on-one for customization. "I can digitize items in-house or if needed, can send out for digitizing." From backpacks to gym bags, shirts, jackets, beach towels and more, Renfro has stitched, embroidered or vinyl transferred nearly everything. Asked if she's ever stitched a finger in error, she nodded affirmation and admitted she's had a needle break off in her finger once.

"It happened because the machine is so fast. You bleed a little bit and go on because there's no time to be hurt," she said. This tenacity also served her well when in 2014 she was diagnosed with breast cancer. "I had a double mastectomy and

have been cancer free for four years. I don't let it define me."

She's noted new trends in monogramming bed sheets and pillow cases for new brides and anniversaries.

"Hankies have always been popular for the wedding party and if I can hoop it, I can embroider it," she said. With 13,000 designs at her nimble finger tips and a heart for serving her customers, Renfro shows no sign of slowing down. "I take pride in what I do because it gives me personal satisfaction."

She also encourages other women to follow their heart. "Don't be afraid to take a chance on learning something new. I've made so many new friends over the years, earned a little bit of money and had time to keep my great grandchildren a few days a week too."

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
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PepsiCo's Indra Nooyi latest high-profile female CEO to exit

(AP) — With Indra Nooyi exiting PepsiCo as its longtime chief executive, the circle of CEOs in the Fortune 500 is losing one of its highest profile women.

Nooyi, who was born in India, is a rarity on Wall Street as a woman and a minority leading a Fortune 500 company. She oversaw PepsiCo during a turbulent time in the industry that has forced food giants including Coca-Cola Co., Campbell Soup Co. and Oreo maker Mondelez International Inc. to adapt to changing tastes. All those companies changed CEOs in roughly the last year.

At PepsiCo Inc., Nooyi stressed the company's move toward "good for you" options that people don't feel as guilty eating, such as Baked Lay's potato chips and Naked juices made of fruits and vegetables. The company has not abandoned sugary sodas or more indulgent snacks.

Nooyi, 62, has been with PepsiCo Inc. for 24 years and held the top job for 12.

Another PepsiCo veteran, Ramon Laguarta, will take over as chief executive in October, the company said Monday. Nooyi will remain as chairwoman until early next year.

"Growing up in India, I never imagined I'd have the opportunity to lead such an extraordinary company," Nooyi said in a statement Monday.

Nooyi began her career in India with positions at companies including Johnson & Johnson. She later attended the Yale School of Management.

The percentage of female CEOs in the Fortune 500 has climbed slowly over the years and broke the 5 percent mark just last year, according to

Catalyst, which promotes women in the workplace. The Fortune 500 includes the largest companies based on revenue.

In the S&P 500, an index that includes companies from different sectors, there are currently 25 female CEOs including Nooyi, according to Catalyst. That also represents around 5 percent of CEOs.

Within the food industry, Nooyi is the latest female chief executive to step down, following Mondelez CEO Irene Rosenfeld last year and Campbell CEO Denise Morrison earlier this year.

The packaged food industry has been undergoing major changes through acquisitions, spinoffs and mergers as big companies look for ways to revive slumping revenues.

Nooyi, who took over as chief executive of PepsiCo in 2006, has resisted calls by an activist investor to spin off the company's beverage business, which has struggled in North America, from its better-performing Frito-Lay snacks business. Some of PepsiCo's other brands include Mountain Dew, Tropicana, Gatorade and Quaker Oats.

Nooyi hands the reins to the 54-year-old Laguarta, who has held a variety of positions in his 22 years at PepsiCo over more than two decades.

He currently serves as president, overseeing global operations, corporate strategy, public policy and government affairs. He previously served as CEO of the Europe Sub-Saharan Africa region.

Laguarta will be the sixth CEO in PepsiCo's history, with all of them coming from within the company.

Shares of PepsiCo, based in Purchase, N.Y., rose more than 1 percent in early trading Monday.

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Longtime Manafort deputy admits embezzlement

ALEXANDRIA, Va. — The government's star witness in the financial fraud trial of Paul Manafort testified Monday that he embezzled hundreds of thousands of dollars from the former Trump campaign chairman — and told jurors that he and Manafort committed crimes together.

Rick Gates has been regarded as a crucial witness for the government ever since he pleaded

guilty this year to two felony charges and agreed to cooperate in special counsel Robert Mueller's investigation into possible ties between Russia and the Trump campaign.

The hugely anticipated courtroom showdown brought Gates face to face with his longtime business associate and fellow Trump campaign aide. His testimony, given in short, clipped answers as Manafort rarely broke his gaze from the witness stand, follows that of vendors who detailed Manafort's luxurious spending

and financial professionals who told jurors how the defendant hid millions of dollars in offshore accounts.

But Gates, described by witnesses as Manafort's "right-hand man," is expected to provide the most damning testimony about Manafort's state of mind as well as his own role in the crimes.

Gates told jurors that he siphoned off the money without Manafort's knowledge by filing false expense reports. He also admitted to concealing millions of dollars in foreign bank

accounts on Manafort's behalf and to falsifying loan applications and other documents to help Manafort obtain more in bank loans.

"We didn't report the income or the foreign bank accounts," Gates told jurors, noting that he knew he and Manafort were committing crimes each time.

Gates read off the names of more than a dozen shell companies he and Manafort set up in Cyprus, St. Vincent and the Grenadines and the United Kingdom to stash the proceeds of Manafort's Ukrainian

political consulting work.

Asked whether the money in the accounts was income to Manafort, Gates said, "it was."

Gates said he repeatedly lied to conceal the bank accounts and, at Manafort's direction, he would classify money that came in as either a loan or income to reduce Manafort's tax burden.

Manafort's defense has sought to blame Gates for any illegal conduct and cited the embezzlement to impugn

Hiroshima remembers atomic bombing on 73rd anniversary


TOKYO — Hiroshima marked the anniversary of the Aug. 6, 1945, atomic bombing of the city with a somber ceremony Monday to remember those killed and injured and a call to eliminate nuclear weapons amid hopes of denuclearizing North Korea.

Hiroshima Mayor Kazumi Matsui opened his speech by describing the hellish scene of the blast that morning 73 years ago and the agony of the victims, telling the audience to listen "as if you and your loved ones were there." Then he raised concerns about the global rise of egocentrism and tensions, and urged Japan's government to take more leadership toward achieving a truly nuclear-free world.

"Certain countries are blatantly proclaiming self-centered nationalism and modernizing their nuclear arsenals, rekindling tensions that had eased with the end of the Cold War," Matsui said, without identifying the nations. Nuclear deterrence and nuclear umbrellas are "inherently unstable and extremely dangerous" approaches that seek to maintain international order by only generating fear in rival countries, he said, urging world leaders to negotiate in good faith to eliminate nuclear arsenals instead.

The U.S. attack on Hiroshima killed 140,000 people, and the bombing of Nagasaki killed more than 70,000 three days later, leading to Japan's surrender and ending World War II.

Matsui said in his speech that Japan's government should do more to achieve

Trump ups sanctions pressure on Iran

WASHINGTON — The United States reimposed stiff economic sanctions on Iran Monday, ratcheting up pressure on the Islamic Republic despite statements of deep dismay from European allies, three months after President Donald Trump pulled the U.S. out of the international accord limiting Iran's nuclear activities.

Trump declared the landmark 2015 agreement had been "horrible," leaving the Iranian government flush with cash to fuel conflict in the Middle East.

Iran accused the U.S. of renegeing on the nuclear agreement, signed by the Obama administration, and of causing recent Iranian economic unrest. European allies said they "deeply regret" the U.S. action.

Trump said in a statement, "We urge all nations to take such steps to make clear that the Iranian regime faces a choice: either change its threatening, destabilizing behavior and reintegrate with the global economy, or continue down a path of economic isolation."

A first set of U.S. sanctions that had been eased under the accord were going into effect at one minute past midnight under an executive order signed by Trump. Those sanctions affect financial transactions that involve U.S. dollars, Iran's automotive sector, the purchase of commercial planes and metals including gold.

A second batch of U.S. sanctions targeting Iran's oil sector and central bank are to be reimposed in early November.

Trump warned that those who don't wind down their economic ties to Iran "risk severe consequences."

The Europeans didn't like any of it.

Despite Trump's claims, the accord "is working and delivering on its goal" of limiting Iran's nuclear program, said a statement by European Union foreign policy chief Federica Mogherini and the foreign ministers of France, Germany and the United Kingdom.

The ministers said the Iran deal is "crucial for the security of Europe, the region and the entire world," and the European Union issued a "blocking statute" Monday to protect European businesses from the impact of the sanctions.

A senior administration official, briefing reporters under ground rules requiring anonymity, said the United States is "not particularly concerned" by EU efforts to protect European firms from the sanctions.

Iranian President Hassan Rouhani said that

Patients who accepted infected kidneys cured of hepatitis C

NEW YORK — Some patients in desperate need of a kidney transplant participated in a bold experiment where they received organs infected with hepatitis C. The gamble paid off.

Their new organs are working fine thanks to medication that got rid of the virus, researchers reported Monday.

It was a small study involving just 20 patients. But researchers say it suggests that organs currently going to waste just might help speed transplants for patients who wait years to get one.

"When there's such a bad organ shortage, we can't just do business as usual," said Dr. Peter Reese, a University of Pennsylvania kidney specialist who led the study. "We need

to shake off that these organs aren't valuable and that people will not want them."

In the United States, almost 95,000 people are on the national kidney waiting list but only 19,850 received a transplant in 2017, according to the United Network for Organ Sharing. That only covers about 20 percent of all cases.

Hepatitis C is an infection that can quietly destroy someone's liver if untreated. Transplanting other organs from patients with the virus can infect the recipients. But with powerful new drugs now available that promise to cure them, Reese's team decided to test if it's safe to transplant infected kidneys to people who don't already have the virus — but who might not survive the wait for a healthy organ.

Twelve weeks of hepatitis treatment cleared the virus in

all 20 patients tested so far. Compared to patients who received uninfected organs, their new kidneys work just as well, even a year after the procedure. Merck & Co., helped fund the research and provided the pills in the study. Results were published in the journal *Annals of Internal Medicine*.

Kiran Shelat, a 65-year-old civil engineer from Yardley, Pennsylvania, had spent two years on the transplant waiting list before signing up for the experiment.

He now feels energetic, and can work out in the gym and attend family events. So far, there's no sign of the virus in his bloodstream.

"This is a lifesaver," Shelat said. "Get off the list; get the kidney. There is nothing to be afraid of."

Thousands left homeless by deadly quake

SENGGIGI, Indonesia — Thousands left homeless by a powerful quake that ruptured roads and flattened buildings on the Indonesian tourist island of Lombok sheltered Monday night in makeshift tents as authorities said rescuers hadn't yet reached all devastated areas and expect the toll of 98 dead to climb. It was the second deadly quake in a week to hit Lombok, a less-developed island compared with its more famous neighbor

Bali, where the strong tremors caused panic and damaged buildings. A July 29 quake killed 16 people and damaged hundreds of houses on Lombok, some of which collapsed in Sunday evening's quake, measured at magnitude 7.0 by Indonesian authorities and 6.9 by the U.S. Geological Survey. Damage was "massive" in mountainous northern Lombok, where the quake was centered, said National Disaster Mitigation Agency spokesman Sutopo Purwo Nugroho. In several districts, more than half the

homes were destroyed or severely damaged. A large mosque collapsed on worshippers in northern Lombok's Lading-Lading village, and rescuers used a backhoe to search the debris. The number of victims was unknown. Some areas still hadn't been reached 24 hours after the quake because of collapsed bridges, blocked and ruptured roads and the loss of power and communications. Nugroho said the death toll had risen to 98 and warned it will continue to increase. All but two of

were killed on Lombok; the others died on Bali. More than 230 people were seriously injured. Thousands of homes and buildings were damaged and those displaced camped wherever they could — in sports fields and on roadsides, cobbling together ramshackle shelters and building campfires for warmth. Sahril, who uses one name, said he escaped his collapsing house in North Lombok with his immediate family, but his older brother is buried in his flattened home in the village of Cubek. "He was serving

customers when the earthquake happened. The customers managed to escape, but he himself didn't," Sahril said. "His two-story house collapsed and buried him. He had no chance to scream (for) help." The quake struck at a shallow depth of 10.5 kilometers (6 miles). Shallow quakes tend to cause more damage than deeper ones. "We were sitting there having dinner at about 7 o'clock last night, we just felt a really big sort of shaking and the lights went off and everyone just ran," Australian

tourist Kim Liebelt said as he waited with other travelers for a flight out at Lombok's international airport. "And then the roof started falling down on us, rocks and rubble and then just everyone running to get away," he said. Videos showed screaming people running in panic from a shopping mall and a neighborhood in Bali where parked vehicles swayed. On Lombok, soldiers and other rescuers carried the injured on stretchers and carpets. Many were treated outdoors because hospitals were damaged.

Gas truck explodes on Italian highway; 2 dead, scores hurt

MILAN — A tanker truck carrying a highly flammable gas exploded Monday after rear-ending a stopped truck on a crowded highway near the northern Italian city of Bologna. At least two people were killed, up to 70 injured and part of the raised expressway collapsed in the fireball. Police said the accident and subsequent fire and explosion injured between 60 and 70 people, some with severe burns. It also shut down a highway north of the city that is a key route between northern Italy and the Adriatic Coast and other points south, including Florence and Rome, the capital. A police video showed the tanker failing to slow down quick enough and plowing into the rear of a truck stopped in traffic, with flames exploding on impact. Another truck appeared to hit the tanker

from behind. After an unspecified time lapse, during which the highway was cleared of most other vehicles, the truck erupted in a second, enormous explosion that spanned eight lanes of the highway and beyond. Flames shot up into the air, followed by a thick black cloud of smoke. Aerial photos showed a gaping hole left in the raised highway. TV images hours after the flames were doused showed the

burned-out skeletons of hulking tractor trailers. Italian prosecutors said the tanker was filled with liquefied petroleum gas, otherwise known as propane, used as a fuel in heaters, cooking equipment and vehicles. Firefighters said the extreme heat of the flames caused the raised roadway to collapse, sending a heat explosion that incinerated dozens of automobiles on new car lots nearby.

Storm strengthens to Hurricane John off Mexico's coast

MEXICO CITY (AP) — One of two storms off Mexico's Pacific coast strengthened into a hurricane Monday afternoon, while forecasters said the other was no longer expected to gain hurricane strength and neither posed an immediate threat to land. Hurricane John was centered about 320 miles southwest of the Mexican port of Manzanillo, with maximum sustained winds of 75 mph late in the afternoon. It was moving northwest at 8 mph. John was expected to strengthen rapidly and become a major hurricane by late Tuesday. It was forecast to peak as a Category 3 hurricane before starting to weaken while staying to the west of the Baja California Peninsula during the week. Tropical Storm Ileana had been projected to reach hurricane force while marching northwestward parallel

to Mexico's southwestern coast, bringing heavy surf, but forecasters said the storm was no longer expected to strengthen and should dissipate by late Tuesday because of the effects of the larger Hurricane John.

Saudi Arabia expels Canadian ambassador over criticism

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates (AP) — Saudi Arabia expelled the Canadian ambassador Monday and froze "all new business" with Ottawa over its criticism of the ultraconservative kingdom's arrest of women's rights activists — yet another warning to the West reflecting Riyadh's newly assertive foreign policy. The sudden and unexpected dispute bore the hallmarks of Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, Saudi Arabia's 32-year-old future leader, whose recent foreign policy exploits include the war in Yemen, the boycott of Qatar and Lebanese Prime Minister Saad Hariri's surprise

resignation broadcast during a visit to the kingdom. Hariri later rescinded the resignation, widely believed to be orchestrated by Riyadh, and returned to Beirut.

Eurozone rescue fund pays final bailout loan to Greece

BRUSSELS (AP) — A rescue fund set up to help euro-using countries paid its final 15 billion-euro (\$17.3 billion) bailout loan to Greece on Monday after objections by Germany delayed the payment by several weeks. The European Stability Mechanism said 9.5 billion euros (nearly \$11 billion) of the loan would go toward a cash buffer Greece could use to meet its financial needs for almost two years. The other 5.5 billion euros (\$6.4 billion) was earmarked for paying off some of the country's considerable debt. The Greek government hailed the payment as "the last act of the bailout drama."



11 dead, nearly 70 wounded in weekend violence in Chicago

CHICAGO — At least 11 people were shot to death and about 70 wounded in a weekend burst of violence in Chicago that instantly became a political issue when President Donald Trump's lawyer, Rudy Giuliani, blamed the carnage on longtime Democratic rule in the city.

Police on Monday attributed the dozens of shootings to gangs, the illegal flow of guns and

sweltering August heat that drew more people outside.

The victims ranged in age from 11 to 63, according to police. One teenage girl died after being shot in the face. A teenage boy was fatally shot riding a bike Sunday afternoon. Other shootings took place at a block party and a funeral.

Even for Chicagoans all too accustomed to violence in parts of the city, the weekend stood out. By way of comparison, at least seven people were killed and 32 wounded

during the long Memorial Day weekend, the Chicago Tribune reported.

"Our souls are burdened," Mayor Rahm Emanuel said. "It is unacceptable to happen in any neighborhood of Chicago. We are a better city."

Echoing comments that Trump himself has made repeatedly about Chicago, Giuliani blamed Emanuel — President Barack Obama's White House chief of staff — and decades of "one party Democratic rule" in a series of tweets on Sunday and Monday.

The former New York mayor also tweeted his support for Chicago mayoral candidate and former Police Superintendent Garry McCarthy, referring to him as "Jerry" and calling him a "policing genius."

McCarthy plans to run next February against Emanuel, who fired McCarthy in 2015 after the release of dashcam video showing a white police officer kill a black teenager by shooting him 16 times.

Misspelling Emanuel's last name, Giuliani

tweeted: "He can do a lot better than Mayor Emmanuel who is fiddling while Chicago burns." Giuliani also falsely claimed that Chicago had "63 murders this weekend."

The mayor had no immediate comment on Giuliani's attacks.

Most of the shootings happened in poor neighborhoods on the West and South Sides where gangs are entrenched, said Police Superintendent Eddie Johnson, standing next to the mayor.

Johnson noted that homicides in the city are

down by around 20 percent from last year. But he said gang members and others arrested on gun charges aren't dealt with harshly enough.

"It is the same people who are pulling the triggers," he said. "This is a small subset of individuals who think they can play by their own rules because they continue to get a slap on the wrist when we arrest them."

Johnson said at the morning news conference there had been no arrests in any of the weekend shootings.

US stocks get a lift from earnings

NEW YORK — U.S. stocks finished broadly higher for the third day in a row Monday. Media, retail and technology companies rose, and Warren Buffett's Berkshire Hathaway led gains for the financial sector.

Most sectors climbed as companies including Facebook and Netflix recovered some of the losses they sustained recently. Investors continued to focus on companies' quarterly results instead of the escalating trade threats the U.S. and China made last week.

Company profits have rocketed higher this year thanks to the corporate tax cut and continued economic growth. But in the first quarter investors didn't always react to that

growth because they were worried about the U.S.'s numerous trade disputes. Julian Emanuel, chief equity and derivative strategist for BTIG, said that's starting to change.

"The skepticism that we had a quarter ago seems, rightly, to be falling by the wayside," he said.

The S&P 500 index rose 10.05 points, or 0.4 percent, to 2,850.40, its highest close since Jan. 29. The benchmark index has risen for five weeks in a row, its longest winning streak in 2018.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average gained 39.60 points, or 0.2 percent, to 25,502.18. The Nasdaq composite added 47.66 points, or 0.6 percent, to 7,859.68. The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks picked up 10.94 points, or 0.7 percent, to 1,684.31.

PepsiCo's Indra Nooyi latest high-profile female CEO to exit

PURCHASE, N.Y. (AP) — With Indra Nooyi exiting PepsiCo as its longtime chief executive, the circle of CEOs in the Fortune 500 is losing one of its highest profile women.

Nooyi, who was born in India, is a rarity on Wall Street as a woman and a minority leading a Fortune 500 company. She oversaw PepsiCo during a turbulent time in the industry that has forced food giants including Coca-Cola Co., Campbell Soup Co. and Oreo maker Mondelez International Inc. to adapt to changing tastes. All those companies changed CEOs in roughly the last year.

At PepsiCo Inc., Nooyi stressed the company's move toward "good for you" options that people don't feel as guilty eating, such as Baked Lay's potato chips and Naked juices made of fruits and

vegetables. The company has not abandoned sugary sodas or more indulgent snacks.

Nooyi, 62, has been with PepsiCo Inc. for 24 years and held the top job for 12.

Major tech companies remove Alex Jones for hate, bullying

NEW YORK (AP) — Major tech companies have begun to ban right-wing conspiracy theorist Alex Jones from their services, reflecting a more aggressive enforcement of policies against hate speech following protests on social media.

Facebook has taken down four pages belonging to Jones, including two featuring his "Infowars" show, for violating its hate speech and bullying policies. Over the past several days, Apple, YouTube and Spotify have also removed material published by Jones. Twitter, which hasn't banned Jones, has also faced similar calls.

Facebook has also suspended Jones' account for 30 days because he repeatedly violated the company's community standards against hate speech that "attacks or dehumanizes others," it said in a statement Monday.

Twitter would not comment on Jones.

No price hike, but new caps on MoviePass discount tix plan

NEW YORK (AP) — MoviePass, a discount service for movie tickets at theaters, is walking back a planned 50 percent price increase following a subscriber backlash. But the cash-starved company will soon impose a cap of three movies per month, instead of one every day.

The company says the new plan will include "many major studio first-run films," though there will be exceptions the company didn't specify. In doing so, MoviePass

is rescinding a recent cost-cutting move of barring viewings of most major releases during the first two weeks.

MoviePass has shown that many moviegoers will make time to hit theaters when movies are affordable, despite more convenient options such as Netflix and video on demand. U.S. movie ticket sales are up 8 percent so far this year, according to comScore. MoviePass claims credit for some of that.

MoviePass has grown to 3 million subscribers, from about 20,000, since it slashed monthly rates nearly a year ago to \$10, from as high as \$50.

But that success has proven costly. Because MoviePass typically pays theaters the full cost of tickets — \$15 or more in big cities — a single movie can put the service in the red. Its parent company recently had to take out a \$5 million emergency loan to pay its payment processors after missed payments resulted in service outages.

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

It's better to prepare for a repeat of Shingrix side effects

DEAR DR. ROACH: I received the first dose of Shingrix this week and had pretty severe side effects, though in the range of what can be expected: high fever (101.5), intense shivering, a severe headache and 12 hours of extreme fatigue. The entire reaction began 11 hours after the shot and ended 18 hours after that. I am 61 and in excellent health, taking only 25 mcg of levothyroxine daily.



Dr. Roach

I have a few questions that I hope you can answer. I've tried looking at the clinical trial results for Shingrix, but I am not qualified to understand the information as presented.

1. Is it likely that I'll have a similar (or worse?) reaction to the second shot? The package insert says one can react to the first, second, neither or both.
 2. Are both injections identical?
 3. When I had chickenpox as a child, I was way sicker than the average kid. Related?
 4. If I get shingles, do I have a higher risk for a severe case?
- J.G.

ANSWER: Compared with the previous one-time vaccine Zostavax, the new two-dose Shingrix vaccine is much more effective. However, it does have a higher risk of side effects. You have had the most common side effect, though only 10 percent of people will have symptoms as bad as yours. These symptoms are caused by your body mounting an inflammatory response to the glycoprotein in the vaccine (the new vaccine does not contain a live virus).
To answer your questions in order: You are at higher risk for

a similar reaction for the second shot. I would plan your day accordingly, and premedicate with Tylenol (even though it may make the vaccine slightly less effective). The second vaccine is identical to the first. I have read recent reports that there are widespread shortages of the vaccine.

Chickenpox and shingles can affect you both by the virus attacking you and by an exuberant inflammatory and immune reaction. I would guess that you are at lower risk for viral complications (such as infection of the eye, brain or lungs) but at higher risk for symptoms due to your own system, such as high fever. In many cases, the body's response to infection can be as damaging as the infection itself.

DEAR DR. ROACH: Please discuss the problem of the thirst mechanism as it relates to the elderly. I'm 70 years old and in almost perfect physical health. I bicycle every day — 75 miles each week. Even with this enormous physical exercise, I am never thirsty all day and night. Also, I do not

perspire. I need to force myself to drink water. Why don't I feel thirsty? — M.U.
ANSWER: Thirst is a powerful motivation. In people with an intact thirst mechanism, the desire for water can be overpowering; it's one of the body's main ways of regulating salt and volume in the body. You are exactly right that as people age, the thirst mechanism becomes less powerful, and that tends to leave older people with a slightly higher amount of salt in the body compared with younger people. Remembering to drink water, especially on hot summer days, reduces the risk of dehydration.
However, people who drink continually may never trigger the thirst response. There are many social cues to drink, and people who are not losing fluid through exertion and sweat may never trigger a strong thirst response. Drinking too much is as dangerous as not drinking enough: If thirst is really impaired, you need to use other mechanisms to monitor fluid status.

Twin fires are second-largest in recorded California history

LAKEPORT, Calif. (AP) — Twin Northern California blazes fueled by dry vegetation and hot, windy weather grew Monday to become the second-largest wildfire in state history, becoming the norm as climate change makes the fire season longer and more severe.

The two fires burning a few miles apart and known as the Mendocino Complex have scorched 428 square miles since igniting July 27 about 100 miles north of San Francisco, the state's firefighting agency said.

The blazes are likely to surpass the largest wildfire on record in the nation's most populous state, which burned 440 square miles in Southern California in December. It killed two people, including a firefighter, and destroyed more than 1,000 buildings before being fully contained on Jan. 12.

Hotter weather attributed to climate change is drying out vegetation, creating more intense fires that spread quickly from rural areas to city subdivisions, climate and fire experts say. But they also blame cities and towns that are expanding housing into previously undeveloped areas.

More than 14,000 firefighters are battling over a dozen major blazes throughout California, state Department of Forestry and Fire Protection spokesman Scott McLean said. "I can remember a couple of years ago when we saw 10 to 12,000 firefighters in the states of California, Oregon and Washington and never the 14,000 we see now," he said.

Crews did make progress over the weekend against one of the two blazes in the Mendocino Complex with help from

water-dropping aircraft, Cal Fire operations chief Charlie Blankenheim said in a video on Facebook.

But the other one is growing after spreading into the Mendocino National Forest.

The complex of fires, which has burned 75 homes, has been less destructive to property than some of the other wildfires in the state because it is mostly raging in remote areas. But officials say the twin fires threaten 9,000 buildings and some new evacuations were ordered over the weekend as the flames spread.

Farther north, crews gained ground against a deadly blaze that has destroyed more than 1,000 homes in and around Redding. It was nearly halfway contained, Cal Fire said.

The wildfire about 225 miles north of San Francisco started more than two weeks ago by sparks from the steel wheel of a towed-trailer's flat tire. It killed two firefighters and four residents and displaced more than 38,000 people.

Officials began allowing some residents to return to their neighborhoods.

But tens of thousands of others were still evacuated.

The fires in Northern California have created such a haze of smoke in the Central Valley that Sacramento County health officials advised residents to avoid outdoor activities for the entire week.

Another blaze that erupted last week has damaged a historic Northern California resort in the Stanislaus National Forest. The nearly century-old Dardanelle Resort has sustained massive structural damage, though the details were unclear, the Sacramento Bee newspaper reported.

The rustic lodge 180 miles east of San Francisco is nestled in the Sierra Nevada mountains and offers cabin and motel rentals along with RV sites, a store and restaurant.

The U.S. Forest Service reported that the fire crossed a highway Sunday evening, forcing crews to retreat from the fire's edge.

The resort owners said in a Facebook post that "at this point it has been confirmed that there is 'massive structural damage.' We are heartbroken and struggling with this news."

Gates' credibility.

Gates, who also served in a senior role in Donald Trump's presidential campaign, is expected to face aggressive cross-examination once prosecutors are finished questioning him. Gates pleaded guilty to financial fraud and to lying to investigators as he negotiated the plea agreement earlier this year. He is awaiting sentencing.

The criminal case has nothing to do with either man's work for the Trump campaign and there's been no discussion during the trial about whether the Trump campaign coordinated

with Russia — the central question Mueller's team has tried to answer. But Trump has shown interest in the proceedings, tweeting support for Manafort and suggesting he had been treated worse than gangster Al Capone.

U.S. District Judge T.S. Ellis III, who repeatedly interrupted prosecutors last week as they tried to present evidence about Manafort's lavish life such as \$900,000 in expensive suits and a \$15,000 ostrich jacket, clashed again with prosecutor Greg Andres on Monday when Andres delved into the status and identities of the Eastern Europeans who made payments to Manafort.

Ellis said all that's relevant is that Manafort was paid and whether he

hid the income from the IRS.

"It doesn't matter whether these are good people, bad people, oligarchs, Mafia. ... You don't need to throw mud at these people," Ellis said.

Andres said he was entitled to show the jury why Manafort was getting tens of millions of dollars in payments.

"When we try to describe the work, Your Honor stops us and tell us to move on," he said.

Prosecutors say Manafort used those companies to stash millions of dollars from his Ukrainian consulting work, proceeds he omitted year-after-year from his income tax returns. Later, they say, when that income dwindled, Manafort launched

a different scheme, shoring up his struggling finances by using doctored documents to obtain millions more in bank loans.

All told, prosecutors allege that Manafort failed to report a

"significant percentage" of the more than \$60 million they say he received from Ukrainians. They aimed to show jurors how that money flowed from more than a dozen shell companies used to stash the income in Cyprus.

a nuclear-free world by helping the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons take effect. Japan, which hosts U.S. troops and is covered by the U.S. nuclear umbrella protecting it from attack, has not signed the treaty.

Japan should live up to the spirit of its pacifist constitution to lead the international community "toward dialogue and cooperation for a world without nuclear weapons," Matsui said.

About 50,000 people, including Hiroshima residents and representatives from 58 countries, including U.S. Ambassador William Hagerty, attended this year's ceremony.

Survivors, their relatives and other participants

marked the 8:15 a.m. blast with a minute of

silence. The anniversary comes

amid hopes to denuclearize North Korea after

President Donald Trump and North Korean leader Kim Jong Un made vague aspirational statements of denuclearizing the peninsula when they met in Singapore in June. "We in civil society fervently hope that the easing of tensions on the Korean Peninsula will proceed through peaceable dialogue," Matsui said.

Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe, who also was at the ceremony, said differences between the nuclear and non-nuclear states are widening. But he pledged to do more to bridge their gap. In order to gain cooperation from both sides, it is important for everyone to understand "the reality of the tragedy of nuclear attacks," he said, reiterating Japan's pledge to maintain its pacifist and non-nuclear principles.

Iran still can rely on China and Russia to keep its oil and banking sectors afloat. Speaking in a television interview, he also demanded compensation for decades of American "intervention" in the Islamic Republic.

Months of uncertainty surrounding the sanctions have already further hurt Iran's economy. The country's rial currency has tanked, and the downturn has sparked protests across the nation.

The "Trump Administration wants the world to believe it's concerned about the Iranian

people," Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif said in a statement posted to Twitter. But, he said, the reimposed sanctions would endanger "ordinary Iranians."

"US hypocrisy knows no bounds," he said.

U.S. officials insisted the American government stands with the people

of Iran and supports many of their complaints against their own government.

National Security Adviser John Bolton said Iran's leadership is on "very shaky ground," but he insisted economic pressure from the Trump administration is not an attempt at "regime change."

Secretary of State Mike

Pompeo said sanctions are an important pillar in U.S. policy toward Iran and will remain in place until the Iranian government radically changes course.

"They've got to behave like a normal country. That's the ask. It's pretty simple," said Pompeo, en route from a three-nation trip to Southeast Asia.

Transplant specialists are keeping a watchful eye.

"As long as the patient accepts the risk, I support this," said Dr. Josh Levitsky, a professor of organ transplantation at Northwestern

University who is not part of the team.

Getting an infected kidney may outweigh the burden of dialysis, which many patients find physically exhausting, said Dr. Matthew Cooper, a transplant surgeon at Georgetown University Hospital.

"People have to plan their entire lives around dialysis," said Cooper, who was not part of the research. "It is a rotten lifestyle."

It costs about \$88,000 a year to undergo dialysis, according to the United States Renal Data System. Merck has set a price of \$54,600 for a round of its

hepatitis C medication, Zepatier.

Most insurance companies still don't cover the drug for transplant patients, Reese said.

The American Society of Transplantation has said larger studies are needed before transplanting infected kidneys is

done routinely.

In 2016, Johns Hopkins University launched a similar experiment with 10 people. All of them are now cured. Researchers in the United Kingdom are already discussing the possibility to use organs with hepatitis C in patients who don't have the virus.

France takes leave following arrest

SAG HARBOR, N.Y. — NASCAR chairman and CEO Brian France announced Monday he was taking an indefinite leave of absence a day after his arrest in New York's Hamptons on charges of driving while intoxicated and criminal possession of oxycodone.

France had a blood-alcohol content that was more than twice the legal limit, smelled of booze and slurred his words after he was seen blowing through a stop sign in

Sag Harbor on Sunday, police said.

"I apologize to our fans, our industry and my family for the impact of my actions last night," France said in a statement Monday. "Effective immediately, I will be taking an indefinite leave of absence from my position to focus on my personal affairs."

France has been NASCAR's chairman and CEO since 2003. His uncle, Jim France, a vice chairman and executive vice president, will take over those roles on an interim basis.

France, 56, was arraigned at Sag Harbor Village Justice Court after spending the night in jail. He was released on his own recognizance and is due back in court Sept. 14.

His lawyer referred reporters to a NASCAR statement on the matter. The organization said it takes France's arrest "as a serious matter and will issue a statement after we have all of the facts."

France, 56, was pulled over and arrested at about 7:30 p.m. Sunday after police said they

saw his 2017 Lexus roll through a stop sign near the Sag Harbor waterfront.

His eyes were red and glassy and he struggled to keep his balance during field sobriety tests, police said. Tests showed France's blood-alcohol content was 0.18, police said. The legal limit in New York is 0.08.

Officers found five oxycodone pills during a subsequent search, police said.

DAVIE — The NFL's active career rushing leader may still be a starter at age 35.

Heat serves as reminder of final PGA in August

ST. LOUIS — The PGA Championship finally found its identity. It's the one major where players are allowed to practice in shorts.

They might not need to next year.

This is the last year for the PGA Championship to be the final major. It will move to the middle of May and be held next year at Bethpage Black on Long Island. Based on the sweat pouring down faces — and legs — and drenched shirts Monday at Bellerive, next year will be a welcome reprieve.

But it's not just the steamy heat of golf in August.

The PGA Championship, which celebrates its 100th edition this year, is easy to get overlooked because it falls at

the end of a busy schedule. Francesco Molinari, who opted for shorts on the first official day of practice, was hoisting the claret jug from his British Open victory just 15 days ago.

Justin Thomas could barely relish his first World Golf Championship title Sunday at Firestone when it was time to prepare for his title defense in the PGA Championship.

"I think it will be good for the vibe," Kevin Chappell said about the move to May. "It limits the golf courses we can play, which could be good or bad depending on your taste. The Open being the last one won't lose any pizzazz because it stands on its own. But this being the fourth major, and the third one in the U.S., it's easily overlooked."

Glasnow and the trouble with tall baseball players

ST. PETERSBURG — Tyler Glasnow, the pitcher who came over to the Rays from the Pirates last week along with outfield prospect Austin Meadows in the Chris Archer trade, features a 97 mph heater that makes hitters sweat and a 12-to-6 curveball that makes their knees buckle.

You would think that's all people would ever want to talk about.

But it's not. "Hey, tall guy, do you play basketball?"

He gets that a lot. "No, I play baseball," he says he tells them. "Or depending on where I'm at, I'll just be like, 'No, I do nothing,' if I'm not trying to get into the whole baseball thing."

As it turns out, there are some drawbacks to being 6 feet, 8 inches tall.

It's understandable why strangers would guess Glasnow plays basketball. Giants in baseball are surprisingly rare.

I searched several baseball databases to find out just how rare. The count of players who stood at least 6 feet, 8 inches: 45.

Forty-five. In all of baseball history. From Johnny Gee, born in 1915, to Glasnow, born in 1993.

Coincidentally, the Rays have rostered five of the 45: Mark Hendrickson (2004-06), Jeff Niemann (2008-12), Dane De La Rosa (2011-12), Adam Russell (2011) and Glasnow.

Success for baseball's giants has been hard to come by. Only four have posted more than 20 wins above replacement in their career. The best one? Randy Johnson. He had a pretty good career. But the 6-foot-10 Hall of Famer is the

exception.

It makes sense why hitters might struggle. They have a larger strike zone to cover. But why pitchers?

Their margin for error is incredibly small. If one part of their delivery is out of whack, they'll have trouble locating their pitches consistently.

Take it from Niemann, who at 6 feet 9, 285 pounds was one of the largest pitchers ever to toe the rubber.

"Tall pitchers are naturally going to have a longer path to release, and any flaw in that path is expanded," he said. "So that's what makes the basic idea of repeating quality pitches, pitching, more difficult for bigger guys because it's simply harder to get bigger, heavier pieces to work together."

As great as Glasnow's stuff is, he has struggled with his command since his callup in July 2016. While with the Pirates, he struck out 9.7 batters per nine innings but walked 5.7.

The Rays, though, like Glasnow's potential, and they have the man who can help — pitching coach Kyle Snyder, who also is 6-8.

"That was the first thing I thought of when I got traded over here,"

Glasnow, 24, said. "My agent texted me, a couple of people were like, 'Man, your pitching coach is 6-8, so that'll be great.' Even talking to him, I'm super-excited. He's one of the more knowledgeable pitching coaches I've ever had."

Snyder, who spent the previous three seasons as pitching coach for Triple-A Durham, had a chance to watch Glasnow when the Pirates' International League affiliate played the Bulls.

"I saw him in Indianapolis the past couple of years, in 2016 and 2017," Snyder said. "I was intrigued by him. He pitched really, really well against us. I guess to some degree I was intrigued by (the trade) because we're similar sizes, and there's a lot that comes with that and understanding, I suppose, somewhat of the platform it provides me is recognizing that it's not all that easy."

Piecing together a repeatable delivery will take time and patience, Snyder said.

"It takes reps at certain levels," he said. "It takes reps at the big-league level. It takes reps at the upper levels of the minor leagues, where (Glasnow has)

obviously dominated. I think it requires a little bit more patience of the individual, of the organization and of the staff, recognizing that there is more to kind of hone in and organize."

Within the past year, Glasnow has made a significant change to his delivery. When the Pirates optioned him to Triple-A Indianapolis in June 2017, he abandoned the windup that pitchers typically use when the bases are empty. He started working exclusively from the stretch.

"I think for me it simplifies movements," Glasnow said. "I'm a pretty big momentum pitcher. The windup was just extra movement that I didn't really need. I can still get that momentum in the stretch."


The sample size is small, but the results are trending in the right direction, even if there's room for improvement. In 59 innings this season, Glasnow is walking 5.3 batters per nine innings, down from 6.4 last season. In his Rays debut Wednesday, against the Angels at Tropicana Field, he struck out five and walked one in three innings.

For now, Glasnow plans on continuing to work exclusively from the stretch.

"He knows there's some things, some consistency that will always be an issue for a 6-foot-8 pitcher," manager Kevin Cash said. "If this simplifies something, we're good with it. If he wants to go back to the windup, we're fine with that, too."

"We just want to get him to where he's staying in one lane, keeping the ball over the plate, giving himself the chance to get some early swings, and control the count."

TMZ first reported the arrest.

France is a third-generation leader of NASCAR. His late grandfather, Bill France Sr., founded the company in 1948.

He's introduced a play-off system, overhauled the design of its cars, and pushed for diversity within the circuit's predominantly white, male ranks.

In recent years, he's been dealing with plunging attendance and TV ratings and departing sponsors, attributing the down turn to the challenge

of connecting with a new, younger generation of fans.

France last month characterized as "rumors" reports that his family was looking into selling its racing properties.

"The France family is locked and loaded in its dedication to NASCAR," France told SiriusXM NASCAR Radio. "We're focused on ruling and managing NASCAR. There's nothing to report on that. Rumors are always interesting, but they're seldom right."

France was involved in a 2006 incident in Daytona Beach, Florida, when a police report stated he crashed his Lexus into a tree after entering a

restaurant parking lot.

France later told an officer called to his home that he was drinking a soda and "bumped into something."

But a witness called 911 and gave police a statement that claimed she saw France driving at a "very reckless speed," and claimed France's car hit the tree after hitting a parked car.

She said she also watched as France "fell over his own feet" as he got out of his car.

Her statement was not attached to the police report, and the Daytona Beach police chief later investigated whether France was given special treatment by authorities.

Add the struggles together, and you get a UF defense that allowed 27.3 points per game (the program's worst since 1946) and gave up 5.7 yards per play (the program's worst since at least World War II).

"Sometimes I look at game film — this is not the Gator football team that I know, personally, that I've seen in the past," linebacker Kylan Johnson said.

The Gators have several reasons to believe their defense will return to historic norms rather than reach another historic low, starting with personnel: Almost everyone is back.

Aside from draft picks Taven Bryan (Jaguars) and Duke Dawson (Patriots), the Gators return every defensive starter, including their top four tacklers and six of the seven players with at least one interception.

"Everybody played last year," defensive back Chauncey Gardner-Johnson said. "We know

what's expected. We've been in big games. We've been in small games. We've just got to take advantage of it."

It helps that the man hired to help them take advantage of that experience (defensive coordinator Todd Grantham) has a recent history of turnarounds, which is why UF awarded him a contract worth \$1.39 million this season. Grantham's only defense at Mississippi State ranked No. 26 nationally in scoring at 20.9 points per game — a strong improvement from the 31.8 points the Bulldogs allowed the year before his arrival.

"I think we have excellent defensive coaches that are going to really work to put those guys in a position to be successful," first-year coach Dan Mullen said. "The great thing I think with Todd and the coaches we have is the flexibility they have to adapt to the players that we're going to put out there on the field."

Perhaps the biggest reasons the Gators can be optimistic about a defensive rebound

have nothing to do with personnel, scheme or the new strength program and everything to do with circumstances. The freefall began against Georgia, when UF faced one of the top two teams in the country, amidst rampant speculation that McElwain was on his way out. The Gators gave up 21 points in the first 7:30 and didn't seem to recover for weeks.

"It happened so fast," Jefferson said. "Then they're looking to me as a leader. I kind of didn't know what to do myself. I was kind of stuck. I never want to feel like that again."

Jefferson said he and his teammates have decided to do something about. The pent-up frustration and disappointment mounted until something clicked during a post-spring workout. Jefferson said the defense's chemistry changed immediately.

"Ever since that day, it's been a different vibe," Jefferson said.

UF can only hope that means different results, too.

"Didn't make a whole lot of sense, when we're trying to move forward, to have the ex-girlfriend over at the house every day," Kiffin said.

With that, welcome to a season of high expectations for Kiffin and the Owls.

FAU is the preseason favorite to win another C-USA title and might have a chance to reach the AP Top 25 for the first time in program history this fall. It brings back a running back in Devin Singletary who led the nation with 32 rushing touchdowns a season ago. School officials have even orchestrated a Heisman Trophy campaign for Singletary, replete with a billboard over an interstate not far from campus.

Kiffin signed off on the Heisman promotion, though he remains leery of what he calls "rat poison" — a phrase he tweeted often last season when the Owls shook off a 1-3 start and finished the year on a 10-game winning streak. He borrowed the phrase from Alabama coach Nick Saban, under whom he

worked for three years before coming to FAU.

His definition of rat poison?

"Listening to things that are being said about how good you're going to be versus what you're really doing," Kiffin said. "You buy into that and you forget what got you there. I didn't invent the phrase. I think my mentor invented the phrase. I'm just copying from the best."

He can't stop the talk from happening on the outside. He sure can limit it inside the Owls' locker room.

And his players understand why the banner is gone.

"The thing is, our coaches do so much for us and they hold us to a certain pinnacle and you have to maintain that," receiver Deandre McNeal said. "You're either standing still or you're moving forward."

It's not just the practice field where the no-looking-back rule applies. There are still banners from FAU's bowl wins under Howard Schnellenberger in 2007 and 2008 that hang in the lobby of the athletic department's primary building on campus, along with some trophies

and team photos.

There's nothing like that from the 2017 season out there.

"It is last year," Singletary said. "This year is a new year. We've definitely got to focus on this year and make it happen. It was kind of easy to reset your mind. That's in the past. We've got to focus on the now."

The opener might make that focus come easily.

FAU starts with one of the toughest Week 1 tests out there, when it travels to Oklahoma to meet a Sooners team that is expected to start the season near the top of the national rankings and figures to be a contender to make the College Football Playoff.

"Everybody still wants to talk about last year, wants to talk about beating Oklahoma," Kiffin said. "Well, let's remember, I don't think the program's ever beaten a Power Five team. So to start sitting here talking about, 'Oh, you should beat Oklahoma, a top-five team.' Well, we're a long way from that."

And gazing at a 2017 banner won't help any new ones get put up in 2018.

Melanie Margalis already has won an Olympic gold medal. Robert Finke could be in contention for one in two years.

Both times set personal bests for Finke.

He also became the 18-under national champion in the 800 and 1,500 by placing the highest among his age group in both events.

Finke will be a freshman at Florida this fall.

UNC: 13 players suspended for selling school-issued shoes

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. — Less than a year after emerging from a long run of NCAA issues, North Carolina is dealing with rule violations again — this time for football players selling team-issued shoes.


The school announced Monday that 13 players will miss games serving suspensions for the secondary NCAA violations, which will leave the Tar Heels shorthanded during much of the season's opening month. While secondary violations are generally considered less severe, the penalties in this case will result in several players being forced to sit out at least a third of the regular-season schedule.

In all, nine players will miss four games, two will sit two games and two others will miss one contest. The NCAA approved a school request to delay two suspensions affecting multiple players at one position, while the other 11 suspensions begin with the Sept. 1 opener at California.

The Tar Heels want to put move on quickly from this latest embarrassment.

"The guys that are suspended, they're very remorseful," coach Larry Fedora said during a news conference Monday. "They don't want to let their teammates down and they feel like they did in this situation. But nobody's pointing fingers on this football team. ... We're beyond that point now. It's already happened. It is what it is, so they're all looking forward and moving forward."

The suspensions have had at least one major impact already.

With sophomore quarterback Chazz Surratt among the players suspended four games, the team's most-watched preseason position battle has come to a swift end with Fedora saying junior Nathan Elliott will start against Cal.

The players facing four-game suspensions are: Surratt; defensive ends Malik Carney, Tomon Fox and Tyrone Hopper; offensive linemen Brian Anderson, Quiron Johnson and Jordan Tucker; receiver Beau Corrales and linebacker Malik Robinson.

Defensive backs Greg Ross and Tre Shaw must sit two games, while quarterback Jack Davidson and offensive lineman Jonah Melton will each miss one.

Carney was the only suspended player to talk with reporters Monday, saying he has apologized to the team.

"In the moment like that, you're not really thinking about the consequences," Carney said when asked if he knew selling his pair of shoes was improper. "Like as a kid, when your mom tells you 'Don't touch the iron because it's hot,' you don't really think that it's hot. You just do it. It's something you don't

really think about in the moment. And I made a wrong decision."

UNC reported the violations after learning of the special-edition Nike shoes being sold to at least one retailer in an email from a member of the public in January, according to documents released after a public-records request from The Associated Press. That email contained a social media advertisement from a retailer seeking \$3,500 for the shoes.

According to case documents released by the school, 15 players ultimately sold shoes either to a retailer or to a teammate, with three of those purchases for as much as \$2,500. Two other players sold shoes for \$200 or less.

One player — who isn't named in the documents — purchased shoes from seven teammates for a total of \$6,150.

Athletics director Bubba Cunningham said school officials completed their early investigation within four days. Players refunded transactions and Cunningham said all but about nine pairs of shoes were recovered.

One of the retailers contacted by the school said he had previously purchased shoes from

athletes at Michigan, California and Marquette, according to the case documents.

"Absolutely we turned everything in back in January and February, got a final adjudication as secondary violations from the NCAA," Cunningham said, "so this case is closed and as soon as the suspensions are served, that will be the end of it."

With three defensive ends among the list, UNC sought — and received — approval from the NCAA to stagger some of the suspensions at the position, which can be allowed for concerns over health and safety during a game.

Carney will miss games starting Week 2 against East Carolina, UCF and Pittsburgh. He'll return to play at Miami, then sit again at home against Virginia Tech on Oct. 13.

Fox won't sit out until the Sept. 27 game against Miami. He'll return against Virginia Tech, then sit again against Syracuse, Virginia and Georgia Tech on Nov. 3.

The shoe-sale penalties come less than a year after UNC had finally emerged from its multi-year academic case, which had the school facing five top-level charges that included lack of institutional control. That case reached a no-penalty conclusion in October.

And that case was an offshoot of an investigation into the football program in 2010 for improper benefits and academic misconduct. That one ended when the NCAA issued sanctions in March 2012 — months before Fedora's first game here — that included a one-year postseason ban and scholarship reductions.

"I come out here and compete every day," he said. "Not just with Drake, but with every guy, my position. I think we all push and help each other. With me, whatever my coaches want me to do this year, I'm going to do it."

Drake could yet prove difficult to dislodge from the No. 1 job. He ranked sixth in the NFL last year with an average of 4.8 yards per carry, topping 100 yards in consecutive games after he became the starter in Week 13.

"I don't think anybody really cares about where they are on the depth chart before preseason even starts," Drake said. "We've got to go out

there and earn our spots."

Gore said Drake is worthy friendly competition.

"Kenyan is a very talented guy," Gore said. He's smart; he can do everything on the field. I think that me and him can really help this team be successful this year."

That would be a change. The Dolphins went 6-10 last season, when they ranked 28th in

both points and rushing.

They expect to have a more potent offense this year with an upgraded line, the return of Ryan Tannehill and their new running back, who's not new to the NFL at all.

Gore has started every game since 2012. Last year he averaged a career-worst 3.7 yards per carry for the Indianapolis Colts, but they provided little room to run, and he did
