SEBRING — The School Board of Highlands County's online education program, Highlands Virtual School, is in open enrollment for the second semester for full-time students.

Highlands Virtual School data clerk Rebecca Torres said open enrollment continues through Wednesday.

The school board's homepage at: www2. highlands.k12.fl.us



provides a link to the Highlands Virtual School website, which includes an online application.

During the first semester Highlands Virtual added its driver's education course, Torres noted. "It's the online

portion; We don't do the actual driving portion that can be done through the DMV [Department of Motor Vehicles].

Including lead teacher, Lorie Layfield, the virtual school has five full-time teachers and two adjunct teachers.

Currently, Highlands Virtual School has about 50 full-time students, but many more students who are attending the "brick and mortar" schools also take online classes for a total of about 900 students taking courses

through the virtual school, Torres said.

For example a Sebring High student can take an algebra course online instead of in a classroom, she said.

Highlands Virtual School is a school of choice and offers a full-time program for students in grades 6-12.

Full-time HVS students are registered as public school students, take part in district and state testing and have

Little Lambs: Child porn addiction strong as drugs

SEBRING — In a taped interview played at his 2016 molestation trial, Camren Robinson said he watched pornography with a 4-year-old boy, which led to sex acts over two years.

On Dec. 21 this year, Polk County sheriff's deputies arrested William "Billy" Lee Smith, counselor at Youth and Family Alternatives Inc., on 15 counts of possessing child pornography he allegedly used for sexual fantasy, traded over the internet and thought protected him from actually touching a child.

He also allegedly said he was addicted to child porn, knew it was illegal, and needed help.

Eileen Sala, of Little Lambs Inc. Christian-based addictions counseling, agrees Smith needs help, but disagrees with his belief that using porn protects an innocent person from harm.

She said anyone under that assumption is a "walking bomb."

"That's saying, 'If I don't have this available, I would move into worse things," Sala said.

Addictions, especially porn, start small and grow, she said. People get used to a level of excitement and then crave things more challenging and dangerous, like violence or underage partners.

Sala and her late husband, John, founded Little Lambs Inc. in 1997 and moved to Sebring in 1998. Robinson and Smith, both from Sebring, were 8- and 9-year-old elementary school students at that time.

Clients have told Sala they first saw pornog raphy at such early ages, finding discarded magazines in an alley or a porn collection hidden under a bed.

Some were also abused, Sala said. Today, the most common source is the internet: Children browsing without filters or supervision.

How much? How often?

Sources vary on how much internet pornography exists and how many view it. FightTheNewDrug.org claims 72 percent of online pornography viewers are men and 28 percent are women.

The site said 90 percent of female viewers watch online porn at least once a week — twothirds using smartphones — 31 percent of women watched every week and another 30 percent did so a few times a month.

Men's Journal, citing San Franciso-based sex therapist Elizabeth McGrath, said women are expected to seek out a partner, not pornography, while men are expected to use it as a "release valve." However, McGrath estimates 40 to 50 percent of women watch porn.

The article also states McGrath encourages women to "explore" sex through porn.

Sala said it's not necessary for people to "explore" for internet porn. While recently researching a health issue, her browser got inundated with pop-up windows from porn sites.

She eventually got them all closed, but for a child, Sala said, curiosity to stay and see more would be too tempting.

Tax refunds may be delayed with shut down

LAKE PLACID - Tax preparers and accountants are watching Capital Hill with eyes wide open. With millions

of Americans heading into tax season, the government shutdown has brought up more questions than answers. Before the government

shut down, the tax season was going to be a challenge with new laws that the Internal Revenue Service staffers had to learn called the Tax and Jobs Act of 2017. According to the IRS, only 12.5 percent of its workers are authorized to work during the government shutdown that started on Dec. 22. Issuing refunds is considered a "non-excepted activity," meaning no one will be harmed if that part of the government is furloughed.

H&R Area Manager and Tax Preparer Lorrie Lammie said the IRS used

to open every Jan. 15 for tax returns but has been late the last few years, opening around Martin Luther King Jr. Day.

There's good news and bad news if the government shut down doesn't get resolved before the IRS would normally open for tax returns. The good new is the government will gladly accept any payments that you have to make. The bad news is that you will not see a penny of your refund until the government shut down is over.

Lammie said that many people use their tax returns to get out of Christmas debt, plan a vacation or even use it as a savings account.

"The government won't fund anyone who has an earned income credit, child tax credit and additional child tax credit or education credit until Feb. 15," Lammie said. "We know that's hard on people so, we offer a portion of the refund in

advance. It is at no charge to the client and it helps them out."

Lammie is urging people to get their tax forms in order and start the return process.


"That way the return is in the queue," she said. "They work on a first come first, serve basis."

Once a return is accepted, it is usually paid in about 21 days, assuming there are no audits or problems with the return, Lammie explained.

"If you get lucky and the government has a soft opening, they might process the return before the official opening," Lammie said. "They do a soft opening to make sure everything is working smoothly.

The government put out a 110-page guide to handle the shutdown for the first five days. They will be re-writing it. The IRS is not taking any phone calls yet but information can be found at IRS.gov.



Couple accused of possessing over 20 grams of marijuana

AVON PARK — On Dec. 30 Highlands County Sheriff's Office deputies responded to a reported domestic disturbance, but law enforcement officers ended the investigation by arresting both individuals for possessing over 20 grams oi marijuana.

Dalton Ray Krell, 21, whose address is not listed on the arrest report, was arrested by HCSO deputies on Dec. 30. Krell was charged with possession of over 20 grams of marijuana; he also faces domestic battery charges on Sabrina Smith. He was previously found guilty of domestic violence and felony criminal mischief on March 28, 2017.

Sabrina Lucille Smith, 42, who is listed as being in a romantic relationship with Krell, was also arrested by HCSO deputies on Dec. 30. Smith was charged with possession of marijuana over 20 grams.

Deputies were called to the scene to investigate a domestic disturbance between Smith and Krell. According to the arrest report, a third party called

SMITH dispatch regarding the dispute.

Smith reportedly told deputies that she had been residing with Krell as a family unit for approximately one year. The couple went to Krell's mom and stepdad's home to assist them with manual labor, she said.

Krell allegedly pushed her on her right shoulder forcefully when she was trying to enter his mom and stepdad's house, and he also reportedly threw a plant of the top of the hood when she attempted to leave. He "placed himself behind the rear driver tire to prevent her from leaving the area," the report states.

One deputy mentioned to another deputy that the vehicle the couple were driving in might have illegal narcotics in it, the report states. Krell had reportedly uttered a spontaneous statement to

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one of the deputies that led the deputy to suspect the illegal drugs, but that statement was redacted from the arrest report.

When the vehicle was searched, the deputies allegedly found 23.9 grams of marijuana.

In 2018, 40 Democrats flipped districts from red to blue - 41, if the Democrat wins the North Carolina race clouded by allegations of vote fraud. Twenty-two Democrats won by 5 percentage points or less. Twentythree lost by 5 points or less. Democrats have noticed that Bustos prospers in a mostly rural district that extends along the Mississippi from the Wisconsin border to a portion of Peoria. Sixty percent of the district's residents live in towns with populations of 1,000 or fewer, 85 percent are in towns of 5,000 or fewer. In November, she won all of her district's 14 counties, 11 of which are

entirely rural. What lessons can Democrats learn from her success among Trump voters? They might start by marrying a cop. She says she gets "instant credibility" by telling audiences that her husband, who has been in law enforcement for 34 years, is the sheriff of Rock Island County. Regarding guns, it is helpful if one of your sons finished second in the national collegiate trap-shooting competition. It also is helpful if another son is a union welder.

Favorable trends might tempt Democrats to think that that they can thrive without the voters Bustos reaches. The Economist. noting that Trump's approval rating is "stratified by age," reports that baby boomers – those born between 1946 and 1964 who have been America's largest age cohort for more than five decades will in 2019 be outnumbered by millennials, those born between 1981 and 1996. Boomers are - were; they are shuffling off stage –almost 75 percent white; millennials are 56 percent white. In this vear's midterm elections, Democrats won two-thirds of voters ages 18 to 29, and 71 percent of millennial women.

Furthermore, the GOP,

which thinks of itself as the redoubt of the devout, is competing in an increasingly secular country. The Economist says that "Nones" - people with no religion - "already outnumber Catholics and mainline Protestants," and in 2019 might outnumber evangelicals. "There will soon be more Nones than any single group of Christians." Ex-Catholics are 13 percent of the American population.

Furthermore, The New York Times reports that with the Democrats' capture of New York's 11th Congressional District, which includes Staten Island and part of Brooklyn, Republicans now hold no "truly urban" district. Since Republicans lost four Orange County, California, seats in November - the Democrats lost only two seats nationally - come January there will be no Republican from there in Congress for the first time since 1940. And there will be no Republicans from New England.

If, however, Democrats aspire to be less of a coastal party – come January, there will be more House Democrats from California than from 36 other states combined - they should want to emulate Bustos' success among voters she calls "Trump triers," those who are less than his devoted acolytes.

Republicans can hope

that in 2020, with Trump presumably at the top of their ticket, the turnout will be much larger and very unlike that of 2018. But analyst Charlie Cook, citing Michael McDonald of the United States Elections Project, says the 2018 turnout of 50.1 percent was the highest of any midterm election since 1914. David Wasserman of the Cook Political Report says Republicans lost 96 percent of House contests in districts Trump either lost or carried by less than 7 points.

Bustos sometimes connects with her constituents by asking them what they do for fun. When one woman answered "cable television," Bustos asked if her family did not go out to movies. No, the woman replied, four tickets and popcorn exceed the family's budget. This answer spoke volumes about the constituent's disposable income. Bustos' question revealed a wellhoned political intuition. Democrats, she says, have to "own" districts like hers, "not rent them." This is what ownership looks like: Her four margins of victory have been 6 percentage points, 11, 20 and 24.

Conserve water by skipping irrigation

SEBRING — The grass may be greener where it's watered, but Southwest Florida Water Management District is asking residents to curb their water usage.

SWFMD has started a "Skip a Week" campaign where a homeowner would do without irrigating their lawns for a week during the cooler months.

SFWMD stated in a press release that over-watering can make grass less resistant to drought, wastes water and can cause pests and disease.

Master Gardener Diedrich Dierks agreed that grass does not need as much watering in the cooler months between November and March. For new lawns, Dierks recommends Bahia grass as it grows well in the sandy soil and goes dormant in the winter. It requires considerably less water than St. Augustine that is much higher maintenance. St. Augustine requires constant watering and Dierks said it requires a lot of fertilizing to keep it "pretty." He noted the runoff from the grass will include the excess fertilizer going into the aquifers.

Proper irrigation should start with proper materials.

"We were required in the mid-1990s to have rain sensors on

Over watering can cause brown spots and bugs.

'Bugs like water," Dierks said. "If your grass is wet, the bugs will go to your house for lunch. Chinch bugs like to munch on roots and cause brown spots."

One of the best ways to measure the amount of water a lawn is getting is by putting several short and wide cans around the yar — Dierks recommends tuna fish cans. After the sprinklers finish a cycle, measure the water in the can.

SWFMD recommends a half inch to three quarters of an inch when using a sprinkler system. Thousands of articles can be found on the University of Florida IFA Extension Office website on agriculture; Dierks

According to SWFMD, residents should only need to water every 10 to 14 days in the cooler months.

"Grass is Florida's largest agriculture crop," Dierks said. "About 50 percent of the water coming from our aquifers is being dumped on sod."

So, when do you water? SWFMD says it is time

to water the grass when a blade of grass folds in half, the blades take on a blue-gray color and when footprints remain in the grass after the foot has been moved.

The SWFMD website shows the days and times for residential watering. Watering is not to be done more than twice a week. The SWFMD schedule should be followed unless a town or county government has a different. The website states:

 Even addresses may water on Thursday and/ or Sunday before 10 a.m. or after 4 p.m.



A police officer reported seeing Knowles run a stop sign and enter into


his lane. The officer took evasive action and turned around on the vehicle to conduct a traffic stop, the arrest report states.


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Buckeyes and fans enjoy Pasadena

Good fishing during the new moon

The Freshwater Fishing Forecast for the second week of January gives anglers a perfect Florida winter weather forecast and the second half of the new moon phase. All fishing factors considered, anglers will experience fish adjusting to two minor back to back cold front, a daily wind direction change, and plenty of atmospheric pressure change each day.

The new moon occurred last night, however the lunar orbit apogee (furthest point from earth) will occur Wednesday. This translates to a very weak lunar influence on fish feeding migrations, especially leading up to the day of the orbit apogee. So you can expect not much help from the new moon but it will yield slightly more than an average day on the water.

The weather this week will be what I consider a normal typical average Florida winter pattern; a ten-degree temperature change every three days, more than an average atmospheric pressure-change each day, and ideal wind speeds and sun-to-cloud ratios

Since our last 28-degree temperature cold front a few weeks ago, the recent warmer weather pattern has produced ideal water temperatures. This in turn created a three-day feeding pattern, meaning every third day fish feed at above average rates.

Last Thursday pressure increased by over 0.13 In Hg between 8-11 a.m. and fishing was spectacular all throughout the heartland. Then Friday the pressure did not change, fish fed very little if at all, and yesterday feeding was sparse with only small bass occasionally feeding.

Today therefore, you can expect an above-average fishing result if you move deeper in the mornings and shallow during the high-temp period of the day. Atmospheric pressure has been peaking daily on the lunar overhead period and I expect that to continue

Best Fishing Days: Today through Wednesday fish will be adjusting to constant changing wind directions and plenty of pressure change—0.10 In Hg or more. It also could be true that Monday's activity rating could be better than today rating due to weather pattern

New moon periods produce three daily feeding periods, triggered by the harmonizing of the moon with the sunrise, solar noon (12:33 p.m.), and sunset periods.

Major Fishing Period: Today the moon is overhead thirty minutes after solar noon---1:04 p.m. A feed intensity rating of 4 will occur from 10 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Daily expect this period to move later by about 50 minutes.

Minor Fishing Periods: Today there are two minor periods centered on the sunrise and sunset. Due to warmer water temperatures during the sunset period, the rating will be a half or full point better than the

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

Shutdown talks conclude without a breakthrough

WASHINGTON — White House officials and congressional aides emerged from talks to reopen the government without a breakthrough Saturday, though they planned to return to the table the following day.

President Donald Trump tweeted: "Not much headway made today." Democrats agreed there had been little movement, saying the White House did not budge on the president's key demand, \$5.6 billion to build a wall along the U.S.-Mexico border.

The White House said funding was not discussed indepth, but the administration was clear they needed funding for a wall and that they wanted to resolve the shutdown all

Acting chief of staff Mick Mulvaney, in an interview with CNN's "State of the Union," accused Democrats of being there to "stall." NEW ORLEANS — As the rest of America winds down from the parties, overeating and merriment of Christmas and New Year's, New Orleans keeps the party going. Mardi Gras season officially kicks off today. Jan. 6, and is often referred to as Epiphany, Twelfth Night or Three Kings' Day and commemorates the day the Bible says the three wise men reached the baby Jesus. For weeks,

the city is taken over by elaborate parades and people stuffing their faces with sugary king cake. The party culminates on Fat Tuesday, which this year falls on March 5.

Here's a look at some of the things to expect this Mardi Gras season:

TWELFTH NIGHT

A number of parading groups often dubbed krewes take to the streets Sunday to kick things off. One group parades through the French Quarter

to honor the fallen French hero, Joan d'Arc. Another group, Phunny Phorty Phellows, heralds the arrival of Carnival with a streetcar ride down St. Charles Ave. wearing costumes. This year they'll be trailed by a new group called the Funky Uptown Krewe, who will ride on a separate streetcar with New Orleans producer and rapper DJ Mannie Fresh performing. Craig Mangum, the krewe's founder, said they'll also be handing out CDs and

Woman in vegetative state for decade reportedly gives birth

PHOENIX (AP) — A woman said to have been in a vegetative state for at least a decade at a private health care facility in Phoenix reportedly gave birth recently, triggering a police investigation and reviews by state agencies in a situation that the state governor's office called "deeply troubling."

Azfamily.com, a news website for television stations KPHO and KTVK, first reported late Thursday that, according to sources not identified by the website, a woman gave birth Dec. 29 living at a Hacienda HealthCare facility where the staff was unaware that she was pregnant.

Two other Phoenix television stations later aired similar reports.

According to some reports, the woman was a victim of a near-drowning more than 10 years ago. Her identity hasn't been reported, and it's not known if she has family or a guardian.

Sources quoted in the reports said the woman was heard to be moaning and that the baby's head was starting to emerge when a

"None of the staff were aware that she was pregnant until she was pretty much giving birth," azfamily.com quoted a source familiar with the situation as saying. That person said the baby was said to be alive and healthy.

Following the azfamily.com report, Hacienda Health Care and state officials issued brief statements about the situation, expressing concern and describing reviews being conducted and steps being taken. But they did not specifically confirm the reported pregnancy and birth.

A Phoenix Police Department spokesman, Sgt. Tommy Thompson, said only that the "the matter is under investigation." He declined to confirm whether the investigation involved a possible sex crime or elaborate on the circumstances that prompted the investigation.

Hacienda said it in a statement it was cooperating with law enforcement and reviewing its security protocols after becoming aware of a "deeply disturbing incident and "an unprecedented matter."

"While federal and state privacy laws prohibit us from publicly discussing a patient's health

Netflix and chill no more streaming is getting complicated

Streaming TV may never again be as simple, or as affordable, as it is now.

Disney and WarnerMedia are each launching their own streaming services in 2019 in a challenge to Netflix's dominance. Netflix viewers will no longer be able to watch hit movies such as "Black Panther" or "Moana," which will soon reside on Disney's subscription service. WarnerMedia, a unit of AT&T, will also soon have its own service to showcase its library of blockbuster films and HBO series.

Families will have to decide between paying more each month or losing access to some of their favorite dramas, comedies, musicals and

action flicks. "There's definitely a lot of change coming," said Paul Verna at eMarketer, a digital research company. "People will have more choices of what to stream, but at the same time the market is already fragmented and intimidating and it is only going to get more so."

Media companies are seeking to capitalize on the popularity and profitability of streaming. But by fragmenting the market, they're also

narrowing the once wide selection that fueled the rise of internet-based video. About 55 percent of U.S. households now subscribe to paid streaming video services, up from just 10 percent in 2009, according to research firm Deloitte.

Just as Netflix, Hulu and Amazon Prime tempted people to "cut the cord" by canceling traditional cable TV packages, the newer services are looking to dismember those more-inclusive options.

Disney Plus is set to launch late next year with new Marvel and Star Wars programming, along with

Firm pledges to find shipping containers lost in North Sea

BERLIN (AP) — Switzerland-based shipping company MSC is pledging to pay the cost of cleaning up hundreds of containers one of its cargo vessels lost in a North Sea storm.

The company said Saturday that it was committed to finding and retrieving the containers that went overboard on Jan. 2 "until the last one is found." Authorities say two contained potentially hazardous materials.

The MSC Zoe, one of the largest freight ships in the world, lost more than 270 containers as it sailed from Portugal to Germany.

Dozens have since been spotted near islands off the coasts of Germany and the Netherlands or washed ashore while spilling light bulbs, plastic toys, flatscreen TVs and shoes onto beaches.

MSC said it appointed a specialist firm to help coordinate the search with authorities.

USGS: Magnitude 6.8 quake shakes remote part of west Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP)

— A powerful earthquake
has shaken northwestern
Brazil near its border
with Peru, affecting a
remote part of the Amazon
rainforest. There were
no immediate reports of
damages.

The U.S. Geological Survey said the magnitude-6.8 quake had an epicenter 55 miles west of Tarauaca, Brazil, and 204 miles east of Pucallpa, Peru. It hit at 2:25 p.m. local time and had a depth of 575 kilometers.

Observatory of the
University of Brasilia said
on its website that it was a
"deep, no risk earthquake"
in the jungle state of Acre.
A powerful

7.1-magnitude quake hit the Peru-Brazil border in August.

Yemen's war rivals exchange artillery fire around port city

SANAA, Yemen (AP)
— Security officials say
Yemen's Shiite rebels and
government forces are
shelling each other in
areas south of Hodeida,
straining an already shaky
cease-fire in the Red Sea
port city.

They said each side blamed the other for Saturday's shelling, and that both were reinforcing their forces in the city in violation of the U.N.-brokered truce reached in Sweden last month.

The violence coincided with the arrival Saturday

in Sanaa of U.N. envoy Martin Griffiths, his first visit to Yemen since the Sweden talks.

The officials spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to brief the media.

Yemen plunged into civil war in 2014 when the rebels known as Houthis captured Sanaa. A Saudi-led coalition intervened in the war a year later, fighting alongside government troops.

UK police arrest suspect in fatal train stabbing

LONDON (AP) — British police on Saturday arrested a suspect in the fatal stabbing of a man who was killed in front of his 14-year-old son on a suburban London train.

Lee Pomeroy was on board a train from the town of Guildford to London with his son when he was stabbed multiple times Friday afternoon. Pomeroy would have turned 52 on Saturday, his family said in a statement.

Chief Inspector Sam Blackburn said the attack was "not believed to be a random assault." He said the two men appeared to have been involved in an argument that escalated in the moments leading up to the killing.

The suspect was detained early Saturday on suspicion of murder. A 27-year-old woman was also arrested on suspicion of assisting an offender.

Police said no one else was being sought in connection with the killing.

"Lee took his son on a trip to London hoping to spend some quality time with him which was cut short by (a) horrific and pointless attack," Pomeroy's family said in their statement.

6 schoolchildren, bus driver die in road accident in India

NEW DELHI (AP) — Six schoolchildren and their bus driver were killed as the vehicle rolled down a gorge on a hilly road in northern India, police said.

Another 12 children were hospitalized with injuries after the school bus skidded off the road in Himachal Pradesh state on Saturday, said police officer Rohit Malpani.

Malpani said three students aged 5 to 14 and the driver died on the spot. Three students died later in a hospital.

The cause of the accident is being investigated.

Around 150,000 people die every year on India's roads, often because of reckless driving, badly maintained roads and vehicles overcrowded with passengers.

In September, 55 people were killed when a bus carrying pilgrims from a Hindu temple in the hills of south India plunged off a road.

French president condemns 'extreme violence' after Yellow Vest clashes

PARIS —French President Emmanuel Macron promised Saturday that justice "will be done" after the first Yellow Vest protests of the new year were again marked by violent clashes in Paris.

About 50,000 protesters took to the streets across France, Interior Minister Christophe Castaner said.

The turnout seemed something of a revival for the protests after declining numbers in the last weeks of 2019.

Few turned out during the holiday season. Macron had offered an expensive package of tax cuts and pay bonuses to appease protesters demanding improved living standards.

For Macron's government, it was the scenes of violence that marked the day, as protesters clashed with police on the Seine riverside and on a pedestrian bridge.

The small Line News agency got more than 1.7 million Twitter views for footage showing a man — apparently a boxer — taking on riot police with his bare hands and, along with other protesters forcing them back on the bridge.

A figure wearing the same clothing can be seen in another clip apparently kicking a policeman who had fallen to the ground.

A police trade union said on

Twitter that the man had been identified, and described it as a "cowardly and intolerable attack."

But radical leftist leader Jean-Luc Melenchon, who has backed the protest movement that initially sought — with success — the cancellation of planned fuel tax rises, took a different view.

"Hand-to-hand combat on the bridges of Paris," Melenchon said on Twitter. "Are the authorities who give such orders republicans?"

Government spokesman Benjamin Griveaux said he had had to leave his office after the door of his ministry building was forced by people who stole heavy machinery from the street outside

"Once again an extreme violence has attacked the Republic — its guardians, its representatives, its symbols," Macron wrote on Twitter. "Justice will be done."

Macron has promised a national debate on the wide range of issues raised by the movement, including taxation, the cost of living, democracy and public services.

"Everyone must regain selfcontrol to bring about debate and dialogue," he said.

Mexico launches plan to stimulate US border economy

MEXICO CITY — President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador launched an ambitious plan Saturday to stimulate economic activity on the Mexican side of the U.S.-Mexico border, reinforcing his country's commitment to manufacturing and trade despite recent U.S. threats to close the border entirely.

Mexico will slash income and corporate taxes to 20 percent from 30 percent for 43 municipalities in six states just south of the U.S., while halving to 8 percent the value-added tax in the region. Business leaders and union representatives have also agreed to double the minimum wage along the border, to 176.2 pesos a day, the equivalent of \$9.07 at current exchange rates.

Lopez Obrador, who took office on Dec. 1, said the idea is to stoke wage and job growth via fiscal incentives and productivity gains. U.S. President Donald Trump has repeatedly complained that low wages in Mexico lure jobs from the U.S. Mexico committed to boost wages during last year's negotiations to retool its free trade agreement with the U.S. and Canada.

Speaking from Ciudad Juarez, a manufacturing hub south of El Paso, Texas, Lopez Obrador said Saturday he agrees with Trump that Mexican wages "should improve." He decried, for instance, that Mexican auto

workers earn a fraction of what their U.S. counterparts take home, topping out at just \$3 an hour versus a typical wage of \$23 an hour in the U.S.

Yet the economic plan comes at a delicate moment for the border region. Trump threatened as recently as last week to close the U.S.-Mexico border "entirely" if Democrats refuse to allot \$5.6 billion to expand the wall that separates the two countries.

Economy Minister Graciela Marquez noted Saturday that the border region targeted for economic stimulus accounts for 7.5 percent of Mexico's gross domestic product. And in recent years, she said, the 43 municipalities included in the plan have boasted combined economic growth of 3.1 percent,

above the national average of 2.6 percent for the six years through 2017.

Much of that robustness owes to trade and proximity with the U.S., the world's biggest economy.

"We have to take advantage of this locomotive that we have on the other side of the border," she said.

Marquez expressed optimism that the stimulus plan will direct more Mexican and foreign investment into the border region. The plan for the border region is part of what Lopez Obrador calls "curtains of development" to shore up different corridors of the country so that Mexicans stay rather than migrating in search of better economic prospects.

DeSantis will be sworn into office on Tuesday. The festivities begin with a prayer breakfast at Florida A&M University before the ceremony on the steps of the Historic Capitol Building and will continue with an address to legislators and Cabinet officials in the Capitol Rotunda. It concludes with a ball at the Donald Tucker Civic Center

The 40-year-old governor decided to cancel the parade, opting to get to work quickly. He told The Associated

Press on Saturday "the pomp

and circumstance is fine, but ultimately this is about putting the pedal to the metal."

Teacher caught with student in Airbnb rental

WILTON MANORS (AP) — A biology teacher is facing a criminal charge after deputies say he was caught with a 14-year-old student in an Airbnb rental in South Florida.

Authorities say Diego Guzman Carranza is facing a charge of engaging in lewd and lascivious act with a minor. He was arrested Thursday and remained in jail on Friday on \$50,000 bond.

The Sun Sentinel of South Florida reports that the 14-year-old girl told authorities that she and Guzman Carranza had intercourse and that they had an ongoing sexual relationship.

No attorney was listed in online court records for the Miami-Dade County teacher.

An Airbnb spokesman in a statement to The Associated Press calls the behavior abhorrent and says the company has permanently banned the teacher from its platform.

Hospital worker run over, killed outside where she works

WESTON (AP) — A Cleveland Clinic worker in South Florida was hit by a car and killed in front of the hospital where she works.

Broward County Sheriff's Office investigators said 52-year-old Margarita Almonte was walking through a crosswalk to her car in a hospital parking lot after her shift on Wednesday when she was hit by a car.

Investigators said her body was carried a short distance and then hit the pavement, and the car ran over her.

Almonte's co-workers in the hospital carried her to the emergency room at the Cleveland Clinic where she was pronounced dead.

The sheriff's office said in a statement that a preliminary investigation shows neither excessive speed nor driver impairment or mechanical failure played a role in the crash.

School custodian arrested for soliciting minor

BLOUNTSTOWN (AP) — State law enforcement agents said they've arrested a school custodian in the Florida Panhandle for trying to solicit a 14-year-old girl online.

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement says John Grande was arrested Thursday.

He is charged with lewd and lascivious conduct and online solicitation of a minor.

An FDLE spokeswoman says the teenage girl wasn't a student at the middle school

student at the middle school where Grande worked. After the 14-year-old girl told detectives she had received messages via a mobile app

messages via a mobile app from Grande, FDLE agents assumed the identity of the girl and began communicating with Grande. The FDLE said Grande

requested lewd photos of the girl.

Online court records showed no listing for an attorney for Grande.

3 killed, 4 injured in California bowling alley shooting

TORRANCE, Calif. — Three men were fatally shot late Friday and four injured when a brawl at a popular Los Angeles-area bowling alley and karaoke bar erupted into gunfire that had terrified patrons, some children, running for their lives.

Police in the coastal city of Torrance responded shortly after midnight to calls of shots fired at the Gable House Bowl. They found seven people with gunshot wounds.

Three men were pronounced dead at the scene and two were taken to a hospital, Sgt. Ronald Harris said. Two other men were struck by gunfire but "opted to seek their own medical attention."

Authorities have not identified the victims nor suspects or released details about what led to the shooting. Witnesses said it stemmed from a fight between two large

Dwayne Edwards, 60, of Los Ängeles, said he received a call from his nephew that his 28-yearold son, Astin Edwards, was one of those killed. His nephew told him his son was attempting to break up a fight when a gunman "just started unloading.'

"I'm thinking this is a dream and I'll wake up,' Edwards told the Orange County Register. "He was a good kid. I don't understand it."

A grieving mother told KABC-7 her 28-year-old son, Robert Meekins, was also trying to break up the fight and that Meekins and Astin Edwards were

"They were friends, so I know he probably jumped in and helped Astin and whoever he was with ... but I don't think my son deserves to die," Anglean Hubbard said.


"My son was a loving person. He loved life, he loved his son, and he loved his family. Nobody can imagine what I'm going through right now," Hubbard said.

The third victim was 20-year-old Michael Radford, his sister Latrice Dumas told the Torrance Daily Breeze.

"He was happy. He was always a protector," Dumas said. "That's how he got into this, he was trying to protect others."

Wes Hamad, a 29-yearold Torrance resident, said he was at the bowling alley with his 13-year-old niece and cousin when he saw a "huge fight" break out. Hamad said the brawl, which lasted about five minutes, blocked the entrance and spiraled

into "complete chaos." "I grabbed my niece

and started running toward the far end of the bowling alley," he said. "As we were running, we heard 15 shots."

As he was leaving, Hamad said he saw a woman weeping over a man who had gunshot wounds to his head and neck.

Damone Thomas was in the karaoke section of the bowling alley, a

regular stop for him and his friends after work on Fridays, when people ran in saying there was a shooting. The 30-yearold Los Angeles resident said his friend flipped a table to shield them as they heard gunshots.

Thomas said he didn't feel scared because he was "just trying to survive." But when he was driving home, he said he realized how

traumatic the situation was and said he hasn't been able to fall asleep.

"Closing my eyes, all I can see is the women against the wall crying, not knowing what to do," he said.

Thomas and Hamad said they had never witnessed any violence there in the past. But Hamad said he had stopped going for a while because he heard someone with a gun was recently seen there.

"I definitely won't be going back anymore," he added.

In a tweet, California U.S. Sen. Kamala Harris said her heart breaks for the victims.

"We must do more to address gun violence," she said. "Americans should be able to go to a bowling alley and be

Hundreds rally as 7-year-old girl's killer remains at large

HOUSTON — Hundreds of people who gathered at a rally Saturday for a 7-yearold Houston girl whose killer remains at large were asked to think of the victim as their own child and to be part of an "army" that will help authorities catch the person who fatally shot

The rally was held in the parking lot of a Walmart near where the shooting happened on Dec. 30 as Jazmine Barnes and her family drove to a grocery store.

During the rally, people held up balloons and stuffed animals, as well as signs that said "Justice for Jazmine." Organizers of the rally also led the crowd in chants that repeated the phrases, "What do we want? Justice. Who do we want

it for? Jazmine."

Jazmine's family believes her death was racially motivated. The girl was black and the alleged shooter is described as a white man in a red truck.

Police have said they are pursuing various leads after a composite sketch of the suspect was

released on Thursday. Investigators added that they have not yet determined a motive, including whether race might have played a role.

Lee Merritt, a national civil rights attorney working with Jazmine's family, said there were no updates in the search on Saturday.

Jazmine's aunt, Sharonica Watt, asked her niece's killer why he took the little girl's life.

"We're asking you to turn yourself in right now, in the name of Jesus. We're asking you to give justice to me and my family," Watt yelled in between tears.

Deric Muhammad, a community activist who helped organize Saturday's rally, told the crowd that everyone there had a role to play 'in finding justice for this baby.

"We all consider ourselves soldiers in Jazmine's army," he said.

Jazmine's mother, LaPorsha Washington, also addressed the crowd, thanking them for their support.

"We going to find him no matter what corner we have to turn. No matter what rock we have gotta go under, we

In an emotional speech, are going to find you," Washington said.

Various local and federal officials, including Houston Congresswoman Sheila Jackson Lee, attended the rally. Houston-based rappers Paul Wall and Trae tha Truth asked the crowd to reach out to authorities if they have any information on the shooter.

"At the end of the day, Jazmine is ours. She's my kid. She's your kid," Trae tha Truth said. "There's no excuse. It's no what L shoulda, what I coulda. At the end of the day it's simple. We all have to stand up."

Lee said she planned to reach out to federal authorities to ask them to create a national manhunt for Jazmine's killer. The Harris County Sheriff's Office in Houston, which is leading the investigation, said it's

already working with the FBI and other federal agencies.

A \$100,000 reward is being offered for information leading to an arrest.

Others at the rally discussed their belief that the shooting was racially motivated and was reflective of what they see as growing intolerance and attacks on minorities and immigrants in the United States.

Community activists said the attack is similar to a 2017 incident in the area in which a suspect described as white shot into a vehicle carrying at least two black people. That shooting remains unsolved.

"This is a disgrace to our nation and we want the hate to stop. We want love to rise up," said Bishop E. L. Usher, the pastor at the church attended by Jazmine's father.

with coupons between 5.5 percent and 5.65 percent. They are all rated BBB, which is still bank-quality, and I

paid about \$10,000 for each bond. My stockbroker wants me to sell these bonds because he believes interest rates will go up to 10 percent in the next few years. He told me that these bonds, which I bought about a year ago, could decline in value by 50 percent. I am concerned that I would lose a lot of money if rates were to rise. But I don't understand how bonds could fall in price if the issuing bond companies maintain their credit ratings and earnings. Could you please help me under-

stand this? Is my broker right about interest rates rising? I've been reading your column for 30 years. HR, Jonesboro, Ark.

Dear HR: Interest rates will rise, but I believe that a 10 percent rate is unrealistic and that your broker's a blockhead, a bonehead, a lunkhead and a dunderhead. I should be able to answer your bond question, but please bear with me. After 45 years of writing this column, I'm discovering that it's so much easier to get older than wiser! So,

here's my AARP version. Assume today's interest rates are 6 percent and you've decided to invest \$10,000 and buy a longterm AAA-rated 6 percent corporate bond that will mature in 30 years. That corporate bond will pay you \$600 in annual interest until maturity. And if necessary, you could sell the 6 percent bond today (bonds trade actively on the market) for very close to what it cost you — give or take \$50.

A week later, Jerome Powell, chairman of the Federal Reserve, announces that he must raise long-term interest rates from 6 percent to 12 percent. So you decide to buy a \$10,000 longterm AAA-rated bond that will pay you 12 percent, or \$1,200, in interest annually until maturity. And if necessary, you could sell the 12 percent bond today for what it cost you – give or take \$50.

So, you have \$10,000 invested in two AAA-rated bonds, both of which will mature in 30 years. One bond pays you 6 percent interest yearly (\$600), and the other pays you 12 percent interest yearly (\$1,200). Now it's six months later, and interest rates are still 12 percent. The Fed tells us they're likely to remain that high for many years.

Assume you wish to sell the \$10,000 bond that pays you 6 percent interest. Because current interest rates are now

12 percent, how much would an investor be willing to pay you for it? Certainly, a knowledgeable investor wouldn't pay \$10,000 for this bond because he could invest \$10,000 and buy a bond that would pay him 12 percent.

Assume the investor pays you \$8,000 for your \$10,000 bond. Well, you have a \$2,000 loss — and the investor will earn \$600 in annual interest. Because he invested \$8,000 to earn \$600 in interest, his yield is 7.5 percent. Note that 7.5 percent of \$8,000 is \$600. But that's not good if long-term interest rates are 12 percent.


Now assume the investor pays you \$7,000 for your \$10,000 bond. Well, you have a \$3,000 loss — and the investor will earn \$600 in annual interest. Because he invested \$7,000 to earn \$600 in interest, his yield is 8.5 percent. Note that 8.5 percent of a \$7,000 investment is \$600. Again, that's not good if longterm interest rates are 12 percent.

But assume the investor pays you \$5,000 for this 6 percent bond that cost you \$10,000. Well, you have a \$5,000 loss, and the investor will still earn \$600 in annual interest.

However, because he invested \$5,000 to earn \$600 in interest, the yield on this investment is 12 percent. And that's just right because current interest rates are 12 percent! Get it? Got it? Good!

A White House official said the meeting included a briefing on border security by Homeland Security Secretary Kirstjen Nielsen. Democrats sought written details from the Department of Homeland Security on their budget needs, which the White House said it would provide.

With talks stalled, House Speaker Nancy Pelosi announced that House Democrats plan to start approving individual bills to reopen shuttered departments starting with Treasury to ensure Americans receive their tax returns.

"While President Trump threatens to keep the government shut down for 'years', Democrats are taking immediate further action to re-open government, so that we can meet the needs of the American people, protect our borders and respect our workers,' Pelosi said.

In an interview with NBC's "Meet the Press," set to air Sunday, Mulvaney argued that the administration was willing to deal. He said Trump was willing to forgo a concrete wall for steel or other materials.

"If he has to give up a concrete wall, replace it with a steel fence in order to do that so that Democrats can say, 'See? He's not

building a wall anymore,' that should help us move in the right direction," Mulvaney said.

The president has already suggested his definition of the wall is flexible, referring to slats and other "border things." But Democrats have made clear they see a wall as immoral and ineffective and prefer other types of border security funded at already agreed upon levels.

Trump had campaigned on the promise that Mexico would pay for the wall. Mexico has refused. He's now demanding the money from Congress.

Trump, who did not attend the discussions, spent the morning tweeting about border security.

Showing little empathy for the hundreds of thousands of federal workers furloughed or working without pay, Trump declared — without citing evidence — that most are Democrats. He also asserted: "I want to stop the Shutdown as soon as we are in agreement on Strong Border Security! I am in the White House ready to go, where are the Dems?'

One Democrat, Maryland Sen. Chris Van Hollen, said in his party's weekly radio address that the shutdown "is part of a larger pattern of a president who puts his personal whims and his effort to score political points before the needs of the American people. ... He is pointing fingers at everyone but himself.

Airports see rise in security screeners calling off work

NEW YORK — The federal agency tasked with guaranteeing U.S. airport security acknowledged an increase in the number of its employees calling off work during the partial government shutdown.

Employees of the Transportation Security Administration are expected to work without pay during the shutdown because their jobs are considered essential.

The TSA said in a statement Friday that call outs that began over the holiday period have increased. The agency did not say how many of its employees have called out, but it said the call outs have had "minimal impact given that there are 51,739 employees supporting the screening process." The statement said wait times "may be affected" but so far "remain well within TSA standards."

"TSA is closely monitoring the situation," the agency statement said. "Security effectiveness will not be compromised.'

The Department of Homeland Security and President Donald Trump pushed back Saturday on suggestions that the call outs represented a "sickout" that was having significant consequences on U.S. air travel. White House officials and congressional aides were in talks Saturday to end the shutdown, which entered its 15th day. Negotiations are at an impasse over Trump's demands for \$5.6 billion

Gov. Doug Ducey's office said Ducey was briefed on the "deeply troubling" reports as soon as the office learned of

them and that state agencies "immediately began taking every measure to protect patient safety."

According to the Arizona Department of Health Services, an agency that regulates health care facilities, the 60-bed Hacienda facility was required to tighten

security procedures to protect patients in wake of the report.

"We are aware of this situation and are actively working with local law enforcement in their criminal investigation," the department said in a statement.

The state Department

a social-service agency whose functions include serving disabled people, said it performed health and safety checks on all of the residents at the Hacienda facility after the birth was reported and was working with police on their investigation.

Probably the biggest single sign that Mardi Gras season is upon us is king cake. The ring-shaped cakes often decorated in the Mardi Gras tri-color of purple, green and gold can be found at bakeries, restaurants, office parties and homes across town during the season. Cakes can be plain or filled with fruit and cream or laced with cinnamon. Bakers go all out.

For example, Alton Osborn, who owns Bywater Bakery with his wife Chaya Conrad, is this

year introducing three savory king cakes — crawfish, boudin and spinach/artichoke — to accompany their nine sweet king cakes. They're also hosting a full lineup of live music Sunday to entertain restaurant goers. King cakes account for a "huge part of our business," Osborn said. He's got high hopes for the new savory king cakes: "It's going to blow some minds."

OUTSIDE NEW ORLEANS

Towns and cities in Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama also host parades and events during Mardi Gras season. Last vear, Alabama's state tourism agency purchased 10 billboards around New Orleans and southern Mississippi to promote Carnival in Mobile. Rather than mentioning Mobile specifically, the signs told drivers how many miles they are from "America's

original Mardi Gras." And they didn't mean New Orleans. New Orleans officials took the ribbing in stride with then-Mayor Mitch Landrieu saying: "There's only one great Mardi Gras in the world." And he didn't mean

PARADE CHANGES

Traditionally the bulk of the parades happen around the two weekends ahead of Fat Tuesday. Scheduling changes this year mean that Krewe of Chewbacchus, a walking parade devoted to science fiction, is rolling earlier than in previous years. Richard Riggs, one of the

three overlords that organizes the parade, said the change came because city officials said they didn't have the policing resources to protect the ever-growing parade on their traditional date while also staffing the large parades that also roll at the same time through the city's Uptown neighborhoods.

A total of three groups were affected by the changes, said city spokesman Trey Caruso, wno said the "growing popularity" of the groups requires "more coverage from our public safety assets.'

Chewbacchus, for example, has grown from a few hundred members when they started in 2011 to about 1,800 participants last year, Riggs said.

But with no other competing parades on their new date of Feb. 9, Riggs said they're optimistic that they'll "have a bigger turnout than usual."

its library of animated and live-action movies and shows. It hasn't announced pricing yet, but Disney CEO Bob Iger said in an August call with analysts that it will likely be less than Netflix, which runs \$8 to \$14 a month, since its library will be smaller.

AT&T plans a three-tier offering from WarnerMedia, with a slate of new and library content centered around the existing HBO streaming app. No word on pricing yet.

Individual channels, such as Fox, ESPN, CBS and Showtime, are also getting into the act. Research group TDG predicts that every major TV network will launch a direct-to-consumer streaming service in the next five years.

Netflix and others have invested heavily in original movies and TV shows to keep their customers loyal. Netflix, for instance, said Wednesday that 45 million subscriber accounts worldwide

watched the Sandra Bullock thriller "Bird Box" during its first seven days on the service, the biggest first-week success of any movie made for the company's nearly 12-yearold streaming service.

That first-week audience means nearly a third of Netflix's 137 million subscribers watched the movie from Dec. 21 through Dec. 27 — a holiday-season stretch when many people aren't working and have more free time.

But Netflix, Hulu and others may soon have to do without programs and movies licensed from their soon-to-be rivals. In December, Netflix paid a reported \$100 million to continue licensing "Friends" from WarnerMedia.

Why are media companies looking to get in? Data and dollars. Sure, they get money when they sell their programs to other services like Netflix. But starting their own service allows networks and studios access to valuable data about who is binging

on their shows. For services with

ad-based options, that data translates into more dollars from advertisers. And services that rely only on subscription revenues, media companies can use the data to better tailor their offerings for individual tastes, helping to draw in more subscribers.

"I think all media companies are coming to grips with the reality that you better establish a relationship directly with your audiences," said AT&T CEO Randall Stephenson at an analyst conference earlier this month.

The business model that some networks and content companies are currently using, distributing their TV shows and movies only by licensing them to streaming platforms, is getting "disrupted aggressively" as more companies launch their own services, said Stephenson, whose company acquired WarnerMedia in June.

Forrester analyst Jim Nail compares this moment to the "Cambrian explosion," a historic era when plant and animal species rapidly multiplied after Ice Age glaciers receded.

But a multiplicity of streaming services could easily overwhelm or confuse consumers. To get a full slate of programming, TV watchers may soon have to subscribe to several services instead of just one or two.

Among those options will be services like Netflix and Hulu that offer a wide range of video from a variety of sources; cable-like "skinny bundles" such as FuboTV, Sling and YouTube TV that offer a variety of live channels; and channel- or network-specific services like Disney Plus.

Consider just AT&T's plan to launch a threetiered service this year centered on HBO. An entry-level bundle will offer mostly movies; a second, slightly more expensive tier will include original programming and newer movies. A third and still more expensive offering would add more WarnerMedia entertainment such as "Friends."

The cost of multiple streaming services could quickly approach the average cost of a cable bill — not counting the cost

of internet service. That's around \$107 per month, according to Leichtman Research Group.

"It's unlikely any of the services individually can charge more than \$10 per month," Forrester's Nail said. "The great unknown is how many individual streaming services people are willing to sign up for."

Companies are already trying to tame this chaos by bundling multiple streaming services together. Amazon Prime customers can add-on subscriptions to HBO, Showtime or Starz. Roku and Chromecast viewers can access their different services from a central place; Roku said Wednesday it will start selling in-app access to Showtime, Starz and other channels as well.

How should consumers deal with all the coming change?

"Be patient," said Michael Greeson, president of research group TDG. "We're in a time of dramatic change for the TV and video business. There'll be great benefits, and question marks and consequences."

Overnight Changes I observed a stock start price very different from where it closed the day before. Can you explain that? — F.W.,

Greensburg, Pennsylvania There may have been a Astock split, or some big news (or rumors) may have broken after the market closed. If, for example, the company is being bought out or it posted an unexpectedly good or bad earnings report, that could have caused buy or sell orders to pile

up overnight, resulting in big overnight price moves. Stock prices simply reflect supply and demand, so if lots of people want to sell, the price will fall to a point at which some will buy — and vice versa. After-hours trading, which occurs before the market opens and after it closes, is

another factor. Are share buybacks good for a company's shareholders?

P.A., Tulsa, Oklahoma It depends. If a com-Apany buys back shares when they're overvalued, it's wasting money that could have been spent in more productive ways (such as being paid out as a dividend or used to grow the business). But if it repurchases shares when they're undervalued, that benefits

shareholders. The shares bought back on the open market are essentially retired, leaving each remaining shareholder owning a bigger piece of the company. For example, imagine that earnings at the Rubber Chicken Catering Co. (ticker: CHEWY) are \$3 million and it has a million shares outstanding. Its earnings per share (EPS) are thus \$3. If CHEWY buys back a tenth of its shares, leaving 900,000, then its EPS suddenly rises to \$3.33 (\$3 million divided by 900,000). Still, investors should prefer earnings to grow mostly due to business growth, not share buybacks.

What If Your Portfolio Tanks? The stock market has experienced some big swings in recent months, and it's got some investors jittery. Do you know what you would do if

your stock portfolio suddenly took a dive? Here's some guidance. For starters, instead of fearing stock market drops, expect them. They will happen every few years, and some years can shrink your portfolio considerably. In 2008, for example, the S&P 500 plunged more than 36 percent. It dropped for three years in a row in 2000, 2001 and 2002, with 2002's drop a hefty 22 percent. Those can be alarming, but know that there were plenty of years with double-digit gains before and after those years. The average annual gain over many

years has been close to 10 percent. So keep that perspective in mind whenever the stock market retracts or crashes. It shouldn't hurt you severely if you've sensibly kept any money you might need in the



stocks. Your investments need time to recover after any downturn. Another smart thing to do if the market drops is to go shopping! It can be hard, psychologically, to buy stocks when others are selling and the media is obsessing about market losses, but that's often a great time to buy, as many terrific stocks will be temporarily sporting signifi-

cantly lower prices. If you like the idea of shopping during downturns, you might aim to keep a modest portion of your portfolio in cash, ready for opportunities. Five or 10 percent is often plenty, though — remember that any money not invested could have been growing for you. When you shop, you might favor healthy dividend-paying stocks, as they can provide welcome income. (Remember — when a stock's price falls, its

dividend yield rises.) Remember that the best investors are patient, and they don't freak out when the market retracts. They expect it — and often profit by it, too. Tune out the noise in the media and focus on buying into great businesses for the long term.

on sounder footing now. A stop, or stop-loss, order can indeed prevent such losses, as it directs your brokerage to sell your stock if it falls to a certain price. But remember that many good stocks are somewhat volatile, and stop-loss orders can get you ejected out of stocks that hiccup temporarily, causing you to lose out on

future gains. As for the safari, most investors shouldn't have to monitor their holdings every day (or hour!), standing ready to sell at any moment. Superinvestor Warren Buffett has said: "If you aren't willing to own a stock for 10 years, don't even think about owning it for 10 minutes.'



Sometimes a great player makes a great play that is difficult to explain. At least it is difficult for us to explain. Maybe that's why they are great players. Karen McCallum, a multiple World Champion, was South, in today's deal from a team game.

At the other table, South won the opening heart lead in hand and led a low spade to dummy's jack, which East allowed to hold. Declarer continued with the king of spades and could no longer make the hand. East won with her ace and shifted to the nine of clubs, ducked all around. A second club forced dummy to ruff and South couldn't avoid the loss of two trumps and two clubs.

McCallum also won the heart lead in hand and led a spade to the jack, also ducked. At this point, she found the only way to make her contract — she played three rounds of diamonds! East ruffed and led the nine of clubs, covered by the king and ace. A second club was ruffed in dummy and McCallum continued leading high diamonds from dummy. East ruffed with the 10 and was over-ruffed. Declarer's last club was ruffed in dummy and the defense had to settle for the ace of trumps. Making four!

McCallum could reason, from the auction, that the hearts were 4-4. Also, West might have led a diamond with a singleton, so it was reasonable to place West with two diamonds. But playing the black suits to split like that? A remarkable guess.

P.S. It's never too late. You can get back on your path by





Lay the sweater flat to dry. Do not wring out the sweater or hang it up to dry, because these actions could cause the sweater to stretch out of shape.

—Never iron a sweater to remove wrinkles, because you could damage the fibers. Instead, use a steamer on the sweater to remove wrinkles.

—If salad dressing or other food drips onto the sweater,

it probably will need to be cleaned. Be aware that the less you wash a good sweater, the longer it will last. — Heloise

Dear Heloise: I bought a pair of pretty leather shoes in a hurry, and they are too tight. Is there anything I can do to make them feel better? — Nancy in Colorado

Dear Nancy: Yes, you can indeed try to stretch the leather just a bit. Try this: Buy a shoe stretcher and a shoe-stretcher spray, which you can find at shoe-repair shops. Put the stretcher into the shoe and apply the spray directly onto each shoe. If this does not work, take the shoes to a shoe-repair shop that has a stretching machine. Good luck! — Heloise

Dear Heloise: I love my wooden knife block, which I clean the outside often, but I noticed that the slots look dirty. How can I clean them? — Tanya in Georgia

Dear Tanya: Start by using your crevice-tool vacuum attachment. This



WASHINGTON — Harold Brown, who as defense secretary in the Carter administration championed cutting-edge fighting technology during a tenure that included the failed rescue of hostages in Iran, has died at age 91.

Brown died Friday, said the Rand Corp., the California-based think tank which Brown served as a trustee for more than 35 years. His sister, Leila Brennet, said he died at his home in Rancho Santa Fe, California.

Brown was a nuclear physicist who led the Pentagon to modernize its defense systems with weapons that included precision-guided cruise missiles, stealth aircraft, advanced satellite surveillance and improved communications and intelligence systems. He successfully campaigned to increase the Pentagon budget during his term, despite skepticism inside the White House and from Democrats in Congress.

That turbulent period included the Soviet Union's invasion of Afghanistan and the Iranian hostage crisis. An effort in April 1980 to rescue the hostages failed when one of the helicopters on the mission struck a tanker aircraft in eastern Iran and crashed, killing eight U.S. servicemen.

"I considered the failed rescue attempt my greatest regret and most painful lesson learned," Brown wrote in his book "Star Spangled

Brown faced numerous obstacles when he took the job as Pentagon chief, including pressure to reduce the defense budget both from within the administration and from influential congressional Democrats.

Wary of the growing Soviet threat, Brown sought to withstand the pressure to cut defense and,

gradually, managed to increase spending.

"The constant Cold War competition raged hot during the Carter administration and preoccupied me throughout the four years," Brown wrote. He noted later that "the Defense Department budget in real terms was 10 to 12 percent more when we left than when we came in," which he said was not an easy accomplishment.

And he cited the technological advances in defense systems, especially weapons systems such as precision-guided cruise missiles, stealth aircraft and advanced satellite surveillance.

Brown was born in New York City on Sept. 19, 1927, attended public schools and went to Columbia University on an accelerated wartime schedule, receiving an undergraduate degree in physics in 1945 "when I was not quite 18," then going to graduate school at Columbia, receiving a doctorate in

Not long after graduation he moved to California and went to work on projects that related to the development of plutonium. He then went to work at a nuclear weapons lab. He worked his way up to director of the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory at Livermore in 1960.

In 1961, Defense Secretary Robert McNamara invited him to be director of defense research and engineering in the Kennedy administration. In 1965 he became secretary of the Air Force during the Johnson administration and, as he described it later, "served in that role through some of the most difficult and divisive parts of the Vietnam War."

After the 1968 election put a Republican, Richard Nixon, back in the White House, Brown accepted the position of president at the California Institute of Technology in Pasadena serving until he went back into government work and was a delegate to the Strategic Arms Limitation Talks in the 1970s,

Carter nominated Brown to be defense secretary in 1977. He was quickly confirmed and served throughout Carter's term. During the 1980 campaign Brown actively defended the Carter administration's policies, speaking frequently on national issues in public.

After leaving the Pentagon, he remained in Washington, joining the Johns Hopkins University School of Advanced International Studies as a visiting professor and later the university's Foreign Policy Institute as chairman. He remained active in matters of national security, including service on the Defense Policy Board, which meets quarterly to offer perspectives to the current secretary of defense. He served as a consultant to many corporations, often serving as a member of the board of directors.

Carter awarded Brown the Presidential Medal of Freedom. President Bill Clinton gave him the Energy Department's Enrico Fermi Award for achievement in science and technology.

Flu toll mounts in California, with 42 deaths so far

California's flu season has just begun to ramp up, but 42 people in the state have already died of influenza, according to officials.

The death tally began in October, the official start of the flu season nationwide. The season runs through May and typically reaches its height in February.

Older people are more likely to develop serious complications, such as pneumonia, after catching the flu. Half the deaths in California this season are among people over 65, according to state data.

In California and nationwide, the flu strain going around is H1N1, a kind of Influenza A known as "swine flu." Nationally, 77 percent of flu cases so far have tested positive for H1N1, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

H1N1 tends to be most dangerous for children and pregnant women, said Los Angeles County chief medical officer Dr. Jeffrey Gunzenhauser. So far this season, 10 people in L.A. County have died of the flu, he said.

Nationwide, there have already been two high-profile flu deaths this season.

On Dec. 24, an 8-yearold boy who was being held in U.S. custody in New Mexico after being

apprehended at the border died of the flu. Later that same week, Bre Payton, a 26-year-old writer for online magazine the Federalist, died of encephalitis caused by the flu, according to her employer.

In general, however, health officials say this year's flu season will probably be milder than the last, when the deadly H3N2 strain was the most prevalent across the country. Then, so many people fell ill that hospitals overflowed with patients and ran out of medicines. The season led to one of the country's highest flu death tolls ever, second only to the 1918 Spanish flu pandemic that killed thousands, according to Gunzenhauser.

Although H1N1 tends to be a less harmful strain, Gunzenhauser still encourages everyone older than 6 months of age to get vaccinated, especially as cases pick up on the West Coast. The vaccine takes about two weeks to take effect.

The flu shot reduces a pregnant woman's chance of catching the flu by 40 percent and provides immunity for her baby, he said. People who receive the shot and then still catch the flu typically experience less severe symptoms.

Last year's flu season killed 185 children, 80 percent of whom were not vaccinated, according to the CDC.

Does an annuity belong in your retirement plan?

An annuity is a stream of monthly income guaranteed for life, starting immediately or deferred to a specified time in the future, in exchange for an upfront lump sum payment. For example, a woman of 65 investing \$500,000 can receive about \$2,700 a month starting immediately, \$3,900 a month starting in five years, or \$5,900 a month starting in 10 years. The five and 10 years are the deferment periods, which can be as long as 25 years.

These are stand-alone quotes, meaning that the annuity is not tied to any other feature of the annuitant's retirement MORTGAGE PROFESSOR

plan. In my view, annuities are best deployed as one part of an integrated plan in which part of the retiree's assets are used to purchase a deferred annuity and the balance is used to live on during the deferment period. My colleagues and I have been developing the technology for such a plan, called the Retirement Income Stabilizer (RIS), which I will be writing about in the months ahead. But this article is about misperceptions of annu-

ities in general.
A major misperception

is that annuities are a bad deal because the rate of return credited to them by insurance companies is substantially lower than the return available to a retiree on the same amount invested in equities. Insurers invest primarily in fixed-income securities, which over long periods yield less than equities.

Annuity payments, however, are also affected by the mortality of purchasers. The insurer stops paying annuitants who die, leaving more for those still living. On Dec. 21, 2018, I measured the mortality effect using RIS. The hypothetical annuitant was a 65-year

old woman who had a nest egg of \$1 million of common stock and wanted it to support her to age 104 if necessary.

I found that if she

used part of her nest egg to purchase a deferred annuity and the remainder to live on during the deferment period, she would receive \$4,260 a month starting immediately, rising by 2 percent a year. For the nest egg to support her without the annuity, it would have to earn a return of 6.2 percent to 6.5 percent, depending on the length of the annuity deferment period used in the calculation. Those rates can be viewed as the return paid

to the annuitant taking account of mortality.

A quick proviso: Those returns are available only to an annuitant who has shopped the market, as I did. The annuity amount referred to above was the highest offered by the 11 companies for which I have data.

Another critical difference between a retirement plan that includes an annuity and one based entirely on draws from financial assets is that annuity payments are guaranteed where investment returns are not. The 65-year-old retiree with a portfolio of common stock is probably going to earn

more than 6.5 percent on it over the next 39 years, but may not. Over the 577 39-year periods between 1926 and 2012, the median rate of return was 7.8 percent, but during 2 percent of those periods the return was 4.7 percent or less. If that came to pass, the consequence of impoverishment at an advanced age is horrendous. An annuity provides insurance against this low-probability hazard.

US average mortgage rates fall

WASHINGTON — U.S. long-term mortgage rates fell this week, starting the year with an inducement to prospective homebuyers.

Mortgage buyer Freddie Mac said Thursday the average rate on the benchmark 30-year, fixed-rate mortgage declined to 4.51 percent from 4.55 percent last week. Despite recent declines, home borrowing rates remain far above last year's levels. The key 30-year rate averaged 3.95 percent a year ago.

The average rate for 15-year fixed-rate loans edged down to 3.99 percent this week from to 4.01 percent last week.

Mortgage rates began to spike after President Donald Trump signed broad tax cuts, financed by government deficits, into law in December 2017. But rates have eased in recent weeks amid steep declines in the stock market and tumbling interest rates on the 10-year U.S. Treasury note — which influences long-term mortgage rates.

The decline in mortgage rates could help boost home sales, which have stumbled last year as higher borrowing costs have eroded affordability.

Low mortgage rates and slowing growth in home prices "should get prospective homebuyers excited to buy," Freddie Mac chief economist Sam Khater said. "However, it will be interesting to see how the recent turmoil in the stock market will affect home buying activity in the coming months."

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Explore shower options with a pre-molded base

Question: Ed: I'm quite the handy homeowner and plan to install a large walk-in shower. My family would like a tile shower stall complete with a built-in tile seat. However, building a tile shower base and seat will really push my contracting skills, and I want to do this job myself. Any ideas to ease my workload and still please my family? — Marty, Mississippi

Answer: Tile shower stalls can be tricky, especially if you plan to install a tile base with a seat. Basically, you'll need to lay out a shower base with a water containment pan, a thick layer of mortar with a drain setup, floor tiles and a custom-made seat.

Since you want to do the job yourself, I understand your concern and have another option for you to explore.

I suggest you install a premade acrylic shower base with a built-in seat and install tile only on the shower walls. These one-piece units include a special tile flange that allows you to connect the tile to the top of the molded shower receptor.

Bottom line: If you install a smart-looking acrylic shower base with an integral seat, you can do a stand-up job and still incorporate tile.

Black walls make a quiet comeback

There was a time when black walls were mostly the purview of goth teens and indie movie theaters. But the color has been quietly cultivating a broader following among designers and homeowners who want a cozy, enveloping ambiance that's still got theatrical flair.

Bedrooms, libraries and bathrooms clad in inky or charcoal tones can be relaxing retreats. If you've got loads of windows, the color helps frame exterior views. And if the space is mostly walls, black creates a cocoon-like setting that can showcase a collection of objets d'art, vibrantly patterned rugs and furniture, or meditative warm woods and textures.

Laboratory-white kitchens are also yielding ground to kitchens dressed in dark hues. Houzz.com editor Mitchell Parker says black is having a moment in the cooking space.

"Our community of homeowners is embracing a heavy dose of dramatic color with large swaths of black range hoods, island accent colors and full-on, all-black cabinetry," he

For a kitchen in Brentwood, California, Shannon Wollack and Brittany Zwickl of Studio Life.Style wanted to add a little more punch. "The kitchen's all-black palette, infused with a large slab of black-and-white marble and bold brass accents, warms and fills the space without feeling too heavy," says Wollack.

LG, GE, Kitchenaid, Bosch, Frigidaire, Smeg, JennAir and others are offering suites of charcoal-black appliances with either a matte or satin smudge-proof finish. And there's black cabinetry, countertop gadgets and cookery as well.

Designer Mark Zeff and his wife, Kristen, have a home in East Hampton, New York, that celebrates black in several ways. The exterior is half-white, halfblack. Inside, black serves as a narrative thread for large design elements including a floating fireplace, a stained pinewood wall in the master suite, and a glass wall in the shower. Punctuation is added with black cowhide rugs; curvy Bibendum chairs by Eileen Gray; and Eero Saarinen Womb chairs.

"Black has properties that make it ideal for interior design: It's calming to the eye, it's elegant and it underscores organic beauty," says Mark Zeff.

but it's actually much starker in comparison to black when blended with an environment. Because of the use of black, our home appears to hunker down and stay closer to the earth, like a natural landmark."

Adds Kristen Zeff: "We also like that black can paradoxically open up a smaller space when applied as a paint, to make a room feel much larger than if white is used. The illusion is achieved by tricking the eye into not knowing where a room ends, by disguising the edges.'

She says they painted pine wood with Benjamin Moore's Black Jack. "The grain comes through, to develop a texture that deepens the shade."

Kristen Ekeland of

Chicago-based Studio Gild also likes adding black, using Benjamin Moore's Midnight in a recent bedroom project. "We wanted to create a space that's calming and cozy. It's dark, but it has an ethereal feeling," she says. Along with the paint, the designers selected a black sideboard from Sabin to add depth and texture.

Dee Schlotter, PPG's senior color marketing manager, says using black on feature walls, interior surfaces and furniture serves as an anchor to neutrals, patterns and mixed materials, and

provides a solid, classic element in any room while creating a sense of space and quiet.

Her color team liked the hue so much that they chose Black Flame as PPG's 2018 Color of the Year. Glidden picked Deep Onyx, another black, as theirs.

"Black reflects the current state of rebelliousness and contentiousness in the world, but it also provides a feeling of privacy and protection," says Schlotter.

What is the water table, and how does it affect homes?

The groundwater table plays a role in home construction, foundation stability and home comfort. Because the groundwater table is so significant, it behooves homeowners to understand how it works.

National Geographic defines a water table as the boundary between water-saturated ground and unsaturated ground. Well beneath the ground, at various depths depending on geography, topography and weather conditions, pockets of water, called aquifers, exist. The water table marks the boundary between that available water and the dry surface.

Ground water is impacted by precipitation, irrigation and ground cover. It also may be affected by land use and tides. The water table can fluctuate with the seasons and from year to year because it is affected by climatic variations, as well as how much water may be drawn from underground, advises Encyclopedia Britannica. The water table where one person lives may be several inches or feet below the surface of the ground and follow the topography of the land. For others, it may be much higher, even coming above the surface of the soil.

The water table as well as local soil conditions and drainage can impact homes and their foundations. If soil drains efficiently and there is a relatively low water table, it may not be problematic. However, if soil is dense and absorbent and the water table is high, the ground around a home may swell and become saturated. This can exert significant pressure against the foundation walls, states Rytech, a water damage and mold rehabilitation company.

In areas where a local water table rises near the surface, water can push against the underside of the foundation in a condition known as "hydrostatic pressure." This may cause water to infiltrate through the bottom of the foundation — even permeating solid concrete over time. If hydrostatic pressure is severe, it could lift certain portions of the foundation out of the ground, but this is very unlikely. But it could cause shifting of foundation walls and structures like fencing and decks.

Even if ground water does not cause foundation cracking or shifting, it could lead to humidity issues, resulting in rust, bacteria and mold. Wood structures in a home may be compromised by a high level of humidity.

The home improvement resource Angie's List says certain steps may need to be taken to protect against damage from a water table and abundant ground water. Basement and foundation waterproofing professionals can help homeowners develop a plan to mitigate water damage. This can include grading changes and the installation of

Arians, 67, is the only known former NFL head coach to meet with the Bucs since they fired Dirk Koetter after three seasons last Sunday.


Licht interviewed Chiefs offensive coordinator Eric Bieniemy on

Thad Turnipseed, Clemson's director of recruiting operations and external affairs, has worked with both Saban and Swinney to implement their holistic

approaches to building champi- the program through graphic onship teams.

"Everything matters in every area of your program," Turnipseed said Saturday at media day for the College Football Playoff national championship

No. 1 Alabama (14-0) and No. 2 Clemson (14-0) will meet Monday night at Levi's Stadium in Santa Clara, the fourth straight year the Crimson Tide and Tigers have played in the playoff and third time they will decide the title.

Turnipseed is a former teammate of Swinney's on Alabama's 1992 national championship team who was working as an administrator in Tuscaloosa even before Saban took over in 2007. Turnipseed oversaw facilities projects, but Saban expanded that role.

Running back Marlon Mack had 148 yards and a touchdown for Indianapolis, which advances to face the top-seeded Kansas City Chiefs in the divisional round next weekend.

Houston (11-6), which overcame a 0-3 start to win the AFC South, gave up too many big plays and couldn't lar season after missing all get anything going on offense in the first half to

fall into the huge hole. Deshaun Watson, who

was sacked an NFL-leading 62 times in the regular season, was sacked three times and hit eight more times in a disappointing playoff debut. He finished with 235 yards passing with a touchdown and an

interception. The Colts, who opened the season 1-5, continued an impressive run by winning their fifth straight and for the 10th time in 11 games. Saturday was their first playoff appearance since the AFC championship game loss at New England in the "Deflategate" game in the 2014 season.

It was another good game in a splendid season for Luck, who grew up in a suburb of Houston. He threw for 4,593 yards and 39 touchdowns in the regu-

Bears exit hibernation to tackle Eagles

Chicago plays first postseason game since 2010, against team with personal ties

LAKE FOREST, Ill. — Not long after he was hired, Matt Nagy watched the Super Bowl with his wife at a bar near the Chicago Bears' practice facility. His good friend Doug Pederson was coaching the Philadelphia Eagles to their first Super Bowl championship.

The place was just about empty. He even had to ask for the game to be turned on.

"It was awesome," he

Nagy hopes things don't go so well for his pal when the NFC North champion Bears host the Eagles on Sunday in a wild-card game packed with storylines.

Chicago (12-4) is in the playoffs for the first time since the 2010 team won the division, making a huge jump in Nagy's first season after four straight last-place finishes. The Bears are on a 9-1 tear; the Eagles (9-7) have won five of six.

Chicago quarterback Mitchell Trubisky will make his first playoff appearance.

Eagles quarterback Nick Foles — last year's Super Bowl MVP — will try to deliver another standout performance while filling in for Carson Wentz. He's 6-0 in those situations the past two seasons.

Foles was particularly good the past three games with Wentz sidelined by a back injury. He tied Philip Rivers' NFL record in last week's win over Washington by completing 25 consecutive passes.

Alshon Jeffery will play in Chicago for the first time since the star receiver left the Bears after five seasons to sign with Philadelphia in 2017. Chicago's Trey Burton will try to beat the Eagles this time after throwing a touchdown to Foles on a trick play — "Philly Special" — in the Super Bowl victory over New England.

There will be Long brothers
— Chicago guard Kyle and
Philadelphia defensive end
Chris — on opposing teams.


And there will be two coaches on opposite sidelines with a strong bond formed while working under Andy Reid in Philadelphia and Kansas City.

NO-NAME SECONDARY:

The Eagles have relied on backups and reserves after losing three-fourths of their starting secondary to season-ending injuries. Secondyear pro Rasul Douglas and rookie Avonte Maddox have stepped up at cornerback since starters Ronald Darby and Jalen Mills went down. Veteran Corey Graham replaced safety Rodney McLeod. Maddox even played safety when Graham was out. Second-year pro Tre Sullivan also has filled in at safety and former Bears defensive back Cre'Von LeBlanc has played nickel cornerback with Sidney Iones out of the lineup.

"They've both settled into those roles well and they've made enough plays for us to win five of our last six and get in," defensive coordinator Jim Schwartz said of LeBlanc and Sullivan

Douglas, who played just 10 snaps in the first five games, led the team with three

interceptions.

The anchor in the secondary is Malcolm Jenkins, who played every defensive snap and another 136 on special teams.

ON TARGET:

Like Foles, Trubisky is on a roll .

The No. 2 overall pick in the 2017 draft, he threw three interceptions in a 15-6 victory over the Los Angeles Rams on Dec. 9 after missing the previous two games because of a shoulder injury. Since then, he's been

making all the right reads.

Trubisky has a 109.7 rating the past three games, completing 63 of 83 passes for 644 and three touchdowns without an interception.

BACKFIELD BY COMMITTEE:

After relying on undrafted rookie Josh Adams for a bulk of the carries following season-ending injuries to Jay Ajayi and Corey Clement, the Eagles are splitting the ball carrying among Adams, veteran Darren Sproles and Wendell Smallwood.

MOVING ON?:

Bears defensive coordinator Vic Fangio insisted he was preparing only for the Eagles, not any head coaching interviews.

"I've done zero on that second part," he said.

The 60-year-old Fangio has overseen a defense that led the NFL in rushing defense, takeaways (36) and interceptions (27) while tying for third in sacks (50).

All 12 playoff coaches tied to Walsh or Parcells

There is no denying the impact on the coaching world

that Bill Walsh and Bill Parcells have had. The hard evidence is apparent again as the NFL playoffs begin.

All 12 of the coaches have some sort of tie-in to either three-time Super Bowl champion Walsh or two-time winner Parcells. Yes, all 12.

Some are direct: New England's Bill Belichick, New Orleans' Sean Payton and the Chargers' Anthony Lynn were assistants under Parcells.

Other affiliations on the coaching tree go out on a bit of a limb. The Colts' Frank Reich worked for Doug Pederson, who coached under Andy Reid, who worked for Mike Holmgren, who was a Walsh protege.

It all gets a bit complicated, but as Bob Glauber, the NFL columnist at Newsday points out, all the connections are legitimate.

Indeed, Glauber's recent book, "Guts And Genius," is all about not only Walsh and Parcells, but Washington's Joe Gibbs. The subtitle of the book tells it all: The story of three unlikely coaches who came to dominate the NFL in the '80s.

"As I was researching the book, I discovered how those two coaches really concentrated on helping other coaches," says Glauber, the current president of the Pro Football Writers of America. "Parcells learned from his high school basketball coach, Mickey Corcoran, that he had to give back and help other coaches, and he always lived by that

"Walsh was so upset he was passed over as Bengals head coach by Paul Brown (in 1976) that he promised himself that if he ever did get a head coaching job, he would make it a point to help develop other coaches. He started what I think is the most productive coaching tree in pro sports history, not just in the NFL."

Consider that such Walsh disciples as George Seifert, Mike Shanahan, Mike Holmgren and Pederson have won Super Bowls.

Glauber points out that since 1981, 30 of the 37 Super Bowls have been won by a

Gibbs. The subtitle of the book tells it all: The story of three coach with ties to either Walsh or Parcells.

Seattle's Pete Carroll coached with the 49ers under George Seifert, who was Walsh's defensive guru and Walsh's replacement as head coach in San Francisco

Dallas' Jason Garrett worked for Nick Saban, who coached under Belichick.

Los Angeles Rams' Sean McVay was on Shanahan's staff

Chicago's Matt Nagy served as offensive coordinator for Reid.

Chargers, Ravens in rematch of late-season game

BALTIMORE — It's been six years since the Ravens hosted a playoff game, so forgive Pro Bowl guard Marshal Yanda for forgetting protocol regarding the distribution of tickets.

"Somebody was asking me if we got tickets during the playoff games, and I couldn't really remember," he said this week. "I was like, 'Uh, it's been a little while.'"

The last time Baltimore was at home in the postseason was in 2012, when linebacker Ray Lewis and quarterback Joe Flacco engineered a 24-8 victory over Indianapolis to launch a surprising Super Bowl run. Lewis is now in the Hall of Fame, and Flacco will be on

Fame, and Flacco will be on the bench when rookie Lamar Jackson and the Ravens (10-6) face the Los Angeles Chargers (12-4) in a wild-card game Sunday.

It's a rematch of a pivotal contest two weeks ago, when Baltimore took control of the AFC North with a 22-10 victory that dropped the Chargers to the No. 6 seed. The Ravens' top-ranked defense limited Los Angeles quarterback Philip Rivers to 181 yards passing with two interceptions.

"You know they're going to come back with changes, with wrinkles, and they're going

to play that much harder, because they know what happened the first game," said Ravens safety Eric Weddle, who played nine years with the Chargers before signing as a free agent with the Ravens in 2016.

The game plan is important, but minimizing errors is what really counts.

If experience means anything at quarterback, the Chargers have the edge. The 37-year-old Rivers has been flinging the football in the NFL since 2004 and has started nine playoff games.

Jackson, a junior at Louisville just a year ago, has been a starter for just under two months. The 21-year-old will be the youngest quarterback ever to start in the postseason.

But the Ravens are 6-1 with Jackson as a starter, and his ability to run has turned Baltimore's offense into a very efficient unit.

BEEN A WHILE

This is the Chargers' first postseason appearance since the 2013 season, and second since 2010.

"When you're younger you think this is it; you get a shot every year," Rivers said. "Then when you go once in the last nine or 10 years, you realize how fleeting it is and how hard it is to get in."

Baltimore is coming off a three-year playoff absence.

ALL ON THE LINE

With the Chargers' line-backers undersized because of injuries, the defensive line will need another good game. Joey Bosa has four sacks in six games since missing the first 10 with a foot injury.

The Chargers had three sacks in the first meeting against Baltimore, but Jackson also had plenty of plays in which he was able to move up in the pocket to complete passes in his lone 200-yard game.

Jokic scores 39 to pace Nuggets past Hornets

DENVER (AP) — Nikola Jokic's impressive numbers took a backseat to his coast-tocoast dunk.

Cheered by the sellout crowd for his jam, he was also teased by his teammates. To him, the slam was a thing of beauty.

"Poetry in motion," the 7-footer said.

Jokic scored a season-high 39 points and grabbed 12 rebounds, reserve Paul Millsap added 18 points and the Western Conference-leading Nuggets knocked off the Charlotte Hornets 123-110 on Saturday for their 10th straight home victory.

That's two straight games where Jokic's now had a memorable dunk.

"If I'm not tired and 100 percent sure I'm going to dunk it, I'm going to dunk," Jokic explained. "But two points is two points — however you score."

His slam in the third quarter led to some good-natured ribbing from teammates such as Torrey Craig, who also had a high-flying dunk.

"He's feeling pretty bouncy lately," Craig playfully said.

Jokic took it all in stride.

"Just because (Craig) can
jump high, doesn't mean he
can dunk better," Jokic said.
Jokic turned in another

impressive stat line, also adding six assists, three steals and one blocked shot. He was 16 of 29 from the floor and 4 of 5 from the line.

Jazz 110, Pistons 105

Donovan Mitchell scored 24 of his 26 points in the second half, and the Utah Jazz rallied from an 18-point, second-quarter deficit to beat the Detroit Pistons 110-105 on Saturday night.

The Jazz nearly squandered an 11-point lead of their own in the final quarter, allowing the Pistons to cut the lead to one on a 3-pointer by Blake Griffin. Ricky Rubio made two free throws for Utah with 12.3 seconds remaining, and Detroit turned the ball over on its next possession.

Griffin scored 34 points for the Pistons.

76ers 106, Mavericks 100

Joel Embiid had 25 points and 12 rebounds, and Ben Simmons had 20 points, 14 rebounds and 11 assists in the Philadelphia 76ers' 106-100 victory over the Dallas Mavericks on Saturday night.

Embiid hit two key free was

Horse of the Year: Justify, Accelerate in tight duel

HALLANDALE BEACH, Fla. — Justify and Accelerate never got to face off on the track. Instead, they'll duel for

Horse of the Year. Justify, Accelerate and Monomoy Girl were the three finalists announced Saturday for Horse of the Year. The top prize will be handed out at the Eclipse Awards on Jan. 24. Justify won the Triple Crown, Accelerate won the Breeders' Cup Classic and Monomoy Girl capped her year with a win in the Breeders' Cup Distaff.

Justify raced six times in his career, all in 2018, and prevailed every time before retiring in July because of issues with his left front ankle.

The rest of the year belonged to Accelerate, who won his last four races. All were of the Grade 1 variety, capped by winning the Classic.

"I read somewhere where it said maybe he did this all on the wrong year," Accelerate owner Kosta Hronis said after the Classic victory, while lobbying for the Horse of the Year prize as well. "But maybe Justify won the Triple Crown in the wrong year."

If Justify wasn't retired, he almost certainly would have faced Accelerate in the Breeders' Cup Classic.

Their lone matchup will be settled on paper.

The voters have decided — officials said Saturday that out of 271 eligible voters, 249 returned ballots. Voters made three selections in each category to determine the finalists, but only first-place votes will be counted when choosing the Eclipse Award winner in the 17 categories.

The only Triple Crown winner not to be declared Horse of the Year was Omaha, in 1935.

"I think he's the greatest of all time," said Mike Smith, who rode Justify to the Triple Crown.

Monomoy Girl won the Kentucky Oaks as part of her six-victory year, and she's the likely winner in the 3-year-old filly category. Justify is almost certain to win top honors in the 3-year-old male division, and Accelerate — whose final race is set to be the \$9 million Pegasus World Cup Invitational at Gulfstream Park on Jan. 26 — is the heavy favorite now in the older dirt male race.

Bob Baffert, who trained Justify, is one of the finalists for top trainer, along with twotime reigning winner Chad Brown and 2008 and 2009 winner Steve

Jose Ortiz, the Eclipse winner as top jockey in 2017, is a finalist alongside his brother — Irad Ortiz Jr. — and Smith, who could win the Eclipse for the first time since 1994.

And most importantly, Arians is a bit of a quarterback whisperer. Arians has worked with quarterbacks Ben Roethlisberger, Peyton Manning, Andrew Luck and Carson Palmer.

Ironically, two of Winston's worst defeats came to the Cardinals under Arians.

In 2016, the Bucs lost at

Arizona 40-7 as Winston went 27 of 52 for 243 yards with one touchdown and four INTs.

Two years ago, the Bucs fell at Arizona 38-33. Winston went only 5 of 10 passing for 61 yards before having to leave the game after injuring his right shoulder after being hit by Chandler Iones

Arians compiled a 49-30-1 record as the Cardinals head coach and twice was named the NFL Coach of the Year by the Associated Press.

He was 9-3 as an interim head coach with the Indianapolis Colts in 2012, when he took over after Chuck Pagano was diagnosed with leukemia.

Arians retired as the Cardinals head coach after the 2017 season and last year worked as a broadcaster.

What's unknown is if the Bucs would have to give compensation in the form of a draft pick to Arizona if they hire Arians. The Cardinals had a club option on Arians' contract for 2019.

and emphasis on a family feel.

Saban might lack Swinney's personal touch and easygoing manner, but in his own steely way he is very much a players' coach. When talking about his program, Saban constantly references the need to create value for the players.

"I think being successful is really the same formula, whether it's as a football player or being an executive at Apple,"

ESPN announcers Chris Fowler and Kirk Herbstreit, who have called all four CFP national championship games, get a look behind the curtain at Alabama and Clemson more than maybe any other members of the media.

"The similarities are an absolute rock-solid top-down commitment from each school," Fowler said. "They pour resources in, human resources, financial resources, incredible attention to detail. The recruiting machine at each school, they know that's the fuel that keeps the engine running. They're both great at it in different ways, different styles perhaps. The way they round up talent is what sets them apart."

Herbstreit said Saban and Swinney have far more differences than similarities in how they set the tone for their programs. But the similarities are crucial to explaining their success.

At Clemson, Turnipseed has overseen the building of Clemson's \$55 million Allen N. Reeves Football Complex, which opened in 2017. The one with a slide, which is definitely more Swinney than Saban.

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (AP) — This time, Alabama held on.

The Crimson Tide are rolling. Tevin Mack made six firsthalf 3-pointers on his way to 22 points, and Alabama held off No. 13 Kentucky 77-75 on Saturday in the Southeastern Conference opener for both

Dazon Ingram scored all 11 of his points after halftime, including some key free throws in the Crimson Tide's fifth consecutive win. The Wildcats gave them a big scare in the final seconds after surging back from 11 points down.

Alabama coach Avery Johnson said the team probably had its hardest four-day stretch of practice of his tenure this week

"We talked a lot about it behind the scenes," Johnson said. "We needed to beat Kentucky."

Ingram made two free throws with 23 seconds left in between back-to-back layups by Ashton Hagans. Hagans' second cut it to 76-73 with 16 seconds left. Alabama (10-3) got the ball across midcourt but Hagans came away with the ball on a steal from Ingram.

PJ Washington scored on a dunk with 5 seconds to play and Kentucky (10-3) quickly fouled John Petty, who made one of two from the line.

Tyler Herro's 3-point try at the buzzer bounced off the rim. Hagans passed him the ball after he couldn't find an opening for a shot.

Kira Lewis Jr. had 12 points for the Tide, who had five players score in double figures. Donta Hall had 11 points and 10 rebounds. Herbert Jones finished with 10 points, eight rebounds and six assists.

Washington led the Wildcats with 15 points and they also had all five starters reach double figures. Keldon Johnson finished with 13.

No. 3 Tennessee 96, Georgia 50

Jordan Bowden scored 20 points off the bench as No. 3 Tennessee opened Southeastern Conference competition by trouncing Georgia 96-50 on Saturday.

Tennessee recorded the most lopsided triumph in this series'

156-game history, surpassing a 105-69 Volunteers victory from Feb. 1, 1975.



MIAMI — Along the way in his 16th and final NBA season, Miami Heat star guard Dwyane Wade will encounter moments like this. Moments where he learns his impact on the game of basketball reaches further than he even knew.

A postgame jersey swap for Wade has become the norm this season, but Friday night's exchange with Washington Wizards all-star guard Bradley Beal was special. On the heels of Beal's 33-point performance in the Heat's 115-109 victory at AmericanAirlines Arena, he revealed something to

"To be able to be a part of their growth in any way, I'm humbled. ... I just appreciate him for keeping it in all these years and telling me at this time when it mattered to be able to hear those words as my career is winding down."

As one of the league's top players over the past decade and a half, Wade feels it's an obligation for top NBA players to continuously pass down to those that come behind them.

"It's our duty and our job to pass down to the next generation, to inspire the next generation," he said. "A lot of our dreams, a lot of our visions becoming basketball players come from the guys that you see. Growing up obviously in Chicago, I watched everything that (Michael) Jordan did. I wanted to go out and emulate those things. Without that, without having the vision of those kind of players, I don't know if I had the vision to become Dwyane Wade, the basketball player."

Arjona said he worked at a car wash in Orlando for a couple of years, where he managed the detailing employees. He decided to return to Highlands County because he thought there was an opportunity to set up a mobile detailing business since there weren't that many doing

Another reason he came back is that his family is here.

Arjona said his grandfather, Jack Terry, taught him things that have served him well, such as work ethic, integrity and being trustworthy.

He said a lot of his

Flavorful cheese

Wisconsin cheesemakers find a niche with distinctive flavors

KIEL, Wis. — Kerry Henning is on a quest.

It's a search for a bloody mary-flavored cheese. It's not quick or easy: He's wrestling with getting the right tomato flavor.

'I bet you I'm close to two years on that, and I think I've still got a ways to go to perfect that one," said Henning, a master Wisconsin cheesemaker and one of the owners of Henning's Wisconsin Cheese near Kiel.

Flavored cheeses can take months and years to perfect — and sometimes don't come to fruition at all — but the eight family owners of Henning's Cheese aren't afraid to chase new tastes in a rural Manitowoc County cheese plant.

"Coming up with flavors can be a lot of work. Some flavors I've invested two years of time into making them," Henning said to the Green Bay Press-Gazette. "The one thing that makes cheese making and flavors different, than say a chef, is a chef can immediately taste his product as soon as it's made ... but cheese is a living organism and is always changing."

The first tasting is about 30 days after it's made and flavors will change in the coming months and years. Taste is checked again at three and six months.

USA TODAY NETWORK-Wisconsin's State of Opportunity series spent 2018 talking to workers from around the state about their jobs and the satisfaction they take from their daily toils. Subjects ranged from cell tower technicians who work

hundreds of feet in the air to the crews working on the the stalwart sharp cheddar Washington Island Ferry in Door County.

The series wraps up with one of the state's most iconic industries: cheese making.

Wisconsin makes about 26 percent of the nation's cheese, and 45 percent of all specialty cheese, at 144 plants around the state, according to 2017 figures from Dairy Farmers of Wisconsin, formerly the Wisconsin Milk Marketing Board. At 3.17 billion pounds, the state was the nation's leading cheese producer in 2016.

Dairy is valued at a \$44 billion state industry annually and ranks No. 2 in milk production behind California. About 90 percent of Wisconsin's milk is used for cheese.

The store in Henning's Cheese plant is stocked

with flavors ranging from and farmer cheeses to more exotic flavors like tequila lime and cranberry orange.

Over the years, the business has been asked to incorporate flavors like blueberry cobbler (a two-year process) and mild Hatch chili peppers into cheeses that have made it to market. Alcohol-flavored cheeses, like those infused with bourbon, have been a recent trend in the indus-

try, Henning said. "Just yesterday we had some folks in here from Mexico who said, 'We like your pepper cheeses and chipotle, but here's the hottest pepper right now in Mexico, look into this and we might be real interested," Henning said. "You get a lot of great ideas from your customers ... But not every idea is going to make

it into cheese."

More than 99 percent of the 3 million pounds of cheese produced by Henning's annually stays in the lower 48 of United States. Grocery stores are the main retail outlet.

"Customers come to us knowing they can seek unique and different flavor profiles," said Kert Henning, Kerry's brother and another of the company's owners. "We have the ability to try a lot of small batches."

There are typically between three and seven cheeses under development at Henning's, which employs between 30 and 40 people and purchases its milk from 23 small farmers in Manitowoc, Sheboygan and Calumet counties.

Both Kert and Kerry Henning say job

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

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
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Retailers ring up their highest holiday sales in six years

Buoyed by a robust economy and pent-up demand, holiday shoppers rang up the highest retail sales in six years, according to a report out Wednesday, Dec. 26, 2018 by Mastercard.

The data — which is culled from all spending types, including credit cards, cash and checks found that sales increased 5.1 percent, to more than \$850 billion, from Nov. 1 to Christmas.

Online shopping grew 19 percent compared with last year.

Amazon.com reported it had a record-breaking season, but didn't provide sales numbers. The company, with a double-digit growth rate, said it signed up "tens of millions" of people for its Prime membership, which provides free shipping for a \$119 annual subscrip-

tion fee. Low unemployment rates and rising wages have been boosting consumer confidence, which in October hit its highest

in a generation. A turn of the calendar meant that retailers enjoyed an extra long window between Thanksgiving and Christmas, of five Saturdays and 32 shopping days. Many began offering the kind of deep discounts once reserved for the Friday after Thanksgiving weeks

ahead. Target offered free shipping with no minimum purchase and guaranteed a two-day delivery, in hopes of taking on Amazon.

"From shopping aisles to online carts, consumer confidence translated into holiday cheer for retail," Steve Sadove, senior adviser for Mastercard and former CEO and Chairman of Saks Incorporated, said in

a statement. The Mastercard Spending Pulse analysis found that apparel was one of the leaders of the season, growing nearly 8 percent, the best mark since 2010. Sales of clothing have been accelerating since a strong

back-to-school season. Home improvement rose 9 percent, and the home furnishing and

decor grew 2.3 percent. Department stores declined, driven by the closures of the Bon-Ton chain and several Sears stores. Sales were down 1.3 percent, according to Mastercard, following two years of modest growth. Online sales for department stores grew 10.2 percent.

pretty confusing. The U.S. stock market took a major nosedive last month, finishing as the worst December since 1931, during the Great Depression. On Christmas Eve, the stock markets suffered their steepest decline. Then, just two days later, stocks had a miraculous comeback, with the Dow Jones Industrial Average soaring more than 1,000 points in a single day for the first

Meanwhile, things have been equally unclear regarding jobs and wages. The unemployment rate is at a 49-year low of 3.7 percent, yet more than 60 percent of Americans recently said they did not receive a pay raise at their current job or get a better-paying job in the last 12 months. That all comes as job creation has slowed, and optimism among manufacturers a critical voter base for President Donald Trump – has slipped. Ask Trump about the jobs numbers, however, and he will tell you they are doing fine. (And on Wednesday, he said last month's stock-market downturn was caused by a "little glitch.")

So you're probably wondering what's happening with the housing market's mortgage rates — the one thing that consistently affects

how much you pay for a home. In October, the 30year fixed mortgage rate jumped past 5 percent for the first time since 2011, creating considerable speculation among market observers that mortgage rates would only go up from there. Then, in December, the rates ticked back down again, hovering at 4.5 percent around Christmas.

It's difficult to predict where mortgage rates or the economy — will go, with forecasts and realities changing monthto-month, or day-to-day.

Still, most economists expect that mortgage rates will continue to rise throughout the year. The housing website and research company Zillow projects that by the end of 2019, rates will reach 5.8 percent. The National Association of Realtors' vice president of research has said 5.3 percent. Freddie Mac, meanwhile, has a more conservative estimate, predicting that the 30-year fixed rate will average 5.1 percent in 2019.

But what does that mean for the typical home buyer, who likely doesn't monitor mortgage rates consistently?

According to one of the latest Zillow reports, rising rates can actually mean a lot.

In a December analysis that studied housing affordability in markets across the nation, Zillow found that mortgage rates can affect buyers' budgets more than they

might think. The higher that mortgage rates rise, Zillow found, the less a buyer can spend on a house and still keep payments affordable.

Consider, for example, a buyer who makes the current U.S. median household income of \$61,240 and wants to spend 30 percent of that salary each month on a mortgage payment. In January 2018, when mortgage rates were 4.15 percent, the buyer could have bought a \$393,700 home, according to Zillow's research. Now, with rates hovering around 4.63 percent, a buyer who wanted the same monthly payment could instead afford a \$372,000 home — \$21,700

less. If mortgage rates were to rise as high as 6 percent, Zillow found, a buyer would instead have to shop for a \$319,200 house to maintain the same affordability, a nearly 19 percent reduction in purchase price from the 4.15 percent mortgage rate of this time last year.

"The interest rates are a really, really big deal," said Skylar Olsen, director of economic research and outreach at Zillow. "A small change could impact your monthly mortgage payment quite a bit."

Rising mortgage rates also could have ripple effects across the entire market.

First-time or current buyers, intimidated by the possibility of taking on more expensive debt, could decide to delay or quit their housing search altogether, Olsen said. Homeowners would, as a result, stay in their current properties, reducing the number of available homes on the market. Generally, a housing market is considered healthy when homeowners are trading up, thereby freeing up housing for different subsets of buyers. When current starter-home owners, for example, do not move on to larger homes, it's harder for first-time buyers to get into the market.

With fewer homeowners selling and buying, Olsen said, the supply constraints that the housing market is already facing could get worse. This, in turn, could increase competition and force prices to rise once again — forcing shoppers to make additional concessions on the size or location of a home.

"All of this is part of the housing ecosystem," Olsen said. "Nothing moves or changes in a vacuum."

Zillow analyzed 35 metropolitan areas as part of its study, finding that the effect of interest rate changes varies considerably by location. For example, in the country's most expensive metro area, San Jose, Calif., home shoppers would have to look for homes that are nearly \$102,000 less expensive if interest rates reached 6 percent,

compared with where they are now.

extreme.

Based on a median household income of \$40,900, a Philadelphia home shopper could currently afford a \$248,400 house if interest rates remain at 4.63 percent — a purchase that would allow him or her to pay just 30 percent of that income, Zillow found. If interest rates were to rise to 5 percent, that person's housing budget would drop to \$225,000 to keep payments the same. At a 6 percent mortgage rate, that person could buy a

found.

An analysis of the entire 11-county Philadelphia metro area showed that a person with the median household income of \$70,321 who wanted to spend 30 percent of his or her income could afford a \$427,200 home at the 4.63 percent mortgage rate. With a 6 percent mortgage rate, that budget drops to \$366,500, the company said. (Zillow's metro area includes parts of Southeastern Pennsylvania, South Jersey, Delaware, and Maryland.)

Still, multiple economists noted, mortgage

rates remain low — and would continue to be considered low even if they reached 6 percent compared with the past. After reaching a peak of more than 18 percent in October 1981, the 30year fixed mortgage rate hovered between 7 and 10 percent for all of the 1990s and early 2000s.

An "important thing to keep in mind is that rates are coming off of unprecedented historic lows," said Kevin Gillen, a senior research fellow at the Lindy Institute for Urban Innovation at Drexel University. " ... Once they cross 6 percent, however, you can start to become more concerned."

Gillen also noted that rising mortgage rates would likely affect the rental market.

"Current renters may have to put off becoming homeowners until they have a larger down payment saved up in order to qualify for a mortgage,' Gillen said. "So, they remain renters longer than they would otherwise."

"Single-family housing and rental housing are often considered as than complementary products," he continued. "What is good for one can be bad for the other."

Bank also offers interest on its savings accounts. Customers must maintain a \$300 balance to avoid the \$4 per month fee.

"We do offer regular savings accounts that can be used for saving for any type of expenses including home repairs, holidays or vacations," Heartland National Bank Senior Vice President Janice Walker said.

We also offer a minor savings account which teaches children about saving and gets them into the habit of saving," Walker said. "A good way to save is to have a fixed amount payroll direct deposited into your savings account from each paycheck."

"Heartland National Bank offers Health Savings Accounts where you can contribute to future medical expenses," Walker said. "There are certain advantages to putting money into these accounts, including favorable tax treatment.

"Contributions can be made by you or your employer or both," Walker said. "However the total contributions are limited annually. If you make a contribution you can deduct the contributions when completing your income tax return.

"You can use the money in the account to pay for any 'qualified medical expense' permitted under federal tax law," Walker said. "Heartland National offers a free HSA account to qualified customers."

Of course, customers are encouraged to speak with their tax professionals regarding specific advice for their situations.

MidFlorida doesn't offer HSA accounts, the Help Desk representative said. Wauchula State Bank does offer HSA accounts, but did not not wish to comment.

AVON PARK — Ridge Area Arc will offer a SafeStaff Foodhandler Certificate program to the public from 2-6 p.m., Wednesday, Jan. 16, at Ridge Area Arc's main campus.

Anyone in the food service industry or those who are interested in working in the field and want to obtain a certificate can enroll in this class being taught by a Certified Professional Food Manager. Florida law requires that all food service employees be trained in an approved food safety program. A public food service establishment has 60 days from the date of hire to train their employees with a Florida approved food safety training program.

This includes all employees responsible for food storage, preparation, display or any service of food and beverages. It is

recommended that even volunteer organizations (churches, clubs and other non-profits) serving food should have their food workers trained in a food safety program.

The SafeStaff Foodhandler Training Program is the contracted program of the Department of Business and Professional Regulation. The class will cover the six mandated key food safety principles: 1. Ensuring proper personal hygiene; 2. Preventing cross-contamination; 3. Controlling time and temperature when handling food; 4. Proper cleaning and sanitizing; 5. The causes and effects of major foodborne illnesses; and 6. Ensuring proper vermin control.

A study guide will be provided and given to each student. A certificate and an original wallet card will also be presented to the students at the end of the class that will be valid for three years.

Students only need to bring to class a No. 2 pencil and a picture ID.

Cost is \$15 per student and must be paid in advance by 5 p.m., Jan. 11. There will be no refunds for students not attending the class since books have to be ordered in advance but a substitution of another person can be made. Checks can be made payable to Ridge Area Arc and mailed to 4352 Independence St., Avon Park, FL 33825 or stop by the Arc administration office on College Drive to make a payment. When submitting payment, include your name, birthdate, address and phone number. For more details or to verify there is still an opening, call 863-452-1295, Ext. 124.

The class will be taught in Ridge Area Arc's training room at the workcenter, 4352 Independence St., off College Drive, Avon Park. Students can show up 30 minutes prior to class time.

It's not uncommon for the brothers to meet their customers directly at promotions and other events.


"I maybe get out of the plant four, five, six times a year ... and when the people say 'Wow, this is really good,' or 'I never thought this would make
