FAA notes radio issue in Sebring plane crash

SEBRING — A report from the FAA shows a radio communication issue may be a factor in a runway collision last month at Sebring Regional Airport.

The preliminary FAA report on the Sept. 29 runway crash shows that around 12:40 p.m., a Diamond Aircraft Industries, Inc. (Diamond) DA20-C1, N397JA, owned and

operated by Aamro Aviation Corporation and a privately owned and operated Piper PA28R-180, N3907T, collided at the Sebring Regional Airport.

There were no injuries to the flight instructor aboard the Diamond or the private pilot and passenger aboard the Piper, while the student pilot aboard the Diamond sustained a minor injury. Both airplanes were substantially damaged, the report states.

The Diamond and Piper

airplanes were being operated under the provisions of Title 14 Code of Federal Regulations Part 91 as an instructional flight, and a personal flight, respectively.

Visual meteorological conditions prevailed at the time and neither flight had filed a flight plan.

The Diamond originated from Sebring Regional Airport about 5 minutes earlier, while the Piper originated from the Peter O'Knight Airport, Tampa.

The flight instructor of the Diamond reported that he and the student pilot were practicing touch and go landings on runway 14 at the Sebring Airport, with the wind from the east.

During the second traffic pattern while on the upwind leg of the airport traffic pattern, he noticed a Piper arriving from the west, heading east, the report shows. As the student pilot turned

Amendment 10

Title
State and Local Government Structure and Operation

Placed By
Constitution Revision Commission

Amending
Amends Article III, Section 3; Amends Article IV, Sections 4 and 11; Amends Article VIII, Sections 1 and 6

Ballot Summary
"Requires legislature to retain department of veterans' affairs. Ensures election of sheriffs, property appraisers, supervisors of elections, tax collectors, and clerks of court in all counties; removes county charters' ability to abolish, change term, transfer duties, or eliminate election of these offices. Changes annual legislative session commencement date in even-numbered years from March to January; removes legislature's authorization to fix another date. Creates office of domestic security and counterterrorism within department of law enforcement."

Note
This amendment is a "bundled" amendment, which means that a single "Yes" or "No" vote applies to all components of the amendment. Voters cannot separate the components of the amendment.

A Yes Vote Means
Piece 1: The Legislature will convene its regular session in January of every even-numbered year.

Piece 2: A new Office of Domestic Security and Counterterrorism would be created within the Florida Department of Law Enforcement.

Piece 3: The Legislature would be required (instead of authorized) to establish a Department of Veterans' Affairs.

Piece 4: Every county would be required to elect their sheriffs, property appraisers, supervisors of elections, tax collectors, and clerks of court, and could not abolish or alter the duties of these officials.

A No Vote Means
Piece 1: The dates on which the Legislature convenes its regular session would be left up to the Legislature in even-numbered years.

Piece 2: There would be no constitutional requirement for an Office of Domestic Security and Counterterrorism.

Piece 3: The Legislature would be authorized (instead of required) to establish a Department of Veterans' Affairs.

Piece 4: The process through which counties choose their sheriffs, property appraisers, supervisors of elections, tax collectors, and clerks of court would remain unchanged.

The Arguments

Pros
Piece 1: Legislators are prohibited from raising money for elections during the official dates of Legislative Session, and in election years, this date change would allow for campaigns to begin several months earlier. Additionally, many legislators have children, and commencing the regular session in January provides opportunity for legislators to

Sebring City Council addresses sign regulations

SEBRING — The Sebring City Council met Tuesday to discuss a downtown beautification project, the Christmas parade, sign ordinances and changes to the city's comprehensive plan.

The City Council approved the Community Redevelopment Agency's (CRA) plans to improve the appearance of the downtown area, which included pressure washing sidewalks and curbs and

updating Circle Park. The CRA also plans to widen the sidewalks on West Center Avenue to make a connection between the downtown and the waterfront. In the near future, the CRA plans to address the waterfront area, highlighting an important feature of the city.

Circle Park will be updated after the Carousel of Lights, beginning in the new year.

The council unanimously approved the Christmas parade from

7-9 p.m. Friday, Dec. 7. Ian Belanger, from the Jaycees, presented the council with information about the parade. "The biggest change this year is the new website at www.sebringchristmasparade.com."

City Council President Charlie Lowrance said, "We appreciate you doing this every year."

Ordinance amended

The City Council unanimously approved Ordinance 1429 that amended elements of Sebring's Comprehensive Plan based on the Ten-Year Water Supply Facilities Work Plan.

In 2005, Florida legislation made major changes to laws regarding land use and water-supply planning. These laws were to ensure intergovernmental connection with regional water supply authorities. In addition, the laws were designed to make sure that the city's future plans were based upon adequate water supplies.

Jennifer Codo-Salisbury, deputy director with the Central Florida Regional Planning Council, presented the

ordinance to the council and was there to answer questions from the public regarding the ordinance. There were no public comments, and the ordinance was approved.


Codo-Salisbury also presented Ordinance 1430, which amended Sebring's Comprehensive Plan to provide consistency with the Heartland Regional Transportation Planning Organization (HRTPO).

The HRTPO, a six-county transportation planning organization, was formed in April 2015 and covers the following counties: Highlands, DeSoto, Glades, Hendry, and Okeechobee. It also covers the cities of Avon Park and Sebring. The amendment will provide for coordination with HRTPO.

New sign laws

After holding more than 30 meetings regarding the new sign laws, the council finally passed both sign ordinances — Ordinance 1426 that changed regulations for the city's signs and Ordinance 1427 that provided sign regulations for the CRA district, historic district and locally-designated historic properties.

Although time was

spent trying to write new sign regulations to help the appearance of the city, very few business owners came to offer input. Attorney Ross Macbeth did express his concerns over sign regulations that would adversely affect his business.

Mayor John Shoop said, "We as a council need to keep our eyes open

and make changes to the ordinance as we see fit. We need to work with people until we get this ironed out. This is a huge change for people."

Lenard Carlisle agreed with Shoop. "The ordinance can always be brought back, and we can change it if we want," he said.

The council responded to Macbeth's concerns

regarding the signs. The members amended the ordinance to address his problems with the regulations, except for his concern over the issue of requiring changes to existing signs. This will be addressed at the next city Council meeting.

Both sign ordinances were approved, but Lowrance abstained, because he owns an off-premise sign. When it came time for Council Member Mark Stewart to vote on Ordinance 1426, which regulates signs outside the historic district, he said, "Yes, Hallelujah!" Stewart was overjoyed that the ordinance they had been working to pass for over a year had finally been approved.

Area improvements

After the sign ordinance was passed, Reverend Dr. Cleveland Williams addressed the council

and told them about the work that he and his daughter had completed to help make the Washington Heights area look better. The father-and-daughter duo mow unattended lawns in this neighborhood and have transformed 55 overgrown lots.

Williams presented the council with pictures of the lots they had cleared. He said, "We have done the whole operation out of pocket. We see a marked improvement in making Sebring beautiful." Williams requested help from the council with his project. He told the council that the city owned some of the lots that were overgrown.

Lowrance thanked Williams for the work he had done. In addition, he promised to look into the issue of city lots that required maintenance.

onto the crosswind and downwind legs of the airport traffic pattern, they lost sight of the Piper, and at that point he did not know if the Piper was transitioning the area or intended to enter the airport traffic pattern.

The student pilot announced the Diamond's position on every leg of the airport traffic pattern, but neither pilot heard the pilot of the Piper acknowledge, according to the report.

The Diamond turned onto the base and final legs of the airport traffic pattern and although the flight instructor was looking for the Piper, he did not see it. After landing on runway 14, the Diamond was configured for takeoff, and just as the

student pilot advanced the throttle to full, the tail was contacted by the Piper's left wing, the report states.

After the accident, the examination of the Diamond revealed the transceiver was set to 122.7 MHz (published CTAF — common traffic

advisory frequency); however, the transceiver of the Piper was set to 122.725 MHz, the report states.

Operational testing of the transceiver (two-way radio) in the Diamond revealed the transmissions were heard on a portable VHF transceiver,

while transmissions from the Piper on the as-found frequency could not be heard; however, after switching to the CTAF frequency, the transmissions were heard.

After further review of the incident, the FAA will issue a final report with a probable cause and findings.

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

Vote 'no' on Amendments 6-10

Florida's Constitution Revision Commission took over a year to formally propose eight amendments for this year's ballot. In reality, the eight were a mash-up of supposedly similar items. Similar, that is, if you consider offshore oil drilling and indoor vaping to be vaguely in the same category.

We don't. And, in the case of one grab-bag amendment proposal, neither did the state Supreme Court. The court dropped an education-related amendment because the mashup — known as bundling — was so egregious. Three more still may be excluded.

Bundling is a maneuver that combines a number of proposals under one heading. The problem is that voters are faced with supporting all constitutional provisions in the grab-bag, including those they don't particularly like, because they strongly support one. That's plain wrong. And it's no way to organize a Constitution, the state's bedrock governing document.

Today, we will address four amendments. All were bundled. All involve measures that either could be handled more appropriately through the legislative process in the future, or are already state law.

All deserve a "no," on principle if nothing else. Amendment 6 would expand and place victims' rights (currently in law) into the Constitution. It also would raise the mandatory age for judges to retire from 70 to 75. It also would prevent state courts from deferring to administrative rules and interpretation of law.

Amendment 7 would require employers to provide death benefits to spouses of first responders and active military personnel killed while on duty. It also would require nine of 12 votes on public university governing boards for student fee increases. It also would place the existing structure of the state college system in the Constitution.

Amendment 8 was tossed out by the Supreme Court. Amendment 9 would prohibit offshore oil and gas drilling in state waters. It also would prohibit vaping in indoor workplaces.

Amendment 10 would require the Legislature to convene in January of every even-numbered year. It also would create a new Office of Domestic Security and Terrorism within the Department of Law Enforcement. It also would require the state to have an Office of Veterans Affairs. It also would require each county to elect (not appoint) sheriffs, property appraisers, elections supervisors, tax collectors and court clerks.

Again, for Amendment 6, victims and their families already have rights by law. This provision may sound attractive to many, but it is unnecessary, vague and potentially places cumbersome burdens on the court system. As the advocacy group TaxWatch saw it, this is "a solution in search of a problem."

As for Amendment 7, it's a mishmash of bundling with an apple-pie lead-in. The same applies to vaping/oil drilling in Amendment 9.

Counter-terrorism and veterans affairs in Amendment 10? Already in law, for the most part. And the Legislature has the power to set its own dates; there's no need for a constitutional amendment. And then, our charter counties already elect constitutional officers (sheriff, etc.).

The Constitution deserves respect as a document. Chocking it with amendments that could otherwise be addressed through the legislative process — and in certain instances, already are — cheapens bedrock concepts of the Constitution and the legislative process.

The Sun recommends a "no" vote on Constitutional Amendments 6, 7, 9 and 10.



Vote 'yes' on Amendment 1

In your Another View article on Oct. 18, 2018 you forgot to mention that Highlands County is listed as a fiscally-constrained county and will not be hurt one bit if Amendment 1 passes. Read below.

Fiscally-constrained counties
As of 2018, the state constitution reserves the power to tax a property's value for local governments — such as counties, cities, school districts, and certain special districts — not the state government.[23] Therefore, Amendment 1 of 2018 would impact the revenue of local governments, as these governments tax the value of properties and spend the revenue.

In Florida, counties that are considered fiscally-constrained counties — defined as rural counties and counties where a one mill levy would raise no more than \$5 million annually — receive funds from the state government to offset decreases in revenue caused by certain homestead exemptions. House Bill 7107 (HB 7107), passed in 2017, would require the state legislature to provide funds to fiscally-constrained counties to offset decreases in property taxes caused by the passage of Amendment 1 of 2018. [24] State fiscal analysis estimate that fiscally-constrained counties would have revenue losses around \$10.5 million annually.[23]

Highlands County is a fiscally-constrained county.

I say lower your taxes any way you can. The more money you give the County Commission, the more they will spend. Remember Phase 3 of the Sebring Parkway.

Piece 2: A constitutional requirement for an Office of Domestic Security and Counterterrorism reflects a serious, long-term commitment to domestic security and to keeping Florida residents and visitors less vulnerable to domestic or international threats.

Piece 3: A constitutional requirement for a Department of Veterans' Affairs reflects a serious, long-term commitment to meeting the needs of veterans.

Piece 4: The voters will always have the right to vote for their independent constitutional county officers and hold them accountable at election time.

Cons

Piece 1: January-February sessions are too early for economic forecasts needed to properly shape the state budget.

Pieces 2 & 3: Most of what would be gained from including the Department of Veterans' Affairs and the FDLE Office of Domestic Security and Counterterrorism in the constitution already exists in Florida law.

Piece 4: The ballot measure would eliminate the constitutional right of local citizens to govern their sheriff, tax collector, property appraiser, supervisor of elections, and the management of county finances.

General: The "bundling" of separate and unrelated issues into a single amendment unconstitutionally prevents voters from making a simple "yes" or "no" decision on

each issue.

Analysis

Piece 1: The constitution prescribes the dates on which the Legislature convenes its 60-day regular session. In odd-numbered years, the regular session commences on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in March. In even-numbered years, the regular session commences on the on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in March, unless a different date has been established by law. Most recently, the 2016 Legislature set Jan. 9, 2018, as the date to convene the 2018 regular session. That law establishing this date applies only to the 2018 regular session, but if the Amendment does not pass, the Legislature may still set the date of Regular Session in even-numbered years as they see fit in the future.

The economy of the Tallahassee area depends heavily on legislature-related commerce. Tallahassee hotel and restaurant owners consider the early legislative session as a "mixed bag." Although the early session stimulates business activity earlier in the new year, there is a corresponding reduction in commerce during the period the Legislature would have normally met.

Overall, by not switching the dates of the regular session every other year, the certainty and predictability helps business owners better plan their business activities.

Piece 2: FDLE is designated in Florida law as the lead agency to coordinate counterterrorism efforts, working

with myriad state, local and federal agencies involved in the preparation against, or response to, acts of terrorism. FDLE's Executive Director (or designee) serves as the Chief of Domestic Security. FDLE operates a Regional Domestic Security Task Force (RDSTF) in each of its seven regional operations centers. The ballot measure, if approved, would establish in the constitution FDLE's responsibility as the lead counterterrorism and domestic security. FDLE's specific duties and responsibilities would be established in Florida law by the Legislature.

Piece 3: Section 20.37, Florida Statutes, establishes Florida Department of Veterans Affairs (FDVA) and designates the Governor and Cabinet as the head of FDVA. Section 20.37, Florida Statutes, also provides that the executive director shall be appointed by the Governor with the approval of three members of the Cabinet and subject to confirmation by the Senate. Responsibilities and duties of FDVA are provided in Chapter 292, Florida Statutes. The ballot measure amends the constitution to "require" rather than "authorize" the Legislature to provide for the FDVA and prescribe its duties by general law.

Piece 4: The Florida Constitution creates five specific county officers: sheriff, tax collector, property appraiser, supervisor of elections, and clerk of the circuit court. Each of these officers are elected separately by the voters of the county for four-year terms, and their duties are prescribed in Florida law. The Florida

Constitution permits charter counties (consistent with their charter) to abolish one or all of these constitutional offices; transfer the powers to another department of the county government; or provide for a different manner of selecting any of these officers.

Eight charter counties (Brevard, Broward, Clay, Duval, Miami-Dade, Orange, Osceola, and Volusia) have changed the manner of selection of at least one of the five constitutional officers or restructured or abolished at least one of the five constitutional offices and transferred their duties to another county office. The ballot measure, if approved, would require these eight charter counties to amend their charters to: (1) reflect that all constitutionally prescribed county officers (sheriff, tax collector, property appraiser, supervisor of elections, and clerk of circuit court) be elected by the voters of that county, as was originally prescribed before the authorization of county charters; and (2) prohibit counties from abolishing, transferring the duties of, or establishing any alternate method of selection for these county constitutional officers. If adopted, the ballot measure would have no impact on non-charter counties or those charter counties that retained the constitutional offices without any changes to its selection or authority.

Fiscal Impact

The constitutional requirements to change the date on which the Legislature convenes in even-numbered years from March to January, and to establish an Office of Domestic Security and

Counterterrorism and a Department of Veterans' Affairs, are not expected to have any significant fiscal impact. The impact of requiring constitutional officers to be elected will be confined to the charter counties who have altered their constitutional officers. The proposal would require the affected counties to expend funds to (a) provide for election of appointed constitutional officers, and (b) reorganize their governments to accommodate the officer's office and responsibilities. The effect will be heavily dependent on the reorganization efforts at the county level and could vary greatly by county. The fiscal impact is indeterminate.

Conclusion

The bundling of two or more separate issues into a single ballot measure, although potentially confusing to voters, has been upheld by the Florida Supreme Court. This bundling has the potential to require voters to accept constitutional changes they may not like in order to get constitutional changes they do like.

Everything that could be achieved by establishing an Office of Domestic Security and Counterterrorism and a Department of Veterans' Affairs in the constitution

can be achieved by action of the Legislature, most of which already has been established. The Legislature currently has authority in the constitution to establish early dates for the regular legislative session. The contents of the Florida Constitution should be limited to matters that are essential or fundamental. Matters that are ordinarily handled through the legislative process, such as enumerating the specific duties of state agencies, should be excluded from the Constitution.

Amendment 10 restores the rights of voters to elect their constitutional officers and prohibits a county charter from including provisions that would permit the selection of constitutional officers in a manner other than by election. TaxWatch believes this provision will restore power to the voters and make the offices of sheriff, tax collector, property appraiser, supervisor of elections, and clerk of the court more accountable and their actions more transparent.

TaxWatch believes that the positive benefits associated with restoring the rights of voters to elect their constitutional officers far outweighs other considerations.

New York plays Atlanta in clash of last-place teams

ATLANTA — Pat Shurmur isn’t about to express sympathy for the Atlanta Falcons’ ever-growing list of key players on injured reserve. The New York Giants’ coach has his own problems. The Giants (1-5) will try to end their three-game losing streak when they face the Falcons (2-4) in tonight’s matchup of last-place teams. Atlanta snapped its own three-game skid with last week’s win over Tampa Bay. The Falcons will lean

on Tevin Coleman as their new starting running back after placing Devonta Freeman on IR this week with a groin injury. Freeman already missed three games with a bruised knee and last week’s game with the groin injury, so it was easy for Shurmur to study Falcons film with Coleman and rookie Ito Smith sharing all the snaps at running back. “I’ve always been impressed with the way they move the ball and the way they score points,” Shurmur said. “They find a way to score points no matter who is running the ball.”

The Giants’ offensive woes continued in a 34-13 loss to the Eagles to extend their losing streak. Freeman joins offensive guard Andy Levitre as offensive starters on IR. Overall, the Falcons have lost five starters to IR, including safeties Keanu Neal and Ricardo Allen and linebacker Deion Jones. Also, top defensive tackle Grady Jarrett has missed two straight games with an ankle injury. The Falcons hope Freeman and Allen can return this season, but each must miss at least eight games. Freeman wouldn’t be eligible to return until

the next-to-last game of the regular season. “It’s heartbreaking to see my guy go down,” said Coleman of Freeman. Coleman said he has to fill the void so defenses can’t focus on Matt Ryan and Atlanta’s passing game. “We definitely need to stay with the run just to open up the pass and keep defenses honest,” he said. Here are some things to know about the Giants-Falcons matchup of last-place teams: Giants rookie halfback Saquon Barkley had a

Surprising benefits of dandelion weeds

Dandelion greens might be considered a weed, but this potent plant contains an impressive arsenal of nutritious compounds that you may want to your diet. I'm referring to dandelions as in *Taraxacum officinale*.

This notoriously bitter weed is packed with protein, minerals, and more vitamin C than spinach. The entire plant is actually edible, though I've never eaten the whole thing, just the leaves. Some people literally harvest the yellow flowers before they open and fry them up in a pan with garlic, butter and other seasonings.

Dandelion is very easy to harvest, remember it's kind of like a weed, it grows everywhere! And interestingly, this inexpensive plant is also sold at health food stores, especially in the produce section where it's usually near the collard greens and kale. Here are 7 reasons to take dandelion:

Aids the digestive system

The plant is a mild diuretic, making you urinate more than normal. It can improve the functioning of the pancreas, stomach, kidneys, and spleen without depleting your body's potassium stores. Diuretics are known to reduce blood pressure. With dandelions, the two compounds that work in this capacity are chicoric and chlorogenic acid.

Good source of antioxidants

You can thank the dandelion's bitter taste for its antioxidant properties which clean your blood. If you can get used to more bitter foods (and less sugary ones), then your detox pathways that operate in your liver will thank you with better health.

Can aid weight loss

Though the facts are still forthcoming, there is evidence today that consuming dandelions can support weight loss by improving your fat-burning rate and metabolism, and simultaneously reducing fat absorption. It's due to the presence of chlorogenic acid—a compound also found in coffee.

Helps fight inflammation

Could eating flowers help you with arthritis? Probably not, but it's fun to think that way. I like herbal remedies that reduce pro-inflammatory cytokines like IL-6 and TNF alpha. Dandelion does this very thing, helping you reduce risk for heart attack, cancer and diabetes.

Can help control blood sugar

Two biologically active phytochemicals in dandelions (specifically, the chicoric and chlorogenic acid) show evidence of controlling blood sugar by regulating your pancreas's insulin production.

Useful as a skin treatment

Applying a leaf and flower extract immediately before or after intense sun exposure seems to reduce overall skin damage. Dandelion-containing creams or poultices reduce skin irritation and may help with acne.

Fresh dandelion greens can be used in fresh salads, sandwiches, smoothies, and teas. If they're too bitter, make a 50-50 mix of dandelions with a subtler green like spinach or Swiss chard.

You could make a tea, or buy a commercially prepared teabag. You could also sauté the dandelion greens with some sweet fruits like pineapple. While dandelions are considered a safe plant for most people, there are a few reported incidences of adverse reactions. People with ragweed allergies are sensitive to dandelions, so please avoid if that's the case.

AARP study shows benefits of travel

AARP Travel released the results of its latest study, examining the health and wellness benefits of leisure travel. According to the survey, those who travel reported better emotional and physical health and improved relationships and productivity at work. Additionally, overall well-being is one of the biggest advantages of travel, with the benefits starting during the initial travel planning phase and extending well beyond the trip. The longest lasting travel benefit reported is improved relationships with

loved ones — lasting six weeks on average.

The study shows four out of five boomers experience at least one health benefit during a trip and 73 percent notice at least one health benefit post-trip. By far, boomers get the most health benefits during the trip (56 percent). One in five indicate they experience health benefits before, during, and after the trip equally. Millennials experience a far bigger benefit from planning a trip (23 percent) than boomers (6 percent).

Teens and young adults who use Juul brand e-cigarettes are failing to recognize the product's addictive potential, despite using it more often than their peers who smoke conventional cigarettes, according to a new study by researchers at the Stanford University School of Medicine.

The findings, from an ongoing Stanford project addressing the use and perceptions of tobacco products by California youth, were published Oct. 19 in JAMA Network Open.

"I was surprised and concerned that so many youths were using Juul more frequently than other products," said the study's senior author, Bonnie Halpern-Felsher, PhD, professor of pediatrics. "We need to help them understand the risks of addiction. This is not a combustible cigarette, but it still contains an enormous amount of nicotine — at least as much as a pack of cigarettes."

The data show a worrisome disconnect between teens' perceptions of their Juul use and actual addiction, the researchers said. "We ask, 'Do you feel addicted?' And they say no, but a series of questions on a validated scale for assessing loss of autonomy over nicotine show that they're dependent," said the study's lead author, Karma McKelvey, PhD, a postdoctoral scholar.

More nicotine

Juul e-cigarettes first went on sale in 2015 and now account for two-thirds of the U.S. e-cigarette market. They deliver more nicotine than competing brands of e-cigarettes, and produce a throat hit that is more comparable to conventional cigarettes than their predecessors. Juul's design, using flavored nicotine-containing liquids inhaled from colorful pods that resemble USB flash drives, also appeal to the youth market.

The Stanford researchers decided to ask about Juul as part of a tobacco-use study they have been conducting in 10 California high schools. Participants answered questions about whether they had ever heard of Juul; if and how often they used conventional cigarettes, Juul or other types of e-cigarettes; their use of flavored e-cigarette products; their perceptions of the social acceptability of the various products; and their perceptions of the products' risks and benefits. Participants who used any form of e-cigarette also completed a standardized questionnaire to assess their degree of nicotine dependence.

About half of the participants

Healthy diet shows better outcomes in colorectal cancer

Patients who changed diet after diagnosis also showed improvement

Colorectal cancer patients who followed healthy diets had a lower risk of death from colorectal cancer and all causes, even those who improved their diets after being diagnosed, according to a new American Cancer Society study.

There are more than 1.4 million colorectal cancer (CRC) survivors in the United States. Previous studies have suggested a strong influence of diet quality in disease outcomes, and that some pre- and postdiagnosis dietary

components are related to survival in men and women with CRC. But studies of dietary patterns to assess overall diet quality in relation to overall and CRC-specific mortality are inconsistent, making the development of evidence-based recommendations for CRC survivors difficult.

To learn more, investigators led by Mark A. Guinter, PhD, MPH, American Cancer Society post-doctoral fellow, reviewed data from 2,801 men and women

How long should a hearing aid last?

How do you know? Is there a 'cut and dried' formula that should be used as to when you should replace your hearing aid? The answer is no. There are many factors that determine the life of your hearing aids.

The first factor to consider is your hearing. When you are fit with a hearing instrument it is set to match your specific prescription that is necessary to correct your hearing properly. When the instrument was selected it should have been ordered so that if your hearing shifts there is some reserve gain to allow for the natural decline in hearing levels. While your hearing care provider can allow for some shift in hearing, they can not leave the door wide open. If an instrument has too much power and exceeds certain thresholds, it can actually damage your hearing. This is why it is necessary to have a competent hearing health care provider taking care of your hearing needs. So, if your hearing doesn't shift more than 5-10 decibels across the board you may get from 4-10 years from your hearing instrument. If your hearing shifts due to medicines, virus's, accidents, strokes, cancer, or infections or even unknown reasons then your hearing instrument may need to be replaced sooner.

If your hearing drops out of the capabilities of the amplification that you need; then you are basically plugging up your ears. Sound is pressure so the hearing

instrument has to deliver enough sound pressure into the ear to stimulate the nerves. If there is not enough power in the hearing instrument then you are only going to stimulate some of the lower pitched sounds. These frequencies give some volume and a lot of background noise. You need the high frequencies also to actually understand the words. Approximately 80 percent of your speech understanding comes from the high frequencies. If your hearing aids are not strong enough then you will not understand well, especially if you are in

background noise.

Technology level also determines how long your hearing instruments may last. The higher the technology, the longer it will last. The reason for this is because the top or premium instruments are the building blocks for the next thing coming out. With Starkey, if you are in the top technology, when they come out with something new they send some of the updates to existing premium level instruments. They don't give everything or they would go out of business, but they do send software and firmware updates to those instruments. These updates help to provide better speech understanding and noise control. (If your hearing has dropped out of the capabilities of the instrument, then the instrument should be replaced). Also, if you are in the premium technology

then the instruments have broader bandwidth, more processors for noise, and greater programming flexibility. Thus, your hearing can also make bigger shifts and the instrument still be re-programmed to fit you properly.

Your health is another reason you may need to get new hearing instruments. Patients may develop dexterity problems thus making a different style easier to put in or change batteries. The onset of dementia or Alzheimer's may produce a need for a more advanced hearing instrument that can do "more" adjustments for the patient automatically. The new Livio AI Instruments help to



had heard of Juul, and 15.6 percent had used the brand. Other e-cigarettes were used by 30.4 percent of participants, while conventional cigarettes were smoked by 24.3 percent of participants. About two-thirds of the participants who used these products used more than one type of product: some combination of Juul, other e-cigarettes and conventional cigarettes.

The participants reported using Juul about twice as often as smoking conventional cigarettes when asked about use of tobacco products over the past seven or past 30 days.

Believed to be less harmful

Participants thought Juul e-cigarettes were less harmful or addictive than other products mentioned in the survey. However, among the participants who had tried Juul, 58.8 percent reported that they had used Juul within the last 30 days. Among participants who had tried other e-cigarettes or conventional cigarettes, 30.1 percent and 28.3 percent, respectively, reported use within the last 30 days. This was the most striking difference between Juul users and users of other e-cigarettes and conventional cigarettes, and it raises concerns about higher rates of addiction among Juul users, Halpern-Felsher said.

Teachers and parents also need better information, Halpern-Felsher said. "We need to get in front of identifying and explaining new and different nicotine-containing products so that we can regulate them and protect youth from using them," she said. "It took quite a while for teachers to start realizing that this product [Juul] existed and that what they were seeing in classrooms were not USBs."

The research was funded by the National Cancer Institute (grant

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

diagnosed with CRC in the American Cancer Society's large, prospective Cancer Prevention Study-II (CPS-II) Nutrition Cohort. They found those whose pre- and postdiagnosis diets were consistent with the American Cancer Society Guidelines on Nutrition and Physical Activity for Cancer Prevention had lower all-cause and CRC specific mortality.

Pre-diagnosis diets that most closely aligned with ACS dietary

recommendations were associated with a 22% lower risk of all-cause mortality compared to those on the other end of the spectrum. Significant inverse trends were observed for CRC specific mortality, as well. For the highest quartile of pre-diagnosis Western dietary pattern, which is characterized by high intakes of red meat and other animal products, there was a 30% higher risk of CRC death compared with the lowest quartile.

Postdiagnosis dietary patterns were also significantly associated with the risk of death. The

highest compared with the lowest ACS-score showed a 65% lower risk of CRC mortality and a 38 percent lower risk of mortality from all causes.

The study authors say additional diet patterns and scores that also were based on plant foods and low red and processed meat consumption corroborated their main findings. They conclude that the results suggest the importance of diet

quality as a potentially modifiable tool to improve prognosis among men and women with CRC.

"This study is this first to our knowledge that considered change in diet quality across the CRC continuum," said Guinter. "These results suggest that high diet quality after diagnosis, even if poor before, may be associated with a lower risk of death."

there are many health and wellness benefits during all stages of travel across generations, and seeing those benefits significantly improves their satisfaction with the trip," said Alison Bryant, AARP Research Senior Vice President. "Any type of travel, whether it's a weekend getaway or a weeklong trip, can be an effective way to renew and recharge and the benefits far outweigh the short-lived drawbacks."

Key findings from "AARP Travel Research: The Health Outcomes of Travel – Perceptions of Boomers":

One in five (21 percent) indicate they experience health benefits before, during, and after the trip equally.

Of the 73 percent of boomers who notice health benefits post-trip, the most unexpected benefits are better sleep (51 percent), more energy (50 percent) and increased productivity (46 percent).

Most boomers credit their travel health benefits simply to relaxation and fun (72 percent) and to spending quality time with loved ones (67 percent).

The health benefits that most improve during a trip include improved emotional well-being (54 percent), connection with loved ones (52 percent), amount of energy (35 percent), intellectual curiosity (34 percent) and mental clarity (30 percent).

Additionally, planning a trip completely focused on wellness is not done by many and does not differ by generation. A wellness-focused trip is most likely a result of more intergenerational travel happening within the younger group surveyed. When planning and taking a trip, wellness is not thought of as an underlying reason to travel, but as a by-product. Most are open to just letting the feeling of wellness happen. A significant majority of boomers (96 percent) who planned a wellness activity on their trip, but did not exclusively focus on it, said they were "somewhat or very satisfied."

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


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Yoga mindfulness

“Who is minding the store?” This is a rhetorical question we may ask, or have been asked referring to our attention to immediate matters. However, do we ask this question of ourselves referring to watching our thoughts and being mindful of what we think/say? Do we question the consequences of our words to others and to ourselves? In a Yoga practice, “mindfulness” is one of the benefits of concentration as we initiate a posture, evaluating and interpreting our visualizations as expressed through our physical body.

If we think of “illness,” we are usually referring to the health or lack of health

of our physical/mental body and may go to a physician for diagnosis/relief. However, before physical symptoms appear, do we pay attention to our prior thinking? Do we consider that negative thoughts can manifest in the body as a physical “illness?” We may ponder the following: “As we think, so we are.”

When we practice Yoga, our attention is both external and internal as the mind “learns” how to perform a posture and instructs the body how to do it. It is by repetition/concentration that learning occurs. We learn to drive a car or perform a job task by following mental instructions until it becomes part of our “muscle memory.” Once we learn how to start a car, we do it

“automatically.”

Yoga postures are both philosophical/physical/psychological/emotional and spiritual. If we want to become more physically flexible, then we visualize our body flowing as it moves then we practice poses that will help the body achieve this goal.

In Yoga, we first visualize the correct form, then concentrate on practicing that posture until the body gradually loosens and moves more freely. Yoga is about visualizing and concentrating on learning a posture in our own time, allowing our physical body to adapt over time to what we visualize. Holding and repeating Yoga postures is about externalizing our mental picture in the body. The more we move and

practice a pose, the body gradually learns to flow into it. Some postures are physically challenging and take months/years to perform, so we just do what we can do at the present moment and keep working on practicing. We avoid the word, “try” as most have heard this term when someone says, “I will ‘try’ to be somewhere” and we intuitively think “they probably will not appear.”

If we choose to work on improving our health, we concentrate on nurturing positive thoughts and “practicing” healthy habits to overcome old ways that may initiate an illness. In Yoga, we work on “self-healing” and may consult a Physician to better understand our capacity to undergo change.

“Mindfulness” is an essential part of a Yoga practice as it awakens thinking, positively moving forward out of our “dross” of limitations. We concentrate on visualizing a healthy mind/body and with determination/practice correctly initiating a pose to manifest our mental vision. We take small steps at first and

move forward at our own pace.

A Yoga practice is about concentration in the present moment, letting go of thoughts of the past and future with deep breathing in a relaxed state of mind. So open that “golden umbrella,” awaken positive thoughts/visions and breathe Life into them. We are alive! Enjoy!




DeSantis, Gillum spar in debate

Race, the economy, the environment and, of course President Trump were subjects of the first debate in the Florida governor's race

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Democratic candidate for Florida governor Andrew Gillum isn't a big fan of President Donald Trump, but he said during a debate Sunday night that he'd gladly work with the president to bring money to the state for needed projects. "That's just not the way it works," said Republican opponent Ron DeSantis, who won the nomination based on

Trump's endorsement. It was one in a series of testy exchanges during the first debate between Gillum, the Tallahassee mayor, and DeSantis, who resigned his seat in the U.S. House to focus on the governor's race. The two scuffled on the economy,

Deadly attack amid Ebola outbreak stalls containment efforts

JOHANNESBURG — Congolese rebels killed 15 civilians and abducted a dozen children in an attack at the epicenter of the latest deadly Ebola outbreak, Congo's military said Sunday, as the violence again forced crucial virus-containment efforts to be suspended.

"It will be very hard to stop the outbreak if this violence continues," said the World Health Organization's emergency chief, Peter Salama.

A regional WHO official told The Associated Press that it was difficult to say how long work would be affected.

Confirmed Ebola cases have reached 202 in this outbreak, including 118 deaths.

Allied Democratic Forces rebels attacked Congolese army positions and several neighborhoods of Beni on Saturday and into Sunday, Capt. Mak Hazukay Mongha told the AP. The U.N. peace-keeping mission said its troops exchanged

fire with rebels in Beni's Mayangose area.

Angry over the killings, residents carried four of the bodies to the town hall, where police dispersed them with tear gas. While some health workers took refuge in a local hospital, the

protesters destroyed a number of government buildings and blocked all traffic, Congo's health ministry said.

Vehicles of aid organizations and the U.N. mission were pelted with stones, the U.N.-backed Radio Okapi reported.

The ADF rebels have killed hundreds of civilians in recent years and are just one of several militias active in Congo's far northeast.

Another deadly attack last month in Beni forced the suspension of Ebola-containment efforts for days, complicating work to track suspected contacts of infected people. Since then, many of the new confirmed Ebola cases have been reported in Beni, and the rate of new cases overall has more than doubled, alarming aid groups.

Health efforts in recent weeks had started to show results, and this new attack "will bring us back," Dr. Michel Yao, WHO's incident manager for Ebola in North Kivu province, told the AP.

Work in Beni was suspended on Sunday and "tomorrow, we don't know yet," Yao said, noting that the burials of victims can be tense.

A ragged, growing army of migrants resumes march toward US

TAPACHULA, Mexico — A ragged army of Honduran migrants streamed through southern Mexico on Sunday heading toward the United States, after making an end-run around Mexican agents who briefly blocked them at the Guatemalan border.

They received help at every turn from sympathetic Mexicans who offered food, water and clothing. Hundreds of locals driving pickups, vans and cargo trucks stopped to let them clamber aboard.

Besi Jaqueline Lopez of the Honduran city of San Pedro Sula carried a stuffed polar bear in a winter cap that seemed out of place in the tropical heat. It's the favorite — and only — toy of her two daughters, 4-year-old Victoria and 3-year-old Elisabeth, who trudged beside her gleaming with sweat.

A business administration graduate, Lopez said she couldn't find work back home and hopes to

reach the United States, but would stay in Mexico if she could find employment here.


"My goal is to find work for a better future for my daughters," she said.

In dozens of interviews along the journey, they have said they are fleeing widespread violence, poverty and corruption in Honduras. The caravan is unlike previous mass migrations for its unprecedented large numbers, and because it largely began spontaneously through word of mouth.

Guatemala's migration agency confirmed that another group of about 1,000 migrants crossed into the country from Honduras on Sunday.

After praising Mexico for its no-nonsense response when police at a southern border bridge pushed the migrants back with riot shields and pepper spray, U.S. President Donald Trump again hammered Democratic Party opponents over what he apparently sees as a winning issue for Republicans a little over two weeks ahead of

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US, Turkey to soon begin joint patrols in north Syria

AL-UDEID AIR BASE, Qatar — Turkish and American troops could begin conducting joint patrols in a matter of days around the northern Syrian city of Manbij within the coming days, the top U.S. commander for the Middle East said Sunday.

Army Gen. Joseph Votel, head of U.S. Central Command, told reporters traveling with him that the soldiers' training is expected to last "several more days," and then will transition to combined patrols.

The Manbij patrols are part of a road map that Ankara and Washington agreed on in June to defuse tensions amid Turkish demands for the withdrawal of a U.S.-backed Kurdish militia that freed the town of Manbij from the Islamic State group in 2016.

The U.S. and the Turks have been conducting independent patrols along the border, and joint patrols are considered a way to tamp down potential violence between the various groups there.

"We're right on track with where we want to be," Votel said. "We've been through a very deliberate and mutually agreed upon training program."

He said the platoons will include security personnel. He did not provide details on the size of the units or how many U.S. and Turkish

forces will be involved in the program. U.S. platoons can often include a couple dozen soldiers.

The initial instruction of Turkey's military trainers began at the beginning of the month, then all the troops were brought together for training to ensure they can all communicate, work together and operate with the same military tactics and procedures, particularly if there is an attack or other incident.

The training had been delayed a bit while equipment was brought in and the two countries worked out the details of how the operations would be conducted.

Manbij has been a major sticking point in the strained relations between the U.S. and Turkey. Ankara considers the U.S.-backed Syrian Kurdish militia, the People's Protection Units, or YPG, a terror group that is linked to a Kurdish insurgency within Turkey.

The patrols will add to the security of the area, Votel said, adding that right now Manbij is stable and "we want to double down and consolidate our gains."

In July, the Manbij Military Council, which administers the town, said the YPG units once stationed there had completed their withdrawal. Turkey's Foreign Ministry called reports of the alleged withdrawal "exaggerated" and said they didn't "reflect the truth."

4 Americans among 5 dead in Costa Rica rafting accident

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (AP) — Four American tourists and a Costa Rican guide were killed in a weekend rafting accident in the Central American country, authorities said Sunday.

Three rafts flipped on the Naranjo river Saturday around 3 p.m. and the five victims were carried away downstream, according to the Judicial Investigation Organism. Other passengers managed to cling to the rafts and some were rescued by another guide in a kayak.

The organism identified those who died as Ernesto Sierra, Jorge Caso, Sergio Lorenzo and Andres Dennis. It did not list hometowns for them. The local guide was Kevin Thompson Reid.

In total there were 14 tourists aboard the rafts and five guides.

Authorities said the river was swollen by rains and the National Emergency Commission maintained an alert in the area due to the possibility of flooding.

The Americans had arrived in Costa Rica Oct. 18 and had been renting a house in Playa Hermosa de Jaco, according to the government.

The Red Cross said via Facebook that the rafts overturned near Liverpool de Quepos.

Costa Rica President Carlos Alvarado expressed his dismay about the accident on Twitter.

Climate fund approves \$1B for projects in poor countries

BERLIN (AP) — Officials overseeing a U.N.-backed fund to help poor countries tackle climate change have approved more than \$1 billion in new investments after a four-day meeting in Bahrain. The Green Climate Fund said

Sunday that the meeting approved 19 new projects, including a program to protect freshwater resources in Bahrain.

Environmentalists had argued the Gulf nation should pay for the project itself using money it has made off its vast reserves of oil and gas.

Officials also agreed to start seeking new money for the fund next year. President Donald Trump's decision to withhold \$2 billion of the \$3 billion pledged by predecessor Barack Obama has contributed to a shortfall in its projected assets.

The South Korea-based fund is considered a key vehicle for climate-related development programs.

Hurricane Willa a Category 4 storm in Pacific off Mexico

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Newly formed Hurricane Willa rapidly gained force and grew into an "extremely dangerous" Category 4 storm in the Pacific off Mexico on Sunday, with a potential to make landfall on a western stretch of coast between Mazatlan and Puerto Vallarta in the coming days.

The U.N. National Hurricane center said in an evening bulletin that the storm was "forecast to produce life-threatening storm surge, wind and rainfall over portions of southwestern and west-central Mexico beginning on Tuesday."

A hurricane watch was posted for a stretch of shore between San Blas and Mazatlan, while a tropical storm warning was in effect from Playa Perula to San Blas. Hurricane force winds extended out 25 miles from the storm's core and tropical storm force winds were up to 80 miles out.

Willa was about 225 miles south-southwest of Cabo Corrientes with maximum

sustained winds of 140 mph. It was moving to the north-northwest at 6 mph, but a turn toward the north was likely during the night or Monday.

The hurricane center forecast 5 to 10 inches of rain across parts of western Jalisco, western Nayarit and southern Sinaloa states, with lesser amounts falling as it moves inland.

Meanwhile, a weakening Tropical Storm Vicente appeared to be a less potent threat farther south. Forecasters said it was expected to weaken into a tropical depression overnight, while remaining just offshore or near Mexico's southern Pacific coast through Tuesday morning.

AL-UDEID AIR BASE, Qatar (AP) — An airstrike by the U.S.-led coalition fighting the Islamic State group targeted a mosque in Syria last week because it was determined to be an insurgent command-and-control center, the U.S. said Sunday.

The coalition said in a statement that while the law of war protects mosques, the use of the building as a headquarters by IS caused it to lose that protected status. It said a dozen fighters were killed.

U.S. Army Gen. Joseph Votel, the top American commander for the Middle East, said Sunday that he is very satisfied that commanders went through the proper procedures to determine that the mosque was being used by IS and that it was a legitimate target.

Syrian state media and the Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said last week that a series of strikes in Sousa near the Iraq border killed and wounded dozens; civilians as well as IS fighters.

Trump and amendments: The week in Florida politics

TALLAHASSEE — Florida's 2018 midterm election is one of the most important in years. The governor's office and all three Cabinet seats are on the ballot; Republican Gov. Rick Scott is challenging three-term Democratic U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson; several congressional seats will be competitive; and Floridians will vote on several proposed constitutional amendments. The following are items of political interest from the past week.

NEW ADS: ALL ABOUT TRUMP

The dueling campaigns of Gov. Rick Scott and U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson traded ads this week that dealt with President Donald Trump.

Nelson launched a new television ad that paints Scott, who was urged by

the president to run for the U.S. Senate, as someone who will do whatever Trump asks him to do.

"When President Trump asks for something that's good for him and bad for Florida, I know what I'll do: I'll say no," said Nelson in the spot. "And we know what Rick Scott will do, he'll say yes."

The Scott campaign quickly responded with its own television ad that said Florida "needs a senator" who will work with the president.

"As for me, I'll work with President Trump when he's doing things that are good for Florida and America," said Scott. "And when I disagree, I have the courage to say so."

Scott's decision to run an ad that mentions Trump comes after he has spent months distancing himself from the president.

In April, Scott skipped a Trump discussion of the tax-cut package in South Florida, heading out of

state to raise money for his Senate campaign instead. In late July, Scott traveled on Air Force One with the president when he visited Florida. But the governor skipped Trump's campaign rally held in Tampa, opting instead to hold a fundraiser in nearby Clearwater.

Still, Trump was effusive in praising Scott on Twitter on Saturday.

"Rick Scott is known as easily one of the best Governors in the USA. Florida is setting records in almost every category of success. Amazing achievement—the envy of the World," Trump tweeted.

REMAINING MUM ON AMENDMENTS

Florida voters are being asked next month to sort out 12 separate constitutional amendments dealing with everything from vaping to property taxes and voting rights.

But don't look for some of the state's top

politicians to help you sort out the ballot and whether to vote yes or no.

Gov. Rick Scott and the two main candidates running for governor have voiced opinions on only a handful of the measures on the ballot.

Both Scott and fellow Republican Ron DeSantis, for example, oppose Amendment 4, while Democrat Andrew Gillum strongly supports the measure. If passed Amendment 4 would allow most former prisoners, except for murderers and those convicted of sex offenses, to have their voting rights restored after they serve their sentences.

DeSantis has expressed concerns about Amendment 3, which would make it clear that only voters can approve new casinos in the future. Both Scott and Gillum have kept silent on the measure.

Scott has said he plans to vote for Amendment 9, a proposal put on

the ballot by Florida's Constitution Revision Commission that deals with both oil drilling and vaping. If passed, it would bar oil drilling in state waters and would make it clear that vaping is not allowed in restaurants and other indoor workplaces.

Neither DeSantis nor Gillum have taken a stance on the measure.

WHO'S COMING TO FLORIDA?

The final campaign push is coming up for the candidates and that includes bringing in outside help.

Democrats announced that former Vice President Joe Biden will headline rallies with both Gillum and Nelson next week just as early voting kicks off in several counties. Meanwhile, U.S. Sen. Cory Booker from New Jersey will be in Jacksonville on Saturday to campaign on behalf of Gillum. And he will also campaign with

Nelson at college campuses in Jacksonville and Orlando.

But what about other well-known politicians?

Well, the Gillum campaign last month publicly announced that Hillary Clinton would help campaign with the Tallahassee mayor in South Florida. Yet Politico reported on Friday that Clinton is coming to help out with closed-door fundraisers and is not doing any public events.

President Trump, who boosted DeSantis's campaign in the GOP primary against Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam, so far has not announced any plans to campaign for the former congressman ahead of the Nov. 6 election.

But Trump made his support clear on Saturday.

"A great Congressman and top student at Harvard & Yale, Ron will be a record setting governor for Florida," Trump said in a tweet.

HEADLINES AROUND THE STATE

Falling palm tree kills woman in hammock

TAMPA (AP) — Florida officials say a woman lying on a hammock was killed after a palm tree fell on her.

Hillsborough County Sheriff's officers say 20-year-old Isabel Melendez was in the hammock on Egmont Key Park on Saturday in late afternoon.

The palm tree crashed on her, and she was taken to a hospital in St. Petersburg, where she later died of her injuries.

Officers said her death wasn't suspicious.

New Civil War memorial dedicated

TAMPA (AP) — A new monument in Tampa was erected with a nod to those who fought for both the Confederacy and the Union.

The Tampa Bay Times reports the new memorial features two granite obelisks mounted with informational plaques

and separated by a few dozen feet of blue marble meant to symbolize the Hillsborough river.

It was dedicated Saturday at a park.

Until Saturday, Veterans Memorial Park included monuments honoring local veterans from nearly every major American conflict — but no major monument dedicated to the Civil War.

In March, a Confederate monument was been relocated from the grounds of a Florida courthouse in downtown Tampa to a private cemetery.

Some 15,000 Floridians fought for the Confederacy during the war, and 2,000 more fought for the Union.

Retired teacher may be fined for her butterfly garden

PENSACOLA (AP) — A retired teacher who started a butterfly garden in the yard of her Panhandle home might be subject to homeowners'

association rules against breeding animals.

WEAR-TV reports Krissa White started her a butterfly garden six years ago. Her front yard has butterfly-friendly plants and trees.

Earlier this month she received a letter of final notice from her homeowners' association, saying it was against the community rules to have any other animals bred or raised on a lot except for dogs, cats or other house-hold pets for non-commercial purposes.

The letter said raising butterflies isn't allowed on the property.

According to the letter, White could be fined \$25 every day.

Florida's open for business, tourism agency says

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Visit Florida is launching a \$9 million marketing plan to show that much of the state is open for business following Hurricane Michael.

The Orlando Sentinel reports the taxpayer-funded tourism agency's executive committee voted Friday to support a plan that includes highlighting what has reopened in areas hit by the deadly Oct. 10 storm in Northwest Florida. The plan also seeks to call attention to other areas of the Panhandle, such as Pensacola, that were largely unscathed.

The marketing effort will feature domestic and international ads along with heavy use of videos on social-media sites. It's seen as a continuation of ongoing work to address concerns of potential tourists about algae and red-tide problems in waterways in Southeast and Southwest Florida this year.

Endangered wildlife get help from 2 research groups

LOXAHATCHEE (AP) — A group dedicated to preserving rare species is partnering with a South Florida university to

help save critically endangered wildlife.

The Palm Beach Post reports the Rare Species Conservatory Foundation has partnered with Florida International University in an effort to save the world's most critically endangered wildlife.

The Tropical Conservation Institute is nonprofit wildlife conservation center will be located in Loxahatchee. It's planned as a hub for international wildlife conservation, research, training and education.

One of TCI's biggest programs includes the conservation and recovery of the Florida grasshopper sparrow, a small, ground-nesting songbird native to South and Central Florida.

TCI also does extensive field work with West African crocodilians, pangolins, lemurs, global reef sharks, marine mammals and freshwater turtles, while research associates work with elephants, bats and other species.

6 shot near north Florida stadium before NFL game

JACKSONVILLE (AP) — Six people have been wounded in a street shooting blocks from the Florida stadium where the NFL's Houston Texans played and defeated the Jacksonville Jaguars on Sunday afternoon, authorities said.

Ron Lendvay, director of investigations for the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office, said several shots rang out about 12:35 p.m. Sunday on a boulevard in the stadium's general area and that five men and one woman were hit by gunfire. All were rushed to hospitals, and the sheriff's office tweeted that three of the victims were in critical condition. The victims ranged in age from their 20s to the 70s, according to Lendvay.

The shooting broke out before the scheduled 1 p.m. start of play. Lendvay reported no link to the game, which went on without incident, and said investigators were investigating whether it was gang-related.

The Texans won their fourth consecutive game Sunday, defeating the Jaguars 20-7 to take a one-game lead in the AFC South at the stadium, TIAA Bank Field.

Local media reports cited authorities as saying the shooting had had no impact on game day activities though some fans headed to the game reported hearing the gunfire.

Lendvay told reporters that a shooter fired from the passenger side of a gray, four-door sedan driven by a companion and that the victims were

hit outside on the sidewalk near a laundromat. He said the car immediately drove off and that detectives had been checking surveillance video in hopes of identifying the vehicle and those involved.

"There were at least two people in the car," Lendvay said. He added that investigators didn't know if any others were in the car and he didn't rule out the possibility of other shooters elsewhere.

"This may be gang-related based on information obtained in the early stages of the investigation," he told reporters Sunday, declining to elaborate.

Some fans told local broadcast outlet New4Jax that they heard shots as they headed to the stadium.

Others told the broadcast outlet that they saw people running out of the coin laundry business when the shots were fired.

Some said it was a series of shots.

"We were over there talking and suddenly, it was like ten gunshots. We ran and went for cover

and then I saw the police, and people were crowding down there," a woman identified as Yvonne Lee told News4Jax.

An update on the conditions of the wounded wasn't immediately available late Sunday and they were not identified.

"A couple of them were in very serious condition on their arrival at the hospital," Lendvay said. He added that five of the wounded were rushed by paramedics for emergency care and the sixth by private vehicle.

He said authorities have been unable to immediately determine whether there was any relationship among the wounded, noting none could be immediately interviewed though authorities hoped to do so later.

Lendvay spoke near the scene Sunday afternoon even as the game was in progress, saying investigators had cordoned off the area but fans who had cars parked in the area could expect an escort to their vehicles so they could leave unhindered after play was over.

Dozens hurt in floor collapse at S. Carolina condo party

CLEMSON, S.C. (AP) — The floor of a condominium clubhouse near Clemson University collapsed during a large private party early Sunday, hurting dozens of people into the basement, authorities said.

About 30 people were taken to local hospitals after the center of the floor caved in at the clubhouse near the South Carolina university. Clemson City Police said nobody was trapped and none of the injuries appeared to be life-threatening.


Video posted on social media shows a large part of the first floor falling as people danced, causing many of them to tumble to the floor below.

Clemson sophomore Larissa Stone told the Independent Mail of Anderson that the room was "packed" and a popular song was playing when the floor collapsed.

"So everyone was jumping. The beat was about to drop and literally the whole floor collapsed," she said. "It happened so quickly. I stood up, and everyone was trying to climb out. People are under other people. People are hurt. People are bleeding. I had blood on my sneakers. It was really bad."

Partygoers screamed, and those who didn't fall stood around the remaining edges of the floor and stared below in shock. Some people standing on the sidelines pulled out their cellphones to record the floor collapse.

A witness who attended the party said people

were jumping and he heard a sudden "boom." "All you seen was falling, everybody's hands up in the air," Franzie Pendergrass told WYFF News 4.

Leroy Pearson said he went to try to help injured people and saw what he thought looked like broken ankles and legs.

Police said the clubhouse at The Woodlands, about three miles from Clemson, had been leased for a private party.

Property manager Tal Slann told The Associated

Press that the condominium complex was built in 2004-2005. He said he could not comment on whether there was a limit on the number of people who were supposed to use the clubhouse at one time.

"I can tell you there was a party. I can tell you there was a floor collapse. There were injuries. They were not life-threatening. Nobody was trapped," he said.

Police said they were called about 12:30 a.m. Sunday and ambulances rushed to the scene.

Utah truck driver jailed after crash kills 6

HEBER, Utah (AP) — A man suspected of driving under the influence remained jailed without bond Sunday in Utah after a crash killed six men in a pickup truck, authorities said.

Jamie Don McKenzie, 41, was being held at Wasatch County Jail for investigation of six counts of vehicular homicide and two counts of driving under the influence causing serious injury as well as allegations involving

open containers, reckless driving and speeding, authorities said.

It was unclear Sunday if McKenzie has a lawyer yet.

The Utah Highway Patrol said investigating officers found prescription pills and open containers of alcohol inside the dump truck after Friday's crash on a state highway near Heber, about 15 miles south of Park City.

Only one of six victims in the pickup truck has

been identified, according to authorities who said the medical examiner's office was working to identify the other five bodies — possibly through DNA — and then notify relatives.

All six men died at the scene, authorities said. Three were ejected and the others were trapped inside the pickup when it was crushed by the dump truck.

"In my 13-year career, this is probably the worst crash I've ever seen,"

Highway Patrol Sgt. Lawrence Hopper said.

The dump truck was taking dirt to a Park City company. It reportedly veered at freeway speed into the median on State Route 40 near Jordanelle Reservoir then vaulted over the median, landing on the other side before colliding with the pickup truck.

Before the crash, troopers received multiple calls about the dump truck swerving and cutting off other vehicles.

Jail records show McKenzie refused to submit to a blood alcohol test so Highway Patrol officials got a search warrant to draw his blood.

A probable cause statement shows McKenzie said he had been in a crash, but didn't remember any details.

He also denied drinking that day although officers could smell alcohol on his breath, according to court documents.

race, and, of course, Trump, who came up when moderator Jake Tapper asked DeSantis if he thought Trump was a good role model for children. The question was based in part on a DeSantis primary ad featuring one of his children stacking toy blocks as DeSantis exclaimed, "Build the wall!"

DeSantis responded by saying he thought Trump did the right thing by moving the U.S. embassy in Israel to Jerusalem.

"I know Andrew didn't support that and doesn't think that's right," DeSantis said.

Gillum looked at Tapper and said, "I'm confused by the question."

"The question was whether or not he thinks President Trump is a good role model for the children of Florida," Tapper said.

"That's what I thought," Gillum said, drawing laughter from the audience. "No, he's not. Donald Trump is weak, and he performs as all weak people do. They become bullies, and Mr. DeSantis is his acolyte. He's trying out to be the Trump apprentice. At every turn he's tweeting him."

That's when Gillum said that despite his disgust for Trump's behavior, he wouldn't turn down

help from the president if it helped Florida.

"You need to be able to work with the president," DeSantis said. "Andrew can't do that. He wants to impeach Trump, he's always saying bad things about him ... I think I will be better positioned to advance Florida's priorities because I have a productive relationship with the administration."

Gillum said doing what's best for the state shouldn't be about politics, noting that he's worked closely with Republican Gov. Rick Scott in the aftermath of Hurricane Matthew, which left most of Tallahassee without power.

"This is not Russia. You

shouldn't have to kiss the ring of the president of the United States for the president to see to the goodwill of the third largest state in all of America," Gillum said. "This is a democracy. We can dissent, we can disagree and where it comes to working together, we can do that too. If you want to look for an example, look at how Rick Scott and I worked with each other in the aftermath of this hurricane."

Gillum appeared calm, while DeSantis looked agitated, often shifting his eyes and moving his head from side to side and interrupting his opponent.

DeSantis said Gillum would hurt the state's economy by raising the corporate income

tax and raising the minimum wage. And he repeatedly said that Tallahassee has the highest crime rate in the state, while Gillum repeatedly defended the city for being at a five-year low in crime.

Tapper brought up the fact that DeSantis said Florida voters shouldn't "monkey this up" by electing Gillum as Florida's first black governor and refused to return money from a donor who called President Barack Obama the N-word on Twitter.

DeSantis brought up his experience as a Navy officer and his time served in Iraq.

"When we're down range in Iraq, it didn't matter your race. We all wore the same uniform, we all had that American flag patch on our arm and that was end of story," he said. "I'll be a governor for all Floridians."

Gillum implied that DeSantis has aligned himself with racists through social media and speeches he's made.

"The monkey up comment said it all and he has only continued in the course of his campaign to draw all the attention he can to the color of my skin," Gillum said. "And the truth is, you know what? I'm black. I've been black I'll my life and as far as I know, I'll die black."

Voters will decide between Gillum and DeSantis on Nov. 6.

midterm elections.

After blaming the Democrats for "weak laws" on immigration a few days earlier, Trump said via Twitter: "The Caravans are a disgrace to the Democrat party. Change the immigration laws NOW!"

"Full efforts are being made to stop the onslaught of illegal aliens from crossing our Southern (sic) Border," he said in another tweet. "People have to apply for asylum in Mexico first, and if they fail to do that, the U.S. will turn them away. The courts are asking the U.S. to do things that are not doable!"

Hundreds of migrants from the caravan did just that — applied for refugee status in Mexico in the southern city of Ciudad Hidalgo.

But a far bigger group forded the Suchiate River from Guatemala to the Mexican side individually and dozens at a time, and resumed the trek at first light, marching 10 abreast on the highway.

"Si se pudo!" they chanted in Spanish — "Yes, we did!"

The throng grew even larger than when the migrants arrived at the border bridge, swelling overnight to 5,000.

It was not immediately clear where the additional travelers came from since about 2,000 had been gathered on the Mexican side Saturday night. But people have been joining and leaving the caravan daily, some moving at their own pace and strung out in a series of columns.

Their destination Sunday was the city of Tapachula in Chiapas state. Under a blazing sun, small groups of 20 to 30 paused to rest in the shade of trees on the side of the road, and by afternoon the caravan had evolved into long lines of walkers straggling for miles.

Jesus Valdivia, of Tuxtla Chico, Mexico, was one of the many who pulled his pickup truck over to let 10 or even 20 migrants hop in at a time, sometimes causing vehicles' springs to groan under the weight.

"You have to help the next person. Today it's for them, tomorrow for us," Valdivia said, adding that he was getting a valuable gift from those he helped:

"From them we learn to value what they do not have."

Passing freight trucks were quickly boarded by dozens of migrants, and straining tuk-tuks carried as many as a half-dozen.

Brenda Sanchez of San Pedro Sula, Honduras, who rode in Valdivia's truck with three nephews ages 10, 11 and 19, expressed gratitude to "God and the Mexicans who have helped us." She even had kind words for Mexican police: "We are very grateful to them because even though they closed the doors to us (at the border), they are coming behind us taking care of us."

Federal police monitored the caravan's progress from a helicopter and had a few units escorting it. Outside Tapachula, about 500 black-uniformed officers briefly gathered along the highway on buses and in patrol units, but they said their orders were to maintain traffic and not to stop the caravan. They moved on toward the city before the caravan reached them.

As the migrants passed through villages on the outskirts of

Ciudad Hidalgo, locals applauded, shouted encouragement and donated supplies.

Maria Teresa Orellana, a resident of Lorenzo, handed out sandals. "It's solidarity," she said. "They're our brothers."

Mexico's Interior Department said in a statement that federal and Chiapas state authorities were providing assistance to migrants, including legal counseling for those who applied for asylum. It released a video showing workers doling out food, medicine and medical treatment.

In comments to reporters after a rally in Elko, Nevada, on Saturday night, Trump said of Mexico's response: "I just want to say, on behalf of the American public, that we appreciate what Mexico is doing. They've really stepped up, and it will not be forgotten."

Trump also repeated: "I will seal off the border before (the migrants) come into this country, and I'll bring out our military, not our reserves."

Mexican President-elect Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador said he was suggesting to Trump

that the United States, Canada and Mexico seek an agreement to invest in development in Central America and southern Mexico, which is home to many of that country's poor.

"In this way we confront the phenomenon of migration, because he who leaves his town does not leave for pleasure but out of necessity," said Lopez Obrador, who takes office Dec. 1.

Mexican authorities had refused to allow the caravan mass entry from Guatemala, instead accepting small groups to process asylum requests and handing out some 45-day visitor permits. An estimated 1,500 were still on the Guatemalan side of the Suchiate, hoping to enter legally.

But police could do little if anything in the face of the throngs who avoided the official entry point and crossed the notoriously porous border elsewhere.

Migrants marching north Sunday said they gave up on Mexico because the application process was too slow, and most wanted to continue to the United States anyway.

"We understand. We are sympathetic. It's not easy to lose relatives. At the same time, it could affect the (outbreak) response."

The attack came after two medical agents with the Congolese army were shot dead by another rebel group — the first time health workers have been killed in this outbreak.

Congo's health minister called it a "dark day" for everyone fighting Ebola.

Mai Mai rebels surged from the forest and opened fire on the unarmed agents with the army's rapid intervention medical unit outside Butembo city, the health ministry said.

Health workers in this outbreak, declared on Aug. 1, have described hearing gunshots daily, operating under the armed escort of U.N. peacekeepers or Congolese security forces and ending work by sundown to lower the risk of attack.

Community resistance

is also a problem, and Congo's health ministry has reported "numerous aggressions" against health workers. Early this month, two Red Cross volunteers were severely injured in a confrontation with wary residents in a region traumatized by decades of fighting and facing an Ebola outbreak for the first time.

"Our agents will continue to go into the field each day to fulfill the mission entrusted to them," Health Minister Oly Ilunga said. "They are true heroes, and we

will continue to take all necessary measures so that they can do their job safely."

On Wednesday, WHO said it was "deeply concerned" by the outbreak but that it does not yet warrant being declared a global emergency. An outbreak must be "an extraordinary event" that might cross borders, requiring a coordinated response. Confirmed cases have been found near the heavily traveled border with Uganda.

In the latest example

of the rumors that pose another serious challenge to containing the virus, the health ministry said 22 young people in Butembo dug up an Ebola victim and opened the body bag to verify that health workers had not taken organs from the body.

They ended up touching highly infectious bodily fluids, the ministry said. "The next day, they agreed to be vaccinated," joining the more than 20,000 people who have received vaccinations so far.

Turmeric works for pain, can have negative side effects

DEAR DR. ROACH: I was having lots of arthritis pain in my neck and feet last summer. Someone recommended turmeric supplements to help. I started taking 600 mg twice a day. The pain slowly subsided. Needless to say, I was ecstatic. I took it for about a month, then I started getting minor stomach cramping and diarrhea, which would come on suddenly and urgently. I stopped taking the supplements, and the diarrhea stopped right away. I tried the supplement again but lowered the dosage to a single 600-mg capsule a day. The cramping and diarrhea came back right away. I have stopped taking the supplements, but now the pain is back, especially in my feet. It is affecting my ability to exercise as I would like. Is there a form of turmeric that does not cause this side effect? I have tried turmeric tea with same results. I feel so much better taking turmeric — except for the stomach cramping and diarrhea. — R.S.J.

people, but when it does, stomach upset, nausea and diarrhea are the most common. The fact that your symptoms went away when you stopped taking the supplement and returned upon restarting does suggest the symptoms are caused by the supplement.

Curcumin is the active chemical, which can be extracted from the spice turmeric. You can try taking curcumin itself, which might help. The dose you are taking is fine for either turmeric or curcumin.

If you are already taking curcumin, you can lower the dose

even further. Unfortunately, some people simply will not tolerate it at any dose.

DEAR DR. ROACH: What I want to see is a chart of bone density results for a 70-year-old white woman, to gauge where my results are in comparison. Am I normal for loss, or higher or lower than normal for bone loss? I've searched for this, and every time, I'm compared to a 30-year-old! Of course I have lost bone mass; that's life. My sister's results are from a different doctor, and we can't even compare ourselves! — V.W.

ANSWER: There are three ways that bone density results are reported. One is called the absolute bone density, and it is given in grams per square centimeter. This number varies depending on the machine, and one machine cannot be compared against another. However, the two other numbers are designed for easy comparison.

The first is called the T-score, and that is the one that compares you against a healthy 30-year-old woman (men get compared

against healthy young men). Bone loss does go down with age, so a 70-year-old woman is expected to have a negative T-score, meaning that she has less bone density than a 30-year-old.

The definition of osteoporosis can be made by T-score, with a result below -2.5 putting a woman at high risk for fracture.

The second score is the Z-score, and it is less known, but that's the one that compares you against other people of your age and gender. If you have a Z-score of zero, that means your bone loss is as predicted for your age. A very negative Z-score suggests a reason other than just age for bone loss, such as vitamin D deficiency. Ethnic background also has an effect on bone density: Black women tend to have higher bone density results than white women (about the level of white men), and are at lower risk for fractures. Of course, there are large differences among individuals within an ethnic population as well as differences between popula-



'Halloween' scares up \$77.5M in sales

40 years after he first appeared in theaters, Michael Myers is still a good scare

LOS ANGELES — Forty years after he first appeared in theaters, Michael Myers is still drawing huge audiences for a good scare.

Universal Pictures said Sunday that "Halloween" took in an estimated \$77.5 million in ticket sales from North American theaters.

It captured first place at the box office with the second-highest horror opening of all time, behind last year's "It."

It also marked the second highest October opening ever behind "Venom's" \$80.3 million launch earlier this month.

The studio also says it's the biggest movie opening ever with a female lead over 55, in star Jamie Lee Curtis.

David Gordon Green directed "Halloween," which brings back Curtis as Laurie Strode and Nick Castle as Michael Myers and essentially ignores the events of the other sequels and spinoffs aside from John Carpenter's original.

Reviews have been largely positive for the new installment, with an 80 percent fresh rating on Rotten Tomatoes and a B+ Cinema Score from audiences that were mostly older (59 percent over 25) and male (53 percent). Internationally, "Halloween" earned \$14.3 million from 23 markets.

Blumhouse, the shop behind "Get Out" and numerous other modestly budgeted horror films, co-produced "Halloween." It cost only \$10 million to make.

"You take the nostalgia for 'Halloween,' especially with the return of Jamie Lee Curtis, and you combine that with the Blumhouse brand and its contemporary currency in the genre and it just made for a ridiculously potent combination at the box office this weekend," said Jim Orr, Universal's president of domestic distribution.

With 10 days to go until the holiday, including another weekend, the studio expects "Halloween" to enjoy a much longer life than typical horror films that usually drop off significantly after the first weekend.

"Halloween" was enough to bump the comic-book film "Venom" out of the No. 1 spot and into third place. In its third weekend in theaters, it collected \$18.1 million, bringing its domestic total to \$171.1 million.

Meanwhile "A Star Is Born" held on to second place in its third weekend with \$19.3 million. The Bradley Cooper and Lady Gaga drama has grossed \$126.4 million from North American theaters and is cruising to break \$200 million worldwide Sunday.

Damien Chazelle's Neil Armstrong biopic "First Man" tumbled to fifth place in its second weekend earning \$8.6 million, down 46 percent from its launch.

It was a particularly busy week at the box office as critically acclaimed films such as the young adult adaptation "The Hate U Give" and the Robert Redford swan song "The Old Man & The Gun" expanded nationwide after a few weeks in limited release.

"The Hate U Give," now in 2,303 locations, placed sixth with \$7.5 million, and "The Old Man & The Gun" took 10th with \$2.1 million from 802 locations. A number of well-received indies also made their debuts. At the top was Jonah Hill's directorial debut "Mid90s," which opened in four theaters with \$249,500 (or a \$62,375 per theater average).

The Melissa McCarthy film "Can You Ever Forgive Me," about the literary forger Lee Israel, grossed \$150,000 in five locations.

October has never been a particularly strong box office month, but 2018 has helped to change that. The weekend was

up nearly 72 percent from the same weekend last October and the year to date is up nearly 11 percent.

"The worst thing you can do is say, 'I know how you feel.' Please don't say that to somebody who has lost a child because unless you have lost a child, you don't know how I feel. Please don't say 'He's in a better place.' I have an amazingly strong faith and

I believe that my two boys are at rest with my Lord. I don't want them there. I want them here, so telling me they're in a better place is a knife to my heart," she said.

So what do you say when you want to say something to a grieving person?

"Just say, 'I love you,'" she said. "What can I do for you? ..."

Delilah said people need to be talking about teenage suicide.

Suicide rates for teens rose between 2010 and 2015 after they had declined for nearly two decades, according to data from the federal

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

NFL: Miami Dolphins

Bad run defense dooms Dolphins in loss to Detroit

MIAMI GARDENS — The Miami Dolphins' run defense is stuck in reverse, perhaps taking the season with it.

Poor tackling, botched assignments and a manhandling up front doomed the Dolphins on Sunday, when the Detroit Lions ran for 248 yards to win 32-21.

It was Detroit's biggest total in 21 years, and the second bad game in a row for the Dolphins' run defense. They allowed 164 yards rushing a week earlier but still somehow managed to beat the Chicago Bears in overtime.

"We have a lot of work to do," defensive end Cameron Wake said. "I'm not panicking yet."

Lions rookie Kerryon Johnson rushed for 158 yards on 19 carries, including a 71-yard draw play where he was untouched until tackled. LeGarrette Blount added 50 yards on 10 carries, and both repeatedly broke tackles as the Lions averaged 7.1 per rush.

"Johnson, LeGarrette, they're big backs," Miami defensive tackle

Akeem Spence said. "With those guys, you have to tackle in committee. One guy can't bring them down. You need two, three guys. That's on the defense. We just have to be better."

With the loss, the Dolphins (4-3) fell out of first place in the AFC East. Linebacker Raekwon McMillan acknowledged they played

on their heels. "We fell back on our attack-type mentality," he said.

That meant the front seven was dominated, with the line surge so tepid Miami had not one tackle for a loss.

The issue extended beyond running plays. Matt Stafford had plenty of time to throw and

Bucs kick the trend

TAMPA — Chandler Catanzaro was confident he would redeem himself.

"I think it's part of my DNA. I've always kind of found of way to bounce back," the Tampa Bay kicker said Sunday after his 59-yard field goal — the longest ever in overtime — gave the Buccaneers a 26-23 victory over the Cleveland Browns. "I rarely miss two in a row. Even if it's from 59, I was just looking for a shot. If it was from 66, I would have tried it."

Catanzaro missed an extra point in the first half, as well as a 40-yard field goal on the final play of regulation. Concerned the Bucs (3-3) might not get the ball back if they punted, coach Dirk Koetter didn't hesitate to give his kicker a chance to end it with 1:50 remaining in the extra period.

"He hit it from 61 in practice this week, so I knew he had the distance in him," Koetter said.

"With the 10-minute overtime ... we weren't going to get the ball back," the coach added.

"So go for the win or hope for the tie. And the way that game was going, we were going for the win."

Tampa Bay, which recovered Jabrill Peppers' fumble near midfield on a punt return to give itself a chance, ended a three-game skid and handed the Browns (2-4-1) a NFL record-tying 24th consecutive road loss.

Cleveland, which has played four overtime games this season — most for a team since Arizona won all four it played in 2011, and tied for second most in NFL history — doesn't have a road victory since winning in overtime at Baltimore on Oct. 11, 2015.

The Detroit Lions also dropped 24 in a row away from home from 2001-03.

"We had our chances to win it. We just didn't finish some things," Browns coach Hue Jackson said.

"This is our fourth overtime game. We're not trying to get to overtime and if we do, we want to win the game," Jackson added. "We've got to find a way to finish these games in the W column." Jameis Winston and

DeSean Jackson scored on 14-yard runs for Tampa Bay (3-3). Rookie Ronald Jones II added his first pro TD on a 2-yard run that put Tampa Bay up 23-9 heading into the fourth quarter.

The Browns, who had 126 yards of offense through three quarters, used Nick Chubb's 1-yard TD run to cut into their deficit and pulled even on

Baker Mayfield's 16-yard pass to Jarvis Landry with 2:28 remaining in regulation.

A week after completing just 48 percent of his passes and being sacked five times during a 24-point loss to the Chargers that Mayfield called the worst of his career, the No. 1 overall draft pick was 23 of 34 for 215 yards, two TDs and

zero interceptions.

The Browns' defense forced four turnovers, including an interception in overtime, but Mayfield struggled to move the ball with consistency until the fourth quarter. But with Chubb playing a bigger role after Cleveland traded leading rusher Carlos Hyde to Jacksonville on

Brooks Koepka has golf's top ranking with win in South Korea

JEJU ISLAND, South Korea — Brooks Koepka is golf's new No. 1 after winning the CJ Cup at Nine Bridges on Sunday by four strokes.

Koepka, who displaced Dustin Johnson for the world's top ranking, shot a final-round 8-under 64 for a 21-under total of 267. Koepka, who had never held the top ranking, led by four strokes after three rounds.

"To be No. 1 is something I've dreamed of as a kid," Koepka said. "I don't think this one is going to sink in."

Gary Woodland certainly made it interesting. Woodland started the day five strokes behind Koepka, who was only 1-under after nine, but Woodland pulled level after making six birdies in seven holes on the front nine.

The two duelled on the back nine, with Woodland birdieing 15 and 16 to again pull level. But Koepka did the same, and a bogey by Woodland on the par-3 17th gave Koepka the cushion he needed to close out the win despite a birdie on the 18th by Woodland.

The biggest moment came on the 16th. Koepka went from a fairway bunker to just left of the green, about 70 feet away. Koepka hit a chip-and-run that was stopped by the pin and dropped for the birdie.

Koepka finished in style with a 25-foot eagle putt on the 18th for a 29 on the back nine.

"I'm not somebody who's going to panic if things go the wrong way," Koepka said of his slow start. "I felt like the one at 15 was quite big with Gary making a charge."

Woodland finished second after a 63. Ryan Palmer

birdied his last seven holes to shoot a course-record 62 and finish in a tie for third place with Rafa Cabrera Bello (65), four strokes behind Koepka.

Woodland was happy with his final round, but looked back to a few missed birdie chances on Saturday.

"Brooks with the lead not much fazes him," Woodland said. "So you knew you had to make a lot of birdies and I made a lot today. I was trying to put as much pressure as I could. But just shows I was too far back to start after not making too many putts yesterday. I gave myself a chance, I was tied for the lead there. Brooks obviously just made some clutch shots down the stretch."

Palmer said he became more confident with each of his seven straight birdies on the back nine.

"The more I made, the more free I felt in my swing and I was able to hit some close," Palmer said. "I made some long putts coming down the stretch. Actually on 17, I looked at my scorecard, I was like, 'oh, that's six in a row.' It is kind of back

there, but you don't think about it. What a special day."

Defending champion Justin Thomas, who could have prevented Koepka from moving to No. 1 with a repeat win, finished at 5-under after a 68 Sunday. Koepka is the third player this year to reach No. 1 for the first time, joining Justin Rose and Thomas. The last time that happened was in 1997, when Ernie Els, Tom Lehman and Tiger Woods each rose to No. 1.

It was Koepka's 12th victory worldwide, including four wins on the European Challenge Tour. He now has won in six countries — the U.S., South Korea, Spain, Italy, Turkey and Scotland.

"Everything I've done this year it's been working. So I don't want to change anything," Koepka said. "Just keep improving."

"I'm so excited right now, you have no idea. I can't wait to go play again."

He'll get his chance soon. Next week the PGA Tour heads to Shanghai for the final stop on its Asian swing, the World Golf Championships-HSBC Champions.

Pirates' advisor provides inspiration during Breast Cancer Awareness month

Fans see the color pink plastered all over the field on Friday nights as teams celebrate Breast Cancer Awareness month, commemorating the valiant battles women around the world have endured.

It's a month to take a step back and cherish life and also a time to recognize what these women and their families have been through.

The importance of the month has rooted itself deep in the Port Charlotte High School football program with one of their own a survivor of the disease.

Stefanie Flowers, the team's academic advisor and 18-year English teacher at Port Charlotte, battled and beat breast cancer beginning 12 years ago when head coach Jordan Ingman was a student at the school.

"I was diagnosed in 2006 and it was my eighth year teaching here," Flowers said. "It was a shocking diagnosis. I'm a pretty healthy person. My family has a history of colon cancer, but no one had ever had breast cancer. It threw me for a loop. But I had amazing support from my family and extraordinary support from the faculty here at Port Charlotte."

During her fight, the faculty at the school took up a collection, which

helped supplement her income after she had met her paid days off limit for treatments. Over the entirety of her battle, the school was there every step doing what it could to help offer aid in many ways.

Over the summer, she endured the most challenging stages. Without the energy to cook for the family, the Port Charlotte High community willingly stepped in.

"The faculty got together and delivered homemade dinners for my family every night of the week," Flowers said. "To the point that we had to ask them to stop bringing them because we had too much food. This is a very sentimental time for me, October is. Especially here at this school because the mindset of this school has been family oriented and we are a family here."

Included in that family was Ingman, along with a few other current assistant coaches.

Flowers said they have adopted a certain "guardianship" over her health. If she misses a day and forgets to call in and let them know, they always call worried about her.

"She was my English teacher when she was going through it," Ingman said. "She was in the heart of chemotherapy, she had no hair. She was one of the first people I

called when I got this job because I was incredibly impressed with the demeanor with which she carried herself through it. Every single day she never felt sorry for herself, and even though I hated English she found a way to make it fun because of her energy.

"It's near and dear to our hearts. She's a living example of a survivor and our kids have seen it. She has a huge impact on us year round."

From the coaches to the players, Mrs.

Flowers, as they call her, is a treasured member of the team. She fills and offers water on Fridays as she watches her team from the sideline. She helps them stay focused in school and in line to graduate and move on to the next level, even offering summer school if needed.

She brings a smile to anyone's face she comes across and provides an added sense of motivation and reflection come October.

"Breast cancer

awareness means a lot to me and a lot to this program," senior running back Mark Jean-Louis said. "It hit us close to home with Mrs. Flowers, who does so much for our program. If they need anything, she's there. We play through it in honor of Mrs. Flowers and anyone else who has come across that sickness."

For Friday's home game against Charlotte, the fans have instigated a "pink out." Everyone is encouraged to

where pink and shirts are being sold by the football moms. A portion of the proceeds will go toward breast cancer research.

The game will reach far beyond the rivalry with the Tarpons or the added pressure of a playoff push. In the back of their minds, they're playing for Flowers and all the women affected by breast cancer.

Dodgers-Red Sox: Rich histories, but little crossover

Sandy Koufax, Jackie Robinson and the Boys of Summer. Ted Williams to Yaz and the Impossible Dream.

Manny Ramirez. Pedro Martinez. Bill Buckner.

Fenway Franks and Dodger Dogs. Ebbets Field, the Green Monster. "Sweet Caroline" or "I Love L.A."

Yet for all their rich history — dating back to Babe Ruth on the mound — the Boston Red Sox and Los Angeles Dodgers have rarely crossed paths heading into this World Series. Only once before in October, and that was more than a century ago.

In fact, Clayton Kershaw has never even pitched at Fenway Park.

Consider this: Going into Game 1 on Tuesday night, the Dodgers have beaten the Red Sox in Boston just one time.

That came on June 12, 2004. And guess who scored and drove in a run for the Dodgers during that 14-5 romp?

Alex Cora, now the rookie manager of the Red Sox. One of his teammates that afternoon — Dave Roberts, ready to lead Los Angeles into its second straight Fall Classic.

"It's great for baseball," Roberts said. "Two storied franchises going head-to-head. It's going to be a great series."

Roberts is sure to draw a big cheer when the teams line up for pregame introductions. He's still a fan favorite in Boston for his daring stolen base that sparked an unprecedented comeback from a 3-0 deficit against Mariano Rivera and the rival Yankees in the 2004 AL Championship Series.

The Red Sox went on to end their 86-year title drought by sweeping St. Louis in the World Series, boosted by Big Papi, Pedro and Manny. Starting next week, Boston will try for its fourth championship in 15 seasons.

"I'm looking forward to going back to Fenway. Obviously for me personally, I have a lot of fond memories of the Red Sox and Fenway Park," Roberts said. "To be wearing another uniform going in there playing for a World Series championship is going to be special for me."

MVP candidate Mookie Betts, slugger J.D. Martinez and the Red Sox posted a team-record 108 wins, a big payoff for the team with the top payroll in the game. Boston pushed past New York in the AL Division Series and then quickly dispatched the defending champion Astros in the ALCS.

Boston opened as a slight betting favorite over Los Angeles.

"That's the best team in the game right now.

We respect that," Dodgers closer Kenley Jansen said. "But know that we're good."

Chris Sale is set to pitch the opener for the Red Sox. He recently spent a night in the hospital because of a stomach illness, and no doubt watchful eyes will be on the lefty ace.

Los Angeles is aiming for its first championship since Kirk Gibson, Orel Hershiser and Tommy Lasorda brought home the crown in 1988.

A year after dropping Game 7 to Houston at Dodger Stadium, Justin Turner and the crew with the third-highest payroll beat Colorado in a tiebreaker for the NL West title, chased Atlanta in the NLDS and topped Milwaukee 5-1 on Saturday night in Game 7 of the pennant.

"It doesn't matter how you get there. But to get to come back and go back from last year, it's unbelievable," Kershaw said. "Where we came from this year, it's a testament to these guys, man. It's a great group. We're excited."

"We don't want to lose again, so we're going to be ready to go," he added. New to the power-packed Dodgers this season is star shortstop Manny Machado, acquired in a July trade with Baltimore. Boston fans are plenty familiar with him — his late slide last year injured longtime Red Sox second baseman

Dustin Pedroia, and led to a tense situation at Fenway with Sale throwing behind Machado.

Soon as they see him, Red Sox rooters might even take up the familiar chant of "Beat LA!"

It's been heard for years in Boston, albeit in a different arena. That's what Celtics fans echoed during the Larry Bird-Magic Johnson rivalry. Fitting, maybe, the former Lakers star is a part-owner of the Dodgers.

On the basketball court, Los Angeles and Boston are certainly intertwined with championships on the

line, going all the way back to the days of Bill Russell, Elgin Baylor, Bob Cousy and Jerry West.

On the diamond, not so much for these storied franchises.

They first tangled for real in the 1916 World Series. The Babe pitched all 14 innings — in a tidy 2 hours, 32 minutes — as Boston beat Brooklyn 2-1 in Game 2. Though Fenway opened four years earlier, the game was played at Braves Field, home of the city's NL franchise, because it held more people.

The Red Sox wound up winning in five games.

Back then, the Dodgers weren't really the Dodgers. They were known by a collection of nicknames, and were often called the Robins because of popular manager Wilbert "Uncle Robbie" Robinson. And Ruth later coached for them.

Over the years, the teams went their own ways, on and off the field.

The Dodgers proudly broke baseball's color barrier when Jackie Robinson played in 1947. The Red Sox were the last team in the majors to have a black player, in 1959 with Pumpsie Green.

Brewers look to bright future after NLCS loss to Dodgers

MILWAUKEE — Christian Yelich and the Milwaukee Brewers think they're just getting started.

Sure looks that way, too.

Led by breakout performances by Yelich, Josh Hader and Jesus Aguilar, Milwaukee chased down the Chicago Cubs to win the NL Central for the first time since 2011. The youthful Brewers then swept Colorado in the Division Series before taking the Los Angeles Dodgers all the way to Game 7 in the NL Championship Series.

The playoff run ended with a 5-1 loss to the more seasoned Dodgers on Saturday night, but the Brewers plan on returning to October very soon.

"We feel like we've got a lot of talent here," Yelich said. "Hopefully it's just the beginning."

The 26-year-old Yelich nearly won the Triple Crown in his first season with Milwaukee after he was acquired in a trade with Miami in January. The silky smooth outfielder is the leading candidate for his first NL MVP

award.

Aguilar cruised past his previous career highs with 35 homers and 108 RBIs, and Hader set a major league record for a left-handed reliever with a whopping 143 strikeouts in 81 ¹/₃ innings. Throw in center fielder Lorenzo Cain and key arms Jeremy Jeffress and Corey Knebel, and Milwaukee is ideally positioned to make consecutive playoff appearances for only the second time in franchise history.

"What these guys accomplished, it's something I hope every one of these guys doesn't forget," said veteran catcher Erik Kratz, who came over in a May 25 trade with the New York Yankees and made a couple of big plays in the postseason.

"We made it to Game 7, and that can be a positive. Hopefully they don't stop there. Hopefully Yelli doesn't stop with one MVP award. Hopefully LoCain doesn't stop with one Gold Glove. I think the game allows everybody to either be content with what happened, or try to build on it. As a group here, these guys can't do anything but


build on it."

After Milwaukee lost to St. Louis in the 2011 NLCS, the Brewers slipped to 83-79 the following year and all the way to 74-88 in 2013. They finally made it back to the playoffs this year.

So don't expect manager Craig Counsell, who played for the 2011 team and grew up in Milwaukee, to take anything for granted.

"That's going to be what we spend a lot of time talking about next year, probably, is sustaining this," he said. "But we feel like that's at the forefront of all of our decisions is how do we build something that we can sustain. So hopefully that gives us a ways and a means to kind of make that happen."

Some of Milwaukee's biggest decisions heading into next season have to do with its pitching staff. Rookie right-hander Freddy Peralta showed some promise during his 14 starts, and Corbin Burnes and Brandon Woodruff became versatile options out of the bullpen after they were highly regarded starters in

the minors.

The Brewers could use Peralta, Burnes and Woodruff to strengthen their rotation next year, or they could be options for Counsell if he tries more of the bullpen-oriented approach he employed so successfully in the playoffs. Jimmy Nelson, who missed the entire season after he had shoulder surgery in September 2017,

also could be an option in the rotation.

It's also unclear what might happen with third baseman Mike Moustakas after he came over in a July trade with Kansas City and provided valuable leadership for the Brewers in the playoffs. The 30-year-old Moustakas was looking for a multiyear deal last winter before returning to the

Royals for a \$6.5 million, one-year contract that included a mutual option for 2019.

"All that stuff in the offseason, I'm not going to think about that for a while," Moustakas said after the loss in Game 7. "I'm going to soak this in, being in this clubhouse this last time this season and hanging out with these guys."

Young has 35 points, Hawks rout Cavs 133-111

CLEVELAND (AP) — Trae Young had 35 points with 11 assists — the best line for a first-year player since Steph Curry in 2010 — and the Atlanta Hawks beat Cleveland 133-111 on Sunday night, dropping the Cavaliers to 0-3 as they re-adjust to life without LeBron James.

The No. 5 overall pick, Young is the first rookie to reach at least 35 points and 10 assists since Steph Curry in 2010. Young made six of Atlanta's 22 3-pointers while overshadowing Cleveland rookie guard Collin Sexton. Young missed four of his first five shots, but finished 13 of 23 from the field. He struggled in his first two games, making just 12 of 32.

Kent Bazemore added 23 points for Atlanta.

Kevin Love had 16

points and 17 rebounds for Cleveland.

KINGS 131, THUNDER 120

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Iman Shumpert scored 26 points and Sacramento beat Oklahoma City to spoil Russell Westbrook's season debut.

Westbrook missed the preseason and the first two regular-season games after having a procedure to deal with inflammation in his right knee. He had 32 points, 12 rebounds and eight assists in 35 minutes after averaging a triple-double the past two seasons.

De'Aaron Fox added 22 points for the Kings. Paul George scored 29 points for the Thunder.

AP Top 25: Clemson back to 2; App State ranked for 1st time

Clemson is back at No. 2 in The Associated Press college football poll behind top-ranked Alabama, moving up to where it started, after a convincing victory and Ohio State's first loss of the season.

The Crimson Tide are a unanimous No. 1, with all 61 first-place votes, for the first time this season.

The Tigers trailed only Alabama in the preseason rankings, but a couple of close wins in September — combined with seemingly impressive performances by other highly ranked teams — dragged Clemson to as low as No. 4.

Coming off a lopsided win against North Carolina State, Clemson rose a spot this week. Notre Dame is No. 3 and LSU is No. 4, setting the stage for a top-five matchup between the Tigers and Crimson Tide in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, on Nov. 3. Both have an open date this week.

Michigan is No. 5 and Ohio State dropped to No. 11 after being upset by Purdue.

POLL POINTS

No. 25 Appalachian

State is ranked in the AP poll for the first time in school history. The Mountaineers (5-1) have not lost since opening the season with an overtime defeat at Penn State.

App State transitioned to the FBS, the highest level of Division I football, in 2014 after years as an FCS power. Under former coach Jerry Moore, the Mountaineers were a regular playoff participant. The program peaked in the mid-2000s, winning three straight FCS (Division I-AA) championships from 2005-07. And, most memorably, App State pulled off one of the most stunning upsets in college football history against Michigan in 2007.

Moore retired after the 2012 season and was replaced by former App State quarterback and assistant coach Scott Satterfield. The move up in class and into the Sun Belt has been practically seamless. The Mountaineers are 46-23 under Satterfield, with two Sun Belt titles. The only other Sun Belt team to ever be ranked was Troy on Nov. 13, 2016.

This season's team was expected to contend for another conference championship. A case could be made it is exceeding even those

high expectations after replacing four-year starting quarterback Taylor Lamb and much of its defensive front seven. Since falling to Penn State, the Mountaineers have outscored their opponents 231-49.

No. 14 Washington State was the only big mover to rise in the rankings this week, jumping 11 spots after beating Oregon.

— Ohio State dropped out of the top 10 for the first this season, tumbling nine spots.

Jaguars implode in locker room after latest lopsided loss

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — The doors opened briefly and closed a few seconds later, but the glimpse into Jacksonville's locker room told the story of the team's third consecutive loss.

Calais Campbell was holding back fellow defensive end Yannick Ngakoue, a carry-over from the screaming, shouting and finger pointing that ensued after a 20-7 loss to AFC South rival Houston (4-3) on Sunday.

"You all walk in here,

you all see how it is in here, you all see how we vibe with each other, you all see how we vibe toward the coaches, you all see how it is," cornerback Jalen Ramsey said. "It is no secret what's going on here right now. Ain't nobody going to say it because we can't. But it ain't no secret what's going on and it ain't right right now."

Ngakoue declined comment, as did safety Tashaun Gipson and cornerback A.J. Bouye.

Their silence spoke volumes for a team that appears to be in upheaval

following a third straight lopsided loss that has seemingly derailed a season that started with Super Bowl expectations.

"I don't speak on locker room business," linebacker Telvin Smith said. "Don't ask me locker room questions."

The Jaguars (3-4) looked slightly more composed on the field, although the result was similar to road losses against Kansas City and Dallas.

Jacksonville failed to score in the first half for the third consecutive game — the first time

that's happened in franchise history — and the defense allowed 141 yards rushing and sacked Deshaun Watson once.

Blake Bortles fumbled on the third play of each half, leading to 10 points and his benching.

Coach Doug Marrone said Bortles was upset with getting yanked after the second turnover — his eighth in the last three games.

"We've got to do something," Marrone said. "Like I said before, the one thing you do with that position, doesn't matter the name,

doesn't matter who it is. When you make a move to get a spark, everyone goes on notice. Everyone."

Cody Kessler replaced Bortles in the third quarter and threw a touchdown pass that energized the home crowd. But Kessler also fumbled on a sack and threw an interception off T.J. Yeldon's hands with a little more than five minutes remaining.

Marrone confirmed afterward that the quarterback job is up for grabs as Jacksonville prepares to play Philadelphia in a "home

game" in London next week.

"It's open," Marrone said. "Who's the starter at right tackle? Who's the starter at center? Who's the starter at receiver? Who's the starter? Everything is open. We've lost three straight games and we can't stop shooting ourselves in the foot for lack of a better expression.

"We've got to do something, but the first thing we've got to do is stop turning the damn ball over. Period. That would be the positive of how we can build."

went 18 for 22 for 217 yards and two scores, with just one sack.

"We couldn't stop them," Miami coach Adam Gase said. "That's just what it was. They were executing better than us, and we just didn't do enough to affect the quarterback. It didn't seem like he got out

of rhythm. "That was really the No. 1 thing we were talking about all week. That guy, if you give him time and he doesn't feel the pressure up front and we're not tight enough in coverage, you're going to have problems."

on third down. The Lions gobbled up yards in such large chunks they earned 21 first downs on first- and second-down plays.

"I'm pretty sure there weren't too many third-and-longs out there," Wake said.

Miami's performance was reminiscent of a loss last November at Carolina, when the Panthers racked up 294 yards rushing. The Dolphins won only two more games the rest of the season.

Panthers rally with 21 fourth-quarter points to beat Eagles

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Cam Newton tossed a 1-yard touchdown pass to Greg Olsen with 1:22 left and the Carolina Panthers overcame a 17-point deficit in the fourth quarter to beat the Philadelphia Eagles 21-17 on Sunday.

After Carolina took the lead, the Eagles started at their 30. A 48-yard pass interference penalty on James Bradberry against Alshon Jeffery put the ball at the Carolina 22. Eric Reid appeared to intercept Wentz's overthrown pass but the play was overturned on a video review. Wentz threw incomplete to Jeffery in the end zone on third-and-2 and was stripped on the next play.

Down 17-0, the Panthers started their rally when Curtis Samuel ran in from the 14 on a reverse but Graham Gano missed the extra point. Newton then quickly drove the Panthers 87 yards, tossing an 18-yard pass to Devin Funchess.

He connected with Jarius Wright on the 2-point conversion with 4:08 left.

The Panthers forced a three-and-out. Newton threw three straight incomplete passes, but took a hit on fourth down and still completed a 35-yard catch-and-run pass to Torrey Smith to reach the Philadelphia 34. A 22-yard pass to Christian McCaffrey gave Carolina first down at the 4. Newton ran it to the 1, setting up third down. He threw it to Olsen wide open in the back of the end zone.

SAINTS 24, RAVENS 23

BALTIMORE (AP) — Justin Tucker missed the first conversion of his career after the Ravens scored the potential tying touchdown with 24 seconds left.

Drew Brees threw two touchdown passes, locked up two more milestones and engineered a comeback that enabled the Saints (5-1) to wipe out a 10-point deficit.

It was 24-17 before Joe Flacco directed a beat-the-clock drive covering 81 yards and ending with a 14-yard touchdown pass to John Brown. That seemingly set up overtime, given that Tucker had connected on 112 straight extra points and was the only NFL kicker without a miss since the placement of the ball was moved back in 2015. He made the first 222 tries of his career.

This attempt, however, went wide right — the deciding moment in a matchup between the NFL's highest-scoring offense and top-ranked defense.

Earlier, Brees threw his 500th career touchdown pass, connecting with tight end Benjamin Watson for a 1-yard score to put New Orleans up 7-3 late in the second quarter.

REDSKINS 20, COWBOYS 17

LANDOVER, Md. (AP) — Redskins linebacker Ryan Kerrigan's strip-sack of Cowboys quarterback Dak Prescott was recovered for a touchdown by Preston Smith with just under five minutes left and Washington held on when a last-second field-goal attempt by Brett Maher went off the left upright.

What would have been a 47-yard kick

The Kerrigan-Smith play that provided the winning points was Washington's fourth sack of Prescott, who appeared to use smelling salts after taking a shoulder to his helmet at the end of a run in the first quarter. Prescott lost two fumbles in the game, including one on an earlier fourth-and-1 keeper.

RAMS 39, 49ERS 10

SANTA CLARA, Calif. (AP) — Todd Gurley scored three touchdowns and Jared Goff threw two TD passes as the Rams took advantage of four takeaways and a blocked punt.

The Rams (7-0) intercepted C.J. Beathard twice and recovered two fumbles to give them seven straight wins to open the season for the first time since 1985.

The Rams began 6-0 for three straight seasons in 1999-2001 before losing the seventh game.

The 49ers (1-6) made sure that wouldn't happen this year by repeatedly giving away the ball, justifying the decision the NFL made to flex this game out of prime time following the season-ending knee injury to San Francisco quarterback Jimmy Garoppolo.

The Rams dominated defensively with Aaron Donald recording four sacks, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery; linebacker Cory Littleton having two sacks and a blocked punt for a safety; and Troy Hill and John Johnson III intercepting passes.

PATRIOTS 38, BEARS 31

CHICAGO (AP) — Tom Brady threw for three touchdowns and the Patriots hung on when Kevin White got stopped at the 1 on a 54-yard pass from Mitchell Trubisky.

About four or five defenders swarmed White after he leaped to haul in that long heave, preventing him from crossing the goal line while preserving the fourth straight win for New England.

The Patriots (5-2) also got two special teams touchdowns and came out on top even though they were missing Rob Gronkowski. The five-time Pro Bowl tight end missed the game because of ankle and back injuries.

Rookie running back Sony Michel left in the second quarter because of a knee injury. But the Patriots beat the Bears for the eighth time in nine games since the 1985 team got routed in the Super Bowl.

CHARGERS 20, TITANS 19

LONDON (AP) — Adrian Phillips broke up Marcus Mariota's pass attempt, the Titans' second try for a 2-point conversion after a defensive penalty on the first attempt, and the Chargers held on.

It was the fourth consecutive victory for the Chargers (5-2), who weathered the absence of running back Melvin Gordon (hamstring) and relied upon their defense to pull out the win.

The Titans (3-4) drove 89 yards over the final 4:55 before Mariota's 1-yard pass to tight end Luke Stocker pulled them within one point. Mariota, who went 24 for 32 for 237 yards with an interception, thought he had scored the touchdown himself. With 40 seconds left, he ran 3 yards on a draw and stretched for the end zone, but replay showed he was down inches shy of the goal line.

After Stocker scored, Mariota's first attempt was a pass intended for Tajae Sharp, an interception negated by a defensive holding call on Casey Hayward, and his second, toward Taywan Taylor, was tipped by Phillips.

VIKINGS 37, JETS 17

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — Kirk Cousins threw two touchdown passes, Latavius Murray ran for two scores, and the Vikings pulled away in the second half for their third straight victory.

Vikings wide receiver Adam Thielen became the fifth player in NFL history to get at least 100 yards receiving in seven consecutive games, catching nine passes for 110 yards and a touchdown.

Jets rookie QB Sam Darnold was 17 of 42 for 206 yards with a TD pass to Chris Herndon and a TD run, but was intercepted three times as New York's two-game winning streak ended.

COLTS 37, BILLS 5

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Andrew Luck threw four touchdown passes and Marlon Mack had his first rushing scores of the season.

The Colts (2-5) snapped a four-game losing streak and finally won their 300th game since moving to Indianapolis from Baltimore in 1984. Adam Vinatieri scored five points to move within five of breaking Morten Andersen's NFL career record (2,544).

The Bills (2-5) lost their second straight, playing this one without injured starting quarterback Josh Allen.

Chase Elliott wins for 2nd time in 3 NASCAR playoff races

KANSAS CITY, Kan. — Chase Elliott first had to figure out how to win at NASCAR's top level. Now that he's got that handled, the son of 1988 champion Bill Elliott is chasing a title of his own.

Elliott won at Kansas Speedway on Sunday for his second victory in three races, cementing himself as a title threat late in a season in which mighty Hendrick Motorsports has lagged. He needed 98 career starts and maybe a dozen near-misses before he finally closed out his first Cup victory.

The breakthrough victory 11 events ago sparked Elliott's performance in NASCAR's playoffs, the second round bookended by a pair of Elliott victories. Elliott opened the round with a win at Dover and closed it with the Kansas victory.

"We're going to keep the hammer down," Elliott said. "I feel like we are among those guys that you have to beat, and I think that is all you can ask for."

Elliott is the only

Hendrick driver and single Chevrolet representative in the round of eight. Hendrick teammate Jimmie Johnson, a seven-time champion, was eliminated in the first round of the playoffs and Alex Bowman was knocked out Sunday.

Also eliminated Sunday were Team Penske teammates Ryan Blaney and Brad Keselowski, both winners in the first round of the playoffs, and Kyle Larson.

Larson needed to win to make it into the third round and was frantically chasing Elliott in the closing laps but settled for third. He was docked 10 points by NASCAR earlier this week for an infraction at Talladega, his team lost two appeals of the penalty and he was in a must-win situation at Kansas.

"I'm actually glad that nothing stupid took us out of the playoffs this year — we had that battery come out at Dover a couple years ago, blew up an engine here last year," Larson said. "I would have liked to have made it into the next round, but I'm glad (elimination) wasn't anything other than just us

not performing where we needed to be that kept us out of the next round."

Advancing into the third round of the playoffs were Elliott, Kyle Busch, Kurt Busch, Martin Truex Jr., Kevin Harvick, Clint Bowyer, Aric Almirola and Joey Logano.

Stewart-Haas Racing has all four of its cars in the round of eight and Ford has five of the slots. Toyota has two entrants in Kyle Busch and defending series champion Truex. Elliott is the only representative from Chevy and Hendrick, which has struggled this year with a new Camaro and a young driver lineup.

NASCAR's so-called "Big Three" of Harvick, Truex and Kyle Busch are still in the playoffs. Harvick, winner of the second stage Sunday, and Kyle Busch, the runner-up to Elliott, have looked like championship contenders all season. Truex has been hot in spurts but was fifth at Kansas, where he swept both races last season.

"This stuff is hard man. It shows how difficult it is you know to win both races here last year and run second in the spring and then come back trying to be better and struggle all day," Truex said.

Keselowski briefly flirted with a title run by reeling off three consecutive victories, but he ran out of gas last week when Talladega went into overtime and it crushed his momentum. He was sixth Sunday.

"We needed something to step up, but it just wasn't there," Keselowski said. "I am proud of what we did down the stretch of the year. We

won three races ... but of course the ultimate goal is to win a championship and we won't have an opportunity to do that this year."

Elliott has now taken over Keselowski's slot as a late challenger to the "Big Three."

"This is a huge time of year. We've got a lot of work to do and a long ways to go," Elliott said.

ENGINE ISSUES: William Byron was knocked out of the race with an engine failure 55 laps into the race. A day earlier, Jamie McMurray had an engine failure during practice. Both engines are built by Hendrick Motorsports and neither driver is in the playoffs.

Dale Earnhardt Jr., a former Hendrick driver, opined in the NBC Sports broadcast booth what many wondered: The Hendrick engine department may have used Byron and McMurray's motors for research and development purposes.

UP NEXT: The opening race of the third round of the playoffs, at Martinsville Speedway on Sunday. Kyle Busch is the defending race winner, while Bowyer won at Martinsville earlier this year.
