## SFSC adjunct faculty join unionization effort

SEBRING — Adjunct professors at South Florida State College were among those at six other public colleges in Florida who are filing to form unions.

Like K-12 teachers across the country, adjunct faculty there are joining together to demand greater investment in the state's broken college system, according to a press release from Service Employees International Union (SEIU), which has 2 million members across the nation.

They are part of a growing national movement, called Faculty Forward, for fully-funded college for all, student loan forgiveness, \$15 an hour, and a union for all campus employees, SEIU states.

Along with adjunct professors at SFSC, a recent week-long blitz for unionization involved Santa Fe College, St. Petersburg College, Lake Sumter

Community College, Polk State College, Florida Gateway College and Chipola College, according to SEIU.

Highlands News-Sun asked SFSC about the salary range for its adjunct professors and for a comment on the unionization effort.

At South Florida State College (SFSC), there are currently 125 active adjunct

instructors. The salary range for these instructors is \$19.50 — \$36.08 per contact hour depending on their academic rank.

“Faculty at SFSC are dedicated to their teaching disciplines and to their students,” said Thomas C. Leitzel, president of SFSC. “The faculty excel in the classroom and the results are impressive. I value their

instructional role and their involvement in the ongoing success of the college.”

The Florida colleges and universities that already filed for or formed their unions with SEIU are: Hillsborough Community College, Broward College, University of South Florida, Seminole State College, Valencia College and Miami Dade College.

The group of adjuncts in the unionization effort are now poised to represent 9,000 adjuncts or 55 percent of adjunct faculty in the Florida College system. In the Tampa area, union density will be even higher at 63 percent, according to SEIU.

“We are witnessing an unprecedented upswing in organizing amongst college faculty. In just two years, the majority of adjunct professors in the Florida College System are on their way to union representation,” said Judith Bernier, director

## On display

### Local artists featured in museum exhibit

SEBRING — The Highlands Art League is featuring 18 local artists from the league in an exhibit that will run through Friday. A wide variety of paintings and drawings will be on display at the Highlands Museum of the Arts, and the public can view the exhibit free of charge, but donations are appreciated.

Visitors can appreciate the beauty of the artwork from 11 a.m. until 3 p.m. today through Friday.

Ginger Adelstone, interim curator for the museum, has scheduled several art exhibits throughout 2019, including a new exhibit scheduled to begin in January. Adelstone was also a curator at the Carrollwood Cultural Center in Tampa under Nancy Kirkpatrick.

## 'Tis the season to shop safely

LAKE PLACID — With less than a week left before Christmas, thousands of shoppers are heading to malls, boutiques and other retail outlets looking for the perfect last-minute gift. Shoppers can be distracted and susceptible to thieves and pickpockets. However, there are ways to shop smarter and safer and avoid being a target this holiday season.

Lake Placid Police Chief James Fansler said the most important thing is to always be aware of your environment. When parking, make sure the area is well lit. Park near a lamp post, even during the day for times when shopping takes longer than anticipated. Make note of parking assignments or landmarks to find the vehicle easily when returning from shopping.

“Leave the phones off until you are safely inside the store or your vehicle,” Fansler said. “Taking a quick second to make sure all the vehicle doors are locked.

“Don't just assume the doors locked because you hit a button,” he said. “There are a number of things that could prevent a door from locking such as a

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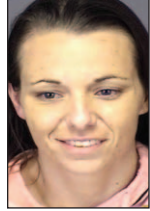
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# More arrests made in counterfeit cash scheme

AVON PARK — The Highlands County Sheriff's Office made two more arrests in a counterfeit cash scheme on Monday.

An Avon Park bank discovered counterfeit \$100 bills had been deposited into its ATM machine, and an investigation began that involved the Sheriff's Office and the U.S. Secret Service.

Four arrests had already been made, including William Alston Clarke, 35, of Sebring; Sarah Jessica Brinkman, 25, of Avon Park; Joshua Allan Baird, 26, of Sebring, and Icylin Renee Malcolm, 29, of Sebring. Brinkman and Malcolm are accused of depositing counterfeit bills into a local bank's ATM. Brinkman reportedly told deputies that Clarke provided her with the counterfeit cash. Baird is also being charged in connection with the scheme, because he reportedly told deputies he received the counterfeit money from Clarke and Chaz Allen Demeere, 34, of Sebring in a white envelope, which Brinkman later used to make the deposit. Video surveillance allegedly shows Demeere entering the bank to obtain an envelope from

one of the clerks. On Monday authorities discovered Demeere and Cierra Michelle Sramek, 33, of Sebring, hiding in an attic. The arrest report did not indicate where in the county the two were located.

A social media post made by the Sheriff's Office stated, "Chaz Demeere and Cierra Sramek were arrested earlier today [Monday]. They decided to come out of the attic where they were hiding when they heard how excited K-9 Gentry was to get a chance to go in and meet them."

Detectives believe Demeere initiated the series of events that led to the counterfeiting incident at an Avon Park bank. Authorities say Demeere called Brinkman and met her at the bank before she made the deposit. Demeere is facing charges of defrauding a financial institution, 20 counts of uttering a false bank note, possession of 10 or more forged notes, grand theft, and using a two-way device to facilitate a felony.

Sramek, who was found hiding with Demeere, is facing the following charges: two counts of failure to appear for marijuana possession and drug paraphernalia, and one count of probation violation.

# Woman accused of stealing almost \$4K from local stores

SEBRING — On Sunday, a local woman was arrested for reportedly stealing from JCPenney at the Lakeshore Mall, and on Monday she was arrested again for allegedly shoplifting from Sears.

prevention staff contacted central dispatch on Sunday and reported that two people were possibly shoplifting in the store. The staff gave a physical description of the two subjects, their clothing and the vehicle that they used to leave the area.

A deputy conducted a traffic stop on the vehicle, and verified the description of the two females and their clothing. The older suspect, Wisdom, allegedly provided the false name of Keshavia Hickman. The other passenger, a 12-year-old female, was not charged. Instead, she was turned over to family members as the deputy continued the investigation, according to Scott Dressel, public information officer

anything. However, when she was taken to the jail, a dark green marijuana cigarette was reportedly found in her left back pocket of her shorts. Wisdom also told staff her real name, which was verified by fingerprints.

The manager of Sears contacted the detective investigating the case and reportedly told the detective about video surveillance footage in his store that showed a black female entering Sears, selecting merchandise, concealing it and exiting the store, the report states. The female in the surveillance footage was identified as Wisdom.

A detective made contact with Wisdom at her home on Monday and questioned her about the incident. She was arrested and is currently in jail.

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# Concert band offers a musical learning experience for students

SEBRING — It's a mix of veteran and young players coming together to make music on a grand scale — it's the Highlands County Concert Band.

First-year Sebring High School Band Director Anthony Juliano, who performed with the concert band as a Sebring High student, has rejoined the ensemble playing the euphonium.

His experience as a student in the concert band, and as a high school band director with students in the band, offers an insight into the unique musical experience for the young musicians.

The concert band is a community band that rehearses at Sebring High School, which offers opportunities for young musicians from the county's three high schools to play in a professional experience and even earn college scholarships, Juliano said.

It provides a continuing musical path beyond the middle and high school music programs into a real life musical practice that can be maintained into adulthood, he said.

Sebring High seniors Kevin Leicht on baritone saxophone and Jordan Reedy on trumpet spoke about their experience with the concert band during a break from the band's practice session Monday evening. For both, it is their first year with the ensemble.

Leicht said the band gives him a first-hand experience on how to perform with others.

Adjusting to playing with the ensemble for the first time "was like getting pushed into the deep end of a pool," he said.

"I plan on getting my master's in musical education and hopefully teach somewhere in Florida and try to help other students reach their potential," Leicht said.

School band directors have to be familiar with a variety of

# AP prepping for Nucor plant

AVON PARK — The City Council discussed the project to extend its utilities northward to provide service to Nucor's steel rebar mill, which is slated to open in July 2020.

The production facility, on the northern side of the Highlands County line in Polk County, will create 250 new high-paying jobs, according to a grant application that will reimburse the city for the cost of extending water and wastewater services.

Councilwoman Maria Sutherland said she placed the Nucor grant project on the agenda due to interest from community members who have been asking about it because the plant will be bringing jobs to the area.

She has no doubt that the jobs will come because what Nucor is planning is huge, Sutherland said.

"What I like about this project is it is going up Highway 27, which will expand our commercial corridor with potential businesses in the future," Sutherland said. "Sun Pure will be doing plastics recycling as well, so it will be a boon for the economy here."

The city seeks \$971,500 from the Florida Job Growth Grant Fund with the design and engineering

costing an estimated \$104,500 and construction costing \$867,000 for the utilities extension.

The grant application notes that the extension of water and wastewater lines to the northern part of Avon Park and Highlands County will provide development opportunities, which will ultimately result in job creation and economic recovery for the community.

Sutherland said the city will be the administrator for the grant, which is based on a reimbursement basis. The city will need to have the money for the project up front so the city will be on the hook for \$971,000. After it is all done, the city will start getting its payments back.

Mayor Garrett Anderson asked Utilities Director Josh Turner if he knew how much wastewater capacity they would be using.

Turner said the city has been informed about Nucor's capacity needs, but the city's utility profits have not been studied.

At some point the city will have to add to its wastewater plant, he added.

Sutherland said Monday it sounds like the grant has been confirmed, but the city has yet to receive a formal final approval.

# Micah Marsh is 'model kid'

SEBRING — Sebring High School student Micah Marsh is a model kid, from his academics to being a group commander for the school's U.S. Air Force JROTC to his military and train model making.

The high school senior is just 18 and spends much of his free time "unplugged" from the video games his contemporaries lose themselves in. Instead, he makes historically accurate replicas for his mentors and the Military Sea Services Museum, where he is an extern.

According to wayup.com, an externship is where an individual is meant to job shadow another individual, typically a respected professional within an industry or workplace a student has interest in pursuing. Externships are typically held for a short time period lasting anywhere from a single day to eight weeks and are often held over a student's winter or spring break whereas internships tend to be eight weeks long at minimum.

Marsh recently created a JROTC modeling club at Sebring High in hopes of introducing modeling to teens. He said many of his friends see the tanks in video games like "Call of Duty" but do not understand how the systems really worked or the "grisly" conditions inside of them that military men and women dealt with.

It all started with Legos. Marsh recalled his stepfather, Paul Manrique, retired master sergeant with the U.S. Air Force, encouraging Marsh to take the leap from Legos to models. He was about 13 and he said he wasn't thrilled with the first model he made but after several more, he was hooked.

"There are several different types of modelers," Marsh said. "With models, you can make them whatever you want. Some people just want to have something nice on

Marsh has won a gold medal for his German U-boat and a silver medal for a plane he created. He enjoys making American military models but says telling the story of the losing side of war is his forte.

"History is written by the victors," he said. "I like to look at the sides of the lesser known. When I graduate from Sebring (High School), my models will be donated to the Military Sea Services Museum. That way, the stories can be told here."

Marsh said the cost of models depends on the scale and project. For beginners, the mass-produced plastic models are a good place to start.

"It's all about how you paint it and weather it," Marsh said. "Weathering means making it more realistic; you show how the grime and dirt affects what you are replicating. If you want a historically accurate kit cheap, you need to do your research, have references, look at pictures and talk to other modelers."

He recommends the website scalemates.com.

Sam Stower said the museum is pleased with Marsh's help at the facility and the models he has on

display there. "Micah has helped us with our inventory," Stower said. "He's helped with our artifacts and put a lot in the computer. He's made models and run tours for JROTC at the museum. He field stripped a Japanese rifle for us.

"He has been invaluable to us. We were so lucky to get him," Stower said. "We are enjoying every moment that we can keep him."

Stower, a Navy man, joked that it was too bad Marsh was going into the U.S. Air Force.

"He's the most valuable young member of the museum," Stower said.

Marsh has already been accepted to Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University where he plans to earn a master's in global conflict studies before joining the U.S. Air Force. Once in the Air Force, he intends to become an intelligence officer and wants to retire as a brigadier general and/or serve approximately 25-20 years.

## Texting law needs to be stronger

News Service of Florida is reporting another bill has been filed for the 2019 legislative session that would allow law enforcement officers to pull over motorists for texting or talking on hand-held cell phones while driving.

It is encouraging that lawmakers are not letting this concern be swept under the rug. The "Florida Ban on Texting While Driving Law" was initially enacted in 2013.

A Tampa lawmaker filed HB107 on Monday that would prohibit drivers from talking on cell phones that are not hands-free devices and would make enforcement a "primary" offense. Currently, the law stipulates that anyone manually typing, sending or reading interpersonal messages on a wireless communication device while driving could be ticketed, but only as a secondary offense. Exceptions would include reporting an emergency or criminal activity to law enforcement, receiving messages that are safety-related, using the device for navigation purposes. A driver would have to be pulled over for another violation to get a ticket, and even then, the fine for breaking this law is only \$20.

As a result, not everyone is willing to pay much attention to the texting ban.

Under Rep. Jackie Toledo's proposed bill, police would be able to stop motorists for texting or talking on hand-held cell phones.

Toledo was a co-sponsor of a similar House measure during the 2018 session, but the proposal did not advance in the Senate amid concerns about issues such as minority drivers facing increased racial profiling.

Sadly, we should be past concerns of increased racial profiling when concerns of drinking and driving or texting and driving affects all of us. Adding more teeth to existing laws should not be reflecting by political correctness but should reflect our entire citizenry.

According to the Florida Department of Motor Vehicle, at 40 mph a driver is traveling more than 58 feet per second. If you look at a text for just five seconds, your vehicle has traveled more than 290 feet; at 55 mph, that five seconds will take you the length of a football field. The agency points out that cars ahead of you may have stopped or a child may have walked into the road, but by the time you look up after just five seconds, it's too late.

A study by the University of Michigan Transportation Research Institute concluded that 25 percent of teens respond to a text message once or more every time they drive. However, it is important to remember that this is not just a teen issue. Many adult drivers are just as guilty.

According to the DMV, nine people in the United States die every day due to distracted driving. Driver's Alert reports cell phone use while driving has reportedly led to 6 million accidents per year. Drivers of all ages who are distracted by texting are eight times more likely to be involved in a collision than non-distracted drivers.

Since 2010, more than 660,000 drivers are using cell phones while driving at any given moment in the United States. Are Americans addicted to technology and cell phones? If they can't put their electronic device down long enough to drive from point A to point B, and risk putting their own life or the lives of others around them in jeopardy, there is a problem.

Although Gov. Rick Scott signed legislation 3 1/2 years ago making it illegal to text while driving, it did little to thwart the problem. Accidents and deaths have continued to rise, primarily because the 2013 law not cover every angle.

Florida has one of the weakest texting-while-driving laws in the nation.

A senate bill (SB 76) similar to Toledo's has been filed by Sen. Wilton Simpson, R-Trilby, for the 2018 session, which starts in March. Under the Toledo and Simpson bills, drivers would be able to communicate on hands-free devices. Also, motorists would be allowed to use hand-held devices for such purposes as reporting emergencies, getting safety-related information or for navigation.

Rep. Emily Slosberg, D-Boca Raton, has filed a similar measure (HB 45) for the 2019 session.

It is common sense that if we can reduce texting while driving, we will also reduce the number of accidents associated with distracted driving and therefore save lives.

We think this law will pass, but common sense also tells us that the mannequins sitting in patrol cars alongside the roadways in Highlands County will have difficulty policing it.

It is painfully obvious that texting while driving is dangerous. It costs lives and puts too many drivers at risk on the roads.

This one is a no-brainer.

## All along, Google's been Googling me

I thought Facebook knew too much about me, but it turns out Google is even worse.

Google, like Facebook, makes its money by targeting ads at us that reflect our interests and needs. The more both know about us, the better they're able to target us with ads we're likely to click.

But Google knows a lot more about me than I thought – plenty more than Facebook.

Since I created a Google account – I use Gmail and Google Docs for my rental-property business – I have freely provided Google with lots of personal information.

I've told Google my name, birthday and gender. It knows my phone number and password. It tracks my email correspondence, photos or videos I've saved, documents I've created in Google Docs, any calendar events I've noted, any contacts I've added.

But Google also collects lots of data that I didn't know I was providing.

"When you use our services – for example, do a search on Google, get

directions on Maps, or watch a video on YouTube – we collect data to make these services work better for you," reports Google on its "Data Transparency" page.

That's where things get a little bit creepy.

Not only does Google keep extensive data on the searches you've conducted and the websites you've visited, it likely knows where you are at this moment – and everywhere you've been.

I discovered this when I reviewed some of the data Google has collected about me.

My Android smartphone, I now know, has been sending Google my location data – incredibly detailed location data – for a very long time. I found this information on my personal Google Location History page.

Curious, I clicked on "Saturday, December 15." A map displayed the entire route I drove that day.

At 9 a.m., Google knew that I left my house and drove to a diner; it knew the name and address of the diner.

It knew that I spent 25 minutes in the diner – I had breakfast with two hired hands who would help me that day – then arrived at U-Haul at 9:38 a.m. I left U-Haul with a box truck at 9:51 a.m. and arrived, at 10:33 a.m., at a private home to pick up some furniture I purchased from the owner. bad actuator, broken lock linkage, etc.”

Fansler recommends staying off the cell phone while walking to and from the car and shopping centers, whether its talking or texting. Do not look like an easy target; walk confidently.

“On the way to the vehicle, scan around and under it,” he said. “If anything looks suspicious, step back and call law enforcement.”

“Looking in the vehicle prior to entering is also great advice,” Fansler said. “We tell women in the self-defense course to light up the interior and take a second to inspect.”

Many shoppers will put bags in the car during a marathon shopping event. Packages should be kept out of sight from any would-be thieves.

Fansler also said the car should be moved from time to time.

“Otherwise, you are telling would-be thieves ‘Hey, I have valuable packages over here for the taking. I’ll be inside with my mind occupied on shopping. Go get ‘em,’” Fansler said.

The risk to be complacent is high after Christmas presents are unwrapped and the kids and adults are playing with their new toys and gadgets. Thieves are not taking the day off and people should not drop their guard either.

“After-holiday safety includes not leaving the evidence on the roadside that you just received a huge TV, computer, gaming system, or other valuable gifts that will remain home while you are at work,” Fansler said.

“Break the boxes down small enough to fit in those marvelous trash

bins,” he said. “You have to anyway! So why not go ahead and be safe while doing the right thing? It is Christmas after all!”

Fansler also said security cameras would be a great gift for those still shopping. It is always helpful to law enforcement to have video when a burglary does happen.

It is best not to carry purses if it can be avoided. They are an easy target for pickpockets, according to DC.gov. A wallet should be kept in a person’s front pocket with their cash, credit cards and IDs.

When away from home, make sure the doors and windows are locked. DC.gov says to turn on music or the television to make a potential thief think someone is home. It also says to keep presents out of view from someone looking into the home and consider putting lights on a timer.

data easier.

“In two years, we will have completely accurate data,” Bashoor said.

He also negotiated with the Clerk of the Courts Office IT department to set up email addresses for all the volunteer firefighters, as well as paid staff, to keep them in the loop with training, meetings and changes in the service.

Bashoor said the original quote he got was \$31,000. He was able to get that cut down to \$10,000. Full implementation of that is a couple of months away, he said.

He also has continued the county’s “Length of Service Award” program to honor volunteers who have been with the county a long time.

He’s in the process of hiring staff and firefighters, renumbering all fire and Emergency Medical Services units to match their stations, and doing assessment of all stations and apparatus for repairs and/or replacement.

He’s able to get started on this, he said, because the county has already collected \$1.58 million, 33 percent of the annual \$4.85 million fire assessment.

Bashoor said Fire Rescue has initiated five construction projects and has finished designing five trucks, including a tanker and a brush truck.

Because of the complexity of the trucks, it will take a year to have them built and delivered, he said, but they are on their way.

The construction projects, set to start at the beginning of the year, include:

- DeSoto City Fire Department
- Venus Fire Department
- Highlands Park Fire Department
- Headquarters on

Kenilworth Boulevard Bashoor said Highlands Lakes Fire Department has been held up by a title search on the property, but he expects that to get cleared up soon.

“We’re all doing this while answering 10,000 fire and EMS calls,” Bashoor said.

On his spreadsheets, Bashoor had the station at Sun ‘n Lake of Sebring listed for staffing in the first three months of 2019, but it’s on hold for now, he said.

In addition to a deputy chief of operations, Bashoor expects to hire three fire battalion chiefs, three lieutenants, and six firefighters this month. “I anticipate they will all be on board in the next two weeks-ish,” Bashoor said.

Bashoor said he had applicants from existing staff or volunteers and some from out of the area, even as far away as California and Kansas. All must have served here previously, he said, because they had Florida certifications.

Bashoor said he is also working on consolidation between fire and EMS, to be able to maximize system efficiency, standardize equipment and processes, improve response times and facilities, share costs and merge administration.

Some mechanisms already in place, aside from renumbering units, are the Twiage application to send medical reports from ambulances to emergency rooms while en route; updating credentials, radios and stretchers; and designing new ambulances.

He said he has 17 paramedics with fire-fighter certifications, but they haven’t been on fire trucks in 10 years, so he’s planning refresher courses.

Once the new patches come in — a Highlands County Fire Rescue insignia shield — he said

EMS and fire personnel can start wearing them, but there’s a lot of consolidation to go.

“There’s no one switch we can switch to say, ‘It’s done,’” Bashoor said. “It will take a year.”

Commission Chair Jim Brooks asked where the fire battalion chiefs would be assigned. Bashoor said they would be assigned to a single shift, covering the whole county and responsible for all calls in the county at that time.

“A county of this size would ideally be eight battalions,” Bashoor said. “Obviously, we’re not going to be at that stage in our lifetimes.”

Beth Degnan of Highlands Park Estates asked from the audience if Venus Fire Department would get any new trucks right away from other departments. Bashoor acknowledged the Venus fire truck — a 1987 fire engine — is officially an antique, but until he gets a new building down there that can hold bigger vehicles, he won’t station a new engine there to have its hoses and apparatus sit out in the sun and the rain.

In the meantime, he said, he will have full-time staff stationed at Sun ‘N Lakes South Fire Station to help cover those calls, just as full-time staff at DeSoto City Fire Stations will help cover calls in Lorida.

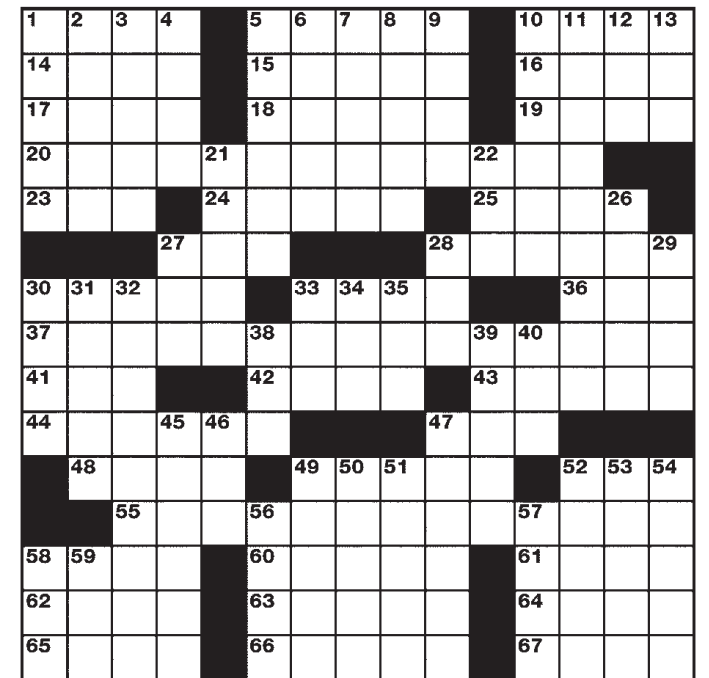

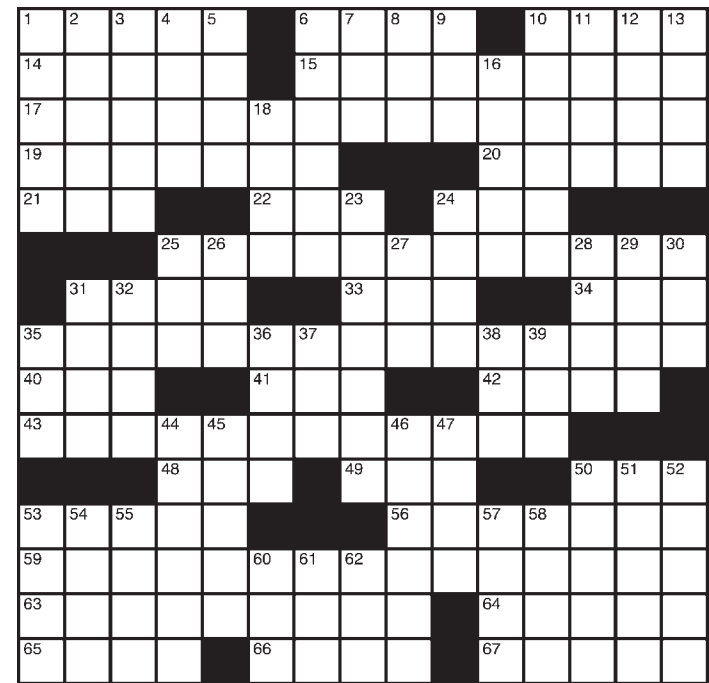

# Paving payment code change passes, 3-2

## County gives one month for holdout landowner

SEBRING — By a 3-2 vote, Highlands County commissioners approved a change to the code that lets them give a longer time for residents to pay for road paving.

They also voted 3-2, on Commissioner Arlene Tuck's suggestion, to send a notice to landowners on Oak Manor Avenue to let them know the county is waiting until Jan. 31, 2019, for the one remaining landowner, the owner of Peace River Citrus, to sign off on the petition for a paved road.

After that, the project and the assessments for it need to move forward.

On both votes, Commission Chair Jim Brooks and Commission Vice Chair Ron Handley dissented.

When Commissioner Don Elwell suggested the

county amend the code again, lowering the percentage of residents on a road needed to request road paving from 75 to 50 percent, commissioners held off.

It would allow the road project to move forward without the extra signature, but Commissioner Greg Harris suggested that would be better handled by a special exception. Other commissioners agreed.

Brooks said he could think of rare, if any, occasions when owners of less than 75 percent of the residential frontage on a road had requested the road get paved. In those cases, there was no request to have an assessment on the neighborhood because the money was already there from a previous assessment or one very generous landowner.

In the Oak Manor

situation, without the citrus grower's signature, the other residents don't own 75 percent or more of the road frontage. Road and Bridge Director Kyle Green explained that the request has been to pave approximately 1,100 feet of the road, which totals 2,194 linear feet of frontage on both sides, combined.

Outside of the land there that the county owns, the citrus grower owns approximately 50 percent of the frontage, leaving the remaining residents without enough frontage to put forth a petition.

Also, without the grower's participation, the cost per linear foot of road goes up. Each person pays that per-foot cost multiplied by the amount of linear feet he or she has, Green said.

Prior to the vote on the amendment to allow

long-term payments, Brooks said the county used to wait until all the money was in before starting work. He asked County Attorney Joy Carmichael, and she confirmed that the code is designed to have people pay up front, then have the county provide the work.

In this case, however, the county would do the work first, then take payments over time.

Handley agreed with Tuck's letter proposal in so far as he wanted to see the matter resolved.

"By a slim margin, we agreed to stretch this one out," Handley said.

"I think we owe the citizens this," Harris said of Oak Manor residents.

Harris recommended supporting the Oak Manor project and looking carefully at all others in the future. Elwell agreed with taking each

request on its merits.

Elwell said, from the first meeting he and Green had with residents, they and residents discussed the option of paying it off in 10 years.

"It was incorrect, it turned out," Elwell said. The code, prior to Tuesday, only allowed three years to pay.

Green said his intent was for the residents to finance the project, not have the county finance it and then get paid back.

"I've never been involved in a project like that," Green said.

Brooks asked who promised a 10-year payoff period, and neither Green nor Elwell could tell.

"I don't think any one person promised to pave the road (up front)," Elwell said. "We always said it would come back to the board."

It did. The County Commission voted 3-2 on

March 20 to set up a 10-year assessment district to raise funds to pave Oak Manor Avenue, and to start the work as soon as the district is established, instead of waiting until the full amount gets collected.

Carmichael told commissioners in November she would need them to amend the ordinance to let them do what they voted to do, since the ordinance didn't allow that.

Tuesday's vote cleared that roadblock, but the residents still don't have everyone on board.

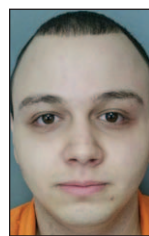
Carmichael said the grower's signature would qualify the petition to come before the board, unless the board wants to use a special exception, just this once.

She said she would look at the county code, and see if they can.

All fishing factors considered; today anglers will have pre-front feeding conditions so I expect today to produce at above average rates. Rain and another 20-degree cold

front arrives Thursday, shutting down or slowing down significantly the

start of the full moon phase — full moon occurs Saturday.

However the fish are already acclimated to the winter weather pattern over the past month to five week, so you can expect them to slow down Thursday and Friday but Saturday the 'full moon effect', having the lunar orbit perigee occurring Monday, will be strong, causing larger numbers of fish to feed at the same

time.

Sunday and Monday will give anglers ideal winter fishing weather to go with the strong full moon. So pre-Christmas fishing will be very good during the midday and sunrise and sunset hours.

There will be very high winds on Thursday and Friday however there is a very good chance that Thursday morning from 7-10:30 a.m. when the winds are picking

up significantly, the big bass will be feeding heavily. This 'possible pre-front feeding frenzy' all depends on how fast the weather front moves through our state late tonight and tomorrow morning.

band back together in a way. It's just good, terrific people. Then, you add in Jimmy Vasser and James Sullivan, guys that I've known for a long time, and it's just a nice, instant chemistry."

In fact, Bell was one of the "chemists" who brought the program together. As an analyst for NBC Sports' coverage of IndyCar racing, Bell has spent a lot of time around Vasser and Sullivan, who have fielded an IndyCar team for the past several years.

He knew of their wishes to get involved in sports car racing, as well as AIM Autosport's desire to return to IMSA competition

after competing in Pirelli World Challenge. He helped make the connection that led to this partnership.

"It's kind of funny, actually," Bell explains. "Over the summer, I had been speaking with Jimmy Vasser about an opportunity for Lexus, so I introduced him to the guys at AIM, having known those guys well and knowing that AIM had an appetite to be back in the WeatherTech Championship.

"Sometimes, you make introductions and things don't work out. In this case, I had a good hunch that there'd be a lot of good energy there, and luckily it worked out that way and Lexus came together. It was like baking a cake. Sometimes

it turns out all right."

Bell will be focused on partnering with Montcalvo and working to put their No. 12 Lexus at the front of the GTD field in 2019. But he's also keenly aware of what's coming for fans in 2019 with the introduction of NBC Sports as the new television home of IMSA, and he's excited about the prospects.

"I think (fans) should be excited about their passion for storytelling," he said. "Having worked for NBC now – I think this is my eighth year coming up, something like that – you really feel like you're part of a team that's just so passionate about making sure they tell the stories thoroughly, professionally and with enthusiasm. We've done

that on the IndyCar side.

"In fairness, IMSA broadcasting has been terrific all along. I mean, everybody in this paddock is absolutely linked by a common passion for the sport. But I think with NBC, what I found is – at least on the side of working for them – whatever it takes to be the best and do the best job [is what they will do].

"They want to introduce little innovations here and there that might have worked in other places for them. But at the end of the day, I think it really comes down to storytelling. Making sure for the fan watching at home that we try to extract the stuff that people care about that's happening and we can convey that the best we

can."

Bell believes there's no shortage of content or storylines to follow, especially heading into the 2019 season.

"When you look at the driver announcements already and the manufacturers and teams, as a competitor, you're always trying to gauge your competition," Bell said. "The sequence of press releases and alignments that have taken place over the last few weeks, as a competitor, you kind of take a deep breath. You're like, 'Whoa.' Over and over again, you're saying, 'Well, that's going to be a strong lineup and that's going to be a strong lineup.'

"It's pretty humbling when you think about the commitment that teams

and sponsors make to this series, because it's significant. I think, as a fan, it's like, 'Wow.' You're seeing some incredible technology, some great drivers and a lot of diversity in terms of the technical diversity of what you see out here. The fact that we all end up within half a second or a second of each other is a small miracle."

# Daytona 500 packed with surprising action

This is the second of a five-part series on the top-five races during the 2018 Monster Energy NASCAR Cup Series. This week: No. 4.

The Daytona 500 has been the season opener for the NASCAR Cup Series since 1982.

It is commonly referred to as stock-car racing's Super Bowl, even though it starts, doesn't end, a season.

By nearly every measure, the 500 is NASCAR's grand stage, and 2018 did not disappoint, with a mix of lead changes, key yellow flags and a surprise, emotional finish with historic significance.

Because of all those factors, the Daytona 500 lands at fourth place on the five best Cup Series races in 2018.

Austin Dillon was not among the top eight drivers on Lap 198 of the scheduled 200-lap run over Daytona International Speedway's 2.5-mile tri-oval.

But thanks to a "Big One" caution on Lap 199 that involved many of the front-running cars, Dillon found himself and his No. 3 Richard Childress Racing Chevrolet up in the lead pack.

He took full advantage of the golden opportunity.

Dillon dumped race leader Eric Almirola, whose car vanished under a hail of sparks and smoke, on the last overtime lap (207) and captured the 60th Daytona 500 before a sellout crowd.

"We went down the backstretch, had a run, went low, the No. 43 (Bubba Wallace) went low and I just had more momentum than he (Almirola) did and caught him," said Dillon. "It turned him, but heck we won the Daytona 500 and we are sitting here now."

The 27-year-old driver was pushed to the front by rookie and pseudo teammate Wallace, who made his full-time NASCAR Cup Series debut in the No. 43 Richard Petty Motorsports Chevrolet.

RPM has a shop in the Childress Racing compound.

For the second time in as many years the 500 winner led only one lap to score an improbable victory.

On this day, yellow flags worked in Dillon's favor. A caution on Lap 199 for a wreck that involved 12 cars in Turn 2 set the table for his victory, because when the field reassembled for a two-lap dash, he was fourth in line behind Almirola.

Dillon and Wallace got a run on the outside lane, and when Almirola moved up to block, he got taken out. Almirola shrugged off the contact.

"It was the last lap and we're all trying to win the Daytona 500," Almirola said. "It's the biggest race of the year and it's a career-changing race, so we were just racing really aggressively."

"I put every move I knew to try and stay in the lead and, unfortunately, I just wasn't able to hold on. He got to

my back bumper and was pushing and just hooked me. My heart is broken."

Dillon shot ahead in Turn 4 and left Wallace and Denny Hamlin to battle it out for second place. They rubbed sheet metal to the finish line with Wallace scoring runner-up honors.

"I got the rookie stripes for a reason, so making some of those moves today I was a little bit delayed and a little bit late and luckily kept out of harm's way," Wallace said.

This Daytona 500 transcended a normal day of NASCAR racing. This was an afternoon packed with tears of joy.

Twenty years ago Dale Earnhardt won the Daytona 500 after two decades of frustrating misfires.

When the "Intimidator" died in 2001, Richard Childress Racing took the car number out of service.

Dillon coaxed his grandfather, "Pop Pop" Childress, to bring Earnhardt's No. 3 Chevrolet out of hiding in 2014, and as the racing fates would have it, the 27-year-old driver made that stock car a Daytona winner again.

"Daytona has a way with just making memories," said Dillon, who was 7 when Earnhardt won this race in 1998. "This place makes memory after memory and they are life-changing memories, and I was fortunate to be in Victory Lane 20 years ago and I'm here again."

Wallace, who is the first African-American driver to run a full Cup Series schedule in four decades, was overcome by emotion when his mother appeared in the media center for a post-race hug.

"That makes you feel good," the tearful 24-year-old driver said. "It definitely pulls on your heartstrings a little bit."

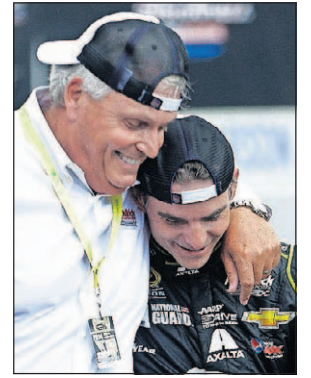
The race was competitive from the get-go. The lead changed hands 15 times by Lap 123 as drivers jockeyed for stage points on Lap 60 and Lap 120.

The jostling created two caution periods involving a total of 16 cars. The second of those eliminated Danica Patrick's No. 7 Chevrolet. Patrick was making her last NASCAR start.

"It wasn't meant to be," said Patrick, who went on to compete in the Indy 500 in May.

### Jeff Gordon Motorsports?

Not so fast. We doubt that the nameplate will ever change atop the Hendrick Motorsports shop, but we finally have semi-official clarity on the future of NASCAR's gold-standard race team. In a recent article in Autoweek, Hendrick confirmed what many insiders had suspected in recent years — that when the 69-year-old team owner steps away from day-to-day duties, his race team will be run by Jeff Gordon, who won four Cup championships in Hendrick's No. 24 Chevy.

### When will this happen?

Not in the very near future, it seems. "I love this and still enjoy it so much, and it's tied to my automotive businesses," Hendrick told Autoweek. "My health is good, so I expect to be around for a long time." We don't doubt it. After all, at 69, Hendrick is a kid in the modern NASCAR ownership game. Between Joe Gibbs (78), Roger Penske (81), Jack Roush (76) and Richard Childress (73), their average age is 77.

### Speaking of Childress ...

Richard Childress Racing dipped into its history books a few years back by reintroducing the No. 3 and putting it on the side of Austin Dillon's cars. Next season, as part of RCR's 50th anniversary campaign, the team will slap the No. 8 on rookie Daniel Hemric's Chevrolets. That, too, is a nostalgic move. Hemric is a native of Kannapolis, N.C., the mill town that also claims the Earnhardts. Ralph ran the No. 8 nearly all of his career, it was Dale's first NASCAR number, and Junior used it most of his career.

## JROTC hike to remember the Bataan Death March

There is plenty of discussion these days about how our young people have no sense of history, which can lead to a generation erroneously believing that events of the past are mere myths.

Not so with 180 JROTC cadets who gathered for a 14-mile hike at Hammock State Park last Saturday to remember one horrendous historical World War II event, the Bataan Death March in the Philippines, April 9, 1942.

Cadets from Avon Park, Lake Placid, Sebring, DeSoto and Hardee high schools met at 7:30 a.m. to receive instructions from Jack Northcutt who organized the memorial hike.

The cadets receive merit for their work in rocketry, marksmanship, community service for this 14-mile hike.

Northcutt told the group that they were not to run.

“Just walk in memory of the men who died during the 65-mile forced walk, and realize that if the American and Filipino soldiers attempted to run they were immediately killed,” he said.

A few simple rules helped the young men and women ready themselves. They all had to carry a water bottle and would be taken off the course if they could not raise their bottle along the hike if asked.

Besides basic safety precautions they were told, “Don't mess with critters, snakes, fire ants, turkeys or deer.”

The cadets, helped by adult volunteers and led by Florida Wildlife Rangers began their hike at 8:30 a.m. They had five hours to complete the winding

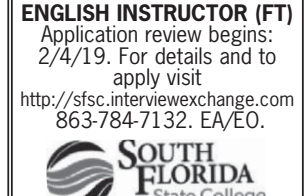

loop course mainly thru the park. The average speed was 3 miles-per-hour. Their reward was a luscious lunch of pulled pork and all the trimmings.

This was the fourth year cadets participated in the 14-mile hike to honor the thousands of casualties of the 1942 World War II Bataan Death March.

The captured American and Filipino POW's were loaded onto trains like sardines when forced to surrender the Bataan Peninsula on the main island of Luzon. Those that made it were then forced to march 65 miles to a prison. The march took less than five days. They were not allowed to drink water in the adjoining streams. They were also stripped of their shoes and hats.

In one showdown the Japanese took two officers and two enlisted men behind a rice patty and shot them. Many were shot as soon as they surrendered. Others suffered sun treatment, forced to sit in sweltering direct sunlight without their helmets. If anyone asked for water they were shot dead. Others died of disease, dysentery,

starvation and were beheaded or bayoneted.

At the end of the war, Japanese General Masaharu Homma was

arrested for these war crimes. On April 3, 1946 he was executed by firing squad while still other former guards where hung.

The JROTC cadets, some doing the memorial hike for the fourth year, realized that they are entrusted with the

obligation to pass on their knowledge of the Death March, other World War II atrocities and significant historical events that shaped our history so that their classmates, friends and the world will "never forget" the ultimate sacrifice so many made to keep us free.

# SCHOOL BUS SAFETY 101

FAMILY FEATURES

For millions of school-age children in the United States, each day begins – and ends – with a bus ride. While the school bus is the safest way to travel to and from school, according to the National Association of Pupil Transportation (NAPT), it's important for parents to teach their children how to stay safe in and around the school bus as obstructed views, distracted drivers and more can put kids at risk.

These tips from the experts at NAPT and the Propane Education & Research Council (PERC) provide parents with some additional measures to take and lessons to teach to increase safety going to and from the bus, and even during the ride.

### Before the Bus Arrives

- Ensure backpacks are packed securely so papers and other items don't scatter as the bus approaches.
- Create a morning routine that puts kids at the bus stop five minutes before the scheduled pickup time. This helps avoid a last-minute rush, when safety lessons are easily forgotten, and ensures kids are safely in place for boarding.
- Encourage children to wear bright, contrasting colors so they can be seen easier by drivers.
- Walk young children to the bus stop or encourage kids to walk in groups. There is safety in numbers; groups are easier for drivers to see.
- If kids must cross a street, driveway or alley, remind them to stop and look both ways before crossing.
- Verify the bus stop location offers good visibility for the bus driver; if changes are needed, talk with nearby homeowners or school district officials to implement changes. Never let kids wait in a house or car, where the driver may miss seeing them approach the bus.

- Remind children that the bus stop is not a playground. Balls or other toys could roll into the street and horseplay can result in someone falling into the path of oncoming traffic.
- Instruct children to stay at least three steps away from the road and allow the bus to come to a complete stop before approaching it.

### On the Bus Ride

- When boarding the bus, items can get bumped and dropped. Caution children that before picking anything up, they should talk to the driver and follow instructions to safely retrieve their possessions.
- Teach safe riding habits: stay seated with head, hands and feet inside at all times; keep bags and books out of the aisle and remain seated until the bus stops moving.
- Instruct children to never throw things on the bus or out the windows and to never play with or block emergency exits.
- Remind kids that just like when riding in a car, loud noises are off limits so they don't distract the driver. That includes cellphones and other electronic devices; instruct children to put them on mute or use headphones.

### Leaving the Bus

- Remind children to look before stepping off the bus. If they must cross the street, teach them to do so in front of the bus by taking five big steps (approximately 10 feet) away from the front of the bus, looking up and waiting for the driver to signal that it is safe.
- For parents who meet their kids at the bus, remember that in their excitement kids may dart across the street. Eliminate the risk by waiting on the side of the street where kids exit the bus.

- Make the bus ride part of your daily "how was school?" discussion. Encourage kids to talk about the things they see and hear on the bus so you can discuss appropriate behaviors and, if necessary, report any concerns to school administrators. As bullying is prevalent and buses are no exception, ask your child to tell you about any bullying they observe, whether against another child or themselves, and talk about how to shut down bully behaviors.

## AN ALTERNATE FORM OF TRANSPORTATION



Many school districts are moving away from diesel buses in favor of buses powered by an alternate fuel, like propane, which offers numerous benefits for school districts and their students.

In fact, school buses powered by propane transport approximately 928,000 students to and from school every day at more than 840 public and private school districts in 48 states, according to a vehicle registration report compiled by PERC using IHS Polk new vehicle registration data.

"There's a lot to like about propane school buses for community stakeholders and school officials, and school districts across the nation continue to take notice," said Michael Taylor, PERC director of autogas business development. "Compared to other fuels, propane school buses are quieter and offer reduced emissions. Plus, they cost less for the district to operate, so schools can put more money back into the classroom where it helps students most."

### Safety

Among the numerous safety advantages propane school buses provide, engines powered by propane are noticeably quieter than diesel engines, which can help ensure a safe ride. Plus, just like all buses, propane buses are crash tested to ensure they meet U.S. Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards for side and rear impact. In addition, an automatic shut-off valve prevents the flow of fuel to the engine when it's not running, even if the ignition is turned on.

### Cleanliness

The World Health Organization and the Environmental Protection Agency have identified diesel engine exhaust as a carcinogen, which can cause short- and long-term health effects. With the emergence of alternative fuels like propane, which provides a clean emissions profile compared with diesel and gasoline buses, there is decreased risk of exposing young passengers to harmful particulate matter that can

be found in the exhaust in older diesel buses, which can escalate breathing-related issues and aggravate asthma.

### Cost-Effectiveness

Financially, propane buses provide school districts with the lowest total cost-of-ownership compared to other fuel types, according to PERC. Even as gas prices continue to fluctuate across the country, propane consistently costs less per gallon than diesel and gasoline, by as much as 50 percent, which saves districts significant money on fuel costs. They also require less maintenance over the lifetime of the vehicle, saving additional money on upkeep. Savings on transportation can help keep more money in the classroom helping students learn.

## Trump Foundation reaches deal to dissolve amid lawsuit

President fights allegations he misused assets for business, political purposes

NEW YORK — President Donald Trump's charitable foundation reached a deal Tuesday to go out of business, even as Trump continues to fight allegations he misused its assets to resolve business disputes and boost his run for the White House.

New York's attorney general and lawyers for the Trump Foundation agreed on a court-supervised process for shutting down the charity and distributing about \$1.7 million in remaining funds to other nonprofit groups.

The agreement resolved one part of the legal drama surrounding Trump, whose campaign, transition, inauguration and real estate empire are all under investigation.

Attorney General Barbara Underwood's lawsuit alleging Trump and his family illegally operated the foundation as an extension of his businesses and his presidential campaign will continue.

The lawsuit, filed last spring, seeks \$2.8 million in restitution and a 10-year ban on Trump and his three eldest children — Donald Jr., Eric and Ivanka — from running any charities in New York.

In a statement Tuesday, Underwood cited "a shocking pattern of illegality involving the Trump Foundation — including unlawful coordination with the Trump presidential campaign, repeated and willful self-dealing, and much more."

The foundation operated as "little more than a checkbook to serve

## Penny Marshall dies at age 75

'Laverne & Shirley' star and movie director suffered from complications from diabetes

NEW YORK — Penny Marshall, who indelibly starred in the top-rated sitcom "Laverne & Shirley" before becoming the trailblazing director of smash-hit big-screen comedies such as "Big" and "A League of Their Own," has died. She was 75.

Michelle Bega, a spokeswoman for the Marshall family, said Tuesday that Marshall died in her Los Angeles home on Monday night due to complications from diabetes. Marshall earlier fought lung cancer, which went into remission in 2013. "Our family is heartbroken," the Marshall family said in a statement.

In "Laverne & Shirley," among television's biggest hits for much of its eight-season run between 1976-1983, the nasal-voiced, Bronx-born Marshall starred as Laverne DeFazio alongside Cindy Williams as a pair of blue-collar roommates toiling on the assembly line of a Milwaukee brewery. A spinoff of "Happy Days," the series was the rare network hit about working-class characters, and its self-empowering opening song ("Give us any chance, we'll take it/Read us any rule, we'll break it") foreshadowed Marshall's own path as a pioneering female filmmaker in the male-dominated movie business.

"Almost everyone had a theory about why 'Laverne & Shirley' took off," Marshall wrote in her 2012 memoir "My Mother Was Nuts." "I thought it was simply because Laverne and Shirley were poor and there were no poor people on TV, but there were plenty of them sitting at home and watching TV."

Marshall directed several episodes of "Laverne & Shirley," which her older brother, the late filmmaker-producer Garry Marshall, created. Those episodes helped launch Marshall as a filmmaker. When Whoopi Goldberg clashed with director Howard Zieff, she brought in Marshall to direct "Jumpin' Jack Flash," the 1986 comedy starring Goldberg.

"Jumpin' Jack Flash" did fair business, but Marshall's next film, "Big," was a major success, making her the first woman to direct a film that grossed more than \$100 million. Marshall reteamed with Hanks for "A League of Their Own," the 1992 comedy about the women's professional baseball league begun during World War II, starring Geena Davis, Madonna and Rosie O'Donnell. That, too, crossed \$100 million, making \$107.5 million domestically.

## Grocery stores begin driverless deliveries

The nation's largest grocery chain is trying to leap into the driverless delivery market, announcing Tuesday that it is now ready to bring milk, eggs and apples to some customers' homes in a vehicle with nobody at the wheel.

Although limited to delivering within about a mile of one Arizona supermarket, it represents the latest step for industries trying to lower delivery costs of everyday items as well as those trying to launch self-driving cars on public roads.

Nuro has been delivering groceries with larger, manned self-driving vehicles since August. It will be adding two of its completely unmanned R1 vehicles to that fleet, Ferguson said.

When summoned, the R1 will travel within a one-mile radius of the Fry's Food grocery store just east of the Phoenix Zoo at speeds up to 25 miles per hour on residential roads, but stay clear of main roads or highways.

Customers, after placing an order on their smartphone or laptop, will get a text message when the groceries are on their way. Another message will alert them when the grocery delivery is curbside. Once the vehicle arrives, the customer will receive a punch code to open the doors of the vehicle,

## Judge delays Flynn sentencing, 'not hiding disgust' at crime

## Trump retreats from threat to shut down government

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump and leaders in Congress appeared to be pulling back Tuesday from a government shutdown over his \$5 billion request for border wall funds, with the first signs of movement toward a possible end to the standoff.

The White House set the tone early when Press Secretary Sarah Huckabee Sanders indicated Trump — who just last week said he'd be "proud" to shut down the government — doesn't want to after all. The president would consider other options and the administration was looking at ways to find the funding elsewhere, Sanders said.

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# Embattled Florida elections official sues to get job back

Former Broward County Supervisor of Elections was removed from office by Gov. Scott

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Calling her suspension “malicious” and politically-motivated, a former Florida elections official is asking a federal judge to reinstate her after she was removed from office by Gov. Rick Scott.

Embattled Broward elections supervisor Brenda Snipes filed a federal lawsuit Monday against Scott and Senate President Bill Galvano, who are both Republicans. Snipes is a Democrat who worked in one of the state’s Democratic strongholds.

The lawsuit contends that Snipes’ due process rights were violated and that the law allowing the governor to suspend elected officials is unconstitutional.

“Snipes seeks to fight for her reputation and stand up against the embarrassment that has

been caused by Governor Scott’s unnecessary and malicious suspension,” states the lawsuit. “There are false allegations contained within the executive order and Snipes has never had a proper forum to state her position ... At this point Governor Scott’s allegations have gone unchallenged as he sits ‘high’ on a throne utilizing state resources to continually humiliate Snipes.”

Snipes, first appointed to her post by then-Gov. Jeb Bush in 2003 and then elected to the job, came under withering criticism for her handling of this year’s elections and a legally required recount in close races for governor and U.S. Senate.

At the close of the recount, Snipes agreed to resign as of Jan. 4 instead of serving out the two years left in her term. But in late November Scott suspended her immediately from office. Snipes responded by saying she

was rescinding her resignation.

The governor said he was suspending her for misfeasance, incompetence and neglect of duty and appointed his former general counsel to take her place. In his executive order, Scott cited problems during the recount, including reports of more than 2,000 ballots being misplaced.

Shortly after the recount started, Scott himself suggested possible fraud, but never offered any concrete examples. Snipes also came under fire in 2017 after she destroyed year-old ballots in violation of law.

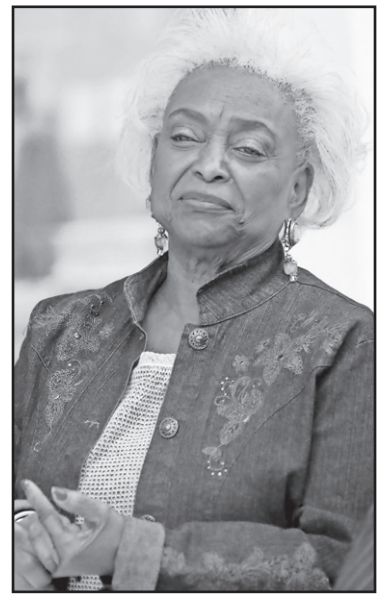
In her lawsuit, Snipes contends that allegations against her were either untrue or were caused by the governor’s own interference after his U.S. Senate campaign sued her during the recount.

The lawsuit targets Galvano because he announced last week that the state Senate would not review her case. Florida law

requires the Senate to either remove or reinstate county officials who are suspended by the governor.

But Galvano sent a memo to senators saying there is not enough time to investigate the allegations against Snipes before her resignation takes effect Jan. 4. He said a legal review by Senate attorneys had concluded that Snipes had rescinded her “unconditional” resignation too late.

Scott replaced Snipes with Peter Antonacci, who has held several posts at the request of the governor but has no elections experience. Antonacci played a pivotal role in the controversial decision to force the ouster of Florida Department of Law Enforcement Commissioner Gerald Bailey in 2015. Antonacci had been president of Florida’s economic development agency before he was sworn last week to replace Snipes.

## School rewind surveillance video during massacre, delaying response

Officers thought gunman was still in the building

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — The police response to the Florida high school massacre was delayed because school officials rewind a school surveillance video, making officers think the gunman was still in the building, a new report shows.

The South Florida Sun-Sentinel reports documents show then-Marjory Stoneman Douglas assistant principal Jeff Morford and security officer Kelvin

Greenleaf began viewing a livestream from inside the three-story freshman building minutes after the Feb. 14 shooting stopped.

When they didn’t see the gunman who killed 14 students and three staff members, they rewind the video until they found him and began relaying information to Broward Sheriff’s Deputy Scot Peterson, who radioed officers who had charged into the building.

At one point, officers were told suspect Nikolas Cruz was coming down the stairs when he had left the building nearly 30 minutes earlier, abandoning his

AR-15 semi-automatic rifle. Officers told investigators that delayed their arrival on the third floor, where several students were dead and wounded. One deputy said one girl had a pulse when they found her, but she was dead by the time they got her outside.

“Had we known the shooter wasn’t there, we probably could have flooded that building a lot faster knowing that we’re just going to go in there and just start trying to recover victims and wounded people,” Coral Springs police SWAT officer George Schmidt told investigators.

The video delay came

to light months ago, but it was not clear then how the misunderstanding occurred.

According to reports, Morford heard the fire alarm — it was probably activated by smoke from Cruz’s gun — and raced outside, where he found Peterson, who yelled, “Code Red,” the school district’s term to lockdown the school because of a shooter. Peterson told Morford to go to the school’s security room and look at the livestream from surveillance cameras inside the freshman building.

Morford found Greenleaf already there, but they

couldn’t locate the shooter. They rewind the video until they found Cruz and Morford radioed Peterson what they saw — but he doesn’t remember if he told Peterson the information was nearly a half-hour old. Peterson told officers inside the building that Cruz was coming down the stairwell from the third floor, so they waited to ambush him — not knowing that he had already fled the school.

That delay cost precious minutes.

“They brought a young lady down from the third floor. I guess she had a pulse up top. When they got back downstairs, she

was gone,” sheriff’s Sgt. Christopher Palmara told investigators.

Peterson retired shortly after it was revealed he failed to enter the building to confront Cruz. Morford was recently transferred to another job while the school district investigates his actions before the shooting, including whether he brushed aside students’ concerns about Cruz, who attended the school in 2016 and 2017. He denies having those conversations, but the state commission investigating the shooting concluded he was not being truthful.

**Pence misses launch but treated to new SpaceX crew capsule**

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Vice President Mike Pence missed seeing a SpaceX rocket soar Tuesday. But he still got to view the company’s new crew capsule, designed to carry astronauts to the International Space Station as soon as next year.

Pence joined members of the Air Force to witness the launch of the most powerful GPS satellite ever built, but a last-minute abort kept the Falcon rocket grounded. SpaceX will try again Wednesday.

Pence later toured a SpaceX hangar and admired the sleek, white Dragon capsule being readied for a January test flight, minus a crew. The next capsule, still in California, will carry astronauts.

The vice president called the spacecraft “very cool” — and not what he expected. He said the interior — shown on a TV monitor near the capsule — reminds him of the movie “The Martian.”

More than 100 SpaceX workers crowded around Pence to shake his hand. Pence told the crowd: “We’re going back to the moon and then Mars. Stay tuned.”

**Lawsuit: Think-tank fired worker over military duty**

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A former employee of a Tallahassee conservative think tank says he was fired because he had to spend time on military duty with the U.S. Air Force Reserve.

Christopher Ricardo filed a federal lawsuit last week against The James Madison Institute. Ricardo’s lawsuit says he worked at the institute from September 2016 until August 2017 as director of donor relations.

The lawsuit asserts officials at the James Madison Institute fired Ricardo in August 2017, shortly after he had returned from his required annual deployment. Upon his return he says he told institute officials he would have to serve a six-month deployment in 2019. He alleges he was fired the following week.

Logan Elizabeth Padgett, a spokeswoman for the institute, called the lawsuit a “meritless accusation by a disgruntled employee.”

**Police: South Florida teen killed in bicycle accident**

PEMBROKE PINES, Fla. (AP) — Police in South Florida now say a 14-year-old boy was killed in a bicycle accident that didn’t involve a hit-and-run.

Pembroke Pines police spokeswoman Amanda Conwell tells news outlets that an investigation and medical evidence found that Bora Duz died during a bike riding accident on Monday night. The boy was taken to a hospital where he died.

A passerby found the child and called 911 and police initially believed it was a hit-and-run accident.

**Florida raises estimate for the state’s manatee population**

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — It’s been a deadly year for manatees, but Florida wildlife officials believe there are more of the threatened marine mammals than they previously thought.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission now says roughly 7,500 to 10,300 manatees swim in state waters, a significant increase from previous estimates of roughly 6,000.

A statement Tuesday said the population estimate comes from data collected in a 2015-2016 survey and analyzed with upgraded computer models.

It’s good news in an otherwise tough year for the sea cows. Wildlife officials have documented 779 manatee deaths so far this year, compared to 538 in 2017.

Experts blame a winter cold snap, a prolonged red tide and collisions with boats. Wildlife commission statistics show red tide caused or is suspected in over 200 manatee deaths.

**Day care worker hit by stray bullet outside school**

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Authorities say a Florida day care worker was hit by a stray bullet while sitting outside her school.

The Orange County Sheriff’s Office says the woman was wounded Tuesday afternoon outside Scholar’s Prep

Academy in Orlando. She was taken to a local hospital with injuries that weren’t considered life-threatening.

Detectives say two vehicles near the day care were involved in a shooting and one of their bullets struck the day care worker.

**Orlando student fatally shot while walking to high school**

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — A Florida sheriff says a 15-year-old high school student was fatally shot while walking to school.

Orange County Sheriff John Mina said first responders treated the student at the scene on Tuesday morning. He was then taken to a hospital where he was pronounced dead.

Mina asked the public for any information about the shooting. He says so far no witnesses have come forward saying they saw what happened.

Mina says investigators believe the student was walking by himself and that he lives in the neighborhood around Boone High School in Orlando.

**Panama City borrows \$50 million for hurricane cleanup**

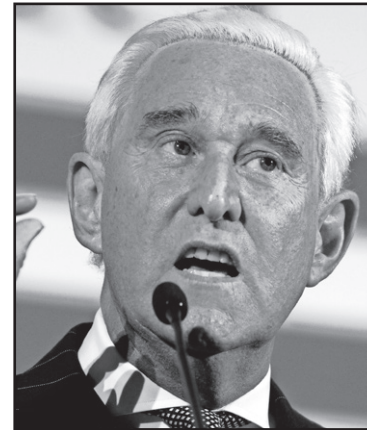
PANAMA CITY, Fla. (AP) — Officials in Florida’s Panhandle have agreed to take out a \$50 million loan to help pay for Hurricane Michael-related bills until federal reimbursements are received.

The Panama City Commission approved the measure Monday, calling the loan a “necessary evil.”

City Manager Mark McQueen told officials that it will cost between \$60 and \$80 million just to cover debris pickup and security measures.

The News Herald reports officials hope to repay the loan with the reimbursement. Bay District School, Bay County and other municipalities in the area hit by Michael on Oct. 10 are also considering similar measures.

They’re borrowing the money from PNC Bank. McQueen told commissioners the hurricane is expected to put a “great strain” on the city’s budget.

**Ex-Trump adviser Stone admits to InfoWars lies, settles suit**

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — Former Trump campaign adviser Roger Stone has settled a \$100 million lawsuit accusing him of publishing lies on the far-right InfoWars website.

The Wall Street Journal reports exiled Chinese businessman Guo Wengui sued Stone in March, saying Stone accused him of being a “turncoat criminal” who violated U.S. election law. Stone now says his conduct was “irresponsible.” Guo has criticized high-level corruption in China and applied for asylum in the U.S.

The settlement reached Monday identifies Chinese-American media tycoon Bruno Wu and a former Trump staffer as the sources of false information.

The settlement allows Stone to avoid paying any damages if he publishes national newspaper ads apologizing for the statements and retracts the statements online. He still is of interest to investigators probing Russian interference in the 2016 election.

**Hulking hog captured near school bus stop**

PALM BAY, Fla. (AP) — A hefty hog has been captured near a school bus stop in Florida.

Florida Today reports the nearly 400-pound hog was captured over the weekend by a team of dogs and trappers in Palm Bay.

Melbourne wildlife trapper James Dean received a call reporting “a very large boar hog”

that was tearing up sod around a playground. Police helped block traffic Saturday morning while Dean, four hunting dogs and four men converged on the scene. Dean says the trained canines sniffed out and zeroed in on the hog within minutes. Dean says the hog was euthanized.

**Prison guards accused of attacking young inmates**

MIAMI (AP) — Authorities say two Florida prison guards assaulted and intimidated several young inmates at the facility where they worked.

Court records show Terrance Reynolds was arrested Monday and charged with conspiring to commit civil rights violations and making false statements. Brendan Butler was sentenced to two years in prison earlier this year after pleading guilty to a civil rights charge in Miami federal court.

Investigators say Reynolds and Butler were working at the South Florida Reception Center in March 2017 when they took three youthful offenders, who had been separated from the general population, to a broom closet. Officials say the guards hit one of the inmates with a broomstick while the other two watched. Another inmate was reportedly assaulted the next day for talking about the previous day’s beating.

**Red tide is giving most of state a break, for now**

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) — After months of widespread red tide infestation along Florida’s coast, the noxious algae bloom is giving much of the state a break.

Florida wildlife officials say there were no fish kills from red tide last week.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission also says there were no signs of red tide on Florida’s Atlantic coast, nor in the Big Bend and Panhandle regions.

In southwest Florida, where the outbreak started late last year, a testing site in Manatee County had a high concentration of red tide. Another testing location there had a low concentration and the rest of southwest Florida showed no signs of red tide, according to an agency map tracking the algae on Monday.



# US pledges \$10.6B aid for Central America, Mexico

\$5.8 billion to strengthen government and economic development in Central America, \$4.8 billion in development aid for southern Mexico

MEXICO CITY — The United States pledged \$5.8 billion in aid and investment Tuesday for strengthening government and economic development in Central America, and another \$4.8 billion in development aid for southern Mexico.

The U.S. aid aims to promote better security conditions and job opportunities as part of a regional plan to allow Central Americans and Mexicans to remain in their countries and not have to emigrate.

The plan was announced in a joint U.S.-Mexican statement released by the State Department and read aloud by Mexican Foreign Relations Secretary Marcelo Ebrard in the Mexican capital.

“In sum I think this is good news, very good news for Mexico,” Ebrard said.

Newly inaugurated President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador waxed poetic about the plan to provide jobs so people won't have to emigrate.

“I have a dream that I want to see become a reality ... that nobody will want to go work in the United States anymore,” Lopez Obrador said at a morning news conference before the announcement.

The combination of public and private investment for the stay-at-home effort doesn't require congressional approval, unlike Trump's signature project to stem illegal immigration — a border wall.

The U.S. State Department issued a simultaneous statement saying “The United States is committing \$5.8 billion through public and private investment to promote institutional reforms and development in the Northern

Triangle,” a term that refers to Honduras, Guatemala and El Salvador.

Lopez Obrador's administration has said it is also interested in agricultural, forestry and tourism projects in southern Mexico, and the U.S. said it will contribute to those efforts.

The U.S. Overseas Private Investment Corporation “is prepared to invest and mobilize \$2 billion in additional funds for projects in southern Mexico that are viable and attract private sector investment,” according to the statement. “This amount is in addition to the \$2.8 billion in projects for Mexico through OPIC's current investment pipeline.”

Ebrard said “The commitments established here signify more than doubling foreign investment in southern Mexico starting in 2019.”

Southern states like Chiapas and Oaxaca are home to many of Mexico's poorest communities. Lopez Obrador, who took office Dec. 1, has sought to make development in that region a priority, including plans for a “Mayan train” stretching from touristy parts of the Yucatan Peninsula down to Chiapas.

It was unclear if Mexico would give anything in return. A planned announcement about Mexico's migration policy was postponed until Wednesday.

The United States has reportedly wanted Mexico to allow migrants seeking asylum in the United States to remain in Mexico while their applications are processed.

Ebrard had previously suggested that about \$25 billion in U.S. investment would be an appropriate figure for what Mexicans and Central Americans have dubbed “The Alliance for Prosperity” in the region.

### Yemeni mom wins travel ban waiver to see dying son in US

(AP) — A Yemeni mother on Tuesday won her fight for a waiver from the Trump administration's travel ban that would allow her to go to California to see her dying 2-year-old son.

Shaima Swileh planned to fly to San Francisco on Wednesday after the U.S. State Department granted her a visa, said Basim Elkarra of the Council on American-Islamic Relations in Sacramento, whose lawyers sued this week.

The boy's father, Ali Hassan, is a U.S. citizen who brought their son, Abdullah, to California in the fall to get treatment for a genetic brain disorder after the boy's health worsened.

Swileh and the boy had been living in Egypt, and she had hoped to accompany them but was not given a visa to enter the United States. Citizens from Yemen and four other mostly Muslim countries, along with North Korea and Venezuela, are restricted from coming to the United States under the travel ban enacted under President Donald Trump.

As Swileh and her husband fought for a waiver, their son's health declined. Last week, doctors at UCSF Benioff Children's Hospital in Oakland put him on life support.

In addition to the waiver, the government gave Swileh a visa that will allow her to remain in the United States with her husband and begin a path toward U.S. citizenship, Elkarra said.

### Official suspended, accused of harassing transgender student

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (AP) — A West Virginia high school assistant principal who told a transgender male student “you freak me out” and questioned his choice of bathrooms has been suspended — a move the American Civil Liberties Union said didn't go far enough.

Assistant Principal Lee Livengood of Liberty High School in Clarksburg was suspended with pay after a meeting Tuesday with Harrison County school administrators, news outlets reported.

Fifteen-year-old student Michael Critchfield said in an interview Monday night that he was traumatized by the Nov. 27 incident in a school boys' bathroom.

### German company to plead guilty in VW emissions scheme

DETROIT (AP) — U.S. authorities say a German engineering company has agreed to plead guilty and pay \$35 million for its role in the Volkswagen vehicle emissions scandal.

The Justice Department said Tuesday that IAV has agreed to plead guilty to conspiracy in Detroit federal court on Jan. 18. The government says IAV misled regulators about whether certain VW and Audi vehicles met pollution standards.

The diesel vehicles were programmed to trigger certain pollution results only during testing, not during regular road use. The scheme affected nearly 600,000 vehicles.

### Man gets 357 years for 1995 sex assaults of 4 roommates

RESTON, Va. (AP) — A man has been sentenced to 357 years in prison for sexually assaulting four women in a northern Virginia apartment more than 20 years ago.

The Washington Post reports that a prosecutor says the jury sentenced 50-year-old Jude Lovchik on Tuesday, a day after finding him guilty on all 17 counts in the 1995 Reston sexual assaults.

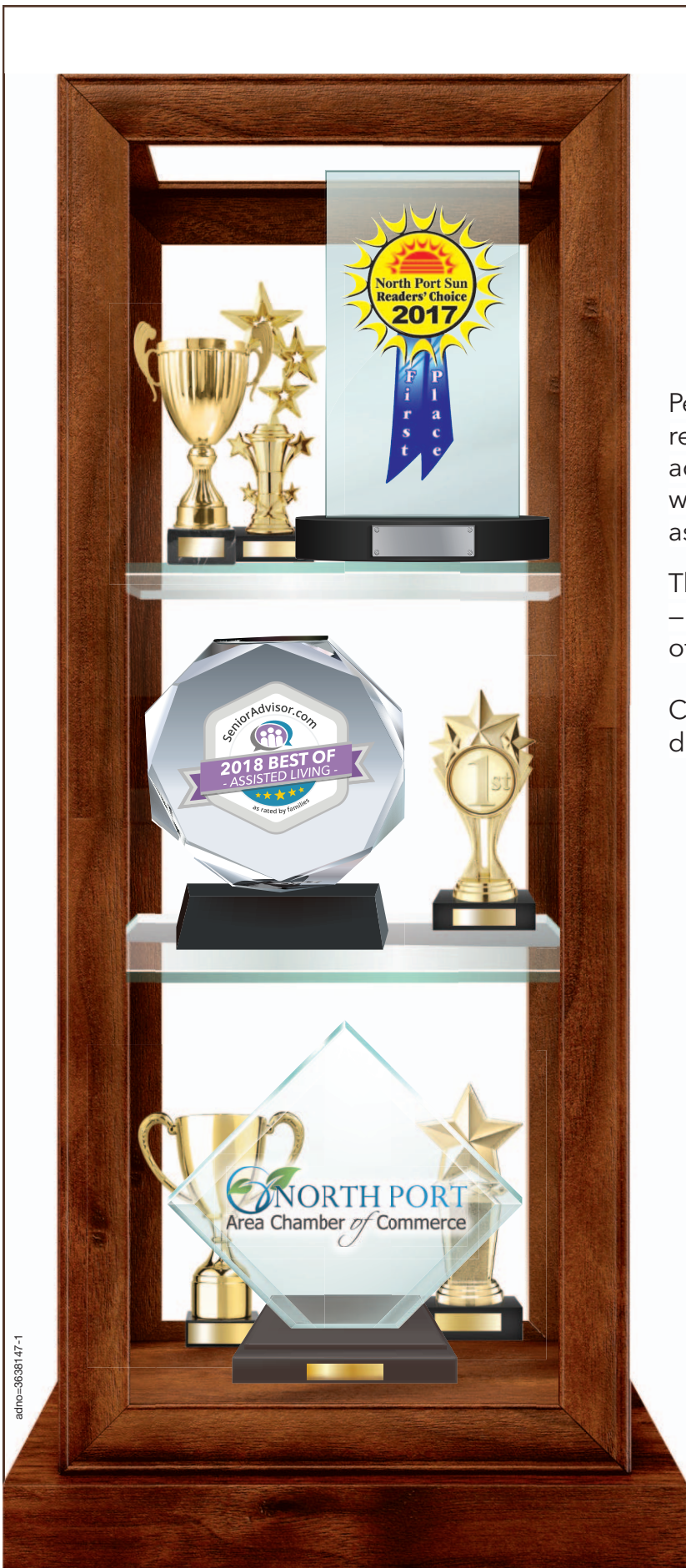
His ex-wife, Kathrin Lovchik, testified that he told her he was the “Fairfax rapist” in 2009. She went to authorities after losing custody of their daughter during their divorce in 2016. An investigation linked him to the case via DNA evidence. He was charged in 2017.

Public defender Dawn Butorac accused a forensic examiner of manipulating aspects of a DNA test to produce a match.

### Russian businessman to stay in jail pending laundering trial

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — A Russian businessman who lived a lavish life in North Carolina will remain in jail while he's prosecuted on charges including money laundering and murder-for-hire.

Prosecutors say in court documents that the 57-year-old Teyf stashed millions in U.S. bank accounts after helping to orchestrate a \$150 million kickback scheme involving suppliers to the Russian military. They also accuse him of plotting to kill a man he suspected of having an affair with his wife.

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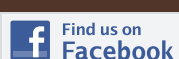

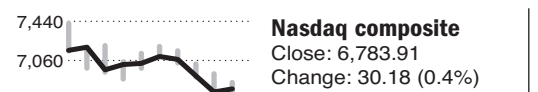


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Stock market woes raise a nagging fear: Is a recession near?

BALTIMORE (AP) — Fears of a recession have been mounting with the U.S. stock market appearing to be headed for its worst December since 1931 — during the Great Depression.

Wall Street's sustained slump has been fueled by investor concerns about lower corporate profits, higher corporate debt, a festering trade war between the United States and China and a broader global slowdown.

But the economy has been growing since mid-2009 and nothing — not even what's become the second-longest U.S. expansion on record — lasts forever.

Plenty of economic gauges suggest that far from being derailed by a stock market that's set to suffer its first annual loss in a decade, the \$20 trillion U.S. economy is barreling forward.

Nearly half the chief financial officers surveyed by Duke University's Fuqua School of Business foresee a recession by the end of next year.

DOES A SUSTAINED FALL IN STOCK PRICES HERALD A RECESSION?

Sometimes. Not always. Both the previous two U.S. recessions overlapped with stock market sell-offs.

The fact is that the stock market captures just a piece of the broader U.S. economy. Less than half of U.S. households even own any stock, according to New York University economist Edward Wolff.

The bulk of most Americans' net worth is derived from a different asset: Their homes.

HOW BAD IS THE DECLINE?

It's painful. But Wall Street has endured far worse sell-offs. Year-to-date, the Dow has lost about 5 percent — just a small fraction of its 2008 plunge.

That said, the sell-off of the past two months has been severe — about 12 percent. This means the market has entered "correction" territory, commonly defined as a decline of at least 10 percent.

# Capsaicin is a reliable and safe topical pain-relief option

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** I am writing to you on behalf of my cousin, an 83-year-old female, 5 feet tall, weighing 100 pounds. She takes only vitamin D. Her blood pressure, cholesterol, etc., all are within the normal ranges. However, she has osteoarthritis in her knees and lower back. Ibu-iprofen sometimes helps a bit, but she would like more relief during the day.

She was considering a topical medication called PainBloc24, but the side effects seem scary. Should she try this over-the-counter remedy? — M.A.C.

**ANSWER:** PainBloc24, like other over-the-counter creams such as Capzasin and Zostrix, contains capsaicin, the active ingredient in hot peppers. It is thought to work by decreasing the activity of pain fibers.

Most people notice a burning sensation when it is applied, which should decrease over time. Afterward, pain is decreased. One study estimated a 33 percent reduction in pain, while another found that 80

percent of people had improvement in pain.

Anyone who has put hot peppers near eyes, mucous membranes or other sensitive skin areas knows that the pain can be exquisite, so stay away from those areas. Further, skin absorption is higher after a hot shower, so capsaicin cream can REALLY burn if applied then — that's not recommended. Finally, if your cousin decides to try it, she should start with the low 0.025 percent strength, not the higher-potency strength. Fortunately, it does not seem to have side effects

outside of the local irritation and burning.

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** I just read your advice to H.S. concerning excessive sweating. I, too, suffered from hyperhidrosis in both my hands. They literally dripped sweat constantly. It affected my everyday life. This began around age 13.

I noticed that you did not recommend surgery as one of the options. I had a sympathectomy performed by a neurologist when I was 18 years old. The surgery worked beautifully. I would highly recommend it and would not hesitate to do it again. I understand that you may not want to recommend this for a 71-year-old woman, but others who suffer as I did might want to know that this may be an option for them. — M.P.

**ANSWER:** Thank you, M.P., for writing with a treatment for hyperhidrosis that I didn't mention. One of the signals for us to sweat normally is the information carried by the sympathetic nerves. The sympathetic nervous system is the

"fight or flight" mode of the autonomic nervous system, the part not under conscious control.

In the case of H.S., the sweating was mostly on the torso; sympathectomy is effective for people whose excess sweating is on the hands (as in the case of M.P.) or feet. It is particularly recommended for people who, like M.P., had onset before age 16 and who are under 25 at the time of evaluation and who are generally healthy. Ninety-five percent of people are satisfied with the results, but symptoms can recur over time.

A new treatment is expected to become available (and may be available by the time this column is published). A topical medication called glycopyrronium tosylate has been shown to reduce sweating, both by self-report and by measuring sweat production. I expect this will be a useful addition to the treatment possibilities, especially for people with axillary (armpit) sweating who have not had good response to over-the-counter or prescription antiperspirants.

Has she seen her doctor to rule out a physical cause? Or could it be that although he looks good on paper, there's simply no chemistry? Because intimacy is an important part of marriage,

Should we relent and refer to that part of his body as something else? — Unsure In The South

# Skin-deep with potatoes

**Dear Heloise:** There's been some debate about whether or not it's safe to eat a POTATO SKIN, due to chemicals and pesticides. Is it safe, and are there any health benefits? — Meredith W., Laramie, Wyo.



**Hints from Heloise**

Meredith, first you'll need to wash those skins. A soft vegetable brush with water should do the trick for removing any pesticides.

To get all the nutrition a potato provides, you should eat the well-washed skins. Potato skins tend to be rich in iron, potassium and fiber, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. — Heloise

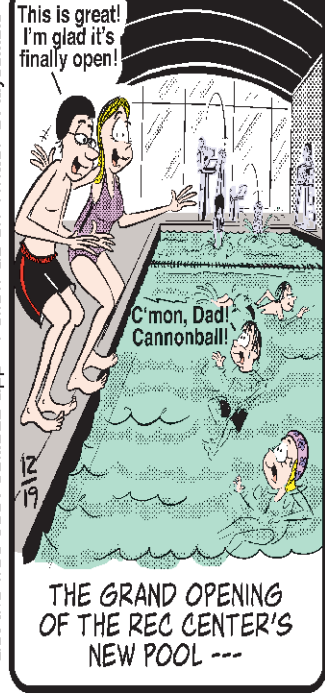

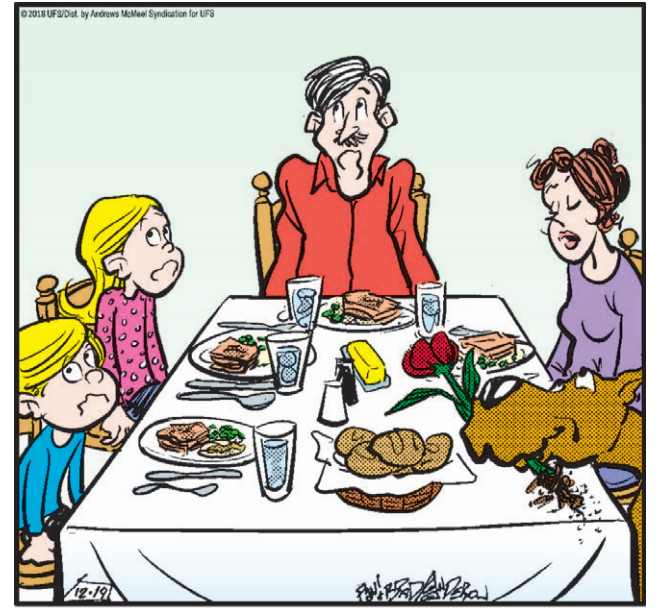

North's four-diamond cue bid was probably too much, but he thought that five-card support, the ruffing value in clubs, and the king of diamonds sitting behind the diamond bidder was enough to show some sign of life.

Also, he probably knew how well his partner could play a hand.

South won the opening club lead with his ace and stopped to make a plan. He did not want to stake the contract on a spade finesse, so he came up with something much better. He led the two of hearts to dummy's four at trick two, drawing trumps. A low diamond was ruffed with the ace of hearts, and then South eliminated clubs by cashing the king and ruffing his last club in dummy.

Dummy's remaining low diamond was ruffed with the king of hearts. The six of hearts was led to dummy's seven. South led dummy's king of diamonds and discarded his low spade. West won with his ace, but he wasn't happy about it. Rather than yield a ruff-sluff, West shifted to a low spade, but declarer had the queen, not East, and South quickly claimed the balance.

This was a beautifully played hand, taking full advantage of the spot cards in the trump suit.

"The president has asked every agency to look and see if they have money that can be used," Sanders said.

It was a turnaround after days of impasse. Without a resolution, more than 800,000 government workers could be furloughed or sent to work without pay, disrupting government operations days before Christmas.

One option that has been circulating on Capitol Hill would be to simply approve government funding at existing levels, without a boost for the border, as a stopgap measure to kick the issue into the new Congress next year. The White House preference was for such a short-term package, said a person familiar with the negotiations.

"We want to know what can pass," Sanders said at a press briefing. "Once they make a decision and they put something on the table, we'll make a determination on whether we'll move forward."

The turn of events kick-started negotiations that had been almost nonexistent since last week's televised meeting at the White House, when Trump neither accepted nor rejected the Democrats' offer. They had proposed keeping funding at current levels of \$1.3 billion for border security fencing and other improvements, but not for the wall.

The Senate's top Republican and Democratic leaders began negotiating new proposals and talks were expected to continue. One idea could be a stopgap measure into February.

Giannonatti said. Customers will pay a flat fee of \$5.95 and can request same-day or next-day delivery.

The unmanned delivery vehicles will be followed by a "shadow car," which will be driven by a human with the ability to stop or control it. The "chase car" is being used in the early stages of the program out of an abundance of caution and will be eventually phased out, Ferguson said.

# Trump administration moves to ban bump stocks

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Trump administration Tuesday banned bump stocks, the firearm attachments that allow semi-automatic weapons to fire like machine guns and were used during the worst mass shooting in modern U.S. history.

The regulation gives gun owners until late March to turn in or destroy the devices. After that, it will be illegal to possess them under the same federal laws that prohibit machine guns.

Bump stocks became a focal point of the gun control debate after they were used in October 2017 when a man opened fire from his Las Vegas hotel suite into a crowd at a country music concert, killing 58 people and injuring hundreds more.

The regulation was signed Tuesday by Acting Attorney General Matthew Whitaker. It will take effect 90 days after it is published in the Federal Register, which is expected to happen Friday.

Bump stock owners will be required to either destroy them or surrender them to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, a senior Justice Department official said. It is impossible to know just how many bump stocks Americans own because the devices aren't traceable, but ATF has estimated that between 280,000 and about 520,000 have been sold since 2010. Investigators expect most owners will comply with the new rule and ATF will take action against those who don't, the official said.

Mr. Trump's business and political interests," she said.

Lawyers for the foundation have said any infractions were minor.

Trump pledged to dissolve the three-decade-old foundation and donate its funds to charity after his 2016 election, but that was only after it found itself under investigation in New York state. The

attorney general's office said it would have been "unacceptable" to let the foundation fold without close supervision from a judge.

Trump Foundation lawyer Alan Futterfas said the nonprofit has distributed approximately \$19 million over the past decade, including \$8.25 million of the president's own money, to hundreds of charitable organizations.

The agreement was reached after a New York judge last month rejected

arguments from the foundation's lawyers that the lawsuit was politically motivated and should be thrown out.

Once the judge approves the deal to dissolve the charity, the two sides will have 30 days to provide her with a list of nonprofit organizations that should get the remaining funds. Each charity will get the same amount, and the attorney general's office will have the right to reject ones it deems unfit to receive funds.

# Lady Pirates still on a learning curve

The Port Charlotte girls basketball team is in the midst of its toughest stretch so far this season.

After winning eight of the first nine games under first-year coach Mike Progl, the Lady Pirates have faced the top two teams in the district, losing to Charlotte on Monday and adding a 57-27 loss to Cape Coral on Tuesday.

With a young team and a new coach, it's still a work in progress, but one that Progl is confident they can learn from. "The team is learning me and

I'm learning them," Progl said. "It's a process. It's not like we were gonna come in and all of the sudden just start destroying every team that we play. That's not realistic. Yeah we won our first seven games, but our two losses were against quality teams."

It was a struggle from the start against Cape Coral (8-2). 12 first-quarter turnovers for Port Charlotte (8-2) put them in a deep 21-6 hole to start the game and it proved challenging to recover.

The Lady Seahawks used a full-court press and a smothering defense to throw off the Lady Pirates' rhythm

throughout the game and Port Charlotte couldn't figure a way around it.

Progl said one of the key factors was that the Lady Pirates were playing to the pace of Cape Coral rather than settling into their offense. Port Charlotte was playing without senior Alani Qualls, who received a rest day.

"They played once again at Cape Coral's tempo," Progl said. "We had a whole game plan of how we wanted this to go and it wasn't executed. These girls need to understand that tempo dictates a lot in a game. If you

## Chargers lead Pro Bowl selections with 7 players

NEW YORK (AP) — The Los Angeles Chargers placed seven players in the Pro Bowl, including safety Derwin James, one of six rookies across the league to make the game.

James, a first-round draft choice, will be joined on the AFC squad by veteran quarterback Philip Rivers, wide receiver Keenan Allen, running back Melvin Gordon, defensive end Melvin Ingram, center Mike Pouncey and special-teamer Adrian Phillips for the game, which will be played Jan. 27 in Orlando. James and Phillips are the only starters, though.

Rivers is a backup to Kansas City's Patrick Mahomes, one of 29 first-time Pro Bowlers. That, of course, includes all the rookies: James, Giants running back Saquon Barkley, Seahawks punter Michael Dickson, Broncos running back Phillip Lindsay, Indianapolis guard Quenton Nelson and Cleveland cornerback Denzel Wads. Lindsay is an undrafted player.

New England's Tom Brady is the other AFC quarterback. Noticeably missing is the Colts' Andrew Luck.

New Orleans, led by quarterback Drew Brees, Dallas and Chicago paced the NFC with five players each. Brees is the starter, backed up by Green Bay's Aaron Rodgers and the Rams' Jared Goff.

Buffalo, Oakland and Tampa Bay had no Pro Bowl selections.

Pittsburgh and Kansas City each had six players chosen, including such first-timers as Steelers running back James Conner and Mahomes, both having breakthrough years.

Cleveland has a first overall draft choice in the game — not Baker Mayfield, but 2017 top pick Myles Garrett at defensive end.

"Football is a team game and you can't do it on your own," said Garrett, who leads the Browns with 12½ sacks. "I'm happy to be able to share this experience with Denzel because this honor is really a testament to our entire defense."

Among the perennial AFC choices returning to the game are Houston DE J.J. Watt, Pittsburgh WR Antonio Brown, Baltimore guard Marshal Yanda and safety Eric Weddle, Cincinnati DT Geno Atkins and Denver LB Von Miller.

For the NFC, frequent repeaters include Atlanta WR Julio Jones and C Alex Mack, Dallas tackle Tyron Smith, inside LBs Luke Kuechly of Carolina and Bobby Wagner of Seattle, Arizona CB Patrick Peterson, Rams DT Aaron Donald and Bears LB Khalil Mack.

## Wilson Ramos had grip on Mets from first handshake

NEW YORK — Wilson Ramos had a grip on the New York Mets from the moment he walked into their winter meetings suite in Las Vegas last week.

"It was his handshake," new general manager Brodie Van Wagenen recalled Tuesday at the catcher's introductory news conference. "As some of you may get to know, this guy has really big, strong, strong mitts here for hands."

Ramos agreed to a \$19 million, two-year contract, the fourth All-Star to join the Mets since Van Wagenen was hired

in late October. New York acquired second baseman Robinson Cano and closer Edwin Diaz from Seattle and brought back former closer Jeurys Familia as a setup man.

"Internally, we would argue that we're the favorites in the division right now," Van Wagenen told the team's SNY network.

Ramos commanded the room, according to Van Wagenen, when he met with the GM, manager Mickey Callaway and other New York executives. Ramos looked at home during the Citi Field news conference, wearing a

# 3rd-period burst leads Panthers to 5-2 win over Sabres

BUFFALO, N.Y. — Evgenii Dadonov had two goals and an assist to lead the Florida Panthers to a 5-2 win over the Buffalo Sabres on Tuesday night.

Troy Brouwer, Aleksander Barkov and Frank Vatrano also scored for the Panthers, who scored three goals in a span of 2:44 in the third period. Roberto Luongo made 30 saves.

Jeff Skinner and Rasmus Ristolainen scored for Buffalo, which lost to Florida for the seventh consecutive time. Carter Hutton made 30 saves. The game turned late in

the second period following a tripping penalty by Skinner on Barkov.

Barkov briefly left the game and defenseman Keith Yandle went after

Skinner, dropping his gloves and drawing a roughing penalty as Skinner backed off.

Both players — and the Panthers as a team

— responded to open the third period. As Yandle was booed loudly, the defenseman's long shot was deflected into the net by Barkov for a power-play goal 58 seconds in to make it 2-2.

Less than two minutes later, Dadonov converted on a penalty shot after he was taken down by defenseman Rasmus Dahlin on a breakaway. Dadonov's shot was initially stopped by Hutton, but he never secured the puck and between his legs and it trickled past the goal line to make it 3-2.

Vatrano completed the flurry 4:42 into the third. After Dadonov circled around the Buffalo net, Vatrano buried Dadonov's rebound to give the Panthers a 4-2 lead.

Dadonov added an empty-net goal with 2:30 remaining.

Skinner opened the scoring on his 25th goal of the season 3:48 into the game, finishing a feed from the corner by Jack Eichel. With the goal, Skinner topped his goal total from last season (24) in just 35 games.

Brouwer evened the score midway through the second period off two fortunate bounces in the Buffalo end. After Jared McCann's initial shot on a 3-on-1 went behind the net, Brouwer flung the rebound off Hutton's skate and into the net from a hard angle.

Ristolainen made it 2-1 with 8:52 left in the second on a misstep by Luongo, tucking a shot inside the near post from close range.

Sabres veteran Jason Pominville was injured six minutes into the third period after an accidental collision with Ristolainen. Pominville made his way slowly to the locker room and did not return.

# Mirror image of first meeting as DeSoto downs Mustangs

# Charlotte keeps composure, stuns North Port

**PUNTA GORDA** – The North Port soccer team will be seeing plenty of yellow and blue in their nightmares Tuesday night after dropping an emotional 2-0 decision to Charlotte.

The Bobcats (8-4) were saddled with a stunning 10 yellow cards, three of which became blue, forcing them to finish the game with an 11-to-8 player deficit. A combination of aggressive play, tight officiating and a lack of verbal composure cost the Bobcats three player disqualifications.

"We took ourselves out of this game," North Port head coach Joey Sorbino said. "I feel that 11-on-11, we have a great shot. When you go down to ten, it's hard to fight back. When you go down to eight, it's even harder." Sorbino's team was

also stifled by the team wearing yellow and blue – the Tarpons (4-5-3) – who enjoyed their first signature win under new head coach Greg Winkler.

"I give credit to Charlotte, they improved tremendously," said Sorbino. "They're a great team and they played like it tonight. They used the field well. They stretched us when we were short on guys and they put their chances away when they had them."

"It's all about composure," Winkler said. "They just did a really good job of not letting the outside noise get to them. We've been working on controlling the things that we can control. Our defense has gotten a lot better."

Tuesday's result was the antithesis of the teams' first meeting this season. In North Port, the Bobcats torched Charlotte for six goals in a dominating 6-1 win on November 29.

"The first time we played, it got a little chippy like that," Sorbino said. "But that should never carry over."

Sorbino knows his team is one of the most talented in the area. It's not hard to see the Bobcats' impressive collection of athleticism, experience and skill. But even though North Port out-shot the Tarpons 14-8 and earned five of the game's six corner kicks, the loss raises concern.

"There's some stuff we have to work on off the field," Sorbino said. "It's just composure. If we allow the mental side of the game to get to us, it shows that mentally we might be weak. This game is meant to be played, not to fight or argue with the refs. You have to do what we're asking you to do, and that's to play soccer."

Charlotte, meanwhile, is on the verge of a major soccer turnaround. Led

by six mature seniors, Winkler is sensing a positive shift in the culture.

"We're in the process of turning a program around," said Winkler. "There's a lot of things that come with not winning for a long time. But now they're seeing what you have to do to win. I think they're starting to get a little belief. Hopefully we can keep building on it."

Both of the Tarpons' goals came late in the second half from an unlikely source. Freshman Tyler Amaral wasn't even on the roster when the season began due to the Tarpons' postseason run in football. But in just his fifth varsity game, he cashed in the game's first score in the 66th minute off a high-arching cross from junior Francesco Buscemi.

"He made a beautiful pass," Amaral said of Buscemi. "He played it

perfect. I just went up, thank God it went in."

Amaral put the game to rest in the 75th minute on a re-direct of a Kaden Howell pass.

"I saw Kaden wide open," said Amaral. "I thought he was going to shoot it at first. He laid it off to me and I finished it."

Tuesday marked the Tarpons' first shutout victory of the season. Charlotte goalkeeper Gavin Pennell recorded seven saves in the victory.

"Gavin is really smart," said Winkler. "Our back line is pretty solid and they work together. Ben Mizell is holding the middle down and talking to the guys. With Gavin back there, they know they can take a few more risks every once in a while."

The Tarpons will take their two-game winning streak to arch rival Port Charlotte for a 7 p.m. showdown on Friday.

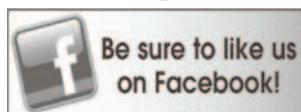

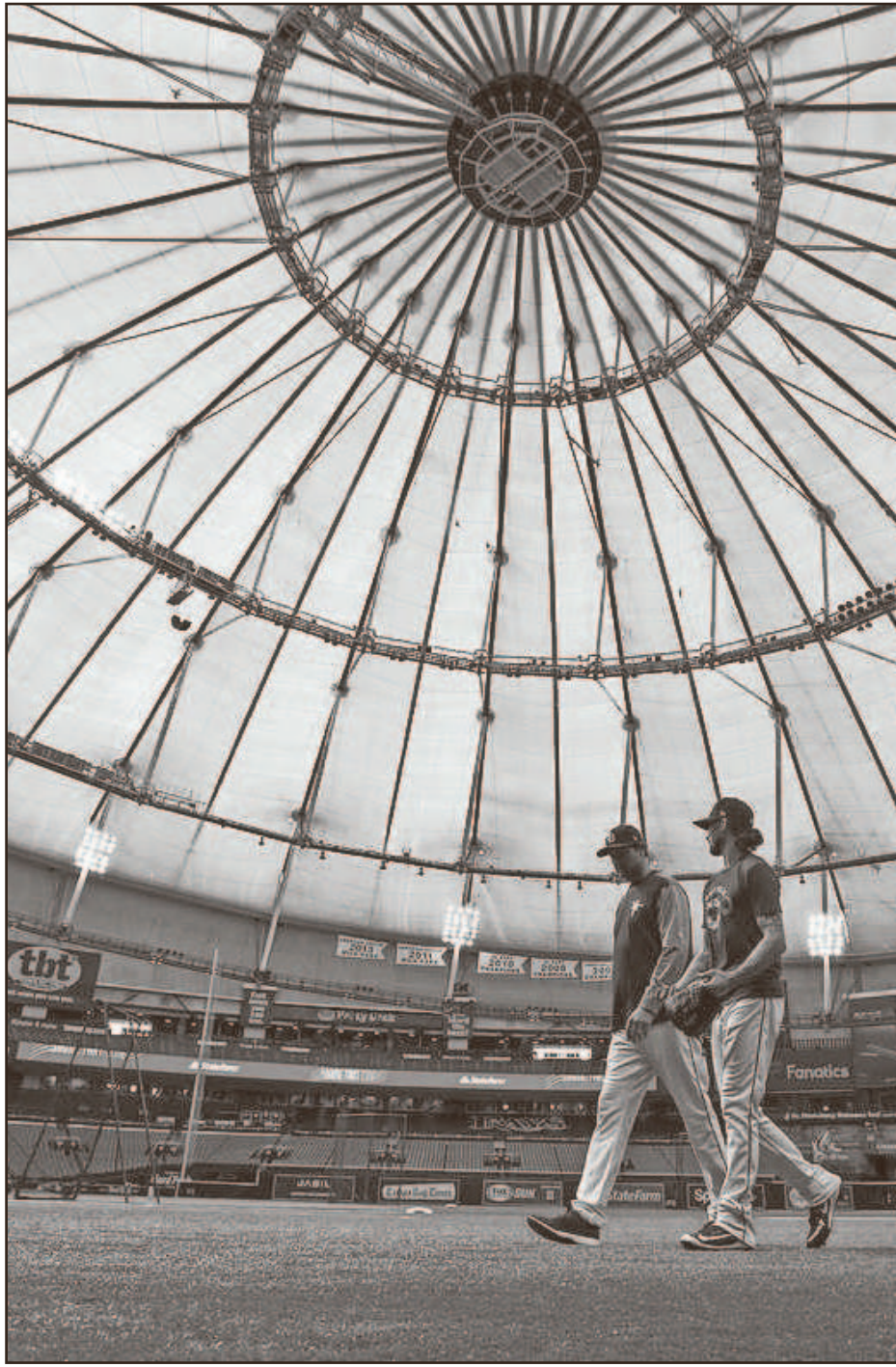
ST. PETERSBURG — The Tampa Bay Rays have told the city of St. Petersburg that the team is no longer looking to build a stadium elsewhere.

The letter — written by Rays General Counsel John Higgins, addressed to Mayor Rick Kriseman and delivered to the city via Fedex on Dec. 17 — serves as formal notice that the memorandum of understanding between the team and city is terminated. The memorandum, which was signed into effect Jan. 15, 2016, gave the Rays three years to look at stadium sites elsewhere in the Tampa Bay area.

Last week, Rays principal owner Stu Sternberg announced at Major League Baseball's winter meetings in Las Vegas that the team had dropped its bid to move to Ybor City, where architects had envisioned building a \$900 million stadium.

Here's the letter in its entirety:

## Twins to retire Joe Mauer's No. 7

Joe Mauer didn't have to wait long to join the list of retired Minnesota Twins stars who received the ultimate team honor.

The Twins announced they will retire Mauer's No. 7 during a ceremony Tuesday at his alma mater, Cretin-Derham Hall High School in St.

Paul, Minn.

The six-time All-Star retired on Nov. 11. He retired 15 seasons and is a career .306 hitter; he won three Gold Gloves as a catcher, is the only catcher to win three batting titles, and was the American League MVP in 2009.

Mauer, 35, joins Harmon Killebrew (No. 3), Rod Carew (29), Tony

Oliva (6), Kent Hrbek (14), Kirby Puckett (34), Bert Blyleven (28) and Tom Kelly (10) as former Twins whose numbers are retired by the team.

The date for the retirement ceremony, which will take place before a game in the 2019 season, has not been set.

Mauer retired because of concussion issues at the expiration of his

eight-year, \$184 million contract.

Hrbek announced the honor at an assembly at Cretin, and Mauer's one-word reaction was "wow." Blyleven, Oliva and Kelly were also on hand.

Gov. Mark Dayton declared Tuesday to be Joe Mauer Day in Minnesota during a video presentation.

## McCutchen eager to play in hitter friendly ballpark

PHILADELPHIA — Andrew McCutchen returned to his home state to join his third team in less than 12 months, intent on regaining his old hitting stroke.

The Philadelphia Phillies introduced their newest outfielder at a news conference Tuesday, a week after giving him a \$50 million, three-year contract that includes a team option for 2022 and could be worth \$62 million over four seasons.

"This is a game of adjustments," McCutchen said. "I've definitely had to make some adjustments over the years, and I know that I can be even better than what I've been over the past few (seasons). There has been a decline, yes, but I do understand what I'm capable of doing."

McCutchen hit .255 with 20 homers and 65 RBIs in 155 games this year for San Francisco and the New York Yankees. His average was a career-low and his homers and RBIs were his fewest since 2010. He spent his first nine years in Pittsburgh and was the 2013 NL Most Valuable Player.

"I know I can be better, and that's what I've been doing all offseason: preparing and working, and that's not going to stop," he said. "I'm looking forward to being even better than I've been. I'm never satisfied, and I don't settle with what I've done. That's just the person I am."

The 32-year-old McCutchen was an All-Star each season from 2011-15, topping .300 in batting average from 2012-14. He has 223 homers, a .287 average and 790 RBIs in 10 major league seasons. His on-base percentage (.378) is higher than anyone else on Philadelphia's current roster and his slugging percentage (.481) is second only to Rhys Hoskins (.525).

"I've never played an entire season in a hitter's park. I'm looking forward to that," McCutchen said of hitter-friendly Citizens Bank Park.

Hoskins came out to see McCutchen and talked about the team's offseason moves. The Phillies acquired shortstop Jean Segura from Seattle and are pursuing free agents Manny Machado and Bryce Harper.

"I think we've (added) some pretty good baseball players so far, really exciting," Hoskins said. "A couple of more veteran guys in Segura and Cutch, which I really think will add to the clubhouse presence and just kind of overall environment, especially when we get late in the year. These guys have been through that. And it will be nice for the bulk of us to be able to lean on them and kind of get us through that."

Hoskins and Harper share an agent, Scott Boras, so Hoskins has talked to the 2015 NL MVP.

"It's just more of me offering any look at to what this city is like, what the organization is like, what the clubhouse is like, what Kap is like," Hoskins said. "It's not me offering information to him. If he wants it, and I've expressed this to him, that I am here for a chat if he wants it and it'd help."

McCutchen hasn't been part of any recruiting process but is willing to do whatever it takes to help the Phillies improve. Philadelphia finished 80-82 last season after leading the NL East on Aug. 11.

"I saw this team from afar and played against them, and I saw what they were able to do this season," McCutchen said. "They fell a little short, but something I realize is that it's there. I'm happy to be a part of it and help push this team forward to winning a championship."

## Ray Rice: 'I'm done with football,' talks domestic violence

NEWYORK (AP) — Former Baltimore Ravens running back Ray Rice says he's not speaking out against domestic violence as a way to rejoin the NFL.

Appearing Tuesday in a "CBS This Morning" interview with his wife, Janay, Rice said he sees similarities with himself after a video showed Kansas City Chiefs running back Kareem Hunt shoving and kicking a woman at a hotel last month. Hunt was released by the Chiefs.

"Well, obviously, you know, you look back and you see the similarities," Rice said. "Early on you could feel like 'Why they keep bringing my name up?' You can make excuses or you can actually do the hard work."

The 31-year-old was dropped from the Ravens after he was captured on videos punching, kicking and dragging his then-fiancee from an elevator in 2014. The punch knocked her unconscious.

"I hate that person. I hate him. Somewhere down the line everybody who's saying, 'Does he deserve a second chance for football?' And this that and the other — I actually got my second chance," Rice said, when the couple married weeks later.

Janay Rice said she had no idea she was in an abusive relationship until she was forced to think about it. She said she has never seen the video in which Rice punched her. She said it was the first and only time

he physically abused her.

"I was there. I lived it. I don't really need to relive it over and over again just to appease the world," she said.

She added: "I knew that we had work to do, and I was willing to move forward and put in the work."

The couple has sought counseling, and Rice says it gave him time to reflect.

"One of the underlying issues for me was — I never wanted to ask for help. Football, for me, was my counseling. It was my therapy. It was my psychologist. It was everything," he said.

Rice says he realized his mother had gone through a bad relationship and he was "normalizing abnormal things."

"We didn't have a

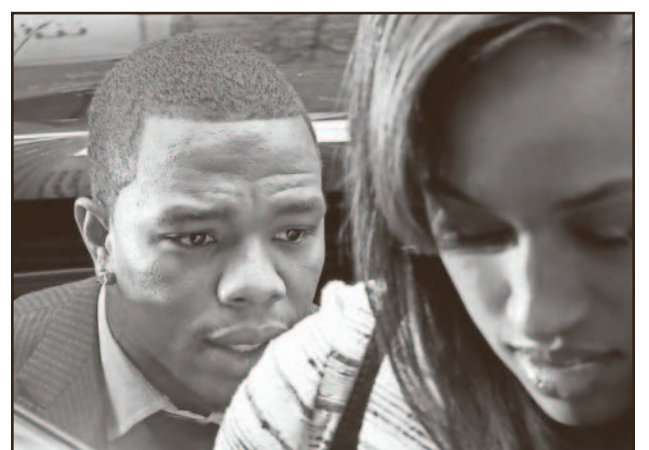
physical abuse problem.

But I can say there were different forms of abuse that took place. Was it emotional? Financial? You get to the physical, and that's obviously, like, if it's one time, it's still one time too many," he said.

Rice denies he's looking to get back on the field.

"Well, see that for me, is something that I understand why it was being said early on about, you know, is this a ploy to get back into football. And I'll be the first one to say it, I don't have to retire to tell you I'm done with football. The pressure I was under of being a star, that was the person I hated the most," he said.

Rice said he "didn't deserve another chance" to play football. He's shared

his story as part of the NFL's domestic violence education program.

"I know they are working

with groups to try to get more of an understanding. And they're doing the work," he said.

sports shirt and sneakers as he slipped on a Mets jersey with his No. 40 — pitcher Jason Vargas agreed to switch to No. 44. Ramos maintained he has completely recovered from a tore right ACL in September 2016, which delayed his first game of the following season until late June.

"Right now I feel 100 percent," he said. "I've been working really hard, training really good in Florida. That made me feel confident to work in every part of my body, not only my knee."

Ramos has a lengthy injury history. His 2012 season ended May 12 when he tore the medial meniscus in his right knee while running after a passed ball. He went on the disabled list twice the following year after straining his left hamstring while running out a grounder. He broke

the hamate bone in his left hand when hit by a foul tip on opening day in 2014, which sidelined him until May 7, then missed two weeks that June due to a strained right hamstring.

He tore his ACL in 2016 when he landed awkwardly while catching a throw. He missed another month last summer after straining his right hamstring while running on a grounder.

"We did a lot of research on his medical file," Van Wagenen said. "We obviously did a physical examination of him, and we were able to get really good detailed video of some of his workouts that he was doing this offseason."

Ramos' arrival could lead New York to giving Travis d'Arnaud some time at first or third base or in left field. New York also may carry three catchers — Kevin Plawecki is out of options.

Ramos' deal includes a \$2 million signing bonus

payable next July 1, \$6.25 million in 2019 and \$9.25 million in 2020. The Mets have a \$10 million option for 2021 with a \$1.5 million buyout. Ramos would earn a \$500,000 bonus in each season he has 100 starts at catcher.

New York was seeking offense from the right side of the plate in the absence of Yoenis Cespedes, expected to be sidelined for a significant part of the season while recovering from surgery on both heels. Van Wagenen called the 31-year-old Ramos a "guy that can keep us a little bit above water on that side of the plate until Cespedes comes back."

Ramos hit .306 with 15 home runs and an .845 OPS last season for Tampa Bay and Philadelphia.

While back in his home nation of Venezuela, Ramos was kidnapped in November 2011 and rescued after two days. He sidestepped a question about whether he and his family needed special

security.

"I feel comfortable living here in the States," he said. "My family's happy and I'm not putting too much attention on that because. ... I want to concentrate on my game, on my job."

Van Wagenen said New York still had the flexibility to add payroll. He made an effort to project confidence, reading from prepared remarks.

"We haven't been shy and we haven't been bashful," he said. "And this action rather than our inaction should demonstrate to the fans that we say what we do and we do what we say."

Notes: OF Brandon Nimmo attended the news conference. Nimmo, who was in New York for a meeting, said he wasn't bothered by his name being mentioned as trade bait and didn't call the Mets to inquire. "There's so many scenarios that come up in the trade talks that it's really hard to know what's fact and what's fiction," he said.

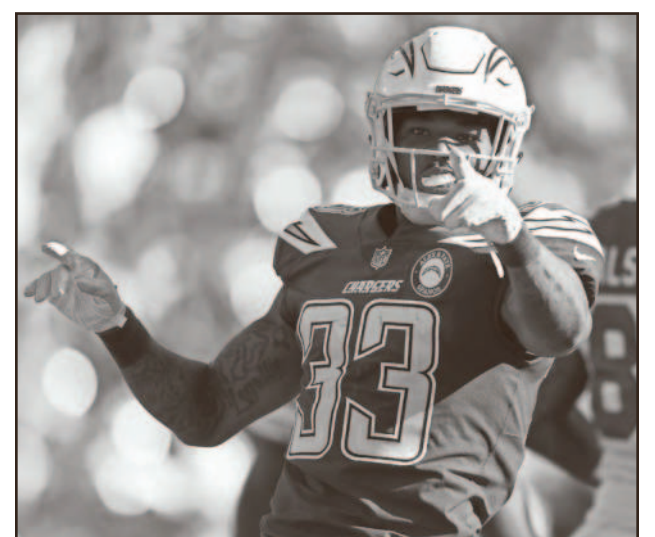

# Nance's tip gives Cavs road win as Pacers' streak ends

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Larry Nance Jr.'s buzzer-beating tip-in gave the Cleveland Cavaliers a 92-91 victory at Indiana on Tuesday night.

Nance finished with 15 points and a career-high 16 rebounds in the Cavs' third road victory of the season. Rodney Hood scored 17 points to lead Cleveland, which snapped a two-game losing streak.

The Pacers were led by Domantas Sabonis' 17 points and Bojan Bogdanovic's 14, but never took control long enough to pull away from Cleveland. The loss ended Indiana's season-best seven-game winning streak.

Indiana certainly had its chances.

Victor Oladipo missed two free throws with 9.5 seconds left, failing to extend the Pacers 91-90 lead.

And after the Cavs called timeout, Hood's layup bounced off the rim — and right into the hands of Nance, whose

shot withstood a replay review.

It was that kind of night for Indiana, which seemed to get caught overlooking one of the league's three seven-win teams with a showdown looming at Toronto on Wednesday.

They shot 39.8 percent from the field, were 4 of 22 on 3-pointers and lacked intensity all night.

And Cleveland finally took advantage of its opportunity in the waning seconds.

## NETS 115, LAKERS 110

NEW YORK (AP) — D'Angelo Russell had 22 points and a career high-tying 13 assists against his former team, and the Brooklyn Nets ran the NBA's longest winning streak to six games by beating the Los Angeles Lakers 115-110 on Tuesday night.

Joe Harris added 19 points and Spencer Dinwiddie scored 18 for the Nets, who last won six

in a row from March 25 to April 3, 2015. Rondae Hollis-Jefferson finished with 17 points and Jared Dudley made some big baskets down the stretch to score 13.

LeBron James bounced back from his lowest-scoring game of the season with 36 points, 13 rebounds and eight assists, but the Lakers finished 1-3 on their road trip. Kyle Kuzma had 22 points and 11 rebounds, while Lonzo Ball scored 23 points.

Brooklyn continued its recovery from an eight-game skid by holding on in front of a loud, large crowd that alternated cheering when the Lakers seized the momentum and when the Nets regained it.

Brooklyn led 100-87 with 7½ minutes to play before back-to-back 3-pointers by Kuzma and Ball made it 100-93. James then scored inside, blocked a shot on the other end and scored again, capping a 10-0 run.

Dudley and Dinwiddie answered with drives, and Dudley hit two more baskets to settle the Nets before Russell's 3-pointer made it 113-107 with 22 seconds remaining.

The Nets had scored 70 points in the first halves of their last two games, and were almost on pace in this one after taking a 33-32 lead after one quarter. They trailed by five with under three

minutes left in the half before a 13-3 finishing surge for a 62-57 lead.

Brooklyn then used a 12-0 run to turn a two-point edge into its largest lead, going ahead 79-65 on Hollis-Jefferson's three-point play with 7:27 remaining in the third quarter. The Lakers trimmed it to five late in the period on a 3-pointer by James and the Nets led 90-83 going

to the fourth.

James was limited to 13 points on 5-of-16 shooting in a loss to Washington on Sunday and things started rough for him in this one, as Jarrett Allen denied his attempt at a dunk with a sensational block on his first attempt. James was called for traveling the next time he had the ball before finding his groove.

# No. 2 Duke emerges from exam break to beat Princeton

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) — RJ Barrett continued his rookie-season scoring rush, finishing with 27 points to help second-ranked Duke beat Princeton 101-50 on Tuesday night.

Fellow freshman Zion Williamson had 17 points and 10 rebounds in the Blue Devils' first game in more than a week due to an exam break. Duke (10-1) got off to a cold start and didn't take its first lead until more than 14 minutes in, but eventually got rolling and handed the Tigers their most lopsided loss in program history.

Duke scored on 10 of 11 possessions to close the first half, then on four straight out of the break to take a 48-28 lead. The Blue Devils shot 64 percent after halftime as the game turned into a rout.

Myles Stephens had 19 points for Princeton (5-5), which scored the game's first eight points and led 18-16 before Duke put together an 11-0 run to take over.

## NO. 15 OHIO STATE 75, YOUNGSTOWN STATE 56

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Kaleb Wesson had a career-high 31 points as No. 15 Ohio State overcame a terrible start and beat Youngstown State 75-56 on Tuesday night.

Wesson was dominating in the second half, scoring 26 points as the Buckeyes were again forced to win in come-from-behind fashion. The sophomore topped his previous career-best 22 points, achieved in Saturday's game against Bucknell.

The Buckeyes (10-1, 2-0 Big Ten) shot poorly in the first half and were forced to rally against a mid-major opponent they should have handled easily from the beginning.

Ohio State trailed 25-22 at the half, but took the lead with a Wesson put-back three minutes into the second half and took control from there.

Luther Muhammad and C.J. Jackson each had 11 points for Ohio State, which has won three in a row after losing their only game of the season Nov.

28.

Darius Quisenberry had 17 points, and Naz Bohannon added 11 for the Penguins (5-9), who have lost five of their last six.

The first half was a nightmare for Ohio State. The Penguins went on a 14-2 run to open the game as the Buckeyes missed shot after shot. Ohio State shot 24 percent from the floor and 1 for 11 from beyond the 3-point line before intermission. The score was so close mostly because Youngstown State wasn't much better, hitting just 33 percent of its shots.

Wesson took a seat with 5:40 left in the first half when he picked up his second foul and got his third early in the second half before going on a scoring tear.

## MISSOURI 71, XAVIER 56

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) — Jeremiah Tilmon scored a career-high 23 points and grabbed 10 rebounds to lead Missouri to a 71-56 victory over Xavier on Tuesday night.

Foul trouble has been a recurring theme for Tilmon, a 6-foot-10 sophomore forward, but he avoided silly fouls while playing solid defense against the Musketeers. Mark Smith and Jordan Geist added 13 points each for the Tigers (7-3) and combined for 13 rebounds.

Quentin Goodin scored 21 points for Xavier (7-5), which shot 39 percent from the field.

Tilmon's big night started early. Xavier initially didn't double-team him in the post and he overpowered defenders Tyrique Jones and Zach Hankins inside. He also showed open-court skills when he stole the ball from guard Paul Scruggs and drove the length of the court for a layup in the first half.

Justin Ravenel led the Rattlers (3-10) with 15 points, Bryce Morange had 12 and M.J. Randolph 10. Florida A&M, which has lost 10 of its last 11 games, scored the final 13 points after trailing by as many as 23 in the second half.

After spotting the Rattlers, a 28½-point underdog coming off a 93-64 loss at Utah on Monday night, an 18-10 lead after 10 minutes, the Ducks went on an 18-0 run sparked by six consecutive points from Bailey, who had 14 in the first half.

Bailey, a 6-foot-4 sophomore guard, made his first start after playing as a reserve for his first 46 games. He replaced sophomore Abu Kigab, who sprained his ankle against Boise State on Saturday night, in Oregon's second game without 7-foot-2 center Bol Bol, who has a foot injury.

The Ducks took a 38-23 lead into the break with eight straight points, including two 3-pointers by Bailey, to close on a 28-5 run after missing 11 of their first 13 shots. Freshman Miles Norris

The Rattlers shot 60 percent (15 of 25) in the second half to finish at 46 percent (24 of 52) for the game. Oregon came in ranked fourth in the nation in field-goal percentage defense at 36 percent.

## UCONN 94, DREXEL 65

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Jalen Adams and Tarin Smith scored 20 points apiece to lead UConn over Drexel 97-65 Tuesday in nonconference play at the XL Center.

Adams shot 8 for 12

from the field, bouncing back from a season-low two points on Saturday against Manhattan.

Smith hit all seven of his shots as UConn (10-3) had four players finish in double-figure scoring. Christian Vital finished with 17 points and six rebounds, while Alterique Gilbert scored 10.

It's the sixth time this season UConn has scored more than 90 points.

Troy Harper led Drexel (6-6) with 20 points, and Camren Wynter added 12. The Dragons, who came in averaging 82.2 points per game, were held to under 70 points for the third time.

The Huskies shot 56 percent from the field in the first half, held a 26-16 edge in scoring in the paint and led 42-28 at intermission.

UConn would shoot 64.5 percent in the second half, finishing with a season-high 60 percent from the field.

Drexel held its last lead at 8-7 on Alihan Demir's put back at 16:32 of the first half. UConn answered with an 18-3 run and led by as many as 20 points.

Smith had 13 points at the break.

The Dragons outbounded UConn 35-30, with 17 coming on the offensive end.

# Day eyes return to No. 1, even if it costs him sleep

Jason Day wants to get back to No. 1 in the world, and he's willing to lose sleep over it.

"There has to be some kind of sacrifice," Day said in the Bahamas before shutting it down for the year. "I was reading the Kobe Bryant book, and he knew there was something he had to sacrifice, so he sacrificed sleep. Because he couldn't sacrifice family, he couldn't sacrifice competing, and not working.

"What can I sacrifice?" he added with a smile. "Sleep."

Day knows the cost of being the best golfer on the planet because he already reached that summit.

He first reached No. 1 in the fall of 2015 after winning five times that year, including his first major at the PGA Championship. The following spring, he won three more tournaments in a span of six starts, capped by a wire-to-wire victory in The Players Championship that gave him the highest points average in the world ranking since Tiger Woods.

He stayed No. 1 for 47 weeks and looked to be the dominant player he always wanted to be.

Getting back might be even tougher.

The 31-year-old Australian thought he was on the right track when he started the year by winning in a playoff at Torrey Pines, his first victory in more than 18 months. He talked that day about how his victory at Torrey in 2015 propelled him to his best season.

"I'm hoping to do much of the same this year," Day

said.

He won again in early May, hitting a towering 7-iron that bounced off the pin on the treacherous par-3 17th at Quail Hollow that sent him to a two-shot victory in the Wells Fargo Championship.

The end of the year brought a sobering reality: Day started at No. 13 in the world, won twice, and finished at No. 14.

"I wasn't as consistent as I should have been," Day said. "If you have a couple of wins, finish with around 10 to 12 top 10s, typically

you're in the top-five region. That's why I was disappointed about this year, even though I had two wins."

There's one other part of the equation.

Along with adding two PGA Tour victories, he and wife Ellie added a third child. A son, Arrow, was born in November.

Dash was 3 when he ran onto the green at Whistling Straits in 2015 after his father won the PGA Championship, and Ellie was six months pregnant with Lucy. The family is

growing and Day invariably has felt a tug.

He has talked about his constant battle with desire and motivation, and now there is another challenge.

"It takes desire, but it takes balance in life," Day said. "Right now, I'm at a different stage in my life just having my third child. It's hard. Tiger made it look so easy over the years. Being No. 1 for 13 years is very impressive, but to be able to be a dominant player, that's the biggest thing. I wanted to be one of those guys."

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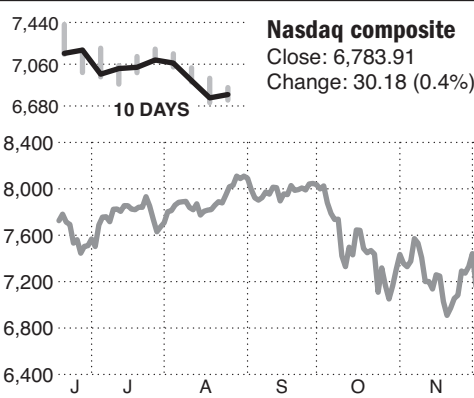
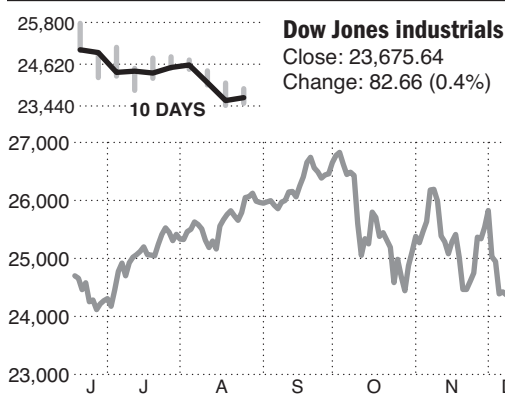
