

## Council gives OK to town hall

### Brantley, Holbrook: Town divided

LAKE PLACID — Although changes to zoning, land use and town ordinances got approved Monday without controversy, a contentious atmosphere still persists in Lake Placid around the new Town Hall.

It came out later in Monday's Lake Placid Town Council meeting when it came time to pay the annual \$3,000 membership invoice to the Greater Lake Placid Chamber of Commerce, which did not support the move.

Ultimately, the council did vote unanimously to pay the invoice, just as they voted unanimously to set up a 14.72-acre site with a 16,377-square-foot former church building as the new town council meeting place, as a town commercial-zoned planned development with public/semi-public land use.

A second reading on the rezoning will take place in January. Councilwoman Debra Worley asked if it would work better to have commercial land use. County Planner Joedene Thayer said that would give more options for how the town can use its new Town Hall site, but said the council would have to readvertise and hold another meeting in January if they wanted to do that.

Instead, the council opted to keep the public use designation, have Thayer explore the options of commercial land use and report back to them in the future.

The town recently bought the building and site at 1069 U.S. 27 North from church of Christ for slightly less than \$1 million. Rising Son Ministries, which was leasing the property, has ended its lease early.

Opposition to the site over recent years has included claims of increased taxes and higher danger to people who visit Town Hall from its location on a four-lane highway as opposed to a two-lane town street.

Worley said the strife between supporters and opponents of the new Town Hall site had left her feeling personally offended, and she was reluctant to support the chamber after that.

"I think we made a good decision, a very good decision," Worley said of the Town Hall purchase.

Mayor John Holbrook said he was upset about "prominent citizens" — adding air quotes to his comment — having visited his place of employment seeking to have him fired for the decision.

Later in the meeting, he said one of the several people was a local attorney.

"I've got broad shoulders. I can take that," Holbrook said. "We as a board have to do what's best for the town."

Bill Brantley, past president of the chamber, said the chamber had voted, unanimously, to support a new Town Hall in the downtown area. However, he said he was told at a Keep Lake Placid Beautiful meeting — another

## Sebring Firemen seek artificial turf

### For football field

SEBRING — Sebring Firemen Inc. propose installing AstroTurf on the football field at Firemen's Field to reduce maintenance costs and for the safety of the players.

At Tuesday's workshop of The School Board of Highlands County, John Shoop, with the Sebring Firemen, said AstroTurf is the top priority they see to improve the field for the students.

He requested keeping the lease at \$95,000 per year.

Under the current 15-year agreement, which expires July 31, 2019, The School Board of Highlands County is paying a total of \$95,000 annually for Sebring High School's use of the athletic fields and facilities at Firemen's Field. The base lease is \$35,000 per year with \$60,000 added

15 years ago to build the locker room and concession buildings.

Shoop noted that during the 15 years of the current lease, the Firemen have contributed more than \$626,000 directly to support Sebring High athletics. The district is getting a good deal to use a facility valued at \$5 million to \$10 million.

The AstroTurf would have a lifespan of 11-13 years with a 10-year warranty and annual maintenance would be about \$5,000 per year, he said.

The cost to maintain grass football fields, which need irrigation and

periodic re-sodding and fertilizing, is much higher. Maintaining the fields properly has been challenging, according to discussion by district staff. The district has a firm that won the bid to maintain the fields.

Shoop's son, J.C., who played college football, spoke of the benefits of AstroTurf.

The difference in playing on a regular grass field and artificial turf is like "night and day," he said. The number of injuries went down and you are playing on a stable surface so the players don't have to worry about potholes or a muddy field when it rains.

"All of us really enjoyed playing on a turf field," J.C. Shoop said.

Avon Park High School Athletic Director Mort Jackson said his school's football field was nothing but weeds at the beginning of the year. He met with the new person who was supposed to maintain and

## Cloudy or yellowed headlights lead to dangerous nighttime driving

SEBRING — Clear headlights are vital to safety, and aged headlights should be replaced or cleaned. Cloudy or yellowed headlights can reduce lighting by more than 80 percent, according to new test results from AAA — The Auto Club Group.

"Headlights are a crucial safety feature," Scott

Dressel, public information officer for the Highlands County Sheriff's Office, said. "Not only do they make it so drivers can see the road, they also allow other drivers to see you. They should be bright enough to give drivers a good field of visibility at night and aimed correctly so they don't hamper other drivers."

AAA compared the light output from 11-year-old headlights and new headlights, and their study found that aged headlights only generate approximately 20 percent of the light that new headlights produce.

When headlights are deteriorated, what can drivers do?

### What does Florida law say about headlights?

316.220 Headlamps on motor vehicles.

(1) Every motor vehicle shall be equipped with at least two headlamps with at least one on each side of the front of the motor vehicle, which headlamps shall comply with the requirements and limitations set forth in this chapter, and shall show a white light. An object, material, or covering that alters the headlamp's light color may not be placed, displayed, installed, affixed, or applied over a headlamp.

(2) Every headlamp upon every motor vehicle shall be located at a height of not more than 54 inches nor less than 24 inches to be measured as set forth in s. 316.217.

(3) A violation of this section is a noncriminal traffic infraction, punishable as a nonmoving violation as provided in chapter 318.

### AAA recommendations for nighttime driving

1. Use high beams at night whenever possible.
2. Monitor driving speeds at night so that you have enough time to react to the people or objects that your headlights illuminate. This often means slowing down so that you have time to stop for an object that might be in the roadway.
3. Replace or restore headlights that are not clear.
4. For people who are older than 60 and have problems with headlight glare, contact your medical provider. Cataracts, which occur as people get older, can cloud your vision just like age can cloud the light output of headlights.

## Keeping warm without feeling the burn

SEBRING — Temperatures have been fluctuating between wide highs and lows like a roller coaster lately. Temperatures in the 40s for a few days and then in the 80s for the next week have people setting thermostats for hot and cold from one day to the next.

Many people use space heaters in small rooms, especially in older homes that were built without central air and heat. Space heaters can be a convenient and efficient way to provide heat but come with significant risk

of causing a fire.

According to the Electric Safety Foundation International, about 65,000 homes are damaged or destroyed in fires connected to space heaters each year. That's not counting the human death and injury toll. ESFI says the property damage is in the millions of dollars every year.

Highlands County Public Safety Director Marc Bashoor explained the way space heaters are used is the reason they are dangerous.

"The biggest issue we see with electric heaters is the use of extension cords and power strips to get the heater closer

to a person," Bashoor said. "Heaters should never be plugged into a power strip, and unfortunately, most residential extension cords are not rated for the amount of amperage heaters pull. This routinely results in

overheating and fires — sometimes with devastating results."

ESFI warns consumers to read the manufacturer's directions and warning labels. Other recommendations before a new purchase or first

use of the season is to check for broken or frayed plugs. If they are damaged, do not use them. Bahsoor also gave safety advice regarding the electric plugs being used.

"We encourage you to

only plug heaters into a wall socket, not an extension cord or power strip," he said. "If you must use an extension cord, keep it short and don't use anything with less than

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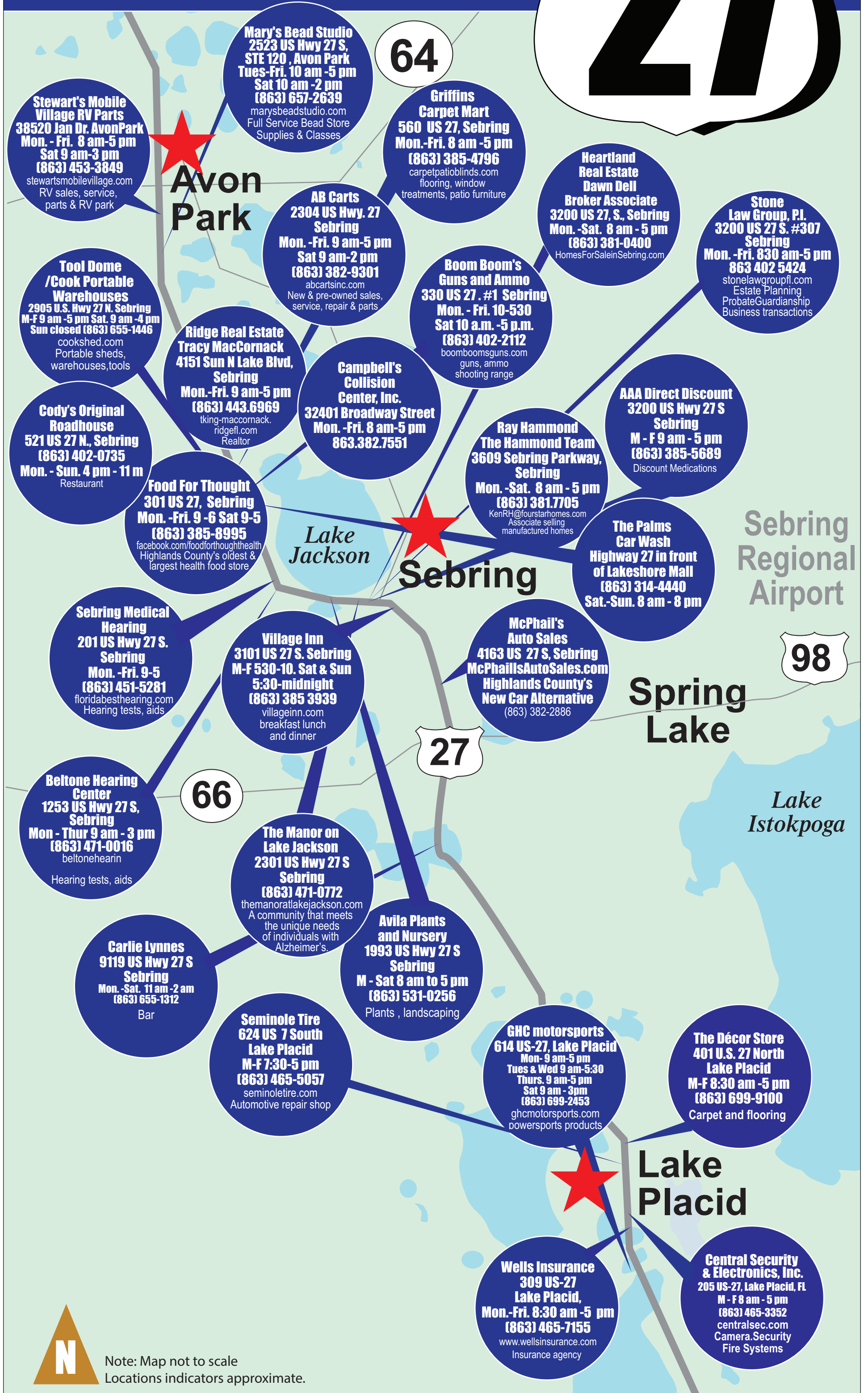

**Sheriff's office makes drug bust in an Avon Park hotel room**

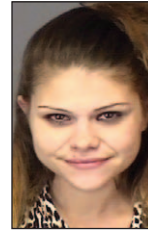
AVON PARK — The Highlands County Sheriff's Office Special Operations Division served a search warrant to two people staying in an Avon Park hotel room, and illegal drugs were reportedly found in their possession.

Joshua Jessie Robins, 39, of Lake Placid, was arrested by the authorities Friday, Dec. 7. Robins was charged with five counts of possession of a controlled substance, carrying a concealed firearm and possession of drug equipment.

Johnnie Harriet Giles, 27, of Lake Placid, was also arrested Friday, Dec. 7. According to the arrest report, Giles is known by various street names, including Rose Tapanga, Snow Bunnii,

Topanga, Tapanga and Baby Jay. She was charged with possession of a controlled substance without a prescription, possession of not more than 20 grams of marijuana, and possession of drug equipment.

Both subjects were found in a local Avon Park hotel room and detained.

Deputies allegedly found illegal drugs in Robins' right front pocket, including a crystal-like substance that field tested positive for methamphetamine, narcotic pain pills, and pills

used to treat anxiety and panic disorders.

According to the arrest report, Robins denied having any knowledge of how the illegal drugs got into his pant's pocket, and he did not know whose drugs they were.

Near Giles' purse, deputies allegedly found a plastic container with smaller plastic bags inside it. One of the bags contained a crystal-like substance that field tested positive for methamphetamine.

Deputies also found three other plastic bags that contained a green, leafy substance that field tested positive for cannabis.

A glass pipe containing residue was found in Giles' purse, and the residue within the pipe field tested positive for the presence of methamphetamine, the report states.

organization with which he's involved — that if that group did not support the move, the town wouldn't write grants for the group in the future.

"I was told I need to be a team player," Brantley said. "I will not be threatened."

He suggested it seemed like organizations he's been involved with had received retributions as a result of this controversy. He said it included the chamber, Keep Lake Placid Beautiful and the Highlands County School District, with parking ordinances being more strictly enforced on Green Dragon Drive in front of Lake Placid Elementary School.

Councilman Ray Royce said in the meeting and again afterwards that Brantley made a "gross mis-characterization" of the tone of the Keep Lake Placid Beautiful meeting as threatening.

Brantley begged to differ, but then said that the town had lost its overall friendly atmosphere and needs it back.

Town Administrator Phil Williams said there have been a lot of suspicions raised that haven't been founded.

Williams said he's learned from Florida Department of Transportation officials the grants that agency provides funds for are not only for beautification but also other tasks, like litter control.

"I had to come up (with) creative writing

with a 14-page marketing plan, saying that we would do some of these things to get the grant," Williams said.

Brantley said Keep Lake Placid Beautiful has spent 10 years or more working to improve the town, and the group has business owners who volunteer all the time.

"The problem is this town is divided," Brantley said. "This is not the small town we all came here for. It's divided."

"You're right. We need to get it back," Holbrook said.

Williams complimented Brantley for being one of those who has "stepped up to the plate"

many times to help the town.

Royce said Tuesday, after the meeting, that most people opposed to the new Town Hall probably haven't considered all the benefits such a facility can provide. It can give the town room for its expanding utilities department, could serve as a community center and might house other government offices, like those of local state legislators.

Also, Royce said, the former church can seat 200 people and serve them with a fully-outfitted kitchen.

All it takes, Royce said, is remodeling costs.

## History of Highlands citrus continues

Since 1962, 186 members have been inducted into the Florida Citrus Hall of Fame. Of that 186, only 11 citrus magnates from Highlands County have been inducted – seven from Avon Park, one from Lake Placid, and three from Sebring.

Some of those local men have been inducted into the Citrus Hall of Fame because of their longevity in the industry, as well as positions they held with industry organizations. Some were recognized for their work with citrus diseases, another was recognized for establishing his own laboratory to prove that grapefruit juice could be processed.

All of them contributed to the citrus industry in a way that warrants their recognition.

Another Highlands County resident will be inducted in March, bringing the county's total to 12. Tim Hurner, a fourth-generation Florida citrus grower best remembered for his career as an IFAS Extension agent, will join the late Richard J. Kinney of Lakeland and Peter McClure of Port St. Lucie as this year's inductees.

Hurner started as the 4-H and citrus agent in Highlands County in 1965. He served for 30 years in the Extension Office, becoming the county agent in 1977.

The Hurner name is symbolic to the Highlands County Extension Office. Laurie Hurner joined the staff in 2013 as the citrus agent. Continuing to follow in the footsteps of her father, she accepted the position of county extension director in 2015.

The Florida Citrus Hall of Fame was established to honor distinguished leaders who have made significant contributions to the Florida citrus industry.

Nominations can be made by anyone by visiting the Florida Citrus Hall of Fame website, but it is a committee representing various facets of the industry across the state that selects the recipients of the prestigious honor.

Hurner will now be listed along other Highlands County notables: Claude Everett Street, inducted in 1962; Ben Hill Griffin Jr., inducted in 1979; A.R. Updike Sr., inducted in 1995; Joe L. Davis Sr., inducted in 1999; C. Elton Crews inducted in 2004; G. Franklin Ward, inducted in 2006; Norman Todd, inducted in 2008; Robert J. Barben and Frank M. Hunt, both inducted in 2012; John Updike Sr., inducted in 2015; and last year's inductee, Marvin Kahn.

## More disruption is coming to Florida public schools

If you love and support Florida public schools, there is a bad moon rising.

Richard Corcoran is all but certain to be the state's new Education Commissioner, and anyone associated with public education may be tempted to hide their eyes for the next four years.

While the Commissioner doesn't directly set policy — the State Board of Education does that — the position carries enormous influence. Corcoran will be in a position to hire the kind of people he wants to staff the Department of Education, and use his considerable political skills to communicate ideas and strategy between the DOE and the state Board.

The Board has to formally approve the appointment, but that's considered a formality.

Administrators should prepare to have more of their budgets directed to charter schools and voucher programs. They can expect more interference in their jobs and less cooperation when they need help.

Teachers will see their negotiating rights under constant siege from a man whose history suggests he despises their union. They won't be able to stop it, either, because Gov.-elect Ron DeSantis appears to share many of Corcoran's core values when it comes to

education.

Ultimately, public school students could lose too because those who operate the system will be consumed by fending off what is all but certain to be a barrage of disruptive edicts from Tallahassee.

And no one will be able to do a darned thing to stop this. Republicans remain in charge of the Legislature and the Governor's Mansion, and history shows they are disgruntled with both the performance and cost of public schools.

Actually, in at least one critical area Republicans have a good point. The South Florida Sun-Sentinel just reported that school districts throughout Florida have ignored the law that requires all crimes on their campuses be reported to the state. The newspaper concluded the lack of those reports could make parents believe their schools are safer than they actually are.

Now, if Corcoran wants to disrupt that kind of deception, hey, go for it. Quickly.

When it comes to education policy though,

I have no doubt that he will, in the words of pitcher Nuke Laloosh in Bull Durham, announce his presence with authority — probably with more success though.

He is really just the next link in the GOP chain regarding education.

This goes back to when then-Gov. Jeb Bush pushed through an arbitrary grading system for public schools, followed by a blizzard of standardized tests that tied student performance to teacher pay. It continued during Corcoran's stint as House Speaker when he went all-in to direct public school money to charters and voucher programs while all but mocking those running Florida public schools.

The situation in some districts has deteriorated to the point where many of them report significant teacher shortages. Crushing demands by politicians coupled with pay that is well below the national average has made teaching a less desirable profession.

Many long-time teachers have left the profession completely because of partisan political meddling. It's reasonable to expect the exodus to continue under Corcoran's rule because he is their worst nightmare.

He is savvy, smart, fearless, determined and utterly convinced he is right, and anyone who opposes him is wrong.

He fiercely believes his vision of education is the correct one, and that the entrenched public-school bureaucracy is resisting meaningful reform.

He is willing to debate that point anyone who disagrees, and as Speaker he tended to roll over anyone who got in his way.

And now he is about to assume a job that will allow him to get deep into the weeds of Florida's education policy.

There was talk earlier this year that Corcoran would run for Governor, but that campaign never happened. Many then believed he might be named to the state Supreme Court. But if he couldn't be Governor, I think this is the job that Corcoran really wanted.

As Speaker, he had many priorities that consumed much of his time.

In his new job, he will be able to concentrate on an area where he believes disruption is good and major change is needed.

That leaves two options for those associated with Florida public schools.

Buckle up or move on.

original equipment manufacturer parts, because it can restore light output back to 100 percent.

• Aftermarket parts rank a close second, restoring light output between 83 to 90 percent, according to AAA. However, aftermarket parts often produce glare for oncoming traffic and don't always meet requirements for light intensity.

• Professional and do-it-yourself restoration provide less benefit than replacement, the study from AAA states. Some users find that products marketed to restore headlights are not effective. Even when the restoration is successful, light output only increases to 70 percent of the original light output. Restored headlights produce more glare than is acceptable, according to Department of Transportation criteria, the study found.

"In some states, motorists can be ticketed for headlights that significantly reduce visibility," Matt Nasworthy, Florida Public Affairs director for AAA, said.

"Yes, drivers can be cited for headlights that are too dim or inoperable, which would fall under the improper or inoperable vehicle statute (F.S. 316.610)," Cmdr. Curtis Hart, with the Sebring Police Department, said. "Also, per state statute (F.S. 316.217) drivers are required to display headlights during the times between sunset and sunrise to include twilight hours, and during rain, fog or smoke conditions," Hart said.

mandates several other requirements concerning headlights. Statutes "indicates the color must be white and the placement of an object that may change the color or something that may impede the illumination is prohibited," Lake Placid Police Chief James Fansler said.

"It is also important to think about what other drivers can see," Dressel said. "At dusk, for example, your headlights may not be providing you with much benefit, but they do make it much easier for other drivers to see your car. The ground gets dark more quickly than the sky, so if you are having trouble seeing cars without their headlights on, that means they can't see you either."

"The moment vehicle manufacturers created automatic headlight sensors is when drivers stopped considering they are not working on foggy or low light days when they are most necessary," Fansler said.

"It's always a good idea to use your vehicles lighting features during times of low visibility, not only to assist the drivers but also to help other drivers on the road to see you,"

Hart said. "Most newer vehicles are equipped with daytime running lamps, which I would advise drivers to turn on as an added safety feature while driving at any time of the day."

"Drivers assume since they can see everyone else, they can obviously be seen as well," Fansler said. "This is proven wrong over and over again, especially on white and grey colored vehicles that blend into the landscape. Use the headlights. Use them daily. Get in the habit of being seen. I want to be as safe as possible. If that means the inconvenience of taking a nano-second to turn my headlights on, I think it may be worth it."

"Also, drivers need to remember the law requires you to turn on your headlights whenever it is raining, so when you turn on your wipers, turn on your headlights, too (but not your flashers. Those are only for stopped vehicles or vehicles in a funeral procession)," Dressel said.

Replace or restore headlights that are cloudy or yellow, and turn on those headlights any time that visibility is low.

spray the field. Jackson told the maintenance person not to spray for weeds, because there would be nothing left to play on, but dirt.

They put in ryegrass, but it was sprayed and killed, and the irrigation pump broke and was down for three weeks, he said.

"We own this property and we are going to have property we don't own

better than what we own?" Jackson asked. "I think it is the School Board's responsibility to see that the facilities that we own are as good as the ones we lease."

School Board member Donna Howerton said the district is always spending a lot of money on maintenance, chemicals and grass.

It will cost \$20,000 to \$30,000 more to get the football field where it needs to be if it doesn't have to be sodded, Jackson said. The Avon

Park field is on an old orange grove with terrible sand.

Superintendent Brenda Longshore said the district may look into having Astroturf at all three high schools.

No decisions were made at the workshop on athletic projects nor the Astroturf proposal.

The middle and high school principals and athletic directors will meet with district administrators to develop a list of priorities.

12 gauge wire. Don't be fooled merely by a thick looking cord — check the wire size before you buy it."

Bashoor said to keep a three foot clearance around the heater.

Other safety suggestions from ESFI are to not drape clothing on or try to dry clothing near the heater.

Do not use a heater to thaw pipes or heat food. Commit an outlet to the sole use of the heater.

Heaters should never be used near bedding.

Place heaters out of high traffic areas to avoid tipping over.

When leaving the room or the home, turn off the heater.

"Although less common in Florida, kerosene heaters are also problematic," Bashoor said. "The same clearance rules apply, although I usually recommend greater distances around kerosene heaters, because of the necessary venting and the flammable liquids inside. Never fill a kerosene heater while the device is on, and never fill a kerosene heater inside a structure.

"I have, unfortunately, witnessed several

residential fatalities that were directly attributed to those two issues," he said.

Space heaters are only to be used to supplement heat in an area. They can be safe when properly used.

"Best bet, pull up another blanket ... it will be 80 [degrees] tomorrow," Bashoor said.

All kidding aside, fire safety is no laughing matter. Prevention is half the battle, but residents need to be prepared in the event of a fire. The first line of defense is a

smoke detector.

"Please, please, please, make sure you have working smoke alarms in your home, trailer, or RV," Bashoor urged. "If you're using any gas service, wood burning, or have an attached garage, you should also have carbon monoxide (CO) detectors.

"Smoke alarms and CO detectors are the cheapest and simplest things you can do to give you a little extra time and chance to get out, should the unthinkable happen in your home," he said.

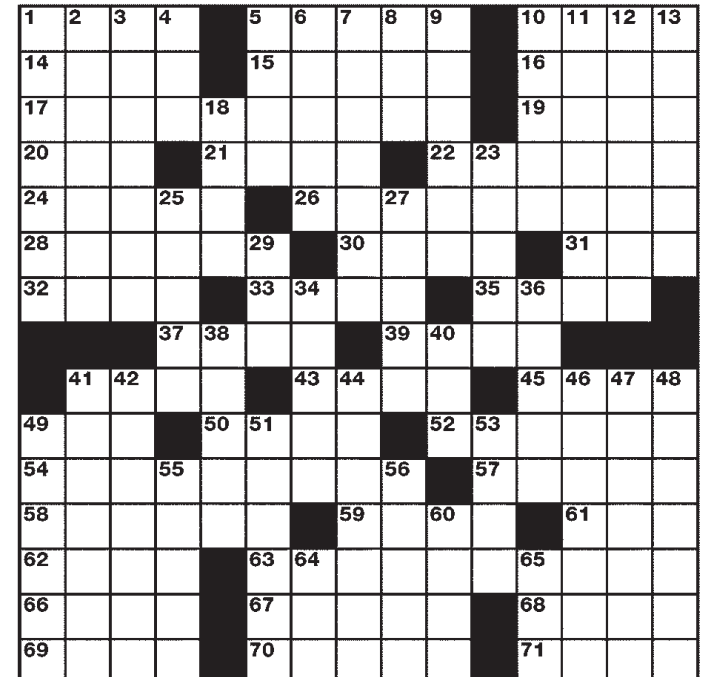

With the second Don & Joe's BIG SHOW Bass tournament coming up on Saturday, I keep getting asked the same question, over and over....."where are the bass?"

Actually, I guess I've been hearing that question all year on Lake Istokpoga, and I've been wondering myself, "where are they?"

I moved to Florida in 1990 so I've been fishing Lake Istokpoga going on 30 years, and like a lot of guys, I remember better fishing on Lake Istokpoga. In fact, not just better, but "great fishing".

But the lake has changed. Years ago we had a problem

with the invasive hydrilla covering as much as 50% of the lake. Water hyacinth and water lettuce were also a problem. The hydrilla was so thick that if you stopped in the middle of a large patch, you wouldn't be able to get your boat back up on plane until you got out of it.

Boats with small motors often had to call for help and ended up being towed out. Not so today. In fact, it's hard to find any hydrilla, let alone the acres and acres that once spread across the open stretches of the lake. Water hyacinth and water lettuce are also pretty scarce.

But there is still an abundance of cattails, reeds, lily pads, bonnets, tussocks and other vegetation that should

hold fish.

Most fishermen blame the poor fishing conditions on all the spraying. Like everyone else, I see the boats out there spraying. Sometimes as many as 4 or 5 airboats spraying a single area.

I've also talked too many of the folks responsible for the spraying as well as the replanting of native vegetation and they all claim the bass population is as strong as it's ever been. Past electro-shocking results appear to support their claim. But if they are right then why are the bass so hard to find and catch?

Just for the record, Florida Fish and Wildlife's,

citizen-science TrophyCatch, a statewide program designed to recognize all species of freshwater fish caught in Florida each year, has had over 500 approved TrophyCatch submissions of largemouth bass over 8 pounds since the program was launched in October 2012. And all those fish were released back into the lake. On their website they claim "Lake Istokpoga is one of the best lakes in the state at having a chance to get your hands on a fish of a lifetime".

Well, I have a theory, and although I'm certainly not a biologist or even an expert bass fisherman, I have been bass fishing for close to 60 years, and fishing bass tournaments for almost 50 years, and my theory is pretty simple. I believe the bass are still there. And by there, I mean in the lake, in the vegetation.

That seems pretty basic

and simple, but you need to delve further into the subject. Baitfish, whether we're talking about golden shiners, or bluegills and crappies need vegetation to survive. Not only do they find safety from predators in vegetation, but that's where their food is. Whether they are bass fry, bait fish or small panfish, they feed on micro-organisms, small crustaceans and the like that live in the vegetation.

If there is no vegetation, they have no protection from predators, and equally as important, they lack the food necessary for their own growth and reproduction. Many are eaten before they even have a chance to grow.

My theory then, is the lack of vegetation creates a lack of food sources for bass in areas where we have typically always caught fish. Does that mean the bass are gone? In a sense, yes. Gone at least from the areas in the past that have always yielded good catches. But gone from the lake? No, not necessarily.

In talking to Eric Johnson, the guy who's in charge of issuing the state exemptions for bass tournaments, as well as over-seeing the general health of Lake Istokpoga, he believes the bass are still there, they've just changed their movements. Eric told me that because we have had so much rain over the past couple of years, the water has literally "flushed" the lake, creating new migratory routes for all game fish, and that fishermen just need to adjust to the change. Again, creel studies over the past couple of years do not suggest a decline in the bass population.

So what's the answer? Given the lack of vegetation (specifically hydrilla), I believe the solution is fishing in whatever vegetation is available. The heavier and thicker the vegetation, the better. In fact, flipping and pitching jigs and plastic worms may be the answer, provided you're using a heavy "punch weight".

I am not alone when

I say that I love Lake Istokpoga. I feel the same way about Lake Okeechobee, but Lake Istokpoga is my home lake and I'd really like to see the fishing improve there. And not just for me but for the hundreds of guys just like me, whether they're fishing tournaments on the lake or just out to have some fun.

So come on out Saturday and fish the BIG SHOW Bass Tournament on Lake Istokpoga. Take off is at 7am and the cost is \$120.00, plus a one-time membership fee of \$25.00 per angler. You can pay at the ramp!

2 tablespoons Dijon-style mustard  
1 1/2 teaspoons ground cloves  
1 teaspoon ground black pepper  
Salt to taste

Trim fat from pork roast, if necessary. Place roast in 4- to 6-quart slow cooker. Use wire whisk to stir together cranberry sauce and sugar in medium bowl. Stir in juice, mustard, cloves and pepper until well combined. Pour cranberry mixture over roast in slow cooker. Cover slow cooker and cook on low for 6 to 8 hours or until pork roast is tender. Season roast to taste with salt; serve juices with roast.

## Tasty creation

### What does it take to build a gingerbread Biltmore replica?

ASHEVILLE, N.C. — Here's what you'll need to make a gingerbread model of Biltmore House: gingerbread, of course. Royal icing. Homemade vanilla wafers. Silver luster. Modeling chocolate. Gold dust. And a little vodka.

The biggest challenge? Not surprisingly, the roof, says Deerpark pastry chef Julie Scheibel, who led her 10-person team on the six-week project to create the gingerbread house now on display in the Biltmore House kitchen.

"The roof took about a week, solid, with at least one person working on it eight hours a day," Scheibel said. It's a laborious process that begins with baking hand-crafted vanilla wafers. The cooled cookies are then sliced in half with a serrated knife before being adhered, one by one, to the roof with a sugary mortar mixture.

Oh, and each tasty tile is hand-dusted with silver luster, a fine-grained culinary powder used to add pizzazz to baked goods. Or gingerbread houses.

Unlike the creations at the Grove Park Inn, which have to be edible through and through, the Biltmore gingerbread is so large it needs a wooden skeleton. So a reusable framework was created some years ago by the estate's engineering team, precisely scaling down the dimensions of the actual building.

The skeleton is affixed to a wooden platform. Once the inner frame is cleaned up and ready to go, the construction order isn't that different from building a real house: walls first, then roof (starting at the bottom and moving upward), lights, decorations.

The walls are all actual gingerbread, minus the leavening, baked a little longer than you would your cookies. "I just try to make sure it's super sturdy," Scheibel says, "since it's going to be here for about two months."

Most of the roof was

constructed by Scheibel and pastry cook Deron Noel.

"He did the majority of the work this year," Scheibel says. "The two of us did the roof together. He installed the little LED lights that you see. And he did most of the decorations."

Some of Noel's work on the house involved sitting at a computer, printing photos of Biltmore House to determine how to shape and where to place the doors and windows, and looking up other confectionary creations for ideas on the swirls, dots and dashes of royal icing that are the finishing touches — "to see what looks the nicest," he said.

He would discuss his design ideas with Scheibel and then start piping the house's white highlights directly onto the walls.

The details change year after year, depending on the chefs working on it, so the pastry team would appreciate it if Biltmore visitors could pause a moment in the kitchen to

admire all the particulars. Those two lions flanking the front door, for example: That's where the vodka comes in. Schiebel hand-sculpted the lions from modeling chocolate. "It's just chocolate and corn syrup," she says. "You melt down your chocolate and add

corn syrup and it makes it like modeling clay" when it cools. "And then it dries hard." Once hardened, the lions were painted with gold — the real stuff. "It's gold dust mixed with vodka," she notes.

While this is Noel's second time on the team, it's Schiebel's first year as team leader, having joined Biltmore more recently.

It's far from her first gingerbread house, however. At her previous gig, at Georgia's Sea Island resort, she worked on elaborate creations every Christmas, inspired by fantasies that included "Alice in Wonderland," "Frozen" and Whoville from "How the Grinch Stole Christmas."

Her advice for home cooks determined to make a gingerbread construction, at least one that favors endurance over edibility: Overcook your gingerbread (and leave out the leavening). "And make sure when you're making your royal icing that it's really thick. If you don't start with a really thick product, like paste, then it will never stick fully when you're gluing your pieces together."

As for transporting the house: It helps if it's fastened to a solid wooden platform (hidden in its final location with a layer of cotton snow). A team of four drove the house from Deerpark before dawn the morning after the tree raising in the Banquet Hall, then wheeled it carefully through Biltmore House's basement to the kitchen, precariously sitting atop the cooks' equivalent of a library cart.

Along with Scheibel and Noel for the delivery were pastry demi chef Megan Moorhead and pastry cook Kayla Breedlove, and they had the house set up and surrounded by snow within just 20 minutes of

their arrival. They were assisted by members of Biltmore's floral team and supervised by Lizzie Borchers, Biltmore's floral manager, the person in charge of all the estate's decorations.

"I love it," Borchers says of this year's gingerbread house. She's especially happy with Schiebel's addition of tiny LED lights along the roof line, since illumination "is something we've been oomphing up this year" throughout the estate.

The gingerbread house provides a touch of Christmas in the kitchen, where the addition of other Christmas decorations wouldn't make much sense.

"We're not going to put a tree down here or deck it out," Borchers says. "The style and what fits down here and in the servants' rooms, the servants' dining room, should be different from what you see upstairs. It should reflect the space."

Within the home's historical context, as it would have appeared at Christmas when occupied by the Vanderbilt family, Borchers imagines the gingerbread house sits in the kitchen "being worked on by the staff before it goes up to the Banquet Hall, maybe for a party."

Borchers says this year's gingerbread house is "different from anything we've done before. It's kind of great to see how many different ways we can make a gingerbread house out of Biltmore."

Don't believe her? Lead decorator Noel has simple advice for those passing through the kitchen and encountering his work. Pause long enough to make sure you "don't miss a thing."

## Trump's ex-lawyer Cohen gets 3 years in prison

Once-devoted 'fixer' says 'blind loyalty' to his boss led him to cover up Trump's 'dirty deeds'

NEW YORK — Michael Cohen, President Donald Trump's once-devoted lawyer and all-around fixer, was sentenced Wednesday to three years in prison after telling a federal judge that his "blind loyalty" to his boss led him to cover up Trump's "dirty deeds."

Standing alone at the defense table, Cohen, 52, shook his head slightly and closed his eyes as the judge pronounced the sentence for crimes that included lying about his boss' business dealings in Russia and funneling hush money to two women who said they had sex with Trump — payments that both Cohen and federal prosecutors said were made at Trump's direction to fend off damage to his White House bid.

Cohen is the first and, so far, only member of Trump's circle during two years of investigations to go into open

court and implicate the president in a crime, though whether a president can be prosecuted under the Constitution is an open question.

Separately, prosecutors announced Wednesday that they filled in another piece of the puzzle in the hush-money case: The parent company of the National Enquirer acknowledged making one of those payments "in concert" with the Trump campaign to protect him from a story that could have hurt his candidacy.

During an appearance at the White House shortly after the sentencing, Trump ignored reporters' questions about Cohen.

At the sentencing, U.S. District Judge William H. Pauley III said Cohen deserved modest credit for his decision over the summer to admit guilt and cooperate in the federal investigation of efforts by Russians to influence the 2016 presidential election, but his assistance "does not wipe the slate clean."

"Somewhere along the way Mr. Cohen appears to have lost his moral compass," the judge said. "As a lawyer, Mr. Cohen should have known better."

The judge also ordered Cohen to pay \$1.39 million in restitution to the IRS, forfeit \$500,000 and pay \$100,000 in fines. He was ordered to report to prison March 6 and left court without comment.

The prison sentence was in line with what prosecutors asked for. Sentencing guidelines called for around four to five years, and the government asked in court papers that Cohen be given only a slight break.

"It was my own weakness and a blind loyalty to this man that led me to choose a path of darkness over light," Cohen, who once boasted he would "take a bullet" for Trump, told the judge before the sentence came

## Cold-stunned turtles flown from New England to Florida Keys

MARATHON, Fla. (AP) — Officials say 32 cold-stunned Kemp's ridley sea turtles rescued off New England's coast have arrived in the Florida Keys to warm up at the Turtle Hospital.

A volunteer group of general aviation pilots, under the banner of "Turtles Fly Too," transported the reptiles on Tuesday.

Hospital officials say several of the turtles suffer from compromised immune systems and pneumonia as a result of "cold stunning," a hypothermic reaction that occurs when turtles are exposed to cold water for prolonged periods.

The turtles were rescued over the past month off Cape Cod, Massachusetts. They were initially treated at the New England Aquarium in Quincy, Massachusetts.

Upon their arrival at the Turtle Hospital, on-site veterinarians and staff conducted full physical examinations and began caring for the reptiles.

## Florida school panel recommends arming teachers

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — The panel investigating the Florida high school massacre recommended Wednesday that teachers who volunteer and undergo extensive background checks and training be allowed to carry concealed guns on campus to stop future shootings.

The Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Commission voted 13-1 to recommend the Legislature allow the arming of teachers, saying it's not enough to have one or two police officers or armed guards on campus. Florida law adopted after the Feb. 14 shooting that left 17 dead allows districts to arm non-teaching staff members such as principals,

librarians and custodians — 13 of the 67 districts do, mostly in rural parts of the state.

Pinellas County Sheriff Bob Gualtieri, the commission's chairman, pushed the measure at the Tallahassee meeting. He said most deaths in school shootings happen within the first few minutes, before officers on and off campus can respond. He said suspect Nikolas Cruz stopped to reload his AR-15 semi-automatic rifle five times, all of which would have been opportunities for an armed teacher to shoot him.

"We have to give people a fighting chance, we have to give them an opportunity to protect themselves," Gualtieri said. He said there aren't enough officers or money to hire one for every school, but even then

officers need backup. "One good guy with a gun on campus is not enough."

The state teachers union and PTA have previously expressed opposition, saying teachers are hired to educate, not be police officers.

Commissioner Max Schachter, whose 14-year-old son Alex died in the massacre, cast the lone vote against the motion. He said the state should focus on hiring more police officers for campuses and allowing non-teaching staff to carry guns.

"We do need more good guys with a gun on campus — nobody understands that and wishes we had more at Marjory Stoneman Douglas than myself," Schachter said. But arming teachers "creates

## Pelosi, foes clinch deal all but paving her way to speaker

Democratic leader would serve no more than four more years

WASHINGTON — Rep. Nancy Pelosi and fellow Democrats who had tried derailing her effort to become House speaker seemed on the verge of an agreement that would all but ensure her election to the post, aides said Wednesday.

Assuming the accord is completed, Pelosi would seem to have a clear path to becoming the most powerful Democrat in government. That would give her a top role in confronting President Donald Trump during the upcoming 2020 presidential and

congressional campaigns and would put a woman at the helm of next year's diverse crop of House Democrats.

As the price for winning decisive support from her opponents, Pelosi, D-Calif., would agree, in effect, to serve no more than four more years as speaker. Aides said that before announcing their support

## UK's May wins no-confidence vote by MPs unhappy over Brexit

LONDON — British Prime Minister Theresa May survived a political crisis over her Brexit deal Wednesday, winning a no-confidence vote by Conservative lawmakers that would have ended her leadership of party and country.

But the margin of victory — 200 votes to 117 — leaves May a weakened leader who has lost the support of a big chunk of her party over her handling of Britain's exit from the European Union. It also came at a steep price as she promised not to run for re-election in 2022. Britain's Brexit problem, meanwhile, remains unsolved as May seeks changes to her EU divorce deal in order to

make it more palatable to Parliament.

May said she was "pleased to have received the backing of my colleagues" but acknowledged that "a significant number" had voted against her in Wednesday evening's secret ballot.

# Thousands of mailed ballots were not counted

Officials say ballots were delivered too late to state election offices

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Florida officials say thousands of mailed ballots were not counted because they were delivered too late to state election offices.

The Department of State late last week informed a federal judge that 6,670 ballots were mailed ahead of the Nov. 6 election but were not counted because they were not received

by Election Day. The tally prepared by state officials includes totals from 65 of Florida's 67 counties. The two counties yet to report their totals are Palm Beach, a Democratic stronghold in south Florida, and Polk in central Florida.

Three statewide Florida races, including the contest for governor, went to state-mandated recounts because the margins were so close.

In the battle for agriculture commissioner,

Democrat Nikki Fried won her election by 6,753 votes. Republican Gov. Rick Scott ousted incumbent Democrat U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson by slightly more than 10,000 votes.

Under Florida law, ballots mailed inside the United States must reach election offices by 7 p.m. on Election Day. Overseas ballots are counted if they are received up to 10 days after the election.

A group called VoteVets Action Fund along

with two Democratic organizations filed a lawsuit a few days after the 2017 election that argued the ballots should count if they were mailed before Election Day.

But U.S. District Judge Mark Walker said the restriction was reasonable and that Florida election officials have a right to establish deadlines. He turned down an emergency request that all properly postmarked ballots received up to 10

days after the election be counted.

The lawsuit, however, is still pending and Walker asked that state election officials report how many ballots were mailed before Election Day but ultimately were not counted.

Walker was the judge involved in a half-dozen lawsuits that were filed following the razor-thin elections in Florida.

In a separate lawsuit filed last month, Walker gave voters extra time to fix

their mail-in ballots if they were not counted because their signature on their ballot envelope did not match the one on file with local election officials.

State officials testified in court that nearly 4,000 mailed-in ballots were set aside because local officials decided the signatures on did not match. The Department of State last week informed Walker that his ruling resulted in 637 votes being counted in the final totals.

## FBI probe leads to charges against Tallahassee city commissioner

44-count federal indictment includes bribery, extortion, bank fraud, racketeering

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — An FBI corruption investigation that became an issue in the Florida governor's race led to a 44-count federal indictment Wednesday against a city commissioner who once ran the state's Democratic Party.

The indictment charges Tallahassee Commissioner Scott Maddox with bribery, extortion, bank fraud, racketeering and other crimes. Not mentioned in the indictment is Democratic nominee for governor Andrew Gillum, who served as Tallahassee's mayor during the investigation.

Gillum lost the governor's race to

Republican former U.S. Rep. Ron DeSantis, who repeatedly said Gillum was being investigated by the FBI. Gillum repeatedly said he wasn't a target. Gillum lost by 32,463 votes out of more than 8.2 million cast — a margin so close it required a statewide recount.

Maddox once served as Tallahassee's mayor. In 2002, he was elected as chairman of the Florida Democratic Party. He resigned in 2005 to run for governor but dropped out of the race before the primary. He has also unsuccessfully run for attorney general and agriculture commissioner, both Cabinet positions.

Longtime Maddox associate Paige Carter-Smith is also charged. The indictment alleges that

when Maddox returned to the city commission in 2012, he falsely claimed that he sold his interest in

a lobbying and consulting firm to Paige and no longer had an interest in it.

The indictment alleges that Maddox and Carter-Smith continued to work together while Maddox was on the commission and took money from clients in exchange for favorable votes by Maddox, including ride-hailing company Uber.

It also alleges the two conspired to defraud a bank of more than \$250,000 through two fraudulent short sales of real property and lied to investigators about their business arrangements and other matters.

Maddox didn't immediately return a phone call seeking comment. Carter-Smith didn't answer a call to her cellphone and her voicemail was full. Carter-Smith served as chief executive officer of the Tallahassee Downtown

Improvement Authority during the investigation, which also involve the Internal Revenue Service.

During the investigation, Gillum spent time with undercover FBI agents in New York City, joining them on a boat ride and accepting tickets to the Broadway show "Hamilton." The agents were posing as businessmen interested in Tallahassee development projects.

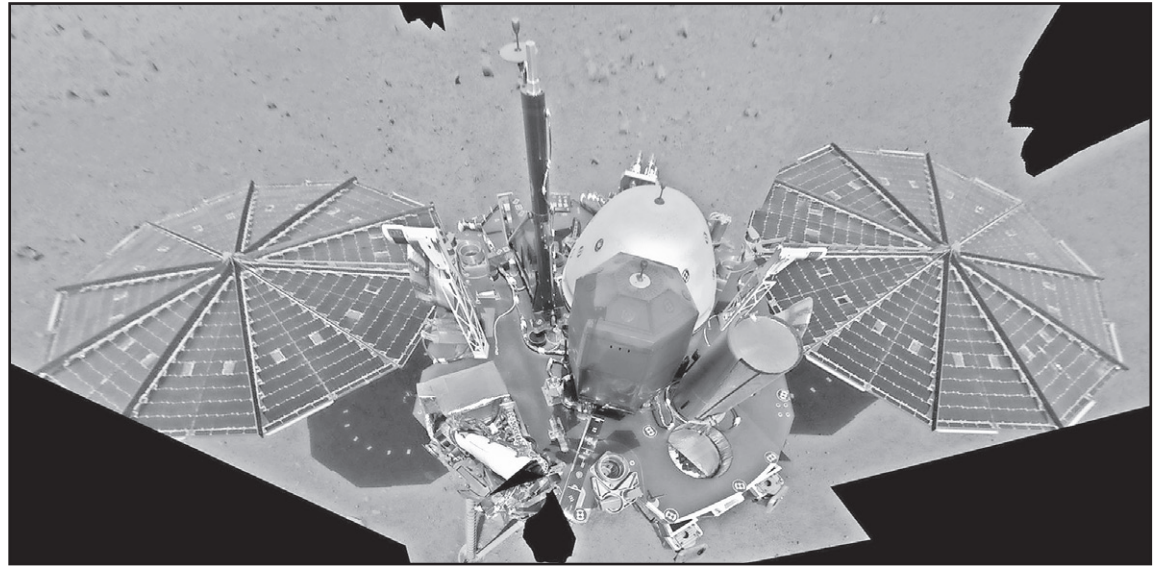
The state ethics commission is considering a separate complaint that Gillum accepted illegal gifts, including from the undercover agents.

The U.S. attorney's office in Tallahassee wouldn't say whether the investigation could result in more indictments.

## NASA's Mars lander takes selfie with robotic arm

#### Florida's state-created insurer wants a hefty rate hike

MAITLAND, Fla. (AP) — One of Florida's largest property insurers plans to raise its rates.

The board that controls Citizens Property Insurance voted on Wednesday to approve an overall statewide rate hike of 8.2 percent for homeowners, condominium owners and renters. If approved by state regulators, the rate hike would take effect in September 2019.

The board of the state-created insurer had planned to vote on a rate hike this past summer. But the vote was delayed until December at the urging of Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis. Patronis was elected to a four-year term in November.

Citizens officials argue that the rate hike is needed because of a surge in non-weather-related water losses, such as those caused by broken pipes.

Citizens has nearly 435,000 policyholders, including many homeowners in South Florida.

#### Report raps Florida Virtual School's ex-lawyer

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — The former top attorney for the Florida Virtual School is accused of making boorish comments and using school employees for his outside business activities in an investigative report.

Frank Kruppenbacher resigned from his job as general counsel

last August on the same day the school's board of trustees voted to hire an outside law firm to investigate a dozen complaints against him.

The report was made public Tuesday at a meeting of the board of the virtual school. The school is the state's public online institution, serving more than 200,000 students a year with more than 180 online courses.

Kruppenbacher denies the allegations, telling the Orlando Sentinel they were retaliation for his finding waste and mismanagement at the school.

#### Surgeon's daughters sue hospital where he worked

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — A prominent cardiologist's daughters are suing the Florida hospital where he worked for decades, claiming a series of medical mistakes after his back surgery left him in a vegetative state.

The daughters of Dr. J. Lancelot Lester on Tuesday sued JFK Medical Center in Palm Beach County, Florida where their father was a surgeon for three decades.

The lawsuit seeks between \$15 million and \$20 million.

Lindsay Stortz told the Palm Beach Post that she and her sister were forced to sue after the hospital neglected to give their father the treatment he needs.

The former chief of JFK's cardiovascular surgery was left in a vegetative state after he had a violent reaction to a narcotic he was prescribed to alleviate pain.

#### 6th grader ordered to stay away from student

LAKELAND, Fla. (AP) — A sixth-grade student at a Florida middle school has been issued a restraining order to stay away from another student who he is accused of beating badly.

A judge issued the restraining order this week, requiring the student to stay 50 feet away from the other student. The judge found that the student had stalked and bullied the victim again following the beating last month.

A police report says that last month the student picked up the victim by his shoulders, slammed him into the pavement and repeatedly punched him in the head after the victim refused to give him popcorn he was selling for a fundraiser.

#### Agency: \$4.2 billion in insured losses in Florida from storm

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — State officials are estimating that Floridians had more than \$4.2 billion in insured losses from Hurricane Michael.

The Florida Office of Insurance Regulation said that as of last week, insurers had handled more than 131,000 claims in Florida, about two-thirds of them involving residential properties.

More than half have been paid, and about a third are still

open. About 10 percent were closed without being paid.

By far the largest number of claims, more than 79,000, came from Bay County, where the Category 4 hurricane came ashore in October.

#### Kids weren't vaccinated in 4 measles cases

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP) — The Florida Department of Health says four children who were diagnosed with measles were never vaccinated.

The health agency says the children in Sarasota County on Florida's Gulf Coast had close contact with each other but didn't elaborate further.

The Sarasota Herald-Tribune reports that health officials are trying to notify others who may have been exposed.

#### Top hospital officials resign after newspaper investigation

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) — Top officials at a Florida children's hospital have resigned after a newspaper investigation found dramatic increases in the hospital's mortality rates for heart surgeries.

The Tampa Bay Times reports Johns Hopkins All Children's Hospital released a statement Tuesday saying CEO Dr. Jonathan Ellen, Vice President Jackie Crain and deputy director of the hospital's Heart Institute Dr. Jeffrey Jacobs had

resigned.

Dr. Paul Colombani stepped down as chair of the department of surgery, but will "continue in a clinical capacity."

The newspaper reported that Crain and Colombani declined to comment. Ellen did not return requests for comment. Jacobs' attorney said in a statement that Jacobs had been "forced out" and prevented from speaking on his own behalf.

A Times investigation found that the Heart Institute's mortality rate tripled between 2015 and 2017.

#### State House member picked to run Florida business agency

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Republican Gov.-elect Ron DeSantis is tapping state Rep. Halsey Beshears to run the Florida department that regulates businesses and professional licensing.

DeSantis announced his pick to run the Department of Business and Professional Regulation on Tuesday. Beshears was elected to the House in 2012 and would have to leave office in 2020 because of term limits.

Beshears is chief financial officer for Simpson Nurseries, a Florida- and Tennessee-based wholesale nursery that specializes in pecan and fruit trees among other trees and shrubs.

He's also been an advocate in the Legislature for eliminating business regulations.

# Julian Castro moves toward 2020 White House run

Texas Democrat, housing chief under President Obama, launches exploratory committee

SAN ANTONIO — Former Obama housing chief Julian Castro says he's taking a step toward a possible White House campaign in 2020 by forming a presidential exploratory committee. The Texas Democrat tells The Associated Press that he will announce a decision Jan. 12.

The move Wednesday gives the 44-year-old former San Antonio mayor an early start to what's

shaping up as a crowded Democratic field without a clear front-runner to challenge President Donald Trump.

Castro indicated in an AP interview that his mind was all but made up.

"I know where I'm leaning, for sure," said Castro, who has said for weeks that it was likely he would seek the nomination.

An exploratory committee usually is a formality before a candidate launches a presidential campaign. It legally allows potential candidates to

begin raising money.

But just as important for Castro, the step gives him an early jump on bigger name Democrats who are considering running but are taking a

slower approach.

No potential contender is more ascendant than outgoing Rep. Beto O'Rourke, who lost last month in a surprisingly close race against Sen. Ted Cruz, R-Texas. O'Rourke has excited donors and activists who are now prodding him to seek the presidency.

Sens. Elizabeth Warren of Massachusetts and Cory Booker of New Jersey, along with former Vice President Joe Biden, are also potential candidates.

Castro would be among the youngest candidates

in the field and the most prominent Latino. He played down the attention that others are generating and pointed to past election cycles in which early favorites ended up faltering.

Castro said he has not spoken to former President Barack Obama about his potential candidacy but plans on consulting Democratic leaders. Obama has spoken to O'Rourke, who has said he won't make a decision on 2020 until after leaving Congress in January.

Obama picked Castro to take over the Department of Housing and Urban Development in 2014. Two years later, Castro was on the short list of Democratic presidential nominee Hillary Clinton's potential running mates.

For Castro, running for president would fulfill a destiny that Democrats have projected since he was elected San Antonio mayor at 34, followed by his star-making turn as the keynote speaker at the Democratic National Convention in 2012.

### Man sues after getting finger caught in airplane armrest

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A man is suing after he says one of his pinky fingers was caught in an airline armrest mechanism for nearly an hour during a flight to Los Angeles.

City News Service reports Stephen Keys has filed a lawsuit in Los Angeles Superior Court against both American Airlines Inc. and SkyWest Airlines Inc., alleging negligence.

A representative for American, which has a flying agreement with SkyWest, referred all comment to SkyWest, which said, "We worked with our partner American to reach out to Mr. Keys regarding his bruised finger and look forward to swiftly resolving this matter. Due to the ongoing litigation, we cannot comment further."

The complaint says the injury to his finger left Keys unable to perform such previously routine tasks as driving and playing with his children. It says Keys experienced weeks of intense pain and severe emotional distress.

### Lawsuit: Drop 'good moral character' esthetician requirement

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Is good moral character required to wax eyebrows and give facials?

In the state of Pennsylvania it is, and two women denied licenses to work as cosmetologists because they ran afoul of that regulation are challenging the law in court.

Courtney Haveman and

Amanda Spillane filed suit on Tuesday, with the help of non-profit law firm the Institute for Justice.

They claim the state's good moral character requirement for cosmetologists is unfair and unconstitutional.

The women say they suffered from addictions in the past, which led to criminal records.

They say they've turned their lives around, completed beauty school and had jobs lined up. Nonetheless, their license application was denied, citing their moral character.

### Rare whales arrival earlier than typical in Cape Cod Bay

PROVINCETOWN, Mass. (AP) — Marine scientists say endangered North Atlantic right whales have been spotted in Cape Cod Bay for the first time this feeding season.

The Center for Coastal Studies says its aerial surveillance team saw seven right whales in the bay on Tuesday. They are among about 411 left in the world. The whales have been under close watch in recent years because of a downward population trend.

The whales transit the area every year to feed on microscopic organisms.

Charles "Stormy" Mayo, a senior scientist with the center, says the sighting indicates the whales are entering the feeding area earlier than previously thought. He says that information is important to protecting what remains of the population.

No new baby whales were found in 2018. They give birth off Georgia and Florida.

### Man charged with stealing FBI unmarked car, body armor

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Federal prosecutors have charged a man who allegedly broke into an FBI storage facility in San Francisco, stole body armor and drove off in an unmarked FBI car that he used to go joyriding.

Federal officials say 30-year-old Angelo Valdez illegally entered the FBI storage facility on Oct. 22 and spent about half an hour inside a crisis negotiation van before turning his attention to an unmarked SUV he drove out of the facility.

The Mercury News reports federal prosecutors in court records say the next day a jogger saw the vehicle smashing into random objects in Golden Gate Park. An officer tried to arrest Valdez but he ran away.

Authorities say Valdez was wearing the body armor when U.S. Park Police arrested him two days later.

### Ex-Romanian official pleads guilty to US credit card thefts

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — A former Romanian official has been sentenced in Buffalo for breaking into gym lockers to steal credit cards and purchasing nearly \$100,000 in high-end electronic devices.

The Erie County District Attorney's Office says 51-year-old George Piha, a former deputy mayor in Romania who lived in Queens, was sentenced Tuesday to 2 to 6 years in prison.

### US lawmakers examine Native women's deaths, disappearances

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — The sister of a missing Blackfeet woman in Montana is expressing frustration over police's initial response to her loved one's disappearance, saying in testimony prepared for U.S. senators Wednesday that dysfunctional investigations into missing persons cases have troubled numerous Native American families.

The testimony from Kimberly Loring is part of a U.S. Senate committee hearing held in Washington, D.C., to examine concerns about investigations into the deaths and disappearance of Native American women. Her sister Ashley HeavyRunner Loring vanished in June 2017 at age 20.

The Associated Press this year found that Native Americans

and Alaska Natives, who comprise less than a percentage point of the U.S. population, made up 1.8 percent of ongoing missing cases in the FBI's National Crime Information Center database.

### Wreath placement on tunnel into New York irking some

JERSEY CITY, N.J. (AP) — The placement of wreaths at the entrance of the Holland Tunnel into New York is causing some holiday angst.

Some motorists have complained that the wreaths — two circular ones and another in the shape of a Christmas tree — can trigger reactions among people with obsessive-compulsive disorder.

The circular wreaths cover the tunnel signs "O" and "U" and the tree-shaped wreath covers the "N" in "Holland."

A www.change.org petition to switch the configuration has received nearly 1,300 supporters. The Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, which operates the tunnel, announced Wednesday it is conducting its own public poll.

More than 1 million vehicles use the tunnel each month, according to Port Authority statistics.

### US officials: China poses serious national security threat

WASHINGTON (AP) — Cyber threats from China and its theft of intellectual property from American companies pose large economic and national security challenges for the United States, national security officials said Wednesday.

Officials from the Department of Justice, the FBI and the Department of Homeland Security told the Senate Judiciary Committee that China is working to steal trade secrets and intellectual property from U.S. companies in order to harm America's economy.

"We cannot tolerate a nation that steals the fruit of our brainpower," Assistant Attorney General John Demers said.

Bill Priestap, the assistant director of the FBI's counterintelligence division, said federal officials are doing everything they can to convey the current threat to business leaders and government officials.

China's espionage activity has been "steadily increasing" in the last few years, Demers said.

"The bottom line is they will do anything they can to achieve their aims," Priestap said of the Chinese.

Cyberespionage cases can be drawn out, involve sensitive intelligence and ultimately may lead to prosecutions, he said. The department is working to train prosecutors across the U.S. in how to bring similar cases.

In the last few months, the Justice Department has filed several charges against Chinese

hackers and intelligence officials.

In October, a suspected Chinese spy was charged with attempting to steal trade secrets from several American aviation and aerospace companies.

Yanjun Xu, an operative of the Chinese Ministry of State Security, is accused of recruiting employees of major aerospace companies, including GE Aviation, and persuading them to travel to China under the guise of giving a presentation at a university.

That case was the first time that a Chinese Ministry of State Security intelligence officer has been extradited to the United States for trial.

Tensions between the U.S. and China have been high recently because of trade disputes, and President Donald Trump frequently criticizes China.

### Sex abuse allegations against Brazil healer multiply

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — More than 200 people have come forward with complaints of sexual abuse by a Brazilian faith healer, authorities said Wednesday.

The accusations against Joao Teixeira de Faria, who uses the name Joao de Deus in his practice, began last week after several alleged victims spoke on a Globo News television program of sexual violence going back years. One young man interviewed said de Faria sexually assaulted his mother, who visited the spiritualist looking for a cure for her terminal cancer.

"There are so many victims that the team assigned to deal

with the case is overwhelmed taking statements," said Ana Cristina Arruda from the prosecutors' office in Goias. "It's still too early to know the full scope of the situation."

Many of de Faria's alleged victims say he molested them as children under the pretense of spiritual healing and that the abuse went on for years.

The spiritual healer, who denies wrongdoing, attracted followers from throughout the world to a retreat in the small town of Abadiania. His treatments, sometimes on video for an outside audience, could involve small incisions, opening nostrils with scissors or scraping an eye without antiseptics.

Visitors included former Brazilian President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva, football player Ronaldo Luis Nazario de Lima and model Naomi Campbell.

In 2012 Oprah Winfrey traveled to visit de Faria to record a special for her talk show, Super Soul Sunday.

### Report: 'High-tech' robot on Russian TV was man in suit

MOSCOW (AP) — Russian media say a contraption presented by Russian state television as a high-tech robot was in fact a man in a commercially available robot costume.

The footage was shot at a high-tech show in the city of Yaroslavl that opened Tuesday, featuring "Boris the Robot." Forum organizers used Boris to enliven the event, having him dance to a pop song.

But a crew for Russian state television apparently thought Boris was real, and used footage of him dancing and speaking as an example of Russian technological prowess.

Online TJournal noted the lack of sensors, human-like movements and other discrepancies, and revealed that Boris was in fact a human clad in a costume sold under the name Alyosha by the Russian company Show Robots.

### Baby boy, born after Israeli mom wounded in West Bank, dies

JERUSALEM (AP) — A baby born prematurely after his Israeli mother was critically wounded in a shooting at a bus stop outside a West Bank settlement earlier this week died on Wednesday.

Jerusalem's Shaare Zedek Hospital said the mother remained hospital in intensive care.

The baby was delivered by a cesarean section on Sunday night, shortly after the drive-by shooting, which wounded seven people.

Security camera footage from the scene showed a Palestinian vehicle speeding away from the scene after the shooting. The suspects remain at large, despite an Israeli military manhunt.

Speaking to foreign reporters on Wednesday night, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu condemned the attackers as "the most deviant criminals on earth."

"The security forces are pursuing them and I hope that there will be news soon on this matter," he said.

### Gunman from attack in France still at large

STRASBOURG, France (AP) — Hundreds of security forces combed eastern France for a 29-year-old man with a long criminal record who shouted "God is great" in Arabic and sprayed gunfire during a deadly rampage in Strasbourg's famous Christmas market, officials said.

Tuesday night's attack at France's largest Christmas market, which killed two people, left a third brain-dead and injured 12, was a stark reminder to a nation wounded by previous assaults that terrorism remains a threat, even as anti-government protests roil the country.

National police distributed a photo of the wounded fugitive, identified as Cherif Chekatt, with the warning: "Individual dangerous, above all do not intervene."

Interior Minister Christophe Castaner told lawmakers that the French native had run-ins with police starting at age 10 and his first conviction at age 13.

Chekatt had been convicted 27 times, mostly in France but also in Switzerland and Germany, for crimes including armed robbery. He had been flagged for extremism and was on a watch list.

The emerging profile pointed to an increasingly common hybrid extremist who moves from acts of delinquency to sowing terror.

Chekatt was flagged as a potential extremist, but Castaner said "the signs had been weak."

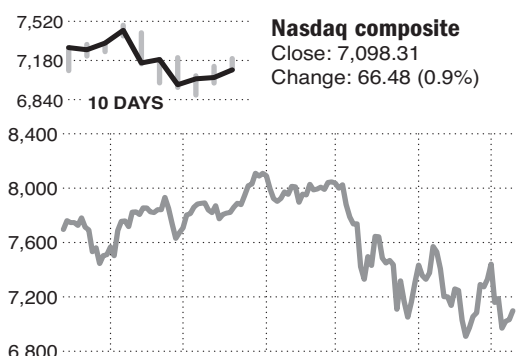

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Wall Street ends higher with help from tech and health care

By MARLEY JAY AP MARKETS WRITER NEW YORK — U.S. stocks couldn't hang on to a big gain Wednesday, but they still finished broadly higher as technology and health care companies rose. That helped reverse some of the market's big losses from the week before. Stocks initially rallied after the Wall Street Journal reported that China's government could make changes to its "Made in China 2025" economic development plan. That could be one step toward easing dispute between the world's two largest economies. The Dow Jones Industrial Average surged as much as 458 points in morning trading, but gave

later back much of that gain. "Any time you get some semblance of good news on trade, you've had this tendency to see a pretty sharp rally," said Liz Ann Sonders, chief investment strategist for Charles Schwab. After taking steep losses at the end of last week, stocks have gyrated this week: on Monday they rallied to erase a big early loss, while on Tuesday a big morning gain turned into a small decline. On Wednesday, most of the day's gains evaporated in the afternoon. The hour-to-hour changes reflect investors' nervousness about the health of the global economy: economic growth is expected to slow in 2019 and the U.S.-China

trade dispute and rising interest rates could both make that slowdown more painful. Sonders said investors overlooked those threats for a time, but can't ignore them anymore. "Some of these intraday reversals have been quite extraordinary," said Sonders. "You have to go back to the financial crisis era to see ... such a big swing on consecutive days." The S&P 500 index rose 14.29 points, or 0.5 percent, to 2,651.07. The Dow gained 157.03 points, or 0.6 percent, to 24,527.27. The Nasdaq composite jumped 66.48 points, or 0.9 percent, to 7,098.31. The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks added 15.19 points, or 1.1 percent, to 1,455.32.

Measurements that will trigger surgery for aneurysm

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am a 68-year-old male in good health with a 3.3-centimeter aneurysm in my internal iliac artery. I have no symptoms. It was 1.9 cm eight years ago.

My physician says that an aneurysm measuring over 3 cm requires surgical intervention. I have looked at recent studies that say an aneurysm measuring less than 4 cm can be safely observed because a rupture under this size is extremely rare. I welcome your opinion on this matter. — T.R.

ANSWER: The internal iliac artery is one of the main blood vessels in the hip. The aorta branches into two common iliac arteries, left and right, which in turn branch into the internal and external iliac arteries. An aneurysm is a dilation of the artery, and the big concern is a rupture, which is immediately life-threatening. Thus, repair is recommended before there is a significant risk of rupture.

The current standard of practice is to repair any aneurysm that is over 3 cm, symptomatic or rapidly

expanding. Although yours has expanded slowly over the past eight years and you have no symptoms, the aneurysm is still over 3 cm.

A study presented in Finland in 2015 has challenged the current standard of practice. The author of the study said that elective treatment of an internal iliac aneurysm could "quite safely be increased to 4 cm." The average person in the study was 77 years old.

Based on this study, it appears you could hold off on surgery, for now. However, it is likely that the vessel will keep expanding and

you eventually will need repair. Most importantly, the one whose opinion matters most, next to your own, is the surgeon who would be operating on you. I would recommend discussing with your vascular surgeon the advisability of waiting. I should mention that many times, these procedures are now done endovascularly, which means no open surgery.

Finally, people with one aneurysm often have others. I am sure you have been checked, but you should continue to be evaluated, even after repair.

DEAR DR. ROACH: My daughter was only a year old when she was diagnosed with an autoimmune disease — a non-life-threatening disorder that would mean she spent a considerable amount of time in and out of hospitals.

Due to this diagnosis, she was unable to get the measles, mumps and rubella vaccine. She contracted measles in the hospital and, despite the best care available, died three months later. I am writing to

educate parents on the benefits of vaccination, as every child deserves to be protected from infectious diseases. — D.M.P.

ANSWER: I admire your trying to make something positive out of the worst tragedy a parent can face.

Measles is an exceptionally infectious disease. Ninety percent of people exposed will contract the disease unless they have immunity from a previous infection or vaccination. People with some immune system diseases and those who have had chemotherapy may be unable to take the vaccine. The best hope for people who cannot get the vaccine is that enough people around them are vaccinated so that the disease cannot spread. In several countries in Europe, the level of vaccination has dropped below the critical level, with a result of over 9,000 cases in the previous 12 months, as of the most recent report. About 1 person per 1,000 with measles will die and another 1-2 per 1,000 will get a serious complication.

Wife can no longer endure vicious tales man's ex tells

DEAR ABBY: I have been with my husband for five years, and we have two children together. It's my husband's second marriage and my first. DEAR DRAMA: You know that what your husband's ex is saying isn't true because you have been with your husband long enough to see the kind of person he is. Continue to ignore and avoid her. If someone repeats her stories, tell them that IN YOUR EXPERIENCE what she's saying couldn't be further from the truth.

DEAR ABBY: I'm a man, married for two years. My husband and I have a great marriage, but last

week my father was diagnosed with stage 4 cancer, and I'm having trouble processing it. But yesterday I woke up and a friend of mine wanted to meet with me and we ended up having sex.

DEAR OFF: I, too, suspect that your infidelity may be related to trying to deal with your father's diagnosis. However, if this becomes your default coping mechanism, discuss it with a licensed psycho-therapist.

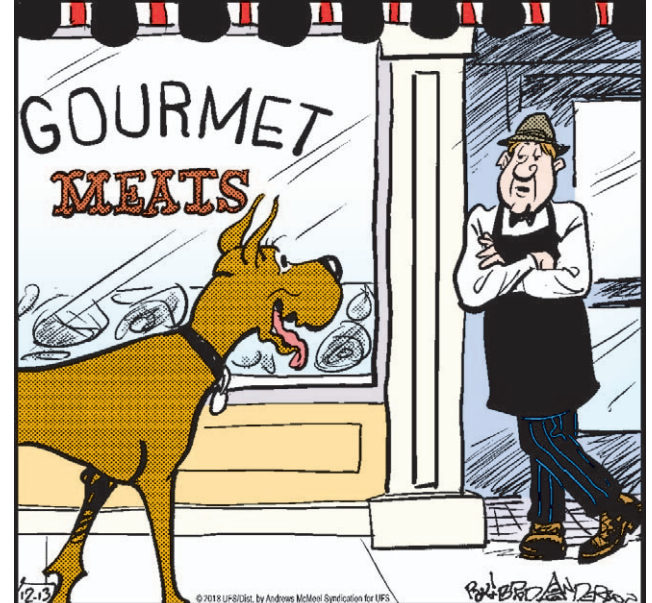

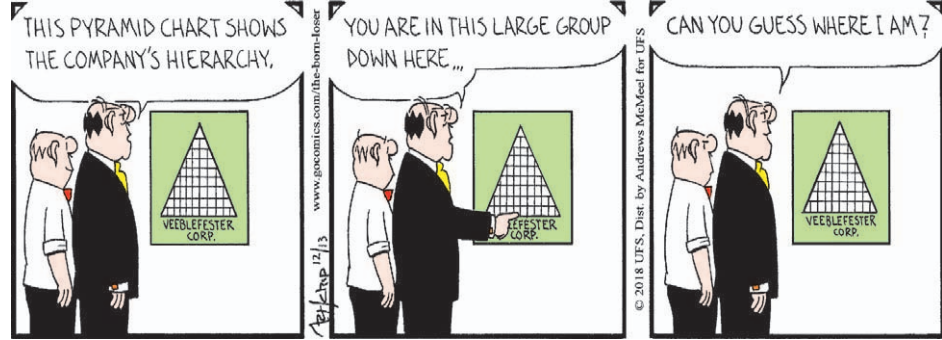
suit, and the lead of trump indicated a desire to ruff something.

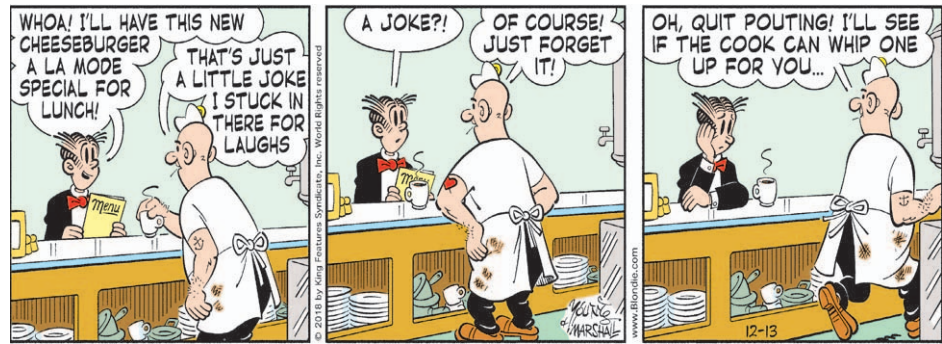

McCoy's kind gesture at the Bucs' AdventHealth Training Center brought Dale to tears as she watched her grandchildren rip open their gifts, which included two bikes, helmets, a Jurassic Park calendar, Star Wars items, and an Olay gift set.

"We were struggling really bad and didn't know what we were going to do," Dale said. "But this is a huge distraction.

"This is a gift from God."

The Bucs sought families from Metropolitan Ministries, Project LINK, Boys & Girls Club of Tampa Bay and other nonprofits. Every child received a new bike in addition to other gifts from their personal wish lists, including toys, Bucs gear, lava lamps, bookbags, personal care gift sets, footballs and much more.

Minutes after McCoy invited his guests to open their gifts, the kids rode their bikes around the

## Rays make big deal, sign RHP Morton

LAS VEGAS — The Rays added a veteran starter to their pitching staff, agreeing to a two-year, \$30 million deal with RHP Charlie Morton that includes a 2021 option.

The team has not confirmed or announced the deal, which is pending a physical.

Morton, 35, was most recently with the Astros, going 14.7, 3.62 in 2017 and 15-3, 3.13 last year, posting career bests in wins, ERA, WHIP 1.16, strikeouts 201.

Morton features a fastball that averaged 96 mph last season, but the key to his success with the Astros was increased use of his curveball.

Morton was somewhat of a bargain for the Astros, making \$14 million in salary plus around \$4 million in incentives total for the last two years.

The Astros declined to make him a \$17.9 million qualifying offer, but were said to be interested in bringing him back. He floated the idea of retiring to spend more time with his family, but obviously teams showed him the merit in signing.

Though much of the attention has been on the Rays' search for an impact bat, manager Kevin Cash has been among those pushing the idea of adding another proven starter.

Morton will join LHP Blake Snell, the AL Cy Young award winner, and presumably RHP Tyler Glasnow as traditional starters in a rotation likely to include two openers.

Morton is also the answer to an interesting baseball trivia question, the first player in MLB history to earn the win in Game 7 of an LCS and the World Series in the same season. He started Game 7 of the 2017 ALCS for Houston

and worked the first five innings, then came in to pitch the final four innings in the World Series clincher.

Just more than a month after the season started, there are only nine unbeaten teams left in Division I men's college basketball.

Getting this far without a loss is no small feat. Just ask Gonzaga, which knocked off Duke and Creighton before finally losing to Tennessee last weekend.

Here's a look at each of the remaining teams with a zero in the win column: First, the undefeated nine:

### BUFFALO

**Record:** 9-0  
**Best Start Since:** 1930-31. Not a misprint. Buffalo went undefeated that season, finishing 15-0.

**Highlight So Far:** CJ Massinburg scored 43 points to lift Buffalo to a 99-94 overtime win at West Virginia on Nov. 9.

**Why They're Unbeaten:** Massinburg leads the way, but the Bulls also have three others with scoring averages in double figures.

### FURMAN

**Record:** 11-0  
**Best Start Since:** This is the best start in school history.  
**Highlight So Far:** Furman won at Villanova on Nov. 17, 76-68 in overtime.

**Why They're Unbeaten:** Jordan Lyons leads the Paladins in scoring at 18.4 points per game. That includes

a 54-point outing against Division II North Greenville in which he made 15 3-pointers. Matt Rafferty had 15 points and 17 rebounds in the Villanova game.

### HOUSTON

**Record:** 8-0  
**Best Start Since:** 1969-70. Houston started 9-0 that season, then later had an 11-game winning streak that ended with a loss in the regional semifinals.

**Highlight So Far:** The Cougars beat a nationally ranked Oregon team 65-61 on Dec. 1.

**Why They're Unbeaten:** The Cougars came with in a buzzer beater of a Sweet 16 berth last season. Guards Armoni Brooks and Corey Davis are each averaging 16.5 points per game.

### KANSAS

**Record:** 8-0  
**Best Start Since:** 2010-11. Kansas began that season with 18 straight wins and lost to Virginia Commonwealth in the regional finals.

**Highlight So Far:** The Jayhawks began the season in style, beating Michigan State 92-87.

**Why They're Unbeaten:** The Jayhawks narrowly escaped in overtime against Tennessee and Stanford. Junior Detric Lawson is averaging 19.1 points and 10.6 rebounds.

### MICHIGAN

**Record:** 10-0  
**Best Start Since:**

2012-13. The Wolverines started 16-0 and ended up going all the way to the national title game.

**Highlight So Far:** Michigan went on the road and routed Villanova 73-46 on Nov. 14 in a rematch of last season's NCAA championship game.

**Why They're Unbeaten:** The Wolverines were one of the best defensive teams in the country last season, and they might be even better now thanks to the emergence of 7-foot-1 Jon Teske. Freshman Iggy Brazdeikis has helped Michigan withstand Moe Wagner's departure.

### NEVADA

**Record:** 10-0  
**Best Start Since:** 1951-52, when Nevada started 14-0.

**Highlight So Far:** The Wolf Pack knocked off Arizona State 72-66 on Friday.

**Why They're Unbeaten:** They have experience with Jordan Caroline and Caleb Martin, and only average 9.1 turnovers a game.

### ST. JOHN'S

**Record:** 9-0  
**Best Start Since:** 1990-91. Lou Carnesecca was the coach and Malik Sealy was a captain on a team that also started 9-0.

**Highlight So Far:** None of the victories have been all that eye-catching, but beating Rutgers by 19 on

**Best Start Since:** 2014-15, when Virginia started 19-0 and lost only twice during the regular season.

**Highlight So Far:** A 53-46 win over Wisconsin on a neutral floor Nov. 23 was an impressive result.

**Why They're Unbeaten:** The Cavaliers were mocked after losing to 16th-seeded UMBC in last season's NCAA Tournament, but it's still business as usual for coach Tony Bennett's defensive-minded team. Opponents have managed only 51 points per game.

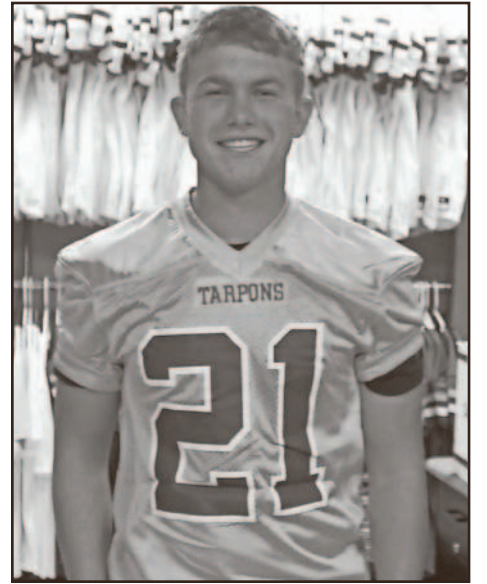

minutes into the second period to keep the score tied 1-1.

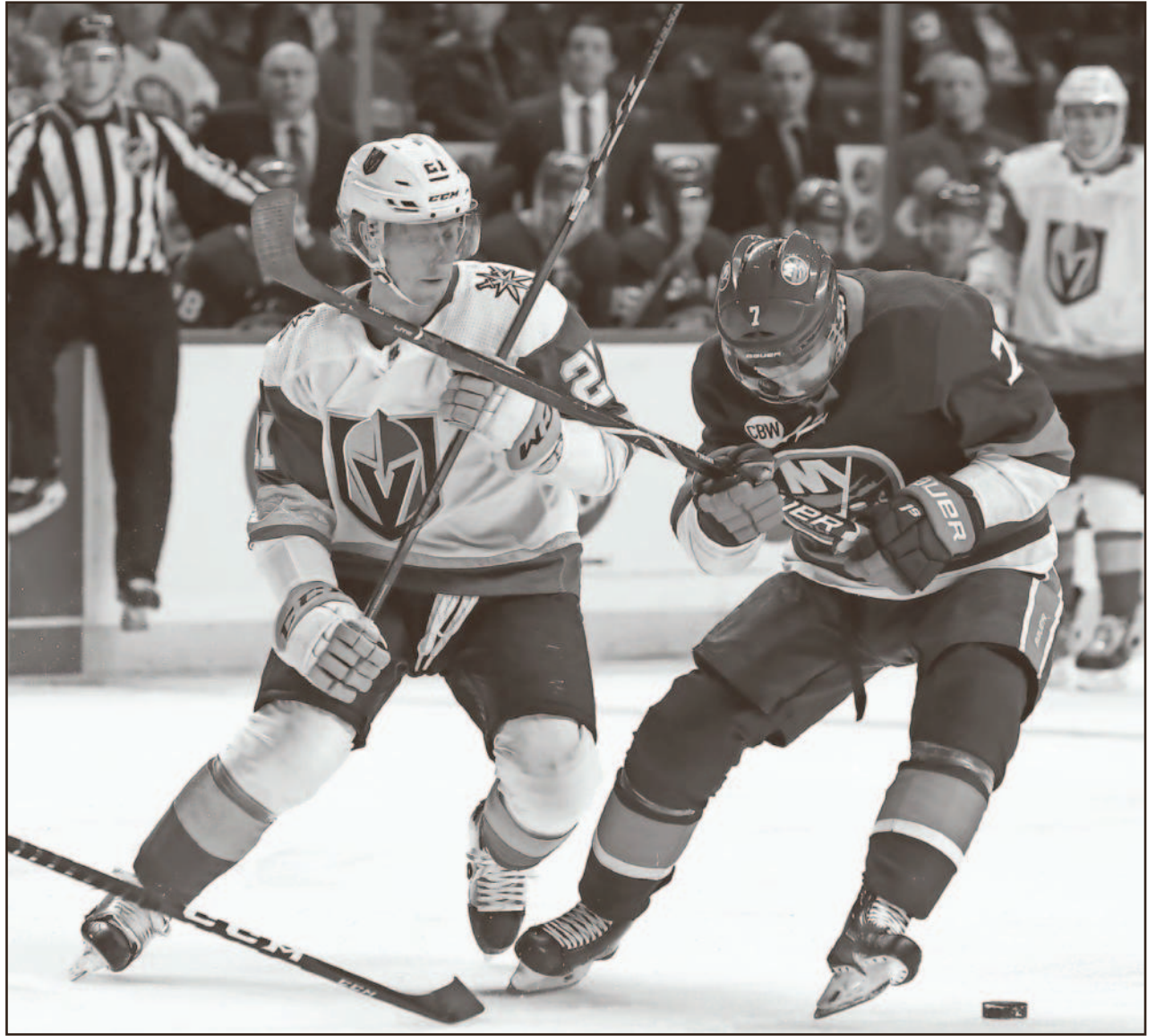

Hood put the Cavaliers in front 107-106 with 23 seconds remaining after New York took a one-point lead on rookie Kevin Knox's fast-break dunk with 32 seconds left.

Hood added 23 points, rookie Collin Sexton scored 19 and Matthew Dellavedova, playing his first home game for Cleveland since being re-acquired from Milwaukee, had 15 points.

Enes Kanter and Tim Hardaway each scored 20 points for New York, which lost its fifth straight. Knox, moved into the starting lineup before the game, finished with 19.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Jeremy Lamb hit a 22-foot

jumper from the right wing with 0.3 seconds left, and the Charlotte Hornets rallied from a late 10-point deficit for a wild 108-107 win over the Detroit Pistons on Wednesday night.

As Lamb released the ball, Malik Monk ran off the Hornets' bench and onto the floor early to celebrate the made basket.

Officials reviewed the play and called one-shot technical on the Hornets for having six men on the court. The basket still counted. The Pistons made the technical free throw, but the ensuing long inbounds pass was intercepted.

Kemba Walker finished with a game-high 31 points and had nine assists and eight rebounds for the Hornets, who won their third straight and moved into sixth place in the Eastern Conference — a half-game ahead of Detroit.

### BOSTON 130, WASHINGTON 125

WASHINGTON — Kyrie Irving scored Boston's last 12 points, including back-to-back 3-pointers in the final 40 seconds of overtime to outduel John Wall in a point-guard showdown, and the Celtics extended their winning streak to seven games with a 130-125 victory over the Washington Wizards on Wednesday night.

Irving finished with 38 points and seven assists. Marcus Morris added 27 points and nine rebounds for Boston, which played without Al Horford, Gordon Hayward and Jaylen Brown — its Nos. 4-6 leading scorers.

Wall returned for the Wizards after missing a game with an aching left heel and finished with 34 points with 13 assists. But his seven points in OT weren't enough to keep pace with fellow All-Star Irving.

Bradley Beal and Jeff Green each added 22 points and Kelly Oubre Jr. scored 20 for Washington.

# Goodell: League won't pay for video in domestic investigations

IRVING, Texas — Commissioner Roger Goodell said Wednesday the NFL won't pay for video evidence in cases involving domestic violence, and he defended the league's handling of those investigations.

Speaking after owners held their annual winter meeting, Goodell said the NFL's approach to dealing with domestic violence is "extraordinary" and that the league has some of the highest standards of any organization.

The NFL came under scrutiny again when surveillance video showed former Kansas City running back Kareem Hunt shoving and kicking a woman in a Cleveland hotel in February. Hunt wasn't disciplined before the video was released by TMZ.

After the video came out, Hunt was placed on the

commissioner's exempt list, the equivalent of suspending him indefinitely with pay. The Chiefs waived him almost immediately after that.

Goodell said the hotel and police in Cleveland declined to release the video to the league. "First off, we don't pay for video evidence," Goodell said. "From our standpoint, we think that's not appropriate for a league organization to do that."

"We obtained material that we have access to. But we're not going to do it by corrupting people or trying to find a way to bribe them into giving us video. That's not what we do."

Goodell said the league acted quickly once the video became public.

"I think what we're doing as a league is extraordinary," Goodell said. "We take this seriously. As a league, I think we've responded very quickly."

# Draft heading to Vegas for 2020

DALLAS (AP) — The NFL draft is heading to Las Vegas for 2020.

It almost certainly will arrive before the Raiders do.

"We believe the draft will be the kickoff to our inaugural season," said Raiders owner Mark Davis, who is moving the team from Oakland.

The league announced Wednesday at an owners meeting that the city where the Raiders will begin play in September 2020 will host the draft that April.

"Las Vegas is the entertainment capital of the world and will provide a tremendous experience for the NFL and its fans," Davis added.

The NFL began to bring the draft to different cities in 2015, when it was in

Chicago. It was held there in 2016, too, then went to Philadelphia in 2017.

Last April, the Cowboys hosted it in their stadium in Arlington, Texas, and next year it will be in Nashville.

April 23-25 will be the dates for the Las Vegas draft, which the league said will be held on and around the Strip.

"The NFL draft is one of the most anticipated events of the year and we are excited to take it to Las Vegas," Commissioner Roger Goodell said.

"We look forward to working with the Raiders, Las Vegas officials and the Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority to create an unforgettable weeklong celebration of football for our fans, the incoming prospects and partners."

# Chiefs can clinch AFC West title against Chargers

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — The Kansas City Chiefs are missing their star running back, likely without his backup and could have their top two wide receivers hobbled or shelved for their crucial AFC West showdown against the Los Angeles Chargers on Thursday night.

They still have Patrick Mahomes, though. And they're still playing the Chargers.

Yes, the Chargers (10-3) are one of the hottest teams in the NFL, having won three straight and nine of 10 to close within a game of Kansas City (11-2) in the division race.

But the Chargers also have had about as much luck against the Chiefs as the Redskins have had with quarterbacks this year, losing nine straight and many of them in lopsided fashion.

That includes this season's opener in Los Angeles, when Mahomes announced his arrival to the NFL with his first four touchdown passes in the Chiefs' 38-28 victory at StubHub Center.

"We're familiar with this group, but they do so many things. It's never easy going up against Kansas City," Chargers coach Anthony Lynn said.

"Go back to September. You can go back to last year, to 2017, when we lost to those guys twice — same things. They are just really good."

The Chiefs have continued to play at a high level despite some personnel challenges.

Running back Kareem Hunt was released nearly two weeks ago because of off-the-field issues, and new starter Spencer Ware hurt his hamstring last Sunday against Baltimore.

Wide receiver Sammy Watkins is likely to miss Thursday night's game with a lingering foot problem, and speedster Tyreek Hill is nursing wrist and heel injuries, but has insisted all week that he'll be ready.

"One thing we have been talking about all season long, you never know when your number is going to be called, so it is important that you are ready," Chiefs offensive coordinator

Eric Bieniemy said.

"It's all hands on deck. When it's all said and done, we go out and play."

Besides, it's not as if the Chargers haven't had injury issues of their own.

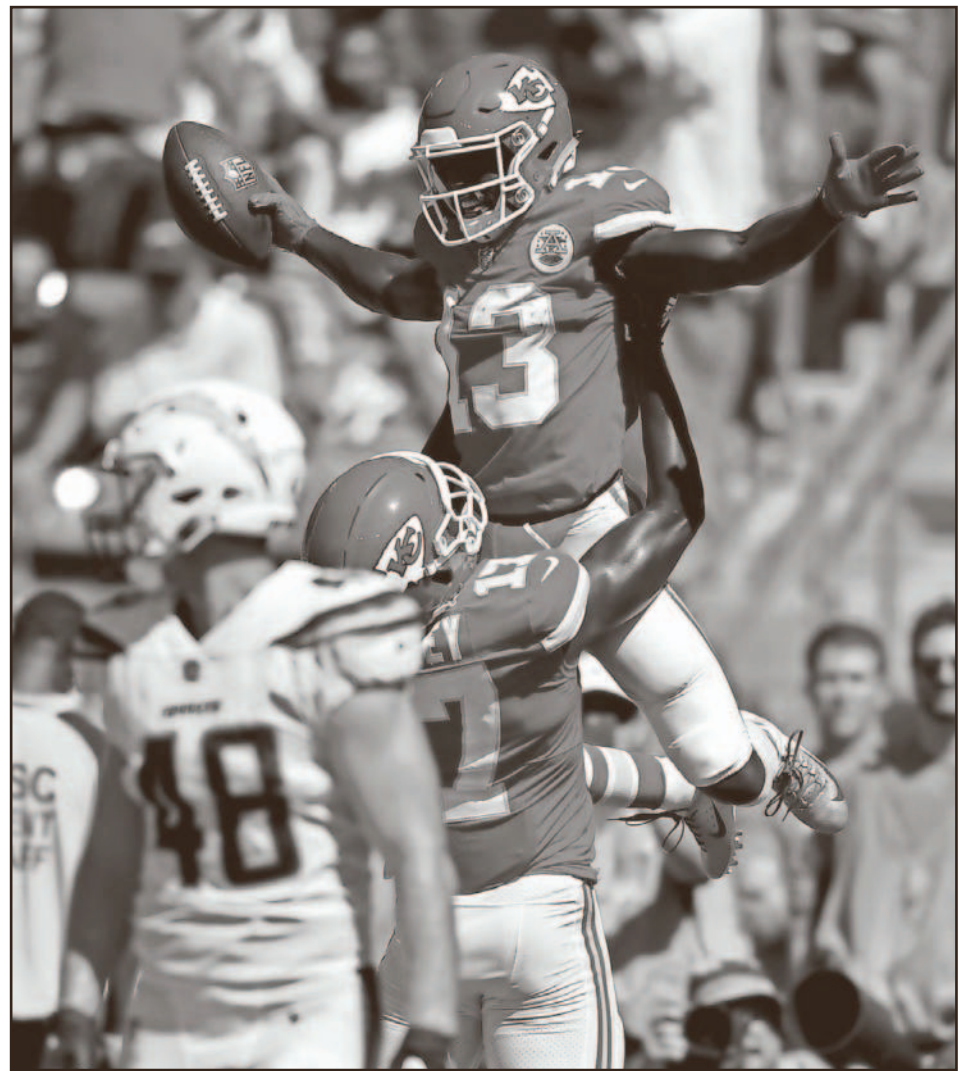
Running back Melvin Gordon is expected to be a game-time decision after spraining his right knee against Arizona and missing the past two games.

His primary backup, Austin Ekeler, is likely out after hurting his neck and sustaining a concussion in last week's win over the Bengals.

"I've been grinding hard to get back," Gordon said. "I know Coach (Lynn) is trying to be careful and doesn't want me to further hurt myself or things like that. So we'll see where that goes."

If he's unable to play, rookie Justin Jackson would get his first start.

"What is it, Week 15 in the NFL? These things happen," Chargers offensive coordinator Ken Whisenhunt said. "We'll see who shows up Thursday and go from there."

# Georgia Tech motivated for Johnson send-off

ATLANTA — Georgia Tech players say they'll have extra motivation to send coach Paul Johnson out with a win when they play Minnesota in the Quick Lane Bowl.

The 61-year-old Johnson announced on Nov. 28 he is stepping down after 11 seasons with the Yellow Jackets. Geoff Collins was hired from Temple as Georgia Tech's new coach on Friday, but Johnson will coach the bowl game.

"Going out with your coach, that's pretty cool, you know?" senior wide receiver Brad Stewart said Tuesday. "That's not something people can say every day. ... It's unique to kind of go out with coach Johnson and be by his side."

Returning players will want to make a good first impression on Collins. But even they say their priority is a successful farewell for Johnson in the Dec. 26 game in Detroit.

"We've had the honor to play for

coach Johnson, for me the past four years," said running back Nathan Cottrell, a fourth-year junior. "He's been an awesome coach. When you hear someone is retiring, especially in this game, you want to send them out on the right note. We get a chance to do that in Detroit. Hopefully we'll send him out with a win. It does put a lot more motivation in our heads, I think."

Johnson is 82-59 at Georgia Tech, including 7-5 this season. He said he needs a break but left open the possibility he could return to coaching.

Johnson has tried to keep players on their normal routine.

"It's only weird if you make it weird," he said Saturday. "To me, it's just like getting ready for any other game. You're just getting ready to play a game."

On Tuesday, Johnson had a quick joke — aimed at his critics — when asked if he found it unusual to be freed of the normal recruiting duties leading up to the early signing period this month.

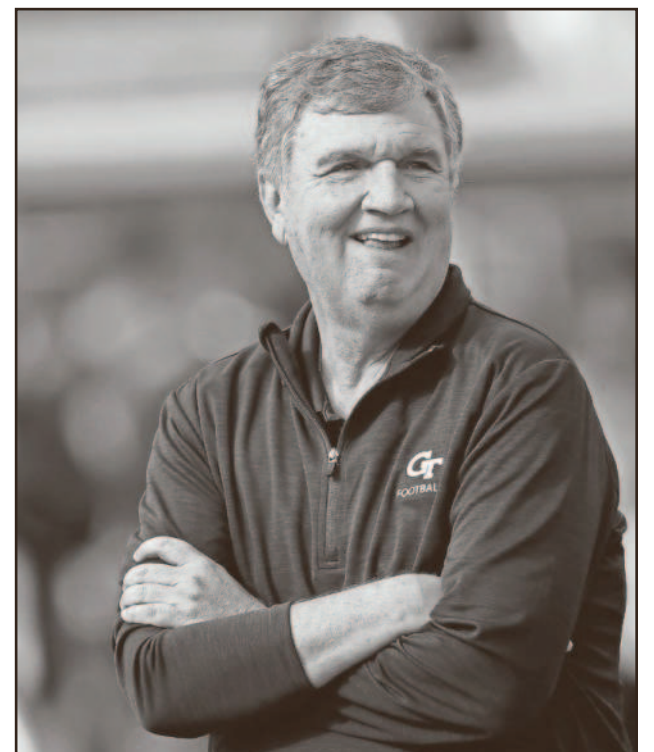
"Shoot, I didn't recruit for 11 years," Johnson said, smiling. "That was the party line, right? I don't know how we ever won any games."

Johnson relied heavily on such under-the-radar recruits as Stewart to play in his spread-option offense.

"I love that man," Stewart said. "He's done so much for me and my family. I was under-recruited and no one really wanted me and he's one of the Division I schools that believed in me. We had a long talk. I'm happy for him and hope the best for him in future endeavors."

Collins will install a pro-style offense that will bring new challenges for players accustomed to Johnson's triple-option scheme. Running back Nathan Cottrell said there's no need to worry about that transition.

"The focus right now is getting through this season and then we'll worry about what's to come in the future and what's to come in the spring," Cottrell said.

# Harper's agent holds court on sweepstakes

LAS VEGAS — Scott Boras climbed atop a platform before a ceiling-scraping imitation fir bedecked with silver, gold and emerald ornaments as dozens of reporters swelled around him.

On the penultimate day of the winter meetings, Boras came bearing corrections, metaphors and reassurances about the strength of the market for his premier client, free-agent outfielder Bryce Harper.

Last week, before the sport convened at the Mandalay Bay, Washington Nationals owner Mark Lerner cast doubt on his franchise re-signing Harper after his initial rejection of a \$300 million offer, and insisted "I really don't expect him back at

this point."

The Chicago Cubs lack interest in bloating their payroll, and the Los Angeles Dodgers appear interested in only a shorter-term commitment to Harper. Earlier this week, New York Yankees general manager Brian Cashman told reporters he was unsure why they kept asking him about Harper — his team was not interested.

Yet Boras rejected the premise that interest for Harper has not reached the fever pitch once projected. Harper is still capable of eclipsing Giancarlo Stanton's \$325 million contract for a new industry benchmark. In meetings with clubs here and in Los Angeles, Boras has sold Harper, the 26-year-old former National League MVP, as a pillar around which a franchise should build.

"When you get to that point, something could happen quickly," Boras said. "And something could also happen in a number of weeks. You can't really put a time on it. We're certainly at a point where we understand the interest level, and what

clubs want to do."

The presence of Boras qualified as an event in an otherwise sedate week. The dominoes of the offseason remain upright. Neither Harper nor infielder Manny Machado has found a new team. The market is still

well stocked with relievers such as Craig Kimbrel, Andrew Miller and Zach Britton. J.T. Realmuto is still a Miami Marlin, Corey Kluber is still a Cleveland Indian and Yasiel Puig is still a Dodger.

No longer do executives treat the winter meetings as an event that requires action. In the past, a team might arrive here with a shopping list, hellbent on checking off its needs for the coming season. Now, these meetings often serve as only a prelude, a chance for people to interact in person before consummating deals later. And a newer generation of risk-adverse executives loathe the creating artificial deadlines: There is no reason to make a move here just to make one, which helps explain the dearth of official activity this week.

Andrew Friedman, Dodgers president of baseball operations, summed up the prevailing philosophy of the majority of his peers Tuesday evening.

"I just don't feel any pressure to do something in the next day and a half," Friedman said. "But obviously if things do line up, we'll do it."

All 30 teams will leave this venue in the aftermath of the Rule 5 draft Thursday. Harper is unlikely to have found a destination by then. But Boras still sounded confident about the overall outlook.

"Bryce is open to a lot of different venues," Boras said. "It's really about what a lot of different owners have said to him about their commitments, and what they want to do long term."

## It's time for baseball's shift to go

LAS VEGAS — Ask baseball managers what they think about the dreaded shift, and most of them have the same answer.

It's not a problem if the hitters don't make it one.

"There's an easy way to combat that," Oakland's Bob Melvin said. "Just hit the ball the other way."

It's a simple enough solution, though certainly an obvious one. Who among us, after all, hasn't screamed at a batter to push the ball the other way or even bunt for a sure hit when the defense is loaded up on one side of the infield?

The guys in the dugout surely have, even if job security dictates they do their screaming silently.

"If a guy can use the whole field, they're not going to shift you," the Marlins' Don Mattingly said.

Unfortunately, guys don't use the whole field anymore. They haven't for some time because they play baseball to make money and the players who make the

most money try to hit the ball as hard as they can to the place they're most comfortable hitting it.

Hitters aren't going to adapt. There's no real incentive for them to go the other way, even when all the numbers add up.

So while managers at this week's winter meetings talked about players adjusting to situations and shifts, their real audience is the guys in the dugout. And they, for the most part, aren't listening.

Push one down the third base line for an easy hit? You'd have better luck getting Manny Machado to hustle down to first.

"The majority of the hitters, I'd say 90 to 95 percent, say to heck with it, I'm going to try to hit a homer and a double," said Kansas City manager Ned Yost. "Our numbers for singles as a baseball league last year dropped way down. And you just lose strategy, you lose the ability to steal bases. You lose the ability to hit and run or bunt if you want to."

In other words, you're losing a big part of

baseball.

The shift, if you haven't noticed, is killing baseball. Maybe not by itself, but as part of a new analytics culture in the game that doesn't value steals, sacrifice bunts, hit-and-runs or any kind of strategy that doesn't always make sense when all the numbers are crunched.

Major League Baseball has noticed, mainly because attendance was down last season and so were hits. Singles have been in decline for the last five years, and the league average of .248 was the worst in 46 years. Meanwhile, for the first time there were more strikeouts than hits in the game, and the World Series — at least on the Dodgers' side — was a badly flawed microcosm of what the game has become.

That's a big reason why baseball's competition committee is looking at doing away with the shift, a move Commissioner Rob Manfred has said he is open to considering. Though baseball tends to move slow, there's an

outside chance both the commissioner's office and the players' union could agree to do something about the increasing use of the shift before next season.

Banning the shift, of course, won't magically make all the problems of the game go away. It might not change much at all, if you believe the analytics that show the shift mainly takes hits away from slow left-handed power hitters.

But it's a step toward making baseball look like baseball again. And it's a step toward being

more proactive when it comes to winning back fans turned off by the slow pace of games and the interminable periods in games where nothing ever seems to happen.

"I just think that shift, it makes the game much, much more boring in my opinion," said Yost, one of the few managers to take a stand against the shift.

Thankfully for baseball, there is an easy solution. Two infielders on each side of second base. Both with at least one foot on the infield dirt.

You know, like baseball used to be played.

The guess is that it's likely to happen, if only because no one but pitchers and the people in the analytics

department have any love for the shift. That includes Dodgers manager Dave Roberts, who used it so much last season that at times it seemed like third baseman Justin Turner was spending more time on the other side of the second base bag than in his normal position.

Roberts said he believes baseball is a better game without the shift, though for now his immediate plans are to increase the time his hitters spend hitting to the opposite field in spring training to try to combat it.

Here's hoping they won't need that extra practice.

It's time for the shift to go.
