## Five dead in bank shooting

## Sebring SunTrust targeted by single suspect, now in custody

SEBRING — What started as a normal Wednesday turned tragic for SunTrust Bank employees and their customers at 1901 U.S. 27. The day would end with five people killed and Zephen Xaver, 21, of Sebring in custody.

Sebring Police Cmdr. Curtis Hart was the lead public information officer for the incident and was assisted by Highlands County Public Information Officer Gloria Rybinski.

"At approximately 12:36 this afternoon, the Sebring Police Department and the Highlands County Sheriff's Office responded to SunTrust at [U.S.] 27 and Tubbs Road, Sebring in reference to a subject calling [911] and stating that he had fired shots inside the building," Hart said. "Once a viable perimeter was set around the bank, negotiations continued. We did breach the bank with the Highlands County SWAT team. At that point the subject did give up and come out. He has been arrested."

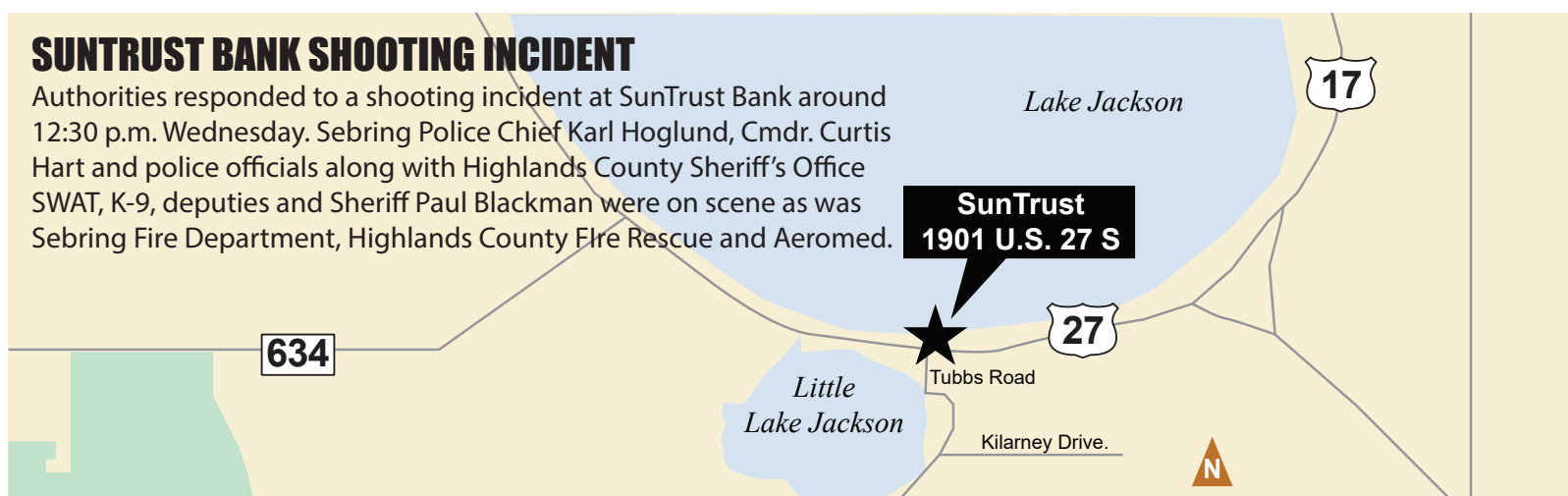
According to a Sheriff's Office press release, the shooter said to the 911 dispatcher, "I have shot five people."

Hart said the suspect was unharmed and he could not attest to the suspect's mental health.

Area hospitals were contacted and put on standby, and Aeromed from Tampa General Hospital was also on scene. Highlands County Emergency Management Services ambulances responded to transfer the injured to local hospitals, according to Rybinski.

### SUNTRUST BANK SHOOTING INCIDENT

Authorities responded to a shooting incident at SunTrust Bank around 12:30 p.m. Wednesday. Sebring Police Chief Karl Hoglund, Cmdr. Curtis Hart and police officials along with Highlands County Sheriff's Office SWAT, K-9, deputies and Sheriff Paul Blackman were on scene as was Sebring Fire Department, Highlands County Fire Rescue and Aeromed.

## Suspect has no local arrest history, multiple Facebook pages

SEBRING — Zephen Xaver, 21, of Sebring, was arrested Wednesday by local authorities for allegedly shooting and killing five people at SunTrust Bank, 1901 U.S. 27 South, in Sebring.

An examination of his three Facebook pages shows multiple pictures of grim reapers, but it does not appear that he has an arrest history as an adult.

The Highlands County Clerk of Courts did not show a criminal history for Xaver.

According to reports on wtsp.com, the Florida Department of Corrections said Xaver was hired by the Avon Park Correctional Institution as a trainee on Nov. 2, 2018 and resigned Jan. 9. He reportedly

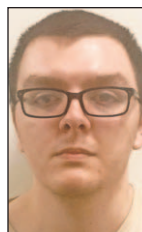
had no disciplinary issues during that time.

When the Highlands News-Sun called Bremen Police

Department in Bremen, Indiana, where Xaver had lived previously, an employee said, "No criminal records were found for Zephen Xaver as an adult." He did have a former address within the city limits of Bremen.

The Highlands County Sheriff's Office released a mugshot of Xaver, and his shirt had a picture of grim reapers riding on horses.

Xaver had three Facebook pages, and the one for Sebring only had eight friends on the page.

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# Rescue operators conduct training at AP Air Force Range

AVON PARK — When lives are on the line, there is no margin for error — and for a group of Air Force Combat Search and Rescue (CSAR) personnel, their razor-thin, life-saving operations were recently put to the test as they mobilized to Avon Park Air Force Range.

During their pre-deployment “spin-up” training, Moody’s 347th Rescue Group tested and maximized their CSAR and personnel recovery capabilities. Under normal circumstances, the HH-60G Pave Hawk helicopter crews and maintainers deploy from Moody and normally integrate with a Guardian Angel team from a different base.

This time, Moody’s 38th and 41st RQs’s (rescue squadron) will deploy together and utilize this exercise to improve their mission readiness and unit cohesion before their departure.

“The purpose of the combined 41st Rescue Squadron, 41st Helicopter Maintenance Unit, and 38th Rescue Squadron ‘spin-up’ training is to prepare the units for the types of operations they will encounter while deployed,” said Lt. Col. Kevin Geoffroy, 41st RQS deployed detachment

commander. “This spin-up is particularly special because the 41st and 38th Rescue Squadrons are planning to deploy together to the same location for the first time in a very long time. They have to be ready to execute their mission on their first day in theater and remain on alert until they come home.”

More than 100 rescue operators, maintainers, and support airmen simultaneously worked together to identify and overcome challenges to maximize mission success while minimizing and mitigating risk. Utilizing Moody’s Avon Park range complex, they familiarized themselves with drop zones, weapons employment ranges, and military operations in urban terrain training villages.

“The ‘spin-up’ exercise is the perfect opportunity for the (347th Rescue Group) to train at our peak to perfect our mission,” said Capt. Jesse Reynolds, 41st RQS HH-60 pilot. “The Department of Defense views (Combat Search and Rescue) and

personnel recovery as a critical mission and the (AF CSAR) solely provides this day-in and day-out. Every day, we wake up and try to perfect our mission because down-range, you can’t try to perfect it, you have to just do it.”

Throughout the exercise, 347th RQG leadership constantly echoed the message that performing routine joint training events with the group’s weapons systems helps ensure personnel are ready for their most important mission — saving lives.

In both dusk and dawn, rescue operators scrambled to the flightline for recovery missions and to conclude the event, the entire group participated in a mass casualty evacuation scenario.

"We are so sorry to receive this news," AdventHealth Sebring Director of Marketing Cathy Albritton said. "Our hearts go out to their families and the community. The ER is standing ready. The trauma unit is ready. Surgeons and medical staff are here and ready."

Lindsey Pierson, marketing director for Highlands Regional Medical Center, echoed Albritton's response.

A press conference held at 4:30 p.m. Wednesday at the Sheriff's Office confirmed the worst: Five people were killed inside the bank. Gov. Ron DeSantis opened the briefing along with Sebring Police Chief Karl Hoglund and Highlands County Sheriff Paul Blackman.

"It's a horrible day for Sebring, Highlands County and the state of Florida," DeSantis said. "People of Florida stand with the community here in light of the circumstances."

He promised help directly from the state with the investigation.

Hoglund was audibly affected when he talked about the fate of the five people inside the bank.

"At least five victims were senselessly murdered as a result of his actions," Hoglund said.

He went on to thank local authorities and the state resources made available to his department. He said the identity and ages of the victims have not been released and authorities are notifying next of kin.

The crime scene was still being processed. Another

news conference is set for 11 a.m. Thursday.

A reporter on scene spoke to Victor and Deanna Sparks, who said they alerted authorities to the incident.

At about 12:35 p.m. Victor Sparks said he walked up to the front door of SunTrust Bank. He said he was going to make a deposit and reached for the bank door and found it was locked. He said he peered inside and saw people laying on the floor and someone walking around in front and among them. Victor Sparks said he turned and walked away from the bank, adding it was "sort of scary" because as he did he heard a big bang. He said he and his wife called 911 and cops were on scene in two minutes.

Hoglund, Hart and other police officials, SWAT, K-9, sheriff's deputies and Blackman responded to the scene as well as Sebring Fire Department and Highlands County Fire Rescue. Florida Highway Patrol assisted with traffic.

A Florida Department of Law Enforcement spokeswoman said the FDLE is providing assistance in the investigation, to the Sebring Police Department, with agents and analysts. FDLE forensic scientists helped to process the crime scene.

U.S. 27 was shut down between Lakeview Drive and Golfview Road with only law enforcement being allowed in the area for several hours. The incident forced the lockdown of several area schools.

"Everyone is on lockdown," Lelia Currence, general manager of Residence Inn by Marriott in Sebring, said Wednesday afternoon.

"Guests are safe and secure in their rooms. When we saw police officers, we locked the doors."

The Sheriff's Office asked employees and family members of anyone who was at the SunTrust branch during this incident to go to Inn on the Lakes.

"We are deeply saddened by the tragic shooting at our Sebring, Florida branch this afternoon," said Brian Rogers, SunTrust chairman and CEO. "We are working with officials and dedicating ourselves to fully addressing the needs of all the individuals and families involved. Our entire team mourns this terrible loss."

Services provided through the state's Division of Victim Services include assistance with paying medical bills, funeral expenses, lost wages, grief counseling and more.

"Our focus is on helping the family members of the victims of this horrific attack receive the support they need in this extremely difficult time," Attorney General Ashley

Moody said. "I spoke to Sheriff Paul Blackman and FDLE Commissioner Rick Swearingen offering any and all resources our office can provide to help in the aftermath of this tragedy. [We] are praying for the victims of this attack and for the brave law enforcement officers who responded to the scene."

Rep. Cary Pigman, R-Avon Park, was saddened by the news.

"I am deeply saddened to learn of the tragic events that occurred today in Sebring. My prayers are with all those who were affected by this senseless act of violence," he said. "Unfortunately, we have learned five innocent people lost their lives today. I want to send my most sincere condolences to the loved ones who must now live with the loss of a loved one taken too soon."

"I am heartened by the courage shown by our first responders that brought an end to this horrific situation," Pigman said. "Their brave action directly resulted in preventing any further

loss of life. We are in communication with local officials on the ground and will receive updates as they come in."

"Today's tragedy in Sebring is another senseless act in which five innocent lives were horrifically lost, and a sobering reminder of the impact that gun violence has on our communities," state Agriculture Commissioner Nicole Fried said.

"As we wait for more details to surface, we praise our courageous law enforcement professionals, and we stand with the victims and their families to ensure they have the support they need in this

traumatic time," she said. Congressman Greg Steube, R-Sarasota, also expressed his sympathy for the families affected by the shootings.

"My thoughts and prayers are with the victims of today's tragic shooting in Sebring. We will stand by law enforcement as they continue their investigation. Thank you to Sheriff Blackman and the brave men and women of Highlands County Sheriff's Office. To the people of Sebring, we are with you."

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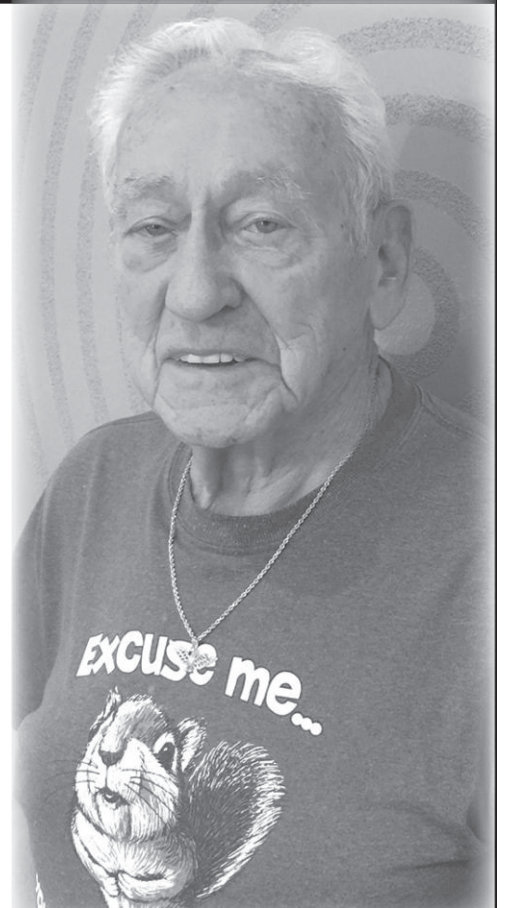

## Storm shelters: Tough decisions still to be made

In the 16 months since Hurricane Irma blew through, Sarasota County officials have checked off 78 of 93 items on their post-storm to-do list.

Two of the remaining 15 will be particularly difficult, though, and both are critical to the welfare of residents in our area.

The first is the need to hammer out a solid agreement between Sarasota County and Charlotte County over protection and shelter of Charlotte residents during an emergency. Talks are still going on and we remain hopeful that an agreement can be reached that provides solid shelter for those in need – no matter where they come from – and properly reimburses communities that provide this critical service.

It's an issue that cannot be put in the low-hanging fruit basket. So it will take time.

The second item is the need for a strong hurricane-proof shelter convenient to the Venice-area population. North Port has plenty of shelter space, thanks to their newer, stronger school buildings, their inland location and geography. To the north, Sarasota also has a sufficient number of new school buildings that double as hurricane shelters.

Venice, though, does not, and that was made clear when Hurricane Irma terrorized Florida in September 2017.

In response to local demand, Venice city officials opened the city-owned Venice Community Center before Irma hit. They took in hundreds of people.

It was a best-option for many, for those who couldn't or wouldn't go farther away to an official, county hurricane-hardened school building. For many, it was better than sheltering at home.

But it was far from optimal. The Community Center was relatively vulnerable. Nothing bad happened – Irma was far less powerful than initially feared. But the “what-if” question lingered. And, afterwards, city officials were stung by critics who thought they improperly exposed people to potential disaster.

We supported the city's action. At the time it seemed compassionate and appropriate, given the unique, overwhelming circumstances of Hurricane Irma. But all now acknowledge it can't happen again.

The solution is new shelter space in the Venice area.

Where, is the question.

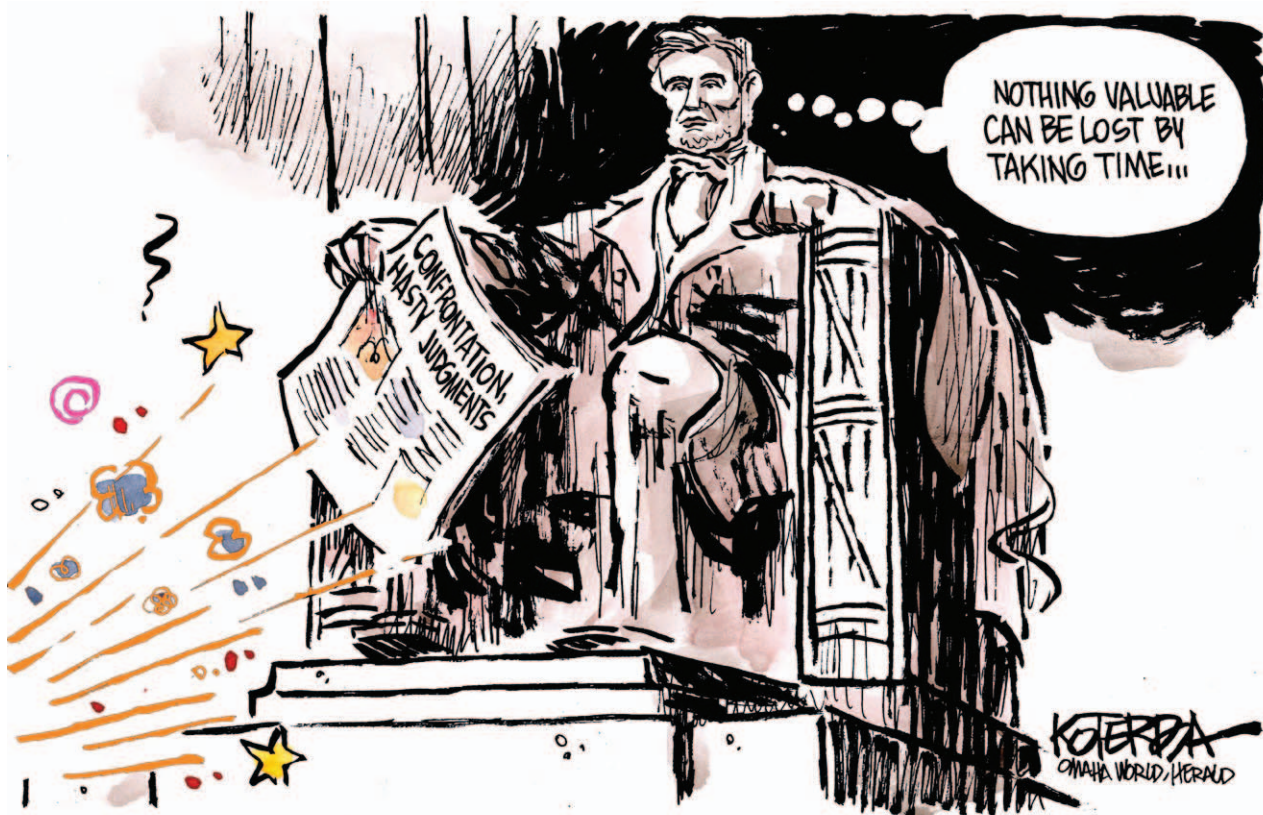
It would be a horrible waste of money to build a standalone hurricane shelter-only building. Venice island is out. Adding to or hardening an off-island school building may be possible.

The best option, now under consideration, may be adding a large space to the new Sarasota Memorial Hospital being built on Laurel Road near Interstate 75 in Nokomis. That option was discussed at a recent meeting of the Sarasota County Commission.

Commission Chairman Charles Hines, who lives in Nokomis, said the large meeting space onsite would be “a huge benefit” for the hospital. And, obviously, the public. It would serve a dual purpose, to be used in rare emergencies as a shelter. Funding could come from the county (or other sources), but also the hospital, which is a public system supported by county taxpayers.

This is a creative, viable option that should be pursued. It's a potential solution to one problem – the need for a hurricane shelter – that adds value to another public facility, the hospital. It's in a convenient location – just off the interstate and close to the large Venice population. It also could be a relatively efficient use of public money for something that all agree is badly needed.

## When it looks like winter

Last weekend's blustery weather made me comment how much it looked like winter. “Makes sense,” replied Mr. Harris. “Technically, it is.”

joints in which to settle. The grass may have been a carpet of green under the pines and hardwoods lining the highway, but it was clear that winter was on the way. “Oh my gosh, it feels and smells just like the Great White North,” I remarked. Mr. Harris quickly agreed. “It's the cold rain.”

“I need a sweatshirt,” I insisted, heading back to the car.

“What are you going to do when we get to Texas?”

“That humongous suitcase which almost gave you a hernia has plenty of clothes,” I shot back. “I plan to wear all of them if

necessary.”

Petrichor is the term for the smell following rainfall and I've always enjoyed that in Florida. It's like inhaling a cool sensation of greenery, water and all that's right in the world. This cold rainfall was not sunshine and light, but rather a hint of cold to come.

We were surprised by a forecast of snow. The last time we found ourselves covered in frozen white stuff was about a decade ago. Our daughter's first experience with fluffy precipitation, it was what I refer to as movie snow.

Flakes fell languorously, weaving about the air as they slid through the sky around us. Landing in the gloved hand as a tiny white doily, each circle was a marvel until it melted moments later. It showered about an hour, leaving several inches of confection. Easily rolled into a snowball, it was the snow stuff of dreams.

In Texas, the sleet and snow thankfully moved through before we arrived and our days were sunny and in the 60's. We hiked a bit and still discovered pockets of snow clinging to rocks and shaded areas of soil.

Our daughter has since seen flurries and is making use of her long underwear when temperatures dip into the low digits. Ever try to find women's long underwear in Florida? Yeah, us neither and until recently, there was no need to search it out. She had never even seen such garments, but we did find a few options at Bass Pro Shop.

It seems Florida doesn't much care for winter or winter garments and that's perfectly fine by me. I'll take a chilled, stiff breeze with a shot of sunshine over an endless expanse of grey topped with foam any day.

## Put Florida first and end the shutdown

As Americans, we have some basic, reasonable expectations. Among them: our food should be safe to eat, our businesses should be able to operate, our workers should be paid for their labor, and our government should function effectively.

That shouldn't be asking too much.

Yet as the federal government shutdown extends past the four-week mark, even those basic expectations aren't being met – and that's beginning to have real impacts on our state.

Agriculture is Florida's second-largest industry, with 47,000 commercial farms creating \$132 billion in economic impact. Our state's farms support 2 million jobs, export more than \$4 billion in agricultural products to 164 countries, raise more than 1 million head of cattle, and are the nation's leading producers of tomatoes, grapefruit, squash, sugarcane, and – of course – oranges.

Yet when we should be supporting our farmers and the food they grow, this shutdown is harming them and creating

unacceptable risks.

The shutdown's closure of the USDA Farm Service Agency means that farmers can't access loans, grants, insurance, and other federal assistance – including disaster claims.

As we speak, Florida's farmers impacted by Hurricane Michael can't file for or receive disaster relief. They're waiting for help that no one can assure is coming.

Florida's shellfish industry is experiencing delays with its \$108 million in exports, as the federal office issuing permits is closed. Meanwhile, there is no federal oversight of shellfish facility inspections. Just as Florida's shellfish industry is recovering from devastating hurricanes, the shutdown is impacting their ability to do business, sell products, and feed families.

The safety of food grown and produced in Florida is critical – yet right now, up to 1,074 food manufacturing facilities in Florida deemed high-risk may be missing scheduled FDA

inspections. And when inspected food samples are found to be unsafe, our state government lacks the authority to initiate recalls, typically a federal responsibility. If there's a food safety emergency, key federal staff have been furloughed, hindering our Department's ability to respond to foodborne illness outbreaks.

The longer-term risks from a continued shutdown are just as serious.

Florida's school lunch and breakfast programs available to 2.9 million students are funded through March – but without federal funding beyond then, our Department may be forced to ask local school districts to foot the bill. Funds for our Emergency Food Assistance Program have already been exhausted.

Our state's crops face a \$120 billion annual threat from exotic pests and diseases – but federal funds to pay the hundreds of Department employees who inspect our state's citrus crops for devastating diseases are almost gone.

Tens of thousands of

federal workers who call Florida home – including 4,500 Coast Guardsmen – are going without pay, wreaking havoc not only on their lives, but on our state's and nation's economy.

This federal government shutdown is costly. It's unnecessary. It makes us less safe, less prosperous, and less secure. Its consequences could touch every Floridian before it's over. And it needs to end now.

President Trump and his backers in Congress need to do the right thing, end the shutdown, and let our government get back to work for the people – including funding the billions in joint ventures and programs administered by the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

Those concerned with defending “the wall” should be equally concerned with defending our state, our people, and our interests – because Floridians expect better than this.

# Shooting grabs response from activists

## Florida Moms Demand Action, Everytown respond to the SunTrust shooting

SEBRING — Wednesday's SunTrust shooting, according to gun law activists, may be the first mass shooting of 2019 with five deaths.

In the wake of the event, even as law enforcement officers investigate the scene and victims' advocates comfort families of the five people killed, the Florida chapter of Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense in America, part of Everytown for Gun Safety, has expressed its sorrow at the event and a call for greater gun control legislation.

"I am heartbroken to hear about the shooting at SunTrust Bank, yet another reminder of the reality that no space in America is safe from the

threat of gun violence," said Gay Valimont, volunteer leader of the Florida chapter of Moms Demand Action. "While we mourn for the lives taken from us today, we must also recommit to taking action to make our state safer. We will keep the victims of this senseless shooting in our hearts as we fight for stronger gun laws to keep our families safe."

Everytown for Gun Safety reports, by its research, that this appears to be the first mass shooting of 2019. Everytown defines mass shootings as those in which four or more people are shot and killed, excluding the shooter.

However, the Gun Violence Archive at gunviolencearchive.org has recorded several incidents involving as many as three deaths.

According to its website, Florida has experienced five mass shootings since Jan. 1, including Wednesday's shooting at SunTrust Bank. The other shootings occurred in Tallahassee (Jan. 1), Jacksonville (Jan. 16 and 19), and Miami (Jan. 20).

Sebring joined those cities on Wednesday. Other out-of-state incidents with three or more deaths occurred this month in Houston, Texas; Hurt, Virginia; and Torrance, California, where three were killed and four injured, gunviolencearchive.org stated.

Wednesday's incident was the first this year with five deaths, the archive stated.

Everytown for Gun Safety also reports this as "at least" the 193rd mass shooting since January 2009.

His Bremen, Indiana, Facebook page lists hundreds of friends.

On two of his Facebook pages, his Facebook profile had pictures of a grim reaper. One of the posts states, "God is busy right now, may I help you?" The background image that corresponded with the post showed a monster in the dark.

One of his Facebook pages indicated he liked the musical group I Killed the Prom Queen and the Facebook group Horror that Rocks, a page that pays tribute to horror movies. Many of the images and things Xaver liked related to death.

On Xaver's Facebook page, he listed several organizations that he liked. One of those organizations was Dysfunctional Veterans. The page said, "Share if you're sick of political correctness." It also listed posts such as, "I love it when people in

40k cars wanna road rage. I have an \$800 car, I'll kill you both."

In a review of the Dysfunctional Veterans Facebook page, one reviewer mentioned the website was meant to help veterans but lately commenters were bullying on the page.

Another reviewer said, "I have become numb to offensive memes and or comments because of this page ... so if that is a problem in your life keep scrolling and eventually it won't be."

A woman who identified herself as Xaver's ex-girlfriend on her Facebook page, made the following post Wednesday: "If anyone has seen the news about my ex killing 5 people. Please do not ask me to talk to you about it. I am devastated. I've been crying all day."

Xaver had approximately 400 friends on

his Indiana Facebook page. As of Wednesday night progressed, those Facebook friends appeared to be progressively unfriending Xaver. As of press time, his friends list had dropped to around 330.

Xaver had attended Stevens-Henager College, which has campuses in Utah and Idaho. However, he attended online.

The college issued an official statement: "We are reviewing what we are allowed to disclose on students while following federal FERPA guidelines. What we can disclose is that Mr. Xaver enrolled in our online program in September of 2018 and withdrew in December of 2018. We will be issuing a statement following guidance from the regulations."

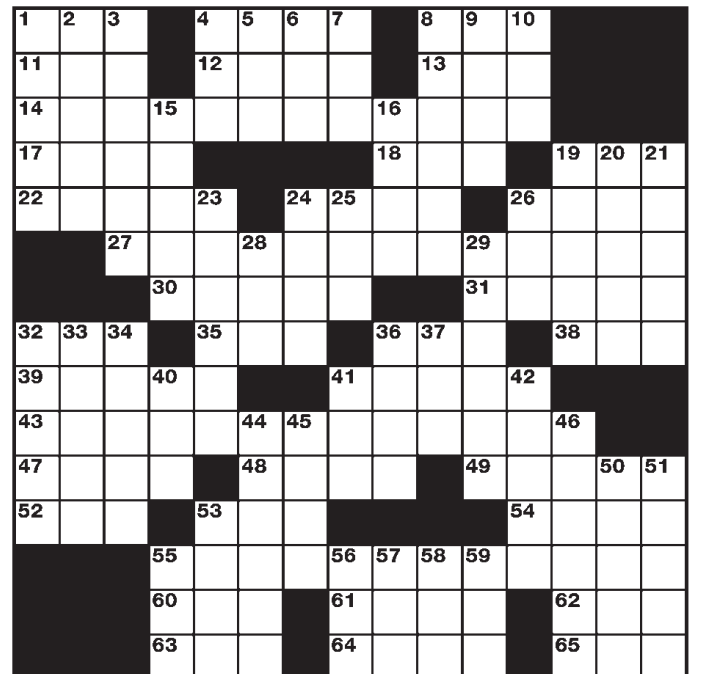

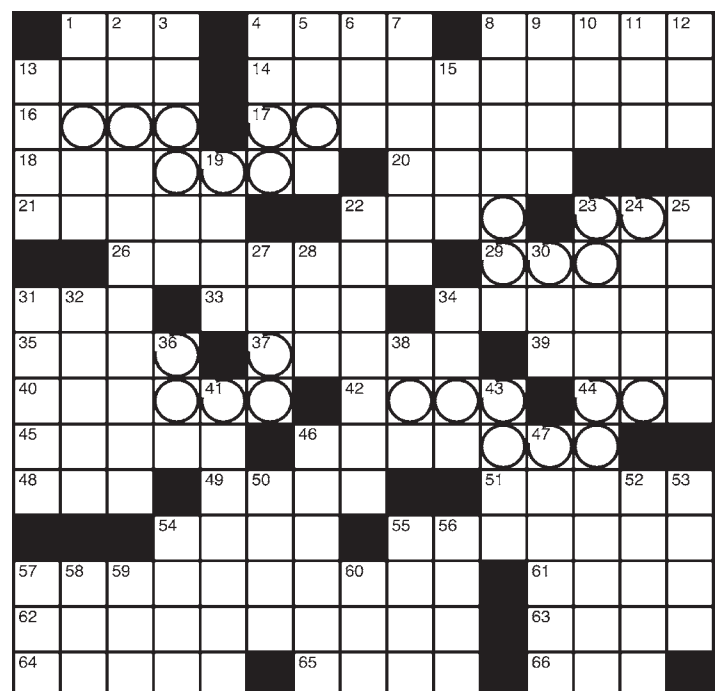

We have some kids that can run so we are trying to keep it down and not put air under it so we can take advantage of their legs."

The Panthers are focused on team goals.

"Our whole premise this season is that it is not about one single person, that is about all 18 of us," Falla added. "We

want to accomplish the goals of all 18 and rather than individual goals. They all have individual goals that they want to accomplish but we are focusing on the team goals that we are working towards. We want 350 strikeouts from our pitching staff this year, that is our goal. Doesn't matter how it happens but we want to get there. We want a certain amount of doubles and triples, we have overall goals we are working towards. Our goals will last the duration of the season and at the end we will see if we met our goals."

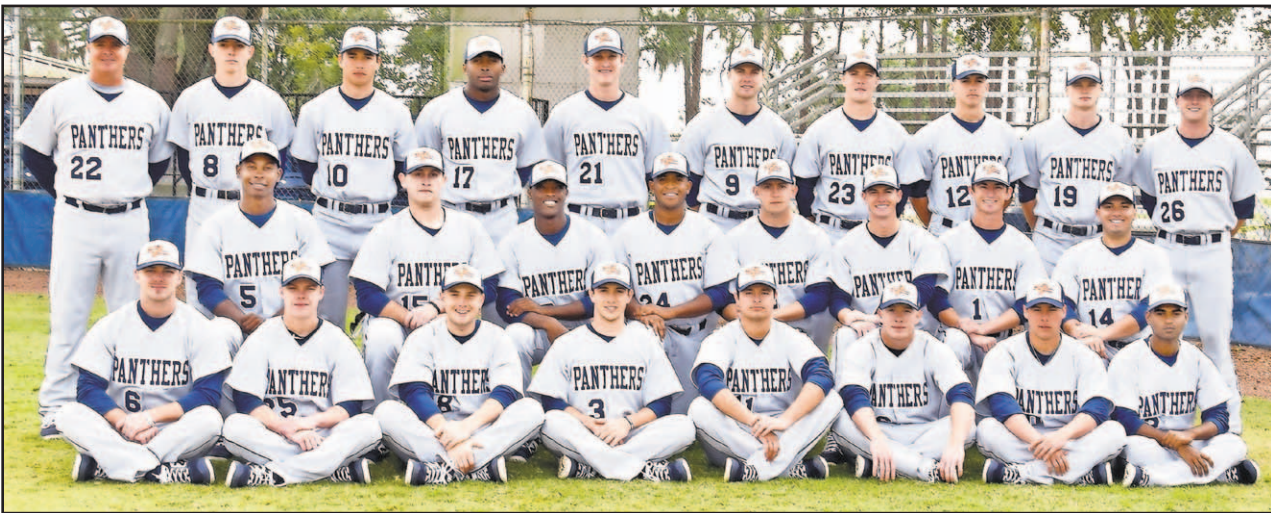

## Vonn hopeful she can ski again

### Former World Cup champion battles injuries

Lindsey Vonn isn't quite done yet. The most successful female skier in World Cup history said Wednesday that she remains "hopeful" she can fix her ailing knees and race again. She just doesn't know when — or if — that will be possible.

"I'm taking things day by day and we will see what happens," Vonn wrote on Instagram. "I know that I might not get the ending to my career that I had hoped for, but if there is a chance, I will take it."

Vonn said the reason she had "so much pain and muscle shut down in Cortina was due to an impact injury to my peroneal nerve."

"This most likely came from the final jump on the first training run in Cortina, but it's hard to know for sure," Vonn added. "After that training run, the pain got progressively worse each day and by Sunday my lower leg was in a lot of pain."

Vonn, who hadn't raced all season because of a left knee injury, finished no better than ninth in three races in Cortina. Vonn has 82 wins — most among women — and four less than overall record-holder Ingemarm Stenmark of Sweden.

After Garmisch, her next scheduled competition is the World Championships in Are, Sweden, which

open on Feb. 5. Vonn had been planning to retire in December following races in Lake Louise, Alberta, where she has won a record 18 times. If she is able to race again this week, Vonn's skis are waiting for her.

"I have just arrived in Garmisch and set up my ski room," Heinz Haemmerle, Vonn's longtime ski technician, told The Associated Press. "The skis are ready whatever she's deciding. That's why I am here. Otherwise I could stay at home."

Vonn had returned to action in Cortina following an injury to her left knee — she hyperextended it and sprained a ligament while training in November. Also, her right knee is permanently damaged from previous crashes.

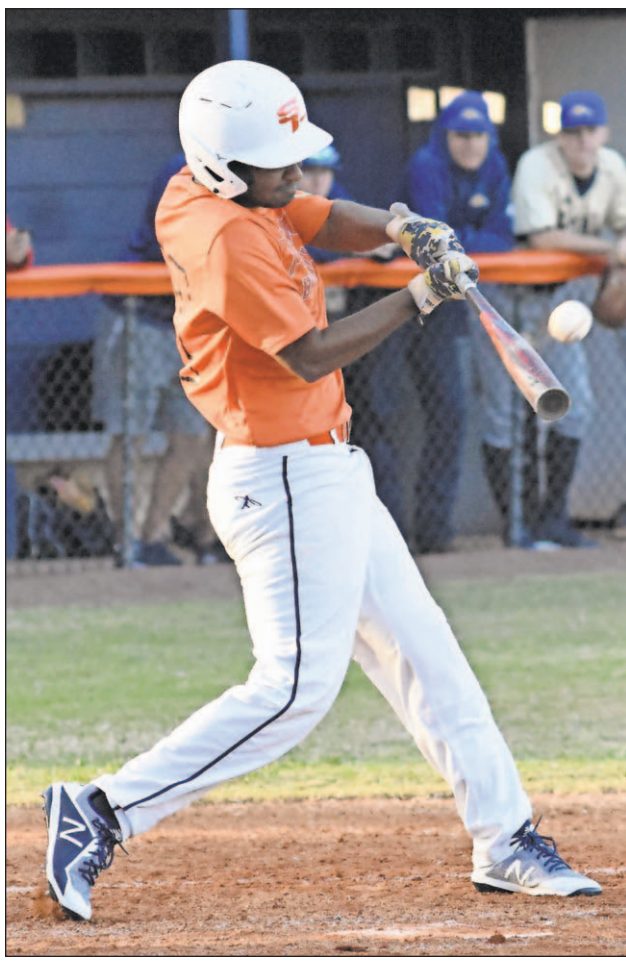

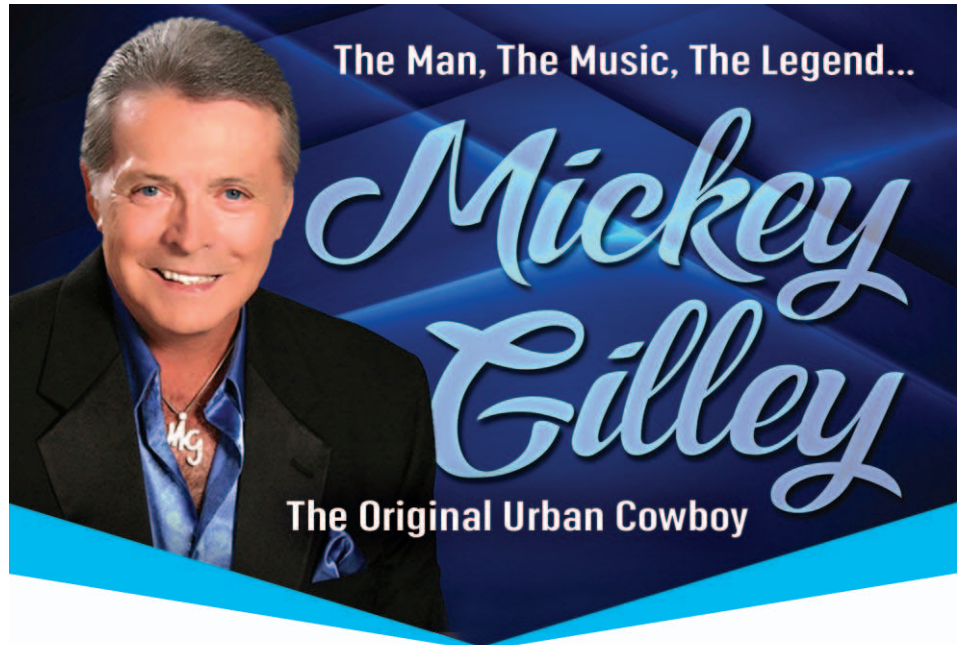
those areas but we feel confident that we will be a club that can do things offensively. We are just not sure how extensive yet. We have some guys that can show some pop but we

LAKE PLACID — Here's a trivia question: Do you have to own a pickup truck to eat at the Smoke Shack BBQ at 123 U.S. 27 North in Lake Placid? The answer is "No, it's just a coincidence that every morning there's a ton of trucks parked in the parking lot."

Actually, no matter what you drive, you'll still get the same friendly service and great food at the Smoke Shack. They open at 6 a.m., except on Sunday. Monday through Wednesday it's breakfast and lunch until 3 p.m. Then, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, dinner is served until 8 p.m. as well.

Jason Roberts introduced his award-winning barbecue to Lake Placid in 2013 and operated out

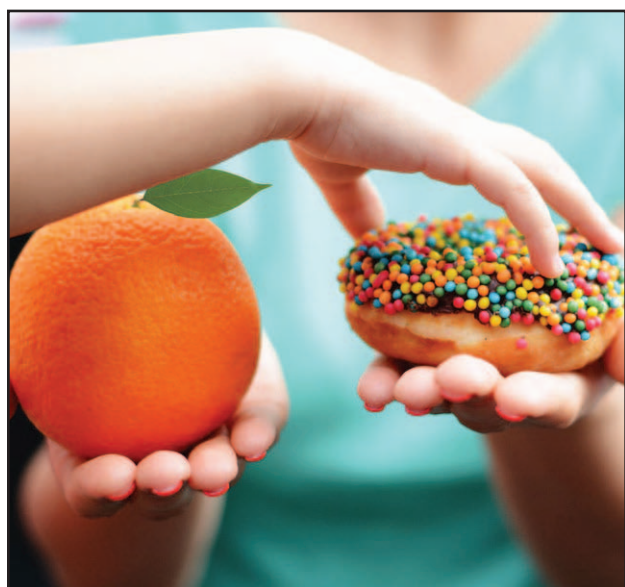

## Is your child's school promoting healthy habits or junk food?



STATEPOINT

Junk food marketing regularly takes place in U.S. schools, and such advertising is taking a toll on children's health.

STATEPOINT

Fast food coupons used as prizes, candy sale fundraisers, vending machine exteriors – these are just a few examples of the kinds of junk food marketing that regularly takes place in U.S. schools, and such advertising is taking a toll on children's health, say experts.

"Fortunately, significant progress has been made nationwide to provide nutritious meals and snacks in cafeterias, vending machines and school stores. However, continued marketing of junk food at school can undermine these improvements. Over time,

those messages being marketed shape children's food preferences, purchase requests, diets and overall health," says Cheryl Anderson, PhD, nutrition chair, American Heart Association.

To help make the schools in your community a place where children can thrive, consider these suggestions from The Voices for Healthy Kids Action Center, a project of the American Heart Association.

• **Healthier Fundraising:** Is your child's school hosting a fundraiser? Get involved and help organize fundraising efforts that don't involve the sale of junk food.

Instead, focus on selling fruit, plants, jewelry or gift items. You could even help organize an event like a walk-a-thon or dance-a-thon that raises money while getting the community moving.

• **Learning Life Skills:** Some schools have classroom units on nutrition and critical thinking. Talk to your school's administration about implementing educational programming to help students identify junk food marketing in their own school and community and discuss how it impacts them.

• **Advertising Audit:** Despite its prevalence, commercial advertising is

usually not a substantial source of revenue for schools. Ninety percent of school officials note that school programs and activities would not be reduced if advertisements of unhealthy food ceased, according to Voices for Healthy Kids. Find out if the junk food marketing taking place in your school district directly contributes to educational programming. If so, ask for healthier food and beverage products to be marketed instead.

• **Speaking Out:** Get involved by calling school board members and school administrators, or

# Top tips for trying new wines

Are you ready to add something new to your standard wine repertoire? To help expand your palate, two-time James Beard Award winning sommelier, Belinda Chang, is offering some expert insight into one of her go-to varietals.

"Fans of Pinot Noir should consider its hip French relative, Beaujolais, made from the Gamay grape which is still relatively unknown among American wine drinkers," says Chang. "And like Pinot Noir, Gamay is a thin-skinned grape that generally produces bright wines with low tannins. These wines tend to exhibit red fruit and berry notes, spices from good French oak barrels and earthy characteristics."

While they are quite similar, Gamay grapes are grown in the Beaujolais region in the southern-most part of Burgundy. Beaujolais differs from northern Burgundy in growing temperatures, soils and other factors.

"If you're looking for a delicious quintessential and easy-to-drink French wine, the Louis Jadot Beaujolais-Villages (\$13.99) is a good one to take home," says Chang.

Louis Jadot is one of the most venerable wine houses in Burgundy and the number one French wine in the U.S. Known for a vinification process that balances tradition and technology, their wines are affordable and versatile. They can be enjoyed by the glass

or paired with a variety of meals. (If you prefer white wines, Jadot also produces an unoaked Chardonnay, Macon-Villages (SRP: \$14.99) and a dry, crisp Rosé (SRP: \$13.99) – two good choices for warm weather.)

"Most sommeliers will confess that the Beaujolais on their wine lists are go-to recommendations to pair with anything on the menu and please every palate at the table. And, I confess that when it comes to a daily drinking red, instead of a ponderous Cabernet Sauvignon or a

monster Malbec, I always want a slightly chilled, juicy Gamay," says Chang, who recommends serving the Château de Jacques Moulin-à-Vent (SRP: \$28.99) when you really want or need to impress your guests.

So, exactly how do these wines hold up to food? "What grows together, goes together is a mantra that always works," says Chang. "Look to the locals for inspiration. When it comes to Gamay and Beaujolais, you'll find yourself in the company of some of the best chefs and

eaters in the world. This is Burgundian cuisine after all, which means coq au vin, boeuf bourguignon and even époisses – the world's greatest stinky

cheese." According to Chang, Beaujolais is one of the most food-friendly wines on Earth, in part due to the natural acidity of Gamay grapes.

Bottom line: these wines make a perfect match for brunch items, grilled meats, buttery pastries topped with anything and much more.

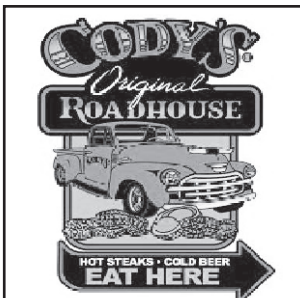

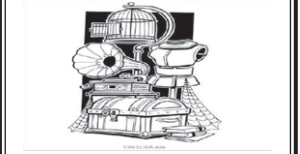

But, how do you go about finding a good butcher?

An old-fashioned butcher in your neighborhood might not be leveraging the internet and social media to advertise services, so you might have to use old-fashioned methods to find a butcher shop.

The next time you're at the farmers' market, ask the vendors which

butchers they'd recommend. Call the nearest fine dining restaurant and ask if you can find out where they source their meat (most good restaurants use local suppliers). Ask a reputable caterers or personal chefs about where they get their best cuts of meat. Your Yellow Pages might point you to clues about where to find a local butcher, too. So will asking a farmer in your community where his or her animals are prepared. Even the older ladies at your church probably have a good lead on a local butcher because they're the smart ones who've been getting a soup bone every week for the last forty years.

When you find a butcher, there are some questions you'll want to ask him or her.

• Where do your animals come from? If

the butcher doesn't name a number of local farms, keep digging until you find out if the meat is factory-farmed.

• Are the animals grass fed and organic? Find out if the animals are fed corn. Ask if they are pasture-raised and organic. The best quality of meat you'll find is organic, grass fed and local.

• Do you do all of the butchering yourself? Ask the butcher if all of the butchering is done onsite. If not, ask how butchered

the meat is by the time it gets to him or her. Ideally, the butcher will say that all meat is butchered on site or that the meat comes in sides or primal cuts.

If all of those questions are answered to your satisfaction, place your order and you're in business.

## Pelosi says no State of Union in House while government shut down

In a high-stakes game of dare and double-dare, House speaker serves notice that President won't be allowed to deliver State of the Union to a joint session of Congress next week

WASHINGTON — In a high-stakes case of dare and double-dare, House Speaker Nancy Pelosi served notice Wednesday that President Donald Trump won't be allowed to deliver his State of the Union address to a joint session of Congress next week. She took the step after Trump said he planned to show up in spite of Democratic objections to the speech taking place with big swaths of the government shut down.

Denied that grand venue, Trump promised to come up with some sort of alternative event. But the White House was scrambling to find something matching the gravitas of the traditional address from the rostrum of the House to lawmakers from both parties, Supreme Court justices, invited guests and a television audience of millions.

"I think that's a great blotch on the incredible country that we all love," Trump said. "It's a great, great horrible mark."

Fireworks over the speech shot back and forth between the Capitol and the White House as the month-long partial government shutdown showed no signs of ending

and with about 800,000 federal workers facing the prospect of going without their second paycheck in a row come Friday.

Pelosi told Trump the House won't approve a resolution allowing him to address

Congress until the shutdown ends. Trump shot back that Pelosi was afraid of hearing the truth.

The drama surrounding the State of the Union address began last week when Pelosi

asked Trump to make other plans but stopped short of denying him the chamber for his address. Trump called her bluff Wednesday in a letter, saying he intended to come anyway. "It would be so very sad for

our Country if the State of the Union were not delivered on time, on schedule, and very importantly, on location," he wrote.

## Nurse arrested in rape of incapacitated woman who gave birth

PHOENIX — A nurse who was supposed to be looking after an incapacitated woman at a long-term health care facility has been charged with raping her, weeks after the patient stunned her caregivers and family by giving birth to a baby boy, Phoenix police said Wednesday.

Investigators arrested Nathan Sutherland, a licensed practical nurse, on suspicion of one count of sexual assault and one count of vulnerable adult abuse, Phoenix Police Chief Jeri Williams said.

The surprise birth late last month triggered reviews by state agencies, highlighted safety concerns for

patients who are severely disabled or incapacitated and led to disciplinary actions and resignations of staffers and managers. It also prompted authorities to test the DNA of all the men who worked at the Hacienda HealthCare facility.

Sutherland, 36, submitted his DNA sample under court order Tuesday and the results came back a few hours later, showing he was a match to the baby. He declined to speak with police and invoked his Fifth Amendment rights, police spokesman Tommy Thompson said.

Sutherland, wearing a T-shirt, black athletic pants and jacket, appeared in court Wednesday. A Maricopa County Superior Court commissioner ordered him released

on a cash-only \$500,000 bond. He also must wear an electronic monitoring device.

Defense attorney David Gregan had asked for a lower bond on the grounds that Sutherland didn't have a criminal record. He described his client as a family man with young children who has lived in Arizona since 1993.

Gregan did not immediately return a message seeking comment.

Investigators found that Sutherland had treated the victim and spent a lot of time with her, according to a probable cause statement. Investigators believe Sutherland raped the patient sometime between February and April.

Hacienda officials fired Sutherland after learning of his arrest.

The 29-year-old victim has been in long-term care since age 3 and gave birth at the facility on Dec. 29. Employees said they had no idea she was pregnant.

Earlier stories had described the patient as being comatose or in a vegetative state. But her parents released a statement Tuesday disputing that characterization.

They described her as intellectually disabled because of seizures in early childhood. While she doesn't speak, she has some mobility in her limbs, head and neck. She also responds to sound and can make facial gestures.

## Maduro foe claims Venezuela presidency amid protests

US says it won't recognize order to expel American diplomats

CARACAS, Venezuela — Venezuela's crisis quickly escalated Wednesday as an opposition leader backed by the Trump administration declared himself interim president in a direct challenge to embattled socialist Nicolas Maduro, who retaliated by breaking off relations with the United States, his biggest trade partner.

For the past two weeks, ever since Maduro took the oath for a second six-year term in the face of widespread international condemnation, the newly invigorated opposition had been preparing for

nationwide demonstrations Wednesday coinciding with the anniversary marking the end of Venezuela's last military dictatorship in 1958.

While Maduro has shown no signs of leaving, his main rival, National Assembly President Juan Guaido, upped the ante by declaring himself interim president before masses of anti-government demonstrators — the only way, he said, to rescue Venezuela from "dictatorship." Outside the capital, seven demonstrators were killed amid disturbances during protests that rocked several cities.

In a seemingly coordinated action, the U.S. led a

chorus of Western hemisphere nations, including Canada, Brazil, Argentina and Colombia, that immediately recognized Guaido, with President Donald Trump calling on Maduro to resign and promising to use the "full weight" of the U.S. economic and diplomatic power to push for the restoration of Venezuela's democracy.

"The people of Venezuela have courageously spoken out against Maduro and his regime and demanded freedom and the rule of law," Trump said in a statement.

The stunning move, which to some harkened

## California city OKs 25-cent fee on disposable cups

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Patrons of restaurants and coffee shops in Berkeley, California, who don't bring a reusable cup for their beverage will have to pay a 25-cent fee for a disposable cup as part of an ordinance approved by city officials to reduce restaurant waste.

Berkeley's City Council voted unanimously Tuesday to approve the fee on single-use cups that will take effect January 2020.

"The goal is to transition Berkeley from throwaway to reusable food ware, to incentivize people to bring their own cup," said Councilwoman Sophie Hahn, who co-authored the ordinance with Mayor Jesse Arreguin. The ordinance,

called Disposable-Free Dining, also requires restaurants to provide takeout containers that are compostable by mid-2020 and to provide only reusable plates and utensils for those eating in. It also says other disposable items, like lids and stirrers, can only be offered when requested.

Restaurants would keep all proceeds, and it would be up to them to decide what to do with the extra money. The funds, for example, could be used to replace plastic cutlery for more environmentally friendly silverware, she added.

# Florida's 2018 youth vote swells over previous midterm

## The 65 and older demographic was still twice as likely as 22- to 25-year-olds to vote

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — They rallied hundreds of thousands to march for gun reform, landed on the cover of Time magazine and raised millions of dollars from celebrities like Oprah and George Clooney. But could the teenage survivors of the Parkland school shooting actually motivate unpredictable young voters to cast their ballots? Newly released data reveals that young Florida voters did hit the polls at a significantly higher rate — 15 percentage points more — compared with the previous midterm

election. About 37 percent of the state's 18- to 29-year-olds voted in November, compared with 22 percent who voted in 2014. That's especially notable for midterm elections when turnout is typically low. "Turnout was up across the board; it was up at a higher rate among younger voters without question," said Dan Smith, a University of Florida political science professor who analyzed voter data released by Florida's Department of State last week. Preliminary exit polls and widespread media attention for the March For Our Lives movement launched after 17

were killed at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School had suggested high turnout among young voters passionate about gun reform. The teenage founders of the organization reached celebrity status, making appearances on late night TV, earning the International Children's Peace Prize and publicly taking on the National Rifle Association and lawmakers they felt were beholden to the group. Counties with large numbers of college students had particularly impressive turnouts, with 49 percent of 18- to 21-year-olds voting in Leon County, home to

Florida State University, and 46.5 percent casting ballots in University of Florida's Alachua County. Nearly 40 percent of that age group voted in Parkland's Broward County and 39 percent in neighboring Miami-Dade County, according to Smith's analysis. The March For Our Lives activists held town halls with lawmakers, started clubs in schools nationwide and visited 24 states in 60 days over the summer to spread their message and encourage people to vote. "We really saw this huge cultural shift around elections and civic engagement," said Brendan

Duff, one of the group's founders, who skipped his fall semester at college to help mobilize young voters. "Even though we had all this support and encouragement, ... it still was kind of like: Will young people actually show up? So just to hear that we had this significant increase is surreal." Not surprisingly, the 65 and older demographic was still twice as likely as 22- to 25-year-olds to vote in Florida. About 73 percent of seniors cast ballots, according to Smith's analysis. And slightly more Republicans turned out among the 8.3 million Floridians who voted on a

ballot that included contentious races for governor and a U.S. Senate seat, both so close they required recounts that ended in Republican winners. Young African-Americans were especially energized, likely because of the closely watched gubernatorial race involving Democratic Andrew Gillum, who would have been Florida's first black governor. Trump-backed Republican Ron DeSantis won that race. Just over 38 percent of black voters between the ages of 18 and 21 showed up at the polls, compared with 37.4 percent of young white voters and 33.5 percent of Hispanics.

# NASA replaces astronaut on Boeing's 1st crew launch

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — NASA has replaced an astronaut assigned to Boeing's first launch with a crew. Astronaut Eric Boe was pulled Tuesday from the upcoming test flight for unspecified medical reasons, after more than three years of training. Taking his seat will be Mike Fincke, a former space station commander. Boeing plans to launch its first Starliner capsule without a crew this spring, followed by a launch with astronauts this summer to the International Space Station. SpaceX — NASA's other commercial crew partner — could launch its Dragon capsule, minus a crew, next month. The capsule and Falcon rocket were on the launch pad Wednesday for a test engine firing. Boe and three other NASA astronauts were chosen in 2015 as the first commercial crew members. They were assigned to either an initial Dragon or Starliner mission last year. Boeing astronaut Chris Ferguson,

who commanded the final space shuttle flight in 2011 before leaving NASA, said it would have been "an honor" to fly with Boe again to the space station. They were on the same shuttle flight in 2008 during station construction. "The #Starliner team is bummed that he isn't making this trip," Ferguson said via Twitter, while noting Fincke "brings years of experience." Ferguson said he and NASA astronaut Nicole Mann, who's also on the first Starliner crew, are glad to have Fincke on board.

# Bezos' Blue Origin shoots NASA experiments into space in test

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Jeff Bezos' rocket company, Blue Origin, launched NASA experiments into space Wednesday on a brief test flight. The New Shepard rocket blasted off from West Texas, hoisting a capsule containing the experiments. The eight experiments were exposed to a few minutes of weightlessness, before the capsule parachuted down. The rocket also landed successfully, completing its fourth spaceflight. "That, everybody, is a reusable rocket," said launch commentator

Ariane Cornell, director of astronaut and orbital sales. "Welcome home, New Shepard." This was Blue Origin's 10th test flight, all precursors to launching passengers by year's end.

The capsules have six windows, one for each customer. Blue Origin isn't taking reservations just yet. Instead, the Kent, Washington, company is focusing on brief research flights.

### Republican legislators want Florida to overhaul sentences

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A Florida Republican says the state's prison system is in a 'crisis' and legislators need to pass sweeping changes to the state's sentencing laws to battle the problem. State Sen. Jeff Brandes from St. Petersburg said Wednesday that he is filing a Florida version of the criminal justice overhaul that was enacted late last year by Congress. He said that Florida does not have enough money for the prison system that now holds nearly 100,000 prisoners. He noted that the Department of Corrections has widespread job vacancies that it is having trouble filling. Brandes did not give specifics on the bill but said the state should change the threshold for felony crimes and give judges greater discretion on handing out sentences. Rep. Byron Donalds, a Naples Republican, says he will sponsor the legislation in the House.

### Man arrested after threat to blow up bus

ORMOND BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Authorities have arrested a man who they say claimed to have a bomb on a transit bus in central Florida. The two-hour standoff Wednesday morning caused the evacuation of a high school and nearby businesses in Ormond Beach. Ormond Beach police spokesman Keith Walker tells news outlets the man stepped off the bus at 10:33 a.m., lit a cigarette and lifted his shirt to show that he didn't have a bomb strapped to his body. Walker says the driver and five passengers got off the bus when the man threatened to blow it up. A Volusia County Sheriff's Office bomb squad robot removed two bags from the bus. Walker says the contents are being examined.

### College says error led to 430 mistaken admissions

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) — A Florida college says it mistakenly sent out more than 400 acceptance letters for applications still under review. The Tampa Bay Times reports the University of South Florida St. Petersburg on Saturday sent hundreds of acceptance letters that were quickly revoked. Applicants say their excitement died

shortly after they got a second email that day that said, "There was an error in the system. Please disregard the previous email." Chancellor Martin Tadlock said "human error" caused 680 acceptance emails to be sent out when only 250 applicants were actually admitted. University spokeswoman Carrie O'Brien says the school is working to contact each applicant who received the erroneous acceptance letter to "discuss possible pathways" for future admission. Tadlock says the university's rolling admissions means that affected students could be accepted later.

### Teen gets community service for fatal crash

FORT MYERS, Fla. (AP) — A Florida teen has received a six-month driver-license suspension and 20 hours of community service for a fatal crash. The News-Press reports that the teen was sentenced last week after pleading no contest to careless driving. Authorities say the then-17-year-old boy was driving at a high rate of speed on a Fort Myers street in January 2018 when he was hit by another vehicle pulling out of a parking lot. A passenger in the other car, 17-year-old Erik Babatz, suffered serious injuries and later died at a hospital.

### Hurricane-hit timber industry needs years to recover

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — It could take a decade or more for Florida's timber industry to recover from Hurricane Michael's devastation, and the countless downed trees pose an immediate wildfire threat, Florida Forest Service Director Jim Karels told a Senate committee Tuesday. Karels told the Senate Agriculture Committee that about 1.4 million acres had severe or catastrophic tree loss, meaning 75 to 95 percent of the pine trees were damaged or destroyed. He said a 20-mile (32-kilometer) swath from the Gulf of Mexico to the Georgia border was the worst hit area. More than 16,000 private landowners were affected overall, including moderate damage far beyond the storm's eye, he said. Karels recommended the state provide \$20 million to help landowners clear fallen trees and start replanting the forests. He also recommended spending nearly \$9 million for equipment and programs to help reduce the fire threat.

# Pope says fear of migration makes us crazy

## Francis calls for 'bridges, not walls'

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Francis said Wednesday that fear of migration is "making us crazy" as he began a trip to Central America amid a standoff over President Donald Trump's promised wall at the U.S.-Mexico border and a new caravan of migrants heading north. Francis was asked by reporters about the proposed border wall Wednesday on the way to Panama, where he is looking to leave the sex abuse scandals buffeting his papacy behind. Francis responded: "It is the fear that makes us crazy." The pontiff's plane touched down in Panama City in the afternoon and he was met by President Juan Carlos Varela and first lady Lorena Castillo, who escorted him along a red carpet laid on the tarmac. Spectators waved Panamanian flags in greeting and shouted, "This is the youth of the pope!" After a brief welcoming ceremony, he was driven away from the airport and did not have any more activities scheduled for the evening. Francis landed as Venezuela's protracted political crisis flared up, with the opposition president of the country's National Assembly declaring himself interim president and a number of regional countries including the United States recognizing him.

The Vatican had said previously that the pope would refrain from making explicit reference to Venezuela while in Panama, but the developments ensured he would face questions about the South American nation during the trip. The Roman Catholic Church's first Latin American pope and the son of Italian immigrants to Argentina, Francis has made the plight of migrants and refugees a cornerstone of his papacy. He is also expected to offer words of encouragement to young people gathered in Panama for World Youth Day, the church's once-every-three-year pep rally that aims to invigorate the next generation of Catholics in their faith. Panama Archbishop Jose Domingo Ulloa said Francis' message is likely to resonate with young Central Americans who see their only future free of

violence and poverty in migrating to the U.S. — "young people who often fall into the hands of drug traffickers and so many other realities that our young people face." The pope is expected to urge young people to create their own opportunities, while calling on governments to do their share as well. The visit is taking place as the U.S. government remains partly shut down in a standoff between the Trump administration and Democrats over funding for Trump's promised border wall. Francis famously has called for "bridges, not walls." After celebrating Mass in 2016 on the Mexican side of the U.S. border, he denounced anyone who wants to build a wall to keep out migrants as "not Christian."

# Michael Cohen delays congressional testimony

## Former lawyer cites ongoing threats against family from Trump's tweets

WASHINGTON — Michael Cohen, President Donald Trump's former lawyer and fixer, will postpone his hotly anticipated appearance before the House Oversight Committee because of "ongoing threats against his family" from President Trump, his spokesman said Wednesday.

Cohen was scheduled to testify on Feb. 7. He's been the target of repeated insults from

Trump and his lawyer, former New York Mayor Rudolph W. Giuliani, both of whom have suggested that Cohen is trying to conceal crimes by his father-in-law.

"Due to ongoing threats against his family from President Trump and Mr. Giuliani, as recently as this weekend, as well as Mr. Cohen's continued cooperation with ongoing investigations, by advice of counsel, Mr. Cohen's appearance will be postponed to a later date," Lanny Davis, the

spokesman, said in his statement.

Cohen "looks forward to testifying at the appropriate time," Davis added.

It's unclear when Cohen will have an opportunity to reschedule his congressional testimony because he's scheduled to start a three-year prison term on March 6. A spokeswoman for the House Oversight Committee did not immediately return a request for comment. It's possible that the committee could issue a subpoena to require Cohen's appearance.

Cohen has pleaded guilty to nine crimes, including campaign finance violations for arranging election-year hush money payments to women who said they had affairs with Trump years ago. Federal prosecutors said the president ordered the illegal scheme.

Cohen also admitted to lying to Congress about his pursuit of a Trump Tower Moscow project during the presidential campaign.

Since Cohen's testimony

was announced, Trump has suggested that investigators look into Cohen's family.

"Watch father-in-law!" he tweeted last week.

Trump told Fox News on Jan. 12 that Cohen was lying about him to get a reduced sentence.

"But he should give information maybe on his father-in-law, because that's the one that people want to look at," he said.

In response, top Democrats issued a statement warning about the president's comments.

"Our nation's laws prohibit efforts to discourage, intimidate or otherwise pressure a witness not to provide testimony to Congress," said Reps. Elijah Cummings (D-Md.), Adam B. Schiff (D-Burbank) and Jerrold Nadler (D-N.Y.), who lead the Oversight, Intelligence and Judiciary committees.

Giuliani said Trump's comments did not represent an attempt to obstruct a congressional investigation.

"It's defending yourself," he said.

# Manafort denies lying to investigators after plea agreement

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump's former campaign chairman on Wednesday denied allegations he lied to investigators after he began cooperating with them.

Lawyers for Paul Manafort submitted a heavily redacted 10-page filing aimed at knocking down claims by special

counsel Robert Mueller's office that he intentionally

lied and breached his plea agreement.

Manafort's guilty plea to conspiracy charges in September required him to cooperate with prosecutors and tell the truth about what he knew. Months later, prosecutors accused him of repeatedly lying to them.

The lawyers said Wednesday that any misstatements by Manafort reflected an inconsistent recollection of facts and

events rather than an intentional effort to mislead.

"Indeed, many of these events occurred years ago, or during a high-pressure U.S. presidential campaign he managed when his time was extraordinarily limited," the defense lawyers said, "or during the difficult time that followed his departure from the 2016 presidential campaign because of the allegations leveled at him and the investigations that

followed."

Among the allegations is that Manafort lied when he denied having shared polling data from the 2016 campaign with Konstantin Kilimnik, a business associate who the U.S. has said has ties to Russian intelligence.

A hearing is set for Friday. Manafort, who is currently jailed in Virginia, asked for permission to skip it.

But U.S. District Judge

Amy Berman Jackson denied the request, citing among other reasons "the number of court appearances defendant has been permitted to waive" and "the significance of the issues at stake."

The September guilty plea resolved allegations in the District of Columbia. He was found guilty of eight financial crimes last year in a separate case in Virginia and is to be sentenced there next month.

# Police: Links sought between 4 victims, man in US illegally

Wednesday. "They're continuing to look at, 'How were these cases connected?'" Carson City Sheriff Ken Furlong said of

dead in their homes days apart in a tight-knit community, and the bodies of a couple were discovered in their house about an hour's drive north, in Reno.

A motive for the slayings is not known. Wilbur Ernesto Martinez-Guzman has been arrested and is expected in court Thursday in Carson City, Nevada's capital city. "I have a hard time

believing these were random," Furlong told The Associated Press of the killings.

The case became part of the immigration debate after President Donald Trump cited it as evidence of the need for his proposed U.S.-Mexico border wall, which is at the heart of a partial government shutdown.

Federal immigration authorities told Furlong

that Martinez-Guzman was from El Salvador and in the country illegally. Immigration and Customs Enforcement did not have more details on how he got into the U.S.

Martinez-Guzman is in jail on stolen property, burglary and immigration charges. Carson City District Attorney Jason Woodbury said Martinez-Guzman had been pawning the victims' items at

pawn shops.

He's expected to have a lawyer appointed Thursday but not face murder charges there.

Douglas County District Attorney Mark Jackson said those charges will be filed separately, probably this week. Officials said they are deciding where Martinez-Guzman will be prosecuted because the killings occurred in two counties.

# Kooiker-huh? An intro to Westminster dog show's new breeds

## More than 200 breeds to compete in upcoming contest

NEW YORK — Two new breeds. Sixteen new syllables.

The grand basset griffon Vendeen and the Nederlandse kooikerhondje make their debuts at the Westminster Kennel Club dog show next month, each getting a nationally televised turn among the more than 200 breeds and varieties on the green carpet at the nation's premier canine contest.

But Buzz Lightyear, for one, seems to be taking his breed's big moment in stride. The 4-year-old grand basset griffon

Vendeen (pronounced grahdn bah-SAY' grih-FAHN' vahn-DAY'-ahn) glanced out Tuesday at the cameras at a Westminster-preview news conference, looked up at owner Brielly Cipriotti, and then lay down on rostrum to do a couple of the things his breed does best: sniff around and induce smiles.

"They're extremely sweet, and they have a big, goofy attitude," Cipriotti, of Bealeton, Virginia, said later. She's excited about the exposure that the breed — a low-slung, long-eared, hardy hound developed in France to hunt rabbits

and hare — stands to gain from Westminster.

About 3,200 dogs, ranging from wee Malteses to strapping mastiffs, are entered to compete at next month's show, which includes agility and obedience competitions along with the breed judging that leads to the signature Best in Show trophy. It will be awarded Feb. 12 at Madison Square Garden and live on FS1.

The relatively new agility and obedience contests are open to mixed-breed dogs.

New breeds appear at Westminster after getting recognized by the American Kennel Club.

The process takes years and includes setting standards and having hundreds of dogs spread around the country.

The merry, clever Nederlandse kooikerhondje (pronounced NAY'-dehr-lahn-seh KOY'-kehr-hahnd-jeh) was initially trained to help Dutch duck hunters by attracting the birds' interest and then luring them into net-covered canals.

"It's the Pied Piper of the dog world," said owner Rod Beckstead, of Jim Thorpe, Pennsylvania, as he showed off 2-year-old Bandit on Tuesday.

The breed remains

versatile and easy to teach to do dog sports and other things; some even serve as cadaver dogs, he said.

Westminster is regularly protested by animal-rights activists who

deplore dog breeding as appearance-focused and detrimental to mixed-breed dogs that need homes. The club portrays the show as a tribute to all canines.

### Amazon testing delivery by self-driving robots

NEW YORK (AP) — Amazon is bringing delivery robots to the streets of a Seattle suburb.

The online shopping giant says it started to test self-driving robots in Snohomish County, Washington, Wednesday that can bring Amazon packages to shoppers' doorsteps.

The robots are light blue, about the size of a Labrador, have six wheels and the Amazon smile logo stamped on its side, according to Amazon photos. Six of them will be roaming the sidewalks and streets of the neighborhood.

Amazon says a worker will accompany the robots at first, but it didn't provide additional details of how the service would work. The company did not respond to questions about the test.

Several companies have been testing similar delivery robots on college campuses that deliver

fast food or snacks to students.

Amazon says its robot, which it is calling Scout, can navigate around pets and pedestrians.

### Ex-Cub Scouts leader accused of sexually abusing 7 children

ST. LOUIS—A former Cub Scout leader has sexually abused at least seven children since 2010, including a boy younger than 12 at a Boy Scout camp in St. Louis County in July, according to charges.

Matthew C. Baker, 49, of O'Fallon, Mo., was first charged in October with two separate incidents of child sexual abuse. More alleged victims later came

forward, leading authorities to file eight additional charges in recent weeks.

Baker now faces a total of 10 sex crimes charges; nine in St. Charles County involving six children and one in St. Louis County involving a seventh child.

### Los Angeles teachers return to classes after reaching deal

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Tens of thousands of Los Angeles teachers returned to work Wednesday after voting to ratify a contract, ending a six-day strike at the nation's second-largest district.

The Los Angeles teachers headed back to work a day after Denver teachers

voted Tuesday to go on strike after more than a year of negotiations. While Colorado teachers have the right to strike, the state officials could delay the walkout by up to 180 days.

In Los Angeles, teachers and administrators greeted students with smiles, hugs and high-fives. The return followed days of marches and picketing and a marathon bargaining session that led to a ratification vote Tuesday.

The deal includes a 6-percent pay hike and a commitment to reduce class sizes over four years.

Mayor Eric Garcetti, accompanied by union and school officials, called it an "historic agreement" that will usher in a "new day" for public education in the city.

### 2 Fort Bliss soldiers killed, 7 hurt after training crash

OTERO COUNTY, N.M. (AP) — Authorities say two soldiers from an Army base in Texas have died and seven other military members remain hospitalized after two military training vehicles crashed in southern New Mexico.

El Paso TV station KTSM reports the soldiers were part of the 1st Armored Division at Fort Bliss that's headquartered in El Paso.

The crash reportedly occurred Tuesday night in U.S. Route 54 close to Otero County Prison, about 30 miles from El Paso, and involved two Stryker vehicles.

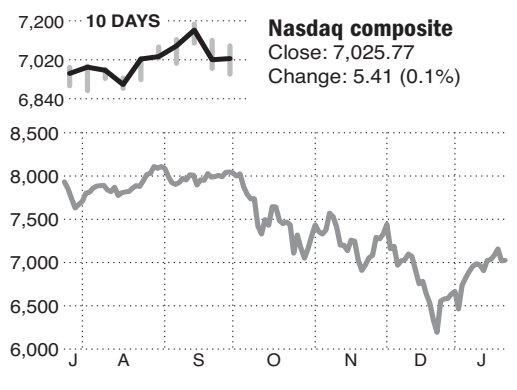
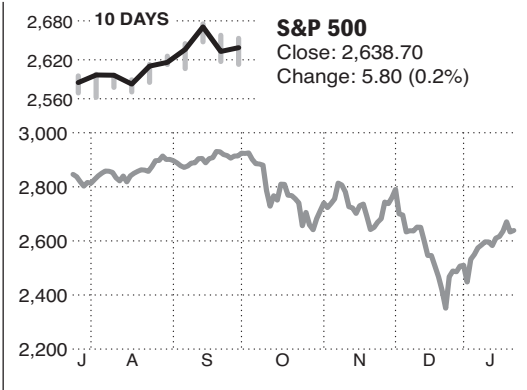

# Lower-leg swelling may be due to venous insufficiency

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** I am an 84-year-old man in reasonably good health. I have taken blood pressure medicine for about 30 years. For the past six months, I have been taking trosipium tablets to treat frequent urination. I have prostate cancer treated with radioactive seeds, not surgery. About two months ago, I began noticing swelling in my lower legs and feet. Do you have any advice on how to reduce or eliminate the swelling? — H.S.



**Dr. Roach**

**ANSWER:** The first thing to consider with a new diagnosis of swelling, also called edema, in the legs is what might be causing it. Medications are one common cause. Of the blood pressure medicines, the calcium blockers that end in "-pine," such as amlodipine (Norvasc) and nifedipine (Procardia), commonly cause this side effect, but with a new issue after 30 years, I wouldn't expect that to be the only cause. Trosipium is a bladder anti-spasmodic, and swelling is not commonly reported with that.

The three main worrisome causes of lower-extremity swelling are heart failure, kidney disease (especially protein loss) and liver disease. Your doctor should be able to evaluate these three very quickly through an exam and simple blood and urine tests. When no cause is identified, by far the most likely cause is "venous insufficiency," meaning that the veins in the legs aren't doing their job properly, often because of poor valves, which can wear out after working perfectly for 84 years. The most appropriate initial treatment

is support stockings put on every morning and taken off at night, combined with leg elevation (above your heart, 30 minutes, three times a day). That works well for most people, and if it doesn't, then further testing and treatment can be considered by an expert, such as a vascular surgeon.

However, in your case, your doctor also should be thinking about your cancer and its treatment. Uncomplicated prostate cancer treated with radiation seeds is not usually associated with leg swelling.

However, blood clots are a known complication of prostate cancer, and a blood clot in the deep veins of the pelvis in the inferior vena cava (the largest vein in the lower part of the body) can lead to swelling. This would be a rare cause but one worth considering.

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** When I had gestational diabetes, my internist always told me my goal A1C level was between 5 and 6 percent and that 7 percent was too high. Is there a difference between the

A1C goal in a gestational diabetic versus a Type 2 diabetic? — N.E.

**ANSWER:** There is a difference. The issue with Type 2 diabetes is that many people are at high risk for heart disease. So, older people with diabetes, especially those with additional risk factors for heart disease, usually are advised to have an A1C goal near 7 percent.

This is due to a study that showed people at high risk for heart disease were more likely to have a heart attack or death when the A1C goal was below 6 percent compared with around 7 percent.

Pregnant women have a different goal, since high levels of insulin during pregnancy cause the developing baby to get large, sometimes so large that there is an increased risk of trauma during birth.

Since an increased risk of heart attack is a very small risk in pregnant women, it's best to have as normal a blood sugar as possible (a normal A1C level in a person without diabetes is 4 percent to 5.6 percent).

# New mom opts for day care instead of grandma's care

**DEAR ABBY:** I gave birth a month ago to a wonderful baby boy. My husband and I originally planned to put him in day care when I go back to work. When my mom found out, she said she had assumed she would be watching him, so I eventually told her she could.

**DEAR ABBY:** A friend of mine, "Gladys," was looking for a home for an old dog. "Breezy" was 12, and his owner had died. Gladys was fostering Breezy until a new home could be found.

I told her I'd take him if she couldn't find another good home. She ended up finding one.

Breezy was living with his new owners for about a month when they called to tell Gladys the dog "wasn't feeling well." When she went to check on it, she decided the placement wasn't working out and asked if I would take him. I agreed.

A couple days later, Gladys called saying the previous owners had taken Breezy to a veterinarian and expected her to pay the vet bill because she had taken the dog back. Now she's expecting ME to reimburse her for the \$319 vet bill because I have him! Am I responsible for that bill? — Dog Lover

**DEAR DOG LOVER:** No, you are not responsible. The folks who adopted Breezy should be paying the vet bill because they are the ones who incurred it.

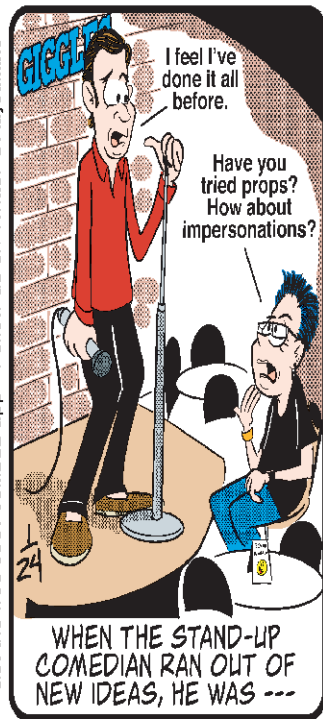

Declarer saw a line that only needed East to hold the jack of diamonds. South won the opening club lead with dummy's ace. The ace and king of spades drew the trumps, followed by the ace, king, and a heart ruff. The queen and jack of hearts didn't fall, so dummy was re-entered with the queen of spades and dummy's last heart was ruffed. Declarer exited with his jack of clubs and hoped for the best.

Opening lead: King of ♣

North's raise to game was perfectly reasonable, but the resulting contract was not a good one. There were only nine tricks and a tenth looked out of reach. The ace and king of diamonds could both be with East, or the queen and jack of hearts both with West, but those were only 25 percent chances.

Had East been able to win this club, he might have defeated the contract by leading the jack of diamonds, "surrounding" South's queen. The opening lead, however, made it a near certainty that West would win this trick. The defense had to play diamonds or yield a ruff-sluaft, so West led a low diamond to East's ace. South played low from his hand on the diamond continuation and claimed his contract when this forced the king from West. Nicely played!

# Iranian TV anchor released from US jail after 10 days

## American-born woman detained as a material witness

WASHINGTON — A prominent American-born anchorwoman on Iranian state television who was held in the U.S. as a material witness was released from jail Wednesday evening.

Marzieh Hashemi, 59, was released from jail in Washington after being detained for 10 days, according to Abed

Ayoub, an attorney with the American-Arab Anti-Discrimination Committee.

Hashemi, who works for the Press TV network's English-language service, was detained by federal agents Jan. 13 in St. Louis, Missouri, where she had filmed a Black Lives Matter documentary after visiting relatives in the New Orleans area, her son said. She was then transported to Washington

and had remained behind bars since then.

Hashemi appeared at least twice before a U.S. District judge in Washington, and court papers said she would be released immediately after her testimony before a grand jury. Court documents did not include details on the criminal case in which she was named a witness.

Federal law allows judges to order witnesses

to be detained if the government can prove that their testimony has extraordinary value for a criminal case and that they would be a flight risk and unlikely to respond to a subpoena. The statute generally requires those witnesses to be promptly released once they are deposed.

Hashemi is a U.S. citizen and was born Melanie Franklin. She lives in Tehran and comes

back to the United States about once a year to see her family, usually scheduling documentary work in the U.S., her son said.

# Government shutdown poses increasing risk to wider economy

## When furloughed employees spend less, stores and restaurants that serve them suffer

WASHINGTON — At this time of year, John Sprinkle and his wife would normally be planning their summer vacation. Not now. Sprinkle, a furloughed federal employee, is about to miss his second paycheck since the partial government shutdown began just before Christmas.

With no end in sight to the longest shutdown in American history, Sprinkle and his family are postponing all manner of spending.

"We were thinking of getting a new computer, but that's not going to happen," he said. "We're not really eating out like we normally would be. We are not going out to events like we would be."

Multiply those decisions by 800,000 federal employees across the country and hundreds of thousands of government contractors who aren't being paid

either, and the shutdown looms as an accelerating threat to the wider economy.

The shutdown's biggest effect on the economy is likely to be the cutback in federal spending. But consumer spending, which is critical to growth, is another important factor.

When government employees spend less, stores and restaurants that serve them suffer. So do landlords and lenders that do business with federal workers. Though spending and growth will rebound once the government reopens, most of the restaurant meals missed and hotel stays canceled will never be made up.

If the shutdown drags on through March, annual economic growth could fall to zero in the first three months of the year. Even if the government reopens by the end of the month, the annual pace of growth could be a meager 1.6 percent — only half

the pace of last quarter, said Sal Guatieri, senior economist at BMO Capital Markets.

Bernard Baumohl, chief economist at the Economic Outlook Group, suggested that once the government reopened, many households would focus on repaying credit card debt and restoring lost savings — trends that would slow the rebound.

For now, there are hints that the shutdown is slowing retail sales. A measure of weekly chain store sales fell 1.3 percent last week, its second straight drop. Cold weather likely contributed to the fall, said Michael Niemira, chief economist at the consulting firm Retail Economist, but the shutdown may also have contributed.

It's hard to know just how much the shutdown is depressing consumer spending because the Commerce Department, which compiles and reports such data, was itself closed by the shutdown.

Pelosi quickly squelched the speech, writing back that the House "will not consider a concurrent resolution authorizing the President's State of the Union address in the House Chamber until government has opened."

The president cannot speak in front of a joint session of Congress without both chambers' explicit permission. A resolution needs to be approved by both chambers specifying the date and time for receiving an address from the president.

The gamesmanship unfolded as the Senate prepared to vote this week on dueling proposals on the shutdown. A Republican one would give Trump money for the wall while one from Democrats would re-open government through Feb. 8, with no wall money, giving bargainiers time to talk about it.

Both proposals were likely to fail to reach the 60-vote threshold needed in the Senate, where Republicans hold a 53-47 majority. As well, House Democrats were putting forward a new proposal, aiming to lure Trump away from his demand for a border wall by offering billions of new dollars for other border security measures.

The Constitution states only that the president "shall from time to time give to the Congress Information of the State of the Union," meaning the president can speak

anywhere he chooses or give his update in writing. The address has been delayed before.

Ronald Reagan's 1986 State of the Union address was postponed after the Challenger space shuttle exploded in flight on Jan. 28 of that year.

But there is no precedent for a State of the Union invitation being rescinded.

Presidents Harry Truman, Dwight Eisenhower and Jimmy Carter issued their final messages in print. As Eisenhower recovered from a heart attack in 1956, he prepared a seven-minute, filmed summary of the message from his retreat in Key West, Florida, that was broadcast nationwide. Richard Nixon sent a printed message in 1973; his staff said an oral message would have come too soon after his second inaugural address.

White House officials have been working on a backup plan to have Trump give the speech somewhere else if Democrats blocked access to the House chamber. Nevertheless, they were rattled by Pelosi's move Wednesday and expressed concern it would further sour shutdown negotiations.

Officials have been considering alternative venues, including a speech in the Senate chamber and a visit to a state on the southern border. Multiple versions of the speech were being drafted to suit the final venue. Trump has been presented with a series of options for making the address and is expected

to decide within the next day or so, said a person familiar with White House discussions but not authorized to speak publicly about them.

Pelosi said that when she extended her Jan. 3 invitation to Trump to deliver the State of the Union address on Jan. 29, there was no thought that the government would still be shut down.

She wrote Wednesday: "I look forward to welcoming you to the House on a mutually agreeable date for this address when government has been opened."

Moments after her letter became public, Trump told reporters he wasn't surprised by Pelosi's action. Democrats have become "radicalized," he claimed. He expanded on those sentiments during a subsequent event at the White House, calling the cancellation a "disgrace" and asserting that Pelosi didn't want to hear the truth about the need for better border security.

The White House and Democratic lawmakers have been accusing one another of pettiness since Pelosi raised doubts about the speech. Trump followed up by revoking her use of a military plane for a congressional delegation visit to Afghanistan.

North Carolina's House speaker, Tim Moore, invited Trump to deliver the speech in the North Carolina House Chamber. Michigan House Speaker Lee Chatfield has offered his state capitol. Trump spoke with both of them this week, according to Moore's office and a tweet from Chatfield.

# Oracle accused of underpaying women, minorities by \$400M

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — U.S. government regulators are accusing software maker Oracle of engaging in discriminatory practices that resulted in thousands of its women, black and Asian employees being underpaid by more than \$400 million.

The allegations emerged Tuesday in a filing made in a two-year-old case that is being pursued by a part of the U.S. Labor Department that examines the pay practices of government

contractors. The agency estimates Oracle has government contracts worth about \$100 million annually.

The filing cites evidence that Oracle underpaid women and ethnic minorities for similar work done by white men by as much as 25 percent.

The alleged practices affected more than 5,000 women, more than 11,000 Asians and fewer than 30 blacks from 2013 through 2016.

Oracle declined to comment.

# Student tackled for 'stealing' own car settles suit for \$1.25M

EVANSTON, ILL. (AP) — A Chicago suburb has tentatively agreed to pay a former doctoral student \$1.25 million to settle a lawsuit alleging police officers tackled him to the ground and arrested him for stealing a car that turned out to be his own, his attorney said.

Evanston City Manager Wally Bobkiewicz confirmed a settlement was reached with Lawrence Crosby, who was 25 and an engineering doctoral student at Northwestern University in 2015 when the incident occurred.

Crosby's attorney, Timothy Touhy, said Crosby was trying to repair loose molding on his car when a woman called police to report a black man trying to steal a car.

When he drove off, the woman followed Crosby

in her car as he drove from his apartment to Northwestern's science building, giving police his location.

Crosby got out the car with his hands raised after being stopped by police but was tackled when he failed to immediately obey orders to get on the ground. Police later determined the car belonged to Crosby but charged him anyhow with disobeying officers and resisting arrest.

At the time of Crosby's arrest, an Evanston Police Department spokesman said the use of force by police was justified as officers were responding to what they thought was an auto theft. The spokesman said officers delivered knee strikes and open-handed strikes.

A judge later threw out the charges, Touhy said.

back to dark episodes of heavy-handed U.S. interventions in Latin America during the Cold War, drew a strong rebuke from Maduro. He responded by swiftly cutting off diplomatic relations with the United States, the biggest importer of the OPEC nation's oil, giving American diplomats 72 hours to leave the country.

"Before the people and nations of the world, and as constitutional president. ... I've decided to break diplomatic and political relations with the imperialist U.S. government," Maduro thundered while holding up a decree banning the diplomats before a crowd of red-shirted supporters gathered at the presidential palace.

"Don't trust the gringos," he said, rattling off a long list of U.S.-backed military coups — Guatemala, Chile, Brazil — in decades past. "They don't have friends or loyalties. They only have interests, guts and the ambition to take Venezuela's oil, gas and gold."

Not to be undone, Guaido issued his own statement, urging foreign embassies to disavow Maduro's orders

and keep their diplomats in the country.

The 35-year-old Guaido, a virtually unknown lawmaker at the start of the year, has reignited the hopes of Venezuela's often beleaguered opposition by taking a rebellious tack amid a crushing economic crisis that has forced millions to flee or go hungry.

Raising his right hand in unison with tens of thousands of supporters, the fresh-faced leader of the opposition-controlled congress took a symbolic oath to assume executive powers he says are his right under two articles of Venezuela constitution to take over as interim president and form a transitional government until he calls new elections.

"Today, January 23, 2019, I swear to formally assume the powers of the national executive as president in charge of Venezuela," he told the cheering crowd as he stood behind a lectern emblazoned with Venezuela's national coat of arms.

"We know that this will have consequences," he shouted, moments before quickly slipping away to an unknown location amid speculation he would soon be arrested.

Williams turned ankle, amassed unforced errors

MELBOURNE, Australia — Four times, Serena Williams was only one point — a single point — from closing out a victory in the Australian Open quarterfinals.

And so it was that a startling reversal and

## Security stepped up for Super Bowl in Atlanta

ATLANTA — When Super Bowl 53 kicks off less than two weeks from now, legions of police and federal agents will be positioned to protect fans inside and outside the Atlanta stadium where the New England Patriots and the Los Angeles Rams face off.

The game will bring international attention, which makes it a potential target for terrorism, said Brian Levin, a former New York City police officer who is director of the Center for the Study of Hate and Extremism at California State University, San Bernardino.

"We fortify these events because we have to," Levin said. "They're the brightest bug lamps that attract an array of possible extremists and also unstable people as well."

Authorities won't discuss specifics of their security plan. But they say they will safeguard areas beyond the downtown Mercedes-Benz Stadium and make officers visible across the city. The city's police department has worked with more than 40 state, federal and local law enforcement agencies to develop the plan, Atlanta Police Chief Erika Shields said. Officers will work 12-hour shifts and will "position ourselves so that we can

react immediately to whatever scenario we are confronted with," Shields said.

The chief said law enforcers have been preparing for two years, during which time they visited Super Bowls in Houston and Minneapolis to observe safety measures.

During the Olympic Games in Atlanta in 1996, a man set off a pipe bomb at Centennial Olympic Park, a downtown public space that lacked the high security of the athletic venues and Olympic Village where athletes were staying. Shrapnel from the bomb tore through a crowd of concertgoers on July 27, 1996, killing a woman who was hit in the

skull with a nail, and wounding more than 100 others.

"Our main focus at that time was on the Olympic Village," said Richard Stogner, who was in charge of finances for the Olympics and as such was involved in security meetings weeks and months before the games. Stogner witnessed the deadly violence from his office overlooking the park. He recalled walking onto his balcony and seeing a large cloud of white smoke and at least a couple of people lying on the ground.

Shields said there was a desire at the time to make the park "family friendly," so the decision was made to keep

security more lax there.

"In hindsight, that was a mistake," she said.

In the days leading up to the Super Bowl on Feb. 3, the park — which has been closed off with high chain-link fencing in some places — will play a central role as it hosts numerous concerts.

In addition to increased security around the city, Atlanta Fire Rescue will put some of its paramedics on bicycles so they can reach patients in areas crowded with pedestrians, Chief Randall Slaughter said. A joint operations center will include officials from Georgia Power and the city's mass transit system.

# Struggling Oilers fire GM Chiarelli

## Keith Gretzky will assume more responsibilities in interim for Edmonton

Edmonton fired Peter Chiarelli on Wednesday in an indictment of his roster moves in three-plus years as general manager, with the Oilers in striking distance of a playoff spot during another losing season.

The team announced Chiarelli's abrupt dismissal in the aftermath of its third consecutive loss. Edmonton has lost 12 of its past 16 games going into the All-Star Break. The Oilers are 14-14-2 since firing coach Todd McLellan and replacing him with Ken Hitchcock.

CEO Bob Nicholson will oversee hockey operations and the search for Chiarelli's replacement. Nicholson said at a news conference in Edmonton that Keith Gretzky will assume GM responsibilities for the time being, including the point role ahead of the Feb. 25 trade deadline.

Nicholson said the Oilers, who are three points out of the final playoff spot in the Western Conference, still believe they can make the playoffs but won't sacrifice the future to try to make quick fixes. He said the organizational

decision was made this week to fire Chiarelli, who was told at the second intermission of a loss Tuesday night to Detroit so he could quietly leave the arena.

Nothing else about Chiarelli's tenure in Edmonton was quiet. He was hired in 2015 after the Oilers won the draft lottery and selected star Connor McDavid. He was heralded as the right executive to get the Oilers back to respectability.

They've made the playoffs just once in McDavid's three seasons despite him putting up 329 points in 258 games, leading the league in scoring twice and winning the Hart Trophy as NHL MVP.

"There's something in the water here in Edmonton that we don't have right," Nicholson said at the news conference. "And we got to get that figured out."

Chiarelli is the second GM to be fired this season. The Philadelphia Flyers dismissed Ron Hextall in November and named Chuck Fletcher his replacement.

Nicholson said Hitchcock will remain coach for the rest of the season as Edmonton tries to close the gap and

qualify for the postseason with 32 games left.

Moves made by Chiarelli along the way contributed to the Oilers struggling for much of the first four seasons of McDavid's career. Chiarelli traded 2010 top pick Taylor Hall to the New Jersey Devils one-for-one for defenseman Adam Larsson. Hall won the Hart last season and led the Devils to the playoffs.

He signed Milan Lucic to a \$42 million, six-year contract that now

appears to be unmovable. The big winger has 96 points in 214 games with the Oilers, including just five goals this season.

And he traded 2008 first-round pick Jordan Eberle to the New York Islanders for Ryan Strome, who he sent to the New York Rangers earlier this season for Ryan Spooner. The Oilers put Spooner on waivers Monday.

Chiarelli was expected to give the woebegone Oilers steady leadership with McDavid. He won

the Stanley Cup with the Bruins in 2011 but made similar personnel mistakes in Boston, most notably a failed trade of Tyler Seguin to the Dallas Stars that contributed to losing his job.

Edmonton had missed the playoffs in nine consecutive seasons before replacing Craig MacTavish with Chiarelli. A trip to the second round of the playoffs in 2017 looked like the start of success, but the Oilers finished 17 points out of the final playoff spot.

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# Puck, player tracking gets TV test

Twenty-three years after Fox's glowing puck made its debut, the NHL's next big technological advancement will be on display this weekend during All-Star festivities.

NBC will showcase puck and player tracking as part of its broadcast of the skills competition Friday night and then as the centerpiece of a digital-only broadcast of the All-Star 3-on-3 tournament Saturday night. It'll be the first chance for American hockey fans to get an up-close look at the system that could be in place as soon as next season.

With each player and puck fitted with a microchip, the amount of available information could be overwhelming. Look for everything from bubbles over players' heads to skating and shot speed to ice time and even a small trail behind the puck as NBC takes tracking technology in hockey for a test drive.

"Eventually it'll go to possession time and more advanced (data), but right now it's mainly focused on speed, shift time, distance traveled, mph on the shot and virtually connecting players on a goal," NBC Sports producer Steve Greenberg said. "We're scratching the surface here, and what we're able to display this weekend is not what we're going to be able to display next year and in the future, but it's going to be able to be a really good first look at what these chips are going to be able to give us."

The NHL privately tested puck and player tracking in two regular-season games in Las Vegas earlier this month, but this will be the first time the data is available for public consumption.

While other types of tracking technology were tested at previous All-Star games and the 2016 World Cup of Hockey, this is something of a dry run for the radio frequency system the NHL has been working with developers to perfect.

Much like the glowing puck was criticized by purists, there's the danger of overloading fans with too much, too fast. NBC will experiment with how much puck and player tracking data can and should fit onto a TV broadcast.

"It's a balancing act," NBC Sports executive producer Sam Flood said. "Think about years ago when the yellow line came in for the first down in football. It's now universal. There are going to be elements that'll become universal in hockey telecasts based on what we learn

over the next period of time."

Kenny Albert, who will call the puck and player tracking-heavy telecast available on NBC Sports' app and online, likens this to the kind of ball-tracking technology that has become ubiquitous in golf coverage. He was with Fox in the 1990s when the glowing puck was perhaps ahead of its time but thinks fans are ready for puck and player tracking on TV.

"We live in an age of information overload and people want stuff like ice time and the mph on a shot for example or how fast a player's skating," Albert said. "I have two teenage daughters and I don't think anybody in that generation now just sits there and watches TV. They want information, whether it's looking at

their phone, their iPad, their computer, and there's so much information out there."

Eventually, once the NHL implements player and puck tracking, fans will be able to take a deep dive into all the numbers and there will be an element of real-time sports gambling. But Commissioner Gary Bettman and other league executives have pointed out that the first goal was always to make it TV-ready.

"The most obvious thing that (viewers will) probably notice is just sort of the correlations tied to speed," NHL senior vice president of business development David Lehanski said. "It's kind of the thing everybody talks about: how fast the game is, how fast the players are, how fast the puck moves."

# Rays have nine prospects in BA's top 100

## Franco, Honeywell, McKay among top players in Baseball America rankings

The Rays' hard work and investment in rebuilding their farm system continues to show — most notably today, when they placed a record-tying nine players in Baseball America's annual preseason ranking of the game's top 100 prospects, led by teenager Wander Franco at No. 4 overall.

The Baseball America list is considered among the game's most prestigious, and the Rays showed well, along with the

Padres, who also placed nine.

Franco, who doesn't turn 18 until March 1, is ranked so highly based on his impressive skill set and dazzling pro debut — he hit .351 with 11 homers, 57 RBIs and a 1.004 OPS in 61 games at rookie-level Princeton while striking out only 19 times (and walking 27).

Other Rays in the Baseball America top 100, which can be read in full here:

No. 23 RHP Brent Honeywell, who is due back from Tommy John surgery recovery some-time in June.

No. 47 LHP/1B Brendan McKay, who who made it advanced Class A Charlotte last year as a two-way player.

No. 56 C Ronaldo Hernandez, who hit 21 homers for Class A Bowling Green last season.

No. 58 LHP Matthew Liberatore, who had a solid debut season as their No. 1 pick in last year's draft.

No. 62. OF Jesus Sanchez, who hits for power and average and made it to Double-A by age 20.

No. 64, 2B Vidal Brujan, who has shown a combo of speed

and hitting ability through Class A.

No. 93 2B Brandon Lowe, who found his power stroke and made it to the majors in 2018.

No. 97 1B Nate Lowe, who (unrelated to Brandon) showed his power and reached Triple-A.

The only other team to land nine prospects in the BA top 100 during its 30-year run was the Royals in 2011, with a group that included three players who would end up traded to the Rays, Jake Odorizzi, Wil

Myers and Mike Montgomery. Also among that group was Eric Hosmer, Mike Moustakas, Danny Duffy, John Lamb, Chris Dwyer and Christian Colon.

Also of note on the Baseball America list:

# Rams must deal with Brady and his weapons

LOS ANGELES — The New England Patriots lost two of their first three regular-season games. They lost two of their last four.

As the second-seeded team in the AFC playoffs, they were forced to play the conference title game on the road against the high-flying Kansas City Chiefs and Patrick Mahomes, the probable most valuable player.

The Patriots' reign as the dominant team in the AFC was thought by some to be in jeopardy. But as Los Angeles Rams coach Sean McVay noted, the Patriots are playing their best when it matters the most.

The Rams play the Patriots in Super Bowl LIII on Feb. 3 at Atlanta. Patriots coach Bill Belichick and quarterback Tom Brady are seeking a sixth Super Bowl title in their ninth appearance.

"It's going to be a great challenge, just like Drew Brees was for us last week," McVay said.

Rams defensive coordinator Wade Phillips held the same position for Denver in 2015 when he successfully schemed against the Patriots and Brady in the AFC championship game. Many Rams have experience playing against Brady, and a few went against him in the playoffs, including linebacker Dante Fowler.

"I never went against him in the Super Bowl, though," Fowler said. "You know, there's a difference."

In eight Super Bowls, Brady has passed for 2,576 yards and 18 touchdowns with five interceptions. Perhaps his greatest performance came two years ago, when he led his team back from a 25-point deficit to defeat Atlanta in Super Bowl LI.

"Probably the best quarterback ever," Rams safety John Johnson said.

As usual, the Patriots' offense under coordinator Josh McDaniels is full of productive players. Other than Brady, tight end Rob Gronkowski and receiver Julian Edelman, they lack star power.

Rookie running back Sony Michel rushed for 931 yards and six touchdowns this season. He rushed for 113 yards and two touchdowns in 29 carries against the Chiefs. Running back James White caught a team-best 87 passes this season and has 12 total touchdowns.

Rex Burkhead rushed for his first touchdown of the season in a playoff victory over the Los Angeles Chargers, and ran for two against the Chiefs. Edelman

caught seven passes for 96 yards against the Chiefs, Gronkowski six passes for 79 yards. The offensive line has not given up a sack in two playoff games.

"They've got the ability to personnel group you, change some different things specific to how they want to attack a defense," McVay said.

When Matt Patricia left the Patriots to become Detroit's coach after last season, linebackers coach Brian Flores took over many of the defensive coordinator responsibilities if not the title. He reportedly will be hired as Miami's coach after the Super Bowl.

"They're going to identify a couple things that they

say, 'All right' — Belichick's the best at this — 'What do the Rams do best and how are we going to say we're not coming out of this game letting them beat us doing this?'" McVay said.

End Trey Flowers has 7 1/2 sacks for a defense that includes veteran linebackers Dont'a Hightower and Kyle Van Noy and cornerback Stephon Gilmore, who was voted to the Pro Bowl. Safety Devin McCourty led the team in solo tackles and returned an interception for a touchdown.

"They've got a great understanding of how to attack you and make you feel like, all right, you're in defense mode when you're on offense," McVay said.

# Fitzgerald returning to Cardinals for 16th season

PHOENIX — That Hall of Fame slot will have to stay vacant for a while. Larry Fitzgerald isn't ready to hang up the cleats just yet.

The receiver, whose career statistics rank among the best ever to play the game, has signed a one-year contract to return for a 16th season with the Arizona Cardinals.

"No player has meant more to this franchise or this community than Larry Fitzgerald," team president Michael Bidwell said Wednesday in the news release announcing the signing.

Fitzgerald explained his decision in an Instagram post.

"A fire burned inside of me my rookie year," he wrote, "a desire, over all else, to be great. To excel on the field. To impact the lives of others off of it. I'm grateful that the fire still burns just as bright today, and that this organization has let me chase that fire for well over a decade."

Fitzgerald continued: "Nothing excites me more than continuing to chase greatness with everyone here on and off the field."

Fitzgerald, who will be 36 before the next season begins, may have been enticed by the

hiring of Kliff Kingsbury to replace the fired Steve Wilks. Kingsbury will bring his "air raid" offense from Texas Tech, where he coached for six seasons, and brought in veteran assistant coach Tom Clements to work with quarterback Josh Rosen, who had a rocky rookie season.

In recent years, State Farm Stadium rocked with chants of "Lar-ry! Lar-ry!" after one of his inevitable big plays. Probably no sports figure in Arizona has been as well-loved as No. 11.

Bidwell said in an interview with the team's flagship radio station, 98.7 FM Arizona's Sports Station, that he believes Kingsbury's hiring helped lure Fitzgerald back.

"I think they had a great conversation and he's excited about focusing on the offense," Bidwell said. "Obviously, he was very disappointed as all of us were in 2018. He bleeds Cardinal red. He wants to be part of getting this turned around. It's exciting he was able to make a quick decision and get right to it."

Arizona went 3-13 last season, the worst record in the NFL and matching the worst for the Cardinals since the franchise moved to the desert from St. Louis 30 years ago. The Cardinals finished last in the

league in total offense, passing and rushing.

Consequently, it was a down year for Fitzgerald statistically, too. After three straight 100-catch seasons, Fitzgerald had 69 receptions for 734 yards and six touchdowns. He did throw his first career TD pass, against the Rams in the next-to-last game of the season.

Fitzgerald's caught a pass in 227 consecutive games, the second-longest such streak in NFL history.

He passed more milestones last season.

With 16,279 yards receiving, Fitzgerald passed Hall of Famer Terrell Owens for second (behind Jerry Rice) on the NFL career list. With 1,303 career catches, he passed Rice for most receptions for one team in his career. By playing in the season finale at Seattle, Fitzgerald tied kicker Jim Bakken for most games by a Cardinal at 234.

Fitzgerald needs 23 catches to pass Antonio Gates into second (again behind Rice) in career receptions.

Drafted No. 3 overall by the Cardinals out of Pittsburgh in 2004, Fitzgerald has never indicated a desire to play anywhere else, despite the intermittent struggles of the team.

He's caught passes from 19

quarterbacks during his time in Arizona, with the most memorable years coming when he was paired with Kurt Warner and Carson Palmer.

He's been at his best in the postseason.

No one has matched his record of 942 yards receiving

in his first nine playoff games. He has five 100-yard receiving games in the postseason, an NFL-best three of at least 150 yards.

Fitzgerald earned \$11 million each of the past two years and this deal probably is about the same.

Toronto was led by Serge Ibaka with 23 points and 11 rebounds and Kyle Lowry with 20 points. The Raptors again played without Kawhi Leonard, O.G. Anunoby or Jonas Valanciunas.

Terry Rozier scored 22 of his 26 points in the

first half and the Boston Celtics coasted to their fifth straight victory with a 125-103 win over the struggling Cleveland Cavaliers.

Jaylen Brown scored 23 points, Gordon Hayward 18 and Jayson Tatum 17 for Boston, which won its 10th straight at home. Rozier, who added eight rebounds and six assists, started in place of the ill Kyrie Irving and shot 6 for 6 and scored 16 points in the opening quarter. He made his only two shots in the second — both 3-pointers — including a 31-foot buzzer-beater from the top of the key that gave Boston a 65-50

Williams then scored off an inbounds play to pull the Vols to 76-74, and Admiral Schofield hit a jumper with 38.1 seconds left to tie it at 76.

Williams blocked Lee's layup, then Aaron Nesmith blocked Jordan Bowden's layup try for the Vols. After a scramble for the ball, Williams came up with the steal and called timeout with 3.3 seconds to go. Brown blocked Williams' 3-point try, and the Vols couldn't get another shot off.

Nesmith had a career-high 24 points, Lee added 21, Ryan 12 and

Simisola Shittu 10.

## No. 25 LSU 92, Georgia 82

Tremont Waters scored a season-high 26 points and No. 25 LSU beat Georgia 92-82 on Wednesday night for its eighth straight victory.

Waters, who added four assists and four steals with no turnovers in 32 minutes, had a hand in 13 straight points by the Tigers late in the game. Normally, Williams is the one manufacturing a comeback. This time, it was surprising to see her let a sizable lead vanish. Only twice before in 380 Grand Slam matches had Williams lost after holding a match point, at the 2010 French Open and 1999

Australian Open.

In Thursday's semifinals, Pliskova will face No. 4-seeded Naomi Osaka, who advanced by beating No. 6 Elina Svitolina 6-4, 6-1. The other women's semifinal will be two-time Wimbledon champion Petra Kvitova against unseeded American Danielle Collins.

In men's action Wednesday, No. 28 Lucas Pouille of France reached his first Grand Slam semifinal by beating 2016 Wimbledon runner-up Milos Raonic of Canada 7-6 (4), 6-3, 6-7 (2), 6-4. Pouille, who is coached by two-time major champion Amelie Mauresmo, had been 0-5 for his career at the Australian Open until last week. His next opponent will be 14-time major champion Novak Djokovic, who moved on when 2014 U.S. Open finalist Kei Nishikori stopped playing while trailing 6-1, 4-1.

Nishikori was treated for

leg problems by a trainer.

This defeat is the earliest in Australia for Williams since 2014, when she exited with a fourth-round loss to Ana Ivanovic. Since then? She won the tournament in 2015, lost in the final in 2016, and won again in 2017 while pregnant, before missing last year's edition a few months after the birth of her daughter."

Williams — coming off an intense three-set victory over No. 1 Simona Halep in the fourth round — often stepped into the patches of shade behind each baseline.

She did not start well, not well at all. Her mistakes were mounting and deficit was growing.

In the first set alone, Williams made more than twice as many unforced errors as her opponent, 11-5, a pattern that would continue throughout. By the end, the margin was 37-15.

times we had as a team and it just went by so fast. When people say it happens in the blink of an eye, they literally mean in the blink of an eye, and I never really took it seriously."

When Cole was a freshman, Jack Merritt was someone he and most of the players looked up to. He was one of two seniors on the roster, a team captain and an example of a true leader. He was a role model that instilled many of the leadership qualities that Cole exudes today.

He learned plenty from Merritt that season, especially when the starting keeper went down in the season opener and Cole had to step in to fill the void.

"I looked to (Cole) and said, 'It's your time,' Port Charlotte coach Joe Roca said. "He just looked at me nervous, but he said, 'OK, coach.' He's always positive and such a tough kid in the goal. He traps everything."

Though his mother may disagree with the importance of competition in Cole's life, he is captivated by winning and it reaches further than just the pitch. Friendly battles with his younger brother Trevor, who is now a freshman for the Pirates, allowed his fight and resolve to come naturally.

Leading a host of his peers, many of which were older,

was a much more difficult undertaking.

As a keeper, Cole was in control of the field and the players on it. He had to get his defenders in position and help create fluid plays on the fly.

But first he had to gain their respect. That esteem that he earned as a freshman has now given him the ability to help further extend the Pirate culture as a senior.

"I always thought the hardest part was yelling at my senior center back or my junior right back," Cole said. "Everyone's older than you so you think that you don't have the respect, but everyone respected me right away."

"Now we have four freshman on varsity who start, so I'm trying to teach not only those four players, but the JV players. I'm trying to show them the leadership I have that I learned as a freshman, so they can be leaders one day."

His leadership may have neared its peak this season as the Pirates continue to rebuild with a young roster. Port Charlotte won just five games and Cole was constantly berated with shots, sometimes 25-30 a game.

It would've been easy to be frustrated, and no one would've blamed him much. As a senior, you want to make one last charge on your way out, but Cole's devotion to the program never wavered.

Up 4-0 to DeSoto County or down 7-2 after stopping 23-of-30 shots against Mariner,

he continued to be the pillar of support for the team.

"He's so consistent and doesn't give up," Roca said. "He's not a kid that kicks the ground or kicks the goal, nothing. He keeps pushing up and keeps making saves."

It's exhausting, but necessary. In Cole's mind, it's up to him to set the tone each and every game and show the team's youth what it takes to lead.

Whether that's laying out for a save or diving into a swarm of charging cleats, Cole leads with his play.

When next winter rolls around, Cole's name might not be remembered and another keeper will have taken his place in net. His 25-save games may be overlooked, but the foundation that he's helped lay will be present in a program that he believes is a sleeping giant.

"It's exhausting, but it shows the work ethic that I'm trying to show everyone," Cole said. "You play those 80 minutes whole-heartedly, 120 percent and then you can rest the entire night. You just give it 80 minutes and everything you got."

"Unfortunately this year we didn't really have the outcome that we wanted, but this was just a rebuilding year. I think in the years to come, Port Charlotte soccer is going to develop so fast. There's so much talent here."

"She's (Sepulveda) overcome some injuries, she's done enough through the season, she handled her business at districts and she handled her business today," said Wayne Skelton, North Port girls weightlifting coach.

Venice Lady Indian Arianna Kerr, winner of the 183-pound 2A District 16 title, added the regional title to her impressive resume.

"We had a goal set, the goals were the weights," said Sasha Hyer, Venice girls weightlifting coach.

"She accomplished half of her goals. She's returning to states, where last year she finished sixth, and the ultimate goal is to be back

in that medal round. We'll train like heck and see what happens in two weeks."

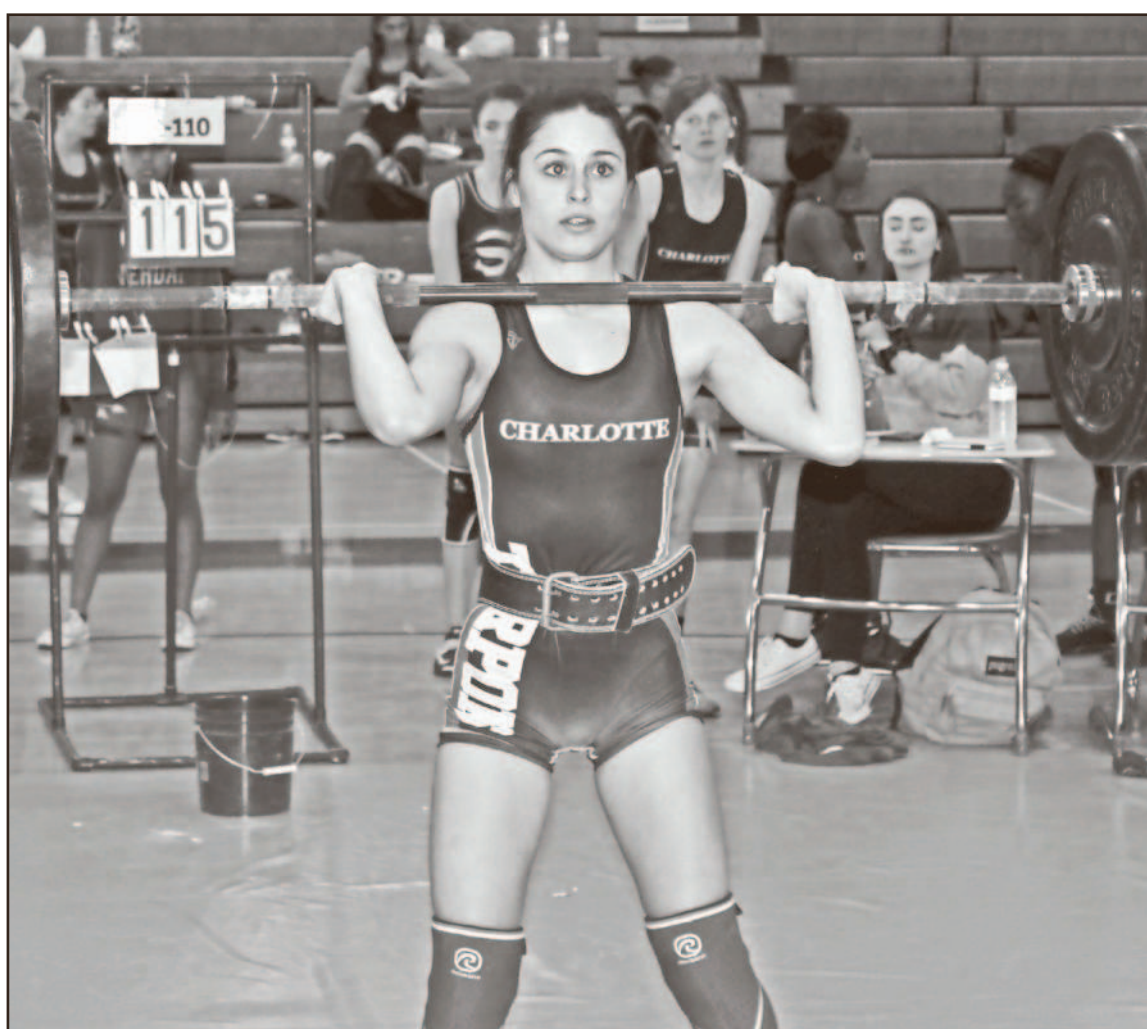

# Tarpons, Mantas part of deep field in regional final

## Charlotte boasts four wrestlers ranked at top of their divisions in state

There's a lot at stake.

This weekend will determine if the Charlotte Tarpons wrestling team will reach their objective. They have a formidable adversary standing in their way on Friday, having to go up against Palmetto Ridge at Osceola High School in Kissimmee in the State Dual Meet quarterfinal.

If they capture a regional crown they'll advance, with a State championship a distinct possibility on Saturday.

Charlotte and Palmetto Ridge have a long history of competing against one another, setting the stage for a rivalry match, one with important implications, with the opportunity to advance in the post-season and the possibility of a state championship within their grasp. Charlotte's roster boasts four wrestlers who are currently ranked no. 1 in the state in their various divisions, Donovan Cataldi, 120-pound; Lucas Willis, 152-pound; Anthony Andou, 195-pound and Jose Valdez, 220-pound.

"It's going to be a pretty big match, I think the winner can advance pretty far," said Evan Robinson, Charlotte wrestling coach.

"The coaches are friends, the

kids are friends, we travel in the offseason together. There's a lot of camaraderie there, but it's also a good rivalry."

Kissimmee is where the Tarpons state duals ended in 2018, but this year's team is confident that they will be able to extend their season, said Robinson.

"They're excited, they've been there, I think the nerves will be out of the way this time," said Robinson.

"Maybe we can shoot for that final. Those top four or five teams in the state, they're all very deep, Palmetto Ridge, Tampa Jesuit, Lake Gibson and Riverdale and us."

The team has prepared the same way they have for every tournament, through practice, working on their technique, going over what they did wrong the previous week, correcting it and staying focused and positive, said Robinson.

"You keep them aggressive and hungry," said Robinson.

Lemon Bay will also compete for a chance at a state title.

The Mantas reached the Final Four last year and will face Teneroc with hopes of taking its deep roster further.

The Quarterfinals will be held on Friday with the final two rounds on Saturday if either team advances.

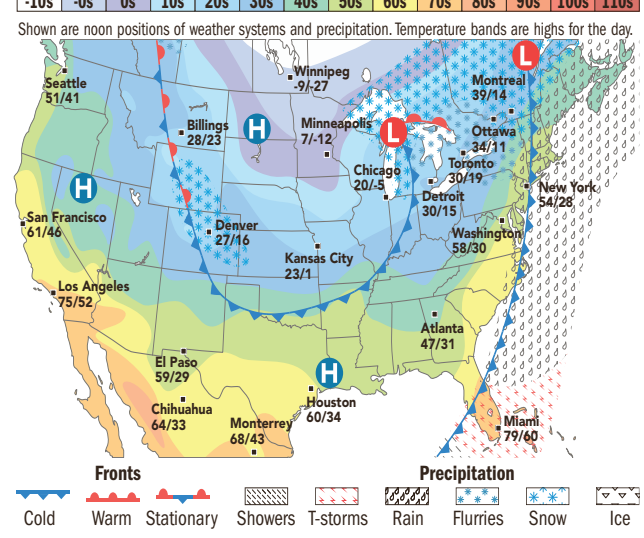

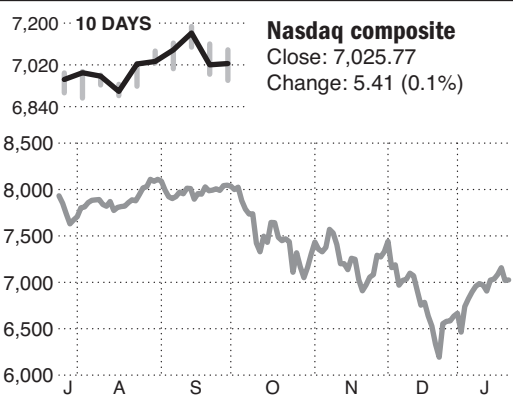
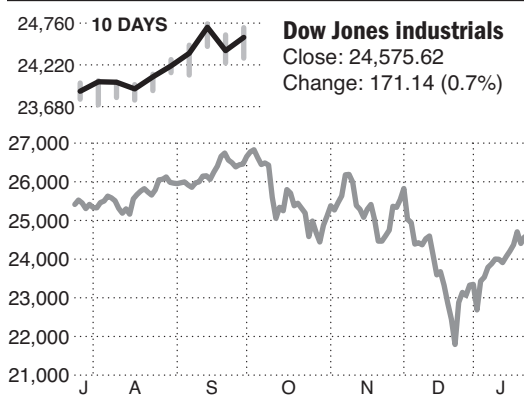
