School officials assess student safety

Recent student conduct coming before School Board

SEBRING — Two middle school students face expulsion in separate incidents that prompted threat assessments at their schools.

The infractions are listed on the Tuesday School Board agenda as threat/intimidation toward a school and unauthorized use of school technology/possession of ammunition.

Assistant Superintendent of Student Support Services Melissa Blackman said the unauthorized use of technology incident was by an Avon Park Middle School student who was downloading photographs and the student was in possession of a bullet.

Whenever those things happen that potentially could be threats, the school initiates a threat assessment to take the necessary precautions to ensure everyone's

safety, she said.

Highlands News-Sun asked what type of photos were downloaded by the student?

"It was a photo that involved a student in possession of a firearm, not the actual student, but they were downloading firearm pictures," Blackman said. "Downloading inappropriate pictures on school equipment."

Issue needs cooperation, funding

Editor's Note: This is the first in a planned series of stories on the community's effort to help the homeless population in Highlands County.

SEBRING — Jane Breylinger tells a story of Dale, living in the woods under a tarp.

Homeless care providers worked with him for a year, through food and supplies — including a tent — and now have gotten him into a permanent home.

It takes time, patience and respect for individuals' privacy, according to Breylinger and approximately 30 local advocates, activists, volunteers, elected officials and care providers who met

Wednesday at the Veterans Service Office in Sebring.

After the first of what may lead to several roundtable discussions on homelessness in Highlands County, officials learned they need time to gain a homeless person's trust. Through that, they can begin to find out if that person wants to move toward permanent housing.

Roundtable participants also learned they need to cooperate with each other and share information, which may be the best way to get funding.

Breylinger said during the "Point in Time Count" for homeless, volunteers tallied 172 people they could identify were living on the streets or in vacant, wooded areas. She expects the number is three times that.

In the six counties of Highlands, DeSoto, Glades, Hardee, Hendry and Okeechobee, there were at least 65 unaccompanied

LPPD revamps evidence storage area

LAKE PLACID — Officers with the Lake Placid Police Department have been taking larger quantities of drugs off the streets in the tiny town. The hauls have been so large over the past year that the office faced a problem: storage and odor. The increase in the amount of drugs being housed as evidence was the cause of the smelly problem.

Some drugs in pill form don't have much of a smell but the record-setting amounts of marijuana officers have confiscated does. Lake Placid Police Chief James Fansler estimated that three to four of the drug cases the police department currently have are suspicious for having fentanyl in them and one confirmed case containing the synthetic opioid drug.

Fentanyl is often used to "cut" other drugs, such as heroine or methamphetamine. According to the National Institute on Drug Abuse, it is 50 to 100 times more potent than morphine.

"I think the increase of drugs in our evidence room is because we have such a great and young group of officers," Fansler said. "They like to get out there and get this stuff off the streets and out of the community."

The total increase of evidence has risen 10-20 percent from last February to this February, according to police. Much of that is drug related and the majority of the drugs is marijuana. Cannabis has a strong and distinctive odor.

"The smell of the marijuana was emanating from the evidence room," Fansler said. "I knew it couldn't be good for anyone who was working near there to be breathing it in."

The evidence room, which was the size of a closet until it was expanded a couple of years ago, needed some expert help. Miller's Air Conditioning was

Owners given chance to fatten up cows, horses

LAKE PLACID — Two separate, alert readers reached out to the Highlands News-Sun earlier this week because they were concerned by the condition of animals they see during their commute near their homes.

The two women called the newspaper worried that their calls were not being heard at the appropriate agencies over the weekend.

However, when the Highlands News-Sun called Highlands County Animal Services Monday morning to relay the information, deputies had already begun

investigating. According to Lt. Clay Kinslow, head of Animal Services, his deputies went to the properties to check on the animals.

One complaint was of cows in poor condition and a dead cow on the property. The other was a complaint about skinny horses. Kinslow met with the owners of the animals on Tuesday and instructed them on what needed to be done to rectify the situation. Kinslow did not issue a citation in either

matter; therefore, the newspaper will not release the owners' names.

The horses were in a pasture of about 25 acres but there was little grass and mostly sand near the Sun N Lakes subdivision near Lake Placid. The horses were not getting enough to eat, Kinslow said.

Because the owner of the horses said he had someone he thought taking care of them and was forthright in his admission of the problem, Kinslow allowed him to keep the horses with close monitoring by authorities.

"If he had told me the horses were fine and he wasn't doing

Gun charge reduced in school incident

Pozo now faces just misdemeanor for gun at elementary school

SEBRING — The State Attorney's Office in Sebring has dropped the felony weapons charge against Eduardo Pozo.

He now stands accused only of violation of his conceal/carry permit, a misdemeanor. He has also waived his arraignment, pleaded not guilty and asked for a trial.

His next hearing is 1 p.m. Wednesday, March 6 at the Highlands County Courthouse. The case against him stems from his having a handgun in a backpack on Jan. 16 when he visited Cracker Trail Elementary School.

Pozo, 39, arrived at the school at 11:43 a.m. that day to have lunch with his child, according to arrest reports.

Reports said his backpack and the way he was carrying it caught the attention of Deputy Sheriff Phillip Michael Cloninger Jr., a retired deputy now serving as a school safety deputy.

Cloninger asked Pozo

Threat Plan security status, but no one was in danger, arrest reports stated.

Pozo was charged with carrying a firearm on a school campus, a third-degree felony, and violation of the concealed carry statutes, a misdemeanor.

Since then, the State Attorney's Office has dropped the felony charge.

Assistant State Attorney Steve Houchin, head of the Sebring office, said his staff took into account that Pozo had a legally-obtained permit for the weapon.

He just was not authorized, under that permit, to carry it onto a school campus, which constitutes a violation of that permit, Houchin said.

Six arrested for illegal drugs during past week

SEBRING — Six people were arrested for illegal drugs in Highlands County this past week. Felony charges include cocaine possession, possession of a controlled substance without a prescription and possession of marijuana.

On Feb. 22, Melvin Daniels, 29, of Sebring was arrested by the Highlands County Sheriff's Office. Daniels was charged with possession of a controlled substance without a prescription and possession of drug equipment. A sheriff's deputy allegedly found a bag of a crystal-like substance that field-tested positive for methamphetamine.

Also on Feb. 22, Todd Eric Redding, 56, of Sebring, was arrested by the Sheriff's Office.

Redding was charged with possession of a controlled substance without a prescription and possession of drug equipment. He reportedly had a plastic bag filled with one gram of a crystal-like substance that field-tested positive for methamphetamine.

Christopher Soloranzo, 27, of Sebring, was the third person arrested on Feb. 22 for illegal drug possession. Soloranzo was arrested by the Sheriff's Office on charges of possession of a controlled substance without a prescription, possession of not more than 20 grams of marijuana, and possession of drug equipment. A sheriff's deputy allegedly found a clear plastic bag with a crystal substance that field-tested positive for methamphetamine and a plastic bag with three "roaches" that field-tested positive for

the presence of tetrahydrocannabinol, the mind-altering component of cannabis. The deputy also noted he found a green glass bulb pipe with a white residual substance.

On Feb. 23, James Thomas Cox, 34, of Sebring, was arrested by the Sheriff's Office. Cox was charged with possession of a controlled substance without a prescription, possession of not more than 20 grams of marijuana, and possession of drug equipment.

Cox allegedly had a bag of a green leafy substance that field-tested positive for cannabis. In addition, he reportedly had a glass pipe that is commonly used for smoking methamphetamine and a bag of a crystal type substance that field-tested positive for methamphetamine.

Also on Feb. 23, Austin

James Baumgartner, 21, of Sebring, was arrested by the Sebring Police Department. Baumgartner was charged with possession of not more than 20 grams of marijuana and possession of drug equipment. He also had a warrant for arrest for failure to appear in court. An officer allegedly found four grams of a green, leafy substance that field-tested positive for cannabis.

On Tuesday, Michael Thomas Gammage, 46, of Sebring, was arrested by the Sheriff's Office. He was charged with possession of cocaine, possession of a controlled substance without a prescription, possession of not more than 20 grams of marijuana, and possession of drug equipment. He reportedly had 1.1 grams of cannabis, 0.9 grams of methamphetamine, and 0.2 grams of cocaine.

USPS driver identified in wreck

Pedestrian still at Lakeland Regional

SEBRING — Florida Highway Patrol has identified the driver of the U.S. Postal Service mail truck in Wednesday's pedestrian wreck as 49-year-old Hugh Slater of Winter Haven.

Juan Arocho Soto, the 59-year-old pedestrian who was reportedly standing in his path, is still in serious condition at Lakeland Regional Medical Center, according to crash reports released Thursday morning.

Reports state the crash is still under investigation. No charges or fault have been issued. The USPS is also investigating the wreck.

The incident took place at approximately 1:55 p.m. Wednesday on Self Avenue in Avon Park, less than 10 yards north of Kersey Street.

FHP reports that the USPS 1989 Chevrolet LLV, "Long-life Vehicle," was northbound. Soto, a resident of Weeki Wachee, was standing in middle of the street, facing away from the truck, reports said.

Deputies on the scene reported Soto was "run over," not merely "hit."

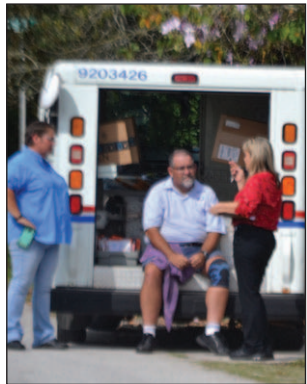
Debris on the road included Soto's wristwatch, eyeglasses and a handful of change.

Slater appeared uninjured. This is at least the fourth time in three years that wrecks involved local USPS trucks and/or drivers.

The Highlands News-Sun reported on June 29, 2017, how a USPS mail truck got hit that morning on U.S. 98 at the junction with Tubbs Ranch Road.

A flatbed transfer truck hit the left rear side of a mail truck, which sent the mail truck tumbling onto the southeast corner of the intersection, flattening a stop sign, spilling letters and packages and landing on its left side.

The driver, a "lifetime carrier" of 20 years, according to USPS officials on scene, reportedly survived the wreck that otherwise mangled the mail truck.

Two other wrecks on June 6, 2018 involving postal vehicles resulted in injuries to a motorcycle rider and damage to public landscaping, respectively.

That day, at the intersection of U.S. 27 and Heartland Boulevard, a Honda motorcycle ran into the side of a Honda Element SUV, which was being used by a mail carrier.

The Element, driven by James Niles, was at the stop sign while Jozef Van Ber Veken was southbound on U.S. 27. According to the Lake

Placid Police Department, Niles failed to yield the right of way to the motorcycle rider as he pulled onto U.S. 27 to turn left at the center median.

The rider, who was wearing a helmet and survived the wreck, got thrown head first into the passenger-side door of the Element, Lake Placid police said, and Niles was cited for failing to yield the right of way.

The mishap with another mail truck that afternoon didn't result in any injuries, but required a tow truck.

At approximately 4:30 p.m. in Avon Park, a mail truck parked atop a rise within the first block of Main Street in the eastbound lanes rolled backward for unknown reasons and veered into the median, according to Highlands County sheriff's deputies on the scene.

It got lodged on a concrete slab in the grass median of the Avon Park Mile-Long Mall. No pedestrians or cars were hit by the truck, which was still operational.

Once the tow truck operator got the truck dislodged, postal workers drove it away from the

site. The trucks, most of them made between 1987 and 1994, have been due for replacement for some time, but plans to replace them have been delayed.

In September 2016, the U.S. Postal Service awarded prototype production contracts worth a total of \$34.7 million to AM General, Karsan, Mahindra, Oshkosh, Utilimaster, and VT Hackney, according to USPS.com.

The USPS required half of the prototypes to have hybrid/alternative fuel features.

News reports from trucks.com in October 2018 stated the multi-billion-dollar program to create a new fleet of advanced-design mail trucks remains in the prototype-testing stage, even though the agency had expected to have a decision by then.

A trucks.com report dated Feb. 4 states the USPS expects to wrap up mail truck prototype testing for its Next Generation Delivery Vehicle program in the coming months, then will seek bids for an estimated \$6.3 billion contract to produce the new trucks.

Driver in motor scooter fatality identified

SEBRING — The Florida Highway Patrol released the name of the person who died in the motor scooter crash earlier this week.

On Monday at approximately 8 p.m., Nelson Dewitt Ross, 53, of Sebring, died in a crash after his 2014 Kiek Meiduo motor scooter collided with a semi tanker filled with 6,000 gallons of orange juice. The crash occurred near the intersection of State Road 66 and Fox Road.

According to the FHP press release, Ross, who was traveling eastbound on SR 66, made an improper u-turn in front of the semi, which was traveling westbound on SR 66, and was struck on the left side by the front of the semi.

The impact of the crash caused Ross to separate from the motor scooter and land in the north grass shoulder of SR 66. The force of the collision also caused the motor scooter to be pushed approximately 250 feet before being run over by the semi.

Ross was not wearing a helmet. It is unknown whether Ross was impaired, FHP states.

The driver of the semi tanker only sustained minor injuries. The semi driver did not show any signs of impairment, according to the FHP report. The driver of the semi was wearing a seat belt.

According to the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles, it is legal to operate a motor scooter on Florida roadways. The vehicle needs to be titled and registered. According to the Highlands County Tax Collector's Office, the 2014 Kiek Meiduo was titled and registered.

Funding should be about "choice"

Gov. Ron DeSantis and most Florida legislators know little about the quality of the private schools into which they're eager to shovel more public money. That accounts for the flaw in the persistent argument that parents deserve to choose the education for their children. It's a powerful reason for supporters of public education to resist with every legal means.

If "choice" were more than just gloss, the state would give parents pertinent information to help them choose. But it tells them little beyond the letter grades, from A to F, given public schools. There are no letter grades for private schools, so it is impossible to make useful comparisons with their public counterparts. Neither does the state impose compulsory testing on private schools, other than for low-income students there on Florida's tax-credit scholarships.

The "choice" that private school advocates extol is deliberately stacked against the public schools.

What the governor and legislature should know, if they're paying attention, is that scholarship students who returned to the public schools had "substantially lower" test scores than other low-income students who never left. That's from the annual report of the Learning System Institute at Florida State University for the 2016-2017 school year, which analyzes data for the Department of Education. But it said no conclusion could be drawn because the returnees were more likely to be struggling before they ever left the public schools.

Beyond that limited data, comparative information isn't the only vacuum in Florida's private school world. Apart from those who teach the scholarship students, faculty don't need college degrees and don't have to be certified in the subjects they teach. They don't have to follow the curriculum Florida established with the goal of a well-educated population.

These are increasingly glaring issues now that DeSantis wants to enlarge the scholarship programs beyond poor families to those making roughly \$68,000 for a family of four — more than double the present limit of \$25,750.

Except for some scholarships targeted to children with disabilities, such vouchers have been financed through corporate tax credits — money that never made it to the state treasury. That was to evade the Florida Supreme Court's decision 13 years ago that public grants to private schools — a key feature of Gov. Jeb Bush's testing-intensive school overhaul — violate the state constitution's requirement for a "uniform, efficient, safe, secure and high-quality system of free public schools."

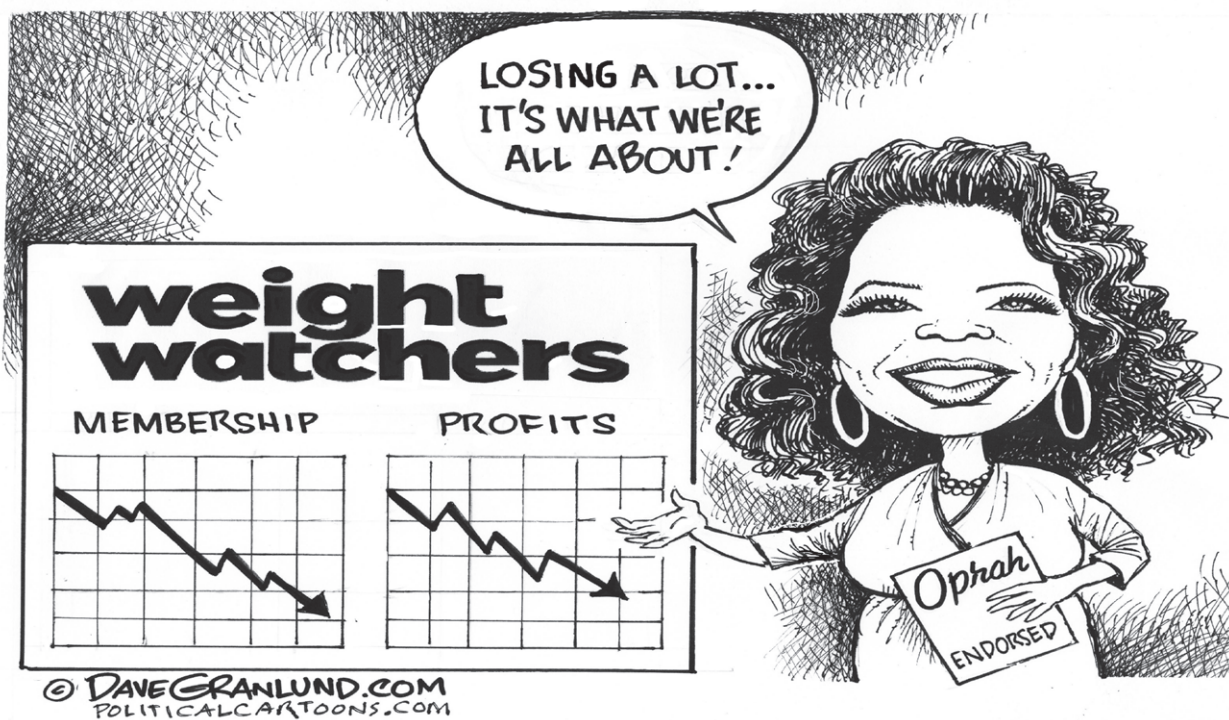
The tax-credit pretext no longer brings in enough money, even for the presently eligible poor families who apply, so DeSantis is targeting general revenue.

"If the taxpayer is paying for education, it's public education," DeSantis declared at an Orlando private school. That's Orwellian doublespeak. The private schools he intends to subsidize with vouchers are by their very designation not public.

That means lawsuits, but now that he has appointed three deeply conservative justices to sit with the three already on the Florida Supreme Court, he and his allies are counting on the court to abandon the precedent. One of the new justices came to the court from the employ of U.S. Secretary of Education Betsey DeVos. America's public schools have never had a worse enemy than her.

It is unreasonable and unwise for private schools to expect public money without accountability. That's where "choice" really belongs — between going their own way, as the law allows, or being accountable for the public's money.

County approves internet, FDOT, paving funding

SEBRING — County commissioners have approved state funds for road projects and local funds for paving and new fire stations, including dedicated internet lines.

The request for internet lines raised some eyebrows at more than \$350 each for three fire stations. Commissioner Don Elwell said that seemed to be a lot when it appeared in the consent agenda, a list of low-cost and/or non-controversial housekeeping administrative items usually approved en masse without discussion.

Commissioners wanted to hear more about the internet lines before voting on that matter.

The request was for \$361.64 per month for Comcast Cable Communications Management LLC to install internet service at Highlands Park, Placid Lakes, and Sun 'N Lakes of Lake Placid Fire Stations. Highlands County Fire Rescue Chief Marc Bashoor had made the request.

Thomas Haralson Jr., Information Technology director for the Highlands County Clerk of the Courts Office, told commissioners those wouldn't

be simple internet connections. Instead, they would be dedicated symmetrical circuits for quick data download and upload to those locations.

The lines would handle both security camera feeds from the three fire stations, as well as data transfers, so "speed is critical," Haralson said.

It also creates redundancy, Haralson said, by providing a backup to other communication connections.

"It's not the same as a consumer connection," Haralson said, adding that Comcast had quoted what they said was the lowest possible rate.

Commissioners then put it back on the consent agenda for approval.

The county is in the process of upgrading/replacing the three stations to provide room and infrastructure for 24-hour, seven-day crews.

Other stations are expected to get upgrades in coming months and years, as Highlands County Fire Rescue brings in more full-time staff and outfits more stations for paid 24/7 crews.

In other business, the Board of County Commission approved a carry-over of \$2.5 million in paving project funds from last year's budget to this year's, in order

to continue repaving existing roads and putting new pavement on shell roads.

The also accepted three grants from the Florida Department of Transportation to make improvements on local roads over the next three years.

County Engineer Clinton Howerton Jr. said two were coming from the road resurfacing funds of the Small County Road Assistance Program (SCRAP) and the third was part of the safety improvement funds of the Small County Outreach Program (SCOP).

Under SCRAP, FDOT approved:
• \$1.42 million

for design and construction to resurface County Road 623 — Kenilworth Boulevard — from Haywood Taylor Boulevard to Mini Ranch Road for an approximate distance of 7,804 linear feet.

• \$1.94 million for design and construction to resurface West Stryker Road from North Olivia Drive to U.S. 27 for an approximate distance of 10,507 linear feet.

Under SCOP, FDOT approved \$1 million for design and construction to widen and resurface Heron Street from Hammock Road north to Hovey Road, an approximate distance of 5,280 linear feet.

On the Kenilworth Road project, Commission Vice Chair Ron Handley asked if there were plans to de-muck the road bed. Howerton said, to do it right, they should, but it would cost more than those funds.

Howerton plans on installing a different road base to compensate for the sub-soil.

Handley asked if FDOT was OK with that, and Howerton said they should be. CR 623 is a former state road that was transferred to the county's control Aug. 18, 1983.

"That's why they did it," said Handley, adding that the road has gotten bad enough to be a "dire

need." Howerton said de-mucking Kenilworth Boulevard would require closing it. If it were more than four of five feet deep, however, there would be no way to afford it, he said.

Stryker Road is another in "dire need" of improvement, said Commission Chair Jim Brooks.

Howerton said design work and any right of way acquisition for the projects would start July 2020 with contracts awarded in time to start construction by January 2021.

On that same timeline, he said, work would need to get completed by July 2023.

Brickell Building cleanup continues

AVON PARK — After two weeks of work clearing out moldy drywall in the city-owned Brickell Building on Main Street, about two weeks of work remains to complete the cleanup, according to City Manager David Flowers.

Five or six inmates from Avon Park Correctional Institution have been working Tuesday through Friday on the cleanup, which thus far included the removal of 120 yards of moldy drywall, Flowers informed the City Council at its meeting on Monday.

"We have got about two weeks worth of work left, possibly a little less," he said Tuesday. All the walls

are done; workers are currently working on the first-floor ceilings.

An air quality report will be done after the work is completed, Flowers said.

The inmates' work is being paid through the existing contract with the correctional institution, which pays for a guard when the inmates are working in city parks and

on right of way and other city projects.

The city is paying the dumping fees for the disposal of the removed materials, which are going into a 20-yard dumpster owned by Excavation Point, Flowers said. Also, the city purchased the respirators, tie-back disposable hazardous materials suits and safety glasses for the project.

The two-story structure incurred significant water intrusion from Hurricane Irma, which necessitated the mold cleanup.

The building got a new roof soon after the hurricane, but there had been little progress since then to remove the mold until Flowers took office as city manager in January.

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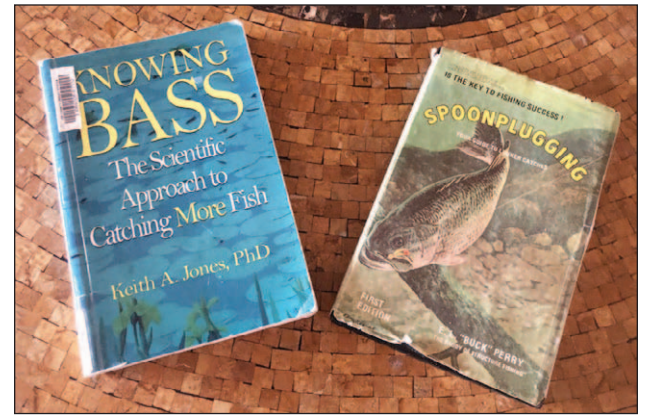

A must read book for bass fisherman

Lots of good information contained in its pages

I own dozens of books written about fishing. Freshwater, saltwater – bass, walleye, musky’s, you name it, I’ve probably got a book written about it. In fact, one of my greatest written treasures, and what I’ve always thought to be the greatest book about fishing ever written is a book entitled “Spoonplugging – Your

Guide to Lunker Catches”.

My first edition book, written and signed by E. L. “Buck” Perry, was given to me many years ago by Buck himself, at the end of one of the many seminars on fishing that we hosted in Akron, Ohio. Considered by many to be “The Daddy of Structure Fishing,” Buck coined many of the terms we use today like migration routes, structure and breaklines. His influence on thousands

of fishermen has been around since the 1950’s and will continue into the foreseeable future. Buck was well ahead of the times when he wrote and lectured about the “home of the fish” being deep water. He believed strongly in the “key to fishing success was knowledge,” and that there were no “experts” when it came to fishing.

For the last 40 years, I didn’t believe anyone would ever write a more

definitive book on fishing than Buck Perry. But I was wrong.

Last summer I was reading an article in one of my fishing magazines and in it, the author mentioned a book “Knowing BASS – The Scientific Approach to Catching More Fish,” by Keith A. Jones, PhD. And recommended it to every bass fisherman. I wrote down the name of the book with the intention of going on-line and buying

it. Time passed and one day, months later, I

happened to see the note

28th-ranked run defense and needs roster upgrades, especially in the receiving corps, defensive front seven and special teams. But any concerns were buried deep as Kitchens came out of the gate oozing confidence.

"We're not scared to talk about it - I'm not and hopefully nobody else in the organization is, either," Kitchens said. "There's a lot of expectations right now, alright, but we want to thrive on those expectations because we are putting those expectations on ourselves. We only have one goal and it's to win the Super Bowl."

Going from 0-16 to

7-8-1 in 2018, the Browns' seven-game turnaround was the largest in franchise history. They closed out the season with a 5-3 record after coach Hue Jackson and offensive coordinator Todd Haley were fired, with defensive coordinator Gregg Williams promoted to interim coach and Kitchens from associate head coach/running backs coach to offensive coordinator. They believe they have found their quarterback of the future in No. 1 overall pick Baker Mayfield, who was 6-7 as a starter.

to myself, so I sat down at my computer and tried to find the book.

To my amazement, I found it listed on Amazon, as well as eBay, for hundreds of dollars. I thought it had to be a mistake. Books about fishing don't sell for that kind of money. But there it was, \$360.00 on Amazon. \$625.00 on eBay. I couldn't believe it! Why was it so much money?

I figured it must be a mistake, and kind of forgot about it for a while. Last month I thought about it again, so I did another search and it was still available. And still hundreds of dollars on both sites. So, I decided to check some of the book stores. Barnes and Noble and Books-A-Million did not have the book, neither did the local library. Someone at Barnes and

Noble mentioned that it was "out of print."

I was about to give up on my search when I mentioned it to one of my fishing buddies, Dave Bennington. Dave is a fisherman as well as a voracious reader, often reading as many as 3 or 4 books a week. He and I have traded books and magazines for years. I mentioned my difficulty in finding the book, and that it was apparently out of print and the few copies that were available, were very expensive.

Last week Dave called and said he had the book. He had contacted someone at the library who reached out to other libraries and found a copy. He assured me that he would let me read it as soon as he'd finished it.

The book is written by Keith A. Jones and has a copyright of 2002. Jones spent much of his career as a scientist, working for Berkley & Company, one

of the largest manufacturers of fishing tackle in the world. To some, including myself, it would seem that anyone working for a fishing tackle company might have certain bias towards lures or products produced by the company. But, according to Paul C. Johnson, in writing the foreword to the book, he said "Unlike many academics, Jones has no aversion to working where products are sold for a profit. He steadfastly refuses to compromise scientific standards or massage his findings to meet marketing hyperbole."

I just finished reading the book, and I will readily admit, I have learned a number of things about bass that I never knew before. Buck Perry's book is a treasure of knowledge. Keith A. Jones Book is a treasure of scientific knowledge.

Anyone who likes to fish for largemouth bass

would do well to read both books, but bear in mind, "Knowing Bass" is written very much like a school text book and although Jones makes every attempt to keep it simple and straight-forward, it is a scientifically written book.

There is much to learn about a bass's hearing, how they interpret color and smell as well as hundreds of other important aspects of how and why they do what they do. It's a terrific read and I highly recommend it to anyone who shares Buck Perry's belief that "knowledge is the key to success."

Unfortunately, I have to return the book to Dave Bennington so he can return it to the library. I've given some thought to actually copying the 298 pages and making my own book. At my age, I often forget items I'd like to remember. Having a written copy to refresh my memory always helps.

When I consider the hundreds and thousands of dollars I have invested in fishing, from my boat to all my fishing gear, I suppose \$300.00+ dollars may not be that big of a deal to pay for a book.

If bass fishing is important to you, and you have the desire to become even more proficient at catching bass, I highly recommend this book (even if you have to buy it).

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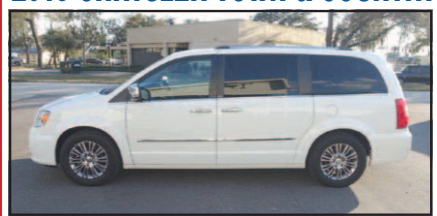
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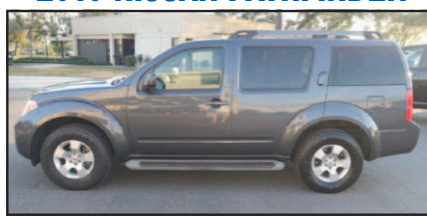
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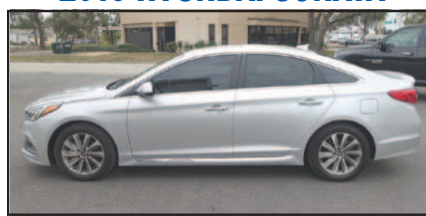
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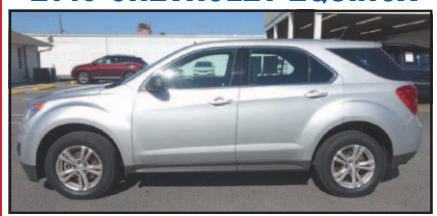
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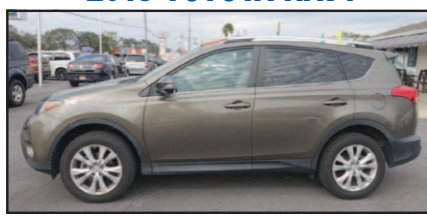
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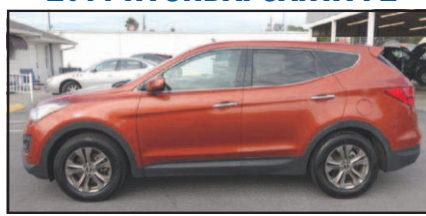
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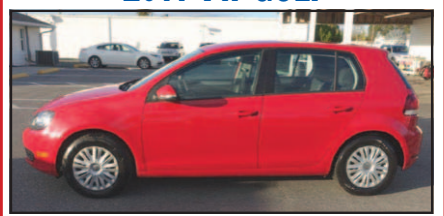
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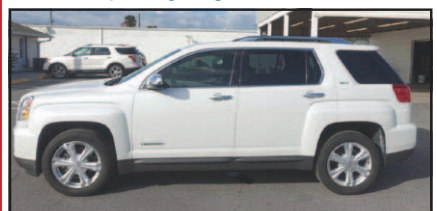
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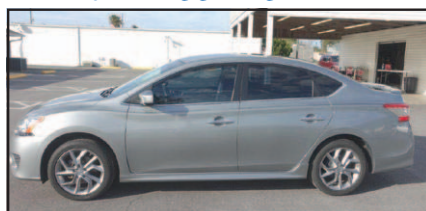
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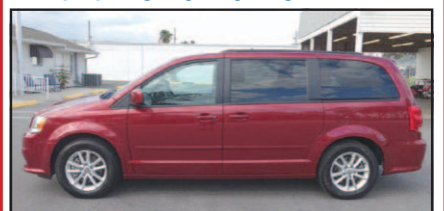
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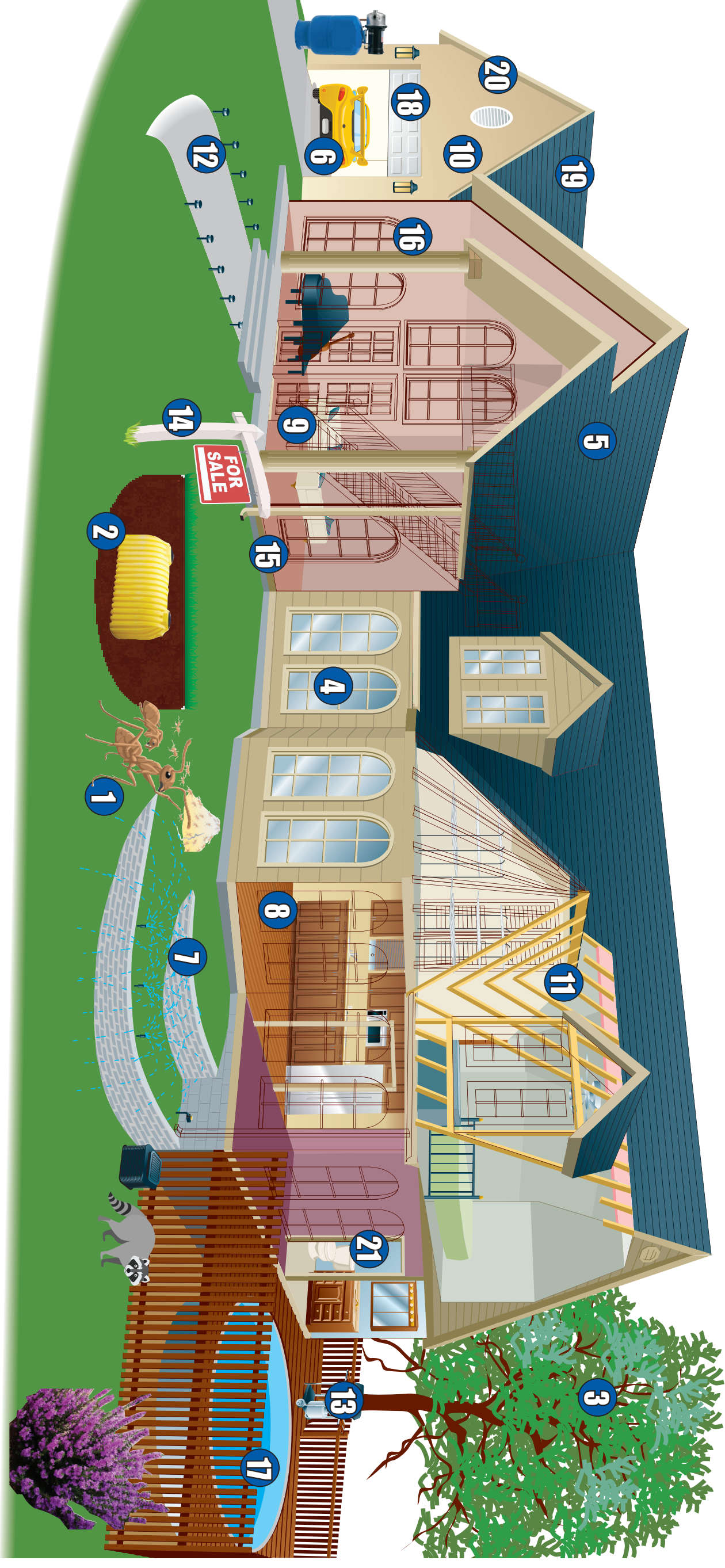

More than 4,000 pancakes

The second Saturday of the month is a busy time at the EAA Chapter 1240 Aviation Development Center (ADC) located on the flightline at the Sebring Regional Airport.

This when EAA Chapter 1240 hosts their monthly pancake breakfast supporting the youth aviation education programs. There was a time when the chapter conducted the breakfast out of two T-hangars on the north side of the airport.

The Sebring Regional Airport was instrumental in helping EAA Chapter 1240 host the breakfasts by providing the hangars rent free and helped in any way they could to get things going. At first, the breakfasts were held only during the "Snowbird Season". We shared the hangars with lots of spiders and dust, and there was always the challenge if the power would stay on for the freezers storing the food.

In 2013 the chapter was able to break ground to construct the ADC on the south flightline and the monthly breakfast took on a new life. Having a large clean space with no power outage worries, added a new energy for the breakfasts.

Two key decisions were made, the first was to offer the breakfasts year-round and second to increase the quality and selection of food for the breakfasts. It made all the difference. It took awhile for the community to know we had something offered every month, but soon we had a "regular" crowd participating.

Many were not pilots, but all had an interest in what was happening with our youth and enjoyed getting together and viewing the activity on the flightline. Highlighting the youth AirCam build drew additional interest and we soon found families saw that there was more happening than just a great breakfast and they joined our chapter.

As the monthly participation increased, we soon outgrew our vintage grill, and had to add another. It didn't take long, and we added a third, only to find out we wore out the second grill. That was replaced with a larger unit. We are fortunate to have a professional leading the cooking crew. Chapter member Rocky Knepper is a manager of a Wendy's restaurant and has helped train and direct our cooking crew.

Sentinel duty for Scrub Jays

Birds stay on guard for predators

Florida Scrub-Jays live in extended family groups and cooperate to avoid predators. Families post a 'sentinel' on a high perch where they scan for predators and alert the group if they see one.

This system only works if the sentinel chooses a perch where they will be safe. Florida Scrub-Jays see their habitat very differently when they are inches from the ground searching for food than when they are more than a dozen feet up acting as sentinels.

Scrub-jays usually search for food close to the ground and often under and between shrubby oaks, palmettos, and other plants. Imagine having to scan for predators while also feeding so close to the ground. Even though scrub might not be tall, from the ground even waist- and knee-high vegetation looms overhead like a dense forest canopy.

Dense leaves harbor lots of good things to eat but can also hide lots of potential predators like hawks. Since it is so hard to see any distance from the ground, a scrub-jay would have to constantly fly to the top of the vegetation to scan for predators such as hawks. This is why posting a family sentinel is such a good solution.

If a scrub-jay has had enough to eat, they often sit on perches a few feet above the ground. During daylight hours, at least one member of each family group is perched high enough to have a good view in all directions, scanning for potential

predators such as hawks or snakes.

Sentinel duty is coordinated, so when one bird goes down to eat, another flies up and assumes the watch. Having sentinels helps scrub-jays stay safe and staying safe requires being able to see trouble coming. But how do jays choose the best place to watch, where they can see but also have access to cover if they spot a predator?

Two researchers affiliated with Archbold Biological Station recently asked this question.

Visiting scientist and Research Associate Dr. Peter Bednekoff, a professor at Eastern Michigan University, took a ladder out to scrub-jay territories and measured visibility at different heights: "Getting my eye 8 feet from the ground gave a good view, and climbing to 12 feet above the ground usually allowed me to see above the scrub for hundreds of yards."

We might expect scrub-jays seek out the highest perches for the best views. To measure the perches that Florida Scrub-Jays

actually select, Archbold Research Intern Alfredo Gonzalez measured the height of perches used by scrub-jay sentinels and the height of other possible perches nearby that the jay might have selected.

He found that, "Florida Scrub-Jays chose perches that were taller than average, but not typically the tallest available perch. They seem to strategically balance the need to detect predators at a distance and the

Cole Porter's "Jubilee" was said to have been "banished into

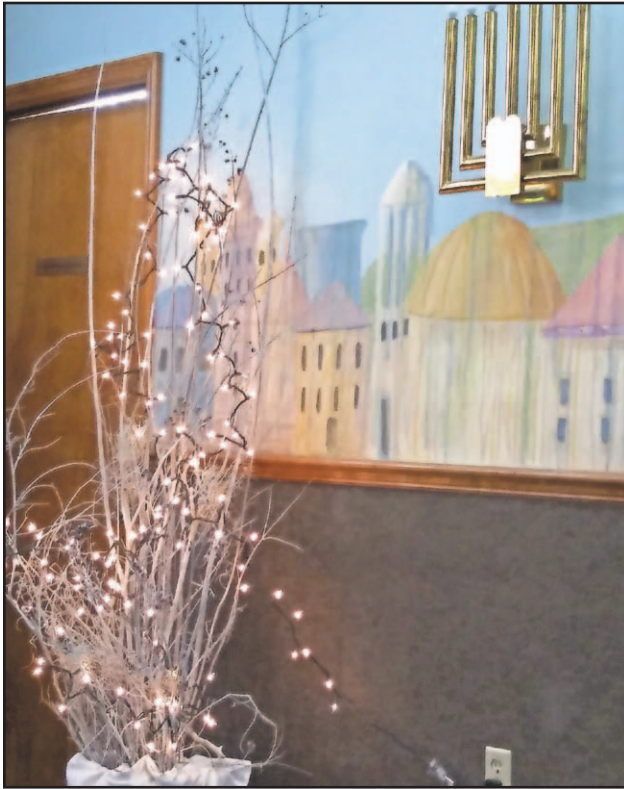
obscurity," but the hit "Begin the Beguine" is still a favorite.

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New class names in Trans Am Series

The Trans Am presented by Pirelli Series has revealed new class names for their growing production-based classes. The SuperGT Class (SGT), formerly TA3, and the GT Class, formerly TA4, are now aligned name-wise with other "GT" series and classes in North America.

As the Trans Am Series has spoken to potential competitors, it has become apparent that not everyone is aware that the Trans Am Series now includes production-based classes where they are able to race their "GT" cars. Even though the Trans Am Series started as a purely production-based series in 1966, since the 1980's, when the Trans Am cars started transitioning over to tube-frame chassis with silhouette bodies, many people have come to assume that those are the only types of cars competing in the Trans Am Series.

"We've updated the

names for the GT and SuperGT Classes to better reflect the kinds of cars that are competing in them," said John Claggett, Trans Am Race Company president. "Diversity is a key aspect of these classes, with sports cars, grand touring cars, performance coupes, and performance sedans, all with varying engines and drivetrain layouts, and all welcomed in the GT and SuperGT classes."

For the 2018 season, the Trans Am Race Company hired a new Technical Director with

extensive experience in production car officiating, engineering and team management. During the 2018 season, the class philosophies were solidified, and a new rule set was developed that will remain in effect for an extended period of time to encourage stability, innovation, and growth of the production classes. The liberal eligibility rules allow a wide range of cars prepared for both professional, and amateur classes, to race for an extended period of time in order to maximize

the return on investment in equipment.

"In recent years, the world of professional motorsports has moved more, and more, towards 'cookie cutter' race cars delivered exclusively from the factory," said Aaron Coalwell, Technical Director for the TA, GT and SGT classes. "While there are some positive aspects to that approach, and Trans Am does

welcome these factory built race cars, it removes all the unique innovation that used to be seen from car to car. It has reached the point where customized and tuned street cars are often more innovative than top level race cars."

The GT and SGT classes represent a different approach by establishing a place to race for individual race teams and tuner shops, to compete with innovative and unique vehicles showcasing their abilities. The Trans Am Series wants to help bring innovation and uniqueness between cars from the various teams back into professional racing.

The SuperGT Class uses the Porsche 991.1 GT3 Cup Car with OEM mechanicals, and ABS added, as the performance baseline due to its level of testing and development, availability, and operational costs. This class has a higher performance potential, and has the most freedom within the rules for innovation.

The Trans Am Series was started by the Sports Car Club of America (SCCA) and is still closely allied with SCCA and sanctioned by SCCA Pro Racing, allowing for special provisions to be made to allow cars eligible for some of the SCCA Club Racing classes, such as T1 and GT2 production based cars, to easily crossover with minor weight and restrictor adjustments as needed, as well as to encourage GT and SGT teams to crossover to SCCA Club Racing events.

There are also a significant number of

professionally-built, or factory-built, race cars that have lost eligibility from the professional series they were built for, or will soon lose eligibility, as new models are released. This is a much different approach from most professional series, and is creating great diversity of cars in our growing fields, which will create great racing for the fans.

In order to grow participation in the production classes, Trans Am has begun contacting former competitors to let them know about the many changes made since they last raced with Trans Am. The Technical Department has also started researching what cars from other North American race series, professional and amateur, would easily crossover into the Trans Am GT and SGT classes. Throughout the 2019 season, they will be contacting teams and prep shops to let them know of the opportunities and benefits of racing in the Trans Am Series.

In addition to new rules with longer eligibility periods, the Trans Am Technical Department has instituted more professional technical procedures where all cars go through tech at least once a weekend. This ensures that cars that do not finish on the podium are still following the rules. Following each event, video and data analysis is performed as needed to keep the performance of the various cars balanced.

The Technical Department has also dedicated itself to providing the best customer service of any race series by making the technical process as easy as possible.

The 2019 Trans Am presented by Pirelli season will launch at Sebring International Raceway today and continue through Sunday. Tickets are \$10 for today or \$20 for Saturday or Sunday. A three-day ticket, which includes camping is available for \$35.

need to be close to the safety of cover."

Safety requires a good getaway plan. If the view is great at 12 feet, then going any higher just puts scrub-jays farther from any bush or shrubby refuge if an attack comes. This is compounded because the tallest perches are often slash pines or dead trees.

Dr. Bednekoff showed that many of these tall perches have little vegetation below them, thus not providing a good place for a scrub-jay to hide from an attacking hawk and exposing the scrub-jay to danger if it is forced to make a longer escape flight to thicker vegetation.

The best perches that provide safety to scrub-jays sentinels may be perches with a

view and with a dense cluster of oak branches below. Florida Scrub-Jays clearly prefer open scrub that has burned within the last decade and are often found near thickets within this scrub.

Says Dr. Bednekoff, "I suspect that pockets of thick vegetation provide safe-space for Florida

Scrub-Jays. To be really safe, Florida Scrub-Jays require low and open scrub to see predators and thick, dense vegetation near the ground to hide from those predators. When scrub is long-unburned and gets overgrown, sentinels are not safe and everyone has to fend for themselves!"

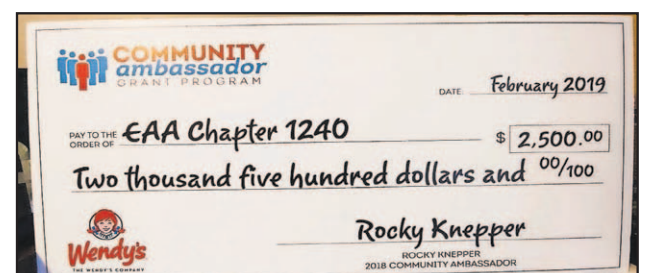

Highlands County important to Cracker Trail ride

LORIDA — Highlands County has always been an important participant in the annual Florida Cracker Trail Annual Cross-State Ride, which took place this year from Feb. 16-23. The ride, which is approximately 120 miles long, commemorates the birth and continuation of the cattle and horse industries by Florida's settlers and their descendants.

Last Wednesday, 110 riders, most of them on horseback but a few in carriages, plus 30 support staff, arrived in Sebring. They entertained children at Cracker Trail Elementary School and then rode to Hickory Hammock Campground in Lorida where they spent the night. On Thursday they crossed into Okeechobee County, traveling along the 17-mile stretch from Hickory Hammock to Bass Ranch in Basinger. The last destination in Highlands County was the former Edna Pearce Lockett Estate in Lorida, where the riders had lunch.

Suzanne Park, a trail rider for the last 15 years and the Trail Boss for the last five years, said she appreciates the efforts of all the officials who helped make the passage through Highlands County a success. She especially commended Fred Tagtmeier of the Highlands County Sheriff's Office for insuring the riders' safety and for keeping the traffic flowing on the

roads, particularly U.S. Highway 98. Tagtmeier, who is an Agricultural Detective for the Sheriff's Office, has been assigned to the event for the past 14 years and was assisted this year by deputy sheriffs Allison Hinkle and Nathan Nichols.

Park said she is also very grateful to Lake Placid resident Butch Thompson, for the wonderful improvements that have been made at the former Edna Pearce Lockett Estate in the last two years. Thompson bought the 16-acre property at auction in 2017 from the South Florida Water Management District, which had let the property deteriorate considerably during the 20-plus years it had tried unsuccessfully to find a buyer.

"As long as I've been involved, we've been stopping here for lunch," Park said. "It's a great location, but for many years we had safety concerns about the condition of the buildings, the trees, and the grounds."

When Thompson bought it, Park also had concerns about whether the trail riders would be allowed back on the grounds.

Not only has Thompson welcomed the trail riders, but he also has made the grounds much safer. He has removed structurally unsound buildings and repaired and restored other buildings. He has removed weeds from the overgrown and unkempt grounds as well as some large oak trees and tree branches destroyed in Hurricane Irma.

The riders can enjoy lunch in much greater comfort too. Thompson has installed a pavilion with picnic tables, electricity with a fan and added a well. Along the top of a fence, he temporarily rigged up a pipe with holes spaced throughout and water running through the pipe, so that riders could wash their hands. He also set up a special tented V.I.P. area, so members of the Pearce family and other guests could watch

Rafa Matos is coming off a year that every driver dreams of, as he dominated the Trans Am Series presented by Pirelli TA2 class, capturing the class title with two races remaining on the schedule. The Brazilian transplant to Florida is looking for another title in 2019 and can't think of a better place to kick-off his title defense than Sebring International Raceway.

"I think Sebring is one of the tracks I love the most," Matos said. "I have done a lot of laps there, I have done the 12 Hours of Sebring a few times. It's a local track for me, I'm only a few hours away in Boca Raton. It's a good place for me and I enjoy it very much."

Sebring is known to be notoriously tough on both the drivers and the cars, which adds to the allure of the track for a professional like Matos.

"Sebring's definitely one of the most demanding tracks, not only for the driver, but for the equipment," Matos said. "We qualify on one set of tires and also have to race on them. By the end of the race if you didn't

conserve the tire and do the right things with tire pressure and camber settings, you're going to suffer lack of grip. It's a tough place, but that makes it exciting."

Matos joined the Trans Am Series last year, racing for friend Doug Peterson, who is no slouch behind the wheel himself, and Matos said racing against Peterson, who is entered in this weekend's race in the No. 87 3Dimensional.com Ford Mustang, is always a good time.

"It is a lot of fun," Matos said. "It's pretty amazing what he can do in the car and to push so hard, he's almost 70 years old. A lot of times I see the data and he's braking deeper than I am and it's pretty impressive."

There are plenty of talented drivers in the TA2

class, but Matos believes he and his team can be even better in 2019.

"When you have a good team behind you, with good sponsors, good engineers, good mechanics, I just have to finalize the job," he said. "I feel this year we're going to be even better. We're acclimated more and everybody is more familiar with the dynamics of the weekend, how things work and we learned from our mistakes last year."

"We have fun and that's very important also. I think we are the team everybody wants to beat and I'm very comfortable with that."

Matos said the TA2 cars are physically demanding to drive and 75 minutes at Sebring pushing as hard as you possibly can

every lap will take its toll on you.

"The TA2 cars are the real deal; they're very hard to drive, but they're very fun to drive," he said. "They reward the driver who can muscle them around and do the proper downshifts. It's a very raw feeling to be driving a TA2 car. It's very much about technique and instinct."

Matos said people can relate to the Trans Am cars — with the vast majority being Mustangs, Camaros and Corvettes — the muscle cars people love, and he believes

Trans Am is doing a great job of promoting that aspect of the series. Along with Trans Am's association with Sportscar Vintage Racing Association, he said it provides a great weekend for car enthusiasts of all ages and racing fans in general.

"It's just a very nice environment," he said. "The events are going to get stronger and stronger all the way around."

While Matos gets all of the accolades, he'll be the first to tell you that racing is a team sport and he

couldn't do what he does without a lot of help from plenty of other people.

"I have to thank my sponsor 3-Dimensional Services Group and Doug Peterson for stepping up and allowing us to be competitive and doing right by the team," Matos said. "Coleman Motorsports, every single member of the team, the mechanics and the engineers, our team manager Shane is a very dedicated individual, Howe Enterprises and Prefix engines, who make my engines."

Collapse of Trump-Kim summit shines alight on the president's brand of personal diplomacy

HANOI, Vietnam — President Donald Trump framed the breakdown of his nuclear summit with North Korea's Kim Jong Un as wisely knowing when "to walk." But the stunning collapse revealed the limits of his unique brand of personal diplomacy and raised concerns about future efforts to disarm a global threat.

Eyeing the history books and a much-needed political

victory, Trump bet big on the two-day Vietnam summit only to be forced to explain away its sudden failure.

The president and North Korea gave conflicting explanations of what went wrong, though the result actually was a relief to some critics and even some Trump supporters who feared he might give too much away in pursuit of a deal.

Trump, the businessman who was elected in part on his boasts of deal-making prowess, said a proposed agreement was "ready to be signed." But he said he

refused to accept what he described as North Korean insistence that all U.S. sanctions be lifted without the North committing to eliminate its nuclear arsenal.

"I'd much rather do it right than do it fast," the president said. "We're in position to do something very special."

The North said it had demanded only partial relief from the punishing sanctions.

Trump had pushed for the summit, telling wary aides that his personal chemistry with North Korea's

young and reclusive leader outweighed any need for detailed, staff-level talks to iron out differences before either head of state set foot in Hanoi.

Secretary of State Mike Pompeo, who along with his special envoy for North Korea, Stephen Biegun, had been leading the preparatory effort, said staff work had achieved some results but that negotiators had intentionally left some of the most contentious issues unresolved.

US, North Korea offer dueling accounts of talks breakdown

HANOI, Vietnam — In open dispute, the U.S. and North Korea offered contradictory accounts Thursday of why the summit between Donald Trump and Kim Jong Un broke down, though both pointed to punishing American sanctions as a sticking point in the high-stakes nuclear negotiation.

President Trump, on his way back to Washington on Thursday, said before leaving Hanoi that the talks collapsed because North Korea's leader insisted that all the sanctions the U.S. has imposed on Pyongyang be lifted without the North firmly committing to eliminate its nuclear arsenal.

But North Korea challenged that account, insisting it had asked only partial sanctions relief in exchange for shutting down its main nuclear complex. Foreign Minister Ri Yong Ho commented on the talks during an abruptly scheduled middle-of-the-night news conference after Trump was in the air.

Ri said the North was also ready to offer in writing a permanent halt of the country's nuclear and intercontinental ballistic missile tests and Washington had wasted an opportunity that "may not come again." He said the North's position won't change even if the United States offers to resume another round of dialogue.

On Friday, North Korea's official news agency put a more positive spin on the summit, saying Trump and Kim "had a constructive and candid exchange of their opinions over the practical issues arising in opening up a new era of the improvement" of relations between the two nations.

Trump made no mention of the disagreement as he addressed U.S. troops during a stopover at Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson in Alaska, though White House spokeswoman Sarah Sanders said he was aware of Ri's comments.

Opioids, timber, cancer on Florida Cabinet priority lists

TALLAHASSEE — Attorney General Ashley Moody wants a task force on opioid addiction, Agriculture Commissioner Nikki Fried wants to help the timber industry recover from Hurricane Michael and Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis wants to help firefighters with cancer.

While Florida's three Cabinet members can't sponsor or vote on bills, they hold important leadership roles in state government and each is working with lawmakers to pass legislation and make budget recommendations.

The Associated Press interviewed each of the Cabinet

members to discuss their 2019 legislative priorities:

Attorney General Ashley Moody

Moody's top priority is legislation to create a state-wide task force to combat the opioid epidemic. She said while campaigning last year that Florida was averaging 14 opioid deaths a day.

"We now lose 17 people a day, so we're not heading in a direction we as Floridians would like to see," she said.

The task force would examine what programs have been effective in reducing opioid addiction and make recommendations on how to best address the problem.

President's former lawyer completes third day on Capitol Hill

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FBI: Vet shoots, wounds doctor before mental health check

RIVIERA BEACH (AP) — A double-amputee Army veteran shot and wounded a doctor just before a mental health evaluation at a veterans' hospital in Florida, authorities said.

Larry Ray Bon, 59, of Michigan, arrived at the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center in Riviera Beach on Wednesday morning and was combative for hours, according to the FBI. Authorities said Bon was taken to the emergency room that evening for the mental health evaluation, when he pulled out a gun and shot the doctor in the neck.

"During the shooting, in between shots, the doctor saw an opportunity to jump on the suspect and disarm him," Justin Fleck, the assistant special agent in charge for the FBI's Miami office,

said in a Palm Beach Post report.

"He's a pretty heroic individual and probably saved a lot of lives," Fleck said.

It was not clear how Bon was able to bring the gun into the hospital.

Another hospital employee was grazed by a bullet. VA spokeswoman Mary Kay Rutan says the doctor was treated at a West Palm Beach hospital and released. The doctor's name was not released.

The medical center opened for scheduled appointments Thursday.

Bon, who has had both his legs amputated and uses an electric wheelchair, served in the Army in the 1970s, but investigators were not aware of him having any combat-related conditions, Fleck said.

Nancy Bon told the

Post that her son was mentally ill and arrived in West Palm Beach after he skipped a 2016 sentencing hearing in Muskegon, Michigan, for illegally possessing a stun gun.

"I don't even know where he would have gotten a gun. He's a felon," she said.

Nancy Bon said her son's mental health suffered after he contracted spinal meningitis at age 8. She said he was honorably discharged from the Army after contracting pneumonia during basic training. One leg was amputated after an infection, and the other was amputated 15 years ago after a car accident, she said.

Bon refused to cooperate after he was taken into federal custody on an assault charge, authorities said. A hearing on

his detention and mental competency was scheduled March 7.

According to online

court records, Bon's only history in Palm Beach County's legal system was a case in small claims

court in 2017 that was dismissed. His name did not appear in county jail records.

Sheriff: Man turns self in, admits to 17-year-old killing

JACKSONVILLE (AP) — Authorities say a Georgia man has walked into a Florida sheriff's office building and confessed to a 17-year-old homicide.

The Florida Times-Union reports that 41-year-old Kenny Lee Maxwell turned himself in last week at the front desk at the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office.

Officials say Maxwell confessed to strangling 57-year-old Richard Ottis Morrison at the Palms Hotel in January 2002. Investigators haven't said what prompted the confession.

The investigation at

the time determined that a physical fight had occurred, and some of Morrison's property was missing. No suspects were identified, and the case went cold.

Detectives are reviewing the case to see if anyone else was involved.

Maxwell was being held without bond. Jail records didn't list an attorney.

Police: Man ends standoff for slice of pizza

PENSACOLA (AP) — Authorities say a Florida man accused of threatening his family ended a four-hour standoff with police after he was promised a slice of pizza.

The Pensacola News Journal reports that 33-year-old Evan Charles McLemore was arrested Tuesday and charged with resisting an officer and aggravated stalking.

Police say officers responded to a report of a possible battery at the Pensacola home and found McLemore had barricaded himself in a room. Officers say McLemore claimed to have a gun, so they brought in a SWAT team. Crisis negotiators eventually managed to coax McLemore out with the promise of pizza. It wasn't clear if he actually received a slice.

McLemore's bond was set at \$105,000 bond. Jail records didn't list an attorney.

Auction nets \$2M for horses owned by ex-Venezuelan official

WEST PALM BEACH (AP) — Bidders spent over \$2 million for show-jumping horses once owned by Venezuela's former national treasurer, who is serving a decade-long U.S. prison sentence for taking part in a \$1 billion bribery scheme.

Fifty-four-year-old Alejandro Andrade is being held at a federal penitentiary in Pennsylvania.

The Palm Beach Post reports 14 horses Andrade owned in Florida brought in \$2,086,500 in an online auction that ended Tuesday. A stallion

named Hardrock Z that Andrade's son rode in the 2016 Summer Olympics fetched the highest bid at \$282,000.

The sale proceeds will go to the U.S. Treasury. Separate auctions will be held to sell off the rest of Andrade's property that was seized by U.S. authorities, including mansions in exclusive Palm Beach County neighborhoods, two farms, 10 vehicles and 35 designer watches.

Man, 83, dies in wrong-way golf cart crash; wife injured

FORT MYERS (AP) — Authorities say a wrong-way golf cart crash in a Florida gated community killed an 83-year-old man

and injured his wife.

The Lee County Sheriff's Office tells news outlets Joseph Heller died in the crash Monday in Estero. His wife, 81-year-old Betty Heller, was riding in the golf cart and suffered life-threatening injuries. Heller died at a hospital where they both were taken after being ejected in the crash.

Deputies say in a report that Heller was driving his golf cart northbound in the southbound lane when it was struck head-on by a pickup truck. It says the truck's driver told deputies he was distracted after dropping a cigarette, however Heller was at fault because he was on the wrong side of the road.

Israel attorney general recommends charges against Netanyahu

JERUSALEM — Israel's attorney general on Thursday recommended indicting Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu with bribery, fraud and breach of trust in a series of corruption cases, a momentous move that shook up Israel's election campaign and could spell the end of the Israeli leader's illustrious political career.

Attorney General Avichai Mandelblit announced his decision after more than two years of intense investigations and deliberations.

Police had recommended indicting Netanyahu on various charges in three separate cases that ranged from accepting expensive gifts from wealthy allies to allegedly trading influence for more favorable press coverage.

The final decision on indictment will only take place after a hearing, where Netanyahu is given the opportunity to defend himself. That process is expected to take many months and be completed long after the April 9 elections.

But the recommendations immediately cast a cloud over the campaign and Netanyahu's future.

Appearing on national TV, Netanyahu dismissed the allegations as an "unprecedented witch hunt" by political opponents intent on ousting him. He called the timing, just weeks before the election, "outrageous" and appeared emotional at times as he dismissed the charges as a "blood libel." He vowed to debunk all allegations and said he would remain prime

minister for "many years." "Don't let this witch hunt affect you," he told Israeli voters.

An indictment would mark the first time in Israeli history that a sitting prime minister has been charged with a crime. Former Prime Minister Ehud Olmert served time in prison for corruption, but had already resigned by the time he was charged.

Netanyahu doesn't look to go that quietly. He denies any wrongdoing and calls the allegations a media-orchestrated campaign aimed at removing him from office. He has vowed to carry on and is deadlocked in the polls, 40 days before Israelis go to vote.

In a last-ditch effort to prevent the public release of an indictment, Netanyahu's Likud party petitioned the Supreme Court to have it delayed until after the elections. But the court rejected the request Thursday,

clearing the way for the announcement from the attorney general.

Despite opposition calls for Netanyahu to step down, Likud and his other nationalist coalition partners have lined up behind him thus far, all but ruling out sitting in a government led by his primary opponent, retired military chief Benny Gantz.

While Israeli prime ministers are not required by law to resign if charged, the prospect of a prime minister standing trial while simultaneously running the country would be uncharted territory.

Mandelblit's decision could either galvanize Netanyahu's hard-line supporters who see him as a victim of an overzealous prosecution or turn more moderate backers against him who have tired of his lengthy rule tainted by long-standing accusations of corruption and hedonism.

Either way, the upcoming elections appear to be morphing into a referendum on Netanyahu as he seeks to become the longest serving premier in Israeli history. Netanyahu has been prime minister since 2009 and served a previous term between 1996 and 1999.

President Donald Trump, with whom Netanyahu has forged a close connection, offered the Israeli leader a boost ahead of the expected announcement.

"I just think he's been a great prime minister and I don't know about his difficulty but you tell me something people have been hearing about, but I don't know about that," he said in response to a question in Hanoi, where he was holding a summit with the leader of North Korea.

"I can say this: that he's done a great job as prime minister. He's tough, he's smart, he's strong," Trump said.

Pakistan pledges to release captive Indian fighter pilot

ISLAMABAD — Pakistan's prime minister pledged on Thursday his country would release a captured Indian fighter pilot, a move that could help defuse the most serious confrontation in two decades between the nuclear-armed neighbors over the disputed region of Kashmir.

Prime Minister Imran Khan made the announcement in an address to both houses of Parliament, saying he tried to reach his Indian counterpart Narendra Modi on Wednesday with a message that he wants to de-escalate tensions.

"We are releasing the Indian pilot as a goodwill

gesture tomorrow," Khan told lawmakers. He did not say whether the release was conditional.

Meanwhile, fresh skirmishes erupted Thursday between Indian and Pakistani soldiers along the so-called Line of Control that divides disputed Kashmir between the two nuclear-armed rivals.

India's army said Pakistani soldiers were targeting nearly two dozen Indian forward points with mortar and gunfire. Lt. Col. Devender Anand, an Indian army spokesman, called it an "unprovoked" violation of the 2003 cease-fire accord between the two countries. He said Indian soldiers were responding to ongoing Pakistani attacks along the highly militarized de facto frontier.

Irish drivers warned over 'no-deal' Brexit as EU and UK talk

LONDON — Ireland's deputy prime minister said Thursday that the European Union wants to work with Britain to ensure there is a Brexit deal, as Irish drivers were warned they will need new paperwork to cross the currently invisible border to Northern Ireland if the U.K. leaves the bloc without an agreement.

The Motor Insurers' Bureau of Ireland said it has supplied insurance companies with 1 million forms

so customers can apply for the internationally recognized "Green Card" proof of insurance documents.

British drivers traveling to Ireland or other EU countries will also need the paperwork — just one of a host of new rules and hurdles citizens will need to negotiate if Britain crashes out of the bloc without a framework over its departure.

Currently, auto insurance in any EU country covers the whole bloc. If Britain leaves with a deal, there will be no change until at least the end of 2020.

US growth falls below Trump goal for 2018

Economists expect slower economy going forward

WASHINGTON — The U.S. economy turned in a solid performance in 2018, boosted in part by tax cuts and higher government spending. But growth slowed by year's end, and most economists envision a weaker outlook for the coming months and probably years.

The nation's gross domestic product, the broadest gauge of economic health, expanded at a 2.6 percent annual rate in the October-December period, the government said Thursday. That was down from a 3.4 percent rate in

the July-September period and a sizzling 4.2 percent pace from April through June. During those months, the economy benefited from tax cuts and from higher government spending, the gains from which are thought to be fading.

For 2018 as a whole, GDP growth amounted to 2.9 percent, the government said, the best showing since 2015. It was just below the 3 percent pace the administration has said it can maintain consistently. By contrast, most economists foresee slower growth ahead. For the current January-March quarter, many analysts say they think growth could

slow to a 2 percent annual rate or less.

"I think the economy will be steadily throttling back over the next two years," said Mark Zandi, chief economist at Moody's Analytics.

The economy's pace of expansion last quarter reflected a slowdown in consumer spending and the start of a 35-day partial shutdown of the government, which subtracted an estimated 0.1 percentage point from growth. That weakness was offset somewhat by a gain in business investment and less of a drag from trade.

The \$1.5 trillion tax cut that President Donald

Trump pushed through Congress in late 2017 and billions of extra dollars in government spending that Congress added for military and domestic programs helped accelerate the economy last year.

In the view of most economists, though, 2018 may turn out to have been the economy's high point for some time. Many are forecasting that growth this year will slow to around 2.2 percent and to weaken further in 2020. Some analysts say they think the economy could even dip into recession next year as the support from the tax cuts fades and the global

economy sputters.

Zandi has forecast growth of 2.5 percent this year and just above 1 percent in 2020 and estimates the chance of a recession starting in 2020 at about 50-50. The National Association for Business Economics said in a survey released this week that roughly half the economists who responded to its latest survey expect a recession to have begun by the end of 2020.

The forecasts from the Trump administration are far rosier. Its officials have projected that the administration's policies will produce growth surpassing 3 percent in coming years.

Kevin Hassett, chairman of the White House Council of Economic Advisers, argued in an interview Thursday that private forecasters are relying on outdated models that don't fully reflect the latest research. Hassett said he had forecast growth of 3.1 percent for 2018, when measured on a fourth-quarter-to-fourth-quarter basis and said that that pace was achieved.

"It worked exactly the way I said," Hassett said. For 2019 as a whole, Hassett said he foresees growth improving to 3.2 percent — well above the expectations of most economists.

House passage of gun bills reflects political shift

WASHINGTON — The House put on a display of Democratic priorities this week with two bills to bolster background checks on firearms purchases, showing just how quickly the politics of gun control have turned.

Just a few years ago, says Kris Brown, the president of one of the nation's leading gun violence prevention groups, there was a "sense of hopelessness" after a divided Congress tried — and failed — to change gun laws following the mass shooting of 20 young children and six adults at Newtown Elementary School in Connecticut.

But a new generation of teen leaders "flipped" public sentiment after the shooting last year at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, she said, helping to elect lawmakers in 2018 who are willing to buck the powerful gun lobby, including the National Rifle Association.

"We're at a completely different time," said Brown, the president of the Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence.

On Thursday, the House approved legislation to allow a review period of up to 10 days for background checks on firearms purchases.

Democrats led passage, 228-198, with a handful of defections and scant Republican support.

After a listless day, S&P 500 marks its 3rd straight loss

Stocks finished modestly lower Thursday, closing out another listless day of trading on Wall Street with a third straight loss for the market.

Technology, energy and consumer products companies pulled down the market, offsetting gains in consumer goods, utilities and real estate stocks.

Investors weighed a government report that showed economic growth slowed at the end of last year. Traders also had their eye on a mixed batch of corporate earnings reports.

"You have a market that's trying to digest what's next right now; really all week it's been kind of consolidating a little bit," said Willie Delwiche, investment strategist at Baird.

The S&P 500 index slipped 7.89 points, or 0.3 percent, to 2,784.49. The Dow Jones Industrial Average lost 69.16 points, or 0.3 percent, to 25,916. The Nasdaq composite index dropped 21.98 points, or 0.3 percent, to 7,532.53.

Experts: US anti-Huawei campaign likely exaggerated

Since last year, the U.S. has waged a vigorous diplomatic offensive against the Chinese telecommunications giant Huawei, claiming that any nation deploying its gear in next-generation wireless networks is giving Beijing a conduit for espionage or worse.

But security experts say the U.S. government is likely exaggerating that threat. Not only is the U.S. case short on specifics, they say, it glosses over the fact that the Chinese don't need secret access to Huawei routers to infiltrate global networks that already have notoriously poor security.

State-sponsored hackers have shown no preference for one manufacturer's technology over another, these experts say. Kremlin-backed hackers, for instance, adroitly exploit internet routers and other networking equipment made by companies that are not Russian.

If the Chinese want to disrupt global networks, "they will do so regardless of the type of equipment you are using," said Jan-Peter Kleinhans, a researcher at the Berlin think tank Neue Verantwortung Stiftung.

One of the most common U.S. fears — that Huawei might install software "backdoors" in its equipment that Chinese intelligence could use to tap into, eavesdrop on or interrupt

data transmissions — strikes some experts as highly unlikely.

Priscilla Moriuchi, who retired from the National Security Agency in 2017 after running its Far East operations, does not believe the Huawei threat is overblown. But she called the odds of the company installing backdoors on behalf of Chinese intelligence "almost zero because of the chance that it would be discovered," thus exposing Huawei's complicity.

Moriuchi, now an analyst at the U.S. cybersecurity firm Recorded Future, said she

was not aware of the NSA ever finding Huawei backdoors created for Chinese intelligence but also cautioned that it can be extraordinarily difficult, when backdoors are found, to determine who is behind them.

European allies have been reluctant to embrace a blanket anti-Huawei ban even as U.S. officials continue to cast the world's No. 1 telecom-equipment maker as little more than an untrustworthy surrogate for Beijing's intelligence services.

The top U.S. diplomat for cybersecurity policy,

Robert Strayer, says Huawei is obliged to heed Chinese Communist Party orders by a 2017 intelligence law that "compels their citizens and their companies to participate in intelligence activities."

Strayer provided no specifics when pressed by reporters Tuesday as to how Huawei gear might pose more of a security threat than other manufacturers' switches, routers and wireless base stations. The diplomat spoke at Mobile World Congress, the world's largest wireless trade show, in Barcelona, Spain.

Huawei pleads not guilty to trade secrets charges in Seattle

SEATTLE (AP) — The Chinese tech giant Huawei pleaded not guilty Thursday to U.S. trade-theft charges in a case that has heightened a trade dispute between the world's two largest economies.

The pleas were entered in federal court in Seattle, where a 10-count indictment was unsealed in January against two Huawei units, Huawei Device Co. and Huawei Device USA.

Charges include conspiracy to steal trade secrets, attempted theft of trade secrets, wire fraud and obstruction of justice. The conspiracy charge carries a potential fine of \$5 million or three times the value of the stolen trade secret, whichever is greater, the U.S. Attorney's office said Thursday.

U.S. District Judge Ricardo S. Martinez set a March 2020 trial date.

The U.S. has accused China of using predatory tactics to turn Chinese companies into leaders in tech fields such as robotics and electric vehicles.

Tribe says Corps' pipeline findings preordained

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) — The Native American tribe leading the fight against the Dakota Access oil pipeline said Thursday that an Army Corps of Engineers document shows the agency concluded the pipeline won't unfairly affect tribes before it consulted them.

Standing Rock Sioux officials say the document, which they shared with The Associated Press, bolsters the tribe's claim that the Corps disregarded a federal judge's order to seriously review the pipeline's potential impact on the Standing Rock Sioux and three other Dakotas-based tribes and to not treat the study as a "bureaucratic formality."

"This was a rigged process intended to justify a dangerous and illegal pipeline," Standing Rock Chairman Mike Faith said in a statement to the AP.

The Justice Department declined to comment Thursday. The Corps has said previously that the four tribes suing to shut down the pipeline that began delivering North Dakota oil to a shipping point in Illinois two years ago have been difficult to work with.

And the agency did meet with the tribes before it presented its study findings to U.S. District Judge James Boasberg.

California man swept away by flood trying to reach kids

GUERNEVILLE, Calif. (AP) — A Northern California man was swept away by floodwaters and died trying to get to his home where three children were trapped, authorities said Thursday, as residents of two communities hundreds of miles to the south were marooned by the worst flooding there in more than 20 years.

The unidentified man was trying to walk from a barn to his home in Ferndale through up to 5 feet of water Wednesday evening when he was carried away by the fast-moving current, said Samantha Karges, a spokeswoman with the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office.

Two adults and a child tried to rescue the man, but their tractor stalled in the water. Deputies in a boat then rescued them and the three children from the home, Karges said.

The missing man's body was found Thursday morning. He was the father of a 12-year-old trapped in the home with two children

under 4, Karges said. She was not sure if all three children were related.

Amazon ups its anti-counterfeit game

(AP) — Amazon, which has wrestled with counterfeit products on its site for years, has developed a fleet of tools that allow sellers to remove items from Amazon.com themselves and to prevent fake goods from making it to the site at all.

To speed the removal process, Amazon said that it's now allowing some companies to remove those goods themselves, rather than reporting fake goods that had been removed previously only after an investigation by Amazon.

In addition, the company has created unique serial codes that can be placed on products during the manufacturing process, which can then be monitored by Amazon on its site.

Amazon has also been testing automated technology that it said can prevent 100 times the number of counterfeit products on its site by scanning logos, trademarks and other key data. The company said it's now scanning more than 5 billion products daily for tell-tale signs of counterfeiting.

Researchers are working on a cure for the herpes virus

DEAR DR. ROACH: If a person has been exposed (verified by blood test) to herpes 1 and 2, can that person be a blood donor? Could a person catch herpes by sitting on a toilet seat that has been used by an infected person? Are scientists working on a cure for herpes? — Anon.

ANSWER: There remains a stigma against people with genital herpes, which is almost always caused by herpes simplex virus type 2. However, most people with genital herpes will not have major disruptions to their lives provided they take some precautions.

First off, a person with herpes simplex virus type 1 (about half of the population between ages 18-49, higher in older people) or HSV-2 (about 12 percent of the same population) certainly can donate blood. Second, being exposed doesn't guarantee infection.

Third, blood testing is not perfect. Fourth, getting any kind of sexually transmitted infection from a toilet seat is very unlikely. Herpes viruses have a very difficult time getting through intact skin, which is why most exposures come through mucus membranes, especially of the genitals and mouth.

There is a type of herpes (usually HSV-1, occasionally HSV-2) in wrestlers, called herpes gladiatorum or "mat herpes," and it can be

transmitted from person to person through skin-to-skin contact, especially if the skin is raw or chafed.

Once a person has herpes of either variety, there is no cure. The virus stays in the nerve cells. There is extensive work being done both on preventing transmission and curing existing infections, but herpes viruses are very good at escaping the immune system. This makes herpes difficult to treat.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I have recently started transitioning to a plant-based diet for preventative health reasons. While discussing the benefits of nuts and seeds with a dietitian, they had a disclaimer that flax seed can interfere with medications and to eat them two hours before or one hour after taking medications.

I would not sit down and eat a handful of flax seeds, but now I am afraid to use them in the meals

I prepare at all. Can you help me make a good decision in using them? — J.E.

ANSWER: For people eating reasonable amounts (like a handful or two) of flax seeds as part of a meal, it is unlikely that they would interfere with medications enough to cause any significant problem, for most medications.

There are two situations that might merit concern: In powerful anti-clotting agents, such as clopidogrel, flax seeds might prompt increased activity. Secondly, flax seeds may lower blood sugar a small amount. In combination with insulin or oral diabetes drugs, the blood sugar could possibly dip lower than expected. I doubt either of these interactions is likely to cause harm, but it is reasonable to discuss with your doctor if you are on one of the classes of medications mentioned.

"We were hoping we could take another big swing when the two leaders got together," he told reporters as he flew from Vietnam to the Philippines after the summit collapsed. "We did. We made some progress. But we didn't get as far as we would have hoped we would have gotten."

Pompeo noted that "when you are dealing with a country that is of the

nature of North Korea, it is often the case that only the most senior leaders have the capacity to make those important decisions."

Echoing the refrain that "no deal is better than a bad deal" — often used during the Obama administration by critics of its Iran negotiations — there was relief in some quarters that the president had not impulsively agreed to concessions without much in return.

"Kudos to him for walking away from the table," said Jonathan Schanzer

of the Foundation for Defense of Democracies, a Washington think-tank that has been highly skeptical of Trump's efforts with Kim Jong Un. "No deal is, in fact, better than a bad deal."

And White House aides stressed that Trump stood strong. Some observers evoked the 1987 Reykjavik summit between Ronald Reagan and the Soviet Union's Mikhail Gorbachev, a meeting that ended without a nuclear weapons deal but laid the groundwork for a

future agreement.

Long-standing U.S. policy insists that American sanctions on North Korea will not be lifted until that country commits to, if not concludes, a complete, verifiable and irreversible end to its nuclear weapons program.

Trump, who did not consult with allies South Korea and Japan before breaking off the talks, declined to restate that goal Thursday, saying he wanted to retain flexibility with Kim.

But North Korea's

foreign minister, in a rare news conference, said that Trump wasted an opportunity that "may not come again" and that the North's position wouldn't change even if there was another round of dialogue.

The failure in Hanoi laid bare a risk in Trump's negotiating style: Preferring one-on-one meetings with his foreign counterparts, his administration doesn't always do the staff-level advance work intended to make a summit more of a victory lap than a negotiation.

Instead, Trump focused on U.S. military might and offered a broad warning to U.S. enemies.

"America does not seek conflict, but if we are forced to defend ourselves we will fight and we will win in an overwhelming fashion," he declared.

Earlier on Thursday in Hanoi, Trump had told reporters the North had demanded a full removal of sanctions in exchange for shutting the Yongbyon nuclear facility. Trump said that there had been a proposed agreement "ready to be signed."

However, he said after the summit was cut short, "Sometimes you have to walk."

The demise of the talks came after Trump and Kim had appeared ready to inch toward normalizing relations between their still technically

warring nations.

The American leader had dampened expectations that the negotiations would yield an agreement by North Korea to take concrete steps toward ending a nuclear program that Pyongyang likely sees

as its strongest security guarantee. However, Kim, when asked whether he was ready to denuclearize, had said, "If I'm not willing to do that I won't be here right now."

But hours after both nations had seemed hopeful of a deal of some

kind, the two leaders' motorcades roared away from the downtown Hanoi summit site within minutes of each other, lunch canceled and signing ceremony scuttled. The president's closing news conference was hurriedly moved

up, and he departed for Washington more than two hours ahead of schedule.

The breakdown denied Trump a much-needed triumph amid growing political turmoil back home and the path forward now appears uncertain. Trump insisted his relations with Kim remain warm, but he did not commit to having a third summit with the North Korean leader, saying a possible next meeting "may not be for a long time."

Ri's comments reflected the North Koreans' disappointment, though there was a notable absence of bluster or threats by either side.

Both Trump and Secretary of State Mike Pompeo said significant progress had been made in Hanoi, but the two sides appeared to be galaxies apart on an agreement that would live up to stated American goals.

"You have people trying different things all over the state, all over the nation. Some are working, some are not," she said. "You want to make sure that once we can pinpoint something that's having a dramatic effect on the death toll, that we can use economy of scale and the structures we have set up throughout Florida to push that out in an efficient way."

Moody also wants lawmakers to increase the amount of money authorized to pay for forensic examinations after sexual assaults. The state now allows up to \$500 payment for the exams.

"It actually costs over twice that, so we're asking for permission to be able to use our funds that we already have ... to pay for those," she said.

She also wants a bill allowing state-paid mental health counseling for 15- through 17-year-old victims of lewd acts.

"We have the authority to do so for younger children and we just want to expand that definition," Moody said.

Agriculture Commissioner Nikki Fried

Fried's top priority is helping the timber industry recover from Hurricane Michael. The industry took a \$1.3 billion hit from the October storm and many of the millions of downed trees still need to be removed.

"The timber industry has been decimated. To see a farmer have his entire life savings on the

ground and no opportunity to make it better is heartbreaking," Fried said.

She's asking for \$39 million to help clear fallen trees, replant new ones and for helicopters to prepare for what's expected to be an active wildfire season because of the downed trees and debris.

"We're going to get to the dry season and fires are going to start," she said. "Our helicopters right now are older than the ones that are in the Vietnam (War) museum and are no longer really safe for our guys to be up there monitoring."

Fried said her second priority is strengthening the department's consumer services operations.

"We hear reports all the time of different fraud that's happening, whether it's travel agents, whether

it's nonprofit organizations, the skimmers in the gas station pumps to car wash places, payday loan lenders," she said. "One of our agency bills will talk about different types of consumer services and beefing up the penalties."

She also is making a budget request to add 77 new employees to the division that issues concealed weapons permits and licenses for armed private investigators and security guards. Her predecessor was criticized for problems with improperly issued licenses. She said one reason is because the department lacks enough full-time staff to process them.

Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis

Patronis' top priority is providing firefighters with

cancer benefits, including full cost of treatment, a \$25,000 payout, disability pay and death benefits for beneficiaries.

"Seventy percent of our firefighters' in line of duty deaths are cancer related. It's just a huge, obscene number," Patronis said. "We've got to create a solution ... to help offset their expenses, their deductibles and their lost wages while they get treatment."

Patronis also is seeking a way to cut down on the number of insurance-related lawsuits following hurricanes. He says the problem occurs when homeowners sign over insurance benefits to contractors before getting in touch with their insurance companies and then the contractors sue to collect payment. He said thousands of lawsuits were filed in the aftermath of Hurricane Michael.

Patronis said contractors immediately swooped into the Panama City area after Michael while internet and cellphone services were down and had homeowners sign assignment of benefits agreements before they were able to contact their insurance companies.

"They were staged prior to the storm better than Verizon Wireless. These guys were everywhere prepared to hit the ground running to sign people up," Patronis said. "The assignment of benefits process has a purpose, but it's being exploited and perverted for a use that it was never, ever intended."

One bill he's seeking would only allow reimbursement of attorney fees for people named on insurance policies, which would make assignment of benefits agreements less attractive for contractors.

Patronis also wants to crack down on scams to replace windshields. He's working with lawmakers to pass a bill that would prohibit auto repair shops or their employees from offering anything of value to entice people to make an insurance claim for windshield replacements.

He said car owners are often offered gift cards to agree to a windshield inspection, the windshield is replaced and insurance companies are billed, often leading to lawsuits.

"The insurance carry will say, 'Where's the broken windshield?' 'It's in the dumpster.' There's no evidence to draw from," Patronis said. "Ultimately it will drive rates up. It's unethical."

were able to "drill down in great detail" on issues they are investigating. Schiff said the committee will also hear from Felix Sater, a Russia-born executive who worked with Cohen on an ultimately unsuccessful deal to build a Trump Tower

in Moscow, in an open hearing March 14.

Cohen, who pleaded guilty last year to lying to Congress about the Moscow real estate project and reports to prison soon for a three-year sentence, gave harsh testimony about Trump on Wednesday. He said Trump knew in advance that damaging emails about Democrat Hillary

Clinton would be released during the 2016 campaign — a claim the president has denied — and accused Trump of lying during the 2016 campaign about the Moscow deal.

Cohen also said Trump directed him to arrange a hush money payment to a porn actress who said she had sex with the president a decade earlier. He said the president arranged

to reimburse Cohen, and Cohen brought to the hearing a check that he said was proof of the transaction.

Two of Trump's most vocal defenders, GOP Reps. Jim Jordan of Ohio and Mark Meadows of North Carolina, sent a referral to the Justice Department alleging Cohen lied in his testimony. Their letter to Attorney General William

Barr details several Cohen statements they said were false, including claims that he "never defrauded any bank" and did not want a job in Trump's White House.

They pointed to Cohen's guilty plea for making false statements to a banking institution and to court filings that say Cohen told friends he wanted a White House job.

Here's why Bucs should trade Pierre-Paul

Defensive end was one of the best in NFL in sacking QBs in 2018, but unlikely to repeat

About this time last year, Tampa Bay Buccaneers general manager Jason Licht picked up the phone.

"Hi, Dave. Is JPP available?"

Dave Gettleman, the New York Giants general manager, paused.

"I have to think about that."

Of course Gettleman was going to think about it. The Giants needed to clear cap space, not only in 2018 but also in 2019. Plus, their new defensive coordinator, a former

assistant under Bruce Arians in Arizona, was switching to a scheme that would feature 3-4 fronts. Jason Pierre-Paul had never played in a 3-4 defense since entering the NFL in 2010.

After about three weeks of talks, Licht and Gettleman had a breakthrough. Gettleman agreed to trade Pierre-Paul to the Bucs. Tampa Bay picked up the defensive end's backloaded contract, and sent New York a third-round draft pick for the privilege.

Pierre-Paul had a solid 2018 campaign, becoming the first Bucs

player since Simeon Rice in 2005 to record at least 10 sacks in a season. His play, however, did not transform the defense like Licht had hoped that it would. Tampa Bay generated more pressure against quarterbacks but at only a slightly higher rate. It improved from last in 2017 to second-to-last in 2018, according to Sports Info Solutions.

Now, the 2019 Bucs are in a similar position to the 2018 Giants. They have limited cap space, a new defensive coordinator (handpicked by Arians) and a high-priced defensive end who might

not be an every-down player in the new scheme.

That is why Licht should do what Gettleman did. He should do what he has been reluctant to do in the past: Sell high. He should trade Pierre-Paul.

To be sure, there's a lot to like about Pierre-Paul. He's a name, someone the Bucs can put on billboards or in season-ticket email solicitations. He's a good story, a resilient player who bounced back after a fireworks accident threatened his career. He's a leader, the

Snell returns to Port Charlotte as ace, Cy Young Award winner

Southpaw threw 16 pitches, scoreless inning in spring debut

I was excited about just getting back on the mound. I was happy with how I was mentally. I was very locked in."

Snell threw 16 pitches over one scoreless inning in the Rays' 1-0 win over Minnesota. He issued a one-out walk to Jonathan Schoop before striking out Lucas Duda and C.J. Cron swinging on curveballs.

"Cron and Duda are very good hitters, but

Murray measures up at combine

Heisman Trophy winner erases some doubts about size

INDIANAPOLIS — Kyler Murray may not show off his arm or his legs at the NFL scouting combine, but on Thursday he assuaged colossal concerns about his size.

The Heisman Trophy-winning dual-threat quarterback and speedy outfielder from the University of Oklahoma checked in at just over 5-foot-10 and 207 pounds with a hand size, as measured from his pinkie to his thumb, of 9½ inches.

"I don't know why people think Kyler is 5-8," said running back Rodney Anderson, Murray's college teammate and fellow NFL hopeful. "I don't know where that came from. I'm 6-foot — I look small next to our offensive line. Anybody is going to look small next to our offensive line."

"He's a solid 5-10, he's heavy, he's fast. He's a heck of an athlete. His size was never an issue."

And now it's less of one for many NFL teams.

Although he's the shortest quarterback measured at the combine since 2003, those numbers were welcome news for Murray, the executives and coaches gathered in Indianapolis and fans wondering how his size would affect his draft stock.

"Quarterbacks come in all shapes and sizes," New York Giants coach Pat Shurmur said.

Murray compares favorably to Wilson in 2012 and Baker Mayfield, last year's top overall draft pick. Murray is a half-inch shorter but 3 pounds heavier than Wilson, and his hand is a quarter-inch larger than Mayfield's.

Murray's measurements might be his most significant results at the combine because he is not expected to throw or compete in any other quarterback drills at Lucas Oil Stadium this week.

After signing a contract with a \$4.66 million signing bonus

as the ninth overall pick in June by baseball's Oakland Athletics, Murray led Oklahoma to the College Football Playoff in his only season as the starter while posting the second-best passer efficiency rating in Bowl Subdivision history.

Before throwing for 4,361 yards and 42 touchdowns and running for 1,001 yards and 12 scores, Murray's only extensive college experience was a rough freshman season at Texas A&M in 2015. After transferring to Oklahoma, he was the backup to Mayfield.

Murray announced a few weeks ago he was choosing the gridiron over the diamond.

How much Murray's size will factor into his success in the NFL is a matter of great speculation.

"I think it's been proven to not be as much of a factor as maybe it was years ago," Los Angeles Raiders coach Jon Gruden said. "I don't know that it's a true impact on the position or the performance."

Harper, Phillies agree to \$330M, 13-year deal

Record contract for 26-year-old All-Star caps team's winter shopping spree

NEW YORK — It took a long time and a lot of money, but the Philadelphia Phillies finally landed Bryce Harper with a record contract.

The young star outfielder and the Phillies agreed Thursday to a \$330 million, 13-year contract, the largest deal in baseball history.

Harper's agent, California-based Scott Boras, said the deal was agreed to at 10:34 a.m. PST, subject to a successful physical.

Phillies manager Gabe Kapler and his players learned of the agreement from fans behind Philadelphia's dugout who saw media reports on their mobile devices during a spring training game in Clearwater, Florida.

"If the reports are true, it's a huge moment for our baseball team," Kapler said. "Certainly I think that the city of Philadelphia will embrace Bryce Harper. I think he would be very

happy in this city because our fans care deeply about winning."

A 26-year-old All-Star who had spent his entire big league career with the Washington Nationals, Harper topped the \$325 million, 13-year agreement outfielder Giancarlo Stanton reached before the 2015 season with the Miami Marlins.

"Harper's goal was he wanted the largest contract and he wanted his value," Boras said. "He wanted the largest length he could get because he really wanted to stay in one city and one uniform, wanted to get a ballpark he hit well in, saw the ball well."

Harper has a .279 career average with 184 homers and 521 RBIs, including a .268 average with 14 homers, 32 RBIs and a .930 OPS in 47 games at Citizens Bank Park. He likely would hit third or fourth, according to Kapler.

"We get a whole lot better on the field," the manager said.

Busch Brothers headline West Coast swing

Kurt and Kyle Busch return home to Las Vegas Motor Speedway

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — The Busch Brothers lead NASCAR into its three-race West Coast swing coming off another set of accomplishments that have established them among the all-time greats of the sport.

The Las Vegas natives return home as two of the headliners of NASCAR's young season.

Kyle Busch on Thursday finalized a multi-year contract extension with Joe Gibbs Racing to drive the No. 18 Toyota. This was a contract year for Busch but he locked up his new deal and avoided free agency. Last week, he made his 500th career Cup Series start — a sixth-place finish at Atlanta, where he drove from the back of the field in a backup car — and he set the Truck Series all-time win mark with his 52nd victory.

Kurt Busch, meanwhile, celebrated his 650th career Cup start with a surprising third-place finish at Atlanta. He moved this year to Chip Ganassi Racing, a team that has struggled to consistently run up front, and Chevrolet has lagged

behind its NASCAR rivals since it debuted the Camaro last season.

Enter Kurt Busch, considered a throwback in that his sense and feel of a car can sometimes help engineers diagnose deficiencies. He prides himself in his knowledge and understanding of cars, rarities among many of his peers who simply drive and don't crunch the numbers.

"Each and every week you want to have a shot at it and Ganassi and Chevrolet, everybody knows we've got to push hard and we can't expect anything to happen just off of good vibes or good feelings," Busch said. "We have to go and apply all of the knowledge we can."

The race Sunday at Las Vegas Motor Speedway will be the first with NASCAR's entire new competition package. A lesser version of the new rules debuted last weekend at Atlanta.

Las Vegas is expected to be the first true test of NASCAR's plan to create closer, tighter racing. NASCAR has reduced both horsepower and downforce, and many believe it will create pack racing at Las Vegas. The new rules and the many

unknowns regarding the racing this season have dominated conversation.

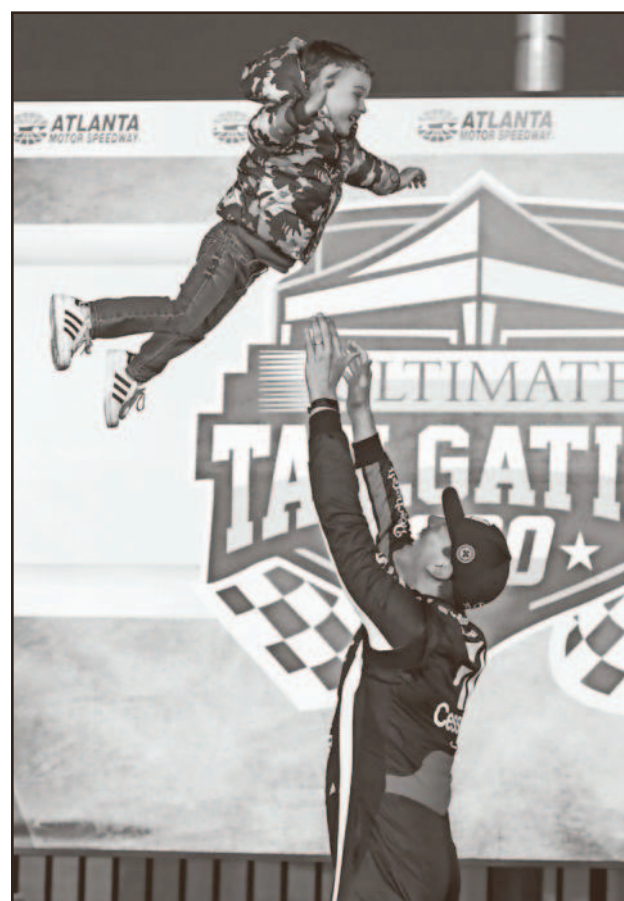
Earlier this week, Kyle Larson accused Hendrick Motorsports of gaming NASCAR's inspection system. He accused Hendrick, his engine supplier at Ganassi, of cheating and then walked it back on Twitter.

"I feel terrible about it," he wrote. "I meant it jokingly, but shouldn't have implied they are anything but a strong competitor that gets better as the season goes on."

Ricky Stenhouse Jr. has aggravated half the field through two races with his aggressive driving, and series champions Joey Logano and Martin Truex Jr. are among those who have taken verbal shots at Stenhouse. He was not backing down.

"I feel like I do everything that I have to do to make sure our car stays in the front," he said.

One element of the new rules package is that smaller teams may be able to close the gap on NASCAR's powerhouses; Chris Buescher of JTG-Daugherty Racing led the charge at Atlanta with a ninth-place finish. Ryan Preece, his rookie teammate, had a great

Daytona 500 debut and a solid run last week until he crashed on pit road.

Daniel Suarez scored his first top-10 finish last week since he moved this season to Stewart-Haas

Racing, and that team had a remarkable rebound from the Daytona 500. All four of its drivers crashed late at Daytona but all four finished in the top 10 at Atlanta.

Vegas shoots 64 for Honda Classic lead

PALM BEACH GARDENS — A year ago at The Honda Classic, Jhonattan Vegas made seven birdies all week.

He's off to a much better start this time.

Vegas made six birdies and no bogeys Thursday, shooting a 6-under 64 to open a two-stroke lead after the first round. Lucas Glover bogeyed his finishing hole for a 66, leaving him tied with Zach Johnson, Ernie Els and Ben Silverman — who went to college at nearby Florida Atlantic.

"Hit my irons the best I've hit them all year and I've always liked this golf course," Vegas said. "It's kind of one of those courses that I think suits me. You have to hit the ball well and you have to get around really well. And then I made a few

putts."

Brooks Koepka, Rickie Fowler and Sergio Garcia were in a large group at 67, and defending champion Justin Thomas shot 68 after an eventful day that saw him play the last eight holes without a 9-iron after it bent when he hit it against a tree.

"To feel like I gave quite a few back today and shoot 2-under par on this golf course, it's great," Thomas said.

Also at 68 was Sam Saunders, the grandson of golf legend Arnold Palmer. Saunders birdied all three holes in the famed "Bear Trap" stretch at PGA National, the run of holes 15 through 17 where a par 4 is sandwiched by a pair of par 3s that can be treacherous even without much wind.

Vegas made 12 bogeys last year at the Honda, along with three doubles and a triple, wound up

beating only one of the 74 finishers and wrapped up the week with a final-round 78. He sprayed irons everywhere, missed half of the fairways, more than half of the greens.

But Thursday, he was dialed in — missing only three of 14 fairways and three of the 18 greens, needing only 29 putts to get through the day.

"I felt like I was in control pretty much all day long," Vegas said.

The 34-year-old Venezuelan has three PGA Tour victories, winning the 2011 Bob Hope Classic and the RBC Canadian Open in 2016 and 2017.

Vegas took advantage on a day to make noise at PGA National, where the wind was down. And that's not typical.

Forecasters correctly said breezes would be relatively light all day and should stay that way until

perhaps the weekend, though Johnson — whose weather apps said breezes were going to be no more than 3 or 4 mph — was among those who felt the wind was still a factor and fluctuated more than expected.

"The ball curving with the wind, depending on the direction, easily 10 to 15 to 20 yards. And then we made the turn and it started to be more consistent, not as gusty," Johnson said.

Els had no complaints.

Els has won more than 70 tournaments worldwide, 19 of them on the PGA Tour — the last of those coming in 2012 at the British Open. Getting a 20th on tour, he said, has been a goal for some time.

"Secretly on tour among the players, you know when you win No. 20 you get some benefits," Els said.

Witten rejoins Cowboys after year as broadcaster

Tight end, franchise leader in receptions signs up for 16th season, \$5 million deal

Jason Witten is back. One year after retiring from the NFL to join the broadcast booth on ESPN's "Monday Night Football," Witten has agreed to terms with the Dallas Cowboys for the 2019 season.

The deal is for 1 year and \$5 million, sources tell the Star-Telegram.

The future Hall of Fame tight end will now suit up for a 16th season.

"The fire inside of me to compete and play this game is just burning too strong," Witten said. "This team has a great group of rising young stars, and I want to help them make a run at a championship. This was completely my decision, and I am very comfortable with it. I'm looking forward to getting back in the dirt."

Witten admittedly struggled with retirement throughout last season while also struggling with the transition to television.

He previously admitted a desire to return to the team during their 2018 playoff run but ultimately decided it wasn't the right thing to do.

Tight end remained a huge need for the Cowboys and was an area the team planned to address in the upcoming draft and possibly free agency.

The Cowboys like the potential of Blake Jarwin and Dalton Schultz but still see a need to improve.

Witten retired as the team's all-time leader with 1,152 career receptions. He ranks fourth in NFL history, behind Jerry Rice, Tony Gonzalez and Larry Fitzgerald.

"Bryce Harper is a sensational teammate."

Harper's agreement surpasses the previous high for a free agent, set last week when infielder Manny Machado signed a \$300 million, 10-year deal with the San Diego Padres. Harper's average annual value of \$25.4 million ranks 14th in baseball history, well below the high of \$34.1 million set by Arizona pitcher Zack Greinke as part of a \$206.5 million, six-year contract.

Harper gets a \$20 million signing bonus in equal installments this June 1 and Nov. 1, a \$10 million salary this year, \$26 million in each of the following nine seasons and \$22 million in each of the last three years. None of the money is deferred, and he gets a full no-trade provision.

Philadelphia will forfeit its second-highest draft selection, currently No. 55, and \$500,000 of its 2019-20 international signing bonus pool allotment.

Following a slow offseason of negotiations that sparked outrage from the players' association, three players in a 10-day span agreed to deals guaranteeing a total of \$890 million. Colorado third baseman Nolan Arenado, who would have been eligible for free agency next offseason, signed a \$260 million, eight-year agreement this week.

Phillies owner John Middleton met with Harper in a Las Vegas hotel suite and at dinner around the time of the winter meetings in December and then again last weekend.

Philadelphia has been among the most active teams this offseason, adding outfielder Andrew McCutchen for \$50 million over three years and reliever David Robertson for \$23 million over two years, and acquiring catcher J.T. Realmuto and shortstop Jean Segura.

"We thought we were a complete team. Now, we're even more of a complete team," McCutchen said.

Philadelphia also gave ace Aaron Nola a \$45 million, four-year deal.

After leading their division in early August, the Phillies went 16-33 over the final 49 games of last season and at 80-82 finished with a losing record for the sixth straight season.

San Francisco and the Los Angeles Dodgers had also pursued Harper in recent weeks.

Harper has been an All-Star in six of seven big league seasons and was the unanimous winner of the 2015 NL MVP award.

An up-and-down defender and an unusual mix of popular and polarizing, Harper is known for the occasional contretemps with opponents, one particular exchange with a reporter about a "clown question," and, most infamously, a dugout dustup in which he was choked by then-teammate Jonathan Papelbon during a game.

Washington took him with the No. 1 overall pick in the 2010 amateur draft and called him up to the majors less than two years later at age 19. He would go on to become the 2012 NL Rookie of the Year for a Nationals club that won its

first division title and made its postseason debut.

Harper was also an integral part of the team that added NL East titles in 2014, 2016 and 2017 and never finished lower than second place in his seven seasons. The Nationals never won a playoff series in that span.

His best year was 2015, when at age 22 he hit .330 with 42 homers, 99 RBIs, 118 runs and 124 walks, amassing an OPS of 1.109.

Last year, he hit 34 homers and produced a career-high 100 RBIs while walking 130 times although his batting average dipped to .249.

self-proclaimed hardest worker on the team.

Those things mean something but not enough to cancel out two key numbers: 30 (Pierre-Paul's age) and \$14.9 million (his 2019 cap hit, seventh highest among defenders who play his position). Soon, his production-to-earnings ratio won't work in Tampa Bay's favor. Expecting him to reach 12.5 sacks again isn't realistic. He hadn't recorded

that many since 2014 and has yet to do so in back-to-back seasons.

The Bucs might want to hide the next couple of paragraphs from prospective trade partners: Pierre-Paul wasn't as productive last season as his sack numbers suggest. Sacks are valuable, of course. They can be drive killers. But they're not the only way a defender can affect a quarterback.

Hurries and hits are disruptive, too, and can lead to incompletions and interceptions. When we take into account hurries, hits and sacks, it turns out that

Pierre-Paul and oft-double-teamed Gerald McCoy had comparable seasons. Each generated pressure on 9 percent of his pass snaps, according to Pro Football Focus.

Let's compare Pierre-Paul's pressure rate with other edge rushers' rates. Did he end in the top 10? The top 20? The top 50? Nope. He came in at ... No. 74 (among those who played at least 100 pass snaps).

Though Pierre-Paul succeeded at converting his pressures into sacks, he did so at an exceptionally high, and likely unsustainable, rate. Of the

edge rushers who recorded at least 20 pressures last season, Pierre-Paul's 28.3 percent sack conversion rate ranked behind only Green Bay's Kyler Fackrell and Arizona's Chandler Jones.

Perhaps Pierre-Paul has a knack for taking down the quarterback? Not at the rate that he did last season. Over his nine NFL seasons, he has converted 17 percent of his pressures into sacks. In other words, if Pierre-Paul plays a ton of snaps again and generates pressure at the same rate this season as he did last season, we should expect him to get to

seven or eight sacks, not 12.5.

As the Bucs look ahead, they should heed the warning hidden in Pierre-Paul's pressure statistics. Regression is coming.

So if a general manager approaches Licht at this week at the NFL scouting combine and asks whether Pierre-Paul is available, he should pause and then respond:

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) — Jon Teske scored a career-high 22 points, and No. 9 Michigan easily rebounded from its loss to Michigan State with an 82-53 victory over Nebraska on Thursday night.

The Wolverines (25-4, 14-4 Big Ten) were without Charles Matthews, out with a right ankle injury, but they raced out to a 22-point halftime lead behind Teske and Iggy Brazdeikis. It was the last home game for Michigan, which finishes the regular season with trips to Maryland and Michigan State.

The Wolverines lost only once at home in 2018-19 — 77-70 to Michigan State on Sunday. That dropped Michigan a game

behind the Spartans in the Big Ten title race, but the Wolverines still look formidable. The biggest question after Thursday's game is how long Matthews will be out. He had a boot on the injured ankle.

Brazdeikis went down holding his left knee near the end of the first half, but he walked off without assistance and was back at the beginning of the second. He finished with 20 points.

Isaiah Livers, who replaced Matthews in the starting lineup, had 12 points and 10 rebounds. Nana Akenten scored 11 points for Nebraska (15-14, 5-13) but took a hard fall in the second half near the basket.

No. 25 Wofford 80, Chattanooga 54

Wofford made a successful debut as an AP Top 25 team by relying on the same businesslike approach that got the Terriers to this point.

Fletcher Magee scored 18 points and the 24th-ranked Terriers pulled away in the second half to trounce Chattanooga 80-54 for their 16th consecutive victory.

Wofford, a private liberal arts college in Spartanburg, South Carolina, with fewer than 1,600 students, moved into the Top 25 for the first time.

"I think our team has handled it with great confidence and humility,"

Wofford coach Mike Young said. "It's a big deal, now. It's a big deal on our campus. But we're still playing."

The Terriers (25-4, 17-0 Southern Conference) haven't lost since falling 98-87 at Mississippi State on Dec. 19. Their only other losses this season were against No. 5 North Carolina, Oklahoma and No. 15 Kansas.

A victory Saturday at Samford would make Wofford the first Southern Conference team to finish the regular season unbeaten in league competition since Davidson in 2007-08.

That squad featured Stephen Curry and advanced to an NCAA regional final.

D.J. Augustin scored 14 points and Nikola Vucevic had 12 points and 13 rebounds to help Orlando end an 11-game losing streak to the Warriors. Orlando's last win over Golden State was on Dec. 14, 2012.

Stephen Curry scored

33 points, but was only 1 for 6 in the fourth quarter. Klay Thompson and DeMarcus Cousins each had 21 for the Warriors. They played without Kevin Durant (rest) and Andre Iguodala (sick).

Pacers 122, Timberwolves 115

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Bojan Bogdanovic scored a season-high 35 points and Indiana overcame Karl-Anthony Towns' big night for Minnesota.

Towns had 42 points and 17 rebounds, scoring 23 points and grabbing seven rebounds in the first quarter.

Tied at 107, the Pacers closed with a 15-8 run, with Bogdanovic scoring 11 points.

Bruins use late scoring barrage to snap Lightning's streak

BOSTON (AP) — The Boston Bruins scored three times in less than three minutes in the third period and snapped the Eastern Conference-leading Tampa Bay Lightning's franchise-best 10-game winning streak with a 4-1 victory Thursday night.

Jake DeBrusk, Noel Acciari, Patrice Bergeron and Brad Marchand all had goals for the Bruins (38-17-9), who have won nine of their last 10 games and earned at least one point in 15 straight.

The game was the first in NHL history in which teams faced off while each owning simultaneous point streaks of 14 or more contests.

Boston's win tied the season series between the East's top two teams at 1-1. They will play twice more over the final five weeks of the regular season.

A goal by Tampa Bay's Anthony Cirelli's with 7:08 remaining prevented the Lightning (49-12-4) from being shut out for the first time since losing 1-0 in overtime to St. Louis on Feb. 7.

Tuukka Rask had 20 saves for the Bruins. Louis Domingue stopped 37 shots for the Lightning in his 24th start of the season and first since Feb. 19.

The Bruins improve to 7-0-1 without leading goal scorer David Pastrnak in the lineup and are 11-0-2 in their last 13 games. They have not lost in regulation since a 3-2 home loss to

the New York Rangers on Jan. 19.

The Lightning looked every bit like a team on the second night of a back-to-back and playing their third game in four nights. Tampa had scored four or more goals eight times in its previous 10 victories, but looked lethargic and generated a minimal attack for most of the night.

For the game, the Bruins outshot the Lightning 41-21.

N.Y. Islanders 6, Toronto 1

UNIONDALE, N.Y. — Casey Cizikas scored twice and the New York Islanders beat the Toronto Maple Leafs 6-1 Thursday night in former captain John Tavares' first time back as a visiting player.

Anthony Beauvillier, Anders Lee and Valtteri Filppula also scored for the Islanders, who had lost three of their last four. Jordan Eberle and Cal Clutterbuck each had two assists, and Robin Lehner stopped 34 shots to help New York move two points ahead of Washington atop the Metropolitan Division one night before hosting the Capitals. The Islanders' 81 points are one more than they had all of last season.

Islanders fans, vocal on social media about their lingering displeasure with Tavares' departure after he repeatedly said he wanted to stay, booed loudly when Tavares and the Maple Leafs hit the

ice for pregame warmups, and when they came back out for the start of each period.

They also serenaded him with choruses of "We Don't Need You!" and other derisive chants throughout the game, including around a video tribute midway through the first period. The face of the franchise for nine years after he was selected No. 1 overall by New York in 2009, Tavares insisted he agonized over his decision to leave before announcing it on July 1, the first day of free agency.

Zach Hyman scored for the Maple Leafs, who had won three straight. Garret Sparks finished with 31 saves.

Edmonton 4, Ottawa 2

OTTAWA, Ontario — Connor McDavid scored a slick goal, Mikko Koskinen made 35 saves and the Edmonton Oilers beat the league-worst Ottawa Senators 4-2 on Thursday night.

Sam Gagner, Colby Cave and Zack Kassian also scored for the Oilers, who stopped a two-game skid.

Chris Tierney and Mark Borowiecki scored for the Senators, who lost their sixth straight, and Craig Anderson stopped 22 shots in his ninth straight defeat.

It was the first home game for Ottawa since Mark Stone was traded to Vegas, but thanks to McDavid the Senators

had one of their biggest crowds of the season.

Edmonton was up two goals after two periods and took a 3-1 lead 1:46 into the third when Cave took advantage of a giveaway by Christian Jaros for his second of the season.

Ottawa made it a one-goal game when Borowiecki scored his first of the season at the seven-minute mark, but Kassian iced it for the Oilers with an empty-net goal.

Panarin, Oliver Bjorkstrand and Scott Harrington also scored for the Blue Jackets, who rebounded from a loss Tuesday night to Pittsburgh and hopped over the idle Penguins and Carolina Hurricanes into third place in the Metropolitan Division. Sergei Bobrovsky made 28 saves.

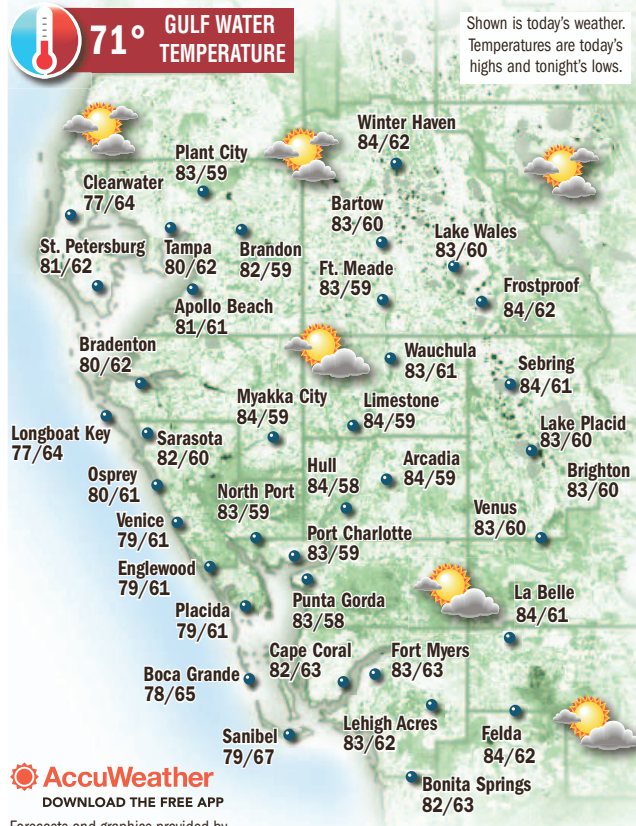
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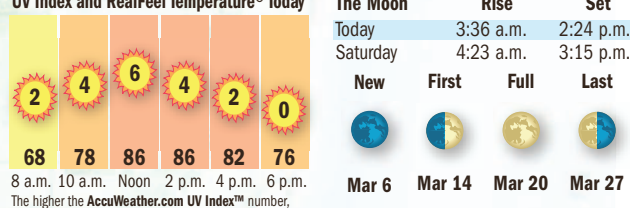

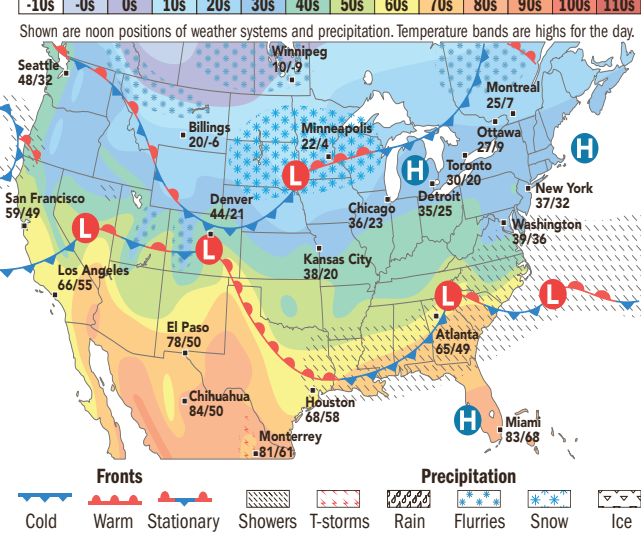

Kraft pleads not guilty to prostitution charges

Patriots owner requests non-jury trial on misdemeanor solicitation counts in spa case

WEST PALM BEACH (AP) — New England Patriots owner Robert Kraft has pleaded not guilty to two counts of misdemeanor solicitation of prostitution in a Florida case, according to court documents released Thursday.

Kraft's attorney Jack Goldberger filed the written plea with the Palm Beach County court on Wednesday. Kraft, 77, is requesting a non-jury trial.

Kraft was among hundreds of men charged in a crackdown on massage parlor prostitution and an investigation into human trafficking at Florida spas. Ten spas have been closed and several people, mostly women originally from China, have been charged with running the operation.

Jupiter, Florida, police say in court documents that Kraft was chauffeured to the Orchids of Asia Day Spa in a 2014 white Bentley on the evening of Jan. 19, where investigators say they videotaped him engaging in a sex act and then handing over an undetermined amount of cash.

Kraft returned 17 hours later, arriving at the upper-middle class shopping center where the spa was located in a

chauffeured 2015 blue Bentley, the documents said. Kraft was videotaped engaging in sex acts before paying with a \$100 bill and another bill, police said. He then flew to Kansas City to watch his Patriots defeat the Chiefs hours later.

Kraft's team then defeated the Los Angeles Rams in the Super Bowl two weeks later, their sixth championship.

Under Florida law, if Kraft is convicted,

he would be required to complete 100 hours of community service, attend a class on the dangers of prostitution and its connection to human trafficking and pay a \$5,000 fine.

He could also get a year in jail, although that is unlikely.

He could also enroll in a diversion program. He would still have to perform the community service, attend the class and pay a fine.

Feds want stiff prison terms over recruiting

Corruption investigation and scandal resulted in convictions for wire fraud

NEW YORK (AP) — Federal prosecutors have recommended multiyear prison sentences for three men convicted of fraud for channeling secret payments to the families of top-tier basketball recruits to influence where the players went to school.

Former Adidas executive James Gatto, business manager Christian Dawkins and amateur league director Merl Code were convicted of conspiracy to commit wire fraud in October for funneling recruits to Louisville, Kansas and North Carolina State.

On Wednesday, prosecutors in the Southern District of New York recommended a sentence of 46 to 57 months for Gatto and 30 to 37 months in prison for Code and Dawkins.

They are scheduled to be sentenced next week.

The schools submitted victim impact statements seeking restitutions from those convicted.

Kansas asked for more than \$1.1 million from Gatto and his co-conspirators.

Kansas says it has "suffered considerable

financial harm," citing losses of scholarships and financial aid to athletes and legal expenses tied to the government and NCAA investigations.

"The damage done by Mr. Gatto's and his co-conspirators' greed cannot be overstated," university counsel William Sullivan wrote.

Louisville is seeking about \$32,000 in connection with Brian Bowen Jr., who was supposed to play for the Cardinals but was suspended by the school amid the corruption scandal.

He also, unsuccessfully, tried to play for South Carolina

employee who worked with young Brian Bowen during the summer and fall of 2017," the school said.

Amy Elizabeth Shoemaker, deputy counsel for Louisville, described Bowen as an 18-year-old who "by all appearances had no idea that a handful of deceitful individuals were conspiring with his father to buy and sell his choice of school."

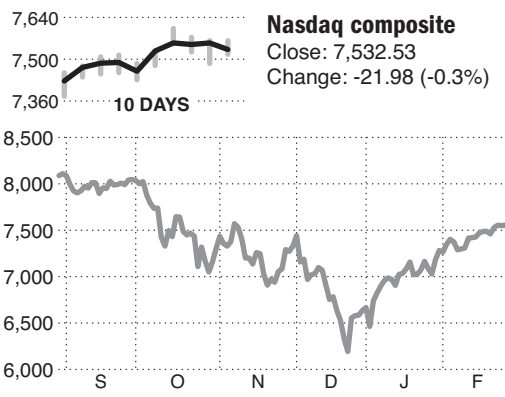
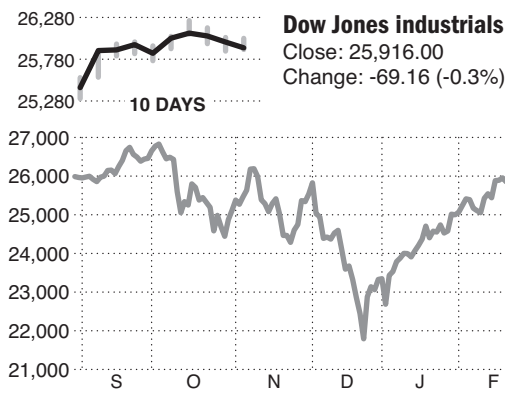
