Sebring moves up Sunday alcohol sales

SEBRING — The Sebring City Council voted 3-2 to start Sunday alcohol sales at 6 a.m., effective immediately. Councilmen Mark Stewart and Lenard Carlisle cast the dissenting votes, but the measure passed at Tuesday's meeting.

Alcohol sales were previously prohibited between the hours of 2 a.m. and 1 p.m. on Sundays. With the passage of the new ordinance, alcohol sales are now allowed beginning at 6 a.m. every day of the week.

The council had discussed the measure as a way to maintain some sort of

conformity to the new ordinance passed by the Highlands County Board of County Commission on Jan. 8 that allows alcohol sales at 7 a.m. on Sundays.

At its Jan. 15 meeting, council members had discussed having alcohol sales begin at 7 a.m. on Sundays, but decided to start at 6 a.m. since alcohol sales begin at 6 a.m. Monday through Saturday within the city limits. A start time of 6 a.m. on Sunday will allow the sales to begin at the same time every day of the week, providing for less confusion.

Councilman Tom Dettman had expressed his support of the new ordinance at the Jan. 15 meeting and felt that it

would allow restaurants in the city limits of Sebring to more effectively compete with restaurants in the county.

The current language of the ordinance reads, "All bars, dance halls, pool halls and bottle clubs located within the city limits wherein any beer, wine, liquor or alcoholic beverages are sold, served or consumed upon the premises shall be closed for business between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. every day ...

"No alcoholic beverages may be sold, consumed, served, or permitted to be served or consumed in any place holding

Oak Manor project moves forward

County approves amended petition, to set assessment hearing

SEBRING — Residents on Oak Manor Avenue will get a hearing to set up an assessment and pave their road.

County commissioners voted 3-2 Tuesday morning in favor of the residents' petition, after last-minute changes submitted by the road's largest landowner, Peace River Packing Company of Fort Meade, managed by Norman Larry Black Jr.

Commission Chair Jim Brooks and Vice Chair Ron Handley dissented. Timing of the changes irked Handley.

"The man has the petition for month after month after month and comes back at the 11th hour with changes," Handley said.

Changes included a stipulation that residents pay no more than half of the county's \$70,000 estimated price tag for paving the first 700 feet of Oak Manor. That includes the county's 5 percent administration fee.

Black had already agreed to pay to pave another 200 feet north from 6000 Oak Manor Ave., but got the county to drop the price of that from \$22,000 to \$20,000, of which he will pay half, not to exceed \$10,000, including a 5 percent fee.

Updates to be provided monthly at School Board meetings

SEBRING — The school district will be providing safety/security updates each month at a meeting of the School Board of Highlands County, Superintendent Brenda Longshore said at Tuesday's School Board meeting.

Frequent security updates have been the norm since the Feb. 14, 2018 school shooting in Parkland.

Deputy Superintendent Andrew Lethbridge, the district's safety point person, provided the security update noting that state Director of the Office of Safe Schools Damien Kelly visited the district on Tuesday and talked about many of the safety initiatives that are coming from the state level.

He saw some of the challenges Highlands County has with trying to transform campuses that were built very open to now be as

secure as possible.

School Board Vice Chair Donna Howerton asked if Kelly offered any recommendations to the district.

The strongest recommendations Kelly made the district is already doing and many of them don't cost

anything, such as making sure that all staff members lock doors, which is a simple thing that people don't understand the significance of that action.

It was pointed out that there has never been a casualty behind a locked door in a school, he said. "It is very, very important that our teachers lock the doors and they take that 'simple of a thing' as extremely serious as far as safety."

Lethbridge said Kelly talked about "hard corners," the areas of a classroom that cannot be seen from a window. The district is working with law enforcement to identify those areas in the classrooms.

Kelly also recommended that every staff member have the ability to initiate a school lockdown if they see something awry, Lethbridge noted.

Every second counts in a safety situation, he said.

School Board Member Jan Shoop said the district will be getting more security cameras for improved coverage of the district's campuses.

School Board Vice Chair Donna Howerton said all the schools will be getting new PA (public address)/intercom systems to improve the announcement of safety alerts.

"It is all pretty much safety related," she said.

The district's Capital Project Plan 2019-2020 shows a number of recommended

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SFSC awarded \$2.3 million job growth grant

AVON PARK — South Florida State College received an executed contract in January from the Department of Economic Opportunity signaling the official sanction of a \$2.3 million award to promote economic opportunity by improving public infrastructure and enhancing workforce training.

The grant from the Florida Job Growth Grant Fund was awarded under former Gov. Rick Scott.

“We are enormously grateful to Gov. Scott for supporting Florida’s Heartland Region with this grant award,” said Thomas C. Leitzel, president of SFSC. “The Job Growth Grant Fund award to South Florida State College will make a meaningful impact by supporting educational programs designed to put people to work in infrastructure support jobs that will contribute to positive economic growth and development.”

In the tri-county region of Highlands, DeSoto, and Hardee counties, there is a demonstrated need for affordable housing and

an educated workforce in order to encourage advanced manufacturing companies to set up locations in Florida’s Heartland and employees to relocate to homes in the region, both boosting the economy of the area.

With this grant, SFSC plans to create a construction institute to provide skills-based training that will meet and exceed the industry’s standard. Students who progress through the institute and graduate can find work with construction firms to sustain and expand the housing industry within the region.

The second phase of funding will expand and enhance the advanced manufacturing

curriculum at SFSC. Students who progress through these courses and graduate will be able to gain employment as a machinist or an industrial maintenance technician, both valuable to the manufacturing industry, which the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics says is on an upswing for hiring with the creation of 288,000 new jobs over the past year.

The third and final phase introduces another option for students who progressed through the advanced manufacturing curriculum and also those who have a military background. SFSC will create an electronic warfare program through a partnership with Florida

Institute of Technology and the United States Air Force. The electronic warfare program labs will be housed partially at the Avon Park Air Force Range. This program will be the first in the nation.

SFSC identified economic demands in the region and with the Florida Job Growth Grant, the college is able to address those needs head-on.

Mote aquarium churns ahead

How impressive is the artist's rendering of the Mote Marine Laboratory aquarium proposed for northern Sarasota County?

It shows a four-story building shaped like a cruise ship – a structure that rises from a narrow keel base to a wide flat top. It's raised on stilts above a lake. The outside is glass with ribs of metal. Marvel of technology, humongous gliding sharks are projected across the sheer exterior walls.

It is impressive. Especially since the new aquarium, proposed for 12 acres of county-owned land at Nathan Benderson Park just south of the University Town Mall, would be visible from nearby Interstate 75. Great visibility and easy access from the interstate.

Imagine how many visitors would come to this aquarium, compared to the current Mote Aquarium tucked out of the way on City Island in Sarasota. The existing aquarium is a very nice place (well worth a visit), but doesn't compare to what's envisioned in the new spot.

Right now, all that's on paper, or on artist's iPad. Mote expects it will need \$130 million to build the place – a very tall and glimmering order.

But the nonprofit organization already has commitments of \$30 million from donors. Sarasota County also may kick in \$20 million from its Tourist Development Tax fund. That will be a tight squeeze, considering the demand for money from that fund, which comes from hotel and short-term rental taxes. There is no argument with the potentially massive boost in tourism; the real hurdle here will be reappportioning the tourist tax fund.

Another hurdle is land acquisition. Last week, Sarasota County commissioners approved an agreement that will allow Mote to proceed with the project. The property transfer is complicated: Mote may either buy the land for a nominal fee or lease it, depending on technicalities in the zoning process.

In addition, a charter amendment approved by voters last November may gum up a clean sales deal. That's unfortunate. The amendment – brought by activists with a longtime, narrowly focused gripe involving an old right of way on Siesta Key – apparently will handcuff the County Commission on all land transfers close to any body of water. It was ill-advised amendment, and it passed. Now, we have to live with the consequences.

Fortunately, the county has devised alternative options that should allow the new aquarium to move forward, one way or another. Good.

This is an exciting project that will bring an extraordinary world of marine biology closer to tens of thousands more people, to residents, school children and tourists. The potential is great. Mote's aquarium deserves wholehearted public support.

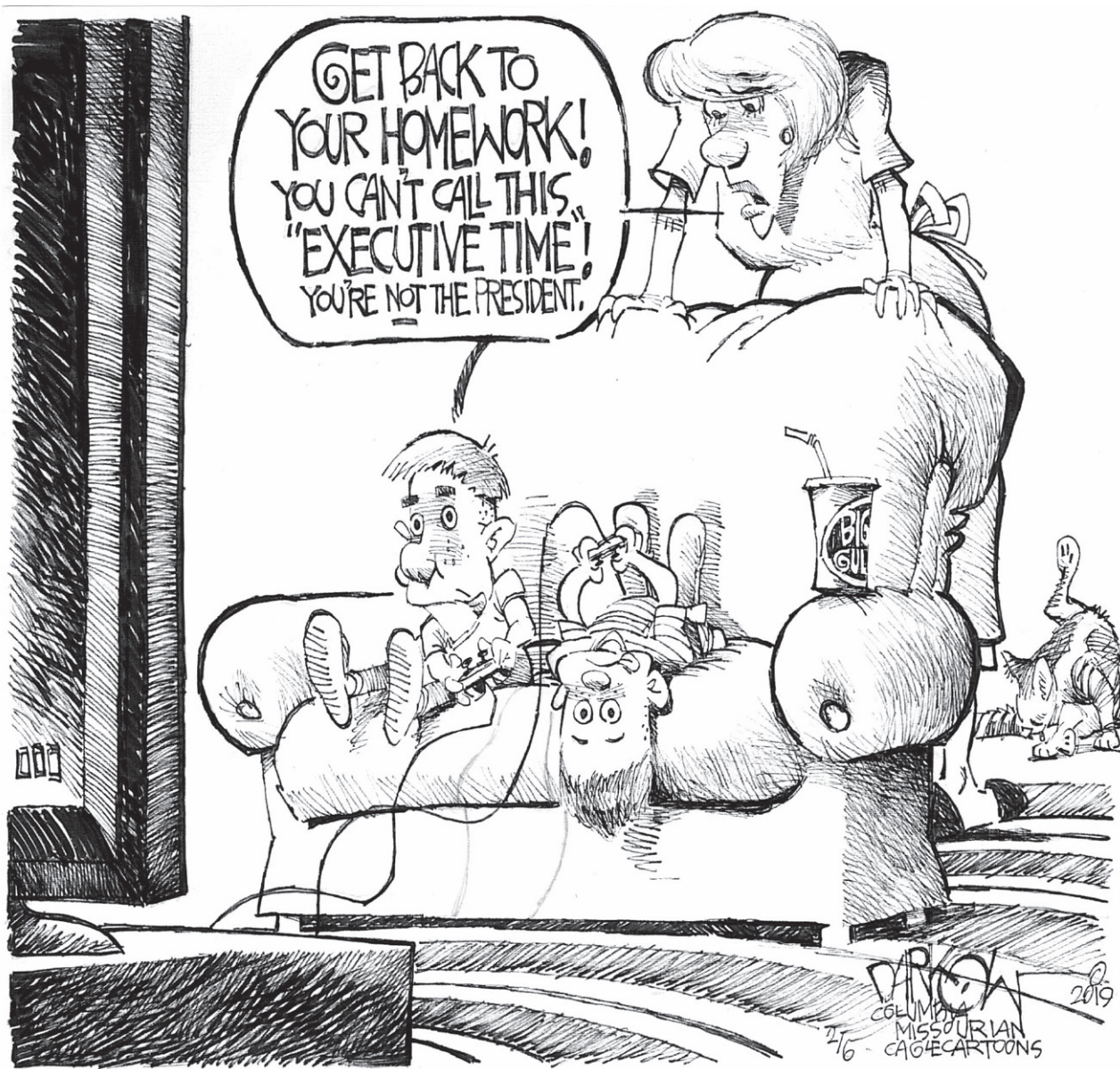

When was the last time you took a road trip? Recently our crew traveled just the other side of 3,000 miles. With an internship about to begin, Western Texas was the destination.

Along the way, we drove through the Florida panhandle. Twisted and broken pines littered the roadside in stark reminder of the prior storm season. Piled along the highway edges, despite our former hurricane experiences it was still sobering to view the destruction.

Motoring through the region, we arrived to dine at an empty restaurant. It felt a little queer being the only ones seated. Soon we figured out the issue. It was only 4:30 in the afternoon. Or was it 5:30 p.m.?

Mr. Harris tried to explain my phone wouldn't change. "But it does for Daylight Saving Time." "That's because you set the time," he explained.

"No, it does it by itself," I reminded. "You have it set for Eastern Time, but we are now on Central Time," he continued. "Wait, my phone says 6:30 p.m.," I insisted. Unable to confirm what time it actually was, we dined according to our tummies.

"We'll gain an hour of sleep," he cheered. "Wait, no we won't. When we get up, it will be earlier, right?" I mused. Road weary and confused, we honestly did not know. Thankfully, my phone eventually reverted to the proper time.

The next couple of states were viewed under sheets of water or darkness. Stuck in the midst of

a storm system, we were thankful it wasn't snow. Hitting the Dallas area, a GPS-related snafu sent us into the heart of the downtown, firmly encased in concrete. A lyric from an old Police song hinted around the edges of my nearly lost mind. "Packed like lemmings into shiny metal boxes, contestants in a suicidal race," I believe it went.

I had never seen so long into the distance or seen a sky remain lit in yellow far beyond sunset. No birds flew and animal life was absent. Like a desolate landscape, the emptiness was peace itself. I yearned to walk into nothing for days yet to come. We found ourselves quiet in reflection of the silence, stunning as it were.

The cowgirl code of "Never give up; never give in," seemed fitting. Those who ranch these lands receive a night sky of diamonds to go with their sunrises of molten gold. Texas may be on central time, but the experience goes on forever.

Additional language in the petition reiterates that Peace River Citrus Investments would pay the "not-to-exceed" costs or the actual costs, whichever are lower.

"It's the perfect example of what we're going to get into when we go into special deals with residents," Handley said. "I know people are watching and waiting with (their) hand out."

"I don't think so," said Commissioner Greg Harris, who believes the county could treat this as a special exception and hold all future requests to the code.

That code states the county normally splits all paving request costs with residents, who must have the funds upfront. Commissioners recently amended the code to allow them to let residents pay after the fact in installments, for up to 10 years.

Commissioners had voted on March 20, 2018, to let Oak Manor residents do that on a 10-year term, something the code didn't allow.

Handley and Brooks dissented then, too.

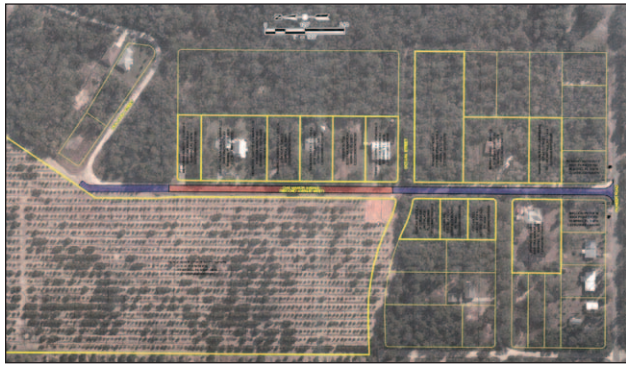
To make things right, they had to amend the code.

The vote on code changes was also 3-2 in December, with Brooks and Handley dissenting. They also voted 3-2 to send notices to all landowners, setting Jan. 31 as the deadline to sign the petition.

Black's suggested changes arrived just before that deadline, on Jan. 30, county officials said.

When contacted by the Highlands News-Sun, just before the deadline, Black declined to comment on his intentions and referred questions to Highlands County Road and Bridge Director Kyle Green.

Commissioner Don Elwell said Tuesday he didn't see much of a problem with the slightly lower price for Peace River Packing's additional 200 feet. He said the county had promised

residents for "a long time" — more than 10 years — that they would get their road paved.

Elwell said he wasn't quite happy with how long it took to get the petition signed.

Handley also took umbrage with Black locking in the residents' portion at \$35,000 and his own portion at \$10,000.

"He puts all the additional cost on us," Handley said.

Handley said the 100-year grove could have something buried in the right of way. Under this arrangement, Handley said, the county would pay for that, too.

Brooks said this would set a bad precedent.

"We promised this, no matter who 'we' is," Brooks said. "I also agree with Handley. We're setting a precedent. What happens if (someone) wants two miles of road paved?"

County Attorney Joy Carmichael said the commission would have opportunity for discussion later at the assessment public hearing. The soonest date would be March 19, the second commission meeting of next month.

They only had to vote whether or not to accept the petition, Carmichael said.

Handley moved to deny the petition, on the grounds that a not-to-exceed stipulation could have the county paying more than 50 percent of the final cost.

Elwell seconded the motion for discussion, but only Handley and Brooks voted yes.

Elwell then moved to accept the petition as amended and set a public hearing. Commissioner Arlene Tuck gave a second.

Handley and Brooks again voted against the petition, but all the rest voted yes.

Tuck said she voted yes for all the residents who live out there, not the grove owner, per se.

When residents met on Feb. 28, 2018, with Elwell, Green and County Administrator Randy Vosburg to talk about plans for realigning, fixing drainage and paving the road, Green said the full cost upfront would have had each property owner pay between \$1,150 and \$3,180, based on their percentage of road frontage.

Green said at the time that not all residents might pay, which could leave more for the rest to cover.

In a November 2018 County Commission meeting, Elwell said most landowners on the road didn't want the higher cost of paying it off in five years, and the largest landowner — Black — said "no" to the three-year option.

Road and Bridge Operations Supervisor Jerry Queen told commissioners in November 2018 that the department already had three or four projects with "pay-later" requests. Elwell confirmed through Queen that taking on all four would mean starting a fourth project while still having three with outstanding payments.

If someone in Broward County would have called a "code red" sooner, lives would have been saved.

"Every employee understands that they have the right and responsibility that if they see something that does not look right to them they can go ahead and initiate the 'active threat plan' for a lockdown scenario," Lethbridge said. If it's a false alarm then it serves as an unannounced practice, which is better than someone not taking action.

Longshore has been going to each school with a presentation covering key safety topics. She has been to about half of the schools.

Emails have been sent to all employees on these safety issues, Lethbridge said.

The report from the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Safety Commission states, "The District's (Broward) failure to mandate and implement hard corners or safe areas in every classroom was a safety breach that contributed to students being shot."

The report noted that only two of the 30 classrooms in building 12, in which accused shooter Nikolas Cruz entered, had marked hard corners. To the extent that when students attempted to

hide in the classrooms' hard corners they were mostly inaccessible due to teachers' desks and other furniture occupying the space.

Because classrooms lacked effective hard corners and/or students were not directed to hard corners, some students were forced to seek cover in an area visible to Cruz, according to the report. Cruz only shot people within his line of sight and he never entered any classroom.

Some students were shot and killed in classrooms with obstructed and inaccessible hard corners as they remained in Cruz's line of sight from outside the

classroom.

Also, the Safety Commission's report stated the lack of a formal Code Red or similar active assailant response policy in the Broward County Public Schools led to school personnel not knowing or clearly understanding the criteria for calling a Code Red, who could call it, or when it could be called.

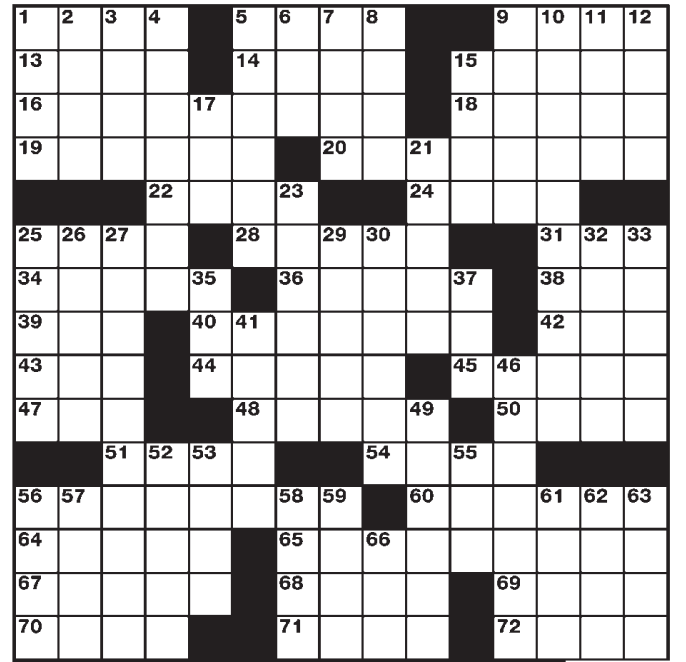
The lack of a called Code Red on Feb. 14, 2018, because there was no policy, little training and no drills, left students and staff vulnerable to being shot and some were shot because they were not notified to lockdown.

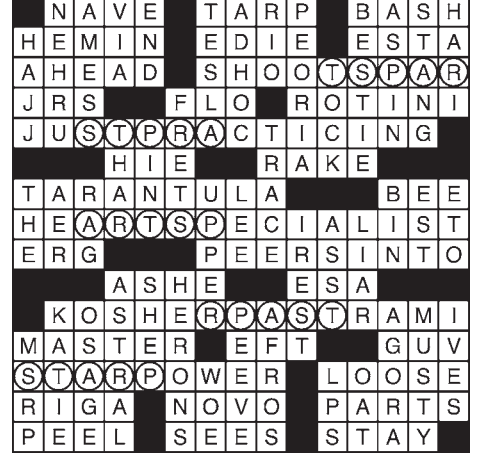

At Memorial Elementary School, the project plan shows \$8,000 for coverings of windows for energy savings and safety — reflective tint in the front foyer and all classroom windows.

Fred Wild Elementary School also requested custom one-way window tint totaling \$5,250.

For Woodlawn Elementary School, \$7,000 is designated for a door installed in the office to ensure controlled

entry onto the campus once the fencing project is complete.

Makes about 48 cookies
1/2 cup plus 1 tablespoon sesame seeds, preferably unhulled

1/3 cup granulated cane sugar
1/3 cup unbleached all-purpose flour
1/8 tablespoon kosher salt

2 extra-large egg whites, at room temperature
3 tablespoons unsalted butter with 82 percent butterfat, very soft

To bake the cookies:

Should you use a broth?

Cook book and food magazine recipe ingredient lists for soups and sauces, often include a broth. What is a broth? It is a liquid made from cooking vegetables, meat, or fish in water. A broth is incorporated to supposedly enhance flavor. The term stock is often used interchangeably with broth, although stock is made mostly from bones and meat. Bouillon cubes are dehydrated meat stock and come in the form of tablets.

Broth and its relatives stock and bouillon are actually unnecessary. Soup and sauce recipes always call for fresh or dried herbs, spices, or smoked bones, and other flavor bombs. Most commercial broths are replete with unhealthy additives and often contain high levels of sodium. Bouillon cubes are notoriously salty and

nutritionally poor as well.

Making your own broth (or stock) is a pointless time-consuming affair. Their recipes often require a long simmering time, even up to several hours! When you add the prep time to this endeavor you have to ask yourself: "Why go to all this trouble when I can just add herbs, spices, or other flavorful ingredients that are routinely used in all other cooked foods?" This is particularly the case in our times when people are extremely busy.

Another issue against the use of home-cooked or commercial broths: When vegetables are exposed to intense and prolonged heat, some of their fragile and heat-sensitive nutrients are rendered dead-on-arrival. So save time, and try the following examples of some no-broth, mouth watering wholesome soups — enjoy!

Split Pea Soup

4 servings
1 cup uncooked dried split peas
4 cups water
1 – 2 smoked soup bones

1 large carrot, sliced, then chopped
1 medium yellow onion, chopped
4 cloves garlic, finely chopped
1 stalk celery, sliced, then chopped
2 teaspoons dried tarragon

Salt and pepper to taste

1. Check peas and discard debris. Rinse peas in a strainer and place in a large saucepan. Add the water, cover; and bring to a boil over high heat. Reduce the heat to medium-low and cook 2 minutes. Turn off the burner and let the peas stand in the hot water 1 hour. 2. Add the bones cover, and cook soup slowly 35 minutes. 3. Prepare all vegetables in a bowl. Mix in vegetables and seasonings and cook 15 – 20 more minutes, stirring occasionally. Tip: You can also soak the peas in the water for 8 hours or overnight, and skip the pre-cooking stage in step one. Before you start, though, be sure and discard any debris mixed with the dry peas, and rinse the peas in a strainer. Proceed with step 2 and on.

Curried Sweet Potato Soup

2 servings
1 large sweet potato
2 tablespoons olive oil
1 yellow onion, chopped
2 teaspoons curry powder
1/2 teaspoon ground ginger

Salt and pepper to taste
2-1/2 cups water
Peel and rinse the potato and cut into 3/4-inch pieces. Place in a bowl and set aside. In a large saucepan heat the oil over medium heat. Add the onion, reduce the heat to medium-low, and cook uncovered 5 minutes, until the onion begins to turn translucent, stirring occasionally. Add curry, ginger, salt, and pepper and mix well to blend. Mix in potatoes and water and bring to a boil over high heat. Cover, reduce heat to medium-low, and

cook slowly 15 minutes, until the potatoes are fork-tender. Remove from stove and use a hand-masher to mash the potatoes. Allow some lumpiness to remain for a more robust soup.

4 servings
Chicken or turkey bones (skinless necks, backs etc.), or 4 skinless chicken drumsticks
5 cups water
1 large yellow onion, chopped

inch sticks 10 sprigs parsley leaves, chopped

In large saucepan place the water, and bones or meat and bring to a boil over high heat. Cover, reduce heat to medium-low and cook 20 minutes.

Add all other ingredients, except parsley, and cook 15 minutes longer. Remove from stove and mix in the parsley. After soup is done cooking, if chicken drumsticks were used, transfer them to a plate. Remove meat off bones, chop into small pieces, and return to soup. Discard the bones.

remaining batter, putting 8 rounds on each pan and leaving 1 1/2 inches between the rounds.

Bake the trays, one at a time, until the cookies are a uniform golden brown, 6 to 8 minutes. Remove from the oven and, while the cookies are still warm, run the offset spatula under each cookie and place it upside down on the rolling pin so that it curls around the pin. (You should be able to do 5 cookies on a rolling pin, so by the time the sixth cookie is about to be draped over the pin, a few should be ready to be moved.

Ideally, though, you will have two rolling pins.) If some of the cookies are not a uniform color, or if some cool too much and are no longer pliable, return them to the oven for another minute until evenly golden brown and again pliable.

Leave the cookies on the rolling pin until they cool completely and have become brittle, a matter of seconds. Carefully lift them off and store them in an airtight container at room temperature until you are ready to dip them. They will keep well for up to 3 days.

Dip the cookies in chocolate:

You can store the cookies and dip them on a day when you have tempered chocolate for another use. Or you can temper chocolate specifically to finish the cookies. Use a tempering machine to temper the chocolate.

Dip the convex (smooth) side of each cookie into the chocolate and then smooth the chocolate with a small offset spatula. Place on a work surface, chocolate side up, and let sit until the chocolate sets, about 30 minutes.

Store in an airtight container in a cool place, not in the refrigerator. They will keep for up to one week.

US says it won't cede leadership of IS fight despite pullout

Pompeo said planned withdrawal 'is not a change in the mission' but a change in tactics

WASHINGTON — America will not cede leadership of the fight against the Islamic State group, Secretary of State Mike Pompeo said Wednesday, as he tried to allay fears that President Donald Trump's decision to withdraw forces from Syria could imperil gains against

the militants there and in neighboring Iraq. Trump's announcement in December shocked U.S. allies and led to the resignations of Defense Secretary Jim Mattis and the top U.S. envoy to the 79-member, U.S.-led anti-IS coalition, Brett McGurk. Some military leaders, skeptical of Trump's course, renewed their questions even as Pompeo

spoke in defense. While the withdrawal would fulfill a Trump goal, top military officials have pushed back for months, arguing IS remains a threat and could regroup. U.S. policy had been to keep troops in place until the extremists are completely eradicated. Fears that IS fighters are making a strategic maneuver to lay low ahead of the U.S. pullout has

fueled criticism that Trump telegraphed his military plans — the same thing he accused President Barack Obama of doing in Afghanistan. Pompeo told foreign ministers and senior officials from global coalition that the planned withdrawal "is not a change in the mission" but a change in tactics against a group that should still be considered a

menace. IS has lost more than 99 percent of the territory it once held in the two countries. "In this new era, local law enforcement and information sharing will be crucial, and our fight will not necessarily always be military-led," he said. Trump's announcement "is not the end of America's fight. The fight is one that we will continue to wage alongside of you."

2018 was 4th warmest, but next 5 years could break records

14 weather/climate disasters cost more than \$1 billion, for total of \$91 billion

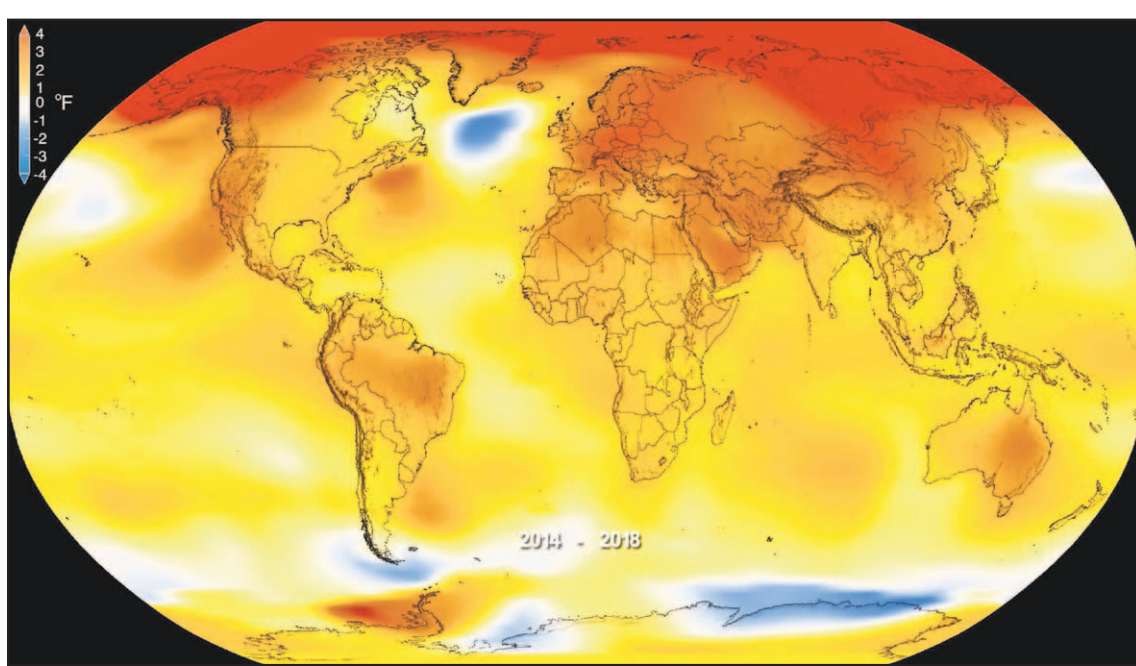

WASHINGTON — While 2018 was the fourth-warmest year on record, British meteorologists are predicting the next five years will be much hotter, maybe even record-breaking. Two U.S. agencies, the United Kingdom Met Office and the World Meteorological Organization analyzed global temperatures in slightly different ways, but each came to the same conclusion Wednesday: 2018 was the fourth-warmest year on record behind 2016, 2015 and 2017.

The U.S. government's National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration said 2018's average temperature was 58.42 degrees (14.69 Celsius), which is 1.42 degrees (0.79 Celsius) warmer than the 20th century average. Much of Europe had its warmest years on record. Records go back to 1880.

NASA and NOAA climate scientists said even though 2018 was a tad cooler than the three previous years that's mostly due to random weather variations.

"Never mind the little

wiggles from year to year. The trend is going relentlessly up, and it will continue to do so," Potsdam Institute climate scientist Stefan Rahmstorf said in an email. "Those who live in denial of this fact are in denial of physics."

Using computer simulations, the British weather office forecasts that the next five years will average somewhere between 58.51 and 59.49 degrees (14.73 to 15.27 Celsius). That would be warmer than the last four years.

Outside scientists, such as Natalie Mahowald of Cornell

University, said the forecast is consistent with what researchers know about warming and natural variability.

The obvious long-term trend of steady warming makes it easier to more accurately predict near future warming, said NASA chief climate scientist Gavin Schmidt.

The U.S. temperature in 2018 was the 14th warmest on average, said NOAA climate monitoring chief Deke Arndt.

Last year was also the third wettest on record in the U.S. Nine eastern states had their wettest years on record, "an

exclamation point on a trend of big rain" in the age of climate change, Arndt said.

There were 14 weather and climate disasters that cost more than \$1 billion, for a total of \$91 billion, Arndt said. At least 247 people died in those disasters. That's the fourth-highest number of billion-dollar disasters and the fourth-highest dollar amount, taking inflation into account. The damage included Hurricane Michael's \$25 billion tally and \$24 billion each from Hurricane Florence and the western wildfires.

Some still unpaid after government shutdown

Many federal workers are still reeling financially

Nearly two weeks after the end of the longest government shutdown in U.S. history, many federal workers are still reeling financially and waiting to be made whole by government agencies that have struggled with payroll glitches and delays in ensuring everyone gets paid.

Thousand have not yet received full back pay while scrambling to catch up on unpaid bills and repay unemployment benefits — all while another government shutdown looms next week.

"President Trump stood in the Rose Garden at the end of the shutdown and said, 'We will make sure that you guys are paid immediately.' ... And here it is, it's almost two weeks later," said Michael Walter, who works for the U.S. Department of Agriculture food safety inspection service in Johnstown, Pennsylvania, and only got his paycheck Wednesday. He said two co-workers told him they still had received nothing.

The government has been short on details about how many people are still waiting to be paid.

Bradley Bishop, a spokesman for the Office of Management and Budget, said the Trump administration had taken "unprecedented steps to ensure federal employees impacted by the shutdown received back pay within a week."

"Much opposite of 'slow and chaotic,' an overwhelming majority of employees received their pay by Jan. 31," he said, though he didn't respond to questions about how many people still hadn't been paid.

The USDA said in a statement that pay was its top priority, but also did not respond to questions about how many workers were still awaiting paychecks. Asked to confirm that some people hadn't been paid, USDA spokeswoman Amanda Heitkamp replied, "I'm not sure."

Crisis escalates in Virginia; top 3 Democrats under fire

Blackface photos and allegations of sexual assault surface after years

RICHMOND, Va. — The political crisis in Virginia exploded Wednesday when the state's attorney general confessed to putting on blackface in the 1980s and a woman went public with detailed allegations of sexual assault against the lieutenant governor.

With Gov. Ralph Northam's career already hanging by a thread over a racist photo in his 1984 medical school yearbook, the day's developments threatened to take down all three of Virginia's top elected officials, all of them Democrats.

The twin blows began with Attorney General Mark Herring issuing a statement admitting he wore brown makeup and a wig in 1980 to look like a rapper during a party as a 19-year-old student at the University of Virginia.

Herring — who has been among those calling on Northam to resign — said that he was "deeply, deeply sorry for the pain that I cause with this revelation" and that the days ahead "will make it clear whether I can or should continue to serve as attorney general."

Then, within hours, Vanessa Tyson, the woman whose

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NASA, SpaceX aim for March test of 1st new astronaut capsule

NASA's shuttle program ended in 2011, forcing reliance on Russian rockets at cost of \$82 million for each seat on Soyuz capsules

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — NASA and SpaceX are now aiming for a March debut of the first capsule from a private company designed to fly astronauts to the International Space Station.

No one will be on board for the crew Dragon's inaugural test flight to the orbiting outpost.

Officials on Wednesday set March 2 as the latest launch date. If the demo goes well, two NASA astronauts will take a test

flight in July aboard the SpaceX capsule.

It would be the first launch of U.S. astronauts into orbit, from U.S. soil, since NASA's shuttle program ended in 2011. President Donald Trump mentioned the upcoming milestone in Tuesday night's State of the Union address.

Boeing, meanwhile, is shooting for an April launch of its first Starliner capsule without a crew. The first Starliner flight with astronauts would be August at best.

NASA's commercial

crew program has been delayed repeatedly over the years, forcing a lengthy, expensive reliance on Russian rockets. Each seat on a Russian Soyuz capsule has cost NASA as much as \$82 million.

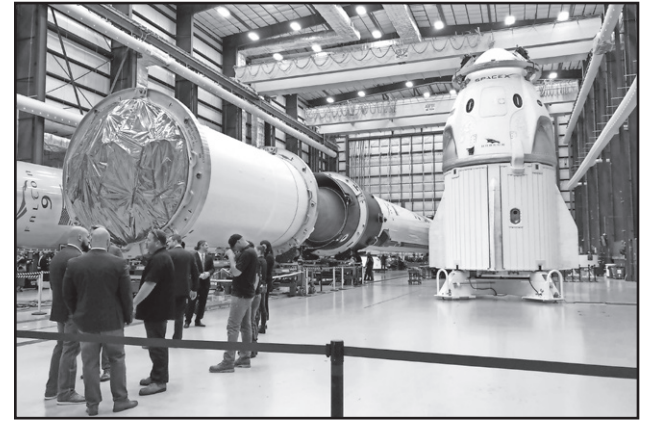
More time is still needed to complete testing, training and safety reviews, according to NASA.

Kathy Lueders, manager of NASA's commercial crew program, said the initial launches without astronauts are "a great dry run for not only our

hardware, but for our team to get ready for our crewed flight tests."

NASA is paying SpaceX and Boeing to provide the capsules and fly astronauts to and from the space station, allowing the space agency to focus on developing a new capsule, Orion, and rocket, Space Launch System or SLS, for transporting astronauts to the moon and, eventually, Mars.

SpaceX has been delivering cargo to the space station since 2012, under contract to NASA. Northrop Grumman

is NASA's other station supplier.

Blue Origin is also developing a crew capsule that might carry passengers by year's end. But

that capsule is intended for brief up-and-down hops, not orbital flights, by tourists. Virgin Galactic also is preparing a spaceship for tourists.

US prosecutors settle health false claims case for \$57M

BURLINGTON, Vt. (AP) — Federal prosecutors in Vermont announced Wednesday they have settled a false claims case against a Florida company that makes electronic medical records software for more than \$57 million.

Vermont U.S. Attorney Christina Nolan said the settlement with Greenway Health, of Tampa, was the second largest of its kind in Vermont history. The largest settlement was a similar health records case settled by federal prosecutors in Vermont in the spring of 2017 for \$155 million.

The two cases represent the largest electronic health records settlements in the United States, Nolan said.

Prosecutors also allege Greenway paid \$750,000 in kickbacks to medical providers to recommend the software.

Nolan says Greenway misrepresented the capabilities of its product known as "Prime Suite," which is used by health care providers in Vermont and across the country to track patient medical records, by looking at tests before they were administered and then manipulating the software to ensure it passed the test.

Prosecutors allege Greenway caused health care providers to submit false claims to the federal Department of Health and Human Services so the company could receive undesired incentive payments related to the operation of its Prime Suite software.

The allegations involve false claims against the Medicare fund.

Wife of UCF official found dead charged with murder

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Authorities say they've arrested the estranged wife of a University of Central Florida faculty member who was found dead in his home last month.

Jail records show Danielle Redlick was arrested Wednesday and charged with second-degree murder and tampering with physical evidence.

Winter Park police responded to the Orlando-area home in January following a 911 call about an unresponsive man. Officers found 65-year-old Michael Redlick dead when they arrived.

Online court records show the Redlicks had been going through a divorce.

Ag commissioner creates cannabis director position

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Florida now has a director of cannabis, who will be tasked with developing a hemp industry for the Department of Agriculture.

Agriculture Commissioner Nikki Fried announced Wednesday that she hired Holly Bell for the position.

Fried took office this year after campaigning on making medical marijuana more accessible and expanding industrial hemp.

Bell has a consulting firm in Nashville, Tennessee, that helps businesses in the hemp industry. She also has experience in banking.

Teen who attacked mom with Molotov cocktail charged

DAVIE, Fla. (AP) — A Florida teen will be tried as an adult on charges that he beat his mother with a baseball bat and lit her on fire with a Molotov cocktail because she scolded him about sneaking out of the house and using social media.

James Edward Monroe faces charges including attempted murder and arson for the Jan. 22 attack.

Authorities say Monroe filled a bottle with alcohol, capped it with a rag and threw it into his mother's bedroom. The Sun Sentinel reports the bottle burst, causing glass and fire to fall on her. Leone said the 17-year-old then beat her.

Chief Assistant Public Defender Gordon Weekes said Monroe doesn't have a criminal record and has a high GPA in school.

His mother was treated for burns and underwent emergency surgery.

Report says Florida's coasts, waterways are at crossroads

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — A new report says Florida's coasts and waterways are at a crossroads following a year when both were traumatized by red tide and blue-green algae.

The report released Wednesday by the Ocean Conservancy provides a synopsis of Florida's water problems and a summary of solutions.

The report notes that last year had the worst blue-green algae bloom in Florida history, and a devastating red tide outbreak that killed hundreds of animals and cost coastal communities millions of dollars.

The report says that Floridians should be working to eliminate ocean trash by participating in beach clean-ups and ending nutrient runoff into waterways from agriculture and septic tanks.

The report also recommends raising the Tamiami Trail so that more water from Lake Okeechobee can flow into the Everglades and Florida Bay.

Florida's busiest airport had 47 million travelers in 2018

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Florida's busiest airport had a record-breaking 47 million passengers passing through it in 2018.

Orlando International Airport officials said Wednesday that the 47.7 million passengers last year marked an almost a 7 percent increase over 2017.

The overwhelming majority of those passengers, or 41 million people, were traveling domestically, which was up more than 6 percent from the previous year.

The airport had 6.6 million international travelers, an increase of more than 11 percent.

The Orlando airport now flies to 150 non-stop domestic and international destinations.

Bay County to shutter schools due to Hurricane Michael

Florida county suffering a population drop after being hit hard by Hurricane Michael has voted in favor of temporarily closing three elementary schools.

The Panama City News Herald reports that the Bay County School Board voted Tuesday to close the schools due to hurricane damage and enrollment drops.

Many people have simply moved away from Bay County since Hurricane Michael slashed through the Panhandle last October. The school district previously estimated it may lose as many as 4,700 students.

Doctor, nursing facility under fire for kickback scheme

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — An orthopedic surgeon, a nursing facility and several health care executives will pay \$1.5 million to settle federal allegations of a kickback scheme involving Medicare and TRICARE patients.

The Orlando Sentinel reports Dr. Kenneth Krumins agreed to pay \$500,000, while Conway Lakes Health & Rehabilitation Center, its Atlanta-based management company Clear Choice Health, and three executives — Matthew File, Jeffrey Cleveland and Geoffrey Fraser — will collectively pay \$1 million.

The Justice Department says Krumins was paid under a sham "medical director" agreement to refer patients to Conway Lakes in violation of the Anti-Kickback Statute.

Key West bans sale of sunscreens that harm coral reefs

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP) — City officials in Key West voted to ban sunscreens containing two ingredients that scientists have said are harmful to the coral reef ecosystem.

In a 6-1 vote Tuesday, the Key West City Commission banned the sale of sunscreens using oxybenzone and octinoxate beginning on Jan. 1, 2021.

Mayor Teri Johnston said it's the commission's "obligation" to protect the reef, which is the only living coral barrier reef in the continental U.S.

Researchers say the chemicals lead to bleaching, DNA damage and death of the corals.

Last year, Hawaii banned sale and distribution of similar sunscreens beginning in 2021.

Barnacle-covered wooden cross washes up on Florida beach

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — A large, barnacle-covered wooden cross has washed ashore along a South Florida beach, captivating tourists who dragged it from the water's edge.

John Skorupa tells the Sun Sentinel he was walking along Fort Lauderdale beach on Saturday when he came upon the 20-foot cross swaying in the water.

A group of people carried it up and onto the beach, where it now rests in the sand, becoming a popular photo spot.

Skorupa says theories about its origins abound at the local tiki bar. The one that makes the most sense to him is that it floated from Puerto Rico after a series of hurricanes.

11 injured when stolen van crashes into commuter bus

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Authorities say 11 people were injured when a stolen van crashed into a commuter bus in Florida.

The Daytona Beach News-Journal reports that the crash happened Tuesday morning at a Daytona Beach intersection. Officials say none of the injuries were life-threatening.

Police say they had been searching for the stolen van when it ran a stop sign and hit the county bus. A passenger in a van was initially mistaken for an injured pedestrian but later identified as a suspect. The van's driver tried to run away but was arrested a short time later when a resident confronted him and blocked his escape until officers arrived.

County with voting problems to spend \$15M on new machines

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — A Florida county where voting problems led to the suspension and resignation of its elections supervisor is spending \$15.7 million on new voting machines.

The Palm Beach Post reports that Palm Beach County commissioners Tuesday on the purchase of 900 scanners, 75 scanner components, 10 high-speed digital scanners and 525 ExpressVote terminals that comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Republican Gov. Ron DeSantis suspended Democrat Susan Bucher last month and replaced her with Republican lawyer

Wendy Link. Link says she's confident that the investment will prevent another election like the one in November, where officials struggled to complete recounts in four close races, including contests for governor and U.S. Senate.

Link says the new voting system should be ready by March 2020 for the Democratic presidential primary. Next month's municipal elections will use the old machines.

Ex-commissioner in Florida city convicted of corruption

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — A former city commissioner in Florida is facing prison time after he was convicted of corruption charges arising from a tiki bar he operated in a strip mall.

Court records show a jury late Monday found 56-year-old David McLean guilty of bribery, official misconduct and theft charges. McLean was a commissioner in the South Florida city of Margate.

Trial evidence showed McLean used his influence to do city favors for the tiki bar's landlord. In return, the landlord forgave about \$8,000 in rent and made another \$6,000 in cash payments.

Broward County prosecutors say McLean faces about four years in prison when he is sentenced in March.

McLean previously was convicted of similar charges in federal court, but an appeals court overturned the verdict because no federal money was involved.

1 year in US prison for Chinese student for military photos

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP) — A Chinese student has been sentenced to a year in federal prison after pleading guilty to illegally taking photos of a U.S. military installation in the Florida Keys.

A federal judge imposed the sentence Tuesday on 20-year-old Zhao Qianli. Authorities say he took photos in September of sensitive areas of the Key West Naval Air Station after walking around a fence into a well-marked restricted zone.

Zhao's attorney insisted he was merely a tourist who got lost and wandered onto the base. But investigators say he had only base photos on his cellphone and camera, and none of familiar tourist locations in Key West.

Zhao was in the U.S. to study musicology as part of a summer exchange program from North University of China.

Federal financial watchdog to gut most payday lending rules

Consumer groups say payday lenders exploit borrowers with interest rates as high as 400 percent

NEW YORK — The nation's federal financial watchdog said Wednesday that it plans to abolish most of its critical consumer protections governing payday lenders.

The move is a major win for the payday lending industry, which argued the government's regulations could kill off a large chunk of its business. It's also a big loss for consumer groups, who say payday lenders exploit the poor and disadvantaged with loans that have annual interest rates as much as 400 percent.

The cornerstone of the regulations was a requirement that lenders make sure borrowers could afford to repay a payday loan without being stuck in a cycle of debt, a standard known as "ability to repay." This standard would be eliminated under the new rules.

Critics of the payday lending industry have argued that without these underwriting standards, the CFPB's new regulations are effectively toothless. The main criticism of the payday lending industry was that many borrowers would take months to repay a loan that was originally designed only to last a couple of weeks.

"This proposal is not a tweak to the existing rule ... it's a complete dismantling of the consumer protections (the bureau) finalized in 2017," said

Alex Horowitz, a researcher with Pew Charitable Trusts, a think tank whose research on the industry was relied on heavily by the bureau when the original rules were unveiled a year and a half ago.

The announcement was the first rollback of regulations under the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau's new director, Kathy Kraninger, who took over the bureau late last year. Mick Mulvaney, who was appointed by President Donald Trump's as acting director of the bureau in late 2017, announced a year ago that the bureau was intending to revisit the rules. As a Congressman from South Carolina, Mulvaney received tens of thousands of dollars in political donations from the payday lending industry, raising concerns he was too connected to the industry to appropriately regulate it.

The Community Financial Services Association, a payday lending group, is holding its annual conference in March at Trump's Doral golf club in Miami. It held its conference there last year, too. Government watchdog groups have criticized the use of Trump hotels and resorts by businesses and lobbying groups as legal bribery, a way to influence regulation and policy by giving money to the president.

Under President Obama, the CFPB spent close to five years

working on a process to finally nationalize the regulation of the payday lending industry, which is mostly regulated at the state level. The bureau started the process back in 2012 and its finalized rules were finished in late 2017. It was the last major pieces of regulation done under Richard Cordray, the bureau's first permanent director, before he left the bureau.

"I think this is a bad development for consumers," Cordray said. "We looked carefully at this industry and there was a common problem of borrowers getting trapped in long-term debt. We had put together what I considered to be a modest proposal. The change is really disappointing and hasty."

CFPB did propose keeping one part of the payday lending regulations: a ban on the industry from making multiple debits on a borrower's bank account, which consumer advocates argued caused borrowers hardship through overdraft fees. In a statement, the CFSA felt the CFPB's repeal did not go far enough, and would have wanted the regulations over debits repealed as well.

The proposed new rules are subject to a 90-day comment period by the public. The proposed changes are almost certain to face legal challenges, since the bureau is taking a radical departure from its previous position.

US attorney in Philadelphia sues over safe injection site

This would be first-in-the-nation supervised drug injection site to address the city's opioid problem

PHILADELPHIA — The top federal prosecutor in Philadelphia has filed suit to stop a nonprofit from opening a first-in-the-nation supervised drug injection site to address the city's opioid problem.

The lawsuit pits U.S. Attorney William McSwain's stance on safe injection sites against those of Philadelphia's mayor, district attorney and a former Pennsylvania governor. McSwain believes supporters should try to change the laws, not break them.

"Normalizing the use of deadly drugs like heroin and fentanyl is not the

answer to solving the epidemic," McSwain said at a Wednesday news conference, while protesters gathered outside his Independence Mall office.

They said thousands of people could die of overdoses in Philadelphia in the time it might take to change the law.

Philadelphia has the highest opioid death rate of any large U.S. city. Mayor Jim Kenney and some city officials have said they'd support a private entity operating and funding safe injection sites. A likely location is the Kensington neighborhood, north of downtown, where so-called "drug tourists" flock to buy high-grade heroin and city

librarians have learned to use Naloxone to respond to bathroom overdoses.

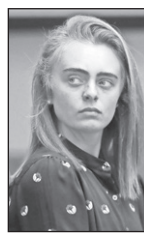
"We are not going to prosecute people who are trying to stop people from dying," District Attorney Larry Krasner said in response to McSwain's remarks. "We had 1,200 people die last year. I think it is inexcusable to play politics with their lives."

Krasner said he has visited a safe injection program in Vancouver to study the situation. The staff does not administer drugs, he said, but instead nudges users if they fall asleep or have trouble breathing and, as a last resort, administers Naloxone.

Conviction upheld for woman who urged boyfriend's suicide

BOSTON (AP) — A young woman who as a teenager encouraged her boyfriend through dozens of text messages to kill himself is responsible for his suicide, Massachusetts' highest court ruled Wednesday in upholding her involuntary manslaughter conviction.

The Supreme Judicial Court said in a unanimous decision in the novel case that Michelle Carter's actions caused Conrad Roy III to die in a truck filled with toxic gas in a deserted parking lot nearly five years ago.

Suspect in teen's abduction ordered to stand trial

BARRON, Wis. (AP) — A man accused of kidnapping a 13-year-old Wisconsin girl and killing her parents waived his right

to a preliminary hearing Wednesday, telling his family, "I love you," after he was ordered to stand trial.

Jake Patterson, 21, is accused of killing James and Denise Closs on Oct. 15 and kidnapping their daughter, Jayme Closs, from their Barron home. Jayme escaped on Jan. 10, after 88 days.

Inmate freed with help by Kim Kardashian gets book deal

NEW YORK (AP) — An inmate whose life sentence was commuted thanks in part to the efforts of Kim Kardashian West has a book deal, along with deals for film and television rights. Harper announced Wednesday that Alice Marie Johnson's "After Life: My Journey From Incarceration to Freedom" comes out May 21.

"I feel humbled that the telling of my story gives hope and my years of pain were not in vain," Johnson said in a statement.

Migrant caravan detained in old factory, across from Texas

PIEDRAS NEGRAS, Mexico (AP) — A caravan of 1,600 Central American migrants was surrounded Wednesday by Mexican authorities in an old factory a short distance from Texas, where they hoped to seek asylum even as U.S. authorities sent extra law enforcement and soldiers to stop them.

President Donald Trump warned in his State of the Union speech on Tuesday of migrant caravans and accused Mexican cities of busying migrants to the border "to bring them up to our country in areas where there is little border protection."

The migrants arrived Monday in Piedras Negras, Mexico, across the Rio Grande from Eagle Pass, Texas. The caravan is the first in recent months to head toward Texas instead of California.

The state government organized 49 buses from the interior cities of Saltillo and Arteaga to ensure the migrants' safety, said Jose Borrego, a spokesman for the Coahuila state government.

But Mexican police and

soldiers are holding the caravan in the factory and not letting them stay anywhere else, in part to prevent a mass attempt by migrants to cross the Rio Grande. Only migrants who receive a humanitarian visitor visa from Mexico were to be allowed to leave the factory, Borrego said.

Long lines were forming inside the factory of people applying for "humanitarian visas" to allow them to leave the enclosure but remain in Mexico, the San Antonio Express-News reported.

On the Texas side, a long line of law enforcement vehicles guarded the U.S. side of the Rio Grande to catch anyone trying to cross illegally.

Eagle Pass has relatively little fencing compared with other sections of Texas or other border states.

Congressional Democrats have not acceded to Trump's demand for \$5.7 billion to build a border wall. DHS in December released a list of where it would want to build new sections of wall if Congress provided \$5 billion. The list included 159 miles in Texas, but none in the Border Patrol's Del Rio sector, where Eagle Pass is located.

Russian court sends Jehovah's Witness to prison for 6 years

MOSCOW (AP) — A regional court in western Russia on Wednesday sentenced a Danish Jehovah's Witness to six years in prison, in arguably the most severe crackdown on religious freedom in Russia in recent years.

The court in Oryol found Dennis Christensen guilty of extremism, making him the first Jehovah's Witness in Russia to be sent to prison.

Christensen was detained during a police raid on a local prayer meeting he was leading in May 2017.

"I do not agree with this judgment, it's a big mistake," Christensen told reporters after the sentencing in the city of Oryol. His wife Irina Christensen added: "I'm really sad that such a thing is happening in Russia, very sad. The same thing could happen to any of us."

The verdict was met with consternation around the world including from the U.S. Embassy, which expressed its concern and urged Russia to respect individual's religious freedom.

Russia in recent years has used its vaguely worded extremism laws to go after dissenters, opposition activists and most recently religious minorities. Russia officially banned the Jehovah's Witnesses in 2017 and declared the religious group an extremist organization.

Nearly 100 members of the group face charges in Russia, and more than 20 of them are in jail awaiting trial. Before the ban, the world headquarters of the Jehovah's Witnesses claimed about 170,000 adherents in Russia.

Trial sought for 25 suspects in 2017 Italian hotel avalanche

ROME (AP) — A trial is being sought for 25 suspects in the deadly 2017 avalanche at a resort hotel in the Italian Apennine mountains.

The Italian news agency ANSA reported that prosecutors in Pescara formally asked a judge Wednesday to issue trial indictments against 24 people and the hotel company. Accusations include multiple manslaughter and causing a disaster.

Tons of snow smashed into the Hotel Rigopiano in Farindola on Jan. 18, 2017, killing 29 guests and staff.

The investigation has largely focused on why help was so slow in arriving, why the hotel was not evacuated after a heavy snowstorm and if it had authorization to be built in an area known to be prone to avalanches.

Istanbul building collapse kills 2; rescuers save 6

ISTANBUL (AP) — An eight-story building collapsed in Istanbul on Wednesday, killing at least two people, Turkish officials said. Rescue workers pulled six others out of the rubble and were working to free more who were trapped.

The building, which had 43 people living in 14 apartments, had a street-level ground floor and seven higher floors, Istanbul Gov. Ali Yerlikaya said, adding that the top three floors had been built illegally.

It was not immediately clear how many people were trapped in the wreckage.

Former Prime Minister

Binali Yildirim told reporters at the site that six people were pulled out of the rubble alive and rescuers had made contact with four others still inside the wreckage.

The chief prosecutor's office said it launched an investigation into the collapse of the 27-year-old building. Yildirim said neighboring buildings had been evacuated in case they were also damaged.

The collapse took place about 4 p.m. on the Asian side of Istanbul in the mostly residential Kartal district. Security camera footage on HaberTurk television showed several people, including schoolchildren with backpacks, running away from the site as the building tumbled down and a cloud of dust engulfed the area.

Authorities sealed off the area as crowds gathered to watch or help with the rescue operation.

Turkey's broadcasting watchdog later announced the prosecutor's office had ordered a media blackout, citing the investigation into the collapse. Turkish television stations then immediately ended their live broadcasts from the scene.

Venezuela military barricades bridge in attempt to block aid

CUCUTA, Colombia (AP) — The Venezuelan military has barricaded a bridge at a key border crossing, issuing a challenge on Wednesday to a U.S.-backed effort by the opposition to bring humanitarian aid into the troubled nation.

The Tienditas International Bridge was blocked a day prior by the Venezuelan National Guard with a giant orange tanker, two large blue containers and makeshift fencing near

the border town of Cucuta, Colombian officials said.

The bridge is at the same site where officials plan to store humanitarian aid that opposition leader Juan Guaido is vowing to deliver to Venezuela. The Trump administration has pledged \$20 million in aid and Canada has promised another \$53 million.

The squabble is now the latest front in the battle between Guaido and President Nicolas Maduro, who is vowing not to let the supplies enter the country. Maduro argues Venezuela isn't a nation of "beggars" and has long rejected receiving humanitarian assistance, equating it to a foreign intervention.

Looking up at the giant containers blocking the bridge Wednesday, aid worker Alba Pereira shook her head and dismissed the barricade as another government ploy. She said that humanitarian volunteers would find a way to get the aid into the country regardless.

Roughly 40 countries around the world have backed Guaido, who swore himself in as president in late January contending that as head of the opposition-led National Assembly he is Venezuela's rightful leader because Maduro's re-election last year was a sham.

Guaido says the emergency shipment is a "test" for Venezuela's armed forces, which will have to choose if they allow the much needed aid to pass, or if they instead obey orders. No details have been released on exactly how the opposition plans to get the shipments into Venezuela.

Soaring hyperinflation has forced millions of Venezuelans to flee or go hungry as they struggle to find or afford basic items like food and medicine.

Latex condoms are effective against an HIV transmission

DEAR DR. ROACH: I read that condoms have tiny holes in them, and that they don't provide protection against HIV/AIDS. Is this true? — G.D.M.

ANSWER: Condoms do have tiny holes in them if magnified enough; however, latex condoms are effective at preventing HIV transmission, both measured in a laboratory as well as in clinical studies. In couples who use condoms 100 percent of the time, HIV transmission is reduced by at least 90 to 95 percent.

Another way of reducing transmission is by pre-exposure prophylaxis. This involves taking a medication in order to prevent infection. In people who took the medication as directed, there was a 96 percent reduction in HIV transmission. The combination of pre-exposure prophylaxis and condoms provides an even greater reduction in risk. Condoms also provide protection against other sexually transmitted infections.

Post-exposure prophylaxis is appropriate for someone who had

condomless sexual intercourse with a person potentially infected with HIV or who had a needlestick from a person known or suspected to have HIV.

Another way of reducing HIV transmission is to treat the person who is infected. With effective treatment, most people with HIV can achieve no detectable virus in the blood. With no detectable virus in the blood, the risk for infection becomes very, very low, with more than 99 percent effectiveness at preventing transmission. This is partly why it's so important to

identify and treat everyone with HIV as early as possible. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends routine testing for everyone, and I agree.

Finally, people can reduce HIV transmission by abstinence — that is, not having sex and not sharing needles or other devices that can transmit blood.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I'm an 83-year-old widower. I had a quadruple bypass 15 years ago, but I exercise regularly and I think my health is good. I have been using a homeopathic human growth hormone supplement gel for the skin. It costs \$170 for a six-week supply. Is this good for my health, or can it hurt me? — C.F.

ANSWER: I looked at the information about the supplement, and I don't think it is good for your health. However, it isn't likely to harm you except financially.

The supplement contains human growth hormone. Human growth hormone does have important actions in the body, and when used in pharmacologic

doses in adults, it increases muscle growth. It's used by people with muscle wasting caused by HIV, for example.

Athletes have used this drug illicitly to improve athletic performance, although it has not been proven to improve strength, power or endurance.

HGH is not absorbed when taken orally, and although there has been some research on skin absorption of HGH after treating the skin with radiofrequency energy to create channels for the drug to be absorbed, it still is not well-absorbed through intact, healthy skin.

Further, the information I found shows that the HGH in your supplement is present at a "30X" dilution. This doesn't mean it is diluted to one part in 30: "30X" in homeopathic products means that it has been diluted a billion, billion, trillion times, and that there is virtually no chance that there is even a single molecule of HGH in a year's worth of gel, which likely wouldn't be absorbed anyway. My advice is to save your money.

The vulnerability kept East-West from competing to five diamonds. It would have cost 500 points, assuming East dropped the offside king of trumps. This would have shown a small profit if North-South made their vulnerable game, but when a sacrifice is going to be that expensive, it's not such a bad idea to just pass and defend. You might

defeat the contract, or declarer might not find the winning line of play.

The club's Saturday night duplicate was raging when Hard Luck Louie found himself declarer in today's deal. The opening diamond lead went to East's ace, and East shifted to the queen of spades. "That's a good break for me," thought Louie, as he covered with his king. West won and continued with the 10 of spades, covered by the jack and ruffed by East. The nine of spades eventually became the setting trick. "I hate my life," said Louie.

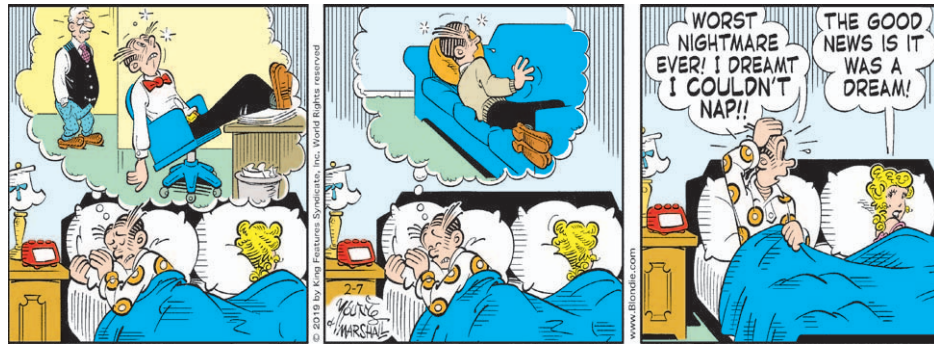
Lucky Larry declared the same hand with the same defense. He gave the queen of spades a long look and decided that East would never have shifted to that card with a doubleton. Any spade losers would never go away, so the lead had to be a singleton. Larry did not cover the queen but allowed it to hold the trick instead. He won East's club shift, drew trumps with the aid of a finesse, and conceded a trick to the ace of spades, making four. Nice play!

Army aims for more combat-ready troops with new fitness test

Commanders said new troops coming into their units could not meet physical demands of combat

FORT BRAGG, N.C. — Army soldiers struggle to haul heavy sleds backward as fast as they can down a grassy field at Fort Bragg, filling the brisk North Carolina morning air with grunts of exertion and the shouts of instruction from their coaches.

Watching from the sidelines, Sgt. Maj. Harold Sampson shakes his head. As a military intelligence specialist he spends a lot of time behind a desk. Over his two decades in the Army, he could easily pound out the situps, pushups and 2-mile run that for years have made up the service's fitness test.

But change has come. The Army is developing a new, more grueling and complex fitness exam that adds dead lifts, power

throws and other exercises designed to make soldiers more fit and ready for combat. "I am prepared to be utterly embarrassed," Sampson said on a recent morning, two days before he was to take the test.

Commanders have complained in recent years that the soldiers they get out of basic training aren't fit enough. Nearly half of the commanders surveyed last year said new troops coming into their units could not meet the physical demands of combat. Officials also say about 12 percent of soldiers at any one time cannot deploy because of injuries.

In addition, there has long been a sense among many senior officials that the existing fitness test does not adequately measure the physical attributes needed for

the battlefield, said Gen. Stephen Townsend, head of U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command.

The new test, "may be harder, but it is necessary," Townsend said.

Reaching the new fitness levels will be challenging. Unlike the old fitness test, which graded soldiers differently based on age

and gender, the new one will be far more physically demanding and will not adjust the passing scores for older or female soldiers.

For example, in the current test — two minutes of situps, two minutes of pushups, a 2-mile run — younger soldiers must do more repetitions and run faster to pass and get

maximum scores than those who are older or female.

Townsend said the new test was designed based on scientific research that matched specific exercises to tasks that soldiers in combat must do: sprint away from fire, carry a wounded comrade on a stretcher, haul cans of fuel to a truck.

Tiny satellites fall silent after proving new tech at Mars

WALL-E & EVE might be unable to send messages or have battery recharging issues

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Two tiny satellites have fallen silent hundreds of millions of miles away, after proving new technology at Mars.

The twin CubeSats, nicknamed WALL-E and EVE, shadowed NASA's InSight lander to Mars last year. As the lander descended to the Martian surface in November, the briefcase-size satellites

flew past the red planet, providing real-time updates to ground controllers in this first-of-its-kind experiment.

This week, NASA said it hasn't heard from them for more than a month now — and doubts it ever will.

WALL-E, which had been leaking fuel since liftoff last May, last radioed back on Dec. 29. It's now more than 1 million miles (1.6 million kilometers) beyond Mars. EVE went mum on Jan. 4; it's nearly

2 million miles (3.2 million kilometers) past the red planet.

These were the first CubeSats to venture into deep space, part of an \$18.5 million experiment to see whether such compact, cheap devices might serve as radio relays at faraway worlds.

"There's big potential in these small packages," program manager John Baker of NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory said in a statement.

Chief engineer Andy Klesh noted the mission was about pushing the limits of miniaturized technology.

"We've put a stake in the ground," he said. "Future CubeSats might go even farther."

Engineers speculate WALL-E and EVE might be wobbling and unable to point precisely to send messages, or there could be battery recharging issues. In any event, the mini satellites will remain

in an elongated orbit around the sun. They were named after the main characters in the 2008 animated movie.

NASA, meanwhile, is still trying to contact the Mars lander Opportunity, silenced last June by a global dust storm that prevented sunlight from reaching its solar panels. Managers consider it a last-ditch effort to reach Opportunity, which recently marked its 15th year on Mars.

Gas line explosion in San Francisco ignites buildings

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A gas explosion in a San Francisco neighborhood shot flames into the air Wednesday and was burning five buildings as utility crews scrambled to shut off the flow of gas more than two hours after the blaze began.

Private construction workers cut a natural gas line. San Francisco Fire Chief Joanne Hayes-White said. Authorities initially said five of them were missing, but the entire construction crew was found safe, and no other injuries were reported.

Hayes-White said several buildings in the area were evacuated, including a medical clinic and several apartment buildings.

"It's pretty dramatic, but we have pretty good handle on it," she said.

Firefighters worked to keep the fire from spreading while

Pacific Gas & Electric crews tried to shut off the natural gas line.

The fire began around 1:20 p.m., apparently by crews working on fiber-optic wires, Hayes-White said.

Doherty, the PG&E spokesman, stressed that the workers who cut the gas line are not affiliated with utility, which is under heightened scrutiny over its natural gas pipelines.

Photographer drugged, raped young models, authorities say

MCMINNVILLE, Ore. (AP) — A professional photographer drugged and sexually assaulted young models or aspiring models he worked with in Oregon and California, federal and state authorities said Wednesday.

Robert Arnold Koester, 52, is accused of bringing young women and girls to a remote property outside McMinnville, in Oregon's wine country, taking nude photos of them and sexually assaulting them there, Yamhill County District Attorney Brad Berry said at a news conference.

He announced an indictment charging Koester with 32 counts, including rape.

Investigators serving two search warrants at the remote, 28-acre property seized "many, many terabytes" of digital photos and videos as evidence.

for the Bureau of Indian Affairs in South Dakota. He has received only a portion of his back pay, and does not expect to be fully paid until Feb. 12. The couple had to drain their savings shortly before the shutdown when both his parents died, leaving them in a precarious financial position.

A spokesman for the Department of Interior, which handles payroll for more than five dozen government offices, did not answer when asked how many workers were due back pay, but said a "small group of employees" had not received anything. Spokesman Russell Newell said others received "interim payments of back pay" that would be made up in the next pay period.

The Census Bureau acknowledged Tuesday that about 250 employees, or 6 percent of its work force, had yet to receive back pay. A spokesman said they expected

those workers to be paid by Friday.

Other affected agencies include the Federal Aviation Administration, where two unions representing FAA workers said their members had not yet received all of their back pay.

Doug Church of the National Air Traffic Controllers Association said members who worked during the shutdown had not gotten overtime, which he said was a violation of the Fair Labor Standards Act. They also had not received the extra pay they were due for working nights and holidays, he said.

"It's good that we got back pay at all, but it seems to have been clumsily done. When people ask questions, the answer they get is, 'We're doing the best we can,'" said Verardo of the American Federation of Government Employees Local 3403.

In addition to the pay delays, workers are struggling with the looming question of whether there would be another shutdown after Feb. 15.

sexual assault allegations against Lt. Gov. Justin Fairfax surfaced earlier this week, issued a detailed statement saying Fairfax forced her to perform oral sex on him in a hotel room in 2004 during the Democratic National Convention in Boston.

Tyson, a 42-year-old political scientist who is on a fellowship at Stanford University and specializes in the political discourse of sexual assault, said, "I have no political motive. I am a proud Democrat."

"Mr. Fairfax has tried to brand me as a liar to a national audience, in service to his political ambitions, and has threatened litigation," she said. "Given his false assertions, I'm compelled to make clear what happened."

The Associated Press typically does not identify those who say they were sexually assaulted, but Tyson issued the statement in her name.

Fairfax — who is in line to

become governor if Northam resigns — has repeatedly denied her allegations, saying that the encounter was consensual and that he is the victim of a strategically timed political smear.

"At no time did she express to me any discomfort or concern about our interactions, neither during that encounter, nor during the months following it, when she stayed in touch with me, nor the past 15 years," he said in a statement.

Tyson said she suffered "deep humiliation and shame" and stayed quiet about the allegations as she pursued her career, but by late 2017, as the #MeToo movement took shape and after she saw a news article about Fairfax's campaign, she took her story to The Washington Post, which decided months later not to publish a story.

Herring, 57, went public after rumors of a blackface photo of him had circulated at the Capitol for a day or more. But in his statement, he said nothing about the existence of a photo.

Falcons release Bryant, giving Tampa Bay shot to reverse curse

TAMPA — The Bucs have a chance to really reverse the curse of kicker Matt Bryant.

Bryant, 43, announced on Twitter Wednesday that the Atlanta Falcons plan to release him with two years remaining on his contract.

"I was informed last night that the team was moving on from my services and that I will be released," Bryant posted. "I want to say thank you to all the fans that have stood with me and our family during our time here. I take great pride in my body of work on and off the field. I hope I have represented you well while I was here. It was a honor to be a part of some big moments in this franchise's history. This chapter is now closed. I look forward to bringing the success and consistency that I produced to my next team."

The Bucs have struggled to find continuity at the place-kicking position since releasing Bryant in 2009.

Tampa Bay also just hired the Keith Armstrong, the Falcons' special teams coach the past 10 seasons. During that time, Bryant connected on 88.7 percent of his 282 field-goal attempts. Over the same period, the Bucs' collection of 11 wayward kickers made only 77.3 percent of 300 during that time.

Tampa Bay also has missed 11 extra-point tries since the NFL moved the spot for the ball to the 15-yard line from the 2 in 2015.

It was a surprise move by the Falcons, who signed Bryant to a three-year extension before the 2018 season. By releasing him, the Falcons will save about \$2.83 million in salary cap room this year, but will take on a \$1.33 million dead cap hit.

Bryant made 20 of 21 field attempts for the Falcons last season. He boomed a 57-yard field goal with 1:10 remaining in the game in a 34-29 win over Tampa Bay at Atlanta on Oct. 14. Then Bryant hit a winning 37-yard field goal as time expired in Atlanta's 34-32 win at Tampa in the Dec. 30 season finale.

Since releasing Bryant, the Bucs have had a revolving door of kickers, from Mike Nugent, Shane Andrus, Connor Barth, Rian Lindell, Pat Murray, Kyle Brindza, Roberto Aguayo, Nick Folk, Chandler Catanzaro and Cairo Santos.

Armstrong said recently that he knows the importance of a good kicker.

"Big time," he said. "They win games, you know what I mean?"

In 2004, Armstrong was Miami's special teams coach when the Dolphins hired Bryant as a fill-in while Olindo Mare healed from a thigh injury.

"When Olindo Mare came back at Miami and we finished the season, I'm sitting there saying, 'Huh, did we keep the right guy?'" Armstrong recalled Friday. "Then Bryant comes up (to the Bucs). As soon as we went to Atlanta and Bryant was let go here, I went right in and got him, and he was the right guy."

Consider the resources the Bucs have invested in kickers. They traded third- and fourth-round draft picks to move into the second round and draft Aguayo in 2016. They paid Folk \$1.75 million for four games and a 2-of-5 field-goal performance in 2017. Catanzaro walked away with \$3.75 million for going 11-of-15 on field and with four missed point-after tries in nine games. Santos went 9-of-12 on field goals but is a free agent.

Assuming he doesn't want to retire, the Bucs should be on the phone with Bryant pretty soon.

Last-minute drama in SEC on signing day

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — Leave it to the Southeastern Conference to provide some drama on signing day that otherwise seemed anticlimactic.

Even though the vast majority of recruits already had finalized their college decisions in the December signing period, the traditional February signing date still provided a few surprises as players SEC teams were targeting backed out of longstanding verbal commitments.

Wide receiver George Pickens, the nation's No. 24 overall prospect according to composite rankings of recruiting sites compiled by 247Sports, flipped his

commitment from Auburn to Georgia. Alabama lost a couple of top-200 verbal commitments when defensive end Khristian Williams (No. 71) chose Florida and cornerback Christian Williams (No. 160) signed with Miami.

"The big surprise was George Pickens picking Georgia over Auburn," said Barton Simmons, the director of scouting for 247Sports. "That's a kid who had been committed to Auburn for two years."

Alabama still topped the 247Sports Composite team recruiting rankings for the eighth time in the last nine years, thanks mainly to the wealth

signed.

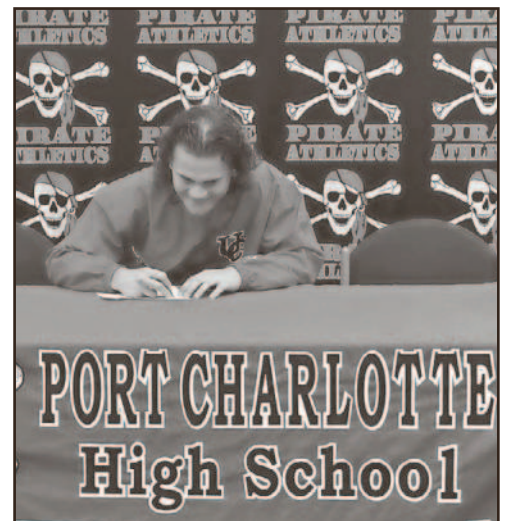

Sweiderk said having her father coach her was a plus, as was the ability to play

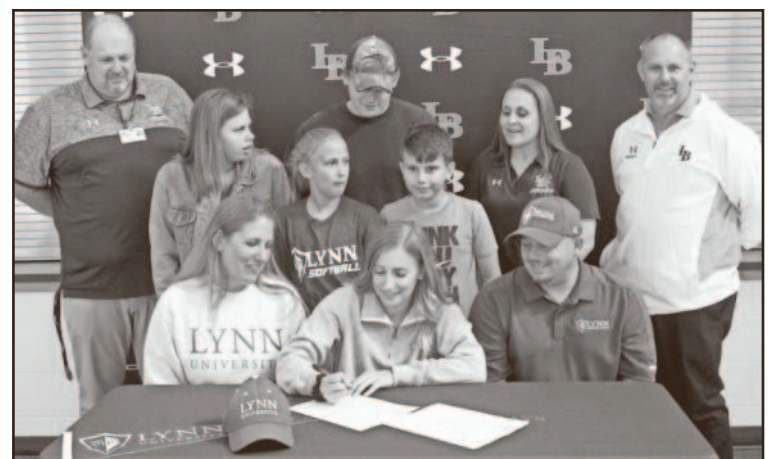
year-round once she moved to Florida.

Harris goes to Philadelphia, Davis remains in limbo

MIAMI — Anthony Davis is still a member of the New Orleans Pelicans.

By 3 p.m. Thursday, that may change.

Davis remained in place Wednesday, though the run-up to the NBA's annual trade deadline picked up steam in plenty of other locales around the league. The first notable deal of Trade Deadline Eve got done early Wednesday afternoon when the Los Angeles Clippers moved Tobias Harris to the Philadelphia 76ers as the centerpiece of a six-person, four-draft-pick swapping.

Harris, Boban Marjanovic and Mike Scott went to the 76ers, while Wilson Chandler, Mike Muscala and Landry Shamet went to the Clippers. Philadelphia — with an eye on moving way up from the No. 5 spot in the Eastern Conference — also gave up a protected 2020 first-round pick, a 2021 first-rounder that was once owned by Miami, and second-rounders in 2021 and 2023 through Detroit.

"We are in the unique position to contend now and we think this trade positions us well for the postseason," 76ers general manager Elton Brand said. "Tobias is one of the best three-point shooters in the NBA and possesses an innate ability to impact the game on both ends of the floor, while Boban and Mike provide valuable skillsets, size and depth to our team."

Another deal was worked out between Miami and Phoenix. The Heat sent Tyler Johnson and Wayne Ellington to the Suns for Ryan Anderson, helping alleviate the logjam of guards that

Miami coach Erik Spoelstra has been dealing with all season — plus considerably lower the Heat's expected luxury tax bill. It's likely that Ellington will be a buyout candidate, and therefore would be able to pick his own spot to finish the season.

If the Pelicans don't trade Davis by Thursday, they'll almost certainly be back in the depths of trade talks in June and July — draft time and free agency.

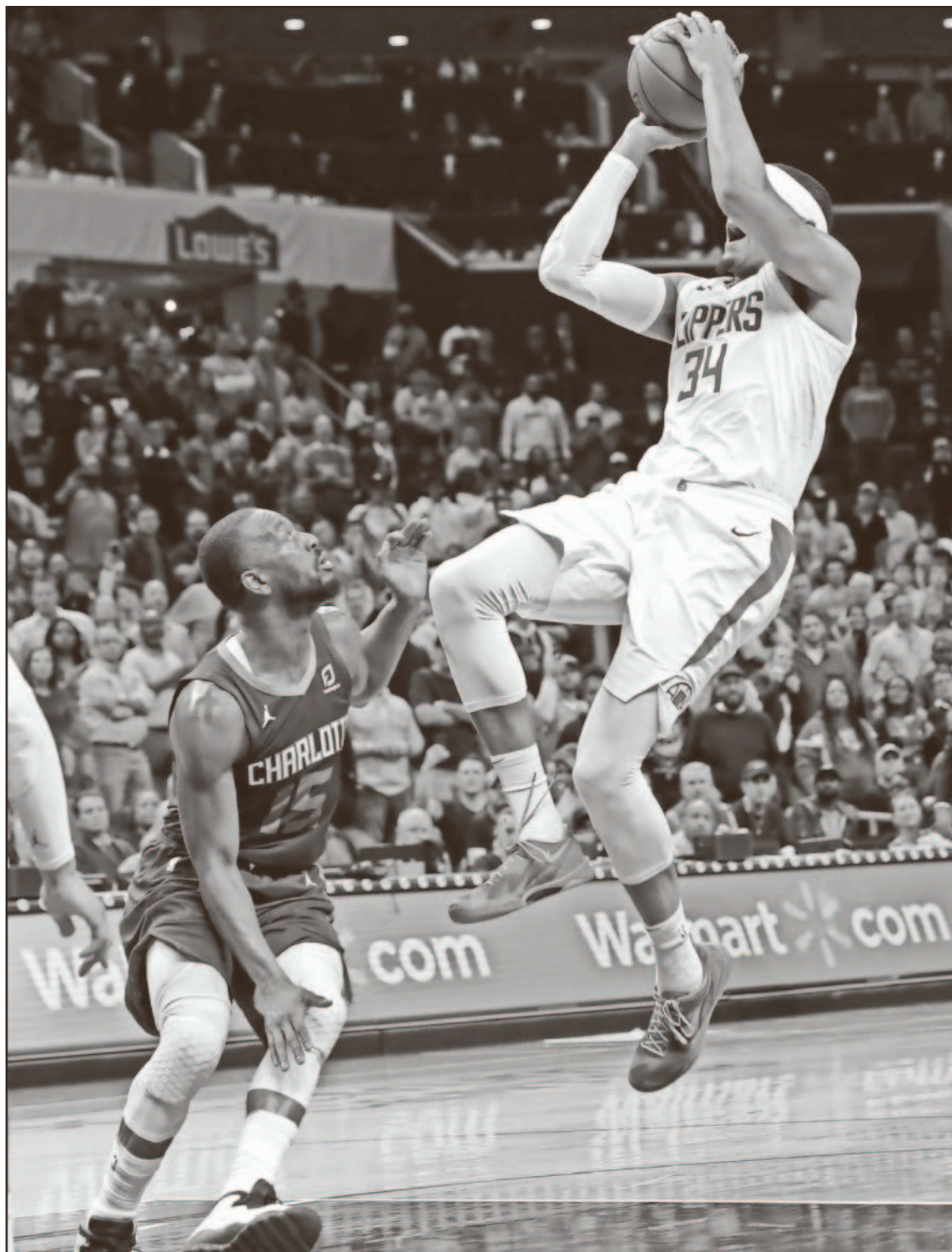
"I mean, obviously, it's on everyone's mind," Gentry said. "But we just try to put it on the back burner and focus on the task at hand and that's playing the Chicago Bulls. Not anything we can do about it. ... I think everything kind of clears up after (Thursday), at least for a while."

In other trades Wednesday:

— A person familiar with the terms said NBA-leading Milwaukee was sending center Thon Maker to the Detroit Pistons for forward Stanley Johnson. Both were lottery picks, Johnson in 2015 and Maker a year later.

— The Los Angeles Lakers — one of the teams known to want Davis — made another deal, getting Reggie Bullock from the Detroit Pistons for rookie guard Svi Mykhailiuk. Bullock is a shooter, and Lakers star LeBron James loves surrounding himself with those. Bullock is making nearly 39 percent of his 3-point tries this season. Mykhailiuk has averaged 3.3 points in 39 appearances.

— Philadelphia swung a deal with Toronto, getting Malachi Richardson and some draft considerations for cash. Richardson appeared in 23 games during two seasons with the Raptors.

Predators make 2 trades to add Boyle, McLeod

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — The Nashville Predators have made a pair of trades, adding size and toughness trying in an attempt to fill the void created by the absence of a trio of players.

That doesn't mean general manager David Poile is necessarily finished trying to improve the defending Presidents' Trophy winners. There is still three weeks before the NHL trade deadline. And no matter how happy Poile is with his roster after trading for a pair of veteran forwards in Brian Boyle from New Jersey and Cody McLeod from the Rangers on Wednesday, things can always be better.

Poile plans to keep making calls, listening and paying attention until

the deadline Feb. 25.

"I think just look for the right deal," Poile said. "If we can improve our club, we're going to do that. I'm comfortable with what we have in our depth and filling the holes that I thought we had or got created by the three players that we've lost in the last couple weeks. But if we can improve our team in the next three weeks, we will certainly do that."

The Predators lost defenseman Anthony Bitetto to a waiver claim to Minnesota on Jan. 25, trying to sneak him to the AHL for some playing time. Forward Austin Watson was suspended indefinitely Jan. 29 under the NHL's substance abuse program. Poile announced Wednesday that forward Zac Rinaldo

will have season-ending surgery for an injured shoulder.

Nashville center Kyle Turris has missed 17 straight games but could return Thursday against Dallas and this weekend in a back-to-back, home-and-home series with St. Louis. Forward Miikka Salomaki also may be closing to a return from an injury.

Poile swapped the Predators' second-round pick in June's NHL draft for Boyle and will send the Rangers a seventh-round pick in the 2020 NHL draft for McLeod. That was prompted by a worst case scenario of Watson possibly not returning.

Both Boyle and McLeod should be in Nashville and available Thursday

night when the Predators host Dallas.

Boyle, 34, has 13 goals and 19 points in his 12th NHL season, and he also has 88 hits in 47 games with New Jersey this season. Boyle won the 2017 Bill Masterton Memorial Trophy after battling chronic myeloid leukemia.

The center originally was drafted 26th overall in the 2003 draft held in Nashville by Los Angeles, and he has played 740 career NHL games with 211 points. He also has blocked 513 shots and 1,498 hits and played in the Stanley Cup Final in 2014 with the New York Rangers and 2015 with Tampa Bay. Boyle has 28 points in 111 career postseason games.

Russell scores 27, Nets hit 19 3s to top Nuggets

NEW YORK — D'Angelo Russell had 27 points and 11 assists, and the Brooklyn Nets surpassed last season's win total by beating the Denver Nuggets 135-130 on Wednesday night.

Russell made six of the Nets' 19 3-pointers, one game after they made only five as a team in their poorest shooting performance of the season.

DeMarre Carroll added 18 points, 10 rebounds and six assists for Brooklyn (29-27), which got two key injured players back and led by 21 points in ending

a three-game skid. Joe Harris scored 17 points and Treveon Graham had 16, with four 3-pointers.

Nikola Jokic had 25 points, 14 rebounds and 10 assists in his 10th triple-double of the season for the Nuggets, who have lost two straight games to fall out of a tie for the Western Conference lead.

Mason Plumlee scored a season-high 24 points on 10-for-12 shooting against his former team, and Jamal Murray had 19 points and 11 assists after missing six games with a sprained left ankle.

Brooklyn had failed to score 100 in its previous

two games and had season lows of 32 percent shooting overall and 11.9 percent (5 for 42) from 3-point range in a 113-94 loss to Milwaukee on Monday.

Coach Kenny Atkinson dismissed questions about a need for more shooting before the trade deadline, and he sure looked right against Denver.

The Nets made 13 of their first 18 attempts from behind the arc. Harris, who missed the last game with a sore right hip, hit three 3s, and Allen Crabbe came off the bench to hit his first 3-point attempt after missing 26 games with a sore right knee.

Smith, Fernando lead Maryland past Nebraska

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Jalen Smith had 18 points and 11 rebounds and fueled Maryland's decisive surge in the first half, and the 24th-ranked Terrapins beat fading Nebraska 60-45 on Wednesday night.

Bruno Fernando wasn't at his best shooting but still had his sixth consecutive double-double, and 15th of the season, with 13 points and a career-high 19 rebounds for Maryland (18-6, 9-4 Big Ten).

Nebraska (13-10, 3-9) set season lows for points and field goal percentage (21 percent) while losing its sixth straight and dropping

to 13th place in the conference.

Isaiah Roby led the Cornhuskers with 20 points and 14 rebounds, and James Palmer Jr. added 11 points.

The Terps were lethargic at the outset, missing 11 of their first 14 shots as offensive leaders Fernando, Anthony Cowan Jr. and Smith went scoreless through the first nine minutes. Meanwhile, Roby scored 12 points as the Huskers jumped to a 15-10 lead.

But then Nebraska had one of its all-too-familiar scoring droughts, this one lasting longer than eight minutes. Smith, whose short runner with 3 seconds left gave the

Terps a 74-72 win over the Huskers on Jan. 2, scored 11 straight points to put his team in front after Tanner Borchardt went to the bench with his second foul.

Maryland outscored the Cornhuskers 20-5 to close the half, with Nebraska making just one field goal over the last 11:41.

The Terps left the door open, starting the second half much as they did the first. Fernando traveled, Smith committed an offensive foul and the Huskers scored nine straight to draw to 31-29 before Aaron Wiggins hit a 3-pointer and Smith dunked off a lob to make it 36-29.

Pebble Beach to be scene of PGA Tour, US Open

AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am kicks off this week, US Open to follow in June

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. — Only four American courses have hosted a PGA Tour event and a major championship in the same year, a concept that USGA chief executive Mike Davis does not consider to be ideal.

One big exception is Pebble Beach. "I think this is great," Davis said Wednesday as he walked down the 16th fairway. "Because this is nothing like it will be June."

The views won't change, and they were as spectacular as ever on the eve of the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am, with turquoise waves crashing against rocks and sending eruptions of white spray against the back drop of Pebble's small greens.

But this is not a week for any scouting reports.

Heavy rain over the weekend, with wind so strong it knocked over a corporate tent left of the sixth fairway, has saturated Pebble Beach so much that the turf sunk ever so slightly with every step on the fairway. Davis Love III didn't see where his shot landed on the 10th green because it was plugged, only the top half of the ball showing.

No, this isn't a sneak preview of the U.S. Open. It's not a complete waste of time, either.

Tommy Fleetwood of England is making his debut in the tournament, and he was so enamored being on the Monterey Peninsula that he quite happily played through the chill and a few hail stones during a practice round Tuesday. Pebble has such a reputation

that Fleetwood compared it with St. Andrews, not because of the course, but because of the iconic nature.

"It's just one of those few places in the world that has like an aura and an atmosphere about it and you feel very lucky to be playing golf this week," he said.

He only picture what it will be like when Pebble hosts the U.S. Open for the sixth time in June.

"It's nowhere near what it's probably going to be like," Fleetwood said. "There's so many guys that have played the PGA Tour for a long time will have been here. They know it. They feel comfortable. For me, this is the first time, so any advantage I would have had just turning up in June is much more positive and good for me."

Torrey Pines also hosted a PGA Tour and U.S. Open in the same year in 2008 (Tiger Woods won them both), and that will happen again in two years. The other courses were Riviera (LA Open and PGA Championship in 1995) and Pinehurst No. 2 (North & South and PGA Championship in 1936).

Changes already have started at Pebble, with fairway lines moved in the way it will be in June. That much was obvious on No. 8, which has a white, knee-high rock on the hill leading up to the fairway as an alignment aid.

The rock is not there this week, because any shot over it would wind up in the rough, not the fairway.

"The fairways taken in is what you notice immediately," Jordan Spieth said. "The rough is actually lower than it

has been in past years for this tournament right now. But the fairway lines ... like our yardage books look different from last year to this year. They have started to take them in already, and you're starting to see the fairways that we're going to see for the U.S. Open. It just will play wider given how soft it is. The ball is not rolling."

Spieth won the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am

two years ago and is back in his regular group, with country singer Jake Owen as his amateur partner alongside two-time Pebble champion Dustin Johnson and Wayne Gretzky.

Johnson is coming off a victory last week in the Saudi International and only arrived from his home in Florida on Wednesday morning. Masters champion Patrick Reed also was

in Saudi Arabia and will be playing in his usual group alongside Phil Mickelson.

The sky cleared Wednesday and it should be reasonable for at least a few days across Pebble Beach, Spyglass Hill and the Shore Course at Monterey Peninsula, with more rain expected Friday and into parts of the weekend.

"When you're here ... it's kind of like a holy golf ground if you will,"

Tony Finau said. "And it's never not a thrill to play Pebble Beach."

With so much rain over the last few days, and the forecast for the weekend, players will likely be able to lift, clean and place their golf balls in the short grass.

That's not unusual for this tournament. It might be unusual for Davis and few others on the USGA executive committee.

of heralded prospects it signed in December. Alabama enhanced its class Wednesday by signing defensive tackles Ishmael Sopsher (No. 47) and Byron Young (No. 77) and running back Keilan Robinson (No. 250).

"Alabama is just more than championships," Sopsher said. "Coach Nick Saban, he's going to turn you into a man and he's going to set you up for life."

Even so, all those signing day switches added some suspense to a February signing date that has lost plenty of relevance since the 2017 arrival of an early signing period.

The SEC had four of the top five teams in the 247Sports Composite rankings as of early Wednesday evening. Georgia was second, Texas A&M fourth and LSU fifth. Also in the top 15 were Florida at No. 9 and Tennessee at No. 12.

"The SEC is known for flips, known for cut-throat recruiting," said Mike Farrell, the director of recruiting for Rivals.

Some other notable recruiting stories from around the SEC.

BOUNCING BACK

Alabama's move to the top of the

recruiting rankings came one year after it signed a class that ranked fifth in the team standings, ending a string of seven straight first-place finishes. Georgia topped the 2018 team standings.

"We're certainly satisfied," Saban said.

TWO-SPORT THREAT

Ole Miss had one of the day's biggest victories when it beat out Clemson and Alabama for running back Jerrion Ealy, rated 29th in the 247Sports Composite.

But the Rebels shouldn't celebrate just yet.

Ealy also is a talented baseball player and a potential first-round pick in June's draft, which could force him into deciding whether to play football at Ole Miss or launch a professional baseball career.

INVADING ENEMY TERRITORY

One interesting element of Georgia's class is that the Bulldogs signed the top two prospects in the state of Alabama.

Center Clay Webb, ranked second in Alabama and 26th nationally, signed with Georgia in December. The Bulldogs got the top prospect in the state Wednesday when Pickens made his switch from Auburn to Georgia.

The top four prospects in the state of Florida all chose either Alabama or Georgia, though they'd

all signed in December. Georgia got defensive end Nolan Smith and cornerback Tyrrique Stevenson, while Alabama added running back Trey Sanders and offensive tackle Evan Neal.

Florida did a better job of protecting its home state Wednesday by getting Bogle to switch from Alabama to the Gators and beating out Georgia for cornerback Kaiir Elam (48th).

FORTIFYING THE LINE

Tennessee landed the nation's top remaining unsigned prospect when it added offensive tackle Darnell Wright, who was 10th overall in the 247Sports Composite.

The additions of Wright and December signee Wanya Morris (28th) should provide a big boost to a Tennessee offensive line that has struggled mightily the last two seasons.

Tennessee seemed poised to add another top-50 recruit Wednesday as linebacker Henry To'oto'o (44th) announced he was choosing the Vols.

"One of the big selling points we've had right now that has helped us in recruiting has been our (top-ranked) men's basketball program," Tennessee coach Jeremy Pruitt said. "Everywhere I go, everybody wants to talk about our basketball program. I think that's a great thing, putting Tennessee on the map again, building the brand."

Major baseball rule changes proposed

NEW YORK — Major League Baseball and its players are discussing bold changes to spark the sport that include a three-batter minimum before a pitching change except at the start of an inning, a single trade deadline set before the All-Star break and expanded rosters.

The union renewed its push to extend the designated hitter to the National League, suggested amateur draft incentives for winning records and penalties for losing records and proposed a change in service-time rules that would lead to faster free agency for top rookies held in the minor leagues early in the season.

The talks are an expansion of the ones last offseason in which management threatened to implement a pitch clock, then backed off but did institute limits on mound visits without pitching changes. Management made its proposal on Jan. 14, the union responded last Friday. Details were disclosed

to The Associated Press by people familiar with the negotiations.

Management is concerned about a drop in offense that saw strikeouts exceed hits for the first time last year and the big league batting average drop to its lowest level since 1972. In a season that included an unusually cold and wet April, average attendance dropped for the third straight season and fell below 30,000 for the first time since 2003.

RELIEF PITCHERS

Management proposed that a team not be allowed to bring in a reliever until the previous pitcher has faced three batters or an inning ends. There were 1,145 one-batter outings last season, according to the Elias Sports Bureau, up from 1,119 the previous year but down from 1,182 in 2016. The change would have an impact on the use of “openers” for a few batters, a move pioneered by Tampa Bay manager Kevin Cash and emulated by Milwaukee manager Craig Counsell in Game 5 of the

NL Championship Series, when he removed left-handed starter Wade Miley after one batter and replaced him with right-hander Brandon Woodruff.

Players countered the change should start in the minor leagues this year and reach the majors in 2020.

DESIGNATED HITTER

The DH has been used in the AL since 1973, but the NL has never adopted the rule and Commissioner Rob Manfred has said he supports the status quo. The union proposed the DH start being used in the NL this year, but management in the past has considered the DH an economic issue, and Manfred has said that economic changes must wait for negotiations for a new labor contract that would start ahead of the 2022 season.

PITCH CLOCKS

Management again has proposed a pitch clock, and the union countered with limitations on its use.

MOUND VISITS, PITCHING CHANGES

A limit of six began last season, and management wants to lower that to four this season and three in 2020. The union countered with five this year and, if the average time of a nine-inning game is longer this year than last, then four in 2020.

TRADE DEADLINE

Players proposed a single trade deadline be instituted before the All-Star break to keep teams from dealing veterans when the clubs conclude their chances of a playoff berth have dwindled. The deadline for trades without waivers was June 15 from 1923 through 1985 and has been July 31 since.

ROSTER SIZE

Many have criticized the roster rules, which generally allow a team 25 active players through Aug. 31 and then 40 until the end of the season. Management proposed allowing a 26-man roster,

including a 12-pitcher maximum, through Aug. 31, and then up to 28 for the rest of the season. The union countered that each team should be required to have 28 active from Sept. 1 on and that there be a supplemental roster of four players after the Triple-A postseason ends. No starting pitchers would be allowed on the supplemental roster, and at least two of the four would have to be position players.

ANTI-TANKING

Concerned that teams with small or no playoff chances put less of an emphasis on winning to get higher selections in the amateur draft, the union proposed that a team with 90 or more losses in consecutive years have its highest selection in the next amateur draft dropped 15 slots and lose \$2 million in international signing bonus pool allocation. A team with 90 or more losses in three straight years would drop 20 slots and lose \$3 million in allocation.

Clubs that reach the postseason would be awarded additional draft picks.

■ HORSE RACING

Game Winner tops those eligible for Triple Crown

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Unbeaten Game Winner, winner of the Breeders' Cup Juvenile and last year's 2-year-old champion, is among 362 3-year-old thoroughbreds made eligible during the early nomination period to compete in the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont Stakes.

Other top horses include Gunmetal Gray, Improbable, Knicks Go, Mucho Gusto and Tax.

Four fillies and 20 horses based outside North America, including 11 from Europe, five from Dubai and four from Japan, also are among the early nominees for

the Triple Crown series that opens with the Kentucky Derby on May 4. The Preakness is May 18 and the Belmont is June 8.

It cost owners and trainers \$600 to nominate each horse during the early period, which ended Jan. 26. The late period, requiring a payment of \$6,000, continues until April 1.

Steve Asmussen led all trainers with 27 nominations. Five-time Derby winner Bob Baffert, Chad Brown and Todd Pletcher each had 17 nominees. Baffert trains Game Winner, Improbable and Mucho Gusto.

Southern Miss interviews Briles, will not hire him

Ex-Baylor coach oversaw program under investigation

Southern Mississippi administrators and football coach Jay Hopson disagree on whether the school should hire former Baylor head coach Art Briles for a position on the Golden Eagles' football staff.

Hopson believes they should.

President Rodney D. Bennett and interim athletics director Jeff Mitchell say no — and they have the final say.

The school released a statement Wednesday morning from Bennett and Mitchell confirming that the school had met with Briles but that “following that meeting, we informed him that he is not a candidate.”

Hopson released his own statement just minutes after the school's release, saying that he respects the president's decision, but disagrees with it and that Briles “deserves a second chance.”

Southern Miss has been searching for a new offensive coordinator.

The 63-year-old Briles, who led the Bears to consecutive Big 12 titles in 2013 and 2014, was fired after an external investigation revealed in May 2016 that Baylor had for years mishandled numerous sexual assault allegations by students, including some against football players.

The Pepper Hamilton firm's investigation found at least 17 women

who reported being sexually assaulted by 19 football players.

Briles has insisted he did not cover up reports of assaults by players, and that he encouraged women involved in the alleged incidents to go to the police.

Baylor is still waiting for the outcome of an NCAA investigation into the school's conduct. Even so, Hopson was willing to hire Briles.

“He is a man that seemed sincere & humble in his interview & personally he committed no crime,” Hopson said in his text message statement. “He may not have acted in the proper protocol, but that would be my JOB at Southern Miss! He was interviewing for an

assistant position, even though I believe he will be a Head Coach at a Major Program in the near future.”

When Briles was scheduled to be part of a breakout session at the American Football Coaches Association convention last year, criticism on social media prompted the organization to cancel his participation in a session called “Standing Strong/Game Management.”

That came only months after he was hired as an assistant coach by the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the CFL, who the same day backtracked amid public pressure and eventually said he wouldn't join the team.

Luck hopes offseason rest will do his body good

INDIANAPOLIS — Andrew Luck spent three offseasons fighting his way back from injuries. Now he can reap the reward.

After returning to the field, making it back to the playoffs, regaining his Pro Bowl form and collecting The Associated Press NFL Comeback Player of the Year Award, a healthy Luck now intends to take a rare and well-deserved break from football.

“I'll be honest, I probably won't throw for a while,” he said before cleaning out his locker. “There will be tweaks, there will be changes to what I do (this offseason) but all of it is geared to one, make me as happy as possible and two, set me up to improve as a quarterback and improve as a person.”

How Luck will spend his downtime is unclear.

Peyton Manning broke the monotony with hunting trips. Brett Favre worked on his ranch. Tom Brady won a Super Bowl after changing last year's offseason routine to spend more time with his family and less on football. They all learned throwing more balls doesn't necessarily make a better quarterback.

Matt Hasselbeck, a

three-time Pro Bowler who backed up Favre and Luck during his 17-year career, became a believer. So after hearing a story about Manning meeting a former U.S. president one offseason, Hasselbeck accepted an offer from assistant coach Clyde Christensen to spend time with a Navy admiral.

“He talked to us in our

quarterback meeting one day about protecting the football because we'd had some issues and he used this analogy of what they tell Top Gun pilots,” Hasselbeck said.

“It was basically that you have this great plane you get to fly and it does not belong to you. It belongs to the government, it belongs to the people.

“That's an example

of something that's not necessarily X's and O's but it's a form of leadership training or just working on you and if you're working on you, you're improving everything about you.”

It was a message Hasselbeck relayed to Luck after joining the Colts in 2013. But it was a hard sell to a young workout warrior with the pressure and

expectations of a No. 1 draft pick.

While Luck enjoyed vacationing in Europe, where he spent part of his childhood reading books, following soccer and riding bikes, the desire to improve drove him to work out.

“When we were first teammates, I told him there are going to be some years that are fun and they're easy and you're healthy the whole year,” said Hasselbeck, who now works for ESPN.

“There's going to be other years when it's miserable and you're dealing with something the whole year and you're in the training room all the time. You're there early and you're there late and you're in pain and you're on drugs.

Luck's good year came with 16 starts for the first time since 2014, producing career highs in completions, attempts and completion percentage.

He finished second to Patrick Mahomes in touchdown passes, helped the Colts end a three-year playoff drought and found a better balance between life and football.

The difference is the 20-month gap between regular-season games following surgery on a partially torn labrum and three successive injury-plagued offseasons have changed Luck's perspective.

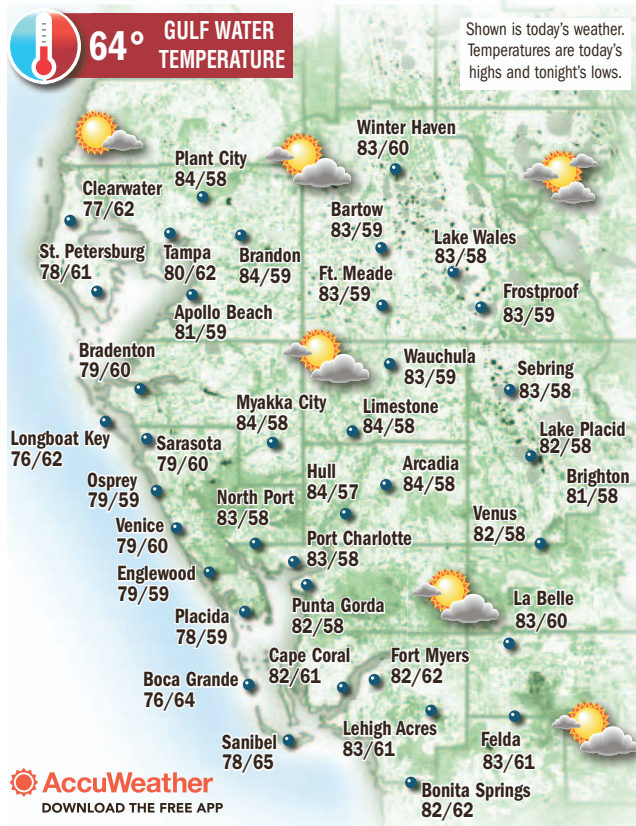

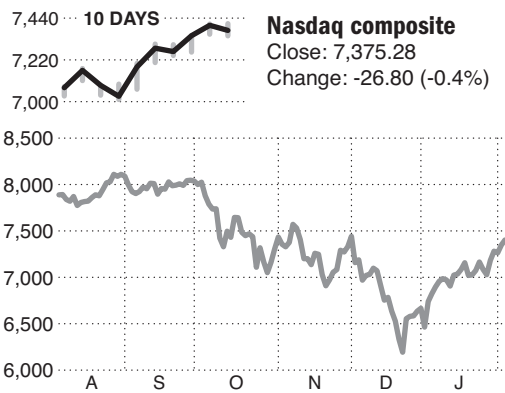
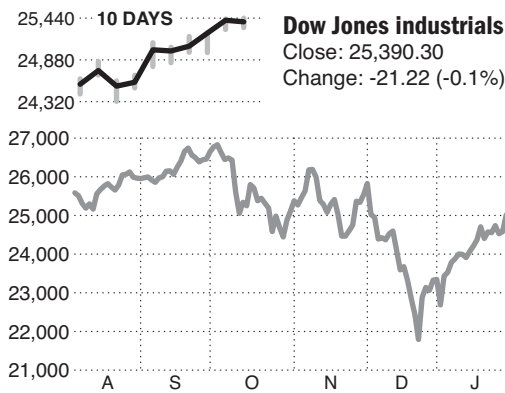
