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District alternative school brimming with students

The number of students attending the School Board of Highlands County's alternative educational facility, Academy at Youth Care Lane, has increased about 35 percent in the past year.

SEBRING — School enrollment growth can be an indicator of an improving local economy, but when a school district's alternative school gets crowded it means there are more students with discipline issues and some with longer terms

in the program.

The School Board of Highlands County's alternative school, Academy at Youth Care Lane, had 44 students on Friday and 45 students on Tuesday when the School Board members and district administration visited the facility during the annual walk through tours of all the school campuses.

School Board Vice Chair Donna Howerton said Friday she expressed her concerns about the high student count at the Academy during the walk through and at a recent school board meeting.

"I definitely feel we need another full-time instructional staff member there," she said.

The Academy's lead

teacher, Marcia Davis, had just enrolled 10 students and it takes approximately 45 minutes per student to set them up there, Howerton said. So that takes away from helping students.

Granted, they are on Highlands Virtual School, the district's online

No election for Sebring **City Council**

Two candidates qualify for two open seats

SEBRING — During the last election period, no election was held for the Sebring City Council, because the candidate, Tom Dettman, was running unopposed. The last election for the Sebring City Council was on March

11, 2014. Since that time, some of the candidates who qualified have had illness in their immediate families or have died prior to election day, leaving the remaining candidates to run without opposition.

Since only two candidates have qualified for

the Sebring City Council, an election will not be held. There is one candidate available for each vacant seat Sebring City Council President Charlie Lowrance is seeking re-election. Curt Ivy is seeking his first term as a councilman.

When asked why he was running for office, Ivy replied, "My wife and I love Sebring." In addition to his love for the city, he felt that his background prepared him to run for this position. Ivy's administrative experience includes both military and civilian service. He spent four years in the Army during Vietnam and 24 years in the Army Reserve, where he retired as a Lieutenant Colonel. After serving in the military he worked his way up in law enforcement and spent 10 years as the police chief of Homestead and 10 years as city manager for Homestead. He is also the director of the Criminal Justice Academy at South Florida State College, where he was awarded employee of the year. Ivy has four main goals for Sebring: keeping taxes low, beautifying the city, ensuring that the city has the appropriate infrastructure for strategic growth and ensuring that the city is business friendly. "To me, the police and fire departments are very important to the city, because of public safety," Lowrance said. He spent a little over 29 years with Miami-Dade Fire Rescue and retired as a captain and station commander. Lowrance has enjoyed seeing the progress that the fire department has made during the past few years. "We are now up to full staff with the fire department. Before, we were always four to five people short." "I believe in a balanced effort to keep taxes low and provide strong services to the people," Lowrance said. "It's important to keep services and infrastructure strong. We will have hurricanes and other challenges. We need to be prepared for them."



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Agreement yet to be finalized Medical Examiner releases in lawsuit against School Board

SEBRING — A negligence lawsuit against The School Board of **Highlands County** continues to be listed as "active" by the court despite a September 2018 settlement agreement between both parties.

The civil lawsuit was related to the case of former Hill-Gustat Middle School teacher Stacy Lynn Hooks.

Hooks was arrested in 2016 and subsequently pleaded no contest to eight counts of lewd battery, nine counts of possession of child pornography, three counts of transmission of harmful material to a child, and one count of use of a computer to solicit a child.

The lawsuit involved the complaint filed by the attorney representing the parent of a student.

The complaint stated



sexual relations" with the minor student and the School Board was negligent for failing to

discharge or reassign Hooks after being made aware of her inappropriate relationship with the student on multiple occasions by students and faculty.

A settlement agreement of \$80,000 was reached in September.

School Board Finance Director Richard "Bo" Birt said when a minor is involved in a case a judge has to approve the agreement and outcome.

The district agreed to the settlement and the plaintiff signed off on it, but it takes time for the judge to approve it.

Winter Haven attorney James T. Joiner, who was appointed as the Guardian ad Litem for

the minor, issued a report in December 2018 after interviewing the mother of the minor and all the attorneys in the case.

All the people who were interviewed said the student wanted the situation settled and was tired of the proceedings, the report states.

"In considering this matter I also considered the problems relating to sovereign immunity and the difficulties that would pose in the litigation of this matter," Joiner stated in his report. "It is my recommendation that the suit be settled for the \$80,000 offer and that the young man go forward with this matter concluded and behind him."

Hooks was sentenced to a 20-year prison term in October 2017.

She is currently incarcerated at the Lowell Correctional Institute Annex in Ocala with a current release date of Feb. 12, 2036.

FROSTPROOF — The Polk County Medical Examiner released the results of the autopsy of Avon Park resident, Emily Sager Moncrief, 23, on Friday afternoon. The report comes seven months after the tragic deaths of Moncrief and her passenger and best friend Lyndsay Serey, 23, of Sebring on June 15 in a vehicle accident.

The examiner stated the cause of death was a result of "blunt impact to the head and torso" due to a "motor vehicle versus railroad train collision." The examiner also stated ethanol (alcohol) intoxication as a contributing factor in the accidental

Heading home to Highlands County, after a night out in Frostproof, both young women died shortly after 3 a.m. when the 2012 Dodge Caravan Moncrief was driving plowed into the side of a CSX train at U.S. 98. The minivan went through the working railroad actuary and functional arm bar at the crossing.

The train was heading Moncrief northbound from Miami when the minivan hit the mother to 27th boxcar. The impact two young derailed two of the train's

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

school, but this is another chance for these students to get back on track and there is only one other instructor there who is temporary and part time.

Howerton said she recalls in the past the Academy had no more than 25 to 30 students at a time.

The district's 2018-19 five-year work plan that was approved by the School Board in September shows the Academy at Youth Care Lane listed under its former name — the "Achievement Center." The name of the district's alternative school was changed more than a dozen years ago.

According to the work plan, the Academy has

one classroom with a capacity of 25 and an actual average 2018-19 class size of seven. The projected class size for 2022-2023 is 33, with 132 percent utilization (meaning over capacity).

But, along with its one building the Academy has two portables with the work plan showing 25 student stations in a portable for 2018-19 school year and 50 student stations for 2019-2020 in portables school year.

District enrollment data shows the Academy already was over its original capacity in 2017. The data shows on May 26, 2017 and May 24, 2018 an enrollment of 33 students at the Academy.

The Academy will likely be enrolling more students soon.

At its meeting on Tuesday the School Board er instructor or staff

will consider the approval of 11 expulsions, including eight drug related and separate incidents of assault on a school board employee and battery on a school board employee.

Marcia Davis said Friday there were 44 students at the Academy, which has a nine-week and 18-week program.

"We also have felony suspension students that come here on a felony suspension and are here until things are handled with their cases so they are not here for a determined amount of time," she said.

Staffing at the Academy includes lab monitors, a school safety officer, and Davis noted she is a certified teacher and there is a part-time person who is a certified teacher.

"It is a lot of kids; it's not a very big facility, I mean we have enough physical space, but it is just a lot of kids," Davis said. "These are kids that have gotten into some kind of trouble so it is challenging."

Superintendent Brenda Longshore said some students are staying at the Academy for longer periods of time and due to that decision the numbers are growing.

"We absolutely will be looking at the number of instructors in that location as well as all of our locations as we have a better understanding of the capacity," she said. "So we will be looking at the numbers that have trended out there this year and try to make the very best decision we can as far as how much

personnel is needed at that location."

Ron DeSantis and the new state Cabinet held their first meeting Friday and made history. Correcting a longstanding injustice, the governor and the Cabinet officially pardoned the Groveland Four, the four African American men who were accused of raping a white woman in 1949 and then victimized by a justice system rotted by racism. The action marks an important acknowledgment of a dark episode in Florida's past that should be remembered but never repeated. On the night of July 16, 1949, 17-year-old

Norma Padgett and her husband were driving outside the Lake County town of Groveland when their car broke down. Four black men stopped to help, but then, Padgett said, they beat her husband and dragged her away and sexually assaulted her at gunpoint. The infamous Lake County Sheriff Willis McCall arrested Walter Irvin, Samuel Shepherd, Ernest Thomas and Charles Greenlee, who was only 16 and had come to town looking for work. Within days, Thomas, a World War II veteran, escaped from the county jail and was lynched by a mob in the Panhandle. The other three were beaten in custody until they confessed and were convicted by an all-white jury.

The injustice did not stop there. The U.S. Supreme Court threw out the convictions, but as McCall was transporting Shepherd and Irvin to their second trial three years later, he shot them in cold blood, saying they had tried to escape. Shepherd died on the spot. Irvin faced trial again and lost in the face of manufactured evidence. Gov. LeRoy Collins commuted his sentence to life, and Irvin was paroled in 1968. Greenlee was paroled in 1962 and died in 2012.

The recent clemency hearing was the culmination of years of work to pardon the men Elected officials from Lake County attended, as well as legislators, historians and family members of the four who believe the crime never happened. Then Padgett spoke, insisting she has always told the truth and still relives the horror of her attack every day. But the purpose of the hearing was not to re-investigate or re-litigate the case. That possibility was lost 70 years ago, when Thomas was lynched and the others lost their freedom to a system corrupted by racists bent on vengeance. It was buried deeper when McCall murdered Shepherd and when Irvin, given a reprieve by the nation's highest court, was deprived a fair trial again. Those perversions of justice are what was finally corrected Friday. The Florida Legislature unanimously passed a resolution in 2017 "offering a formal and heartfelt apology to these victims of racial hatred and to their families" and asking former Gov. Rick Scott and the Cabinet to expedite the pardon process. Scott never made it a priority. It should stand as an early mark of his character and independence that DeSantis took up the cause on his busy first week in office. He noted his belief in the Constitution and in "getting a fair shake." The Groveland Four never got that, and now the official state record says so.

Day" until 2000 when it officially changed the name to "Martin Luther King Jr. Day."

It was officially adopted by all 50 states in 2000. That year, South Carolina made it a paid holiday for state employees. Before this, employers were able to choose between Martin Luther King Jr. Day and one of three Confederate holidays.

The state of Arkansas recognized the holiday, but chose to pair it with Robert E. Lee Day, which celebrates the birthday of the Confederate general. In March 2017 the two holidays were finally separated and Robert E. Lee Day moved to October.

The United States isn't the only place King is honored each year. Other places that honor the legacy of Martin Luther King Jr. are the city of Toronto in Canada, Hiroshima, Japan and The Netherlands.

Cold front affects super moon fishing

The Freshwater Fishing Forecast for the fourth week of January gives anglers the super full moon and a strong cold front, both arriving today. Anglers therefore will be challenged by two opposing fishing-factors.

A super full moon which always produces faster metabolism speeds in all living beings, will be overpowered by a weather condition which starts this morning with a strong low pressure system driven by a strong southern wind, only to be countered by a strong high pressure system cold front

producing a conflicting slow metabolism speed.

As I have always stated; severe weather changes always trump solar and lunar fishing factors. Essentially, the elevated energy levels caused by the super full moon will cause fish to become aggressive as the ionosphere builds daily energy bursts, but a serious cold front will act as a binder on the release of this energy, causing a stressed physical state.

The end result in the world of fish, will be a four to five feed rating instead of an eight to nine rating — perhaps, maybe, maybe not. Trying to stay optimistic. All bets are off.

One fact for sure will be...if fish need to feed, they'll wait for the warmest water temperatures of the day to hunt for food. And I am willing to wager it will be a snack instead of a full meal.

So might I suggest using a short, fat, and heavy-action during slow retrieve type bait, Carolina-rigged in order to keep it down along the lake bottom where the warmer temperatures will be until the cold surface water descends tonight and Monday.

More bad news: This current full moon has no nighttime cloud-cover, which always reduces any potential feeding fish during the daytime. Throw in the active bass spawning going on currently and finding a hungry bass will be very challenging.

Best Fishing Days: Fish have been feeding every three days over the past month, and with the current cold front I expect this to feeding trend to extend to a four day feeding pattern — doesn't mean no fish will feed on the three days in between, just that once a fish feeds, they're metabolism speed will not require food for the duration of four days. So the next cold front (slow-moving longer-duration almost-freezing front) is forecasted to arrive Thursday afternoon so Wednesday night-Thursday morning will be the next better fishing period.

Major Fishing Period: Today the moon underfoot period occur at 12:07 p.m. and solar noon at 12:37 p.m. and will create a feed intensity rating of 3-5 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Daily this period move later into the warmer water period (2-5 p.m.) of the day and will remain there regardless

Race team excited to compete in Rolex 24 At Daytona

DAYTONA BEACH – When it comes to past success and high expectations, you'd be hard-pressed to find a more heralded group of teammates than the Acura Team Penske lineup for the Jan. 26-27 Rolex 24 At Daytona.

As it has done seamlessly in the past, the team has brought together a diverse and accomplished group of drivers to contend for the season-opening trophy in the IMSA WeatherTech SportsCar Championship's annual twice-around-the-clock event.

Penske's high-achieving lineup this year features three Indianapolis 500 winners, a pair of IndyCar champions and some of the finest sports car competitors in the world.

The No. 7 Team Penske Acura ARX-05 DPi will be driven by three-time Indy 500 winner Helio Castroneves and 2017 WeatherTech **Championship Prototype** champion Ricky Taylor on a full-time basis, with help next weekend from 2016 Indy 500 winner Alexander Rossi, whose lone Rolex 24 appearance to date came in 2014 as part of the DeltaWing driver lineup. The No. 6 Team Penske Acura will again be driven full time this season by two-time Indy 500 winner and former NASCAR and Formula 1 star Juan Pablo Montoya and 2016 Weather Tech **Championship Prototype** champion Dane Cameron. Joining them for the Rolex is Simon Pagenaud, who won the 2016 IndyCar title with Team Penske. And judging by their time both in front of the cameras and in the garage during the recent Roar Before the Rolex 24 test weekend, the group has already begun to gel in an effort to land the big trophy in the season-opening event. "There are so many things we developed in the offseason and now hopefully we'll be able to deliver," Castroneves said. "Alex [Rossi] has joined us and good news is he's using the same seat as [last year's Penske driver] Graham [Rahal] so he 'fits right in.' Hopefully we'll get the results we deserve." Certainly, this race is an important part of Penske's illustrious racing contribution. He's won the Rolex three times, including overall in 1969 with the late Mark Donohue and Chuck Parsons. Last year, the two-car Acura Team Penske program returned to sports car competition full time

and placed ninth and 10th overall at Daytona. In qualifying, Castroneves put the No. 7 car on the outside pole position, and both cars ran competitively before midrace issues ended their hopes of winning.

Castroneves and Taylor scored the only victory for the team in its sports car return at the Mid-Ohio SportsCar Course in May. They led a 1-2 sweep for the team, with Montoya and Cameron's No. 6 entry crossing the finish line close behind.

A victory at Daytona this year would go a long way to setting the tone for a championship-contending season. Taylor was third and Montoya was seventh in the qualifying session that concluded the Roar and set the order for garage and pit selections.


held on for the 39-38 victory.

throws down the stretch. Christy Shank fell and hit her head but got up and made both of her free throws. Skylar did a nice job inside and I am just






excited to win. I thought we were done but the team didn't give up. It was a great comeback."

Rams' Goff always learning Los Angeles quarterback takes on Saints in NFC title game

THOUSAND OAKS, Calif. — Although Jared Goff is uncomfortable being overly nosy when he's around the NFL's best quarterbacks, he kept a close eye on Drew Brees while they were together at the Pro Bowl in Orlando last year.

The most prolific passer in NFL history had no problem sharing aspects of his mental approach and game-day preparation with Goff, who was eager for knowledge a few weeks after taking a loss in his first career playoff game for the Los Angeles Rams.

"I wasn't going to pry too deeply," Goff said. "But I'd ask him a few questions as far as his warmup, and things he does throughout the week."

While Goff admires Brees, Tom Brady and the other top quarterbacks of this era, he is more interested in the mental mechanics of their game than in their arms, achievements or trophies. Goff wants to know how they prepare, and he seeks out tips on film study, game-morning arm exercises — anything he can put into his own evolving approach to the game.

"The thing about Jared is that he's always looking to get better," Rams coach Sean McVay said. "He doesn't look at our record or his success and think he's made it."

Goff's rough rookie season has vanished into history as he heads into his first NFC championship game with the Rams (14-3) against Brees and the New Orleans Saints (14-3) today. While McVay clearly deserves

much of the credit for Goff's swift evolution from a struggling No. 1 overall pick into an above-average NFL passer, Goff's adaptability and eagerness to learn are just as important as his arm strength.

"I think I rely on a lot of the successes I've had, and understand that I didn't do that on accident," Goff said. "It's part of my process, and part of what I do routinely."

The same quarterback who went 0-7 as a rookie starter while getting sacked 26 times is now a two-time Pro Bowl selection at the helm of an elite NFL offense. The Rams have won their first back-to-back division titles since the 1970s during his two full seasons as their starter, and they earned their first playoff victory in 14 years last weekend. "You talk about a guy who stays evenkeeled," Rams receiver Brandin Cooks said. "He operates with such a quieted mind, no matter what's going on. The ebbs and flows of the game, he seems to stay even-keeled, and when you have that from your quarterback, that's special."

Despite his impressive success over the past two seasons, Goff still has more to prove than the other three quarterbacks playing this Sunday. Brees and Brady have accomplished nearly everything possible behind center, while Patrick Mahomes just completed a spectacular season that has left him the league MVP favorite.

Brees was happy to speak with Goff at last year's Pro Bowl even while knowing they were likely to be rivals atop the NFC for the next few seasons. Brees remembered Doug Flutie's willingness to mentor him in San Diego.

"I want to make sure that I pay it forward, just like those guys did with me," the 40-year-old Brees said.

Brees praises Goff as an outstanding passer and an emerging leader. He also sees intricacies to Goff's performances that others might not.

"You watch what they do with their offense, there's a lot of moving parts, and I think he handles it very, very well," Brees said. "I think he creates great timing and rhythm in the passing game." Goff was fourth in the NFL with 4,688 yards passing this season, and his 32 TD passes were sixth. Yet his season arguably peaked with his 413 yards and four TD passes in the Rams' epic Monday night victory over Kansas City in late November, leading into a December in which he didn't exactly distinguish himself.

In the Rams' final five regular-season games, Goff averaged just 228.2 yards per game with six TD passes against six interceptions and nine sacks. The Rams took two of their three losses all season during that stretch, with Goff memorably throwing four interceptions in the freezing cold of Chicago.

"It was a bad game or two, and I hate having to talk about it," Goff said. "But if (reporters) keep asking about it, you can call it three (bad games) if you want. If you're going to (criticize) three out of 16, I'm OK with that."

McVay also rejects the notion Goff had a slow finish to the regular season, noting the external perception of a quarterback's performance can be altered by something as arbitrary as a couple of tipped passes turning into interceptions instead of incompletions.

"I think everybody wants to make a big deal of the way that he was playing," McVay said. "I think in large part it's because he was playing at such an elite level, he almost became a victim of his own success. But he really didn't fall off at all. I think it was just some of those things that bounced one way or the other, and then defensive guys made some good plays."

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A scaled-down, but still angry, Women's March

Cold weather didn't stop Women's Marches across the nation

WASHINGTON - Amid internal controversies and a capital city deeply distracted by the partial government shutdown, the third Women's March returned to Washington on Saturday with an enduring message of anger and defiance aimed directly at President Donald Trump's White House.

The original march in 2017, the day after Trump's inauguration, flooded the city with pink-hatted protesters. The exact size of the turnout remains subject to a politically charged debate, but it's generally regarded as the largest Washington protest since the Vietnam era.

This year was a more modest affair for multiple reasons. An estimated 100,000 protesters packed several blocks around Freedom Plaza, just east of the White House, holding a

daylong rally. The march itself took about an hour and only moved about four blocks west along Pennsylvania Avenue past the Trump International Hotel before looping back to Freedom Plaza.

Organizers submitted a permit application estimating up to 500,000 participants even though it was widely expected that the turnout would be smaller. The original plan was to gather on the National Mall.

But with the forecast calling for snow and freezing rain and the National Park Service no longer plowing snow because of the shutdown, organizers on Thursday changed the march's location and route.

As it turned out the weather was chilly but otherwise pleasant, and the mood among the marchers a now-familiar mix of sister-power camaraderie

Mexican pipeline explosion kills 73, leaves nightmare of ash

Forensic experts attempt to separate and count charred heaps of corpses

Trump celebrates new citizens in Oval Office ceremony

WASHINGTON (AP) - On a day focused on his demand for a border wall, President Donald Trump used music and pageantry to welcome "the five newest members of our great American family" during a naturalization ceremony in the Oval Office.

In a ceremony Saturday that began to the strains of a violin and ended with a booming national anthem, Trump celebrated the five new Americans from Iraq, Britain,

South Korea, Jamaica and Bolivia.

"Each of you worked hard for this moment. You followed the rules, upheld our laws," the president said, stressing that they had arrived in the country legally.

A couple of hours later, Trump would unveil his offer to extend temporary protection to young immigrants brought to the U.S. illegally as children if Democrats would agree to fund the southern

border wall he promised as a candidate. Democrats quickly dismissed the plan as a "non-starter."

Trump introduced each of the new U.S. citizens, noting that some had come to the country with American spouses and some had children who were born here. To a woman from South Korea who came to the U.S. to pursue graduate studies and is now a university

Was a response to an attack on Somali forces

JOHANNESBURG -The U.S. military on Saturday said it had carried out its deadliest airstrike in Somalia in months, killing 52 al-Shabab extremists after a "large group" mounted an attack on Somali forces.

The U.S. Africa Command said the airstrike occurred near Jilib in Middle Juba region. There were no reports of Americans killed or wounded.

The U.S. statement did not say whether any Somali forces were killed or wounded by the al-Qaida-linked extremists. Al-Shabab via its Shahada news agency asserted that its attack on two Somali army bases killed at least 41 soldiers. It described the location as the Bar Sanjuni area near the port city of Kismayo.

There was no immediate comment from Somalia's government.

In neighboring Ethiopia, state television cited the defense ministry as saying more than 60 al-Shabab fighters had been killed and that four vehicles loaded with explosives had been "destroyed." Ethiopia contributes troops to a multinational African Union peacekeeping mission in Somalia and has troops there independently under Ethiopian army command.

A Somali intelligence officer said al-Shabab had been amassing fighters for more than a week to launch a major attack against Somali and Kenyan forces in order to disrupt a planned offensive against the extremists. The officer said some

suicide bombings and other attacks in the capital, Mogadishu, and elsewhere.

The Islamic extremist group claimed responsibility for the deadly attack on a luxury hotel complex in the capital of neighboring Kenya on Tuesday, the latest high-toll assault inside that county in retaliation for Kenya sending troops to Somalia to fight al-Shabab.

The extremist group finds itself under pressure at home on a number of fronts, including from a small presence of rival fighters linked to the Islamic State organization, which has begun challenging al-Shabab in recent months.

The United States has dramatically stepped up airstrikes against al-Shabab in Somalia since President Donald Trump took office, carrying out at least 47 such strikes last year. Some have targeted top al-Shabab leaders or key financial officials; the extremist group funds its attacks with an extensive network of "taxation" and extortion.

In October, the U.S. said an airstrike killed about 60 fighters near the al-Shabab-controlled community of Harardere in Mudug province in the central part of the country.

The airstrikes hamper the extremist group but have not "seriously degraded al-Shabab's capability to mount strikes either inside or outside Somalia," Matt Bryden of Sahan Research, an expert on the extremists, told The Associated Press after the Nairobi hotel attack.

Airstrikes alone cannot defeat the extremists. Bryden said, and must be combined with more ground-based attacks as well as a non-military campaign to win over residents of extremist-held areas. The U.S. on Saturday said it is committed to "preventing al-Shabab from taking advantage of safe havens from which they can build capacity and attack the people of Somalia."

Survivors: Up to 117 missing from sunken boat off Libya

ROME — Three survivors of a rubber dinghy that sank in the Mediterranean Sea off the coast of Libya say up to 117 other migrants were aboard at the time, a U.N. migration official said Saturday.

It appeared to be the latest tragedy on the dangerous central Mediterranean route from North Africa to Europe.

Flavio Di Giacomo of the International Organization for Migration (IOM) told Italian state TV that "unfortunately about 120" migrants were reported by survivors to have been on the overloaded smugglers' dinghy when it was launched from Libyan shores on Thursday evening.

"After a few hours, it began sinking and people began drowning," Di Giacomo said.

Among the missing are 10 women and two children, including a twomonth-old baby, he said. Survivors indicated their fellow migrants came from Nigeria, Ivory Coast, Gambia and Sudan, Di Giacomo said.

Italian President Sergio Mattarella, who has urged that the government show more compassion for migrants, expressed his "deep sorrow for the tragedy that has taken place in the Mediterranean."

Rescuers hope to reach Spanish boy in deep hole

MADRID (AP) — Authorities in southern Spain said Saturday they hope to soon reach the spot where they believe a two-year-old boy is trapped after falling in a deep borehole six days ago.

Angel Garcia, the leading engineer coordinating the searchand-rescue operation, said that they hope to get there in 35 hours — sometime Sunday — though that depends on everything "going favorably." Garcia said a drill is perforating a hole, after which two or three experts will be lowered in a cage so they can begin digging a horizontal tunnel to the location where they believe the toddler is. There has been no contact made colleague said.

was "shocked" at the reports of the sinking and vowed that Italy would continue to combat human traffickers.

Italy's populist government has banned private rescue boats from bringing migrants to Italian shores. Together with Malta, Italy has also launched probes of the rescue groups themselves, claiming their operations might facilitate trafficking.

The three survivors of the sinking were plucked to safety by an Italian navy helicopter on Friday afternoon, the navy said.

The Italian navy said when its patrol plane first spotted the sinking dinghy it had about 20 persons aboard. The plane's crew launched two life rafts near the dinghy, which inflated, and a navy destroyer

100 nautical away sent a helicopter to the scene. That helicopter rescued the survivors, two from

a life raft and one from the water, the navy said, adding that all had hypothermia.

Many migrants cannot afford to pay for life vests, an extra cost when boarding a smuggler's boat in Libya. The survivors said the migrants aboard the dinghy didn't have any.

It wasn't immediately clear exactly how many migrants might have died before the navy plane spotted the sinking dinghy.

The Italian Coast Guard says Libya asked a nearby cargo ship to search for survivors but the ship reported it found no one.

Libyan navy spokesman Ayoub Gassim said one of its boats was sent Friday to the scene but it "had a

mechanical issue and we had to call it back." The official said 50 migrants were believed to have been aboard the dinghy when it set sail.

According to the IOM, at least 2,297 people died at sea or went missing trying to reach Europe in 2018. In all, 116,959 migrants reached Europe by sea routes last year, it says.

The U.N. refugee agency UNHCR, said Saturday it was "appalled" at the news of the latest migrant deaths in the Mediterranean. In a statement from its Geneva headquarters, it said in addition to those missing off Libya, 53 people died in recent days in the western Mediterranean, where one survivor was rescued by a fishing boat after being stranded for more than 24 hours at sea.

Florida agriculture commissioner orders LGBT protections

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Florida Agriculture Commissioner Nikki Fried is adding sexual orientation and gender identity to her department's list of workplace protections against discrimination.

Friday's announcement means the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services will include LGBT employment protections along with those based on race, religion, ethnicity, gender, age and disability.

It is the first agency to extend protections to transgender employees and applicants.

Fried was sworn in earlier this month and is the only Democrat to hold a statewide office in Florida.

She said she's encouraging the state's other two Cabinet members to enact similar policies.

Man gets life sentence for killing 3 teens during robberies

WEST PALM BEACH (AP) – A Florida man has been sentenced to life in prison for killing three teens in robberies. The Palm Beach Post reports

that 20-year-old Joel Rodriguez was sentenced Friday after pleading guilty to three murder counts as part of a deal with prosecutors.

Authorities say Rodriguez fatally shot 18-year-old Dalton Dobkins at a Wellington home in November 2016. Rodriguez's half-brother, 22-year-old Augustine Ricardo Rivera, served as lookout for the robbery. He faced a life sentence for his involvement, but prosecutors settled for 20 years after his brother's guilty plea.

Officials say Rodriguez also killed 18-year-old Aaron Valle and 17-year-old Elijah Montas outside a Greenacres apartment several weeks after the first shooting. During that robbery, 19-year-old Carlos Amaya Hernandez was with Rodriguez. Hernandez has pleaded guilty to two counts of murder and awaits sentencing.

Woman gets 30 days in jail for crash that killed 2 people

FORT LAUDERDALE (AP) — A Florida woman has been sentenced to 30 days in jail for a drunken driving crash that left two people dead.

WPLG news reports that 55-year-old Judith Khouri was sentenced Friday as part of a

deal with prosecutors. She had been charged with a misdemeanor count of driving under the influence.

Police say Khouri ran a red light at a Lauderhill intersection early one morning in March 2017. Officials say she collided with another car. The crash left Benyamin Benyamin and Zafrit Ruvio Benyamin dead.

Tests showed Khouri had a blood alcohol level of 0.14 percent. Florida law considers a driver impaired at 0.08 percent.

The Broward State Attorney's Office says it had a difficult time proving that Khouri's drinking directly caused the deaths.

Man charged with underage sex with girl he met on Fortnite

FORT LAUDERDALE (AP) -Authorities say a Florida man had sex with an underage girl he met through the online video game Fortnite.

The Florida Attorney General's Office announced the arrest Thursday of 41-year-old Anthony Gene Thomas on charges including unlawful sex with a minor and child pornography. Investigators believe there could be as many as 20 additional victims.

Officials say the 17-year-old

victim initially had contact with a 23-year-old woman, who then introduced the victim to Thomas. Thomas and the woman arranged in August to pick up the teen in Brevard County and bring her back Broward County.

Law enforcement served a search warrant in October. Authorities say Thomas had pornographic images and videos of the victim on his phone.

No charges were immediately filed against the woman.

Spanish citizen found guilty of triple murder in Florida

FORT LAUDERDALE (AP) -A Florida jury has convicted a man for three murders in a case that is being closed watched in Spain.

The South Florida Sun Sentinel reported that after 22 hours of deliberation a jury found Pablo Ibar guilty on Saturday.

Ibar had previously been convicted of the 1994 murders of Casimir Sucharski, Sharon Anderson and Marie Rogers. A surveillance camera in Sucharski's Miramar home had captured the fatal shootings.

The state Supreme Court in 2016 granted a request for a retrial. The court concluded

that Ibar's lawyer should have hired an expert to question whether the murderer in a grainy surveillance camera video was actually Ibar.

Ibar was born in South Florida to a Spanish jai-alai player and only took Spanish citizenship after being initially convicted in 2000.

Shooting leaves 3 dead and 2 injured

JACKSONVILLE (AP) -Authorities in Florida are investigating a shooting that left three people dead and two people injured.

First Coast News reported that the shooting occurred in a west Jacksonville neighborhood early Saturday morning. A spokesman for the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office told local media that they believed it was a "murder-suicide."

The two victims were in critical condition according to the sheriff's office spokesman.

Before being transported to a local hospital, one of the victims told deputies the name of the suspect who shot her. The sheriff's office said that they believed that the suspect was found dead inside the home.

Authorities did not release any additional details about the suspect or the victims.

Suspended pairs skating champion dies at 33

John Coughlin, a twotime U.S. pairs champion recently suspended from figure skating, died by suicide in Kansas City, Missouri. He was 33.

U.S. Figure Skating released a statement Saturday and cited his sister, Angela Laune. The sister said in a Facebook post that her "wonderful, strong, amazingly compassionate brother John Coughlin took his own life. ... I have no words." There were no further details from her.

The Kansas City Police Department said in an email Saturday that officers responded to a call of a suicide at a house in the Country Lanes Estates neighborhood in Kansas City just before 5 p.m. Friday and found Coughlin's body. Sgt. Jacob Becchina declined to give specifics on the death.

Coughlin received an interim suspension from the U.S. Center for SafeSport





Wonder of wonders, in 1940, a lad called Sam "Sam Boy" Walton took a trainee job at a J.C. Penney store in Iowa. He got a lot of good training; however, 18 months later, Walton was drafted into the Army. In any event, by 1973, there were 2,050 J.C. Penney stores selling thousands of products and pumping profits. But that's when the troubles began, as the company realized it was competing with Wal-Mart and Sears, which were selling merchandise at discount prices. Then came the 1990s, with big-box stores such as Costco and Target, Circuit City and Best Buy. J.C. Penney's management fumbled. Then came Amazon.com, and its management stumbled. Along came similar e-commerce platforms, and its management bumbled. And as revenues dropped 40 percent in the past 12 years, J.C. Penney's store count imploded, falling from 2,050 to 850.

So, like Claire's, Toys R Us, The Limited, H.H. Gregg, Sports Authority, Aeropostale, Radio Shack, A&P and Sears, each of which is bankrupt, J.C. Penney (JCP-\$1.36) lacks the mojo to keep its doors open for another few years. During the past 10 years, JCP has tried appealing to a younger

Management has reasoned that with fewer stores and lower sales, the company won't lose as much money in future years. That's logical!

But now, new leadership has come, in the form of CEO Jill Soltau. Her past is riddled with 30 years of excellent retail experience, impressive product development and an important e-commerce skill set. The board believes that Jill's skills will be able to turn JCP around, helped by a sizable credit line that will give Jill the liquidity she'll need. However, I would hope she'd sell some of



JCP's numerous non-core assets before increasing debt.

Without someone of Soltau's experience, the possibility of a JCP comeback would make a sick cat laugh. However, I like this very classy lady's retail background, and I like her record of success. And most of all, I was impressed that the people at her previous employer (Jo-Ann Stores) spoke so highly of her.

Here's my suggestion: Take a humongous speculation and buy 1,000 shares of JCP at \$1.36. Wait 31 days, and then sell your 400 shares with a \$52.50 basis. There's a 38.7 percent degree of probability that Jill will turn JCP around and the shares will rise to \$6 by September.

Students mock Native American after rally

Boys were from an all-male Catholic high school and wore 'MAGA' hats

FRANKFORT, Ky. — A diocese in Kentucky apologized Saturday after videos emerged showing students from a Catholic boys' high school mocking Native Americans outside the Lincoln Memorial after a rally in Washington.

The Indigenous Peoples March in Washington on Friday coincided with the March for Life, which drew thousands of anti-abortion protesters, including a group from Covington Catholic High School in Park Hills.

Videos circulating online show a youth staring at and standing extremely close to Nathan Phillips, a 64-year-old Native American man singing

and playing a drum. Other students, some wearing Covington clothing and many wearing "Make America Great Again" hats and sweatshirts, surrounded them, chanting, laughing and jeering.

In a joint statement, the Roman Catholic Diocese of Covington and Covington Catholic High School apologized to Phillips. Officials said they are investigating and will take "appropriate action, up to and including expulsion."

We extend our deepest apologies to Mr. Phillips," the statement read. "This behavior is opposed to the Church's teachings on the dignity and respect of the human person.'

According to the "Indian Country Today" website,

Phillips is an Omaha elder and Vietnam veteran who holds an annual ceremony honoring Native American veterans at Arlington National Cemetery.

"When I was there singing, I heard them saying 'Build that wall, build that wall,'" Phillips said, as he wiped away tears in a video posted on Instagram. "This is indigenous lands.

We're not supposed to have walls here. We never did."

He told The Washington Post that while he was drumming, he thought about his wife, Shoshana, who died of bone marrow cancer nearly four years ago, and the threats that indigenous communities around the world are facing.

"I felt like the spirit was talking through me," Phillips told the newspaper.

The videos prompted a torrent of outrage online. Actress and activist Alyssa Milano tweeted that the footage "brought me to tears," while actor Chris Evans tweeted that the students' actions were "appalling" and "shameful."

A few corpses seemed to embrace each other in death. Lost shoes were scattered around a space the size of a soccer field, as were half-melted plastic jugs the victims carried to gather spilling fuel. Closer to the explosion, forensic workers marked mounds of ash with numbers.

On Friday, hundreds of people had gathered in an almost festive atmosphere in a field where a duct had been perforated by fuel thieves and gasoline spewed 20 feet into the air.

State oil company Petroleos Mexicanos, or Pemex, said the pipeline, which supplies much of central Mexico with fuel, had just reopened after being shut since Dec. 23 and that it had been breached 10 times over three months.

But in recent days, as the government cracks down on fuel theft rings, the gangs have punctured pipelines and invited locals to help themselves.

Tlahuelilpan, population 20,000, is just 8 miles from Pemex's Tula refinery. Pemex Chief Executive Octavio Romero said an estimated 10,000 barrels of premium gasoline were rushing through the pipeline with 20 kilograms of pressure when it was ruptured.

Giant rotating ice disk draws attention, visitors

WESTBROOK, Maine (AP) — Think of it as a crop circle, but in a river. A curious formation that's getting attention in Greater Portland is actually a spinning ice disk that is roughly 100 yards wide.

The formation in the Presumpscot River was widely shared on social media and has drawn comparisons to an alien spacecraft, a carousel and the moon.

The oddity drew a crowd that stood mesmerized by the slow-turning disk Tuesday afternoon in Westbrook.

The ice formation is believed to have formed naturally in a part of the river where there's a circular current that creates a whirlpool effect, said Tina Radel, the city's marketing and communications manager.

Locals say they've seen smaller ice disks before, but nothing like this one, Radel said.

Funds, Stocks and Diversification If I'm invested in mutual funds, do I need to invest

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in some individual stocks, too. to diversify further? - M.W., Columbus, Mississippi

Mutual funds alone can pro-Avide plenty of diversification especially if they're broadmarket index funds. An S&P 500 index fund, for example, spreads its shareholders' money across all (or a representative sample of the) 500 stocks in the S&P 500 index, from Apple to Zions Bancorporation. (If you're invested only in funds focused on one or two regions or sectors, though, such as Asia or biotechnology, you're not sufficiently diversified.)

The main reason you'd add individual stocks to your mix is to try to improve your portfolio's overall performance. If one stock among 200 in a mutual fund doubles in value, it might not make too big a difference to your bottom line. But if you invest 5 percent of your money in Scruffy's Chicken Shack (ticker: BUKBUK) and it doubles, your portfolio's value will increase by 5 percent.

Studying stocks and deciding which ones to buy (and sell) and when takes skill, though. You can start learning how at Fool.com/ how-to-invest. If you don't have the time or interest, just stick with low-cost, broad-market index funds that track the stock market's performance.

What does it mean when an investor "takes profits"? -R.T., online

It's when they sell a holding A that has appreciated in value. Imagine, for example, that you own shares in Buzzy's Broccoli Beer (ticker: BRRRP), and the share price has risen 30 percent since you bought them. That's great, but it's just a "paper" gain that will be higher or lower in a day or two. When you sell, you "realize" the gain, taking your profits.

Staying on Target

If you like the idea of your investments automatically getting more conservative as you approach retirement, consider making use of target-date funds, which are sometimes called life-cycle funds.

Generally, they're mutual funds that invest in a bunch 圈 of index funds. They dis-

tribute shareholder money across asset categories such as U.S. stocks, foreign stocks, bonds and cash. Each target-date fund has a year in its title — the year a shareholder would want to retire. So if you're 59 and hoping to retire in six years, in 2025, you could invest in a 2025 target-date fund from Vanguard, Fidelity or another major fund company. If you're, say, 24, hoping to retire at age 65 in the year 2060, you could put your money in a 2060 target-date fund. (Many 401(k) plans feature target-date funds.)

Target-date funds adjust their holdings over time, typically shrinking stock holdings and

adding more bond holdings as the target date approaches and their shareholders near retirement. Consider, as examples, the Vanguard 2025 and 2060 funds. The 2060 fund is designed for young adults, and has about 88 percent of its assets in stocks, and just 10 percent in bonds. The 2025 fund, though, is about 61 percent in stocks and 37 percent in bonds. (The remaining 2 percent in each fund is in cash and other investments.)

These funds are clearly convenient, freeing you from having to reallocate your assets over time. They're not perfect, though, and they're not all alike, either. A Fidelity 2060 fund, for example, recently had around 85 percent of assets in stocks, 7 percent in bonds and 8 percent in cash.

When shopping for target-date funds, seek those with low fees and the kind of asset mix you want. If you aim to retire in, say, 2030, you can always invest in a 2035 fund in order to be a little more aggressive, or a 2025 one to be more conservative. Remember that each target-date fund will perform a little differently, too.

My Dumbest Investment

Out of Ink

So far, my biggest mistake has been doubling down on 3D printing stocks. I bought into Stratasys, ExOne and 3D Systems in mid-2014, a little before the big drop began. After one was accused of misleading investors in its financial statements and the stock dropped 30 percent, dragging down the others with it, I bought more of each, thinking they would bounce back. But then another company announced disappointing earnings and dropped 25 percent, dragging down the others with it. I bought in again, thinking the deal was too good to pass up.

Each stock has been repeatedly disappointing. I keep waiting for the industry to begin to deliver value instead of hype, but it will be a long climb before I can come close to breaking even for any of these picks. - Randall, Florida

The Fool Responds: 3D printing is a prime example of a new technology that got lots of investors excited and hopeful, with many buying shares well before there was established and substantial consumer demand — not to mention dependable profitability.

While some have soured on the industry at this point, others see it as simply being still early in the game, and expect future profitability from 3D printing in the health care realm, among others.

Whenever you think about doubling down on a fallen stock, it's smart to first do a lot of research confirming the likelihood of a rebound.

Blue Skies

Stiff competition and overcapacity in some of its markets have recently been holding back JetBlue Airways' (Nasdaq: JBLU) unit revenue growth. Revenue per available seat mile (RASM) rose just 2 percent in the first nine months of 2018, while JetBlue's average fuel price shot up 34 percent. This has shrunk both profit margins and expected earnings.

The outlook for 2019, though, is better. First, JetBlue has eliminated a variety of underperforming flights, redeploying that capacity into its most profitable markets. The company has also increased its bag fees and some other fees, which are starting to have a positive impact, with RASM expected to rise 2.4 percent in the fourth quarter.

Meanwhile, cost trends are set to change dramatically in 2019. The market price of jet fuel has plunged about 25 percent in recent months, and JetBlue is planning to add seats to each of its A320s. It has reduced staffing needs by upgrading airport kiosks, too. Thus, JetBlue's profit margin could improve significantly this year. Further refinement of its route network, additional cost savings and the introduction of a "basic economy" seating class could boost profit margin further in 2020.

JetBlue is poised to keep growing its earnings beyond 2020. Its stock may not be a screaming bargain, but it's appealingly priced for longterm believers and at least deserves consideration for your watch list. (The Motley Fool has recommended JetBlue Airways.)




name on my degree because this degree is also for my parents, although both have since passed. So, which last name should I use for my degree? — UNSURE IN TEXAS



-Turn off the water when brushing teeth and use a cup or glass to rinse. — Heloise





US average mortgage rates steady

WASHINGTON — U.S. long-term mortgage rates held steady this week, after falling for six straight weeks to reach their lowest levels in nine months.

Mortgage buyer Freddie Mac said Thursday the average rate on the benchmark 30-year, fixed-rate mortgage was unchanged from last week at 4.45 percent.

Rates remain far above last year's levels, however. The key 30-year rate averaged 4.04 percent a year ago.

The average rate for 15-year fixed-rate loans edged down to 3.88 percent from 3.89 percent last week.

The decline in home borrowing rates in recent weeks has been a spur to prospective homebuyers, reflected in a





MELBOURNE, Australia — It was all a bit overwhelming for the latest opponent who could do nothing to slow Serena Williams at the Australian Open. So Dayana Yastremska, an 18-year-old from Ukraine, found herself wiping away tears as she walked to the net.

Williams knows what it's like to be the one weeping after a loss. She put her right hand on Yastremska's shoulder and consoled her by saying, "You're so young. You did amazing. Don't cry." Then they embraced, and Williams patted Yastremska on the back.

"I could tell she was quite upset. I kind of liked that. It shows she wasn't just there to play a good match — she was there to win. She wanted to win. That really broke my heart," Williams said. "I think she's a good talent. It's good to see that attitude."

Maybe she will be tested in the fourth round, because no one has come close to making her work too hard so far, including the 6-2, 6-1 victory on Saturday.

Next up, though, is a far more accomplished player, No. 1-ranked Simona Halep, who took control by reeling off six consecutive games in one stretch and advanced by beating Williams' sister, Venus, 6-2, 6-3.

After two tough three-set tussles, Halep had a much easier time of things, making only 12 unforced errors while Venus had 33. Halep played with her left thigh taped, but moved around the court well.

"She played pretty flawless," said Venus, who exits before the fourth round at a fifth consecutive Grand Slam tournament.

Looking ahead, Halep said: "It's going to be a bigger challenge. I am ready to face it."

She's lost eight of her past nine matches against Serena.

Saints-Rams coaching matchup features

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — The only defense the Kansas City Chiefs played most of this season was, well, in defense of their own defense, which gave up so many yards and points that it became a running joke around the league.

Yes, the Chiefs scored in bushels. They also allowed points in bunches.

The fact that they spent most of the season coughing up 30 points and 400-plus yards per game came despite the fact that they excelled at sacking the quarterback. They finished with 52 of them, tied for the NFL lead, thanks primarily to the trio of Chris Jones, Dee Ford and Justin Houston.

Yet things began to

change in Week 17, when the Chiefs shut down the Oakland Raiders in a game they needed to win to secure the No. 1 seed in the AFC. And when critics claimed that the Raiders were playing for nothing, the Chiefs backed it up with a defensive gem in the divisional round against the Colts.

Now, that suddenly stingy defense gets its biggest test Sunday against Tom Brady and the New England Patriots.

At stake: A trip to the Super Bowl, the first for the Chiefs in 49 years.

So what changed? How did a Swiss cheese defense that was torched by the Patriots for 43 points in a Week 6 loss in Foxborough suddenly turn into a steel curtain, and just in the nick of time?

"In the last couple of

games, the three things we've done is we've limited the explosive plays, we've done a really solid job of tackling and we've had one defensive penalty in two weeks," Chiefs defensive coordinator Bob Sutton said. "Those three things allow you to function and go."

Take each one in order. In the Chiefs' four losses this season, they allowed four plays of 40-plus yards and 21 plays of at least 20 yards. Seven of those came in a particularly dismal defensive performance against the Rams, who ultimately won a 53-50 shootout at the Coliseum in Los Angeles.

But the Chiefs didn't allow a single play over 15 yards against Oakland, and didn't allow the

Running on fumes Indians fall flat in fourth game in five days

■ GOLF **Mickelson maintains advantage at Desert Classic**

LA QUINTA, Calif. (AP) — Phil Mickelson made three long birdie putts on the back nine Saturday to take a two-stroke lead into the final round of the Desert Classic.

Making his first start of the year, the 48-year-old Mickelson shot a bogey-free 6-under 66 on the Stadium Course at PGA West to get to 22-under 194.

"I don't know what to say," Mickelson said. "I played OK and my goal or game plan of playing the Stadium Course is to actually hit drivers and to try to bomb it down there as close to the greens as you can. ... It seemed to play out OK and I gave myself a lot of good chances. I missed a few short putts ... but I also made a couple of long ones that were nice little bonuses.'

He topped the leaderboard for the third straight day after matching his career-low score with an opening 60 at La Quinta Country Club and shooting a 68 on Friday on PGA West's Nicklaus Tournament Course.

"It's so fun," Mickelson said. "I just love being in contention, having a chance to win, being in the final group, feeling the nerves, feeling that excitement, the opportunity. It's just, it's really fun."

The tournament winner in 2002 and 2004, Lefty rolled in a 35-foot birdie putt on the par-3 13th and added a 12-footer on the par-4 14th. After missing a 10-foot try on the par-5 16th to spoil an up-and-down bid from the deep greenside bunker, he ran in a 25-footer on the island green, par-3 17th called Alcatraz.

Adam Hadwin was second after a 65 on the Nicklaus layout. The Canadian has three straight top-six finishes in the event. He was second in 2017 after a third-round 59 at La Quinta and tied for third last year.

"Living in Phoenix these past few years, this is the golf that I play every day," Hadwin said. 'The greens are exactly what we play back in Scottsdale. So I would assume that might add to some of the comfort. It's really hard to pinpoint. For whatever reason as soon as I get down here in the desert I start playing some good golf."

Mickelson is making his first tour start since early October and first competitive appearance since beating Tiger Woods in Las Vegas in November in a made-for-TV event. The Hall of Famer won the World Golf Championships-Mexico Championship last year for his 43rd PGA Tour title and first since the 2013 British Open. After opening with five

straight pars, he chipped in for

birdie on the par-3 sixth and birdied the next two.

"Every once in a while you just need that little putt, chip, something to fall and give you a little momentum," Mickelson said. "I followed that with two more birdies, so that was kind of the shot that ignited that little run and got the round going.'

He'll be back on the Stadium Course for the final round.

"It's a course you don't have to be perfect on, you have to hit a lot of good shots in certain spots, but if you miss it, miss it properly, you can still play this course," Mickelson said. "I feel like I don't have to be perfect, I can come out, play aggressive, which is how I like to play, try

to crush drivers and get it down as close as I can to the greens and see if I can make some more birdies.'

Adam Long was third at 19 under after a 63 at La Quinta, and Steve Marino had a 67 on the Nicklaus layout to get to 18 under. Defending champion Jon Rahm was tied for seventh at 16 under.

Ko, Ji share LPGA lead at Lake Buena Vista

LAKE BUENA VISTA, Fla. (AP) – Lydia Ko could only think about the putts that didn't go in, perhaps because she was used to making so many.

Ko ran off four birdies on the front nine Saturday for a 30, and it was enough to carry her to a 5-under 66 and a share of the lead with Eun-Hee Ji going into the final round of the season-opening Diamond Resorts Tournament of Champions on the LPGA Tour.

Ji also was hot early, and a pair of birdies early on the back nine gave her a 66.

They were at 13-under 200. Brooke Henderson of

Canada was poised to make it a three-way tie at the top until she made bogey on the par-3 closing hole for a 69, leaving her one shot behind. Nelly Korda had an eagle and four birdies for a 65 and was two shots off the lead.

Stacy Lewis, in her first tournament as a mother, bounced back from a 74 to post a 66. She was six shots behind.

"Honestly, if I could finish this thing under par for four days, I was going to be happy," Lewis said. "I've hit some good chip shots, I've hit some good putts. I feel like the touch and the feel is coming back. I still hit some weird golf shots, which is fatigue, I think, more than anything. Got pretty tired toward the end of the round yesterday. Just really happy where things are."

Kenneth Temple is a devout New Orleans Saints fan. Ask him a question about his beloved team, and the first words from his mouth are "Who Dat? Who Dat?"

Still, Temple, a noted chef who has cooked for several NFL players, including Malcolm Jenkins, Brandin Cooks and All-Pro receiver Michael Thomas, recognizes there are three other teams remaining in the playoffs. So when Hormel Chili asked him to create dips for the Super Bowl, he dived right in with versions that reflect not only New Orleans, but New England, Los Angeles and Kansas City

"The beautiful thing about it is chili and football go hand in hand," Temple says,

noting Hormel was a partner other items and, voila. with the NFL as far back as the 1950s. But his chore for now is to accommodate four distinctly different tastes as part of a contest in which fans will include touchdown dances; a winner and a guest will get tickets to the 2020 Super Bowl in Miami.

"Chili is versatile, but you can't throw everything in it," he says. "Don't want it to be intimidating."

First, the Big Easy.

"I had to make sure I represent the culture right, being from New Orleans," he says. "Nobody wants to eat shrimp with their chili, they don't go together. So what to do?

Temple quickly came up with an answer: red beans. Add in some onions, celery and bell peppers, sausage, creole seasoning, a few

"I was thoroughly impressed with it," Temple says. So he rolled on to LA.

"The fun thing about Los Angeles is it's such a large melting pot, so you don't know which culture to pull from to represent the area," he explains. "I came across a Felipe's restaurant known for their chili, they do annual giveaways. So we paid homage to the Latin culture."

Which meant a touch of cilantro and some jalapenos. Next stop, Kansas City, renowned for its barbecue. As in his LA chili, no beans for this creation.

'My wife is from Kansas City and we went on a barbecue tour of about eight spots recently, so I knew I wanted to play with the burnt ends," Temple says.

"That is what they do well and people wait on line for."

This recipe included the flavor of a Kansas City barbecue sauce, which Temple says is "spicier and bolder than I expected. I am used to more of the sweeter side of barbecue."

He wanted the smokiness of the burnt ends to blend in, but urges folks to mix the meat into this dish, not to simply put the burnt ends on top and chow down.

Finally, he tackled New England, knowing that, like in New Orleans, clams or lobster wouldn't quite work.

"Boston baked beans," he exclaims. "That's a savory sweet payoff, and because you can use a variety of baked beans, I can imagine you will get a lot of different flavors with it."

Temple recently gave

cooking lessons to Vikings star receiver Adam Thielen. Indeed, the dance contest emanates from some of Thielen and his teammates' touchdown celebrations. From now through Super Bowl Sunday on Feb. 3, 2019, fans can submit their best touchdown dance via social media by tagging @ HormelChili on Facebook, Instagram, or Twitter.

Temple and Thielen created a Minnesota chili.

"I told Adam that I am the chef, so this is my side of the field," Temple says with a hearty laugh. "But when I have an engagement with whomever I am cooking with, I want him to throw out some ideas and we bounce them back and forth - especially with people who do not get a chance to cook too many times."

Tampa Bay Rays finalize signing of Avisail Garcia

ST. PETERSBURG – Avisail Garcia is confident the disappointing dropoff in production from his 2017 All-Star performance to last season was the residual of a significant hamstring strain and ongoing right knee issues.

So with his hamstring healed, his knee surgically repaired in early October and the resulting bad habits eradicated from his swing, Garcia is confident he

can return to his old form with his new Rays team.

"One hundred percent," Garcia said Friday night, after his deal for \$3.5 million, plus up to \$2.5 million of plate-appearance based incentives, was finalized. "For sure. I know what I can do. I know my swing. I've just got to be healthy and ready to go. And that's how I am right now."

Garcia, 27, was non-tendered by the White Sox after making \$6.7 million for an inconsistent 2018 showing in which he hit

a career high 19 homers but posted only a .236 average, .719 OPS and 0.3 WAR while limited to 93 games.

"I was fighting the whole season with injuries, up and down, up and down," he said. "You know how it is when you play with pain; sometimes you feel good and sometimes you don't.'

In 2017, Garcia, whose first name is pronounced ah-veesigh-EEL, hit .330 (second in the AL) with 18 homers, .885 OPS and 4.6 WAR.

A righty hitter, Garcia is expected to play rightfield or DH against lefthanded pitchers, against whom he has a career .304 average and .816 OPS, and compete for playing time vs. some righthanders, already working on hitting more to right-center. His outfield play has gotten mixed reviews though he has a strong arm.

Garcia, a Venezuelan who lives in Miami, said he was excited to join the Rays because they "are a competitive team, they play hard, they are close to

my home."

To create a roster space, the Rays, for the second time this off-season, designated for assignment RHP Oliver Drake.

Drake, who pitched for a single-season record five teams in 2018 (Brewers, Indians, Angels, Blue Jays, Twins), was claimed off waivers from the Twins Nov. 1, then DFA'd Nov. 20. The Blue Javs claimed him, then turned around and DFA'd him Dec. 30, and the Rays re-acquired him for cash considerations on Jan. 4.

George's four-point play lifts Thunder past 76ers

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Paul George converted a four-point play with 5.1 seconds left, sending Russell Westbrook and the Oklahoma City Thunder to a wild 117-115 victory over Joel Embiid and the Philadelphia 76ers on Saturday.

George's clutch shot capped a wild finish that included another memorable exchange with Westbrook and Embiid. Westbrook hit the floor out of bounds under the basket after a foul by Embiid late in the game, and Westbrook fouled out with 14.9 seconds remaining after he got Embiid while shooting a 3-pointer.

Embiid made all three foul shots, tying it at 113, and Jimmy Butler's driving layup put Philadelphia in front with 6.9 seconds to go. But George drained a 3 while being fouled by Butler and made the foul shot.

Philadelphia had one last chance, but Butler missed a 3-point attempt in the final seconds. The 76ers have lost 19 in a row to the Thunder.

George finished with 31 points, six rebounds, five assists and three steals. Westbrook had 21 points, 10 rebounds and six assists for Oklahoma City, and reserve Dennis Schroder also

scored 21 points.

Embiid had 31 points, eight rebounds and six assists. JJ Redick scored 22 points for Philadelphia, and Ben Simmons finished with 20 points, 15 rebounds and nine assists.

Hornets 135, Suns 115

Kemba Walker scored 21 points, Jeremy Lamb hit threepoints and had 18 points and the Charlotte Hornets beat the Phoenix Suns 135-115 on Saturday for their third straight victory.

Charlotte shot 54.5 percent from the field and made 16 of 34 3-point attempts in the wireto-wire victory en route to its season-high points total.

Bismack Biyombo had 11 points and 13 rebounds, and Willy Hernangomez added nine points and 13 rebounds to help the Hornets outrebound the Suns 53-26.

Coltsa play over 30 yards. In fact, Indianapolis didn't score on offense until late in the fourth quarter.

Their success in limiting big plays is, at least in part, a byproduct of improved tackling.

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) — RJ Barrett scored 30 points, Zion Williamson had 27 and No. 1 Duke beat No. 4 Virginia 72-70 on Saturday night to give the Cavaliers their first loss of the season.

Cameron Reddish hit a free throw to make it a four-point game before Hunter hit a jumper before the buzzer for Virginia.

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

Will your fiscal house stand strong?

Editor's note: This article is the final installment of a three-part series.

If you look at our country's early history, one could argue many of our successes came at the misfortune of the British Empire. The same could be said about the success of our most prominent stock exchange, the New York Stock Exchange.

In the 17th century the East India Company had a monopoly on trade and therefore, were well established. Many people purchased shares of stock in hopes of benefiting from the company's profits. This inspired many entrepreneurs to "set up shop" and sell shares of stock for their new ventures. Many of these businesses failed and people owning shares of stock lost money. This caused the government of England to have a knee-jerk reaction and

ban the sale of any stock until 1825.

This created a huge opportunity for the NYSE, which "officially" formed in 1817. America was open for business. Countries around the world came to our shores to buy and sell stocks and bonds.

Businesses need capital to grow and the stock market was a place to raise capital. These enterprises could sell equity in their firms (shares of stock) or borrow money from investors through the sale of debt instruments (bonds). The NYSE soon became the center for global economic trade and it held that prominence for 150-plus years. Even though this global marketplace was burgeoning on a street named "Wall" in Manhattan, the vast majority of Americans had little knowledge it existed. This was mainly due to the fact that it didn't affect their everyday lives. It wasn't until the 1980's when the stock market became well known on Main Street.

Prior to 1981, most all retirement plans were "defined benefit plans," commonly known as pensions. These plans were established by large companies such as General Electric and Sears Roebuck & Company. Investment decisions and the subsequent risk involved, rested solely on the shoulders of the company. However, that all began to change with the introduction of the 401(k) plan in 1981.

The 401(k) or defined contribution plan is owned and managed (directly or indirectly), by the individual investor. For the first time, the Average Joe had to make investment decisions regarding his retirement assets. There was pressure for the Average Joe to understand the stock market better due to the fact that the risk of loss was laid squarely on his shoulders, rather than the shoulders of his employer.

Those early adopters of 401(k) plans who took on investment risk were handsomely rewarded. The period from 1982 to 2000 was known as the Millennium Boom, the largest stock market boom ever. It is a modern example of that old Chinese proverb, "Pearls don't lie on the seashore. If you want one, you must dive for it."

Due to the success many investors experienced within their retirement accounts, scores of Americans began investing non-retirement funds in the stock market as well. This coincided with the expansion of media outlets reporting business news. Readily accessible information about the stock market educated

PARIS — One by one, European Union nations are spending millions, hiring thousands of workers and issuing emergency decrees to cope with the increasingly likely possibility that Britain will leave the bloc on March 29 without a plan.

A no-deal Brexit could shake up the rest of the continent in ways that many Europeans haven't yet fathomed, from snarled air traffic to paralyzed ports and millions of workers in legal limbo.

France is spending 50 million euros (\$57 million) to beef up security at airports and the Eurotunnel, and hiring hundreds of extra customs officers.

Portugal is opening special airport lanes for British travelers, the nation's main source of tourists. The Netherlands is scouring for qualified veterinarians to carry out new checks on live imports. Germany is fast-tracking a debate on solving bureaucratic problems if there is no Brexit deal.

Governments from Europe's Atlantic Coast to the Black Sea are preparing rules for British citizens to live and work in their countries once they no longer enjoy EU residency rights ---and hoping that Britain is doing the same for their citizens.

Britain, which would face by far the biggest disruption, has devoted thousands of civil servants and several billion pounds (dollars) on measures to mitigate the worst effect — although officials can only speculate about what will actually happen on March 30 if Brexit happens without a deal.

After the British parliament overwhelmingly rejected British Prime Minister Theresa May's Brexit divorce deal this week, other governments are bracing for chaos, too.

"We strongly believe" Britain will leave with no exit deal, French Prime Minister Edouard Philippe announced Thursday, unveiling a raft of emergency measures to cope with that prospect. "Under these conditions,

our responsibility ... is to ensure that our country is ready, that the interests of our citizens are preserved and defended."

The French government will build new infrastructure and hire new staff at airports and ports - and the tunnel beneath the English Channel. The company that operates the Eurotunnel says a quarter of all U.K.-EU trade passes through the tunnel, which could be a major chokepoint in a no-deal Brexit.

France's emergency decrees will temporarily let British companies transport goods in France, and allow certain British insurance and other financial activities to continue in France despite Britain's loss of access to the EU financial market. The exceptional transfer of military equipment between the two countries will also be allowed.

In Berlin, German lawmakers debated a bill Thursday that aims to solve bureaucratic issues arising from Brexit.

"We want to keep the damage and there will certainly be damage from Britain's departure — as small as possible," German Chancellor Angela Merkel said Wednesday. "That's why we will of course do everything to find an orderly solution, but we are also prepared if there is no orderly solution."

Portuguese Prime Minister Antonio Costa said Thursday that 80 percent of British tourists arrive at airports in Faro, the Algarve and Funchal in the Madeira Islands, where dedicated lines for them will help prevent delays.

Dutch authorities say they are hoping for the best and preparing for the worst. The customs service is hiring some 900 new staff. The food and animal welfare authority is scouring southern and eastern Europe for qualified vets to carry out checks on live imports.

The government has set up an online Brexit counter and checklist for Dutch companies doing business with Britain — some 35,000 of which have no experience of dealing with countries outside the EU single market.

the general public and increased investor confidence. People fear what they don't know. The more people learned about the stock market, the less they feared it. Experiencing a solid return on investment helped to fuel that fire as well.

According to the Stern Business School at New York University, from 1928 to 2013, the S&P 500 had an average annual return of 9.55 percent. Over the long term, a well diversified portfolio of stocks such as the S&P 500 typically outperforms not have enough time

other investment vehicles such as Treasury Bills, Bonds and Certificates of Deposit.

The key words in that previous sentence are "over the long-term." Having a long investment time horizon is essential to realize a return similar to the S&P 500. It begs the question, "what if I don't have a long time horizon?" This is a question that troubles many retirees.

Romanian leaders have sought to reassure the estimated half a million Romanians living in Britain that they won't be left in the lurch — but haven't provided specifics. Romania currently holds the EU's rotating presidency.

The Czech Republic and Slovakia are working on legislation to deal with the short-term rights of British citizens in a no-deal Brexit, while the Dutch will let British citizens living in the country remain for 15 months and offer them the chance to apply for residency permits.

In Britain, the government announced Thursday it's putting military reservists on standby for permanent service in the event the country leaves without a divorce deal. It's also recruiting hundreds of extra customs officers and border staff and has passed laws to help cross-border trade continue to flow, such as permits for long-distance truckers. Many
