Monday morning had firemen busy

LAKE PLACID — Highlands County firefighters were battling flames from one end of the county to the other in the early morning hours on Monday. The business of the morning is one that Public Safety Officer and Fire Chief Marc Bashoor said was "normal."

A large mobile home on Melrose Lane in the Lake Placid area Sun N Lakes subdivision was fully engulfed when the 911 call came in around 3:30 a.m., Bashoor said. No one was injured or hurt but the owner's dog was missing as of Monday. Bashoor said someone on social media posted that the dog died in the fire but he could not confirm that. He thought there was only one person in the house who got out.

Bashoor called the fire "suspicious" and the State Fire Marshal was called in to investigate.

Sun N Lakes Fire Department was first to arrive on the scene. The mobile home had several additions over the years and it was difficult to douse the fire because of different roof lines and materials.

Bashoor also said officials called in the county's Road and Bridge Department to bring in a big earth mover to pull the materials apart. Homes with different roof lines can fall in an unexpected way. The tractors move the materials so firefighters can suppress the fire.

Also adding to the fight was the lack of a nearby fire hydrant, which required several tanker trucks. Just about all the county's southern departments were on the scene to do battle with the fire. On scene

Manatee Drive closed; pass-through will return after week of construction

SEBRING — Motorists who have enjoyed driving from State Road 17 to their homes on Manatee Drive found a detour Monday morning.

Highlands County Road and Bridge Department crews will spend this week building Sebring Parkway Phase 3 where the two roads cross. When they finish April 1, Manatee Drive will allow through traffic at that spot again.

County Engineer Clinton Howerton Jr. said Monday that he plans to put in stop signs there, once work is done this week.

However, similar to work done at and on Scenic Highway, Manatee Drive will have traffic flow changes once the Parkway is completed later this year.

Eventually, the portion of Manatee Drive that fronts on Sunshine Blueberry Farm ultimately will not connect to the Parkway or Scenic Highway.

Manatee Drive will have a connection to the Parkway to the south of that stretch, a full median opening with a new name for the stretch of Manatee Drive that connects the Parkway to State Road 17, Howerton said.

Where Manatee Drive connects to the Parkway from the west, Howerton said there will also be another full median opening, but no connection to Manatee on the east side of the Parkway.

Through several venues, including social media, Highlands County Government announced last week that Road and Bridge, along with the Engineering Department would close the junction to through-traffic at 7:30 a.m. Monday through 5 p.m. next Monday, April 1.

A detour is posted for Manatee traffic on the east side of the Parkway route to turn left onto Scenic Highway.

Manatee traffic on the west side of the Parkway is advised to find an alternative route to State Road 17.

'Guardian' expansion draws heavy debate

TALLAHASSEE — More than a year after the Parkland high school shooting, emotions continue to run high at the Florida Capitol as lawmakers consider school-safety proposals that would expand a controversial "school guardian" program and allow trained teachers to be armed.

The House Education Committee on Thursday approved its version of the bill (PCB EDC 19-02) along party lines, following heated back-and-forth between Republican lawmakers who support the guardian program and teachers who testified that they oppose having colleagues carry guns.

The bill includes other changes to try to bolster school safety, but the

hour-and-a-half debate primarily focused on the proposal that would broaden the guardian program, which is voluntary for school districts.

Lawmakers rushed last year to pass a wide-ranging school safety bill after a gunman killed 17 students and faculty members on Feb. 14, 2018, at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland. As part of the law, school employees

whose primary duties are outside classrooms can be designated as guardians.

The House bill debated Thursday and a Senate version (SB 7030) would expand the program to allow classroom teachers to serve as guardians.

Also under the proposal, some training requirements for the program would change.

Tucker case continued to April 18

In jail, sans bond, on DUI manslaughter

SEBRING — Nothing has changed for a local man sought for a year on a DUI manslaughter charge and extradited from Ireland after he was found.

Samuel Joseph Tucker, 24, is sitting in Highlands County Jail, without bond, and his arraignment on Monday morning in front of Circuit Court Judge Peter Estrada got continued until April 18.

A pretrial conference is scheduled for that day. Tucker entered a plea of not guilty last Friday to a charge of DUI manslaughter and two counts of DUI while causing damage to property.

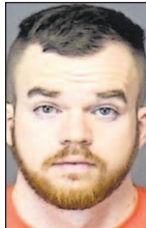
Tucker is being held responsible for the death of 22-year-old Alyssa Kay Vice, the passenger in his car on June 24, 2017, when he lost control on a curve on State Road 17, just south of San Juan Avenue and ran off the road.

Florida Highway Patrol crash reports state he admitted to driving the Maserati Ghibli, with Vice as his passenger, at 3:30 a.m. that morning.

The car knocked down a power pole, hit a phone junction box, plowed into a chain link fence, overturned four times and landed on its left side, reports said. Vice died at the scene.

After being taken to Lakeland Regional Medical Center, Tucker's blood alcohol level measured more than twice the legal limit, FHP reports said.

FHP also determined the Maserati was going 140 mph just before the

crash and was still traveling at 127 mph when it hit the pole, 200 feet from where the car left the road.

He was found late August 2018 in Cork, Ireland, more than a year after the wreck.

The High Court in Dublin confirmed the extradition order just prior to Jan. 22, when it was reported by The Irish Times.

Tucker sought asylum in Ireland, claiming his life was at risk, according to The Irish Times.

He allegedly claimed individuals sought information about him from his employees in Sebring and placed a bounty on his head.

Allegedly, a number of hooded people gathered outside his home with firearms and he was shot at several days after the wreck, his shoulder grazed by a bullet.

It was the following week, he told the High Court, that he left Florida for Ireland, reports state.

Chief Justice Paul McDermott found Tucker's claims lacked sufficient detail or sufficient reason to refuse extradition, The Irish Times reported.

The High Court in Dublin ordered him sent back to the United States.

U.S. Marshals brought him back, and he arrived at Highlands County Jail late at night on Feb. 15.

He has been held in the local jail without bail since then.

LPPD has a care seat program

LAKE PLACID — Highland County Sheriff's Office posted a picture of a young woman pushing a shopping cart with a young child in the buggy. The Sebring Walmart security cameras show the woman allegedly stealing a car seat and a package of diaper wipes on March 18. The incident took place on Feb. 1.

The HCSO posted the pictures on social media and asked the public to help identify the woman. Although the photos were grainy, the public responded with credible tips and the sheriff's Public Information officer Scott Dressel said they are looking for her.

The woman's plight had many in the county responding with sympathy and even empathy. While others condemned her actions and said stealing was not right for any reason. Many people posted that they would purchase the car seat for her; others petitioned to the management's sense of decency not to press charges.

"This community has proven time and time again, if there is a need, the resident's will fill it," the PIO said. "She should have reached out to someone. If anyone needs help, they can send a private message to HCSO Facebook page. I cannot guarantee that we can help but we may know of any agency or resource that can help. There's no reason to steal."

Lake Placid Police Department has a car seat program where trained technicians will give a free car seat to those who need them. Recipients of the car seats do not have to live in the Town of Lake Placid. Officer Mostyn Mullins heads the car seat program and he said no one in Highlands County is excluded from receiving a car seat.

However, what there might be is a shortage of car seats.

"Our program relies solely on donations," Mullins said. "We get no funding from the state. I do buy our seats from the Sebring Walmart. Their pricing is the best and I can keep it local. The store manager, Caryn Wells, is so great to work with and she is big on helping out communities."

Mullins thinks the county has about four technicians who are specifically

trained on the installation and use of car seats. Mullins is the only instructor in the county. Lt. Mark Schneider is the other certified officer at LPPD.

The officers don't just give away car seats; they instruct parents and grandparents on the proper usage.

Mullins, who is also the Code Enforcement Officer in the small town, says he doesn't travel as much in the county as he used to but is willing to go to someone in need of a car seat. Mullins and Schneider have both brought newborn seats to the hospitals so that mom and baby can be discharged.

The department goes through the car seats rather quickly. Mullins keeps a list of those who need the seats.

"Once I have the funds to purchase them and the Sebring Walmart has been so good to our program," Mullins said. "I hate to hear that people are stealing car seats. I go out of my way to help keep our kids safe in car seats."

"Over 600 given out by our office since 2015, which is when I became a technician," he said. "I've been an instructor for two years now and just re-certified a week ago."

Mullins is reaching out to other communities to share the program model LPPD uses.

"I work with the technicians to help them keep their certifications," he said. "I just did a PowerPoint for the Occupant Protection Coalition telling others how I keep our program running with no state assistance. I'm told it will be a template for actual training, which is exciting coming from little Lake Placid."

Generous civic clubs and individuals have donated to the police to buy the much-needed seats.

"The Elks Lodge in LP has been great too they have been getting a grant late summer," Mullins said. "I order the seats and pick them up and we schedule an event around September at the lodge in Lake Placid."

Mullins said there is no reason not to reach out. They can help with car seat assistance legally and keep children safe.

"People can call our office at 863-699-375, or post to Chief James Fansler on Facebook," Mullins said.

DeSantis environmental projects get House support

TALLAHASSEE — Gov. Ron DeSantis would get nearly all the money he's requested for environmental projects in an initial House budget proposal for next year.

A \$3.97 billion proposal for the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, the Department of Environmental Protection and the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission includes \$607.4 million for Everglades restoration and water-improvement projects such as combating future outbreaks of toxic algae and red tide.

DeSantis asked for \$625 million as the first part of an ambitious \$2.5 billion in funding over the next four years.

House Agriculture & Natural Resources Appropriations Chairwoman Holly Raschein, R-Key Largo, praised work of the state agencies.

"Our agencies have faced significant challenges over the past couple of years responding to hurricanes, harmful algae blooms and red tide, to a great extent using existing trust funds, (which) limits our funding abilities," Raschein said.

Senate President Bill Galvano, R-Bradenton, has said the governor's environmental-funding request may be "pushing" the limits of a budget expected to be stretched because of the response to Hurricane Michael.

An initial Senate environmental-budget proposal will be released Wednesday, said Sen. Debbie Mayfield, a Rockledge Republican who chairs the Agriculture & Natural Resources Appropriations Subcommittee.

The full House and Senate in the coming weeks will approve overall budgets and then enter negotiations on a final spending plan for the 2019-2020 fiscal year, which starts July 1.

The House proposal includes \$327.4 million for Everglades restoration, \$50 million for targeted grants for wastewater and stormwater improvements, \$50 million for the state's natural springs and \$40 million in the

state Department of Transportation work plan to complete raising a section of the Tamiami Trail. That project is intended to improve southern flow of water through the Everglades.

The springs funding would remain unchanged from the current year.

The proposal floats \$10.8 million to increase water-quality monitoring and the establishment of a Blue Green Algae Task Force within the Department of Environmental Protection and \$4.2 million for the creation of the Center for Red Tide Research within the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

Outside the governor's request, the House

proposal would provide \$307 million for hazardous waste cleanup, \$48 million for state park repairs, \$50 million for beach repairs, \$38.6 million for debris removal

from Hurricane Irma and \$20 million for the Florida Forever land preservation program.

A bill (SB 944) that has started moving in the Senate would provide \$100 million for the Florida Forever program.

The House is also offering \$58.1 million for citrus-canker payments to residents in Lee and Orange counties.

Legislators agreed to pay the money to compensate residents who lost orange, grapefruit and other citrus trees as part of a Florida Department of Agriculture program to stop the spread of deadly citrus-canker disease. Attorneys for the homeowners raised property-rights arguments in challenging the department's actions, and a judgment was entered in 2008.

Another \$14.6 million in the House proposal would go toward citrus greening research.

Before Raschein

released the spending plan, her subcommittee introduced a proposal (PCB ANR 19-01) that would send 19 Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission law-enforcement officers to the Department of Environmental Protection, a change sought by DeSantis.

The number of officers represents a fraction of the more than 800 sworn officers in the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

Asked by Rep. Rick Roth, R-Loxahatchee, about what has "broken" to justify the move, Raschein pointed to a Jan. 10 executive order in which DeSantis outlined his environmental proposals. The executive order included a shift of environmental crimes law enforcement.

"This is an area where FWC has agreed that they would be willing to relinquish. FDEP is happy to take this on," Raschein said.

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Man jailed on injunction violation

Judge orders no bond after short trial

SEBRING — Most pretrial conferences involve attorneys getting coordinated for a trial, not having a short trial in front of the judge.

A hearing Monday for Zachary Joseph Lenoff, 31, ended up with Circuit Court Judge Peter Estrada putting him back in jail without bond, at until first appearance with Circuit Court Judge Anthony Ritenour. The testimony Estrada heard regarded allegations that Lenoff had contacted the victims in a domestic violence case, even through a third party.

Lenoff tried to make an argument against being sent back to jail. Estrada cut him off, told him he would need to make his case with Ritenour, and held up two thick paper-bound law books while saying, "I'm following the law."

The law, in this case, is Florida Statutes 721.31 about violation of injunctions for domestic violence. Under Section (4)(a), Item 5, Estrada found that Lenoff violated an injunction by having contact with the victim, either directly or indirectly.

The injunction was imposed in connection to a domestic violence battery, second offense, on Oct. 28, 2018, with a woman with whom he has a child.

The argument during which the battery occurred, according to arrest affidavits, was over a set of vehicle keys in the woman's possession.

Arrest affidavits said she had received the keys the previous night, had been allowed to use the car in the past and recently, and was never told she could not.

A Highlands County Sheriff's deputy was called first to the scene to investigate the allegation of her stealing the vehicle, but left after finding no crime had been committed.

Shortly after that, the woman made a 911 call, "screaming and not making sense," the report said.

When deputies arrived, they found her in the center of the road, crying, with a bleeding hand. She told deputies Lenoff pushed her to the ground, so he was handcuffed, reports said.

Allegedly, he attempted to take the keys from her as she prepared to exit the house and lock up the front door.

In addition to Lenoff allegedly knocking her down during a struggle for the keys, causing injuries to her right hand and fingers, reports said he also allegedly dragged her across the pavement, causing injuries to her right knee and right elbow.

She also allegedly hit her face against the ground during the struggle.

Reports said she told deputies she kicked him in an attempt to get him to let go.

Lenoff has a previous conviction for domestic violence battery on Dec. 20, 2011, arrest reports said.

During Monday's hearing, 25-year-old Matthew Tucker, who has since married the battery victim, confirmed she was dating Lenoff prior to the October arrest.

Tucker said he has known Lenoff since 2013. The wife, Tucker's former girlfriend, allegedly knew Lenoff for five years.

Tucker admitted to having two violations of probation on his own record for marijuana possession and for a suicide attempt. However, he said he has not violated probation since those events.

He also admitted to being on the Florida Department of Law Enforcement sexual offender registry. The Registry lists his offense as lewd and lascivious conduct by a person under age 18 with a victim under age 16.

Tucker and his new wife said Tucker is working to get court clearance to be around her daughter. The wife said it is an expensive process, but possible.

Tucker testified Monday that Lenoff has contacted him, concerned about his history of drug abuse, and offered to pay twice what it costs for the legal process if Tucker would give it up and stay away from his daughter.

Lenoff allegedly then called back to make sure Tucker knew his concerns were for Tucker's drug history, and not the sex offender status.

That conversation was in December 2018, Tucker's wife said.

His wife then testified that Lenoff also called Tucker in November to see if he would convince her to sign a victim's waiver of prosecution in the domestic battery case.

He also allegedly called about getting some of his things back, she said, including the vehicle for which she had the keys in October.

She said both she and Lenoff have custody of their child, with no custody agreement arranged at this time.

Assistant State Attorney Richard Castillo argued that Lenoff has, thus, had contact with the victim and requested an increase in Lenoff's bond.

Peter Brewer, Lenoff's attorney, argued that Lenoff did not directly contact the victim and took issue with the alleged contact being four months ago, or more, but being brought up now, close to having a trial.

Estrada noted that, under Florida law, the court can designate a third party to be a go-between, but that was not established in this case. He found Lenoff violated the injunction and had him held without bond until first appearance.

Homeless man arrested for beer, meth and pills

SEBRING — Lazaro Eladio Adarcio, 35, homeless, was arrested on March 21 by Sebring Police Department.

Adarcio is being charged with violating a city ordinance, possession of methamphetamine, possessing a controlled substance without a prescription, possession of marijuana less than 20 grams and drug equipment possession.

Just before 2 a.m., Sebring police officers say they saw Adarcio popping his head and part of his body from behind the American Legion building at 528 N. Pine St. Adarcio was wearing white shorts and white tube socks.

Adarcio left the cover of the building and began to walk quickly southbound in the alley behind the Legion, authorities say. That is where the officers temporarily lost sight of him.

According to the arrest report, the officers caught up to Adarcio again, on North Pine Street where he turned

and eventually went behind the Legion again. The officer wrote the suspect had a beer in an aluminum can. The "Natty Daddy" beer was open and the officer noted Adarcio smelled strongly of alcohol.

The report shows the officer handcuffing him and arresting him for the open beer. When the suspect was searched, officers found a silver spoon in his pocket and a tin with four baggies inside with a crystal-like substance in each. That substance would field-test positive for methamphetamine.

Officers also found a leafy green substance they suspected was marijuana, and a baggy with two pills. The leafy green substance proved to be marijuana; the pills were identified from Poison Control as hydrocodone and Montelukast.

Adarcio has several cases listed since 2014 in the county Clerk of Courts website.

Release the Mueller report

Special Counsel Robert Mueller's investigation into Russian sabotage of the 2016 presidential election has concluded. What exactly that means will not be known until Attorney General William Barr publicly releases Mueller's report.

Barr's own four-page summary, sent to congressional leaders on Sunday, relayed Mueller's conclusion that neither President Donald Trump nor anyone else involved in his campaign conspired with Russian government agents to subvert the election.

There's nothing to argue about here. Russian sabotage — and any American involvement in it — was the very heart of Mueller's mandate. If, after more than 2,800 subpoenas and almost 500 search warrants, the special counsel concluded that no one in Trump world conspired with the Russians, then there is no legal or political basis to believe they did.

The second half of Barr's letter is more problematic. Barr said Mueller chose not to decide whether Trump had obstructed justice. Rather, Mueller's report "sets out evidence on both sides of the question." Barr took it upon himself to decide the issue in the president's favor. But the only way to know if Barr is correct is to see and weigh the evidence Mueller accumulated.

At a minimum, the full report describes an attack by a foreign power on the workings of American democracy, and the actions of the president while in office. Both topics are vital to Americans' understanding of the 2016 campaign, the current functioning of American government, and the vulnerability of future U.S. elections.

The report is also vital to Congress. House Democrats have laid out an aggressive agenda for investigation and oversight of the executive. Facts included in the Mueller report may indicate that parts of that agenda are misguided. The report might also indicate that other lines of inquiry, currently unknown to Congress, are more pressing. Thus, Mueller's findings can help make sure public resources are deployed efficiently. They should also enable Congress to take aggressive action to protect the machinery of U.S. elections.

These issues are not partisan. Mueller, a Republican, was appointed, and the investigation was launched, while Republicans held full control of Congress. Nor should lawmakers now rush to partisan corners. They need to obtain the full report — or as much as national security will permit.

Barr said he intends to "release as much of the Special Counsel's report as I can consistent with applicable law, regulations and Departmental policies." Congress and the American public will benefit if he does, at the earliest possible moment.

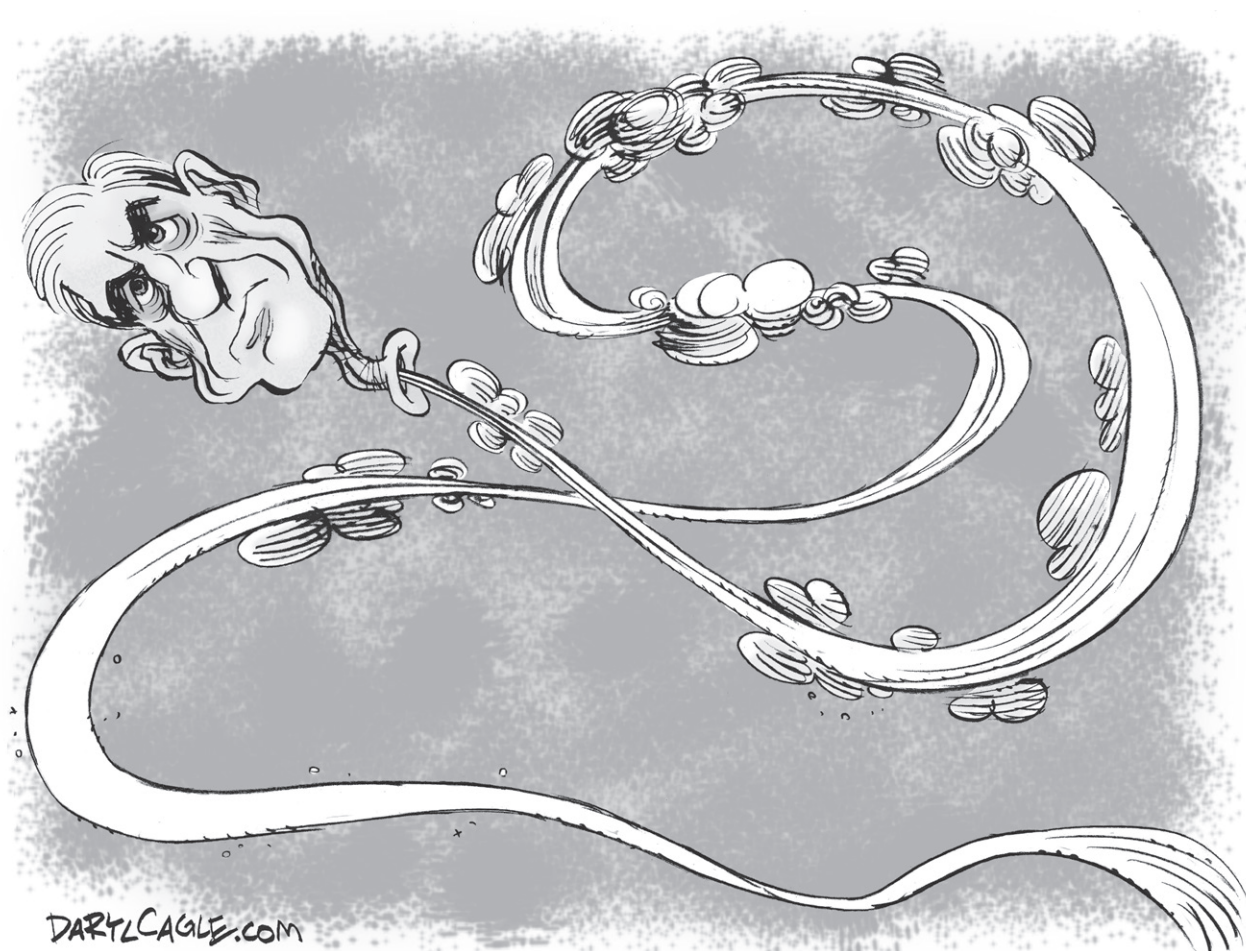

Guardians would be able to get trained by police academies and the school districts that employ them, not just by local sheriff's offices. The total number of hours for training also would increase from 132 to 144 under the proposal.

"I would say that the teachers who choose to apply for this program, who choose to go through this training are going to be those types of individuals that no matter what happens at that school they are going to risk their lives for the good of others," said House Education Chairwoman Jennifer Sullivan, a Mount Dora Republican leading the effort to pass the House bill.

Sullivan said it would be unfair to not trust those people if they qualify to be trained and to carry guns in schools. Supporters of the guardian program say it helps protect against active-shooter situations.

"The more people who are there to defend students, to defend other teachers, the better," Sullivan said.

However, Democrats protested against expanding the guardian program, with some arguing that there is no evidence it is effective. Fewer than half of the 67 school districts have decided to use guardians this year.

"I just believe we need to give this another study, or give it another year, to be able to see how the 26 school districts who have already passed this measure to see what type of results and data they have to move forward," state Rep. James Bush, D-Miami, said.

A number of teachers also protested against expanding the program because they said it would put minority students at higher risk, prompting two Republicans lawmakers to question one teacher

about whether she believed teachers were racists or Islamophobic. "Arming teachers who are on the clock to teach, not in attack mode, places us and our students at an increased risk of being killed," said Grieta Patenaude, a Tampa teacher at Robinson High School, adding that her classroom has Muslim, black and Latino students.

Rep. Randy Fine, R-Palm Bay, asked Patenaude if she believed she worked with racist teachers.

"Are you stating here, publicly, that you believe the other teachers you work with are racist, anti-Semitic and Islamophobic because you have students of different background in your classroom, and a result of that, they can't be trusted?" Fine said.

"I think that exists in every population," Patenaude said. "That is just part of society."

Amid the debate of the guardian program, Sullivan urged the public and her colleagues to also pay attention to other provisions in the bill that would give districts greater flexibility to put in place more school-safety measures. Many of these proposals were recommended by the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Commission, which was created by the Legislature last year to help identify

improvements that can make students safer.

One of those changes would require better information-sharing between schools, requiring all schools to transfer student records, including mental-health and behavioral records, within a day or two depending on whether students are transferring within or outside districts.

The bill would also allow superintendents, school board members or school personnel to be fined an unspecified amount if they do not comply with reporting requirements related to discipline and safety incidents that occur on school grounds involving students and non-students.

A mental-health component in the bill was popular among Republicans and Democrats on the House panel. The measure would give schools 45 days to screen students referred for mental assistance and require schools to intervene within a month of the screening until the students receive community-based care. The intervention plan would follow the students if they transfer schools, according to the bill.

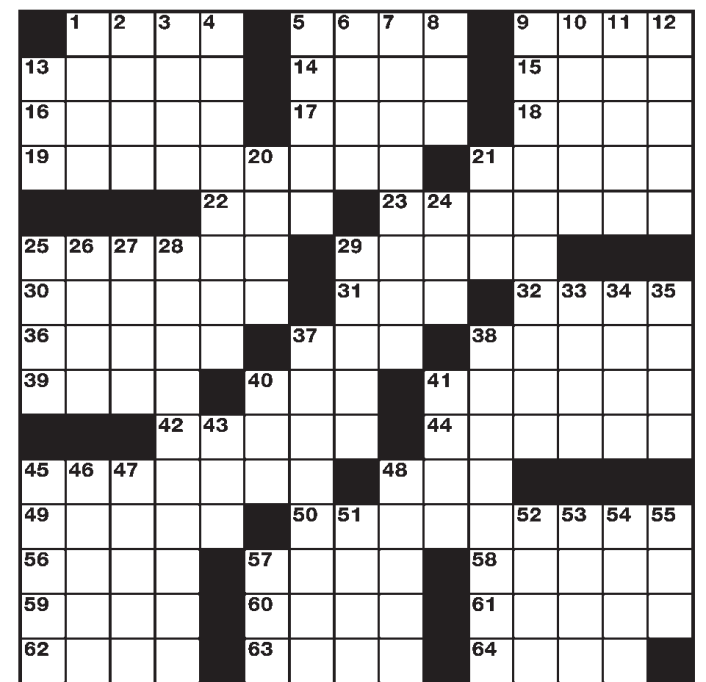
A Senate committee was scheduled to hear the Senate version of the bill Wednesday but ran out of time. That bill will be considered on Tuesday.

biological sons to China on separate mission trips where they both had the opportunity to meet Isaac. Alison returned from the mission trips and started a campaign to find Isaac a family. The Juliano family got together for Christmas dinner and Isaac came up in conversation and the family made the decision to adopt Isaac.

Isaac was brought to his new home and has since undergone surgery on his spinal cord to relieve the muscle tightness and is now able to walk with the assistance of crutches but the goal is for him to be able to walk independently. "Isaac was so excited," said Sebring baseball Coach Jasone DeWitt. "I met him for the first time today. He was excited walking down and had a huge smile on his face. To be able to see these kids smile is what it's all about.

This is a great honor. This is an opportunity to give back to our community. It teaches the players that it is not just about baseball or themselves but about this area and giving back to their community. We want the players to know that it is important to give back to their community when they can. I know they are touched each year and hopefully they will continue this when they leave here."

The Heartland Courageous Kid has partnered with Champions for Children. All the donations are made to Champions for Children who distributes the funds to the Courageous Kid. One hundred percent of the gate proceeds are donated, the Courageous Cupcake proceeds and any donations received go to the recipient.

So that my son can experience what it means to be a part of something greater than yourself. As

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FDA approves first treatment for postpartum depression

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration approved Zulresso (brexanolone) injection for intravenous (IV) use for the treatment of postpartum depression (PPD) in adult women last week. This is the first drug approved by the FDA specifically for PPD.

“Postpartum depression is a serious condition that, when severe, can be life-threatening. Women may experience thoughts about harming themselves or harming their child. Postpartum

depression can also interfere with the maternal-infant bond. This approval marks the first time a drug has been specifically approved to treat postpartum depression, providing an important new treatment option,” said Tiffany Farchione, M.D., acting director of the Division of Psychiatry Products in the FDA’s Center for Drug Evaluation and Research. “Because of concerns about serious risks, including excessive sedation or sudden loss of consciousness during

administration, Zulresso has been approved

with a Risk Evaluation and Mitigation Strategy

(REMS) and is only available to patients through a restricted distribution program at certified health care facilities where the health care provider can carefully monitor the patient.”

PPD is a major depressive episode that occurs following childbirth, although symptoms can start during pregnancy. As with other forms of depression, it is characterized by sadness and/or loss of interest in activities that one used to enjoy and a decreased ability to feel pleasure

(anhedonia) and may present with symptoms such as cognitive impairment, feelings of worthlessness or guilt, or suicidal ideation.

Zulresso will be available only through a restricted program called the Zulresso REMS Program that requires the drug be administered by a health care provider in a certified health care facility. The REMS requires that patients be enrolled in the program prior to administration of the

Her husband would eventually become the Fire Chief for the City of Sebring, but early on the couple realized both having erratic schedules would not mesh with their desire to start a family. Kathleen switched to being the marketing coordinator for South Florida Community College and later became the development director for the Ridge Area Arc. She gave birth to two boys and also served as marketing director for Highlands Regional Medical Center.

“After all this I focused on home health for a variety of companies for about 15 years.” Finding that the mission of home health spoke to her spirit, she explained how assisting seniors to age in place resonated with her. “These weren't clients, but to me more like my friend's grandparents.” She loved the work, but it required a lot of travel as she managed a region spanning half of Florida.

pendent living and our supportive employment program.” Then there’s job coaching to help clients prepare a resume, understand how to interview, know what to wear and all those little things we take for granted, like how to direct deposit a paycheck.

For clients with intellectual or developmental disabilities, knowing how to ask for help can make the difference between limited or overall success. Border explained once employed, clients receive ongoing support. “We work with vocational rehabilitation and the Agency for Persons with Disabilities too and potential clients can choose us as their community employment.”

Adult day training at their Avon Park location includes reading, writing and basic academic skills along with an art

Don’t forget to be kind to yourself.”

drug. Zulresso is administered as a continuous IV infusion over a total of 60 hours (2.5 days). Because of the risk of serious harm due to the sudden loss of consciousness, patients must be monitored for excessive sedation and sudden loss of consciousness and have continuous pulse oximetry monitoring (monitors oxygen levels in the blood). While receiving the infusion, patients must be accompanied during interactions with their child(ren). The need for these steps is addressed in a Boxed Warning in the drug’s prescribing information. Patients will be counseled on the risks of Zulresso treatment and instructed that they must be monitored for these effects at a health care facility for the entire 60 hours of infusion. Patients should not drive, operate machinery, or do other dangerous activities until feelings of sleepiness from the treatment have completely gone away.

The efficacy of Zulresso was shown in two clinical studies in participants who received a 60-hour continuous infusion of Zulresso or placebo and were then followed for four weeks. One study included patients with severe PPD and the other included patients with moderate PPD. The primary measure in the study was

the mean change from baseline in depressive symptoms as measured by a depression rating scale. In both placebo controlled studies, Zulresso demonstrated superiority to placebo in improvement of depressive symptoms at the end of the first infusion. The improvement in depression was also observed at the end of the 30-day follow-up period.

The most common adverse reactions reported by patients treated with Zulresso in clinical trials include sleepiness, dry mouth, loss of consciousness and flushing. Health care providers should consider changing the therapeutic regimen, including discontinuing Zulresso in patients whose PPD becomes worse or who experience

emergent suicidal thoughts and behaviors.

The FDA granted this application Priority Review and Breakthrough Therapy designation.

Approval of Zulresso was granted to Sage Therapeutics, Inc.

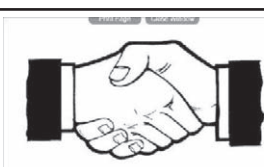

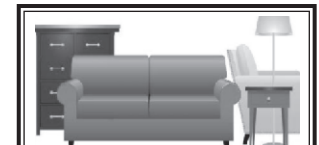

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Basic makeup tips for older women

There are thousands of beauty tricks that make a difference in your looks — especially if you're a woman age 50-plus. But who has time for all that? Let me show you a shortcut to the best of the best. As a beauty editor, I've watched top pros use these tips on magazine shoots with grownup celebs and everyday women for decades. They're timeless and do work. Here are 10 from my greatest hits list.

1. Test makeup in the right places

Swipe lipstick on your thumb and foundation, concealer and shadow in the web between thumb and forefinger. No more wiping clean the store tester and applying to your face or the back of your hand, please. Not only is it unhygienic, it's not realistic. Test on skin similar to the area where the product will be used. The soft, fleshy blue-red pad of your thumb is more like actual lip skin and gives a truer idea of lipstick shade and texture. The web of skin near your thumb is thinner, looser and crinkled — it will show how face makeup or eye shadow will look when applied, blended and worn.

2. Apply skin care upward and outward

It really does help counteract gravity, and it sidekicks saggy skin and deep expression lines. Blend on creams, serums and oils in gentle sweeping movements, working from the center of your face outward. In the short term, it gets the circulation going, helps products melt into skin and feels soothing — in the long term, it minimizes the downward pull. Makeup artists, day spa aestheticians, facialists and the teeny print instructions sheet that comes with luxury face creams wouldn't have it any other way! Start at the base of your neck and work upwards to the jawline. Then sweep outward along the jawline, from chin to ears, beneath nose to cheekbones to temples, in a big C. Blend eye cream from inner eye near the nose, in a hammock following the under eye. You're subtly lifting the face as you massage up and out.

3. Apply brow makeup before eye makeup, not after

Unless you have tattooed or microbladed your eyebrows, or have genetically gifted strong full brows — your own are not what they used to be. Filling and extending your brow shape before jumping to liner, shadow and mascara gives your eye area a

brand-new bigger frame. This "window" will affect how much eye makeup you need or want — and maybe it's not as much as you thought. Dark hair? Go one or two shades lighter in brow makeup. Light hair? Go one or two shades darker in brow filler.

4. Start and stop brow makeup where it should

Improving or inventing mature brows is a biggie, but we often pay too much attention to fullness and shape, not length. This is why even "corrected" brows fall short. Line up any pencil vertically from the outside corner of your nose to align with your inner eye corner. This is where your brow should begin. Fill in your brow with small, hairlike, upward pencil strokes, then angle the pencil from the nose to the outer corner of your eye. This is where your brow should end. Warning: Do not follow the downward curve of brow hairs that droop. Instead, cheat the line outward for a straighter look, and pluck hairs that drag your eye down. Comb brow hairs up, and fill from the bottom to top with pencil and/or powder.

5. Our faces become more asymmetrical with age. Don't fight it

By age 50, unmatched features are the norm. One brow may be higher or differently shaped than the other; your top lip may have thinned to a nearly invisible line, while the bottom lip is still pouty. On your face, you may see that one side is more lined and crinkled than the other (usually the side you

it. Keep the edge of the arc soft. This new fake crease is an illusion that expands lash to crease space, pushes back the overhang and makes eyes look bigger and stronger in shape — even before you get to liner!

8. Work your eye liner strategically

Stop applying liner on autopilot. Vary placement and line thickness according to a specific goal — and this may differ daily. You can, for example: rim upper and lower lids to really emphasize eye shape and draw attention away from underage bags or lines; line the upper lid at the lash roots and beneath them in the waterline to bring deepest eyes out; widen the top lid liner slightly at the outer end to lift the eyes; use a gray or brown liner instead of dark, inky black or chocolate for a softer look; line the lower waterline with a beige eye pencil to cancel out redness. The options are endless.

9. The center of your face is where you need the most makeup coverage

Stop obsessing about those cheeky brown spots — no one else is even noticing them. Start at your nose (bridge to beneath nostrils) and its surrounding area, since this is where redness, dark circles, broken capillaries, enlarged pores require coverage. Apply foundation or your beauty balm/color-correcting (BB/CC) cream in the center, and blend outward from there toward hairline, jaw and ears, sheering the texture as you go. Then for round two, go over the area again, using a foundation brush in a back-and-forth motion every which way, like painting a wall. This forces the makeup and skin to melt together seamlessly instead of lying on top. Aim for subtle coverage with skin visible beneath.

10. Manipulate your same old lipstick's texture and shade

You already know lining and filling in lips with a lip-toned pencil will prevent ring around the mouth and hold the color, but you don't know this: You can turn any lipstick into a more matte or muted one by blotting with a tissue and satin or matte powder — select from pressed to loose, even blush, a peachy, rosy, tawny eyeshadow or bronzer — any kind works. This tip softens the look of too bold bright or deep berry shades, too. Want more shimmer or shine that won't get sloppy and slimy? Apply your usual lipstick and dab it with a glittery, shimmery powder as above.



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Could an eye doctor diagnose Alzheimer's before you have symptoms?

Study suggests loss of blood vessels in retina reflect changes in brain health

DURHAM, N.C. – A quick eye exam might one day allow eye doctors to check up on both your eyeglasses prescription and your brain health.

A study of more than 200 people at the Duke Eye Center published March 11 in the journal Ophthalmology Retina suggests the loss of blood vessels in the retina could signal Alzheimer's disease.

In people with healthy brains, microscopic blood vessels form a dense web at the back of the eye inside the retina, as seen in 133 participants in a control group.

In the eyes of 39 people with Alzheimer's disease, that web was less dense and even sparse in places. The differences in density were statistically significant after researchers controlled for factors including age, sex, and level of education, said Duke ophthalmologist and retinal surgeon Sharon Fekrat, M.D., the study's senior author.

"We're measuring blood vessels that can't be seen during a regular eye exam and we're doing that with relatively new noninvasive technology that takes high-resolution images of very small blood vessels within the retina in just a few minutes," she said. "It's possible that these changes in blood vessel density in the retina could mirror what's going on in the tiny blood vessels in the brain, perhaps before we are able to detect any changes in cognition."

The study found differences in the retinas of those with Alzheimer's disease when compared to healthy people and to those with mild cognitive impairment, often a precursor to Alzheimer's disease.

With nearly 6 million Americans living with Alzheimer's disease and no viable treatments or noninvasive tools for early diagnosis, its burden on families and the economy is heavy. Scientists at Duke Eye

Center and beyond have studied other changes in the retina that could signal trouble upstream in the brain, such as thinning of some of the retinal nerve layers.

"We know that there are changes that occur in the brain in the small blood vessels in people with Alzheimer's disease, and because the retina is an extension of the brain, we wanted to investigate whether these changes could be detected in the retina using a new technology that is less invasive and easy to obtain," said Dilraj S. Grewal, M.D., a Duke ophthalmologist and retinal surgeon and lead author on the study. The Duke study used a noninvasive technology called optical coherence tomography angiography (OCTA). OCTA machines use light waves that reveal blood flow in every layer of the retina.

An OCTA scan could even reveal changes in tiny capillaries — most less than half the width of a human hair — before blood vessel changes show up on a brain scan such as an MRI or cerebral angiogram, which highlight only larger blood vessels. Such techniques to study the brain are invasive and costly.

"Ultimately, the goal would be to use this technology to detect Alzheimer's early, before symptoms of memory loss are evident, and be able to monitor these changes over time in participants of clinical trials studying new Alzheimer's treatments," Fekrat said.

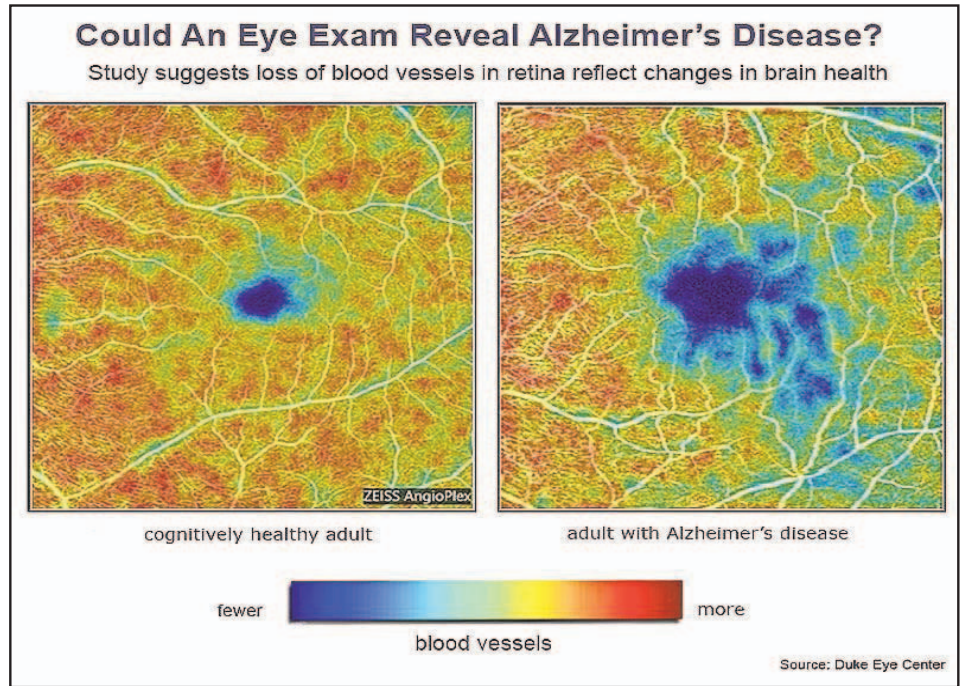

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Vaccine for HER2 breast cancer shows early promise

DURHAM, N.C. — A vaccine developed by Duke Cancer Institute researchers has shown early promise in targeting the HER2 protein that fuels a deadly form of breast cancer.

In a phase 1 clinical trial that enrolled 22 women with recurrent cancers that overexpress the HER2 protein, the vaccine demonstrated an ability to halt tumor growth and improve survival for a subset of patients. A phase 2 trial is being planned at Duke.

“Therapies targeting HER2 are widely used to treat breast cancers that overexpress the protein, but drug resistance is common, leading to progressive disease and

death,” said H. Kim Lyerly, M.D., professor of surgery, immunology and pathology at Duke and senior author of a study in the journal *Clinical Cancer Research*.

“We need new options, and our study shows that vaccine approaches could lead to an additional weapon in the arsenal,” Lyerly said.

Lyerly and colleagues — including lead author Erika J. Crosby, Ph.D., and co-corresponding author Zachary C. Hartman, Ph.D. — constructed a vaccine using a neutralized virus vector to carry genetic information that targets HER2 proteins. Once deployed, the vaccines homes in on the HER2 proteins in the cancer cells, sparking the

immune system to mount an attack on the cancer.

In mouse models, the vaccine prompted tumors to recede, leading to a clinical trial that began enrolling HER2-positive breast cancer patients between 2012 and 2015. The first four patients received the vaccine only; all subsequent participants received the vaccine along with HER2 targeted therapies, which resulted in a more robust response to the vaccine.

Among participants, seven saw their tumor growth stabilize, at least initially. Two patients continue to survive at publication and have experienced long-standing control over tumor progression. The researchers also identified

a marker that correlates with improved progression-free survival.

“These data support the further testing of this vaccine platform in combination with immune checkpoint inhibitors like anti-PD1 to better engage the expanded T cell populations,” Lyerly said.

In addition to Lyerly, Crosby and Hartman, study authors include William Gwin, Kimberly Blackwell, Paul K. Marcom, Serena Chang, Holden T Maecker, Gloria Broadwater, Terry Hyslop, Sungjin Kim, Andre Rogatko, Veronica Lubkov, Joshua C. Snyder, Takuya Osada, Amy C. Hobeika and Michael A. Morse.

Democrats want Mueller files; GOP says 'Move on'

Divided politics continue with conclusion of no collusion

WASHINGTON — House Democrats pressed the Justice Department Monday to provide the full report from special counsel Robert Mueller even as Republicans gleefully called for them to “move on” from the Russia investigation. President Donald Trump accused those

responsible for launching Mueller's probe of “treasonous things against our country” and said they “certainly will be looked into.”

Trump said the release of Mueller's full report “wouldn't bother me at all,” and Democrats quickly put that statement to the test, demanding that his administration hand over the entire document

and not just Sunday's four-page summary from Attorney General William Barr.

Six House Democratic committee chairmen wrote to Barr that his summary is “not sufficient” and asked to be given Mueller's full report by April 2. They also want to begin receiving the underlying evidence the same day. The information is “urgently needed by our committees to perform their duties under the Constitution,” they wrote, implying that the information would be subpoenaed if it is not turned over by

the deadline.

Barr said in his letter to Congress that Mueller did not find that Trump's campaign “conspired or coordinated” with the Russian government to influence the 2016 presidential election — knocking down arguments from Democrats who have long claimed there was evidence of such collusion.

But he also said Mueller reached no conclusion on whether Trump obstructed the federal investigation, instead setting out “evidence on both sides” of the question and

stating that “while this report does not conclude the president committed a crime, it also does not exonerate him.” Absent a recommendation from Mueller, Barr stepped in and decided there wasn't sufficient evidence to establish that the president obstructed justice. Democrats said Barr's judgment is not the final word.

“All I'm interested in is them releasing the full report, the full Mueller report,” said House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif.

New NASA study finds that one of the fastest-shrinking glaciers, is growing again — if only temporary

WASHINGTON — A major Greenland glacier that was one of the fastest shrinking ice and snow masses on Earth is growing again, a new NASA study finds.

The Jakobshavn glacier around 2012 was retreating about 1.8 miles and thinning nearly 130 feet annually. But it started growing again at about the same rate in the

past two years, according to a study in Monday's Nature Geoscience. Study authors and outside scientists think this is temporary.

“That was kind of a surprise. We kind of got used to a runaway system,” said Geological Survey of Denmark and Greenland ice and climate scientist Jason Box. “The good news is that it's a reminder that it's not necessarily going that fast. But it is going.”

Box, who wasn't part of the study, said Jakobshavn is “arguably the most important Greenland glacier because it discharges the most ice in the northern hemisphere. For all of Greenland, it is king.”

A natural cyclical cooling of North Atlantic waters likely caused the glacier to reverse course, said study lead author Ala Khazendar, a NASA glaciologist on the Oceans Melting Greenland

(OMG) project. Khazendar and colleagues say this coincides with a flip of the North Atlantic Oscillation — a natural and temporary cooling and warming of parts of the ocean that is like a distant cousin to El Nino in the Pacific.

The water in Disko Bay, where Jakobshavn hits the ocean, is about 3.6 degrees cooler (2 degrees Celsius)

Avenatti charged with trying to extort millions from Nike

NEW YORK — Michael Avenatti, the pugnacious attorney best known for representing porn actress Stormy Daniels in lawsuits against President Donald Trump, was arrested Monday on charges that included trying to shake down Nike for as much as \$25 million by threatening the company with bad publicity.

Avenatti, who was also accused of embezzling a client's money to pay his own expenses, was charged with extortion and bank and wire fraud in separate cases in New York and California. He was arrested at a New York law firm where he had gone to meet with Nike executives. It was just minutes after he tweeted that he planned to hold a news conference Tuesday to “disclose a major high school/college basketball scandal perpetrated by @Nike that we have uncovered.”

“When lawyers use their law licenses as weapons, as a guise to extort payments for themselves, they are no longer acting as attorneys. They are acting as criminals,” said Geoffrey S. Berman, the U.S. attorney in New York.

California investigators had been building a case against Avenatti for more than a year, but prosecutors in New York said their investigation began only last week and was completed in days.

In the California case, Avenatti allegedly misused a client's money to pay his debts and those of his coffee business and law firm. Federal prosecutors said he also defrauded a Mississippi bank by using phony tax returns to obtain millions of dollars in loans.

The allegations “paint an ugly picture of lawless conduct and greed,” said Nick Hanna, the U.S. attorney in Los Angeles. Avenatti describes himself on Twitter as an attorney and advocate, but the accusations describe “a corrupt lawyer who instead fights for his own selfish interests.”

Avenatti appeared briefly in court Monday evening in New York and was ordered released on \$300,000 bond. He did not enter a plea. Emerging from the courthouse, he thanked the federal agents who arrested him for being courteous and professional.

“As all of you know, for the entirety of my career I have fought against the

Trump reverses US policy on Israel's claim over Golan Heights

The controversial move has had international backlash

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump signed a proclamation on Monday recognizing Israel's sovereignty over the Golan Heights, reversing more than a half-century of U.S. policy in the Middle East.

Standing alongside Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu at the White House, Trump made formal a move he announced in a surprise tweet last week.

The president said it was time for the U.S. to take the step after 52 years of Israeli control of the strategic highlands on the border with Syria. The U.S. is the first country to recognize Israel's sovereignty over the Golan, which the rest of the international community regards as Israeli-occupied.

Trump said his decision would cement the Jewish state's ability to defend itself from regional threats should a broad Arab-Israeli peace deal ever be reached. Trump's action also likely gives Netanyahu a political boost ahead of what's expected to be a close Israeli election. During his 90-minute visit to the White House, reporters and photographers were invited to see Netanyahu at least four times: his arrival at the South Lawn, the signing of the declaration in the Diplomatic Room, a walk through the Colonnade and in the Oval Office.

Syria denounced the U.S. move as "blatant aggression" on its sovereignty and territorial integrity. The foreign ministry said Trump's step represented the "highest level of contempt for international legitimacy" and showed that Washington was "the main enemy" of Arabs. Syrian

Foreign Minister Walid al-Moallem told Syrian TV that the Golan is a Syrian-occupied territory and that Trump decision will only isolate America.

Lebanon, which Secretary of State Mike Pence visited over the past weekend, said the Golan Heights are "Syrian Arab" territory and that "no country can falsify history by transferring" land from one country to another.

Amnesty International called the decision "irresponsible, reckless and yet another example of the Trump administration violating international law and consensus by condoning Israel's illegal annexation."

Netanyahu had pressed for recognition of his country's sovereignty over the area for months.

Israel has long argued that the strategically important area has for all practical purposes been fully integrated into Israel since it was captured from Syria in the 1967 Mideast war and that control of the strategic plateau is needed as protection from Iran and its allies in Syria.

The proclamation noted the "unique circumstances" presented by the Golan, language that appeared to be aimed at countering criticism that the recognition would be used by other countries to justify control of disputed territory such as Russia's 2014 annexation of Ukraine's Crimea region.

Eric Goldstein, deputy Middle East and North Africa director at Human Rights Watch, said Trump seems to want to "drive a wrecking ball" through international law that protects the people who live in "occupied Golan Heights." He said it could embolden other "occupying states to double down on their own land grabs, settlements and plunder of resources."

Netanyahu, even as he was somberly cutting short his visit to Washington to deal with a rocket attack in central Israel, was elated by Trump's move.

"Israel has never had a better friend than you," he told the president.

Israel hits targets across Gaza after rocket attack

JERUSALEM — Israeli forces on Monday struck targets across the Gaza Strip, including the offices of Hamas' supreme leader, in response to a surprise rocket attack from the Palestinian territory, as the military bolstered its troops and rocket-defense systems in anticipation of a new round of heavy fighting with the Islamic militant group.

Israel opened public bomb shelters in most major cities and civil defense authorities canceled sports events and public transportation in southern Israel. The Israeli army said air raid sirens wailed across southern Israel late Monday night, and Israeli media reported at least 10 rockets fired into the country, but it provided no further details.

"Israel will not tolerate this. I will not tolerate this," Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu declared during a White House meeting with President Donald Trump.

"Israel is responding forcefully to this wanton aggression," he said. "We will do whatever we must do to defend our people and defend our state."

Ahead of the Israeli airstrikes, Hamas' leadership went into hiding.

Several airstrikes rocked Gaza, including an explosion that destroyed the office of Hamas leader Ismail Haniyeh. The Israeli military issued a statement confirming it bombed the building, which had "served as an office for many military meetings." An earlier blast destroyed a multi-story building in Gaza City that Israel said had served as a Hamas military intelligence headquarters.

There were no immediate reports of casualties. In both blasts, Israel fired warning shots to evacuate the buildings. But the airstrike on the multistory building was so powerful it sent debris flying onto the roof of The Associated Press bureau, located on the 11th floor of a nearby high-rise.

Netanyahu is in a tight race for re-election, and just two weeks before the April 9 vote, faces tough criticism from challengers who accuse him of being too soft on Hamas.

In Washington to celebrate the U.S. recognition of Israel's control of the Golan Heights, Netanyahu instead was forced to cut short his trip under heavy pressure to strike back at Hamas.

Earlier, Haniyeh issued a statement warning Israel

against heavy retaliation. He said the Palestinian people "will not surrender."

An Israel-Egyptian blockade, imposed to weaken Hamas, combined with sanctions by the Palestinian Authority and mismanagement by the Hamas government, have all fueled an economic crisis that has left Gaza with an unemployment rate above 50 percent.

Hamas has been leading weekly protests along the Israeli border for the past year in hopes of easing the blockade, but the demonstrations, in which some 190 people have been killed by Israeli fire, have done little to improve conditions.

Last week, hundreds of Gazans protested the dire conditions, a rare expression of public discontent against the authoritarian government. Hamas responded with a violent crackdown, beating and arresting dozens of demonstrators and drawing rare public criticism.

Israel and Hamas have fought three wars, most recently in 2014, and ended with over 2,000 Palestinian deaths, including hundreds of civilians, and 73 killed on the Israeli side.

Yaakov Amidror, a former national security adviser to Netanyahu, said a mild response was not an option.

"It will be something on a bigger scale," he said.

Monday's attack came 10 days after rockets were fired from Gaza toward Israel's densely populated commercial capital of Tel Aviv, and the Israeli military struck back. Gaza's Hamas leaders said the rocket was fired

accidentally and the fighting quickly subsided.

The sounds of air raid sirens jolted residents of the Sharon area, northeast of Tel Aviv, shortly after 5 a.m. Monday, sending them scurrying to bomb shelters.

The rocket destroyed a residential home in the farming community of Mishmeret, wounding six members of a family. The Magen David Adom rescue service said it treated seven people, including two women who were moderately wounded. The others, including two children and an infant, had minor injuries.

The cities of Tel Aviv and Beersheba opened public bomb shelters. Civil defense officials canceled sporting matches and train service in southern Israel. Schools were ordered to hold classes in bomb shelters, and large public gatherings were banned.

The family home in Mishmeret was left in ruins, with tiles, broken furniture and debris scattered about. A shattered baby's crib lay among the rubble and two family dogs died in the explosion.

"I nearly lost my family," said Robert Wolf, grandfather of the injured residents. "If we hadn't gotten to the bomb shelter in time, I would now be burying all my family."

Netanyahu came under heavy criticism from allies and opponents for what they say has been an ineffective policy containing Gaza militants. He has conducted indirect cease-fire talks through Egyptian mediators in recent months, and even allowed the delivery of millions of dollars of Qatari aid to Hamas to ease harsh conditions in Gaza.

Sister, 12 and 9, die in minibike crash

LAKELAND (AP) — Authorities say two young sisters died when the minibike they were riding crashed into a pickup truck.

Polk County Sheriff Grady Judd tells news outlets the truck driver didn't see 12-year-old Charisma Vega and her 9-year-old sister Kiara as they crossed a road near Lakeland on Sunday afternoon.

Judd says the girls were taken to a hospital where they later died.

The sheriff says the girls "were just out on a Sunday afternoon, having fun," but the bike was not certified for the road. He says there is no evidence of wrongdoing by the truck driver.

Investigators say the girls weren't wearing helmets.

Sheriff: Parents didn't realize girl was left alone at park

WEST PALM BEACH (AP) — Sheriff's officials in Florida say they've arrested the parents of a young child who was found wandering alone in a park.

The Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office posted the little girl's picture on social media after she was found in Haverhill Park around 7 p.m. Friday. On Saturday morning, they located

the parents who told investigators they didn't realize they'd left the child, who had been missing for 14 hours.

Investigators arrested Jolanda and Makenson Alexandre on child neglect charges. The Department of Children and Families removed the couple's seven other children from the home.

5th earthquake near Alabama-Florida state line

MOBILE, Ala. (AP) — Another weak earthquake has struck near the Alabama-Florida state line.

News outlets report it's the fifth small quake in the area this month. There has been no damage or injuries.

The U.S. Geological Survey said a 2.7 magnitude quake hit an early about 2 miles east of Century, Florida, on Sunday.

The first quake in the area struck March 6. Another occurred March 11 and two more happened March 13.

The first quake, March 6, was recorded as the strongest at 3.1 magnitude. It was about 3 miles east-northeast of Flomaton. It was felt 20 miles away in Brewton and also on the Florida side the state line.

Alabama's Geological Investigations Program said

the five quakes are part of the "normal seismic activity" in the area.

Dad who dropped daughter off bridge claims insanity

ST. PETERSBURG (AP) — A murder trial is moving forward for a Florida man who threw his 5-year-old daughter off a Tampa Bay area bridge.

Prosecutors made opening statements Monday afternoon at the Pinellas County Courthouse. It took a week for lawyers to agree on 12 jurors and four alternates to decide the fate of 29-year-old John Jonchuck.

No one disputes that Jonchuck dropped his daughter Phoebe 62 feet into Tampa Bay on Jan. 8, 2015, and prosecutors are not seeking the death penalty. If convicted of first-degree murder, he'll automatically go to prison for life.

Jonchuck's lawyers are using an insanity defense. They must convince jurors his mental illness was so severe that he didn't know what he was doing.

Canadian couple found dead in South Florida mobile home park

POMPANO BEACH (AP) — Neighbors who checked on a

Canadian couple they had not seen in a few days found them dead inside their home in a South Florida mobile home park.

The Sun Sentinel and WPLG report 80-year-old Marc Gagne and his 78-year-old wife Rita Gagne were found dead Friday afternoon.

Broward Sheriff's detectives have released few details. The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation reported the Gagnes were from Saint-Come-Liniere.

Neighbors in the Golf View Estates say the Gagnes split their time between the Pompano Beach area and Canada.

An investigation continues.

Senate panel backs giving Florida access to Canadian drugs

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — A Florida Senate panel has approved a bill that would give Floridians access to cheaper prescription drugs from Canada if the federal government agrees.

The Senate Health Policy Committee voted Monday for one of Republican Gov. Ron DeSantis' top priorities in the 60-day legislative session. A companion measure with several key differences is moving through House committees, as well.

The Senate bill's sponsor, Republican Sen. Aaron Bean of

Jacksonville, said the Canadian drug import program would be submitted for approval to the federal Health and Human Services Department. If approved there, the plan would come back to Florida lawmakers for a final decision.

Man electrocuted trying to remove bird from power line

WEST PALM BEACH (AP) — Officials say a man who kept pigeons was electrocuted when he used a metal pole to remove one of his birds from a power line.

The Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office says 36-year-old Elian Garcia Rivera was in his backyard Saturday afternoon when he spotted one of his pigeons on a power line running above.

They say he got a 20-foot pole and tried to remove the bird, but he touched the power line and was electrocuted.

According to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, birds can safely sit on wires because they aren't grounded — so the electricity in the power line stays put. People get electrocuted when they touch a power line because they are on the ground, causing the electricity to flow through them.

Coaches, others plead not guilty in college admissions scam

BOSTON — Athletic coaches charged in a sweeping college admissions scam pleaded not guilty Monday to taking bribes from wealthy parents in exchange for helping students get into elite universities such as Georgetown.

They appeared in Boston's federal court nearly two weeks after they were arrested in what authorities have described as the biggest college admissions scheme ever prosecuted by the U.S. Justice Department, which also ensnared prominent parents like actresses Felicity Huffman and Lori Loughlin.

Authorities say the coaches were paid tens of thousands of dollars to help falsify student's athletic credentials and get them admitted as recruits for sports they didn't play.

They include longtime tennis coach Gordon Ernst, who's accused of getting \$2.7 million in bribes to designate at least 12 applicants as recruits to Georgetown, as well as former UCLA men's soccer coach Jorge Salcedo, Wake Forest University women's volleyball coach William Ferguson and former USC water polo coach Jovan Vavic.

One by one, the suit-clad coaches stood before the packed courtroom before leaning into the microphone to say "not guilty."

Ernst, Salcedo, Vavic and their lawyers left the courthouse without commenting amid a crush of reporters shouting questions.

An attorney for Ferguson told reporters that his client is innocent and "does not belong in this indictment." Ferguson is charged with taking a \$100,000 bribe to recruit a student who had been placed on the wait list. He's been suspended by Wake Forest.

"Two weeks ago, the U.S. attorney told you about a litany of abuses: phony test scores, unqualified students, falsified athletic profiles. Well I can't speak to what happened at any other school, but not at Wake Forest University," attorney Shaun Clarke said. "No one, no one was admitted to Wake Forest who didn't earn it as a student and as an athlete," he said.

Ernst, who also was the personal tennis coach for former first lady Michelle Obama and her daughters, left Georgetown in 2017 after an internal investigation found he violated admissions rules. He was later hired by the University of Rhode Island, which says it wasn't told about the admissions rules violations. The school said Saturday that Ernst has resigned.

Salcedo, a former UCLA All-American and national champion, also resigned after being charged with getting \$200,000 in exchange for helping one male and one female applicant into the school.

Authorities say Vavic, who won 16 national water polo titles at USC, was paid \$250,000 to designate two students as recruits. He has been fired by USC.

Former USC senior associate athletic director

Donna Heinel, two college entrance exam administrators and other defendants accused of participating in the admissions scam also pleaded not guilty to racketeering conspiracy charges Monday.

The charge calls for up to 20 years in prison, although defendants, especially first-time offenders, typically get far less than that.

At least nine athletic coaches and 33 parents, many of them prominent in law, finance, fashion, the food and beverage industry and other fields, have been charged in the case.

In addition to the athletic recruiting scheme, authorities say parents paid an admissions consultant to arrange for someone else to take college entrance exams on behalf of their children or correct answers for them.

Huffman, Loughlin and Loughlin's fashion designer husband Mossimo Giannulli are scheduled to make their initial appearances in the Boston court on April 3.

Stanford's former sailing coach John Vandemoer has already pleaded guilty and former Yale University women soccer coach Rudy Meredith is expected to plead guilty Thursday.

The consultant at the center of the scheme, Rick Singer, admitted to fraud and conspiracy charges on the same day the charges against the parents and coaches were unsealed. Singer secretly recorded his conversations with the parents after agreeing to work with investigators in the hopes of getting a lesser sentence.

US stocks end choppy day mixed amid global growth jitters

U.S. stocks capped a day of choppy trading with an uneven finish Monday as investors wrestled to make sense of newly pessimistic outlooks for the global economy.

Traders also weighed another troubling drop in long-term bond yields, which many see as a warning sign of a possible recession.

Large-company stocks ended broadly lower, led by drops in big technology companies. Apple fell 1.2 percent after announcing several new services including streaming video and news. Small-company stocks fared better.

The bout of volatile trading left the S&P 500 index slightly lower, extending the benchmark index's losses from a broad market sell-off last week.

"Today's moves are very reflective of very different interpretations of the environment and risks ahead," said Luke Tilley, chief economist at Wilmington Trust. "Different investors and different investment shops are interpreting the data very differently."

The S&P 500 dropped 2.35 points, or 0.1 percent, to 2,798.36.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average rose 14.51 points, or 0.1 percent, to 25,516.83. It was down as much as 130 and up as much as 100 earlier in the day.

The Nasdaq composite lost 5.13 points, or 0.1 percent, to 7,637.54. The

Russell 2000 index of smaller company stocks picked up 6.94 points, or 0.5 percent, to 1,512.86.

Major European stock indexes finished lower as uncertainty over Brexit continued.

Despite the market's recent slide, the S&P 500 index is still up more than 11 percent so far in 2019, an unusually strong start to a year.

Stocks spent much of the morning wavering between gains and losses as investors weighed another downbeat outlook on the economy.

Citing a global slowdown and trade conflicts, economists from the National Association for Business Economics collectively project that growth will reach a modest 2.4 this year and just 2 percent in 2020.

That's in sharp contrast to the Trump administration's predictions that growth will accelerate in the coming years. Still, the economists say they think a recession remains unlikely any time soon.

Worried investors have shifted money into bonds, sending yields lower. The yield on the 10-year Treasury slid to 2.40 percent from 2.45 percent late Friday. At one point, the yield had fallen to 2.38 percent, briefly triggering deeper declines in the stock indexes.

The 10-year Treasury yield remains below the yield on the three-month Treasury bill, a worrying sign that in the past has preceded recessions. That "inversion" occurred on Friday and has spooked investors.

When it comes to antibiotics, relying on them less is wise

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am an 81-year-old male. I have CMML (chronic myelomonocytic leukemia), but Vidaza has stabilized my condition. I am otherwise in good health.

Some years ago, I had an operation on my thumb that became infected, and I was given Duricef. This caused me to have colitis, which was treated by killing all my stomach bacteria and reintroducing good bacteria. I recently had diverticulitis and took ciprofloxacin and metronidazole for seven days. The oral antibiotics for the diverticulitis caused me to have stomach cramps, as do all oral antibiotics.

The problem is, I frequently have cuts and abrasions that turn the surrounding area red. I would like to manage infections and inflammations while reducing the need for oral antibiotics. I am concerned that frequent use of antibiotics causes them to become less effective.

I also wonder about letting a fever continue to allow natural healing. I need to monitor and

manage fever since excessive temperature can be harmful. When should I take medication to reduce a fever, and how high does a fever need to be before I should go to the emergency room? — R.P.

ANSWER: Overuse of antibiotics is a serious problem, and I am glad to hear that you want to reduce your use of them. This is important in an individual, because not only will you experience less of the kind of side effects you mention, but the antibiotics will be more effective when you do choose to use them. It's also important

for the population as a whole; the less we use antibiotics, the less likely their targets will develop into highly resistant organisms.

The decision to use antibiotics is for you and your doctor to make, but if you communicate that you are trying to avoid them, you are less likely to have them prescribed.

There is no precise level of fever that indicates a need for medication or evaluation. It depends on the person's situation. Although some people run too fast to the ER or their doctor demanding antibiotics, that's not what's happening with you.

In your case, because you have a disease of the bone marrow (CMML), and are taking the cancer chemotherapy drug azacitidine (Vidaza), you are at higher risk of developing a serious bacterial infection. For that reason, you should be more inclined to get evaluated for a possible infection than a person who does not have these medical conditions.

Further, because of the leukemia and its treatment, you are a little

less likely to show signs of infection; a fever means more for you than it would for a 40-year-old with no cancer. In your situation, a temperature of 100.5 F (38 C) should prompt a visit to your doctor for evaluation.

DEAR DR. ROACH: My eosinophil count on routine blood test came back at 6.7 (normal 3-5). Should I be concerned? I do have asthma. — E.P.

ANSWER: Eosinophils are a normal component of blood. They are a specialized white blood cell that is found normally in small amounts.

The number you are giving is a percentage of the total, and in people with white blood cell counts on the low end of normal, it may represent a normal eosinophil count (0-500 per microliter of blood).

People with asthma often have slightly elevated eosinophil levels. Odds are, this level is not something to worry about, but talk to your doctor at your next appointment to get more information.

Mother becomes distant after son reveals he's gay

DEAR ABBY: I love my mother, but our relationship has been awkward since I came out to her when I was 13. After I told her I was gay, she grew more and more distant.

She was seldom home, and when she was, we would argue about everything. It got so bad that I left and moved in with my aunt, who was like a mom to me. My sister told me she thinks Mom is in denial because every time my sister would want to talk about it, Mom would clam up.

Mom and I have NEVER talked about it. I clearly recall the day I came out. When I told Mom, she said she already knew. Then she added, "It's just a phase."

I'm sad that even after 12 years she still hasn't accepted that this is who I am and who I have always been. Should I have a sit-down talk with her like the adults we are? — Same Son As Always

The times are changing. Many large stores are inviting customers to bring in their returns for the



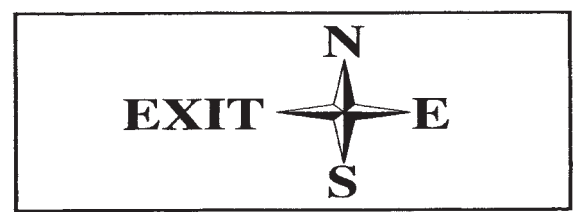

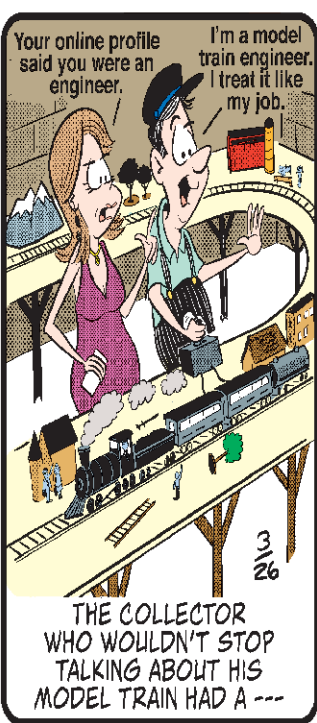

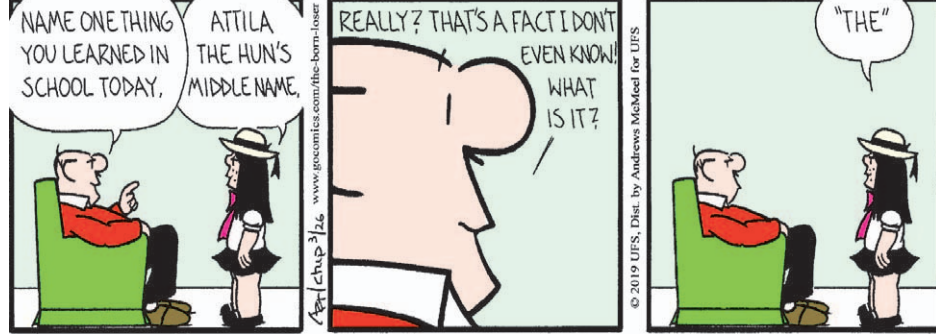
dog. Sometimes in bridge we draw inferences from what our opponent, or our partner, didn't do.

Bloom reasoned that his partner had no interest in a spade ruff, as East knew from the auction that South was also short in spades. Should East have a strong diamond holding, he would have played the two of spades on the opening lead to encourage a shift. Bloom saw that his own club holding was doomed under the ace-queen, and the contract couldn't be defeated if South had the ace of hearts and the king of diamonds. Even just the queen of diamonds, instead of the king, would make the contract solid.

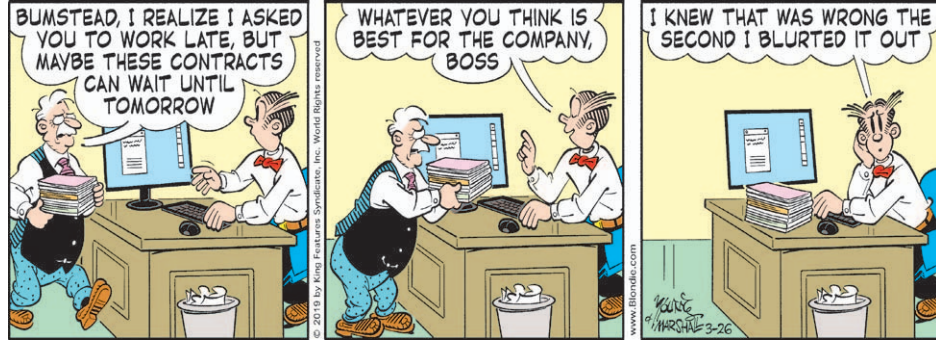
Bloom saw that the only helpful card partner could have, consistent with the play so far, was the ace of hearts. Bloom shifted to the king of hearts at trick three and continued with a heart to East's ace. A third heart was ruffed by South and over ruffed by Bloom for the setting trick. Nice shift!

renewing their communities' focus on the suicide prevention and mental health resources that remain available 13 months after a gunman killed 17 people at the high school.

In Newtown, Connecticut, where 20 first-graders died along with six staff members six years ago, the body of 49-year-old Jeremy Richman was found outside his office Monday morning.

Richman's daughter Avielle was fatally shot at Sandy Hook. He had visited Florida last week and met with the parents of Stoneman Douglas victims, said Lori Alhadeff, whose 14-year-old daughter Alyssa died there.

Richman and his wife oversaw The Avielle Foundation, a group they started dedicated to preventing violence by better understanding brain health.

Multiple suicides among mass shooting survivors can be alarming, but mental health experts said the Florida deaths are not surprising. They come amid a rising nationwide trend: More than 47,000 U.S. suicides occurred in 2017, at the highest rate in at least half a century — 14 per 100,000. Suicide is the second-leading cause of death among U.S. teenagers.

"One of the big risk factors for suicide is exposure to violence,"

said Dr. Louis Kraus, chief of child and adolescent psychiatry at Rush University Medical Center in Chicago.

Even if they weren't hit by bullets or didn't see shots fired, "anyone who was at that school is at risk," Kraus said, and should be screened.

Psychologist April Foreman, a board member at the American Association of Suicidology, said survivors are more prone to suicide and thus must be vigilant about mental health check-ups just as if they had a family history of breast cancer or heart disease.

With help, people can overcome their suicidal impulses, she said.

"It's not a foregone conclusion that this will happen to everyone who's been exposed to this and the majority of people who are suicidal don't go on to die. They go on to recover and live," she said.

The first suicide took place March 16. Cara Aiello told WFOR-TV last week that her 18-year-old daughter Sydney had suffered from survivor's guilt — her friend, Meadow Pollack, died in the attack.

Sydney had been diagnosed with post-traumatic

stress disorder and struggled to attend college because she feared being in a classroom, but never asked for help, her mother said.

Coral Springs police officer Tyler Reik confirmed Monday that a Stoneman Douglas sophomore apparently killed himself Saturday, but said an official determination had not been made pending an autopsy. The boy's name was not immediately released.

Community leaders, government officials, parents, police and others held an emergency meeting Sunday after the second student suicide, Parkland Mayor Christine Hunschofsky said.

The biggest push will be to alert parents to talk to their children about whether they are having suicidal thoughts and outline the danger signs for them, such as personality changes or a preoccupation with

death, she said. The groups also want students to look out for each other, and noted that the community counseling and resource centers that opened after the attack still remain available.

The task has been made more difficult as Stoneman Douglas students are on spring break.

Hunschofsky said that while there is concern the two suicides could lead to more, it is more dangerous not to discuss what happened.

"We cannot be afraid of talking — the only way we are going to identify people who need help is to talk about it," she said.

A 16-year-old Stoneman Douglas sophomore who was in a classroom where three students died on Feb. 14, 2018, told The Associated Press on Monday that she tried to kill herself four times before she entered therapy.

At first, she was ashamed, she said, fearing that accepting counseling would mean she "couldn't handle my problems." But her attitude changed with the support of therapists, family and friends, said the girl, who the AP is not naming because of her age.

The girl said she fears not every Stoneman Douglas student who needs counseling is getting it and noted that some teachers seem uncomfortable talking about suicide and simply want to move on.

Neil Heslin, whose son, Jesse Lewis, was killed at Sandy Hook, said the families' grief has been compounded by such conspiracy theories.

"Every day you get up, you expect to get punched in the chin," Heslin said.

Newtown Police Lt. Aaron Bahamonde said Richman left a suicide note, but did not disclose its contents.

Despite Mueller's refusal to exonerate Trump, his spokesmen and leading congressional Republicans all claimed total vindication for the president anyway. Questioned by reporters, Trump said he welcomed Mueller's results but complained he had been abused by the investigation occurring at all and taking too long.

"We can never let this happen to another president again," he said. "There are a lot of people out there that have done some very evil things, very bad things, I would say treasonous things against our country."

"Those people will certainly be looked at. I've been looking at them for a long time. And I'm saying, why haven't they been looked at? They lied to Congress. Many of them you know who they are."

He didn't name names, but Trump has spent months railing against former Justice Department officials, including

former FBI Director James Comey, accusing them of an illegal witch hunt for the purpose of delegitimizing his presidency. He has also falsely claimed that the investigation was based on memos compiled by former British spy Christopher Steele, and even blamed former Sen. John McCain, who died last year, for passing the memos to the FBI.

The investigation began months before the FBI saw the dossier — and the FBI already had a copy by the time McCain turned it in.

On Monday, after a series of evening strategy meetings, Democrats vowed to continue their multiple investigations into Trump, perhaps with shifted focus. House Intelligence Committee Chairman Adam Schiff, the California Democrat who has become a focus of Republicans' post-Mueller ire, said he is "circumspect about how much more we will be able to find on issues that he thoroughly investigated," but said Mueller's conclusion would not

affect his own committee's counterintelligence probes.

"There may be other corrupt meetings between the Trump campaign and the Russians, there may be other profound financial conflicts of interest that are not mentioned in the Mueller report, and there may be unanswered questions even within what he did examine," Schiff said.

Democrats also signaled that they will curtail some public focus, at least, from their investigations of Trump and try to keep attention on their policy goals. Schiff postponed an open hearing with Felix Sater, a Russian-born former business adviser to Trump who helped him negotiate an ultimately unsuccessful deal for a Trump Tower in Moscow, while the intelligence committee tries to get a look at Mueller's report.

Pelosi, meanwhile, was scheduled to hold a press conference Tuesday on health care legislation, Democrats' top campaign issue.

Rhode Island Rep. David Cicilline, a member

of Democratic leadership, said he has been encouraging colleagues to talk about those policy issues like health care and infrastructure.

Democrats seem more likely to focus on those issues, and their ongoing investigations, than engaging in the talk of impeachment that has been amplified on Pelosi's left flank. As the release of Mueller's report loomed, she recently tried to scuttle that talk by saying she's not for impeachment, for now.

But Mueller's report hasn't dissuaded some of Trump's fiercest critics among the new Democratic lawmakers who helped flip the House from Republican control. By the end of the month, Rep. Rashida Tlaib, D-Mich., is still planning to introduce her resolution calling for the Judiciary Committee to investigate grounds for Trump's impeachment.

Meanwhile, GOP lawmakers called for Congress to move on. "This is done with," said House Majority Leader

Kevin McCarthy. "It is time for the country to move forward."

At the same time, however, Republicans followed Trump's lead in looking into how the investigation began. Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Lindsey Graham promised to "unpack the other side of the story" of the Russia investigation.

Graham, who spent the weekend with Trump in Florida, said his committee will probe the actions of the Justice Department. Still, he said the investigation was legitimate and had to happen in order to answer questions about Russian interference in the 2016 election.

Among those whom Mueller charged during the course of his investigation were the president's former campaign chairman, Paul Manafort, and his first national security adviser, Michael Flynn. Five Trump aides pleaded guilty and a sixth, longtime confidant Roger Stone, is awaiting trial on charges that he lied to Congress and engaged in witness tampering.

powerful. Powerful people and powerful corporations. I will never stop fighting that good fight," he said. "I am highly confident that when all the evidence is laid bare in connection with these cases, when it is all known, when due process occurs, that I will be fully exonerated and justice will be done."

The arrest was a sharp reversal of fortune for the 48-year-old lawyer, who, less than a year ago, emerged as a leading figure in the anti-Trump movement, with relentless cable news appearances, a hard-punching style and a knack for obtaining information

about others' wrongdoing. At one point, he even flirted with a presidential run.

Donald Trump Jr. gloated over the arrest on Twitter.

Prosecutors said Avenatti and another attorney, whom they called a co-conspirator, initially approached Nike on behalf of a client who coached a Nike-sponsored Amateur Athletic Union basketball program in California.

They claimed to have evidence of misconduct by Nike employees and threatened to hold a news conference last week on the eve of a company's quarterly earnings call and the start of the NCAA tournament. Avenatti told Nike the company could either pay them \$15 million to

\$25 million to investigate the allegations, or pay him more than \$22 million for his silence, the criminal complaint said.

Two people familiar with the investigation confirmed that the unidentified co-conspirator was Mark Geragos, a Los Angeles criminal defense lawyer known for his work with celebrities. The people spoke on condition of anonymity because the information was not made public by prosecutors.

Geragos, a CNN contributor, has a client list that has included Michael Jackson, Winona Ryder, Scott Peterson and most recently Jussie Smollett, the actor accused of fabricating a racist, anti-gay attack in Chicago. Geragos did not respond to messages seeking

comment. Within hours, CNN cut ties with him.

While lawyers sometimes make demands to seek out-of-court settlements, they cannot threaten to go public with damaging information to get something of value or gain leverage in a civil dispute, attorney Neema Rahmani said.

Nike officials told investigators Avenatti claimed to know of rules violations by an amateur basketball team sponsored by Nike. Executives immediately reported the threats to federal authorities.

The company "firmly believes in ethical and fair play, both in business and sports, and will continue to assist the prosecutors," Nike said in a statement.

than a few years ago, study authors said. While this is "good news" on a temporary basis, this is bad news on the long term because it tells scientists that ocean temperature is a bigger player in glacier retreats

and advances than previously thought, said NASA climate scientist Josh Willis, a study co-author. Over the decades the water has been and will be warming from man-made climate change, he said, noting that about 90 percent of the heat trapped by greenhouse gases goes into the oceans.

"In the long run we'll

probably have to raise our predictions of sea level rise again," Willis said.

Think of the ocean temperatures near Greenland like an escalator that's rising slowly from global warming, Khazendar said. But the natural North Atlantic Oscillation sometimes is like jumping down a few steps or jumping up a few steps.

The water can get cooler and have effects, but in the long run it is getting warmer and the melting will be worse, he said.

Four outside scientists said the study and results make sense.

University of Washington ice scientist Ian Joughin, who wasn't part of the study and predicted such a change

seven years ago, said it would be a "grave mistake" to interpret the latest data as contradicting climate change science.

What's happening, Joughin said, is "to a large extent, a temporary blip. Downturns do occur in the stock market, but overall the long term trajectory is up. This is really the same thing,"

Honoring rivalries

Packers at Bears to open 2019 schedule

PHOENIX — As part of the celebration of its 100th season, the NFL will break from tradition and feature the Packers vs. the Bears in its season opener Sept. 5.

Usually, the Super Bowl champion is the home team for the prime-time opener, but the league wants to salute historic rivalries in 2019. None fits better than Chicago-Green Bay. The teams have met 200 times since 1921, when the Bears were the Chicago Staleys. Green Bay leads the series 97-95-6 in the regular season, with the clubs splitting two postseason games.

Staging the Thursday night game at Chicago's Soldier Field — even if it is a modernized version of the stadium — adds to the theme.

This will be the first time since 2003 the Super Bowl champion has not hosted the opener. New England instead will open at home in the prime-time game Sunday night, Sept. 8. The opponent has not yet been determined. The full schedule will be announced next month.

"With the 100th season, we want to do something to kick it off in a special way," said Hans Schroder, the league's chief operating officer of media. "We're celebrating the Bears, one of the original member clubs, in their 100th season, and the Packers are in their 101st. It's an iconic matchup."

Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel invoked the name of George Halas, the team's founder, in welcoming the news.

"George 'Papa Bear' Halas and the NFL's co-founders probably didn't imagine the federation they established 100 years ago in cities and towns across the Midwest would one day be the most successful professional sports league in the world," Emanuel said in a statement. "But that's what their vision achieved. Chicago — the most American of American cities — is the perfect venue for this game."

Schroder and Brian Rolapp, the NFL's chief media and business officer, outlined other plans for the 100th season: NFL Films will select the 100 greatest teams, plays, games, characters and game changers; an all-time team is being chosen and will be featured in a TV series; Peyton Manning will talk to fans around the country about the history of the NFL for another television series.

Ogunbowale and Young show way as Irish rout MSU, 91-63

Notre Dame ran away from No. 9-seed Michigan State in the first half of the NCAA Chicago Regional

SOUTH BEND, Ind. — Arike Ogunbowale scored 23 points and two teammates had double-doubles as top-seed Notre Dame ran away from No. 9-seed Michigan State in the first half of a 91-63 victory Monday night in the NCAA Chicago Regional.

Jackie Young gave coach Muffet McGraw and the Purcell Pavilion crowd a scare when she fell hard to the floor just seconds before the end of the third quarter. She was ok and finished with 21 points, 11 rebounds and seven assists for the Fighting Irish, who are

in the Sweet 16 for the 10th straight season. They will play No. 4-seed Texas A&M Saturday at Wintrust Arena in Chicago.

Brianna Turner had 14 points and 11 rebounds in becoming Notre Dame's all-time leading rebounder, passing All-American Ruth Riley from the 2001 NCAA champions. Jessica Shepard had 19 points and nine rebounds as Notre Dame won its 11th straight despite shooting 47.9 percent (35 of 73). The Irish had a 49-37 edge in rebounds.

Coach Suzy Merchant's Spartans (21-12) had few answers for Notre Dame's dominant starters. For

the second straight game, Sidney Cooks came off the bench to score a team-high 17 points on 8-of-12 shooting and Jenna Allen closed her Michigan State career with 12 points. Kayla Belles scored 10. The Spartans shot just 37.3 percent (25 of 67) for the game.

Young showed off her versatility in the first half that Notre Dame dominated 52-26. Indiana's all-time prep scorer at Princeton High School, 87 miles down the southern Indiana roads from Allen's Bedford North Lawrence High, scored 13 points, pulled

Magic shut down 76ers in 2nd half, win 119-98, close on 8th

Nikola Vucevic paces Magic with 28 points and 11 rebounds

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Nikola Vucevic had 28 points and 11 rebounds, and the Orlando Magic held the Philadelphia 76ers without a field goal for a stretch of nearly 12 minutes Monday night in a 119-98 victory.

Evan Fournier scored 24 points for the Magic, who outscored the 76ers 30-5 over a second-half stretch in which Philadelphia missed 15 straight shots. The Magic completed their first 5-0 homestand in franchise history and moved a half-game behind Miami in chasing the eighth playoff spot in the Eastern Conference. They visit the Heat on Tuesday.

Joel Embiid led the 76ers with 20 points and 10 rebounds. Playing without point guard Ben Simmons, the 76ers led 60-57 after shooting 61.5 percent in the first half.

Shake Milton's jump shot cut the Magic's lead to 78-77 with 4:32 left in the third quarter, but Philadelphia did not score in the remainder of the period, falling behind by 14 points.

When Zhare Smith hit a 3-pointer with 4:50 remaining in the game, it ended a stretch of 11 minutes, 42 seconds without a field goal for the 76ers, who then trailed 108-85. Embiid overcame four early turnovers to put up 14 points and eight rebounds in the first half. His 3-pointer opened a 10-0 run that quickly erased Orlando's seven-point lead midway through the second quarter.

Fournier's 14 points in the third quarter helped Orlando move ahead, and Vucevic's 3-pointer put the Magic ahead to stay midway through the period.

Newest Yankees OF buys razor to get through hairy situation

Newest Yankees outfielder Mike Tauchman gets rid of beard that would have violated team policy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mike Tauchman (TOCK-min) needed to face facts: Getting traded to the New York Yankees meant the outfielder had to get rid of the beard he's worn for years. It was a hairy situation, because he was on the road and had a trimmer but no razor.

So Tauchman said he went out in search of a pharmacy and bought the right tool the night before the Yankees' scheduled exhibition finale Monday at the Washington Nationals. That allowed him to abide by the team policy that bars Yankees players from wearing facial hair other than mustaches, except for religious reasons. The 28-year-old Tauchman made it by a whisker, arriving clean shaven at the visiting clubhouse at Nationals Park.

His beard was gone, but he did carry one remnant from his 52-game career with Colorado since his major league debut in 2017, a purple-and-black Rockies bag.

The Yankees got him in exchange for left-hander Phillip Diehl.

MLB: Opening Day

In data-driven age, 'honor' of opening day start still big

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. — As spring training neared its conclusion, a reporter mentioned to Washington Nationals manager Dave Martinez that Max Scherzer was not precisely on schedule to start on opening day. "He's going to be lined up," Martinez said with a laugh. "Come Thursday at 1:05, he'll be on the mound."

Of course he will. Scherzer is, after all, one of the best pitchers in all of baseball, a three-time Cy Young Award winner and runner-up last season. So it makes perfect sense that when Washington hosts the NL East rival New York Mets this week, Scherzer will take on the pitcher who topped him in the NL voting, Jacob deGrom.

"It definitely has its prestige," Scherzer said. "It's symbolic. It's an honor to get the ball in that situation."

That's because even in this data-driven age in baseball, when analytics and analysis are supposed to be replacing "gut feel" and sentiment when it comes to making any and all decisions, granting an opening day start to a particular pitcher because of his status rather than his statistics is something of a remnant of a bygone era. So what if your team, say, is facing an all-righty lineup? If a right-hander seems like the proper guy to send out there for Game 1, managers tend to do it.

"There's still a hierarchy on your pitching staff. And certainly when you have established, veteran guys, it still matters to them," said Houston Astros manager A.J. Hinch, who will use Justin Verlander on Thursday against the Tampa Bay Rays and 2018 AL Cy Young Award winner Blake Snell. "It also matters to your team. People want to name guys 'aces.'"

The choice is often an obvious one, such as for Mets-Nationals and Astros-Rays.

Other times, though, it can get complicated, and this year is no exception.

Take the Los Angeles Dodgers. Their natural pick would Clayton Kershaw, but the lefty is beginning the season on the injured list. Walker Buehler and Rich Hill were ruled out, too. So the World Series runners-up the past two years are

going with Hyun-Jin Ryu against Zach Greinke, an easier pick for the Arizona Diamondbacks. Sometimes, there's not a bevy of optimal options. Coming off a 115-loss season, the Baltimore Orioles planned to go with Alex Cobb to face the New York Yankees on Thursday, before the righty had groin soreness in his final exhibition tuneup Sunday. Cobb was 5-15 with a 4.90 ERA in 2018.

Fact is, Baltimore's top two other starters — "top" being relative, of course — also each took at least 15 Ls a year ago. Yankees manager Aaron Boone counters with Masahiro Tanaka, because Luis Severino is sidelined with right shoulder inflammation.

It'll be Tanaka's fourth start in the past five opening days for New York, which went 0-3 in his others.

"Obviously, if you're given the opportunity to pitch on that day, you want to go out and do your best," Tanaka said through a translator. "If you look back, I don't think I've necessarily been good on opening days."

Seattle Mariners manager Scott Servais went away from tradition for his team's opener against the Oakland Athletics in Japan last week, bypassing Felix Hernandez, who had made 10 consecutive Game 1 starts, the longest active streak in the majors and surpassed by only four pitchers in history (Hall of Famer Jack Morris holds the record of 14 in a row).

Hernandez, the 2010 AL Cy Young Award winner, boasts a 1.53 ERA in opening day appearances but struggled this spring, to the tune of a 15.95 ERA.

"We try to take as much of the emotion out of it as you can," Servais said, "and do what's best for our ballclub."

Still, King Felix did not hide his displeasure at giving up a slot he'd held for a full decade. Instead, Marco Gonzalez and Yusei Kikuchi started for Seattle in the two overseas games that officially got the season going.

As much as getting that initial pitching assignment clearly counts for something to many, Houston's Hinch knows the next 161 games are equally valuable in the standings.

"We should continue to make it a big deal to start on opening day," Hinch said. "And we should make it a bigger deal to take your 33, 34 starts and go wire-to-wire."

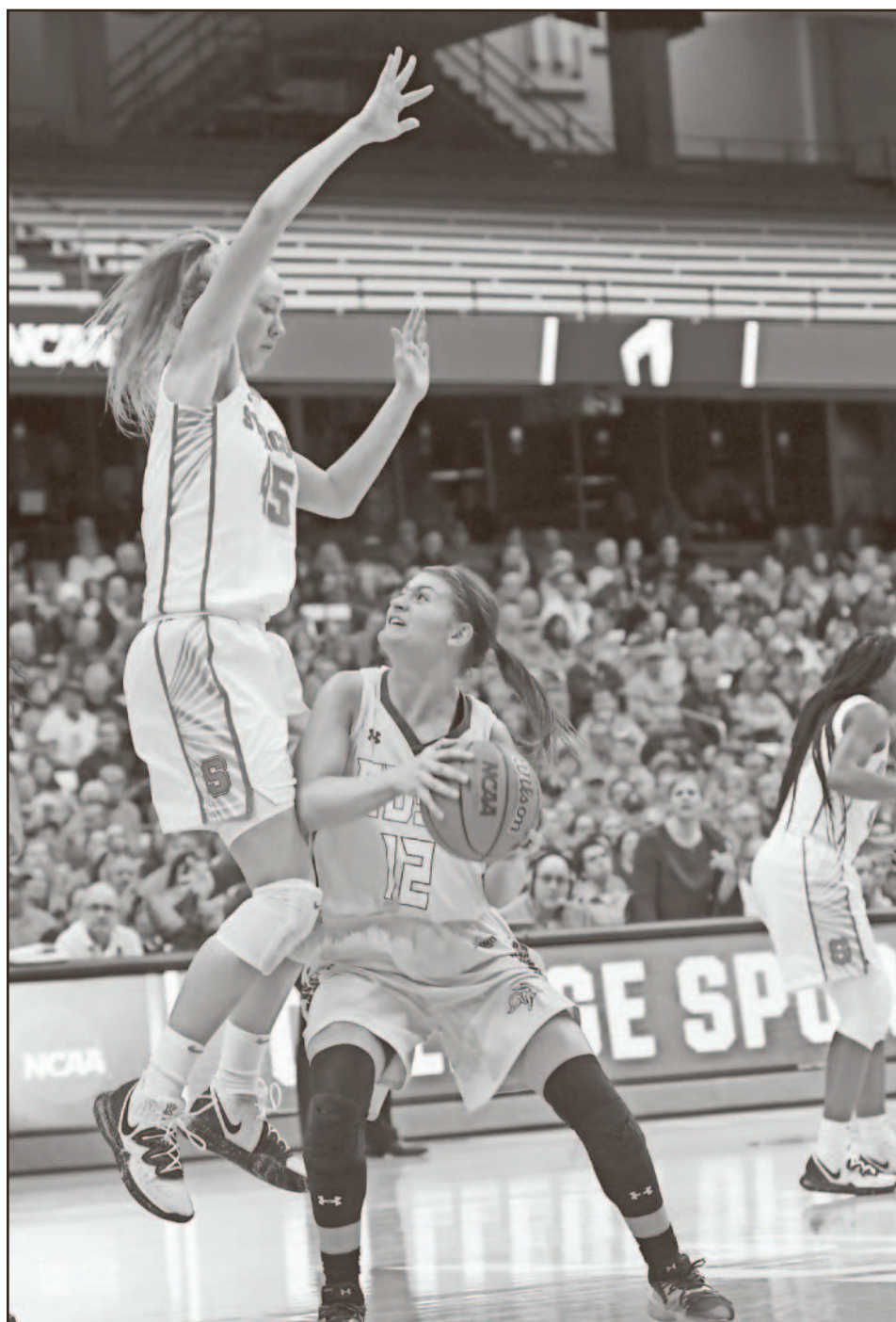
